EAST INDIA. ACCOUNTS AND ESTIMATES, 1887-88.

Memorandum by the Under Secretary of State for India, relating to the Accounts of the Government of India for 1885–86, and the Estimates for 1886–87 and 1887–88.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

The Gross Revenue and Expenditure of the Government of India for the three years are as follows. The figures of the Revised Estimate for 1886-87 are taken from No. 179, which differs from the Financial Statement, owing to the Revenue and Expenditure in England being corrected to the end of the year.

Apart from other considerations, the Revenue and Expenditure of the country are continually increasing through the opening of additional railways and canals; and, therefore, a clearer view of the financial condition may be gathered by a reference to the net Revenue and Expenditure (in the form given at page 64 of the Financial Statement); the net Revenue being the amount received from the principal sources, after deducting the cost of collection, &c., and the net Expenditure being the charges of the various departments, after deducting the receipts of those departments. The following are the net figures:—

As explained last year, the principal causes of the variation from the Budget were, the extraordinary military preparations which, under the designation of the Quetta Field Force, involved a net Expenditure of Rx 2,116,000, the Expedition to Burma which cost Rx 605,000, and the increased Political charges which were Rx 484,000 in excess of the Budget Estimate.

Compared with the Revised Estimate, the Account shows an improvement of Rx 509,314 in the net Revenue, of which Rx 169,216 occurs under Land Revenue, Rx 80,334 under Opium, Rx 114,674 under Salt, Rx 77,658 under Provincial Rates, and Rx 67,432 under other heads. The net Expenditure is increased by Rx 458,636, owing to the augmentation of the Army charges by Rx 296,279, Superannuation by Rx 128,140, and the unspent allotments to Provincial Governments by Rx 409,982, while under Buildings and Roads there is a reduction of Rx 289,946, and under other heads of Rx 85,819.

In 1885-86 the net Expenditure was temporarily increased by Rx 2,116,000 in consequence of the organization of the Quetta Field Force, and by Rx 605,000 on account of the Burma Expedition; there was also additional expenditure on the Pay and Allowances of the Forces in India, of Rx 157,000 for the European Troops (of which about Rx 49,000 was due to the fall in exchange), and Rx 150,000 for the Native Army, and also Rx 40,000 for other charges. In England the payments for Ordnance stores were increased by £287,000, and for other stores by £181,000, while the charge for Exchange was greater by Rx 194,000; but the other payments were reduced by £745,000, mainly owing to the new system of paying, on account of the British Troops serving in India, only the amount of pension accruing in the year, instead of the capitalized value of all pensions granted during the year.

In 1886-87 the charges in India exceed those of 1885-86 (excluding the Quetta Field Force) by Rx 985,000, of which Rx 555,000 is due to the Burma Expedition; the permanent increase of the Army causes an additional charge of about Rx 500,000 for the British Troops (including Rx 51,000 due to the fall in exchange), and of Rx 265,000 for the Native Army, but in other directions a net saving of Rx 335,000 was effected; in England the sterling expenditure is reduced by £92,000, but the charge for Exchange is increased by Rx 187,000.

In 1887-88 the Expenditure in India is reduced by Rx 440,000 on account of the Burma Expedition, and increased by Rx 345,000 for the permanent charge (including Rx 161,000 on account of the additional pay of the European troops owing to the fall in exchange), to which must be added Rx 25,000 for other charges. The sterling Expenditure in England is increased by £210,000, of which £118,000 is for Non-Effective Charges, £110,000 for Stores, and £30,000 for deferred pay, while there is a reduction of £48,000 in Transport and other services; the Exchange is, moreover, increased by Rx 62,000.

The additional length sanctioned in 1886-87 was 450 miles, of which 225 were on the Toungoo-Mandalay Extension, 124 on the Mysore line, 67 on the Junagarh Railway in Kathiawar, 21 on the Gaekwar's line from Mehsana to Wadnagar, and 13 on other lines. The length opened in 1886-87 was 1,025 miles, of which 251 were on the Southern Mahratta Railways, 276 on the North-Western system, 37 on the Bilaspur-Etawa, 20 on the Tirhoot, and 55 on the Lucknow-Sitapur line; 42 on the Indian Midland, 73 on the Bengal and North-Western, and 41 on the West of India Portuguese Company's Railway; 87 on the Nizam's, 60 on the Jodhpore, 44 on the Wadhwan-Morvi, and 21 on the Gaekwar's line from Mehsana to Wadnagar; and 18 on other lines.
