EAST INDIA: ACCOUNTS AND ESTIMATES, 1899-1900.

Memorandum by the Secretary of State for India, relating to the Accounts of the Government of India for 1897-98, and the Estimates for 1898-99 and 1899-1900.

[Note.—With the view of marking clearly the difference between Pounds sterling and Tens of Rupees, the notation of \pounds for the former and Rx for the latter is adopted in the Accounts and Estimates.]

GROSS REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

The Gross Revenue and Expenditure of the Government of India for the three years are as follows :----

NET REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

Apart from other considerations, the Revenue and Expenditure of the country are continually increasing through the opening of additional railways and canals; and, therefore, a clearer view of the financial condition may be gathered by a reference to the net Revenue and Expenditure as shown in the form given in the return of Income and Expenditure laid before the House of Commons (No. 80 of 1899), and in Appendix E to the Financial Statement; the net Revenue being the amount received from the principal sources, after deducting the refunds and assignments chargeable thereon, and, in the case of opium, the cost of cultivation and manufacture; while the net Expenditure represents the charges of the various departments, after deducting the receipts of those departments. The following are the net figures :---

Comparison of Ac-Budget Estimate.

The variations from the Budget Estimate resulted in a reduction of the net count with Revenue by Rx 314,391, and an increase of the net Expenditure by Rx 2,580,820, making the result worse by Rx 2,895,211.

The decrease of Rx 314,391 in the net Revenue is attributable to reductions of Table I., page 11. Rx 372,555 under Opium, Rx 197,516 under Excise, and Rx 127,062 under Salt, while there were improvements of Rx 178,333 in Customs, Rx 101,560 in Provincial Rates, and Rx 102,849 under other heads. The result was a deficiency of Rx 869,170 on Imperial Account, and a gain of Rx 554,779 by the Provincial Governments.

The increase of Rx 2,580,820 in the net Expenditure arose from three main causes, war, famine, and plague. in India the Army Charges were increased by Rx 3,398,907; the cost of Famine Relief exceeded the Budget provision by Rx 1,694,205; and the Medical Charges were enhanced by Rx 260,878. On the other hand, the net charge on the Railway Revenue Account was reduced by Rx 766,551; in Irrigation there was an improvement of Rx 415,025; and under other heads of Rx 172,829; so that the expenditure in India was, on the whole, increased by Rx 3,999,585. In England the charge was higher than had been estimated by £77,563; but the Exchange was reduced by Rx 1,496,328, owing to the remittances being effected at 15.354d. instead of the Budget rate of 14.46d. the rupee. Of the total increase, Rx 2,026,041 fell on Imperial revenues, and Rx 554,779 on the Provincial balances.

Comparison of Account with Revised Estimate. and IV., page 12.

Compared with the Revised Estimate, the net Revenue was worse by Rx 214,191, or rather more than one-third of 1 per cent., and the net Expenditure less by Rx 138,080, or not quite one-quarter of 1 per cent. The approximate accounts published in India at the end of May 1898 showed an anticipated deficit of 'Tables III. Rx 5,307,000.

1898-99.

The following table gives a comparison of the Revised Estimate for 1898-99 with the Budget Estimate published in March 1898 :---

There is an estimated increase of Rx 1,658,200 in the net Revenue, and a Comparireduction of Rx 1,509,800 in the net Expenditure, so that it is anticipated that son of the position will be better by Rx 3,168,000.

Budget \mathbf{with} Revised Estimate.

In the net Revenue the estimated increase of Rx 1,658,200 arises thus : the net Table V., receipts from Opium were better by Rx 655,400; Salt by Rx 305,500; Customs page 13. by Rx 331,000; and other heads by Rx 366,300.

Of the reduction of Rx 1,509,800 in the net Expenditure, the rise in the Table VI., estimated value of the rupee from 15.385d. to 16d. accounted for Rx 1,070,600 in page 13. the Exchange on the sterling Expenditure. Apart from this, there were reductions in India of Rx 848,000 in the Railway Revenue Account, Rx 226,900 in Irrigation, Rx 520,800 under Army, chiefly owing to the early cessation of the military operations, Rx 247,600 in Military and Civil Works, and Rx 167,700 in the cost of the Collection of the Revenue; while there were increases of Rx 141,600 under Telegraph, and Rx 329,100 in the Medical Charges, with a diminution of Rx 244,400 under other heads; and in the adjustments with the Provincial Governments there was an increase of Rx 834,700, in addition to special payments amounting to Rx 700,000 on account of their expenditure in connection with the famine and plague. In England the charges were reduced by £189,200. The result is that, while the Imperial Expenditure was diminished by Rx 2,791,300, the Provincial Governments contributed less than had been expected by Rx 1,281,500, so that the net Expenditure charged on the Revenue was lessened by Rx 1,509,800.

> The reduction in the Budget for the current year of Rx 599,600 in the net Revenue from the amount in the Revised Estimate of 1898-99 is due mainly to a

diminution by Rx 282,500 of the receipts from salt, chiefly in Madras, where the Excise receipts on that article were unusually large in 1898-99, and by Rx 261,400 in those from Customs, as it is expected that the exports of rice and the imports of silver and oils will fall off.

The total Net Expenditure, Imperial and Provincial, in 1899-1900 is expected Table to be larger than in the Revised Estimate for 1898-99 by Rx 1,869,800. VIII., The special grants, amounting to Rx 700,000, made to the Provincial Govern-^{page 14.} ments last year, are in the Budget devoted to Expenditure on Civil Works, under which head there is an increase of Rx 843,800; the charges for collection of Revenue are enhanced by Rx 310,100; for the Civil Departments, chiefly Medical, Police, and Law and Justice, by Rx 640,100; for Military and Special Defence Works, by Rx 110,600, for Invition by Rx 123,300, and under Defence Works by Rx 119,600; for Irrigation by Rx 123,300; and under other heads by Rx 119,800; but owing to the cessation of the Military operations on the North West Frontier, there is a net reduction under Army of Rx 286,900. But, while in 1898–99 payments to the Provincial Governments are included amounting to Rx 1,417,900 in excess of their Expenditure, the Budget for 1899-1900 contemplates that Rx 924,700 of the total Expenditure will be defrayed from their balances, so that the addition of these two sums, amounting to Rx 2,342,600, comes as a credit to the Imperial Government in the comparison of the two years, and the net Expenditure charged on the Revenue of the year is reduced by Rx 472,800.

Setting this reduction against that in the Net Revenue, it will be seen that, on the whole, the Imperial position is worse by Rx 126,800 than in the previous year.

Review of the last Three Years.

The Budget for 1899-1900 shews an improvement over the Account for 1896-97 Tables IX., of Rx 5,637,622. The Net Revenue is increased by Rx 4,188,715, of which the pages 15 bulk occurs through the Land Revenue being better by Rx 3,675,515, chiefly and 16. owing to the recovery in the North West Provinces, and to the receipt of about Bx 1,400,000 on account of arrows temporarily arrows ded ded to the receipt of about Rx 1,400,000 on account of arrears temporarily suspended during the famine. Provincial rates are more by Rx 419,148, Salt by Rx 324,457, Excise by Rx 168,899, Customs by Rx 167,916, and other heads by Rx 9,004, except Opium in which there is a reduction of Rx 576,224. The Net Expenditure is reduced by Rx 1,448,907; in India the charges are less by Rx 593,674, in England they are heavier by £829,529, and the Exchange is lower by Rx 1,684,762. In India the Railway Revenue Account and Irrigation are better, owing to the improved receipts, by Rx 1,206,895 and Rx 214,922 respectively; the Famine Expenditure is reduced by Rx 982,871, the Army charges by Rx 341,520, and Interest by Rx 405,199; but the Expenditure under the head of Medical is increased by Rx 616,606, on Police by Rx 143,539, and in other Civil Departments by Rx 146,616, on the Collection of the Revenue by Rx 293,370, on Civil, Military, and Special Defence Works by Rx 1,047,028, on Superannuation The increase in England is by Rx 111,544, and on other heads by Rx 199,030. under Interest £305,591, Army £292,362, Railway Revenue Account £144,963, and in other respects $\pounds 86,613$.

In 1896–97 Bills and Telegraphic Transfers on India were drawn to the amount of Rs. 25,78,70,106 realizing $\pm 15,526,547$, at an average rate of 14.451 pence per rupee. In 1899–1900 the Estimate is that $\pounds 17,000,000$ will be obtained by the sale, at 15.75 pence per rupee, of bills, &c., amounting to Rs. 25,90,47,619, or almost the same as in 1896-97; but the improvement in the rate of Exchange, Table if realized, will relieve the finances in various ways to the extent of about XIII. Rx 2,430,000.

Famine Relief and Insurance.

The system of Famine Insurance has been explained on previous occasions. Table XII., At first a provision of Rx 1,500,000 a year was devoted to the reduction or page 17. avoidance of debt, after meeting the small outlay needed in relief of distress; but in 1894-95 it was decided that Rx 1,000,000 would be a sufficient appropriation.

Under these arrangements the outlay from 1881-82 to 1895-96 was, on relief Rx 320,664, on protective works Rx 11,996,221, and, in reduction or avoidance of debt Rx 5,327,299, making a total of Rx 17,644,184.

In the Budget for 1896–97 the usual provision of Rx 1,000,000 was made; but a most severe famine arose, and it became necessary not only to meet the direct outlay on relief, but also to make large suspensions and remissions of The following is an estimate of the net cost which fell on the Governrevenue. ment in various ways through this terrible famine, in the two years 1896-97 and 1897–98, together with the outlay on protective works during the same period.

Nearly the whole of the amount temporarily suspended in 1896–97 is expected to be received in 1898–99 and 1899–1900. The grant for Famine Relief and Insurance was raised to Rx. 1,500,000 in the Budget for 1898-99, and that amount is repeated in the present year.

Exchange.

In 1897-98 the gold value of the rupee was 15.354d., and the charge for Exchange Rx 10,562,301. In the Revised Estimate for 1898-99 the average rate was taken at 16d. (it actually proved to be 15.978d.), and the charge reduced to Rx 9,253,600. In the Budget for 1899-1900 the Government of India, in order to avoid the appearance of being too sanguine, have taken what they term the "modest estimate" of $15\frac{3}{4}d$., at which rate the charge is calculated to be Rx 9,686,500.

Home Charges.

The net Expenditure in England chargeable to Revenue is shown as £16,004,601 in 1897-98, £16,091,200 in the Revised Estimate for 1898-99, and £16,324,500

Besides this, the outlay on stores, &c., for the construction of Railways and Irrigation Works is £815,583 in 1897-98, £791,100 in 1898-99, and £682,100 in 1899-1900.

Railways and Irrigation Works.

On the 31st of March 1899 the length of Railways in India open for traffic was Table XV., 651 miles, of which 1,452 were opened in 1898–99. The total length page 19. 22,651 miles, of which 1,452 were opened in 1898-99. sanctioned was 26,081 miles, of which 541 were sanctioned during that year.

A programme was approved for the three years from April 1, 1896, to March 31, 1899, involving the construction of 5,055 miles of railway, estimated to cost Rx 29,665,000, either by the State, or by Companies the interest on whose outlay is guaranteed by the Government; the amount spent is, however, now calculated at only Rx 27,592,000, namely, Rx 8,658,800 in 1896-97, .Rx 8,144,300 in 1897-98, and Rx 10,788,900 according to the estimate for 1898-99. A new programme for three years has now been sanctioned, amounting to Rx 20,322,100 in the current and the two following years, on a length of 3,825 miles. This is exclusive of lines classed as urgent but not yet sanctioned, and of those to be made by private companies on branch or feeder line terms and by native States, together estimated to amount to a length of 2,045 miles at a cost of Rx 14,168,700.

The net return in India on the capital cost of the open lines was 5.20 per cent. in 1896; the receipts were seriously affected by the Famine and Plague in both 1896 and 1897, and in the latter year the return fell to 5.08 per cent. In 1898 they improved greatly, and the percentage rose to 5.30.

The net charge in the Railway Revenue Account fell from Rx 2,659,981 in 1896-97 to Rx 1,432,616 in 1897-98. In the Revised Estimate for 1898-99 it is again greatly reduced, being Rx 878,100; and in the Budget for 1899-1900 it is estimated at Rx 880,600, of which Rx 292,900 represents the redemption of capital which is included in the annuities issued for the purchase of guaranteed railways.

The Famine, which in other respects was so disastrous, caused a great improve- Table ment in the revenue from Irrigation, and in 1897–98 there was a net receipt XVI. of Rx 425,779. In 1898–99 there was, as expected, a smaller demand for the page 20. supply of water, and the net receipt is estimated at Rx 239,600; while in 1899–1900 it is taken at only Rx 116,300. The capital outlay on Irrigation Works, including sums spent from revenue, was Rx 742,663 in 1897–98, and is estimated at Rx 722,600 in 1898–99 and Rx 896,600 in 1890–1900 is estimated at Rx 722,600 in 1898–99, and Rx 896,600 in 1899–1900.

The total outlay on railways and irrigation works is calculated at Rx 10,095,306 Table in 1897-98, Rx 10,931,700 in 1898-99, and Rx 10,195,300 in 1899-1900, XVII., of which Rx 9,352,643 in 1897-98, Rx 10,209,100 in 1898-99, and Rx 9,298,700 page 21. in 1899–1900, is on railways.

Debt.

In 1897-98 a loan was raised for the prosecution of railways in India, bearing Table interest at $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., to the amount of Rx 3,000,000, at an average price of XVIII. Rs 98 "5 "3 per cent., and debt was discharged to the extent of Rx 419,419. page 21. In England, India 21 per cent. stock to the amount of $\pm 3,500,000$ was issued, at an average price of ± 96 15s. 11d. per cent. ; $\pm 0,000,000$ was also raised by India (sterling) bills, at average rates varying from £2 4s. 5d. to £2 15s. 2d. per cent. per annum, while £1,000,000 of such bills was paid off; and £2,802 of outstanding 4 per cent. stock was discharged, in addition to $\pm 105,751$ of stock cancelled by the operation of sinking funds.

In 1898-99 a loan of Rx 1,200,000 was raised in India, bearing interest at 3] per cent., at an average price of Rs 94 ,, 12 ,, 6, and debt was discharged to the amount of Rx 245,200. In England $\pm 6,000,000$ of India 2] per cent. stock was issued, at an average price of ± 88 10s. 5d., realizing a net amount of £5,297,700; and £3,000,000 India $3\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. debentures, £384,700 Oude and Rohilkund Railway 4 per cent. debenture stock, and £200 of outstanding India 4 per cent. stock, were discharged. Of the £6,000,000 India (sterling) bills which fell due, only £4,500,000 were replaced by similar bills, at average rates of $\pounds 2$ 2s. 6d. and $\pounds 2$ 12s.

The estimate for 1899–1900 does not provide for any additional loans in England or in India, and it is expected that Rx 190,000 of Rupee Debt will be discharged.

The Exports of merchandise in 1898-99 were exceeded in 1895-96, when they amounted to Rx 114,334,738, but in no other year were they so much as 109 millions. Including treasure, the exports were Rx 120,212,602, or more than a million and a half in excess of those of 1895-96, in which year the amount was the largest hitherto on record. The Imports of merchandise, Rx 72,110,716, were not relatively large; but with treasure they amounted to Rx 90,006,329, which has only twice been exceeded, in 1890-91 when exchange rose suddenly owing to action in the United States, and 1893-94 when the Indian mints were closed. The surplus of Exports, Rx 30,206,273, has been three times exceeded, in 1892-93, 1894-95, and 1895-96. Never before has so large an amount of gold as Rx 6,503,408 been absorbed by India in a single year.

Assets and Liabilities.

Table XX., page 25. t

Taking as assets the value of the railways and irrigation works constructed by the State, as shown by the capital outlay upon them, the amounts lent to port trusts and other corporations, landholders, &c., and the cash balance in hand, and as liabilities the debt and other obligations, the Government of India had, according to the estimates, on the 31st of March 1899, a surplus of assets over liabilities in Indian currency amounting to Rx 32,010,000. On the other hand, if against the debt in England are set the sterling value of the purchased railways constructed by Companies, advances made to Railway Companies, and the cash balance, there is an excess of liabilities in sterling amounting to $\pm 53,029,000$.

Burden of Taxation.

If the taxation proper be divided over the population of British India, without making any deduction on account of the portion derived from Salt, Excise, Customs, &c., which must fall on the inhabitants of the Native States, the burden of taxation per head in the Budget for 1899–1900 is R 1 ,, 4 ,, 5, which, at the exchange value of 16 pence per rupee, is equal to not quite 1s. $8\frac{1}{2}d$. If to this be added the amount of the Land Revenue, the average is raised to R 2 ,, 6 ,, 7, or about 3s. $2\frac{1}{2}d$.
