EAST INDIA ACCOUNTS AND ESTIMATES, 1900-1901.

Memorandum by the Secretary of State for India, relating to the Accounts of the Government of India for 1898-99, and the Estimates for 1899-1900 and 1900-1901.

FORM OF ACCOUNT.

From 1884-85 to 1898-99, the Accounts of the Government of India were rendered so as to shew the transactions in India in tens of rupees, the notation of Rx being substituted for £ in 1886-87; those in England were given in sterling, and a column of Exchange was added under the several heads, the effect of which was to bring the whole into tens of rupees, as exhibited in a final column. Sovereigns having now been made legal tender in India, and being at present interchangeable with rupees at the rate of 1 to 15 (equal to 16 pence per rupee), the Government of India have altered the form of the Accounts.

Beginning with the year 1899–1900, the Accounts are to be prepared so as to shew the transactions in India in rupees; the totals of these transactions will then be shewn in pounds at the rate of 1 to 15; the sterling transactions in England will next be stated; and the last two sets of figures will be added together, so as to shew in pounds the combined transactions in India and in England. Thus, whereas formerly the English transactions were brought into tens of rupees by adding the exchange, under the new plan the Indian transactions will be converted into pounds and added to those in sterling.

The comparatively small addition or deduction on account of exchange resulting from the facts that the remittances are not effected at exactly 16 pence to the rupee, and that the Government is under obligations to carry out various transactions at specific rates, will be included in a single line, under the head of Exchange, in the miscellaneous group of Revenue or Expenditure. In the Appendix to the Financial Statement, the Government of India have recast the Account for 1898–99 into the new form, for comparison with the Estimates.

GROSS REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

NET REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

Apart from other considerations, the Revenue and Expenditure of the country are continually increasing through the opening of additional railways and canals; and, therefore, a clearer view of the financial condition may be gathered by a reference to the net Revenue and Expenditure as shown in the form given in the return of Income and Expenditure laid before the House of Commons (No. 203 of 1900), and in Statement E appended to the Financial Statement; the net Revenue being the amount received from the principal sources, after deducting

the refunds and assignments chargeable thereon, and, in the case of opium, the cost of cultivation and manufacture; while the net Expenditure represents the charges of the various departments, after deducting the receipts of those departments. The following are the net figures:—

1898-99.

For the year 1898-99, the following table gives a comparison of the net Revenue and Expenditure as laid before the House in the Estimates and Account, when adjusted for comparison with the form now adopted:—

Comparison of Account with Budget Estimate.

The variations from the Budget Estimate resulted in an increase of the net Revenue by £1,584,517, and a reduction of the net Expenditure by £462,056, making the result better by £2,046,573.

Table I., page 10.

The increase of £1,584,517 in the net Revenue is attributable to improvements of £613,428 in Exchange, £452,908 under Opium, £255,957 under Salt, £157,530 in Customs, £95,784 under Miscellaneous, and £81,710 under Forest, while there were reductions of £62,489 in Land Revenue, and £10,311 under other heads.

Table II., page 10.

The reduction of £462,056 in the net Expenditure occurred thus:—The Railway Revenue Account was better by £542,935, chiefly through the receipts of the Guaranteed Lines; the Army Charges were reduced by £535,558, the military operations having terminated sooner than was expected; Interest was less by £206,037; Irrigation by £169,660; the cost of the Collection of Revenue by £145,451; and Civil Works by £132,145; while there were increases of £65,885 under Telegraph; 58,743 under Famine Relief and Insurance; £49,213 under Civil Departments; and £39,855 under other heads; and the Provincial and Local balances were augmented by £1,056,034.

Comparison of Ac-Revised Estimate. Tables III. and IV., page 11.

Compared with the Revised Estimate, the net Revenue was worse by £171,583, or rather more than two-fifths of 1 per cent., and the net Expenditure less by count with £106,156, or about one-quarter of 1 per cent.

1899-1900.

The following table gives a comparison of the Revised Estimate for 1899-1900 with the Budget Estimate published in March 1899, when re-cast in the new

There is an estimated reduction of £351,200 in the net Revenue, and of Compari-£282,200 in the net Expenditure, so that it is anticipated that the position will son of be worse by £69,000.

with Revised Estimate.

In the net Revenue the estimated decrease of £351,200 arises from the reduction Table V., of £1,189,800 in Land Revenue, and £121,500 in Provincial Rates, caused by page 12. the Famine. The receipts from Opium were better by £442,000; Mint by £286,200; Exchange by £143,000; and other heads by £88,900.

The following is an explanation of the reduction of £282,200 in the net Table VI., Expenditure. The Railway Revenue Account was better by £484,400; the Army page 12. charges were less by £817,200, owing to the absence of certain regiments from India, the stoppage of the regular transport of reliefs, and reduction in the payments for ordnance stores; Civil Works were less by £361,800; Medical by £191,900; Telegraph by £113,600; and other heads by £50,600. On the other hand, in Famine Relief and Insurance there was an increase of £2,051,000 under Relief, which was reduced to £1,319,800 by the withdrawal of grants made for protective works and avoidance of debt; and the Provincial and Local balances were increased by £417,500.

1900-1901.

The increase in the Budget for the current year of £1,010,000 in the net Revenue, over the amount in the Revised Estimate of 1899–1900, is due mainly to the improvement of £841,900 in Land Revenue, based on the hope that the famine will have disappeared in September. Opium is better by £116,200, and other heads by £51,900.

Table VIII., page 14. The total Net Expenditure, Imperial and Provincial, in 1900-1901 is expected to be larger than in the Revised Estimate for 1899-1900 by £3,754,100. The charge for Famine Relief and Insurance is heavier by £1,295,400; the Army effective charges by £1,205,700, owing mainly to the high price of food, the rearmament of the native troops with the Lee-Enfield rifle, the measures for improving the Commissariat Transport Department, and the expected resumption of the

transport of reliefs for India; the Railway Revenue Account by £477,000, partly" in consequence of the purchase of the Great Indian Peninsula Railway, and partly because it is not thought prudent to reckon on a continuance of last year's exceptional traffic; Civil Departments by £305,200, chiefly Law and Justice, Police, and Minor Departments (Census); Collection of Revenue by £165,800; Telegraph by £106,400, through capital outlay; Civil Works by £105,300; and other heads £93,300. But of this excess the Provincial Governments are to defray £351,600 from their balances, so that the increase falling on the Imperial Government is it £3,402,500.

Deducting from this the increase of £1,010,000 in the Net Revenue, it/will be ! seen that, on the whole, the Imperial position is worse by £2,392,500 than in the I previous year.

Review of the last Three Years.

The Budget for 1900-1901 shews an improvement of £3,733,107 over the Account Tables IX., for 1897-98. The Net Revenue is increased by £3,180,121, of which the bulk occurs under three heads; Land Revenue, which is better by £946,684, mainly pages 15 owing to the recovery after the famine of 1897-98 in the North-West Provinces, and to improvements in Burma and Madras; Opium, which gives £928,659 more, the qui chests sold at Calcutta being increased by 5,400, and the average price higher by 177 rupees per chest, while an enhancement of 8,075 chests is expected in the exports from Bombay; and Exchange, which is better by £656,257, the gold value of the rupee having risen from 15.354 to 16 pence. Of the remainder, £160,211 is in Excise, £158,346 under Mint, owing to the coinage of rupees. £130,426 in Provincial Rates, £108,075 in Salt, and £91,463 under other heads. The Net Expenditure is reduced by £552,986, the charges in India being less by £1,627,723, while in England they are increased by £1,074,737. The reduction in India arises mainly from the absence of Military Operations, which in the former year cost £2,565,300, and on the whole the Army charges are less by £2,145,072; the Railway Revenue Account, owing to larger receipts, is improved by £572,198; the charge for Interest is less by £291,161, owing to the transfer of Debt to the Public Works portion; and that for Famine Relief and Insurance is diminished by £205,303. On the other hand, the Expenditure on Civil Works is greater by £542,615, chiefly in Burma, Civil Departments £476,250, Collection of Revenue £249,486, Irrigation £178,116, Telegraph £123,468, and other heads £261,557; but of the increase the Provincial Governments meet £245,481 from their balances. Taking Revenue and Expenditure together, the position in India is better by £4,800,006. Against this, however, has to be set the increase of £1,066,899 in England, of which £466,375 is for Ordnance Stores and other military purposes, £348,285 is on the Railway Revenue Account, £114,656 under Civil Departments, chiefly on account of the building of a new troopship, and £145,421 on Furlough, Superannuation, Telegraph, and other heads, while the receipts are better by £7,838.

Famine Relief and Insurance.

The system of Famine Insurance has been explained on previous occasions. At Table XII. first a provision was made of 15,000,000 rupees a year which, after meeting the page 17. small outlay needed in relief of distress, was devoted to the reduction or avoidance. of debt; but in 1894-95 it was decided that 10,000,000 rupees would be ave sufficient appropriation. Under these arrangements the outlay from 1881-82 to 1895–96 was, on relief £213,825, on protective works £7,997,261, and in reduction or avoidance of debt £3,551,533, making a total of £11,762,619.

The years 1896-97 and 1897-98 were marked by a very wide-spread famine, during which the cost of relief was extremely heavy. In 1898-99 the grant was about 15,000,000 rupees or £1,000,000; and in the Budget for 1899-1900 the allotment was a similar sum, which has been determined to be the provision that should be made in normal years. Owing, however, to another extremely severe famine, the expenditure in the Revised Estimate has been raised to £2,162,400; and in the Budget for 1900-1901 it is taken at £3,505,400. The further cost, owing to loss of revenue and to payments in compensation for dearness of provisions, &c., is estimated at £1,820,000 in 1899-1900, and £1,280,000 in 1900-01. Besides this, loans to Native States and agricultural advances are being made, which were estimated at £571,700 last year, and £633,000 this year; but it is expected that the last figure

will be exceeded. Altogether the drain on the balances, as shewn in the Estimates, is £4,446,500 in 1899-1900, and £5,248,300 in 1900-01, against which may be set some improvement in the railway and irrigation receipts.

Exchange.

Table XIII., - page 17.

Owing to the alteration in the form of the Accounts explained on page 3, and the slight variations in the gold value of the rupee from the rate of 16 pence which has been adopted, the entry under Exchange has become of minor importance. In the Account for 1898-99 there is a receipt of £28,628; in the Revised Estimate for 1899-1900 a charge of £70,000; and in the Budget for 1900-1901 a receipt of £12,100. This is, however, exclusive of the payments in India as compensation to the European troops and the officers, on account of the fall in the value of the rupee from its former rate to 16d.

Home Charges.

Table XIV., page 18. The net Expenditure in England chargcable to Revenue is shown as £16,060,636 in 1898-99, £16,249,700 in the Revised Estimate for 1899-1900, and £17,071,500 in the Budget for 1900-1901. The last-named amount is thus divided:—

Besides this, the outlay on stores, &c., for the construction of Railways and Irrigation Works is £770,160 in 1898-99, and is estimated at £644,000 in 1899-1900, and £913,500 in 1900-1901.

Railways and Irrigation Works.

Table XV., page 119.

On the 31st of March 1900 the length of Railways in India open for traffic was 23,780 miles, of which 1,275 were opened in 1899-1900. The total length sanctioned was 26,782 miles, of which 711 were sanctioned during that year.

The Expenditure on Railway Construction for which the Government undertakes financial responsibility or gives a direct guarantee amounted to £5,894,746 in 1898-99, and is estimated at £6,188,500 in 1899-1900, and £4,872,300 in 1900-1901. This, however, does not include Expenditure by branch line Companies not in receipt of a direct guarantee, or by those whose transactions are outside the Government accounts, nor outlay from Provincial and Local Revenues on local lines; if these are added, the total expenditure becomes £6,944,649 in 1898-99, £6,853,700 in 1899-1900, and £5,396,600 in 1900-1901.

The net return in India on the capital cost of the open lines was 5.08 per cent. in 1897, when the receipts were seriously affected by the Famine and Plague. In 1898 they improved greatly, and the percentage rose to 5.37; and in 1899 it

The net charge in the Railway Revenue Account was £620,165 in 1898-99. In 1899-1900 there was almost an equilibrium, the net charge according to the Revised Estimate being only £8,400, after including £221,700 on account of the redemption of capital which is contained in the annuities issued for the purchase of guaranteed railways. For 1900-1901 it has been thought imprudent to reckon on so good receipts, and the charges are increased by the purchase of the Great Indian Peninsula Railway; the net charge on Railway Revenue account is estimated at £485,400, of which £402,000 represents redemption of capital.

The Famine, which in many other respects was so disastrous, caused a great improvement in the revenue from Irrigation, and in 1898-99 and 1899-1900 the net XVI. receipt was £179,760 and £173,400 respectively. For 1900-1901 it is taken at page 20. only £105,800. The capital outlay on Irrigation Works, including sums spent from revenue, was £453,047 in 1898-99, and is estimated at £622,733 in 1899-1900, and £708,200 in 1900-1901, the grant having been specially increased.

The total outlay on railways and irrigation works is calculated at £6,934,885 in Table 1898-99, £7,092,300 in 1899-1900, and £5,662,000 in 1900-1901, of which XVII £6,490,848 in 1898-99, £6,469,600 in 1899-1900, and £4,953,800 in 1900-1901. page 21. is on railways.

` Debt.

In 1898-99 a loan of £800,000 was raised in India, bearing interest at 3½ per Table cent., at an average rate of 945 per cent., and debt was discharged to the amount XVIII. of £160,624. In England £6,000,000 of India 2½ per cent. stock was issued, page 21. at an average price of £88 10s. · 5d., realizing a net amount of £5,297,654; and £3,000,000 India 3½ per cent. debentures, £383,500 Oude and Rohilkund Railway 4 per cent. debenture stock, and £478 of outstanding India 4 per cent. stock, were discharged. Of the £6,000,000 India (sterling) bills which fell due, only £4,500,000 were replaced by similar bills, at average rates of £2 2s. 6d. and £2 12s.

In 1899–1900 there was a slight reduction of the debt, both in India and in England; and £6,500,000 of India sterling bills, which fell due, were replaced by similar bills, at average rates varying from £2 10s. 2d. to £4 2s 11d. per cent.

According to the Budget for 1900-1901, a Loan in India of £2,000,000 was to be raised at 3½ per cent., which has been effected at an average price of about 94 per cent., and £103,300 was to be discharged. In England it was estimated that the Temporary Debt would be increased by £500,000, and Sterling Bills to that amount have been issued at an average of £3 6s. 2d. per cent. When the Budget was prepared, it was not expected that it would be necessary to add to the Permanent Debt; but, owing to the expenditure in the relief of famine and the large amount of advances to the Native States, it is now probable that some issue of India Stock will be requisite.

Trade.

The following figures show the Exports from, and Imports into, India, during Table the last three years :-

The Exports of merchandise in 1899-1900 were less than in the previous year by £2,457,386, and the Imports were larger by £2,135,300; so that there was a reduction of £4,592,686 in the net Exports of merchandise. In the net Imports of treasure there was an augmentation of £1,688,738, an increase of £1,957,509 occurring in gold, while in silver there was a reduction of £268,771. The surplus of Exports, on the whole, was £13,861,245, as against £20,142,669 in 1898-99.

Assets and Liabilities.

Table XX., page 25.

Taking as assets the value of the railways and irrigation works constructed and purchased by the State, as shown by the capital outlay upon them, the amounts lent to port trusts and other corporations, landholders, &c., and advanced to railway companies, and the cash balances in hand, and as liabilities the debt and other obligations, there was, according to the estimates, on the 31st of March 1900, an excess of liabilities over assets, in India and in England, amounting to £30,261,000, or about three-fourths of the net revenue of a single year.

Burden of Taxation.

Table XXI., page 25. If the taxation proper be divided over the population of British India, without making any deduction on account of the portion derived from Salt, Excise, Customs, &c., which must fall on the inhabitants of the Native States, the burden of taxation per head in the Budget for 1899-1900 is 1s. $8\frac{1}{4}d$. If to this be added the amount of the Land Revenue, the average is raised to 3s. 2d.

EXCHANGE.

From 1884-85 to 1898-99 the Accounts were so prepared as to bring the English transactions into tens of rupees by adding the Exchange, and combining the result with the Indian transactions. As sovereigns have now been declared legal tender in India, and are at present interchangeable with rupees at the rate of 1 to 15 (equal to 16d. per rupee), it has been decided that in the Accounts, with effect from the 1st of April, 1899, the Indian transactions shall be converted into pounds at that rate, and the sterling transactions be added thereto, the result being given in pounds. But there will almost always be some addition or subtraction to be made on account of Exchange, owing to the extreme improbability that the remittances for the whole year will be effected at exactly 16d. per rupee, and to engagements to remit various sums at specified rates. There are also charges incurred in India for the increase of the pay of the European soldiers in India owing to the fall in Exchange, and for compensation to officers. In the following table the receipt (+) or charge (—) due to these several causes, during recent years, is shewn.

There is an increase in the Budget for 1900-1901, as compared with the Account for 1898-99, of £577,488 in Stores, chiefly for the Army, of £315,011 in the Railway Revenue Account, of £93,132 under Interest and Management of the Debt, and of £52,616 in the Non-Effective charges; and a reduction of £27,383 in other payments; so that the total increase in the net sterling Expenditure is £1,010,864.
