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EAST INDIA: ACCOUNTS AND ESTIMATES, 1901–1902.

Memorandum by the Secretary of State for India, relating to the Accounts of the Government of India for 1899-1900, and the Estimates for 1900-1901 and 1901-1902.

FORM OF ACCOUNT.

From 1884-85 to 1898-99, the Accounts of the Government of India were rendered so as to shew the transactions in India in tens of rupees, the notation of Rx being substituted for £ in 1886-87; those in England were given in sterling, and a column of Exchange was added under the several heads, the effect of which was to bring the whole into tens of rupees, as exhibited in a final column. Sovereigns having now been made legal tender in India, and being at present interchangeable with rupees at the rate of 1 to 15 (equal to 16 pence per rupee), the Government of India have altered the form of the Accounts.

For the year 1899-1900, the Accounts are prepared so as to shew the transactions in India in rupees; the totals of these transactions are then shewn in pounds at the rate of 1 to 15; the sterling transactions in England are next stated; and the last two sets of figures are added together, so as to shew in pounds the combined transactions in India and in England. Thus, whereas formerly the English transactions were brought into tens of rupees by adding the exchange, under the new plan the Indian transactions are converted into pounds and added to those in sterling. The comparatively small addition or deduction on account of exchange

The comparatively small addition or deduction on account of exchange resulting from the facts that the remittances are not effected at exactly 16 pence to the rupee, and that the Government is under obligations to carry out various transactions at specific rates, are included in a single line, under the head of Exchange, in the miscellaneous group of Revenue or Expenditure.

GROSS REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

The Gross Revenue and Expenditure of the Government of India for the three years are as follows :---

NET REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

Apart from other considerations, the Revenue and Expenditure of the country are continually increasing through the opening of additional railways and canals; and, therefore, a clearer view of the financial condition may be gathered by a reference to the net Revenue and Expenditure as shown in the form given in the return of Income and Expenditure laid before the House of Commons (No. 146 of 1901), and in Statement E appended to the Financial Statement (No. 171 of 1901); the net Revenue being the amount received from the principal sources, after deducting the refunds and assignments chargeable thereon, and, in the case of opium, the cost of cultivation and manufacture, and also the net

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receipts under the heads of Mint, Exchange, and Miscellaneous; while the net Expenditure represents the charges of the various departments, after deducting the receipts of those departments. The following are the net figures :---

Table II., page 12. The variations from the Budget Estimate resulted in a reduction of the net Revenue by $\pounds 406,002$, and of the net Expenditure by $\pounds 558,825$, making the result better by $\pounds 152,823$.

The reduction in the net Revenue was attributable to the Famine, Land Revenue being less by $\pounds 1,215,275$, and Provincial Rates by $\pounds 135,442$; but there were improvements of $\pounds 444,189$ under Opium, $\pounds 292,583$ under Mint, $\pounds 132,151$ in Exchange, and $\pounds 75,792$ under Customs and other heads.

The reduction of £558,825 in the net Expenditure occurred thus:—The Army Charges were reduced by £990,457, owing to the absence of regiments employed out of India, to the interruption of the transport service, to more economical arrangements on the north-west frontier, and to a diminished noneffective charge; the Railway Revenue Account was better by £569,556; there was a reduction of £337,810 under Civil Works; of £132,156 under Civil Departments; and of £120,491 under Telegraph; the cost of the Collection of Revenue was less by £95,561; of Irrigation by £58,887; and of Military Works by £44,744; and the net receipt from the Post Office was greater by £49,768. On the other hand, there was an increase of £1,345,748 under Famine Relief and Insurance; of £57,025 in Civil Furlough pay; and of £27,552 under other heads; and the Provincial and Local Balances were better than had been expected by £410,280, the Imperial Government having made to them special grants amounting to £387,500.

Compared with the Revised Estimate, the net Revenue was worse by ±54,802,

or rather less than one-seventh of 1 per cent., and the net Expenditure less by

£276,625, or about two-thirds of 1 per cent.

There is an estimated improvement of £458,700 in the net Revenue, and Comparia reduction of £1,021,400 in the net Expenditure, so that it is anticipated that $\frac{\text{son of}}{D-1}$ the position will be better by $\pounds 1,480,100$.

Budget with Revised Estimate.

In the net Revenue the estimated increase of £458,700 arises chiefly under Table V., Opium, the receipts from which are expected to be better by £552,500; Customs page 14. give an improvement of $\pounds 169,200$; Excise $\pounds 138,500$; Salt $\pounds 113,000$; Forest $\pounds 90,400$; and Stamps $\pounds 75,400$. On the other hand, there is a reduction of $\pounds 381,500$ under Land Revenue; $\pounds 159,000$ under Mint; $\pounds 50,500$ in the Provincial Rates; and £89,300 under other heads.

The following is an explanation of the reduction of $\pounds 1,021,400$ in the net Table VI., Expenditure. The Army Charges were less by £1,276,400, owing to the absence page 15. of regiments from India in South Africa and China, the stoppage of the regular transport of reliefs, and reduction in the payments for ordnance stores; the Railway Revenue Account was better by £641,600, and Irrigation by £202,100; Kallway Revenue Account was better by £641,000, and Irrigation by £202,100; Political Charges were less by £131,300, mainly owing to delay by the Amir of Afghanistan in drawing his subsidy; Telegraph by £89,400; and the Collection of Revenue by £74,200; the expenditure on Local Railways was lower by £67,000; Civil Departments (other than Political) by £53,200; Post Office by £51,300; and other heads by £69,700; while there was an increase of £181,700 under Interest, owing to the issue of £3,000,000 India Stock which had not been contemplated in the Budget; the Famine Charge was heavier by £876,700; and the Provincial and Local Balances were increased by £576,400, special grants amounting to £699 500 having been made to them by the Imperial special grants amounting to $\pounds 699,500$ having been made to them by the Imperial Government.

The reduction in the Budget for the current year of £187,500 in the net Table VII., Revenue, from the amount in the Revised Estimate of 1900-1901, is due mainly page 16. to a decrease of $\pounds 569,800$ under Opium, owing to the moderate estimate of the price in Calcutta, which is taken at only Rs. 1,100 per chest, as compared with Rs. 1,361 in the Revised Estimate for 1900–1901. There is an improvement of $\pounds 476,900$ in Land Revenue, and of $\pounds 161,000$ in Provincial Rates; but a

diminution of £119,700 under Customs, of £97,900 under Mint, and of £38,000 under other heads.

The total Net Expenditure in 1901-1902 is expected to be larger than the Table amount in the Revised Estimate for 1900-1901 by $\pounds 762,000$, notwithstanding VIII., reductions of $\pounds 3,245,000$ under Famine Relief and Insurance, $\pounds 99,100$ in Interest, and $\pounds 208,400$ under Provincial and Local Balances.⁻ The main increase is that of $\pounds 2,083,200$ in the Army Effective Charges, in consequence of the expected return of troops from South Africa and China, the re-armament of page 16. the Native Forces, improvement of the Transport Service, large purchases of ordnance stores, and other measures for increasing the efficiency of the troops; in Civil Works there is an increase of $\pm 551,900$; the Railway Revenue Account is worse by $\pm 321,000$; and Irrigation by $\pm 226,900$, as it is not thought prudent to estimate for so large receipts as in the past year; the Political charges are increased by £195,300, in anticipation that the Amir of Afghanistan will draw his full subsidy; the Collection of Revenue is heavier by £188,000; Military Works £149,400; Police £137,800; Telegraph £121,300; Scientific and Minor Departments, including the Census, £108,200; Education £77,900; Post Office £75,800; and other heads £77,800.

Combining with this the reduction of $\pounds 187,500$ in the Net Revenue, it will be seen that, on the whole, the position is worse by $\pm 949,500$ than in the previous year.

Review of the last Three Years.

The Budget for 1901-1902 shows a deterioration of £1,949,973 as compared Tables IX., with the Account for 1898-99. The Net Revenue is increased by £443,083, X.,and XI., chiefly the result of an improvement of £536,891 under Opium. The Net Expen-diture, however, is increased by £2,393,056, the charges in India being heavier by 2730,264 bit is the data where the formula of the £738,864, while in England they are enhanced by £1,654,192. The increase in India arises mainly in the groups of Civil Departments, £846,237; Civil Buildings and Roads, £843,569; and Collection of Revenue, £463,146 (towards meeting which the Provincial Balances, having received special grants of £1,096,200 from the Imperial Government, contribute an amount larger by £1,160,834); Army Effective Charges, £292,026 ; Famine Relief and Insurance, £208,458 ; Military Works, £123,208; Irrigation, £99,575; and other heads, £189,628; while the charge for Interest is reduced by £127,373, and the Railway Revenue Account is better by £1,038,776. Of the increase of £1,654,192 in England, £688,194 is for Ordnance Stores and other military purposes; £583,411 is on the Railway Revenue Account; £233,210 for Interest; £100,978 under Telegraph; and $\pounds 48,399$ under other heads.

Famine Relief and Insurance.

The system of Famine Insurance has been explained on previous occasions. At Table XII., first a provision was made of 15,000,000 rupees a year, which, after meeting the Page 20. small outlay needed in relief of distress, was devoted to the reduction or avoidance of debt; but it was subsequently decided, with effect from the 1st of April, 1894, that 10,000,000 rupees would be a sufficient appropriation. Under these arrangements the outlay from 1881-82 to 1895-96 was, on relief £213,776, on protective works £7,997,481, and in reduction or avoidance of debt £3,551,533, making a total of £11,762,790.

The years 1896-97 and 1897-98 were marked by a very serious famine, during which the cost of relief was extremely heavy. In 1898–99 the grant was about 15,000,000 rupees or £1,000,000, which was determined to be the provision that should be made in normal years. Owing, however, to a yet more widely spread famine, the expenditure in 1899–1900 was $\pounds 2,128,447$; and in the Revised Estimate for 1900–1901 it is taken at $\pounds 4,245,000$. In the Budget for 1901–02 the normal provision of $\pounds 1,000,000$ is entered. The further cost, owing to loss

of revenue and to payments in compensation for dearness of provisions, &c., aftermaking allowance for increased receipts from railways and irrigation, is estimated at £1,367,000 in 1899–1900, £1,336,000 in 1900–1901, and £367,000 in 1901–1902. Besides this, loans to Native States and agricultural advances have been made, which amounted to £1,041,000 in 1899–1900, and £3,687,000 in 1900–1901. Altogether the drain on the balances is estimated to have been $\pounds4,536,000$ in 1899-1900, and $\pounds 9,268,000$ in 1900-1901.

Owing to the alteration in the form of the Accounts explained on page 3, and the slightness of the variations in the gold value of the rupee from the rate of 16 pence, the entry under Exchange has become of minor importance. In the Account for 1899-1900 there is a charge of £80,949; in the Revised Estimate for 1900-1901 a charge of £3,300; and in the Budget for 1901-1902 a receipt of £16,000. This is, however, exclusive of the payments in India as compensation to the European troops and the officers, on account of the fall in the value of the rupee from its former rate to 16d., which amount to about $\pounds764,000$.

Home Charges.

The net Expenditure in England chargeable to Revenue is shown as $\pm 16,129,303$ in 1899-1900, £16,961,400 in the Revised Estimate for 1900-1901, and ±17,747,300 in the Budget for 1901-1902. The last-named amount is thus divided :----£

Besides this, the outlay on stores, &c., for the construction of State Railways and Irrigation Works was £615,814 in 1899-1900, and is estimated at £654,800 in 1900–1901, and £1,483,900 in 1901–1902.

Railways and Irrigation Works.

On the 31st of March 1901 the length of Railways in India open for traffic was 25,156 miles, of which 1,387 were opened in 1900-1901. The total length sanctioned was 27,175 miles, of which 392 were sanctioned during that year.

The Expenditure on Railway Construction for which the Government undertakes financial responsibility or gives a direct guarantee amounted to $\pm 5,980,876$ in 1899–1900, and is estimated at $\pm 5,556,500$ in 1900–1901, and $\pm 6,926,200$ in 1901–1902. This, however, does not include Expenditure by branch line Companies not in receipt of a direct guarantee, or by those whose transactions are outside the Government accounts, nor outlay from Provincial and Local Revenues on local lines; if these are added, the total expenditure becomes $\pm 6,595,079$ in 1899-1900, £5,861,000 in 1900-1901, and £7,392,200 in 1901-1902.

The net return in India on the capital cost of the open lines was 5.37 per cent. in 1898, and 5.39 in 1899, and in 1900 it is estimated at 5.50.

In the Railway Revenue Account there was, in 1899-1900, a net receipt, for the first time, amounting to $\pounds 76,756$, after including in the charge $\pounds 221,700$ on account of the redemption of capital which is contained in the annuities issued for the purchase of guaranteed railways. In 1900-1901 there is, according to the Revised Estimate, a net receipt of £156,200, after charging £402,000 for redemption of capital. In the Budget for 1901-1902 it is estimated that there will be a net charge of £164,800, the payments in redemption of capital amounting to. £590,100.

The Famine, which in many other respects was so disastrous, was favourable to the revenue from Irrigation, and in 1899-1900 and 1900-1901 the net receipts were $\pm 136,387$ and $\pm 307,900$ respectively. For 1901-1902 they are taken at only $\pm 81,000$. The capital outlay on Irrigation Works, including sums spent from revenue, was $\pm 627,951$ in 1899-1900, and is estimated at $\pm 625,400$ in 1900-1901, and $\pm 752,000$ in 1901-1902, the grant having been specially increased.

Debt.

In 1899-1900 there was a slight reduction of the debt, both in India and in Table England; and the India sterling bills, which fell due, were replaced by similar XVIII., bills, at average rates varying from £2 10s. 2d. to £4 2s 11d. per cent.

In 1900-1901, a Loan of three crores of rupees ($\pounds 2,000,000$) was raised in India at $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., at an average price of about 94 per cent., and $\pounds 301,900$ Temporary Debt was also incurred, while $\pounds 96,700$ of Permanent Debt was discharged. In England the Temporary Debt was increased by $\pounds 500,000$, Sterling Bills being issued to an amount of $\pounds 5,500,000$, at average rates varying from $\pounds 3$ 6s. 2d. (June) to $\pounds 3$ 17s. 8d. (December) per cent., while only $\pounds 5,000,000$ was discharged; and, owing to the expenditure in the relief of famine and the large amount of $\pounds 3,000,000$ was issued at the fixed price of $\pounds 95$ 10s. per cent.

For 1901-1902 the Budget provides in India for a Rupee Loan of two crores ($\pm 1,333,300$), and the repayment of $\pm 93,300$ Permanent and $\pm 301,900$ Temporary Debt; and in England for an issue of $\pm 1,000,000$ India Stock, and for the replacement of the Sterling Bills which fall due.

The Exports of merchandise in 1900-1901 were less than in the previous year by $\pm 879,272$, and the Imports were larger by $\pm 3,726,405$; so that there was a reduction of $\pm 4,605,677$ in the net Exports of merchandise. In the net Imports of treasure there was a reduction of $\pm 1,778,621$, an increase of $\pm 3,953,690$ occurring in silver, while in gold there was a reduction of $\pm 5,732,311$. The surplus of Exports, on the whole, was $\pm 11,013,973$, as against $\pm 13,841,029$ in 1899-1900.

The transactions in treasure on account of the Government were unusually large in 1900-1901. Owing to the demand for rupecs, silver to the value of $\pm 5,389,051$ was imported on Government account; and towards the payments for it $\pm 4,482,242$ of gold was exported.

B

Assets and Liabilities.

As the statement of Assets and Liabilities shows a considerable improve-Table XX., ment this year, owing to the purchase of an important railway undertaking by means of an annuity, it may be well to explain somewhat fully the nature of this statement. It contains only the figures which relate to capital, not those dealing with annual revenue and expenditure. The assets, in addition to sums due from corporations and railway companies and the cash balances, comprise the values of the railways and irrigation works constructed or purchased by the State; but these values are taken as being identical with the total capital outlay upon each undertaking, as shown in the capital accounts in India; they do not represent the commercial value of the undertakings, nor are they based upon the prices that it has been necessary to pay, in order to acquire those undertakings; otherwise, the assets would, of course, appear much larger. The liabilities are the debt and capital obligations which the Secretary of State has already incurred, or which he has assumed the liability to incur; but they do not take account of the annuities by means of which the undertakings have been purchased, and which, being by law charged on the revenues of India, are shown in the statement of expenditure (against the earnings of the railways shown in the statement of revenue), and are not entered in the capital account.

> On the 31st of March 1901 the assets were £216,416,000 and the liabilities £225,885,000.

Burden of Taxation.

If the taxation proper be divided over the population of British India, without making any deduction on account of the portion derived from Salt, Excise, Customs, &c., which must fall on the inhabitants of the Native States, the burden of taxation per head in the Budget for 1901-1902 is 1s. 9d. If to this be added the amount of the Land Revenue, the average is raised to 3s. 3d.

EXCHANGE.

From 1884-85 to 1898-99 the Accounts were so prepared as to bring the English transactions into tens of rupees by adding the Exchange, and combining the result with the Indian transactions. As sovereigns have now been declared legal tender in India, and are at present interchangeable with rupees at the rate of 1 to 15 (equal to 16d. per rupee), it was decided that in the Accounts, with effect from the 1st of April, 1899, the Indian transactions should be converted into pounds at that rate, and the sterling transactions be added thereto, the result being given in pounds. But there will almost always be some addition or subtraction to be made on account of Exchange, owing to the extreme improbability that the remittances for the whole year will be effected at *exactly* 16d. per rupee, and to engagements to remit various sums at specified rates. There are also charges incurred in India for the increase of the pay of the European soldiers in India owing to the fall in Exchange, and for compensation to officers. In the following table the receipt (+) or charge (-) due to these several causes, during recent years, is shewn.

There is an increase in the Budget for 1901-1902, as compared with the Account for 1899-1900, of $\pounds 1,043,506$ in Stores, almost entirely for the Army, of $\pounds 544,573$ in the Railway Revenue Account, of $\pounds 166,491$ under Interest and Management of the Debt, and of $\pounds 120,427$ in other payments, against which is to be set the grant of $\pounds 257,000$ by the Imperial Government, in consequence of the report of the Royal Commission on Indian Expenditure; so that the total increase in the net sterling Expenditure is $\pounds 1,617,997$.
