#### REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

#### Gross Revenue and Expenditure.

The Gross Revenue and Expenditure of the Government of India for the three years to which this Memorandum refers are as follows:

In these figures all receipts are included in the total of revenue and all outlay in the total of expenditure, with the one exception that the working expenses of railways and the surplus profits paid to certain railway companies are treated not as expenditure but as a deduction from revenue. Rupees have been converted into sterling throughout this Memorandum (unless otherwise stated) at the conventional rate of Rs. 15 = £1.

#### Net Revenue and Expenditure.

The figures of Gross Revenue just given include the net receipts of railways without any deduction on account of interest charges, the total receipts (without any deduction on account of interest charges, working expenses, &c.) derived from the other commercial undertakings of the Government of India (i.e., Irrigation works, Post Office and Telegraphs), and from the sale of Opium, and the receipts of certain spending departments; while the figures of Gross Expenditure include refunds and assignments, the interest charges of railways, the working expenses and interest charges of other commercial undertakings, and the cost of cultivation and manufacture of opium. This method of compiling the figures causes the revenue available for administrative purposes and the expenditure on such purposes to appear much greater than they really are

and it is accordingly the practice to present to Parliament an annual statement of Net Income and Expenditure (see H. of C. 99 of 1918), in which the net revenue derived from commercial undertakings and opium is shown instead of the gross revenue, and similar adjustments are made under other heads of revenue and expenditure by deducting (1) refunds and assignments from the gross yield of land revenue, taxation, &c., and (2) the receipts of the spending departments from the gross expenditure incurred by them. The cost of the establishments maintained for the collection of revenue is not shown as a deduction from revenue but as a separate head of expenditure. In the following table the Net Revenue and Expenditure for 1916-17, 1917-18 and 1918-19 are calculated in the same manner as in the annual Parliamentary return mentioned above.

#### Accounts, 1916-17.

It will be seen from the table that the final accounts for 1916-17 show a surplus of £7,478,170; this is better by £1,489,470 than the amount shown in the Revised Estimate for that year.

#### Revised Estimate, 1917-18.

In the Budget for 1917-18, the Government of India imposed additional taxation in order to meet the recurring liabilities consequent upon the contribution of £100,000,000 towards the cost of the War, which allowing for a sinking fund are estimated at about £6,000,000 a year. The following was the yield from this additional taxation estimated in the Budget for 1917-18.

The Revised Estimate of 1917–18 shows, as compared with the Budget of that year, increases of £9,960,900 in net revenue and £4,384,700 in net expenditure, with a resulting increase of £5,576,200 in the surplus, which thus becomes £5,711,600 as against the Budget Estimate of £135,400. #### Budget, 1918-19.

The Budget is framed upon the supposition that the War will last through the financial year and that the monsoon will be normal. No fresh taxation is imposed.

As compared with the Revised Estimate for 1917-18 these figures show a decrease of £2,317,600 in net revenue, an increase of £812,500 in net expenditure, and an estimated surplus of £2,581,500 as compared with an estimated surplus of £5,711,600.

For the purpose of calculating the burden of taxation the figures of population in the three years under review have been based on the Census of March, 1911, an annual increase of population at the rate of 1/2 per cent. being assumed.

#### DEBT TRANSACTIONS AND CAPITAL EXPENDITURE.

#### Debt.

1917-18.—£500,000 India Bonds and £1,582,500 Railway Debentures were discharged during the year. The rupee War Loan in India realised the following amounts:—

5 per cent. long-term Loan of 1929-47 8,300,000 (inclusive of amounts subscribed through the Post Office)

5 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. 3-year War Bonds ... 13,200,000 ( do., do. )

5-year Post Office Cash Certificates... 6,600,000

The above figures include about £4,000,000, which was actually received in 1916-17 as a result of the loan having opened before the commencement of the current financial year; also a little over £1,000,000 tendered in England in Treasury Bills, which were exchanged for allotments in Indian War Loan.

The amount subscribed through the Post Office (other than by way of Cash Certificates) was £2,900,000. In accordance with the announcements made last year, the proceeds of the War Loan have been made over to His Majesty's Government in part liquidation of India's War contribution of £100,000,000. The amount actually paid on this account to His Majesty's Treasury during the year was £35,073,000.

paid on this account to His Majesty's Treasury during the year was £35,073,000.

In view of the drain on their resources caused by heavy war payments for His Majesty's Government and the Secretary of State's Council Bills, the Government of India in the middle of October, 1917, issued short-term Treasury Bills for periods first of 6, 9 and 12 months, and later, 3 months. The total amount of Bills issued during 1917–18 was £29,000,000.

1918-19.—The Budget provided for the discharge of £500,000 India Bonds and of all the Railway Debentures maturing during the year to the value of £2,624,900. It further provided for the issue of a second rupee War Loan in India, the proceeds of which, provisionally estimated at £20,000,000, would be made over to the Home

Government in the same way as the Loan of 1917-18. The War Loan was accordingly issued in the following forms:—

- 1.  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. War Bonds, free of income tax, issued at par, and repayable at par on 15th September, 1921, or 15th September, 1923, at the option of the subscriber.
- 2.  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. War Bonds, free of income tax, issued at par, and repayable at 103 per cent. on 15th September, 1925, or 105 per cent. on 15th September, 1928, at the option of the subscriber.
- 3. Post Office 5-year Cash Certificates, on the same terms as those issued during the previous year (vide last year's Explanatory Memorandum, Cd. 8874 of 1917).

The amount realised, including subscriptions through the Post Office and sales of Post Office Cash Certificates, was approximately Rs. 53 crores. The equivalent of this amount converted at 1s. 6d. the rupee (i.e., about £40,000,000) will accordingly be paid

over to His Majesty's Treasury during 1918-19 and 1919-20.

The issue of Indian Treasury Bills was temporarily discontinued for the period during which the War Loan remained open, but was resumed after its closure. The amount of Bills outstanding in the middle of October, 1918 (i.e., the gross amount issued, less those paid off at maturity or discounted as subscriptions to the War Loan), was about £20,000,000.

#### Irrigation Works.

The actual and estimated outlay on the construction of Major Irrigation Works is as follows:—  $\pounds$

The total capital outlay on Major Irrigation Works up to 31st March, 1918,

excluding indirect charges, is estimated at £43,996,100.

The net earnings (i.e., gross receipts less working expenses) in 1916-17 gave a return of 8·134 per cent. on the mean of the capital expenditure at the beginning and the end of the year. (See App. II. (c).)

#### Railways.

On the 31st March, 1917, the length of railways in India open for traffic was 36,286 miles, of which 453 miles were opened in the preceding twelve months. The total mileage under construction or sanctioned for construction at the close of the year was 2,070 miles.

The capital expenditure on railways shown in the Government Accounts for

1916-17 and Estimates for 1917-18 and 1918-19 is as follows:—

The figures given above do not include expenditure on lines other than State and guaranteed railways. In 1916-17 the capital expenditure on such lines was £2,051,665

of which £465,733 was on railways owned or guaranteed by Native States.

In 1916-17 the net traffic receipts, i.e., the gross receipts after paying working expenses but not interest charges, of open lines in which the Government is directly interested, gave a return of 6.275 per cent. on the mean of the capital expenditure at the beginning and end of the year. (See App. II. (b).)

#### Liabilities and Assets.

On the 31st of March, 1918, the debt of India amounted to £403,419,055 (viz.:—rupee debt, converted into sterling at 1s. 4d. the rupee, £165,658,888, and sterling debt, £237,760,167, inclusive of £64,861,000, being the liability outstanding on 31st March, 1918, for British war debt assumed by India in respect of the balance of her financial contribution of £100,000,000 towards the cost of the War). There were also other obligations of the Government of India, including Post Office Cash Certificates which are treated in the Government of India's accounts as unfunded debt, Savings Bank balances, Judicial and Departmental deposits, balances of Service Funds, &c., amounting to £41,634,890, and the various railway annuities, representing in 1917-18 a charge of £994,013.

Up to the same date the Government of India had devoted £181,934,861 to the construction of Railways, and £43,996,100 to the construction of Irrigation Works. It had purchased from guaranteed companies (in some cases by cash payments, in others by annuities, and in one case by the direct issue of India Stock to the Company) nine railways, on which, at the time of purchase, £108,092,386 had been spent from capital raised by the Companies. The liabilities created by the purchases have not yet been fully discharged, partly because in the case of some lines a portion of the amount due to the Companies was retained by the Secretary of State and treated as capital deposited with him by the Companies for the purpose of new working contracts, and partly because in all cases of purchase by annuity the period for which the annuity is payable has not yet terminated. If the assets in respect of purchased lines are estimated as being the equivalent of the debt created and liabilities assumed or redeemed in connection with purchase plus the capital actuarially calculated to have been discharged through annuities, the amount on the 31st March, 1918, was £76,100,646. On that date also the Government of India's advances to Railway Companies stood at £1,607,299 and it had lent £11,462,243 (net) to Native States, Corporations, Agriculturists, &c. Other assets were the Gold Standard Reserve, consisting of sterling securities of an estimated value of £28,452,943, and £6,000,499 in cash at short notice in London; the cash balances in India, £15,320,000; and the cash (Treasury) balances in England, £10,624,917 (these are actuals, and hence differ from the "Revised" figures in the following statement).

N.B.—In the revised figures for 1917-18 given above, the debt incurred includes £35,139,000 being the proceeds of the Indian War Loan for that year which have been paid over to His Majesty's Government, and also £64,861,000 being the liability which India has assumed for British war debt. These two amounts make up the £100,000,000 which is shown per contra as a disbursement item under "India's financial contribution to the War."

#### GOLD STANDARD RESERVE.

It was decided that, with effect from 1st April, 1900-

(1) the net profit on the coinage of new rupees should not be treated as revenue, but should be paid to a special reserve (now called the Gold Standard Reserve);

(2) the Reserve should be held mainly in sterling securities, the interest being

added to the reserve as it accrued.

From July, 1906, a portion of the Reserve was held in India in rupees in order that the Government of India might be in a favourable position for meeting heavy

demands for the issue of rupees without delay in times of pressure.

In 1907 it was decided that half of the net profit on coinage from 1st April, 1907, should be used to supplement the funds available for capital expenditure on railways, the other half of the profit and the whole of the interest receipts being added to the Reserve as before. In June, 1912, this arrangement was modified, and it was decided that the interest on investments and the profits on coinage thereafter received, except profits retained in India for building up the rupee branch of the Reserve to the amount of 6 crores, should be held in gold at the Bank of England until the amount so held reached £5,000,000; no portion of the profit was to be used for railway purposes until the total sterling assets of the Gold Standard Reserve amounted to at least £25,000,000.

The Royal Commission on Indian Currency and Finance which reported in February, 1914, made certain recommendations bearing on the Gold Standard Reserve. In view of the disturbance of financial conditions caused by the war decisions on the more important of these recommendations have been deferred; but in August, 1915, the silver branch of the Reserve was abolished, in accordance with the Royal Commission's proposal, and the 6 crores of rupees held therein were exchanged for a corresponding

amount in gold (£4,000,000) from the Paper Currency Reserve.

Since 1915, in addition to profit on coinage, the profit or loss arising on the remittances of funds for the Gold Standard Reserve has also been credited or debited to that Reserve.

Of this sum £1,123,655 has been used for capital expenditure on railways; the remainder has been paid to the Reserve.

The fall in the Revised Estimate for 1917-18 as compared with the Budget is mainly due to a decline of about £500,000 in Burma owing to a postponement of collections as a result of the unsettled condition of the paddy market. Small decreases in certain of the other provinces are partly set off by a rise of about £100,000 in the Punjab as the rabi harvest there has proved better than was anticipated in the Budget.

The estimates for the current year are framed on the basis of normal monsoon conditions, and allow for the recovery of arrears in Burma and other provinces, and generally for normal growth in the revenue demand.

All the provinces contribute to the improvement. The Budget anticipates increased receipts in the United Provinces, Bengal and the Punjab, a decline in Madras, and normal receipts in the other provinces.

The decrease in the Receipts anticipated in the Revised Estimate for 1917-18 is due to the fact that owing to freight and exchange difficulties and the large stocks in hand less than one-fifth of the chests offered for sale by auction at the beginning of the year were actually sold. The greater part of the opium disposed of is, however, not sold by auction but is supplied direct to certain Governments (e.g. Straits Settlements, Hong Kong, Netherlands Indies, Siam, British North Borneo) or sold in England for medicinal purposes. The decrease in the charges is mainly due to the reduction anticipated in payments to cultivators in the United Provinces owing to the area brought under cultivation in 1917-18 having fallen short of original expectations.

Including the expected requirements of the Governments mentioned above, and taking into account opium sent to England for medicinal purposes, the Budget for 1918-19 provides for the sale of 15,700 chests of Bengal opium at an average price of about Rs. 2,555 a chest.

The Budget provides for an expansion of the area cultivated in the United Provinces, and in the case of the Central Indian States for final payments on account of the crop of 1917–18, and for advances in respect of the cultivation in 1918.

The effect of the rise in prices on ad valorem duties has brought about an improvement in the revised figures for 1917-18 of about £1,700,000 in spite of import restrictions. This course has operated especially in the case of cotton manufactures which show an increase of about £800,000 over Budget expectations, but the majority of other heads show similar enhancements to a less degree. The export duties on jute, rice and tea are not on an ad valorem basis but have also exceeded anticipation owing to the heavy demands by the U.K. and allied Governments for these commodities.

The Budget Estimate for 1918-19 allows for an increase under jute, but decreases under silver bullion and coin, owing to the prohibition placed during 1917-18 on the import of silver into India on private account, and under cotton manufactures and

The increase in revenue during the year 1917-18 is due mainly to the activity of internal trade and a growth of revenue from State messages owing to war conditions; while expenditure has decreased in consequence of further credits for stores supplied to the Indian Expeditionary Forces. The Budget for 1918-19 allows for a further advance in collections in India, chiefly as a result of enhanced charges, and for an increase in expenditure owing generally to the rise in wages and prices of stores.

State Railways.—The profit derived by the State from the railways arises from the State lines, under which head are included not only the lines worked by the State (of which the most important are the North-Western, Eastern Bengal, and Oudh and Rohilkhand systems), but also lines which, while classified as State railways, are worked by companies receiving guaranteed interest on their share capital and a share of the surplus profits. Among the most important of the lines included in the latter class are the East Indian, Bengal-Nagpur, Bombay, Baroda and Central India (including Rajputana-Malwa), Madras and Southern Mahratta, South Indian (including the Indian Midland Railway), Great Indian Peninsula, Assam-Bengal, and Burma Railways.

The Budget for 1917-18 was based on a cautious estimate anticipating a decrease from the high earnings of 1916-17, but actually, the Revised Estimate shows an increase of £4,000,000 over the Budget on the gross earnings. The increase is shared by all principal Companies and is mainly due to larger receipts from the carriage of troops and military stores, and from wheat and coal traffic, and to a less extent to the enhancement of fares and freights.

A considerable decline in working expenses is also shown in the Revised Estimates

attributable to the increasing difficulty experienced in obtaining railway materials from the United Kingdom, and the consequent restriction of renewals and repairs.

In the Budget for 1917-18 £500,000 is included in the Gross Receipts on account of the Freight Tax imposed last year. The proceeds of this tax are now shown in the Government of India's accounts under a miscellaneous head and, therefore, not included

in the two last columns.

The Budget for 1918-19 estimates for an increase of about £1,400,000 in gross receipts on the assumption that the conditions which led to the increased earnings of 1917-18 will still prevail, and for an increase of about £2,400,000 in working expenses, this being due partly to the larger traffic anticipated and partly to a larger programme of special repairs and renewals and to the increase of pay for railway subordinates recently sanctioned.

The excess shown in the Revised Estimate for 1917-18 over the Budget for that year is due for the most part to seigniorage on new coinage of rupees amounting to nearly £300,000 not allowed for in the Budget, and there has also been an increase of £50,000 from the profit on the circulation of nickel coins, which has been stimulated by trade activity. Per contra, as a result of the heavy coinage of purchased silver working expenses have considerably increased. In this connection it is to be noticed that in 1917-18 new rupees and small silver coins were coined to the value (at Rs. 15  $\cdot = \pounds$ ) of £16,000,000. A moderate provision is made in the Budget for 1918-19 for seigniorage on new coinage of rupees and for profit on the circulation of nickel and bronze coins.

The charges for the service of the Indian War Loan which were placed at £500,000 in the Budget Estimate for 1917-18 are estimated in the Revised Estimate for that year at £1,847,000, owing to the large increase over the estimated proceeds of the loan. The increase in interest on the War Loan is counter-balanced by a corresponding reduction in the amount to be applied to meeting interest and sinking fund charges on the balance of the Home Government's War Debt for which India has assumed liability. The Revised Estimate includes a sum of £600,000, which represents the discount on Treasury Bills issued during the year (vide p. 7).

The Budget for 1918-19 makes provision for a full year's interest on the War Loan raised in 1917-18 and for a sinking fund of £273,300 in respect of the long term portion of that loan. It also sets aside £666,700 for the service of the Second Indian War Loan and £700,000 for discount on Treasury Bills which it is anticipated will be

sold in 1918-19.

The total permanent debt is classified in the Accounts as (1) Public Works Debt and (2) Ordinary Debt.\* The amount entered as belonging to the former category is the equivalent of the total capital expenditure which has been incurred by the State on Railways and Irrigation Works, including the amount advanced to Railway Companies for capital expenditure, and the interest on this portion of the debt is charged under Railways and Irrigation (see pages 17 and 18); the "Ordinary Debt" consists of the difference between the total debt in existence and the amount entered as Public Works Debt. In any year in which, owing to the use, for the construction of Public Works, of surplus revenue or deposits or a portion of the Famine Grant appropriated to the Reduction or avoidance of Debt (see page 22), the capital expenditure exceeds the amount of debt incurred in the year, the effect of this system of classification is to cause a decrease to be shown in the amount of the Ordinary Debt, the interest thereon showing a corresponding reduction in due course, while there is a corresponding In 1917-18, owing to increase in the Public Works Debt and the interest on it. India's contribution to the war of £100,000,000, the ordinary debt was increased to £87,969,200, and it is expected that by the end of 1918-19 this figure will stand at £86,063,900. These figures do not include the value of Indian Treasury Bills outstanding nor certain temporary loans by the Presidency Banks. These forms of short term debt amounted to £31,713,700 on 31st March, 1918, and are estimated at £17,017,000 at the end of 1918–19. The receipts from the sale of Post Office Cash Certificates (see p. 7) are treated as additions to unfunded debt and are thus included under "other obligations."

The most important of the remaining "other obligations" referred to in the table above are the Savings Bank Balances, the Service Funds and other special funds held by the Government of India. The sums paid in the form of annuities in respect of the purchase of various railways, being directly chargeable to the Railway Revenue Account (see page 17) are not shown under the head of "Debt Services," though their

payment is of course an obligation similar to that of the interest on debt.

The amount of the debt and other obligations is shown on page 9 above, under "Liabilities and Assets."

The receipts shown in the table above include the interest received in India on loans granted by the Government to Native States, Municipalities, Port Trusts, Railway Companies, &c., and in England on the balances of the Secretary of State in Council. They also include the interest, in India and England, on the invested portion (now about £57,700,000) of the Paper Currency Reserve.

The net Army Charges for 1917-18 exceeded the Budget Estimate by £2,224,600. This large increase is due to various causes arising directly from the War. Of these the more important are an enhanced outlay on account of special war services in respect of internal defence, the grant of increased pay to British soldiers, and an increase of £900,000 in England for the completion of the supply of rifles and ammunition.

The Budget for 1918-19 is higher by £92,600 than the Revised Estimate. This increase is represented by a larger net provision of £1,911,500 in India, chiefly due to an enhanced reserve for unforeseen charges, and a smaller provision of £1,818,900 in

England, £1,700,200 of this being the decrease in the estimate for stores.

Under Non-effective Charges (India) is included an increase of £100,000 for wound and family pension charges arising out of the War; this is counterbalanced by a corresponding reduction of (Home) non-effective payments to the Imperial Government, which bears the extra pensionary charges attributable to the War.

Schedule Expenditure.—Any new measure, the expenditure on which during the first year is likely to exceed £3,300, is included in a Schedule for special sanction. The Budget grants for such expenditure are determined by the urgency of the need, the claims of other branches of the administration and the condition of the revenue. Excluding recurring expenditure on completed measures and the recurring expenditure already attained on measures in progress, the total outlay on special measures in 1916–17, 1917–18, and 1918–19 is estimated to be approximately as follows:—

The main increase in the Revised Estimate for 1917-18 falls under "Political" attributable to special expenditure in Persia necessitated by the war in connection with South Persia Rifles, and the main decrease under "Education," in consequence of lapses in ordinary grants in Bombay, Bengal, and Madras. There is a reduction also under Police as a result of the non-filling up of vacancies in the executive forces.

The Budget for 1918-19 allows for a considerable increase of expenditure, particularly under the heads of (1) "Education," where provision is made for the development of primary education and a general expansion of expenditure in all

provinces; (2) "Political," as a result of higher anticipated expenditure in Persia and (3) "Police," owing to the cost of various schemes of reform in Bengal, Central Provinces and elsewhere.

A sum of not less than £1,000,000 is annually appropriated for the purposes of Famine Relief and Insurance. When the outlay on direct famine relief is less than the sum appropriated, the balance is used (1) for the construction or maintenance of protective railways and irrigation works, and (2) for the construction of productive public works, which would otherwise require additional borrowing. The amount used for the last-mentioned purpose is shown under the head of "Reduction or Avoidance of Debt."

Up to the end of 1916 expenditure on famine relief was borne partly, if not entirely, by Imperial Revenues, under a somewhat complicated system, whereby Local Governments whose Provinces were liable to famine were annually credited with fixed sums in order to enable them to accumulate funds up to certain limits on which they could draw in case expenditure on famine relief became necessary.

With effect from the 1st April, 1917, a simpler scheme has been introduced, whereby expenditure for famine relief in all provinces is divided, when it occurs, between the Government of India and the Local Government concerned in the proportion of  $\frac{3}{4}$  to  $\frac{1}{4}$ .

The decrease in the Revised Estimates is due to the policy of retrenchment which has been followed since the beginning of the war. In the Budget for 1918-19 provision is made for a considerable increase of outlay in most provinces, especially Bombay and Burma.

Under the present system of provincial finance, provincial surpluses are added to the balances at the credit of the Provinces, and charged against the revenue of the year; provincial deficits are met by withdrawals from the balances at the credit of the Provinces, and deducted from the expenditure of the year. The result of this system is that provincial revenue and expenditure always show an exact equilibrium in the general accounts of the Government of India.
