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### PREFACE.

This volume—Part II B Tables—contains the three Economic Tables (B—Series). Part II A—which was published earlier—gives all the other main tables: A—General Population Tables, C—Household and Age (Sample) Tables, D—Social and Cultural Tables and E—Summary Figures by Districts, Subdivisions, Revenue Thanas and Police Stations.

2. The Indian Census Economic Classification Scheme followed in the B—Series Tables has been dealt with at some length in Appendix A. Of the three tables presented in this volume, Table B-I.—Livelihood Classes and Sub-classes is entirely new. Table B-II.—Secondary Means of Livelihood is also new, though some information regarding subsidiary occupations was given in Imperial Table X of 1931. Table B-III.—corresponds, generally speaking, to Table X of 1931, but both the scheme of classification and the mode of presentation differ, and it is necessary to exercise very great care in making comparisons between the two.

### APPENDIX A.

# The Indian Census Economic Classification (I. C. E. C.) Scheme.

- 1. Introductory.—The nature of the enquiry regarding economic characteristics has varied from census to census. In 1881, nothing was recorded save the occupation of actual workers. At the next census (1891), it was decided to record the means of subsistence rather than occupation and no distinction was drawn between workers and dependants. In 1901 for the first time, workers were distinguished from dependants and in the case of the latter, the principal occupation of the person on whom they were dependent was entered. This scheme was followed at the next two censuses, but in 1931, only the occupation of earners and working dependants was recorded, and no attempt was made to ascertain the means of livelihood of the non-working population. At the census of 1941, information was collected regarding the means of livelihood of all enumerated persons including non-working population, but the material was not tabulated. and we have only got the results of a 2 per cent sample processed on the 1931 model.
- 2. The scheme of classification adopted at the 1951 census and known as the I.C. E.C. Scheme embodies extensive revision and rearrangement of schemes followed at the 1931 and earlier censuses, and is designed to secure the following purposes:-
  - (i) To establish a comprehensive economic classification of the people as a whole, and not merely of persons who are gainfully employed;
  - (ii) To simplify and improve the method of presentation of census economic data, and provide additional data; and
  - (iii) To secure international comparability of data as recommended by the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations.
- 3. As explained in the fly-leaf to Table B-I, the population has been divided into two broad livelihood categories: Agricultural and Non-Agricultural; each of these categories being further subdivided into four classes as below:-

Agricultural.

- I—Cultivators of land, wholly or mainly owned; and their dependants.
- II—Cultivators of land, wholly or mainly unowned; and their dependants. III—Cultivating labourers; and their dependants.

IV-Non-cultivating owners of land; agricultural rent receivers; and their dependants.

# Non-Agricultural.—

Persons, including dependants, who derive their principal means of livelihood from-

V-Production (other than cultivation).

VI—Commerce.

VII—Transport.

VIII—Other services and miscellaneous sources.

Figures under each of the eight livelihood classes have been shown under three sub-classes according to their primary economic status as below:-

(i) Self-supporting persons:

(ii) Non-earning dependants; and

(iii) Earning dependants.

A person who is in receipt of an income, whether in cash or kind, which is sufficient at least for his own maintenance, is regarded as a self-supporting person.

A non-earning dependant is one who does not secure any income, in cash or kind, and is wholly dependent on the earning of some one else.

An earning dependant is a person who secures a regular income, but whose income is not sufficient to support him.

All self-supporting persons are ordinarily economically active, but there are certain classes and groups which constitute an exception to this rule. Details of these have been furnished in the fly-leaf to Table B-III. Economic activity includes all activities of which the result is the production of useful commodities or the performance of useful services, but not including the performance of domestic or personal services by members of a family household to one another. Among economic activities, the most important is cultivation of land. It stands in a by itself. All other economic activities may be regarded as falling in another category which may be referred to as "Industries and Services". Under the I. C. E. C. Scheme, "Industries and Services" are classified in 10. Divisions; and these Divisions are sub-divided into 88 Sub-Divisions. The scope of activities included in each Sub-Division is indicated by its title. All persons included in each Sub-Division have been further sub-divided as-

- (a) Employers:
- (b) Employees; and
- (c) Independent workers.

Divisions and Sub-Divisions of Industries and Services falling under the various non-agricultura! classes are shown below:-

4. Comparability with the 1931 Scheme of Occupations.—The 1931 Scheme of Occupations consisted of 4 Classes, 12 Sub-Classes, 55 Orders and 195 Occupational Groups. These included agriculture also. Under the I.C.E.C. Scheme, Agriculture forms a category by itself and Industries and Services are divided into 10 Divisions, 88 Sub-Divisions and 161 Groups. The statement below shows the Divisions and Sub-Divisions of the I. C. E. C. Scheme and the corresponding occupational groups of 1931:-

Note.—In Bihar, comparison between the 1951 Divisions and Sub-Divisions of Industries and Services and the occupational groups of 1931 is rendered difficult in practice due to the fact that the figures given in Table X (Part I) of 1931 relate to both Bihar and Orissa. Part II of Table X of 1931 gives details for districts, but only the most important economic groups are mentioned in this part and no information has been given regarding the remaining groups.

5. International Standard Industrial Classification (I. S. I. C.) Scheme.—The United Nations Organisation has evolved a scheme of classification of Economic Activities, known as the "International Standard Industrial Classification Scheme". The Economic and Social Council of the United Nations has recommended the use of this Scheme by all member Governments either by adopting this system of classification as a national standard or rearranging their statistical data in accordance with this system for purposes of international comparability. There are 10 Divisions and 44 major Groups of economic activities under the I. S. I. C. Scheme which include agriculture, and in addition, correspond to the 10 Divisions and 88 Sub-Divisions of Industries and Services under the I. C. E. C. Scheme. The elements of the I. C. E. C. Scheme which correspond to each individual division and each individual major group of the I. S. I. C. Scheme are set out below:—
