

WE have the honour to forward, for your Honourable Court's information, copies of communications from Sir Lawrence Peel, Knt., Chief Justice of the Supreme Court at this Presidency, dated the 29th ultimo and 4th instant, together with a copy of our reply to the minute which accompanied the letter from the Chief Justice of the first-mentioned date, respecting defalcations in the assets of the estates of which the late Registrar of the court was the *ex-officio* administrator, and the arrangement to be made for the appointment of a successor to Sir Thomas Turton, resigned.

2. Your Honourable Court will observe, that we have not concurred in the propositions in the Chief Justice's minute, for the compensation of the abused estates by an appropriation of the fees of the Registrar's office, and of a part of the commissions, &c., and that we are engaged in discussing, with the Honourable Judges, new measures regarding the appointment.

Honourable Sirs,

WITH reference to our despatches in the Judicial Department, Nos. 6 and 9, dated the 9th and 18th March 1848, we have the honour to transmit our Proceedings, and the several Minutes* which have been recorded by the members of this Government, on the question of the liability of Sir Thomas Turton to a criminal prosecution on account of the extensive defalcations discovered in the office which he lately held, as Ecclesiastical Registrar of the Supreme Court at Calcutta. We transmit, also, the Report, with its Appendices, furnished by the Commissioners appointed by the Judges of the court to inquire into the state of the various offices which were held by Sir Thomas Turton; also two communications which we have received, one from Major Seaton, the other from the Trade Association, representing the losses which certain estates have suffered from these defalcations, and praying for redress.

2. Among the papers under transmission, your Honourable Court will find the opinions of the law officers of the Crown in England, obtained demiofficially by the Governor-general, and of Mr. Colvile, late Advocate-general at this Presidency, showing that, in the present state of the law, a prosecution for the principal offence could not successfully be instituted. Mr. Colvile thought that an indictment might lie for the misapplication of certain Equity deposits, and for the omission to comply with the requirements of sect. 5 of the Statute 55 Geo. 3, c. 84, as regards the filing in court of true and perfect schedules of monies and securities belonging to the estates of deceased persons; but while the main offence remained unpunishable, it was considered inexpedient, both by Mr. Colvile and ourselves, to prosecute for comparatively insignificant irregularities.

3. Under these circumstances, our colleague, Mr. Bethune, suggested the propriety of supplying the deficiency in the statute law by the passing of a retrospective Act, under the title of an Act of Pains and Penalties, against the delinquent; and he further recommended, as a necessary measure of precaution, that until such an Act could be completed, a preliminary law should be passed, authorizing Sir Thomas Turton's arrest and detention, in order to prevent the risk of his leaving India. Mr. Bethune felt no doubt that the Government of India was competent to legislate in the manner proposed, and he was of opinion that, however unusual and distasteful such a course of proceeding might be in ordinary cases, the enormity of the offence to be immediately dealt with would justify that course in public estimation.

4. The Governor-general, although extremely desirous of finding the means of bringing the conduct of Sir Thomas Turton under judicial investigation, dissents from the course recommended by Mr. Bethune. His Lordship has grave doubts of the competency of the Indian Legislature to enact a retrospective law, inflicting punishment for conduct which the statute law of England has not recognized to be a crime, and thus exercising an authority which the Imperial Parliament itself does not exercise, except on very rare occasions. His Lord-ship also doubts the expediency of the measure. His Lordship has strongly advised us to submit the whole question for the consideration of your Honourable Court, and we now do so in the hope that you will, by an early opportunity, favour us with your views thereon.

5. Sir Thomas Turton has been permitted by the Judges to examine the Report furnished by the Committee relative to his accounts. Should he furnish any

3. Ir is also our desire that you request the attention of Her Majesty's Judges to the amount of security (viz. 50,000 rupees) given by the Registrar for the due discharge of his office; by the Regulations of the Supreme Court at Madras, the Registrar at that Presidency is required to enter into security to the amount of a lac of pagodas; we are decidedly of opinion that the security given by the Registrar at Calcutta should not be less than that required from the individual holding a similar office at a Presidency where the responsibility and risk cannot be so great.

4. If in the course of your communication with Her Majesty's Judges other points of regulation or practice occur to you as deserving consideration, we feel persuaded that any suggestions you may offer in relation thereto, will receive every attention from their Lordships.

3. The Registrar of the Court already furnishes security to the extent of a lac of rupees, and not 50,000, as supposed by your Honourable Court.

The Chief Justice respectfully submits the following Minute to the attention of the Right honourable the Governor-General of India in Council.

SIR THOMAS TURTON having tendered his resignation of the offices which he held in the Supreme Court, with an announcement of a great deficiency in the assets for which he is accountable, the court immediately acted upon his resignation, and made an *ad interim* appointment to the office, until a proper successor could be selected. Their next step was to appoint a committee to examine into the state of the assets, and to report to the court the result of that examination. Sir Thomas Turton represents the ultimate deficiency at three lacs; it is to be feared that that is an under estimate.

The emoluments of the Registrar's office formerly consisted both of court fees and the customary 5 per cent. commission on the administration of assets. The commission alone was received by the late Registrar, in consequence of an arrangement effected with him by the court in the time of the late Chief 417. Justice Ryan, when Sir Thomas Turton was appointed Registrar. Under tha arrangement, the fees from the offices of Ecclesiastical, Equity and Admiralty Registrar, were paid over to the Government, Sir Thomas Turton performing the duties of Equity, Admiralty and Ecclesiastical Registrar without any other remuneration than the commission claimable as ex-officio administrator, which is an office annexed by statute to that of the Ecclesiastical Registrar of the Supreme Court. The receipt of these fees by the Government took effect in pursuance of a general arrangement between the Government and the court, in consequence of some suggestions from the home authorities, whereby fixed salaries were recommended to be substituted for fees, as a mode of remunerating the officers of the court for their services. The Government, previously to this arrange-ment, paid certain salaries amounting to Rs. 51,907. 9. 3. per annum, and the officers received the rest of their remuneration in fees. It was intended that the Government should not be exposed to any further charge, and therefore some precautionary surplus was to be provided. The following extract from the letter from the Judges of the Supreme Court, to the Governor-general of India in Council, dated 25 April 1836, expresses this : "Of course the relief of the suitor is the first and principal object; subject always to the condition, that the Government is not to incur the risk of additional expense. There is incidentally a strong probability that in being secured against this risk, they will, in fact, gain some advantage.'

There has always been a surplus, after deducting the old salaries, which were before a charge upon the Government: this surplus has been progressive, the charges of the court having been in a course of gradual diminution as offices become vacant, and the business of the court having been constantly on the increase. The gain in the last year, 1846, for which returns are made, amounts, according to the account before me, to Rs. 33,487. 15, and it is almost wholly made up of the fees in the Registrar's offices. The Government would be exposed to no risk of loss, if it permitted the fees of the Registrar's offices to be applied, together with a portion of the commissions, to form a fund which should exonerate the estates from the loss occasioned by the late Registrar's misappropriation of the funds under his administration.

If the Government would permit this arrangement, reserving, say 5,000 rupees per annum as its precautionary surplus against future loss, an annual sum, probably of 30,000 rupees per annum, might be provided from the fees ; from the commissions perhaps 20,000 rupees more could be depended upon. Mr. Sandes, a gentleman every way calculated for the office, of competent knowledge, steady and careful habits, strict honour and integrity, and with a considerable acquired property, the fruit of his acquisition at the bar, has expressed his willingness to accept the office, on the terms of paying over to such fund, if established, all the commissions received over 24,000 rupees, and limiting his whole remuneration to that amount; which is considerably less than he was making at the bar. During Sir Thomas Turton's time it has averaged, as he informs me, about 50,000 Company's rupees per annum net. Some diminution must now be looked for, for it is not likely that persons will, for some time, voluntarily place their estates in the office. Future abuses can hardly occur under the new rules, enforced, as we hope they may be, by some new legislative enactments, which are wanting to put this office under perfect supervision and control.

Mr. Sandes' administration will, I trust, restore confidence, and the net receipts may be calculated at not less than 45,000 rupees per annum; if this be so, 21,000 rupees would remain to form the above fund, and not less than 50,000 rupees per annum could be raised from fees and commissions jointly, to avert the ruin which must otherwise inevitably fall on many fatherless children and widows.

There are ancient unclaimed estates to a considerable amount, in which there is little probability of any claim being made, which might, by a legislative enactment be applied to the present relief of the estates, and the above fund might be subsequently applied to restore to these estates what had been taken from them for the purpose of the immediate relief of other estates.

The same legislative measure might provide for the reduction of the emoluments of the office, after the debt should be cleared off, by limiting the commission to that recommended by the Law Commissioners in their Report on the establishments of the court; and the same Act might provide also for the reduction

reduction of the whole establishments of the court, as offices fall in, to the extent recommended by the Law Commissioners in that Report, to which, I think, even without enactment, the court should labour to conform. In a minute of the Chief Justice, several years ago, addressed to the Law Commissioners, he remarked on the absence of all real power of supervision in the court over the office of ex-officio administrator, and expressed his disapprobation of the annexation needlessly of such administrative offices to courts of justice. [See Extract in an Appendix, 13th February 1844.] If the Chief Justice should be honoured by receiving any approval of the above suggestions, and by the request of the Government to him to undertake the framing of a legislative measure for their consideration, embodying the remedial measures which he has suggested, he will apply himself gladly to the work.

EXTRACT from the Minute of the Chief Justice, of the 13th February 1844.

"IT is necessary that I should preface my plan of reduction, as contained in this letter, by a few remarks on establishments of officers in courts, when confined to their proper functions, and on the union of judicial functions, or of functions the exercise of which has no necessary connexion with a court, with the proper functions of such officers. The establishment needed for a court, is that of officers having duties of a ministerial character to discharge in the various stages of a suit, as issuing the first process, seeing that it is in the legal form, and has the proper vouchers of its genuineness, and issues under the prescribed checks against abuse, recording its return, filing the proceedings as they go on, attending at the hearing or trial, taking the evidence where essential, entering in proper form the proceedings of the court, taking accounts, and conducting inquiries of a protracted nature, which would otherwise unnecessarily occupy the time of the court, and if taken in court, would materially enhance the expenses of a suit. When the forms of courts are simple, these duties require no great degree of professional learning. Where duties of a judicial or quasi judicial character are assigned to such officers, it is a defect in the system of administration of justice, which is generally owing to the necessity of some such delegation, in consequence of the pressure of business in courts. It seems to me, that some of the matters usually referred to the Master, might either be decided in court without a reference, or be decided by one of its own members sitting as a judge in chambers. It would make this minute of undue length if I were now to go into details. I have, however, annexed to this minute some observations on the general improvement of the judicial system here, which will serve to illustrate my plan. Next, as to the delegation to the officers of the court of duties not necessarily connected with a court. Of this kind in our court, are, first, the official administration of the estates of intestates, conferred, by command of the Legislature of Great Britain, on an officer of the court—the Ecclesiastical Registrar; next, the Receivership, which commonly falls on an officer of the court by the consent of the parties in a suit, but it is not of compulsory obligation on the parties to select an officer of the court for such purpose; and, lastly, the official trusteeship lately created by an Act of the Indian Legislature. All the duties of these various officers are those of ordinary administrators, ordinary receivers and ordinary trustees, and they have no necessary reference to any suit whatever. FURTHER EXTRACT from the Minute of the Chief Justice, of the 13th day of February 1844.

"THE emoluments of one of these officers, the Registrar, are now wholly derived from his commission as Administrator of Intestates' Estates, for which, as it has been before noticed in the Judges' letter, the court was not at any time responsible. These are not a burthen on the State,* and the charge on the parties interested is precisely the same as that which falls upon them under nonofficial administrations. It is however desirable, in my opinion, to lessen this charge in both classes of administrations."

"THEY are not officially acquainted with the views of the Government relative to the proposal that the Government should permit the reduction of some part of the fees of court of which the Government are now the recipients."

THE commission which the *ex-officio* administrator receives, grew up by the usage and custom of this place; it was allowed by a decision in the High Court of Chancery, and is recognized by statute; ordinary executors and administrators are entitled to the same. It requires a legislative measure to reduce it in any case. The *ex-officio* administrator, however, may, if he think fit, relinquish a part, in like manner as any ordinary administrator or executor may, and if he is content to take office, agreeing to receive a lesser rate of commission, and to carry the surplus to a fund to compensate sufferers by the misconduct of his predecessor, *volenti non fit injuria*.

Bargaius with officers I hold to be objectionable in principle; and nothing but the sad exigency of the case has induced me to propose one to Mr. Sandes.

So far as the question regards the public, it may be thus stated. For the alleviation of a part of the public suffering by the misconduct of a public officer, it is proposed to make the reduction of an existing charge, not immediate, but future. It is not charging anew a part of the public to compensate another part. It is not the imposition of a charge, but the postponement of a legislative measure to reduce it. It is but a choice of evils, a painful choice. I doubt not that the Government will decide wisely on the matter. In their decision I shall be cheerfully acquiescent.

I should have added to my minute, that it has been decided by the Privy Council, on appeal from an order of the Supreme Court of Madras, that there is no power inherent in the court to compel executors or administrators to account, except on the application of parties interested.

The power of the court over the *ex-officio* administrator, as such, is not more extensive, as to compelling any account. He is ordered by statute to exhibit his accounts, which are to be filed in court, and publicity is to be given to them by advertisements in the Gazette, &c. But the court has not the power conferred upon

upon it to order *ex-parte*, or any accountings and auditings of the accounts; and unless on suit instituted, the correctness of an administration cannot be questioned. The court has ordered, by a recent rule, the balances in hand to be paid into the Bank of Bengal; but this alone will not suffice, if an officer be tempted to abuse his trust. For instance, if Sir Thomas Turton had commanded credit to raise his apparent balance, and paid it into the bank, he might have escaped detection for years, perhaps altogether. A fraudulent officer, with the connivance of others in his office, might frame accounts, not disclosing on the face of them matter of suspicion. It would be utterly impossible for the court itself to conduct an examination of the accounts, and it is not possessed of the legal power to do it effectively. The main trust now is, therefore, in the honour and integrity of the officer. Some legislative provisions seem to me to be imperatively called for.

From the Government of India to the Honourable Sir Lawrence Peel, Knt., Chief Justice of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort William, dated 9 March 1848.

Honourable Sir,

WE beg leave to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, dated 29th ultimo, and of the minute referred to respecting the office of Registrar of the court, as now constituted and remunerated.

2. We are informed by your minute, that a large defalcation has been discovered in the funds of the estates, of which the Ecclesiastical Registrar is the *ex-officio* administrator, and for which Sir Thomas Turton, the late Registrar, who has resigned the appointment, is responsible.

3. Sir Thomas Turton received neither salary nor fees for discharging the duties of Ecclesiastical, Equity and Admiralty Registrar, enjoying, as his only emolument of office, the commission of 5 per cent. on his administration of the assets of estates in his hands, which commission is stated to have yielded about 50,000 Company's rupees per annum during Sir Thomas Turton's time.

4. The Chief Justice, in the minute which we have before us, proposes that the fees of the Registrar's office be applied, together with a portion of the commissions, to form a fund which shall exonerate the estates from the loss occasioned by the late Registrar's misappropriation of the assets under his administration, and calculates that 50,000 rupees a year may be depended on for that object.

5. With this view it is suggested, that the court appoint a successor to Sir Thomas Turton, who shall accept the office on the terms of paying over to such fund all the commissions received over 24,000 rupees a year, and that his remuneration be limited to that amount.

6. The minute likewise adverts to "ancient unclaimed estates to a considerable amount," which, if we rightly understand the meaning, might, by a legislative enactment, be applied to the present relief of the abused estates, and the fund before mentioned might be applied hereafter to restore to the "ancient unclaimed estates" what had been taken from them for the purpose of the immediate relief of the estates.

7. The benevolent purpose of the proposition is to avert the ruin which must, it is said, otherwise inevitably fall on many fatherless children and widows.

8. The Judges of the court are of opinion that future abuses can hardly occur under the new rules, enforced as they hope they may be by some new legislative enactments, which are wanting to put the office under perfect supervision and control.

9. The court think that the legislative measure which is required for other purpose, might provide for the reduction of the emoluments of the office after Sir Thomas Turton's debt should be cleared off, by limiting the commission to that recommended by the Law Commissioners, and "the same Act might provide also for the reduction of the whole establishment of the court as offices fall in, to the extent recommended by the Law Commissioners in that Report, to which, even without enactment, the court should labour to conform;" and the minute which we have been receiving, concludes, on the part of the Chief Justice, by a tender to undertake the framing of a legislative measure, embodying the remedial propositions which have been suggested.

10. The Indian Law Commissioners, in their Report, dated the 3d July 1845, para. 120, quote, on the subject of commission, the opinion of the Judges of the Supreme Court at Calcutta, dated 14th September 1842, that, "The best course to be adopted, as it appears to us, would be to reduce the commission on a future vacancy from 5 per cent. to $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., and on recurring receipts, to reduce the commission to $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., except as to houses and buildings, which are very troublesome, and an expensive item of administration in the office, that we think the full reduced commission, viz. $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. should still be payable on these receipts."

11. In para. 127 of the same Report, the Commissioners make the following is best to allow a general commission, upon the principle of an average, instead of a commission varying in rate according to circumstances; and seeing that 3 per cent. is the lowest rate which would be suitable at Madras and Bombay, we would recommend that it be adopted as the general rate for all the Presidencies."

12. In the same report (para. 23), it was recommended that all the necessary services of the court, that is to say those essential to the due conduct of its proceedings and the recording thereof, should be performed by three principal officers; viz.-

"One performing the duties of Master and Examiner in Equity and the ministerial duties of Registrar in all departments, including the duties now

assigned to the Sworn Clerk. "The second, the duties of Prothonotary and Clerk of the Papers, Clerk of the Crown and Sealer, and Keeper of the Records. "The third, all the ministerial duties of the Insolvent Court, and the duties of

Taxing Officer in all departments; also those of Attorney for Paupers."

13. The Law Commissioners, in para. 37 of their Report, offer their opinion, "that the net sum of 30,000 rupees per annum will be a sufficient remuneration for the duties of Official Administrator of Intestate Estates, Receiver, Assignee of Insolvent Court, and Curator under Act XIX. of 1841, which we propose to commit to a single officer unconnected with the court. We think that fourfifths of the proposed remuneration, or 24,000 rupees, should be assured to him as salary, and that he should be allowed such a proportion of the commission upon the estates and funds under his management, as upon a fair estimate may be expected to make good the balance, 6,000 rupees per annum.'

14. We find paras. 149 to 152 of the Law Commissioners' Report devoted to the consideration of the arrangement made with Sir Thomas Turton when the office of Registrar was conferred on him by the court, to whom the Commissioners recommended an equitable allowance of 54,000 rupees per annum, fourfifths, or 43,200 in salary and one-fifth, 10,800, in share of commission. But as that arrangement depended on circumstances peculiar to itself, it is now unnecessary to notice that particular proposition.

15. Having thus referred to the proposal of the court and to the results of previous discussions on the subject now before us, we proceed to state the conclusions at which we have arrived after careful and anxious consideration.

16. We cannot fail keenly to sympathize with the Honourable the Judges of the Court on the distressing occurrence which is the subject of this communication and the occasion of these propositions, and we desire, with the court, that the Legislature shall promptly interfere to avert, by every practicable precaution, the repetition of the abuse committed in the office of the Registrar. But we would prefer, in communication with the court, to adopt such measures as may be necessary for placing the administration of the estates which now devolves on their Registrar, in a condition of more actual security, as a distinct and substantive proceeding, altogether unconnected with the scheme recommended for the compensation of the injured parties.

17. We beg, with much respect, to state our opinion that the scheme before us, although founded in benevolence and intended to effect a most desirable object, by averting the ruin impending over many through the malversation of a public officer, nevertheless contains within it a principle of injustice.

18. We feel strongly, that if it should hereafter be determined by competent authorities that the losses of the parties who have suffered from the misconduct of a public officer should be replaced from some source or other, the restitution could

could never with justice be exacted from the property of one particular class. and that class composed of persons for the most part little able to bear the burden.

19. It may rightly be enacted, that a certain proportion shall be deducted from the property of persons who die intestate, or whose estates fall to be administered by the Registrar of the court, sufficient to afford a fair remuneration to those charged with the care and future distribution of the funds.

20. But we think it would not be just to continue to deduct a proportion which we know to be more than sufficient to afford that remuneration, in order that we might bestow the surplus on sufferers, for whose losses the parties taxed are in no way responsible, but whose losses they, and they alone, will by this measure be compelled to make good.

21. We admit that the continued exaction of a commission of 5 per cent. on estates will impose no new burden on those by whom it is to be borne. But it will continue a burden which the highest authorities, the Law Commission and the honourable Judges themselves, have long ago said it is expedient to diminish, and which, through the resignation of Sir Thomas Turton, and the termination of his interest in the office, may now be reduced without impediment.

22. The Government, while they deeply commiserate the misfortunes of those on whom this affliction has fallen, and while they regard with indignation the conduct of the officer who has been its cause, feel it to be their first duty to have regard to the interests of the community at large, and to provide, as far as in them lies, that the burdens imposed by law shall not press unduly or unequally.

23. We therefore entertain an insuperable objection to taxing the estates in question for the formation of a fund from which Sir Thomas Turton's defalcations are to be made good. Partly on the same principle, and partly because we cannot admit the existence in this matter of any responsibility on the part of the Government, we cannot for such a purpose sanction in the Legislature the application of the ancient unclaimed estates to the present relief of the estates which have suffered by Sir Thomas Turton's conduct.

24. These estates must eventually become the property of the State, or they will belong to persons whose right of succession may be recognized.

25. We are therefore satisfied, after affording the whole subject of your minute our utmost consideration, and with the earnest wish in every possible way to act in concert with the learned Judges of the court in respect both to the distribution of the officers of the court and the amount and mode of their remuneration, that it is our duty to suggest to the Judges either to confer the appointment of Registrar on the Ecclesiastical, Equity and Admiralty side, on some gentleman in succession to Sir Thomas Turton, with an amount of emolument which may be determined on as fit and sufficient for remunerating the duties and securing the responsibilities of the office, or to take advantage of the vacancy for introducing the appointment suggested in the Report of the Indian Law Commis- Para. 37, of Re-sioners, on the scale of fixed salary and fees mentioned in a former paragraph of port of Indian La our letter.

26. We need not assure the Honourable the Chief Justice of the gratitude with which we shall receive, and the attention which we shall immediately pay to any draft of legislative enactment he may do us the favour of framing to give effect to these views.

27. We have to acknowledge also the receipt of your letter of the 4th instant, and of the additional minute which accompanied it.

From the Honourable Sir Lawrence Peel, Knt., Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Fort William, to the Right honourable the Earl of Dalhousie, Governor-General of India, in Council; dated 10 March 1848.

Right honourable Lord and Honourable Sirs,

I HAVE to acknowledge the receipt of the letter of the 9th March 1848, which your Lordship in Council has done me the honour to write to me; and I beg, on behalf of my colleagues and myself, to render your Lordship and the honourable the members of Council our thanks for the kind expressions and disposition towards us which it evinces. The objections stated by your Lordship in Council to the mode of relief suggested in the proposal which I had the honour to submit, had not, amidst a choice of difficulties, escaped ourselves; but we perfectly acquiesce in your Lordship's view, that in the decision of this question they should preponderate.

I will apply myself immediately to the preparation of a draft Act for the consideration of your Lordship in Council, to embody such of the other suggestions which I had the honour to make, as have not been disapproved of by your Lordship in Council.

There is no bar in any engagements with either Mr. Sandes or Mr. Macpherson to the adoption of the proposed or other arrangements. Until the reduction of the Commission takes effect by legislative enactment,

Until the reduction of the Commission takes effect by legislative enactment, Mr. Sandes will receive the ordinary 5 per cent. commission, which the court had no power to reduce except under the subsisting agreement, the object of which has failed. He will defray out of it the necessary additional expenses of the offices which will be occasioned for a short time by the prosecution of the inquiries of the Committee, and the engagement of an additional accountant.

SIR THOMAS TURTON.

THE announcement of the default of the Ecclesiastical Registrar, Sir Thomas Turton, has been received in England, as in India, with strong expressions of indignation.

The Government of India had no voice in the appointment of this officer, nor any control, directly or indirectly, over his proceedings; but as soon as I heard of the event, I stated my determination, as the head of the Government, to institute a prosecution against so gross and scandalous an offender, if I could find the legal means of doing so, and if it should appear that there was any statute or regulation on which a criminal prosecution might be founded with any chance of success.

I deferred submitting a proposal to that effect to the Council, until the committee appointed to investigate Sir Thomas Turton's defalcations should report.

I wrote, however, to the President of the Board of Control, intimating my intentions.

The President, fully approving of them, submitted a case to the Queen's Attorney and Solicitor, to ascertain whether a prosecution would lie.

Their opinion is now before me, and I regret to observe that they do not consider that Sir Thomas Turton can be brought within the reach of a criminal prosecution. The Committee have not yet reported; but without further delay I propose to transmit the opinion of the law officers of the Crown to the Advocate-general, and request to be favoured with his opinion, as to whether Sir Thomas Turton can be criminally prosecuted for his default in office, with any reasonable chance of success. If the answer should be in the negative, I shall deeply regret it; but the Government of India will have been enabled to place upon record an evidence of their indignant detestation of the conduct of this officer, and of their resolution, if the law had given them the power, of sending to to merited punishment in Botany Bay this worst of all robbers, a robber of the widow and the fatherless.

OPINION of the Law Officers of the Crown on a Case laid before them with respect to the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature in Calcutta.

HER Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor-general are requested to advise the Commissioners for the Affairs of India, whether, as far as they can form an opinion from the circumstances disclosed in the foregoing papers, Sir Thomas Turton has rendered himself liable to a criminal prosecution for the misappropriation of monies entrusted to his charge in his office of Ecclesiastical Registrar of the Supreme Court at Calcutta.

WE are of opinion that, under the circumstances, no prosecution of any sort can be instituted against Sir Thomas Turton under the 9 Geo. 4, c. 74, which contains the criminal law applicable to India, because the money embezzled by him was not received by him in any private capacity within the meaning of that Act. The 2 Will. 4, c. 4, s. 1, which might apply to a case of this description, does not extend to India. If Sir Thomas Turton held an office under Her Majesty or the East India Company, he might be proceeded against under the 24 Geo. 3, c. 25, s. 64, and the following section, as amended by the 26 Geo. 3, c. 57, for a misdemeanor. The mode of proceeding under that Act is anomalous, and seems never to have been exercised ;* but as the offence of Sir Thomas * See Rex. v. Hollan Turton is of a very grave description, this perhaps will be no objection to such 4 T.R. 457, 662, 691, where these a course, particularly as we are not aware of any other mode by which proceedings can be taken against him. We have not sufficient information to enable us statutes were acted upon. to judge whether the office held by Sir Thomas Turton would bring him within these statutes, nor can we recommend the adoption of this course without fuller evidence.

The Government of India has not, as yet, been furnished with a copy of the Report of the Committee appointed by the Court to investigate Sir Thomas Turton's defalcations; but with advertence to the opinion of Her Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor-general, the Governor-General in Council is desirous of possessing your sentiments as to whether Sir Thomas Turton can be criminally prosecuted for his default in office, with any reasonable chance of success.

Sir,

I HAVE for some time delayed answering your letter of the 27th of July last, in the hope that the Committee appointed to examine and report upon the accounts of Sir Thomas Turton, the late Ecclesiastical Registrar of the Supreme Court, would by this time have been able to make their Report. Some weeks will, however, I fear, still elapse before this can be done, and I therefore proceed to communicate, through you, my views upon the question referred to me by the Governor-general in Council; viz. "whether Sir Thomas Turton can be criminally prosecuted for his default in office, with any reasonable chance of success."

2. I entirely concur with the Attorney and Solicitor-general in the opinion, that Sir Thomas has been guilty of no statutable offence. He is clearly not within the scope of the 9 Geo. 4, c. 74; and if his misconduct falls within the letter of the 2 Will. 4, c. 4, that statute has never been extended to India. His offence, therefore, if indictable at all, must be a misdemeanor at common law; that it may be so, seems to be contemplated by the law officers of the Crown, for the statutes the 24 Geo. 3, c. 25, and the 26 Geo. 3, c. 57, which they think may be applicable to his case, create no new offence; they simply provide a new tribunal and procedure for the trial of certain classes of persons accused of the crime of extortion or other misdemeanors.

3. Sir Thomas Turton was Registrar of the Supreme Court on its Equity, Ecclesiastical, and Admiralty sides; he was appointed to that office by the Judges, under the powers vested in them by the 10th clause of the Letters Patent, commonly known as the Charter of Justice. He was, therefore, derivatively, an officer of the Crown, and upon the principles laid down by Lord Mansfield in the case of Charles Bainbridge (Howell's State Trials, vol. 22, p. 77 and p. 155), I should think Sir Thomas Turton is indictable for his default in office, unless it can be shown that the office in respect of which he has been guilty of such default is not "one of trust and confidence concerning the public."

The Ecclesiastical Registrar of the Supreme Court has, it is well known, certain functions which do not properly or naturally appertain to his office. Under the 39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 79, he is, under certain circumstances, entitled as of right to administer the estates of persons dying intestate. The administration of other estates of deceased persons devolves upon him in practice under the will, or by the act either of the deceased themselves, or of their representatives. He is further, under Act 17, of 1843, *ex-officio* trustee of trust funds brought within the operation of that Act. The defalcations of Sir Thomas Turton have arisen mainly in his administration of estates of deceased persons. From an account before me, for the precise accuracy of which I do not at present vouch, the gross amount of costs, balances due from him to such estates, appears to be Rs. 8,04,188. 10. 8. (of which the larger, though I cannot yet state what precise proportion, is due to estates of which he was administrator under the statute 39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 79). His defalcations, as official trustee, are stated at Rs. 12,036. 15. 8., whilst the monies which ought to have been in his hands as an officer of court, being suitors' monies deposited for costs and other purposes, do not appear to exceed Rs. 6,611. 12. 7.

4. In respect of his breaches of trust in the administration of estates, to which he administered otherwise than under the statute, I am clear that Sir Thomas Turton, like any other administrator, is only civilly responsible to the parties interested in those estates; as to these, therefore, no indictment will lie.

5. As to breaches of trust in the administration of the estates to which he administered *ex-officio* and by virtue of the statute, I have felt far more doubt. On the one hand, it may be argued that the duty of taking out administration to, and consequently that of faithfully administering these estates, is cast upon the Ecclesiastical Registrar as such by a public statute, that it has thereby become a duty inherent in his office, in the performance of which the public is as much concerned as in the performance of any other duty by an officer of justice; on the other hand, it may be argued that this selection of the Ecclesiastical Registrar is merely a matter of convenience for the parties interested in the estates, that his remuneration is derived not from the public, but from the particular

particular estates; that for every breach of duty by him, the law affords a civil remedy, and that such breaches of trust cannot be said to concern the public, which is no more affected by them than by those of ordinary executors or trustees. If the course taken by Parliament in the case of Mr. Ricketts, at Madras; viz. that of making the revenues of India, and therefore in a sense the State, liable for the defaults of the Registrar as official administrator, had established this liability as a principle, or was likely to be followed as a precedent on the present occasion, I should have no doubt as to the propriety of indicting Sir Thomas Turton for his malversations as official administrator; for in that case, his breach of duty would directly and materially affect the public; but if this liability be repudiated, the question whether Sir T. T. be amenable to the criminal law in respect of his defaults as administrator, seems to me to be one of doubt and difficulty; and the impolicy of doing anything which may be construed to imply a recognition of the liability of the State, is an additional reason why I should hesitate, as I do hesitate, to recommend a government prosecution of Sir Thomas, for any misappropriation of monies in his charge, as official administrator.

6. The same considerations apply to the malversations of Sir Thomas Turton, as official trustee, under Act 17, of 1843.

7. It appears to me, that if the misappropriation of the suitors' monies received by Sir Thomas Turton (Co.'s Rs. 6,611. 12. 7. in all), strictly, as Equity Registrar, can be brought home to him (and I do not anticipate much difficulty in respect of evidence on this point), he has been guilty of misconduct in office, amounting to an indictable misdemeanor. I believe that the amount in cash made over to the present Registrar did not exceed 5,000 rupees, and was therefore less than the whole amount of Equity deposits. Had it exceeded these, there might have been some difficulty in proving the misappropriation of these particular sums, as we have, I believe, no means of tracing the particular monies paid in.

8. Another ground on which I have always thought that Sir Thomas Turton is indictable, is his disobedience of the statute 55 Geo. 3, c. 84.* By the 5th * That this is a section of that Act, the Registrar is bound to keep the accounts of each estate misdemeanor at committed to him in a book open to the inspection of the public. He is also Common Law Rex v. Davis, bound to file in court, periodically, true and perfect schedules of all sums of money, Sayers, 163; bonds or other securities received on account of each estate remaining under his Queen v. Crossby, charge, together with the payments made thereout, and the balances. I believe 10 Ad. & E. 132; that it would not be difficult to show that the books kept by the late Registrar & Queen v. But were not in accordance with this enactment, and that the schedules filed were by no means true or perfect. It is, however, difficult to say, that the precise errors assignable imply a fraudulent intention. Many make against, though many others make for the Registrar; and all, I believe, arose less from design than from the generally loose manner in which the accounts of the office were kept. In the schedule filed as the practice was, so late as December 1847, though purporting to be a schedule of the assets as they stood in December 1846, there are various errors which may not unfairly be attributed to design. The Registrar is bound not to keep, unless under particular circumstances, a large cash balance in hand; it was therefore his interest, in order to avoid injury, to make the amount of the securities invested on account of any particular estate appear in the schedule to be as large, and to make the cash balance on account of that estate appear to be as small as possible. Now, in the schedule in question, I find, in the estate of John Athenass the cash balance is stated at 6,171. 13. 10, and the amount of securities is stated at 25,000 Sicca rupees. By the ledger, it appears that the real cash balance due to that estate was 15,050. 15. 7, and the securities only 17,000 Sicc a rupees, Company's paper, to the amount of 8,000 Sicca rupees having been sold in November or December 1846, but no notice of that transaction taken by those who made up the schedule. In the estate of Lieutenant Charles Dicken, the schedule debits the estate with a small cash balance, 470. 10. 5, and credits it with Government paper to the amount of 11,000 rupees. That Government paper had been sold in November 1846, and on the 31st December 1846 the ledgers show the state of the account to have been a cash balance of Rupees $11,67\overline{6}$. 11. 5, and no Government paper at all at the credit of that estate. There are other instances of the same kind; but the extreme carelessness of all the native writers in the office (and there were none but natives employed), the general confu-C sion

sion of the accounts, and the laxity of the whole system of the office were such, that it is possible Sir Thomas Turton may, in respect of these false entries, have been guilty of no more than a very culpable degree of carelessness, and may not have been himself conscious of the errors.

9. Upon the whole case his Lordship in Council will see I am of opinion, that an indictment against Sir Thomas Turton for the misapplication of the Equity deposits, or one for the omission to file a true and perfect schedule, pursuant to the statute, is the least open to objection, and affords the most reasonable grounds on which to expect a conviction. There is nothing to prevent two separate indictments being prepared against him for these distinct offences. There was not in the office a single employé on whose evidence I should be disposed to rely; and this circumstance, and the complexity and confusion of the accounts, would probably operate to prevent success in any but the simplest case. The cases, however, to which I have adverted, are simple, and evidence in them seems to be easily attainable.

10. Since I began this letter, I have examined more attentively the amounts relating to the Equity deposits. They consist of small sums deposited by way of security for the costs of an appeal or re-hearing. Some have been many years in the office, owing to the carelessness of those entitled to claim them, and were taken over by Sir Thomas (probably as items in account) from his predecessor. Others I may instance, 1,220 Sicca rupees, in a cause of the Rajah of Vizinagram v. John Muller and others, and a sum of 420 Co.'s rupees, in a cause of Wallace v. M'Kellar, were paid in during the year 1847–1848.

It will no doubt strike his Lordship in Council, that the most obvious objection to the adoption of the course suggested above is, that if it be followed, we shall be driven to indict Sir Thomas Turton for offences insignificant, when compared with the greater delinquencies, which, from the defects in the criminal law, we must leave unpunished; and that a conviction upon such charges can only entail a punishment proportioned to the nature and magnitude of the offence charged and proven.

MINUTE by the Right honourable the Governor-General; dated 26 September 1848.

I CIRCULATE the Advocate-general's opinion relative to the liability of Sir Thomas Turton to criminal prosecution, for the gross malversations of which he has been guilty in his office as Ecclesiastical Registrar.

The Advocate-general concurs in the opinion expressed by Her Majesty's Attorney-general and Solicitor-general.

I attach great weight to the observation in the concluding paragraph of the Advocate's letter.

If Sir Thomas Turton cannot be prosecuted with any probability of a conviction for the great crime of which he has been guilty, I think the Government would lower itself, and would err, if it were to pursue him for the minor and comparatively petty delinquencies he has committed.

I deeply regret that so great an offender should escape the punishment he merits. But the Government is powerless in the matter; and the Governorgeneral in Council can do no more than now place on record the evidence of his resolution to bring this criminal to trial and to punishment, if the state of the law had enabled him to do so.

MINUTE by the Honourable J. E. D. Bethune; dated 27 September 1848.

ECCLESIASTICAL REGISTRAR.

I HAD carefully examined all the statutes bearing on Sir Thomas Turton's case before perusing the opinions of the Attorney and Solicitor-general, and of the Advocate-general, and had fully satisfied myself of the soundness of the opinion to which they have come, that a successful prosecution of Sir Thomas Turton (except for the minor offence of not keeping regular accounts in the form and manner prescribed by the statute) would be extremely doubtful and difficult to carry through. I am also much struck by the observation of the Advocate-general, that if the Government could succeed in convicting him in ordinary course of law, as a public defaulter, the record of that conviction would very much strengthen the claim of the parties defrauded by him to be reimbursed out of the public funds; which claim has been hitherto (and as I think with reason), repudiated by Government.

I do not think it would be a dignified or proper course to indict Sir Thomas Turton for mere irregularities in book-keeping; in the hope that under colour of a conviction for this comparatively venial offence, he might be more severely punished than such misconduct alone would deserve, in consideration of the greater guilt which appears to be beyond the reach of the ordinary legal tribunals. But there is another course, which, however unusual and distasteful to the common way of thinking of English jurists, would appear to me fully justified by the enormity of Sir Thomas Turton's behaviour, and which has been resorted to by the Legislature in cases of delinquency which were not of deeper die than that now under consideration. I mean a retrospective Act, or what is popularly called an Act of Pains and Penalties. The greatest number of such Acts has been framed in disturbed periods of our history, in the form of attainders for high treason; there are, however, some precedents more nearly applicable to the present case.

The first of these is the South Sea Act of 1719 (7 Geo. 1, c. 28).

The South Sea Company was a corporate body, incorporated by Royal Charter, under authority of an Act of Parliament (9 Anne, c. 21), and consequently the separate estates of the shareholders were not answerable for its debts and liabilities. In the year 1718, an Act had been passed enabling them to undertake the payment of the national debts. In 1719, an Act was passed, which, after inveighing in its preamble in the strongest language against the conduct of the directors, declared all their estates forfeited for the benefit of the sufferers by their frauds, and disqualified them for holding any office or place of trust under the Crown, or for sitting or voting in Parliament.

In these penalties were also included Mr. Aislabie, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Mr. Craggs (neither of whom were directors), on the ground that they had confederated with the directors, and promoted and encouraged the pernicious execution of the South Sea scheme.

The second instance I shall quote, is that of Sir Thomas Rumbold. The Bill of Pains and Penalties introduced into the House of Commons by Mr Dundas. in 1782-3 (then Lord Advocate for Scotland), did not indeed pass; but this was owing to the conflict of parties, by which the attention of the House was drawn to other matters, and not to any feeling that an improper instrument of punishment had been resorted to.

Although many of the charges against Sir Thomas Rumbold (which may be seen in Hansard's Parliamentary History for 1782, April 29th) were of a political character, yet the gist of most of them lay in the suspicion against him that he had violated his covenants with the East India Company, had corruptly received money himself from the native potentates, and had connived at similar peculation in others; and it is remarkable (as we learn from the 2d Report of Mr. Dundas's Committee) that he was actually under prosecution by the East India Company (who had previously dismissed him from their service), at the same time that his conduct was under the inquiry of the Secret Committee, and possibly at the very time when the Bill of Pains and Penalties was brought in against him. As the Bill did not pass, I am not able here to learn what its provisions were, but something of their scope may be guessed by the preliminary Act (22 Geo. 3, c. 54), "For restraining Sir Thomas Rumbold, Bart., and Peter Perring, Esq., from 417. C 2 going

going out of this Kingdom for a limited time, and for discovering their Estates and Effects, and preventing the transporting or alienating the same."

By this Act, Sir Thomas Rumbold was required to enter into personal security for 100,000*l*. and five sureties for 10,000*l*. each, not to leave the kingdom, and in default to be committed to the Fleet. He was also disabled from alienating or encumbering his real or personal estate, unless by will. These proceedings, originated by Mr. Dundas, were supported by Burke, Fox and Pitt.

The case of Lord Macclesfield was referred to by Mr. Dundas as a precedent for his proceedings against Rumbold; but that was an impeachment, and not a Bill of Pains and Penalties.

It was, however, so far out of the common course, that it is doubtful whether the sentence pronounced on him could be justified in an ordinary proceeding under 6 Edw. 6, c. 16, which was the only statute under which the Managers for the Commons insisted that the sale of Masterships in the Court of Chancery was an offence already punishable by law. Some of the articles exhibited against him were clearly not prohibited by that or any other statute, or by the common law (see Hansard's Parl. Hist. 1725, 20 March). Such was Act 20, that the said Earl of Macclesfield, in breach of the trust reposed in him as Lord Chancellor, did borrow of the Master of the Court, and apply to his own private use, so long as he had occasion for the same, large sums of money belonging to the suitors. It was not alleged that any defalcation in the Master's accounts arose from this misappropriation of the Suitors' Fund, but, with that exception, which makes an enormous difference of guilt against the late Ecclesiastical Registrar, the charge against him is the same. The very words used by the Managers against Lord Macclesfield may be literally applied to him : "The guardian of orphans has proved their oppressor."

"Against apparent extortioners and robbers, we guard ourselves with a caution proportionable to the infamy of their characters; but when the sanctity of the laws and the ensigns of authority designed to defend and protect us, are made use of to invite us into ruin, how sure and extensive must that ruin be."

I am of opinion, therefore, that there is good ground for proceeding by way of an Act of Pains and Penalties against Sir Thomas Turton, and, for my own part, I am quite prepared to concur in an Act for inflicting on him as great a measure of punishment as he would have been liable to if he were strictly and technically within the letter of those laws against public defaulters, none of whom can possibly exceed him in real criminality; but that is a matter of detail, and, perhaps, in a proceeding so wholly new to the Indian Legislature (unless the retrospective laws against Thugs and Dacoits be deemed to furnish a precedent), it might be thought better to visit him with some infamous punishment short of actual transportation. I conceive that it would be right, not only as being conformable to English precedents, but as consistent with natural justice, that he should be allowed the opportunity of being heard by counsel against the Act, and that, as a necessary measure of precaution, a preliminary Act should be passed without delay, justifying the taking of him into custody, that he may be forthcoming to suffer whatever punishment the main Act, if passed, may inflict upon him.

Mrs. William Shortreed, the widow of late Captain William Shortreed, 1st European Bengal Fusileers, has empowered me to endeavour to obtain the settlement of her deceased husband's estate.

She is entirely dependent on Lord Clive's Fund and the proceeds of her late husband's estate, which will, when realized, amount to a sum not exceeding 500*l*. sterling.

I applied on Mrs. Shortreed's behalf to the present Registrar of the Supreme Court, for information regarding the sum of Rs.15,055.5a.11p., which was paid to Sir Thomas Turton, as Registrar of the Supreme Court, by Messrs. J. Munro & Co., of Calcutta, on account of Captain William Shortreed's estate; the following is an extract of Mr. Sandy's reply:

"The assets which were in the hands of the late Registrar are, I am afraid, lost, and the Government is not in any way bound, nor does it show an inclination to make good the loss, which, I am sorry to say, will, under such circumstances, fall upon the parties interested."

I would most respectfully beg to be informed if it is the intention of the Government of India to allow such a loss to fall upon one so ill able to afford it, and if I might be permitted to appeal in behalf of a deceased brother officer's widow, I would urgently entreat for redress, and to be made acquainted with the proper means of obtaining it, should this application be deemed insufficient.

THE CASE OF SIR THOMAS TURTON.

In the month of September 1848, the Advocate-general submitted his opinion on the liability of Sir Thomas Turton to criminal prosecution under the statutes, on account of the malversations of which he had been guilty as Ecclesiastical Registrar.

The Advocate-general concurred with Her Majesty's Attorney and Solicitorgeneral, that under the law as it stood Sir Thomas Turton could not be prosecuted for the principal crime which had been laid to his charge.

On receiving these concurrent opinions of the legal authorities, I recorded a minute, in which I stated my own opinion that the Government was powerless as against Sir Thomas Turton, and that it could do no more than place on record the evidence of its resolution to punish him, if the state of the law had permitted it.

Mr. Millett and Sir John Littler concurred in this view of the subject.

Mr. Bethune, while he agreed with the law officers in thinking that the law, as it stood, would not reach the main offence, and while he agreed also in thinking that it would be inexpedient to prosecute for a comparatively insignificant ir regularity, declared his opinion of the propriety of supplying the deficiency of the statute law, by passing in the Council an Act of Pains and Penalties for the punishment of the crime committed by Sir Thomas Turton. The measure proposed by Mr. Bethune was a very strong one; it was without precedent in 4^{17} . the proceedings of the Council of India, and consequently was of a character to forbid its being lightly determined upon, or hastily determined upon.

Moreover, the Committee appointed by the Supreme Court to examine and report upon the state of Sir Thomas Turton's office, had not completed their task, so as to afford a foundation for proceedings against him. They have not reported even now. For these reasons I delayed recording any further minute on the question, awaiting until the Report of the Committee be given in, and more especially until I should receive a reply to letters which I addressed, demiofficially, to the authorities at home on the subject, as soon as J received Mr. Bethune's minute.

The mail which has just arrived, and which might have brought me a reply, has not conveyed to me any observations on the subject. I will, therefore, no longer delay the expression of my sentiments on Mr. Bethune's proposal, which has been again brought under my notice by a demi-official letter from the President in Council, received by me a few days ago.

Sir Herbert Maddock informs me, that a general rumour prevails that Sir Thomas Turton is about to take his departure from India. He expected, at the time he wrote, that the Report of the Committee on Sir T. Turton's office, would be given in forthwith. He suggests, in accordance with Mr. Bethune's proposal, that an Act of Pains and Penalties against Sir T. Turton, should be passed; and that, to prevent the risk of his leaving India before the Act could be rendered complete, another preliminary Act should be passed (as I understand *per saltum*) authorizing the arrest and detention of Sir Thomas Turton for such specified time as will admit of the passing of the main Act.

I have given very anxious consideration to this question, not only since the receipt of the letter addressed to me by the President in Council, but during the time which has elapsed since Mr. Bethune delivered to me his minute.

It is quite unnecessary for me to repeat the declaration of my desire, personally, for the credit of the Government of India, to find the means of punishing this man; and although the measure proposed would be, as Mr. Bethune truly says, "unusual and distasteful to the common way of thinking of English jurists," I should not be deterred by any such considerations from promptly adopting it, if I could satisfy my own judgment that it would be successful.

I entertain very great doubts of its success.

Mr. Bethune, as I gather from his minute, and from the conversation we had upon the subject, feels no doubt whatever of the entire competency of the Council of India to pass such an Act.

Without placing my opinion for a moment on a question of law in competition with his, yet on various grounds I feel myself unable to entertain any confident opinion that the competency of the Council for passing such an Act would be admitted.

The enactment of a Bill of Pains and Penalties relating to such crimes as that with which Sir T. Turton is charged, is an event of very rare occurrence indeed, even in the Imperial Parliament.

Only two precedents are quoted, and one of these failed.

I am by no means confident that the power of the Council of India to pass a retrospective Act, inflicting punishment on an individual for a conduct which the statute law of England had not recognized to be a crime, and thus exercising an authority which the Imperial Parliament itself does not put forth except on the rarest occasions and at distant intervals, would be received as indisputable, either by legal authorities in England, or by the Honourable Court of Directors under whom we serve.

The Honourable Court has of late, on more occasions than one, evinced an inclination to hold that the legislative powers of the Council of India, on other points than those which are specially regulated by the Charter Act, are anything but co-extensive with the powers of other Legislatures; while it is very certain, that if the highest legal authorities of Her Majesty's Government and of the Honourable Company should be of opinion that the Council of India, in passing an Act of Pains and Penalties had exceeded its powers, or had even exercised a power that was questionable, their opinion would of necessity prevail, and very embarrassing results might be produced.

If the Act of Pains and Penalties, passed by the Council of India, should be disallowed, the result would be a triumph to the criminal, instead of a punishment. If the power to pass the Act should be questioned, it would lead to litigation, and to the stirring of propositions which might create unnecessary doubts, and lead to vexatious and endless controversy.

Having regard to these considerations, and to the doubts which I myself entertain of the recognition of the competency of the Council of India to exercise such a power, or, at all events, of the expediency of its exercising it without reference to the Honourable Court; having regard also to the rapidity with which such reference can now be made; I am adverse to the commencement of any proceedings in the Legislative Council of India without the previous sanction of the Court.

I have already stated, that within a few days after the receipt of Mr. Bethune's minute, I solicited, demi-officially, the instructions of the authorities at home on the point. It is more than probable that I shall receive those instructions; but, even if they should not reach me, I should still recommend strongly to the President in Council and to my colleagues, that the proceedings in question should not be commenced without the authority of the Court.

I recommend this course with the less hesitation, because, if it should turn out that Sir Thomas Turton in the meantime did actually quit India, his departure will not place him beyond the reach of punishment for the crime which he has committed in that country. An Act of Pains and Penalties against him may still, if it is thought right, be introduced into the Imperial Parliament. I think it infinitely better that we should hereafter recommend to those we serve to obtain the punishment of this man from Parliament, than that we should exercise what is to my mind a doubtful power, in making an attempt to punish him here, which attempt, if it fail, will place the criminal in a better position than that which he now occupies.

If it should be proposed to pass an Act for detaining him here until the orders of the Court may be received, in the same manner as it is proposed to detain him by an Act until the main Act should be passed, I must again reluctantly dissent. The expressions in Mr. Bethune's minute confirm my recollection of his having expressed doubts himself, in our conversation, of the expediency of inflicting the penalty of transportation in the proposed Act, and of his having contemplated inflicting by it the degradation of perpetual banishment from the territories of the East India Company.

In accordance with the doubts I have already expressed, I could not assent to the infliction of a sentence of transportation; and to pass an Act preventing a man from leaving the country, in order to give us time to pass another Act sending him out of it, would, in the eyes of the public generally, appear to be something so inconsistent, and even more, that I fear the effect would be bad.

I take the liberty, for the reasons I have stated above, to recommend to the President in Council not to pass an Act of Pains and Penalties against Sir Thomas Turton, without having obtained the previous sanction of the Honourable Court. And in case I should not receive a reply to my demi-official communications which may appear to be sufficiently authoritative, I would suggest that a full statement of the facts should be made by the next mail to the Court, the wishes of the Government of India explained, and the instructions of the Court requested.

This, however, cannot be done otherwise than hypothetically, if the Report of the Committee of the Supreme Court has not yet been before Government.

We think it right to state, that Sir Thomas Turton does not admit that his deficiencies amount to the sum at which they are estimated by the Commissioners. He has, in a letter addressed to us, protested, in a manner, against any publication of the Report until he has had an opportunity of examining it; but we consider it to be our duty to forward the Report without delay, and that we have no jurisdiction to enter upon the question of the accuracy of a necessarily ex-parte Report, and that we should not be justified in delaying its presentation to the Government here and in England, for whose general information on this painful subject the facts stated in the Report have been collected. We shall intimate to Sir Thomas Turton our decision, and offer him the means of examining the Report, and the documents annexed to it.

From the Commissioners appointed to inquire and report to the Supreme Court upon the Accounts of Sir *Thomas Edward Michell Turton*, Bart., to the Honourable the Justices of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort William, in Bengal; dated 25 January 1849.

Honourable Sirs,

WE, the Commissioners appointed by an order under the seal of the Supreme Court, bearing date the 8th of March 1848, to inquire and report to the court upon the accounts of Sir Thomas Edward Michell Turton, Bart., in relation to the deficiency of the assets which have at various times come to his hands, as administrator, under the Statute 39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 79, and also in relation to the deficiency (if any) in property belonging either to suitors of the court, or to other *cestuis que* trust, and come to the hands of Sir Thomas Turton, as Registrar of the court, on its Ecclesiastical, Equity and Admiralty sides, or as official trustee, under the Act 17 of 1843, have now the honour to present the following Report on the matter referred to us.

We regret that, for reasons which will presently appear, our Report has been long delayed, and even now fails to present the result of so full and complete an investigation as was probably expected at our hands.

The subjects of inquiry embraced in the reference to us, we understood to be— 1st., the amount of the gross deficiency in the assets lately under the administration tion of Sir Thomas Turton. 2d. The mode in which that deficiency was to be apportioned amongst the several estates and trusts committed to his charge. 3d. What were his means of meeting, and partially making good his liabilities to these estates.

It further appeared to us, that in dealing with the second head of inquiry, we ought to distinguish, and we understood that we were expected to distinguish, the precise character in which the late Registrar had received the various trust funds in question, because there might be considerations applicable to one or other class of trusts which were not applicable to all.

As Registrar on the Equity and Admiralty sides of the court, Sir Thomas Turton was entrusted with certain small sums deposited by suitors, by way of security for costs. These were classed generally in his books as "Equity deposits." He had also been specially appointed receiver in a suit in which Robert Denton and others were plaintiffs, and Bebee Poonah and others were defendants; of the estate of Mary Hollier and George Denton; and also in a suit wherein Gabriel Vregnin and others were plaintiffs, and Alexander Colvin and others were defendants; of the estate of Joseph Baretto, the elder; for the administration of which estates those suits had respectively been instituted.

We believe that the above two classes comprise all the monies entrusted to him, of which it can strictly be predicated that they were "monies belonging to suitors," and received by him as an officer of court.

The other trust funds committed to him in an official capacity, consisted of— 1st. Court fees received by him as Registrar on the Equity, Ecclesiastical and Admiralty sides of the court, for which he was accountable to Government. 2d. Monies belonging to an estate of which he had been appointed curator under Act 19 of 1841. 3d. Trust property, of which he was official trustee under Act 17 of 1843; and 4th. The estates of deceased persons, of whom he was, *ex-officio*, the legal personal representative in this country.

This last, and by far most important class, is again subdivisible under the following heads :

1st. Estates of intestates, to the administration of which he was entitled as of right, under the Statute 39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 79.

2d. Estates, the administration of which had devolved upon him by virtue of the wills of persons who had thought fit to appoint the Ecclesiastical Registrar for the time being their executor, or of powers of attorney from the foreign or other executor named in the will.

3d. Estates which were taken charge of by the Ecclesiastical Registrar, we presume, with a view to a grant of administration under the statute, in order to preserve the assets in the meantime; but of which, owing either to their insufficiency to bear the charge of administration, or to the claims of parties preferably entitled, or other causes, administration was never actually granted to him.

4th. Estates of Hindoos or Mahomedans, the administration of which had been granted to the Ecclesiastical Registrar, not as of right, but upon the consent of the parties principally interested therein.

There are certain estates which appear in one or other of the two first schedules, of which particular mention should be made. These are—the estates of Grace Elizabeth, General Popham, J. C. Smith, W. R. Munro, Jane Benjamin and General Stuart; of all these, the late Mr. John Palmer was an executor, and Sir Thomas Turton is the sole executor of Mr. John Palmer, the only other executor named having renounced probate.

In the year 1837, Sir Thomas Turton being then absent in Europe, but having appointed an attorney in this country, letters of administration *de bonis non*, both of Palmer's and of the above-mentioned estates, were granted to the then Ecclesiastical Registrar. The regularity of these grants was, we understand, questioned by Sir Thomas on his return, and the administration to Palmer's estate was recalled, but no formal attempt was made to revoke the letters of administration granted in the other estates, or to impeach any act done under them, and shortly after his return, he himself became Ecclesiastical Registrar.

Assuming that the late John Palmer was the sole or surviving executor of these several testators, the grant appears to have been irregular. Sir Thomas, however, seems to have kept the accounts of these estates in the public books of the office, and to have included the balance due to or from them, in the schedules periodically published by him as Ecclesiastical Registrar, and so far to have 417. D treated

treated them as being under his administration in his official capacity, up to the 1st of May 1846. On that day, we understand that he opened accounts with these estates in his private book ; but the accounts in the public books of the same estates were, nevertheless, continued for some purposes and to some extent until the 31st of December, on which day, it would appear from entries in the cashbook, that they were closed, as follows; viz. the account of Grace Elizabeth's estate, by transfers in account to Sir Thomas Turton, as executor of John Palmer, of 22,000 Sicca rupees and 700 Co.'s rupees, in Government paper, and of Rs. 2,469. 4. 8. in cash. The account of General Popham's estate, by a like transfer of 13,600 Sicca rupees in Company's paper, and a trifling cash balance of Rs. 9. 10. 1. remaining due to the administrator. The account of J. C. Smith's estate, by like transfer of 3,300 Sicca rupees and 900 Co.'s rupees, in Government paper, and of a trifling cash balance of Rs. 1. 3. 6. The account of W. R. Munro's estate, by like transfer of 11,200 Sicca rupees and 2,000 Co.'s rupees, in Government paper, and of Co.'s Rs. 262. 3. 4. in cash. The account of Jane Benjamin, by like transfers of 1,100 Sicca rupees in Government paper, and of Co.'s Rs. 275. 11. 9. in cash. The small balances appearing in the schedules hereto at the debit of those estates, arise from their respective proportions of the expense of printing and publishing the last two published schedules of the late Registrar, and other petty charges of administration not previously brought to account. All the above-mentioned transfers are stated in the books to be made as of the 1st of May 1845, but the balances transferred are the results of accounts which comprise sums received or paid subsequently to that date.

All the Company's paper belonging to these estates was removed from the office by Sir Thomas Turton, when he ceased to be Ecclesiastical Registrar; but various communications took place between him and his successor, touching these estates, and the result has been, that since the 25th of February 1848, the date to which the schedules hereafter mentioned are made up, the Government paper above stated to belong to the estate of Grace Elizabeth, of whom it appeared that Palmer was not the last surviving executor, as well as that abovementioned to belong to the estates of General Popham and W. R. Munro, of whom it was doubtful whether Palmer was last-surviving executor, has also been made over to Mr. Sandes, the present Registrar, as administrator de bonis non of those estates respectively; whilst the Government paper above-mentioned to belong to the estates of General Stuart, of whom Palmer was the executor, remains in the hands of Sir Thomas Turton as derivative executor; and that above-mentioned to belong to the estate of J. C. Smith, of whom Palmer was also surviving executor, has, at the request of the parties interested, been made over to Mr. Sandes, but as attorney for Sir T. Turton as the derivative executor. The Government paper, belonging as above-mentioned to the estate of Jane Benjamin, stands in the name of the Ecclesiastical Registrar as her administrator. It has been claimed by Sir Thomas Turton as executor of Palmer, on the ground that Palmer was trustee of the marriage settlement of Jane Benjamin, and that the paper was purchased or renewed, by mistake, in the name of the representative of Jane Benjamin, instead of that of the trustee of her marriage settlement, and has been handed over by him to the present Registrar for indorsement; Mr. Sandes, however, in the absence of satisfactory evidence in support of this claim, has declined to indorse or transfer the paper.

The estate of Joykissen Doss ought also to be specially noticed. He by his will appointed the Government of India his executors, and Mr. Morley, Mr. Oakes and Mr. Francis Macnaghten, then respectively filling the offices of Accountant-general, Sub-treasurer and Government Agent, as representing the Government, proved the will and appointed the Ecclesiastical Registrar their attorney to manage the estate. On the departure of Mr. Morley, the last of these gentlemen who remained in this country, the Ecclesiastical Registrar, with the sanction of Government, obtained letters of administration with the will annexed, to the estate, but continued to manage it in the same manner as theretofore; obtaining from the Treasury such sums as were required from time to time for paying the annuities left by the will, and the other charges incident to the management of the estate, and accounting for such sums; he never took the Company's paper into his possession, but left it in the hands of the Government Agent, who still holds it. On the 25th of February 1848 the Company's paper amounted in Sicca rupees to 2,49,200, and in Company's rupees to 40,600: and

and it is included in the paper hereafter mentioned to have been delivered over by the late to the present Registrar.

Sir Thomas Turton ceased to hold office on the 25th of February 1848. The only trust funds then in his hands capable of being made over, and in fact made over to his successor, we find to have been the following :-

1. Government paper in the Treasury, viz. 1st. Paper deposited there on account of estates administered to by the Ecclesiastical Registrar under the 39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 79, and consisting of 1,494 notes, aggregating in Sicca rupees 25,87,385, and in Company's rupees 71,380. 2d. Other Government paper, also in the Treasury, but deposited on account of the Registrar as official trustee, under Act 17 of 1843, and consisting of 29 notes, aggregating in Sicca rupees 1,00,300, and in Company's rupees 56,400; and, 3d. The Government paper belonging to the estate of Joykissen Doss, amounting in Sicca rupees to 2,49,200, and in Company's rupees to 40,600 in the hands of the Government Agent, as we have before mentioned.

2. Government paper held by Sir Thomas Turton in one or other of his official capacities, but not deposited in the Treasury; viz. 181 notes and nine stock receipts, aggregating in Sicca rupees 8,02,990, and 130 notes, aggregating in **Co.**'s rupees 4,45,000.

3. The following other securities, held by Sir Thomas Turton in trust as aforesaid; viz.

261 Bank of Bengal shares.

- 211 Union Bank shares.
- $30\frac{1}{2}$ Agra Bank shares.
 - 1 Reliance Marine Insurance Company's share.
 - 2 Policies in the Laudable Life Insurance Society.
 - 1 Docking Company's share.
 - 1 Certificate of 20 shares in the North of India Railway Company.
 - 11 Shares in the India General Steam Navigation Company.
 - 10 Shares in the Bengal Coal Company.
 - 2 Shares in the Bonded Warehouse Association.
 - 1 Certificate for 10 shares in the United Life Insurance Company; and 1 Delhi Bank share.

4. Of the following sums of cash; viz. Rs. 5,049. 8. 9. standing to the account of Sir Thomas Turton as Registrar, in the Oriental Bank; the sum of Rs. 3,144. 7. 7., principally in Bank of Bengal notes, but partly in cash, which was found in the hands of the cashier of the office, enclosed in an envelope, with a memorandum thereon, endorsed to the effect that the money belonged, as to Rs. 1,738. 3. 7., part thereof, to the estate of C. O. H. Bridgman, and as to the residue, to the estate of R. T. Whiter; and, lastly, of a sum of Rs. 397. 5. 9., which, some time after Mr. Sandes became Registrar, was handed over to him by the then cashier of the office, as belonging to the estate of G. S. Fraser.

The Government paper thus delivered over by Sir T. Turton on the 25th of February 1848 amounted in Sicca rupees to 37,39,875, and in Company's rupees to 12,55,800, aggregating in Sicca and Company's rupees, without distinguishing the two classes of papers, 49,95,675 rupees.

The above does not include the Government paper in Sir Thomas Turton's hands as real or supposed derivative executor of Grace Elizabeth, General Popham, J. C. Smith, W. R. Munro and Jane Benjamin, no part of which, as we have stated, was made over until a subsequent period.

This was the state of the assets ; the gross deficiency was, of course, the difference between them and the amount of the securities and cash which ought to have been in hand on the 25th of February 1848. To ascertain this latter amount, and to apportion both the assets forthcoming, and the deficiency amongst the several estates and trusts, comprised all which we had to do under the two first heads of inquiry. This would have been a simple task had the records of the office been in the state in which they ought to have been. Such, however, was not the case, and we must now describe the state in which we found these records, and the manner in which we have dealt with them, for it is only by so doing that we can explain either what we have done or what we have been obliged to leave undone, or account for the delay in the presentation of our Report, or its imperfections as presented.

We need hardly mention, that by the 55 Geo. 3, c. 84, s. 5, the Ecclesiastical Registrar is required in all cases in which he is appointed administrator under the 39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 79, besides filing an inventory and account current according to the tenor of the administration and the usual course of the Ecclesiastical Court, to enter in a book, to be kept by him for the purpose, separate and distinct accounts of each estate, and of all such sums of money, bonds and other securities for money, goods, effects and things as shall come to his hands, or to the hands of any persons employed by him, and likewise of all payments made by him for or on account of the said estates, and of all debts due by or to the same, specifying the dates of such receipts and payments respectively, which book was to be kept in the Registrar's office, and to be open for the inspection of all persons, &c. &c.

Such a book was obviously designed to be the record of the office, and to show the state of the Registrar's account with each estate under his administration by virtue of the statute.

The number of the estates of which the administration devolved on the Ecclesiastical Registrar, and the magnitude of his daily transactions, gave rise to a more complex system of accounts than that which appears to have been contemplated by the above-cited enactment. If, however, the books which were opened and kept had been regularly and properly kept, all the requisities of the statute would have been complied with, and its object fully attained.

For many years the Ecclesiastical Registrar has kept a set of books, consisting of cash-books and ledgers, with certain subsidiary waste and other books for each year, and comprising not only the estates of which he was administrator under the statute, but all the estates of deceased persons under his administration, and also the Equity deposits and monies received in respect of court fees, comprising, therefore, every description of trust funds enumerated above as under Sir Thomas Turton's charge, except the funds of which he was a trustee under Act 17 of 1843, and his receipts on account of the estate of Mary Hollier and George Denton; for his account with the estate of Joseph Baretto, the other estate of which he was receiver, appears, from accident or design, to have been kept in those books.

It is clear, that if these ledgers had been properly kept and balanced, they would have shown, not only the particulars of all the estates and the other accounts comprised in them, so far as they purported to contain such particulars, but in their general results would have corresponded not only with the cash-book from which they purported to have been posted up, but also with the inventories and account current filed by the Registrar, according to the ordinary course of the Ecclesiastical Court, and with those schedules which, by the subsequent part of the 5th sect. of 55 Geo. 3, c. 84, he was required periodically to exhibit in court, and cause to be published.

What, then, was the state of these books, the records of the office, on the 25th of February 1848?

The cash-book of 1846 appeared to have been regularly closed and balanced up to the 31st of December of that year, and the balance therein had been carried into the cash-book of 1847. The accounts actually opened in the ledger of 1846 also appeared to be written up and balanced in the usual way, except that the additions of these accounts had been made merely in pencil.

There were no entries in the ledgers of 1847 of a date posterior to May 1847. The cash-book of that year purported to have been written up to the 31st of December; and there were some rough waste-books, containing the transactions between that date and the 25th of February 1848.

To ascertain the gross cash deficiency, it was therefore necessary, assuming the books as far as they went to be correct, to write up and balance the cashbook as of the 25th of February 1848. To ascertain how that deficiency was divisible amongst the different estates, it was necessary to post up the ledgers from May 1847.

The accounts had been wholly kept by native mohurrirs and writers employed in the office. No European clerk or accountant was employed there. We felt that we could not safely undertake the task of bringing up or investigating the accounts without the assistance of an European accountant, and one wholly unconnected with the office; after due inquiry, we made the necessary arrangements with Mr. Mackellar, who had been for some years an assistant in the late firm

firm of Cockerell & Co., and that gentleman, with whose diligence and intelligence we have had every reason to be satisfied, undertook, with the aid of certain writers selected by himself, and occasional assistance from such of the former employés as remained in the office, and in particular of Ramrutton Gangooly, who had been represented to us by Sir Thomas Turton to be the person most conversant with the accounts, to make up and balance the books.

At the outset of the inquiry, however, and in consequence of the expressed desire of Sir Thomas Turton, Ramrutton Gangooly was directed to make up and render an account, showing what, according to his view of the books. was the state of Sir Thomas Turton's account with the office.

That account is set forth in the Appendix, and is marked No. 1. It was communicated to Sir Thomas Turton, signed by him, and returned to us in a letter, also set forth in the Appendix, and marked No. 2.

That account debits Sir Thomas Turton with Rs.8,70,224. 3. 1., as apparently due on the 25th of February 1848, which balance, by corrections, consisting mainly of remittances stated to have been omitted in the cash-book, although they ought to have been there charged against sundry estates, it afterwards reduces to Co.'s Rs.6,74,313. 15. 1. The dates of the remittances alleged to have been omitted show that if this statement of account be correct, the cashbook of 1846, as well as that of 1847, must have been erroneously kept. Sir Thomas Turton expressed his willingness to be bound by this account; it was, however, obvious to us, that very little dependence could be placed upon it, and we directed the books to be balanced and made up irrespectively of it.

Mr. Mackellar's first act was to sum the ledgers of 1846. Upon inspecting these books, he found that, in fact, only 903 accounts with credit, and about 169 accounts with debit balances had been opened in them. Other estate accounts (in all 1,351), which appeared in the last published schedule of the Registrar, had never been opened in these books at all, although such schedule purported to be a schedule of the estates as the same stood on the 31st of December 1846. It should, however, be mentioned, that of these 1,351 accounts, only 25 showed balances at credit exceeding 1,000 rupees each, the aggregate of such balances being Rs. 61,926. 14. 11. Of the rest, 1,204 showed small balances at credit under 1,000 rupees each, and aggregating Rs.1,07,494. 9. 5.; two showed balances at debit exceeding 1,000 rupees each, and aggregating Rs.3,191. 10. 2., and the remaining 120 showed balances at debit under 1,000 rupees each, and aggregating Rs.4,788. 2. 10. All probably were estates in which no transactions had taken place during the year 1846. There were also 18 Equity deposit accounts, aggregating Rs. 6,501. 12. 7., which had never been carried over from the books of 1845. Mr. Mackellar accordingly took the omitted estate balances as they stood in the last schedule filed, and also the omitted Equity deposits from the books of 1845. He thus arrived at the balances to be carried forward into the ledgers of 1847. The general result showedbalances to the credit of various accounts to the amount of Rs. 9,33,906. 7. 11.; balances to the debit of various accounts to the amount of Rs.96,933. 5. in the whole, and, therefore, an apparent cash balance in the hands of the Registrar, as on the 31st of December 1846, of Rs.8,36,973. 2. 11., whilst, on the other hand, the cash balance carried from the cash-book of 1846 into that of 1847 was Rs. 8,39,486. 6.

Mr. Mackellar next proceeded to make up the books of 1847. His materials for this operation were the following; viz. two cash-books, four lists, showing the interest drawn on securities deposited in the Treasury; one similar list, showing the interest drawn on securities not deposited in the Treasury, but retained in the office; one commission book, one administration costs book, a postage list, one rough remittance book, and sundry original bills for advertising, &c., 15 waste books, two receipts books, one bills receivable book, and five house-rent bills books.

The cash-books were carefully checked with the other books and documents enumerated above, and brought up to and balanced as of the 25th February 1848, and the ledgers have been duly posted up from the cash-books. In the course of this operation, many entries were brought to account which did not appear in the books when examined by Ramrutton Gangooly for the purpose of rendering the account of the 10th of April (No. 1.), above referred to. The attention of Ramrutton has, however, been drawn to all those new or altered 417. entries.

30

entries, and he has himself checked them, and admitted their correctness. If, therefore, there be any error in the accounts as now made up, it is due, we believe, either to the errors existing in the accounts anterior to the 1st of January 1847, or to the absence of all accounts and vouchers relating to sums which may have been received or paid on account of certain estates in the course of the year 1847, and not brought to account.

That the books, anterior to the 1st of January 1847, are inaccurate, and not to be depended upon, is a conclusion to which we have reluctantly, but confidently, come. We have before mentioned that upon the books of 1846, as they were first balanced, there was an excess in the cash balance shown by the cashbooks over the aggregate of the cash balances shown by the ledgers; whereas they ought, of course, to have precisely squared. In making up and checking the books of 1847, it transpired, however, that remittances to the amount of Rs. 72,529. 7. 10., which had been made in the latter part of 1846, had never been brought to account in the cash-book of that year, although written up in the ledgers. This appears also by Ramrutton Gangooly's account, No. 1. On the other hand, it also transpired, that interest had been received on account of estates in that year, the receipt of which was not entered in the cash-book, although written up in the ledgers; and these several errors having been rectified, by continuing the cash-book of 1846 and opening a suspense account in the ledger, the result ultimately arrived at was, that if the cash-books for that year had been properly kept, they would have shown only a cash balance of Rs.7,71,463. 0. 10., whereas the ledgers would still have shown a cash balance of Rs.8,36,973. 2. 11. to be accounted for on the 31st of December 1846, and that there was therefore a difference of Rs. 65,510. 2. 1. between the cash-books and the ledgers; in other words, that sums to that amount had either been carried to the credit of estates in the ledgers without being entered in the cash books, or that payments on account of estates had been entered in the cash-books, and never posted up in the ledgers. The error, whatever it be, has however no relation to the remittances above referred to, all of which had previously, as before stated, been duly carried in the ledgers of 1846 to the debit of the several estates on account of which they were made.

Ramrutton Gangooly states that there were, and indeed can point to other payments entered in the cash-book of that year, for which no credit has been taken by the Registrar in the ledgers. On the other hand, he admits that there are also errors of the opposite kind; and the conclusion at which we have arrived is, that the books, from at least the 1st of January 1843, are not to be depended upon as accurate records of the transactions of the office.

So far this conclusion is a deduction from discrepancies in the books themselves, and the statements of Gangooly in reference thereto; but it is supported by other and wholly extrinsic evidence.

In endeavouring, as we shall hereafter more particularly mention, to account for the differences between the amounts of securities appearing in the books to belong to certain estates, and of the securities actually in hand and appropriated to these estates, and also to trace the estates on account of which securities, apparently unappropriated, had been purchased, we had occasion to consult the accounts current filed in court by Sir Thomas Turton, according to the ordinary course of the Ecclesiastical Court, and these, both as regarded receipts and payments, we found to differ, in many instances, materially from the accounts of the same estates as recorded in the books.

Under these circumstances there were two courses open to us; first, to enter upon an investigation of the accounts of the office, from the time at which Sir Thomas Turton became Ecclesiastical Registrar, a period of more than six years; or, secondly, to make a report upon the accounts as they stood, premising that many of the results might or might not be accurate.

We have determined to adopt, in the first instance at least, the latter of these courses, for the following reasons:

1st. Because it appeared to us desirable to publish, without further delay, for the information of those concerned, the amount of the assets belonging to each estate which are still forthcoming.

2d. Because, if it were possible for us (which we saw reason to doubt, to ascertain conclusively the real amount of the deficiency in each estate, we could only do so by means of a long and expensive inquiry, involving the taking of the accounts accounts of upwards of 2,000 estates, during a period, in many instances, of six years' accounts which, when taken, would be binding in law neither on Sir Thomas Turton nor on those interested in the estates.

3d. Because we had not the means of prosecuting such an inquiry effectively, or of providing for the expense which it necessarily involved.

Acting on this determination, we have caused the Schedules annexed to this our Report to be prepared; they are as follows; viz.—

Schedule (A.), containing an Alphabetical List of all the Estates which, on the 25th of February 1848, were under the administration of Sir Thomas Turton, by virtue, of the Statute 39 & 40 Geo. 3, c. 79, and showing in a columnar form, in respect of each estate,

- 1. The Amount of the Government Paper and other Securities which ought on that day to have been forthcoming, on account of such Estates.
- 2. The Amount of Cash at the Credit or Debit of such Estate on that day.
- 3. The Amounts of such Securities actually received by the present, from the late Registrar; and,
- 4. The deficiency (if any) in such Securities, and any other remarks specially applicable to the particular Estate.
- Schedule (B.), containing a like List of Estates under the Administration of Sir Thomas Turton as Ecclesiastical Registrar, on the 25th of February 1848 (other than the Estates of Hindoos and Mahomedans), the administration of which had devolved upon him or his predecessors in office, either under the Wills of the Testators, or by virtue of some Power of Attorney, or otherwise than of right under the statute.
- Schedule (C.), containing a like List of Estates of Intestates under the charge of the late Registrar, but of which, owing to their smallness or other cause, no Letters of Administration were ever taken out.
- Schedule (D.), containing a like List of all the Estates of Hindoos and Mahomedans under the administration of Sir Thomas Turton, as Ecclesiastical Registrar, on the 25th of February 1848.
- Registrar, on the 25th of February 1848. Schedule (E.), containing a List of the Equity Deposits in the hands of Sir Thomas Turton, as Registrar, on the 25th of February 1848, and showing the Title of the Causes in which such Deposits were made.
- Schedule (F.), containing a List of the Trusts committed to Sir Thomas Turton, under Act 17 of 1843, and under his charge on the 25th February 1848, showing the Amounts of Government Paper, other Securities and Cash which ought to have been in hand at that date on account of each Trust, and the Amounts then actually in hand.

It has been deemed unnecessary to make any special mention in these Schedules of the deficiency in the cash balances, because, with the exception of the unappropriated sum of Rs. 5,049. 8. 9. received from the Oriental Bank, of the sum of Rs. 3,144. 7. 7. found in the envelope, and of the sum of Rs. 397. 5. 9. received from the late cashier of the office as before-mentioned, no cash whatever is forthcoming, and all the cash balances at the credit of estates, with the exception of the three estates of Bridgeman, Whiter and Frazer before mentioned, must, therefore, be treated as deficient.

There being but one estate, that of Ramnarain Coondoo, of which Sir Thomas Turton was curator under Act 19 of 1841, we have thought it unnecessary to make a separate Schedule under this head; by the accounts of this estate, it, on the 25th of February 1848, consisted of Company's paper to the amount of 2,500 Sicca rupees, the whole of which is forthcoming, and of a cash balance of Co.'s Rs. 1,137. 12. 9., the whole of which is lost.

For the same reason, we have not made a separate Schedule of the estates of which Sir Thomas Turton was receiver. The accounts of these estates stand on the 25th of February 1848 as follows: the estate of Mary Hollier and George Denton consisted of Company's paper to the following amounts; viz. 9,000 Sicca rupees and 33,500 Co.'s rupees, the whole of which is forthcoming; there was a cash balance apparently due to the Receiver from this estate of Rs. 7,742. 12. 3. On account of Joseph Barretto's estate there was a balance apparently due to the Receiver of Rs. 751. 11. 10.; there was no Company's paper belonging to this estate, which now consists only of a small piece of land situate in Calcutta.

That

That Schedules (A.), (.B), (C.) and (D.) contain all the estates of deceased persons which, on the 25th of February 1848, were under the administration of Sir Thomas Turton as Ecclesiastical Registrar, we have ascertained, by causing the lists set forth in these Schedules to be carefully compared with the Schedule of the estates made over to Sir Thomas Turton by his predecessor, Mr. Dickens, as admitted by the former, and with the records of probates and letters of administration subsequently granted.

That Schedule (F.) contains a true list of all the trusts of which Sir Thomas Turton was official trustee, we have in like manner ascertained, by causing the list set forth in this Schedule to be compared with the several orders of Court made . under Act 17 of 1843.

Schedules (A.), (B.), (C.), (D.) and (E.) have all been made up from the books of the office, of which so much has been said above; the results shown by them must therefore be taken subject to the observations we have already made or shall hereafter have to make, touching the possible inaccuracy of those books.

The accounts relating to the funds of which Sir Thomas Turton was trustee under Act 17 of 1843, were very loosely kept; there was no regular book of account relating to them, but we have caused them to be made up from the waste-books, receipt-books, interest and rent bills-books above mentioned, and the original vouchers found in the office. If there be any error in them as now rendered, such error must arise from the omission to enter or keep any record of sums received or paid on account of such trust estates.

The results shown by these Schedules as regards the cash balances for which Sir Thomas Turton was accountable on the 25th of February 1848, are as follows; viz.—

There appears to be due from him,

- 1. To estates comprised in Schedule (A.), balances to the amount of Rs. 8,37,562. 14. 1.
- 2. To estates comprised in Schedule (B.), balances to the amount of Rs. 78,140. 10. 3.
- 3. To estates comprised in Schedule (C.), balances to the amount of Rs. 21,287. 13.
- 4. To estates comprised in Schedule (D.), balances to the amount of Rs. 64,820. 15. 2.
- 5. In respect of Equity deposits as per Schedule (E.), sums amounting to Rs. 7,351. 12. 7.
- 6. In respect of trust funds as per Schedule (F.), sums amounting to Rs. 14,638. 9.

To these sums must be added a small balance of Rs. 773. 15. due from him in respect of court fees received by him, but not accounted for to Government, and also the balance of Rs. 1,137. 12. 9. due by him as curator to the estate of Ramnarain Coondoo, which last-mentioned two sums are not included in any of the above-mentioned Schedules. Upon these accounts, therefore, the total amount due from him is Rs. 10,25,714. 5. 10.

On the other hand, there appears to be due to him,

- 1: From estates comprised in Schedule (A.), balances amounting to Rs. 89,451.
- 2. From estates comprised in Schedule (B.), balances amounting to Rs. 18,258. 5. 10.
- 3. From estates comprised in Schedule (C.), balances amounting to Rs.1,825. 7. 5.
- 4. From estates comprised in Schedule (D.), balances amounting to Rs. 21,391. 3. 6.
- 5. From estates comprised in Schedule (F.), balances amounting to Rs.2,601. 9. 4.

And in respect of his Receiver's accounts, Rs. 7,742. 12. 3. and Rs. 751. 11. 10., making together Rs. 8,494. 8. 1. The total amount apparently due to him is, therefore, Rs. 1,42,022. 2. 2.

The difference between these two sums is Rs. 8,83,692. 3. 8., a sum which, it will be seen, very greatly exceeds the sum at which the liabilities of Sir Thomas Turton are estimated by the account rendered by Ramrutton Gangooly. Some explanation explanation of the difference between these results will be found at the end of this Report.

Whether the larger amount with which we have, *primâ facie*, charged Sir Thomas Turton be reducible or not, is, as we have before shown, uncertain; if, however, it be reducible, it is so only by proof of errors in the official books and accounts kept by writers in the employ of Sir Thomas Turton prior to the 1st of January 1847, or of payments of which no record or voucher is to be found in the office. We profess only to give the results of the books as they existed in February 1848, and of the additions made to them from materials found in the office at that date.

We think it necessary further to observe, that, although in estimating the sum for which Sir Thomas Turton is a defaulter, it may be right to give him credit for the balances apparently due to him; that sum does not correctly measure the amount of his legal liability, or of the gross deficiency in the assets belonging to the various estates and trusts committed to his charge. In the first place, we are by no means clear that Sir Thomas's claim to these sums as still due to him could, in all cases, be substantiated; in the second, the Ecclesiastical Registrar was, in point of law, no more entitled to advance the monies belonging to Estate (A.) for the purposes of Estate (B.) than he was entitled to apply them to his own use, and it by no means follows that the monies so advanced will be recoverable in full, or that such as may be recovered will be traceable to the particular estate from which they were borrowed, or capable of being applied otherwise than the other monies which may be recovered from Sir Thomas Turton's estate, that is, by way of dividend on the general amount of his official liabilities.

It seems, therefore, more proper to state the gross apparent deficiency in cash, at the larger sum of Rs. 10,25,714.5.10, and to treat the sum of Rs. 1,42,022. 2. 2: as a part of Sir Thomas Turton's estate, of which so much as may be recovered will be specially applicable to the discharge of his official liabilities.

We now proceed to state shortly in what state we have found the securities, and the manner in which we have dealt with them.

We have before stated, in detail, that the late Registrar, on quitting office;. delivered over to his successor Government securities to the amount of 49.95,675 rupees, partly Sicca and partly Company's rupees, between which, for the purposes of this statement, it is unnecessary to distinguish. On the other hand, by the books as they then stood, it appeared that the gross amount of Government securities which (taking in like manner the Sicca and Company's rupees. together), ought then to have been in hand, was 50,92,675 rupees. There was therefore apparently a gross deficiency in Government securities to the amount of 97,000 rupees. Of the Government securities so delivered over by the late Registrar, a list, distinguishing the estates to which they were supposed to belong, was made up, partly from lists made by the late Registrar, and sent by him, with the securities comprised in them, to the Treasury, partly from the securities actually found in the office, according to their respective indorsements. A comparison however of this list with the books as they then stood, presented this. further discrepancy: - it was found, on the one hand, that securities to the amount of 1,54,200 rupees in the whole, appeared in the books at the credit of certain estates, but were not entered in the list as belonging to those estates; on the other hand, that other securities, to the amount of 57,200 rupees in the whole, were entered in the list as belonging to certain other estates, but were not written up in the books to the credit of such estates.

The adjustment of the securities delivered over in the state we have mentioned, has been a work of time, and considerable labour. The means of accounting for the apparent deficiency, and of correcting the apparent errors in the list, were sought in the accounts current of estates filed in court; in rough memorandum-books, showing the sale and purchase of Company's paper by the late Registrar; in books relating to Government paper sent to or taken out of the Treasury; in waste-books, letter-books, Bengalee books, and other documents found in the office; and in the examination both of the securities thenselves and the indorsements thereon, and of the earlier records of the office.

Upon an examination of these materials, many errors and omissions were discovered, in both the list and the books; those in the former consisting in the misdescription of securities arising chiefly from the indorsements by the Registrar, or from the renewal by him, as administrator of one estate, whereas they ought 417. E

to have been renewed by him as administrator of another estate, the errors and omissions in the books being occasioned sometimes by leaving Government paper still entered to the credit of certain estates, although such paper had been sold, and the estates credited with the proceeds: at other times by omitting to bring Government paper, which had been purchased on account of particular estates, to the credit of those estates, or to record transfers which had actually been made in specie to legatees or other persons entitled thereto.

The results of the investigation as to the apparent deficiency of 1,54,000 rupees, are, --

Ist. That in one estate, that of Zachariah Manassur, Government paper to the amount of 5,300 Co.'s rupees was apparently deficient, and no trace of the actual sale of that paper could be discovered, yet, inasmuch as the proper records in the office show that this paper was taken out of the Treasury with other papers on the 31st of March 1847, "for the purpose of being sold, and of remitting the proceeds to the Crown," and there are entries in the books, and copies of letters addressed at different periods in 1847 by Sir Thomas Turton to Mr. George Maule, the Solicitor of the Treasury and nominee of the Crown, from which it would seem that such proceeds were in fact remitted, and that by reason of such remittances a cash balance of Rs. 5,903. 9. has become due to the late Registrar from this estate, we find sufficient grounds for the conclusion that the missing paper was properly sold, and that the apparent deficiency is altogether due to errors and omissions in the books,

2d. That Government paper to the amount of 85,700 rupees has actually been sold in the course of administration; but the proceeds of such sales not having been duly carried to the credit of the estates to which they belonged, must be included in the cash balances due from the late Registrar to such estates, and form part of the general cash deficiency.

3d. That other Government paper to the amount of 42,800 rupees had been erroneously continued in the books as belonging to certain estates, although it had been actually sold or paid away in the course of administration, and entries made in the books accordingly.

4th. That in other estates Government paper to the amount of 2,600 rupees had been transferred to legatees in satisfaction of their legacies, but that no entries of these transfers had been made in the books.

5th. That other Government paper, to the amount of 13,200 rupees, appeared from the accounts to belong to certain estates to which it had been written up in the books, but was indorsed as still belonging to other estates; and that the residue of the apparent deficiency of 1,54,200 rupees before mentioned, amounting to 4,600 rupees, of which 600 Co.'s rupees, belonged to the estate of Mrs. R. A. Ferrao, and 4,000 Co.'s rupees to the estate of Charles Coles, is an actual deficit, there being no record of any sale of such Government paper by the late Registrar, as the representative of those estates, or any trace of what has become of the paper.

The result of the investigation as to the before-mentioned Government paper, to the amount of 57,200 rupees, mentioned in that list, are—

1st. That securities for 13,200 rupees had been purchased for certain estates, but no entry made in the ledgers to indicate for what estates they had been purchased.

2d. That other securities, to the amount of 25,300 rupees, had been received on account of other estates, but no entry of such receipts made in the ledgers.

3d. That a Government paper to the amount of 1,000 rupees had been found in the office, which, though entered in the books of 1846 to the credit of a particular estate, had not been carried from the books of that year into those of 1847.

4th. That other securities, to the amount of 13,200 rupees, appeared to belong to estates to which they did not in fact belong, either having been sold and transferred to other estates, to the credit of which they were entered up in the books, but not indorsed in conformity with such transfers, or having been originally received on account of estates other than those specified in the list, and that the residue, amounting to 4,500 rupees, remains unappropriated, and cannot be traced to any estates.

There are some observations with respect to the particular items comprised in the above general results, and to the particular estates affected by these results, which we deem it necessary to make.

lst. As

Ist. As to the deficiency in the securities belonging to the estate of Mrs. R. A. Ferrao.—The books show that a certain Government paper for 600 rupees ought to have been in hand on account of this estate, on the 25th of February 1848. By an account current of the estate filed in court on the 10th of December 1847, and made up to the 20th of August 1847, that paper appears to have been in hand at the latter date. There is nothing to show either that this paper has actually been sold, or that there was any occasion for selling it. According to the accounts, a cash balance of Rs.253. 7. 6. exclusive of the value of the missing security, is due from the late Registrar to this estate.

2d. As to the deficiency in the securities belonging to the estate of Charles Coles. -- According to the books, a Government paper for 4,000 rupees, was purchased on account of this estate on the 31st of August 1846. This is apparently confirmed by the account current of this estate, filed in court on the 31st of October 1846, and dated on the 31st of August of that year, from which it would appear that such a security was forthcoming at the latter date. We cannot, however, discover that any such investment was ever actually made; Ramrutton Gangooly has stated, that the entries in the books and account current, were made in anticipation of the splitting of a certain note for 5,000 rupees, of which it was intended to appropriate 4,000 rupees to this estate, but that this note for 5,000 rupees, together with others, amounting in all to 25,000 rupees, was afterwards, and about the 2d of February 1848, sold by one Parbutty Sunker, a writer in the office, by Sir Thomas Turton's order, on some other account. According to the books, a cash balance of Rs. 257. 1., exclusive of the value of the missing security, is also due from the late Registrar to the estate of Charles Coles.

3d. As to certain paper supposed to have been renewed in the wrong name, thus occasioning one of the discrepancies between the books and the list above adverted to.—This relates to paper to the amount of 3,700 rupees, which by the books appears to belong to the estate of one Gregory Lucas. The original representative of that estate, was one C. Galastaun, upon whose death intestate, the late Registrar took out administration to his estate, and also administration *de bonis non* to the estate of Gregory Lucas. The paper in question having been renewed at the Treasury, appears to have been erroneously issued to Sir Thomas Turton as administrator to the estate of C. Galastaun instead of being renewed to him as administrator *de bonis non* of the estate of Gregory Lucas. Hence has arisen an apparent deficiency in the securities belonging to the estate of Gregory Lucas, and an apparent surplus in the securities belonging to the estate of C. Galastaun, This error we have corrected in the schedule, and have treated this paper as belonging to the estate of G. Lucas.

4th. With respect to the unappropriated paper to the amount of 4,500 rupees. -This was found to consist of the following notes : No. 10,822, for 1,000 Sicca rupees; No. 785, for 1,000 Co.'s rupees; No. 908, for 500 Co.'s rupees; No. 4,362. for 500 Co.'s rupees; No. 16,031, for 500 Co's. rupees; and No. 15,752 for 1,000 Sicca rupees. The first formerly belonged to the estate of C. W. Jaustz. The accounts of that estate show that the security in question was sold, and that the proceeds were brought to credit on the 24th of April 1847. The paper, however, remained in the hands of Sir Thomas Turton, and it still stands specially indorsed to C. W. Jaustz. The books show that a cash balance of Rs. 740. 12. 2. is due to this estate from the late Registrar. The second note, in like manner, belonged to the estate of George Scott. The books record a sale of this security on the 30th of January 1846, on which day the estate of George Scott is credited with the proceeds; the note itself, however, still stands in the name of the administrator of George Scott's estate, and that estate appears to have been erroneously (if the entry of the sale be correct) credited with the interest, up to the 8th of January 1848. Inclusive of such interest, a cash balance of Rs. 102, 8.2, appears to be due from the late Registrar to this estate. The third note appears to have belonged to the estate of T. S. Colliard, and to have been sold on the 8th of January 1848, and the estate credited with the proceeds. There is no evidence of its appropriation to any other estate. The last indorsement is that in blank of Ramhurry Bhudder, the broker generally employed by 417. SirE 2

Sir Thomas Turton; the cash balance appearing to be due from the late Registrar to this estate, is Co.'s Rs.124. 9. 6. The fourth note appears to have once belonged to the estate of Captain J. Saunders, and to have been sold on account of the estate, which was credited with the proceeds on the 28th of May 1846. The last indorsement thereon is that in blank of Kullachurn Milter, a partner in the business of brokers of Ramhurry Bhudder. The cash balance shown by the books to be due from the late Registrar to the estate of Captain J. Saunders, is Co.'s Rs. 132. 6. 3.; there is nothing to show that either the fifth or sixth of the above-mentioned notes was ever appropriated to any estate under the administration of Sir Thomas Turton; they were probably purchased on account of what was called the "Suspense Account." The last indorsement on the former, is the blank indorsement of Sir Thomas Turton in his individual capacity. These two last-mentioned papers seem to be part of the assets applicable to meet the general deficiency; as to the four others, a question may arise whether the estates to which they are shown to have belonged last, have not in some measure a lien upon them for the small balances due to those estates respectively.

We think it right to state the following circumstances specially with respect to some other Government securities, which we have treated as belonging to certain estates.

The books show, that on the 8th of March 1847 a Government paper for 1,200 rupees was purchased on account of the estate of Miss S. E. Bouchier, from what was styled in the office the "Suspense Account," having been previously transferred to that account from the estate of Dr. A. J. Kemp. The transaction is duly entered in the account of each estate, the former being debited, the latter credited with the value of the paper. The paper itself has not, however, been duly indorsed, but still stands in the name of the administrator of Dr. A. J. Kemp. Assuming the transaction to stand, the accounts of the two estates would show that a cash balance of Rs. 1,362. 5. is due from the late Registrar to the estate of Miss Bouchier, and that only a balance of Rs. 79. 1. 2. is due from him to the estate of Dr. Kemp; under the circumstances, it appeared to us that the transaction, though not formally completed by the indorsement of paper, must be treated as valid, and that the paper belonged to the estate of Miss S. E. Bouchier.

The books also show, that a certain Government paper for 700 rupees belongs to the estate of James Thomson, but that the interest on this paper has latterly been credited to the estate of Bayfield; the indorsements on the paper (which is forthcoming) show pretty clearly how this confusion has arisen: the paper was originally issued to the Registrar as administrator to Bayfield, and in the body of it appears to belong to that estate, but by a regular indorsement was transferred to the Registrar as administrator of Thomson: by mistake, the interest receipts have been signed by Sir Thomas Turton, described as "administrator as within," instead of as "administrator as above," and the interest for which such receipts were given, credited accordingly to the estate of Bayfield. The books show that a cash balance of Rs. 298. 15., is due from Sir Thomas Turton to the estate of Bayfield, and one of Rs. 82. 9. 3. to that of Thomson. We cannot, however, under the above circumstances, entertain any doubt that the paper in question belongs to the estate of Thomson.

Again, two papers, one for 2,000 rupees, the other for 1,000 rupees, appear by the books to have been sold and transferred from the estate of Huttman, the first to the estate of General Croxter, the second to the estate of Peter Lambert. The estate of Huttman is regularly credited, the other two estates respectively debited with the price of these papers; the transactions, however, have not been formally completed by the requisite indorsements of these papers, which still stand as belonging to Huttman's estate. Treating these transfers as valid and complete, Sir Thomas Turton would appear to be indebted to all these estates in the following cash balances: to the estate of Huttman, in the sum of Rs. 1,024. 3. 8.; to the estate of Croxton, in the sum of Rs. 3,768. 9. 8.; to the estate of Lambert, in the sum of Rs. 3,341. 3. 10. It appears to us that, notwithstanding notwithstanding the non-indorsement of the papers, they must be considered as belonging to the estate of Croxton and Lambert respectively.

Amongst the securities in the office other than Government paper, we find one Union Bank share, No. 6,455, for 1,000 Co.'s rupees, which we cannot trace to any particular estate.

In all those cases in which we have been able to correct errors and omissions in the accounts relating to the securities, the requisite entries by way of correction have been made in the books, which, as they now stand, are in accordance with the Schedule annexed to this Report. The general result of this process has been considerably to increase the amount of cash balances which originally appeared to be due to certain estates, and to diminish the amount of cash balances which originally appeared to be due from certain estates.

It will be obvious from the foregoing details, that of late years the system of dealing with the securities belonging to the estates under the administration of the Ecclesiastical Registrar has been extremely lax, and to say the least, careless. We deem it right to notice the more prominent instances in which we have found that system to have been at variance, either with the positive rules of the court, or with those more general rules which ought to regulate the conduct of our administrator.

In the first place, we find, that although by the 9th Rule of Court then in force in relation to the duties of the Registrar as *ex-officio* administrator, Sir Thomas Turton was bound to deposit all Government securities which should come to his hands or be purchased by him as such administrator, when and as often as they should so come to his hands, or be purchased, in the Government Treasury; he did not, in fact, send to or deposit in the Treasury any Government securities so purchased, between the 17th of June 1845 and the 22d of February 1848, on which latter date, being about to tender his resignation, he sent at once Government paper to the amount of 6,67,985 Sicca rupees, and 3,09,900 Co.'s rupees, to the Treasury.

We further find, that much of the Company's paper in the hands of the late Registrar was indorsed to him generally, or was blank indorsed, being in either case in his order and disposition, bearing no mark of being trust property, and capable therefore of being pledged or otherwise disposed of for the private purposes of its ostensible holder.

Again, we have above stated that Company's paper to the amount of 85,700 rupees, appears to have been regularly sold, although the sales have not been regularly entered in the books, or the estates credited with the proceeds. In the case of some of the estates, on account of which these sales were made, there seems to have been some dispute, or doubt, as to the identity or title of the parties entitled to, or other cause, accounting for the retention of the money. It does not, however, appear to us that there was even in these cases any sufficient reason why the sales were made before the parties entitled to the proceeds of the paper were ascertained, or why, supposing the difficulty to have arisen after the sale of the paper, the money which it was found necessary to retain was not re-invested.

Again, soon after the investigation into the discrepancies between the books and the above-mentioned list, as to the Government securities, was commenced, certain accounts were discovered in the office, consisting of sheets of paper loosely stitched together, and very roughly kept, but obviously purporting to record the transfers of Government securities to and from an account intituled the "Suspense Account." Upon this we caused a letter to be written to Sir Thomas Turton, requesting information as to the Company's paper, then to all appearance unappropriated, and also as to this "Suspense Account," of which we supposed there might be some more formal record than the loose papers abovementioned. In answer to our application, Mr. Sandes, the present Registrar, received from Sir Thomas Turton a letter, dated 24th of July, of which a copy will be found in the Appendix, marked No. 3.

We deem it right to make the following observations as to this "Suspense Account," and the mode in which, as far as we can judge from the scanty materials before us, it has been worked.

The

The keeping of a suspense account, of the nature described by Sir Thomas Turton, in the office, may be convenient, but it is not necessary. If one estate requires to purchase securities to a certain amount, and another estate requires to sell securities to a like amount, the securities and cash may be transferred from one estate to another without the intervention of a suspense account at all. If an estate requires to sell or to buy certain securities, and those securities are not required for the purposes of, or cannot be procured from another estate, the sale or purchase, as the case may be, can readily be effected in the open market.

On the other hand, the system of keeping a suspense account appears to us to have its inconveniences, and to be extremely likely to lead to abuse. It is inconvenient, because, if securities are transferred to and from it, at the shifting rates of the day, the operation must result either in a profit or a loss. The Registrar can have no right to appropriate to his own use the profit, and he ought not to be saddled with the loss arising from a rise or fall in the market value of these trust securities; but, on the other hand, this gain or loss cannot be carried to the credit or debit of the estate to which it should be appropriated, without re-opening the accounts of that estate.

Again, it is likely to lead to abuse; because, if the profit be treated, as it appears to have been heretofore treated, as the profit of the office, there is a strong temptation given to the Registrar or his subordinates to work the suspense account for the profit of the office, and to the detriment of estates. That it has been so worked in fact of late years appears clearly from the accounts, loose and imperfect as they are, before us. The transfers to and from the "Suspense Account" seem, from the loose sheets before us, invariably to have resulted in a profit. The differences in the buying and selling prices seem greater than the fluctuations of the market during the period in question would account for. Brokerage is charged, though the intervention of a broker in a transaction which the Registrar could effect by entries in his own books, and the indorsement of the papers, is obviously unnecessary, and in many cases Government paper appears to have been passed through the "Suspense Account," merely for the purpose of making a profit, which, there is evidence to show, was treated as the legitimate gain of the office.

We give one instance, which we are bound to state is the strongest instance we find of loss to the estate, and which we select not so much for that reason, as because, by a memorandum found in the same desk with these loose accounts, the transaction is brought home to the knowledge of the late Registrar.

The account-book contains the following entries :

These two sums, Rs. 25,376. 11. 11. and Rs. 5,735. 10, making together Rs. 31,112. 5. 11., the net proceeds of the identical notes, for the sale of which, as of the 29th March, the estate of Sir Wm. Casement receives credit for for Rs. 30,377. 6. 2., the profit of the "Suspense Account" on this transaction being Rs. 734. 15. 9. less brokerage.

The memorandum to which we have referred is as follows ; viz.

beneath which, and in Sir Thomas Turton's handwriting, are these words: "Seen and approved"—" T. E. M. T."

The regular books of the office show that these Government notes were part of Sir W. Casement's estate, and that they were sold as of the 29th March 1846, at 7/8 rupees per cent. discount for Rs. 30,377. 6. 3. Not the least remarkable part of the transaction is, that they appear to have been actually sold on account of the "Suspense Account" at the lower rates of discount of 5 and 6/4 rupees per cent. on the 26th and 27th of March; whereas they are treated as not sold by the estate of Sir William Casement to the "Suspense Account," until the 29th of March.

The next item on the debit side of the rough account-book containing the foregoing entry is fully in accordance with the memorandum ; it is as follows :

Other instances might be given in which it is impossible to account for the fact, that Government paper was both bought and sold on account of the same estate within a very short period, except by supposing that these transactions were entered into with a view to the profit not of the estate, but of the office.

With respect to the third head of inquiry, viz. what are Sir Thomas Turton's means of meeting or partially making good his defalcations, we have to report, that, so far as we can ascertain, the property of Sir T. E. M. Turton on the 25th of February 1848 consisted of the following particulars; viz.—

1st. Houses in Raneemoody Gully, of which the legal estate was vested in Mr. Joseph Spencer Judge, under the circumstances which we shall hereafter mention; the rental of them is 850 rupees per mensem, and the supposed value to sell from 80,000 rupees to 90,000 rupees; a house at Dum Dum, known as Fairy Hall, and now in the occupation of the Ex-Ameers of Scinde; it is now let to the Ameers for 250 rupees per mensem, but this is supposed to be more than it is worth to an ordinary tenant, and its value cannot safely be stated at more than 20,000 Co.'s rupees.

2d. A debt of 43,799 Co.'s rupees from Charles Anquetil to the late Registrar, secured by two bonds of C. Anquetil for 31,000 rupees and 7,000 Co.'s rupees; two policies of insurance on the life of C. Anquetil for 7,000 Co.'s rupees and 5,000 Co.'s rupees; a mortgage of a house in Chowningee for 5,000 Co.'s rupees, and an agreement that the whole debt should be paid out of a legacy payable to C. Anquetil on the 18th of February 1849, if he so englive, out of the estate of the late General Anquetil, which was under the charge of the late Registrar. The whole of this debt may, we believe, be considered as good, if C. Anquetil live until the 18th of February next. Two promissory notes of Smith, Huffnagle & Co., for 10,000 rupees each, which have since been duly paid; many small balances due

to

to the late Registrar from various estates, and aggregating Co.'s Rs. 1,42,022. 2. 2. Many of these must, we fear, be treated as irrecoverable; but the present Registrar has already realized Co.'s Rs. 25,219. 0. 4. and may realize considerably more on this account.

We have particularized the above-mentioned assets, in the first instance, separately from the other property of which Sir T. E. M. Turton was possessed on the 25th of February 1848, because we consider that upon all, to their whole or to a part of their value, the office has a claim preferable to those of the general creditors of Sir T. E. M. Turton: the nature and extent of this lien vary as to each asset.

lst. As to the houses in Raneemoody Gully.—These, in the vear 1843, were conveyed to Mr. Joseph Spencer Judge, and at or about the same time were mortgaged to Sir Thomas Turton for 70,000 Co.'s rupees. We are informed by Mr. Judge that at that time Sir Thomas delivered to him a sealed paper, which having been opened about the time at which Sir Thomas ceased to hold his office, proved to be in the nature of a declaration of trust of the monies received by the mortgagee in the following proportions; viz. 40,000 Co.'s rupees for the Registrar's Office; 27,000 Co.'s rupees for the estate of John Palmer; and 3,000 Co.'s rupees for the children of Sir Thomas Turton, which last charge we understand to have been since satisfied; the preferable claim of the office therefore in these houses is limited to the 40,000 rupees, with interest thereon. By an arrangement with Mr. Judge, Messrs. Frith & Swinhoe, as trustees for the purposes hereinafter mentioned, have, since the end of March last, received 400 Co.'s rupees per mensem, being part of the monthly rents of these premises; the other rents have been received by Mr. Judge, who has undertaken to account for them.

2d. As to Fairy Hall.-It appears by the letter of Sir Thomas Turton of the 22d March 1848, of which a copy will be found in the Appendix, marked No. 4, that this property was originally purchased with trust monies, of which he seems to admit a large proportion never to have been replaced. We consider, therefore, that to the extent of 16,250 Co.'s rupees at least, the office has, in equity, a lien upon it. By an indenture, bearing date the 24th of July 1848, Sir Thomas Turton conveyed this house to Messrs. Frith & Swinhoe, upon trust to sell and to stand possessed of the proceeds upon certain trusts, for creditors, of which the first is upon trust to pay or discharge any charge or lien which "the Registrar for the time being of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort William, now hath at law or in equity on the said hereditaments and premises. The debt from Anquetil is still outstanding; but the securities have been handed over to the trustees for the present Registrar, and he has also in his hands the funds out of which the legacy to Anquetil will become payable on the 18th of February next. The promissory notes have been realised by the present Registrar, together with so much of the balances due from estates as have yet been found recoverable. In all, the Registrar has received on this account, including the promissory notes, and the sum of Rs. 10,055. 6. 4. realized from Joykissen Doss's estate, as hereafter mentioned, about 45,000 Co.'s rupees, which amount has been entered to Sir Thomas Turton's credit in a suspense account.

Besides the above, Sir Thomas Turton was, on the 25th of February 1848, possessed of certain other property, the particulars of which, so far as we can ascertain them, are as follows :---

1st. Real property in England, subject to certain incumbrances and charges, the precise nature and amount of which we cannot state with certainty. By a settlement made on the occasion of his last marriage, and dated the 23d of September 1842, Sir Thomas settled this estate on himself for life, and, subject to such life estate, upon certain trusts for his children by a former marriage, with an ultimate limitation in the event of the death of all such children, before attaining a vested interest in favour of the trustees of another settlement, made in contemplation of his marriage with, and apparently for the benefit of the present Lady Turton. It seems doubtful how far this settlement in favour of his children would be good against creditors. He has, by a deed dated the 23d of October 1848, conveyed his life-interest in this property to trustees for the benefit of his creditors generally. It seems to be uncertain whether, in fact, this property is more than sufficient to meet the charges paramount to the settlement therein.

2d. Certain personal property, also comprised in the settlement in favour of his children, of which the principal is one-third share of certain trust funds comprised in the marriage settlement of the father and mother of Sir Thomas Turton, and afterwards laid out in mortgage upon the real estate in England above-mentioned. The observations made above as to the real property in England, may be applied also to this item.

3d. The surplus proceeds of the houses in Raneemoody Gully, after satisfying the preferable claims of the office, and the estate of the late John Palmer, and subject to a lien claimed by Mr. Judge thereon, of which the validity, and the amount if valid, appear to us alike uncertain.

4th. Certain houses and locations at or near Darjeeling, of which Sir Thomas was absolute owner, and seven other locations also at Darjeeling, called Michell Grove, of which he was only life tenant, these being comprised in the beforementioned settlement in favour of his children. The whole Darjeeling property was subject to a charge in favour of Messrs. Smith, Huffnagle & Co., for 2,000 Co.'s rupees and upwards, which has been discharged as hereinafter men-The whole of Sir Thomas Turton's interest in this property was tioned. assigned, subject to the charge, by a deed dated the 20th of July 1848, to Messrs. Frith & Swinhoe, in trust for the creditors generally; but the value of the property, from its nature, the amount of the outgoings, and the uncertainty of a demand for house property at a hill-station, is extremely uncertain.

5th. A house at Neilgunge, near Calcutta, valued at 4,000 rupees or thereabouts. This has also been assigned to the above-mentioned trustees for the creditors generally.

6th. A coffee plantation in Ceylon, which Sir Thomas Turton offered to assign, but which the trustees hesitate to accept, it being by no means clear that from the nature of the property it may not prove damnosa hereditus, or at all events require advances which they might be in no condition to make.

7th. A promissory note of Carr, Tagore & Co. for 33,000 Co's. rupees, secured by a pledge of 74 Docking Company's shares.

8th. A Union Bank post bill for 25,000 Co.'s rupees, on which judgment has been recovered. This was, by mistake, indorsed to the present Registrar, who has sued and recovered judgment thereon; we believe, however, that it ought to be treated as part of the property of Sir Thomas Turton, applicable to the claims of his general creditors.

9th. A promissory note, originally for 5,000 Co.'s rupees, of which 3,000 Co.'s rupees was due, and which has since been recovered by the trustees for the creditors.

10th. Several small debts, amounting altogether to 13,765 Co.'s rupees. These were assigned to the trustees for the benefit of the creditors generally; some must be considered as bad.

11th. His contingent life-interest in a policy of insurance effected in the Universal Life Insurance Office of Calcutta, for 5,000 Co.'s rupees, and settled by his marriage settlement. His interest was valued at 5,000 Co.'s rupees by the secretary of the Insurance Company, and this sum has since been realized therein by the trustees for the benefit of the creditors; a part of this sum has been applied in paying off the charge on the Darjeeling property, which may now be considered as free, the remainder was applied in liquidation of premiums paid upon the policy, for which certain parties claimed in lien.

12th. Sir Thomas Turton was also possessed of books and household furniture, but these were claimed by the trustees of the marriage settlement under that deed, and have since been sold, or are about to be sold by them. It would seem that the creditors are entitled to no more than Sir Thomas Turton's life-interest in the proceeds of this property; about 13,641 Co.'s rupees appears to have been realized and invested by the trustees. Sir Thomas declines to execute any assignment of his interest under the settlement in this property.

In conclusion, we wish to recur to the large difference between the apparent gross deficiency, as found by us, and that admitted by Sir Thomas Turton, pursuant to the loose account of Ramrutton Gangooly, and to make a few observations as to the principal items of account to which that difference may be ascribed. Ramrutton Gangooly's account purported only to be the balance shown by the cash-book, as made up to the 25th of February 1848. In arriving, F 417.

therefore, at that result, he must necessarily have given Sir Thomas Turton credit for the balances claimed as due to him from the different estates.

The gross deficiency with which we charge Sir Thomas Turton, as per page 32, is, Rs. 10,25,714. 5. 10.; if from this be deducted the amount of balances apparently due to him, the gross deficiency is Rs. 8,83,692. 3. 8.

The balance admitted by Sir Thomas Turton in Ramrutton Gaugooly's account, as due from him to the office, is Rs. 6,74,313. 15. 1.

The difference between the last two sums is, Rs. 2,09,378. 4. 7.

This difference may, in great part, be accounted for as follows :--

1st. Ramrutton Gangooly's account is the result of the cash-book; whereas the sum with which we charge Sir Thomas Turton is the result of the ledgers. The former, therefore, takes no account of the difference between the cash-book and ledgers for 1846, amounting to Rs. 65,510. 2. 1., of which we have said so much above, and which we have shown may be capable of explanation and reduction, upon an investigation of the earlier accounts. We are justified in making this sum, in the meantime, a part of Sir Thomas's liabilities, because it is compounded of sums admitted by his own books to be due from him.

2d. Into the sum with which we have charged Sir Thomas Turton, enters the sum of Rs. 87,291. 1. 7., the proceeds of sales of Company's paper to the amount of 85,700 rupees, which, as stated above, were not carried to account either in the cash-book or ledger. On the other hand, he has received credit in account of Rs. 13,370. 6. 9., the price of Company's paper purchased by him, for which he had omitted to take credit in the cash-book. The difference between these two sums being Rs. 73,920. 10. 10., is a large element in the difference between the results now under comparison. It is clear that he must either be debited with this sum, as part of the cash balance due from him, or that he must be treated as a defaulter in Company's paper to a corresponding amount.

3d. Another item of this difference consists of interest received on account of several estates, but not entered in the cash-book, amounting in all to Rs. 6,289. 10. 8.

4th. A further item is, the balance of Rs. 12,036. 15. 8. due from him as official trustee, the accounts resulting in which do not enter into the books from which Gangooly's account was prepared. Against this may be set off the sum of Rs. 7,742, 12. 3., due to him as receiver, which also does not enter into those books; the difference is, Rs. 4,294. 3. 5.

Again, in arriving at the balance which he admits, Sir Thomas Turton takes credit for the following sums, for which he has not received credit in our account, and with which we conceive he is not entitled to be credited; viz.

1st. Overdrawn commission to the amount of Rs. 12,827. 10. 7.

2d. The remittances of Rs. 11,450. 10. and Rs. 11,828. 4. 7., made on the 7th of September and the 8th of December 1847, making together Rs. 23,278. 14. 7. For these sums Sir Thomas had received credit in the cashbook, which resulted in the balance of Rs. 8,70,224. 3. 1., and for which, therefore, he is not entitled to credit a second time in diminution of that balance.

Lastly. Our account purports to be made up to the 25th of February 1848. Sir Thomas Turton, in arriving at the balance of Rs. 6,74,313. 15. 1., has taken credit for the sum of Rs. 10,055. 6. 4., on account of the estate of Joykissen Doss, and the sum of Rs. 5,049. 8. 9. received from the Oriental Bank, and unappropriated to any particular estate, for which, as they were received by the present Registrar since the 25th of February, he is not credited in the accounts prior to that date, but has received credit in the suspense account opened with him by the present Registrar, as mentioned at page 44. He further takes credit for the sum of Rs. 3,134. 0. 4., for outstanding term bills, so much of which as has been received by Mr. Sandes has also been carried to his credit in the Suspense Account. These latter items affect rather the mode of stating the account, than the actual result.

When allowance is made for the several items above mentioned (they amount in all to Rs. 204,360. S. 3.), it will be seen that the difference between the accounts as rendered by Gangooly, and those now made up by us, is neither startling nor incapable of explanation. We have before stated, that all the items which compose such difference, have been shown to and admitted by Gangooly.

Lastly, we desire to draw attention to the fact, that although the gross amount

of

of the defalcations upon which it has been our painful duty to report, is very large, it is so subdivided amongst the different estates and trusts, that the sum abstracted from each is, happily for the sufferers, in most cases, comparatively small. On a reference to the schedules, it will be found that on only one estate, that of Prince Jammercodech, the loss exceeds 35,000 rupees; that on only one other estate, that of Lieutenant-colonel E. J. Smith, the loss exceeds 25,000 rupees, being, in that case, less than 30,000 rupees; on two other estates, the loss exceeds 20,000 rupees, and is less than 25,000 rupees each; on two more it is greater than 15,000 rupees, but less than 20,000 rupees each; on four, greater than 10,000 rupees, but less than 15,000 rupees each; on 21, greater than 5,000 rupees, but less than 5,000 rupees, and the sum due to many of them to the amount in all of Rs. 1,07,494. 9. 5., if not of Rs. 1,69,421. 8. 4., appear to be trifling balances due to estates otherwise administered in full, and such as are not likely ever to be claimed.

From Sir Thomas E. M. Turton, Bart., to M. F. Sandes, Esq.

Sir,

Calcutta, 8 April 1848.

I HAVE the honour to forward herewith the cash account, as made out by Ramrutton Gangoolee, exhibiting a balance as due by me to the office, of Rs. 6,74,313. 15. 1. This, as made out under the competent person who in fact has been for some time the real accountant, and is well acquainted with the details of the accounts, I have no hesitation in admitting to be the gross balance with which I am to be charged; and as soon as he can apportion it among the estates by which it is to be borne, by writing up the ledgers, I shall be equally ready to admit the accuracy of the details. In the course of writing up the ledgers, some estates will be found indebted to me. For these amounts I am quite satisfied you will give me credit in accounts, and to that I am perfectly willing to leave them. If, on the other hand, it shall be found that any trifling errors have taken place in the calculations, so as to vary the accounts against me, I shall be most ready to acquiesce in the correction of them. I hope this declaration will be satisfactory to the Committee.

I perceive that the accounts of the official trustee, and where I acted as receiver, are not yet made up. In the first, I believe, with the exception of Mr. Gogerly's small balance due to me, there is nothing, one way or the other. In the receiver's I believe I shall be entitled to some credit, but not to a large amount. I have to request the favour of your pressing Parbutty Sunker Mookerjee, who has the charge of them, to bring up the accounts forthwith. They are of very trifling extent, and there really is no excuse on his part in their being in arrear.

I also send herewith a list of sums due to me from persons who had to receive money in the office, amounting in all to Rs.68,103. 13. 3., to which is to be added also 40,000 rupees received on the houses in Ranee Moody Gully, as all these sums are clearly recoverable (though Anquetil's not till January 1849); this will reduce the ultimate balance due from me to about 5,65,000 rupees.

From Sir T. E. M. Turton, Bart., to Maurice F. Sandes, Esq., Registrar, Supreme Court; dated 24 July 1848.

Sir,

I HAVE to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 22d instant, on behalf of the Committee appointed to inquire into the affairs of the Registrar, stating that some of the Company's paper in that office, to a considerable amount, is standing in the name of the Registrar, without any indication of the particular estate to which it belongs; and calling for information as to the account called the "Suspense Account" (which you state is not forthcoming), on the following points; viz. by whom, and upon what principle it was kept; to what transactions it referred, and what has become of the accounts or the books in which they were entered.

In reply I have to state, that when any transaction took place which was not considered of a permanent, but of a temporary nature, such transaction was treated as in suspense, and a memorandum or account was made accordingly. I do not believe that the proceeds of any Company's paper sold belonging to estates in the office, were ever carried to the Suspense Account; they ought not to have been; but if Company's paper had been taken over, which was afterwards sold on the Suspense Account, that would, of course, have been carried to the Suspense Account. The account was simply of this nature: if Company's paper belonging to an estate was required to be disposed of on closing it, or to pay a claim against it, such paper would be taken over at once in suspense, without being appropriated to any other estate, at the time the estate to which it belonged was credited at the rate of the day, and the amount remitted or paid, as it might happen, to the party entitled. The Company's 417. paper (or other securities) remaining the property of the Registrar, in suspense, until actually sold or passed to other estates.

If any Company's paper is now in the office in the name of the Registrar, without any indication to which estate it belongs, it belongs to the Suspense Account, and ought to be credited to my general account with the Registrar's office. When Company's paper or other securities were purchased, and paid for out of the general fund, they also were placed in suspense until appropriated.

The Suspense Account was kept by Parbutty Sunker Mookerjee; I believe not in any regular books, and I believe chiefly in Bengallee. I never saw the accounts; but when any transaction, such as the sale or purchase of securities, to any amount took place, a memo-randum was given to me, which, after examination, was returned to Parbutty Sunker.

Some months before my resignation, I directed the account to be closed, and to be made up in English for my information, and to be shown to me; but though I frequently asked for it before my resignation, I never obtained it.

If they are not in the office, I do not know what has become of these accounts, which, as I have stated, I never saw, nor of the books, if there were any (which I do not believe), in which they were entered. I am, &c.

I HAVE to acknowledge your letter of the 20th instant, asking me for such further information as I may think fit to give on the statement of my assets, as rendered by me under date the 15th instant, as to the several items entered in yours, under acknowledgment.

I should have answered your letter (which I did not receive till 5 o'clock on the evening of the 20th) yesterday, had I not been much occupied in replying to letters received in the same evening by the Overland Mail, for the express of this day.

On the subject of the Dum Dum house, which appears in my rough statement of liabilities to the office, as showing a sum of Rs. 16,250. 11. 3., due by me to the office, I beg to say that I originally paid for that house by funds derived from the office, but the accounts were merely kept separate, and under the head of "The Dum Dum House Account," for my information, and for convenience sake. The house was in no way pledged to the office. The sum of Rs. 16,250. 11. 3. is referrible to the balance appearing against me on the 31st December 1847 on that account, the original purchase being 20,000 rupees.

The special equitable lien upon the Raneemoody Gully houses is stated (not "estimated") at 40,000 rupees, and in the statement before-mentioned of my liabilities, is put a sum in respect of these houses of Rs. 28,519. 3. 3. This sum is the balance due in respect of these houses of Rs. 28,519. 3. 3. This sum is the balance due in respect of the purchase-money which was used by me from the office funds. I have put 40,000 rupees as the money due on these houses, to the office, because that amount, and upwards, being still due by me to the office, I consider the houses as still pledged for that amount. The sum of Rs. 28,519. 3. 3. does not represent office funds laid out on this property in excess of that sum.

I have no objection to the inspection of the settlement deeds by the Committee. From them they will perceive the assets included therein. The items of landed property included in my children's settlement are numerous, but individually of very triffing value; I shall be ready to give every information in my power as to all or any of them, and I will request Mr. Judge, who is one of the trustees, to give the Committee every information in his power, whenever the Committee may be pleased to express their wish to see him on the subject:

With reference to the last paragraph of your letter, I am prepared to adopt such measures as the Judges may think proper and expedient for securing to the office such portion of my property or its proceeds, as they may consider exclusively applicable to the payment of the debts due to the office, and for securing to my general creditors (the office included) included) the rest of my property. This I have already expressed to Messrs. Frith & Sandes, in a letter to them in reply to one addressed to me by them on the 13th instant. It does not appear to me that I ought to suggest the mode of doing so. But I am perfectly ready to do whatever the Judges may consider just and proper. With reference to the rights of the office, and those of my creditors in general, I would only request, that if the Judges desire that I should assign over my property (legal and equitable) to trustees for such purposes (to which I am quite ready to assent), that I may be permitted to name one of the trustees, such one to be approved by the Judges, that my interests may be duly watched, and the property may not be sacrificed; or otherwise, if there should be any objection to the appointment of such trustee, that my property should not be disposed of, finally, without reference to me, as being well acquainted with the value of the whole of it.

If the Committee are not likely to require my attendance next week, I think of going to Mulnauth, and remaining there the following 10 days.

MINUTE by the Honourable Sir *Herbert Maddock*, Knt.; dated 19 February 1849.

In this letter, on the state of the late Registrar's office, which is signed by Sir L. Peel only, though it is written, apparently, in the name of the Court collectively, no opinion or advice is offered as to the best mode of dealing with the case. And before I can form a judgment on that point, I should wish first to have the opinion of the fourth ordinary Member of Council, after a perusal of the Governor-General's minute, dated , whether there is anything which this Government can do, without authority or advice from England, to bring Sir T. E. M. Turton to account in this country for any portion of his proceedings, as exhibited in the Report of the Commissioners appointed to inquire into the state of his office.

MINUTE by Major-general the Honourable Sir J. H. Littler, G.C.B.; dated 20 February 1849.

By the accompanying letter from Sir L. Peel, on the part of the Supreme Court, we are led to suppose that Sir T. Turton has, in a manner, protested against any publication of the Report until he has had an opportunity of examining it.

It will probably be necessary, therefore, to wait until a reasonable time has elapsed for Sir T. Turton to make that communication.

The opinion of the fourth Member of Council on the subject will be very desirable; but I am disposed to concur in the sentiments expressed by the Governor-General in his minute, that no Act of Pains and Penalties be passed until the previous sanction of the Honourable Court has been obtained.

MINUTE by the Honourable Sir F. Currie, Bart., (without date.)

As the Governor-General has intimated that he will not give his assent to an Act of the kind suggested by the fourth ordinary Member without the acquiescence of the home authorities, we can do nothing; but had his Lordship's reply been different, I would, in this case of very especial and extraordinary delinquency, have supported the passing of an Act of Pains and Penalties.

MINUTE by the Honourable J. E. D. Bethune; dated 8 March 1849.

ECCLESIASTICAL REGISTRAR.

The decision of the Governor-General on my suggestion of passing an Act of Pains and Penalties against Sir Thomas Turton, does not much surprise me, though I regret it, as it seems to me to throw great additional difficulty in the way of vindication of the national honour, which has been undoubtedly stained in the estimation of the native population by Sir Thomas Turton's behaviour, and especially by such behaviour being allowed to pass unpunished.

It cannot raise our law, in their estimation, that they should be told that it is powerless for that purpose.

The Governor-General grounds his decision on a doubt of our power to pass such an Act, as well as on the ulterior question of its expediency. I hold the legislative power conferred by Parliament on the Governor-General in Council, to be as large within the sphere of its operation, as that of Parliament itself for the whole of Her Majesty's dominions, subject only to these express exceptions, made by the Act by which this power was created, and I think it right to assort this

this opinion as plainly and broadly as possible, when the observations of the Governor-General appear in some degree to countenance a different doctrine.

On the expediency of passing the suggested Act, I shall not presume, in the present stage of the discussion, to attempt to fortify the opinion which I had formed, after much anxious deliberation, in opposition to that now expressed by the Governor-General.

A reference home before any other step is taken, is, of course, unavoidable, and this seems to render any further discussion here unnecessary and misplaced. I wish, however, to explain the ground of those sentiments of mine, which the Governor-General has rightly interpreted into an indication that if the measure had been adopted, I should have been disposed to concur in some infamous punishment short of transportation.

mishment short of transportation. In coming to this opinion, I was influenced partly by considering how far I was likely to carry my colleagues with me in approving such an Act, and partly by reflecting on the probability of its being allowed at home; and each of these separate trains of thought led me to the conclusion that a proposition for a punishment which would inflict little but public disgrace on Sir Thomas Turton, was most likely to insure the final success of the measure!. If the passing of it rested with myself alone, I would transport him for 14 years (the prescribed punishment for embezzlement of public money by Her Majesty's servants) without any hesitation. But although I think that is the adequate punishment for the offence, I cannot acquiesce in the Governor-General's reasoning, that there would have been any incongruity in detaining Sir Thomas Turton in India, merely for the purpose of passing an Act to send him out of it, if that had been the extreme penalty inflicted. Nothing is more common than to refuse to allow an officer to resign his commission in Her Majesty's service pending proceedings, of which the most unfavourable termination for him can be only his dismissal from it, and the two cases appear to me precisely analogous.

I cannot but feel that it is a very different thing to request instructions from the Honourable Court whether or not we ought to pass such an Act, or to ask their approval of the Act when passed. A far greater share of responsibility would have been assumed by us in the latter case, responsibility not only to those whom we serve, but to the judgment of public- opinion and of the British Par-. liament. My share of this responsibility I was ready to undergo, but, although the Governor-General, on his part, declines it, I trust it is scarcely necessary for me to say, that I know that his abhorrence of the dishonesty of the conduct which has given rise to this discussion is not surpassed even by mine.

The Memorial of the Master and Members of the Trade Association of Calcutta; Respectfully showeth,

THAT by Act 39 & 40 Geo. 3, the Ecclesiastical Registrars of the Supreme Courts in Calcutta, Madras and Bombay are empowered and required to apply for and take out letters of administration to the estates of all British subjects dying intestate, within the limits of each Presidency respectively.

2. That this wise and prudent enactment of the British Legislature has been wrongfully perverted to his own advantage by Sir Thomas Turton, late Registrar of the Supreme Court in this city, in gross breach of the trust confided to him as a public officer and servant of the Government, misappropriated the proceeds of estates administered to by him, and having been found a defaulter to an amount exceeding eight lacs of rupees, was, on the 25th day of February last (1848), removed from his office of Registrar.

3. That, owing to want of precaution on the part of the proper officers of the Supreme Court, not only this heavy defalcation occurred, the amount having been suffered to accumulate in Sir Thomas Turton's hands, instead of being paid into the general treasury from time to time as received, but safe and adequate security not having been taken or required from him on his appointment to office, little or nothing is forthcoming to cover the losses sustained by the public.

4. Your memorialists beg to submit, in proof of Sir T. Turton's malversation and abuse of trust as respects this Association, a Schedule of claims duly acknowledged and registered by him against 162 estates, as due to eight only out of the number of firms connected with the Association, amounting to 25,149 rupees, there being no less than 1,60,790 rupees, realised by him, out of which those and other claims ought to have been paid, but no portion of which amount is now forthcoming.

5. Your memorialists, representing the interests of a large and useful section of the community, submit respectfully, that the wrong thus done and the losses entailed ought to be remedied, as in the case of the late Gilbert Ricketts of the Madras Court, who became a defaulter in like manner, to the extent of 49,906*l*. 16*s.*, which, by Act 2 Geo. 4 and 1 Will. 4, c. 75, was directed to be made good from the revenues of the Indian Government.

6. The cases being precisely similar, your memorialists accordingly solicit that your Honor in Council will be pleased to adopt such measures as the case requires, for which, as in duty bound, they will ever pray.

MINUTE by the Honourable J. E. D. Bethune ; dated 30 March 1849.

THERE is no doubt that the Act referred to by the memorialists is a precedent directly in point, but I conceive that Act must have been passed with the concurrence of the East India Company, as it would have been extremely unjust to force such an Act on them.

The Registrar of the Supreme Court is not an officer of the East India Company, even in his original capacity, and it was by an Act of the Imperial Legislature, and not of the Indian Government, that he became official administrator to the estates of intestates; according to my view of the case, the Company have no more to do with his defalcations than if it had pleased Parliament to entrust the same functions to the Commander-in-Chief of the Queen's troops in India, or to the Governor of Ceylon.

I cannot find any allusion to Mr. Rickett's case in the Parliamentary inquiry of 1830-52, but I presume the circumstances in which that Act was passed are sufficiently well known. I think the most prudent answer to give to the memorialists is, that the Government of India cannot recognise any claim on them arising from Sir Thomas Turton's alleged defalcations as administrator of intestate effects, but that they will forward the memorial for the consideration of the Home Authorities.
