#### CHAPTER I.

#### GENERAL and POLITICAL.

I. The Taluka of Thanadevli is situated in the Southern part of Kathiawar and is bounded on the North by Gondal, Situation. on the East by Nawanagar and Bhavnagar and on the South by Junagadh and on the West, again by Gondal and Junagadh States.

It is divided into four principal divisions viz Thanadevli, Motadevalia, Matirala, and Mendarda.

The most melancholy event, in the very beginning of this official year was the passing away of the wise and The Late sagacious Darbar Saheb, Wala Laxman Meram, Darbar C. L. E. Chief of Thanadevli, on 12th May 1922 Saheb. the Darbar Saheb was, of late suffering from a lingering disease and inspite of the best medical help in the person of Col. Hooten and the medical men that could be secured, he passed away at the age of 74 to the great sorrow of his family, subjects, servants and friends.

The present Darbar Saheb assumed the reins of the Administration of the State on 13th May after going through proper religious ceremonies as prescribed by the Hindoo-Shastras.

- 3. The late Darbar Saheb was held in very high esteem by all his subjects, brother-rulers, Agency-officers and friends and the telegrams and letters of condolence that continued to pour in, greatly testify to the hold he had on these persons. H. H. the Nabab Saheb of the premier State of Junagadh showed his great regards for the deceased Chief in a most practical & symphathetic manner, by ordering all the offices & schools of Junagadh, to be kept closed, out of respect for the Darbar Saheb and again by sending a deputation to Thanadavli, consisting of H H.'s Amir of the first rank and other officials, to remove the late Darbar Saheb's mourning on 13—6—1922.
- 4. The Agent to the Governor, Kathiawar was pleased to give official expression of his tribute of high regards for the late Chief in the Agency Gazettee by his notification No. 26 dated 19—5—22, which was in the following words:—

- "The Agent to the Governor in Kathiawar records with sorrow the death of Darbar Shri Laxman Vala, C. I. E., Chief of Thanade vli. The late Darbar Saheb was a fine old Chief of the old school, who looked after his Estate and his people thoroughly. He was an influence for good throughout Kathiawar, especially amongst the Kathis. Those who had the pleasure of his friendship and acquaintance will mourn him sincerely; and all Kathiawar will mourn the loss of a true friend and an honest gentleman.
- '5 The past Political Officers of the Kathiawar Political Agency showed their very highest regards and admiration for the late Darbar Saheb as was evinced by letters of condolence from Sir Charles Ollievent, Mr. Fitzerald, Col. Kenuedy, Sir Hill, Mr. Rendall, Sir E. Machonochie, Col. Pottinger, and Mr. Sladen.
- 6 The present Darbar Saheb, with his usual filial love and affection established. "The Darbar Shri Laxman Wala Memorial Scholarship" in the Saurasht High School at Rajkot, in which the late Chief used to take a keen interest; the scholarship which is of the amount of Rs. 10 per month is awarded to a student who comes highest in Std. VI. At present the State has already paid the required amount of Rs 120/-but in due course of time, it is proposed to place a sufficient amount of money at the disposal of the High School, the interest of which would realise annually the required amount.
- 7. The Thanadevli State now consists of 25 Swang villages, the area of which is 1023 square miles (excluding Majmu AREA. villages in the Jetpur Taluka wherein there are well defined Patis having sole Revenue Jurisdiction) and the population is 12730 souls according to the census of 1921.
  - Revenues. past five years is Rs. 225336
- 9. It pays tribute of Rs. 6940-11-9 to the British Government and Rs. 760-2-4 as Jortalbi to Junagadh.
- 10. Soon after the lamentable death of Daroar Shri Laxman Wala Saheb, the most important question of the amalgamation of the Luni Taluka, the patrimony of the Succession present Darbar Saheb, arose; and Government after a of the Present most anxious and careful consideration were pleased to order that the Taluka of Luni should merge in Darbar Saheb. the Thanadevli State and Darbar Shri Wala Amra Laxman was formally recognised as Chief of Thanadevli by Government Resolution No. Confi/611-C dated 12th October 1922 which was conveyed by the Political Agent; Sorath in his No. x D/-19-10-22; the best thanks of the Darbar Saheb are due to Government for thus recognising and confirming the succession of D. S. Amra Wala Saheb to the Chiet-ship of Thanadevli, with the Taluka of Luni added to it. The happy and auspicious installation of the Darbar Saheb took place on the 23rd October 1922 and the speeches that were made on the occasion, and which have been reproduced below will give the full idea of this, unique event,

- 11. The following concessions were announced in the public Darbar, in commemoration of this happy day.
  - 1. Monthly pensions of the aggregate amount of Rs. 25/-to wilows for their life.
  - 2. One pay as bonus to each and every servant of the State.
  - 3. Release of all the prisoners.
  - 4. Remittance of Tagavi to the extent of Rs 12000 and odds.
  - 5. Rs:500/-to Jetpur Mahajan.
  - 6. Reduction in the Registration fees of Brahmins of the Jetpnr Pati.

The whole town of Thanadevli was en-fete and the Installation day was really a galaday in the history of Thanadevli. Almost all the states of Kathiawar kindly sent deputations, with Poshak to partake in this joyous function and the Government of Baroda, H. H. the Maha Rao Saheb of Cutch and H. H. the Nabab Saheb of Palanpur sent congratulatory messages and the latter two, costly Poshak also.

- 12. The camp for the Political Agent, and other distinguished guests was arranged just in the proximity of the town, and a line of tents, flags etc. presented a very charming scene.

  Political Agent arrived at the Shamiyana exactly at 11 and his arrival
  was announced by booming of guns; the Political Agent, was received by
  the Darbar Saheb as soon as he alighted from his carriage & four; a
  procession was then formed which proceeded to the dias; the political
  Agent, then delievered his speech, Gujrati translation of which was read
  by Mr. Kadri the Deputy Political Agent, Sorath; the Darbar Sahib read
  his reply, Gujrati translation of which was read by Mr. Maganlal.
- 14. The Darbar Saheb then received congratulations from the Political Agent, as well as from the distinguished guests and deputations of several states. Poshaks were then received and distribution of Pan-Gulab then followed; the Darbar Saheb, the Political Agent, and other guests were then guarlanded and potographed and the proceedings then terminated with all due ceremony.
- 15 A show of fireworks was held at night on a grand scale and a banquet was also held the same night; the programme was a crowded one but all was joy and merriment.
- 16. Major A. S. Meek, the Political Agent, delivered the following memorable speech.

#### DARBAR SHRI AMRA VALA,

It is my privilege to-day as your Political Agent, to hand over to you a letter from the Agent to the Governor in Kathiawar, and to offer you congratulations on the recognition by Government of your succession to the Gadi of Thanadevli.

The Talukdar of Luni in your own right, you have succeeded to the . Gadi of the Thanadevli Taluka. as the adopted son of the late Chief Vala Laxman C. I. E., and you Political carry into the Thanadevli Taluka the Taluka of Luni Agent under the special orders which Government have Speech. been rleased to issue. The facts of your adoption, of your succession to the Thanadevli Chiefship and of the amalgamation of Luni with Thanadevli have provoked the opposition of the other members of your family who have sought to have applied the common rules of partition pertaining to the Kathis of this province. It may be expecting too much of human nature to hope that contention in this disagreement will not be continued as a matter of personal animosity, but I do hope that your collaterals will treat the case as one of principle and not look upon you personally as the arch enemy. They will not ascribe it as a crime to you that Darbar Shri Laxman Vala selected you as his adopted son, and I trust that when they have exhausted their remedies constitutionally they will sceept the hand of friendship which I know you will extend to them. I would take occasion here to remark that while the more important of the Kathi Chiefs have recognised the importance of adopting the rule of primogeniture foreign to the family law of the race there is still, a general desire among Kathi Landed proprietors to retain the Kathi law of partition of estates, while at the same time they seek mot only the retention of the status of Chiefship, but the augmentation of their powers and privileges as such; they regard the Talukas and jurisdictional powers attaching thereto in a manner which it seems to me is not compatible with truechiefship, as matter merely of personal property which can be valued in money.

It is usual on such occasions for a Political Officer to offer advice to a young Ruler ascending the Gadi. I have offerred such advice at similar functions, but I have become a little mistrustful of the habit, feeling that the advice is regarded often merely as a part of the ceremonial applicable for the day only. And on this occasion we have in you a chief assuming the reins of Government who has already been administering another Taluka. I am confident however, Darbar Shri Amra Vala, that you would like me to say something as to the work that lies before you.

The late Chief was one of the finest figures in Kathiawar. Regarded as a leader among the Kathis he was held in general esteem. Gifted with an oldworld generosity and courtliness of bearing and of heart, he took great pride in his alliance with and allegiance to the british Crown, and his dominant idea was that of co-operation with Government. He was further a master of tact. I can wish nothing better for you. Darbar Saheb, than that you emulate in these respects. But while, I extol the good qualities of feeling of the late Chief I wish to point

to the need for a more efficient administration in some, departments than has formerly existed. The resources of the Taluka have not been well developed, the revenues have not been carefully accounted for These facts, coupled with a lavish hospitality, made impossible the extension of education, of the provision of roads, of the improvement of village sanitation, of medical relief. If it be a question of material advancement in an Indian state without kirdly rule, or a kindly rule without advancement, then I would choose the kindly rule; but here in Thanadevli I am confident that you, the new Chief, will aspire to combine the two and to add to the kindliness of Darbar Shri Laxman Vala's Chiefship the efficiency required by modern conditions Keep your administration in tune with the essential spirit of the times. And in your efforts to build gradually upon your father's. mansion let me ask of you to remember his position outside his own. Taluka, his position as a leader of the Kathi community, I hope, that you will keep continually before you the need for amelioration of the common lot of the community which is, bound, in fetters of, custom and unable to take as a body a proper part in the general. advancement of the province. The Kathi Girassia class is I fear a drage on progress and it is now for the leaders, for Jasdan and for Thansdevli especially to inculcate the lesson that all healthy men should be useful working members of society, contributing each in his own way to the common good and to the welfare of the realm,

I wish you a long, useful and happy life and add to myo fficial, my very warm personal congratulations.

17 The Darbar Sahib's reply was as follows:----

MAJOR MEEK, SHRI YUVRAJ SAHEB, DARBAR SAHEBS,

VAZIR SAHEB, MY BELOVED SUBJECTS AND

#### GENTLEMEN.

I request you Major Meek to convey to His Excellency the Governor my deep sense of gratitude for his recognition of my succession to the Taluka of Thanadevli and the merging of the Taluka of Luni thereunder; will you also convey to His Excellency my assurances of abiding loyalty to the Throne and person of His Imperial Majesty the King Emperor.?

It was my ardent desire to receive His Excellency's recognition at the hands of Col. Wood, who has always proved himself a staunch friend of the Indian States; My personal debt of gratitude to him is considerable for the kind solicitious interest he has ever evinced in my welfare. The pressing call of his exalted office has unfortunately deprived me of this pleasure at the moment. I hope however that the pleasure is merely postponed and that we shall soon have the honour of welcoming amongst us and entertaining Col. Wood. I also hope that as a reward of this, although campulsory patience, I shall have the added pleasure of also welcoming Mrs. Wood.

Your presence amongst us today, Major Meek, is to me a source of very great pleasure. You have always not only maintained a kindly of

interest in my career, but have always been ready to help me with valuable advice and guidance whenever occasion demanded. I look upon this kind interest of yours as a valuable support in future career of added responsibility.

This is an unique occasion not only in the history of Thanadevli but in the annals of the whole kathi community. It promises a new era in the world of Kathi Chiefships. We. Kathis look upon this province with Saheb's special pride. We claim that we have not only Speech. given it a new name but we have enriched the rages of its history by deeds of valour and chivalry that will live for many a century yet to come. At our first advent in the province we carved out for ourselves no paltry kingdoms. In those days when our strength was our sword, we could well afford to be generous. Whatever territory one powerful Kathi subdugated, he divided equally among his sons; relying upon our ancient traditions and the courage and the strength of his sons, he was easy in his mind as to their future, as he knew every one of them would be capable of extending his territories if he was to inclined or succomb a in the attempt. Thanks to the British Government and their kindly intervention in the province we can now face the future without any misgiving in a reign of peace and prosperity. Our energy which was once directed towards the formation, retention and extention of our"principalities we can now afford to divert towards the translation of the welfare and happiness of our subjects. Our ambitions and aspirations have changed. New sentiments are born; our custom must keep pace with times. To-day the equal apportionment of Taluka spells disintegration not only of our lands, but also of our dignity, prestige and importance, all of which we had won and bought at the supreme sacrifice of blood and life. If we are to be worthy custodians of the position and prestige bestowed upon us by our distinguished ancestors. we must maintain our principalities in tact. That great statesman and wise ruler Darbar Shri Ala Khachar of Jasdan was the first to perceive this pressing need of the Kathi Chiefs, the presence of whose successor amongst us today I am honoured to note with pleasure. The advocation of this wise and eagacious policy of Darbar Shri Laxman Vala C. I. E. also stared these views. That his attempts were crowned with success we witness to-day. The day's occasion we owe more specially to the benevolent intentions of the British Government to further support and extend this policy. This mark of Government's intention to strengthen the Kathi Chiefa we all hail with prefound gratitude. The honour that the leading and enlightened Kathi Chiefs have done me to-day by personally gracing the occasion at such short notice is the testimony of the warmth of our gratitude to the British Government.

I wish to thank Darbar Shri Mulu Vala of Pithadia for whom I entertain feelings of respect for kindly honouring me with a visit on this occasion. I thank you all my brothers and friends, the Kathi Derbars who have given me great pleasure by your presence. If I my individualise one-Darbar Shri Vira Vala of Bagasra-all my life he has been a source of great strength and support. Ever since my earliest college life, as my companion he has evinced the keenest interest in my wellbeing for which I shall ever remain most grateful.

Turning to my cwn sentiment today; this is the beginning of a new and more responsible life. I hope and pray that I shall prove equal to it. My succession as you mentioned, Major Meck, marks the triumph of principle over prejudice. Such bettles inevitably result in the disappointment of some; that I should supply the cause of disappointment to any would be a source of great regret to me. That I am not guilty of such a crime I am grateful to you for asserting. My hand of friendship shall ever remain extended to my collaterals and the day they accept it, will be one of supreme pleasure to me.

I succeed to-day a noble and distinguished Chief who by the power of his own personality placed himself in the leading ranks of the Kathi Chiefs. That I should succeed such a glorious heritage is to me a source of no small pride,. To live up to the high reputation and praditions established by Darbar Shri Laxman Vala will be my sacred duty: that I may succeed, in whatever small measure, will be my continual prayer. My gratitude to the late lamented Darbar Shri Saheb is unlimited. The inexhaustible flow of parental care and extreme kindness that he ever directed towards me shall ever live with me as long as I live as the sweetest memories of my life. One of the proudest and pleasantest of the heritages that I inherit today is the one that secures for me the task of maintaining and cultivating the kindly intentions of a wide circle of friends; That I should see amongst the distinguished assemblage today, representatives of important states of Kathiawar is a pleasure and privilege with which no former Chief of Thanadevli has been. blessed. I welcome here the distinguished representative of the Limdi State. There always existed between His Highness and the late Darbar Saheb a cordiality and warmth of relationship which has secured for me the kindly interest of the Thakor Saheb as a mark of which kindness he has been good enough to depute the Yuvraj Saheb to attend this function. I am obliged both to the Thakore Saheb and the Yuvraj Saheb whom I have known from my earliest college days.

The connection between the Thanadevli and Kotda Taluka is both ancient and warm. It is therefore always a pleasure to welcome the Thakore Saheb of Ketda and the pleasure is greatly enhanced that I am able to entertain him at such an important occasion. The premier State of Kathiawar is represented by its premier Amir and Officer. I appreciate all the more the presence of such an exalted personage as, he happens to be one who is not only exalted in office but one who possesses the exalted qualities of head and heart, which have endeared him not only to the subjects of Junagadh but also to his wide circle of friends in which I hope I may claim a place. Vazir Sahib, I thank you for gracing this occasion.

To the Maharaja Saheb of Porbandar I am most thankful for deputing a deputation as strong in personnel as the strength and prestige of the Porbandar State which has attaited today a height unknown in the past.

I thank one and all once again for the honour you have done me by gracing this occasion as a mark of your sincere and kind wishes for my future welbeing. That I may prove worthy of trust is my eternal prayer.

- 18 Thus was celebrated this most eventful occasion.
- 19 Darbar Shri Amravala now holds a greater part of Jetpur then any other share-holder of Jetpur and presides as a The State senior member in the Jetpur Taluka Court, which exercises the jurisdiction of the fifth class. The Thanadevli State is separated and declared independent and enjoys 3rd class jurisdiction. There are three big Thanas viz Chital, Mendarda, and Bilkha under the Jetpur, Taluka Court. In Chital & Mendarda, the greater part belongs to the Darbar Saheb.
- 20 The Darbar Saheb is in his 27th year and has one son, K S.

  Ram Wala aged 3, and one daughter Kunvari Shri

  The Ruler Nanbai aged 5; he has two Ranis all continued in good health, throughout the year.

  His Family
- Levies from Sudhara Varad while Udhad & Jama are received from Simasi, Khorasa, Jhalansar & Isapar under Junagadh to the State and Hathigadh under Babra, and Jama from Motadevalia respectively; the levy called, Choth is recovered from Sanala, Luni, and Mandarda annually, while the Taluka has to pay Mamuli from Chital & Ghee Kori from Mendarda to Junagadh.
- 22 The relations of the Darbar Saheb with the representatives of the Paramount Power are proverbially cordial; and equally satisfactory are his relations, with his Bhayats and Mulgirasias, as well as with neighbouring States.
- and conciliatory; one of its Bhayats Vala Hathia Relations of the Ebhal of Devalia has no less than two dozen small State with the & big disputes with the state; in order to avoid costly Agency & others litigations the State accepted his request to hear and settle all these disputes, so far as possible, in a miscellaneous way and the hearing was fixed; but unfortunately the Bhayat fell ill and could not be present; the matter is tobe laken up at the earliest possible moment.
- -24. The State also proposes to settle boundary disputes with Junagadh, Gondal, and Baroda, by private ammicable settlement and the Devan Sahebs of the respective States, have already been comminicated with, in this connection.
- 25. Major A. S. Meek-our popular Political Agent, visited Thanadevli on the 27th May 1922 and 22nd October 1922, all these visits were of very brief durations but they were nonethless, less profitable, as they gave ample scope for friendly exchange of views on important matters
- 26. Mr K. Barlee-the Judicial Assistant, visited Thanadevli on 19-2-23 and also on 27-2-23.

27. As this report goes to the Press, the capital of the State is visited by Shaikh Saheb Mahmodbhai-the Vazir Saheb of the Visitors. Junagadh State; the Vazir Saheb arrived here in the evening of the 13th April and left on the 15th; his two days' stay here was a source of great mutual pleasure; he was entertained with all due hospitality becoming an officer of high rank of the greatest State of Kathiawar.

The Devan Saheb of Junagadh and Porbandar also paid brief visits to the State.

- 28. Soon after his accession to the Gadi the Darbar Saheb visited most of the villages of the distant Mendarda Division and in the end of November 1922 he visited almost all the important villages of Devalia and Matirala side and personally ascertained the conditions of the people who were found quite happy and contented.
- 29. He paid several visits to Rajkot and spent the whole period of the Red Cross Fete there, making handsome contributions amounting to Rs. 3000/ in round figures.
- 30. It is with great pleasure that I have to note here that handsome Jivais have been provided for the three step-mothers of the Dasbar Saheb and they are quite satisfied with the arrangement.
- where he spent about 12 days; he visited almost all Darbar Saheb's the Political Officers of Government and H. E. the movements Governor, Sir, George Amrose was also pleased to grant him an interview on the (6th February. The Darbar Saheb's visit to Bombay and specially his interviews with H. E. and the Leading Government Officers, was productive of great good to him in many ways.
- 32. The Darbar Saheb enjoyed his Bombay trip very much and an intelligent and shrewd chief like him, turned to the best possible account, all what he saw in this urban primus of In in. India.
- 33. He also attended the Kathiawar-races which were held from the 12th to the 15th February at Rajkot; he freely mixed with all the prominent visitors, including H. H. the Aga Khan who had then been staying in Rajkot; an at-home-party was given on a magnificent scale by the Darhar Saheb on the race-course on the 14th February.
- 34. The Darbar Saheb is a member of the Free-mason-lodge and to mark his auspicious Installation-day, he had given a sumptuous dinner at the Rajkot-lodge on his first visit there after the Installation.
- 35. The birth-day of His Imperial Majesty the King-Emperor was celebrated as a public holi-day and though the King-Emperor's state was in mourning on account of the demise Birth-day. of the late Darbar Saheb, general rejoicings were observed.

36. The 28th of November, being the Darbar Saheb's birth-day was observed as a great holiday and a public Darbar Other-festi- was held in Thanadevli, when several promotious to servants of the State and charities to the poor were announced.

37. 12th of December was observed as a coronation holiday and the Armistice Day was observed on the 11th November 1922,

#### ADMINISTRATION.

- exercising the full powers of a third-class State, the General. Darbar Saheb himself regularly attends office, where he hears petitioners personally whereby the work is expedited and the people have the great satisfaction of presenting their supplaints to their master, thus leaving little scope for any mischief being played by Lower officials. In other matters, Heads of Departments pass suitable orders on their own initiative and in important matters they make a reference to the Kamdar and in more important matters, orders of the Darbar Saheb are obtained. The office—work has become a pleasure with the Darbar Saheb and he is proverbially punctual in his office work.
  - 41. Mr. Maganlal D. Swadia was appointed Kamdar in November 1922.
- Kanji Chatur, formerly Agency Manager, of important Revenue Talukas, and mature in age and experience, was Administration. appointed Revenue-officer, in the year under report; he introduced, with the approval of the Darbar Saheb, improved methods of revenue-administration; they are simple and still suitable and convenient; systematic accounts are now maintained by Vahivatdars; the Revenue Officer, personally visited almost all the villages of the State and made important suggestions, as a result of his district-tours, and these suggestions are receiving careful attention of the Hazur.

43. The collection of the land revenue is conducted on the time honoured system of Bhagbatai.

## CHAPTER III. PROTECTION.

- Legislation. 44. Appendix II shows the list of Laws & regulations in force in the State.
  - 45. There is no regular Military-force in the Taluka, but 95 Pasaitas,
    16 Police-Patels, 20 Jivaidars, and other 106 men,
    Military. forming Sir-Bandi are kept for the protection of the
    Darbar Gadh and the villages of the State.
- 46. The village-Police-Patels and the Pasaitas are paid either in cash or kind.
  - 47. The Serviceable guns, are as Shown in Appendix III, for.

    purposes of Salutation when Political officers or any

    Guns. distinguished personages visit the State.
- 48. There are 20 police-men; they are trained in drill and are equipped with arms; they are posted as Jail-guards and perform general police-duties;
- 49. There were two Police-Fozdars one at Mota-Devalia and another at Mendarda; Now one Naib-Fozdar has been Police. newly appointed and he keeps his Head-quarters in Thanadevli; thus the work is being done expeditiously and naturally with greater efficiency.

The total cost of the Police is Rs. \$292.

- 50. Appendix V shows the working of the Police during the year. The number of offences reported to the Police (including CrIme. those of last years) was 34 & the persons arrested by them this year were 37. Of these 37 arrested, 54 were sent for trial, in which 22 were convicted and 13 were discharged;
  - 1 was not demanded for trial, and
  - 2 Persons remain under trial, i.e. I to be extradited and the other to be tried in the gang dacoity case.
  - 51. The amount of stolen property was Rs. 6267-5-0 and the amount recovered was Rs. 303-3-3 giving a percentage of **Property**4-7 against 10-7 of the last year, as the amount Stolen. involved in the daconity case only amounted to Rs. 5886.
- 52. Appendices VII and VIII will show that 34 offences were committed for trial, of which 27 were disdosed of.
- 53. The number of accused persons was 37 of which 23 were convicted and 17 were discharged by the Nyayadhish court.
  - 54. The Nyayadhish is invested with 1st Class Magisterial-powers in Criminal-matters and in Civl cases, he can hear Criminal suits to the extent of Rs. 5000/-suits of a higher Justice. value were heard by the Darbar Saheb and thus there was

no appeal-court for such suits of higher value; at the same time, in Criminal-matters, if the Nyayadhish had to commit a case to the Sessions-court of the Taluka, some special arrangement had to be made for the disposal of such cases; in order to obviate such a difficulty and with a view to give one Appeal-court to the parties, the Kamdar has been invested with the full powers of the Taluka, both in Civil and Criminal matters and would hear appeals against the decisions of the Nyayadhish-court, the Darbar presiding in the Hazur Court and being the highest court of appeal and revision; practically the Hazur Court would be exercising the powers of a presidency-High-Court, as it were. This arrangement comes into force from the 1st of April 1923 i. e. at the beginning of the new official year and is decidedly, in the interests of justice.

- 55. Appendix P, selates to Criminal Appeals 3 applications were filed in which 4 persons were concerned, the sentence in 1 case was confirmed while in 2 cases, decisions were modified or reversed.
- 56 As mentioned in para 54 the Kamdar being invested with judicial powers, he would be presiding as the Appellate Judge as well as the Original Judge in Civil Suits of higher valuations.
  - 57 The number of civil suits including that of the last year was
    103 of which 79 were disposed of. The value of
    Civil the suits filed during the year was Rs. 4936,
    Justice while that of the disposed of was Rs. 4148.
- 58 The balance at the end of the year of undisposed of suits was-24
- 59 Of the 79 suits disposed of 5 were exparte, 15 amicably disposed of, while 15 were struck off the file and 42 otherwise disposed of.
- 60 Appendix XI relates to the execution of decrees. There were 130 applications on the register, of which 62 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 68 for the current year.
- 61 The value of 81 registered this year was Rs. 8530, that of disposed of Rs. 4971 leaving a balance of 68 with a value of Rs 11256. Of The Remaining 68 This Year 41, were of under six months while 2 were of under one year and 25 were of above one year.
- 62. Appendix XII relates to civil appeals. No appeal was presented this year, so it needs no remark.
  - 63. The Bhayati & Rajprakarni court is presided over by the Deputy Kamdar and appeals against his decisions Bhayati are berd by the Hazur,

Out of 10 culprits of the last year 7 were extradited and 1 was not surrendered by Baroda, so the demand was to be withdrawn and 2 culprits are still at large; of the 3 culprits apprehended this year 1 is to be surrendered; the other is to be tried in the dacoity case and 1 being surrendered is convicted, but undergoes punishment at Junagadh in a similar case there.

66. There were 2 prisoners at the end of the last year and 3 were admitted during the year under report 5 were released and 2 remain at the end of the year.

#### CHAPTER IV.

#### PRODUCTION, DISTRIBUTION & FINANCES.

- 63. A reference to appindix XVII will shew that the rainfall registered at Thanadevli was 17 inches and 65 cents, Rainfall. and nearly the same quantity of rainfall over the whole Taluka, so the Agtar and Paster produce was not below the average income as compared with that of the preceeding year.
  - 70. The average ratufall for 5 years was 22 inches and 28 cents.
  - 71. Appendix XVIII will show that the prices of staplefood have not yet abated as much as they were before the year 1914, and the wages of labour are still the same as in the last year.
  - 72. Labouring classes find ample works in agricultural and public works, as well as in the Gir forest of this Taluka.
  - 73. As Mendarda division borders on the Gir Jungle and there is a big Ahara at Mota-devalia where there is a natural growth of Babul trees no reserved forest is kept in the Taluka.
  - 74. There is a white-stone quarry at Zinzuda under Mendarda and black-stone quarry near Jetrur; the State having Stone.

    Stone. requested the Devan Sahebs of Porbandar and Quarries. Dhrangdhra to lend the services of their quarry superintendents to this State, for sometime, they have kindly consented to do so and with their expert advice the State proposes

to develop these quarries on scientific lines, which would bringad-ditional profits to the State and provide ample work for labourers.

- 75. The Mendarda-portion of the great Gir belonging to this State produces grass in considerable quantity; and there are Grass. sufficient number of hay-Stacks there.
- 76. People of this Taluka have not yet Started any ginning factory

  Trade & or press, and they lead a general life in ordinary

  Industry. trade and avocation.
- 77, There is no mint in the Taluka, but the British coins and cur-Mint, rency notes are in ordinary use.
  - 78. Appendix XIX will show that 7008-10-10 rupees were spent Public for repairs to public buildings constructing wells and Works. erecting houses for cultivators in villages.
- 79. As regards the live stock of this Taluka, a reference to appendix XX will show that there is a marked increase in the Sale of Cattle. number of miles animals. This shows that the prevention of export of miles animals and the introduction of Singroti rules have made a healthy effect and it is hoped that not only cultivators will be benefited but the price of milk and ghee which are the chief necessaries of life will still be reduced.
  - 80. Appendix XXI relates to the income of Ganja. There were 4 shops Intoxicative drugs. and the income was 220-4-0

Opium sale is farmed by the Jetpur Taluka Court as usual.

#### CHAPTER V.

#### REVENUE & FINANCE.

81. It will appear from Appendix XXII that the income and expenditure of the year Samvat 1978 come to Rs. 300225/ and Rs. 302354 respectively.

The Taluka has neither guaranted nor Government debts.

82. when the present Darbar Saheb assumed the reins of administration of this State, soon after passing away of his revered father, unfortunately the finances of the State were Finances. not in a satisfactory condition and he had to meet several extra-ordinary expenses such as the Karaj, Dhro Parayan and Varsi of the late Darbar Saheb; he wished to introduce though gradually but steadily, improved methods of State-administration; he had to incur sufficient expenses on his Installation-Darbar; so, in order to cope with all these requirements he atonce appointed a committee of leading officers of the State to inquire into an i report on this and other important matters; the committee sat from day to day and after collecting a mass of information made various suggestions to the Darbar Saheb, who atonce grasped the situation and issued prompt orders in urgent matters; asa result of which several items of expenses were curtailed, while other matters which can brook some delay, are receiving his careful consideration I am right glad to report that the issue of the prompt orders referred

to above, has greatly improved the situation and in due course of time, with the kindly and zealous supervision of the Darbar Saheb, the State, will enter upon an era of prosperity and improvement at no distant date.

#### CHAPTER VL

#### MEDICAL-RELIEF & VITAL STATISTICS.

- Medical devl. The number of outdoor patients treated this Institution. year was 1950 giving a daily average of 45.
- 84 The surrounding villages take advantage of the dispensary and the Darbar Saheb is always generous in providing sufficient stock of medicine.
- \*\*\* 85-Some native physicians are paid annuities and give advantage of their visits to the people of Thanadevli.
  - 83. The total expenditure comes to Rs. 2462 vide appendix XXIIL
- 87. Malaria, had broken out in some of the Mendarda villages during the monsoon and the Mendarda Majmu Doctor was atonce asked to visit all such villages and distribute medicines to the people at the expense of the State, which at once brought this fever under control.
  - 88 Appendix XXIV shows the registration of births and deaths.
    - 89 There is an increase in the number of births while there is also an apparent increase in the number of deaths.

- 12 This Taluka pays its usual share towares the expenses of the English and Vernacular and Guls schools at Jetpur, Mendarda and Chital.
- 93 Scholarships to the students at Jetpur, Rajkot, Bombay etc. are given as mentioned in the last years report,
- 94 Rs. 2500 are set spart for any Kathi boy studying at the Dhadhuka Hottel.

95 It is proposed to open two new schools in two of the villages of the State in the near future.

96 There is no separate Library but leading papers are subscribed for, such as the Times of India, the Kathiawar Library. Times etc., they are sent to the Local Mahetaji of the Vernacular school and the papers are there kept for the use of the public, in a way which may not interfere with the school-work.

#### CHAPTER VIII.

#### MISCELIANEOUS.

97. As is so well known gangs of dacoits were ravaging several parts of Kathiawar, and this State etonce put one Operations. Ford-Motor-ear at the disposal of the Agency Superintendent of Police, for their use, during their operations agrinst these dacoits and made its own Bandobast in the State.

Printing Press. 98. There is no Printing Press in the State.

199. Thansdevli is noted for its hospitality and the State has kept up its reputation by providing methodical hospitality to its guests. The State maintains a decent Sadavrat for which and for looking after its religious Institutions, the State has kept a small but regular establishment It also provides ready food or grain to the blind disabled or those who are extremely poor and who are bona-fide subjects of the State.
