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# 39 th Indian National Congress, Belgaum: 

## Introdaction.

The province of Karnatak had a distinct ontity in the ancient Indian jolity. It has played no mean part in its contribution to and preservation of General. Indian cultare. In faot, it mas be prondly said that Karnatak for seven handred years i. e. from. the Chaiukain period to the fall of the glorious and vever-to-be:forgotten Empire of Vijayanagar nurtured and defended the precious Aryan colture when it was threstened with extinetion. Ultimately in common with the rest of India, Karnatak too, as bas been truly observed " bad had to pass through a period, brief bat very disatrous period of the dwindling of the fire of life, a period of ill-started disintegration, marbed politiceally by the anarchy which gave European adventure its clance; and inwardly by an inareasing torpor of the creative spirit in religion and art, science and philosophy. And these evils have been incalculably aggravated by the moltiple partition to which the province has come to be subjected ". It was only during the last deoade that a movement ;ifor the anification of Karnatak was started. Meanwhile -under the constitution of the Indian National Congress as adopted at Nagpur all the provinces were reorganised on linguistic basis. Thus, since 1921 Karnatak got its recognition as a distinct provinoe in the nationed affairs. :

The Congress beld its session, for the first time, in Karnatak is. December 1924. The responsibility on the province in inviting the Congress was nọ small one, as the province comprises barely seven British districts though large territories under more than a dozen Native States with hardily any soope for politi, 'cal activity are included in it. Still the enthusiasum for the Congress was unique and it must be noted with gratitude that all the districts and States, especially the State of Mysore, heartily responded to the appeal made on behall of the Reception Committee for funds.

The Karaatak Provincial Congress Committee met in March 1924 to select Belgaum : a suitable place for holding the sessions of the Congress; and after a very been the congress contest the choice fell upon Belgaum. Belganm is by no meang a vory large or popalous eity; but it afforded a number of facilities suited for making the best possible arrangements with a view to convenience and comfort of all con. corned. Belgarm could, moreover, with some pride claim to have contributed its hamble wite in the recent political activities of the nation. It was in Belgaum in the year 1916 that the 16 th Bombay Provincial Conference held its session
when the basis was laid for the unity between the two wings of the Congress of those days, namely, the Moderntes and the Nationalists with the result that both the parties once again came under the common flag of the next Congress at Lacknow. It was in Belgaum again tbat Lokmanya founded his Indian Home Rule Leegue in 1916

## Formation of the Reception Committes.

The Karnatak Provinolal Congrese Committee at its meeting referred to above formed the Reception Committee which met in its turn on the next day to make provisional appointments of the office-bearers. The Reception Committes met again in August when the final appointments of the office-bearers, the formation of the Executive Committee and the various sub-committees took place. There were in all 16 sub-committees to look to the different functions of the Reception Committee, the Chairman and the General Secretaries being ex-officio members of each sub-committee. The names of the office-bearers aud the various sub-committees with their members are given in Appendix I.

## Arrangements.

The Reception Committee chose a beartiful site situate on the ground of the Belgaum Extension covering an area of about 80 acres-all compact and beautiful-surrounded on one side with the smenities of modern city life and on the other with all the charm of rural life and gave it the historic name of Vijsyanagar to remind us of the glorious Karnatak Empire of that name.

The prinoiple arrangements made by the Reception Committee in Vijayanagar were:-

1. The Pandal-The Reception Committee had secured on hire for the purposes of the Pandal the huge khaddar Tent which the Reception Committee of Cocanada had got specially made for the Congress by Mesars A. N. Mukerji of Caleutta and which had been purchased by the All-India Congress Committee for the annual sessions of the congress. It was tastefully decorated all through. Just near the centre of the platform were seen the life-size portraits of Lokmanya and Mahatma Gandhi while a number of portraits of patriots who have earned name and fame in the cause of the Country were exhibited on all sides. Following the preeedent of the last three years, the assembly sat on the floor covered with carpets excepting visitors for whom a gallery of wooden planks was provided ranning all round the tent.

A beautiful garden with a marble fountain in the centre was artistically laid out just in front of the Pandal, -
2. The Gopura-The main gate to the pandal formed quite a unique and remarkably attractive feature. It was designed and executed by the young promising artist of Karnatak now carrying on his business in Bombay under the name of Shrinivas and Co. taking for his model the gate of the temple of Shri Virupar of Hampi, the capital of the Vijay anagar Empire. At night the Gopura was illaminated with electrio lights supplied by special installations.
3. Subjects Committee Hall-A speoious octagonal Hall covering an area of about 14,000 square leet was erected just adjoining the Pandal with a view to minimise the chances of disappointment to visitors eager to witness the proceedings of the Committee. This ball was also intended to serve and it did serve to afford facilities for bolding meetings of the various other conferences on the congress grounds
4. Central Offices-By the side of tbe Subjects Committee Hall, a big quadrangular space was reserved on which the various Reception Committee offices were located including offices for Post, Telegraph and the Bank.
5. The " IThaddar Palace"-Close by the Subjects Committee Hall, a small and simple structure was construated for accommodating the President. Though it was worthy of being called a 'palace' from the point of view of beauty it was certainly a cottage from the point of view of cost.
6. Hospital and Medical aid-A little further to the west of the President's camp ard in a quiet corner was erected a hospital where qualified modical men were ever ready to render service. Besides this, there was a free dispensary under the supervision of experienced

- doctors and it was freely resorted to by delegates and visitors.

7. Spinning Hall-A hall equipped with sppinning wheels and other accessories was specially constructed for the convenience of delegates desiring to spin. Spinning compatetions were slso held here and prizes awarded. In this connection it should be noted that the thanks of the Reception Committee are due to Sjt. Satish Chandra Das Gupta of the Khadi Pratishthan, Calcatta, for having entertained large masses of people by his Lantern lectures siving a visible representation of the prosperity of Indis in the pre-British period and also of the meaning of the Khaddar movement so far as it relates to the revival of the glorious past.
8. The Concert Hall-Close by the spinning hall was erected another structure with an appearance of a modern theatre for holding musical coneerts. Prominences was given to Kannad râgas and tunes.

Colebrated masicians from Mysore inoluding Sjt. Veené Sheshannsthe veteran and talented Vegna player, contributed a great deal in making this part of the programo quite attractive and successtul. The Reeeption Csmmittee is deeply indebted to all these musicians for their honorary services.
9. Accommodation-Acormmodation for delegates, members of the Reception Committee and visitors from other provinces were provided in Blooks constructed either of khaddar or of bamboo mats, each blook containing generally 12 rooms and each room accommodating 6 persons. In all 72 blocks were erected out of which 39 blocks were of pare khaddar. In addition, there were 70 " special cottages" each being separately provided with kitohen, bath and water-supply for the convenience of those requiring such arrangements.
10. Dinner arrangements-A cenbral general kitohen providing meals in Karnatak style was arranged and a buge hall measuring about $500 \times 100$ was reserved for dining. Arrangements were also made for separate kitchens for provinces desiring to have their own arrangements. Close to the kitchen, a store was maintained to supply all provisions at cost price
11. Water Works-The town of Belgaum being without the facility of any water works, special arrangements bad to be made for the supply of water. For this purpose a large well measuring 50 x 50 was dug to a depth of nearly 40 feat for getting perennial and sufficient supply of water. The wator wis then pumped out by steam pumps specially pat ap for the purpose into tauks of the eapacity of 30,000 gallons and then distributed by means of pipes throughout Vijayanagar.
12. Conservancy and Sanitation-Following the precedents of the last few years, treach privies were conatructed The Municipal staff and a noble band of Volunteers under the direct supervision of Sjt D. B. Kalelkar worked in close co-operation in arranging for the disposal of the night-soil. But for the devoted work of the Volunteers, satisfactory management of this departmeht would have been impossible.
13. Lighting-Arrangements for lighting had aloo to be specially made. Exhibition enolosures were lighted by "electricity specially installed? for the parpose. The Pandal, the Subjeats Committee Hall, the offices, Volunteers' barraoks and the President's camp were lighted by Petromax lights ; the kitohen, Dinining Halls, the Roads and other pablic places by kitson lights and the Delegates' quarters by Dietz lanterns, 14. Volunteers-The Volunteer orgranisation was another "unique feature of the Belgaum Congress. Early in April, Dr. Hardikar had preparea
an elaborate soheme for securing " trained " Volunteers for the Congress. Owing to dearth of funds the scheme could only be partly carried out. The strength of volunteers was 1156 consisting of 817 Sahayaks, 141 Sahayikas (Lady volunteers) and 198 Soouts-all reoruited solely from Karnatak and Kannada residents of Andhra, Mabarastra and Bombay. Of these, about 275 Sahayaks had received full time training in camps specially opened for the parpose and an equal number were given instruetions in classes conducted by some of the regularly trained Volunteers. Taking into consideration the fact that the Volunteers had onerous and heavy duties to periorm suoh as, crowd and traffic control, night patrol, and guard-duty-not to apeas of ordinary duties-it must be noted with gratitude that they aoquitted themselves quite creditably under the able management of the Captain and other officers of the Volunteer organisation.

15 National Flag-A specious quadrangular camp was constructed for housing the Volunteers with the Sonapati's tent in the middle. Adjoing the camp, on the open Maidan, a flag staff of majostic height was raised and the national flag of pure khadder with oharaka was hoisted on it with due ceromoney. Deily in the morning \& in the evening the flag was hoisted and lowered. The entire camp, the Sabayaks, and other officers in their khaki and white uniforms and the Sabayikas in their black tri.colour-bordered and edged saries and Kumars (soonts) with their scarfs, saluting it at hoisting and low. ering times every day in the horse-sboe lormation was attraoting a very large mass of on-lookers. This daily hoisting of National Flag was altogether a new function in the history of Congress volanteers.
16. Swadeshi Exhibition-The Swadeshí Exhibition was arranged in a special onclosure measaring 350 z 200 . It was divided as in previous years into foar sections (a) Museum (b) Demonstratiou (c) Sale and (d) Ayurvedio.
(a) In the Museum section. various 1ndian arts and industries were allowed to be exhibited. The Mysore Government was good enough to exlibit a handsome number of articles relating to agriculture as well as other manufactures and they refleot great ore. dit on the industrial activities and progreess of the State.
(b) In the demonstration section parties from different provinces were allowed to demonstrate all the processes commencing from the ginning of cotton to weaving of hand.spun yarn.
(c) Sales section provided stalls for sale of articles of Indian mannfactare.
(d) Asarvedie section eshibited Indian. Medical herbs and essences. This section was a new feature this year.

## The co-operation of other bodies.

a Tbe M. S. and M. Railway cempany were good enough to accede to the reyuest of the Raception eommittes for opeuing a flag station close to the Congrose site. Besides this, they showed readiness to meet the needs of the Committee in all possible ways, Last but not least, it is gratilying to note the hearty and enthusiastic co-operation of the Belgaum Municipality and its off. cin's. But for their help and co-opgration the Reception Committee would not hisvo bosu able to achieve all it did. Speaial thanks of the Reception Committee art, therefore, due to these two bodies and to such other public departmeuts and their heads for having rendered all possible assistance.

It is regretted also that the report could not be seen 'through the press and published before 28 th April 1925 as is required by the Constitution as amended at Belgaum. Various caases beyond our control conspired to caves this regrettable delay

# Belgaum Impressions 

By Mahatma Gandhi

When there are too many impressions all elamouring for expression, the registrar's task becomes unenviable. Such is my position as I take up the pencil to register my impressions of Belgaum. I can but try.

Gangadhar Rao Deshpande and his band of workors rose to the highest height. His Vijayanagar was a triumph-not yet of Swaraj-but certainly of organisation. Every detail was well thought out. Dr Hardikar's voluntears were smart and attentive. The roads were broad and well kept. They could easily be broader for the convevience of the temporary shops and the easy movement of thousands of sight-seers Tbe lighting arrangement was perfect. The huge pavilion with a marble fountain in front of it seemed to invite all who would enter it. The eapacity of the pavilion could not be less than seventeen thousand. The sanitary arrangements though quite good needed still more scientific treatment than what they had. The method of the disposal of used water was very primitive. I invite the Clawnpore people who are to: bave the honour of holding the Congress session of 1925 to study the most effective mes. thods of camp sanitation now and not leave this very important part to the eleventh hour.

Whilst I am able to give ungrudging praise for the almost perfect organisation that one conld see in the Congress camp, I oannot help remarking that Gangadhar Rao could not escape the temptation of making the outside look lavish and in following the traditional custom of going in for extravagant luxuries for the 'people at the top.' Take the presidential 'hut'. I had bargained for a khaddar hut; but I was insulted with a kbaddar palace. The floor space reserved for the President was certainly quite necessary. The fenoe round the 'palace' was an absolute necessity for my protection from embarrassingly admiring crowds. But I am sure that, had I been contractor, I would have given the same space and the same comfort to the President at half the expense. This however is only one instance of the many I can quote of Iavish expenditare. The refreshments supplied to the members of the Subjects Committee and others were panecessarily lavish. There was no sense of proportion observed as to the quantities served. I am finding fanlt with nobody. The exbravagance came from a generous heart. It was all well meant. Forty yeara' tradition cannot be undone in a day, especially it no one likely to gain a hearing will repeatills criticise it. I know, when I suggested to Vallabhbbai in 1921 that he should make a beginning, he retorted by aaying that whilat he would
try to attain simplicity and avoid extravagance, he would not allow his pet Gujarath to be considered miserly. I could not persuade him that if he did not have a temporary fountain costing several thousand rupees he would not be considered miserly. I told him too that whatever he did was bound to be copied by his successors. Vallabhbhai would not take the odium of being considered miserly. I advise Camppure to lead the way. The miserliness of Cawnpore may be considered the extravagance of tomorrow. There were many trings Vallababhai did discard. I did not hear any remarks about the disappearance of things that were really not a felt want.

Let us remember the Congress is intended to represent the poorest toilers who are the salt of India. Our scale must be so far as possible adjusted to theirs. We must therefore be progressively economical without being inefficient and stingy.

In my opinion the charges for acoommodation and food are muoh too heavy. We may do worse than take a lesson from the book of Swami Shraddbanandji. I remember the sheds he built for his guests who came for the Gurukul anniversary in 1916. He built grass sheds for them at a cost (I think) of about Rs. 2000 . He invited contractors to open restaurants on the ground and made no charge for the accommodation. No one could complain of the arrangement. They knew what they were to expect.. Nearly 40,000 people were thus accommodated on the Gurukul ground without the slightest difficulty and with practically no expense. And what is more, each visitor received what he wanted and was at liberty to live oheeply or extravagantly.

I do not say that the Swami's plan should be copied in its entirety. But I do suggest that better and cheaper plans are imperatively necessary. The reduotion of the delegate's fees from Rs. 10 to 1 was universally acclaimed. The reduction of lodging and dining oharges would be, I am sure, still more appreciated.

The source of income should be a small entrance fee levied from every speotator. The Congress must be an annual fair where visitors may come and get instruction with amusement. The deliberative part should be an item round which the demonstrative programme should turn. It therefore should take plaoe in decent time, as this year, and the appointments must be religiously observed.

I am not sure that the paoking of all other conferences into one week serves any national purpose, In my opinion only those conferences should take place during the Congress week that aid and strengthen the Congress. Tine Presidentiand his 'Cabinet' must not be expected to give their attention to any--thing but Congress work, I know that, it there had been no other call upon

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my time, I could bave better attended to the charge entrusted to me. I had not a moment left to me for contemplation. I was unable to frame the necessary recommendations for making the franchise a success. The fact is that the organisers of various conferences do not take their tasks seriously. They hold them because it has become the fashion to do so. I would urge workers in various directions to avoid the annaal dissipation of energy.

The oxhibition of indigenous aris and industries is an institution that should grow from year to year. The masical concert was a treat that thonsands must have enjoyed The lantern lectures tracing the tragic history of the ruin of the grestest national industry and the possibilities of its revival were apposite, instructive and amusing. I tender my congratulations to Satish Babu upon the thoughtful and thorough manner in which he organised these lectures, The spinning competition must also be a permanent feature. Its popularity is evinced by the number of competitors, the brillance of results and the number of donors. This spinning movement is bringing out women from their seclusion as nothing else could have done. Of the 11 prize winners, 4 belonged to the gentle sex It has given them a diginity and self-confidence which no university degree could gife them. They are realising that their active assistance is just as iodispensable as that of men and, what is more, such assistance can be as easily rendered by them as, if not more easily. than, by men.

One thing I must not omit before I elose these impressions. There were nearly seventy five volunteers, mostly Brahmans, who were engaged in conservancy work in the Congress camp. The Municipal bhangis were indeed taken, but it was thought necessary to have the volunteers also. Kaka Kalelkar who was in charee of this corps tells me that this part of the work would not have heen done as satisfactorily as it was, if the corps had not been formed. He tells me too that the voluntears worked most willingly, Not one of them shirked the wort which ordinarily very few would be prepared to undertake. And yet it is the noblest of all from one point of view. Indeed sanitary work must be regarded as the foundation of all volunteer training.

## FIRST DAY.

## I. CONDOLENCE RESOLUTION.

This Congress records with sorrow the deaths of Bi Ammsn, Bir Ashutosh Chaudhari. Sir Ashutosh Mukerii, Mr. Bhupendransth Basu, Dr. Subrahmanya Iyer, Mr. Dal Bahadur Giri, Mr. Govind Venktesh Yalgi, Mr. Vaman Ras Moharir, Mr. T. V. Gopalaswami Madaliar, Mx. C. V. P. Shivam, and Lala Kanailalji and also of Messrs, Rustomji Jeevanji Ghorkhodu and Mr. P. K. Naidu in South Atria snd tenders its respectful sympathy to the bereaved families.

## II. THE AGRELMENT \& THE SPINNING FRANCHISE.

(a) (i) The Congress hereby endorses the following agreement between Mahatma Gandhi on the one hand and Deshbandu C. R. Das and Pandit Motilal Nehru acting on behalf of the Swaraj Party on the other.

## THE AGREEMENT.

"Whereas although Swaraj is the goal of the parties in Indis, the country is divided into different groups seemingly working in opposite direction, and whereas such antagonistio aetivity relards the progress of the nation towards Swaraj, and whereas it is desirable to bring so far as possible all such parties within the Congess and on a common platform, and wheraas the Congress itaglt is divided into two opposing seotions. resulting in harm to the country's oanse, and whereas it is desirable to reanite these parties for the parpose of furthering the common cause, and wharess a policy of repression has beere commenced in Bengal by the local government with the sanation of the Governer-General, and wheress in the opinion of the undersigned this repression is aimed in reality not at any party of violence, but at the Swaraj Party in Bengal and therefore at constitutional and orderly activity, and whereas therefore it has become a matter of immediate necossity to ine
vite and secure the eo-operation of all parties for putting forth the anited strength of the nation against the policy of repression, we the andersigned strongly recommend the following for adoption by all parties and eventually by Congress at Belgaum:
"The Congress s'ould suspend the programme of non-co-operation as the national programme excepi in so far as it relates to use or wear eloth made out of India.
"The Congress should further resolve that different classes of work of the Congress mary. be done as may be found necessary by different sections within the Congress and should resolve that the spresd of hand-spinning and band-weaving and all the antecedent processes and the spread of hand-spun and hand-woven khaddar, and the promotion of unity between different eommunities, specially between the Hindus and the Mahomedane, and the removal of untouchability by the Hindas from amonget them, should ba carried on by all sections with'in the Congress, and the work in connection with the Central and Provinoial Iregislaturas should be carried on by the Swaraj Party on behall of the Coogress and as an integral part of the Congress organisation, and for such work the Swaraj Party should make its own rales and administer its own funds.
"Inasmuch as exporience has shown that without nuiversal spinuing India oannot become sell-supporting regarding the olothing requirements and inasmuch as band-spinning is the best and the most tangible method of establishing a visitle and substantial bond between the masses and Congressmen and women and in order to popularise band-spinning and its products the Congress should repeal Article seven of the Congress Constitution and should substitute the following therefor:-
"No one shall be a member of any Congress Committee or organieation who is not of the age of 18 and who does not wear hand-spun and hand-woven khaddar at political and Congress functions or while engaged in Congress business and does not make a contribation of 2,000 yards of evenly span yarn per month of his or her own spinning or in case of illuess unwillinguess or any such cause a like quantity of yarn spas by any obher, person."
(ii) The Congress hopes that the agreement will resuit in true unity between the two wings of the Congress and
will aliso enable persons belonging to other politioul orgat nisations to join the Congress. The Congress congratu: Iates the Swarajists and others arrested under the New Ordinance or Regalation III of 1818 and is of opinion
$\therefore$. that such arrests are inevitable so lung as the people of India have not the capacity for vindicating their statua and liberty, and is farther of 'opinion that ,such capacity can in the present circumstances of the country be developed by achieving the long deferred exclusion of foreign cloth; and therefore as a token of the earnestness and determination of the people to achiers this national par. pose, weicomes the introduotion of handspinning as part of the franchise and. appeals to every person to avail himself or herself of it and join the Congress.
(iii) In view of the foregoing, the Congress expecte every Indian, man and woman, to discard all foreign cloth and to use and wear hand-span and hand-woven Khaddar to the exclusion of all other cloth.
With a view to accomplish the said parpose without delay, the Congress expects all Congress members to help the spread of hand-spinning and the anteceedent processas and the manufacture and sale of Khaddar.
(iv) The Congress appesis to the Princes and the wealthy classes of India and the members of political and other organisations not represented on the Congress, and municipalities, local boards, panchayats and such other institutions, to extend their help to the spread of handspinning by personal use and ttherwise and aspecially by giving liberal patronage to the classes of artiats, atill surviving and capable of working artistic designs in fina kbaddar.
(v) The Congress appeals to the merchants engaged in the foreign cloth and yarn trade to appreciate the interests of the nation, and discontinue their importation of foreign cloth and yarn and help the national cettage industry by dealing.in khaddar. :

(vi) It having come to the notice of the Congress that maiso ties of cloth are manufactored in mills and on other looms out of mill yarn and sold in the Indian market as shaddar, the Congres appeals to the mill-owners and other manufactarers concerned, to discontinue this undesirable practice and further appeals to them to encourage the revival of the ancient cottage indastry of India by restricting their oparations among those parts of the country that have not yet come under the Congress influence and appeals to them to discontinue the importa. tion of foreiga yarn.
(vii) The Congrsss appeals to the heads and leaders of all religions denominations whether Hindu, Moslim or any other to preach to their congregations the message of khaddar and advise them to discontinue the use of foreign cloth.
(b) The present Article VII of the Constitation to be repealed and the following to be substitated therefor:-
(i) Every person not disqualified under Article IV sball be entitled to become a member of any primary organisation controlled by the Provincial Congress Committee, provided that no one shall be a member of |any Congress Committee or organisation who" does not wear hand-span and hand-wove Khaddar at political and Congress functions or while engaged in Congress business and does not make contribution of 20,000 yards of evenly spun yarn per year of his or her own spinging, or in the case of illness on unwillingness or any such cause, the same quality of yarn spun by any other person; provided also thatino person shall be a member of two parallel Congress organisations at one and the same time.
(ii) The year of the membership shall be reckoned from the Lst Janaary to the 31st December. The said subscription shall be payable in advance and may be paid in instalments of 2,000 yards per month payable in advance. Members joining in the middle of the year shall contribate the full quantity due from the beginning of the year.

## $\xi$

## Transitory Provision.

During 1925 the subscription shall be 20,000 yards only and shall be payable on or before 1st March or in ingtalments as "aforessaid.
(iii) No person shall be entitled to vote at thee election of representatives or delegates or any committee or sabcommittee of any Congress organisation whatsoever, or to be elected as such, or to take part in any meetings of the Congress or any Congress organisation or any committee or sub-committee thereof, if he has not contributed the yarn subscription or the instalments due.
Any member who has made default in the payment of the yarn subscription may have his or her rights restored by paying the subscription in respect of which the default has occurred and the instalment for the month then carrent.
(iv) Every Provincial Congress Conmmittee shall send 'to the General Secretary, All-India Congress Committee, from month to month returns of membership and of the yarn received by it in virtue of this Article. The Provincial Congress Committees shall contribute ten per cent of the yarn sabscriptions or their value to the All-India Congress Committee.
(v) Omit present Article VI (e) and Article IX (b)

## V. SYMPATBY WITH TEE PEOPLE OF BURMA.

The Congress tenders its respectful sympathy to the people of Barma in their-troubles and trusts that they will not be awed or cowed down by the repression now going on in their midst.

The Congress notes with regret the tendency among certain Indian settlers in Burms to claim communal representation and strongly advises them not to make any such claim as such separatist tendency is bad in principle.

The Congress deplores the Hindu-Moslem tension and the riots that have taken place in various parts of India. The Congress deplores the riots that recently took place in Kohat, resalting in loss of life and destruction of property including temples and is of "opinion that the local authority failed to perform the primary duty of protection of life and property. The Congress further deplores the enforced exodus of the Hindu popalation from Kohat and strongly urges the Massalmans of Kohat to assure their Hindu brethren of fult protection of their lives and
property and to invite them to return as their honoured friends and neighbours. The Congress advises the refugees not to return to Kohat exeept upon an honourable invitation from the Kohat Mussalmans and apon the advice of Hindu and Mussalman leaders. The Congress advises the public, whether Hindus or Mussalicans, not to accept the finding of the Government of India, as also of others, in the Kohat tragedy and to suspend judgment till the Board appointed by the Unity Conference or some other eqully representative body has inguired into the unfortanate event and come to a decision upon it.

The Congress expresses its heart-felt sympathy for the sufferers in the Gulbarga riots and condemns the desecretion committed on the places of worship in that town.

The Congress notes with satisfaction the progress made in Hindu opinion regarding the removal of untouchability but is of opinion that much yet remains to be done and therefore appeals to the Hindu members of all Congress organisations to make a greater effort in the canse. The Congress hereby urges the Hindu members of Provincial Congress Committees to devote greater attention to the amelioration of the lot of the depressed classes by ascertaining their wants such as wells, places of worship, facilities for Education ete, and making provisions for meeting such wants. The Congress congratulates the Satyagrahis of Vaikom, who are engaged in asserting the right of way of untonchables through a thorough-fare which is open to caste Hindus, on their non-violence, patience, courage, and endurance and hopes that the State of Travancore which is regarded as enlightened will recognaise the justice of the Satya grahis' claim and grant speedy relief.

## VIII. INDIANS OVERSEAS.

The Congress notes with deep sorrow the increasing disabilities of the settlers overseas and records its opinion that the Indian and Imperial Governments have failed to protect the interest of the settlers which they have repestedly declared to be their trust. The Congress whilst tendering its sympathy to the settlers in their troables regret its inability to render effective assistance till Swaraj has been attained.

The Congress notes with profound dissatisfaction the sanction given by the Governer General of the Union of South Africa to the Ordinance of the Natal Provincial Legislature depriving the Indians domiciled there of the mancipal franchise which they have long enjojed with impunity,

The Congress regards the question of the deprivation of franchise at not only manifestly unjust but also as a breach of the agreement of 1914 between the Union Government and the Indian community and the past declarations of the Natal Government.

The Congress is of opinion that the so-called settlement of the Kenya question is nothing short of the deprivation of the natural and just rights of the Indian settlers in Kenya.

The Congress congratulates the Akalis on the patient endarance and courage with which they are carrying on their struggle for Guradwara reform and hopes that these qualities of theirs will withstand and survive the insidions attempts now being made by the $\mathrm{P}^{\prime}$ ajab Government to crush the spirit of the brape Akalis.

The Congress views with horror and indignation the report of over one hundred deaths among the Akali prisoners in Nabha jail and expresses the strongest disapproval of the refusal of the Nabha authorities to pormit the "Akali Repression Enquiry Committee, appointed by the Congress Working Committee, to visit the jail. The Congress is of opinion that the phenomenal mortality among prisoners is proof of the inhuman conduct of the authorities towards the prisoners.

## X. NATIONAL EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTLONS.

The Congress is strongly of opinion that the hope of the fature of the coantry lies in its youth and therefore trusts that the Provincial Committees will strive more vigorously than they have done to keep alive all national educational institutions. But whilst the Congress is of opinion that existing national educational institutions should be maintsined and new ones opened, the Congress does not regard any such institution to be national which does not employ some Indian language as the medium of instruction, and which does not actively encourage Hindu-Moslem nnity, education among untouchables and removal of: untouchability, which does not make hand-spinning, oarding, and training in physical culture and self-defence obligatory, and in which teachers and students over the age of 12 years do not spin for at least half an hour per working day and in which students and teachers do not habitually wear Khaddar.

## XI. PAID NATIONAL SERVICE.

Whereas it has been discovered that many otherwise deserving men are anobtainable for national service because of their reluctance to accept remuneration for service, the Congress places on record its opinion that there is not only nothing derogatory to one's dignity in accepting re*: muneration for national service, but the Congress hopes that patriotic young men and women will regard it as an honour to accept mainteuance for service faithfuliy rendered and that those needing or willing to do service will prefer national to any other service.

# INDIAN NATIONAL CONGRESS THE 39TH SESSION 

HELD AT<br>BELGAUM

ON
26世6 \&o 27th Deeem6er 1924.

## OPENING DAY.

TIHE thirty-ninth gession of the İndian National Congress assembled in Belgaum at 3 p. y. on Friday the 26th December1924, under the most auspicious circumstances and amidst scenes of great. enthasiasm in the spacious and magnificent Congress pavilion made in 1923 for the Cocanada session of the Congress. It was a momentous; eventfal, and unique session. It was thoroughly businesslike and the shortest on record inspite of a difficalt programme to be gone through., Ever since Mahatma Gandhiji's release all eyes of the country had turned to him for his Ieadership and for the establishment of unity in and outside the Congress. Having studied the situation, he began to prepare the ground for anity and cement the foundation laid by the Cocanada Congress for unity. By his rare skill and tact, by his great personality and persuasiveness and his heart-to-heart tallss, while allowing fearless open disccussion in private conferènces and Committee meetings, he had facilitated matters for the open session. Thas the session achieved signal success in bringing bogether the No-changers and the 'Swarajists and in remoring matual suspicions and antagonisms. Besides, this session has given scope for the return of the Liberals and other seceders into the Congress so far as it is "humanly possible ": The substitution of the spinning franchise for the money franchise is un-precedented and unique in the political history of the world, All agreed to work it out for the attainment of the goal.

The Congress pavilion was splendidly decorated with wreaths of greens, flıgs and festoons inspiring nationalism, and with Sanskrit, Kiッnada and English mottoes inspiring freedom and liberty. The seating scoommodation was almost similar to that made in the previons session of the Congress and all in the usaal national style. In the western segment of the pavilion was a long raised platform, in the middle of which was arranged a nice Mandap well beantified with Khaddar and floral wrasths. At the back of the President's cashion in the centre was prominently seen the life-size portrait of Lokamanya Tilak, on either side of which life-size portraits of Mahatma Gandhi in his loin-cloth were pat up. The pictures of Vidyaranys and his disciples along with those of the deities of Shiva, Vishnu and Lakshmi, symbolic of destruction, construcfion and evolation of force, adowned the front of the Mandap. Below them was hung a picture of the Karnatak Coat-of Arms with Nandi in the centre and two elephants with their truaks raised on either side and "Karnatak ki jai" was inscribed in Kannada in it. Among other portraits were those of the Maharaja of Mysore and many leaders, past.and present. The portrait of Sir P. C. Ray busy with his Charkha' was entertsining. On the right of the Mandap ladies were seated; and also a big choir of men in 'Khaki and ";women in dark "Kaladggi' Saris. On either side of it were seated distinguished 'visitors, members of the A. I. C. C. and members of the Reception Committee. The delegates were seated on the floor in the various avenues which projected to the central palpit circle. 'Ihe visitors occupied the gallery all round.

Long over three hours before the time fixed for the "commencement of the session, people began to pour in",at the majestic,"Gopura," "towering; over a height of 70 feet, which was built in the Hampi style reminding the Teraple of Freedom. Until 2 p. м. when the gates of the Gopura were thrown open, the rush was toc hesvy and the volunteers"and the Congress Officers very remarkably commanded them. By p-30 p. m. the whole pavilion was folly ? nccapied by the delegates, members of the Reception Committee and visitors.

Just a few minutes before $3^{\text {p. . y. the President's imposing proces- }}$ sion passed throngh the Gopara amidst thundering cheerings of the immense crowds standing by. Then it marched by the side of the merry fountain playing on the flowers and the greens designed in the words,


Jai". The cheerings of the peosple oatside were a signal to the delegates and visitors inside to be on their alert to give a fitting welcome to the President. Hardly had the processinn ranched the inviting deities and the Dwarpalakas put at the main entrance of the parilion and hardly had the Swaraj flag been seen passing in, when the vast assembly sprang to their feet and accorded a prolonged and enthusiastic ovation with a tremendous outburst of rejoicing cheerings of "Mahatma Gandhi Ki Jai", " Vande Mataram", "Alla-ho-akabar", and so on. Uuder the able lead of.Dr. Hardikar, Commander of the Volunteer CJrps, the proceasion slowly moved on in twos 'towards the iMandap, to the strains of masic. Among the leaders in the prosession, who were all moving two by two except the President who was alone by himself in his loin-cloth, there were Deshbandhn C. R. Dae Dr. Saif-ud-din Kitchlew, Sjt. Gangadhar rao Deshpande; Pandit Miziwa Mokad Malviya, Lala Lajpat Rai, Manlana Mohammad Ali, Srimati Sarojani Devi, Maulana Shaukat Ali, Manlana Abal Kalam Azad, Pandit Motilal Nebru, Sjt. C. Rajagopalaohariar, Sjet. Vithalbhai Patel, Sjt. T. Prakasham, Babu'Rajendra Prasad Sjit. K. Venkatappayya Pantula, Seth Jamnalal Bajaj, Dr. Moonje, Sjt. A. Rangasmami Aigangar, nud Pandit Javaharlal Nehru. Among others Who also tonk their seats on the dais were Babra, Shiva Prasad Gupta, Sjt. N. C. Kelkar, Maulana Hasrat Mohani, Sji. P. Siva Rao, Janab Yakoob Hasan, Sjt. S. Satyamurti, Sjt. Parushottamdas Tandon, Pandit Sundarlal Sjt. Shankarlal Banker, Srimam S. Sreenivas』 Aiyangar, Dr. Mahmood, Sjt. Jamnadas Mehta, Dr. U. Rams Rao, Sjt. S. V. Kanjalgi, Sjit. C. R. Reddi, Janab Assaf Ali, Mris. Mohammad Ali and Miss Mohammad Ali (Gulnar); Swarai Shradahanandji, Sirdar Mangal Singh and Sriman C. V. Venkat Raman Iyengar.

The President, Mahatma Mohandas Karamohand Gandhi, was re coived on the dais by the Chairman of ths Reception Committee and was profusely garlanded. Other leaders were also garlanded. On the right of the President, Lala Lajpat Rai and Shrimati Sarojani Devi, on the left Pandit Malviga and Deshbandha Das, and in front Maulana Mohammad Ali and Maulana Shaukat Ali took their seats.

Punctually at 3 P. M. the proceedings of the Congress commenced with the singing of the national anthem "Sajalam, suphalam, malaysja sheetalam......" by a big choir of volunteers, while all were standing. Then followed the following two welcome'gongs in Kanarese by the same choir :-

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Shriyut GANGADHAR RAO BALKRISHNA DESHPANDE, the Chairman of the Receiption Committee, then welcomed the delegates in a short speech in Kanarese.

The following is his printed address in English, which was taken as read :-

## Sister and Biother Delegates, Ladies \& Gentiemen,

Wbile I regard it as the crowning moment of my life to have the privilege. of offering to you on behalf of this newly awakened Province of Karnatak, a cordial welcome to this small agricultural town of Belgaum, I cannot at the same time, adequitely express to you the feelings that are surging within me on this great occasion, teelings of diffidence at the magnitude of the responsibilities thrown on us by your kindness and courtesy in accepting our invitation. I cannot but be consoious of the fact bat our utter lack of experiense, extremely inadequate resources, and the difficuities we have had to face o: account of the absence of all facilities which large cities offer, have rendered the preparations we have made for your reception imperfect in every way, aid that we have been unsble to arrange for all those comforts, with which you could be provided in other cities. I must frankly admit, it was more our love and enthusiasm for the Congress eause and a desire to realise our existence as a distinct provincial unit than our reaources or capacity that emboldened us at Cocoanada to invite you this year. I have therefore to erave with all humility for your indulgence nt our numerous short-comings.

It is for the first time in the history of the Congress that as amall town lite ours with a population hardly exceeding 36,000 souls most of whom are simple peasante, has ventured to hold its Sessions. If by the grace of Providence, this aession is crowned with a measure of success, I am sure other such small rural places, will, in future, be emboldened to invite the Congress and thus serve to demonstrate the-proot of the movement keing an expression not merely of the wealth and intelligentia bat of the mind of the whole nation.

On this occasion, when for the first time Karnatak as a province is ooming before the whole of India, however intensely I may desire to acquaint you with its great and glorious past, the pressare of time compels me io rest content with only a brief reference to it in very general terms. Long have we sufferd from the multiple partition of fair Karnatak. Some ohroniclers may try to find justifiostion for this dismemberment but none ean deny that it was without the consent and against the interests of the people themselves.

The Kannadigas are a unit by themselves, speaking the same language and fostering a common tradition, heritage and oulture. They had a distínct entity in the ancient Indian polity. Even in the modern historical times; Karnatak has exhibited the riahness of its oulture and power, when it was one and undivided, uader the mighty and glorious and never-to-be forgotten Empire of Vijayanagar. That was the bey day of our civiliaation. Poets and philosophers, administratore and religious reformers, architsocts and ongineers, vied with each other to prove the feoundity of Karuatak, Our philosophical speoulation has powerthlly influenced the North, through the then national language Sanskrit. I may just observe bere in passing, that we have come to recognise that to-day, if we want to influence the North, it can only be through Hindi, i, e. Hindu. atani the national langaage of to-day.

Karnatak has had, with the rest of India, to pass through a period, briof bat very diesstrous period of the dwindling of the fire of life, a period of ills. started disintergratiou, marked politically by the anarchy which gave European. adventure its chance; and inwardily by an inoreasing torpor of the creative spirit in religion and art, science and philosophy. And these evils have been inoalculably aggravated by the multiple partition to which the province has come to be subjected. But the particion was not our ouly woo. Multiplioity of religions, castes, oreeds, sects and parsaazions, that ought to bave lent richnese and variety, as in former times, to orr outlook and achievements, bas only served almost to dismomber the provinea internally. The inherent capacity for growth was there, but the necessary organisation for its development yras denied to us. Along with the aign of in ganeral ievival in the rest of India, this province too can boast of some engineering skill, legal acuman, and administrative ability; while the patient tiller of the sonl is atill the pride of tho land, alike for
his industry and oulture, high idealism combined with an eye for prastioal rosaits, and a atrong regard for discoiplipe and oombined action sea still the charabteristics of this province ; and thank. God, with the reoonstraction of our Pro-

Paning dday. yinee by the Congress, hope has sprung up out of the depths of dispair and a bright fauure seems to be assured to us. Not only has the Congress united usi Chairman's grographicalls, but the spirit of independenoe and ad appreciation of non-vio. ©. Addrus. lence are fast cemeating varions faiths and parties in the Karnatak. The Jain and the Lingayat, the Brahman and the Non-Brabman, the Hindu and the Musalman are now learning to understand each other. We are becoming more and more alive to the duties and responsibilies of brotherbood and we are gra. dually uniting under the banner of Swaraj.

The guestion of Brahman and Non-Brahman estrangement had grown so very delicate that we dared not even refere to it without fear of misunderatanding. But thank Providance, we have passed that atage and ander the magio influenee of Mahabmaji we have come to understand to an apprecisble degree each other's view-points. I am frmly of opinion that the solation of the problem lies to a great extent, in the hands of the Brabmans. The very Brabmanical ifleal demands of thera the utmost sacrifice. Mahatmaji has set as a noble oxample of how far we sball surrender for.the sake of love and uaity. Having onoe recognised that, it is impossible for this bapless nation to live and breathe *pely without Swaraj. No sacrifice should be too great for us for securing the unity so essential for Swaraj.

To my mind, whatever be our formulas for Gighting bureaueracy, our programme for securing the strength and unity of India is common to us all." The triple construotive programme laid down by Gandaiji is sufficient to engage all the anprgy of even the best of us,

In our Province but for stray incidents Hindu-Moselm problem bas no place. The relalions of the two communities have been as a rule, very cordial.

The sense of untauchability is:unfortunstely still lingering bere, bat it is taet dying out under the infuence of healtbier ideas. The erstwhile untouchables in our Province freely mix with other Bindoos in publio meetings, pubiio bodies and national sohools. Yet I must admit, muoh remains to be done in the matter of their eduoation and sjoial amelioration,

Although we cannot claim to have done much in the organisation and use of Khadar from the point of view of the goal we have to reach, Karnatak can well take pride in being one of the foremost provinces in the production of Khaddar. Our monthly output of Khadi is more than $44,600 \mathrm{lbs}$. It is estimated that $2,24,000$ wheels are regularly plying to keep the movement agoing. About 600 persons have undertaken to pay the Swaraj.tuw of 2,000 yards per month and had it not been for the Congress preparations, the number would have
gone much highor. Any-way a large part of the public has come to realise that the Khaddar movement is a positive boon to the toiling masses, and in this lies the best guarantee and insurance of the Khadi mopment. A goodly number of earnest workere bave also realised that Khadi work is the best anifying factor
Chairana's between the classes and the masses and I can well say that the coarse handepun
aditres. stuff of our national flag is more representative of our national unity than the oolours in whioh it is painted.

The aniortuagte differences in the Congress fold have thrown the whole country into dismay and confusion. But it oannot, ought not, to go on for longe Our forces are disunited and to some extent shattered, but certainly they are not destroyed. If we do not go mad and syatematically destroy everything that we achieved during these recent years, I am sure our solid work will survive all disappointments and misgivings. We have simply to pull together the loosened atrings to make a nuited India onoe again. Our difficulties ars not oxternal, they are of the heartr Not negotiations therefore, but purification of the hesret is what is needed:

The task is not easy, I admit, but neither is it impossible. The stroog tamily-tie for whioh and by which India has always stood will stand us in good atead and the spirit of brotherhood, let us hope, will overcome the spirit of hatred or miatrust. The unmitigated tyranny of rulers too, is a greait unifying tactor.

When I think of the oircumatances created by the Bengal Government by Ita recent issue of a monstrous Ordinance, I am tempted to regard it as a blessing In disguise. Bengal has onee again heroically stood sgainst the oppression of an anserapulons burearoxeey in a way that has commanded the admiration of all, and ber gufferiagg have not been endured in vain since they have belped tc draw oloser all parts of the country in sympathy.

Eriends, our country is passing through a criticai stage. Mighty potentiar litien for good and for evil are before us, Our opportanities are unique bat our: pitfalla are also deep, numorous and deceptive. To-day with us, it is the best of time, it is the worst of time; it is the age of wiadom, it is the age of folly; it is the apooh of boliaf ; it is the epooh of soeptiolsm.

I do not propose to give my opinion on the greas politiosl problems of the day that are olamouring for solution at your hands. I bave ever held that it is not the bcientific precision of a programme but the will behind it that really counte. I want our masses to rise to the consciourness of the potentiality and thus develop a will to Swaraj. Whatever programme secures this, has my suprort. I heve worked in that spirit under the flag of the Lokmanye and ame now trying to do the same under Mahatmaji who has been holding aloft that Aas tinoe. I ona only say that withoad unity among oursolpes and a leader
comuruading the confidence and affeotion of all masegs as well as classes, our further progress is impossible. Fortunately for us, we have amongst us to-day Mabatmaji who visibly embodies in himself such unity and such leadership, and with him at the helm of our national affairs, I am confident, we shall not only be able to recover our lost ground but soon again be in sight of our oherishedPresidents gool. . In electing him as President, the Reception Committee have, I am sure, Opening only fafifiled the demand of the time. It is with feelings, whioh I find laok of words to describe, that I request Mahatmaji to take the ohair.

The President, MAHATMA GHANDI, walked down from the Dias to the rostrum in loin-cloth and with Khaddar in his hand amidst enthusiastic cheers. He hung up his bag on the rostrum, sat on a sufficiently high stool and kept his watch open in front of him. He "was then presented by the Chairman of the Receiption Committee a copy of the KARNATAK A HAND-BOOK enclosed in a sandal wood box, saying "for your information, Sir". The President received the present amidst cheeers with a living smile. He then proceeded to address in Hindi. For ten minutes he made a speech in Hindi, which is as follows:-

मैं आपको सिर्क इतना कहना चाहता दू कि आज हमारे सामने ऐसा मौकां भंग गया है कि हुम जे श२२०-२? में करना चाहते थे वह न करसके ऐेकिन उसके

श्रीयुत दास महोदय के भाषण्र के अनन्तर मौलाना मुहम्मद्द अलीने दूसरे प्त्ताव पर माषण किया। तर्मश्थात् महालमाजी ने कहा :-' मैलाना हजरत मोहानी, धाप भाइयों ने दों व्याख्यान सुनलिया समर्थन में; अब मैलाना हजजरत मोहानी भाते हैं विरोध करनें के लियेय।

Contiuuing his remarks in English, the Prosident gaid :Friends!

I do not propose to keep you longer than ten minutes. I had given myself no more than hall an hour and I have taken more time than I had intended to in Hindustani. As you have all received copies of my address in the several neoessary languages for our purpose, I do not propose to read any part of that address. It will tax your patience, it will waste your time and my time, and ${ }_{80} \mathrm{I}$ am avoiding to read that address. We want to go through the work that lies before us as quiokly as possible, Desbbandbu Das will presently place before you, the central resolution, If you reject that resolution you should go
your way;and do what you thfnk best for you and for the country and permit
aponing
day. me to do that work which I consider best for me, namely, to spin. I arge son, every one of you, to ponder over what is going to be placed before you.

A revolutionary change is being proposed before the nation, a change, I
Ynidents think, as Lulaji has; said, as revolutionary as the change embarked; apon by the Opening Remurkhation ander his Presidency'in 1920 at the Special Session at Oalcutta. I even admit with him, that the change that I bave proposed and placed betore the nation is possibly thore revolutionary still. And, therefore, I make bold to say that it is calculated to bring you within measurable distance of Swaraj if yon will whole heartedly accept that resolution and give effect to it; for the daye when we could be satisfied with meraly passing resolutions and then forgetting all aboutithem are gone. This resolation is not addressed to the nation in a - pague manner but to everybody who has a will to wark. This resolution is specifically addressed to every man and every woman of understanding who gra, ces this audience, by his or her presence this afternoon. And, though Deshs. bandhu Das and Maulana Mobamed ali will not ask you to pass this resolution, keeeping Good as witness, I ask you to do that. And when you begin to rote apon that;resolution, please remember and understand, you will be passing that resolation with God as witness. It would mean that you are andertaking to do something for the nation, for the poorest of the cquatry, for the attainment of Smaraj; andia you haveno conviotion about it in you, then I would urge you to reject that resolution.

It sbould not matter to you that my penality is behind that resolation, I have said ropeatedly that. I, am not an infallible being. I bave admittad repeatedly that I am a fallible being. I have repeatedly admitted that I have sombimes in my life committed Himalayan blunders. I have made penanes for them, An-infallible being is a perfect person. :He does not need to perform penances. He doss not need to repent, because he is incapable of folly. Ho need not argue. I am juat as good or as bad a mortal as any one of your. And Therdiore, I want you to diamiss my ipersonality from the equation and find the true answer to the equation.

The resolution is a momentous one. I know, there is a large body of opinion against it. There is one body of opinion which says, "It is not proper:to pin our faith entirely on spinning." Another body says that spinning is good bat it is a long drawn out agony. And a third says," Although Khadiar and handspianing are good in themselves, they oan have no place in national franchise," I hold, viewa absolutely contrary to them. And my conviotion is growing upon me day by day, so much so that if I had all time to mysell I would be spinning away every hour and feel that every revolution of the Chartha was bringing Swaraj nearer and nearer to us. Maltiply that cevolu. tion by 300 milliong and you imagine the momentum that is set free for th
attainment of Swaraj. But that momentan you will set free, only if you baved the conviotion, that fires me, in its effiosoy for the attainment of Sivaraj.

There are many things that I have gaid in my address. Srimati Sarojini Deri has asked me to touch upon one thing; and out of regard for her who has readered such splendid service in South Atrica I do so now. That is Eindu Musim unity. Maulana Shaukat Ali says "I am tired ot the whole businees Lat as aimply leave alone Hindu- Maslim riots wherever they happen" There is a good deal of wisdom in that big head: it is not all tat, I tell you, (Lagghter), Repeatedly he has said, "These Massalmans of mine Lave become idiota. They have become demented. Simlarly your Hindus also have become idiotio. We are trying to decide their diputes and in trying to do so we are nallowing Swaraj to slip throagh our hands. So let us leave them alone." .But how oan I do so? Hindu-Muslim unity, like the Charkha, is a madnees with, me: it is passion with me. I can not possibly leave it and forget all aboot it. so also, you see, I dote on that little girl, Gulnar. ". Why does this man dote upon her" you may ask. "With a reason" say I. This girl when she grows will think of :one Gandhi who though a Sanatan Hinda, who would not share meat with her, would not touch beet himself, wed to let others eat it it they liked, allthough be himself woribippodi: the cow. I miggt die by the time that girl reaches the year of maturity. When she grows up ahe will tranamit my message. She is to-day pure and innoceat. She thinks every thing is right. She knows nothing of hatred. She is all love, I find in her love personified. Therefore, I have been treating her as my very feesh and blood in spite of the sea that divids her from me. I am tryirg to unite mysolf with the Musalmans by this means: 'She thinks that her Koran! makes it lawful for her to till the oow, while my religicn enjoins upon me not to kill the cow. 'Who am I under 'the circoumstancoss to prevent her from killing the oow? I would be denying my religion if I did so, Bat I wish to conquer her by presching lore, I will tall her, "The, Koran does not pledge yon," I may to her, "to kill the oow or eat beef: my religion not only does not, permit it, my Koran compels me to worship the coow, You may eliminate the worship of the oow but yor may tolerate $m y$ abstention from beef; you may tolerate $m y$ worship of the cow. Out of friendly regard for me you ana abstain from killing the cow." That is the seoret of my love for the little grirl, Gulnar. That is why I allow myeelf to bo oarried in the pocket of Mano lans. Shaukat Alii. Why do I not think of Malavigaji? Simply beoause my worahip of Malaviyaji, is spontaneous, But I am partial to Musalmang. How.ean L do otherwise? When you are partial to the Muealmans yon will reach the proper coocilasion, proper answer to :this equation. If anybody were to say "Bolve this equation, what the:Hindus mod the Musalmansesthould do," I woold ung, it is the duty of every Hindu to be, partial to the Musalmanas:and of overy 4 I , N. C.

Mugalman to be partial to the Hindus. I find that there is a seer who wants to Opening see God or to meet God in one way and I in another way, and therefore, every-
day. thing that he does I look askance. Then I aay to myself, I must be partial and when I have done that I shall be just. I like to ask the Musalmans to do that-

Remarks. to be partial to the Hindus.

One thing more she (Mrs. Nsida) asks me to say. It is about the Liberals. "Are you going to say anything about the liberals?" I can simply say, I worship the Liberals. I wast the Liberals to come in the Congress just as much as I want the Swarajists to do so. My heart is laid bare to them. We want to sit and spin at the Cbartha. "No "they say, "we don't like to sit at the Charkba and won't spin." I say. "What shall I do ?" If thes say, "We won't go to Charkha," I simply say to them, "enter the Congress and drive me out of it.'

I have finished. With God as witness I want you to say , that whatevor you decide to do you will fulfil it even though you may have to die. (Applause).

At the outset, let me note with respectful feelings the deaths during the year of Bi Amman, Sir Asatosh Mukerji, Mr, Bhupendra Nath Basu; Dr. Sub. ramaniam Iyer and Mr. Dal Babadur Giri at home, and of Messrs. Rustomjoe and P. K. Naidu in South Africa. I tender in your "name my respectul con. dolences to the bereaved families:'

## RETROSPECTIVE

From the September of 1920 the Congress has been principally an institution for devaloping strength Irom within, ' It has ceased to function by means of resolutions addressed to the Government for rearess of grievances. It did so beosuse it cessed to believe in the beneficial character of the existing system of sovernment. The breach of faith with the Musalmans of India was the first rude shook to the people's faith in the Govermmat. "The Rnwlatt Aot and

(Gandhi. conscious or unconscious, and whether voluntary or forced, of the people. With the view, therefore, of mending or ending the system it was decided to try to begin withdrawing voluntary cooperation from the top. At the Special Seesion of the Congress at Calcutta in 1920 the boycott of Government titles, law. courts, educational institutions, legislative bodies, and foreign cloth was resolved upon. All the boycotts were more or less taken up by the parties concerned. Those who could nat or would not, retired from the Congress. I do not prow pose to trace the chequered career of the non cooperation movement Though, not a single boycott was anywhere near completion, every one of them had undoubtedly the effect of diminishing the prestige of the particular institution boycotted.

The most important boycott was the boycott of violence. Whilst it appel arad at one time to be entirely successful, it was soon discovered that the non violence was only skin-deep. It was the passive non-violence of helplessness, not the enlightened nonviolence of resourcefulness. The result was an erup* timon of intolerance against those who did not non-cooperate. This was violence of a subtler type. In spite, 'however, of this grave defect I make bold to say that the propaganda of non-violence checked the outbreak of physios violence which would certainly have broken out, had not non-violent non-cooperation come into being. It is my deliberate conviction that nonviolent non-cooparstron has given to the people a consciousness of their strength. It has brought to the surface the hidden powers in the people of resistance through suffering. It has caused an awakening among the masses which perhaps no other method could have.

Though, therefore, nonviolent pon-cooperation has not brought us Swaraj, though it has brought about certain deplorable results and though the institutions that were sought to be boycotted are still flourishing, in my humble opin. ion, nonviolent noncooperation as a means of attaining political freedom has come to stay and that even its "partial success has brought us nearer Swaraj. There is no mistaking the fact that the capacity for suffering for the sake of a cause must advance it,

## a halt

But we are face to tace with a situation that compels us to cry halt. For whilst individuals hold firmly to their belief in non-cooperation, the majority of those who are immediately concerned, have practically lost faith in it, with the exception of boycott of foreign cloth. Scores of lawyers have resumed practice.

Some even regrea having ever givan it up. Many who had given up Corunello:

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nemantran: have retarnod to them and the number of those who believe in Conncil entry its, Oundai, and colloges have-repented of their aotion and have returned to them. I hear. that Government schools and colleges aan hardly cope with the demand for admiseion. In these oircumstances these boycotts cannot be worked as part-ot the National programme, unless the Congresse is prepared to do without the alagses direafly affeated. But I hold it to be just as impraatioahle to keap these classes out of the Congress as it would be now to keep the non-co-operators out They must both remain in the Congress, without either party interfering-with or hostilily criticieing the other. What is applicable to Hindu-Muslim unily. is, I feel, applioable to the auity among different politicel groups: We mast tolorate each other and trust to time to convert the one or the other to the. opposite beliet. We must go further. We must plead with the Liberale, and others who have seceded to rejoin the Congress. If non-cooperation is suspended, there is no reason why they should teep out. The advance must be from us; Congresamen. We must cordially invite them and make it easy for them to nome in.

You are perhaps now able to see why I entered into the agreement with the Swarajists.

## FOBEIGN CLOTH BOYCOTT

You will observe that one boycott has been retained. Out of regard for the aentiment of an English friend the word ' Boycott' has been changed in the agreement into ' refusal to use foreign cloth.' Thore is no doubt a tad odour about the word 'Boyoott:' It usually implies hatred. So far as I am concerned, I have not intended the word to bear any such meaning. The boycott has referenoe not to British but to foreign oloth. That boyoott is pot marely a right but a duty. It is as much a duty as boycott of foreign waters would be if they were imported to substitute the: waters of the Indian rivers. This, howerer, is a digression.

What I wanted to say was that the agreement saves and emphasises the boycott ol foreiga cloth. For me it is an effective substitute for violent methods. Just as cortain acts such as personal abase, "irritating conduct, lying, causing hurt and marder are"symbols of violence, similarly courtesy, inoffensive conduct, truthfulness etc., ara symbols af non-violence. And so to mo is boycots of foroign oloth a symbol of non-violence. Revolutionary crime is intended to srort preasure. But it is the insane pressure of.anger and ill-will. I contend that non-violent aots oxert pressure lar more effective than violenti aote, for that-presaure comes from good-will and gentieness. Boyoott of foreign eloth exarte sanah pressure. We import the largest aruount of foreign nloth from

Lencashire: It is also by far the largest of all our imports, sugar being rext. Pritsin's chief interest centres round the Lenoeshire trade with - India: It is Adsmesesof the I the one thing more than noy other that bas ruined the Indian peasant and imposed partial idleness upon him by depriving him of the one supplementary occupation he had. Boyeott of foreign oloth is therfore a necessity if he is to live, The plan theriore, is not merely to induce the pessant to refuse to bay the chaap and nice-looking forsign fabric bat also by teachiug him to atilize bis spare hours in carding and spinning cotton sad getting it woven by the village weavers to dress himeall in khaddar so woven and thua to save him the cost of buying foreign and for that matter even Indian mill-made cloth. Thus boyoott of foreign cloth by means of hand-spinning and band-wearing, i. a. khaddar not only saves the pessant's money but it enablesus, workers, to render social service of \& first class order. It brings us into direot touch with the villagers. It enables us to give them real politiacil eduaation and teach them to become self-sustained and sell-reliant. Organisation of khaddar is thus iofinitely better than co-operative societies or any other form of village organisation. It is fraught with the highest politioal consequence, because it res: moves the greatest immoral temptation from Britain's way, I eall the Lanoashire trade immoral, because it was raised and is gustained on the rain of millions of Indis's peasante And as one immorality lesde to another, the many proved immoral sets of Britain are traceable to. this one immoral trafico. If therefore this one great temptation is, removed from. Britain's path by India's voluntary effort, it would be good for India, gooi for Britain, and as Britain is today the predominent world-power, good even for hamanity.

I do not endorse the proposition that supply follows der and. On the cootrary, demand is often artificially created by. unsorupulous vendors. And it a nation is bound, as I hold it is, like individunsla to comply with a code of moral conduct, then it must consider the welliare of those whose wants it seeks to supply. It is wrong and immoral for a nation to supply for instance intoxiosting liquor to those who are addicted to drink, What is true of intoxicants is brae of grain or oloth, if the disoontinuance of their oultivation or mannufactare in the country to which foreign grain or cloth are exported resulte in anforced idieness or penury. These latter hurt a man's soul and body just as mnch as intoxication. Depression is but excitement upside. down and henoe equally. disastrous in its resalts and often more so becanse we bave not yet learat to regard as immoral or sinful the depression of idleness or penury.

## BRITAIN'S DUTY.

It is then I hold the duty of Great Britain to regulate her exports with dua regard to the welfare of India, as it is India's to rogulate ber imports with due regard to her own welfare. That geconomics is untrue whioh ignores or

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diaregards moral values. The extension of the law of non-violence in the do. main of eoonomics means nothing less than the introduction of moral values as a factor to be oonsidered in regolating international commerce. And I must confess that my ambition is nothing lass than to see international relations placed on a moral basis through India's efforts. I do not dispair of cultivation of limited mass non-violence. I refuse to believe that the tendency of human nature is slways downward.

The fruition of the boycott of foreign cloth through hand-spinning and khaddar is caloulated not only to bring about a politioal result of the first magnitude it is calculated also to make the poorest of India, whether men or women, conscious of their strength and make them partakers in the struggle for India's (reedom,

## FOREIGN VERSOS BRITISA.

It is bardly necessary now to demonstrate the futility, not to say the violent nature, of boycott of British cloth or better still British goods as 80 many patriots have suggested. I am considering the boycott purely from the point of view of India's good. All British goods do not barm us. Some goods such as Eaglish books we need for our intellectual or spiritual benefit. As regards oloth, it is not merely British cloth that harms us, but all faregign cloth and for that matter to a lesser extent even mill-made cloth injures us. Boyoots brought about any how of British cloth cannot yield the same results as suoh boyoott brought about by hand-spinning and khaddar. This necessitates oxoluaion at least of all foreign cloth. The exclasion is not intanfigd as a punishment. It is a necessity of national existence.

## OBJECTIONS CONSIDERED

But, say the critics, the spinning wheel has not taken, it is not exciting enough, it is an occupation only for women, it means a return to the midadle ages, it is a vain effort against the majestic march of scientific knowledge for which machinery stands In my hamble opinion India's need is not exeitement but solid work. For the millions solid work itselt is excitement and tonic at the same time. The fact is that we have not given the spinning wheel onough trial ; I am aorry to have to say that many of us have not given it a gerious thought. Even the members of the All.India Congress Committee have failed to oarry out the series of resolutions on hand-spianing which they themselves have passed from time to time. The majority of us have simply not believed in it. In the circumatances, it is bardly just to say that spinning has failed for want of excitement about it. To say that it is merely an old woman's ocoupation is to ignore facts. Spianing mills are a multiplication of spinning wheels. They are managed by men. It is time that we got out of this superstition that some ocoupations are beneath the dignity of men. Under normal
oonditions no doubt spinning will be the occupation of the gentie sex. But the State of the future will always have to keep some men at the spinning wheel so as to make improvments in it within the limitations which as a cottage industry it must have. I must inform you that the progress, the meehanism of the Wheel has made, would have been imossible, if some of us men bad not worked at it and had not thought about it day and night.

## MACHINERY

I wish, toc, you would dismiss from your minds the views attributed to me about machinery. In the first ingtance, I am no more trying to present for national acceptence all my views on machinery, than $I$ am presenting the whole of my beliet in non-violence. The spinning wheel is itselt an exquisite piece of machinery. My head daily bows in reverence to its unknown inventor, What I do resent is the wanton and wicked destruction of the one cottage industry of India that kept the wolf from the doors of thousands of homes ecat. tered over a surface 1900 miles long, 1500 miles broad.

## SPINNING FRANCHISE

You will not now wonder at my passion for the spinning wheel, nor will you wonder why I have ventured to present it for introduction in the franohise, and why Pandit Motilal Nehru and Desbbandhu Das have accepted it on behalf of the Swaraj Party. If I had my way, there would be no one on the Congress register who is unwilling to spin or who would not wear khaddar on all ocea. sions. I am bowever thankful for what the Swaraj Party has accepted. The modification is a conoession to weakness or want of faith, But it must serve as a spur to greater effort on the part of those who have full faith in the wheel and khaddar.

## NO OTRER MESSAGE

I havesthus dilated upon the spinning wheel beanase I have no better or other message for the nation. I know no other effective method for the attainment of Suwraj if it is to be by ' peaceful and legitimate means'. As I have already remarked it is the only substitute for violence that can be accepted by the whole nation. I swear by Civil Disobedience. But Civil Disobedience for the attainment of Swaraj is an impossibility unless and until we have attained the power ot achieving boycott of foreign oloth. You will now easily per ceive why I should be a useless guide for the Congress if my viewa about the apinning wheel are not acceptable to you. Indeed you would be justified in regarding me, as some friends do, as a hindrance to nationsl progress, if you
bonsider me to be mrong in my arpooition of the dootrine ondorlying the wid
trusidatial
midreas of the Mahastma fredsi mall be wanting in your duty in not rejecting my lead. Lat it no longer m said, as Lord Willingdon very properly onco said of ns, that we had not the atrength and courage to sas ' No'. Indeed your rejection of my propoial, il you do not believe in it, will be a step towards Swaraj.

Hindu-Muslim unity is not less impartant than the spinning wheel. It it breath of our life I do not need to ocoupy much of your time on this question becanse the necessity of it is almost universally accepted. I say 'almod' because I know some Hindus and some Musalmans who prefer the presem condition of dependence on Great Britain if they canonot have either wholl Magalman India. Happily their number is small.

I share Maulana Shautat Ali's robrast optimism that the present tensionii a mere tomporary distemper. The Khilatat agitation in whioh Hindas mad common cause with their Masalman brethren and the non-cooperation that followed it, caused an awatening among the hitherto slumbering masses. has glven a conciousness to the classes as well as the masses. Interested per nons who were disappointed during the palmy days of non-cooperation, now the It has lost the charm of novelty, have found their opportunity and are tradim upon the religious bigotry or selfishness of both the communities. The rastit is written in the history of the feuds of the past two years, Religion has has 'travested. Trifles have been dignified by the name of religious tenets which the fanatios daim, must be observad at any cost. Eoonomic and politioal carl ues have been brought into play for the sake of fomenting trouble. The oul minating point was reached in Kohat. The tragody was aggravated by tha callous indiference of the local authority. I must not tarry to examine thy esuses or to distribute the blame: I have not the material for the task oral UI was minded for it. Suffice it to say that the Hindu refugees fled for fest of their lives. There is in Kobat an overwhelming Musalman majority. Thei) bave in so far as is possible under a foreign domination effective political controu It is up to them, therefore, to show that the Eindus are as safe in the midd of theit majority, as they would be if the whole population of Kohat was Hindr The Musalmans of Kohat may not rest satisfied till they have brought bach to Kohat every one of the refugees. I hope that the Eipdus would not tal into the trap laid for them by the Government and woold resolutely dealine to go baok till Lusalmans of Rohat have given them full assuarances as to theit livesand proparty:

The Hindus can live in the midst of an overwhelming Musalman majority only it the latter are willing to receive and treag them as friends and equalan fuat mo Musalmans, itima minority, must depend for honourable existenoe in
the midat of a Hindu majority on the Latter's friendlinese. A Government oail give protection against thieves and robbers, bat not even a Swaraj Government mill be able to proteot people against a wholesale boyoott by one community of noothar. Governments can deal with abnormal situations. When quarrels bsoome a normal thing of life, it is oallid oivil war and parties must fight it out themselves. The Present Government being foreign, in reality a veiled military rule, hass resources at its command for its proteotion against any combination wo oan maka and has, therefore, the power, it it has the will, to deal with our dlass feids. But no Swaraj Goverament with any pretention to being a popuar Government can possibly be organised and maintained on a war footing. A Swarsj Government means a Government established by the free joint will of Hindus, Maslmans and others. Hindas and Musalmans, if they desiro Smaraj, bave perforce to eettle their differences amieably.

The Unity Conferonce at Delhi has paved the way for a settiement of reUgiound differences. The Committee of the All Partiea' Conferonoe is among ofther things expeoted to find a workable and just solution of the politioal diférencees not only between Hindus and Musalmanas bat between ail dasses and all eastes, seots or denominations. Oar' goal mast be remopal, at the ourliest possible moment, of communal or seetional representation. A common eleotorate must impartially eloct its reprosentatives on the sole ground of marit. Our services must be likewise impartially manned by the most qualifed man and women. But till that time comes and coomminal jealousies or protrences become in thing of the pasti; mindorities who saspeet the thotives of majorities mast be allowed their way. The majorities mast eet the oxamplo of sall-aaorifice.

## UNTOCCBABILITY

Untoachabilty is another hindranoo to Swaraj. Its removal is juat as essential for Swaraj as the attainmenti! of Hindr.Muslim anity. This is an pessentially Hindu question and Hindus cannot claim or take Swraj till they have restored the liberty of the suppressed classes. They have sunts with the lattar's supproesion. Historians toll us that the Aryan invaders trested the original inhabitants of Hindustian preclsely as the English insrders treat ua, it not muoh worse. If so, our helotry is a just retribution for our having creatod un untonohable dlasg. The seoner we remove the blot, the better it is for as, Hibdus. But the priests tell na that untouchability is a divine appointmeut. I am oerthin thatithe prieste are wrong. It is a blasphemy to say that God rot apart any portion of humanity as untocichsbler. And Findus who are Con. gresesmen have to see to it that they break down the barrier at the earlisest Dosible moment. The Vaikom satyagrabis are showing us the way. They tre ourrying on their battle with gentlonesu and firmness, They have patioces, BI, Ni. O.

Gandhi, I woonld however warn the Eindu brethren against the tendenoy whi -one sees new-a-days of exploiting the suppressed olasses for a political and. ! rexnove untorohability is apponsnes that caste Hindus owe to Hinduigm and 'themselves. The purification required is not of untouchables but of the: oblled superior castes. There is no vice that is special to the untouchabl not even dirt and insanibation. It is our arrogance which blinds us, 'superio Hindus, to our own blemishes and which magnifies those of our down trodd brathren whom we have suppressed and whom we koep under suppressic - Beligiong llke nationgare being weighed in the balanes. God's grace and rer lation are the monopaly.ot ne race or nation. They descend equally upon 1 who wait apon God. That religion and that nation will bo-blotted out of t * face of the earth whioh pins its faith to injustice, untruth or violence. God 'Light, "nof darkness'. God is Love, not hate." God is Trush, not untruth. G1 slone is' Great. We, His oreatures are but düst. Last us hé humble avid reco nise the place of the lowliest of His creatures, Erishna honoured Sudams his rags ás he honoured no one else. Love is the root of religion or sacrifis and this porishable body is the root 'of self 'or irraligion, says Iulaids Whether we win Swaraj or not, the Hindus have to purify themselves befor they oan hope to revive the Vedie philosophy sud make it a living reality.

## SWARA Scheme

But the spinning wheel, Hindu-Maslim unity and removal of antouchab lity are only means to an end, The end we do not know. For me it is onou: to know the means. Mesns and end are convertible terms in my philosopt of life. But I have long professed my conversion to the view pressed rpon th public by Babu Bhagran Das that the pablie must know the end, not vaguel but preaisely. They must know the full defiaition of Swaraj, i. e. the scham of Swaraj which all India wants and must fight for. Happily the Committio appoiated by the All Parties' Conference is oharged with that mission andlk us hope that the Committee will be able to produce a scheme that will be $\psi$ saptable to all parties. May I sugsess for its consideration the following poins!

1. The qualifioation for the franahise should be neither property noy pois 'tion but manual work, such for axample as suggested for the Congress. Frus ohise. Literary or property test has proved to be eluaive: Manual worls give an opportanity to all who wish, to take part in the government and the well being of the 8tate.
2. The ruinous military expendituare should be curtailed to the proportio necossary for phtection of lite and property in normal timen.
3. Administration of justice ahould be obespened and with that end in. viem the final court of appeal sbould the not in Lrondon but in Delhi. Parties peaderase of the woivil suits mast be compolled in the majority of osseg to refer their diepntes..

Watation
Gandhi, to arbitration, the decisions of these Panobayats to be final esoept in oases of corraption or obvions misapplication of law. Multiplicity of intermediate courts abould be avoided. Case law stoold be abolisbed and the general procedur stiould be simplified. We have slavishly followed the cumbroue and worn out Eaglish procedurs. The tendency in the Colonies is to simplity the procedure so iss to make it èssy for litiganta to plead their own oases.
4. Revenues from intoxicating liquors and drugs shouid be abolisbod.

Before I leave this bighly attractive, becange "speculative, theme let om asure tho Committeo in obarge of the drating of i, S, Swaraj, sobme, that I

## nDDEPENDENCE

The above stetcol presupposes the retention of the British oonneotion on porteotively honourable and absolately equal tarms. Bat I know that thero In a peetion among Congressmen who want ander every concievable cirroum. atance complete independanoe of Britain. They will wot have even an aqual partnership. In my opiniop if the British Government mean what they bay and honestiy help us to equality, it wonld be a greator triumph than a com. plate severanace of the British connoction. I woild therefore atrive for Swaraj within the Empirite bat would not hasitate to serve all oonnection, it severance booame a noesessity throagh Rritadn's own tault. I would thas throw the burden of separation on the British people. The better mind of the world deeirs today not absolutely independent States warring one against another but 1 foderation of friendly inter-dependent states. The consummation of that event may be far off. I want to make no grand olaim for our country. But I nothing grand or impossible about our oxpressing our readiness for universal interdependenoe rather that independense. It should rest with Britsin to ans that she will have no raal olliance with India. I desire the ability to be to: tally independert without aeserting the independence, Any nebeme that I would trame, while Britain deelares her goal about India to be sompiete equarlity within?the Empire, would be that of alliaioe and not of 'independenes witboat allianoe. Lịे would arge every Congressman not to be insistont on independence in each and every case, not because there is anything imposibile about it, bat beoause it is wholly unnecessary tull it has become perifetly manitest that that Britain really menne sabjagation in apite of her iecolaration to the oontrary.

## TRE SWARAd PARTY

So tar, then, I have considered the contents of the agreement and the general questions arising from it, Not muach need be said about the status of oquality given to the Swaraj Party. I wish I could have avoided it, not beo osanee the Party is not worthy, bat beeanga I do not share its views about Connsil-antry. Bat il I mast remain in,the Congress, oven lead it, I mast reDogaise the facts as they are. It was ease enough for me to go out of the Congress or to decline the honour of presiding. Bat it was not, so I thought snd atill think, in the interest of the counatry for me to take that step. The Swasaj Party represeata il sot a majority; at least a atrong and growing minority in the Congress. III was not to divide the Congreas on the iasqe of ita status, I was
bound to agree to its conditions, so long as they were not in coonfiot with my consecience. They are not in my opinion, unreasonable. The Swarajiats want to nse the name of the Congress for their policy. A formula had to be found for their doing so withoat their pledging or binding the ohangers to their polios. One of the ways of doing it was to give it the authority and the responsibility finmoial and exeentive with regard to the framing and the prosection of their poliog. The Congress as a whole coold not guide that polioy withont gharing the responsibility. And as I could not take the responsibility, and as I apprehend no No-changers can. I could not be party to shaping the polioy nor could I shape it without my heart in it, and the heart oan only go where the befliet is, I know that the sole authority to the Swaraj Parity to nee the name of Congress in regard to the Council programme makes somenthat awsward the posi. Hion of the other parties wishing to join the Congress. But I fear it is inevitable. The Swaraj Party oan not be expected to surrender the adrantage it possesses. After all, it wants the advantage not for itsell but for the servico of the coanirry. All parties have or oan have that ambition or no other. I hope therefore that the others will join the Oongrees and work within to affect the course of country's poliey - Dr. Besant has led the way in that direction. I know that she would have many things done otherwise, bat she is oontant to come hoping to bring round the electorate to her view by working within the Oongress. The Noshangers oan, in my humble opinion, vote tor the agreemen; with a olear conscienoe. The only national programme jointly to be worked by all the parties is shaddar, Hiadu-Muslim unity and, for the Eindus, removal of untoubility. Is: not this altor all what I want ?

## PURELY SOCIAL REFORM?

It has been suggested thast this programme tarns the Congreas into a pureIs social relorm organisation, I beg to differ from that view. Everything that is absolately essential for Swaraj is more than merely social worls and must be tateon ap by the Congress. It is not suggeetcod that the "Congress should oonfine its activity for all time to this work only. Bat it is saggested that the Congress should for the coming year concentrate the whole of itte energy on the work of construotion, or as I have otherwise desoribed it the work of internal growth,

Nor does the agreement axhaust the list of conatractive items that the Congress must handie. Those9 I am aboat to mention are of the highest importance, bat they, being non-oontontions and not sboolutelly esseatial for Swaraj as the foregoing three items, find no mention in the agreement.

## NATIONAL SCHOOLS.

One such is the maintenance of national ednoational linstitations. Pro$8^{\text {ably }}$ the pablic do not know that next to khaddar the ruaning of national
eduoational institations bas been the mast successful: These can not be gives

Presideritial Addren of the Bhhatma up so long as even a fer pupils are left. It must be a point of bonour with the respestive provinces to keep up their colleges and schools. Suspension of non-cooperation should not have any injarious effect on these institutions. On the contrary, greater effort than ever before should be made to maintain and atrengthen them. Most provinces have their national sohools and colleges. Gujarat slone bas a rational university, maintained at an annual cost of Rs. $1,00,000$, and baving control of 3 Colleges and 70 Schools with 9,000 pupile. It bas acquired its own ground at Abmedabad and bas already spent Rs. 2,05,323, in baildings. Throughout the country, finest and sileut work bas been done by the non-cooperating students. Theirs is a great and noble sacrifice. From a worldly standpoint they beve perhaps lost the prospectif of brilliant cereers. I nuggest to them however that from the national standpoint they have gained more than they have lost. They leit their schools or colleges, because it was through them that the youth of the nation were in. sulted and bumiliated in the Punjab. The first link in the ehsin of our bondage is forged in these institutions. The corresponding national institutions however ineffigiently managed they may be, are the factories where the first instruments of our freedom are forged. Atter all; the hope of the fature centres round the boys and giris studying in these national institutions. I therefore regard the apkeep of these instizations as a frat charge on provincial lunds. But these institutions to be truly national mast be olabs for promoting real Hindu Muslim unity, they mast be also nurseries for training Hindu boys and girls to regard untoriohability as a blot upon Hinduism and a orima against bumanity. They should be training schools for experts spinners and weapers. If the Congress retaing its belief in the potency of the spinning wheel and drbaddar, one has a right to expect these institutions to supply the soience of the spinning wheel. They should be also faotories for khaddar produotion. This is not to say that the boys and the girls are not to bave any literary training. But I do maintain that the training of the hand and the beart must go hand-in-hand with that of the head. The quality and the usefulness of a national sohool or college will be measured not by the brilliance of the literary attainments of its scholars but by the strength of the national chereoter ${ }_{4}$, and deftness in banding the carding bow, the spinning wheel and the loom. Whilst I mom most anxious that no national school or college should be closed, I should not have the slightest hesitation in closing down a school or college, that is indifferent to the admission of non. Hindu boys or that shuts its door against the entry of untouchables or that has rot carding and spinning as an indiapensable part of the training. Time is past when we can be sativfied with the rord ' rational' on the sign-board of the school and the knowledge that it is not affilisted to any Government Universiiv or is not otherwise controlled an by the Government, I mast also not omit to point ont that the tendeney in was
many national institutions still is to neglect the Vernaculars 'and Aindustaui. Prusidental Many teachers have not realised the necessity of impartiog : ostruction throughadrases of the the vernnculars or Hivdustani. I rejoice to observe that Sjt. Gangadhai Rao has arranged a meeting of national edncationists to exchange experiences 'on the sevvral points mentioned by me and to evolve, 'if possible, a general plan of eduastion and action.

## UNEMPLOYED NON-CO.OPERATORS

This is perhaps the proper place to mention those lawyers who have given up practice, and school masters and other government employees who have given up Government service at the eall of the nation. I know that there are many such men who find it hard to make the two ends meet. They deeerve national eupport, The Kbadi Board and-the national schools and colleges are the two services that oan take in almost an unlimited number of honest- and ( induetrious men who are willing to learn and labour and are satisfed with a modest allowance. I observe a tendency not to accept asy remuneration for national service. The desire to serve without remuneration is praiseworthy, bat all can not satisfy it. Every labourer is worthy of his hire. No country oan produce thousands of unpaid wholetime workers. We muat therefore develope an atmosphere in which a patriot would consider it an honour to serve the country and accept an allowance for such service,

## INTOXICANTS

Another item of national importanee is the liquor and the opium traffic. Had the wave of enthasiasm that swept across the country in 1921 in the cause of temperance remained non violent, we would today have witnessed a progressive improvement. But unfortanately our pioketting degenerated into violence, yeiled when it was not open., Picketting had, therefore, to be abandoned and the liquor-shops and opiam-dens began to flourish as 'beore But you will be pleased to biear that the temperanee work has not died ont altogether. Many workers are still continuing their quiet and self-less service in the cause of temperance. We must, however, realise that we would not be able ts eradicate the evil till we have Swarsj. It is no matter of pride to us that our ohildren are being educated ont of the revenus derived from this im. moral source. "I would almost forgive the 'Council-entry by Conaressmen it they would boldy sweep out this revenue even though education may have to be starved Nothing of the kind should happen if they will insist on a corres. ponding reduction in the military expenditure.

## BENGAL REPEESSION

You will observe that in the foregoing paragraphs I have conflned myself to the interal developments.

But the axtornal circumstanoes, and among them ebiefly the acts of our hruidertind reviers, are affooting our deatiny no last ouroly (though it may be adversely)
Mahatana than the internal developement. We may turn them to sdvantage if we will or we may surumb to thena to our disadvantage. The latest act of ruiers is the reoression commenced in Bengal. The All Parties' Conferanoe oondem. ned it in no uneertain terms. The Conference had hesitation in enying that the Blow was aimed st the Bengal Swaraj party. But I thave none, I have been to Caloutte and had the opportunity of meeting men representing a varioty of opinion and I osme to the conclusion that the blow was aimed at the 8 保. raj Party. The opinion is confirmed by the speeches since delivered by Lordi Lytton and Reading. The defence they have offered is wholly anoonvincing. Suoh a defence is possible only in a place like India where publio opinion counta for little or nothing. Lord Lytton's conditions of release are an insuli to our intelligence. Their Excellencies beg the question when they toll as that the aitamtion warranted the Ordinsnoe and the action under the Regulation of 1818. The national contention is

1. That the situation they deseribe has not been proved to exist ;
2. That assaming that the situation does exist ; the remedy is worse than the disease;
3. That the ordinary law containg enough powers for dealing with the siltuation; and lastly
4. That even it extraordinary powera were necessary they should have been taken from the legislatare which is of their own oreation.

The speeches of their Exoellencies evade these issues altogether. The nation which has had considerable experience of unsupported atatements of the Goverament will not accept them as gospel brath. Their Excellencies know that we cannot and will not believe their statements not becense they are willully uatrutbful, bat beesuse the sources of their information have often been disoovered to be tainted. Their assurances are therefore moctery of the poople. The speeches are almost a challenge to us to do our worst. But we must not bo irrifated or be lmpatient. Repression, if it does not cow us down, if it does not deter us from our parpose, can bat hasten the adveat of Swaraj ; for it pats ng on our mettle and evokes the spirit of salf-sacrifice and courage in tha fece of danger, Bepression does for a true man or a nation what fire does for gold. In 1921 we answered xepression with Civil Disobodience and invited the Government to do its worst. But to day we are obliged to oat the humble pic. We are not rendy for Civil Disobedianoe. We asn bub prepare for $\mathrm{ib}_{6}$ Preparation for civil disobedience means discipline, sell-reotraints, a non-violont but reeisting spirit, cohesion and above all sorapulous and willing obedienoe to the know laws of God and suc̣ laws of man an are in
furtberance of God's laws. But unfortunately we have nethor disoipline nor gell-resitraint enough for our purpose, we are either violent or our non-violenoesdidrese if ithe is unresisting, we have not enough coohesion and the laws that we obey, whether of God or man, we obey compalsorily. As between Hindss and Musal nans we witness a daily defiant breach of laws both of God and man. This is a , tmosphere for Civil Disobedienoe-the one matechlees and iuvincible mespon at the disposal of the oppressed. The alfernative is undoubtedly violence. We seem to have the atmosphere for it, Eindu.Mustim fights are our training for it. And those who believe that India's deliveranoe lies through violence are ontitled bo gloat over the free fights that tske place betreen us. But I say to those who believe in the eall of violenoe, 'You are retarding Iddia's progress. It you have any pity or friendly fealing for the atarving millions, know that your violence will do them no gervice. Those whom you seed to depose are bettor armed and infinitely better organised than you are. You may not eare lor your own lives, bat you dare not disregard those of your countrymen who have no desire to die a martyr's death. You know that this Goverument believes in Jullianwala Bagh massacres as a legitimato means of sallddetenee. Whatever may be true of othar countries, there is no chanoe of the oult of violence flourishing in this country. India is admiltedly the best repository and exponent of non-violence. Will you not better devobe your lives if you sacrifice them in the cause of non-vialence ?'

I kuow, howerer, that my appeal to the violent revolutionaries will be just as fruitless as any such appeal to the violent and anarchical Gevernment is likely to be.

We must therefore find the remedy and demonstrato to both, the violent Government and the violent revolutionaries that there is a foree that is more offootive than their violence.

## REPRESSION, A SYMPTOM

I regard this repression as a ohronic iymptom of a ohronic disease. The Earopean dominadee and Asiatic subjection is the formala. Sometimes it is aldaded still more oryptically as White vs, Blaok. Kipling misoalled the white man's yoke as the ' white man's burden:' In the Malaya peningula the colour bar that was thought to be temporary has now slmost become a permanent institation. The Mauritius planter must get Indian labour without let or hirdrance. The Kenga Earopeans successfully lord it over Indians who have a prior right to be there. The Union of South Atrioa would today drive outi every Indian if it asiely could, in tota: 's atitard of past obligations. In all these cases the Gover $\cdot$, s.ry of India nuu the Imporial Government are not helipleas ; theiey are ung, uling or not so ingistent as they ought to be on 约e

protection of Indian settlers. The Government of India have not shown even the decency to publlsh the report of its own Commission on Fiji.

The attempt to crush the indomitable spirit of the Akalis is a symptom of the same disease." They bave poured their blood like water for the sake of a cuase they bold as dear as life itself They may have erred. If they have, it is they who have bled in the process. They have burt no one else. Nan. sana Sabeb, Guruka-Bagb and Jsito will bear witness to their courage and and their mute sufferings and martyrdom, But the Governor of the Punjab is reported to have vowed that he will orush the Akalis.

One hears that repression is crushing the Burmese spirit.
Egypt fares no better than we do. A mad Egyptian kills a British officer, certainly a detestable crime The punishment is not only a detestable crime, bat it is an outrage upon humanity. Egypt has nearly lost all it got. A whole nation has been mersilessly punished for the crime of one man. It may be that the murder had the sympathy of the Egyptianns. Would that justify terrorism by a power well able to protect its interests without it?

The repression in Bengal is therefore not an extraordinary thing. We must treat its periodic aruption in some shape or other in some province or other, as our normal condition till we come to our own.

## NEED FOR SANCTION

The Congress, therefore, to be worthy of its trust must devise a sanction to beck its demands. Before we can forge the sanction, we, Hindus, Musalmans. Christians, Sikhs, Parsis eto must anite and so should Swarajists, No-obangers, Liberals, Home-Rulers. Muslim Leaguers and others. If we can but speak with a united voice and know our own mind it would be well If we oan develop the power to keep foreign cloth from our land, it would be better. We are ready then for the sanction.

## MY FAITH

Let me state my faith As a Congressman wishing to keep the Congress intact, I advise supension of non-co-operatiou for $I$ see that the nation is not ready for $i t$. But as an individual, I cannot, will not do so as long as the Government remains what it is. It is not merely a policy with me, it is an artiole of faith. Satyagraha is search for Trath; and God is. Truth. Abimsa or Non-violence is the light that reveals that Truth to me. Swaraj for me is part of that Truth. This Satyagraba did not fail me in South

Jrica, Sheda, or Champarain and in a host of other cases I could mention. Heacoldes all violence or hate. Therefore, I oannot and will not bate Eng-Address of the \%hmen. Nor will I bear their yoke. I must fight unto death the unholy Mahatma Gandi. Atampt to impose British methods and British institutions on India. But I womat the attempt with non-violence. I believe in the capacity of India to ofier non-violent battle to the English ralers. The experiment has not failed. It has succeeded, but not to the extent we had hoped and desired. I do not despair. On the contrary I believe that India will come to her own in the near future, and that only through Satyagraha. The proposed suspension is part-of the experiment. Non-co operation need never be resumed if the programme sketched by me can be fulfilled. Non-violent non-00-operation in some form or other, whether through the Congress or without it, will be resumed if the programme fails. I have repeatedly stated that Satyagraha bever fails and that one perfect Sabyagrahi is enough to vindicate"Truth. Leti us all strive to be perfect Satagrahis. The striving does not require any quality unattainsble by the lowliest among us. For satyagraha is an attribute of the 'spirit within, It is latent in every one of us. Like Swaraj it is our birthrigut. Let ue know it.

## Mabatmaji, Sisters and Brothers of the Indian Nationsl Congress 1

It is a matter of great congratulation to me to be asked by Mahatm 0 . move the second resolution on the agenda. I need not read that resolat but all of you mast now be aware of its contents. It is the resolation by which the two sections, the two parties, of the Indian National Congress are to be united. That is the resolation which contains our ohallenge to the Government-that after all the Indian National Congress knows-that whatavar differenpes of opinion there may remain they know, the Indian National Congreas knows how to stand united in moments of trouble. (Hear, haar. Applanse): It is a madtar of congratulation for me: $I$ feel so happy to-day. For

the last few years this is what I have been thinking and dreaming of day and Opening day night. You know these unfortunste differences of opinion were expressed at the Gays Oongress, Even there I made proposals of unity. Gentlemen, I stand before you today as a man who has vindicated his membership of the Indian National Congress. I, Sir, have never been a rebel. If I have fought against my brothers, it is because I thought it was my duty to turn the direction of the Deshabauibu activities of the Indian National Congress. And, after all these years, the C. R. Das history of the Indian National Congress will bear testimony to this, that whatever I have done, I have done to establish the Indian National Congress on a firmer footing. I did not go out of it to form another organisation: and all my efforts were directed at bringing the Indian National Congress round. Today I congratulate myselt that I have sucoeeded to a certain extent.

After the Gaya resolution, you will remember again a proposal was made at Allahabad in the month of February ; that was accepted to my great satisfaction. Then again another proposal was made at Lahore, and you will find that is reported in the resolutions of the Working Committee dated 17th of April', 1923, very muoh to this effect: namoly, that we must keep this Indian Nationsl Congress; we must agree to sink our differences; we must agree to differ; and yet underlying all those differences there must be the spirit of unity ; the two parties must have the oharity to feel for esch other. We must work as best as we oan. It you think that this -is the ooly way which is right, we think another right. You must allow us to work as !́best as we can. That is the kind of unity which is wanted and which is given by the resolution which I am placing before you.

Atter this attempt of mine before the Working Committee, which failed in April, 1983, you all know that there was a Secial Congress at Delhi which tried to do the same thing. We also succeeded there to a certain extent, but to my disappointment I found greater differences arising thereat. Then again at Cooanada all of us joined. I am not aharging here anybody with "any in. sircority. My friends on the other side who fought me were as sincere in their conviotions as I was, We fought at Delhi and we made up our differonces; again, we fought at Cocanada and made up our differences. Put all the time I kuew that before Mahatmaji came to us again, before his release, no lasting unity could be thoughs of. I waited and waited from day to day till I found the day when Mahatmaji agreed to the settlement that has been arrived at Cocsuada.

My friends, you all know what that settiement is. The main thing which stands behind this settlement is this: that no party can say the other party is outside the Congress: I have as much a right to the Congress as many of my trieuds on the other side. That is the position wioh the resolution recognises. It

That is the resolution before you today. Mahatma Gandhi lovingly co. operated with Love and has drawn a circle by which ho has taken all of us $\mathrm{i}_{\text {nside the }}$ Congress. (Hear, hear Loud cheers).

Today No-changers and Pro-ohangers, they are integral parts of the Congress, To day the Government is not in a position to say, 'you divided against (amongst) yourselves.' Differences of opinion there are, there reust be, as long as human beings have a right to think. But there is suoh a thing as standing from and giving answer to the ohallenge of bureaucracy. That moment is befor ${ }^{\text {b }}$ us. It depends upon us now whether the bureaucracy wins or whether the Indian nation wins. The bureaucracy has given you the challenge: Thay have passed an Ordinanoe, it may be intended to one province to day. Take it from me the Ordinance is an insult against the whole country. (Hear, hear), The whole of India stands attaoked today, What is the answer? What is going to be your answor? Are the No-changers to say that these Pro-changers are irrational beinge and so turn them out of the Congress? Or, are the Pro-obangers to say that these people, the No-changers, are narrow in their vision and so turn them out of Oongress? That is the feast to which bureauoracy wae looking at Belgaum 1 (Laughter), That is the huge fight they were contemplating, a fight between the No-obaners and the Pro changers. Mabatma Gandhi has defeated that little plan. (Cheers) Oar' answer today is, "Do What you may, there is no bureauaraoy in the world which oan stand againsta united nation" What answer to give ! The answer which I want to give is to fight them in all directions; if you pass this resolution I have got that sanotion. I have got the sanction of the Indian National Congress to fight the bureaucraoy in all direotions. Give them no quarter. Take hold of them wharever you find them and uproot their foundations.

What is the idea of Swaraj whioh haunte mo day and night? People tals of Dominion statue, people talk of Independence. I love none of them. I stand by Swaraj. That is my bitthrighth What is aiter all Independence? What is
it? Supposing you drive out the English today, do you get Swaraj? No! Smaraj is a higher ideal than that. Swaraj means indepenàence from sill ob. Openins day stacies to your national building. In the first place, it means independence The comprofrom all obstacles, from all that obstructs your path to realise yourselif. In the mise and the second place, Swaraj means the right of self-realisation, the progressive self. Franclise realisation of the Indian nation. That is the meaning of Swaraj. I don't barDeshabandhu tar that for any phrase which comes from the West. Now, it this is Swaraj, C. R, Das. what have you got to do? Today the whole of your national life is coveresed by the activities of the bureaucracy. You have got to free the field of action from the activities of the bureancracy. That is indendence. But that is only one aspect of the question. You will find out that you cannot remove the infuance of the spberes, you cannot remove their activity vithout at the same time building up your nation. I want you to teep in view both these aspeots.

I have otten been asked, "Will Council give you Swaraj $?^{\prime \prime}$ I have answered this question several times, but $I$ am afraid $I$ carry no conviction. Becanse those gentlemen who are againet the Council approached me with a great deal of suspicion. I have said over and over again, "Counoil does not give you Swaraj; Council cannot give you Swaraj; but Council is at the same time an institution which works against you. You must remove that obstruction in order to get Swaraj from it." (Hear, hear. Applause). But you mast get Swaraj by your own activity. What is the Swaraj I am asking you to concentrate upon? My idea is, that you should activelv work to get ready or that you should get ready to capture all the fields in which the bureaucracy worss.' Capture the Councils as long as there is anytbing to capture. When you have destroyed this picious system, leave the Councils for another work. Council is not going to be the permanent activity with us. Catcoh hold of all the Municipal administration of the country, District'Boards, and all local organisations acd try to brild up your life.

In the second place, the great answer which I want to give to the bureanorsoy to day is what is contained in the second part of the resolation, vié, boyoott of foreign cloth. This is the answer which I want you to give to the bareancracy. It not only demolishes their claim bat at the same time it builds up your national life in a manner which nothing else can do. That is another resolation which I want to make to you. Those who do not spin mast look to the orgenisation of spinning. Those who do not weave must look to the organisation of weaving. Aid if we all work hard and do our little, the least that anybody oan do. I feel sure that within a sbort time you will encompass the boycott of foreign eloth. And that day is the beginning of your treedom. That day will be the foundation of your salvation. That is the gospel which I always prasob.

I bave never spoken one single word against the constructive work, I Oparing day have tried to inclade other activities. And today the resolution which I have The compro- the honour of presenting before you is the resolution which gives you the mine and the liberty of fighting the bureauoracy from all quarters, which gives you the Spinaing
Frachis liberty of destroying all what must be destroyed, which gives you the liberis of building up all what must be built up.

## Maulana Mohamed Ahi, Manatmajl and Friends

With your permission I will begin in English, and afterwards with your permission air, I will use the national language and address the audience. The resolution that has baen moved by Deshabandhu Das, I am asked by the Ohairman of the Reception Committee, Mr. Shivajirso of Karnatak, to read to you, and I do so even as Aurangazed will have to obey Shivaji in his own oountry. (Hear, bear, Lavghter and applause). I hope you do not want me to read the agreement, beoanse it has been published broadoast and everybody knows what it is.

## The resolution is this:-

A. (i) The Congress hereby endorses the following agreement entered into between Mahatma Gradhi on the one hand and Deshabandhu Das and Pandib Motilal Nohra aoting on behalf of the Swarajya Party on the other :-

## The Agreement

Whereas although Swaraj is the goal of all the parties in India the oountry is divided into diferent gronps seemingly working in opposite direotions, and whereas such antagonistie activity retards the progress of the na* tion towards Swaraj, and wheress it is desirable to bring so far as possible all such parties within the Congress and on a common platiorm, and wheresa the Clongress itmelf is divided into two opposing seotions restulting in hario to
the country's cnuse, and whereas it is desirable to recuite these parties for the purpose of furthoring the common cause, and whereas a policy of repres. Opening day sion has been commenced in Bengal by the Local Government with the sanction of the Governor.General, and whereas in the opinion of the under. signed this ropression is aimad in reality not at any party of violence, but at the Swaraj Party in Bengal and therefore at constitutional and orderly The Comprew mise \& the Spinaing Franchise. astivity, and whereas therefore it has becomo a matter of immediate nocessity to invite and secure the co-operation of all parties for patting forth the Maulana united strength of the nation against the policy of repression, we the undersigned strongly recommond the following for adoption by all parties and eventually by the Congress at Belgaum :-
"The Congress should suspend the programme of non-co-operation as the national programme except in so far as it relates to the refusal to use or wear cloth made out of India.
"The Congress should further resolve that different classes of work of the Congress may be done as may be found necessary by different sections within the Congress and should resolve that the spread of hand-spinning and hand-weaving and all the antecedent processes and the spread of hand-spun and hand-woven Khaddar, and the promotion of unity between different communities, specially between the Hindus and the Muhammadans, and the removal of untouchability by the Hindus from amongst them, should be oarried on by all seotions withiw the Congress, and the work in connection with the Ceniral and Proviacial Legislatures should be oarried on by the Swaraj Party on behalf of the Congress and as an integral part of the Congress organisation, and for such work the Swaxaj Party ahould mako its ofn rules and administer its own funds.
"Inasmuch as experience has shown that without universal spinning India cannot bocome self-supporting regarding her olothing requirements and inasmuch as hand-spinning is the best and the moat tangible method of establishing a visible and substantial bond between the masses and the Congressmen and women and in order to popularise hand-spinning and its products the Congress should repeal Article VII of the Congress Constitution and should substitute the following therefor: -
" No one shall be a member of any Congress Committea or rganisation who is not of the age oi 18 and who does not wear hand-spun and hindwoven Khaddar at political and Cougress functions or while ongaged in Congress businese and does not make a contribution of $2, n 00$ yards of evenly spun yarn per month of his or her own spinning or in case of illness, anwill-, ingness or any such oause a like quantity of yam spun by any other person.
(ii) The Congress hopes that the agreement will result in true unity between the two wings of the Congress anid will also onable persons belonging to other political organisations to join the Congress. The Congress cougratalates the Swarajists and others arrested under the new Crdinance or Regralation III of 1818 and is of opinion that such eniosts are inevitable so long as the people

(iv) The Congress appeals to the Princes and realthy classes of Indis and the members of oolitical and other organisations not represented on the Congress, and Municipaities, Local Boards, Panchayats and such other institutions, to exteud their help to the spread of hand-spinning by personal use and otherwise and especially by giving liberal patronage to the classes of artioles, atill surviving and capable of working artistic designs in the fine Khaddar.
(v) The Congress appeals to the merchants angaged in the foreign oloth and yarn trade to appreciate the interests of the nation, and disoontinue their importation of foreign cloth and yarn and belp the national cottage industry by dealing in Khaddar.
(vi) It haviog come to the notice of the Congrass that variatios of doth are manfacturod in mills and on other looms out of mill yarn and sold in the Indian market as Khaddar, the Congress appeais to the mill-owners and other manufactures concerned, to discontinue this undesirable practice and farther appeals to them to enoourase the revival of the ancient oottage industry of India by restrioting their operations among those parts of the country that bave not yet come under the Congress influence and appalls to til i to diseontinue the importation of foreign yara,

When Deshabandhu Das tells you what he means by his Council Programme, I feel it to be my duty to say that I do not agree with him. Beyond that I do not wish to enter into that controversy. We want to close that controversy. I wanted to olose that evan at Delbi and what I praposed at that time was that neither party should be responsible for the other; when, we wished to agree to differ and yet both to remain together in the Congress. There shoald be no driving out of the Congress, no rebellion against the Congrass. Latt the Congrass have both parties، One party says that it is for Councileatry and that it is not : against non-00oparation; while another party says that it is againgt Council-entry. Epen over this quastion of interpretation we should not divide the Congress. We sbould permit each party to consider that its interpretation is right: we should pormit enoh his right of admission to the Congress and fight the common enemy of the Congress and of the Indian nation. And, for my part I refuse to have any responsibility in the interpretation of the resolution passed. It was said that those who had religious or other conscientious soraples need not take part in the Counoil'elections', that they need not stand as candidates and that they need not vote, but out of deference to our friends who wated to onter the Councils, we, the No-ohangers in the intereate of unity and brotherhood should suspend out right of propaganda against Couacil-entry, while we allowed them (the Proohangers ) to arrry on propagands in favour of Council-entry. At Cocanada again the same position was taken up and now the new agreement that is before you socopts that poaition, that in the body of the Congress there are two sets of peoplo-ane set who bolieves that good will come, bat not Swaraj, from going into these Counoils and who, amonget them, also believes tbat Swaraj will come it we go to Councils: there is another body who do not think that any good will come from going to these Councils. This national genius, spinning and weaving. is still with 'India. This 'East India Company found the secret of India's wealth and then would it find peace. Because Indians were an agricultural people and they thought that as by-products "of agriculture they got the oottage industry of the Charkba and the loom. And they said of the cottage industry, "Why should Indians be so strong? Let us spin and let us develop our strensth at the expense of the weaver:" They used the weavers so muob that at last the weavers had to ent off their thumbs in order to keep them out of the shuttle. The weaver was made the slave of the loom, of the shattle, in order to keep him out of it.

Cloth was sent from India, nothing now, when the Egyptian mommies were to be buried in the royal tomb. When the Egyptians wanted to emtalm the mammy they had to get eloth from India; and for those living in great Britain oluth was sent from Ir ?ia. Cotton is indigenous to India. That is the seoret why Sudan was reeeiving from Espypt to-day. Yet it was from India that seoret bad gone to Egypt, and it was Indian eloth that the Egyptian
mummies required. So this time, it is not for the dead but for the living men that Indian oloth costing one rupee was sold for Rs, i or Rs. 8 in England. Opening day Thase were the days of hand-loomes. Then came the machinery of Jenny.

I do not quarrel with the discoverers, I do not quarrel with the millowners. My quarrel is with ourselves who do not see what spinning has done for us and who do not do anything ourselves. When a machine began to do with one man the work of ten, the English found the secret of ruiaing India. Orders went that the Ganges should go bickwards, that the Ganges should flow back to Gangothri but not to the Bay of Bengal. (Leughter !. Indian cloth was no longer to be sent to Eugland bat Pritish eloth was to be imported to India. I ask you, I am suing no rhetoric, no figure of speeeb;-I want you to think calamly all the implications of this, God is just. He is not anjust to one country and just to another. It He gives the polar bear fine furs and mool to protect him in the cold climate of the polar regions, He also gives the necessary skin and wool to the goats, sheep, buffaloos' and the like in this bot dimate of India. Indians-what ào they want? Not furs, not wool. It is unatural for him to banker for cloth made in Grest Britain but it is natural to go in for the wool of Kashmir, It is far more unnatural that all ootton practically required for this country to which God has given a olimate for cotton to grow, should be exported 7,000 miles away and cloth is prepared and imported here. That is an onnatural way. From the chain of ghats, Imagrodes to Lard's End, there is not one acere of soil where cotton is grown in Eagland, not one cotton seed is planted in British soil, and yet most of the oloth has to come from there-almost all the eloth made of our own cotton has to come from 7,000 miles away. I have spoiken, I have talked to villagers. I bave asked them, "Tell me, would it be natural 'that, when you have sown with wheah, pulses, rice, millet or anything that you require, when you throw the seed in your soil, when you cus the harvest, instead of grinding the wheat of your hatvast yourselves and make bread for your children you should export it on sea to the wheei of Reading and that Reading biscuits had to come 7,000 miles away for the breakiast of your children?" They say, it ig ridiculous. Because wheat grows even in England, but cotton does not grow. Not ouly Governer-General and Viceroy Readint-Lord Reading-you are also importing Reading biseaits. (Laughter). And yet Indian cotton is a thing with which we clothe our women.

I have used to our Government this simile, the historic simile of Draupsdi. Her vastar-oloth was in the hands of a relation who wanted to show her atfer nakedness, to show her shame, to his own family. To day the garment, the vastar of our women is in the foreign hands, is in hands of Manchester acd Liyperpool. If yeru want the whole world to know her neckedness it is not her
nakedness.........I am not going to enter into these matters. It is nat rheto.

What happens to us Indians? This slave mentality of ours haping learm spinning from the West, having been flowing from the West, we should think that Franchise light comes from west, from the sinking sun, bat not from the rising sun. It
Maulana a German with a double barelled name, a name of seven syllables, hardly to Mahamed Ali be pronouced, was to come and tell you that for the political salvation of Jndia, her econmic salvation is necessary and that the secret for her economie salvation is the Charkha and that the Charkha is the only remedy, you would call him mad. German. All that fine brotherly feeling is applied is used for this Mahatma. For this mad Mullah. This is our slave mentality.

People eome for prescription to doctors, Dr, Rey, Dr, Ansari, Dr, Ranade of Bombay. They write long presariptions, commercial agents as they are to European draggists. They give yov everything that you have to get from Eng. land, everything that you have to indent from Eurape, perhaps some of whioh may not be available easily, and then you will be satisfied with that long pres. oription and you say, "What a fine doctor he is!" When doctors of your Ayurveda or Unani tell you to use a thing grown af your door, yon are not satisfied with it. God, if He has created diseases He has also oreated remedies. II these are tropical diseases there are tropical herbs also to oure them. A aimple herb that grows at your door is presaribed to you, and you are asked to piok it out, you say, "No, he is mad, I want a remedy, a long prescription, from the West to cure to disease." Such is your slave mentality. Really the seoret of sucoess of great physicians is that they have got simple remdies, not compounds, that they prescribe to you. The simple presoription that Mahatma gives you is the Charkha. (A ory,-It is time, more than time for closing the speөeh).

Mahatma Gandhi tells you that you must not be led by your bearts; he must be led by our hearts,...the lead of our hearts too sometimes. He tells you that if your head is not convinced you may go against this pact or agreement, you may yote against this resolution, and I don't want a single person, a single soldier, in our army, who is not convineed of the value of the Charkha and that this is a flag that will lead you to viotory. Very well, my friend, Deshabandhu Das, is just as much convinced as I am that in the last resort India rill have to depend for freedom upon the masses. We talk of 320 millions. (Mahatmaji, the President, then came up from his Presidential Mandap to the rostrum, and took a seat there, obviously to remind the speakers of the time limitt and possibly to let any of his remarks be well heard. Some of you who mast have seen me opposing this resolution in the All India Congress Committee will be surprised to see me supporting this resolution, (Cheers) and, think an explanation is due to you from me⿻ In the All India Congress Committee which is considered to be a deliberative body, or ratber comparing it to a War Counoil, I was asked to give my opinion as a member of the Council; and I frankly gsve my opinion there. The War Council's decision went against me, and as a member of the war staff I am bound to stick to the resolution. I am a disciplinarian, (Hear, Hear), though not in the sense in which Pandit Motilal Nehru enforces his discipline even in deliberative bodies; but I am a strict disciplinarian in action. (Hear, hear). When it was a matter of deliberation I may give my opinion frankly. But When once a decision is taken we must whole-hearteady carry out that deeision and then only we oan succeed and not otherwise. Then my request to you all is this, it you are determined to whole-heartedly oarry out this resolution, then and then only vote for it. Don't deceive by lip gympathy if you think that you will not carry it out.

Shrigut N. O. Kelear, sapported the resolution in Marathi.
Sjt. Abhyankar in supporting the resolution said:-

## Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen!

Sit. Let me first tell you that it is with the special permisson of the President Abhyakkr. obtained on my request that I am standing here to address you today. I am not one of those who, it was decided, would speas on this resolation. And I assure you that' had it not been for Maulana Mohammad Ali's' speech on "this resolution, I would never have even dreamt myself of speaking on it, Maulana Mohammad Ali supported this resolution. Maúlana Mohammad Ali farther told you not to open up old oontroversies ${ }^{\text {ºn }}$ and he also assured you that he would not do so. And yet while he was speaking, I could feel as everybody amongst. you mast have felt that he was opening up sld oontroversies in the worst fashion postible (Hear, hear, No, no). He told you that we were going to unite on this resolation; and yet he did not fail to remind you that it was today that Deshbandha Chittaranjan Das, the leader of my Swaraj Party, had aoknow. ledged that Mahatma Gandhi was not a mad man-as it was, Deshbandhu Das never said that ho was a mad man-and that Deshhandha Das realised today the potenoy of the Charkha. I challenge anybody, so far as Deshbandhu Das is concerned, to say if he deprecated Charsba and if he said that it was not a Weapon to win Swaraj. (The speaker who was here interrupted replied that It was his opinion to which he was entitied and the President remarked, "Let him finish." The speaker proceeding said, ) When- Laulans Mohammad Ali prooeeded to support this resolution, he remioded me of a little joke that I
pad in one of the English magazines on my way from Poons to Belganm. Jtter a oase in a Law Court was frished and judgement was pronounced ${ }^{\text {Oponing }}$ das be unisnocossfal litigant agked the Judge if it would be oontempt of Court Tha cmimpo' Wha wera to oall him a son of a dog. The Jndge asid that it would oartainly mie of thy be so, whereupon the litigant remarked that he would not say it then I Practive mold lize to know whether it is not in the memory of poople who are silting bare in the Congress that it was Maulana Mohammad All who onoe in a publio absyankas. ppeod in Caloutia declared that it was a wrong polioy that entry into the Conouils was opposed, but that it was no use orying over the spilt " mills; and be binseoll would stand for election it he himself would get \& ohanoe of doing w. (Haar, hear). Having gaid that, it does not lie in his movith to oondemn the Emaraj Party for its antry into the Councils. Madana Mobammad All then aid that it was the Cliarsha and Charkh alone that would load them to smaraj. I should like to know from you, gentlemen, whether we had not our Clartha when we lost our Swaraj? Was it because the British imported oloth lato India that we lost our Swaraj? We had not lost the Oharkha, but we had it when we lost our Swarsj. ( No, , no; $\mathrm{Y}_{\text {es; }}$ yes; Hear, hear). I want you to look to history, which you evidently have forgotten. It was not due to liaport of British oloth into India that we lost our Smaraj and I assure you it mooid not be the boyoott" of British oloth that wooid give yon Swarsj. There were other thingg, there wereother forces, there were other faota that took amay Swaraj from ns. And unless we come into possession of those thinge whidh were wanting in us then. you will not get Swaraj. I assure you Charkha cannotitive you Swaraj. In factr, pardon me it I bay, so far as I am concorned, I do not believe one atom in the atility of Charkha as a politioal weapon. If Manlana Mohammad Ali does not bolieve in the entry into. the Councills and wanks to suffer it as a mere ooncesssion to ag, qullow me also in my tarn to tell you that Charkha under no ciroumstances? will bring as an inch neaser, to Smaraj. And yet Iet me tell you as a member of the.Swaraj Party; that I have agreed to this compaot as a conoession to those who believe in Charkha and I publioly deoiare hare thet. so far as my part of the contraat is conoerned, I will faithfalify abide by it. (Hear, hear; Applause). I. aak Mabatms Gandhi, and there can be no better witness than bim to say whether I was not his poilitioal opponent from the very beginning of, the Nagpar Congreas : (The President: 'Yon were, indeed!' Laughtor) and whether, although not; believing one inoh in hie programme, not belleving one atom in the polioy that he propounded, I have not taithfully carried them out in obedience to the Congress. What I promise I woold carty out in perison, I mould abk any person In my Province if I have not done go: I challeange any man in my Provinoe it I have not done so, And it is in that, apirit alone that the 8 warajibts have tormed this pact. We want to lipe and let live gnd as Mahatmaji has said, to die if possible togethor. If in conrse of time, one aide will win over the other
and time won't be long before we will march together fully belleving in ous programme and one policy. There must be mistake somewhere. I don't pre: The Comproo tend to be the wisest, but at the same time I deny and I refuse to believe any mine and the other man to be the wisest in the world and any one to be infalliable. All are
Spinaing Pranchis falliable, All are falliaole. We want to come together to tussle against the oommon enemy. We want to see it we oannot do that under this resolution.
Sit
shyankar, I believe we will be able to do it.
Two words more: two minutes more, and I will have fiaished, Spasker after apeaker has come on this platform until now to support this resolution. And yet it was my. friend, Mr. Kelkar alone who pointed out to you that there were two parties, two sides, two promises, two offers and two accoptances in this contract. I should have liked all those speakers who preceded me to have told you this in all serionsness, in all sincerity, It has heen said by Maulana Mohammad Ali that if Mr. Das did not believe in Charkha let him not do so; but he for one would advise you to go forward with Charsbs alone, with blinkers to your eyes looking neither way, either this way or that. I should like to know from him it we Swarajists were to put on the same blinkers, would it do? Would he like it? And is it on that understanding that we bave come together? Let ua be faithful to each other. Let there be mubuality; withoat oohesion and mutaality there cannot be any progress. Maulana Mohammad Ali has aaid that Swarajists have entered the Councils and yet Swaraj has not been obtained. I promise him, and I use the word promise, and I particularly use it-that Indis caunot obtain Swaraj, India shall never obtain Swaraj through Councils only. No country in India's circumstancess has done it, and the Swaraj party never thought so either. "Council" is one of the modern weapons that has been forged by Government in order to govern you. It was Mabatmaji himsell who told ua that Government creates and gets its powers through these Councils. . Is it not our duty to see that the wespons that-have been forged against us should be smashed, should be taken away, should be snatched away from our opponents? Assume that we don't do anything, which makes as stronger, yet if we deprive our opponent of a power which he already possesses, doesa't it make us comparatively stronger than what we were? Why has the Government given us these Counoils? These were not there before 50 years. Fifty years before the Government was content without them, because it could rule you only with the power of the sword. Todsy also it would do so if it could. bat it has got to exist in these modern days.

Then, one thing I should like to tell yon. Carry whatever programme you will in the country. But would it not be better, would it not be stronger, would it not be more successfal with the Counoila on your side than it would be with the Counoils against you, as they were, when you had chosen to keop

Wam anainst you by keoping yoursell aloof from them? I may tell you, you asy do your oonstruotive programme, you may do the destructive programme $\theta^{0 \text { pening }}$ day Ifoon will, you may do anything that you think proper, that the oircumstancess ud times mayy leave at your command and disposal and yet I ask yon, wouldnie coappow wot ill those programmes be more successiul, if you had the forces of the Conncils behind you than if they are against you ? It is simple logio and I do sot tind that I need dilate upon it any more.

Mahatmaji has told me that $m y$ time is up and I don't want to take your time any longer. One thing I should like to tell your. Remember what the Smaraj Party is. I want you to look at the Swaraj Party it you will and it you bsse faith in Mahatmaji! through his glasses, Mahatmaji's persidential address itsoll will tell you what the Smaraj Party is. Swami Govindanda, sind, said:Haliatmaji and trieads,

I have, I feel, a painful duty today to perfom inasmuch as I rise to

Swami Goviadanamela oppose the resolution that has heen so ably moved and seconded by Deshbandha Das and Marjana Mobnmmad Ali. Indeed itiwas a sight for the gods to ege when the erstwhile opponents; Maulana Mohammad Ali and Deshbandha' $D_{\text {ss, }}$ came forward on this platform to sapport a resolution proposing such very draetic and revolutionary change in the constitution of the Congress. I. son afraid that the unity that has been purchased, hat been purchased at the. enst of the vital interests of this nation.

The agreement before you reads thus :-
"The Congress hopes that the agreement will resalt in the true unity of the two wings of the Congress and will also enable persons belonging to other political organisations to join the Congress."
I sek you in all seriousness, my friends, whether the pasaing of this resolation conduces to the unity of the different parties. There have been uptil now in this Congress two parties. The passing of this resolution, as Desh-
bandtu Das himself confessed in the Subjects Committee will result in the creation of a third pasty. By this resolution you are creating a party of dis. The Comproe senters like myselt who believe that this Assembly, and for the matter of that mine d the no Assembly, has got any right whatsoever to deny to the poor millions of Spianing
Frachis. this nation the right to vote in the unofficial parliament of India. I olaim that no power on earth has got this authority of disenfranahising millions of man Swami
Covindanadiand $I$ also further say that no power on earth should have any right to deny this right of franohise and the right of serving the Indian National Congress and through the Indian National Congress the nation itself. If I don't Believe in your spinning, are you going to deprive me of my right to serve this nation, to work for the emancipation of this nation from the thraldom imposed upon it by the most tyrannical power on this earth? Do you want me to 'go away and sit dumb without doing anything to serve this my nation? This is'a very grest responsibility that you are taking upon yourselves it yon pasa this resolution. Inatead of widening the doors of the Congress to admit new-oomers are you not rather shutting them against even those who are uptil now in the Congress? Are you not driving out many a sincere patriot from the Congress organisations? I want universal franchise, so that any one who aspires to liberate India may come and offer his Ahuti to the Yajna Kunda of Swarajya. I ssk Mabatma Gandhi who tolls that this resolution proposes a revolotionary ohange bat ins'smuch ae he is going to substitute for the different yualifications of franchise uptil now in vogue the most insoceptble one, vis, manual labour-I ask him in all seriousness why is it that he has acoepted the spinaing as the only right manual labour? How has he made this the oxohange in politioal franohise? The spinning eannot be the ourreacy, the money in politioal franohise affiairs.

There is another aspeat of the question. I also want to impress upon you this, that we are today the diesentors in a minority so far as the pliysiosl or external raising of hands is concerned, but I assure you, Sirs, the inner consoience of a majority of delegates is against, this resolution ( $\mathrm{No}, \mathrm{no}$; Yes, yes). I know that it is against this decision and I hope the test would sjon be known and this tranohise repealed. We are told that the Swarajists are going to vote on this resolation on party lines. I ask Deshbandhu Dus and Pandit Motilad Nehra, who gave us an exoelleat harangue on disopline. Discipline, discipline is the watoh-word of their party. What became of that disoipline st the Gaya Congress? Why did they enter the Counoils in defiances of the declared will of this nation? Here are Deshbandhu Das and Pandit Motilal Nehru who defied the whole nation. Is loyalty, I ask, to the party greater than to the Congreas? They were there to defy the Congress, I ask you, when you enter this House, do you not cease to be mombers of the Swarajya Party? Here you are only members of the Congress and you must not in the Congress as loyal

10 the Congress demands. The Congress is greater than the Swarajya Party 'Opening day Therdore, whenever there is a eonflict of daties, you must ohoose the greater daty and owe alligiance to the greater duty. Your duty is not to the Swarajys The Comprov Pacty. (Doshbandbu Das: Some of the questions put to me, I cannot hear. 1 ) Spinaning Ihare no loader voice. The Swarajya Party bas by such conduatt enslaved the concience, I mean political conscience, the nation's service conseianoe, and Ins the bumble son and servant of my mother India, here I protest against Covindanande these new fotters and I vow that I shall destroy this bondaga. Lastly, I wish to put it to you-my time is over. My triends, consider Bial bojecott. We in 1921 worked this boyeott of foreign oloth: we worked at apinning, I ask you in all seriousness to consider whather the boyoott of loreign cloth brought you by one inoh nearer to your goal of Swarajga. I am not a haliever in thase external things. I believe that we must get. Swarajya by neing any method. Spinning is not the only method to get Swarajga. It ehall not arrogate to itsell the right of monopoly of wianing ' Syarajya to you. I believe that every man should adopt every honourable and righteong meang to. ond bis bureatucray, this oppresife bureanioratic Government in India, every mesoe that will lead to Swaiajya." I went you to concestrate your "atmontion upon this particular weapon, oivil disobedience: You can be nearrer to civill disobadience: you ean support civil digobodienoo: yon oan propare for oivil ditiobedibnes. You oan sotaally offer civiil disobedienoe withoot sititing at the spinalhg wbeel,

One more word, and I finigh. Do you believe that a man who pever harras his lessons from his Charkha Gura, do you believe that a man who aterer sita at bis feet and never sping, has not got that fire of patriotism in How, thal he shaill not face the canoons to give batte to the bareatioracy? Is that that we, the dissenters from spinning, are laoking in, I want to ask you? And why this spinning or manual labour bigotry? [ want to destroy this fsuas-. Hoism. I ara a born enemy of all fanaticisms: This fanatioism of manual Lbourr must be exterminated it we want to make the world isale for liberty, Muadity and demooracy-the ary年g needs of the modern ase and whither" all
forees are irresistibly leading us on. I assure Mr. Das when he says that we The Compro. that even before this pact, the Bengal-Indian Governments onme out with the Ordinance we were prepared not only to stand by the Swarajya Party bot also we were and are prepared to die for them aud to die for any of the meanest servants of the Indian Nation, whoever be be and to whatever denomination

Still the ories of "Hladi, Hindi" persisted, When the President requested the assembly to keep silence and said, "Yon will have both English and Hindi" Then the speaker addressed in Hiadustani as follows:-

Pandit Morimal Netru, next addressing in English, said:- Pandit Motilal thends!

Nehru.
I will shortly explain to you what I have said in Jrdu. (A voice: Thanks), Ithank you. I will answer to those objections advancediby Maulans Hagrat it Yohani and Maulana Azad Sobhani.

I have been saying in Hindustani that those objections do, not hold water, Haolana Hazrat Mohani has gone to the length of saying that this House was upacked House consisting of a vast audience and delegates and tbat everybody boompelled to vote in a certain manner: those who are No-changers, ethough not asked by Mahatmaji, by high esteem and respect and reverenoe in which they hold Mabatmaji, feel compelled to vote in favour of the resolution in spite of the lact that Mahatmaji has respectedly told them not to vote against their . conscience. As to the Swaraj Party, the objection of the Maulsaa was that the action of Deshbandhu Das and myself was wholly arbitrary and that it wascontrary to rales and conscitution, becsuse be was under the impression that no mating of the party was held by which this fact was made a party question; That was a mistake of fact. I have sent a notioe round which was ciroulsted : trosdeast, and to Manlana Saheb who was shown the resolution that I have fort now read to this side of the House, -which you might have followed. The Caolation was lost by a large majority; it was not a meating of the Executive., Committee, not even of the leaders of the Swaraj Party Council; it was lost 1 by a large majority of the General Council. Then the Maulans proceeded to: hy that although all that might be true, striotly true, his consoience though: be belonged to the Swaraj Party, dia not accept the vote of the majority, and:bo would dertainly rise above party becanse be followed his conscience and his .. cotatry more that party. Buth for that we have to osamine his reasons; and
the reasons that he has given are no reasons at all, He saya that Mahatmasil gaid that he suspended non.co-operation and that his experienco of this suspen. The Compro. sion was that it meant the calling of non-co-operation. The first thing that mint and the Spinining atrikes is that Maulana having joined the Swaras Party, by the mere fact of Franchist, joining it he was himself suspending at least one part of the non*00-operation:
Paodit Motilat that is to asy, that part which relates to the Swaraj Parly: Council-entry,
Netru. Then it may be borne in mind that the other parts of the programme did not succeed so well as they wele oxpeoted to. It is but natural that the reason. why they did not sucoced was beosuse they were not quite prapared. Mabatmaji has therefore suapended the programme; mind you, bat not non-co-0peration. That is a thing which we cannot conceive-the susponson of non-co. operation itsell. But the items of the non-co-operation programme which have been so far considered to be enforced, -they have been suspended; and wenn It they were not suspended no one practically would be aotive. Then his other reason was, that this franchise only meang that we are pulling down high ideald whioh we accepted betore. The high ideal we accepted before and we have bee fore un is nothing but Swaraj and now we are aiming only at the exclusion of British cloth. So that is a fallaoy. It is not a matter of saying,-he says, it is not a matter of carising a loss of 15 crores, 40 or 50 crores, whatever it may be, to British who could afford to suffer. But I say it is a question of asaing so muoh money to the country, it is a saving for our poor people, it is a saring for the feeding of the poor. It is only presenting a wrong point of rion belore you. That is aftor all a secondary consideration. The real thing is, which is gubjeoted to, the preparation for the very thing whioh Maulana Sabeb deolared, vis, the suspension of non-co-operation. These are the fow remarts: this is the substance of what is said about Maulana Hazrat Mohani,

Then so far as Maulana Azad Sobhani is concerned, — he said it was a very weak case before as. He would not have opposed this resolution if the suaspension of non-co-operation were not made, beoause it differed; as he mal be tor the franobise wanting sny path; he would not be considered it must oall apon to oppose this resolution, beoanse he was asked, he hexpressed his readiness to undertake and run through greater risk if he was commanded by Mahatmaji. That is the reason why he opposed ; it was the suspension of non-00-0peration. He wanted to go ahead beyond non-co-operation for complete independenoe. He asked Mahatmaji to permit him to carry on a campaign in the coontry in favour of complete independence, He said that so far from going forward in that direotion Mabatmaji had now saspended non-00operation itsell and limited the extent of freedom or liberty which was the real idea Just now I have answered that as regards non-co-operation. As regards Iranobise, he himsolf says though he differed it is a thing which he had to work if oommanded by Mahatmaji as if not by the third part of the resolution

Now as regards the last speaker, Swami Govindanand. He pat a question. He zaid, "You talk so much on disoipliie. What has become of that opening day liseipline when you differed at Gaya to go into the Councils?" Now, I olaim The Comprootat whaterger we did, we did, not as rebels bat as a"thoroughly disoiplined mise and the widy. We differed from the majority. What did it do? We constitated a Franchise wmpat minority. What again did that minority do? They cultivated opinion xuated public opinion and went on like that till, as Desbabsadhu Das printed oot to you, "We stand thorougbly vindicated torday." That was por ledly legitimate, perfectly disoiplined and perfeetly honegt work to do. We mantinte the Councils. When? When at Delhi the Congress had come to lat resolution that those who had not any riligions or conscientions soruples benter into Councill, might do so; and they say that for that they should wotbe excluded from the Congress. Of Course, I am not giving you those mar words, bat only the sabstance. Where is the echo of indiscipline? It is rery easy to say that it is indiscipline. Those who differ and disagree with thia pact, thes have a right to vote agginst it. Not' only that. Those who difier from the Swaraj Party may go out of the Party, of course, the constitulion of the party will not permit them to be in the party and they have perfect inght to form themselves into another party and have public opinion and oultinate edueated opinion and oome into the Congress and oliaim a majority of thair own yiews. And so, I say, there is nothing wrong.

And the last thing you heard is between the Swarajists and the Non. §rarajigts, Please don't attach any importanoe to them.. There are Swarafiets and Nooohangers. I don't say all. But there are gome amongst both, to moom, I know, this franchise and agreement is a bitter pill to swallow. Bitber or not, to their oredit they have swallowed and if you only give time they will digest it too. S So you will not give way to any suoh and you should not attach any importanoe to them.

Bat I am asked by Maulana Mohamed Ali and my friend Desbabsndhu $D_{28}$ that thay were not correotly understood by Swami Govindanand and my tibad My. Abhyaukar. They did not for a moment bay that Mabatmaji : was hero to bo a mad man at any time, Neither of them believed in apinning wifther of them said that they believed in yarn, in Ehaddar. All that they Wid was,-all that Deshabandhu Dasg.; Baid was that now his fuith in the Charkha was growing in him; it was not so about the franchise at the beginsiog. There is no differenoe whatever amongst the Swarajists and No-changers Orar this agreement and also among those who were subsequently consalted thoot it. The objeotions that we have heard are very feeble iodeed. I would therefore ask you all, Swarajists and No-ohangers to yote as one man for this Prodation and to prove to my friend, Manlana Hazrat Mohani, that he may
multiply the number of those who voted against as many. times as he wool like and that the test he may apply as he feels; but he won't bave any con
The Compro: sideration whatsoever. (Cheers,)

WHE Congress resumed its sitting punctually at 11 o'clook on the 27 th December, 1924. Mahatma M. K. Gandhi presided. The proceedings of the day were obaracterised with the usual enthusiasm but with greater: solemnity. As on the previous day, the volunteers sang in ohorus the song of Vande Mata-ram-and the following Canarese song.

Syt, V.. Madanjit, Burma, in eeconding the resolation eaid :- . Ladies and Gentlemen!
' Mr. Tyabjee just now told in Hindustani what the exaot position of the V. Mydapith people of Burma has been. There is a party in Burma which is called the party of non-coopepation and is represented by the G. C. B. A. consisting of 7,000 different associations in different parts of the country. That congrega: thion of 7,000 associations is causing great anxiety to the Government of Burma and Sir Harcourt Butler and his administration are out to orrush the G. O, B. A. All the persecutions and proseoctions and miseries of Burma are due to that poliey of Sir Harcourt Butler, At present for the last four or five montan Sir Harooort Butler has been deolaring associations after associations as illogal under the Criminal Law Amendment Act and over 500 associations have been declared illegal in ali parts of the country. Many of them have boen deolared in suoh a way that the names of the members are also gazetted; and these men cannot join any other associations and form any new associations in any part of the country. The property of the associations has been confiscated, They are at the mercy of the Exeoutiue in different parts of the country:

The only man who could stir Barma from one end to the other aud who coorld command univeraal influence is in Jail. Hundreds of people and Poongys and Sudhas have been put into Jail and have been ill treated; and our gymparthy is due to them because they have been struggling for liberty in that part of the country for themselves:

The Indians understand the prineiples on which our non-co-operation is going on. In Burma, English education has not made so muoz advance. But sympatay in Burma there is this advantage that the Burman people have been homogene. Sythpatay theople ous people and that they are fond of liberty. They lost their Government re-
efbrma. contly and they feel the loss very keonly when they compare themselves with V. Mydaniit. other people. In their struggle for existence they are pressed down and they V. Madapiit. are repressed by the administration all over the country.

Ten years ago there was not an association in Burme which could speak of politios as it is today. From 1917 certain people started political propaganda and this prodasanda was bribed out in 1922. There were some people who had love of liberty and that party have been prosecuting propaganda and the entire country was converted to politioal ideas from one end to the other to such an extent that the Government was frightened. Rev. Ottama was first patin Jail in 1921. When he came out he again worked hard and weat out into the country from one corner to the other and awakened the latent forces in the country. The result is that all the parts of the country are wide awabe as to the vital issues at present.

At present the repression is due especially to the decline in the payment of capitation tax. Thers is a capitation tax in Burma. Every man and every married woman must pay an annaal tax of ropees two and anvas eight only is to the Government. Tbere is not such a large revenue out. of it. Batit means the oontrol of the officials over every living soul in Burma and it heighteng the suffering of the poor people in the coltivating area.. They are in the grip of the headman of the village. And, this headman, as you know, has the power of imprisoning poor people. Small men as they are, they can play muoh havoe on the unfortanate people living in villages. These villagers are mostly a cultivating class and the Government collect the tazes at the time when they want money for their very existence. They have no spare money. to pay the tax and they have to borrow money to pay the tax. And yon know. what mones lenders are. The poor people borrow money by selling paddy in. adpanoe and the money lenders will not give the money unless they get their own torm. Geatlemen, the ooltivator has to agree to give his paddy basket. for Re. 1 when be could get in season Rs. 2 for same. The situation is most $]_{j}$ pathetio. They are suffering a good deal and our aympathy should go to them. In Burma many associations are prohibited: districts after distriots are daily being deolared. You oannot hold meatings anywhere. And very many good people of the districts are suffering, Members of people are terrorised. 'You sannot have nay idea what they are sabjected to. There are not many nationa: list papers in Burma whioh will espouse their cause and expose the misaries of the people. It is why I wek this Nationsl Congress to express its heartielt sympathy and give sdrice to the people thare. I ask the Bengalees and the

Mairssis in this Assembly to convey to their brethera in Burma to look with heartfell sympathy towards the straggling people of Burma.:

I toll you one thing. The Government is out for repression and there is with the Peopla not that inherent strength in them to stand for a long time. With these misaries, znless we help these people, they will succumb, There is a latent loroe in the people of Burma and that force is limited.

Coming to the communal representation I may fell jou that vast numbers $\alpha$ Indian people do not want communal represetation. There are some lew lemyers rad a fow rich men, not rich men of the merchant class, who wish to ankor Legislative Counoil as Indian representatives. There are 8 seats for the Indian prople in the Council. These eight seats nay, even nine are ours if we organise ourselves and remain freindly with the people of the country. I have thaen double the time My time is over. My speech is finished. (Cheers.)

But the conditions bave been stated in detail with clearness to you by Mr. Tyabjee and Mr. Madanjit. Both of them are Indians añd not men of Burme and both of them have setijed in Burma: And: therefore, it is clear that there is a section of Indian advanoed opinion in Burma Whioh is prepared to sapport this resolution. I am here merely to tell you that the Indian opinion here is also supporting this and that Indians must support this in principle It is perfectily alear that commanal representation can ondy be jastified on the plainest of politioal necessity; and except on the ground to the erent to which it has been radmitted, it would be traught with diffioulties and dangers in places and countries where it has not till now been extended. It is equally clear to you that communal representation means the perpetuation of the bureaucracy. It is not apen to the Congress to say that it has the Swaraj Government and able to lay down commanal representation so wa to deal out justioe to all the communities. When the time comes thinge will imprope and all thase differences and snspioions will be colved; but till the brearacracy exists and till the poople are governed by the bureaucreoy, in this Way, it is quite clear that commanal reprasentation means only the porpotinaHion of the brreaucrsey. Becaude, the grant of communal represantation, the erant of offioes, the grant of power and patronage-they all lie with them. It is theirs and they will reward, those that will agree to these things. And therslore, you mugt sot your face againgti say extension of this communal repre. 12 I. N. O.

## KOHAT AND GULBARGA RIOTS.

Pandit Monilal Neirio who wae given a big ovation came ap the rosbrum to move the resolation on Kohat and Guibarga. As soon as he began to apeak in English with the words; "Mahatmaji and friends ! ", there were heard contlanous ories of "Hindi, Hindi" and "English, English'" from the assombly. Panditiji replied by asking their permission to spaak first in English far a lew minutes. He then said.

Friends. the resolution that bas been entrusted to me runs as follows; it relates to Kohat and Gulbarga :-

The Congress deplores the Hindu-Moslem tension and the riots that have taken place in various parts of India. The Congress deplores the riots that recently took place in Kohat, resulting in loss of life and destruction of property including temples and gurudwaras, and is of opinion that the local authority failed to perform the primary duty of protection of life and property. The Congress further deplures the exforced exodus of the Hindu population from Kohat and strongly urges the Musalmans of Kohat to ensure their Hindu brethren of full protection of their lives and property and to invite them to return to Kohat except upon an honourable invitation from the Kohat Mussalmans and upon the advice of Hindw

and Musalman leaders. ## Pandit Motilal Hehru

The Congress expresses its heartfelt sympathy for the suffers in the Gulbarga riots and condemns the desecration committed on the places of worship in that town.
(The Candrese and Hindi renderings of the above resolution were next read by Srits. Mudvedkar and another gentleman).

Proceeding next, the speaker said:-
Friends, I do not olaim any special knowledge of the facts of the tragedy whioh is referred to in this resolation, But if $I$ am here to move the resolution it is to commend to your acoeptance the prinoiple which it involves. It invalves a principle and it states two facts which cannot admit of doubt and which are above controversy. But the facte are: Arst, in Kohat a tragedy has taken: place, the like of which has not been known in India for many years; and indeed I do not remember at least in my life-time, which is not a vary amall pariod, of anything approsohing tragedy in Kohat, There is no doubt thast the Hindu population of Kobat which is in a very small minority has suffered very greastly and grievoasly. There is no doubt also that an enyuiry whioh took placo-a bole and corner enquiry by a person designated as Special Magitrate has been thoroughly inadequate and insufficient and based upon material as to which the public have not beea taken into the confidence of the authority.

Those are the two facts. The principle involved is that Hindus and Mohammadans, both have to depend upon themsalves for their salvation. No smount of protection under-their benign laws, no amount of police lorce, no amount of military protection which is always held out before you, can aave yon ualoss you try to save yourselves. (Hear, hear.)

You know, what has happened, There are two instances before you one from each estreme of India. Tou have the tragedy in Kohat and you have the tragedy in Bengal. Wbat has taken place under the Ordipance in Bengal can only bo described as another tragedy. Now what is the prinniple whioh ought to have actuated the Government? The Government have always, undertaken to be the guardian angels, to be the guardians of our lives and property, and, ol course, I allow that they are entitled aloo to guard themselves. That is entirely true. But there is the line clearly drawn. In Bengal where the Goverament feared the oonseqnances of the activities of anarchical societies,
what happened there? There is no enquiry, there is no invostigation, 'all and
Second day, Whan Riots. A painfal and heart-rending tragedy took place. I read in one of the Englishedited Journals whose correspondent visited the docality and gave his impression

 Motilal Nehro. line of hoases were burnt down. You know the loss of lives which has taken place; not only that, temples bave been desecrated. Now, there is not the slightest doubt and there can be no two opinions in any reasonable being that the desecration of temples and the burning of houses and Hindu property could only have been from the hands of their Muhammadan neighboure and whatever anfferings were eatailed on the Muhammadans they could only have been in. flicted by the Hindus.I do not propose to go into the question as to who were responsible for the beginning of the trouble and as to who took the initiative, because it is not the. time for ns to apportion the blame upon the parties concerned. The resolution is a non-controversial one. It commits the Congress to nothing, neither to the Musalman view nor to the Hindu view. It stands upon svoch tacts as are snown and asks for an open enguiry either by the Bosrd which has already been appointed by the Unity Conference or by a similarly representative body sppointed by the peole of India. It agks you to refuse to accept the finding of the Special Magistrate, beoause on its own face it is a very defective finding and the bigher authorities which have received that finding have themselves sdmitted that the authorities were at fault. What was at the bottom of the exact nature of the delinquency of the authorities? That again $I$ ask you to determine In aocepting this resolution what I ask you is to accept the primeiple, the principle being that you will not accept anything that emanates from one party or other or from the Government which is the arbiter of our destinies. Whaterer you do, you must acoept only the decision of a oommittee which has the confidence of the pablic and that is what it advises you the Hindus and the Musalmana. It advises the Hindus not to go bsok to Kohat until they are assured of protection hy their Musalman brethren, until the Musulmans request them to go . What dues it signilg? It signifies that it has been proved that the British bayonets, the British foroe and the machine guns are not mennt to protect the citizens; they are simply meant to porpotuate this Government of furce oo our peple, because it is the people and the people only that suffer. All these resourcos, the vast military resources of the Government, lie idle, As soon as there is a breath whispered against the Government itself, all the men, honest or dishonest, oriminal as well as ianocent people-they are all huddled together in jail and there is no possible chance of their being hesrd by the Goverament. It is on these broad principles that I ask you to aceept this resolation in regard to Kehat as well as Guibarga. (Cheers ),

In the oourse of his speech Dr. Annie Besant acocompanied by Mr. Jamnadina Dmaratadas and others arrived. Dr. Besant, was reeeived by the President mith great courtreey and respeot while the whole aspembly extended its welcome by y landing.

The President then called upon Lala Lajpat Rai to speak.
Lala Lajpat rar who was reecived amidst prolonged and enthaviastio aboers hegan to speak in English. Then there were continued cries of " Hindi, Bindi" and "English" from among the audience. He addressed them thas:- Lamipat Rai. Friends:
You must allow me to speak in English as I do want to be correctly mported. I had no intention of making any speeoh at this session of the Congrese and loast of all, on the resolution that is just before you. The subinot wiith which this resolution deals, is so delicate and so difficollt as to require the greatest possible oare that not a word is uttered which might injure the lealings of either a Hinda or a Mohamimadan. The subjeet ie a very contenti: othe one. There are two or rather three stories aboat the events that took
place at Kohat which are now known by the name of Kohat tragedy. Thare is

Lalm, you as to the events that terminated in the Kohat tragedy and which are prachajput Ruk tically admitted by all parties to be true.

The Kohat tragedy, as my triend, Pandit Motilal Nehru, told you, is a unique incident of its own kind which is unparallelled in the history of British rule in India. Its significance demands, its importance requires thas all of you should try your best to root ont those causes which have broughb about this tragedy, because I believe in my heart of hearts putting my God as witness, that there is no salvation for India unless we can solve the Hindr. Moslem problem. (Hear, heer. Applause). There is absolutaly no salvation for us, no Swaraj and no peace, no emancipation and no prosperity, and if I may soy with the permission of the President, no Khaddar and no Swadeshi, unless you solve this problem (hear, hear) to the satisfaction of both the commanities. (oheers). Whatever may be the solution, I beg of you to postpone every-other subject and devote practically the whole of your energ? to the solation of this problem. Because on the solution of this problem not only depends the fate of India, but if I may be pormitted to say, slso the fats of the whole continent of Asis, Mind, friends, unless you can solve the pro. blem of Bindus and Muslims in this country you may rest assured thai thero is no salvation, that there is no emanoipation for the continent of Asia, absolltely none. Therefore the issues are so great, they are so comprehensive, they are so important to the pesce of the world at large, that I beg of you to devoto all your attention, all your heart and head to the solution of this problem and try to solve it as soon as you oan, but yet with no undue burry, beasuse a great problem like this cannot be solved in a few days.

Now I am here on this platiorm not to blame either the Hindus or the Mohammadans for the trasedy of Kohat, I just want to give you a few faoks whioh are admitted to be true by all parties so that you may be in a position I to grasp the importance and significance of this question. Take the resolations of the Government, take the atatements, issued by the Hindus, take the state. ments issued by the Momammadans. You will find that the following facts, whioh I am going to state, are practically un-disputed. It is admitted by all the three parties that long before the introduction of that pamphlet, it is agreed beyond all doubt which was alleged to be the immediate cause of this disturbance, the feelings of the Eindus and the Mohammadane were strained. Then comes one of the dispates about the tank, When one dispate about the tady was settled this trouble on their pamphlet eropped up. What is it? What was that pauphliot? I just want to give you the facts.

Now 'on'22nd of -Anguat 30 or 40 oopies of this pamptlet were sold on distribated,' On the lest or 2ad of September,-I do not aexsotly remember the date,-a dispute arose abont the tank-between-the Hindus and the Mohammadans and it was disposed of in favour-of the Hindus by the Mohammadan Aseistant Commigsioner. The Hindus went back and o a partial hartal as a protest against the burning of Shri Krishna's pioture authorities, however, succeeded in bringing round the Hindus and hartal was stopped. In the meantime the Muslims had translated the and distributed it among the border tribes and asked them to come and an u the hearing of the case against Jewan Das. But nothing actually happeni ontil the 8th. The Mohammadans expressed their disaatisfaction at that apology. Jewan Das who had been arrested under Section 107 of the G.P.C. and was in custody was released on bail by the Depaty Commissioner on the 80h. I have nothing to say whether it was right or not. After that reloasej the Mohammadan anger increased. They expressed their dissatisfaction at the conduct of the officer in releasing him. It is said that they held a meeting at one of the Musjids, wherein they took a vow of divorce. I do not take.the statemats of Hindus or Mussalmans. But I say it on the strength of the resolution of the Government of Iudia including the report of the Chief Com missioner and the Report of the special magistrate. (The reports do not give us the exact language of that vow and from that you can judge of the nature of the inquiry made. But that is not very relevent). I shall however tell you what the divoree vow has been stated by the authorities to mean, $i, e$. if thein demands were not satiafied, if their grievances were not redressed, they would take the law into their hands. Unless they satisfied themselves, their wived were to be regarded as divorced and they could not associate with them. They say the vow was taten on the 8 th night.Early on the morning of the 9th, the quarrel or the dispnte in a way began, Here comes the most important point,whioh is, with what indifference, with what stupidity, I would say; with what criminal negligence the anthorities dealt with the situation. The Gosernment of India in its resolation says on pass 445 of the extra-ordinary Gazette that it is impossible to guard against panic and it is difficuls to say what action the authorities could have taken io avert the out-break if the Depaty Commiasioner had heard of the divorce-vow on the night before. But he says this vow was not reported to him. According to the report of the Chief Commissioner the report did reach the Inspecter of Police at. 1 A . M on the morning of the 9th who inatructed the Head Oonstable to give it in writting. This was done at $6 \mathrm{~A}, \mathrm{M}$. The lindus had warned the authorities on the $8 t h$, gth 10 th and sent telegrams the Deputy Commissioner, the Chiet Commissioner and Suparintendent of Wice, but no aetion was taken. Afterwards, when the whole tragedy had boen auted they oame up and said that they had no intimation. "That is the plea tioh is made by a Government whioh spends millions of money on the Cririoal Investigation Department for setting up spies in every house- (Cries ("sbame, shame").
This reminds me, gentlemen, you will pardon me, I am not going to speak ong, this reminds me of a similar incident at Guraka-Bagh, a few miles from Amfhar and yet when the Governor and his Council came to Amritsar they would uit go to see what was happening. People came from the scene of the tragedy 0 Amritsar and told them what had happened, The Governor-in-Council told them that it was incredible and they oould not possibly believe what they mere being told. When they were asked, "why not go yourselves and varify?" Theg asid, "We won't do it." '"Then, very well, don't go to Guruka bagh, but why not go to the hospital where the wounded are lying and varify from those people whether the statements are true or not?" No, that moold interfere with their prestige! (Lagghter!. Have you seen bow callous, how indifferent, how criminslly negligent the authorities are on occasions like Hin? They would not go snd see with their eyes, but they would satisfy themWras by sending their subordinate agents. They always rely on the reports of their own C. I. D, who give them wrong information or do not take Inforation in time, and then they say that they did not get information in tlme tnd therefore they could not interfere. 'It is'sdmittea' by the suthorities that no arra' ments were made; no preosutions' were taken to prevent the recrudescence the troable on the "10th." The "Government of India's enquiries, conelusions and final opinion are all based on incorrect, tussound and in some cases, untrue data, . The whole of it is to whitewash the authorities' neglect and to exculpate them from any blame. I am firmly convinced in my mind that it the authorities had done.their daty on the morning of the 9 th or the night before, there could have been no riot and therefore no tragedy at Eohat in any case, not on the scale on which it actually ocoured.

So much with regard to that part of the resolution which deals with the oonduot of the Government. With regard to the other part of 'the resolution, I am firmly oonvinced in my mind, I have no doubt about it; that the Hindus of the Frontior Province cannot live in that Provinoe unless they win the good. will and friendship of the Mohamadans residing there. The Hindus are a mere drop in the sea of a population consisting of 93 per cent of Mohammadans and 7 per cent of Hindus. When you add to it the population of the independent tribes in the neighbouring territories you will see the atter help. lessness of the Hindu popalation in the sea of Mohammadans and you will realise that they cannot live in peace or with any chance of security unless with the goodwill and friendship of Mussalmans. I have told you. that the Kohat tragedy was unparalleled in the history of trdia and even in the Frontier Provinoe where we have heard many times of frontier raids, we have heard of looting, dacoities and kidnappings bat never in my memory do I. rsmember of having heard of any communal troubles between the Hindus .and Mohammadans in the Frontier Province on the scele on which this tragedy. has takea plaoe. Never bave I heard of such riats in other Provinces, never of this magnitude did riots tale."place in the Punjab or any othar.-Province. . In fact the Hindus and the Mobammadans on the whole lived quite peacelully. and on the whole I think they were on very good terms. uoless something. special happened to distarb their good relations and made them ensmies of each other. Then the speaker read the following resolution:-
The Congress notes with deep serrow the increasing disabilities of 'the settlers overseas and records its opinion that the Indian and Imperial Govermments have fail to protect the interest of the settlers which they have repeatedly declared to be their trust. The Congress whilst tendering its sympathy to the settlers in their troubles regrets its inability to render effective assistance till Swaraj has been attained.

The Congress notes with profound dissatisfaction the sanction given by the Governor-general of the Union of South Africa to the Ordinance of the Natal Provincial Legislature depriving the Indians domiciled there of the Municipal franchise, which they have long enjoyed, with impunity.

The Congress regards the question of the deprivation of franchise as not only manifestly unjust but also a breach of the agreement of 1924 'betoeen the Union Government and the Indian community and the past -declarations of the Natal Government.

The Congreess is of opinion that the so-called settlement of the Kenya question is nothing short of the deprivation of the natural and just rights !of the Indian settlers in Kenya.
(The above realution was next translated into Hicdi and Canarese by others).

Friends, I have so recontly returned fr.m Africs to which you depated mo to go on your behall, and that, fresh in the memory of those disabilitios and disadvantages, their sufferings and tyrannies, from which our brethren and kindred are suffering, I feel, and Mabatmaji will excuse me for feeling eo, that this resolution is too little coloured with the life-blood and with the Buafting to which my people abroad are doomed. I feel so strongly on this Master that I would rather have been excused from speaking to day where Tpechos must be so brief, where speeches must be so restrained, where speethes mast be of that quality that might not divert too poignantly your minds

When I went to South Africa, when I was in the thereshold of Africa, while I was still in Portuguese East Africa, the South African people Central Africa had sent their representative to interview me. One man, a lithl man, more frank in his opinion, snid to me, "Whant will you do in Sooth Africa? General Smuts is a strong man!" And, I said to "him, "I may tell you I am a atrong woman with the whole weight of Indian opinion. (Hean Lear. Laughter and applsuse). It is with the weight of this opinion of Indis behind me that I took the message of hope to the suffering hearts living abrod, from Mombasa to Cape Town : it was the self-same message I carried. The wonderful opations I received were not for myself, '-nay, I was the ambodied messsage of the nation of India (cheers) who said, thus far and no farthet shall tyranny be over the people who are the blood and the bone and the feeb of the people of India. And, it is earrying this message of hope, this massage of kinship, this messiage of moral support, this messege of suffering with their sufforing, this message of rejoioing with their vietories, that brought oomioth that brought encouragement, that brought courage, to the heart of Indiansin Kenys and Indians in Sonth Africa.

While I oondomo the Natal Covernment for passing this Ordinance so uuconstitational, so doubly unioonstitutional, because I believe the taking awny of the political franohise in 1896 from Indians was the firat time almost in British history whon a right that was given voluntarily was arbitrarily taken awas, and now the takiug away of the munioipal franchise is a betrayal of the agreement arrived at with Mahatma Gandhi. Nay, more than that: it is 1 betrayal of the human inalienable rights of the Indian Colonials who bape muoh right ugon the African soil as General Smuts and othor white Coloniad of South Afrios. And, I believe it is our daty to so create pablio opinion in the country that the Imperial and Indian Governments will be oonatrained nol to bo reademio in their pity and their compassion but to protect effectively the interests of our brethern abroad.

Evor since I have retarned I have been pressing for a Round Table Conlorenoe, and when I was in South Afries and when I had the pripilege of visi'
${ }^{3}$ Miniaters and Members of Parliament I put forth this suggestion of a Table Confereuce ; and General Smuts and his party, General Hertzog party and Colonel Kressman and his party were willing and anxious to Fhyia Roand Table Conterenee, but the people of India failed because not sufficiently prove themselves in exrnest in backing up the opinion own ambassador to South Africa.

One hand. | sixty thousand more or less exile childeren of India are also being disinherited from the land where they have inviolable rights, Are we ith going to pass this academieal resolution expressing helpless lip sympawy? Are we going to be content when the white people deprive them of their dadacal rights? This Natal Ordinanoe deprives them of their inalionsble rishts $d$ oitizenship. And are we going to treat it as su aeademie question saying it is marely a question of race prejudice, or are we going to solve it saying that we w down to its root and help our brethrea? I know, I believe, my countryman will be very angry with me for sayiag so It is partly the econmic presara in Natal that gives rise to the anctoness of raoe feeling. Merely saying that it is a race teeling will not help our brethren. They look' to as for more maotical help, to atretoh out the hand of fellowehip which will enable them to Uhbilisa their moral position, to concentrate their moral strength and to preerre the integrity of their ideals whioh bid them keep alive and undsunted the idaal of Indian heritage which is their owa, bs they colonial, coloured black or White in Atrica.

They point to us the problem of untouchability about which we have passed a resolution to day : and we are asked; 'when you have got millions of human beings who go in the name of uatouchables, how dare you ask Swaraj : and how dare you ask for equal treatment to your countrymen abroad '?. But is it ever realised that these very people who taunt us with our social disabilifies have made the whole Indian Nation untonchables in the British Empire 9. When we put forward the demand for equality of freedom to the Indian settlers and press their claim for fair treatment, it if pointed out by Colonial statesmen and ratified by the Imperial Government that the problem of the Indian settiar is not a racial problem but it is purely an economio problem. Apart from the lact whether the treatment meted out to the Indian settlers oan be justified even on economic grounds, let us try to understand whether in the every day lile of South Afrioa the real crux of the whole matter is not racial arrogance and racial prejudice.

We are told that not long ago when the Robertson Commission was sent out by the Government of India and when Mr. Sen, one of the Indian members of that Commission went to Durbari, he had to stay for some time in a boat, becsuse no hotel would give accomodation to Indians there. We were told how atter the persuasion of Sir Bejamin Robertson that Mr. Sen was taken into that forbidden hotel : and even then only on condition that he could have his meals in his own room and that he should not be allowed into the common dining hall. When this treatment was meted to a respectable Indian, do we not realise that it is due to racial arrogance and recial pride ?. It is unnecessary for $m e$ to disonss the theoretical right of the citizens of the Empire to go and settle and live on terms of equality in any part of the Empire that they ohoose. But it must certainis be conceded that the vested interests and the elementary rights of the people who have already settled in those parts must be safeguarded. The Indians in Transwal bave enjoyed the franchise from the year 1875. Not long ago a private member brought a Bill in the Provincial Legislative Council of Natal to take awoy even the Municipal Franohise enjoyed by the Indians in Natal, but the Governor-General withheld bis assent. To-day we get the melanoholy news that once again the bill has been introduced and passed and that the bill has received the assent of the Gover-nor-General of South Africa. And what has the Imperial Goverament done?. What have they, the cuastodians of the interests of the Indian settler, done? 15 I. N. C.

You know that Mahatma Gandhi has repsatedly drawn your attention with regard to the uplift of us the Panchamas and with regard to the removal of untonchability. He has also several times publishad his articles in ".Young India" about this, This "untouchability should be removed. Unless it is removed we cannot approach you and join with you and take part in your endeavours. This is an obstruction in our advancement. I pray that you all obgy Mahatma Gandhi and act up to what he says.

The President:- Now, before I proceed to the other resolutions The Presideat I have to announce to you that Dr. Boanat feels that she must make a statement before this Honse in connection with the resolution we psised yesterday. I do not wish to anticipate what the illustrious Itdy has got to say. But I think, I voive the feelings of this House when I tender my congratalations to her for gracing this pandal with hor presence. Whether she and her devoted lollowers are able to remain in the Congress or not, I may hope that we will always have her sympathy and moral support with us, I now request Dr Besant to make her statement.

Dr Annie Besant, the Ex. President of the Congress who was received by the President with great courtesy and respect, and who was accorded by the Stateanant assembly an onthusiastic ovation, said:Friends !

By the courtesy of your President, I am allowed to say to you a few words before you finish your meeting; and I would ask you, it you think it right, to thind them over in your coming year, so that you may open the doors of the Congress to all the political parties in India. We shall have, by the arrangement of the Unity Conierence in Bumbay, a meeting on Janurry 23 rd to consider there the soheme for tho egtablishmant of Swaraj. I feel, perhaps as an Ex. Presidant of the Congress, a little jealous for the Congress, that some other Conferenca of all parties should be called together, while in the Congress there are sums political parties, who find themselves, shat out. (No, no!. Now, I do Dos bolieve that any one of you desires to shat out any political party from workins with you for the freedom of India. India is too mighty to refare the services of any oi hor children who desire to make her once more the ruler in her own bousebolh, and to crown her with the orown of her freedom in this, ber copti-
nent. You may say to me: "You are not an Indian, yon don't share our birth." No. It is true that I am not an Indian born, but it you are a free Nation and have the right of giving nataralisation, then I should be a naturall. Socond day, sed Indian as I am now one by my own adoption ; (haar, hear, applause) and so, beoause I love the land so truly beyond any other land on earth, beaste

## Dr. Besant's

Statement. I deem it the privilege of my life to be allowed to work among her children is win freedom for Bharatha Mata, therefore, I would plead to you to allow os, though we do not agree with you in everything, to work with you for the com. mon birthright of freedom for the motherland. I have no right and I am oot going to reopen in this Congress the resolution that you have passed; bat I would ask you daring the coming year to think it over, and at your next Congress, at least, to throw your doors of welcome wide open to every political party in India that is working for Swaraj. And because I hope to see that, lek me tell you very ahortly why it is that some of us feel that you have not oponed the doors wide onough to admit ng.

You have the party of liberals here, to which I have never belonged and do not belong, but I know-for I work with them-that they have men among them who love India as truely is any one of you, and would do honour to Indis in any country in the world. They are shut out by this resolation you have paseed. They oannot, or they will not, spin. They want that point. I do not feel it a prinoiple.' I promised your President that $I$ would spin halt an borr every morning, and I have done it. (Cheers). I have no prejudice againot apinning, ( hear, hear), and when he said to me it world encourage some of the poor, I gladly said; "I will give half. an hour to spinning, but F cannot pled $\mathrm{g}^{\circ}$ myself to apin two thousand yards of yarn every month." I cannot work at that rate ; and I won't buy a substitute, for I think that is not fair spinning and that is not contribating the work of your owa hands. I do not like it ; to $m e$ it is an evasion thongh, $I$ am arre, not to many of yon. I ask you not to make that an egsential, next year, of taking part in yoar deleberations, and far more I ask you that every political party shall be equal in the Congress of the Nation. (Hear, hear). I do not think that it is an unfair claim. It was the poliey of the Congress for all the years before this one. Always epery politioal organisation sent its members to the Congress, and all stood on one equal platform, and they anrioheid the Congress of their days. They did not weaken it in the face of the world: Bat as long as Liberals, Moderates, National Home "Rulers, are all shut ont, beeause they say; "We do not agree with one party only in the Legislatures ", it must weaken it. Mon of all partios there are in the legislatures to-day-aren't they? Every party has members in thoss Conucils and why should they be put at a disadrantage by allowing only one party to speak in the name of the Congress? Far better. I sabmit, to allow thour to asp what they believe to be best; and let us all meet here, as we
had met so many years, differing intellectually, differing in some of our opinions, bat united by one love for the common Motherland ; and so, now that you Second day bave thought it right to make that door in that way partly open, it may be that De. Besant's before next year all political parties here shall join in equal brotherhood and Statement equal right of opinion.

To me freedom of speech, freedom of expression, is so vital a part in a country's life, that even for mp worst enemy I would olaim freedom of speech, Ior, I believe in the old words that ' Truth only conquers and not falsebood'. Lot those who come say what they believe; let every one who discusses come and pat bis case before you ; and then the whole nountry oan speak to Britain mild say with one voice: "We demand Swaraj". That has been my dream bor years. I have been working for it, I have been striving for it, not only here bat in other lands as well. I pray to you to think the mattier over. I do not ask more, bat I do want that when we go and gay that tudians have made thair own Constitution and they present it for Imperial sanation nest year to Parliment, - when that comes, as come it will, for all the forces of righteonsness are fighting for India's freedom to-day, I pray you that it may not lie in the mouth of any nation to say when that bill comes, " you have not got the Congress with you and the Congress is the National institution of India." You cannot be National whill you sbut out any party. You cannot be national while only one party may speak for you in the Couneils of the Notion; and it is beesuse I felt that so strongly that I ventured to ask your President to allow us all who do not agree with the Swaraj Party to come here as members of theo Congress, withont deserting our own belieif, and then we shall be like the "bundle of stioks". There are many in the bundle, esoh weak by itself; but tie them together with the string of the Congress, and no power in Heaven or on arrth shall be able to break that bundle of men determined to be free. (Lood Cbeers).

The Presionst :-Friends, you have heard the statement that Dr. Beasant The Praident. has made. You will not espeet me to make any remarks upon that statement. Drr. Besant bas not made the statement, as I know, in order that she may have roply just now. She has made that statement from a sense of duty so that her silenee, might not be construed into meaning that we had her assent to the re-solation that we passed yesterday. But I hope I may give her the assaranco of this Congress that all that she has said will command our respectial attenfion and that no stone will be left unturned by this Comgress or Congressmen and Congress momen to open the door wide, as wide as is hamanly possible, for the entrance of every party that bas the interest of India at heart and every party whose goal is Swaraj for India. With these words I eloss this inoident, repeating my request to Dr . Besant that, whether she and other parties are able to join the Congress or not, the Congress will almays expect her and every
party's aympathy and support in anything and everytbing that may commend

## Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen :-

The resolution which I place belore you runs as follows:-
"The Congress congratulates the Akalis on their patience, endurance and courage with which they are carrying on their struggle for Gurudwar reform and hopes that these qualities of theirs will withstand and survive the insidious attempts now being made by the Punjab Government to crush the spirit of the brave Akalis."
"The Congress views with horror and indignation the report of over one hundred deaths among the Akali prisoners in Nabha Jail and ezpresses its strongest disapproval of the refusal of the Nabha authorities to permit the Akali Repression Enquiry Committee appointed by the Congress Working Committee, to visit the jail."

The Congress is of opinion that the phenominal mortality among the prisoners is proof of the inhuman conduct of the authorities towards the prisoners.

The Congress tenders its respectful sympathy to the bereaved families."
(The above resolation was also translated into Eindi and Canarese.)

## Proceeding the speaker said:-

Friends, the Akali brothers are now passing through the fourth phase of repression in the Pajab. You are all aware that daring the last four years along with the mopement of Non-co-oparation and the new awakening in our country the Atali brothers were progressing side by side though not in their politioal aotivity bat in their aotivity for securing religious freadom. The first phese of repression was in ennnection with the koys of the Galden Tomple of whiah you are all familiar. You koow how by accepting the message of nonviolonee and the message of Non-co-operstion of Mahatos Gandhi they started civil disobedience with regard to the mangement of the Golden Temple and the teys of the temple that were in the bands of the manager appointed by the offioial Depaty Commissioner. They suoceerded, after sending about 300 of themselves to prison, in foroing the keys out of the hands of the Governmgnt into their own bands.

The sècond phase of repression was what was cailed the Spring Repression. fod that was connocted witia the imprisonment of about 200 members of the Gorudwara Prabaudbak Committee who are also members of the political Congratulabodies in the Punjab.
tions to Akalis
The third was in connection with the historic Gurukabagh struggle. The Sjt. T. Prakapresent repression is the fourth oue through which they are passing now and sham. Hat was started on the 13th Sepetember 1923-when, after the deposition of the Maharaja of Nabba, the pilgrimage of the Akalis to the Gurudwaras in Jaito was interrupted and the a khand Path itself was interrupted. The challenge was taken up by them. Then they started Civil Disobedience by sending Jathas; each of 24 people. Eight thourand Aksilis had been to the jail on that sccount alone. Those that were arrested were kept in confinement for two or Hree daya in a place and then they were taken away into some distant deserts near Delhi and were left there without food, provisions or clothing:

After sending to jail 8000 they gave a shift to their programme; they sopped the daily jathas of 24 and subatituted the Sabidi Jatha of 500 . You remember how the first Jathe of 500 had to face the rain of bollets ss they entered into the State and how the survivers bad marched on the bodies of those who bad been killed singing their holy songe until they reached their temple Thus there bad been twelve Jatbas making a total of six thousand persons. The thirteenth Jathe started on the 15th Decemker, which will be reaching some day, perhaps it may have reached now. Altogether you will find fourteen thousand arrested in Nabha State.

What is the position of these people who have been arrested? Where have they been Imprisoned? What is their food and olothing? What is the treatment accorded to the sick? The food was very bad, the clothing ecanty, and almost nothing, and the siek were treated very indiferently. The result Was that 110 , persons died in jail on account of the criminal negligence of the anthoritios (siome, shame). That is the result, that is the thing that has been relerred to in this resolution.

Now, just follow what happened after this event. This was started on the 13th of September, I told you. Hardly, month had passed when on the 13th of Ootober 1923, they raided the Office of the Gurudwara Prabandbak Committee. arrested all the members of the Executive Committee and the Whole of the clerical staff. A notification was issued the next day, on the 14th of October 1923, declaring the Garudwara Prabandhak Committee the represedtative religious institution of the Akalis, an "unlawful association". They declared the Akali $D_{a l}$ also an "unlawful association". Again the Akalis tccepted the challenge of the Government at once. A general meeting of the Abalia was held : a new Exeoutive Committee was appointed: they wore badges on their shoulders proclaiming in bold lettars that esoh and every ons
of them was a member of the " unlawful association", and marched throught the Secend day, streets of Amritgar: similar processions were conduated throughout the ProCongratula - vince on the largest possible scale defying the Government. tions to Akalia

Friends, it so happened that some of us were present in Amritsar when this
Sit T. Praka- was going on. So some of us joined as members of that unlawful association: sham. and marched with the Akalis in a procession to the Golden Temple but nothing would induce the Government to touch any of these who bave openly defid. Any reasonable Government with a conscience would have accepted the deleat on their part. But this is a Government which would not move, which mould not change. (At this stage the President left his seat in the rostrum asking the spaaker to continue until he returned). I am asked to continue till the President comes. Certainly I oan engage you because the story is rather : long one. (smiles) What happended after this? They picked about 1,500 in ${ }^{\circ}$ portant workers of the Akalis on some pretext or other and they were prosecnted under the Criminal Law Amendment Act. Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, Prot. Gidwani also were arrested. Mr. Gidwani is now rotting in the jail there, and Mrs Gidwani has not been able to go to him and attend to his wants. Wo have not considered and we are not considering in the least to-day how and in what manner Prot. Gidwani could be brought out of jail.

We bave become powerless and we have been Writing down here that Non: oo-operation is suspended. The boycotts have been suspended, but I tell youl friends, we may suspead these resolations bat. Non-00-operation will never be suspended in this country of ours. (Hear, hear). Well, is it not an irony of fate that we are passing these resolutions here to-day while Non-co-operation and civil disobedienoe on a systematio scale are being carried on by our Abali brethren there? Where is Non-co-operatin suspended? The Indian National Congress represents all the people in India. It 14 lakhs of Sikh population are to-day carrying on the Non-violent Non-co-oparation, - no doabt, it is with regard to religious freedom it is carried on in a perfect and legitimate mannerWhat does it matter whether we bave passed this resolution or not? You will note that the Mirasidars of Tanjore and Trichonopoly were carrying on nonviolent non-co-operation on the largest soale with regard to the non-payment of tazes. (Hear, hear). So I say this non-co-operation, this nonviolent move, has been accopted by the people. Whatever you may be doing here they are carrying it on there : it is going on.

There carne again the Bhai Peru atruggle. It is the aame as that of Gurukabagh, While the Akalis attempted to cut the wood from the trees for the Guru's kitchen they were arrested as at Gurukabagh. This was another challenge thrown into their face, which they accepted and started Jathas of 24 each. Those Jathas went on until 5000 people had been arrested.

Now the chief aim of the Government is to break the beck of the Akali mevement. The organisations of the Akslis have been so perfect, their village Second day, organisations have been so complete, but for that they would not have been Congratalaable to find the response in the manner in which it has been forthcoming, fieas to Akalis What has been the result? The result has been that the response came not sith T. Praknonly from Bengal, from the United Provinces, irom the Central Provinoes bat sham. also from Canada. A special jatha marched from Canada to India. (Hear ). And you will remember how this Jatha received the blessings of Mahatma Gandhi at Delhi on their march to the Gurudwara Prabandhak Committee. That Jatha is now waiting for orders to march to Jaito. Village organigations of the Akalis should be broken, that is the aim of the Government. What is the attempt, which the Government is making to break up these organisations?

The methods adopted in the Panjab sgainst the Akalis are not new. We had gone through all these methods in the Guntur District, and in the Godavari District, during 1921 and 1922. I shall tell you now how the village organisations have been broken "up. Notifioations are issued that no man should pay any contribution by way of money or by way of articles to those associations. But this is disregarded by the people.

The second method is the posting of punitive police in the villages and compelling them to pay the cost

The third method is by prohibition of the supply of provisions and supply of food to these jathas as they maroh fro $n$ the Golden Temple to their destination,

The tourth method adopted by notification is that no pension would be given, that the lands would be forfeited, that the Jahagirs, the Zamindaris would be taken away and alienated to others, if any support was given to the Akalis. Seven handred Talakdars and Ammaldars have been dismissed from service for sympathising with the Akali movement or rendering sny assistance to them:

Well, Sir, side by side with all this, attacks were made on newspapers and the press also. The Akali Pablicity Bureau was more prompt than that of the Government. With a view to stop that publicity work, orders were passed prohibitting the pablication of the communioations issued by the Gurudwara Prabandhak Committee in newspapers in the Punjab. Although sll other papers refrained from doing it, the AEali papers continued to do it. The papers could not be suppressel under the new laws Bat the editore were destt with : the Akali papar alone contribated 23 editora to jail. Of them five ware ent to jail sifter the notification of October 23. Several othar papers were there which sent their quota to the jail.

And lastly, attempt was made by atarting Sudhar Committees by way of Seound day, counter-propagands ic the villages, These Committes correspond to, what are Congratula. known as, Loyalist Committees which were organised in our parts of the coontions to Akalis bry to combat Non co-operation. They wanted to create factions and hosililSji T. Praka. ties in the Akali ranks. When a question was put to the Gavernor of the
sham. Pupjab, it was admitted that the Oificials were permitted to assist these Sudbar Committees. The Akalis are continuing their struggle in a most remarkbble manner and that struggle is going on and will go on. You see the object of the Government is to break the back and the spirit of the Akalis so that all of us or any of ne would never think of non-co-operation movameat once again.

In that way we are olosely connected with the Akali movement, Although our aupport will not be wanted by our Akali brethren by way of men, yet they want advice and money from as. Advice, would be abundantly forthcoming, because Mahatma Gandhi is always at their disposal. As regards money, Sirdar Mangal Singh has opened a subscription list to-day of Re. 1 fund., Before you go away, it you have any spare money, instead of throwing it away to some shops, I would request you to put something in his hands. I heartily commend this proposition to you (Cheers).

Whereas it has been discovered that many otherwise deserving men are unobtainable for national service because of their reluctance to accept remuneration for service, the Congress places on record its opinion that there is not only nothing derogatory to one's dignity in accepting remumeration for national service, but the Congress hopes that patriotic young men and woomen will regard it as an honour to accept maintenance for service faithfully rendered and that those needing or those willing to do urvice will prefer national to any other service.

In Article XI "Rs. 10 to be altered to Re, 1",
In Article XXIII, add atter the first gantence anding with the word "Congress ":-

The Treasurers shall be in charge of the funds of the Congress and shall keep proper accounts of them. The General Secretaries shall be in charge of the Office of the All India Congress Committee and shall be responsible for the publication of the report of the proceedings of the preceding session of the Congress and of any special session held in the course of the year, in co-operation woith the Reception Committee. Such report shall be published as soon as possible and not later than four months after the session, and shall be offered for sale.
Add at the ond of Article XXII, "and poblighed along with the next Congrese report !".

## DRINK \& OPIUM TRAFFIC.

## Other Resolatiens

The Congress notes with satisfaction that notwithstanding the setback suffered by the campaign against the use of intoxicating drinks and The Presiden. drugs initiated in 1921, Congress workers in several parts of the country have continued it with vigour and determination. The Congress hopes that the peaceful endeavours of workers to wean those who are addicted to the drink or the opium habit from the curse will receive further and greater strength and encouragement than hitherto.

The Congress is of opinion that the policy of the Government of India in using the drink and drug habit of the people as a source of revenue is detrimental to the moral welfare of the people of India and would therefore welcome its abolition.

The Congress is further of opinion that the regulation by the Government of India of the opium traffic is detrimental not only to the moral welfare of India but of the whole world, and that the cultivation of opium in India which is out of all proportion to. medical and seientific requirements should be restricted to such requirements.

The President next spoke in Hindi announcing the results of the Spinning Competition and the programme of other meetings and conferences, The Hindil speech was as follows:-

## THE PRESIDENT'S CONCLUDING ADDRESS.

In bringing the proceedings of the session to a olose the President delivered a most impassioned address first in Hindi and then in English, It was The Preail. really a" heart-pouring" address and deeply moved the hearts of his hearers. ding diddrass. He said in Hindi :-

## dddressing next in English, the President said:-

I have just poured out my heart to you in my Hindi speech. It is impossible for me to reproduce what I have said in Hindi. One thing however I Want to sag. I do not think that any Chairman, iny President, could possibly. olaim greater courtesy, greater attention and greater affection than you the delogates have extended to me. I assure you that it has been the greatest delight to me to preside over your deliberations hers in the Congress and in the Subjeots Committee. Every one of you have readily responded to every call. that I have made upon you. I know that I have put a heavy atrain upon you. I have not walked you. I know I have run you. But what ean I do? You aro impatient and I am impatient. We want to march towarde Swaraj and our march for Swaraj has got to, be, not at a snail's pace, buta double quick march; and if we do want to work and march forward, I can not afford to Waste a single minute of your time and my time. Therefore, I have put on
apeed to the best of my ability and it has been a wonder to me- it hes Seeond day, given to me the greatest satisfaction that you have so readily responded to The Presii me, so nobly! And you have not done this thing charily but with a magn. dent's Conelur ficent generosity. No one could have possibly claimed more, asked for moer and got more. You have given me all that I could possibly ask of you.

But what I now want to ask your for, is something more; something better, something richer, and that is this: transfer all this noble affection, all this generosity that you have shown to me to the thing that you and I hold dear, to the thing that alone binds you and me together and that is Swarg. It we want Swaraj, we must know the conditions of Swaraj. You have endored the conditions in the resolutions. Every one of you knows those conditions. Do not leave these conditions here. Take them away with you and fulfil them to the letter and to the spirit and insist upon others to fulfil those conditions, not by force but by love. Exert all the influence and all the pressure which love oan exert, upon every one that surrounds you and upon your neighbours. Go throughout your district and spread this message of Khaddar, spread blis message of Hindu-Muslim unity and spread this message of Untouchability. Go hand in hand with the youngsters of the country and make them the ral soldiers of Swaraj.

But you will not do it if the Swarajists and No-changers still bear malice against each other, if they still have jealousies acainst one another. It will be possible only if you bury hatred, leave all the jealousies and anger, all thoss bad influences here. Jaskyon to bary the hatchet. Bury the jealousies underground and cremate them wherever you like. But take away the saored resolution that you have passed and say "Let the heavens fall;' but the bond that binds us to day, the tie that has bound the Swarajists and the No-changers ahall never anap". (Loud oheers), My work is finished (Prolonged cheers).

Soarcely had the President got down the rostrum when he was reminded of the duty of the Congress to thank the Reception Committee, and he reo antered the rostrum and said:-

I would not have forgiven mysell if I had not tendered my thanks to the noble volunteers trained by Dr: Hardikar (Cheers) and to the members of the Reception Committee. But in the mad passion for Swarsj I forgot all about the voluntears and the members of the Reception Committee:

I know that they have not served in order to receive thanks. The noble service that they have rendered is its own reward. But it was due from me and I would hava been guilty of a breach of duty to you if I had not returned thanks to all of you. May God bless all the voluntears and the members of the Reception Cormmittee. (Applanse).

Bat in passing this resolation which on other occasions is merely a matter of torinality, I take it that you sre responding to the call which he made upon you in his concluding remarks. That oall was to the Swarajiste, and to the No-changers, and to all others whom it may concern. That was a call that you nave to perform your undertaking to the very lettar in apinit as well as in matter. Now when I propose thie vote of thanks I expect you to say by passing it that yon agree to all that Mabatinaji said and that you willingly and chearfully nadertake the responsibility which be has laid upon you. I need not say enything more. I only agk you to pass this pote of thanks by acclamation. (Loud and continued applanse. Vooiferous shouts of "Mababma Gadaiki jai").
