I have the honour, under instructions from the Chief, to submit the Annual Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State for the Fasli year 1335, ending 5th June 1926.

## CHAPTER I.

#### GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

- 2. The area of the State is 524 square miles and it is divided for adhinistrative purposes into two Talukas, Jamkhandi and Kundgol and three Thanas, Wathar, Patkhal and Dhavalpuri. The population of the State is 1,01,195 as per census of 1921. The gross revenue of the State, exclusive of Inams, based on the average of past five years is Rs. 8,97,466. The State pays a tribute of Rs. 20,516 annually to British Government.
- 3. The Chief Meherban Shrimant Shankarrao Parashuramrao alias Appasaheb Patwardhan is a Konkanastha Brahmin. He is a First Class Sardar of the Deccan and a Treaty Chief. His age is 20. He has a son named Shrimant Parashuramrao Bhausaheb, who is now in his 2nd year. It gives me great pleasure to mention here a happy event in the family of the Chief. On the 14th May 1926 at 11-45 A. M. Shrimant Saubhagyavati Lilavati

Ranisaheb presented the Chief with a daughter in the Chief's bungalow on the Boat Club Road at Poona. The child is named Shrimant Indira Raje alias Taisaheb. All the members of the Chief's family are enjoying excellent health.

- 4. The most note-worthy, joyous and important event of the year is that Shrimant Appasaheb, having fittingly finished his education by an All-India Tour under the guardianship of Major W. E. D. Campbell was invested with the full powers of the State by Colonel E. O'Brien, the Resident at Kolhapur and Political Agent, S. M. C. States, under instructions from the Government of Bombay. The Darbar in connection with the ceremony was a notable one having been graced by the presence of a number of Chiefs, Sardars and notables. The Resident and Political Agent while presenting the Chief with the "Kharita" and "Khillat" from Government referred to the glorious heritage of the Chief in very eulogistic terms and drew an ideal picture of State craft in a few but choice sentences and closed his address with a warm and sincere advice to follow in the worthy foot-steps of his illustrious father and to lay to his heart the progress and prosperity of his subjects.
  - 5. The Chief in response expressed his sincere thanks to the Government and the Political Officers for the able and wise management of the State during his minority and assured the Political Agent that he would do his best to act up to his advice and that his watch words would be efficiency and co-operation in the various departments of his State and that the welfare and prosperity of his subjects would be dear and near to his heart.
  - 6. This happy occasion was availed of by many public bodies and institutions not only from within the State but also from the outside for presenting congratulations and addresses expressing their good wishes. The Chief received them all in his usual magnanim-cus and sympathetic manner and gave befitting donations to most of them in furtherance of their praise-worthy objects.
  - 7. Your goodself and Major L. E. Lang, the Assistant Political Agent, S. M. C. States paid official visits to Jamkhandi during the year under report.

### CHAPTER II.

#### ADMINISTRATION OF LAND.

9. Revision Survey has been extended to the whole of the State except Benkanhalli, Kop and Hanchinal, the three Inam villages, in Kundgol Taluka. The 'Pot-Hissa' measurement work is completed in Kundgol Taluka and that in Jamkhandi is in progress.

10. The area under cultivation, first taken up for and thrown out of cultivation during the year under review is shown in the following table:—

<sup>12.</sup> The dues on the whole were collected without having had to resort to coercive measures except in a few cases in Jamkhandi Taluka. Notices of demands had to be issued in some cases only.

<sup>13.</sup> The comparatively large arrears appearing aginst the Jamkhandi Taluka are mainly due to insufficient rainfall and the consequent poor yield of crops while those against Dhavalpuri, an Inam village in the Ahmadnagar District, is mainly due to suspensions granted by the British Government during the years 1922-23 and 1923-24.

- 14. Record of Rights was re-written in the Kundgol Taluka during the year under report and village forms Nos. 6 & 7 are being maintained according to the Maxwell system.
- 15. No Tagai loans were advanced during the year under report.

#### CHAPTER III.

#### PROTECTION.

#### Legislation.

- 16. Appendix II shows the Acts and Regulations in force in the State.
- 17. The following Acts were made applicable during the year:— The Co-operative Societies' Act, and an Act to amend certain sections of the Jamkhandi Cotton Market Act I of 1925.

#### Military Force.

18. The State maintains no Military Force.

#### e visit Mar ranka an error of Police.

- 19. The details regarding the strength, discipline and education of the Police are given in Appendix IV.
- 20. Of the 311 foot police, 304 are armed of whom 140 carry breech loaders, 107 muzzle loaders and 57 carry swords. The remaining 7 are unarmed.
- 21. The sowars are armed with breech loading guns, swords and lances. Strict discipline was maintained in the force. Three were dismissed departmently on account of gross negligence while on duty and three were dismissed being convicted under section 223 of the I. P. Code.
- 22. The ratio of police to the entire population of the State is 1 to 283 souls and to area 1 to 14 square miles.
- 23. The strength of the Police Patils and Sanadis is 328. They do ordinary police work in their respective villages and assist the district police in the detection and prevention of crime.
- 24. The results of the working of the Police are given in Appendix. V to VII. The percentage of convictions to the accused sent up for trial shows a slight increase as compared with that of the last year. The work of the Police on the whole is satisfactory but the percentage of property recovered shows a fall. The work of the police though fair on the whole requires further improvement. Attempts are being made to improve the force by giving regular training under experienced and trained officers.
- 25. The number of accidental deaths and suicides was 44 as against 42 of the last year.

26. The number of accidental fires was 36 as against 32 of the last year and the property destroyed was worth Rs. 2243 as against 6111 of the past year.

#### Criminal Justice.

#### ORIGINAL.

27. Appendix VIII shows the work done by the various Criminal Courts during the year under report.

#### Appellate Work.

28. The results of appeals heard and disposed of by the Appellate Courts during the year are given in Appendix IX. The very small number of appeals goes to show that the contending parties found that their complaints and grievances received due consideration at the hands of the original courts.

## Civil Justice.

#### ORIGINAL.

- 29. The details of suits filed and disposed of by the several courts of original Civil Jurisdiction are given in Appendix X. The file of the Nyayadhish Court was slightly heavy as compared with that of the last year.
- 30. Appendix XI gives the details of the results of applications for executions of decrees in all the Civil Courts.
- 31. Appendix XII shows the results of the work done by the Civil Appellate Courts.

## Extradition.

32. During the year 11 accused were surrendered to the State by the British Government and three by a Native State for trial. All of them were convicted. No persons were surrendered to British Government or to any other Native States.

#### Wards' Estates.

33. Appendix A gives the details of all the estates under the management of the Court of Wards. The health, education and general interest of the wards were very keenly watched by the Managers.

#### Mamlatdars' Courts.

34. The number of suits filed in the Courts of all the Mamlatdars and Vahivatdars was 28 as against 30 of the last year. All of them were disposed of during the year. There were revision applications in two cases only. In one case the order of the Lower Court was upheld and that in the other reversed.

#### Prisons.

- 35. Appendix XIII gives the number of Jails and Locks-up in the State. The Central Jail is located at Jamkhandi and the Medical Officer at Jamkhandi is its Superintendent. It affords sufficient accommodation and is well ventilated. A separate ward is set apart for female convicts. The Jail was periodically visited by the visitors appointed for the purpose. Your goodself and Major Lang, the Assistant Political Agent, S. M. C. States, visited this Jail during your sojourn here. Although strict discipline was maintained in the Jail, six prisoners ran away from Police custody while on extra mural work. Four of them were arrested and after due trial were convicted. The remaining two being notorious dacoits from the gang of Sindur Laxmya, are still at large and every effort is being made to ratake them with the help of the British and Sangli State Police. The general health of the prisoners was good. No death took place in the Jail during the year.
- 36. Remissions were awarded to 25 prisoners according to the rules obtaining in the Jail Manual. On the happy occasion of the Investiture ceremony twelve prisoners were released and special remissions were awarded to 10 prisoners.
  - 37. There were two civil prisoners and no lunatics.
- 38. The total expenditure of the central Jail and locks-up was Rs. 7,171 as against 8,248 of the last year.
- 39. The dietory cost in the Central Jail was annas 2 and pies 11 per head per diem.
- 40. Rations and clothing were given to the prisoners according to the scale obtaining in the Yeravda Central Jail.
- 41. Weaving silks and cottons such as coarse cloth, carpets and towels was carried on though on a modest scale during the year under report.

#### Registration.

42. The full details of the work done by the Registration Department, are given in Appandix XIV and XV. The figures show a decline. This perceptible decrease speaks itself for the better condition of the Agricultural Class.

#### Municipal Administration.

43. There are six Minicipalities. Appendix XVI shows their financial condition. Their principal sources of income are octroi, house-tax, tolls and water-tax while sanitation, general conservency, lighting, road-repairs, water supply, contribution towards education and vaccination are the principal heads of expenditure. All the six Municipalities exercise the right of election. The State Karbhari is the Ex-Officio President and the Mamlatdar the Ex-Officio Vice President of all the Municipalities except Jamkhandi which has

the privilege of electing its own President. Sanitation is well looked after by all the Municipalities. The working of all the Municipalities was satisfactory.

## CHAPTER IV.

#### PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

#### Rain-Fall and Crops.

41. Appendix XVII shows the distribution of rain-fall by Talukas and by months. The rain-fall though not below the normal was untimely and eratic with the result that the kharif crops yielded a very poor return and even the rabi did not come up to the normal. Cotton crop though on the whole fair did not yield good out-turn and commanded low prices in the market. Rabi jowari did not give the expected yield and wheat crops failed to some extent. The anna valuation of cotton, wheat and jowari was 8, 6 and 8, respectively. Though water supply was difficient that of fodder was sufficient and consequently the agricultural stock fared well as would be seen from Appendix XX.

#### Prices and Wages.

#### PRICES.

45. The prices of food grains slightly fell as could be seen from Appendix XVIII.

#### WAGES.

46. Rates of wages have remained stationary.

#### Forests.

- 47. The total area of the State forests remained unchanged. The forest growth is very poor. No rich teak is available. It supplies only fuel and affords at places grazing.
- 48. During the year under review there were only four offences against forest rules with six offenders. All of them were fined. There were no forest fires.

#### Excise Revenue.

49. The number of excise shops and the revenue realized therefrom are given in Appendix XXI. There is no change in the number of shops.

#### Trade and Manufacture.

50. There is no important trade worth mention in the State and there are no prospects of its increase till the State is conveniently connected with the outside business centres by rail. Sugar, rice, salt, colours, spices, cocoanut, timber, stationery, yarn, cloth, metals and kerosene are the principal imports while food grains, cotton, cotton-seeds, coarse cotton cloth, sarees, kardi oil, and oil cake are the chief articles of export. The figures taken from the municipal records show that imports and exports amounted to Rs. 24,22,678 and Rs. 8,52,295 respectively during the year under report.

- 51. At Jamkhandi, Banhatti, Asangi and a few adjoining villages a considerable industry of dying of yarn and silk and weaving of sarees and coarse cloth is carried on. The total number of handlooms working is 2565 of which 167 are used for weaving rough woolen blankets and the rest are used for the manufacture of cotton goods.
- 52. The State owns a Ginning Factory and a Cotton Press at Jamkhandi. About 25 candies of cotton were ginned and 2000 bales were pressed with the result that the State realized a net income of Rs. 14,924. The slight decrease in the yield of cotton and a general fall in the prices did not keep the factories working through out the season.
- 53. Besides these two State Factories there are 6 ginning Factories at Jamkhandi and 12 in Kundgol Taluka. All of them had no sufficient work on account of poor and dull season.
- 54. Jamkhandi is well known for the supply of good quality of Karadi oil. This oil is pressed out from Karadi in country oil mills. The number of such mills is 52.

#### Fairs and Shows.

- 55. The following four fairs were held in the State as usual during the year.
  - (1) The Cattle Fair at, Jamkhandi was held in the month of April. The number of cattle brought for Exhibition and sale was 7058 as against 6256 of the last year,

    The Chief addressed the agriculturists on the importance and necessity of good cattle breeding and urged that good farming depended mostly on healthy and well-bred cattle and that he would be prepared to help them in their attempts to improve the breed. 44 prizes for well-bred animals were distributed in a Darbar specially held for the purpose.
  - (2) The Bramhadeva Fair at Kundgol was held in the month of June.
  - (3) The Basavana Fair at Kadpatti was held in the month of August.
    - (4) Shri Venkoba Fair at Kalhalli was held in the month of October.

#### Post Offices and Mints.

#### POST OFFICES.

56. There are in all nine post offices in the State which are under the control and management of the British Government. Of these two are combined Post and Telegraph Offices, one at Jamkhandi and the other at Ramtirth. Kundgol and Saunshi being Railway Stations have no separate Telegraph Offices. A Telephone

service is maintained at Jamkhandi and Ramtirth. It is very useful in facilitating communications between several offices and institutions.

57. There is no mint in the State.

#### Public Works.

- 58. Appendix XIX shows the details of expenditure on Public Works from State and Local Funds.
- 59. The total expenditure on public works was Rs. 1,18,054 as against 94,026 of last year. The more important works executed were:—
- (1) Construction of a new Chavadi at Kumbharhal, (2) Erection of compound walls for the High School, Ferris School and Dhed School buildings, (3) Construction of a new Jakat Naka near Bhandegani, (4) Construction of a new kitchen in the Prince of Wales Hospital for indoor patients, (5) Construction of an armourer's shop near the Body Guard lines, (6) Construction of a new school building at Kadpatti in Kundgol Taluka, (7) Erection of a new shed for witnesses and parties attending the Sub-Judge Court at Kundgol, (8) Completion of a new Dharmashala at Shiravade in Wathar Thana, (9) Sinking a new well at Hosur, (10) Erection of a dam near Siddapur Tank.
- 60. In addition to the above mentioned works annual repairs to all roads, schools, temples, chavadies, Dharamashalas and ferries were carried out.

## CHAPTER V.

#### REVENUE AND FINANCE.

- 61. Appendix XXII shows the different heads of receipts and expenditure as also the general condition of finances of the State as compared with that of the last year.
- 62. The gross income and expenditure during the year under report amounted to Rs. 9,84,530 and Rs. 8,30,809 respectively as against Rs. 10,66,068 and Rs. 10,27,159 of the past year. The causes of increase and decrease under the several heads have been given where necessary in the column of remarks of the Appendix.
- 63. The State Bank is working satisfactorily and is appreciated by the agriculturists and the middle classes. The average rate of interest is 6 p. c. per annum whereas the local current rate of interest is from 12 to 18 p. c. During the year Rs. 28,775 were advanced on the security of gold and Rs. 66,120 on that of land.

### CHAPTER VI.

#### MEDICAL RELIEF AND VITAL STATISTICS.

#### Medical Relief.

- 64. The State maintains one central Hospital at Jamkhandi and three Dispensaries outside. No fees are charged. Appendix XXIII shows the details of work done and the total expenditure incurred. All of them are doing useful and satisfactory work. The total number of operations performed was 1385 as against 1900 of the last year.
- 65. All the Medical Officers are qualified men, two being University Graduates and four Sub-Assistant Surgeons. Besides there is one qualified lady Doctor attached to the Central Hospital who with her staff of nurses is very useful to female patients.
- 66. The Jamkhandi Municipality maintains an Ayurvedic Dispensary. It is generally attended by orthodox class of people.

#### Vital Statistics.

- 67. Appendix XXIV gives details about the Vital Statistics for the year under report as compared with that of the last year.
- 68. Plague made its appearance in three villages viz., Kundgol, Benkanhalli and Shiravade. But the vigorous measures taken to suppress it in—time did not allow it to continue for a long time. Only 27 persons fell victim to it.
  - 69. There were no cases of cholera and influenza.
- 70. Four deaths occurred from small-pox and those from amongst the non-vaccinated.

#### Sanitation.

71. There is no special Sanitary Department in the State. The Municipalities look after sanitation in their areas. In villages it is looked after by Village and Taluka Officers. Of late Sanitary Committees have been organised in 11 important Villages and the villagers have begun to realise the utility and benefits of such Committees and have commenced to take interest in the work.

#### Vaccination.

72. The following statement shows the work done by the Vaccination Department as compared with that of the last year:-

73. Revaccination was done in 113 cases out of which 30 proved unsuccessful and 18 did not present themselves for inspection.

### CHAPTER VII

#### PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

- 74. Appendix XXV gives the classification of different schoools with particulars regarding attendance and expenditure thereon.
- 75. Primary education has been free in the State. The perceptage of school going boys and girls to the entire population in the State is the same as last year, i. e. 6. Female education is well attended to. Free boarding and scholarships are given to poor and deserving students irrespective of caste and creed. The number of such free boarders is 50. Clothes and books are also given free of charge to the boys of backward classes with a view to encourage education amongst them. A special class for the untouchables is attached to the Vernacular School No. 2 at Jamkhandi which meets in the same building. This building is known as the Dhed School.
- 76. The number of schools for boys and girls remained the same as last year. During the year under report scout training was carefully attended to under the supervision of the two specially trained teachers. The class of singing and playing on harmonium which came to be attached last year to the vernacular school at Jamkhandi is showing good progress and is fully taken advantage of by the pupils. The figures of attendance in general show an increase which is a satisfactory feature and a sure index of the appreciation by the subjects of the boon of free education. The general progress is satisfactory.

- 77. The State maintains a separate Urdu School at Jamkhandi for boys and girls. There are 57 boys and 10 girls in this school. This small number is due to the fact that a number of Mahomedan boys attend the Marathi School as English is taught in the High School through the medium of Marathi and as Marathi happens to be the Court language. One Urdu Class is attached to the Marathi School at Kundgol for the benefit of Mahomedan boys.
- 78. In all 4051 students appeared for the various examinations and 3169 passed. The percentage of passes is 78 as against 75 of the last year, which speaks for itself as regards the general efficiency of the education imparted.
- 79. The number of boys in the Sanskrit Pathshala at Kundgol is 5 as against 8 of the last year.
- 80. The number of schools for girls remained the same as last year i.e. 4. The number of girls in these schools was 420 as against 413 of last year. There are 8 female teachers. The head mistress is a trained teacher.
- 81. In other places the girls are taught along with boys as the number is very small and not sufficient to open a separate class for them.
- 82. The number of ladies and grown up girls in the Home Classes is decreasing and the few that attend do not care to learn any-thing but sewing and needle work. It is a matter for serious consideration if these classes are to be continued when the money spent thereon could very well be utilised for adding English Standards to the girls' School where it is likely full advantage could be taken by girls attending higher vernacular standards.
- 83. Out of the three Anglo-Vernacular Schools, that at Kundgol is First Grade. During the year under report IV Standard was added to the Banhatti School. Both the Kundgol and Banhatti Schools are well attended and show very good progress. The School at Savalgi shows no progress and the attendance is meagre. The School Panchas and the Villagers have been told to increase the attendance or else the school will be closed. Secondary education is given practically free in view of the fact that a nominal fee of one anna only is being charged.
- 84. 53 students were sent for the School Leaving Certificate Examination from the P. B. High School and 15 only came out successful. This poor result though not creditable to the Staff is partly due to the liberal issue of forms this year consequent on the compartment system introduced by the University. 19 students appeared for the Elementary Art Examination and 13 for the Intermediate. In the former 10 and in the latter 7 came out successful.
- 85. Thirteen scholarships have been awarded by the State to deserving students for higher studies.

- 86. The total expenditure on Public Instruction was Rs. 85,932 as against Rs. 80,579 last year.
- 87. The establishment of a new Technical Institute on modest lines at Jamkhandi is under contemplation in memory of the late Chief and popular contributions for the purpose have been collected. A feasible scheme has been formulated under the advice of the Government Board for Technical Education and, it is hoped, will be put through not before long.
- 88. There are 8 private vernacular schools as against 7 of last year. The number of boys receiving instructions in these schools is Law Day Good College Hill Cons 252 as against 166 of last year. CHAPTER VIII.

- 89. The State maintains a Printing Press purely for State work. There is only one private Printing Press at Jamkhandi known as "the Hanuman Press". This Press does job work only.

### Railways, Markets and Water Supply.

- 94. The nearest Railway Station which connects Jamkhandi, the capital town of the State with the other centres of trade and activity is Kudchi. It is 34 miles from Jamkhandi. The introduction of Motor service has facilitated passenger traffic., It is not possible to improve the general trade and commerce of the State unless a branch line is opened between Raibag and Jamkhandi.
- 95. The benefits of the Cotton Market are being appreciated by all concerned and the opposition set up in the beginning both by the agriculturists and the merchants is disappearing. The State has made all possible arrangements for its location and supervision with a view that weighment is correctly and properly, done and the agriculturists are not deceived in any way. Prevailing rates

from different quarters are published daily for the guidance of the buyers and the sellers.

96. The question of water supply for the towns of Jamkhandi and Kundgol is receiving careful attention of the Chief. The Sanitary Engineer to the Government of Bombay who is drawing up these schemes has prepared rough estimates. The schemes are under consideration.

#### State Karbhari's Tour.

97. I made an annual tour of inspection in the Talukas and Thanas. Taluka and village accounts were carefully examined. Schools and dispensaries were visited. All wants of the Rayats were satisfied as far as possible and complaints were removed. All offices were inspected and the irregularities discovered were brought to the notice of the officers concerned.

#### Condition of the People.

98. During the year under report the Kharif crops failed for want of early rains and the out-turn of Rabi crops was also less than the normal. The cotton crop though not disappointing did not fetch good prices. The prices of food stuffs were comparatively low. The rates of wages both for the skilled and unskilled labour were slightly high. The slight decrease in the prices of food stuffs coupled with the high rates of wages enabled the poor and middle classes to live comfortably.

#### Concluding Remarks.

- 99. This in brief is the record of events connected with the administration of the State and the condition of the people during the year under report. The needs and comforts of the people were attended to. Justice was well administered and protection of life and property was ensured as far as possible. People on the whole were loyal and lawabiding.
- 100. The administration of the state was being carried on since June 1924 by a Council of Regency consisting of the Dowager Ranisaheb, myself and the Sar-Nyayadhish as members. The Dowager Ranisaheb exercised the powers of the Regent. The Resident at Kolhapur and Political Agent, S. M. C. States exercised the powers of the High Court. The establishment of such a Regency was an experiment, novel to the S. M. C. The Regency Administration terminated on the 28th of May 1926, when the Chief was invested with the full powers of the State, The experiment, novel as it was, was not an easy task. It would have been very difficult for me as Government Karbhari and the Chief Executive Officer to have brought it to a successful close without the hearty co-operation of my colleagues especially the Regent who evinced; a personal interest in all the affairs connected with the State. The period of the Regency though short was not without good results. The balance of the State increased in spite of the unusual and heavy expenditure that had to be

incurred in connection with defraying the expenses of the marriages and other ceremonies connected therewith and the celebrations of the birth of Yuvaraj. My sincere thanks are due to Colonel O'Brien, Colonel Pottinger, Major Macnabb, Major Lang and Major Campbell for the kind advice and counsel given to me from time to time which I needed most in carrying out this difficult experiment under the then peculiar circumstances.

101. In conclusion, the Chief has asked me to convey his sincere and cordial thanks to your goodself, to Major Macnabb and to Major Campbell and his sense of gratitude to the Government for the very valuable advice given to the State from time to time in important matters of administration.
