Note.—This enquiry has nothing whatever to do with taxation or rates. It is for the benefit of the people that the information asked for is obtained.

2. The particulars with regard to each family will be regarded as strictly private and confidential. All the statements will be put together in such a way as to produce general averages. It is these averages which will eventually be published. The identity of the hudgets will not be disclosed.

3. This Form is intended for middle class families in industrial centres. As the whole population consists of men, women and children, it is desirable that each family selected for this enquiry should consist of husband, wife and children.

4. Special attention should be given to cases of families living under ordinary conditions. The more ordinary the family the better because it represents a large number. Exceptional cases should be avoided, on the other hand, because they are not representative of any large number.

5. A separate form can be obtained for men living in towns single or in groups away from their homes in the country or mofussil.

6. The percentage expenditure on food is largely affected by the family incomethe percentage is high with poor families and falls as the income rises. It is, therefore, important to obtain a fair number of representative statements for families with different incomes. Thus families with fairly high incomes and families with low incomes should both be represented.

7. Statements should be obtained from all middle class localities. Otherwise they are open to criticism on the ground that they are not representative of the whole of the area. Similarly care should be taken to make the statements cover as large a number as possible of representative professions.

8. In selecting families those in which the head was normally employed for the whole month should be taken, and persons in casual employment should be excluded on the present occasion. The object is to obtain statements relating to normal conditions.

9. The dietaries of families belonging to different religions and castes frequently vary and therefore an endcavour should be made to ensure that the statements fairly represent all classes. Thus a considerable number of Hindu, Muhammadan, Parsi, Christian, Jew, etc., family statements should be collected.

10. There may be a tendency to overstate the expenditure and to understate the family income. Where the expenditure adds up to more than the total income the Investigator should make further enquiries. Cost por article.—In column 3 should be entered the price per article when purchased. If similar articles were purchased at different prices, the prices should be entered separately and the number of articles at each price shown.

Total cost.—Column 4 will be obtained by multiplying the number in column 2 by the price in column 3.

Duration of articles.—In column 5 should be entered the total time which each article may be expected to last from the date of its purchase to the date when it is finally discarded as useless.

Cost per month.—Column 6 will be obtained by dividing the total cost in column 4 by the number entered in column δ .

APPENDIX D

Engel's Law and the Middle Class Family Budget Investigation

Dr. Engel, Chief of the Royal Bureau of Statistics of Prussia has laid down certain well-known propositions regarding the relationship

between income and the percentage expenditure on various groups of items included in a family budget. The following are the four main propositions laid down by Dr. Engel :---

(1) The greater the income, the smaller the percentage of outlay on subsistence.

(2) The percentage of outlay for clothing is approximately the same whatever the income.

(3) The percentage for lodging or rent and for fuel and lighting is invariably the same whatever the income.

(4) As the income increases in amount the percentage of outlay on sundries becomes greater.

It is proposed to examine in this note the extent to which the present investigation bears out these propositions. Taking the first proposition, it will be seen that in the three income classes Rs. 75 and below Rs. 125, Rs. 125 and below Rs. 175 and Rs. 175 and below Rs. 225, the percentage expenditure on food is 45.5, 43.5 and 41.3 respectively. It is quite clear, therefore, that as income increases the percentage expenditure on food decreases. This proposition has been confirmed by the results of family budget investigations conducted in Australia, Germany and the United States.

In his second proposition Dr. Engel says that the percentage of outlay on clothing is approximately the same whatever the income. The truth of this proposition is brought out remarkably well by the present investigation which shows that in the three income classes the percentage of expenditure is very nearly the same being 10.3, 10.3 and 10.5 respectively. This proposition is confirmed in Australia but not in Germany and the United States where the percentage of expenditure on clothing increases as the size of the income increases.

According to the third proposition of Dr. Engel the percentage expenditure on rent and fuel and lighting is invariably the same whatever the income. This proposition is not borne out completely by the present investigation which shows that the percentage expenditure on rent and fuel and lighting respectively in the three income classes is 16.4, 14.6, 13.5 and 6.2, 5.5 and 4.9. The differences in the percentages of expenditure on rents among the three income classes are greater than those in the case of fuel and lighting. Perhaps this is due to the fact that at the time of the present investigation housing conditions in Bombay were not quite normal and families had often to spend more on rent than they desired or could afford.

Dr. Engel's proposition as regards rents is confirmed in Australia and the United States. In Germany neither part of the proposition is confirmed.

Dr. Engel's fourth proposition lays down that the percentage expenditure on sundries increases as the income increases and this is completely borne out by the results of the present investigation. It is seen that the percentage expenditure on miscellaneous items in the three income classes is 19[•]1, 23[•]7 and 27[•]3 respectively. This proposition is also confirmed in Australia, Germany and the United States.
