

FOREWORD

This bulletin reports the results of a survey of intercity motortruck freight transportation for hire, conducted in 1931 jointly by the Bureau of Public Roads of the United States Department of Agriculture and the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce of the United States Department of Commerce. The principal objects of the investigation were to secure available data on (1) motor equipment in use, particularly as to types and weights of vehicles, (2) radius of haul, and (3) costs of operation.

The survey was made under the general supervision of E. W. James, chief, division of highway transport, Bureau of Public Roads, and A. Lane Cricher, chief, division of transportation and communication, Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce. William G. Eliot, 3d, Robert A. Montgomery, and Frank B.
