

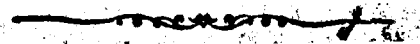

Sir,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report, together with the usual statistical tables on the Prisons and Jails in the Bombay Presidency (including the Province of the Sind and the Settlement of Aden), for the year 1909. The office of the Inspector-General of Prisons was held by me during the year under report.

### JUDICIAL.

2. The number of Central, District, Special and Extra-mural Prisons has undergone no change during the year under report. The accommodation of the Kárwár District Prison from April 1st, 1910, is however reduced from 252 to 178. I went into this matter very carefully at my annual inspection in November. The proper accommodation of this Prison is males 122, females 16, hospital 23, juveniles 5, undertrials 12, giving a total of 178 against the present total of 252. Statistics of all the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails have been grouped together with those of the Lock-ups as was done in previous years.

3. From the general summary preceding the statements in the appendices to this report, it will be seen that the total population of all classes of prisons, subsidiary jails, lock-ups and civil jails, during the year 1909, has been 91,265 against 90,408, an increase of 857. The daily average population has been 8,984, showing a decrease of 343 over the figures of the previous year.

4. The following table, which compares the figures of the past two years, refers to the admission of convicts into Prisons and 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails only :—

5. There has been a decrease in the number of convicts admitted. The two Bombay Prisons, the Central Prisons of Yeránda and Hyderabad, and the Prisons of Dhulia, Kárwár, Rájkot and Sukkur show a decline, while the Ahmedabad Central Prison and the Prisons of Dhárwár, Karáchi, Bijápur, Ratnágiri and Aden show a marked increase. The increase in the Dhárwár Prison is mainly due to cases of dacoity, while at Ahmedabad it is attributable to petty thefts and convictions under the A'bkári Act. In the Karáchi Prison, the increase was due to the prevalence of Cerebro-spinal Meningitis in the

Hyderabad Central Prison, which necessitated the closing of that prison to new admissions throughout the year. In Bijápur, the increase is due to one big dacoity case.

6. With regard to the disposal of convicts, there is an increase under the head "Transferred to other Jails". This is due to large batches of prisoners having been transferred from the Common Prison and Yeránda Central Prison to the Deccan Convict Gang, and from Karáchi and Sukkur to the Sind Gang. The headings "Released on appeal" and "Executed" show an increase, while the headings "Released on expiry of sentence," "Under Remission Rules" and "Escaped" show a decline over the figures for the year 1903. As no Royal Indian Marine steamer was available, no transports were deported to the Andamans during the year under report. Of the 33 prisoners released by order of Government, 6 males and 2 females were released on the ground of sickness, one each from H. M.'s Common Prison, Karáchi Prison, Ahmedabad Central Prison and Godhra Subsidiary Jail, and 3 males and 1 female from the Yeránda Central Prison. Five ex-military convicts were sent to England from H. M.'s House of Correction. Seventeen unfit life transports were released—10 from Yeránda, 4 from Ahmedabad, and 1 each from H. M.'s Common Prison, Thána and Bijápur Prisons. Three prisoners, one each from Dhárwár, Ahmedabad and Aden, were released on other grounds. The heading "Transferred to Lunatic Asylum" shows a decrease of 2 over the figures of the year previous. The number of deaths shows a decrease of 8, which will be commented on later. There were no State prisoners in confinement at the close of the year.

7. It will be observed from the figures appearing in the statement noted in the margin that there is an increase under the sub-head "Eurasians" and "All other classes" while all other heads under "Religion" show a decrease.

8. The number of juveniles admitted during the year under report was 60 against 62 in the year previous, or a decrease of 2 only. The prisons of Ahmedabad and Yeránda show an increase. Of the 48 male and 12 female youthful offenders convicted, 24 males and 6 females were sentenced to one month and under, 22 males and 6 females to above one month and under six months, and 2 males to over six months. Out of 60 admitted, 7 males had previous convictions. Out of the total of 60 juveniles admitted, 14 were sent to the Reformatory by the District Magistrates on reference from the Superintendents. I repeat my remark in former reports to Government that this system of awarding short sentences of imprisonment to juvenile offenders is one without a redeeming good point. I briefly give a few instances of what, in my opinion, are ill-considered sentences :—

All other sub-heads show a decrease with the exception of the sub-head "Above 60" under males. Under the head "Education of Convicts," the sub-head "Able to read and write" show an increase of 138 over the figures of the year previous. With the exception of the sub-heads "Persons employed under Government or Municipal Authorities," "Persons

engaged in commerce and trade" and "Miscellaneous persons not classified otherwise," all other sub-heads of "Previous occupation" show a decrease. The percentage of the total number admitted to free population according to the census of 1901, is 0.155 during the year as compared with 0.156 in 1908.

9. There has been a decrease under the heads "Not exceeding one month," "Above three months and not exceeding one year" and "Term transports," while all other heads show an increase. There were 1,044 prisoners sentenced to simple imprisonment, 14,371 sentenced to rigorous imprisonment and 94 sentenced to rigorous imprisonment with whipping as compared with 1,038, 14,564 and 184 in the year previous. The number of prisoners sentenced to rigorous imprisonment with solitary confinement was 359 as compared with 349 in 1908, 406 in 1907, and 450 in 1906. Proper accommodation for carrying out sentences of solitary confinement is still needed in many Jails. Superintendents, in order to carry out these sentences, have been hampering themselves by using nearly all the solitary cells for this purpose. I have now directed that in future at least half the cells shall be reserved for prison punishments. In spite of every endeavour, it has been found impossible to carry out all the sentences awarded, and this difficulty will be more marked in the coming year. The bulk of prisoners sentenced to solitary confinement came from Bombay City, and they have to be distributed throughout the Presidency. 5,183 persons were sentenced to "Not exceeding one month" as compared with 5,342 in 1908. Of these, 2,753 were admitted to the Common Prison, Bombay.

10. The statement noted in the margin deals with re-convicted prisoners. The number of habituals identified by the Jail officials after arrival in Jail has risen from 208 in 1908 to 288 in the year under report. 1,810 were classified as habituals out of a total of 3,358 previously convicted prisoners against 1,967 out of 3,271 in the year 1908.

11. It appears from the information supplied by the Inspector-General of Police that 1,405 persons were identified in the Bombay Presidency inclusive of Sind as compared with 1,302 in the year previous. Of the 1,405 prisoners, 159 were identified in Bombay, 41 in Bijápúr, 91 in Dhárwár, 165 in Dhulia, 138 in Thána, 202 in Ahmedabad, 230 at Yeránda, 50 in Ahmednagar, 58 in Belgaum, 66 in Násik, 82 in Sholápur, 47 in Sátára, 31 in Surat and the rest in other parts of the Presidency.

The tendency throughout the world is to deal in a more deterrent manner with habituals. Prisoners in England now can get an additional sentence if proved habituals. In New South Wales, the principle has been adopted in its entirety of giving a definite term of imprisonment for the actual offence followed by an indeterminate sentence on account of the prisoner's record. Similar procedure has been introduced in New Zealand, South Australia, Victoria and Tasmania. Against those who habitually and as a profession violate the laws of society, it is necessary to adopt special measures. The moment it is recognized that the habitual criminal's profession is crime, it follows that nothing will prevent him from following that profession until he recognises that the risks have become so great that the game is not worth the candle. This is the case when there is almost a certainty that a criminal at his 7th or 8th conviction will receive a really deterrent sentence. An indeterminate sentence has been adopted in Australia to meet the case. But in India under section 75, the same principle can be followed. And if each habitual got 14 years or life at his 7th or 8th conviction, crime would rapidly show a decrease. Here lies a most excellent weapon if properly used. Many Courts do use it most efficiently, but the following cases—there are dozens of like ones—illustrate why crime goes on. A prisoner's career *may* be cut short by a long sentence, but he can always reckon on the chance of an indefinite number of small sentences awarded on no system of any kind :—

S. M. Classed Habitual. Sentence 14 months and 1 month solitary confinement, section 381. Previous convictions (1) 380, 7 days; (2) 379, 7 days; (3) 380, 2 months; (4) 380, 3 months; (5) 380 and 420, 12 months.

E. J. Classed Habitual. Sentence 2 years and Rs. 50 or 6 months, section 380. Previous convictions (1) Drunk, 15 days; (2) 380, 1 month; (3) 380, 6 months; (4) 380, 3 months; (5) 43-15-56, 3 months; (6) 379, 9 months and 20 stripes; (7) 393, 2 years and 3 months' solitary confinement; (8) 326, 6 months and Rs. 75 or 3 months; (9) 323, 15 days, Rs. 15 or 15 days; (10) 352, Rs. 2 or 4 days; (11) 352, Rs. 10 or 7 days.

C. C. Classed Habitual. Sentence one month, theft. Previous convictions (1) 380, 1 month; (2) 380, 2 months; (3) 411, 3 months; (4) 380 and 75, 18 months; (5) 109, 1 year; (6) 379 and 75, 1 year; (7) 454 and 384, 6 months; (8) 414, 2 years; (9) 379, 2 years and 20 stripes; (10) 380, 9 months; (11) 380, 2 years. It is worth noting in this case that after 11 convictions, he gets the same sentence for the last as for the first offence.

D. R. Classed Habitual. Sentence 2 years' rigorous imprisonment and solitary confinement 2 months and to report residence for 5 years. Previous convictions (1) 403, 1 month; (2) 380, 3 months; (3) 411, 6 months; (4) 380, Rs. 6 or 6 days; (5) Drunk, Rs. 2 or 2 days; (6) 379, 1 month; (7) 380, 15 days; (8) 379, 6 months; (9) 379, 2 years; (10) 379, 3 months; (11) Drunk, Rs. 3 or 3 days; (12) 379, 109, 2 years and Rs. 100 or 6 months; (13) 379, 2 years, 15 stripes and to report residence for 5 years; (14) 379, 4 months.

12. The number of escapes during the year under report has been 7 against 20 in the year previous. Of the 7 escapes, one was from inside the Ratnágiri Prison, one from inside the Belgaum Jail, while one each occurred from extra-mural parties at the Hyderabad, Sukkur, Aden Prison, and two from the Sind Gang. Detailed reports on the escapes from the Ratnágiri Prison and the Belgaum Subsidiary Jail were submitted to Government, and the officials at fault were dealt with as per this office Nos. 9618 and 13468, dated respectively the 1st September and 1st December 1909. The warders at fault were dealt

with departmentally in all cases save at Hyderabad. This warder was prosecuted and sentenced to a fine of Rs. 50 or in default one month's simple imprisonment.

13. The statement noted in the margin relates to offences committed by and the punishments awarded to convicts confined in the Prisons and the 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails. The offences dealt with by Criminal Courts show an increase of 14 over the figures for the year previous as will be seen from the details given below. The increase is due to 1 under work, 7 under assaults, 6 under escapes. Two prisoners, prosecuted for unnatural offence and attempt to commit suicide respectively, were acquitted :—

15. The following table shows the nature of the punishments awarded during the past two years. It will be seen that the total number of major and minor punishments awarded by Superintendents during the year under report was 21,683 and the total number of offences 21,086. The difference is due to 602 offences having been dealt with during the year 1909 by the award of combined punishments :—

16. Of the 21,683 punishments awarded by the Superintendents of Prisons and Jails, 13,763 or 63 per cent. belong to the minor class and 7,925 or 37 per cent. belong to the major class. The increase in major punishments is more apparent than real. Under the old mark rules forfeiture of prospective remission up to 6 days in the case of a convict, 10 days if a night watchman, 15 days if a convict overseer, and 20 days if a convict warder, counted as a minor punishment. From January 1st, under the new remission rules, all forfeiture of remission over 3 days counts as a major punishment. In Yerávida alone this accounts for an increase of 521 in major punishments. The sub-heads "Warning and penal diet" under "Minor punishments" and "Penal diet with solitary confinement," "Fetters or hand-cuffing behind or to a staple" and "Other punishments" under "Major punishments" show an increase, while all other sub-heads show a decline. The Prisons of Yerávida, Kárwár, Ratnágiri, Ahmedabad, Karáchi, Dhulia, Aden and Common Prison, and the Sind and Deccan Gangs show an increase, while all others show a decline. The increase in punishments in the Deccan Convict Gang, Ratnágiri, Sukkur and Aden is due to increased population. In the Yerávida Central Prison, the increase is due to a large proportion of offences relating to work, chiefly grinding grain and weaving. The Press shows an increase of 379. 517 habituais account for 2,700 punishments, many being very turbulent and idle. In Kárwár and Ratnágiri, the increase is due to a much-needed improvement in the discipline of these Jails. The previous Jailors had been very inefficient and it was found necessary to dismiss or transfer a large proportion of the warder staff. The increase in the Common Prison is due to the more frequent discovery of illicit articles. The Superintendent attributes this to frequent change of Jailors and the increase in the warder staff. This latter factor applies to almost every Jail that shows an increase. Out of a total of 21,086 offences, 2,318 habituais were responsible for 8,177 and 4,384 non-habituais for the balance of 12,909 offences. The actual percentage of habituais to other Prisoners is only 12.7. From the above it will be seen that only 6,802 prisoners were punished, and the number who actually had passed through the prisons and Jails was 23,194. Very many of these prisoners were only punished once, the punishment frequently being only a warning—2,498 warnings were actually given. Of the total number of punishments, 1,895 were inflicted on convict officers for negligence in the discharge of their duties.

17. The subjoined table gives particulars as to the number of stripes inflicted on prisoners in our prisons during the year under report. It will be seen that although the total number of corporal punishments shows a decline

of 13 over the figures for the past year, there is an increase in certain prisons. These are Dhulia, Deccan Convict Gang, Ratnágiri, Thána and Hyderabad. Out of the 37 corporal punishments inflicted at Yeránda, 30 were awarded to habituals. Of these, 8 were for assaults, 10 for persistent short work, 5 for refusing to work, 5 for creating disturbances, 1 for persistent malingering and 1 for grossly indecent conduct. Of the 7 casuals flogged, 2 were for assault, 1 grossly indecent behaviour, 1 creating disturbance and 1 persistent short work. In Hyderabad 4 were punished for refusing to work, 4 for persistent short work and 2 for insubordinate behaviour. In the Ratnágiri Prison, 3 were punished for assault, 1 for insubordinate behaviour and 1 for throwing night-soil on a warder. The prisoners in Ratnágiri resented the tightening of discipline and assaulted the Jailor and a warder. In the Deccan Gang, 3 for refusing to go on extra-mural work and 2 for making spear heads.

18. During the year under report, 7,498 prisoners were fettered as compared with 6,725 during the year previous. The increase is due to the increased number of punishments awarded.

### REMISSION SYSTEM.

19. The new remission system sanctioned by the Government of India *vide* Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 4414, dated 24th August 1908, was brought into force from 1st January 1909. It will be seen from the figures appearing in Statement C appended to this report that 2,467 prisoners were released during the year under the remission system as compared with 2,743 in the year previous. The percentage during the year 1909 of those released under the remission system to the total number, who might have been released under that system if of average good conduct up to the date of release, was 97.5 against 98.0 in 1908. The practice of mustering prisoners and reading and explaining to them the benefits of the remission rules has been continued. Special award under Rule 513—remission for committing no offence during the

previous 12 months—was granted to 1,054 prisoners as against 1,238 in the year previous. So far as I can judge, this new system of awarding remission is a great improvement. Superintendents and Jailors are unanimous in its favour and testify to the great saving of clerical work. Prisoners have a much clearer idea of what remission they have and are earning, and even the most illiterate prisoners have some fair idea of the subject.

20. The average number employed as Prison Officers during the year under report in our Prisons and 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails was 950 males and 11 females against 991 males and 9 females in 1908. I will deal further with this subject under the Special Class at Thána.

Statement No. VII—Convict Officers.

21. The statement noted in the margin shows the different diet scales in use in Prisons and 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails. These scales have been found to work satisfactorily. Such changes as have been made during the year are noted in the fifth column of this statement.

Statement No. VIII—Diet.

22. The statistics of undertrial prisoners confined in our Prisons, Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups are embodied in the statement noted in the margin. The number of prisoners admitted during the year under report shows an increase of 1,302 over the figures for the year previous. The daily average strength has also risen from 1,363 in 1908 to 1,392 in 1909, due to increased admissions.

Statement No. XVIII—Undertrial Prisoners.

23. The number of escapes from 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups shows a decrease of 9 over the figures for the past year. Of the 14 escapes, 2 each occurred from the Subsidiary Jails in the districts of Broach, Bijápur and Sholápur, 1 each from the Jails in the Karáchi, Hyderabad, Ahmedabad, Ratnágiri and Thána Districts, and 1 each from the Lock-ups in the districts of Ahmedabad, Poona and Sátára.

24. The number of deaths shows an increase of 2 over the figures for the year previous. Of the 22 deaths, 4 occurred in Prisons and 18 in 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups. Of the 18 deaths, 2 died of cholera, 3 from dysentery, 2 from malarial fever, 2 from pneumonia, 4 from tubercle, 1 from asthma, 1 from enlargement of spleen, 1 from rupture of spleen, and 1 from old age and debility. One female prisoner committed suicide in the Sindkheda Subsidiary Jail in West Klándesh.

25. The number remaining on 31st December 1909 was 218 males and 18 females in Prisons, 87 males and 7 females in the 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails, and 864 males and 49 females in the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups, thus making a total of 1,169 males and 74 females.

26. In the beginning of the year 1909, there were 59 male and 1 female prisoners in the Civil Jails. The number admitted during the year was 938 male and 2 female prisoners. 932 males and 3 females were released and one male died during the year under report, thus leaving a balance of 57 males at the close of the year 1909. The daily average number has been 57 as against 51 in the year previous. The total cost and cost per head have respectively been Rs. 5,790-1-3 and Rs. 101-9-3 during the year under report as against Rs. 5,807-14-2 and Rs. 113-14-1 in the year previous.

Civil Prisoners.

## FINANCIAL.

27. The statements noted in the margin deal with the gross expenditure on account of convicted and undertrial prisoners confined in the Central, District and Extra-mural Prisons, and the Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups. The cost of Police guards has been omitted as usual except in the case of the Central Prisons of Yerárda and Ahmedabad, and the Special Prison of Thána, where the guarding is undertaken by the Reserved Armed Warder Guard. The

realization from the sale-proceeds of garden produce has been deducted from the total charges. The gross expenditure during the year 1909 has been Rs. 8,73,164 and the cost per head Rs. 98-2-4 against Rs. 8,45,354 and Rs. 91-2-2 in the year previous.

28. The total cost under this head has risen from Rs. 2,85,114 in 1908 to Rs. 2,98,656 or an increase of Rs. 13,542. The increase is entirely due to the revision of the Warder Establishment, grant of Bombay allowance and of grain compensation to low-paid subordinates during the year.

29. Both the total cost and cost per head have risen from Rs. 3,87,088 and Rs. 41-11-8 to Rs. 3,95,678 and Rs. 44-5-2, respectively, during the year under report. The increase is due to unfavourable contract rates for staple food-grains and the improved scale of diet allowed to prisoners in 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails, *vide* Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 1389, dated 8th March 1909. As remarked in last year's report, it was anticipated that a favourable monsoon would produce a fall in the prices of food-grains, but this hope was not fulfilled.

30. The value of vegetables and other supplies from the gardens attached to our Prisons and Jails shows a decrease of Rs. 939 over the figures for the year 1908, the figures being Rs. 17,280 in 1909 against Rs. 18,218 in the year previous. The gardens attached to the Prisons of Yeravda, Dhulia, Dhárwár, Kárwár, Thána and Hyderabad are responsible for this decrease. In Yeravda failure of seedlings, in Dhulia scarcity of canal water, in Thána depletion of the Special Class and in Hyderabad the slackness of the Jailor were the respective causes of the decline.

31. The total cost and cost per head under "Hospital Charges" has been Rs. 36,836 and Rs. 4-2-0 against Rs. 38,982 and Rs. 4-3-3, respectively, during the year previous. The decrease is mainly due to a smaller number of prisoners being admitted into the Hospital for sickness. The decrease is most marked in the Prisons of Yeravda, Bijápur, Kárwár, Thána, Hyderabad and Common Prison.

32. The expenditure under this heading has risen from Rs. 30,277 in 1908 to Rs. 32,002 in 1909. This is due to articles of clothing indented for by the Deccan Convict Gang during 1908 being received and adjusted in the early part of 1909. The cost per head has also risen from Rs. 3-4-3 in 1908 to Rs. 3-9-4 during the year under report.

33. The total cost and cost per head under this head has risen from Rs. 19,525 and Rs. 2-1-8 in 1908 to Rs. 20,069 and Rs. 2-4-0 during the year under report. The sub-heads "Charges for Conservancy, Washing and Purifying" and "Charges for Water-supply" show an increase while the sub-head "Extraordinary Charges" show a decline. The increase under the first heading is due to repairs to conservancy carts and larger purchases of coal tar in the Ahmedabad Central Prison, and under the second head it is due to heavier charges for water-supply being paid by the Thána Special Prison for increased population and to the payment of arrears of these charges by the Rájkot Prison.

34. This head shows an increase of Rs. 1,322, the figures for 1909 being Rs. 29,803 and Rs. 3-5-5 as against Rs. 28,481 and Rs. 3-1-2 in 1908, due to the increased number of transfers.

35. The total cost and cost per head has risen from Rs. 31,847 and Rs. 3-6-11 in 1908 to Rs. 34,804 and Rs. 3-14-5 in 1909, respectively. The increase is due to the lighting of the Yeravda Central Prison by electricity and to the purchase of a well and land for the Bijápur Prison, *vide* Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 1915, dated 23rd Feb-

ruary 1909. Electricity will not again be used for lighting at Yeravda until the accumulators are provided.

36. The total cost under this head shows a decrease of Rs. 165 on the figures for the year previous, while the cost per head is just the same as that of the past year.  
Travelling Allowance.
37. The expenditure under this head has risen from Rs. 12,660 and Rs. 1-5-10 in 1908 to Rs. 17,548 and Rs. 1-15-5, respectively, in the year under report. The increase is entirely due to the adjustment of Rs. 8,185 having been shown against this office under the head "Charges for Registers and Stationery" as against Rs. 2,618 in the year previous, the Yeravda Prison Press having printed larger stock of printed forms and bound books which will last for the next two years.  
Contingencies.
38. The total cost and cost per head under this head has fallen from Rs. 6,984 and Re. 0-12-1 in 1908 to Rs. 6,507 and Re. 0-11-8 during the year under report. The decrease is due to fewer purchases of Dead Stock Articles.  
Extraordinary Charges for Live-stock, Tools and Plant.
39. The statement noted in the margin deals with the employment of convicts in our Prisons, and 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails. It will be seen that the daily average number of prisoners sentenced to labour has fallen in our Prisons from 7,555 in 1908 to 7,168 in 1909, while the figures for the 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails are identical with those for the year previous. All the heads with the exception of "Manufactures" show a decrease which is due to the smaller number of prisoners confined during the year under report.  
Statement No. XI—Employment of Convicts.
40. The marginally noted statement deals with the net cash earnings of convicts sentenced to labour. The cash earnings have increased from Rs. 85,100 in 1908 to 90,145 in the year under report. The Common Prison, Yeravda Central Prison, Deccan Convict Gang and Sind Gang, and the Prisons of Bijápur, Kárwár, Ratnágiri, Thána, Karághi and Aden show an increase, while all other Prisons show a decrease. The decline is most marked in the Prisons of Dhulia, Dhárwár, Ahmedabad, Rájkot, Hyderabad, Sukkur and House of Correction.  
Statement No. XII—Net Cash Earnings.
- Dhulia.*—To writing off Dead Stock and a sum paid to the Dhulia Exhibition of Rs. 84.
- Dhárwár.*—To the purchase of Rs. 6,068-4-2 of teak wood, which is bought for seasoning.
- Ahmedabad.*—To the accumulation of 2,000 Police suits for distribution early in April, the accumulation of cloth for the same purpose and increase in raw materials in store.
- Rájkot.*—The small decrease is due to less demand.
- Hyderabad.*—No extra-mural labour and reduced tasks on account of Cerebro-spinal Meningitis.
- Sukkur.*—Due to increase in raw materials on hand.
- House of Correction.*—The small decrease is due to purchase of better quality of coir.

In the Yeravda Central Prison out of Rs. 36,816, the Prison Factory shows a profit of Rs. 6,486, while Rs. 30,330 are for the Press. The large increase in the Press is due to increased output and to the return of a greater number of empty packing cases for which the Press had not to incur any extra expenditure. Out of the sum of Rs. 90,145 mentioned at the commencement of this paragraph, a sum of Rs. 65,253 represents the profits of our Prison Factories, Rs. 23,636 of extra-mural labour and Rs. 1,256 of our 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails. The average cash earnings per head of those sentenced to labour and of these employed on manufactures in the case of Prisons and 1st

and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails have risen from Rs. 32-11-0 and Rs. 10-15-0 in 1908 to Rs. 33-15-0 and Rs. 12-3-0, respectively, during the year under report.

41. During the year under report, Jail-made articles of the value of Rs. 22,016 as detailed below, were sold to Government Departments against Rs. 19,620 in the year previous or an increase of Rs. 2,396 :—

42. This Gang was located at Ganja Takar near Hyderabad throughout the year. With an average population of 432, the Gang has earned Rs. 16,440 in 1909 against Rs. 10,359 with an average of 459 prisoners in the year previous. The increase is mainly due to the sale of metal which was on hand at the close of 1908. Throughout the year the prisoners were employed in breaking metal in the quarries near the camp.

43. This Gang was located at Visapur in the Ahmednagar District throughout the year. With an average of 600 prisoners, the Deccan Gang. Gang has earned Rs. 6,550 in 1909 against Rs. 5,769 with an average of 581 in 1908. The increase is chiefly due to the average number employed on works being more than in the previous year.

44. The net profit of the Quinine Industry in the Central Prisons of Yeravda and Hyderabad amounted to Rs. 3,682-15-2 during the year as against Rs. 4,222-4-11 in 1908. The Central Prison of Yeravda shows a profit of Rs. 2,487-1-4 while a sum of Rs. 1,195-13-10 represents the profit of the Hyderabad Central Prison. The value of quinine, packing materials, service stamps and establishment charges amounted to Rs. 24,252-13-11 during the year against Rs. 27,017-7-4 in 1908, and the amount paid into the Treasury during the year under report was Rs. 27,841-10-7 against Rs. 31,575-11-7 in the year previous. During 1910, the packet of quinine will be raised from 7 to 10 grains without any increase in the price of the article.

45. In addition to supplying the requirements of this Department, the Yeravda Prison Press has, during the year under report, printed forms for all Government Departments with the exception of the Civil Medical forms. The total number of forms, envelopes and books supplied to all the Departments was respectively 29,277,944; 9,469,925; and 2,41,531 against 20,106,644; 7,174,232; and 99,570 in the year previous. The net profit is Rs. 94,313 against 65,000 in the year 1908. The engines have been running fairly satisfactorily during the year, and the expert opinion is that with the introduction of accumulators, the plant will run smoothly and efficiently. Full reports on the Press and allied matters were submitted to Government and orders have been issued thereon.

46. The statement noted in the margin shows the total cost of maintenance for all Prisons, Subsidiary Jails and Look-ups. The Statement No. XIII—Net Cost. total expenditure, excluding charges for inspection and general superintendence, has amounted to Rs. 8,30,113 during the year under report against Rs. 8,03,441 in 1908, or an increase of Rs. 26,672. The total cash earnings have been Rs. 90,145 against Rs. 85,100 in the year 1908, thus making a net cost to Government of Rs. 7,39,968 during the year against Rs. 7,18,341 in the year previous. The average net cost to Government per prisoner has been Rs. 82-14-0 in 1909 against Rs. 77-7-0 in 1908. The increase is due to the revision of the Warder Establishment and to the dearness of staple food-grains.



## VITAL.

47. The statement noted in the margin deals with the sickness and mortality of all classes during the year. The following table compares the figures for 1908-1909 of prisoners confined in Central, District, Special and Extra-mural Prisons, Subsidiary Jails, Civil Jails and Lock-ups :—

48. The death-rate for the year is 17.5 almost the same as that for 1908 (17.4), and the lowest recorded for 30 years save in 1905, when it was 17.1. Of the 137 prisoners who died in our prisons, 4 were admitted dying, 38 in bad health, of whom 25 were suffering from the disease which ultimately proved fatal, and 23 in fair health, the remainder in good health.

49. There were three cases of plague, of which two died. All these occurred in the Dhárwár Prison where rats had been dying for some time, plague being prevalent in the village of Saidápur close to the prison. All the prisoners had been inoculated and I am confident that to this is due the circumscribed nature of the outbreak. The prison was much overcrowded at times through unavoidable circumstances which have already been reported in detail to Government.

50. There was constant overcrowding in the following prisons, H. M.'s Common Prison, Dhárwár and Sukkur, and occasional overcrowding at House of Correction, Yeránda, Bijápur, Thána, Ahmedabad, Rájkot and Karáchi. The excess over accommodation was very slight at Thána, Rájkot, Karáchi, Bijápur, Yeránda and the House of Correction. Overcrowding at Ahmedabad has been relieved by a well ventilated workshop which is not used during the day. The overcrowding at the Common Prison could not be avoided, constant transfers of all long-termers were made and the excess number of prisoners slept in open sheds used for coir work. The overcrowding at Dhárwár was due to the influx of large numbers of under-trials, the overcrowding was relieved as far as possible by transfers to other prisons; plans are before Government for increasing the under-trial accommodation of this Prison. The overcrowding at Sukkur was from April to October when all prisoners sleep in the open, it was not therefore material.

51. The following prisons which show a death-rate of over 20 *per mille* are dealt with in detail :—

*H. M.'s Common Prison.*—42.4 per mille. There were 17 deaths. Of these 7 general paralysis of the insane, tubercle of lung (2), epilepsy, debility and rupture of spleen were admitted suffering from the disease from which they died. Of these 4 general paralysis of insane, tubercle, debility and rupture of spleen were moribund. The Bombay habitual is a syphilitic, malaria-sodden, debauched person. Every healthy prisoner is sent to the Deccan Gang and the residue are prisoners of poor physique.

*H. M.'s House of Correction.*—28.8 per mille, 6 deaths. Of these 4 were admitted in bad health, of whom one was suffering from abscess of the lung, of which disease he died, and one in very bad health, being admitted to hospital for enteritis, of which he died in a few days.

*Central Prison, Ahmedabad.*—23.9 per mille, 22 deaths. Of these cirrhosis of the liver and cerebral malaria were admitted suffering from the disease which ultimately proved fatal. Three deaths occurred from malarial cachexia, the infection was not contracted in the Ahmedabad Jail. There were only 25 cases of ordinary ague in the year, all, as far as I could judge, relapses of a previous

infection. There were 8 deaths from dysentery and diarrhoea, and special care is being devoted to the preparation of the food and the regular examination of any prisoner losing weight.

*District Prison, Karachi.*—21·6 per mille, 8 deaths. Of these 5, *viz.*, Leucocythæmia, tuberculosis of the lung, fatty degeneration of the heart, renal calculus, chronic dysentery were actually admitted suffering from the disease. The sixth death was from acute enteritis admitted into Prison with anæmia and enlarged liver and spleen. The seventh, a case of pneumonia, had extensive disease of the aortic valves existing for years before his entrance into jail. The eighth died of cerebro-spinal meningitis and was in good health on admission.

*Central Prison, Hyderabad.*—21·8 per mille. There were 17 admissions from cerebro-spinal meningitis with five deaths. The outbreak was investigated by Captain Stevenson, I. M. S., and a full report submitted to Government. Two Hospital Assistants have now been sanctioned to enable the Superintendent of the Prison to carry out the recommendations made by Captain Stevenson. One prisoner died from Diabetes from which he was suffering on admission. The other deaths were due to Tuberculosis 2, dysentery 4, pneumonia 2. The cooking in this Prison was unsatisfactory, it is now an object of special care.

*Central Prison, Sukkur.*—20·5 per mille, 12 deaths. Of these 3 from heat apoplexy. The Medical Officer reports that the hot weather was very trying and much damper than usual. Three deaths from malaria, all admitted, suffering from enlarged spleens and malarial infection. Malaria was prevalent in the district. One death from epilepsy admitted suffering from the disease. One death from hæmorrhage into the Pons Varolii admitted moribund. It will be seen that for at least 5 out of the 12 deaths, prison conditions are in no way responsible.

*Sind Gang, Ganja Takar.*—25·5 per mille, 11 deaths. 2 from dysentery, 1 from heat stroke and 8 from pneumonia. Owing to the closing of the Hyderabad Prison on account of Cerebro-spinal Meningitis, I had to draft freely to the Sind Gang and it was overcrowded during the last few months of the year. The extremes of temperature experienced by this Gang, the hard work, and the temporary nature of the buildings they are housed in, render the task of the Medical Officer a difficult one, and I am well pleased with the manner in which he has performed it.

52. The health of Yeravda 14·5, Dhulia 14·1, Dhárwár 10·8, Thána 8·6, Rájkot *nil*, Ratnágiri *nil*, Aden *nil*, has been very satisfactory. Of the 20 deaths at Yeravda, 4 died from senile decay. The Deccan Extra-mural Gang gives the extremely small death-rate of 6·7, a result equally creditable to the Superintendent and the Medical Officer.

53. During the past year the much needed extension of the Hospital in the Central Prison, Hyderabad, has been taken in hand and will be shortly completed. A similar extension is required at the Central Prison, Ahmedabad, and a Tubercle ward at the Central Prison, Yeravda. In the course of the year, I will ask Government to permit me to call for plans and estimates.

54. The following measures were adopted during the year under report, with a view to improve the health of the prisoners confined in our Prisons and Jails, and are inserted in accordance with the orders contained in paragraph 1 of Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 9115, dated 29th December 1896:—

- (1) Issue of wheat and rice in lieu of *bájrí* and *jowári*.
- (2) Issue of extra rations to weakly prisoners and convalescents.
- (3) Issue of 2 ozs. extra flour and 1 oz. molasses to working prisoners in the Deccan Gang.
- (4) Issue of quinine as a prophylactic.
- (5) Issue of potatoes and onions in lieu of green vegetables.
- (6) Issue of extra warm clothing when considered necessary.
- (7) Inoculation by Professor Haffkine's prophylactic serum.

55. Reviewing the health statistics of Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups, it will be observed that the population has increased from 60,682 in 1908 to 62,032 in the year under report. The daily average strength, number of admissions into Hospital and the daily average sick have been respectively 1,384, 1,230 and 18.0 against 1,383, 861 and 22.3 in 1908; and the number of deaths has risen from 18 in 1908 to 19 in 1909, and the ratio per mille of average strength has risen from 13.0 in 1908 to 13.7 in the year under report.

Statement No. XV—Chief Diseases.

56. The marginally noted statement shows the diseases chiefly responsible for sick admissions and deaths.

Dysentery shows a decrease of 98 in admissions but an increase of 8 in deaths. Ahmedabad and Hyderabad accounting for 5 of the increase in deaths.

Malaria shows a diminution of 103 admissions, but with 10 deaths against 6 deaths in 1908. Of the 10 fatal cases, Yeravda gives 2, of these 1 was certainly badly infected with Malaria on admission, Bijapur 1, Ahmedabad 4, of whom 3 were sodden with Malaria on admission, and Sukkur 3, all of whom were Cachectic and with enlarged spleens on admission. Quinine has been issued as a prophylactic in most Jails. Orders are being issued to ensure greater uniformity of practice in dosage, etc.

Tubercle shows 27 admissions and 16 deaths against 50 admissions and 23 deaths. Provision of a proper Tubercle ward in selected Prisons is the best preventive of this disease. Anæmia and Debility show 99 admissions and 8 deaths against 78 admissions and 2 deaths in the year previous. In commenting on this disease, it is necessary to recognize that an admission for Debility very often only means that the Medical Officer considers that a prisoner wants a rest, and the most effectual method is a few days in Hospital. Of the deaths 1 from Debility occurred in the Common Prison, being admitted in very bad health, skin and bone; four at Yeravda from Debility, old men really dying of senility; one at Dhulia from Anæmia; and two at Ahmedabad from Anæmia.

The admission for all other general diseases remains practically stationary, but the deaths due to this are 12 less. There were five less deaths from Cerebro-spinal Meningitis at Hyderabad.

Pneumonia shows a decrease of 37 admissions and 2 deaths over the figures for the year previous. For this decrease Hyderabad and Sind Gang are responsible, showing respectively 29 admissions and 2 deaths against 56 admissions and 9 deaths, and 18 admissions and 8 deaths against 44 admissions and 7 deaths.

The other Respiratory diseases show a decline of 132 admissions and 3 deaths over the figures for the past year. The Deccan Gang, Bijapur, Thana, Hyderabad and Sind Gang are responsible for this decline.

Diarrhoea shows a diminution of 112 admissions while the deaths are just the same for those of the last year. The decrease is most marked in the Yeravda Central Prison, the figures being 38 admissions against 178 in the year previous. The alteration of diet alluded to in paragraph 53 of last year's report was not carried out, and Yeravda enjoyed a singular freedom from bowel complaints though these diseases were rife in Poona among the free population during the rains.

Abscesses, Boils and Ulcers of all kinds show 651 admissions and 1 death against 719 and 2 deaths in the previous year. The Prisons of Yeravda and Ahmedabad and the Sind Gang are responsible for this decrease.

57. Out of a total number of 16,582 prisoners who were discharged during the year, 9,107 or in other words 54.9 per cent. gained weight against 56.1 in the year previous, 2,699 or 16.3 per cent. lost weight against 19.2 in 1908, and 4,776 or 28.8 per cent. remained stationary as compared with 24.7 per cent. in 1908.

## OFFICIAL AND NON-OFFICIAL VISITORS.

58. There were two hundred and seventy-nine official visitors during the year for our prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. Seventy-three quarterly meetings were held during the year and all were well attended. Seven hundred and forty-eight visits were paid by official visitors while one hundred and ninety-eight were paid by non-official visitors.

## BUILDINGS.

59. The following allotments were sanctioned during the year for original major works :—

## MISCELLANEOUS REMARKS.

60. During the year 1909, the following Prisons, Gangs and Subsidiary Jails were inspected by me :—

I also visited the Sátára Jail and paid several visits to the House of Correction, the Common Prison and the Central Prison, Yeravda.

61. The Special Class at Thána has practically ceased to exist, only one prisoner being left at the close of the year. This scheme—a modification of the Crofton or Irish system—which owed its inception to Sir E. M. H. Fulton, worked exceedingly well. The prisoners behaved excellently, giving practically no trouble at all. They appreciated highly the privileges earned by consistent good behaviour and went out in every way better men and better fitted for freedom than would have been the case under the usual routine. Unfortunately, the great difficulty experienced in almost every prison in finding suitable prisoners for promotion to the Convict Officer grade compelled me to stop drafting to the class. For it meant that Prisons were deprived of their best and most reliable Convict Officers and left with an indifferent residue. Undesirable as the system of Convict Officers is, every bad point is aggravated, and any good point nullified by promotion of prisoners of indifferent character or slack disposition. It is not easy to explain why it should be so hard to find good Convict Officers. Probably the practical reduction in length of sentences of unfit life transports and cumulative sentences to 14 years or less and the frequent general releases of good conduct men since 1897 may explain some of the difficulty.

62. The full effect of the increase in numbers of the warders and the improvement in pay on the morale and discipline of the staff cannot yet be fully estimated. Owing to want of quarters, only a few Jails (Deccan Gang, Sind Gang, Rájkot, Bijápur, Kárwár and Ratnágiri) have been able to recruit up to the sanctioned strength. The enlistment of some military pensioners of good standing in the higher grades has to some degrees improved matters, but in the lower grades the result has been disappointing. This matter I deal with fully in a subsequent report. The provision of quarters is an urgent question and provision has been made by Government of Rs. 69,500 for this purpose during 1910-1911.

63. The Juvenile class at Dhárwár has worked satisfactorily during the year. The construction of the proposed Borstal Prison has been deferred for the present. But recognizing the importance of the subject, Government has sanctioned certain alterations in the structural arrangements of the Dhárwár Prison by which our work will be rendered somewhat easier. A special establishment for the juvenile class has also been approved. Even with these improvements, the work of reformation and moral teaching will still be carried on under disheartening conditions. But from this small beginning, a great development may result. One of the great essentials to a proper system of reclamation of juvenile offenders is a society independent of the Prison but working in co-operation with the Prison authorities to obtain employment for, and to help youthful criminals in a fresh start in life. So far no movement of this description is to be discerned in the Bombay Presidency. In this branch of philanthropy, no imposing hospital or stately pile for education remains as a monument of the donor. The worker must be content with the knowledge that he has gained many recruits to the great army of honest industry and saved many a young life from shipwreck.

64. By the death of Khán Bahádur Dadabhai S. Munsiffna, Superintendent, H. M.'s Common Prison, the Department has lost its senior officer. He was in every respect a first rate Prison Officer and absolutely devoted to his duty.

*Deccan Convict Gang.*—Issue of 2 ozs. extra flour to all working prisoners continued throughout the year. Ten drs. oil was issued to all working prisoners and 6 drs. to sick prisoners, instead of 6 drs. and 4 drs. from 1st April to 30th September 1909. One oz. of molasses issued to every working prisoner from 1st June 1909.

*Sind Gang.*—Eight drs. molasses issued in the morning. Conjee up to the end of March, 1909 and during cold weather.

*Karachi Prison.*—Bājri was issued twice a week on Tuesday and Friday in lieu of jowāri.

*Sukkur Prison.*—Bājri was given instead of jowāri twice a week on Tuesday and Friday during February and March 1909.

*Bijapur.*—Bājri was issued to all prisoners twice a week.

- Letter from the Inspector-General of Prisons, No. 4195, dated the 25th April 1910—  
Submitting the Annual Report on the Jails of the Bombay Presidency for the  
year 1909, together with a statement contrasting the main results of the Administration  
of the Prison Department for the years 1908 and 1909.

RESOLUTION.—During the year 1909 the total population of all classes of Prisons and Jails rose slightly to 91,265, but the daily average fell by 343 to 8,984, this apparent anomaly being due largely to a decrease of almost 1,000 in the number of persons imprisoned in the Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails, that is, in the number of prisoners sentenced to longer terms. The maintenance of discipline involved the infliction of a greater number of punishments than in the previous year, but the Inspector-General of Prisons attributes the rise not so much to the more unruly conduct of the prisoners, though they seem to have been troublesome at Yeravda, as to their better control, due chiefly to the improvement in the Prison staff brought about by the removal or transfer of inefficient Jailors and Warders, and to some extent by the introduction of the reorganisation scheme which was sanctioned by Government Resolution No. 1198 of the 26th February 1909. The death-rate stood at the low level of 17·5 per mille—practically the same as in the previous year. There were only three cases of plague, all at Dhárwár. An outbreak of cerebro-spinal meningitis occurred at Hyderabad (Sind) and caused five deaths; measures have been adopted to improve the general condition of the Prison. Although several Prisons were more or less overcrowded during the year, it does not seem possible to trace any direct connection between this state and the prevalence of disease. Orders are issuing for the erection of an extension at Dhárwár, and it is hoped that before long the approval of the Secretary of State will be obtained to the Andheri scheme.

2. Expenditure increased noticeably; each prisoner cost Rs. 7 more than in the previous year, of which Rs. 2-9-6 was due to the heavier charges for diet, and the revision of the Warder establishment accounts for a considerable part of the difference. The cash earnings were Rs. 90,145, of which fully one-third is due to the Yeravda Press. The new electric installation at Yeravda will, it is hoped, prove more efficient and more economical when the accumulators are set up.

3. The number of juveniles admitted was practically stationary, and the Governor in Council finds it necessary once more to call attention to the policy which Government have already on several occasions laid down. The infliction of short sentences of imprisonment on juveniles can very seldom be justified: the risk of contamination by association with mature criminals is very great and the chance of reformation under proper discipline infinitesimal. The Governor in Council was not able to accept the Honourable Lieut.-Colonel Jackson's proposals for the introduction of a system modelled on that framed from the Borstal Prison, but he hopes that the special arrangements now being made at Dhárwár will give the Juvenile Class there better prospects of success, and Government will always be willing to welcome the co-operation of private bodies such as those which, in England and elsewhere, undertake the care, after their release, of juveniles who have been dealt with on the Borstal system.

4. The number of prisoners classed as habituals fell this year from 1,967 to 1,810. But there was an increase in the number of previously convicted prisoners and out of the smaller number treated as habitual 84 more than last year escaped detection as belonging to that class until after conviction. The statistics for Karachi, if correct, indicate that not one of the 142 habituals admitted to that Prison was identified in time to allow of his previous history being considered by the trying Court before sentence was passed. The District

Magistrate, Karachi, should enquire how these facts are explained and report the reasons to Government. On the subject of the proper punishment of habituals the Governor in Council is fully in accord with the opinions expressed by the Honourable Lieut.-Colonel Jackson, and in the various schemes for improving the Prisons in the Bombay Presidency an important place is being given to arrangements for separating the habitual from the casual offender, and to another kindred matter, the provision of adequate accommodation for solitary confinement.

5. The new Remission System has been in force for a year only, but the experience already gained indicates that its simplicity and intelligibility make it a great improvement upon the old system. Under present conditions there is no alternative to the continued employment of convict-warders, but the Governor in Council is well aware of the difficulties which arise therefrom, and regards it as very unfortunate that the exigencies of maintaining discipline have led to the disappearance of the Thana Special Class, the good work done by which has been recognised on former occasions.

6. The Governor in Council desires to record his cordial appreciation of the manner in which the Inspector-General and Superintendents have conducted their arduous duties. In doing so he wishes again to express his sense of the loss which Government have sustained by the death of Khan Bahadur D. S. Munsiffna.
