Sir,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report together with the usual statistical tables on the Prisons and Jails in the Bombay Presidency (including the Province of Sind and the Settlement of Aden) for the year 1911. The office of the Inspector-General of Prisons was held by me during the year under report.

JUDICIAL.

2. The number of Central, District, Special and Extramural Prisons has undergone no change. The statistics of all the Third Class Subsidiary Jails have been grouped together with those of the lockups as was done in previous years.

3. From the general summary preceding the statements in the appendices to this report, it will be seen that the total population of all classes of Prisons, Subsidiary Jails, Lockups and Civil Jails has been 100,791 against 95,031, an increase of 5,760. The daily average population has been 10,131, showing an increase of 572 over the figures of the previous year.

4. The following table, which compares the figures of the past two years, refers to the admission of convicts into Prisons and 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails only :—

5. There has been an increase in the number of convicts admitted. His Majesty's Common Prison, the Central Prisons of Ahmedabad and Hyderabad, and the Prisons of Ratnágiri, Thána and Shikárpur show an increase; while the Yerávda Central Prison and the Prisons of Dhulia, Bijápur, Dhárwár, Kárwár, Rájkot, Karáchi, Sukkur, Aden and His Majesty's House of Correction show a decline.

The increase in the Ahmedabad Central Prison may be attributed to the prevailing scarcity in Gujarát from failure of monsoon; for that in the Hyderabad Central Prison—283—there is no local cause. In His Majesty's Common Prison, no special reason can be assigned for the increase in admissions beyond the prosecution of beggars by the Police and under the Municipal Act for possessing Cocaine without a license. In the Thána Special Prison, the increase is due to the prisoners, sentenced to over one month in the Násik District, having been sent to Thána Prison since June 1911. The increase in the Shikárpur Prison is due to the fact that the Prison was opened in the middle of 1910. The increase in the Ratnágiri Prison cannot be explained, as no local cause for the increase exists.

6. With regard to the disposal of convicts there is an increase under the head "Released on expiry of sentence", "Under remission rules" and "Released by order of Government". 1,414 prisoners were released on the day of the Delhi Durbar. Of the remaining 48, 13 prisoners were released on the grounds of sickness, two from Yerávda, one from Bijápur, two from Dhárwár, one from Thána, two from Ahmedabad, three from Hyderabad, one from Sind Gang, and one from Ratnágiri. Seven ex-military convicts were sent to England from His Majesty's House of Correction. Seventeen unfit life transports were released on expiry of 14 years' imprisonment, ten from Yerávda, two from Ahmedabad, one from Thána, and four from Dhárwár. Two from Yerávda, one from Common Prison, three from House of Correction, one from Thána, two from Kárwár, one from Karáchi and one from Sukkur were released on other grounds. 100 prisoners were deported to the Andamans *via* Madras, against 207 in the year previous. The heading "Transfer to Lunatic Asylum" shows an increase of 5 over the figures for the past year. The heading "Escaped" shows a decline of 5, while the heading "Executed" shows an increase of 7 over the figures for the year 1910.

The number of deaths shows an increase of 38, which will be commented on later. There were no state prisoners in confinement at the close of the year.

7. There is an increase under the sub-heads "Europeans", "Eurasians", "Native Christians" under females: "Mahomedans", "Hindus" and "Sikhs" under males: and "Buddhists" and "Jains", while all other sub-heads show a decline. The number of juveniles under 16 years of age admitted during the year under report was 37 against 43 in the year previous or a decrease of 6. Out of 28 male and 9 female youthful offenders convicted, 11 males and 5 females were sentenced to fifteen days or less, 5 males and 3 females to between one month and fifteen days, and 11 males and 1 female to periods varying between one month and two years. One boy in Aden was sentenced to six years, of which five were to be spent in a Reformatory. Government at once directed his removal to a Reformatory. Out of 37 admitted, two males had previous convictions. Of the total number of 37 juveniles admitted, 5 were sent to the Reformatory by the District Magistrates on reference by Prisons authorities, thus leaving 32 juveniles who underwent imprisonment.

As in former years I append a list showing sentences which, I conceive, served no good purpose. As Gross remarks "Whoever remembers the artificial, but nevertheless necessary, egoism in children will have to think more kindly of many a childish crime. Moreover, we must not overlook the fact that the child does many things simply in imitation." Confinement until the Court rose would have met the case better than a few days' imprisonment, and where

a small boy of 13 is fined Rs. 10, and the fine is paid, the month of substantive sentence might have been foregone. It seems almost ludicrous to call on a child to furnish security, and in the case of the shorter sentences the individual is injured, and neither the state nor anybody else is benefited in the smallest degree.

The sub-heads "15 to 40", and "40 to 60", under males, and "Above 60", show an increase, while other sub-heads show a decrease; under the head "Education" the sub-heads "Able to read only" and females under "Illiterate" show a decrease, while all others show an increase. With the exception of the sub-heads "Persons employed under Government" and "Miscellaneous persons not classified otherwise" all other sub-heads show an increase over the figures of the previous year. The percentage of the total number admitted to free population according to the Census of 1911 is 0.0891 during the year.

8. There has been a decrease under the heads "Not exceeding one month" under females, "Above three and not exceeding six months", "Above one year and not exceeding two years" under males; "Above two years and not exceeding five years" under males, "Above five years and not exceeding ten years" and "Exceeding ten years", while all other heads show an increase. There were 2,103 prisoners sentenced to simple imprisonment, 15,087 sentenced to rigorous imprisonment and 23 sentenced to rigorous imprisonment with whipping as compared with 1,226, 15,249 and 23 in the year previous. The number of prisoners sentenced to rigorous imprisonment with solitary confinement was 317 as compared with 344 in 1910, 359 in 1909, and 349 in 1908. Proper accommodation for carrying out sentences of solitary confinement is still needed in many Jails and some of the sentences could not be carried out for lack of solitary cells. In my own opinion solitary confinement has little

deterrent effect on the ordinary prisoner and none on the habitual. Pathans, Baluchis and Bhils dislike it very much. 5,960 prisoners were sentenced to "Not exceeding one month" as compared with 5,448 in 1910; of these 3,453 were admitted to the Common Prison, Bombay.

9. The statement of reconvicted prisoners was done away with under Government orders conveyed in their Resolution No. 2814, dated 12th May 1911, in the Judicial Department. The number of prisoners, classified as habituals, was 1,826, of which 192 were classified by the District Magistrate and 173 by the Jail Superintendents and the balance by the sentencing Court. This statement does not include 1,763 prisoners sentenced under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code but who under the orders of Government are always treated as Habituals. Of this number 1,122 were sentenced in Sind.

10. From the information supplied by the Inspector-General of Police it is seen that 1,481 persons were identified in the Bombay Presidency inclusive of Sind as compared with 1,432 in the year previous. Out of 1,481 prisoners 99 were identified in Bombay, 256 in Ahmedabad, 240 at Yeránda, 157 in Thána, 152 in Dbulia, 104 in Ahmednagar, 80 in Sholápur, 67 in Dhárwár, 64 in Násik, 57 in Belgaum, 49 in Sátára and the rest in other parts of the Presidency.

11. I have in previous reports dwelt on the ineffective method in vogue of dealing with the confirmed habitual, and have also pointed out how the youthful offender is gradually trained as a criminal by a series of short sentences. These sentences slowly inure the culprit to prison life and remove all dread of punishment. As Gauthier says "When the first repugnance is overcome, many—doubtless the majority—come imperceptibly to the point of preparing a prison future for themselves."

The habitual criminal developes young, the man who takes to habitual crime after 25 is the exception. During the past year 2,773 juvenile adults (16 to 21 years) were admitted into prisons in the Bombay Presidency and Sind and Aden under various sentences. These form the recruiting ground for the army of recidivism. It is plain that to reduce habitual crime some effort must be made to reform the criminal while his mind is yet plastic and has not taken the final mould of vice.

In Bombay alone 798 males and 62 females under the age of 21 were admitted into the Common Prison. During the year 296 beggars were sent to the Common Prison. I was present when a batch of 30 came in, the old and the decrepit, the blind and the cripple, and young adults, all in for sentences of a few days. These juveniles have begged today, they will thieve tomorrow.

The remedy is plain. Having provided a Prison with a proper staff for the reception of such juveniles, these ridiculous repeated short sentences should be stopped, and when a juvenile adult is convicted for a second or third time he should be sent to the special institution for such time as, removing him from bad surroundings and temptation, will give teaching and discipline the opportunity to eradicate the faults developed by defective training and evil environment.

This the state can do, but this alone will not suffice nor cope with the evil. The public must play their part and endeavour to help the young criminal on his release, by getting him employment, helping his first foot-steps in his new life, and letting him see that he has other friends than those whose example originally caused his fall.

Could this be done the cost of the building and the staff would in a few years be recouped many times over to the state.

12. The number of escapes during the year under report has been 11 against 9 in the year previous. Out of 11, 9 escaped from Extramural files and two from inside the Prisons. A full report as to the escape of the two life transports from inside the Thána Special Prison has already been submitted to Government in this office letter No. 11064, dated 28th October 1911.

A party of ten prisoners were engaged on digging in the Garden of the Sábarmati Prison when three of them suddenly threw down their tools, jumped into a neighbouring *nála* and got clear away. In this case I did not consider either the warders or convict overseers to blame. Other cases were dealt with departmentally. Out of the eleven prisoners who escaped, eight, including the two life transports, have been recaptured by the Police.

13. The statement noted in the margin relates to the offences committed by and the punishments awarded to convicts confined in the Prisons and first and second Class Subsidiary Jails. The offences dealt with by Criminal Courts show a decline of 7 over the figures for the year previous, as will be seen from the details given below:—

14. It will be observed from the following table that the number of offences has risen from 22,455 to 22,641 or an increase of 186 over the figures for the year previous; but the daily average was greater than 1910 by 446. So the ratio of punishments to population is less.

15. The following table shows the nature of punishments awarded during the past two years. It will be seen that the total number of major and minor punishments awarded by the Superintendents during the year under report was 22,978 and the total number of offences 22,641. The difference is due to 337 offences having been dealt with during the year 1911 by the award of combined punishments. It will also be noticed that fewer major punishments have been awarded in the present year.

16. Out of the 22,978 punishments awarded by the Superintendents of Prisons and Jails, 15,505 or 67 per cent. belong to the minor class and 7,458 or 33 per cent. belong to the major. All the heads under minor punishments except "Other punishments" show an increase, while all the heads under major punishments show a decline. The two Bombay Prisons and the Prisons of Dhulia, Deccan Convict Gang, Bijapur, Ratnagiri, Rajkot, Karachi, Hyderabad, Sukkur, Shikarpur, Sind Convict Gang and Aden show an increase while all other Prisons show a decline.

In the House of Correction the increase is due to (1) greater daily average strength, (2) stricter supervision, the great increase is under relating to work (87) prohibited articles (106) and breaches of Jail rules (125). In the Common Prison the increase (50) is not due to any particular cause. In the Deccan Gang, the Sind Gang and Shikarpur, the increase is due to a greater daily population and in Shikarpur also to the fact that the Jail only opened in June 1910.

In Hyderabad the increase is due to a greater daily average of prisoners confined (876 against 751). The punishments in this Prison are high but this is attributable to the epidemics of Cerebro-spinal Meningitis in former years leading to relaxation of discipline, the constant changes of Superintendents, and the evil legacy left by an inefficient Jailor and Deputy Jailor. However, things are better than at first sight would appear. Cases of assaults and mutiny have fallen from 216 to 72; prohibited articles from 271 to 91; punishments relating to work have risen from 4,483 to 5,220; and to convict officers for breaches of orders or slackness in duty from 52 to 815. The increase in Bijapur (33) is attributed by the Superintendent to the fact that the habituals had to be punished frequently for short work.

In Ratnagiri (152) the increase is due to a greater daily average and better exaction of labour.

In Karachi (175) the increase is due to "Other breaches of Jail rules".

The increase in Dhulia (20) and Sukkur (39) is insignificant.

In Aden the increase is due to better supervision of work and stricter discipline.

The decrease at Yeravda (545) is due to a smaller number of prisoners confined.

The fall in punishments at Ahmedabad is attributed to the prisoners having now settled down to the tailoring work, also to Sindhi and Pathan prisoners being fewer in number, and giving less trouble than usual.

Out of 22,641 offences, 2,805 habituals were responsible for 8,761 and 4,507 non-habituals for the balance of 13,880 offences. The actual percentage of habituals is 20.5. From the above it will be seen that only 7,312 prisoners were punished and the number who actually passed through the Prisons and Jails was 25,876. Very many of these prisoners were only punished once, the punishment frequently being only a warning; 3,392 warnings were actually given. Of the total number of punishments, 2,390 were inflicted on convict officers for negligence in the discharge of their duties.

17. The subjoined table gives particulars as to the number of stripes inflicted on prisoners in our Prisons during the year under report. It will be seen that although the total number of corporal punishments show a decline of 10 over the figures for the past year, there is an increase in certain prisons. These are House of Correction, Yeránda, Hyderabad and Karáchi. Out of 22 corporal punishments inflicted at Yeránda against 21 last year 15 were awarded to habituals. Floggings were inflicted for the following offences:—

Persistent short work 4, refusing to work 6, creating disturbances and assaults 5, false charge 1, gross insolence and disobedience of orders 3, abusive and obscene language 3. Some of these offences could have been dealt with by less severe punishments and the necessary action was taken by me.

In Hyderabad floggings were inflicted for assault 9, inciting to mutiny 1, refusing to work 6, short work 5, taking keys from a warder 1, stealing food from a sick prisoner 1, refusing to wear clothing 1, destroying clothing of convict officer 2, and stealing molasses 1. Here too flogging was in some cases too readily resorted to.

18. During the year under report 8,106 prisoners were fettered as compared with 8,056 during 1910. Looking to the increased population this is a substantial decrease.

REMISSION SYSTEM.

19. It will be seen from the figures appearing in statement C appended to this report, that 2,983 prisoners were released during the year under remission system as compared with 2,717 in the previous year. The percentage during the year 1911 of those released under remission system to the total number, who might have been released under that system if of average good conduct up to the date of release was 98·0 against 97·6 in 1910. The practice of mustering prisoners and reading and explaining to them the benefits of the remission rules has been continued. Special awards under rule 513 remission for committing no offence during the previous 12 months were granted to 1,361 prisoners as against 1,105 in the year previous. The new remission system continues to work well.

20. The average number employed as Prison officers during the year under report in our Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails was 1,026 males and 19 females against 990 males and 12 females in 1910. Nearly every Prison complains of the difficulty in getting good convict officers; and this difficulty has been greatly intensified by the large number of releases on December 12th, when the best behaved of the prisoners, and therefore the best of the convict officers and the pick of prisoners eligible for promotion, were released. As reported last year, I have issued orders to promote prisoners under a year's sentence to convict officers and the result has been on the whole satisfactory, and at any rate has eased matters a little.

21. The statement noted in the margin shows the different diet scales in Prisons and in 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails. Statement No. VIII.—Diet. These scales have been found to work satisfactorily. Such changes, as have been made during the year, are noted in the fifth column of this statement.

22. The statistics of under-trial prisoners confined in our Prisons, Jails and Lock-ups are embodied in the marginally noted statement. Statement No. XVIII.—Under-trial Prisoners. The number admitted during the year under report shows an increase of 4,805 over the figures for the year previous. The daily average strength has also risen from 1,504 in 1910 to 1,630 in 1911 due to increased admissions.

23. The number of escapes was 17 as compared with 14 in 1910. Of the 17 escapes, 3 took place from the Subsidiary Jails in the district of Karáchi, 3 from the Sukkur District, 2 each from Thar and Párkar and Upper Sind Frontier Districts, one each from the districts of Kaira, Dhárwár, Násik, Ahmedabad, Hyderabad, Poona and one from Bombay.

24. The number of deaths shows an increase of 14 over the figures for the past year. Out of 32 deaths, 7 occurred in the Prisons, one in the 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails and 24 in the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups. Of the 24 deaths, under-trials accounted for 23, 5 from pneumonia, 5 from plague, 2 from malaria, 2 from compression of brain, 1 from snake bite, 2 from wound, 1 from liver abscess, 1 from dysentery, 2 from heart disease, 1 from bronchitis and 1 undiagnosed; 1 convicted prisoner died of asthma.

25. The number remaining on 31st December 1911 was 356 males and 13 females in Prisons, 136 males and 2 females in the 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails and 1,232 males and 59 females in the Third Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups, thus making a total of 1,724 males and 74 females.

26. In the beginning of the year 1911 there were 54 males in the Civil Jails. Statement No. XIX.—Civil Prisoners. The number admitted during the year was 872 male and 9 female prisoners; 886 males and 9 females were released thus leaving a balance of 40 males at the close of the year under report. The daily average number has been just the same, viz., 58 a, in the year previous. The total cost and cost per head have respectively been Rs. 5,878-6-11 and Rs. 101-5-6 during the year under report as against Rs. 5,748-1-6 and Rs. 99-1-8 in the year previous.

FINANCIAL.

27. The statements noted in the margin deal with the gross expenditure on account of convicted and under-trial prisoners confined in the Central, District, and Extramural Prisons and the Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups. The cost of Police guards has been omitted as usual, except in the case of the Central Prisons of Yeránda and Ahmedabad and the Special Prison of Thána where the guarding is undertaken by the Reserved Armed Warder Guard. The realization from the sale proceeds of garden produce has been deducted from the total charges. The gross expenditure during the year 1911 has been Rs. 9,87,324 and the cost per head Rs. 98-0-3 against Rs. 9,22,268 and Rs. 97-1-2 in the year previous.

28. The total cost under this head has risen from Rs. 3,19,996 in 1910 to Rs. 3,30,319 or an increase of Rs. 10,323 in the year under report. The increase is due to the entertainment of sanctioned strength of warders at Yeránda; additional hands for the Prison Press; pay of a probationary Superintendent; grant of Local allowance to warders at Karáchi; grade promotion to the Superintendent at Ahmedabad; an additional Sub-Assistant Surgeon in the Common Prison; also the Shikárpur Prison was open for the whole year against 7 months in 1910.

29. The total cost has risen from Rs. 4,09,657 in 1910 to Rs. 4,32,681 in 1911 but the cost per head has fallen from Rs. 43-1-11 to Rs. 42-15-3 respectively. The increase is entirely due to the increased population during the year under report. The fall in cost per head is due to slightly more favourable contract rates.

30. The value of vegetables and other supplies from the gardens attached to our Prisons and Jails shows an increase of Rs. 7,985 over the figures for 1910, the figures being Rs. 26,980 against Rs. 18,995 in the year previous. The Prisons of Yeránda, Dhulia, Deccan Gang, Dhárwár, Thána, Ahmedabad, Hyderabad, Shikárpur and Sind Gang show an increase while all other Prisons show a decrease. The decrease at Karáchi is due to less average number of prisoners confined during the year under report, and in Kárwár it is due to a heavy storm with rain in November which washed out the seeds just sown.

31. The total cost and cost per head has fallen from Rs. 40,227 and Rs. 4-3-9 in 1910 to Rs. 37,663 and Rs. 3-11-10 in the year under report. The decrease is mainly due to less average number of sick prisoners admitted into hospital.

32. The expenditure under this heading has risen from Rs. 36,403 and Rs. 3-13-4 in 1910 to Rs. 49,021 and Rs. 4-13-10 in the year under report. The increase is marked in Sind Gang (Rs. 3,000 expended in 1910, adjusted in 1911), Ahmedabad (provision for increase of population due to scarcity), Deccan Gang (increased population), Hyderabad (increased population). In Common Prison the increase is due to the issue of an extra blanket to all the prisoners in cold weather on the recommendation of the Medical Officer.

33. The total cost has risen from Rs. 20,776 in 1910 to Rs. 21,631 in the year under report and the cost per head fallen from Rs. 2-3-0 to Rs. 2-2-4. The increase is mainly due to higher charges for water having been paid by the Thána Prison due to increase in water tax.

34. This head shows an increase of Rs. 10,028, the figure for 1911 being Rs. 42,735 and Rs. 4-3-11 as against Rs. 32,707 and Rs. 3-7-1 in 1910, due to a greater number of transfers in the 3rd Class Subsidiary Jails and Lock-ups and to subsistence allowance and railway fares for the prisoners released on Delhi Durbar day. In the case of Dhárwár and Hyderabad Prisons,

charges for moving prisoners for the last year were adjusted in this year's account. In Aden Prison it is due to the transfer of 24 military prisoners to India and two transports to the Thána Prison. The expense likely to be incurred in transferring military prisoners from Aden to India was pointed out in this office letter No. 10254, dated 7th October 1910.

35. The total cost and cost per head has risen from Rs. 33,113 and Rs. 3-7-9 in 1910 to Rs. 42,597 and Rs. 4-3-8 in 1911 respectively. The increase is due to larger payments being made on account of gratuities to released convict officers on 12th December 1911, biennial supply of uniforms to the warders in Deccan Convict Gang, Thána and Ahmedabad, heavier lighting charges at Yerávdá.

Charges for other Miscellaneous Services and Supplies.
36. This head shows an increase of Rs. 235, the figures being Rs. 5,089 in 1911 against Rs. 4,854 in the year previous. The increase is most marked in the Dhárwár Prison owing to the transfers of subordinates during the year under report necessitated by departmental reasons.

37. The total cost has risen from Rs. 16,682 in 1910 to Rs. 17,614 in the year under report, but the cost per head has fallen from Rs. 1-12-1 to Rs. 1-12-0. The increase is largely due to the purchase of two Type Writer Machines for the use of my office.

Contingencies.
38. The total cost has risen from Rs. 7,853 in 1910 to Rs. 7,974 in the year under report, while the cost per head has fallen from Rs. 0-13-2 to Rs. 0-12-8 respectively. The increase is very small and calls for no explanation.

Extraordinary charges for Live Stock, Tools and Plant.
39. The statement noted in the margin deals with the employment of convicts in our Prisons and 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails. It will be seen that the total number of prisoners sentenced to labour has risen from 7,845 in 1910 to 8,287 in the year under report. The figures for the 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails show an increase of one only over the figures for the past year. All the heads with the exception of "Average number Sick," "Average number Convalescent and Infirm," "Employed on preparing articles for Jail use" and "Jail repairs" show an increase. The number of prisoners employed on extramural works shows an increase of 287 over the figures for the year previous.

40. The marginally noted statement deals with the net cash earnings of convicts sentenced to labour. The cash earnings have fallen from Rs. 2,27,924 in 1910 to Rs. 1,93,201 in the year under report or a decrease of Rs. 34,723. His Majesty's House of Correction and the Prisons of Dhulia, Deccan Convict Gang, Dhárwár, Ratnágiri, Thána, Karáchi, Hyderabad, Sind Gang and Aden show an increase, while all other Prisons show a decline. The decline is most marked in the Prisons of Yerávdá, Bijápur, Kárwár, Ahmedabad and Sukkur.

The decline in Factory profits of the Bijápur Prison is due to a smaller demand on the part of the public and by Government Departments. The prevalence of plague in Bijápur for six months and the consequent evacuation of the town affected sales unfavourably.

In the Kárwár Prison the decrease is due to a greater stock of raw materials as well as manufactured articles in hand and also to the employment of fewer prisoners—23 as against 34—on Jail manufactures.

In the Ahmedabad Central Prison the decline is due to larger stock of raw materials (Rs 4,810) and manufactured articles (Rs. 4,736) on hand at the close of 1911; Rs. 800 more tools and plant on hand than in 1910; outstanding debts at the close of the year Rs. 1,413 more than at close of 1910; lastly owing to the high rate of twist the profits on the Police clothing contract were considerably reduced—approximately by Rs. 4,400.

The profits of the Dhárwár Prison are unsatisfactory. This is due to diminished demand for manufactured articles. The station is much smaller

than it used to be. There was on hand at the close of the year 1911 Rs. 2,283 worth of manufactured articles more than at the close of the previous year; Rs. 1,536 more of raw material. Of the manufactured articles, teakwood and blackwood scantlings (cut and seasoning) represent Rs. 4,395-15-8.

Sukkur.—The decline in the profits of the Sukkur Prison is due to (a) Rs. 604-6-11 more raw material on hand, (b) Rs. 155 more manufactured articles on hand, (c) Rs. 231-0-9 more debts outstanding due to prison, (d) Rs. 514 cash in hand less, (e) Rs. 361-8-8 more tools and plant, (f) high price of cotton and wool.

In the Common Prison and Rájkot Prison the decrease is small and covered by the ordinary fluctuations in orders.

In the Yeránda Central Prison out of Rs. 1,20,717, the Prison Factory shows a minus profit of Rs. 22,608 while Rs. 1,43,325 represents the profits of the Press.

The decline in the Prison Factory profits is due to (a) as pointed out last year a sum of Rs. 14,400 was left over to be paid in 1911; (b) Rs. 18,091 worth of quinine was in hand at the close of 1911 against Rs. 6,172 at the close of 1910; (c) outstanding advances of quinine to Post Offices are Rs. 11,951 against Rs. 9,968 in 1910. As regards sub-head (b) quinine was bought in absurdly large quantities owing to an error in judgment on the part of the Superintendent.

41. Of the sum of Rs. 1,93,201 mentioned at the commencement of this paragraph a sum of Rs. 1,46,307 represents the profits of our Prison Factories, Rs. 45,378 of extramural labour and Rs. 1,516 of our First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. The average cash earnings per head of those sentenced to labour and of those employed on manufactures in the case of Prisons and First and Second Class Subsidiary Jails have been Rs. 23-5-0 and Rs. 61-13-0 as against Rs. 29-1-0 and Rs. 83-1-0 in the year previous.

42. During the year under report Jail made articles of the value of Rs. 64,934, as detailed below, were sold to Government Departments against Rs. 58,111 in the year previous or an increase of Rs. 6,823. Articles of the value of Rs. 42,975 were supplied to the Police Department by the Ahmedabad Central Prison during the year under report :—

43. This Gang was located at Ganja Takar near Hyderabad (Sind) throughout the year. With an average population of 653 the Gang has earned Rs. 28,374-4-0 in 1911 against Rs. 20,290-7-0 with an average of 573 prisoners in the year previous. The increase is due to the sale of metal and to the employment of a Gang of prisoners on loading and unloading of ballast. The prisoners were employed on breaking metal in the quarries near the camp throughout the year.

44. This Gang was located at Visápur in the Ahmednagar District throughout the year. With an average of 898 Deccan Gang. prisoners the Gang has earned Rs. 12,377-7-0 in 1911 against Rs. 7,379 with an average of 675 prisoners in the year previous.

45. The net profit of the quinine industry in the Central Prisons of Yeránda and Hyderabad amounted to Rs. 3,199-10-0 Sale of Quinine Packets. during the year under report as against Rs. 7,430-10-8 in 1910. The diminution in profits is due to the fact that throughout the year 10-grain packets of quinine were issued; during 1910, 10-grain packets were only issued in the last five months of the year. The Yeránda Central

Prison shows a profit of Rs. 2,752-4-9 while a sum of Rs. 447-5-3 represents the profits of the Hyderabad Central Prison. The value of quinine packing materials, service stamps and establishment charges amounted to Rs. 45,008-5-3 during the year as against Rs. 26,521-1-2 in 1910 and the amount paid into the Treasury during the year under report was Rs. 23,894-4-11 as against Rs. 29,335-6-9 in the year previous. As noted in paragraph 40 there was Rs. 18,091 of quinine in hand at the close of the year.

46. In addition to supplying the requirements of this department the Yerávda Prison Press has during the year under report printed forms for all Government Departments with the exception of the Civil Medical Forms. The total number of forms, envelopes, and books supplied to all departments was respectively 7,61,99,855, 96,93,081 and 7,58,595 against 5,46,16,417, 1,43,17,485 and 6,48,394 in the year previous. The net profit is Rs. 1,21,478 against Rs. 98,188 in the past year.

The Press is making every effort to so keep the accounts that the actual cost of production can be readily ascertained. I have submitted to Government a scheme, whereby, I believe Government will be able to satisfy themselves as to what the Yerávda Press genuinely means from a financial point of view.

I am also submitting shortly proposals regarding the reorganizing of the staff of the Press with a view to enabling it to cope with the actual work—greatly increased owing to the dearth of literate prisoners—and also to make such provision as may be necessary for the better safe-guarding and discipline of the prisoners.

47. The statement noted in the margin shows the total cost of maintenance for all Prisons, Subsidiary Jails, and Lock-ups. The Statement No. XIII.—Net cost. total expenditure, excluding charges for inspection and general superintendence, has amounted to Rs. 9,38,789 during the year under report, against Rs. 8,75,814 in the year previous. The total cash earnings have been Rs. 1,93,201 against Rs. 2,27,924 in 1910, thus making a net cost to Government of Rs. 7,45,588 during the year against Rs. 6,47,890 in the year previous. The average net cost to Government per prisoner has been Rs. 74 against Rs. 68-3-0 in the year previous.

VITAL.

48. The statement noted in the margin deals with the sickness and mortality of all classes during the year under report. Statement No. XIV.—Sickness and Mortality. The following table compares the figures for 1910-1911 of prisoners confined in the Central, District, Special and Extramural Prisons, Subsidiary Jails, Civil Jails and Lock-ups:—

49. The death-rate for the year is 18.7 against 14.3 last year; both the total admission into hospital and the daily average sick were less than in 1910, though the daily average strength was 572 more than in 1910.

Of the 161 prisoners who died in our Prisons 49 were admitted in bad health of whom 36 were suffering from the disease from which they ultimately died, 17 in fair health, the remainder 95 in good health.

50. There have been only two cases of plague during the year. One an under-trial admitted into the Common Prison on the 23rd November developed plague on the 26th and died of it. The Prison was very overcrowded. All contacts were inoculated.

The second case was that of a prisoner admitted into Thána on 7th October 1911. He developed plague on the 9th October 1911, was discharged cured on 20th November 1911. Neither prisoner had been inoculated. Wherever necessary, inoculation was freely resorted to with the usual satisfactory result.

51. There was constant overcrowding in the following Prisons:—His Majesty's Common Prison, Sukkur, Sind Gang and Sábarmati; in the House of Correction in the last week of November and all December; in Dhárwár on 155 days of the year; in Hyderabad August, April and May; in Karáchi in May, June and July. There was trivial excess over accommodation in Thána, Bijápur, Kárwár and Rájkot. It is impossible to relieve the overcrowding in the Common Prison. Constant drafts are made and the excess population sleep in open sheds. In Sukkur, Sind Gang, Sábarmati, Hyderabad and Karáchi the excess population slept either in open tents, verandahs or unused worksheds.

The Sind Jails were generally overcrowded, due to the great number of prisoners sentenced under section 123, Criminal Procedure Code.

52. The following Prisons, which show a death-rate of over 15 per mille, are commented on below:—

Thána Special Prison:—25·3 per mille as against 18·1 last year. Of the 15 deaths Tubercle (3), of these two were suffering from the disease on admission; Diarrhœa (2); Dysentery (4); of these 3 were admitted in bad or fair health. Bright's disease (2), one probably had the disease when admitted; Pneumonia (2), one admitted in bad health, one admitted in fair health; Asthma (1) admitted in fair health; Puerperal septicæmia (1).

His Majesty's House of Correction:—21·2 per mille. An antiquated building. The death-rate is really due to bad luck. Three out of the five deaths, *viz.* Tubercle of Lungs (2), Sprue (1), were admitted suffering from the disease of which they died.

His Majesty's Common Prison:—29·1. A condemned Prison and always overcrowded. The deaths are due to Pneumonia (2), one admitted suffering from the disease; Diarrhœa (2) both admitted in bad health; Tubercle (3), two admitted suffering from the disease; Dysentery (1), Plague (1) admitted incubating the disease; Chronic Bronchitis (1) admitted in bad health; Posterior curvature of spine (1) admitted suffering from the disease; Hepatic abscess (1). That the death-rate is not greater is due to the manner in which the Medical Officer and the Superintendent discharge their onerous duties; for into this Prison come the malaria-stricken, the syphilitic, the drug-taker, the alcoholic, and their combinations; together with maimed, halt and blind beggars of a truly wonderful filthiness.

While dealing with the health of this Prison I have to bring to the notice of Government the manner in which Colonel Crimmin, V.C., C. I. E., the Medical Officer, Mr. Reed and Mr. Brierley, the Superintendents of the Common Prison and House of Correction, dealt with an unexpected influx of undertrials towards the end of November. The population of the Common Prison rose in a couple of days by 285 and that of the House of Correction by 107. Everything was managed without a hitch and no ill-effects ensued from the overcrowding owing to the excellent arrangements made.

Kárwár Prison:—17·1. Two deaths, one from Gangrene, an old man admitted in bad health; one from heart disease, the prisoner admitted suffering from the disease. Neither prisoner ever did any labour.

Sukkur Prison:—49·7. 22 deaths, of these 21 in the first five months of the year. Of the 22 deaths, Pneumonia 16, Chronic Bronchitis 3, Anæmia 1, Cystitis 1, Papilloma Larynx 1. There was an epidemic of Pneumonia in January and February attacking chiefly prisoners just admitted; 62·5 per cent. of these who died were in the Prison for a month or less. 70 per cent. of those attacked died. Similar pneumonia was prevalent in the town and district; there were extreme variations of temperature. The general health of the prisoners otherwise was excellent and every possible measure for coping with the disease was taken by Major Bakhle.

Central Prison, Yeránda:—18·8. Of the 28 deaths, Tubercle (7), of these four were admitted suffering from the disease; Nephritis (3), Asthma (2) both admitted suffering from the disease; Debility (1), Pneumonia (2), Diarrhœa (1), Rheumatism (1), Cirrhosis of Liver (1), Valvular disease of heart (1) admitted suffering from the disease; Pyonephrosis (1), Dyspepsia (1); Cerebral Hæmorrhage (2) one due to Atheroma, Chronic Malaria (1) contracted outside the Prison, Atheroma (1) due to old age; Diabetes mellitus (1) admitted suffering from the disease; Heat Apoplexy (1), Embolism (1).

Sind Gang:—38·3. Owing to the overcrowding of other Sind Prisons some prisoners had to be sent to the Gang inferior in physique to those of former years. The prisoners in this Gang are exposed to every variation of temperature and we find of the 25 deaths that 14 are due to respiratory diseases, of these 11 are from Pneumonia. This disease is equally fatal among the free population. Heat stroke (2), Cerebral Hæmorrhage (2), Cardiac disease; (2), Rheumatism (1), Enteritis (1), Gastric enteritis (1), Dysentery (1), Malaria (1).

Ratnágiri Prison:—22·5. Two deaths, Tuberculosis (1), admitted dying; Syphilis tertiary (1) contracted outside.

53. The health of Rájkot nil, Bijápur nil, Shikárpur nil and Aden nil. The Deccan Gang 12·2, Central Prison Sábarmati 12·4, Dhárwár 11·5, Karáchi 15·8, Dhulia 11·0, Central Prison Hyderabad 12·9, has been satisfactory.

54. The extension of the Hospital in Hyderabad has been an important factor in the improved health of that Central Prison. Government have sanctioned the extension of the Hospital in the Central Prison, Sábarmati, and the building of a tubercle ward in the Central Prison, Yeránda. I hope that the latter at least may be completed in the coming year. The tubercle ward is planned for the open air treatment and will, it is hoped, reduce the mortality and the risks of infection to other prisoners.

The undertrial barrack at Dhárwár is under construction and will be completed shortly. Other improvements are noted under paragraphs dealing with original major works and the expenditure of the departmental discretionary grant.

A second Sub-Assistant Surgeon has been appointed to His Majesty's Common Prison, Bombay, and the medical work there can now be properly dealt with.

55. The following measures were adopted during the year under report with a view to improve the health of the prisoners confined in our Prisons and Jails, and are inserted in accordance with the orders contained in paragraph 1 of Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 9115, dated 29th December 1896:—

- (1) Issue of wheat and rice in lieu of bájri and jowári.
- (2) Issue of 2 ounces extra flour and one ounce molasses to working prisoners in the Deccan Gang. Issue of 1 ounce molasses to working prisoners in Sind Gang in lieu of 2 ounces of flour.
- (3) Issue of extra rations to weakly prisoners and convalescents.
- (4) Issue of quinine as prophylactic.
- (5) Issue of potatoes and onions in lieu of green vegetables.
- (6) Issue of extra warm clothing when considered necessary.
- (7) Inoculation by Professor Haffkine's prophylactic serum.

56. Reviewing the health statistics of Subsidiary Jails and lockups, it will be observed that the population has increased from 63,425 in 1910 to 67,675 in 1911.

The daily average strength, number of admissions into Hospital and the daily average sick have been respectively 1,530, 851 and 16·4 against 1,440, 1,230 and 20·7 in 1910. The number of deaths was 28 against 19 in 1910 and the death ratio per mille of average strength has risen from 18·2 in 1910 to 18·3 in the year under report.

57. The marginally noted statement shows diseases chiefly responsible for sick admissions and deaths. Statement No. XV.

Dysentery shows a diminution of 94 in admissions but an increase of 2 in deaths. For the decrease in admissions Yeránda 26, Dhárwár 15, Hyderabad 29, Sukkur 24, and Kárwár 10 are mainly responsible. The Deccan Gang showed an increase of 22.

Malaria 743 admissions and 6 deaths as against 785 admissions and 12 deaths in the previous year. Of the 6 prisoners who died all contracted Malaria outside the Prison.

Quinine was given as a prophylactic in 10-grain doses weekly in all Prisons with the following exceptions:—

In Kárwár, Aden, Rájkot, and Ratnágiri none was issued, there being no Malaria.

In Dhárwár 10 grains twice weekly.

In Karáchi all prisoners 15 grains daily for ten days on admission. There are no mosquitoes in this Prison.

Dhulia 10 grains every Saturday and Sunday.

Hyderabad 10 grains twice weekly.

Sukkur 7 grains twice weekly.

Bijápur 5 grains twice weekly.

Deccan Gang 15 grains weekly to all convalescents from Malaria and to all prisoners with spleen.

Tubercle showed 35 admissions and 15 deaths against 23 admissions and 7 deaths. Of these admissions 20 probably had the disease when admitted into Prison. Of these 10 died.

Anæmia and Debility: These headings show a satisfactory decline from 154 admissions and 6 deaths to 79 admissions and 5 deaths. Of the deaths Dhulia (1) in all probability due to tuberculosis. Yeránda (1) really due to Chronic Bronchitis with cardiac failure. Deccan Gang (1) probably fatty degeneration of heart and other organs. Hyderabad (1) an old feeble man constantly suffering from Diarrhœa.

Other General diseases show 610 admissions and 19 deaths against 621 admissions and 21 deaths in the past year. Deaths are due to Syphilis (3), Cerebrospinal fever (1), Papilloma Larynx (1), Septicæmia, (1), Pyæmia (1), Puerperal Septicæmia (1), Erysipelas (1), Rheumatism (2), Carcinoma Pancreas (1), Enteric fever (1), Tubercular affections (4), Diabetes mellitus (1).

Pneumonia: 100 cases and 39 deaths against 96 cases and 22 deaths. Sukkur and the Sind Gang showing 27 admissions and 16 deaths and 24 cases and 11 deaths against 13 cases and 2 deaths and 24 cases and 6 deaths respectively.

Other respiratory diseases show 334 admissions and 12 deaths against 209 and 5 deaths. The increase is attributed to the following Prisons:—Yeránda 98 admissions and 3 deaths against 35 admissions and no deaths in 1910. Deccan Gang 26 admissions and 2 deaths against 20 admissions and no deaths. Hyderabad 45 admissions against 18. Sind Gang 32 admissions and 3 deaths against 17 and no deaths in the previous year.

Diarrhœa: 290 admissions and 9 deaths against 236 admissions and 12 deaths in 1910. Yeránda 46 and Thána 60 account for the increase in admissions.

Abscesses, Boils and Ulcers show a decline of 91 on the previous year. Yeránda shows 104 less. Sábarmati an increase of 37.

58. Out of the total of 19,603 prisoners who were discharged during the year, 10,903 or in other words 55.6 per cent. gained weight against 54.2 in the year previous; 3,185 or 16.3 per cent. lost weight against 17.2 in 1910 and 5,515 or 28.1 per cent. remained stationary as compared with 28.6 per cent. in 1910.

OFFICIAL AND NON-OFFICIAL VISITORS.

59. There were two hundred and seventy-three Official Visitors during the year for our Prisons and 1st and 2nd Class Subsidiary Jails. Seventy-nine quarterly meetings were held during the year and all were well attended. Six hundred and thirty visits were paid by official visitors, while two hundred and nine were paid by non-official visitors.

Of the above sum Rs. 25,000 for improvements in His Majesty's House of Correction was reappropriated from the Prison Department. The great bulk of the allotment went towards the provision of warders' quarters. Practically all warders in Central, Special, and District Prisons now have quarters.

In addition to the above, a sum of Rs. 20,000 was allotted for the Discretionary Grant; all of which was expended during the year under report with the exception of a sum of Rs. 250 reappropriated in March. Of this sum Rs. 3,592 went to build quarters for the Jailor at Dhulia, the original building being condemned as unsafe; Rs. 3,417 to build a kitchen at Thána; Rs. 1,753 to construct a septic Tank at the Ahmedabad Central Prison; Rs. 1,499 for repairing roofs in Shikárpur Prison, which were unsafe; Rs. 1,612 for alterations in the coir matting work-shed in Karáchi, necessitated by destruction of wood work by white ants; Rs. 1,425 for removal of gallows at Thána to inside the Prison and a long needed improvement in the water-supply; Rs. 1,941 for water tanks at Yerávda and re-roofing the water cistern which was in an insanitary condition; the balance was expended in numerous petty works.

62. Government are considering the important question of improving the status and pay of the Prison warders. If good men could be induced to enlist a great step would be made in the management of Prisons.

63. Labouring, as it does, under every disadvantage the work done in connection with the Juvenile class at Dhárwár continues to be satisfactory. Five boys were released on the 12th of December on the occasion of the Delhi Durbar.

In all 12 boys were released during the year. Two were supplied with tools and sent to Bombay, employment being obtained for them there; at the close of the year both had left their employment.

The remainder, who returned to foreign territory, or had fields to look after, or who were unwilling to follow carpentry as a trade, were not given tools. So far as is known to the Prison Department, no juvenile released from this class has been reconvicted. Under rule 1030, Bombay Jail Manual, I have sanctioned a grant of Rs. 8 to such juveniles as take employment in Bombay in order that they may have subsistence allowance until they earn their first wages. The money is given to them by the Superintendent of the Common Prison. This is not an ideal arrangement but is the best that can be done when no one, outside officials, takes the slightest interest in the redemption of the criminal. A little interest shown in the welfare of criminals, especially youthful ones, on release is worth all the secular and religious instruction that can be imparted by most devoted workers to prisoners inside a jail.

Some articles of furniture made by the juveniles and sent to the Mysore Durbar, exhibition obtained a bronze medal.

64. Before my next report is written Mr. H. A. Hall, Superintendent, Deccan Gang, Visápur, will have retired, having completed over 30 years' service in the Department. Becoming Superintendent of the Deccan Gang in 1900, in the course of a few years he wrought a wonderful change. In cleanliness, discipline and health the Gang now compares favourably with many an intramural Prison. Never sparing himself in his long service Mr. Hall has ever given of his best; how good that best was only those under whom he has served can know. In retiring to a well-earned leisure he leaves behind him a record of unblemished service as an example to every one in the Department.

65. The results of the year may be briefly summarised as follows:—

The gross cost per head is Rs. 98-0-3 against Rs. 97-1-2 in 1910. The net cost per head Rs. 74-0-0 against Rs. 68-3-0 in 1910. The cash earnings Rs. 1,93,201 against Rs. 2,27,924 in 1910. The death-rate 18·7 against 14·3 per mille.

66. During the past year my Office Staff has worked well and the Head Accountant, Mr. Keshav Narayan Ratnaparkhi, has completed the statistical portion of this report with his usual speed and accuracy.
