Sir,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report, together with the usual Statistical Tables, on the Prisons and Jails in the Bombay Presidency, including the Province of Sind and the Settlement of Aden, for the year 1918. Lieut.-Colonel J. Jackson, I. M. S., was in charge of the Department until the 14th December when Lieut.-Colonel F. H. G. Hutchinson, I. M. S., relieved him.

JUDICIAL.

2. The number of Central, District, Special and Extra-mural Prisons has undergone no change during the year under report. Statistics of the Third Class Subsidiary Jails have been grouped together with those of Lockups, as in previous years.

3. From the general summary preceding the statements in the appendices to this report, it will be seen that the total population of all classes of prisoners confined in the Prisons, Subsidiary Jails, Lockups and Civil Jails has been 128,757, as compared with 109,412 in the year 1917, an increase of 19,345. The daily average population has been 12,095 which shows an increase of 852 when compared with the figures of the year previous.

4. The following table, which compares the figures of the past two years, Statement No. I.—Number refers to the admission of convicts into Prisons and and disposal of convicts. Second Class Subsidiary Jails only :—

5. The number of convicts admitted into Prisons and Second Class Subsidiary Jails increased by 2,042. The increase occurred at the Prisons of Yeravda, Dhulia, Thana, Ahmedabad, Hyderabad, Sukkur, Aden and His Majesty's Common Prison, Bombay, and is generally attributed to high prices of food-stuffs owing to failure of crops.

His Majesty's House of Correction, Bombay, shows a notable decrease in admissions, especially amongst Europeans, viz., 85 in 1918, against 205 in 1917. The admissions of 1917 contained a large number of prisoners under the Shipping Act against nine in 1918.

6. There is an appreciable decrease under the heads "Released on appeal" and "Released on other grounds by order of Government," while the heads "Released on expiry of sentence" and "Died" show a considerable

increase. Four hundred and eighty-nine prisoners were released by order of Government as detailed below :—

Ten released on medical grounds, 1 each from His Majesty's Common Prison and Yeravda Central Prison, 2 each from His Majesty's House of Correction and Sukkur Prison and 4 from Sabarmati. Of the 477 released on other grounds, 14 were life-transporters who had completed 14 years' imprisonment; 1 prisoner was released on the recommendation of the District Magistrate of Ratnagiri, 1 prisoner was given conditional release, 2 prisoners were released subject to police surveillance; 4 prisoners were released and sent to the Released Prisoners' Aid Society, Bijapur; 38 prisoners belonging to Criminal Tribes were released and sent to the Criminal Tribes Settlements at Bijapur and Khanapur; 36 were released and sent to the Salvation Army Home, Bombay; 1 female was released and sent to the Salvation Army Institute at Phulpur under Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 4254, dated the 25th June 1918; 5 females were released from the Common Prison and sent to the Bai Motlabai Hospital for their confinement; 293 were released and handed over to the Military Authorities under Government endorsement, Judicial Department, No. 6753, dated 15th October 1918, and 82 were sent to Mesopotamia. Ninety-four life-transporters and 55 term-transporters were deported to the Andamans *via* Alipore, against 153 life-transporters and 22 term-transporters in 1917.

There were 52 State prisoners, mostly Turkish subjects, in confinement in the Bombay Jails at the close of the year.

7. The heads "Native Christians," "Mahomedans" and "Hindus and Sikhs," which generally form the bulk of the admissions, show an increase of 34, 827 and 1,360 respectively; the heads "Europeans" and "Buddhists and Jains" show a slight decline.

Statement No. II.—Religion, age, education and previous occupation of convicts.

The number of juveniles under 15 years of age admitted during the year 1918 was 22 against 20 in 1917. Of the 18 males and 4 females convicted during the year, 2 males were previously convicted.

I tabulate below the punishments awarded in the case of the remaining 19, excluding one case where a sentence of 4 months' rigorous imprisonment was subsequently altered to one of whipping, as well as the ages of these prisoners :—

Magistrates might with advantage resort more frequently to the provisions of section 562 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

Of the total number of juveniles, 4 were sent to the Reformatory School by order of the District Magistrate and 1 was sent to the Dharwar Juvenile Jail by order of the sentencing Magistrate. As many as 10 out of the total 22 juveniles were admitted in Karachi.

Classified by education, 14 per cent. were able to read or write against 16 per cent. in 1917, 15 per cent. in 1916 and 14 per cent. in 1915.

Under "Previous conviction" an increase is noticeable under the two main heads "Persons engaged in agriculture and with animals" and "Persons engaged in commerce and trade," and a decline under the heads "Professional persons" and "Miscellaneous persons not classed otherwise". The percentage of the total number of males and females admitted to the free population according to the census of 1911 was 0.169 and .008 respectively.

8. With the exception of the sub-heads "Above 5 years and not exceeding 10 years," "Exceeding 10 years" and "Sentenced to death" all sub-heads show an increase in numbers, as compared with the previous year; but, while the increase in the total number of admissions was 2,042, the number sentenced to 1 month and under increased by 344. To this increase the Common Prison, Bombay, contributed as many as 277.

There were 719 prisoners sentenced to simple imprisonment, 17,286 sentenced to rigorous imprisonment and 19 to rigorous imprisonment with whipping as compared with 767, 15,174 and 10 in the previous year. The number of prisoners sentenced to rigorous imprisonment with solitary confinement was 96 against 127 in 1917, 186 in 1916 and 236 in 1915. Insufficient cellular accommodation prevents the due execution of many of these sentences.

The number of prisoners sentenced in Bombay for seven days and under in default of payment of fine was 377, against 297 in 1917. Two hundred and fifty-nine prisoners were sent to the Common Prison under substantive sentences of a week or less against 242 in 1917. Of these 259, 82 were under 25 years of age.

9. Out of a total of 3,050 previously convicted prisoners, 2,011 were classified as habituals. The number of habituals identified by Jail Officials was 70, against 119 in the year previous. The decrease occurred mainly at Yeravda, which shows nil in 1918 against 40 in 1917. The statement does not include 1,312 prisoners sentenced under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code. The admissions in Sind under this heading, commencing from 1910, are as follows:—

10. From the information supplied by the Inspector General of Police it appears that 1,527 persons were identified as old offenders in the Bombay Presidency, inclusive of Sind, as compared with 1,522 in the year previous. Of these 1,527 prisoners, 98 were identified in Bombay, 245 at Dhulia, 144 at Thana, 415 at Ahmedabad, 244 at Yeravda, 91 at Bijapur, 63 at Dharwar, 103 at the Deccan Gang and the rest in other parts of the Presidency.

11. The number of escapes of convicted prisoners during the year under report from Prisons, Extra-mural Gangs and Second Class Subsidiary Jails were 21 against 15 in the previous year, 13 being from inside jails and 8 from outside. The Hyderabad Central Prison was responsible for 11 intra-mural escapes, and Dharwar and the Sind Gang for 1 each. The extra-mural escapes were :—4 from the Sind Gang, 2 from Yeravda and 1 each from Karachi and the Deccan Gang. The total number of recaptures during the year were 22, four of whom had escaped in previous years and 18 in 1918.

The intra-mural escapes from Dharwar Prison and the Sind Gang were due to gross carelessness on the part of convict officers and a paid warder who were punished either departmentally or by prosecution before a Magistrate.

Eleven prisoners escaped from the Hyderabad Central Prison on the night of November 4th, 1918. A detailed report of the escape was made to Government in this office letters Nos. 13725 and 14294, dated the 18th and 30th November 1918 respectively.

Escapes from outside jails were due to neglect of standing orders, the officials responsible being suitably dealt with.

12. The number of offences dealt with by the Criminal Courts remain stationary as compared with those of the year previous, as detailed in the subjoined statement :—

13. The following table shows that the number of offences dealt with by Superintendents has fallen from 17,304 to 16,387, a decrease of 917, with an increased average population of the year of 9,666 against 9,372 in 1917. The number of offences dealt with by minor punishments has decreased by 766 and of those dealt with by major punishments by 151. The only unsatisfactory feature about these offences is the rise in the number relating to prohibited articles and to assaults, mutiny and escapes. I am dealing with the matter.

14. The following table shows the nature of punishments awarded during the past two years. It will be seen that the total number of major and minor punishments awarded by Superintendents during the year under report was 17,048 and the total number of offences 16,387. The difference is due to 661 offences having been dealt with during the year under report by the award of combined punishments.

15. Of the 17,048 punishments awarded by the Superintendents of Prisons and Jails, 11,075, or nearly 65 per cent., belong to the minor and 5,973, or 35 per cent., belong to the major class. Warnings formed 18.9 per cent. of the total number.

The following Prisons show an increase in punishments :—

Yeravda Central Prison 255, Dhulia Prison 197, Karwar Prison 75, Ahmedabad Central Prison 68, Hyderabad Central Prison 560 and Aden Special Prison 68. The increases are generally due to an increased population, to the exaction of full tasks, to short work given by certain refractory prisoners, and to poor supervision on the part of Jail Officials.

Out of 16,387 offences, 2,194 habituais were responsible for 5,174 and 4,503 non-habituais for the balance of 11,213 offences. The percentage of habituais including those under section 110, Criminal Procedure Code, is 17.1 calculated on admission rates.

16. The subjoined table furnishes details as to the number of stripes inflicted on convicts in the various Prisons during the year under report. The total number of corporal punishments has decreased from 27 in 1917 to 21 in 1918 and are accounted for as follows :—

His Majesty's Common Prison—one; for assaulting a prisoner by throwing filth on him.

His Majesty's House of Correction—one; for a similar offence.

Yeravda Central Prison—three; one for a similar assault on the Superintendent and Jailor and two for ordinary assaults on convict overseers.

Bijapur Prison—one; attempting to assault a Head Warder and assaulting a night watchman and a convict warder.

Thana Special Prison—two; one for persistently refusing to work and one for instigating another convict not to work.

Ahmedabad Central Prison—three; two for refusing to work and one for striking a prisoner.

Rajkot Agency Prison—one; assaulting the Jailor.

Hyderabad Central Prison—four; one for refusing to work and instigating others not to work, two for absolutely refusing to work and one for assaulting a convict with a knife.

Aden Special Prison—five; four for assaulting a night watchman and one for threatening to assault the Jailor and Head Warder and persistently refusing to do any work.

Of the 21 prisoners flogged, 11 were habituals. The floggings are the lowest recorded in the reports of this Presidency and were well deserved in every case.

17. A total of 9,164 prisoners were fettered during the year as compared with 7,939 in 1917, an increase mostly due to a larger population. As in previous years, fetters were generally imposed on prisoners employed on extra mural labour—in many cases a single fetter and ankle ring.

Remission System.

18. A total of 2,849 prisoners were released during the year under the remission system, as compared with 2,785 in the year previous. The percentage during the year 1918 of those released under the remission system to the total number who might have been released under that system, if of average good conduct upto the date of release, was 98.2 in 1918 against 97.9 in 1917. The practice of mustering prisoners and reading and explaining to them the benefits of the remission rules has been continued. Special awards under rules 514 and 519, *i.e.* remission for committing no offence during the previous 12 months and for doing special work, were granted to 2,193 and 2,618 prisoners respectively, against 1,853 and 2,648 in the year previous.

The practice of promoting prisoners under sentence of one year, in the absence of suitable long-term prisoners, was adopted in all Prisons and was found to work satisfactorily.

19. The average number employed as Prison Officers during the year under report in Prisons and Second Class Subsidiary Jails was 1,031 males and 13 females, against 1,055 males and 14 females in the year previous. The total number of punishments awarded to them was 1,959, against 2,036 in 1917.

Statement No. VII.—Convict Officers.

Statement No. VIII.—Diet. 20. The statement requires no comment.

21. The number of undertrial prisoners admitted during the year rose from 76,140 to 94,207 in 1918, an increase of 18,067, and the daily average strength from 1,811 to 2,390, an increase of 579. The number of undertrials acquitted were 18,439 against 15,901 in 1917.

Statement No. XVIII—Undertrial prisoners.

22. The instances in which adolescents or juveniles were detained as undertrial for prolonged periods were more numerous than in any other year, which is a matter for regret. The list is a long one and my purpose will be served if I tabulate it by detention periods:—

23. Thirty-eight undertrial prisoners escaped in 1918 against 19 in 1917. Of these escapes, 1 was from the Ahmedabad Central Prison; 2 females from Belgaum and 32 males and 3 females from Third Class Subsidiary Jails and Lockups. The escapes from Ahmedabad and Belgaum were from inside the Jail.

The Ahmedabad escape was a very daring one. The prisoner was a notorious character, who had escaped from a jail before and was fettered with bar fetters and confined in a separate cell. The escape was noticed only in the morning at the time of unlocking the cell when the door-frame was found to have been cut near the staple bolt from inside. After coming out of the cell the prisoner appears to have readjusted the hasp in position, fixing the staple bolt *in situ* in the clean-cut socket, so that it could barely be detected from outside that the door was in any way tampered with. He put up a dummy in the middle of the cell improvised out of his dinner and conservancy vessels which were covered over with a blanket. The warders and convict officers on night duty who had obviously connived at the escape or were grossly negligent were punished departmentally. The prisoner has not yet been recaptured.

Two females escaped from the Belgaum Subsidiary Jail one evening between 7 and 9 o'clock. The escape was evidently planned at the instigation of, and in collusion with, a Jail warder and a Police Constable. The latter were tried before the First Class Magistrate, Belgaum, but were discharged on some technical ground. The Jail warder has been dismissed from the service.

24. The number of deaths among undertrial prisoners show an increase of 104 on the figure for the year previous. Of the total 140 deaths, 21 occurred in Prisons, 2 in Second Class Subsidiary Jails and 117 in Third Class Subsidiary Jails and Lockups. Of the 117 deaths in Subsidiary Jails, 53 were due to influenza, 39 to pneumonia, 6 to malaria, 3 each to asthma and failure of heart and 1 each to senile debility, opium habit, opium poisoning, emphysema of the lungs, tubercle of the lung, pleurisy, plague, syphilis, cholera, diarrhoea, epilepsy, heart disease and injury. Of the 23 deaths in Prisons and Second Class Subsidiary Jails, 13 were due to influenza alone.

25. The number of undertrials remaining on 31st December 1918 was 627 males and 14 females in Prisons, 97 males and 5 females in Second Class Subsidiary Jails and 2,437 males and 94 females in Third Class Subsidiary Jails and Lockups, making a total of 3,161 males and 113 females.

26. The number of prisoners admitted to Civil Jails during the year was 739 males and 2 females, against 1,092 males in 1917, while the daily average number was 39, against 60 in 1917. The total cost and cost per head have been Rs. 6,719-2-11 and Rs. 172-4-7 during the year under report, as against Rs. 5,826-5-4 and Rs. 97-1-8 respectively in the year 1917. This amount is exclusive of ration charges which are borne by the creditor. The increase in cost per head is due to the cost of establishment being distributed over a smaller average population, to the grant of a war allowance to Civil Warders and to an increased grant under "Uniform".

FINANCIAL.

27. The statements noted in the margin deal with the gross expenditure on account of convicted and undertrial prisoners confined in the Central, District and Extra-mural Prisons, Subsidiary Jails and Lockups. Statement No. IX includes charges for inspection and general superintendence. The

realization from the sale-proceeds of garden produce has been deducted from the total charges. The gross expenditure during the year 1918 was Rs. 14,58,992 and the cost per head Rs. 121-0-3 against Rs. 10,79,874 and Rs. 96-9-0 in the year previous.

28. The total cost and cost per head under this head have increased from Rs. 3,40,316 and Rs. 30-6-11 in the year 1917 to Rs. 3,95,510 and Rs. 32-13-0 in the year under report.

Establishment.

The increase is due to (1) payment of acting allowance in 1918 to the acting Inspector General of Prisons in the absence of Lieut.-Colonel J. Jackson, I. M. S., on privilege leave in 1917, (2) increase in pay of warders, (3) payment of war allowance, (4) entertainment of two European warders in 1918 at H. M.'s House of Correction instead of one, (5) substitution of Reserve Warder Guard for the Police Guard at the Dharwar Juvenile Jail during the year under report, (6) entertainment of three warders at Rs. 14-0-0 each as sowars at the Deccan Gang and (7) increase under the sub-head "Temporary Establishment," required to guard prisoners employed on special extra-mural work in Sind.

29. The total cost of dietary charges has increased from Rs. 4,88,360 in the year 1917 to Rs. 7,57,687 in the year under report and the cost per head has risen from Rs. 43-10-8 to Rs. 62-13-6. The increase is due to an increase in population, to the high rates of articles of provisions, and to water rates charged for the irrigation of gardens attached to the Prisons at Hyderabad and Shikarpur.

Dietary charges.

30. The value of vegetables and other supplies from the gardens attached to Prisons and Jails was Rs. 40,135, an increase of Rs. 9,099 as compared with the figure for the year previous.

Gardens.

At Sukkur a piece of land close to the Jail, measuring 21,556 square feet, was acquired at a cost of Rs. 9,336 for the disposal of sullage water and for use as a Jail garden. Vegetables of the value of Rs. 1,099 were supplied to prisoners during the year from this new garden.

31. The total cost and cost per head have increased from Rs. 44,999 and Rs. 4-0-4 in the year 1917 to Rs. 54,824 and Rs. 4-8-8 in the year under report. The increase is due to

Hospital charges.

(1) the increase in the number of admissions into hospitals from 8,326 in 1917 to 12,225 in 1918, (2) higher rates for milk and other articles of food, and (3) extras allowed to a much larger number of prisoners during the epidemic of influenza.

32. The total cost and cost per head have increased from Rs. 56,014 and Rs. 5-0-2 in 1917 to Rs. 75,092 and Rs. 6-3-7 in the year under report. The increase is due to (a) larger population and (b) enhanced rates of twist and wool.

Clothing and Bedding.

33. The expenditure under this head was Rs. 32,965, an increase of Rs. 5,026 when compared with the figure of the previous year. The increase is due to the general increase in the prison population during the year under report, and to the general increase in prices of all articles.

Sanitation charges.

34. The total cost of moving prisoners rose from Rs. 50,733 in 1917 to Rs. 60,335 in the year under report, an increase of Rs. 9,602. The increase is due to a larger number of convicted and undertrial prisoners being admitted, released and transferred during the year under report and to the police lockup charges at Aden being higher owing to war conditions.

Charges for moving prisoners.

35. The total cost and cost per head have increased from Rs. 50,086 and Rs. 4-7-8 in the year 1917 to Rs. 58,716 and Rs. 4-14-0 in the year under report. Apart from the general rise in prices of all articles, the increase is due to increase of grant under uniforms and to purchase of fodder for Jail bullocks and of grass and grain for three horses for sowars at the Deccan Gang.

Charges for Miscellaneous Services and Supplies.

36. The total cost and cost per head have decreased from Rs. 5,171 and Re. 0-7-5 to Rs. 5,163 and Re. 0-6-11,

Travelling Allowance.

37. The total cost and cost per head have increased from Rs. 10,844 and Re. 0-15-6 in the year 1917 to Rs. 11,859 and Re. 0-15-10 in the year under report.

38. This head shows an increase of Rs. 1,429; the figures being Rs. 6,841 and Re. 0-9-1 in 1918 against Rs. 5,412 and Re. 0-7-9 in 1917. At the Sind Convict Gang five tents of the value of Rs. 1,250 were purchased for a detachment of prisoners working at Karachi.

39. Although the total number of prisoners sentenced to labour increased from 9,218 in 1917 to 9,547 in the year under report the percentage of those employed on manufactures decreased by one. This was due to a more unhealthy year giving a larger number of sick, convalescents and infirm and to a larger number being employed under the Public Works Department for building purposes, such labour being excluded from this head.

40. This statement is supposed to give some idea of the financial results of jail manufactures, but it deals merely with cash transactions and does not take into account stocks in hand and debts at beginning and end of year. The prescribed financial statements do not show all factory transactions during the year, and it is necessary to employ the form used by all other Provincial Governments, except Bombay and Burma, under the heading of statement No. XII-A. This form will be found next to statement XII.

The cash earnings have increased from Rs. 1,20,018 in the year 1917 to Rs. 1,60,744 in the year under report, an increase of Rs. 40,726. The Sind Gang has contributed Rs. 27,350 to this increase, or 67 per cent. Sukkur comes next with an increase of Rs. 9,230 and the Deccan Gang with Rs. 6,314.

Column 11 of statement XII shows a cash loss of Rs. 18,575 against Yeravda, whereas really there was a profit of Rs. 5,342 if the stocks in hand etc. are taken into account. The profit would have been larger but for the loss of Rs. 13,022 on the manufacture and supply of quinine powders for sale to the public. For the last two years the results of factory transactions at this Jail have been vitiated by the purchase of quinine at higher rates than those at which the manufactured powders have been sold.

Quinine treatments of the value of Rs. 22,409 were received from the Medical Storekeeper, Bombay, and 2,601 parcels were distributed during the year. There was a loss on these transactions also, as there was a difference of Rs. 2-4-0 between the purchase and selling prices of the treatments; but the accounts of quinine treatments are dealt with in the budget of the Medical Department.

Another reason of small profits at Yeravda is the fact that the value of prison labour employed in the Press is not charged for. Thus, an average of 252 prisoners were so employed whose cash earnings, calculated at a cooly's wage of annas 8 per day, would have amounted to Rs. 38,556.

To illustrate the value of what I have said above, I would point out that whereas statement XII shows a cash loss at four Jails, statement XII-A shows a profit at all jails.

The net profit (column 21, statement XII-A) was largest at the Sind Gang (Rs. 58,229), next come the Deccan Gang with a profit of Rs. 44,177, Ahmedabad with a profit of Rs. 26,053 and Sukkur with a profit of Rs. 12,118.

41. During the year under report jail-made articles of the value of Rs. 83,496 were sold to Government Departments, etc., as detailed below, against Rs. 60,603 in the year previous:—

42. The Gang remained at Visapur in the Ahmednagar District throughout the year. With an average of 1,301 prisoners sentenced to labour, the net profit amounted to Rs. 44,177 against Rs. 33,306 in 1917, with an average of 1,089 prisoners. The general health of the prisoners was not satisfactory. The death rate per mille, excluding influenza deaths, was 15·3 in 1918, against 23·7 in 1917. The Superintendent, Mr. C. N. Hall, I. S. O., and the medical staff of the Gang had to contend against a particularly severe outbreak of the disease which caused 90 deaths.

43. This Gang was at Ganja Takar near Hyderabad (Sind) during the whole year. It showed a net profit of Rs. 58,229 with an average population of 775 labouring prisoners, as against Rs. 59,313 with 750 prisoners in the year 1917. The work thrown on the Superintendent—Assistant Surgeon Contractor—and the executive and medical staff of the Gang was very heavy during this year also.

The Sind Gang has helped the Military Departments at Karachi and Hyderabad considerably by the supply of jail labour. Prison labour was required to make a coal reserve, to unload and stock grain bags at the supply and transport depôts, to build barracks and buildings for the troops and to dig trenches for imparting training at manœuvres. The health of the Gang was not satisfactory owing to a virulent outbreak of influenza and the general unhealthiness of the year. The total number of deaths was 101, of which 51 were due to influenza. The Gang stands next to Karachi as regards unhealthiness with a ratio of 130·3 deaths per mille.

44. The subjoined statement compares the outturn of the Yeravda Prison Press in the years of 1917 and 1918. The number of prisoners employed in 1918 was 252 against 267 in the year previous, the total cost of their maintenance being Rs. 27,681 calculated on an average cost of Rs. 109-13-6 per prisoner.

45. The average net cost to Government per prisoner was Rs. 103-13-0 against Rs. 82-2-0 in the year previous.

VITAL.

Statement No. XIV—Sickness and Mortality.

46. The following table compares the principal features relating to sickness and mortality for the years 1917 and 1918:—

It shows that the number of admissions into hospital was greater by 50 per cent., that the number of daily average sick rose from 281.3 to 336.9 and that the death ratio per mille increased by over 300 per cent. Influenza contributed 62 per cent. of the total deaths.

47. The subjoined statement compares the health of each prison during the last two years. It will be seen that the total number of deaths were 708, against 210 in 1917, of which 436 or 61.5 per cent. were due to influenza. The death rate from this disease per mille was 36, against a total death rate of 58.5, from all causes. The subject of influenza as it affected the jail population has been dealt with in the interesting report of the Sanitary Commissioner submitted to Government under No. 844 on the 22nd January 1919. The general death rate for the Presidency was 88.05, against 40.76 in 1917.

48. I now comment on the mortality in certain jails where the death rate was comparatively high.

His Majesty's Common Prison.—Sixteen deaths in the year, of which 4 were due to influenza, against a total of 4 deaths only in 1917. It is significant that there were 5 deaths from pneumonia during the year, against only 1 in 1917. Six prisoners are reported to have been admitted to jail in very bad health and one in the incubation stage of plague.

Yeravda.—A total of 70 deaths, of which 48 were due to influenza. Excluding the latter, the death rate was only 11.2 per mille.

Thana.—Fourteen deaths against only 6 in 1917. Three of these 14 were due to influenza and 3 to pneumonia, against nil and 1 respectively in 1917. I am looking into the medical administration of this prison.

Karachi.—Of a total of 72 deaths, as many as 62, or 86 per cent., were due to influenza.

Hyderabad.—Seventy-seven deaths, of which 40 were due to influenza, 11 to pneumonia and 7 to tubercle of lung, against nil, 20 and 1 respectively in 1917. I am enquiring into the causes of increased mortality under tubercle.

Shikarpur.—Eight deaths, of which 3 were due to influenza and 1 to pneumonia. Two prisoners were released on medical grounds within 15 days of their admission and are shown as deaths for the purpose of jail statistics.

The Sind Gang shows a larger incidence of pneumonia cases and a heavier mortality.

The following prisons were overcrowded throughout the year:—H. M.'s Common Prison, Bombay, Yeravda, Bijapur, Thana, Ahmedabad, Karachi, Hyderabad and Sukkur, and Dhulia from May to December. How far the overcrowding has reacted on the general health of prisoners I am unable to say, but, after inspection of some prisons since assuming charge, I am of the opinion that the question of the lateral ventilation area in our jails will have to be reconsidered:

Overcrowding was relieved by the use of tents, verandahs and unused worksheds as dormitories, and by transfers to other prisons.

49. The following methods were adopted during the year under report with a view to improve the health of the prisoners confined in our prisons and are inserted in accordance with the orders contained in paragraph 1 of Government Resolution, Judicial Department, No. 9115, dated 29th December 1896:—

- (1) Issue of wheat and rice in lieu of bajri and jowari in certain cases.
- (2) Issue of two ounces extra flour and one ounce of molasses to working prisoners in the Deccan Gang.
- (3) Issue of wheat in lieu of bajri and jowari at the Sind Gang and anti-scorbutic chatni in the hot weather.
- (4) Issue of extra rations to weakly prisoners and convalescents.
- (5) Issue of quinine as a prophylactic against malaria.
- (6) Issue of potatoes and onions in the vegetable ration.
- (7) Issue of extra warm clothing when considered necessary.
- (8) Inoculation with plague prophylactic serum.

50. In subsidiary jails and lockups the population has risen from 73,606 in 1917 to 90,308 in the year under report.

The daily average strength, number of admissions into hospital, and daily average sick have been, respectively, 1,997, 1,725 and 25.7 against 1,569, 1,688 and 26.2 in 1917. The number of deaths was 120, of which 54 were due to influenza, against a total of 33 in 1917. The death rate per mille was 60.1, against 23.0 in 1917.

51. The marginally noted statement shows the diseases chiefly responsible for sick admissions and deaths among convicted prisoners.

Statement No. XV.

Two cases of plague occurred at Ratnagiri, one at Karachi and one at the Common Prison, Bombay. The Ratnagiri cases were inoculated previous to admission, but one of them died three months after inoculation. The case at the Common Prison was received in the incubation stage and died soon after admission to jail.

Inoculation as a precautionary measure against plague was resorted to at H. M.'s Common Prison, Bombay, and at the Prisons of Yeravda, Dhulia, Bijapur, Ratnagiri, Thana, Ahmedabad, Rajkot, Hyderabad, Shikarpur and the Deccan Convict Gang. No ill effects were observed in the prisoners so inoculated.

Dysentery.—A decrease of 111 cases and 1 death as compared with 1917. With the exception of the Deccan Gang and Dharwar, which show increases of 45 and 6 cases respectively, all prisons and jails show a decrease.

Malaria.—A slight increase of 34 cases, but with 7 deaths as against 8 in 1917.

Pyrexia of uncertain origin shows 23 admissions and 1 death against 29 admissions and 1 death in 1917. Of the 23 admissions, Aden alone is responsible for 18 cases.

Quinine was given as a prophylactic measure at all prisons and jails with the exception of Dharwar, the two Bombay prisons, Rajkot and Karwar. Enquiries are being made as to why the orders on the subject were not carried out.

Tubercle of the lungs shows 63 admissions and 19 deaths against 48 admissions and 24 deaths in 1917. Of these, 38 at least had contracted the disease outside the jail. There is no accommodation for the reception of these cases in any of our prisons except at Yeravda, but plans and estimates for the construction of proper tubercle wards and cells in the prisons of Ahmedabad, Hyderabad, Karachi, Thana and Dhulia have been approved and sanctioned by

Government during the current year and work will be taken in hand as soon as funds are allotted. The accommodation at Yeravda is being increased.

Anæmia and debility show 65 admissions and 3 deaths, against 39 cases and 1 death in 1917. The increase was marked at the Deccan Gang (8 cases against nil in 1917) and at the Thana Special Prison (16 cases in 1918 against 2 in the year previous). I have satisfied myself that the diagnosis at Thana in the large majority of these cases was faulty and I have discussed the subject with the Medical Officer. I am asking Medical Officers to try and ascertain the cause of anæmia in each case and not remain content with diagnosing the condition of anæmia.

Other general infective diseases show 4,526 cases and 384 deaths against 1,009 cases and 18 deaths in 1917. The enormous increase is due to the inclusion of 3,615 admissions and 370 deaths of influenza under this head.

Pneumonia.—206 admissions and 71 deaths against 196 and 60 deaths in 1917. The disease was practically confined to the Deccan Gang (20 cases, 7 deaths), Karachi Prison (18 cases, 3 deaths), Hyderabad Central Prison (40 cases, 11 deaths) and the Sind Gang (72 cases, 34 deaths).

52. Out of the total of 20,183 prisoners who were discharged during the year, 11,170 or 55·3 per cent. gained weight against 10,720 or 54·6 in the year previous; 4,664 or 23·1 per cent. lost weight against 4,175 or 21·2 per cent. in 1917 and 4,349 or 21·6 per cent. remained stationary as compared with 4,750, or 24·2 in 1917.

OFFICIAL AND NON-OFFICIAL VISITORS.

53. There were 262 official visitors during the year for Prisons and Second Class Subsidiary Jails. Fifty-six quarterly meetings were held during the year, all being well attended. Five hundred and forty-two visits were paid by official visitors and 74 by non-official visitors.

54. The following allotments were sanctioned during the year for original major works :—

56. There were 143 adolescents in the Dharwar Juvenile Jail at the beginning of the year; a total of 136 were admitted, against 112 in the previous year, and 96 were released, leaving a balance of 183 at the end of 1918.

Transfers.—Three carpenters were transferred to the Yeravda Central Prison to do war work, and one was transferred to the Dharwar Lunatic Asylum.

Releases.—Four good carpenters were granted sets of tools on release, three of them being allowed to work in their villages and one in the Salvation Army Released Prisoners' Home, Byculla. One prisoner was released conditionally and sent to the Salvation Army Released Prisoners' Home, but as his behaviour there was unsatisfactory he was transferred to the Yeravda Central Prison to serve out the unexpired portion of his sentence. Two other prisoners were released conditionally and sent to the Salvation Army Home, Bombay, and one was released on appeal. Of four others who on release were employed at the Salvation Army Home, two left the Home while the others are working satisfactorily.

One lad with a previous conviction for cheating was allowed on release to go to his village, but as he committed an offence punishable under section 420, Indian Penal Code, shortly after his release, he was sentenced to two years' rigorous imprisonment and a fine of Rs. 30 or two months' rigorous imprisonment and sent to the Bijapur Prison.

One prisoner was enlisted in the Army by the Assistant Recruiting Officer, Dharwar and Bijapur, 8 were sent to the Salvation Army Released Prisoners' Home, Bombay, with letters requesting the Superintendent to give them work and 70 were released in the ordinary way and sent to their native places, as they wished to see their relatives.

The conduct and work of the class-boys was good. At the close of the year there were 46 lads learning carpentry, 28 gardening, 13 smithy and 42 masonry.

The Educational Inspector has reported favourably on the school where the boys are taught the three R's upto the 3rd standard. Lads whose home language is Urdu get lessons in that language from a warder.

The boys are fond of the Gymnastics, Indian club-swinging, and drill they are made to go through. The Superintendent reports that they take a pride in doing these exercises well and that a course of it makes a wonderful difference in their bearing and development. Cricket has also been started.

The boys have completed the jail wall and it is hoped the main gate and offices will be taken in hand this year.

Mr. Spooner, District Engineer, Madras and Southern Mahratha Railway, gave a magic lantern display in the class room, which the lads appreciated very much. Three artists from the Patwardhan Circus performed for the boys on the

horizontal and parallel bars and also gave them a couple of lessons. Moulvi Mahomed Abdulla and Mr. N. M. Mahishi visited the Prison and lectured to the boys.

57. The Bombay Presidency Released Prisoners' Aid Society has now completed three years of active existence. During this period, the Society has made good progress both financially and in the scope and character of its activities. The number of released prisoners helped during the year was much greater than in the previous year. The attempts made to keep in touch with the released prisoners helped were more systematic, although there is still much room for improvement in that direction. At the end of the year under report, the Society decided to extend its sphere of activities to the Police Courts in the City, in order to help first offenders to obtain the benefit of section 562 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

The Agent of the Society, Mr. M. R. Chitnis, has worked zealously under the supervision of Mr. N. M. Joshi of the Servants of India Society, a member of the Central Committee. As during last year, Messrs. T. A. Kulkarni and S. R. Kapadia gave weekly lectures to the prisoners in the Bombay Prisons. The total contributions have increased from Rs. 2,615 in 1917 to Rs. 8,603 in 1918, an increase of Rs. 5,988. To this increase the N. M. Wadia Charities Fund has contributed Rs. 1,500. The Bijapur Prisoners' Aid Society has been working throughout the year, but no detailed report has been received in my office.

The Annual Report on the Salvation Army Boys' Home, declared as a Reformatory at Byculla, Bombay, has been separately submitted for the information of Government.

58. A report on the Hur Settlement at Visapur has, under orders of Government, been forwarded to the Criminal Tribes Settlement Officer, Bijapur.

59. During the year 82 prisoners were sent for service in the Labour Corps in Mesopotamia.

60. The sanctioned strength of warders is 860. It is too soon yet to report on the results of the increase in the pay of warders sanctioned by Government during the course of the year under report but there were 107 resignations and 93 dismissals or discharges during the year, while the year closed with 42 vacancies.

61. The results of the year may be briefly summarised as follows:—The gross cost per head was Rs. 121-0-3 against Rs. 96-9-0 in 1917; the net cost per head exclusive of charges on account of inspection and general superintendence Rs. 103-15-0 against Rs. 82-2-0 in 1917; the cash earnings Rs. 1,60,744 against Rs. 1,20,018, and the death rate 58·5, against 18·7 in 1917.

They have had to contend against persistent overcrowding, a depleted warder establishment and, lastly, a severe outbreak of influenza which must have thrown the whole machinery of jail administration out of gear.

The quantity of condiments was reduced to 3 drs. on medical grounds for all other prisoners. Convict Overseers were given meat on Wednesdays along with convict Warders.

Ratnágiri Prison.—The issue of rice 1 lb. on Monday, Thursday and Saturday in lieu of bájri was continued upto October 1918. From November wheat and rice were issued as bájri was not procurable in the market.

Common Prison.—Dál, toor, was issued 5 times a week, while Dál, gram, was issued twice a week.

Deccan Gang.—One oz. of molasses were issued to every labouring prisoner with the morning canjee excepting those sick prisoners who were on (d) diet.
