A few minor works were still in progress at the close of the year. The works are now in charge of the Public Works Department.

Sheesham trees have been extensively planted and nurseries to the extent of sixty acres laid. Four hundred and twenty-nine acres of Jungle were cleared and the land levelled for cultivation.

4. Standards of height of troop horses.—The statement given below shewn the average heights of the several classes of Australian remounts purchased during the year under review as compared with the previous year.

5. Arabs and Persians.—The number advertised for purchase was 205 ! the number obtained 160. In last year's report it was stated that the Arab and Persian imports of that year were the worst lot landed for many years; but this year the Arabs were still worse. The Persians however showed an improvement, The worst feature of the Arab importations was that three Arabs out of every five landed were three-year olds. This was the result of the high prices given for all classes of animals in the year of the Delhi Durbar. Dealers tempted by the hope of these prices still obtaining imported during the next two years every full-grown, Arab they could lay hands on and thus youg stock only were left in the Arabian market. The Arab dealers themselves admitted that this year's importations as a whole were very bad, but they added that they had brought the best they could get. If this is true, and it was confirmed by Colonel Fadlullah, Commandant of the Arab stud at Babolna, himself an Arab, who had been in Arabia lately, and the Arab market is declining, the importance of strengthening our Stud while there is time cannot be exaggerated.

6. Imported Mules.—During the year this department imported mules from the Argentine Republic, from Persia, and from the Chinese Frontier. In order to make good the shortage in the previous year, Major Arbuthnot was specially deputed to purchase in Persia, and Major Gough was sent to the Argentine to pass 750 mules to be supplied by Mr. Tetley of Buenos Aires.

(i) Argentines.—When Major Gough had passed the 750 to be supplied by Mr. Tetley he was further deputed to purchase the 6,500 sanctioned in connection with the Reorganisation scheme. A trial contract was placed with Messrs. Bracht and Co. of Antwerp for the supply of 1,000, $@f_{21}$ to each, but owing to the difficulty the firm seemed to experience in obtaining animals and the inferior class they offered for inspection, no further contract was given them. Arrangements for the supply of the remainder were then made with Mr. Tetley whose work has given every satisfaction.

A total number of 6,534 mules were obtained at a cost $\pounds 21$ to a head plus expenses of the officers purchasing them. They have been classified as follows by the Supply and Transport Department :---

(iii) Chinese.—In view of the possibilities of the country conterminous with the Burman frontier to supply mules, Major Willoughby was deputed to enquire into its resources and to purchase any suitable animals that might be available. Major Willoughby's report has already been submitted and Government have been pleased to express their appreciation thereof. Major Willoughby was asked to purchase—

Of these he could only secure one ordnance mule and 26 transport mules. The Commandants of units to whom the latter were issued reported that the animals were suitable in every way for transport purposes.

- 7. Health.-The health of the horses during the year has been very good.

The health of the establishment has on the whole been good. Plague however claimed five victims in the Saharanpur Depôt and at Hosur, notwithstanding inoculation and every possible precaution, the disease found its way into the Depôt. There were 44 cases of which 35 succumbed to the attack. The epidemic lasted from the 27th August 1904 to 11th February 1905.

Saharanpur.—The decrease in the profit at this depôt is chiefly due to smaller outturn of certain crops consequent on the severity of the winter, higher price of labour than in the previous year, and to lower market rates.

Hapur and Mona.—The noticeable increase in the profit at these depots may be considered satisfactory.

Hosur.—The decrease is due to the reduced outturn of hay consequent on the failure of the north-east monsoon.

Ahmednagar.—The increased loss at Ahmednagar is due to a scanty rainfall and the consequent falling off in the outturn of the farm. With the land now secured at Framjee's Garden it is hoped that farming will assume a different aspect at Ahmednagar. 9. Poonapalli Tank.—After protracted negotiations the Poonapalli tank was at last notified by the Collector of Salem on 31st March 1905 as ready to be handed over. It has since been taken over by the Hosur Depôt.

Of this number 98 were landed 80 of which had been selected in Austria by Mr. Fairholme subject to passing a veterinary examination in Bombay. The remaining 20 were to be purchased in India if considered fit. Of the latter 15 were purchased. The contract price of the lot was \pounds 45 a head, of which Mr. Fairholme received $\pounds 2$ a head for his services.

As far as can be judged at present these horses do not compare with Australians of the same class for pace or power. On the other hand they require no acclimatisation. They seem to take naturally to the country, travel well and keep their condition under work on a very small ration. In the event of sudden mobilisation these horses would be very useful for cavalry. For artillery it is doubtful if they have sufficient power. I have to thank Mr. Fairholme for the way he carried out his work which involved much travelling.

14. Argentines.—An order was placed with Messrs. Porteous and Knight, the representatives of Colonel Brough in the Argentine, to supply 250 horses for Artillery. The number purchased was only 91 and these are a very indifferent lot. The shippers when accepting the contract had three months in which to fulfil it. Failing to do so and to produce the class of animal wanted they complained of the shortness of the notice and that the time of the year was unfavourable for conditioning horses. Major Gough reports that good horses in the Argentine, though not plentiful, are procurable in small numbers in different parts of the country. Breeding is spasmodic for want of encouragement and he is of opinion that if India offered a regular market for a particular type, breeders would certainly endeavour to produce that type. He considers that the price offered by Government leaves a very fair margin of profit to the stock breeder. The prices offered were \pounds 20 a head in the Argentine or \pounds 45 c.i.f. landed in India. The 91 obtained cost \pounds 35-9 a head landed in India. Under the circumstances I do not think we can look on Argentine as a source of supply.

15. North Americans.—Major Gough was also directed to visit the United States of America in order to explain to our contractors there, the class of animal required for the Indian Services and to arrange for the purchase of 100 sample horses. He proceeded to Sheridan Wyoming, and stayed about 10 days with the Messrs. Moncreiffe looking over their stock and explaining to them our requirements. He reports they are all bred in the North-West, a lime stone country, among rocky hills, subject to a good deal of heat in the summer and to very severe winters. Like the Argentine horse they are purely pasture-fed and a year's acclimatisation and grain feeding in India should give good development. Out of 94 horses landed in India by Messrs. Moncreiffe, 87 were purchased.

The increase under horses is due chiefly to 23 having been cast and sold at the Saharanpur depôt during the year under review against 8 cast in the previous year, and to 15 young stock having died at Mona during 1904-05 against 4 in the previous year. Out of the 23 cast at Saharanpur during 1904-05 7 were actually cast in the previous year, but having been sold in 1904-05 they were included in the accounts of the latter year. The comparison therefore should be 15 cast in 1903-04 and 16 in 1004-05. The increase at Mona is due chiefly to the large number of deaths from strangles.

HORSE, MULE AND DONKEY BREEDING.

33. The Gujranwala District was transferred from the Rawalpindi Circle to the Jhelum Canal Colony Circle and the Gujrat District from the Civil Veterinary Department to the Rawalpindi Circle. The Sharakpur Tahsil of the Lahore District was transferred from the Lahore Circle to the Jhelum Canal Colony Circle.

34. In Military Department letter No. 3883-D., dated the 14th July 1904, Government sanctioned the establishment of stud farms at Ahmednagar and Mona with the object of preserving the pure eastern breeds of horses and of, producing pure bred animals which will be fit for use as Imperial stallions.

The stud at Ahmednagar will ultimately consist: of 85* mares and that at 18

Arab mares require acclimatising just as much as Australians. Moreover from the experience gained up to date it would appear that Arab mare freshly purchased and turned into the paddock take longer to condition than the Australians.

Mona Horse Stud.—Out of the 20 brood mares sanctioned, 17 were bought before 31st March 1905. The average price paid for the mares was Rs. 667-3-6. Several of these mares were in foal when purchased and four have dropped foals. Two stallions have been used for covering these mares, one an Unmol lent by Malak Umar Hayat Khan and the other a Shihan purchased in the Jhang District.

35. In Military Department letter No. 741-D., dated 2nd February 1904, Government sanctioned the formation of small stude at Mona and Mirpur for the purpose of breeding donkey stallions. The stude are to consist of one stallion and 20 mares at each of these places.

Mona Donkey Stud.—15 mares had been obtained by 31st March 1905. The average price of these mares was Rs. 90-9-0. Two donkeys were foaled during 1904-05.

Mirpur Donkey Stud.—Twenty mares were purchased during 1904-05 at an average price of Rs. 93. Of these, four were in foal at the time of purchase. These four mares produced four colt foals, two of which are good and two fair. The mares have been covered chiefly by an American jack. Twelve more foals were born by the end of the year of which 8 were colts and four fillies. Two of the former were born dead. The stock on the whole is good.

The success of the two donkey breeding studs has been satisfactory, and with a view to extending the scheme I have addressed Government to sanction the addition of 40 mares.

36. The prospects of Horse, Mule and Donkey Breeding Operations are, on the whole, encouraging.

The Jhelum Canal Colony shows excellent results and this despite the fact Thelum Canal Colony Circle. That operations were considerably impeded last year by a severe outbreak of plague which caused colonists to leave their land. The percentage of foalings to coverings in the Colony itself was 38. It promises to be an excellent field for the purchase of stock for the army. The number of young stock purchased exceeded the aggregate of all the other Circles, a good result, I think, when it is remembered that the first batch of mares did not commence to arrive in the Colony until the end of March 1903, and that only 20 stallions had commenced working in the Colony by the beginning of June 1903. The work of the Circle has progressed satisfactorily with the exception of the mule breeding scheme in the Chenab Colony, which has not received the attention which its importance deserves and which it must inevitably forego until the area over which it extends is constituted a separate Circle controlled by and commanding the constant attention of a whole-time officer. Proposals on the subject have recently been submitted by me to Government. The Department is greatly, indebted to the Colonization Officer, Mr. W. M. Hailey, C. S., for the help he has continued to give our officers in the Colony.

Horse-breeding Operations in this Circle were hampered considerably by the

Lebore Circle. owing to the prevalence of Dourine; the steps taken have, however, proved successful. This is satisfactory, as Dera Ghazi Khan is one of the best horsebreeding districts in India.

In last year's annual report I described how certain districts in this Circle, United Provinces Circle. Doutine.

The disease has now been practically suppressed, but it will take some time before these districts recover from its effects.

in a precarious condition owing to the large mortality among the brood mares and young stock during the famine years and to the inability of the breeders owing to poverty to replace losses with suitable animals.

A perusal of Table XV, giving the percentage of foals to coverings for the last 6 years, shows that decided improvement has been made and this

should increase annually; it is only by getting a fair percentage of foals to coverings that horse breeding can really flourish. Once the foal is born, it remains with the owner to care for it; but with a fair percentage of foals he gets a good chance of success.

The present percentage of foals to coverings is close on 30, an increase of 6 per cent. on last year, and if we can gradually raise this to something over 40 per cent. things will be on a totally different footing and will bear a fair comparison with the results of horse breeding on somewhat the same lines on the Continent.

With mule breeding again—see paragraph 53—a distinct advance is made in the percentage of foalings to coverings, but a great improvement is still necessary.

Of the 34 stallions removed from the register 30 died, were destroyed or sold; one, a thorough-bred English, was transferred to the Junagadh State in exchange for a Kathiawari stallion and 3 were cast and transferred respectively to the Imperial Bacteriologist, the Labore Veterinary College and the Hapur Remount Depôt.

The average cost of the 12 thorough-bred English stallions imported from England was £287-16-0, and that of the 4 Arabs imported from England £267-15-0. The figures for the thorough-bred English stallions and the English Arabs, however, represent the actual price paid and do not include transit and other incidental charges.

Twelve thorough-bred English stallions were imported from England during Thorough-bred English. Thorough-bred Engl Jummy", " Marechal Neil " and " Ashanti, Gold " arrived in December. My remarks on each of these stallions were called for and submitted to Government in March. HORSE FAIRS AND SHOWS.

69. Table XIV is an abstract of particulars regarding horse fairs and shows held during the year.

RAWALPINDI CIRCLE.

70. Two fairs were held in this Circle. The number of animals present was Gajrat and Revelpindi. 5,987 against 4,099 in the previous year

and the number competing 964 against 798. The number of remounts purchased was 36. 274 mules were purchased by Government and 1,469 by others.

Gujrat.—There was an increase of 238 animals present as compared with last year. A large number of mares have gone from this district to the Jhelum Canal Colony, 10 horses and 9 mules were purchased by Government.

Rawalpindi.—There was a large increase in the total number of animals present, viz., 4,963 against 3,410 last year. The increase is due chiefly to the large number of young mules present. 3 horses were purchased for this department and 23 for Native cavalry. 75 mules were purchased for this department and 26 for the Hissar Cattle farm.

JHELUM CANAL COLONY CIRCLE.

71. Four shows were held in this Circle. The number of animals present Lyallpur, Gujranwala, Jhang, Shahpur and was 10,594 against 7,907 last year and sargodah. 1,424. The number of remounts purchased was 38. 12 mules were purchased by Government and 13 by others.

Lyallpur promises to become one of the most important shows in India. It is already bigger than the old established and noted Shahpur fair. The total number of animals present was 3,477 against 938 of Shahpur this year and 1,230 last year. Although only 1 remount and 4 mules were bought for Government, no fewer than 223 animals changed hands for the sum of Rs. 23,192, while the total amount realised by sales of animals at the Shahpur fair did not exceed Rs. 19,364.

Gujranwala.—A small show at which very few animals were sold this year. There were 748 animals present against 689 last year. 220 competed for prizes against 230 last year. There were no young stock horses suitable for Government purposes and no Native Cavalry or police remounts were purchased. 2 mules were purchased for Government.

Jhang.—There was a decrease of 497 in the number of animals present and of 86 in those competing for prizes. The formation of the new Lyallpur District by which a great port of the Colony was taken away from the Jhang District is largely responsible for this marked falling off. No remounts or mules were purchased.

Shahpur compared very favourably with those of former years in spite of the fact that a very great number of good mares have been transferred from this district to the Jhelum Canal Colony. The number of animals present was 938 against 1,230 last year and the number competing 427 against 543. 17 remounts were purchased by this Department and 14 for native cavalry. 8 mules were purchased : 6 by Government, 2 by others.

Sargodah.—This was the first show ever held at Sargodah. In spite of the fact that there was a good collection of brood mares and young stock, very little business was done. This was due in part to the inexperience of the colonists and in part to a scarcity of purchasers. No "Bhojpuries" or other dealers visited this fair although there were many at the Shahpur fair which was held only a few days earlier.

LAHORE CIECLE.

72. Five fairs were held in this Circle. There was a large increase this year in Amrituar (Dewali), Jalalabad, Multan, Dara Ghasi Then and Amrituar (Beisakhi). decrease in the numbers competing, vis., 1,313 against 1,344. The number of remounts purchased was 294. 196 mules were purchased by Government and 1,246 by others. The Jalalabad fair which was abandoned last year was again held this year.

Amritsar (Dewali).—There was an increase of 567 animals attending the fair. 11 remounts were purchased for Government and 87 for Native cavalry. 15 mules were purchased for Government and 62 for Native cavalry. A good many animals were also bought for the Jaipur State, Bombay Tramway Company, etc.

Jalalabad.—A decrease of 720 as compared with 1903 chiefly due to the large number of animals that have died or been destroyed for "surra" and also in some measure to the inclement weather. 3 remounts were purchased for Government, 10 for Native cavalry and 2 for Police. 10 mules were purchased for Government,

Multan.—There was a decrease of 94 animals in the number attending the fair. It was not a good fair for remounts, either British or Native cavalry. No horses were purchased for Government, but 12 young stock were purchased for Native cavalry. 20 mules were bought for Government. The number and quality of the mules, a large number of which belonged to zamindars, was the chief feature of the show.

Dera Ghazi Khan.—The success of the show this year was marred by the fact that owing to there being plague in the city the fair was held 2½ miles out, the city itself being put out of bounds. 10 remounts were bought for Government, 64 for Native cavalry, 1 mule for Government and 14 for Native cavalry. The number and stamp of mules was disappointing.

Amritsar (Baisakhi).—The number attending the fair was 5,118 against 4,718 last year. There would have been a greater increase still but for the earthquake which took place two days before the commencement of the fair. 8 remounts were purchased for Government and 87 for Native cavalry. 33 mules were purchased for Government and 117 for Native cavalry.

BALUCHISTAN CIRCLE.

73. Five shows were held. There was a large increase in the number of Quests, Sibi, Jacobabad, Teibar and Shikarpur. animals present, viz., 5,138 against 3,459 last year. The numbers competing also show an increase, viz., 4,972 against 3,404 last year. The number of remounts purchased was 482. 72 mules were purchased by Government and 10 by others.

Quetta.—The total number of animals exhibited was 954 against 590 last year showing an increase of 364. The number of remounts purchased was 3 by Army Remount Department, 131 by Native cavalry and 108 by Police. 2 mules by Army Remount Department and 5 by Native cavalry were purchased. Branded marcs and fillies, 2-year old fillies, yearling colts, geldings and foals—colts and fillies—were well represented and of good quality. Remaining classes were indifferent.

Sibi.—The number of animals exhibited was 646 against 785 last year. The decrease is due to the failure of rain in Kachi and consequent scarcity of fodder and to the inclemency of the weather both before and during the horse-show. 9 remounts and 2 mules were purchased. The quality of the classes at the show was as usual excellent.

Jacobabad.—The number, present was 1,502 against 1,404, a small increase of 98 on the last show. 12 remounts were purchased by Army Remount Department, 67 by Native cavalry and 112 by Police. The number of mules purchased at this show was 41 by Army Remount Department and 5 by Native cavalry. Brood mares, branded fillies, 2-year old fillies, yearling colts and geldings and yearling mules were above the average and well represented. Remaining classes were poor.

Tolhor.—1,474 animals were present at the show against 932 last year. The large increase is due to the great interest taken in horse breeding by Mr. Ferrers, Assistant Collector, Tando Division. 19 remounts were purchased for Police and 12 mules by Army Remount Department. With the exception of branded mares and yearling mules a most indifferent lot of animals was shown.

Shikarpur.—The number exhibited was 562 against 426 last year. 21 remounts were purchased, *i.e.*, 1 by Army Remount Department and 20 by Levies and Police. 15 mules were bought by the Army Remount Department. All classes shown were well represented and of good quality, a great improvement on former years.

UNITED PROVINCES CIRCLE.

74. Four fairs were held in this Circle. The number present was 6,221 Aligarb, Bulandehabr, Mussffarusgar and Nauchandi. decrease is due to the Garhmuktesar fair not having been held during the year under report. 107 remounts were purchased. 14 mules were purchased by Government.

Aligarh.—There was a decrease of 301 as compared with the attendance of the previous year. The decrease was due to frosts on account of which many owners who would otherwise have brought their animals to the fair were occupied with trying to save some of their crops by watering, etc. 5 remounts and 2 mules were purchased for this Department and 6 remounts for Native and Imperial Service cavalry regiments.

Bulandshahr.—1,193 animals were present as compared with 1,299 last year. The decrease is attributed to the frosts and unsettled weather. 16 remounts and 4 mules were purchased for this department, and 16 remounts for Native cavalry regiments.

Muzaffarnagar.—2,075 animals attended as compared with 1,950 the previous year and 410 competed against 394 last year. 10 remounts and 4 mules were purchased for this department. 8 remounts were purchased for Native and Imperial Service cavalry regiments.

Nauchandi.—This fair was held outside the period of the year under report, viz., from 3rd April to 10th April 1905. 1,750 animals attended as compared with 1,730 last year. 577 competed against 518 last year. 16 remounts and 4 mules were purchased by this department. 30 remounts were purchased for Native and Imperial Service cavalry regiments.

DECCAN CIECLE.

75. Only one show is held in this Circle. 482 animals were present and competed against 507 last year. Only one

remount was purchased. The judges pronounced the show to be disappointing and the quality of the stock poor except the three-year old fillies which were very good and promising. The falling off in the show is directly traceable to plague and famine against which it is impossible to struggle, and does not necessarily imply that horsebreeding in this district is on the wane; in fact the exorbitant prices asked (and in many cases obtained) by breeders for anything of merit shows that there is a good demand for well bred stock and that the people realize that the horse-breeding industry is a lucrative one.

GENERAL

Equine Diseases.

76. Dourine was prevalent in the Dera Ghazi Khan District of the Lahore Dourine Circle and interfered much with

Dowise. Provinces Circle there was only one fresh case of this disease among the Imperial stallions and two fresh cases among the Provincial pony stallions. Major Pease, Principal of the Punjab Veterinary College, toured through the Aligarh, Bulandshahr and Dera Ghazi Khan Districts in connection with his investigation of this disease.

There was a small outbreak of surra in the Ferozepore district which necessitated the suspension of coverings Same

at Ferozepore and Muktesar stands for a short period and for a long period at the Jalalabad stand. 25 cases of surrá occurred in the Jhelum Canal Colony Circle. 20 of these occurred in the Jhelum Canal Colony. The cases were confined to a very limited area and can be satisfactorily accounted for by the water-logged condition of the areas due to the peculiar non-perculative properties of the soil. The Colonisation Officer is transferring horse-breeding colonists away from these villages and a recrudescence of the disease need not be anticipated.

One case of glanders occurred in the Jhelum Canal Colony. There is little doubt that this case was contracted Glanders. in Sialkot. All the stock in the neighbourhood were subjected to strict isolated segregation until they had been twice tested with mallein and until subsequently declared free of the disease.

Two stallions died from anthrax in the Baluchistan Circle. Strict precautions were taken against the spread of Anthras. the disease and were successful, no

further cases having occurred.

Health.

77. Plague was prevalent around almost all the stands of the Deccan Circle, but the Circle establishment was not effected. A virulent outbreak of plague occurred during the months of April and May and part of June 1904 in the Jhelum Canal Colony and imposed a very severe check on the development of the horse-breeding scheme owing to the flight of the colonists with their marca. This resulted in the colony being practically denuded of mare's for about eight weeks of the most important part of the covering season. Stallions were however sent to and temporarily accommodated in the districts to which mares had been removed and this measure to some extent mitigated the inevitable results of the exodus.
