In this new edition opportunity has been taken thoroughly to revise the whole book. All important High Court rulings and Government orders recently passed have been included to make this book up-to-date. In order to make it more exhaustive notes have been added to several sections for the first time.

Since the publication of the second edition most of the provisions of the Bombay Tenancy Act, 1939 have been brought into force in some parts of this Province. The effect of this on the scope of various sections of the Code in those parts of the Province has been clearly explained.

All Sind amendments to the Code up-to-date have been incorporated in their proper places to make the book useful for the Province of Sind also.

There has been a substantial increase in the number of pages ; in addition to this the prices of printing paper and other materials have risen enormously, but in spite of these the price of this book has been kept as low as possible.

The Bombay Land Revenue Code has been described by the High Court of Bombay as 'technical and difficult Act,' and again as 'particularly difficult one to construe'.
