FOREWORD

As required under Section 124 of the B. M. C. Act, I place the Administration Report for the year 1987-88 before the Corporation. This report highlights the progress of the activities carried out and services rendered by various Civic Departments during the year 1987-88.

During last three years, no major construction work was taken up due to stringency of funds and a number of works were either postponed or abandoned. Major repairs to some municipal hospitals and schools buildings were undertaken during this year. Sports Complex at Andheri is nearing completion.

The Slum Improvement Cell has taken up the programme supplied by the B. H. A. D. Board for providing basic amenities at an estimated cost of Rs. 4 crore under the Environmental Improvement Programme. Slum Upgradation Programme has been undertaken under the Bombay Urban Development Project.

The Environmental Sanitation & Projects Wing of the Corporation was engaged in abatement of air, water and noise pollution by various industries.

Draft Revised Development Plan submitted to the State Government is awaiting its approval.

Having regard to the heavy traffic volume and length of roads in Greater Bombay, the amount available for road maintenance is inadequate. The road maintenance work was, therefore, restricted to repairs to bad patches and practically no new road work was taken in hand.

Participation of private parties was promoted for developing traffic islands and for providing road safety dividers in order to minimise the burden on civic finances, Work of improvement of street lighting by providing sodium vapour lamps on arterial roads and flyovers in the city was also in progress.

To abate the nuisance due to flooding in the city, antiflood measures were taken up during this year with World Bank assistance.

The Solid Waste Management Department carried out sweeping, collection and transportation of garbage. In addition, debrid due to road excavation and building repair works were also removed by this Department. This Department has introduced dumper placers skip on and off tipper container system for transportation of garbage and debris.

This Department has been implementing LOGFAS component of BUDPI funded by the World Bank through BMRDA. This project is inclusive of providing Mechanical Refuse Transfer station at Mahalaxmi.

The works covered under the Water Supply Project Bombay—II were at the completion stage and an additional 160 MLD of water would be available to the city as part of the phased completion of the project.

Preliminary works of Bombay—III Project were started. This project aims at bringing an additional ;

✓ 455 MLD of water to Greater Bombay.

Works under Bombay II—Sewerage Project amounting to Rs. 321.02 crore were also in progress which include Pumping and Disposal (Civil) works and Mechanical and Electrical Works.

After occupation of the Campus at Abhinav Nagar, Borivali (E), Civic Training Institute and Research Centre has started organising and conducting training programmes for all the levels of civic employees. In addition to above, systems Studies and Research and Development activities were also undertaken during this year.

As regards health situation in Greater Bombay, birth rate and death rate for 1986 were 21.6 and 7.3 respectively. Infant mortality rate per 1000 live birth was 58.9 and maternal mortality rate 0.6. During the year 1986, 2,12,678 births and 72,203 deaths were registered. Out of 20 notifiable diseases, sporadic cases of Infective Hepatitis 'B' and Memingococal Meningitits were reported but there was decline in these cases. There was no epidemic during this year.

Because of Expanded Programme of Immunisation against Diphtheria, Tetanus, Typhoid and Measles, etc., there was no increase in the incidence of these notifiable diseases.

The Assessment and Collection Department, a major revenue earning Department of the Corporation collected Rs. 230.56 crores from Municipal Property Taxes, including Government taxes and Rs. 272.31 crores from Octori. Altogether, Rs. 502.87 crores were collected from various taxes for the year 1987-88. This collection was in excess by Rs. 87.80 crores over previous years' collection of Rs. 415.07 crores.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Preamble:

The Municipal Government of Greater Bombay is controlled by the Bombay Municipal Corporation. Act, which was originally described as Bombay Act No. III of 1888, and then was called the City of Bombay Municipal Act 1888. The Bill embodying the provisions of this Act received the assent of the Governor General of India and was first published by the Governor of Bombay on 14th September 1888. Their designation was further changed to the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act in 1950, when the limits of the Corporation were extended on the north to include a part of Salsette Taluka of Thane District and the area was called Greater Bombay. The area was further extended on 1st February 1957 and the Corporation is known as Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay. In spite of more than 150 amendments to this basic statute over the last 100 years, the basic Frame-work of this law, in terms of distribution of powers and the roles of different statutory authorities and their intense relationship has remained unaltered. This is particularly striking in the context of the fundamental, social and political changes that have taken place as a result of transition from a colonial rule to democratic self-governance where the executive power vests in the freely elected representatives of the people.

The Municipal area of 437.71 Sq. K. Mts. is divided into 23 Wards which are grouped under five administrative zones, which served for civic needs of over 9001 Million Citizens by employing a work force of about 1,42,000 with budgetory outlay of Rs. 1190.46 Crores. Each of the five zones is supervised by a Deputy Municipal Commissioner who is delegated with most of the executive powers of the Commissioner for administration of Wards through the Ward Officers. In addition, there are five functional Dy. Municipal Commissioners who heads certain departments dealing with specialised subjects, like Water Supply & Sewerage, Development Plan of the City, Personnel Administration etc. One of the functional Dy. Municipal Commissioner is designated as the Director, Engineering Services and Projects.

Since 1984, by amendment of B. M. C. Act, post of Addl, Municipal Commissioner was constituted and two such posts were created to assist the Commissioner in the overall management of the Municipal affairs.

The existing Municipal Councillors are holding their position from 10th May 1985, with an added strength of 30 Councillors, raising the number of Councillors to 170.

The basic philosophy on which the existing Municipal Corporation Act 1988 is framed is enunciated, way back by the memorable pronouncement by Lord Ripon on Local Self-Government in 1882, obviously seems to be valid even now. As the Resolution of 18th May, 1882 interalia states "It is not primarily with a view to improvement in administration that this measure is put forward and supported. It is chiefly designed as an instrument of political and popular education. As education advances, there is rapidly growing up all over the country an intelligent class of public-spirited men whom, it is not only bad policy, but sheer waste of powers, to fail to utilise". Many great Indians, who were associated in framing this legislation and piloting it through the Council of Governor in 1887 were Shri K. T. Telang, who later became one of the youngest Indians to be nominated as Judge of the Bombay High Court Sir, Pherozeshah Mehta, Lord Reay, Mr. Forbes Adam and other eminent jurists. As Shri K. T. Telang expressed, the philosophy of this statue "My ideal of Municipal Government includes a strong Executive responsible to the Corporation, and an enlightened Corporation watchful over its Executive". This is ensured by constituting relatively independent authorities within the overall legal entity called Bombay Municipal Corporation. While the Municipal Government of the City vests in the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay, the entire executive power of the Corporation for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of Bombay Municipal Corporation Act vests in the Municipal Commissioner, except whenever by the provisions of this Act, sanction of the Corporation or its Statutory Committees, is expressly provided. The Councillors are elected on the basis of adult-franchise from constituencies which normally have about 29,000 voters, and they are expected to deliberate in the meetings of the Corporation/its Committees or all its Sub-Committees either statutorily constituted or constituted by the Corporation for specific purposes, and express the demands and grievances of the people whom they represent and control the Municipal Administration by casting their votes on the proposal submitted by the Municipal Commissioner as the Head of the Municipal Administration. The Municipal Commissioner is appointed by the State Government for a period not exceeding three years, but his appointment also is renewable by the State Government for a further period not exceeding three years. He can be recalled by the State Government at any time after consultation with the Corporation. He has to be removed by the State Government from office if at a meeting of the Corporation not less than 5/8 of the whole number of Councillors vote in favour of such a proposition. He is a member of the Corporation, and also one of the seven Municipal Authorities charged with carrying out the provisions of B. M. C. Act, each of the authorities having its own independent existence, sphere of jurisdiction and powers; yet, they are

interdependent and must support one another in a large measure if the governance of civic affairs has to run smoothly.

The Municipal Authorities are :

- a) a Municipal Corporation,
- b) a Standing Committee,
- c) a Improvements Committée,
- d) a Bombay Electric Supply and Transport Committee,
- e) an Education Committee,
- f) a Municipal Commissioner,
- g) a General Manager of Bombay Electric Supply and Transport Undertaking.

The Municipal Administration has municipal officers and servants such as Special Engineers, City Engineers, Hydraulic Engineer, Executive Health Officer, Education Officer, Municipal Secretary, Municipal Chief Auditor and others, these officers are not given the status of municipal authority and they are the servants of Municipal Corporation.

The Municipal Commissioner is a member of Municipal Corporation and has all the rights of a Councillor except the right to vote. He has in addition certain other special powers in making statements, in addressing the Corporation or calling special meetings at a short notice under special circumstances.

The Mayor is the presiding functionary of the Corporation and is not vested in any executive or statutory authority: He is elected every year from amongst the Councillors by the Councillors. His authority extends in calling the meetings of the Corporation and in conducting the proceedings of the Corporation in an orderly fashion in conformity with the law. He is accorded the respect due to a presiding functionary of the august body of the Municipal Corporation and for protocol, social purposes exalted and described as the "First Citizen of the City". The Mayor and the Chairman of various Committees are helped by an organization, independent of the control of the Municipal Commissioner, and headed by a Municipal Secretary, who renders all the ministerial assistance, advice based on the precedents and keeps the record of the proceedings for future references.

The Municipal Cheif Auditor, like the Municipal Secretary, is also an independent officer of the Municipal Corporation for the purpose of conducting the audit of the Municipal finances.

Apart from the four Statutory Committees mentioned above, the Corporation has constituted five Special Committees, viz.,

- (1) Works Committee (City),
 - (2) Works Committee (Suburbs),
 - (3) Public Health Committee,
 - (4) Market and Gardens Committee,

(5) Law, Revenue and General Purposes Committee which deal with the subjects covered by the designations of these Committees. In addition, an Consultative Committee called Grant-in-Aid Committee has been also constituted for submitting proposals to the Corporation for awarding of grants to certain organizations.

An informal forum for deliberations is constituted in the form of "Group Leaders Meeting" which is a device for the Leaders of different political groups to discuss informally various proposals before they are crystallised in the form of propositions which can be put before the Corporation or its statutory authorities for a formal sanction. This system has been evolved soon after the independence when the Municipal Corporation Elections came to be organised on the basis of political affiliations and by political parties. By established conventions, the political group or party, which commands the largest number of Councillors, is called a majority party and the Leader of this group is called the Leader of the House; on the other hand, the largest group in the oppositive party have their own Leader who may or may not necessarily have a support of other opposition group and is given the honour of Leader of the Opposition. However, unlike in the State Government where the party or the Group, which commands majority of votes, is in charge of executive administration of the State Government; in the Municipal Corporation, the executive administration headed by the Municipal Commissioner is independent of all the groups including the group which may command the majority at any particular time during the elected period of Councillors.

The total number of complaints registered and followed up during the year under report was 2363 as detailed in the accompanying statement as against 2533 in the preceding year.

The Section worked in close co-operation with the Fire Brigade and Water Supply Control Room and ensured that in cases of house collapses and such other emergencies, the Municipal Officers and Staff reached the site in time, to mitigate the hardships of the victims. Co-operation among various agencies including Maharashtra Housing & Area Development Board was also brought about on such occassions.

PUBLIC RELATIONS DEPARTMENT

Shri J. B. Mahajan, M.A., LL.B., was Public Relations Officer and Editor, Brihan Mumbai Mahanagarpalika Patrika, during the year 1987-88.

Efforts were made to give wide publicity to the various activities of the Municipal Corporation through the conventional and mass publicity media such as newspapers, All India Radio, Doordarshan, informative films, exhibitions etc. The department continued to liaison between the members of public and the different municipal departments. The dissemination of information about the civic activities and the services rendered by different municipal departments had been a major activity of this department. The information counter of this department continued to give necessary guidance and information to the public in addition to carrying out the sale of various civic publications.

Press Notes, Handouts etc.: During the year under reference 764 press notes and seven handouts giving information about various civic services and declarations of the civic projects etc. were issued to the press, Radio and T. V. etc.

Press Room: A press room equipped with lockers, telephone, typewriter etc. continued to be provided for the use of press reporters and media people. During the year 1987-88, Municipal Commissioner's six press meets for briefing the press on important issues were arranged. Nine press visits to the municipal institutions and installations were also arranged to give information related to civic services, activities and programmes etc.

Rejoinders and Clarifications: A number of complaints received through letters and over telephone regarding civic matters were attended to. The replies and clarifications totalling 209 on the criticism and suggestions appearing in the local newspapers were also promptly issued during the year under reference.

Production of Publicity Literature: The Civic Diary 1988 consisting of diary, useful civic information with eight colour photographs was brought out in addition to a list of Municipal Councillors and Officers as the regular publications. The department also extended co-operation to the Municipal Secretary in bringing out multi-colour Municipal Year Book, 1987-88.

A special multi-colour booklet on Bombay Fire Brigade was also brought out on the occasion of the Centenary Celebrations of the institution. Other publicity literatures such as posters and folders on various subjects such as Handicapped Children, Dehydration, Leprosy, Conservancy, Save Water etc. were also brought out.

Film Shows: The department organises film shows to educate the masses especially slum dwellers in the city and as a part of it 258 film shows on health education, civic sense etc. were organised during 1987-88.

Photography': The photography section of the department continued to cover all the major civic events and functions. Special efforts were made for preparing colour transperencies to be used in multicolour publications and printing greeting cards etc.

Protocol, Liaison and Exhibitions: Receiving the guests of the Corporation and arranging for their hospitality has been a major function of this department. During the year under reference, over 100 guests including Mayors, Commissioners and other top officials of the various municipal corporations in India and abroad and other dignitaries were received by this department and extended them hospitality by way of making their staying and sight-seeing arrangements.

This department has also organised a health exhibition of Mount Mary Fair, Bandra and at other places with the help of social, educational and charitable institutions. Exhibitions at the sites of immunisation camps was a special feature during the year.

Special Activities: In addition to the usual cleansing campaigns, special campaigns for Civic Health Camps were carried out extensively. Sustained educative propaganda was undertaken through various media of publicity. Extensive publicity was also given to the "Fourth Quienuennial Census of children" organised by the Education Department. Besides, the department also assisted the Municipal Secretary in organising the annual 'Clean Mumbai, Green Mumbai' Competitions so also the open tournaments in Kabaddi, Kho-Kho and Wrestling for the Mayor's shields and Executive Committee Meeting of the 'All India Mayor's Council and Conference of Committee of the Single Municipal Act'. Similarly due publicity was given to departmental civic functions.

The department also participated in the observance of the World Health Day, National Cleanliness Day, World Leprosy Day, Social Education Week, Family Planning Campaign, Grow More Trees Campaign, Anti-Fire Campaign, Flay Day and also other health drives and exhibitions organised by various Social Welfare Organisations.

BRIHAN MUMBAI MAHANAGARPALIKA PATRIKA

Shri J. B. Mahajan, M.A., LL.B., the Public Relations Officer of the Corporation also worked as Editor of Brihan Mumbai Mahanagarpalika Patrika during the year 1987-88.

In the monthly issues of the Patrika various articles on civic activities, Important Municipal Circulars, and some of the items of the minutes of the Municipal Commissioner's meeting with Addl. Municipal Commissioners, Dy. Municipal Commissioners, Head of the Departments and Ward Officers were published for giving the information to the readers of the multifarious activities undertaken by the Corporation for their welfare.

Centenary celebrations of Mumbai Fire Brigade and Balgandharva were the important functions, to which wide coverage was given in Patrika by bringing out two special issues in the month of April 1987 (Mumbai Fire Brigade Centenary) and June 1987 (Bal Gandharva Birth Centenary).

A five day Yokohama Festival was observed in Mumbai from 14th to/18th October 1987 at Birla Krida Kendra, Chowpatty as a part of the celebrations of Japan month jointly sponsored by Government of India and Government of Japan. The Patrika gave full coverage to this important event.

Other events which were given due publicity in the Patrika included the annual elections of the Mayor and Chairmen of the statutory and special committees, Annual Budget of Municipal Corporation and some highlights of Central and State Budgets, celebration of World Health Day, celebration of Shiyaji Jayanti, presentation of Nurses' Awards, civic receptions to Shri Sunil Gavaskar, and Smt. Lata Mangeshkar, mass immunisation campaigns, Republic Day and Maharashtra Day Celebrations.

BACKWARD CLASS CELL

The Backward Class Cell is headed by Deputy Personnel Officer (Backward Class Cell) which is put under control and supervision of Deputy Municipal Commissioner with a view to check whether the Government policies with regards to reservation of vacancies for Backward Class communities as per prescribed percentage in the matter of direct recruitment and also at the stage of promotions are being implemented effectively in all the wards and departments.

The department had collected the quarterly information and six monthly information from all the departments and wards, and has complied together. The quarterly return contains the number of B. C. candidates recruited during particular quarter against reserved quota for B. Cs., backlog of B. Cs. etc., while six monthly return contains number and names of B. C. candidates recruited and promoted during a particular six monthly period and backlog of B. Cs. etc. During the year of report, the quarterly returns upto the quarter ending 31st December 1987 and six monthly report upto the period ending 30th June 1987 has been submitted to the Government and Corporation respectively.

During the year under report, 390 proposals involving the question of reservation scrutinised by this cell.

28 complaints and grievances of B. C. employees regarding recruitment, promotion, seniority etc. were attended to by this department.

Deputy Personnel Officer (Backward Class Cell) and his representatives have served as a member of panel for recruitment and promotion.

During the period under report, the Scheduled Caste Welfare Committee (a legislative Committee of Assembly of Maharashtra) desired to discuss with Municipal Officials, regarding progress made in filling up the backlog of B. Cs. in the services of the Corporation as well as welfare of B. Cs. Accordingly, the meetings were held which were attended to by A. M. C. (V), D. M. C. (P) Dy. C. A. (P), P. O., Dy. P. O. (B. C. Cell) etc. As desired by the Committee, the statements showing the position of the total posts in each category, number of Ş. C. employees in each post, backlog of S. Cs. etc. were submitted.

Recently, the above referred to Committee has published the minutes/proceedings of the meetings with its recommendation and have designed the Corporation to submit the detail report on the recommendations made.

The necessary report in detail on the recommendations as mentioned above is being prepared, which will be submitted to the committee very shortly.

Trade Unions :-

The Trade Union activities among Labour and other staff members were mostly confined to 46 unions/Associations recognised by the Municipal Commissioner as per rules and covers about 1.25 lakhs employees.

Industrial Relations :-

(ii) Children

With a view to promote harmonious industrial Relations the following steps were continued.

- (i) Grievance Procedure: -The periodical meetings of the Grievance Committee i.e. at unit level, zonal level, Apex level were arranged at different wards and department to settle the labour problems of all the deptts, and wards as well as individula grievances of the employees. The unit level committee meetings were attended by A. L. Os whereas Zonal level committee meetings were attended by Dy. L. O. and Apex committee meetings by Labour Officer. Whenever the meetings of the grievance committee are held in L. O.'s chamber, the representatives of the concerned union and the employees are also requested to remain present. Such meetings were held from time to time in L. O.'s chamber. The efforts are made by the unit level committees to settle grievances existing at Shop/Unit level where there is no deviation from the existing policies. The policy decisions are discussed at Apex Level and the grievances which could not be solved at Unit Level are discussed at Zonal Level.
- (iii) Individual Grievances :- The individual grievances from the individual employees are represented by the unions received directly in this department are attended by this office.

These grievances are of various nature and can be broadly classifed as under :-

- (1) Recruitment, retrenchment and reinstatement.
- (2) Promotions, Transfers, Confirmation and annual increments.
- (3) Fines, Reversion, Suspensions, Removal, Dismissal and other punishments.
- (4) Delay in Payment of wages (Wages of leave, Overtime, Leave Travel Assistance etc.) and Allowances.
- (5) Delay in settlement of Provident Fund and other retirement benefits.
- (6) Non-supply of egipments and uniforms.
- (7) Delay in sanctioning leave due.
- (8) House Rent, accommodation and transfers of quarters.
- (9) P. T. employment.

Industrial Disputes :-

During the year under report, 21 disputes were referred to the different authorities such as Government Labour Officer, Asstt. Commissioner of Labour, Conciliation Officer i.e. office of Commissioner of Labour, Labour Court/Industrial Tribunals' etc. Out of 17 disputes, are referred to the Office of Commissioner of Labour as stated in Appendix 'A', 5 disputes were not settled and failure report is submitted to Government. The remaining 12 cases have been settled. Out of 4 approval applications referred to Industrial Tribunal, the Tribunal has granted approval to 2 applications and 2 are still pending.

Scholarship to the children of the Municipal employees:-

During the year 1987-88, 300 employees applied for scholarship to their children for various studies. However, the matter is yet to be finalised and likely expenditure of Rs. 1,35,000/- of scholarship is to be incurred. After finalisation, the necessary circular will be issued to all Head of Departments and Ward Officers. Meeting in this respect will be fixed shortly.

Medical Assistance scheme for Municipal employees:-

Under the above scheme of granting medical aid to Municipal employees from Labour Welfare Fund, 120 Municipal employees were given financial assistance of Rs. 2,59;420.25 for them or their dependent's sickness.

Immediate Cash Assistance :--

Under the scheme for granting Immediate Cash Assistance of Rs. 500/- to the direct dependants of Municipal employees who die while in service, the amount of Rs. 4,00,000/- only was spent during the year under report. Thus 800 dependents of the ex-employees have been given this benefit.

Inter Ward/Inter Departmental Drama Competitions:-

Twelve Wards/Departments took part in the Inter Ward/Inter departmental drma Competitions held at Birla Kreeda Kendra Chowpaty between 4-2-1988 to 29-2-1988.

First three dramas were awarded with rotating trophies. Besides the trophies, 5 individual prizes of Rs. 2517- each were awarded to the Best Actor, the Best Actress, Best Director, Best Background Music and Best setting as done annually. 20 consolation prizes for the acting in drama were given Cash prize of Rs. 517- for acting and cash prize of Rs. 517- was awarded for script Written by Municipal employee.

Recruitment of Telephone Operators :-

The work of recruitment, transfer, promotion and confirmation of Telephone Operators is entrusted to this department.

During the year under report—

- 1. 26 Telephone Operators 'B' Grade are appointed.
- 2. 21 Telephone Operators 'B' Grade are promoted to the post of Telephone Operator 'A' Grade.

Recruitment of P. T. candidates for Sub-clerical & Class IV posts :-

Ninety P.*T. candidates have been appointed as part time Registration Asstts, and 76 P. T. Registration Asstts, have been promoted as Full-time Registration Asstts. III P.T. candidates were appointed to the posts of Laboarers & 177 P. T. condidates were appointed to the post of Ayah/Sweeper/Hamal. Welfare Branch:—

51 Welfare centres are run by this department, on an average attendance of the Adult Male/Female participants and children at the different welfare centres is about 6000 and 5900 respectively. The activities are conducted regularly at the different welfare centres are as under:—

For Women and Girls :--

Sewing, Embroidery, Knitting, Cooking, Handicraft, Indoor and outdoor games, Music, Dance, etc. For Adults and Boys:—

Indoor and outdoor games, Gymnasium, Dramatics, Dances, Debating etc.

In addition to the above, Inter Centre Tournaments/Competitions and other activities were conducted as mentioned below:—

- (i) Inter Centre Tournaments and Competitions :— Volley Ball, Carrom, Kabaddi, Table Tennis, Rangoli, Elocution and Fancy Dress Competitions were held during the year under report.
- (ii) Film Shows:—Documentary and full length feature film of the Educational and social importance were shown at the different welfare centres during the year when other functions were not there.
- (iii) Excursion for Nursing Staff:—The excursion to Delhi, Nainital, Haridwar, Rishikesh and Mussorie was organised during the period from 30-3-1988 to 8-4-1988.

Total 55 nurses from different hospitals and maternity homes participated in the excursion.

(2) Balwadies :-

Balwadies are conducted at the following welfare centres regularly.

- 3. Colaba Welfare Centre.

Nearly 365 children of the Municipal employees have taken advantage of the Balwadies

- (A) Ganpati Festival was organised at 23 welfare centres when cultural items were presented during the festival and the prizes were distributed to the participants for taking part and showing their talents in the programmes.
 - (B) Haldi Kumkum functions were organised at 49 centres.
 - (C) Buddha Jayanti functions were organised at 14 welfare centres.
- (D) The National Days such as 26th January and 15th August were also celebrated at all Welfare Centres.
 - (4) GIRL GUIDE: -Guides of our department have taken the part in the following activities:-
 - 1. Tree plantation programme.
 - 2. Patrol Leader's training.
 - 3. First class Training.
 - 4. Scout Guide week.
 - 5. Anand Mela.

They have earned 'Khari Kamai' by going door to door in their respective area and handed over the amount of Rs. 800/— to the West Bombay Bharat Scounts and Guides. It is very significant to note that 8 guides and 2 guiders were selected to the Jamboree held at Goregaon. They got 'A' grade.

(5) PROVISION OF TELEVISION SETS:

42 Welfare Centres are provided with the television sets for the use of participants at the centres under control of L. O. under the contributory community T. V. scheme in the year under report through the Director of Rural Broadcasting, Govt. of Maharashtra. During the year 42 T. V. sets have been provided at 42 centres situated in City, Suburbs, extended suburbs and outside City division of Water Works Deptt.

STATISTICAL CELL

The Statistical Cell is working under Labour Officer. The Statistical information in respect of total employees, wages, grades etc. are collected paysheet-wise from various departments of the Corporation.

Centain statistical information required by the State/Central Govt. and Corporation of various categories and posts in the Municipal Corporation has been collected by this department during the year under report.

Job Evaluation Study of Municipal employees in the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay.

An agreement was executed on 18-8-1985 between the Municipal Administration and Unions to evaluate the jobs of Municipal employees working in different categories in different units of the Corporation. As per the Terms of Agreement it was decided to carry out job analysis and prepare job descriptions for all the jobs except M. C., A.M.C., Medical Teachers and the staff working in the Secondary Schools who are governed by S. S. Code. The process of job evaluation study is to be carried out with participation of representatives of Administration as well as Unions after giving them requisite training for the same. It was anticipated to complete the job evaluation study, within a period of 18 to 24 months.

Accordingly training was given in batches upto December, 1987 and nearly 36 Sub-committee members and 34 Field Officers were trained and thereafter the job evaluation study commenced in February, 1988.

As per the Terms of Agreement members of the Apex Panel and Steering Committee for job evaluation study were finalised. After commencing job evaluation study in February, 1988, we completed job evaluation study in Transport Department, Garden Department, Education Deptt. (non-teaching), Security Department. The Job Evaluation work is in progress in Engineering Department Municipal Printing Press, Fire, Brigade and Nair Hospital. As per the agreement this study is required to be completed by the end of August, 1989, so that thereafter the work of finalising factors, degrees, definations and weightages can be taken in hand on the basis of following plans:—

- Points span for range minimum and maximum points.
- 2. Break points.
- 3. Existing practices in B.M.C.
- 4. Distribution of jobs in various grades.
- 5. Checking with Bench Mark job.

CENTRAL STORES

The Stores Department acts as a Central Purchasing and Stores Agency of the Corporation for procuring, storing and supplying various items to all the departments. There are about 299 schedules covering 2523 items. The purchasing are made by inviting tenders by public advertisement and/or by circular letters to the known dealers.

The transactions made during the year under report are shown below in Statement 'A'.

During the year under report, the expenditure incurred on Establishment was Rs. 29,82,630/-, Advertisement Rs. 1,69,014.00, Printing and Stationery Rs. 91,253.25/-, Misc., viz., Clothing, Books and Dead Stock, Electricity & telephones charges, etc., Rs. 2,20,480.94, and Maintenance and Repairs, was Rs. 1,29,600.00/-.

During the year, all together tenders invited were 255, quotations invited were 103, Contract executed were 229, and purchase orders placed were 1608.

During the year, 78 notices were served on defaulting suppliers and, in 1 case, tender deposits was forfeited. For delayed supplies, penalties were also recovered as per the terms of the contract.

FUTURE PLANNING

The Central Stores is working on manual system and there is no effective control on stock levels at the ward stores and other departmental stores even though some kind of budgetory control is excercised by C. A. In order to achieve this objective of stock control and to optimise investment in material. It has been decided to computerise the stock accounting, Inventory control and suppliers, accounting.

The process of taking each ward store on computer parallel run was started from April 1986 and was continued in the year 1987-88 so as to cover all the wards before December 1987 i.e. 9 ward stores have been taken on parallel run from April 1987 to December 1987 in addition to the 14 sub-stores already taken in the previous year. The live run for computer was started from 1-4-1988 for the month April 1988 in respect central stores only.

The Schedules and items pertaining to the Medical Institutions are being transferred from Central Stores to the Head of respective Medical Institutions from 1-4-1988.

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER (ENQUIRIES)

The Department of Administrative Officer (Enquiries) is a Central Agency for investigation into complaints of lapses of Municipal employees and conducting Departmental Enquiries against delinquent employees is the major function of the Department.

The Department is headed by the Administrative Officer (Enquiries) who was assisted by three Deputy Administrative Officers (Enquiries), eight Chief Inspectors (Enquiries), 40 Inspectors (Enquiries) and other administrative staff, during this year 1987-88.

The department carried out the following functions.

- (1) (a) Detection of mal-practices indulged in by municipal employees of all categories including officers, such as acceptance of illegal gratification, defalcation, misappropriation of municipal money or property, negligence and other misconduct.
 - (b) Holding of departmental enquiries against the municipal employees.
 - (c) Giving advice and instructions in the matter of investigation and departmental enquiries to other departments, whenever sought.
 - (d) Verification of inventories prepared by Ward staff before shifting the slum dwellers from old places to new places.
- During the year, the department conducted 610 investigations, paid 732 surprise visits to various municipal institutions and mustering places and disposed of 4514 cases of miscellaneous nature.

Departmental Information:

There are 3832 men working on the Establishment of Security Force. A separate Security Force Wing guarding the installations of Water Supply & Sewerage Department has been formulated. However, both the Security Wings are under the overall control of the Security Officer.

The Administration of the department is now decentralised in three zones i.e., City, Eastern Subs., and Western Subs. headed by the Dy. Security Officers.

The main work of Security Force is protection of Municipal Property against theft, pilferages etc., as also to conduct Preliminary Enquiries into cases of theft, pilferages, misbehaviour, assaults etc.

The Security Assistant have completed 100 Preliminary Enquiries during the year in the cases of desertion of duty, sleeping while on duty, unauthorised absence from duty for long periods, theft, pilferages and assults etc.

The Security Force has also been engaged in special bandobast of Corporation Meeting at the Corporation Hall. The Officers of the Security Force are called on special duty round the clock of emergencies like strikes, bundh etc.

The Security Force participates in Flag Salutation Ceremony on the Republic Day and Independence Day every year when special staff is called for parade.

Recently this department has started a full-fledged training School at C. T. I. & R. C. at Borivali where the new recruits and regular security guards and Officers are imparted with full-fledged training in the line of paramilitary forces. At the same time the new scheme of recruitment of stipend basis has been introduced in this department and under this scheme 100 security guards had been recruited so far. In addition to that new task force has been constituted where 55 security guards are working for removal of encroachment.

The Mumbal Municipal Security Force has organised its own Band Unit. It gives its programme on Sundays in Public Parks and Gardens as required by the Supdt. of Garden. The Standing Committee has given sanction for Mumbai Municipal Security Unit to give Band programmes to the public on hire basis on prescribed rates.

There were 3832 Men working on the Establishment which includes Officers, Subordinates and Labour Staff. The Security Force recruited 280 candidates as security guards during the year.

- 3. The Chief Accountant is the principal Finance Officer and the Advisor to the Commissioner in the financial matters of the Corporation. The Jt. Chief Accountant is the principal Treasury Officer of the Corporation and keep such Municipal Account and perform such duties with regard to the Municipal Accounts or shall be required by him, by the Corporation, the Standing Committee or Commissioner.
- 4 The Chief Accountant's Department is situated at Head Office in the old and New Building and there are two Zonal Offices viz. Dy. C. A. (W.S.) & Dy. C.A. (E.S.) at Bandra and Chembur respectively. There is also a separate branch at Head Office for Budget 'B', under the control of Dy. Chief Accountant, (Education Fund). Besides, there are ward Account Units in almost all the Wards in City and Suburbs including the major Hospitals like K.E.M., Nair, Son Hospital, Cooper Hospital etc. for expediting the financial matters and for the convenience of the Municipal employees as well as the public.
- 5. In addition to the normal functions of this department the following noteworthy activities/schemes have been carried out during the year 1987-88.
- (a) To expedite the finalisation and payment of claims of provident Fund, pension and Gratuity, a separate Cell has been set up to bring about reduction in the number of outstanding cases, of provident Fund and Pension, Gratuity claims.
- (b) The scheme of disbursement of Pension through certain Nationalised Banks has proved very useful and at the present, nearly 14206 (March 1988) pensioners are taking advantage of the scheme. The scheme is made compulsory with effect from 1-4-1983. It is observed that there is addition of about 250 new pensioners every month to receive payment of their pension through Banks. There are 4562 pensioners drawing their monthly pension at C.A.'s counters under computerised scheme in March 1988.

(c) Scheme of Payment through Bank to the superior sta working under Budget 'A', B' & G' has been introduced from April 1987. Under the said scheme the net payable amount towards the monthly salary is directly credited to the employee's Saving Bank Account in the branch of his choice. At present, the scheme is made applicable only for superior staff numbering about 27,000 employees. At present there are 20 Nationalised Banks and one Co-op. Bank with 746 branches are participating in the above scheme. The area of the above scheme is restricted to Greater Bombay and outside upto Badlapur and Virar only. This scheme is proposed to be extended to teaching, non-teaching staff of Education department, numbering about 23,000 employees in the year 1988-89. It is also proposed to extend the scheme to security Department, Labour staff and Transport Labour staff in stages. On watching the progress, it will be further extended to labour staff in general.

The pay scales of the Municipal employees were recently revised from 1-7-1985. So far, the pay fixation statements were prepared and the arrears were worked out manually which involved lot of man hours and which also resulted in delay in making the payment to the concerned staff. The work of preparation of the Fixation statements was therefore, taken up on the computer for the first time.

(d) For financing capital works pertaining to Budget 'A', E' & 'G' Loans of Rs. 36.04 crores were raised from the Public (Open Market) during the year 1987-88: In response to the Loan/Notification published in Government Gazette, Local News Papers, Subscription to the tune of Rs. 778.09 Crores were received on the very day of floating the loans i.e. on 28-12-1987 from the public, out of which excess subscription of Rs. 742.05 Crores were immediately refunded to the public and the investment of the Loan proceeds were made on the very day, thus the Corporation has been benefited of the interest of Rs. 87,330.61 per day and that too without paying any brokerage and underwriting commission to the extent of Rs. 18.02 lakhs. The repayments of previous loans Rs. 19.80 Crores were made during the year 1987-88 on 12-12-1987. Due to the streneous efforts made by the staff of this department in making repayment of Rs. 2.20 Crores directly, the Bank Commission amounting to Rs. 27,500/- was saved.

The Computerisation of Stores.

The new cell which has been set up during the year 1985-86, has carried out parallel run on Computer of Engineering Sotres so as to get reports as desired data through Computer outputs. It was decided to take over the main stores on Computer and hence the Priliminary work such as instructing the staff of stores regarding correctly feeding the in-put etc. was done so as to have live run from 1-4-1988. During the year 1987-88 some discripancies in purchase of Stores at different wards at different rates were pointed out. Besides revised manual has been prepared for further guidance of staff.

During the year 1987-88, the following agreements were reached with the Unions.

#### BOMBAY URBAN DEVELOPMENT PROJECT-I.

13A. The Corporation vide resolution No. 592 dated the 3rd October, 1983 approved Municipal Commissioner's proposal to carry out the works, of providing offsite infrastructural facilities to the sites and services projects, undertaken by the Government of Maharashtra through Maharashtra Housing and Area Development Authorities. Accordingly the Corporation entered, into the Subsidiary Loan Agreement for the above proj. known as B. U. D. P.-I with the Government of Maharashtra on 26th July 1985 vide C. R. No. 90 of 25th July 1985. The project will be partly financed by the World Bank and will be implemented for urban poor class. As per the conditions of above agreement the Corporation has to carry out various works pertaining to Budgets 'A', B' and 'G' and also to maintain separate Account at one Central place.

The Loan receipt of Rs. 5,22,00,000 and capitalised interest of Rs. 53,95,159 thereon at the rate of 8.5% per annum amounted to Rs. 5,75,95,159 upto 31st March 1987. During the year under report further instalment of Rs. 2,50,00,000 was released by the Government of Maharashtra. The interest capitalised upto 31st March 1988 on otal Loan receipt of Rs. 8,25,95,159 amounted to Rs. 52,84,900. An amount of Rs. 82,800 received from Slum dwellers wascredited to Loan Fund being 10% share to wards environmental Improvement Loan under Slum upgradation programme. Due to continuous collection drive, the recovery of Municipal Property taxes, together with wheel tax and Octroi was in excess to the tune of Rs. 85.77 Crores as compared with last year the details whereof are as under:—

The Property taxes and Octroi are the main stay of revenue of the Municipal Corporation and therefore this department has to achieve the target of collection by strenuous efforts throughout the year so that the Corporation can render civic services efficiently.

There was a marked improvement in the total tax collection including Government taxes during the year under report in as much as the department brought Rs. 231.37 Crores as against Rs. 184.30 Crores' during the previous year.

The total demand of Municipal Property taxes, including Water Charges and Wheel Tax was Rs. 366.45 Crores whereas the total outstanding which includes arrears of past and previous years was Rs. 156.94 Crores. These arrears include settled demand as well as unsettled demand. Out of these arrears 45% are generally recovered during the subsequent year and balance amount remains locked up on account of various reasons shown in the statement Appendix VIII.

The Reteable Value of Railway Properties upto 31st March 1977 has been finalised and finalization of the R. V. for the further period is under process. The quantum of taxes to be paid is 42% of General Tax payable at normal rate. Railway authorities in the meantime have paid Rs. 2.00 Crs. during the year 1987-88.

The assessment of Bombay Port Trust properties for the quinquennium 1969-74 is in progress.

As regards the assessment of State & Central Government properties for the quinquennium 1979-84 Shri C. D. Vaidya, Arbritrator, who has been appointed to fix the Rateable Values of lands and buildings in charge of State & Central Governments in Greater Bombay, has taken up the matter in hand the same is in progress.

### Building Repair Cess :-

Repair Cess amounting to Rs. 10.61 Crores was collected during the year 1987-88.

## Meharashtra Tax on Building with Larger Residential Premises (Re-enacted) Act 1979 :-

Under the aforesaid Act, effective from 1-4-1974 the State Government has levied retrospectively a tax on residential premises having floorage of more than 125 Sq. Mtrs., and the Reteable Value whereof being more than Rs. 1,500/-, at the rate of 10% of the Reteable Value per year. The work of levy and recovery of this tax is entrusted to Assessment & Collection Department. Maharashtra Tax on Buildings (with Larger Residential Premises) Cell collected Rs. 1,35,09,000/- during the year 1987-88.

#### Octrol:-

In the year 1987-88, the rates of Octrol continued to be the same as in the year 1986-87.

The amount of Octrol collection during the year 1987-88 was Rs. 270.31 Crores as against Rs. 230.77 Crores collected during the year 1986-87. This shows an increase of Rs. 39.54 Crores in Octrol collection in the year 1987-88 as compared with Octrol collection in 1986-87.

### **EDUCATION DEPARTMENT**

Under Section 61(g) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, it is incumbent on the Corporation to provide primary Education to the children of school going age between 6 to 11 years and this responsibility is being carried out by the Education Department of the Corporation right from 1907.

In addition to the primary Education, the Corporation also run a few Secondary schools since 1965 just to give a helping hand to the State Government.

The entire supervision and administration of Education Department was carried out by the Education Officer, Dr. Smt. S. V. Desai, B. A. (Hons), M.Ed., Ph. D (Bombay), M. A. (London) up to 31-10-87, Shri B. P. Naik, P. A., (Hons.) M.A., B.Ed. from 1-11-1987 as the Head of the department with assistance of officers on academic side as well as the Administrative staff.

#### School Premises

In order to meet the ever increasing Educational needs of all the children, the Corporation has planned a programme of construction of school buildings at various places. The position of the school premises is shown in the statement given below:—

#### Language Development Project :-

Activities of the language Development Project were carried out in the following broad areas.

- 1. Teacher Training.
- 2. Production of instructional material.
- 3. Research and Evaluation.

These broad areas were covered in respect of five languages in namely English, Marathi, Hindi, Gujarati and Urdu.

#### Teacher Training: ...

Teacher training is an important activity at the project centre during the year 1987-88, a number of Training programme, workshops orientation lectures, seminars and literary programmes were organised in the area of English language teaching and mother tongue teaching.

#### DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

The fourth correspondence-cum-contact Course in English which is of 8 months duration was carried to a successful completion. The contact sessions were held every 15 days and the teacher trainees were given units and lectures on "Methods of teaching English, English grammer" and spoken English. They were also shown films, film strips, video films and they were given a course in spoken English through audio cassettes. 81 teachers appeared in the final examination of this course which was held in July 1987. A function was held for the distribution of certificates to the successful teacher-trainees who had successfully completed the Correspondence-cum-Contact Course. 76 teachers-trainees received the certificates in the function organised in which Mr. Ventat Chari, Addi Municipal Commissioner (V) was the Chief Guest. The first four teacher-trainees were given prizes by Mr. Chari.

As per the instructions of Ex. Addl. M. C., Shri Ajit Warty five batches of teachers attended Correspondence-cum-Contact C ourse in English during the year 1987-88. Shri Ajit Warty felt that the facilities at the Language Development Project should be extended to a larger number of teachers teaching English and hence aboaut 204 teachers registered their names for the Correspondence-cum-Contact Course in English including a batch of about 25 Secondary Teachers teaching English in Std. V to VII. Because of the appointment of a full time Language Training Officer in English two more components in the curriculum of the C. C. C. were added to the existing course.

- 1) Conversational English
- 2) Functional English

During the contact sessions, the teacher-trainees are expessed to language laboratory experiences and a number of Films, film strips, slides etc. are shown to the trainees. The contact sessions which were part-time till 1985, were made fulltime during 1986-87.

As the contact sessions for the five batches of teachers taking the C. C. C. twice a month come to about 10 days in a month. We could not accommodate teacher-trainees from private institutions for the training in spoken English this year. However, the five day spoken English Course was given to about 20 teacher-trainees from Somaiyya Vidya Vihar and teachers from Girton High school on payment of Rs. 25/—per person.

A three-day workshop of about 25 teachers working in secondary schools run by the Vidya Vardhini Education Society was conducted by L. D. P. at the request of the management of the school. It was the first time that L. D. P. conducted a workshop for the teachers working in private institutions. The teachers from far away places like Jat and Akkalkot attnded this workshop.

A workshop for the premaration of tasks in functional English was held for two weeks. 29 activities and apprendix tasks per activity were prepared by the resource persons, Ms. Rochelle D'Souza and Ms. Lorna Barrett from jai Hind College and St. Ammrews College respectively. Five secondary teachers were selected by a selection Committee for conducting spoken English Courses for bright students of Std. IX in Municipal Secondary Schools. These teachers were trained in the Audio—Active Course in English prepared by linguaphone. They were also deputed to R. I. E. Banglore to attend the conference on the teaching of English in May June 1987. These five selected teachers conducted the spoken English Course at 10 centres in Secondary Schools in Bombay. The Centres were 1) Topiwala Lane Sec. school 2) Mahim Sec. School 3) Nana Chowk Sec. school 4, Rajda Nagar Sec. School 5) Vile-Parle Sec. School 6) Naigaum Sec. school 7) Malvani Sec. School 8) Vile-Parle (W) Sec. school 9) G. K. Marg Sec. school, 10) Agripada Sec. school 11) Shindewadi Sec. School. About 920 students of Std. IX participated in this spoken English Course and they will be given some books as gifts as a token present. The spoken English Course was supported by specially prepared charts, cassette recorders and there is a demand from many secondary schools for conducting similar courses.

In addition to the five secondary teachers who were deputed to R. I. E. Banglore, four officers from the department were also deputed to the conference on the subject of 'Methods in teaching English'.

Seventeen officers of the department were deputed to the H, M. Patel Institute of Research and Training at Vallabh-Vidya Nagar, Anand to attend a one-month course in English from 15th October to 14th November 1987.

The total number of teachers and students trained during the year were as follows:

- 1) Correspondence-cum-contact Course.
- 2) Spoken English for students.
- Orientation in English teaching.
- Part-time orientation to teachers.
- 80 primary school teachers.
  - 920 students of Std. IX.
- .— 300 Marathi Urdu teachers under massive teacher training programme.
- 472 Teachers from Municipal & private schools.

As the L. D. P. is on the visiting lists of all the colleges of Education in Bombay groups of teachers, teacher trainees, experts in language teaching and educationsts all over India visit the L. D. P. in groups and individually. Batches of teachers who are being trained under the massive teacher training programmes continuously visit the L. D. P. and they are shown the language laboratory and other audio visual equipment available at L. D. P.

## 1) Special Workshops conducted in the teaching of language.

A four-day workshop was orgainsed at the L. D. P. in April 1987 on the subject of evaluation. The Resource Person was Mr. Gregory James who was sponsored by the British Council. Two general lectures were arranged for the officers of the department and other educationist on evaluation and the skill tests prepared by the Hindi and Marathi department were discussed and reviewed by Mr. Gregory James during the course of this workshop.

# 2) Children's Literature Week.

In colaboration with the Child Development and Education centre was organised at the Nehru Centre in the first week of January 1988. Anumber of activities for the promotion of "Reading for enjoyment" were conducted for the pupils of Municipal and Private schools.

A number of guidance lectures were simultaneously arranged for parents and teachers. About 300 Municipal students and 13 teachers participated in this workshop.

## 3) A three-week workshop on the Development of Writing Skills.

Was organised by L. D. P. and the Resource Person sponsored by British Council was Mr. Jremy Rows. Demonstration lessons on writing skills were organised in Nana Chowk Secondary school and about 25 teachers teaching in Municipal school participated in this workshop.

#### 4) A five day Workshop on the use of Drama Techniques for the.

Development of Language was organised with the help of British Council. This workshop was attended by a number of teachers working in the field of dramatics, teachers from private schools and the L. D. P. staff. The Resource Person was Mrs. Elaine Philips. It was held on 7th to 11th March 1988.

As a follow-up-programme of the training of teachers working in the beats of officers who attended the one month course at 'Anand' a half day work shop is organised on the last day of every month. Every month end, about 60 teachers from the beats of 'Anand' trained officers visit L. D. P. and they are exposed to language laboratory experiences, shown films and video films and given training in audio lingual drills.

#### **MOTHER—TONGUE DEPARTMENT**

- 1. An Audio Visual show of two famous classic fairy tales in English was shown to about 2000 students of Std. II and III. These fairy tales were translated in to Marathi, Gujarati, Hindi and Urdu.

#### Schools Social Service Project including nonformal Education.

With the view to restrict the rate of drop-out in the Municipal Schools, the social service centres were launched in the year 1979. The international year of the child.

During the year under report, the following are the highlights of the work done by social service centres. The total child population served is 72,270 in the area of drop-out problem. Out of cases 1,775, 1450 children were brought back to the school successfully.

The total number of 11,319 malnourished, poverty-sticken children and also those suffering from chronic diseases were given supplementary nutritious food through philentropic organisation.

The children suffering from beheaviour and psychological programme successfully handled were 264 children suffering from various types of medical problems i.e., leprosy, T. B. Scabies, B. N. T. etc. were 1,350 who benefitted from social service centres.

Through the various schemes like material Aid, sponsorship, financial assistance. 3,066 children belonging to poverty sticken families were helped prevented from droping out of schools.

With the view of prevention of potential drop-outs and various child problems in relation to the family school system and slum community, the projects such as Balwadi, Study-centres thearapeutic group works, medical camps, leadership camps, competitions, vocational guidance and training programmes. Day camps, Recreation Centres, Anand Malas etc. were conducted. The total benficiances were 90,979.

The importance of parents role in and all-round development of children in vital and to create this. awareness and strengthen this role, various Educational meetings and programmes were held in which 8005 parents participated through various medias e.g. film shows, slide-shows, demonstrations, folds, discussions, visits exhibitions in the area of health & Hygiens, social problems, Alcoholism and Drug application family budgeting low cast nutrition, importance of education, non-formal programme, and housing problems, the parents were educated.

With the view to bring back to the field of eudcation, schools-drop-outs as also the non-entrances, the Education Department started non-formal Education Centres for children within the age-ground of 9-14 years. Some of these centres impart only academic education where as some include vocational training

### Schools Health Services for the year 1987-88 (June-87 to April 88)

During the year, 29,14,53 children were examined in 1196 primary Municipal Schools, 21,769 condren were examined in 38 secondary Municipal schools, 27,64,14 children were found defectives. Total defects noted among the children were 61,58,64. 8386 cases were treated at the Municipal General Dispensaries, 10,49,52 (New & Old) cases were treated at the school clinics.

30,456 children were referred to the out patient department of Municipal General Hospital for exports opinion. 263 Toncils operations were performed at the school clinics, 700 children were supplied with spectacles, 22 children were supplied with special aid, such as calipers. hearing aid etc. 831 cases of leprosy and 794 of Tuberculosis were referred to the special clinics for investigation and treatment.

## The performance report of Teachers and Head Teachers Seminars held on 1987-88.

The seminars for the teachers and the Head Teachers are held annually for all the languages schools on tonics of Educational importance. The teachers seminars are held heat wise by the Best Inspectors and the Head Teachers. Seminars are held by the Superintendents Divisionwise.

Superintendents of private primary schools also held the seminars for the teachers and the Head Teachers of those schools.

#### The Objectives are:

- .1. To improve the professional competency of the teacher.
- 2. To help the teachers to come together and have a free exchange of views on educational topics.
- 3. To make available the knowledge of experts in the field of the education by inviting them as resource persons to the Teachers seminars.

No fixed topic was allowed by the Education Officer either for the teachers seminars and the Head

Seminars, each Beat Officers and the Superintendent were given the to select topics of their own choice that would reflect the needs and difficult areas of teaching as expressed by the teachers. The topics chosen for the Head Teachers' Seminars were mostly related to the supervisory duties of the Head

#### School Social service project :

In 1979 the international year of the child, the Bombay Municipal Corporation decided to establish 17 social services centres in the Municipal schools with collaboration of Niruala Niketan as Grant in aid project. This project served the children in some of the poorest and most deprived, slums area in the Bombay City. In Feb. 1986 the project was merged in Bombay Municipal Corporation, Education Department.

The focus of activities in the school is (1) to bring back dropouts (2) snrolluent of the compulsory age group children in Municipal school (3) To create a school environment conclusive to the children learning and growth and to prevent potential dropouts (4) to solve their individual and familiar problem.

Many activities are undertaken to develop the talents of the child and leadership training all of which make the school an attractive place for the child, which helps to prevent potential dropouts. Nutritian programmes.

Health exhibition, various competitions, sports Day-Camp, Parents education, science projects, educational visits etc. have seen conducted by the school social workers.

School social workers also works in the surrounding community which helps to bridge the gap between the slum community from where the child come to the school.

#### Secondary Education

The Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay have undertaken the activities of Secondary education since 1965.

Though it is not an obligatory duty of the Corporation has undertaken this activity purely with a view to meet the needs of children from low income group and also to supplement the efforts of private schools.



## FOOD SANITATION AND PREVENTION OF FOOD ADULTERATION

Food sanitation comprises of Control and Supervision over the Food Premises, where articles of food are manufactured, stored and kept for sale. This control is exercised by imposing licence under the B.M.C. Act and the Maharashtra Prevention of Food Adulteration Rules, 1962. The Food Establishment are also controlled from the point of view of Prevention of Adulteration of food under the provision of the Prevention of Food Adulteration Act, 1954 and the Rules thereunder. In order to improve the standard of food, sanitation, eating houses and bakeries are classified as Grade I, II and III depending upon the compliance with the conditions of the licence and other measures taken to maintain cleanliness and sanitation in the various trade operations and in the trade premises. 

There is also system of medical examination of food handlers (cooks and cook-mates) in eating houses so as to prevent the spread of various diseases through articles of food.

Details of Food articles destroyed being unfit for human consumption are as under :-

#### DESTRUCTION OF UNWHOLESOME FOOD:

Destruction of unwholesome food exposed for sale by hawkers and shopkeepers including those near Schools and markets is done under Section 415 to 417 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, by special squads appointed for the purpose and by war Inspectional staff to prevent food borne diseases such as Cholera, Typhoid, Infective Hepatitis, etc.

#### REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS:

The Registration of Births and Deaths Act, 1969, unified the system of registration throughout the country and made reporting and registration of births and deaths compulsory. This Act is implemented in the Greater Bombay from 1-1-1982 and has replaced the provisions of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. The Executive Health Officer is appointed as Registrar for Greater Bombay and all the Medical Officers of Health as Sub-Registrar for the respective Wards for the purpose of registration of births and deaths.

According to the Act the information of live births, still births and deaths is required to be given in prescribed forms to the Registrar within 14 days from the date of occurrence of the events. The Name of the Newly born child can be registered free of charge within 12 months from the date of registration of birth and thereafter on payment of prescribed late fee and compounding charges.

The medical practitioners and Heads of the Medical Institutions are required to issue medical certificate of cause of death in form No. 8. These forms are supplied by the Medical Officers of Health in the respective Ward Offices. · -

The parents and guardians are advised to sign or put their thumb impression on the birth reports filled in at the Medical Institutions after verifying the correctness of the facts recorded in the said report so as to avoid any mistakes there in etc. Certificates of Birth and Death occuring in Greater Bombay is issued at the office of the Medical Officer of the ward concerned according to the residential address given in the birth or death report.

#### Vital Statistics and Control of communicable diseases:

The statistics regarding Birth and Birth rate, Death and Death rate, Infant mortality, infectious and communicable diseases immunization etc. are shown in the table at page 5 and 39.

#### Anti — plague measure.

#### Rat Control Work:

Integrated rat control with the employment of combinations of different measures was planned and executed. Total number of rates caught and destroyed was 7,32,621. No rat was found plague infected.

Other anti-plague measures viz., flues destruction, especially through cynogassing of rat holes and pleansing of areas was carried out.

Cholera: There was not case of Cholera. Preyentive measures such as anti-cholera inoculations, disinfection of well water, destruction of over ripe and rotten fruits, were continued as routine measures. 83,577 person were inoculated against Cholera.

Tubercalosis: T. B. Control Unit continued its activities during the year. Majority of hidden cases have been brought on the register. During the year 17,227 T. B. cases were notified and deaths numbered 7008. Services of Health Visitors have been integrated with the services of Treatment Organisers working under . Assistant Health Officer (T.B.) at F/South Municipal Ward Office, Parel, Bombay 400 012.

E. C. ** Vaccination: In view of the new policy for E. C. G. Vaccination in National T. B. Control Programme all the new born babies in Municipal and private maternity homes are being given Neo-natal B. C. G. vaccination. The drop-outs and the children upto the age of 2 years, who are born outside Bombay and living in Bombay are also being immunised with B. C. G. vaccination at the Maternity Homes or in the field.

As per the directives from the Directorate General of Health Services, B. C. G. vaccination in the Micipal Schools and revaccination is stopped.

Under the programme of B. C. G. Training, more nurses and Jr. Health Visitors are being trained in B. C. G. vaccination at the B. C. G. Training Centre, Rajawadi Hospital, Bombay.

B. C. G. Camps: To achieve more B. C. G. vaccination coverage among the children, more B. C. G. camps are being held in slums and such areas where there is no facility for B. C. G. vaccination nearby hutments. Sexualty Transimitted Diseases (V. D.):

At the Municipal Anti S. T. D. Clinic, S.T.D. Cases are treated confidentially with the latest methods of treatment after proper clinical diagnosis, confirmed by modern laboratory test carried out at the clinic's laboratory. Male and Female patients are examined and treated in separate wings of the clinic, maintianed in absolute privacy and secrecy. In addition, a Medico-Social Department comprising of one Male Medico-Social Worker and one Female Medico-Social Worker and supplemented by Health Visitor (Auxiliary Nurse) render necessary medico-social service to the patients attending the clinic. This clinic is presently participating in AIDS screening programme.

S.T.D. Reference Laboratory situated at Kamathipura Maternity Home premsies, undertakes Blood, V.D.R.L. and certification tests. Dark Ground, Illumination for Treponema Pallidum and extends facilities to patients referred by general medical practioners and medical institutions free of charge.

#### LEPROSY :

Liprosy cases in Greater Bombay are treated at the out-patient clinics of the Acworth Leprosy Hospital and also at the 7 centres situated throughout Greater Bombay under the Greater Bombay Leprosy Control Scheme. The Corporation bears the expenditure of about 225 permanent beds out of 500 beds and 100 temporary beds at Acworth Leprosy Hospital. Due to repeal of Lepers Act 1898 from 26-1-1984, in Greater Bombay Corporation Area, the total expenditure of all the in-patients in provisionally being borne by Corporation. The Corporation also bears the cost of the out patients clinics at Acworth Leprosy Hospital and 50% cost of the recurring as well as capital expenditure of the Greater Bombay Leprosy Scheme.

Mobile Health Unit: The Health Unit continued to perform its the following stipulated objectives during the year.

#### (1) Comprehensive Health Care to the Municipal School Children.

The Mobile Health Unit is working under the supervision of Assistant Health Officer (Epidemiologist) and undertaking Medical examination and immunization of school children and slums of Greater Bombay.

#### (2) Control of communicable diseases.

51,492 infimunization procedures against various communicable diseases were performed both in the Municipal Schools and in the field (Table 12).

#### (3) Health Drives and Family Planning Exhibition.

In addition to the general health education performed and the mass immunization carried through its units, 218 health drives were carried out when 60,868 persons were immunized against measles, T. A. B., T. A. B. C., T. T., D. T. and Triple, including the administration of Polio vaccine and vits A orally.

#### VECTOR CONTROL.

Potential breeding places such as wells, cisterns, over head tanks, mill-tanks, storm water entrances and drains were checked periodically for detection and destruction of mosquitoes. Necessary anti-mosquito treatments were rendered to these situations and occurrance of mosquito breeding was destroyed as an anti-malaria measure.

Mosquito Nuisance: For controlling mosquitoes causing nuisance by breeding in large numbers, regular round of applications of insecticides were continued. Insecticidal fogging operations were also resorted to serve a dual purpose of anti-malaria and anti-mosquito operations.

Precautions against yellow fever: Campaigns against Aedes Aegypty the vector for Yellow Fever and dengue diseases was continued throughout the year. Aedes Aegypti breeding was detected on 477 occasions and stegemiya index was 0.014%.

House Fly Control: For abatement of fly nuisance and to check fly borne diseases regular anti-fly measures were continued through-out the year and were intensified during monsoon months.

Entomological Survey: Entomological Survey to assess and delimit the transmission of Filariasis by mosquitoes was continued during this year.

MALARIA: Under the National Malaria Eradication Programme, Malaria Surveillance Scheme is divided into two parts (1) Active Surveillance and (2) Passive Surveillance. The area occupied by the City proper is covered for Passive Surveillance, while that of the Suburbs is covered for both. In the city, blood smears are collected from the patients suffering from fever and attending the Municipal Dispensaries, Municipal and Government Hospitals and other Charitable Institutions and from those treated by private Medical Practitioner wherever possible.

In the case of Indigenous cases, Mass — Survey is carried out and if necessary. Mass treatment is arranged to control transmission.

Filaria Control Programme: Fileria night control clinic is functioning at Khar Danda Village at night for collecting blood smears and for giving treatment for positive cases.

Vector density rate and infectivity rate are monitered by collecting and dissecting mosquitoes at various parts of suburban wards.

Intensive larviciding and thermal fogging are carried out when there is increase in the density rate as well as when infective mosquitoes are detected to prevent filarial transmission.

#### CEMETERIES.

There are in all 183 cemeteries in use in Greater Bombay, out of which 29 are Municipal. At the Municipal Cemeteries, amenities are provided by the Corporation and at the private cemeteries, by the private bodies.

#### **ELECTRIC CREMATORIUM.**

There are 3 Electric Crematoria (1) Chandanwadi (2) Sion and (3) Oshivara, Andheri (West). They are opened round-the-clock for cremation. The charges for cremation are Rs. 125/- per adult dead body and Rs. 60/- per child dead body, below 12 years of age. The crematorium at Chandanwadi is at present under repairs.

Permission for removal of dead body outside Greater Bombay is issued at the office of Executive Health Officer during office hours and thereafter at the residence of zonal Dy. Executive Health Officer, Zonal Asstt. Health Officers and Medical Officers of Health of the wards. Permissions are also given by Heads of the all Municipal General Hospitals when dead body is to be removed by motor to places which can be reached within 24 hours after death.

#### MUNICIPAL LABORATORY. -

To safeguard public health, samples of various food stuffs and samples of water from different parts of Greater Bombay were examined at the Municipal Laboratory situated at 2nd floor, G/North Ward Of after death.

The stones are given to Dhobies for washing clothes at a monthly rent of Rs. 60/-.

#### School Health Services.

Children attending Primary and Secondary Municipal schools are examined at regular intervals by the Medical staff under Medical Officer (Schools). The rectification of defects and treatment of their ailments are arranged through school clinics at the six municipal General Hospitals and at Dental Clinics at the Nair Hospital Dental College and Dr. R. N. Cooper Hospital, Juhu, as also at the Municipal Dispensaries, etc. Special appliances such as calipers, hearing aid and spectacles, etc. if needed are given free of charge or at nominal cost to the students of Municipal schools. Milk is also given to the ailing school children at school clinics attached to the K. E. M. Hospital, Nair Hospital, Sion Hospital, Cooper Hospital, Juhu, Seth V. C., Gandhi and Seth M. A. Vora Municipal General Hospital, Rajawadi, Ghatkopar and Harilal Bhagwati Municipal General Hospital at Borivli.

Children suspected to be suffering from infectious diseases, such as Leprosy, Tuberculosis, etc. are referred to the special clinics for investigation and treatment.

Health Education Scheme is implemented in all the Municipal Schools by giving talks, showing slides, etc. on the various Health subjects.

#### Impounding of stray cattles

As per provisions of Section 441 C to 441 G of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act stray Cattles are seized and impounded in the Municipal Cattle Pound at Malad (West). The claimant of the animal is prosecuted in the Court and after the claimant is penalised by the court, the cattles are released on branding under orders from the Magistrate and on payment of pound fees etc. Unclaimed cattle and branded cattle if seized are not released and are sold to Bombay Humanitarian League on prescribed charges. The stray pigs are seized and sent to Deonar Abattoir for destruction as per provision of section 384 (2) of B. M. C. Act.

#### Maternity and Child Welfare.

The Maternity and Child Welfare Services were rendered through 25 Municipal Maternity Homes, 11 Mat. Wards attached to 14 Municipal General Hospitals and 39 Maternity and Child Welfare Centres. The scheduled strength of Maternity Beds was 1577Then number of deliveries conducted was 73526 The average stay of mothers in the maternity homes was 3 days. Domicillary care was rendered to impart health education and to carry out health propoganda amongst mothers. Institutional care included antenatal, postnatal, infant and pre-school age child care, follow up work and health education by propogands through posters, leaflets, group-talk, domonstrations and filmshows, etc.

Milk was given place within walking distance from the slums and other residnetial areas where they live Bombay Municipal Corporation has located 56 Health posts in existing Family Welfare Centres.

About 30,00,000 population is to be covered through these posts. The health workers attached to these posts with the assistance of voluntary women health workers residing in the selected areas would help in rendering preventive, promotive and curative services to this population which will include Health Education, Immunization Family Planning, mother's and child's health care etc.

The entire scheme will be cent percent financed by Government of India.

#### KASTURBA HOSPITAL FOR INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Dr. (Smt.) S. N. Marathe, M.B.B.S., D.P.H., worked as Medical Superintendet through out the year.

#### Pharmacy Department

The Paharmacy Department at this hospital is under expansionn to raise the production of I.V. Fluids, from 600 bottles to 1000 bottles per day to meet the requirement of I. V. Fluids of all other Hospitals and Maternity Homes under Bombay Municipal Corporation.

### Immunization Centre

515 persons were immunized against Diphtheria, 1406 against Enteric Fever, 1406 against Cholera. 360 against meningoccoccal meningitis and 28 against Serum Hepatitis.

As required by the Bombay University, the ward laboratories have been started for a recognition to House posts for post graduate studies.

# Intensive Care Unit

To render prompt medical treatment, cases in acute condition requiring very prompt and Intensive Care are admitted in Ward No. 11 of the Hospital. The total No. of patients admitted are 394 as against 554  $^\circ$ during the previous year.

#### Paying Beds

The paying bed facility is provided to those desiring the same voluntarily. Teaching

Lectures in Infectious Diseases were given to 139 students including under-graduates of Allopathic Ayurvedic and Homeopathic, Students Nurses, Nurses, Health Visitors, etc. from various institutions in Greater Bombay were also given instructions in Nursing Management of infectious Diseases.

A full-fledged Laboratory, X-Ray Department, Operation Theatre, Library and Medical Record Department worked satisfactorily.

#### MEDICAL RELIEF

#### Municipal General Hospitals

The Public Health Department conducted thirteen General Hospitals in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs. Details of the work doen thereat are detailed in Table No. 13.

## Dispensaries

New cases treated at the 150 dispensaries and 7 Mobile Dispensaries were 14,17,208 and the total

#### IMMUNIZATION

B. C. G. vaccination, Polio, Triple, Injections to the infants and children aged 3 months and above are given free at the Municipal Maternity Homes, General Hospitals and Dispensaries.

#### Measles

Measles vaccine is given in all the Municipal Maternity Homes, Hospitals and Dispensaries.

#### Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics

2,21,018 new cases were treated at the 39 Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics and total attendance was 6,51,578 during the year 1986.

#### Municipal Eye Hospital, Kamathipura

The total number of new cases and the total attendance at the out-patient department of this hospital way 23,845 and 68,591 as against 26,631 and 56,783 respectively during the previous year. The number of indoor patients amongst new cases and total attendance was 1622 and 15,546 respectively, as against 2,927 and 19,698 respectively during the previous year.

#### Ambulance and Hearse Services

Municipal ambulance service is available at all Municipal General Hospitals in City and Suburbs. The Services are available round the clock at the major hospitals. In other cases, it is in two shifts from Morning to Evening. Ambulance services, are also available in Maternity Homes situated at Mahim, Deonar, Bhandup, Malad and Tagor Nagar, Vikhroli. Ambulance under the control of Fire Brigade is available for removal of case of Mat. Street Accident (free) and non-infectious medical cases on payment within the limits of Greater Bombay.

Ambulance service at Sane Guruji Marg is available for removal of infectious disease cases free and hearse for removal of dead bodies on payment within Greater Bombay.

The services of hearse are also available on payment of prescribed charges at Juhu Hospital, Rajawadi Hospital, Mulund (W) Hospital, Borivli Hospital round the clock and at Maa Hospital, Chembur, and K. B. Bhabha Hospital, Bandra from morning to evening for removal of dead Bodies in Greater Bombay.

#### **Upgraded Dispensaries**

There has been considerable over crowding at the out-patient departments of the Municipal General Hospitals, making it difficult for the medical staff of the Hospitals to pay adequate attention to eah patient. The over crowding in the O. P. Ds. is due to attendance of a large number of patients requiring dispensary treatment. With a view to relieving the general hospitals of the heavy load of patients, 65 Municipal General Dispensaries were upgraded.

#### Integrated Child Development Services Scheme

In pursuance of the National Policy for Children, the Government of India have sanctioned the Integrated Child Development Scheme, integrating various services for the development of a child. The scheme is in operation in the slums of R and R Wards from September 1976 and has been extended to Dharavi Slums recently. The main aspect of the scheme is to deliver basic health services such as Immunizations, Health Check-up of Children upto the age of 6 years and expectants and nursing mothers, health education, referred services etc. The entire expenditure on the scheme is borne by the Government of India.

#### Voluntary Health Services Scheme

This scheme has been introduced by Government of Maharashtra in 1982. The scheme is extended to student volunteers of 11th and 12th standard of science faculty with a view of giving them an opportunity for rendering their services in improving the health conditions of the people of Greater Bombay, to make people more health conscious and also to inculcate in the students, a habit of social service which also makes the stundents, aware of the various health needs of the people. The stundents can participate in the scheme during vacation period every year. Each participant has to pay house to house visit for health survey. The overall performance of each students is consider by giving additional marks which helps him for admission to Government Medical, Ayurvedic etc. colleges. However the Government has discontinued from 1-4-1987 the scheme of giving additional marks though the scheme is otherwise continued.

## **Expanded Programme on Immunization**

Multi-purpose Worker's Scheme is prevalent in Greater Bombay and includes Expanded Programmed of Immunization. Under the scheme every child in Greater Bombay is contacted and Programmed for Diphtheria, Tetanus Whooping Cough, Tuberculosis within 1 to 1½ years from its birth.

Expanded Programme of Immunization' is implemented in Brihan Mumbai. The aim of the scheme is to immunize the children below 3 years of age with 3 doses of Triple and Polio, 1st dose of B. C. G. and pregnant mothers with 2 doses of Tetanus Toxide. This will reduce the morbidity and mortality caused by disease like Diptheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, T. B., Measles and Poliomyelitis in children and Tetanus in pregnant mothers. The immunization against Measles has already been included in the Programme. The immunization work under the programme is carried out in all Municipal Maternity Homes, Dispensaries and Hospitals and also in the slum areas for which special staff has been appointed under the Programme. E. P. diseases mentioned above. It is proposed to cover 90% of eligible population by the year 1990.

#### Rahies

Anti-Rabic Treatment is given at 15 Municipal Hospitals, 1 Government Hospital and 15 Municipal Dispensaries, (list shown in the Annual Civic Health Bulletin) pet dogs are also immunized against rabies at nine dog immunization centre list of which is shown in the Annual Health Bulletin of the Public Health Department. The stray dogs are seized and destroyed by electrocation method if not retrieved within three days. Pet dogs are licensed by the dog licensing establishment of the Corporation.

#### Control on Certain Trades and Cinema and Drama Theatres

Certain trades like hair dressing saloons, Pan shops, laundries, etc. are controlled from Public Health Point of view by imposing a licence under Section 394 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

Similarly Cinema Theatres, Drama Halls, etc. are inspected to control them from public health point of view under the prevention of "Maharashtra Cinema (Rules) Regulations, 1966 and Rules for licensing and controlling places for public amusement respectively.

#### **Health Education**

The citizens are educated through health film, posters and others publicity media in matters of environmental sanitation, good habits for healthy living, immunization, etc. Special educational compaigns are arranged on various Health subject from time to time in slums.

#### **REGISTRATION OF NURSING HOMES**

Nursing Homes require registration under the Bombay Nursing Home Registration Act 1949 and Rules thereunder. Certificate of Registration is issued on payment of the prescribed fees of Rs. 50/- (less than 10 beds) and Rs. 100/- (more than 10 beds) at the office of the Medical Officer of Health at each of the wards. Renewal of registration is done annually on payment of equal amount payable for the first registration:

#### LICENSING OF NURSES ESTABLISHMENT

Nurses Establishment require licence under the provisions of the Bombay Nurses, Midwives and Health Visitors Act, 1954 and the Rules and Bye-Laws passed thereunder. The licence is issued on payment of prescribed fees of Rs. 100/- by the Medical Officer of Health of the ward and is renewable every year in April. Failure to take licence is punishable with fine which extends to Rs. 250/- for the first offence and for any subsequent offence with fine which may extends to Rs. 500/- or with simple inprisonment which may extend to six months or with both.

## INTERNATIONAL HEALTH CERTIFICATE

Inoculation against cholera, and T. A. B. is done and duly authenticated certificates in approved form are issued at certain Municipal Institutions on payment of Rs. 10/- each.

Every traveller must produce his passport at the time of immunization and authentication. The Medical Officer, may, however, inoculate a traveller in the absence of a passport and keep the certificate with him by giving him an undergoing that the certificate would be cancelled if he would not turn up within fifteen days of the inoculation.

Inoculations against yellow fever are given at the seamen's medical examination organisation, Nav Bhuvan, Nicol Road, Karwar Street, Bombay — 400 001 and at Sahar Air Port.

- (7) At the same centre, the other Medico Social Worker M/s. Goswani organised and participated with paraplegics of our hospital for National Level Sports at the K. S. Infirmary. She also attended Macarthy's Workshop Therpies in Sexual Dysfunction' and read paper on 'Sexuality and Spinal Cord injured' at the Sion Hospital Workshop at the Taj. 'According to her counselling in Sexual Therapies has brought about excellent results. Further she acted as a Resource person at the Law and Social work Workshop and as a Panelist at the Refresher's Course, both of which were organised by the Tata Inst. of Social Sciences. Through her untiring efforts a TV set was secured in donation for Wd. 26 (Children's Wd.). At present she is Committee member of coucil of Internationa Prog. #### TUMOUR CLINIC:

#### Principle Activities:

Clinical: Follow up of cancer patients and treatment of advanced cancer cases.

Teaching: Undergraduate and Post-graduate lectures in Oncology

Research: Indigenous drugs in malignancy, Relief of pain.

O. P. D. Attendance: About 250 cases (Old & New), and Ind. Admn. 250.

Admissions, Investigations & Operations: Since this is only and OPD activity, no such activity was undertaken.

Special Activity: Dr. Patel represented corporation on Maharashtra state Cancer Control Board. (Diagnostic Sub-Committee).

#### - DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE :

#### **Principal Activities:**

Teaching: Undergraduate: Students rotate through the Department in 3 phases: junior clinical and 1st and 2nd Medicine terms. During the junior clinical rotating term of about 2 months, three lectures a week on initiation into the subject are conducted. About 8-10 lectures a week are also conducted during the 2nd medicine term of 2 months. In addition, during all the above terms students are expected to be in the Wards for at least 3 hours daily, during which individual teachers or units also conduct bedside activities.

Post-graduate: The department conduct a post-graduate bedside clinic a clinically-priented conference, a lecture and a postdoctoral journal club every week. Individual units conduct their own post-graduate activities in addition.

Clinical: The Department has six independent units which conduct outpatient days and have indoor beds for management of the full spectrum of diseases in Internal Medicine. In addition, specialised sections include weekly Rheumatology and Geriatrics Clinics. Specialised indoor facilities include a tetanus ward and a six-bed intensive care unit which is manned round the clock.

Research: Individual units conduct their research activities independently, in collaboration with other departments in the institution, either through the auspices of the Research Society of the Hospital or otherwise.

#### Important achievements and other information:

- Dr. P. D. Dastur resigned as Professer and Head of the Department of Medicine effective 1-2-1987 and left this Institution after a length of service of almost two decades. During his tenure in the department, he was in charge of the Tetanus section, conceived and developed the Medical Intensive Care Unit and was head of a Medical Unit and later the Department of Medicine. The Medical Unit and attached Tetanus section are now headed by Dr. P. Abraham, Feader in Medicine.
- Dr. S. R. Naik, resigned as Professor and Head of the Gastroenterology Division after serving in the Department for about 5 years. He was responsible for upgrading this division into an independently functioning, fully equipped department. Dr. P. Abraham has been given charge of the Gastroenterology department (report of G. E. Department has been submitted separately).

The Rheumatology Clinic continues to be managed by Dr. G. H. Tilve, Professor and Head of Department of Medicine, and his Medical Unit staff. A total of 1331 old cases and 349 new cases were seen in the clinic during the year.

Dr. K. P. Chawla was promoted as Professor of Medicine and continues to run the Geriatric Clinic, Geriatric Outpatient Clinic was started in February 1986, by Dr. Mrs. K. P. Chawla. It is run once in a week in the afternoon time for about 2 hours by medical unit under Dr. Chawla. About 150 patients are registered in this clinic. Roughly about 20 to 30 patients attend the clinic regularly. Elderly persons attending this clinic are fully evaluated on routine basis. Most of them have chronic ailments like hypertension, cardiorespiretory either acute or chronic problems, diabetes, genitourinary, psychosocial problems etc. Patient needing hospitalisation are admitted in the same medical unit which conduct the outpatient clinic. Some projects on geriatric patients are started which are mainly locked after by the postgraduate students as their dissertation under the guidance of the unit chief.

A total of over 500 patinets were treated this year in the Tetanus + MICU section.

## DEPARTMENT OF NEPHROLOGY

#### Principle Activities of the Department :

## Teaching:

Undergraduate: Physic and Occupational Therapy M. B. B. S.

Footgraduate: D. M. and Diploma of National Board in Nephrologyt and M. D. Medicine.

The department was recognised as an independent postgraduate department for D. M. Course in Manager and since then a total of 3 students have registered for D. M. Course in Nephrology. Besides this afthem are being trained for Diplomate of National Board in Nephrology, the staff members i.e., Dr. V. N. Gunarya and Dr. Alan Almeida are also actively involved in teaching the M. B. B. S. and Physic and Occupational Therapy students by taking fectures and conducting clinical sessions for them. The training programme for nurses, technicians and students of bio-technology from other institutions is being conducted as usual

## Clinical Service:

The department carries out its OPD service in the following 4 outpatinets that it runs:

- (i) The Ranal clinic an important component which looks after the preventive aspects of renal dialysis and renal failure continue to run by appointments on Monday.
- (ii) The special Renal Diabetic clinic continued to be run once a week on Thursday afternoons and has been proved very useful in prevention and early detection of diabetic renal diseases. In addition 2 more outpatient sections have been started functioning in the department.
  - (iii) The Nephrology OPD is run on Tuesday mornings between 9.30 to 12.30 p.m.
- (iv) The Renal transplant clinic is run on Thursday mornings between 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. In these clinics bacteriology of urine, diet advise, certain immunological investigations are being done on the spot. The biochemical profile of these patients is obtained on regular basis for renal package studies being carried out by Lab. No. 44 as in the previous years.

The indoor patients of the department have a total of 34 beds assigneed between Ward 34, 34-A, Ward 12 and Ward. 4.

A total of 6424 patients were seen in the above various outpatient clinics run by the department. The break-up of which is as follows:—

## Dr. P. K. Sen Dept. of Cardiovascular & Thotacic Surgery.

Teaching: Teaching and training programme from the postgraduate students who are training for M.Ch. (Cardiothoracic surg.) in Bombay. University. There are four recognised postgraduate students are registered every year for this course.

/ The undergraduates of G. S. Medical College are also sufficiently exposed to the knowledge of the super speciality and the staff members take regular lectures for undergraduate students of this institution. There is a separate course being conducted for Extra Corporeal Perfusion technology.

The staff members also provide superspeciality training to nursing staff and other paramedical personnel.

Clinical Service: As mentioned, the centre provides surgical treatment to large number of patients, and all types of surgecal procedures, both closed and open heart, vascular and thoracic are being routinely conducted. In the year 1987—88, 668 open heart procedures were carried which included all types of simple and complex congenital heart diseases, valvular heart disease and coronary artery baypass grafting. Bestdes, there were 573 other operations carried out which included closed heart operations, lung resections, pacemaker implantations, Thymectomies and others.

While the major bulk of operations is still formed by valvular heart disease. It is followied closely by operations for gongenital heart diseases. There is a heartening increase in the number of coronary artery bypass grafting operations for ischaemic heart disease. The closed heart operations, lung resections and vascular operations for aneurysm and obstructuve arterial diseases also are being carried out in good number.

The valvular surgery has included Open Mitral Commissurotomy, and valve repairs, valve replacements, single and double, aortic valve replacement with aortic root wid, VSD, PS to complex repairs like Tetrology of Fallot, T. G. A. and single ventricles. This includes two cases of Senning's repair and two cases of Fontan's repair.

Four OPSs are conducted during the week, two each by a Unit. As mentioned, large number of both new and old cases are seen during the outpatient clinic.

Besides the routine teaching, frequent seminars and symposia are arranged with the local faculty as well as visiting surgeons and expers from overseas. There are close integrated teaching programmes with related displines like cardiology, cardiac pathology vascular radiology, chest medicine etc.

## DEPARTMENT OF CADRIOLOGY (Dr. P. A. Kale).

#### Principle activities of the Department:

Teaching: Department of Cardiology is designed as a superspeciality and therefore this unit (Unit—II) is concerned mainly with the clinical and investigative teaching of Doctors registered for the post of D. M. Cardiology. This includes daily bedside rounds with clinical teaching, specialised non invasive procedures like arrhythmia analysis, external chest wall stimulation in patients with permanent pacemaker and other procedures like sinus node recovery time studies. His bundle electrographic analysis. There are 2 post graduate clinics organised in the form of seminars per week by both the units of the department in combined fashion. Similarly a joint session once a week with the members of cardiac surgery and cardiac pathology. Cardiac catheterazation and angiography studies are performed 3 times a week and the unit performs on and average 10 to 15 procedures/week. Permanent pacemaker implantation is routinely done on patients in need of this device. New techniques in interventional cardiology like balloon dilatation of stenosed valves and coarctation of aorta are now being routinely done and taught to the residents of our unit.

Clinical Service: Our unit has a big service which attends to all aspects of adult and paediatric heart diseases, both congenital and acquired.

## DEPARTMENT OF CARDIOLOGY (Dr. A. S. Vengsarkar).

## Principal Activities of the Department:

**Teaching: Undergraduate Teaching:** Lectures on different subjects of Cardiology are taken by the staff members for undergraduate students.

Postgraduate Teaching: Each senior staff member: Dr. A. S. Vengsarkar, Dr. S. C. Munsi, Dr. L. S. Shah are university teachers and have 1-2 PG students at a time for PG training in the sunjects of Cardiology PG training is as follows:

Clinical rounds made by staff members with PG students and residents.

Department Conferences: 2 per week for postgraduate training. Inter Department conference with surgeons for PG training and clearing cases.

Inter Hospital Conferences: Once/month—arranged by Dept. of Cardiology of teaching hospitals of Bombay in turn and of Cardiovascular and Thoracic Surgeons.

#### Cardiological Society of India (Bombay Branch) Conference:

National and International speakers of reputations are invited to speak on 'Update cardiology'.

CSI—National Confereces — One/Yr. papers of teaching interest are presented by staff members and PG students.

PG students are taught invasive and non invasive procedures. Invasive procedures include Cardiac Catheterization in various types of cardiac lesions. Special procedures like septostomy and valve dilatations are performed. Similarly pacemaker implantations, arrhythmia recognition, EPS, HBE etc. are done regularly. Non invasive procedures like 2 dimentional echocardiographic studies with doppler assessment, computerized and regular stress tests, Holter monitoring are done.

#### Clinical Service:

Unit I treats a large number of various types of cardiac lessions i.e. congenital heart disease, rheumatic heart disease, ischaemic heart disease, hypertensive heart disease and cardiomyopathies. A large number of new and old cases are examined in outpatient department and follow up. Unit I has 2 OPD days. There are 3 admission days in a week and alternate Sundays for ICCU and cardiac Ward admissions. ICCU has 8 beds capacity which treats all acute emergencies round the clock. Average ward capacity is 35—40 patients. Patients in ICCU are treated with new drugs and modern equipment. Emergency procedures like CPR, arrhythmia recognition, pacemaker implantations, and throkbolytic therapy are carried out round the clock.

## University Examination: D. M. Cardiology.

The Department has the largest number of teachers and Cardiology PGs among the affiliated colleges in Bombay University. All the three candidates who appeared for the D. M. Cardiology, in 1987—88 were declared successful at the first attempt.

## **DEPARTMENT OF UROLOGY:**

During the year 1987, the Department made qualitative and quantitative improvements in its work in the fields of Patient care. Medical Teaching (Undergraduate and Postgraduate) and Research. A total number of 6,529 new and old patients were attended to while 863 indoor patients were looked after in the indoor wards. The operative work included 2,177 operations including open operations (360), operative endoscopy (237) and Diagnostic endoscopy (1,580). Kidney transplantation was carried out on 23 patients and 9 patients were treated by microsurgical techniques. The department organized regular undergraduate teaching and 102 post—graduate teaching sessions were spread out over the year for post-graduate teaching. Teaching collaborations included Uro-Radiology, Uro-Nephrology and Uro-Pathology meetings.

The urology laboratory increased its work output during the current year. A total of 15,588 investigative procedures were carried out including urine culture (1,780), testicular biopsy (56), and semen examination (1,280) etc.

In the academic field, 3 urologises from U. S. A. visited the department and delivered scientific lectures. The members of the staff and resident and P. G. students of the department participated in National Conferences and presented 4 scientific papers. During the same period two scientific papers were published in Medical Journal.

The department has at present a number of clinical and experimental research projects in progress. Also, interesting work is continued in the fields of Percutaneous Renal Surgery, Microsurgery and Investigations and Surgery of Impotence and Male Infertility and Kidney Transplantation.

During the year 1987, the department enhanced its activities in the fields of parient care, medicaleducation and research.

Patient Care: There was an overall increase to 6,527 outdoor attendance in the 3 O. P. D.s being operated by the department of Urology, namely, General Urogoly O. P.D., Urinary stone O. P. D. and the Male Infertility O. P. D. Atotal of 1,338 new patients were seen in these O. P. D.s whereas the number of old patients was 5,189. Similarly a total of 863 In-patients were admitted in different urological wards. In the field of perative work, 360 open operations were done out of which 50% consisted of major operative procedures. The breakup of 237 operative endoscopy was TURP (117), TURB (10), VIU (65) and other (45) cases. Diagnostic endoscopy was performed in 1,580 cases. A total of 2,177 operations were thus performed in 1987 which included 23 kidney transplantations and 9 cases of microsurgery of vas deferens.

UROLOGY LABAORATORY: A total of 15,588 lab. investigations were carried out in the Urology Laboratory in 1987. Thest investigations included special investigations like semen examination (1260), testicular biopsy (56), urine culture (1,780). In addition routine investigations included Heamogram (435), urine examination (322). Renal Chemistry (8,100), serum Ca/P (1,630) etc.

In this there are clinical teachings, demonstrations and classroom lectures (6 per semester). The department does postgraduate teaching for M. D. (Resp. Dis.) students twice a week, clinical meeting once a week, radiology meeting twice a week and clinical teaching rounds.

In addition to comprehensice health care, nutrition classes and milk distribution has been done regularly.

#### School Health Clinic:

Under this programme, children from Municipal Schools in 'F' and 'G' wards are transported to KEM Hospital for regular check up investigations and treatment.

#### **POST—GRADUATE TEACHING PROGRAMME:**

- 1) Clinics for postgraduates by Denior Staff Members.
- 2) Journal club.
- 3) Clinical Meeting (Interhospital) once a week.
- 4) Pediatric Radiology Teaching Session—once a week, with Head, Pathology Department.
- 5) Postgraduate seminars —2 per year.

## **UNDER-GRADUATE TEACHING PROGRAMME:**

The undergraduate teaching programme comprises 3 month clinical posting in the III M. B. S. S. year.

The term includes 50 lectures, about 60—70 bed side clinics, ward rounds, OPD attendance, emergency attendance with instructions on emergency pediatric management thorugh clinics by Registrar and 10—12 sessions of self teaching by audiovisual aids. The entire syllabus of pediatrics as recommended by the Medical Council of India and the Indian Academy of Pediatrics is covered. The students' performance is evaluated in the last week of the term as follows:

Theory: 100 marks.

Practicals including clinical case and viva: 100 marks.

#### TE'ACHING

All staff members and students take active part in the routine seminars arranged by the Microbiology Department. It includes presentation of seminars on newly advancing fields in Micorbiology; and discussions regarding their utility and applicability in our hospital set up.

- 22 students secured distinction in the subject Physiology in October 1987 examination. Shri Sumeet Bhatia secured T. H. Rindani Scholarship in Physiology for the year 1987. Miss Sucheta Joshi and Jyoti Bhatia stood first in the subject of Physiology amongst the successful female candidate of 1st MBBS in the University of Bombay. They were awarded the Lady Reay Medical Scholarship for 1987.

#### Paying Bed Scheme:-

The paying bed scheme has started functioning from 18th July 1977 in the Side Section of Ward 17 for female patients and Ward 20 and 21 for male patients. 307 patients had taken the advantage of the paying beds during the year 1986.

#### Intensive Paediatric Care Unit :--

An Intensive Paediatric Care Unit started functioning from 1st August 1977 in a special and separate section of the Paediatric Ward. The Intensive Paediatric Care Unit admit acutely ill children in need of continuous observation. It is eqipped with all the monitoring and resuscitative equipment. A Registrar and a Staff Nurse are posted for round the clock duty. Mortality rate has been declining after the commissioning of this specialised unit. During the year 1986, 274 children were admitted in the unit.

#### Medical Acute Care Unit:-

The Department of Medicine established a separate Medical Acute Care Unit with 12 beds which started functioning from March 1978 onwards. These beds are housed in a single ward with pooled in eqipment which includes respirators, E. C. G. Machine, X-ray Unit etc. All the critically sick patients are isclated in this section and observed under the supervision of trained staff: Medical and Nursing, round the clock service is provided with post-graduate qualified doctors in attendance. 628 patients were treated in this section.

#### SCOPE OF, ACTIVITIES :

The hospital has been progressively expanding to include various new specialities. The hospital has well established department of General Medicine, General Surgery, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Psychiatry, Paediatrics, Anaesthesiology, Anstomy, E. N. T., Orthopaedic, Radiology, Tuberculosis, Ophthalmology, Dermatology and Venereology. There are also the specialised Departments of Cardiology, Cardio Thoracic Surgery, Neuro-Surgery, Plastic Surgery, Genitourinary Surgery, Nephrology, Gastroenterology (Medical and Surgical), Haematology, Endocrinology, Rheumatology and Collegen Diseases, Neonatology, Paediatric Surgery, Head & Neck Surgery and the department of Neuroscience which is approved by W. H. O. for research and training in stroke and tropical diseases. Besides this, special out-patient clinics are being conducted in the hospital, namely Thyroid, Renal, Diabetes, Premature and New Born Care, Hypertension, Asthma, Abortion, High Risk Pregnancy, Sterility, Glaucome and Squints, Anaesthesis Assesment and a School Clinic.

Special units for hospital patients have been developed like Intensive Care Units (Medical and Surgical for Cardiac patients) and Medical Acute Care Unit. Also there is an Intensive Paediatric Care Unit (I.P.C.U.). There is a special Planning Centre and a most modern Speech Therapy and Audiology Clinic and a training school effiliated to the University of Bombay and probably the only one of its kind in India. There are also well established departments of Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therepy, Social Service and Medical Records.

The hospital has an immunisation centre and growth and development clinic established by the Department of Preventive and Social Medicine and has also carried out several health educational programme in the community and have developed several audiovisuals and sound slide shows on various aspects of health are regularly screened in the slums of the city.

The hospital has an eye bank and blood bank which functions on voluntary donations of blood by relative of patients and members of the public.

#### Expension Programme:

Expansion of hospital is in process and a new two storey building has been occupied. It will house all Out-patients' Departments, Speciality and Superspeciality clinics, Blood Bank, Dispensary, Pharmacy, Isotope Unit, Artificial Kidney Unit, Cardiac Catheterisation Laboratory with I.C.C.U. and Casualty Department with an attached Trauma Ward. The space thus vacated by shifting of these activities will be utilised for having additional beds for superspecialities which have not yet got Municipal Commissioner—I recognition due to want of beds:

#### DEPARTMENT OF ANATOMY:

Following activities have been started:-

- (a) New pattern of dissection programme with the undergraduate study.
- (b) Setting up a laboratory for work in clinical Genetics which is under process.
- (c) Preparation and use thermocole and magnetic board for teaching.

## BLOOD BANK:

Proposed new activities: H.L.A. typing in Diabetic patients (Project).

#### **ENDOCRINOLOGY DEPARTMENT:**

New O. P. D. to follow-up patients with growth disorders has been started from October 1987.

Seminar on Growth Retardation organised by the department on 20th February 1988, sponsored by the Nair Golden Jubilee Research Foundation.

#### **MICROBIOLOGY DEPARTMENT:**

Dr. (Mrs.) P. K. Murti. Prof. & Head of the department is recognised as a Ph. D. guide in Microbiology by the University of Bombiy and she has already registered three students for the said course.

'Sperm Selection Procedure for IVF/IUI combination of Bacter blogical and Physiological techniques' by Sumedha Sahni. This paper bagged the 1st prise for the best paper when presented at 1st Chapter conference of the Maharashtra Obst. and Gynaec. Societies on 1st November 1987, at Pune.

## DEPARTMENT OF CARDIOLOGY :

Lab. from December 22 to December 25, 1987 with the help of foreign experts.

#### GENERAL SURGERY DEPARTMENT:

Dr. S. T. Chaudhry, Professor, visited Urology Department of Inst. Urology, London, U. K. and Mass. General Hospital Bostom U. S. A. Laser in Urology on going projects with research society Nair Hospital.

#### LIBRARY DEPARTMENT:

This department have about 33,000 books and 16,000 Bound Volumes of Medical Periodicals. This department subscribes to over 290 Foreign Periodicals. This department add about 900 books annually. This department have about 34 department Libraries to look after the needs of the individual departments. Library services caters to 3000 regular members including undergraduate and post graduate students, Residential doctors, Scientific Officers, Nurses, Physicians, Research Assistants and other Paramedical

#### MEDICAL RECORD DEPARTMENT:

This hospital has got a good Medical Record Department on the lines of the W. H. O.'s International Classification Diseases, Operations, injuries and cause of death. This helps the post graduate students in # their dessertation.

The department also looks after the work of registering donors who wish to donate their bodies after death for dissection purpose.

#### **DEPARTMENT OF NEUROSURGERY:**

An oration on 'Brain Malignancies' was delivered by Dr. U. S. Vengsarkar, Hon. Prof. & Head of Department for I. M. A. (Nagpur) on 10th April 1988.

#### **DEPARTMENT OF OBST. & GYNAEC.:**

Dr. M. Y. Rawal, Prof. and Head of Obst. & Gynaec, was awarded Dr. V. G. Patel oration at Baroda. **DEPARTMENT OF ORTHOPAEDICS:** 

The following projects have been started:

- 1. Posterior-lumbar Interbody funsion with segmental fixation in selected and indicated cases.
- 2. Total hip replacement : uncemented isoelastic total hip joints.
- 3. A new technique of fixation of fracture has been developed at this hospital of interfragmental compression with intramedullary nailing.

## OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY DEPARTMENT:

The Occupational Therapy Department of this Institution is under expansion whereas seceral sections like Day Care Unit cum Sheltered Workshop, Splint Section, Printing Unit have been functioning and expanding alongwith regular treatment of Occupational Therapy in various fields of Medicine to the benefit of indoor and outdoor patients of this institution.

Department participated in Diagnostic Camps in Tardeo area on 16th and 20th September. Department was involved in the Universal Immunization Drive on 15th, 16th, 17th September 1987 along with Public Health Department.

Diabetics detection camp was organised by Preventive & Social Medicine Department Rotary Club of Bombay At Tardeo.

The department under the sponsorship of Nair Golden Jubilee Research Foundation organised a workshop on Planning and Management of Expanded Programme of Immunization between 17th - 20th February 1988. There were about 28 participants from the department of Paediatrics and Preventive & Social Medicine from all 4 medical collages in Bombay. A faculty member from the National Institute of Communicable Diseases Delhi also participated as a Resource Person. The Deputy Director of RPI from Maharashtra Dr. (Mrs.) N. P. Diwan and UNICEF Programme Officer Mr. Yoshitoru Uramto also graced the workshop and interacted with the participants, A vaccination evaluation coverage session on WHO nodule was also held as a field exercise at Shivajinagar Urban Health Centre.

#### DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACOLOGY:

The Ethnopharmacology wing was initiated in the department in 1987.

The Nair Golden Jubilee Research foundation aponsored 1st Dr. S. Subramaniam Oration in Basic Science by Dr. O. D. Gulati titled 'Modern Treatment of Hypertension and Quality of Life' was arranged by the department on 9th January 1988.

#### PHYSIOTHERAPY DEPARTMENT :

The Physiotherapy Department helps in rehabilitation of the patient. Recently this department has started electro diagnostic section and Respirator volume tests.

#### **DEPARTMENT OF PAEDIATRICS:**

From 2nd January 1988 B. Y. L. Nair Ch. Hospital has launched an extension of its services for sick children and infants in the form of 'Paediatric Emergency Walk in Clinic', the first of its type in any general hospital in Bombay.

#### DEPARTMENT OF RESPIRATORY DISEASES:

This department is involved in the management of both T. B. and Non T. B. Chest diseases. It has a computerised Pulmonary Function Test machine, Fibrooptic Bronchoscope and allergy skin testing facility.

#### CHARGING OF FEES TO O. P. D. AND INDOOR PATIENTS AT THE MUNICIPAL HOSPITAL:

The Standing Committee under item No. 1733, dated 2nd March 1982 has approved M. C.'s proposal for levy of a taken fee for O. P. D. and Indoor patients attending Municipal General Hospitals. As per C. A.'s circular No.CA/RG/95, dated 2nd March 1982 this scheme has been implemented from 1.4.82 The staff at the Registration counter receive Rs. 2/- per O.P.D. case papers form the patients coming for treatment in O.P.D. O.P.D. case paper would be valid for 15 days only. After 15 days the patient has to pay Rs. 2/- for renewing the case paper.

As regards indoor patients and admission fee of Rs. 5/-is to be collected at the time of admitting the patient. Each paper is valid for 10 days only. If however the doctor attending on the ptient, advises that the patient is required to be kept in the hospital beyond 10 days and the Dean, Assistant Dean or A.M.O. of the hospital on considering the advise prescribed such a stay beyond 10 days the same old form will be continued beyond 10 days and no additional fees could be levied. In the absence of such certificate from the doctor attending on the patient, a fee of Rs. 5/- per day of stay in the hospital beyond 10 days is levied and recovered.

A charge of Rs. 400/- is made for C. T. Scans for inpatients referred from Municipal Hospital. Outpatients from the Municipal Hospitals and patients referred from elsewhere are charged Rs. 750/- for the scan preference being given to patients from the Municipal Hospitals. Free scans are carried out on employees of the Bombay Municipal Corporation.

An amount of Rs. 300/- is charged for 2-D Echo investigations. An amount of Rs. 60 is charged for E. E. G. investigations.

#### PAYING SCHEME :

The charges of Rs. 30/- per patient per day for paying beds (Side Room) have been increased to Rs. 50/- per patient per day. Similarly, charges of Rs. 15/- per patient per day in paying wards at Sion and other hospitals have been increased to Rs. 25/- per patient per day. Besides, these patients are also being charged at Rs. 75/- for minor operation and Rs. 150/- for major operation. They are also be liable to pay Rs. 20/- per X-ray investigation and Rs. 30/- for Pathological/Bacteriological BMR test and for E. C. G. or Encephalogram. These fees are to be paid in the office of the hospitals as at present. The above charges are revised from 10th March 1988.

The Municipal employees and their nearest dependent family members are to be given treatment free of above levies for case paper etc. The Municipal Employees, however, will have to produce his identity card or a proof from the head of the department about his employment in Municipal service.

#### 1. DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE:

The department of Medicine has 3 full-time and 3 part-time units which participates in under graduate and post graduate teaching/training programme. There are 3 full-time and 2 Hon. Professor of Medicine. There are 5 full-time Readers, 2 Hon. Associate Professors and 3 Hon. Professors of Medicine. There are total 13 Lecterers in the department. They work for general medicine, M. A. C. U. and for the specialities attached to the department. The members of the staff also participates in the teaching of Dental, O. T., P.T., Nursing and Speech Thereapy students of our hospital.

The patient care includes one O.P.D. per unit with one emergency admission day and inpatient services. The specialities associated with the department are Rheumatology, Nephrology, Asthma and Obstructive Airway Diseases Clinic, Hypertension and Diabetes which was separted in the month of October 1987, to the Department of Endocrinology with the promotion of Dr. (Mrs.) K. D. Nihalani, Professor of Medicine to the post of Head of Endocrinology Department. Also Dr. (Mrs.) D. V. Deashpande who is promoted to the post of Professor of Medicine from 1st Otober 1987, is associated with thyroid clinic and attached to the Kasturba Hospital for Infectious Diseases. The specialities run their own O. P. D. services alongwith inpatient facilities.

Medical Acute Care Unit is a special area created in the department where all seriously ill but potentially salvageable patients are admitted and treated. The unit is managed by a senior member of staff e.g., Professor, Associate or Assistant Professor, two Lecturers, 2 Registrars and 2 House Officers. The cycles for this are on a monthly basis. On an average 60-70 cases are treated per month.

The department has an attached research laboratory headed by Senior Biochemist Dr. D. S. Salgaonkar. The laboratory is well-equipped. It caters to the speciality investigations in the field of Rheumatology, Immunology, Diabetes, Nephrology, Hypertension and Asthma. Also we are planned to increase the areas of activity.

The under-graduate teaching programme consists of 80 well selected subjects, 70 tutorial topics minimum alongwith table-work and ward clinics. Regular ward examination for M. B. B. S. as well as B. D. S. students are held. The results of under-graduates at final M. B. B. S. examination are good.

Post-graduate training consists of regular post-graduate bed-side clinics, lectures, guest lectures, seminars, clinical meetings and Clinico-Pathological-Corelation meetings. Our students have been performing very well at the University examinations.

The members of the staff are active members of Association of Physicians of India and other various speciality associations. Some of them are associated with the Journals published by such associations. Most have contributed to text-books of medicine or have written books for students. The members are also actively participating in the conferences both national, international and also attend conferences in outside countries.

Other members associated with the department are a Medical Social Worker and a dietician who are also actively engaged in their duties.

Newer activities to be started are a clinical Pharmacology service which is under process for obtaining sanctions. The department had organised a work-shop on Evaluation techniques and is presently in the process of modifying the theory examination papers to bring in more objectivity and reliability.

## 2. DEPARTMENT OF SURGERY :

Department of Surgery consists of 3 full time and 3 part time units.

## 3. DEPARTMENT OF GYNAEC. AND OBSTETRIC:

Department of Gynaec. and Obstetric consists of 3 units, one full-time and two units under Hon. Professor and Asstt. Professor. Each unit functions twice a week.

## 4. DEPARTMENT OF PEDIATRICS :-

The Department of Paediatric continued to work with one full-time unit and one part-time unit.

#### 9. .. CARDIOVASCULAR AND THORACIC SURGERY

In the calender year 1987 the department of Cardio Vascular and Thoracic Surgery has maintained the pace set at the beginning 1986 and has achieved considerable progress with many-fold activities. The presentation highlights both the academic and clinical aspects of our activities:

## Operative Work:

It is worthwhile mentioning that our moto has been to reflect a high cost effective utility ratio. At present we operate 5 days a week and hardly any working day has been lost without doing an open heart operation except for unavoidable reasons. The following list shows the operative work done by the department in 1987 :---

The overall operative mortality is around 7%. This work output is significant on the background that . we had to stop operating for 1½ month due to R. M. O. Strike.

## Academic Achievements :

Monday meeting: every Monday a Cardiac Cath. meeting is held jointly with the department of Cardiology where cases catheterised during the previous week are discussed and their treatment is finalised.

#### Thursday Grand Round: '

Every Thursday at 3.00 p.m., all the staff and residents of the department of Cardio Vascular and Thoracic Surgery take a clinical round in the wards with detailed discussion on each patient, regarding treatment and plan of surgery.

#### Saturday Meeting:

Every Saturday at 9.00 a.m., the department of Cardio Vascular and Thoracic Surgery and Cardiology discuss the cases operated during the previous week. Here the clinical aspects during the previous week. Here the clinical aspects are presented by the Carciology residents and surgical aspects by the Cardio Vascular and Thoracic residents.

The department of Cardio Vascular and Thoracic Surgery and Department of Cardiology jointly organised an international conference on Interventional Cardiology and Cardiac Surgery on 20-21st Dacember 1987 at Hotel Oberoi Towers. This was sponsored by Nair Hospital Golden Jubilee Research Frendation. Following portfolies were held by our departmental staff:

Dr. J. N. Karbhase — An Executive President.

Dr. J. M. Desai — As Chairman Scientific Committee.

Dr. R. B. Patil — Treasurer.

Dr. S. M. Doshi — Secretary.

This conference required one year of spade work and continuous efforts and was well attended with over 300 delegates. Many interesting and informative Cardiology and Cardiac Surgical aspects were discussed by the well-known international as well as national personalities. The international Cardiac Surgeons including Dr. Quagaburgh from Netherland, Dr. S. Subramanium from U. S. A. Later on from 18th to 24th December we had a cardiac surgery workshop at Nair Hospital where five unusual Paediatric Cardiac Surgical cases were operated and demonstrated. Of these switch operation for transposition of great arteries done by Dr. Quagaburgh is worth noted as this is probably the first such operation has been done in India.

#### **Guest Lectures:**

Dr. J. N. Karbhase has delivered a guest lecture at I. M. A., Chopda Dist. Jalgaon in February (Valvular and Coronary Bypass Surgery).

Coronary Angiography in post myocardial infarction period became a routine. Electrophysiological studies were started and were performed in 13 cases.

#### Other achievements/activities:

The departments of Cardiology and Cardiac Surgery organised an "International Conference on Interventional Cardiology and Sugery" on December 20 and 21, 1987. The Conference was attended by luminaries from 8 countries. Following the conference, mitral balloon valvuloplasty and coronary angioplasty was performed with the help of visiting specialists.

- Dr. C. V. Shah, Honorary Associate Cardiologist was appointed as President of India Society of Medical Ultrasound.
- Dr. S. Sharma, Professor and Head of Cardiology selected for International Starr, Ahmed Fellowship of Cardiovascular surgeon's society.
- Dr. S. Sharma, Professor and Head of Cardiology appointed on the Editorial Board for International Journal C. V. World Report and also appointed as Member of Clinical Cardiology and Research Committee of Asian Pacific Society of Cardiology.

Many members of the department gave invited lectures in national and international conferences.

#### 11. PLASTIC SURGERY:

Plastic Surgery O. P. D. was conducted every Wednesday and Friday and a total of 626 new cases were seen.

In addition about 125 cases were seen every week for follow up treatment. Full documentations and records of all these cases were made and updated. A total of 768 cases were admitted for surgery of which 342 cases were elective and rest were emergency cases mainly involving the hand and face. A large number of emergency cases were also treated in casualty.

Clinical meetings of the Bombay Plastic Surgeons group were held under the auspicies of the Department of Plastic Surgery. Clinics for undergraduates were arranged by the Department of Plastic Surgery.

Dr. Srivastava from University of Benaras was deputed as a clinical observor as a part of his post-graduate curriculum in our department during October 1987 for a period of 2 weeks.

#### 12. HYPERTENSION CLINIC:

The Hypertension Clinic has been gradually having an increased workload. Over 150 new cases of hypertension have registered with us in the last one year. These patients are examined, investigated and treated with the latest drugs which are not easily available in the general O. P. D. These drugs have been procured by us by donations. Old patients are followed up every 15 days.

The clinic is held on every Tuesday.

Members of the clinic are on the Editorial Board of the National Journal of Hypertension.

From the Hypertension Clinic a drug trial of Nefedepine Retard tablets was conducted and presented at the Annual A. P. I. conference.

#### 14. ASTHMA AND OBSTRUCTIVE AIRWAY DISEASES CLINIC:

This clinic of the Department of Medicine was started in January 1976 and is held every Monday in R. No. 106 between 9.00 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. Every week about 4-6 new patients and 50-60 old patients attend the clinic for treatment of their asthma. Every week 2-3 patients are admitted in the hospital from the clinic.

In the year 1987, the total number of new cases seen in the O. P. D. were 205, while about 100 cases were admitted in the hospital from the clinic.

Several special investigations are carried out in these patients e.g.

- a. Pulmonary function tests by Spirometry before and after isoprenaline.
- b.' Exercise testing in asthmatics with the help of Treadmill equipment alongwith pulmonary functions to see the production of exercise induced asthma.
- c. Allergy testing for various allergens like pollen, fungi, dust, food items etc.
- d. Immunoglobulins E and G.
- e. Blood serotonin and histamine during asthmatic attack and when free from bronchospasm.
- f. Platelet factor 4 by RIA and blood recalcification time, to see the platelet activity in asthmatics.

This clinic has also started studying the cardiovascular effects of chronic airway obstruction by MUGA Scan.

## 15. DIABETES CLINIC :

The Diabetes Clinic runs O. P. D.'s for new patients on Mondays and Thursdays from 9.00 a.m. onwards. Patients are examined in detail. A complete dietary assessment is made and caloric adjustment is made according to the patients dietary habits. A full social work up is also carried out. Patients spend about surhour to an hour and a half for this first detailed evaluation, when their therapy is decided.

Follow up patients are seen every Monday and Thursday from 1.40 p.m. onwards. Drugs are distributed at this O. P. D. Blood Sugars are repeated every three monthly and doses of the drugs are adjusted according the Blood Surgars. Patients are also evaluated for any specific problems that they may have which are also investigated and treated.

A joint round is taken for referred patients in the wards where patients of endocrine disorders and diabetes are seen in detail. These patients are referred on any day to a Registrars and Seniors, to reevaluate the patient.

All patients suffering from diabetes undergoing surgery are managed by the Diabetes Unit. Special care is taken of patients with juvenile diabetes and of pregnant diabetic woman. All the services are offered as and when needed to the diabetic patients with complications e.g. laser therepy for retinopathy and dialysis for Nephropathy.

Besides three monthly blood sugars, lipidograms, glycosylated haemoglobins, renal and liver function tests are carried out initially. These and any other necessary investigations are carried out for patients with diabetes when indicated.

The diabetes unit also runs Diabetes — T. B. Clinic in association with the Department of Chest Diseases and Tuberculosis for the benefit and improved Follow-up of patients with both these diseases. This clinic is held on Wednesday from 9.00° a.m. onwards.

#### 17. AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH THERAPY SCHOOL:

Clinical: 4213 new patients were seen.

#### Classes for Deaf:

Under the Audiology and Speech Therapy Department the Classes for Deaf were working at Nana Chowk, Matunga, Vile Parle and Mahalaxmi.

Our school celebrated various functions. Annual School week including educational trip to Vihar Lake, Pawai and Goregaon and small visits to Mahalaxmi Fair, Ganpati Decoration. We had our sports and various competitions like Drawing, Handwriting etc.

Their progress in the normal school has been satisfactory. 18 New students were admitted in the Jr. Class. Six full time and one part time teachers were on the staff. The total number of students was 75.

Our students took part in various competitions organised by Vikas Vidyalaya and Rotary Club and other institutions for the Deaf. Some of our students won the prizes.

Our teachers attended various workshop and seminars on Education of Deaf at Ali-Yavar Jung, Bandra.

The main objective is Rehabilitation of these disables with the colaboration from various charitable organisation and private industries. Job training facilities are given in Tailoring, assembling packing numbering our hospital registers, along with this we have started training them to make staff toys which is very beneficial. The remuneration is paid for the same by industries and hospital. Four disables are completely rehabilitated and they are on own. During this year 35 disables have taken advantage of this project. Free lunch facility is arranged through donation.

Two punching machines, 2 max numbering machines, 3 sewing machines and one sewing with beeding attachment and rexin material is bought through the donation which is very much helpful for disables to earn their bread.

Lions Club of Byculla has taken keen and active interest in expanding Work and Training Centre for disables which is an asset to help more disabled to be on their own.

This project started on World Health Day (7th April 1983) from the point of view to rehabilitate alcoholics. There are many employees and patients who are alcoholics, suffering from various health complaints and problems with families as well as in work. We wish to understand their problems and motivate them to give up drinking. From this point of view this project has been started with the colaboration of Alcoholic Annonimous Group. A. A.'s meetings are arranged on every Saturday between 10.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. This is a group therepy. The employees and patients are attending meetings regularly and taking benefit of this project. It has been observed that fifty alcoholics have stopped drinking and are able to lead normal life with their family members. Alongwith the alcoholics their family members are also involved in this project. All these families are taken for the individual and group therepy and then rehabilitation.

This was a great achievement and success. Some alcoholics who are fully motivated and recovered took initiative to start the independent A. A. project in their own offices and factories. Day by day more alcoholics and few drugs addicts are taking benefits of this project.

#### 29. RHEUMATOLOGY CLINIC:

The Rheumatology Clinic started in the year 1956. Rheumatology O. P. D. for new cases is held on every Friday moring. On Saturdays follow-up patients are seen and at the same time drugs are dispensed. These apart SLE, PSS, DM/PM and other collegen vascular diseases second-line RA patients SSA and special study patients are seen on different days for better follow-up.

In the year 1987, we have registered 1027 new patients in the clinic. Also Indoor admission in wards were 113 during the year.

The laboratory services provide adequate support of routine and immunologic tests. Techniques for study of lymphocyte subsets are being well-established in the laboratory for the patients attending the clinic. Cellaborative studies on Aurvedic drugs and accupancture is continued in the year.

The members of the unit had participated in the Annual Indian Rheumatism Association Conference held in Goa in the year and presented in all four papers. Also few other research papers have been published and under publication during the year in national journals.

The clinic is increasing/growing progessively and successfully.

## 32. PHARMACY DEPARTMENT:

## 1. Dispensary:

This year Dispensary has dispensed 432688 cases papers out-door and 832 at Indoor.

#### 31. E. N. T. DEPARTMENT:

Department of E. N. T. consists of one Full-time Unit which was under Dr. A. G. Pusalkar, Prof. & Head of E. N. T. and Head & Neck Surgery Department and also Head of Audiology & Speech Therapy School till December 1987 and one part-time unit under Dr. N. L. Hiranandani, Hon. E. N. T. Surgeon and Hon. Prof. of E. N. T. The E. N. T. Department & Audiology & Speech Therapy Department, were separated from 1st December 1987 and Dr. D. S. Grewal is looking after E. N. T. & Head & Neck Surgery Department and Prof. Jagdish is looking after Audiology & Speech Therapy Department. From 1st January 1988 Dr. D. S. Grewal is appointed as Prof. & Head of E. N. T. Department and there are 2 units, one full-time unit headed by Dr. D. S. Grewal and other part-time unit headed by Dr. N. L. Hiranandani. Each unit attending alternate day O. P. D. and Operation Theatre.

The following were the activities of the department of E. N. T. and Head & Neck Surgery during the year 1987:—

#### O. P. D. Services :-

The total No. of patients attended E. N. T. O. P. D. during the year 1987 were 13,572. In addition old cases of the previous years requiring follow-up and treatment have been attended.

#### Operative Session:

#### E. N. G. Clinic:

Patients of vertigo, deafness and tinnitus have been referred from the Out-patient Department of E.N.T. Patients history and clinical examination is done. Following this they are referred from O. P. D. for Electronystagmography. These patients are further followed up on Wednesday and Friday at the E. N. G. Clinic conducted in L. C. V. R. Laboratory of E. N. T. Department at 11.30 a.m. They are given treatment and further follow-up is done at periods of 2 weeks. Further investigations if necessary, for Radiography, Blood examination etc. are also advised, 100 new ceses have been thus investigated and treated in the year 1987. The old cases have also been followed up as required.

BERA TEST:
We have started the facility of Brain-stem Evoked Response Audiometry from January 1986. This is a unique investigation and only this department amongst all the Municipal Corporation Hospitals having this facility. This facility help in diagnosis, the deafness even in New Born and helps in diagnosis of early acoustic neuromas. These tests were carried out by Prof. R. K. Jagdeesh and Smt, G. B. Gore, Asstt. Prof. of A. S. T. Department. The total number of BERA done during the year 1987 were 331.

Admissions:—The admission capacity of students admitted for MBBS Course at this institution is 100 per year. The number of students on roll as on 31st December 1987 was 515 and that of post-graduate student was 303. There are 5 students under Dr. Dhar doing Ph. D. in Pharmacology. The department of Biochemistry is recognised for Ph. D. in Biochemistry since 1984 and 4 students are registered and working for Ph. D.

DMLT Course is conducted at this intitution with intake capacity of 10 students. We are also enrolling students for M. Sc. course in following subjects in June term every year.

Educational Activities: — Besides regular teaching programme monthly scheduled meetings and clinical cardiology conferences are held regularly. Scientific and educational films were shown to the staff and students.

Specialised training is imparted to students of other institutions by organising workshops and seminars. Specialised training in super speciality subjects is given and fee of 100/- p.m., is charged.

Interns:—Graduate from University other than Bombay University are allowed to undergo Internship training at the attached LTMG Hospital to the extent of 10 percent. From October 1984 term these interns are charged Rs. 100/- for every months training B. Pharm, D. Pharm students are given training of 750 hours in pharmacy to a maximum capacity of six students at a time Rs. 100/- for 3 months training are charged from June 1985 term. Students from S. N. D. T. University & other technical Institutions are allowed to work for practical training in Pathology on payment of Rs. 100/- for 3 month for training. Results of undergraduate and postgraduate students of the year 1987 and the prizes won by the students and those who stood first in the examination are shown on the Appendix I-A and I-B.

We are conducting competitive examinations in the subjects of Anatomy, Physiology, for Ist MBBS, Pharmacology, for Ind MBBS and Medicine, Surgery, Obst & Gyn. PSM, ENT and Paediatrics for Illrd MBBS / students every year. The winners of the exams are given merit certificates and cash prizes from the interest of the donation received at the time of silver Jubilee of the Institution which are kept in fixed deposit. The details of prizes with names of students who have won the prizes are given in Appendix I-CA competitive examination in Ophthalmology (only practical examn.) for regular batch and casual batch of interns is started from ugus^o 1983 named as Dr. Sathe's prize in Ophthalmology. Cash prize is given to Intern Judged as first. Similarly a competitive examinations in Pathology (for IInd MBBS students) and Paediatrics (for IIIrd MBBS stadents) are started from February 1986 and August 1985 respectively named as Dr. Athawale Prize. Cash Prizes are given to the students who stood I and II in the Competitive Examination.

Since November 1982 term, Dr. Hemant Kelker prize is awarded for the P. G. student who is first in the merit list of registered candidate for M. S. (Gen- Surg.) course in the regular batch. (November term) student. It is given from the donations received from relatives in the memory of Late Dr. Kelker in 1981.

A seperate committee of students manages the students cultural and sport activities. To defray this expenditure, fee of Rs. 50/- per annum is being collected from the students and interns which has been increased to Rs. 80/- per annum from November 1982 terms onwards.

Research Society:—The staff and Research Society is functioning in this Institution since August 1966. It is registered under the Societies registrate: Act, and Public Trust Act, Medical Officers working in this Institution including Hon. Prof. Hon. Assistant Prof. Full Time Medical Officers upto the level of Tutors and Demonstrators are the member of the society. Annual subscription for each member is Rs. 25/- per annum. Total No. of membership as on 31st December 1987 is 225:

Hostel: Boys and Girls are given accommodation in two separate hostels. About 100 students are accommodated in these hostels. There are only boarding facilities in the hostel and for that an amount of Rs. 70/- per terms is recovered from the students which has been increased to Rs. 100/- 3/rom November 1982 term. Deposit of Rs. 35/- is taken from students occupying hostel for the first time.

Library:—During the year 427 books have been added to the collection totalling to 15,843 books. The Library has subscribed to 300 title of journals. The budget grant sanctioned for Library from L. T. M. M. College is Rs. 3,90,000.00 and that from L. T. M. G. Hospital budget is Rs. 2,20,000/-.

Group Works: Group Work as a method has been found as one of the most effective one and hence, it has been used by the MSWs now for the last several years. Some groups were time-bound and completed in a series of sessions, whereas some were on-going. Details of the same are as follows:—

#### (A) Therapeutic Groups:

- i) The Youth Deef Club continued its activities on Once a week basis between 1.30 to 4.30 p.m., every Saturdays. As ususal they had various topics from current news to discuss. They went out for picnics and overnight Camps. This year, with the Dean's permission, the Deaf Group is registered with the Charity Commissioner and with the Society Registration Act, The Deaf_would be the Committee members and would conduct activities of their interest with priorities.
- ii) Group of Deaf from the School was conducted on an ongoing Basis.
- iii) Group of Parents of the Deaf were also seen regularly to solve their difficulties and quaries and to learn from each other to cope with the needs of the deaf child.

- v) Group of Paraplegics conducted with the help of student Social Workers who helped the new paraplegics to learn to cope with their physical & emotional problems due to parapelgia, it also helped them to take more interest in themselves and get motivated to take up work.
- vi) Family Therepy Groups were conducted for marital disharmony and emotional disturbance.
- vii) Groups of Alcoholics were conducted with help of the AA members. Groups of the relatives of alcoholics were also conducted to help them cope with the stress and to regard the addiction as an illness.
- (B) Education Group Work: These are conducted to educate the patients and their relatives on the nature of the illness and the care that needs to be taken they were:
  - i) Relatives of drug addicts admitted in the Wards were seen once a week.

- ii) Parents of the epileptic children were seen to disceminate information about epilepsy and its management, importance of follow-up, regular treatment, etc.
- iii) Parents for high protein preparation and demonstration were seen in groups and talks were given to them on importance of a balanced diet and high protein food.

- (C) Recreation Group: Patients from wards are kept occupied in recreational activities. Children are given toys or story books. N. S. S. Volunteers go to the Wards to play some game, etc., for the bed ridden children. Other children who can move, are taken to the All India Woemn's Conference. She comes daily from Monday to Friday between 2.00 p.m. to 4.00 p.m. and manages the Toy Bank with with the help of the N. S. S. Volunteers.
- (D) On Going Projects (a) For Out-door Patients.
  - i) Nutrition Project: Malnourished children, T. B. Patients and children are advised high protein diet and are given high protein powder specially devised and prepared by the M. S. W. dept, This powder is also sold at the sale Counter at the rate of Rs. 6/- per packet of ½ Kg. Sometimes domonstration of preparing various tempting dishes is given to the mothers.
  - ii) Grain Distribution for families going through a crisis situation is done with the help of the VISHWA HINDU PARISHAD, at the rate of 5 Kgs. Rice and 5 Kgs wheat per month. Fifty such families are getting the benefit of this project.
    - iii) Mid-day meals given to poor relatives of patients admitted in the Wards, especially for those who cannot afford to go out and buy their meals. This scheme is also extended to the Workshop inmates.
    - iv) Sheltered Workshop is conducted for the physical, mentally retarded and emotionally **/handicapped cases its sections are:
      - a) Training in tailoring is given to the deaf young girls who have just passed out from school and have nothing else to do. One batch of 12 girls have passed the Government Vocational Training Examination held in 1985 This year along with the deaf girls even the mentally ill and the socially handicapped are also undergoing training for the examination.
      - b) Production: Patients with different handicape (blind, deaf, orthopaedically handicapped, mentally ill, socially handicapped and some medical cases, relatives of needy patients) are given apportunity to work together, to gain self-confidence and earn some money. They are paid on piece work basis; This also keeps them gainfully occupied in the following activities:
        - i) Tailoring: Making baby clothes, hospital mending stitching orders, 6-8 pkts when work is available.
        - ii) Paper bags making: 8-10 patients employed per day.
        - iii) Chair canning: 4-5 patients when work is available.
      - c) Sale Counter: Sanitary pads and baby clothes, made by the convalescent patients in the workshop, and high protein powder are sold at the sale counter. All sale proceeds are deposited in the Poor Box Fund. Handicapped persons conduct the sale.

Indoor Patients: (i) Toy Bank is conducted for children admitted in the Wards. Sometimes children related to patients admitted in wards also come and play. A volunteer to manage this activity is given an honorarium by the All India Women's Conference.

- (ii) Circulating Library for the wards where usually adult patients are kept for longer time. Old magazines and books are given for reading. Everyday in the afternoon, patients from different wards. (Wards 12, 14, 15, 16, 19, 29 and 30) are given books and magazines by a Worker (old patient of the deptt.) This activity is cobducted by sponsorship of donors by paying honorarium to the attendant and donation of old books and magazines. The M. S. W. Department gives overall supervision.
- (iii) Picture—Poster Library by which Posters are circulated in the Wards which helps to create a plasant and healthy atmosphere there.

Special Activities: Overnight Camps: Trips and Picnics are organised for the different groups of handicapped. Through these activities a platform is provided to the group members to share their experiences and generate confidence to face difficult situations in life:

Seminars, Workshops and Panel Discussions: are organised for the various groups of disabled along with the rehabilitation team members to bring about petter interaction between them and among themselves.

#### Special Projects :

a) Development Clinic: A Workshop on Early Diagnosis and early intervention of handicapped children of pre-school Age was held in 1984 in the L.T. M. G. Hospital. The emphasis was developmentally subnormal (retarded) children (6) years and the necessity of early intervention. With this in view, the Development Clinic was started in LTMG Hospital. The MSW works with the parents and children for the best possible development and rehabilitation of the children.

man and the histories and the of the open

A team of a paediatrician. Occupational Therapist and Social worker attend the Development Clinic OPD, once a week. Patients are evaluated by the team and are thus helped in therepy. Role of social worker comes into the picture to help the family with a mentally handicapped child. The entire family needs moral support, practical advice, continuing encouragement and motivation to work for the child.

#### Stategies Planned:

- a) Visits to Special ephople/institutions for the mentally retarded planned.
- b) To reach more families in the community, especially in the lower income levels and in particular to identify those who have a handicupped shill of pre-school age, a project is being formulated. This will be a sequel to the Development Clinic.

The M. P. S. W. Department is one of the Core Group members in the "Genetic Counselling Project" under CAMHADD (Common Wealth Association of Mentally Handicapped and Developmental Disabilities). The Social Worker attended a one week Workshop and received training in the same. In order to prevent mental retardation and for its early detection, survey work will be conducted in a slum community. The Social worker will be responsible for selecting and training of community health volunteers, supervising the project and maintaining records. The survey will begin by the end of this year after the volunteers are given raining.

Project Help: In the Cause of Women a Project was undertaken by the Deptt. As the daily papers reported frequent cases of harrassment of women by in-laws, married women losing their lives in order to get justice. In collaboration with the police Cell, Women voluntary organisations and M. P. S. W. Deptt. "PROJECT HELP" was started in July 1987. Under this Project the women Burn-cases were seen immediately on admission. Form Night (after 9.00 p.m.) the Police Van was sent to MSWs and Volunteers' Houses and cases were interviewed. Total number of cases seen under this project was 152 in the year under consideration.

Hospital Extension Project Sarvodaya Hospital: Convalescing patients from the wards, unknown patients with rehabilitation plans are transferred to Sarvodaya Hospital. Weekly follow-up is maintained by M. S. Ws., concerned for discharge or any other related social and psychological problem. Overall supervision for discharge or rehabilitation is also maintained.

King George Infirmary: 20 Patients mainly from Orthopaedic Units are transferred to K. G. Infirmary through M. S. Ws. who keep weekly follow-up for related problems and discharge. Patients are kept here jainly for P.T.O.T. Treatment and psychosocial rehabilitation.

L. T. M. G. Hospital's School for the Deaf: The M. P. S. W. Deptt. started the school of the Deaf in the year 1973 at the old barracks of our hospital. We had 7 deaf children and one trained teacher. The expenses were sponsored by the Vivekanand Medical Mission.

In the year 1976, the school developed and shifted to the Municipal Primary School Building. By 1987 we had 120 children. The staff includes 13 teachers for the deaf, two part-time craft teachers for the deaf deputed by the Education Deptt. B. M. C. One teacher for Tailoring sponsored by the donor, 1 ayabhai and one sweeper.

#### II) Teaching and Supervision:

- a) Teaching Medical, Nursing and Social work students.
- b) Student Social Workers come from training schools of social work for their field work experience. They usually have to put in 15 hours week. They are given cases, group and projects to work with to gain experience, through cases records and demonstrations, etc., they are taught social work practive and skills. An evaluation report is sent to their respective institutions on the basis of which the students are given grades in their field work. Passing in the Field work is cumpulsory.
- (C) Orientation lectures: are given to the visiting groups from various training institutions of social work in hospital and hospital social work.
- (D) N. S. S. Voluntéers are sent to the hospitals from Khalsa, Ruia, S. I. E. S., Poddar, B. M. Ruia and S. I. W. S. Colleges. They come in batches for a total period of 60-120 hours from the month of August to February. 133 students were placed in the year 1987.
- P&S. M.: The Report of the work done by the Department of Preventive and Social Medicine to be included in the body of the Annual Administration Report of the Institution.

#### 2. HEALTH SUPERVISION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN:

Cross Road School and Transit Camp School Dharavi are included under School health programme. Medical Check up and immunisation are carried out in both the schools. 200 Children have received supplementary feeding. In addition Audio-metric check-up for screening for hard of hearing, health educational talks by Interns.

As a part of child to child programme, child volunteers are trained in various health aspects at Transit Camp School and at Cross Road Schools.

#### 3. VIT A. PROPHYLAXIS PROGRAMME:

Oral Vit A was given in Dharavi community by making home visits as well as at the Clinic.

#### 4. UNDER FIVE CLINIC:

Under five clinics are conducted at Matunga Labour Camp, Urban Health Centre, Dharavi. Minor ailments of these children are treated. If necessary they are referred to the specialist. B. C. G., Triple, Polio Measles, Immunisation, are carried out. Malnourished children are given Nutritional Aid, Health education on the common problems is given to monthers (App. 1).

#### 5. CHILD WELFARE CENTRE:

The child welfare centre is conducted by the department of P. S. M. at L. T. M. M. College & Hospital compound and children are enrolled from 3 months onwards and are followed upto the age of five years (App. 2).

#### 6. MEDICAL RELIEF:

Adult patients and children were examined and treated at Dharavi Urban Health Centre & Matunga Labour Camp H. P. Area. Those who need specialist's Treatment were referred to L. T. M. G. Hospital, TT & TABC were given to adult population. Children were protected by D. P. T., Polio, Measles, T. A. B. (App. 3).

#### . 7. URBAN HEALTH INTERNSHIP PROGRAMME:

Interns are posted for comprehensive health care to all Urban Slum Community adopted by P. S. M. Department.

#### 8. ROME PROJECT:

Gautam Nagar, Lai donger, Kala Killa, Naik Nagar, were selected for this programme, Immunization & vit. A prophylaxis were conducted.

#### 3). Aids Provided for the Dharavi Slums Dwellers:

- A C.R.S.—Nutritional aid with the help of Catholic Relief Services is given to the slum dwellers from Dharavi. No. of beneficieries—150 children.
  - ii) N. R. C. Nutritional rehabilitation centre Dharavi has enrolled 40 mainourished children. They are fed on nutritions type of diet including milk once a day. Average attendance at each clinic is around 35.
  - iii) Feeding fro affected children. A high protein Nutrition snack is being given daily to 25-35/months.

- C School fees & Note Books 15 children were sponsored.

- a. Literacy Classes: Literacy classes are continued four times a week with the help of voluntary workers in Four areas 50
  - 1) Ramabai Nagar, 2) Indira Nagar, 3) C.W.C., Nityanad Nagar.
- b. Sewing classes: Sewing classes are continued from Monday to Saturday at U. H. C. A Teacher is appointed. There are 4 sewing machines donated by various agencies and 75 women are UNDER training. Tests are arranged once in Six months & Certificates are issued to sewing women. One is community also there.
- c. Balwadies: 4 Balwadies at Kunchikorve Nagar and one each at Indira Nagar, Nityanand Nagar & Ambedkar Nagar are continued, about 150 children enrolled. Balwadi started at Ambedkar Nagar in 87 Oct.
- d. 35 Mahila Mandals have been organised in Dharavi Slum.
- e. 22 youth groups have been organised in Dharavi area.
- f. 1397 T. B. patients have been diagnosed in Dharavi slum and being followed up regarding treatment. This programme has been started from August 1982.
- g. Exhibition: MMP Shah students gave lecture on handicrafts to 10 girls, 3 exhibitions—Transit Camp—Shramjivi Nagar Chembur (MLC).
- 5) Health Education: Activities are continued regularly in the form of health talks, demonstration, exhibitions, films, slides shows etc., in all the communities.

#### i. WORLD HEALTH DAY CELEBRATION:

Wh. O. Day was celebrated on 7th April 1987. The department of Preventive & Social Medicine at L. T. M. M. C. Sion, celebrated the World Health Day by organising an exhibition and seminar, at O., P. D. building of L. T. M. G. Hospital Sion, Bombay — 22. The posters were displayed on various aspects of immunization and vaccination programme for children was also carried out in the exhibition with the help of P. H. N. and staff of P. S. M. Department. About 121 children were immunised and were also advised to come for followup.

The exhibition was kept expen for public for 2 days i.e., on 7th and 8th April 1987. About 2000 visited the exhibition. All the posters were explained to visitors by the staff of P. S. M. Dept., MSW and student Nurses.

#### II T. B. CLINIC :

This is conducted by Urban Health Centre, Dharavi. The adult suspected cases of T.B. are referred to Sion Hospital, for further investigation. So far 1889 cases are referred for investigation and they got their treatment at Urban Health Centre Dharavi. 1866 children are treatment at T.B. Clinic at Urban Health. Centre Dharavi.

III Leprosy Clinic: This is conducted at Urban Health Centre, Dharavi trice a week with the help of Bombay Leprosy Project. About 620 cases of leprosy are under treatment.

IV Rehabilitation of Physically Handicapped: The programme was started in June 1987 with the help of I. S. R. R. The physically handicapped children who were school drop outs were included under this programme. The aim of this programme is to prevent juvenile delinguency and train every physically handicapped in some vacation through which he can earn and maintain himself. Two courses are conducted for the Physically handicapped namely: 1) Radio Respiring, 2) Tailoring (Rexine bag making 3) Clay madelling 4) T. V. Repairing.

V Screening for Hard of Hearing: This project is in colloboration with NAŞEOH & UNICEF and was started in August 1983 Under this project as a first phase 10,000 children between 0.10 years will be screened from Dharavi area. The group is divided into two sub-group consists of 5000 children 6-10 years from school, 1763 were found defective. 5 students were operated and 1404 had minor ailments. The various activities of the programme are:—

- 1) Audiometric check up of children
- 2) Treatment of ear problems
- 3) Rehabilitation of hard of hearing children
- 4) Training of workers and parents in care of ear.

VI Family Welfare Clinic: Every Friday 2-3 women undergo sterilisation Daily Vasectomy operations are carried out as well as distribution of Oral pills and insertion of loops. Population is educated regarding small family norm. Vasectomies are carried out on all working days and 21 vasectomies were carried out during 1987.

At this clinic the population is educated regarding small family norm daily.

#### Vil Special Training Schemes:

- a) Community health workers scheme. It is continued and regular training to a batch of women and refreshers training course is arranged for the group which is already trained.
- b) Training of traditional birth attendants (DAIS) Two batches were already trained under the programme. Another batch of women is under training.

- Training children—child to child programme: 150 children were given training on various aspects of health under this programme. One more batch under training.
- d): Training of Youth 15.

#### **Health Education Activities:**

- Routine Health talk on health promitional aspect is given in Dharayi and other community
- Health exhibition is regularly held at Dharavi, Urban Health Centre. The posters on various aspects of health are displayed.
- Health education films are shown to the slum dwellers regular.
- 471 Nutritional demonstrations are arranged at Urban Health Centre for mothers attending under five clinics.

- b) Xerophthalmia project at Bombay slums continued with the help of Operation Eye sight Universal (O. E. U.).

#### **Nutrition Rehabilitation Centre:**

The nutrition rehabilitation centre is run at the Urban Health Centre, Dharavi. About 70 malnurished colldren are fed nutritions type of food twise in a day, both in the morning and evening. Nutrition componentiations are carried out for the mothers of malnourished children at the centre as well as in slums.

#### | Balwadies :

There are 4 Balwadies run by the department of P. S. M., in the slums of Dharavi. In each Balwadi about 30 children are enrolled and given non-formal education, recreation & supplementary nutrition.

#### IV Training of the Workers:

- a. Community health workers scheme. It is continued and regular training to the new batch of women and refreshers training course is arranged for the group which is already trained.
- Training of traditional birth attendants (DAIS). One batch of 5 was already trained under the programme.
- Training of children child to child programme. 100 children were given training on various aspects of health under this programme.

#### **DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES:**

#### Health Supervision of School Children:

Cross road School and Transit Camp School Dharavi are included under school health programme. Medical Check up and Immunization are carried out in both the schools, supplementary feeding programme was extended to Four Standards and 3000 children received supplementary feeding. In addition Audiometric Check up Health Education talks by Interns, Detection for Rheumatic fever, child to child programme was carried out in Transit Camp group of schools as well as at Cross Road group of Schools. 

#### AUDIO VISCUAL SLIDS SHOW:

One audio-visual slide show produced by Dr. Gopa Kothari on vaccine preventable diseases in collaboration with Lion's Club of Sion. .

Nurses Training School: During the year 85 students nurses were admitted for training in the General Nursing and 35 students nurses for midwifery. 73 and 48 student were sent for general nursing part I and part II and midwifery examinations respectively. Out of whom 70 and 47 student nurses in part I & Il have passed respectively. Out of 35 student nurses of midwifery 34 have passed.

Ambulance Services: Round the clock ambulance service is maintained at this Hospital.

Poor Box Charity Fund: The amount in the poor Box Charity Fund as on 31st March 1987 stood at Rs. 4,90,010.06 collection from the Boxes donations and other miscellaneous receipts during year amounted to Rs. 15,19,052.19 and expenditure through the Poor Box Charity Fund was Rs. 11,27,043.49. The total amount in the Fund as on 31st March 1988 stood at Rs. 6,22,018.76.

Special Facilities for Municipal Employees: Separate counters have been kept reserved at the Registration Department. Dispensary and afternoon O.P.D. for the Municipal Staff. Fifty percent concession is granted in paying bed scheme.

The sale of drugs and Medicines for the benefit of patients have been started at this Hospital through L.T.M.M. College and Hospital consumers Co-operative Society from the year 1986.

A mobile dental van for rendering dental treatment to the dental patients introduced in the year 1982-83 continued its work during the year under report. The treatment was rendered in those areas of slums, hutment colonies etc. in Greater Bombay, where treatment facilities are not available to the citizens.

#### PATIENTS TREATED :

1,85,885 patients were treated in different departments of this Institution and the daily average was 574 patients. Total income and expenditure of this Institutions during the year under report was Rs. 8,93,403.64 and Rs. 83,31,843.75 respectively as against the income of Rs. 8,46,845.15 and expenditure Rs. 77,63,008.21 last year.

Library:

During the year 345 books were added to the collection. There are 8037 books in the Library. Currently, the Library Subscribes to 66 perodicals, titles in addition to the complimentary periodicals and some college magazines. The Library holds 269 dissertations. There are 1911 bound volumes of the Journal.

Super Practix X-ray Unit Siemens Heliodent-60, Simens Heliodent-70, Siemens status X-ray unit and Orthoceph-10 X-ray unit W. Germany make has been added to facilitate parioramic radiography.

Recently, Jelrus Porcelain Furnace with Vucast Induction Casting Machine with relevant accessories was added to produce porcelain with bonded matal restoration.

All the Clinical depts of the college have been renovated Additions & alterations have been carried out. All the old equipments have been painted & put into function. New equipments have been purchased by replacing old ones wherever necessary. Certain depts have been expended to meet the patients care. No. of beds in the indoor ward have been increased to 24 (male 13, Female 8 & recovery 3). During the year total 4094 Patients (2027 male + 1508 Female + 559 children 3 4094) were admitted to the ward for treatment during the year 1987-88.

- 3. To co-ordinate and manage the whole TB programme by associating all the agencies including the voluntary and private charitable organisations.

- 5. Reaserch work in the field and in hospital area.

#### Poor Box :

Collection out of the Poor Box Charity Fund of the Hospitals is utilised for the benefit of the poor and needy patients and the incidental expenses. Amount of Rs. 71,114.53 was collected for the Poor Box Charity Fund of the Hospital and Clinics during the year.

#### Teaching:

The Group of T. B. Hospitals and T. B. Clinics continued to recognised for Diploma Course in Tuberculosis & Chest Diseases by the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Bombay and for Degree Course in M. D. (Tuberculosis & Chest Diseases) by the University of Bombay, so also for D. P. H. (University of Bombay) and Homoeopathy students. Clinical instructions are imparted to under-graduate students of L.T. M. M. College, Sion and G. S. M. College, Parel.

#### City Tuberculosis Programme:

The Brihan Mumbal Mahanagarpalika have established the City Tuberculosis Programme (CTP) in the City on behalf of the State Government. The Central Government given free supply of Anti-TB drugs and MMR X-ray film rolls for this programme run by the Corporation. The Programme is jointly supervised by the Medical Superintendent, Group of TB Hospitals and the Assistant Health Officer (TB).

For active implementation of this programme the whole City of Bombay has been divided into 3 Zones (i) City, (ii) Western Suburbs and (iii) Eastern Suburbs. Thirty Centres (including 5 TB Clinics under M. S. G. T. B. and 5 of outside agencies) alongwith several others run by the Teaching Medical Institutions and Peripheral Hospitals which are working primarily as the diagnostic and the treatment centres in addition to 61 centres (Municipal General Dispensaries and Urban Health Centres of 3 Medical Colleges) have been entrusted with the drug distribution consisting of most modern and effective drugs like Rifampicin which are known to cure the disease within the course of 6-9 months' total treatment period. The work of all these centres is co-ordinated by M. S. G. T. B. with the assistance of Medical Officers of TB Clinic and Assistant Health Officer (TB) and the staff consisting of 4 TB Inspectors, 89 Treatment Organisers, 15 Health Visitors, and 1, B. C. G. Team Leader. This staff is engaged on the case findings, case holding and for the defaulter action.

Following are the Up-graded Dispensaries, Peripheral Centres (Treatment Centres) and BCG Vaccination Centres covered by each Area Tuberculosis Centres.

Every Area Tuberculosis Centre (A.TC) is staffed by a Medical Officer, Health Visiter and 2 to 3 TB Investigators (Treatment Organisers) and some members of the lower staff. Out of 27 Area Tuberculosis Centres, 9 have M.M.R. X-ray Machine/other X-ray Machines equipment and Pathology Department and the remaining are having X-ray and/or Screening Machines and the Laboratories. All the Peripheral Centre which are the Municipal General Dispensaries, serve as the Treatment Centres only. The Medical Record Department of the hospital and TB Clinic and Central Statistical Section for field services is located at the Group of TB Hospital, Sewri.

As provided under the National Tuberculosis Programme, the Central Control Agency is being formed under the Chairmanship of the Municipal Commissioner.

#### **BCG Vaccination Programme:**

BCG Vaccination is now the part and parcel of the EPI Programme and is looked after by A. H. O. (EPI) of Public Health Department of Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay.

#### Performance Budget :

The performance budget has been introduced from 1976-77. The details in respect of the target laid down and the target achieved are enclosed. The reasons for short falls and steps for maximising the output performance are also briefly stated in the table No. 1.

## SETH V. C. GANDHI & M. A. VORA, MUNICIPAL GENERAL HOSPITAL RAJAWADI GHATKOPAR, BOMBAY — 77.

#### **HISTORY:**

The land on which this hospital is situated originally belonged to Maharaja of Baroda and hence popularly known as Rajawadi. It was acquired by the then Local Municipal Bureau in the year 1950.

The begining of the health care started on the land in the year 1956 with a ground floor structure dispensary with the help of the donations from Gandhi & Vora families.

In the year 1957, the area was merged into the Bombay Municipal Corporation Limits, The S. V. Khimji Maternity Home of 20 beds of the then Local Municipalty was attached to the dispensary in the dispensary in the same year.

By then, the number of patients increased considerable which gave birth to a 50 beded general hospital in the year 1958. It had indoor treatment facilities with Operation theatre, X-Ray & Laboratory. It was named as "Seth V. C. Gandhi, & M. A. Vora Municipal General Hospital, Rajawadi Ghatkopar".

In the year 1960, the S. V. K. Maternity Home was merged into the hospital as a result of a lightening strike caused due to the issue of gifts received by Maternity Home's Staff.

In the year 1969 the bed strength rose to 160 with the introduction of Paediatric and Gynaec Wards. In the year 1972, specialities like E. N. T., Opthalmalogy, Orthopaedics, Pathology were introduced which rose the bedstrength to 200.

Nurse's and servant's quarters were shifted to Raoli Camp at they were indulging in certain unethical malpractices and servant's quarters were converted into R. M.O's quarters.

In 1973, Casualty Department was introduced along with mobile dispensary, ambulance, hearse and a Blood Bank.

It was in the year 1976 that the major expansion took place introducing a new 4 storeyed building with 6 new Operation theatres behind the old building.

Medical council of India recognised the houseposts in 1977.

In 1979, further upgradation earned recognition as a teaching institution by Bombay University. Under graduate students from Sion Hospital and Nair Hospital attended clinical training.

The units in Medical, Surgery, Gynaec & Obstetric were increased from 2 to 3 and in Opthalmic & Paediatric from 1 to 2. The beds of Surgery Department were incressed from 72 to 94. The total bed strength rose to 560.

I. C. C. U and M. I. C. U. of total 11 beds were introduced.

Central Ambulance Central System was introduced. Pathology was upgraded with 6 sections like Histopthology etc. and qualified Scientific Officers and Technicians were appointed.

Introduction of cold storage facility upgraded the Mortury block.

In addition, the following activities are also run.

Clinics for drug addicts.

Examination of food handlers.

Seminars for I. M. A. Doctors with case presentations. Hospital is also equipped with disaster plan to meet unforseen massive emergencies when the lecture hall is converted into special emergency ward.

Apart from this, 70 beds are reserved in Sarvodaya hospital for convalscent patients.

From 3rd February 1988, the Additional Corner's Court, Rajawadi has started functioning near the hospital.

LOCATION: This Hospital is located in the Ghatkopar suburb on the Eastern side of the Central Railway line.

It is on the Eastern side of the Eastern side of the Vidyavihar Railway Station at a distance of approximately 1/4 K. M. and about 1/2 K. M. away from the Ghatkopar Railway Station on it's North side.

It is located in between the Tansa Water mains which abouts the hospital on the west and Mahatma Gandhi Road, on the east at a distance of about 200 yds.

The Addl. Coroner's Court at Rajawadi is Icoated in campus of this hopsital.

#### DEPARTMENT OF MEDICINE :

The department of Medicine consists of 3 units, Each unit is looked by a Part Time Honorary Physician, Part Time Honorary Assistant Physician, Registrar, Houseman and A. M. Os. Each Unit conducts out patient Department and Emergency Services twice a week by rotation.

The Gastroenterology Department is looked after by Physician and a Surgeon jointly.

Diabetic O. P. D. is conducted every Friday when blood sugar estimation is onde on the spot on Ame's Cyetone (Detrometer). Patients are called by appointment for Post Parandial Blood Sugar and some random blood sugar samples are also examined. About ten patients blood is examined for blood sugar every O. P. D.

#### 3. DEPARTMENT OF PAEDIATRICS :

Minor

The department of Paediatrics consists of 2 units. Each units is looked after by a Part-time Honorary Paediatrician, Part-time Honorary Assistant Paediatrician, a Registrar and 2 Housemen. Each unit conducts their O. P. D. and Emergency services thrice a week (Appendix 3 and 4).

#### Establishment of Exchange Transfusion Centre.

The services rendered by Rajawadi Hospital are expanding at a greater speed. To keep up with the demand and need of Paediatric Services the time has come to set up an organised services in the form of Exchange Transfusion Centre.

It is noted that Rajawadi Hospital not only caters the other municipal hospital, mainly on North East side of Bombay as well as interiors of Maharashtra. With our experience improved care of mothers and babies, risk patinets and their management demands facilities to treat complicated cases.

Exchange Transfusion procedure is a LIFE SAVING PROCEDURE. This is being carried out till today in very much strained situation and cannot meet demand rate of exchange transfusion.

The main critical investigation for such cases is SERUM BILIRUBIN. It is to be assed immediately. At present our Institute has an equipment SAEC PHOTOANALYSER, but this services are only available during working hours 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. which is handling the load of the entire biochemical demand and cannot take up any further load of work.

Another equipment SEAC-100 PHOTOANALYSER if installed in our special care baby unit and the medical staff could be easily trained to handle this equipment. The advantages by such proposal are :--

- 1. Better and efficient services for such sick babies.
- 2. Hospital can render exchange transfusion services without any strain and load on present existing system.

- 3. EBUIDMERT IS Surely long last and minimum maintenance.
- 4: Personnel can be trained to operate the equipment.

- 5: Equipment can be adjusted to any nature of biochemical investigation by MICROMETHOD an absolute necessary for paediatric department:

#### 4. DEPARTMENT OF GYNAEC AND OBSTETRIC:

This department consist of 3 units. Each unit is looked after by a Part-time Honorary Obstetrician & Gynaecologist and Part-time Honorary Assistant Obstetrician & Gynaecologist, Registrar, Houseman & A. M. O. Each unit conduct their O. P. D. & Emergency Services twice a week.

A wide variety of Obstetrics cases were seen and treated competently. These included cases transferred from maternity homes at Barve Nagar, Vikroli, Bhandup and Deonar, The cases transferred required specialised obstetric care unit and were either referred from both diagnosis and treatment.

O. P. D. service Antinatal & Postnatal Services were made available to a large section of the public and the attenuance at Gynaec O. P. D. is in large no. (Appendix 3 & 4).

Each Antinatal Patients blood analysis, regular weight. Urine examination besides general and abdominal examination are done.

These clinics are exteremely beneficial in the detection and treatment of obstetricil malaise in the from of anemia, cardiac ddisease, diabetic, hypertension etc.

The interns posted attend O. P. Ds. perform minor O. P. D. pocedures under supervision, learn basic antinatal care, attended Operation theatre, performed tubal sterlizations under supervision and attednemergency duties also.

The residents have been trained to deal efficiently with almost any emergency and have learnt to independently perform several major operations compentently.

#### 5. DEPARTMENT OF ORTHOPAEDICS

This department conists of only one unit. This unit is looked after by a Part-time Honorary Orthopaedic Surgeon, 2 part-time Honorary Assistant Orthopaedic Surgeons, 2 Registrar, 2 Houseman and A. M. O. This department conducts O. P. D. and emergency thrice a week.

Academic activities in the Orthopaedic Department :

1. Image Intensifier with 'C' arm and Television Monitors was installed in Orthopaedic Operation Theatre in March 1986.

This has to a great extent eased out surgeries around the hip especially where a number of x-rays were required intra-operatively, thereby decreasing the time of surgery required.

2. In January 1987 on 9th and 17th, Internal fixation course was held where 9—10 cases were demonstrated by Dr. S. D. Mehta, Head and Honorary Orthopaedic Surgeon, Dr. M. G. Yagnik, Dr. A. A. Rao, Honorary Asstt. Orthopaedic Surgeons held by Bombay Orthopaedic Society.

This was highly appreciated by all the delegates as a wide variety of surgery was shown to them.

- 3. In February 15th 1987 a Clinical Meeting of Bombay Orthopaedic Society was held where cases were presented by Hon. and Asstt. Hon. followed by discussion with eminent Orthopaedic Surgeons.
- 4. Spine Conference with demonstration of Spinal Surgery cases were held on 18-9-1987 where 5 spinal cases were demonstrated by the Honorary and Assistant Honorary. This was followed by a brief discussion on other spinal problems encountered in Orthopaedic practice.
- 5. Demonstration Surgery was arranged for the E. Merch Travelling fellows on 11th November 1987. A case of spine treated with Harrington Instrumentation with sublaminar wiring was shown by Dr. A. A. Rao, Asstt. Hon, also a clinical meeting on interesting cases was held after the Demonstration Surgery.
- 6. Demonstration Surgery of some interesting simple problems in Orthopaedics were shown to Travelling fellows from Tamil Nadu Orthopaedic Association on 8th January 1988. This was followed up by discussion of interesting cases.
- 7. Internal fixation coursse: Demonstration Surgery was held on 11th January 1988 where Hon. and Asstt. Honoraries demonstrated 11 major orthopaedic fracture surgery. This was followed by discussion on the cases and followed by lunch held by Bombay Orthopaedic Society.
- 8. M. S. (Orthopaedic) Practical Examinations were held with Dr. S. D. Mehta as one of the local examiners on 27th and 28th January. Each day 8 candidates were examined. Arrangements made for the examination were appreciated by both the local and external examiners. This was held by the Bombay University.
- 9. A O. Sets (Locally manufactured by Shushrut Surgicals) were acquired by the Orthopaedic Department in July 1987.

Theey include — Basic Instrument set
— Basic small and mini fragment set
— Basic condylar plate set
— Plate set
— Screw set

This has made all types of trauma to be treated in a better method and earlier mobilization of the patient.

- 10. Hospital has a diagnostic arthoscope for the last 8—9 years which will now require updating i.e. operative instruments with its own arthroscope.
- 11. Facilities to do Dynamic Compression Screw fixation for Transcemical fracture neck femur cases is available with both implants and instruments provided by the hospital.
- 12. A new theatre set up has been established within the present Orthopaedic Operation Theatre which is for Replacements mainly Total Hip Replacement. Instruments and Implants are being organised and in near future Rajawadi Hospital will become the only Peripheral Hospital in Bombay Municipal *Corporation to have a separate Replacement Orthopaedic Theatre complex. A new Hydraulic Operation Talbe, two shadowless lamps through donations from a private party have already been acquired.

b) Social cases work: The social worker attends Psychiatry O. P. D. from Monday to Saturday from 9.00 A. M. to 12.00 Noon.

The duties performed by her are as follows :-

- (i) Collecting family history and main compaints of all the new cases. Total number of cases this year is 1097 (About 2194 hours in Psychiatry O. P. D.).
  - (ii) Psychiatric case work and counselling.

The patients who are in need of Psychiatric case work are referred to Medico Social Worker. This year 107 patients are referred fort case work and counselling. Each case is interviewed on an average 5 to 10 times each interview lasts for about half an hour to one hour. Total number of sessions this year is about 965. (About 726 hours spent on case work and counselling).

- (c) The cases in need of psychiological testing like I. Q. Rozschach, Ink-block test, M. M. P. I. were referred to other hospital as clinical Psychologist is not a staff member.

#### SECTION II

Socio-economic condition and medical aid to the needy patients.

Fixing the quota of the Medical aid which is decided after scrutinisation according to socio-economic condition of the patient. 1500 patients are given medical aid yearly.

Financial subsidy or concession to the patient is made upon socio-economic conditions of the patient and charges are waived after thorough scrutinisation and counselling.

#### Group activities among N. S. S. Students/General Public/Staff:

To channelise the potential energy and to tape out the talent to the service of the society and community.

Students group consists of 60 N. S. S. from Jhunjhunwala College Ghatkopar, 60 N. S. S. students from Somaiya College, Ghatkopar and 30 students from Somaiya Science College.

- A. Orientation Programme: To teach and give them specific knowledge to know skills and techniques to realise pain and pleasure of all the types of the patients.
- B. Ward Patients Library: Old magazines, papers, story books are circulated daily to the patients by these students. It gives recreation to the patients.
- C. Counselling and sharing the patients problem: Practical exposure is given through direct communication with patient to create a sense of belonging in patients as well as joy of sharing in students.
- D. Sarvodaya Hospital activities: N. S. S. students and other volunteers have successfully celebrated diwali with the patient by decorating the ward and distributing sweets.

#### PROJECT WORK

1. Small project is taken up through our social service department for general awakening for leprosy.

Leprosy exhibition and slide show was organised through Ackworth Leprosy Hospital on 9th, 10th, and 11th September. There was good response from patients, relatives and general public.

- 2. Sports—Games—Prize destribution: Entertainment programme and snaks for the patients was arranged on 11th December 1987 with the help of N. S. S. students of Jhunjhunwala College. On this occassion Honorable M. L. A. Shri Virendra Pal Bakshi had donated Rs. 1000/—towards this programme.
- 3. Analytical reporting: It is done through patients interview counselling—case studies through indoor—outdoor patients with analytical study in the question or manner and interview. Round about 80 cases were prepared and presented to Medical Superintendent for information.

#### LIBRARY

#### Highlights (Comparison between 1986-87)

No of inpatients has increased from 27,921 to 28,697. Daily average inpatients has increased from 502 to 459. Total Indoor attendance has increased from 1,83,212 to 1,67,570. The O. P. D. attendance (New) including Casualty has increased from 1,45,197 to 1,58,228. The daily O. P. D. Average of new patients has increased from 472 to 522. The No of operations has increased from 14,664 to 15,626. Total expenditure has increased from 2,50,23,861 to 2,93,05,295.

#### Certain good things recently done in Rajawadi Hospital:

- 1. The Medical superintendent of the hospital visits the I. C. C. Unit twice a week and moves from bed to bed to enquire of the patients admitted therein.
- 2. The Assistant Medical Officers of the hospital on duty are assigned to visit wards during the visiting hours between 4.30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. to enbsure dialogue between the administration and the ailing patients and his relatives. Patience hearing is given to their complaints and/or suggestions if needed, corrective steps are taken to give them a relief/satisfaction which helps to bridge the communication gap.
- 3. Colour boards at the entrace of the Administrative Bldg, are exhibited indicating the names, replacement and the location of the M. O. and the A. M. O. on duty. The plates painted in red colour indicates the Medical Staff on routine duty whereas a white colour indicates the staff on Emergency duty. This effects easy locations, facilitates the relatives of the patients to locate, talk and touch the Medical Staff to ventilate their grievances or feelings.
- 4. The Medico social worker attached to the ante Natal Clinic during the session utilizes the waiting timing of patients to educate the expectant mothers to stitch baby frocks, shorts for use for their own newly born babies by supplying condemned linen from the hospital.
- 5. Boards indicating Telephone Nos. of Police, Ambulance, Fire Brigade services and other hospitals as also the fees charged at the hospital have been displayed at various points clearly.
- 6. The Left and Right foot impression of the newly born baby and the left thumb impression of the mother is taken immediately in the Labour Ward on a plain paper and attached with Indoor case paper to avoid exhange of babies.
  - 7. Following rules have been framed for supply of blood to the needy patients at the hospital:
  - i) Free blood supply is given to the Donor.
- ii) Rs. 30/— are charged as service charges for supply of blood on production of the close relatives 'Donor Card'.
  - iii) Rs. 80/— are levied as service charges when the blood is supplied on replacement basis.
  - iv) Rs. 200/— are charged in all other cases.
- 8. Use of colour indicators Different colours are applied for different specialities of Medical Branches on the front portion at the entrace of the Ward which facilitates patients relative to identify the wards easily.
- The name board of the members of the Public Health Committee is also exhibited in the Hospital which is helpful to the persons in case of need and help from the members.

#### DEFICIENCIES AND SHORTCOMINGS.

Out—patient departments: Existing O. P. Ds. are not well ventilated and becomes very hot and stuffy in summer due to asbestos roof and leak heavily during monsoons.

There is proposal to shift the 'N' Ward Stores which is at present in the compound of Rajawadi Hospital to other premises so that area which is ear-marked for O. P. D. building can be used for the same. The expansion plan of Rajawadi Hospital, especially its O. P. D. is closely linked to the shifting of the 'N' Ward stores.

The R. M. Os. quarters are at present housed in the quarters which were occupied by the Labour Staff. The Guiniting work of the quarters is progress.

The need for the new R. M. Os. quarters is very urgent. The house officers which are required to be appointed to fulfill the M. C. I. S. requirement for completion of staff pattern of one unit cannot be met due to the lack of accomodation for the R. M. Os.

#### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENT**

- 1. A trauma Unit having 6 beds is being set up next to the Casualty. Proposal for staff, furniture and equipment is being finalised. This trauma unit will be manned by Doctors round the clock.
- 2. A proposal for starting a Paychiatric Ward is approved next to the I. C. C. Unit. Proposal for staff, furniture and equipment is being finalised.
- 3. Setting up an Eye Bank is administratively approved and necessary detail proposals for procurement of staff, furniture, material is in process.
  - 4. Starting a Paediatric Intensive Care Unit and a Premature Baby Care Unit is in process.
  - 5. A proposal to establish a Cancer detection centre at this hospital is under process.
- 6. The Government of Maharashtra has sanctioned a post-partum centre at this hospital from the year February 1988 vide No. GR No. FFB/4686/195/CR-18/FW—II of 25-1-1988.

#### MEDICAL RECORD DEPARTMENT

#### In-patient Division:

The number' of schedule bedstrength during the year was 520. During the year 1987 the average no. of in-patient in the hospital was 523 against 521 and 516 during the year 1986 and 1985 respectively. The total no. of patients admitted for hospitalization during the year under report was 30021 as against 30481 as against 29995 respectively for 1986 and 1985. The average stay of in-patients was 7 days during the year under report.

#### Results of treatment of Indoor patients;

Out of total no. of 30512 including 491 brought over from the previous year 25028 were considered as cured, 960 left the hospital against medical advice or were otherwise discharged and 2033 died (excluding 187 still Birth and 19 Neonatal deaths. 12 Maternal Deaths, 5 Casualty Deaths.) At the end of the year 441 patients were in the hospital under treatment.

#### **DEATH CLASSIFIED:**

Out of 2038 deaths 642 died within 24 hours of admission, 463 after 24 hours and within 72 hours is of admission, 744 deaths took place after three days from the date of admission. 184 premature infants deaths, 5 died at casualty. The figures are exclusive of 187 Still Births and 19 Neonate, 12 Maternal death. Death rate was 6.1 against 5.7 during the last year.

Total number of autopsies performed during the year under report was 701 against 766 and 531 for the year 1986 as against 5.4 and 5.4 for the year 1986 and 1985. All these autopsies were performed by the Additional Coroner's Surgeon.

#### Confinements:

During the year under report the total number of confinements were 3005 and abortions 880.

#### Operations:

6852 operations were performed on In-patients and 26114 operations were performed on Outpatients.

#### Out-patients Department + Out-patient Particulars ;

The total no. of new case papers issued during the year under report was 1,85,026 against 1,61,541 in the year 1986 and 1,56,132 in the year 1985. The total no. of out-patient attendance (New & Old) including casualty cases was 5,68,023 bringing the average total attendance 1775 per day.

#### Expenditure out of Poor Box Charity Fund:

Besides the expenditure incurred from Muhicipal Funds sum of Rs. 5,38,212 was spent out of Poor Box Charity Fund in the year of 1987—88 as against Rs. 6,67,746 in the previous year. The amount was mostly spent on X-Ray Plates, C. T. Scan, costly drugs, Blood Transfusion, and Blood Products for needy patients. #### SHORT NOTE :--

The late Shri Harilal Bhagawati donated a piece of land to the Municipal Corporation in the year 1962 for construction of the hospital so as to provide Medical relief facilities to the people staying in the Northern end of the city. Foundation stone was taid by Shri Marotrao Kannamwar the late chief Minister of Maharashtra on 1st September 1965 and the hospital was inguarated by Shri Morarji Desai, the then Deputy Prime Minister of India on 4th February 1968. Originally the hospital started with 50 beds with only two wards, one for females and another for males. There was a unit of two operation Theatres and

laboratory for routine pathological examinations. In the year 1971 paediatrics ward with 30 beds was added and the bed strength of the existing wards was increased by 10 each making the total bed strength to 100. In the year 1975 expansion activities started at the hospital and all specialised departments such as Gyanec, and Obsteries, E. N. T. Ortho. Ophthalmic and Skin and V. D. Radiology Patiology Anti Rabic-Immunization Audiology and speech Therapy, Poor Box charity fund, Dispensary, Family planning centre special facilities to Municipal Employees Laboratory, Internship for post Graduate, etc., were gradualy raising the total bed strength to 300. The No. of operation Theatres was also increased to 7. We have now 2 of operations Theatres. Two suits have been air-conditioned.

The Blood Bank at the hospital was put in to commission in August 1977. It is working round the clock on receipt of donation form the Lions Club of Borivli (W).

It has been named after Shri Keshavial Jethuchand Bhonsali lion Blood Bank on 24th June 1979.

The hospital had no casualty Department and cases of accidents etc., were therefore, directed to Dr. R. N. Cooper Hospital the casualty Department at the hospital was put into commission from 25th May 1978.

Part time Dental Clinics started at this hospital from March 1978 School Clinics started from 3rd March 1980 Psychiatrics department from 8th September 1980.

#### **B — WATER POLLUTION CONTROL:**

A No. of industries are discharging their industrial effluent into municipal drains and sewe nallas, etc., without treatment causing nuisance. Action against such — industries is inevitable

Accordingly, scrutiny of such industries has been started and requisite information is called to assess the quantity and quality of effluent. Consent of M. P. C. Board is also insisted upon.

The industries are directed to submit proposals for arrangement for effluent treatment a disposal with reference to the consent characteristics. Such proposals are scrutinised and industries are directed to provide — Effluent Treatment Plants (ETP) wherever necessary.

The industries' proposals for renewal of permit/licence, additional power, additional we quota, etc., are considered on grounds of steps proposed to be taken by them for effluent treatment.

If the industry fails to comply with requirements in respect of effluent treatment and disposuitable action is recommended to respective Ward Officers. With the effective pursuation mindustries are coming forward to execute scheme for treatment and disposal of effluent.

Summarising Abatement of pollution as well as pollution prevention measures are ensured advising Ward Offices to ensure implementation of pollution prevention measures by the concerting that industries or the establishment or requesting Ward Offices to ensure effective action against enfolded industries under the provisions of B.M.C. Act.

#### SPECIAL PROJECTS

1. Remodelling of Dhobi Ghat at Mahalaxmi:

There has not been any progress in respect of this project during the year as Çourt Case is not yet decided

#### 2. Rehabilitation of potters at Dharavi, Kumbharwada:

The project involves socio-econimic problems and due to paucity of funds with the potters, the scheme for development of the area could not progress during the year.

#### 3. Task Force on Quarrying Operation in the City:

Number of meeting were held of the members of the "Task Force" appointed for Geological Survey and prospecting a B.M.R. for locating construction materials and identifying future area for quarrying in B.M.R. under the chairmanship of Secretary, Revenue 80 Forest Department. The report prepared by the committe has already been submitted to the Minister Revenue Department on 15th January 1988 by the Chairman of the Committee.

However, under this report the recommendations are for a short duration of two years and hence the B.M.R.D.A. has proposed to undertake the detailed survey for locating and indentifying the future area where quarrying can be done.

One Assitstat Engineer form Dy. C.E.(C)E.S.P.Department will work as Liason Officer for the work to be undertaken by B.M.R.D.A.

#### 2. EMISSION INVENTORY GROUP

i) The work of compilation of a comprehensive emission inventory of all polluting sources is in progress.

Amongest the various available methods, the methods of "collecting data by sending questionnaries" was adopted. Industrial sector was given priority.

Based on the data collected, the industries have been categorised into different slabs according to their connected power load. Master data sheets incorporating general information of a factory were sent to factories having connected load over 200 H.P. Process data questionnaire asking further details like fuel consumption, production details, raw materials used and nature and extent of emissions, were also posted to these industries. Based on the information collected, further wardwise and activitywise tabulations have been prepared. The factories have been classified into 29 groups according to their activities for standardisation.

A Laboratory has been set-up for analysis of emission samples collected with the help of stack sampling equipment.

Total 21 stacks have been monitored, in which the industries covered are viz., Parle Beverage Ltd., Vile-Parle, Carona Sahu Shoe Co., Jogeshwari, Britania Industries Ltd., Mazgaon, Chandanwadi Electric Crematerium; Polychem Ltd., Goregaon; Bhor Industries Ltd., Prabhadevi, Morarjee Mills No. 2, Lower Parel, Roche Products Ltd., Tardeo, Kwality Frozen Foods Ltd., Worli, Western Ministill Ltd., Mulund, All the Ward Officers were informed to get the stack — monitoring facilities prepared from the industries.

#### ii) Auto Exhaust Pollution:

Auto Exhaust Analyser of "Horiba" make, Japan, has been purchased to measure auto exhaust emisssions of CQ and HC; for petrol driven vehicles and Hartridge Smoke Meter to measure the smoke density of auto exhaust emissions from diesel driven vehicles.

This Group has also been authorised to check municipal vehicles and vehicles belonging to municipal officers for pollution control and issue certificates about pollution under control. A fee of Rs. 12/- per vehicle per test is charged in respect of vehicles of municipal officers whereas municipal vehicles are tested free of charge. Total 85 vehicles have been tested.

#### iii) Noise Pollution:

Noise levels were measured fifteen times to investigate into various complaints due to noise nuisance.

#### iv) I. S. I. Matters

I. S. I. meetings of Committees relating to air quality have been attended from time to time. Suggestions to amend the existing standards and formulation of new standards were also submitted for consideration of the I. S. I.

#### 3. AIR QUALITY MONITORING & RESEARCH LABORATORY:

The Air Quality Monitoring and Research Laboratory at Khar has receptor oriented 22 air monitoring stations in different parts of the city. The air samples collected at these stations are analysed at the Laboratory for Gaseous pollutants like SO², NO², NH³ and SPM. SPM is further analysed for Carcinogens, Heavy Metals, Sulphates, Nitrates etc., Metrological studies are also carried out and ambient air quality is studied with respect to prevailing Metrological conditions (details in Annexure-I). The analysis of samples is carried out with highly precision Scientific Methods like Gas Chromatography, Calorimetry, Fluorometry, Atomic Absorption etc.

The Laboratory also carried out spot monitorings in case of accidental leakages of gases of complaints of severe air pollution to locate the source and extent of air pollution (details of annexure-II). Air Quality Monitoring at traffic junctions is carried out to assess the impact of auto exhaust pollution (details in Annexure - III).

- 4. Civil Defence & Vigilance over Mech/Elect. works.
- A Civil Defence
- (i) Training to Volunteers

The activity of imparting training to the Municipal Employees in Civil Defence Courses in liaison with the Director of Civil Defence of the State Government has been continued and during the year under report '47' employees under went training.

- (ii) Revision of Plans.
- (a) Operational and Survival plans for the emergency services for Civil Defence are being revised for the period ending 31-3-1988. The matter is being followed up with the concerned Departments.

#### B - Vigilance over Mech/Elect. Works.

Technical audit in respect of 80 cases was carried out.

In all 150 electrical, mechanical and refrigeration works were inspected. The Rebate of Rs. 15,175/-and penalty of Rs. 6,500/- was recovered.

#### C. Installation & Maintenance of Telephones in Municipal Head Office.

Routine maintenance and repairs to PABX 60 + 600 exchanges at Municipal Head Office is got done through Mahanagar Telephone Nigam Ltd. shifting of telephone extension at Municipal Head Office is followed up with Mahanagar Telephone Nigam Ltd.

. The works of maintenance is classified under the major head :— (1) Normal Repairs (2) Special repairs and (3) New works.

Monsoon repairs are also included in Normal repairs. Special repairs cover the works which are likely to increase the life of buildings and structures. New works cover the works of additions and alterations to the buildings as also those of providing additional amenities.

This year the repairs and maintenance works of the Municipal properties were carried out either departmentally or through petty works contractors.

The total expenditure incurred on the maintenance of Municipal properties was Rs. 864.34 lakhs (City Rs. 482.59 lakhs and Suburbs Rs. 381.75 lakhs). Out of this, amount of Rs. 250.57 lakhs was spent on normal maintenance. And amount of Rs. 513.80 lakhs was spent on New and Special Repairs Works costing Rs. 835.02 lakhs (City: Rs. 402.85 lakhs and Suburbs: Rs. 432.17 lakhs) were executed through the petty works - contractors. Total Nos. of works carried out through the petty works contractors was 2,067 and Total No. of works carried out departmentally was 17,223 and the expenditure incurred was Rs. 190.88 lakhs and Rs. 832.02 lakhs on departmental and P. W. C. works respectively.

The Roads & Storm Water Drains Department is a major department of Civic administration, providing amenities and facilities to the citizens of Grater Bombay. Originally Chief Engineer (Roads & Storm Water Drains) was heading departments with various branches under him viz., for construction and maintenance of roads and Storm Water Drains which is manned by three Dy. Chief Engineers viz., one for city, one for Eastern Suburbs & one for Western Suburbs. In addition to above there was Dy. Chief Engineer (Roads-Traffic) looking after the work of traffic & Co-ordination with Government Agency viz., Additional Commissioner of Police (Traffic). There was one more post of Dy. Ch. E. (Roads-Project) who is looking after the work of construction of subways and fly overs.

Due to enormous increase in the work load and the possibility of undertaking Bombay Urban Transport Project II in collaboration with Government of Maharashtra, the post of Dy. C. E. (Roads-Project) has been transferred under City Engineer's jurisdiction.

The work of Traffic & Co-ordination with traffic Police Department and Government of Maharashtra being independent one & looked after by Dy. Ch. Engr. Rds. (Traffic) the same is transferred under Addl. Municipal Commissioner Shri Venkat Chary and the Municipal Commissioner Shri G. S. Tinaikar.

However, the department of Roads & Storm Water Drains headed by Chief Engineer is required to take up additional following projects in addition to the normal load of construction of roads and storm water Drains and nallah training programme.

- 1. Prime Minister Grants Project for improving Dharavi and for additional resettlement at Mulund.
- 2. Construction of roads and Storm Water Drains under Bombay Urban Development Project (BUDP-I) which is at present in progress at (i) Charkop (ii) Gorai-Borivali (iii) Varsova.
- BRIM-STOWAD Brihanmumbai Mahanagarpalika Storm Water Drains Project in Planning stage.
- 4. Concreting of junctions & roads Due to heavy rain fall of 104" during last monsoon as compared with normal rainfall of 80" most of the arterial roads in the City and Suburbs were caroded. Municipal Commissioner has decided to undertake the concreting of such portions. Detailed functioning of Asphalf Plant of worll and (ii) Traffic & Co-ordination dept is attaced Detailed activities of the Maintenance Department of Roads & S. W. ## PLANNING OF STORM WATER DRAINS & NALLAS

For the year 1987-88, the report is as follows :--,

Due to unprecedented floods which occured in the monsoon of 1985, considerable demage was caused to the life and property. Moreover, public transport services were highly dislocated. In order to abate this nuisance in future, large scale construction of storm water drains nallas training works were taken up in hand with the help of financial aid from the Central Government Some of these nallas, where training has now been nearly completed, are as below:—

- 1. Love Grove Nalla
- 2. Nehru Science Centre nalla
- 3. J. K. Chemical nalla
- 4. Joglekar & Naik Nagar Nalla
- 5. Dadar Dharavi nalla

The work of training of Antop Hill nalla has been just taken up and will be completed before the onset of 1989 monsoon.

Plans and estimates for construction of additional storm water drains are in progress.

# P.M.G.P. WORKS:

There are certain works proposed to the carried out in Dharavi area, under Prime Minister's Grant Project. The Project has already commenced. The Director (P.M.G.P.) had originally assured us a Grant-in-Aid of Rs. 27.00 Crores which was later reduced to Rs. 18.00 Crores and the same is likely to be reviewed. The following works are to be carried out under the project.

- 1. Providing and laying storm water drains.
- 2. Construction of road works.
- 3. Sewrage Project works.
- 4. Desilting of nalla works.
- 5. Provision of water supply mains.

The department of Roads & SWD is co-ordinator for this project and executing agency for Item No. 1 and 2 above.

The following works of providing and laying storm water drains are in progress.

- (a) Providing and laying storm water precest box drain along Dharavi Sion Road, Part-I.
- (b) Providing and laying storm water percast box drain along Dharavi Sion Road, Part-II.
- (c) Providing and laying precast and cast-in-site box drain along Jasmine Mill Road.
- (d) Providing and laying precast storm water precast drain along Andhera Vally Road, Dharavi.

Providing and laying storm water drains (pipe drain) along part of i) Dharavi Main Road, ii) 90' Boad, iii) Dharavi Sion link road, iv) Andhra Vally Road.

The following are likely to be taken in hand shortly.

- (a) Providing and laying S. W. Box drain in Part of Dharavi Sion Link Road and constructing out fall of 'A', 'B' & 'C'.
- (b) Providing and laying S.W. Box drain along part of 60' Road, Dharavi from Etrella Battery junction upto Dharavi Sion Link Road.

Out of above mentioned Rs. 18.00 Crores, the Corporation has received an amount of Rs. 2.51 Crores.

# B. U. D. P. PROJECT

The Government of Maharashtra through the Maharashtra Housing and Area Development Authority (MHADA) have undertaken a number of scheme for housing the low income groups and aconomically weaker sections. The sites are generally undeveloped and it is necessary to provide infrastructure such as laying water mains sewers, constructing nallas, S. W. Drains, roads and street light for the lay out. Accordingly, the Maharashtra Housing & Area Development Authority (MHADA) have proposed for development of sites and service scheme at Gorai, Versova and Charkop.

The Standing Committee and the Corporation have accorded their approval vide Standing Committee Resolution No. 1363, dated the 24th March 1983 and the Corporation Resolution No. 582, dated the 3rd October 1983 to provide the infrastructure viz., Road and Storm Water Drains etc., in the project with the loan assistance from the World Bank. The Corporation vide Resolution No. 90, dated the 25th July 1985 have accorded approval to enter into a subsidiary Loan Agreement with the Government of Maharashtra in this respect.

Accordingly during this Administrative report the following works were completed.

1. Construction and training of nalla at Charkop, Kandivali (West).

2. Construction of D. P. roads and S. W. Drains at Charkop

3. Construction and training of nalla at Corai site.

Plans and estimates for the following works were done for invitation of tenders:

1. Training and construction of nalla at Versova site Part I A and I B

2. Works

The tenders were also invited for the above mentioned four works.

Short note on Bombay Storm Water Drainage Master Plan viz., Brihanmumbai Storm Water Drainage Project i.e., (BRIM — STOWAD)

Underground Storm Water Drainage arrangement provided in the Island of Bombay for the City area is about 100 years old and its structure is getting weaker and is also found inadequate in size. The system needs strengthening as well as augmentation by laying additional lines. The low level areas are subjected to periodic flooding during heavy rains synchronizing with high tides. The suburban areas are having natural open storm water drainage system discharging into creek or Arabian Sea. Thus the storm drainage system in City as well as in Suburban areas needs considerable improvement particularly in the island of Bombay to minimise the flooding areas and thereby reducing the hardships of the citizens.

In order to review the existing storm drainage system and to develop alternative strategies as well as to redress the system defeciency, it is necessary to appoint the consultents to undertake this assignment and thereafter implement master plan prepared by the consultants according to the Municipal requirements.

The project cost for this storm water drainage plan is estimated to be around Rs. 200 crores. Since funding of such a large amount is beyond the available resources of Bombay Municipal Corporation, the problem was discussed with the World Bank Team during their visit to Bombay regarding other W.S.S.D. Project which are aided by the World Bank.

During discussion, it was indicated by World Bank representative that the World Bank would be inclined to finance the project if the feasibility report was put up for consideration to the World Bank. For the present, World Bank agreed that the cost of feasibility study will be funded from the on going B. U. D. P. Project under No. 1544/N aided by World Bank.

On getting this assurance, B. M. C. has invited applications from the consulting firms on International competitive bidding procedure of World Bank for the purpose of short-listing the consultants for prequalifications. The response to this invitation was from 17 consulting firms including international consulting firms. From the applications received, 6 consulting firms were short-listed for pre-qualification, in consultation with the World Bank representative. The Terms of References to be given to these short-listed firms for invitind their bids for consultancy projects is now ready and the bids are being invited shortly. On receipt of these bids, one consulting firm will be selected in accordance with the World Bank procedure and in consultation with World Bank. The selected consultancy firms will be entrusted with the job of preparing master plan for Bombay Storm Water Drainage Project.

The consultancy firms is expected to submit their report in about 18 months after entrusting the work of consultancy to them.

## III- F Asphalt Plant.

The work of asphalting some roads in Corporation area were carried out departmentally during the year and 82,123 sq. mts. area of roads were asphalted with Chip coat produced at the Asphalt plant Worli. Besides asphalt plant has supplied 4547.27 M.T. OF cold mix to the wards for repairing potholes on minor roads and an footpaths. Total cost of production of premix for wards, refurfacing of roads and repairing potholes s Rs. 64,12,843.71.

## (I) Asphalt Plant

- (a) The Municipal hot mix Asphalt Plant at Worli was in operation throughout the year. During the year Main Plant was in operation for six month and Pegson plant was in operation for remaining six months. Actual working days were 291 days and remained closed for 74 days on account of rainy season, Sundays, Holidays and break downs of plant. The labourers for running the Asphalt plant were engaged departmentally.
- (b) Total area of 82123 sq. mts. of Asphalt roads were repaired with Bitumen, Surface, Chip Coat etc., & earned Rs. 44.68.352.15.
  - (c) 4547.27 M. T. of cold mix were supplied to wards and earned Rs. 19,44,491.56. The total turn out by the Main and Pagson Plant were 5541.98 M.T. & 5704.32 M.T. respectively.

- VI. During the year 1987-88 the programme for change over of HPMV lamps to MPSV on main corridors is continued.

It is proposed to replace all existing Marcury Vapour Lamps by Sodium Vapour Lamps on all major arterial roads phasewise and to provide semi-highmast lamps with Sodium Vapour at some major junctions.

Since B. E. S. T. Undertaking have limited capacity to carry out this work, the possibility of improving street lighting along Central Corridor from Sion to V. T. on mass scale through a private agency is being explored. Accordingly one trial installation of 8 poles is erected by M/s. Philips India @ total cost of Rs. 1.84 lakh on Dr. Babasaheb Ambadkar Marg at Chitra Cinema.

Temporary lighting arrangement was made during Ganapati Festival at Girgaon Chowpatty, Cuffe Parade, Mazgaon, Colaba, Banganga, Worli Prabhadevi, Dadar Shivaji Park, Mahim Beaches for the safety of general public visiting immersion caremony.

The lighting arrangement was also provided during Navaratra Festival at Mahalaxmi Temple and Mahim Fair at Mahim and on new year even and on 26th January at Gateway of India.

All these lighting arrangements were made at the cost of Municipal Corporation to help the Police to maintian results and for the public security.

VII. The B. P. T. is maintaining and lighting roads in B. P. T. area, which are used by general public also, B. P. T., is paid a rebate per annum for maintenance, cleaning and lighting B. P. T. roads in Docks and Bunders and in Cotton Depots as per C. R. No. 2598 of 30-3-1982.

## **REMOVAL OF VEHICLES:**

Vehicles found abovinded or undergoing repairs on public roads or footpaths, causing obstruction to the traffic and pedestrians are removed to Municipal Custody under section 314 of the B. M. C. Act. During the year under report, total number of 1610 vehicles were removed to Municipal Custoday out of which 1210 vehicles were retrieved by the parties on payment of towing and demurrage charges. The unclaimed vehicles which are lying in various Municipal any recovery due to auction Yards are auctioned to recover Municipal dues on this account:

#### **MICRO COMPUTER:**

The use of Micro Computer has given an added adventage in obtaining precise and accurate solutions to the otherwise lengthy and time consuming traffic engineering problems and benefits. Cost analysis work which include speed delay, survey data, signal timing plan, preparing graphics and preserving statistics.

# TRAFFIC AMENITIES :

The work of construction traffic islands channelisers, central dividers, parabolic dividers etc., was carried out on certain roads and intersections in order to ensure safety of both pedestrians as well as vehicular traffic. The total cost of such work amounted to Rs. 9,72,515/-

The names of roads on which regular lines were prescribed are shown in Appendix I & III.

Road markings such as strips, pedestrian crossings and road dividers and kerbs were painted on all important roads in the City and Suburbs.

Traffic Informatory sign boards were installed during the year at important locations in the Eastern as well as Western Suburbs of Bombay at a total cost of Rs. 6,98,539.00 for the guidance of visitors, tourists and the general public. Speed braker cautionary boards were also installed during the year at various locations at a total cost of Rs. 17,84,535.00 in order to fore-warn the motorists and ensure effective safety of vehicles and pedestrians.

Specially designed traffic reflective sylindrical comes have been installed at several inter sections at a total cost of Rs. 2,11,649.00. In order to delincate refuse inlands/central dividers an to-ensure safety of both vehicular and pedestri an traffic.

The traffic department have also supplied traffic reflective concs to the Traffic Police at a cost of Rs. 75,000.00 in order to help them to regulate traffic in a better and more efficient manner.

# PAY AND PARK SCHEMES IN GREATER BOMBAY:

Municipal Corporation haw reintroduced pay and Park' schemes in Brihan Mumbai with the view to control indiscriminate parking, reduce traffic congestion and misuse of roads. The planning and implementation of the schemes in being carried out by the Traffic Department. Several locations both off streets parking and on street parking have been identified by the traffic department after conducting detailed technical studies for the purpose of 'Pay and Park Schemes. All the necessary infrastructural facilities like provisions of chowkies, lay out and painting of parking lots, construction of traffic islands, installation of railings, instillation of time recorder punching machine, card racks designing and printing of tickets, parking charges tickets etc., are being provided by the traffic department.

To start with the scheme has been introduced at the parking lot at Gateway of India with 37 parking bays on 27th January, 1988. The scheme proved to be successful and yeilded an average daily collection of Rs. 600/1. It is contemplated to as extend this scheme of the two parking lots at Mahatma Phule Market-during the financial year. There are about 90 parking bays within these two parking lots which will yield daily anticipated collection of Rs. 1,200.00.

The scheme is also being extended to the traffic islands at Flora Fountain as well as certain stretches of kerb side parking along M.G. Road near University. The number of Rarking bays available in these parking lots is about 200. The scheme was also been extended to Veer Nariman Road with Cul-De-Sac, arrangement Besides several other potentially vaible locations are also being identified for the above purpose and the scheme will be extended to these locations in a phased manner.

It is anticipated that once the scheme is fully established the total collection will range in the order of Rs. 500,000.00 per month.

The impact of reintroduction of the scheme in terms of public resistance can not be under estimated. However, with skillful and systimatic implementation in a phased manner giving due considerations to administrative, financial and legal issues, this office hopesto ensure the success of the 'Pay and Park Scheme'.

# SIGNAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMME:

Under the World Bank Assisted Bombay Urban Transport Project, the work of modernising road traffic signals in the City has been completed. 83 intersections have been provided with Hicro Processor based intersection Controllers and all signal pates have been provided with imported signal heads or better visibility and appeal. The 83 intersections have been grouped in 6 corridors each of them provided with Micro processor based master controller which co-ordinates the working of local controller by means of communication cable. Separate timing plans for various periods of day and Sundays have been provided in consultation with the traffic police department which have resulted in the traffic signal system being traffic responsive to the maximum extent.

# INTERUTILITY CO-ORDINATION CELL

The interutility co-ordination cell which was established earlier, properly regulates and co-ordinates the extensive excavations on roads and footpaths undertaken by various utility concerns on major roads. The programme is called for from each utility concern and the same is discussed in Central Committee meetings of the representatives of the utility concerns. In the monscon period efforts are made to minimise the repeated excavations and regulate the excavation activity in the manner prescribed in the code of conduct which is drawn up after mutual consultation with the member utility concern.

The meetings such as Apex Committee, Zonal Committee etc., of the interutility organisations are held at regular intervals. In these meetings issues such as pending reinstatement authorities, difficulties encountered by the utility concerns, difficulties from the point of free flow of traffic on roads etc., are discussed and solutions are thought of.

Administration Report of Solid Waste Management Department for the year 1987-88 (City, Subs. and Ext. Subs.).

The Department of Solid Waste Management including the Transport Branches works under the direction and control of the Dy. City Engineer, (Solid Waste Management). He is assisted in the work by Head Supervisor (Solid Waste Management), Dy. Head Supervisors, Assistant to the Supervisors and by two Executive Engineers in the Transport Wing. The Transport Wing provides vehicles for transportation of refuse and Cess-pool contents from unsewered area.

Solid Waste Management: The service consists of Collection, removal and disposal of garbage and sweepings from the public roads, streets, footpaths and by lanes and maintenance of dumping grounds. The work of removal of Night Soil and cess-pool from unsewered areas, maintenance of public Sanitary Conveniences is also undertaken.

Collection of Refuse, Debris etc. : All the public Roads, foot-paths and house gullies are cleaned daily. The quantity of refuse debris and other waste material collected in street cleansing operation as well as from residential premises was approximately 9.12 tonnes (City) and 8.68 lakhs tonnes in Subs. average per day being 2500.01 & 2379.87 tonnes in City & Subs. respectively. During the year, 150 hutment colonies in City and 943 in Subs & Ex. Subs. situated on Government, Maharashtra Housing Board, Private and B. M. C.'s land were attended to and 75545 and 109929 tonnes of refuse was removed from the said slum colonies in City and Subs respectively.

Transportation of Refuse: Transportation of refuse as collected above, was regularly carried out by engaging mechanical traction. Total vehicles shift employed for removal of refuse during the year are asunder :--

For transportation of refuse 14 compacting vehicles which carry 11/2 times more load than that carried by conventional vehicles. 

Disposal of Refuse: The final disposal of refuse was carried out by reclaiming low lying land at Deonar. Total refuse dumped at Deonar from City Wards was approximately 7,73,687 tonnes. The final disposal of refuse was done by reclaiming Low lying land at Chincholi, Gorai, Easic Nagar and Chandan & Marve Road., Malad in the Western Suburbs and Deonar and Mulund in the Eastern Suburbs. Total disposal of waste in the Western Suburbs and Eastern Suburbs dumping grounds was 5,97.140 tonnes.

Public & Private Latrines and Urinals: During the year, 1280 public sanitary conveniences with 8158 W. C. Seats and 937 Urinals Stalls were maintained. There exist 86 separate urinal blocks with 392 urinal stalls in the City area and 176 Urinal blocks with 680 urinal stalls in the Suburbs and Ext. Subs.

Prevention of Nulsance: 687 cases in the City and 916 cases in Subs. and Ext. Subs. were lodged by 91 Nuisance Detectors for offences such as urinating, defecating and throwing refuse on public roads under Section 115 of the Bombay police Act, and Rs. 55,309.00 were recovered as fine. During the year 683 cases in the City and 1044 cases in Sub. & Ext., Subs. were lodged under Section 372(E) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, & Rs. 38,200 and Rs. 54,318 were levied as fine respectively in the City and Suburbs.

Removal and Disposal of Dead Animals: Bombay Khadi & Village Industries Association are the contractors for the work of removal and disposal of dead animals from areas within Greater Bombay limits. About 21262 dead animals were removed during the period from 1st April 1987 to October 1987. From November 1987 the work is carried out departmently due to strike of employees of Bombay Khadi & Village Industries Association.

Conservancy Services: Special Conservancy Services were rendered to Circuses, Exhibitions, Big concerns, Industrial Establishments etc., on payment of schedule charges. An amount of Rs. 28,600 was received for rendering conservancy services.

Conservancy Staff Quarters: 159 Labour Chawls, 9 Transit Camps in the City and 111 Chawls in Subs. with 4169 and 1861 tenements respectively were looked after and maintained for housing Conservancy staff. Out of 10082 employees in the City Wards and,7501 employees in the Subs. and Ext. Subs. Wards about 41.35% and 24.81% respectively are provided with accommodation and the rest of the employees are paid House Rent Allowance.

Labour_Welfare : 31 Welfare Centres are working for the benefit of Conservancy employees at different places in the City and Subs.

Co-Operative Credit Societies for Labourers: There are 12 Co-operative credit societies with an aggregate membership of 4979 members for the benefit of the labourers staff of S. W. M. Deptt. The share capital subcribed was Rs. 40,31,863. The working of the co-operative credit societies is satisfactory.

Expenditure on Conservancy Services for the year 1987-88: The total expenditure for Div.-I, II & III incurred on Collection, Removal and disposal of garbage, Cess-pool and Maintenance of cleanliness of Public Sanitary Conveniences etc., during the year was Rs. 41,74,60,481.65 out of which Rs. 38,10,34,998.94 was for clearance, transportation and disposal of refuse of 17.80 lakh tonnes. The expenditure on Halalkhore Services in the City and Suburbs was Rs. 1,00,07,490.10 and Rs. 2,64,17,792.61 respectively.

The cost of removal per tonne of garbage comes to Rs. 214.00 and per capital Rs. 43.30.

# Special Features :--

This Department has received financial assistance from International Development Association (I. D. A.) under the Bombay Urban Development Project —I (BUDP-I). The following works have been undertaken under this project.

- 1. Mechanical Refuse Transfer Station at Mahalaxmi.
- 2. Sites & Services Programme.
- 3. Slum Upgradation Programme.

The present status of the Works is as under :--

- 1) The work of preparation of Tender document related to the Refuse Transfer Station of 500 tonnes per day capacity at Mahalaxmi is in progress. The actual civil works and erection of plant and machinery will commence after finalisation of tender documents and invitation and award of contract.
- 2) Purchase of Refuse Vehicles, Ex-cavators and construction of two garages, mustering chowkies etc. Is included in the Sites and Services programme and the Slum Upgradation Programme. Tenders for procurement of Refuse vehicles, ex-cavators, are received. Supply will commence shortly. Tenders for garages and Mustering Chowkies etc. are being finalised shortly. Actual work will commence immediately after award of contract.

# **CHIEF ENGINEER (DEVELOPMENT PLAN)**

The Corporation have finalised the draft revised Development plan of Brihan Mumbai and the same has been submitted to the State Government for approval. The State Government in Urban Development Department in turn appointed an Advisory Committee under the Chairmanship of Shri J. S. D'souza, Ex. Ch. Secretary to the State Government to scrutinies the Development plan proposals and the Development Control Rules finalised by the Corporation. The Development plan Department has helped the said Committee by furnishing the necessary details including the background in framing of different policies for the purpose of graming of the draft revised D. P., resources and implementation of the same, etc. This office has also assisted Director of Town planning, Maharashtra State. The said Advisory Committee has already submitted its report on the draft Development plan of Brihan Mumbai and draft Building Bye-laws and Development Control Rules to the State Government and the administration is in dialogue with the State Government in this respect.

The Development wing of the Chief Engineer Development plan is also connection with various policies required to be framed for implementation of Development Control Rules, Development plan etc. In this connection, necessary policies for allowing development of the plots reserved for the purpose of Market and Primary school etc. have been framed and the same have been submitted to the Corporation for their consideration.

Considering the size and magnitude of the implementation of the proposals made in the draft revised Development plan, it is extremely necessary to augment the Municipal funds and to raise further resources for the same. Due to present financial stringency, the programme of acquiring the land for various public purposes was required to be restricted for acquisition of lands mainly to the cases of purchase Notice under Section 127 of the Maharashtra Regional & Town Planning Act, 1966. There are many properties, which are encumbered and it becomes difficult to provide alternative accommodation to the occupants thereof. However, as it is the policy of the Corporation to provide alternative accommodation to the persons displaced an account of various development proposals, the State Government is being requested to transfer same of the surplus vacant lands for development purposes under the provision of the Urban Land (Ceiling & Regulation) Act, 1976 either at no cost or at low cost. Similarly, the private institutions are also being encouraged to take up the development of some of reservations such as primary schools/Secondary schools, welfare Centres etc., at the their cost and thus making the amenity available to the members of public.

#### ACQUISITION:

As per the Land Acquisition Amendment Act (I), 1984, L. A. cases for which the notification u/s. 6 of the L. A. Act, have been issued prior to 24th September 1984, the awards were required to be declared by 24th September 1986. There were 180 land acquisition cases of the Municipal Corporation for which the notification u/s. 6 of the L. A. Act, had been issued prior to 24th September 1984. It was, therefore, decided to give priority to only those few cases which are urgently required for the projects in hand and for the purposes of proposed roads etc., and for which the necessary funds were available in the budget. In view of this 40 cases have been finalised and the awards have been declared 23rd September 1986. Notification in respect of remaining cases have already been passed 24th September 1986. The awards for 4 cases were declared after finalising the acquisition proceeding during the year 1987-88, after fixing the priority etc. Fresh notification will have to be issued in accordance with priority fixed for the same by the user deptts., etc.

Apart from the land acquisition cases, the Acquisition section has taken possession of the lands in respect of 42 cases free of cost against the grant of F. S. I. of the road land under D. C. Rule 10(2) and against conditions of the exemption order under the U; L; C. & R. Act, etc., for the year 1987-88.

In 1 case the valuation have been done for the Municipal lands. Standard rents have been fixed for 21 Municipal properties.

The Municipal Corporation has taken over the possession of 10 plots from the State Government and B. H. A. D. Board for public amenties.

# TOWN PLANNING SCHEMES:

There are all 33 T. P. Schemes in the Greater Bombay of which 4 are in city, 25 in Suburbs and 4 in extended suburbs out of which except the T. P. Schemes mentioned below at Sr. No. 1 to 3 and T. P. # THE ZONAL SET UP OF BUILDING PROPOSAL SECTION :-

Greater Bombay area has been divided into three Zones viz. City zone, Western Suburbs zone & Eastern Suburbs zone under the control of Ch. Eng. (D.P.)'s Department and activities of Building proposal section in these zones are new in full swing. The zonal Dy. City Engineers are giving technical guidance in engineering matters to the respective Executive Engineers of Building proposal section and Ward officers in their zones so far as private developments are concerned.

In order to streamline the procedure in the Building proposal section as also to out short the delay in approving the plans, a manual has been prepared by the adminitration in consultation with DEATA and with the adoption of the procedure specified in the manual, the period for approval of the building proposals will be reduced. Similarly, the system of Central Cell has been started in the building proposal section which co-ordinates the remarks of the various departments of the Corporation needed for the consideration of development permission etc. This will also avoid considerable inconvenience to the architects, owners etc.

Shri D. J. Vyas, Chief Engineer (Civic Training Institute & Research Centre), Shri R. N. Joshi and Shri A. M. Gor, Executive Engineers (CTI & RC) participated at the Afro-Asian Conference at Nehru Science Centre, Worli, Mumbai. The Conference was organised by the Bombay Centre and the International Division of the Indian Water Works Association'. At the Conference the topics included subjects like 'Water Resources Development' including 'Operation of Multiple Resources', 'Distribution Net Work Design', 'Distribution System', 'Water Quality', 'Leak Detection', 'Funding of Projects', Integrated Water Management etc.

5) Progress Note on Pilot Plant Studies at Dadar Sewage

Treatment Plant.

The Research and Development experiment with the pilot plant of 'Anafil' Digestor for treating sewage and generating bio-gas has been undertaken with a grant-in-aid of Rs. 6.04 lakhs from the Department of Non Conventional Energy Sources, (D.N.E.S.) Ministry of Energy, Govt. of India. An amount of Rs. 4 lakhs was released by the D.N.E.S. before starting construction in 85-86 The plant has been constructed and commissioned in 1986. The plant was in continuous operation in 1987-88. The initial results are encouraging. This is a single unit process for treating sewage and consumes minimum energy. At the same time dioxide it generates energy in the form of bio-gas of enriched quality (i.e., low Carbon Lioxide content). The average gas yield was 60 litres per cu.m. of sewage. The D.N.E.S. has sanctioned release of a second instalment of Rs. 2 lakhs from their grants for the year 1987-88. The experiment is to be continued till the end of May 1989,

The ground rent is charged at 10% per cent. On the value of land. The rate for calculating ground rent revised from 7% to 10% as per C. R. No. 2493 of 23-3-1976. The commutation is stopped from 1st July 1962.

The amount received by way of commutation of ground rent and premium etc., during the year was Rs. 10,86,377.00.

As can be seen in the Statement 'J' vide Item No. 8 that percentage of 64-71 arrears could be attributed mostly to the usual tendancy on the part of the prospective lessees to withhold payment of ground rent to the extent to cash security deposited by them with a view to getting the same adjusted towards the ground rent. # (2) Short Leases.

No temporary leases were granted during the year under report.

The number of vacant land tenancies both ex-Trust and Municipal Estates excluding those given in Mankhurd and Jogeshwari Colonies were 4218 and 659 respectively at the close of the year. The demand for vacant land tenancies in Ex-Trust Estates and Municipal Lands for the year under report was Rs. 7,70,814.56 and Rs. 31,32,148.89 and the recovery was Rs. 7,71,401.80 and Rs. 31,34,485.47 respectively inclusive of arrears.

# MANAGEMENT OF PROPERTY AND COLLECTION OF REVENUE.

## A — Trust Section.

(a) Chawl Permanent: The gross demand of tenements in the Chawls for the year was Rs. 62,94,491.56 on 31st March 1988 as against Rs. 80,35,193.12.

The concessional rent includes the rents of rooms let out to the poens of the different departments in lieusof house rent allowance and rent free quarters allotted to 193 sweepers on this department.

The Collection on account of rents from the permanent chawls during the year amount to Rs. 56,81,360.61 deducting therefrom the charges on account of outgoing amounting to Rs. not loss comes to Rs.

The Capital expenditure inclurred on the chawls including the value of the land is Rs. 246 Lacs. The Corporation have to pay interest and sinking fund charges at the rate of 4.61 per cent. per annum on the capital expenditure prior to 1919-20 and 6.35 per cent. per annum on the capital expenditure incurred in subsequent years and 4.24 per cent. In respect of those constructed after 1950. This amounts to 13.85 per annum, after adding the amount of net loss into the amount of interest and sinking fund charges as shown in Statement 'G', the A/C, for the chawl shows a loss of about Rs.

(b) Semi permanent sheds: The gross demand in respect of 7340 rooms in the semi permanent sheds including Labour Camps for the year was Rs. 26,29,917.46. The net demand after excluding the concessional rent and vacancies was Rs. 26,23,859.85 which was equivalent to 145.71 per cent. of the total recoverable rent including arrears of Rs. 18,00,759.51 for the previous year.

The percentage of outgoing in respect of the chawls and Semi-Permanent sheds are shown in statement on the basis of annual rental of Rs. 1,37,16,553.73 for chawl and Rs. 44,13,507.91 for semi-permanent shads, total outgoing being per cent and respectively.

Amounts transferred to Rent Equalisation Fund and Amenity Fund were Rs. 1,78,178.00 and Rs. 59,591.00 respectively. The difference between the standard rents works out on 5 per cent of the cost of land and 10 per cent on the cost of construction of post-war residential tenements and subsidised rents actually charged are to be met from the Rent Equalisation Fund.

Revenue collected from tenements constructed for slum clearance was Rs. 18,75,913.54 against the demand of Rs. 52,42,852.55 inclusive of arrears.

•

Acquired Properties: At the commencement of the year there were 449 acquired or surrendered buildings in charge of this department containing 6479 tenancies. At the close of the year, corresponding figures were 449 building and 6479 tenements.

The gross demand of 6479 tenements in the acquired and re-entered buildings was Rs. 26,89,631.96. After excluding the amount for concession in rent and vacancies the net demand for the year was Rs. 33,76,593.83.

The revenue collected amount to Rs. 31,34,485.47 which was equal to 212.73 per cent of the total recoverable amount including arrears of Rs. 14,73,421.29 for the previous year.

Summary of revenue: The total collection of revenue from leasehold plots and rent and ground rent from Building Vacant Land tenancies and slum clearance propoeties are shown in Statement 'D'.

Requisitioned Buildings: The management and collection of rent in respect of 17 properties having 386 tenancies requisitioned from private landlords for A. R. P. purposes were continued to be looked after by this department. The demand inclusive of arrears in respect of these tenancies for the year was Rs. 1,87,907.48 and the recovery was Rs. 85,852.96 which was equal to 45.69 per cent of the total recoverable amount.

During the year under review, the demand and recovery of taxes aggregated to Rs. 4,81,858.53 and Rs. 6,723.63 respectively. The arrears due for collection at the close of the year stood at Rs. 4,75,134.90.

- (b) 'Balwadi' (a Nursery School), was conducted at Welfare Centre at Fire Brigade Headquarters, Byculla, for the benefit of children of staff members.
- (c) Sewing Classes are conducted at the Welfare Centre for the benefit of family members of the staff.
- (d) Education tours staging of dramas/plays, and picnics were arranged for the children of staff members.

# (18) Industrial Tribunal Award:

Award of the industrial Tribunal under Reference No. I. T. 44 of 1981 was published in Part I—L. Gazette of Maharashtra dated 30-7-1988. Though the Award has rejected most of the demands of the staff members referred to the industrial Tribunal, the following benefits were granted.

- (i) Introduction of eight hours shift duty system in place of the existing 24 hours continuous duty system, as early as possible.
- (ii) Additional Risk Allowance of Rs. 50/- per month till the eight hours shift duty system is implemented.
- (iii) Crediting of denied Casual Leave and Festival and Bank Holidays to the Earned Leave account of the concerned employee.
- (iv) Grant of day off after three days duty. If not granted due to departmental exigencies, the denied day offs should be credited to the Earned Leave account or Cash Allowance should be paid at the option of the concerned employee at the end of the year.

# DR. BHAU DAJI LAD MUSEUM

The Museum founded in 1855 and known as the Victoria and Albert Museum was handed over to the Corporation by the Bombay Government in 1885. On 1st November, 1975 it was renamed as the Dr. Bhau Daji Lad Museum.

The exhibits in the Museum are classified into different sections, such as Agriculture & Village-Life, Arms, Cottage-Industries, Ethnology, Fine-Arts, Numismatics, Geology and Old Bon, Jay History. The Reference Library of the Museum contains books on Art, Archeology, History, Old Bombay etc. and most importantly eighteen volumes of specimens of old Indian Textiles that are available for reference on request.

Routine maintenance work was carried out through the year, inclusive of the special treatment against the menace of termites. Effort was also made to enrich the reference library through the purchase of new books as well as by reorganising the cataloguing so as to be of increased assistance to readers. In addition to the routine maintenance work, two major maintenance projects are scheduled to be taken up in connection with repairs to the Museum building.

- a) Repair of the dilapalated windows of the Museum
- b) Repair and replacement of the supports to the cornices on the Museum building

The Municipal Commissioner has proposed to reorganise the existing Museum set-up with a view of finally converting the Museum into a "City Museum" depicting and describing the history of Bombay city as well as reornanising some of the existing display.

In this connection, the administration of the Dr. Bhau Daji Lad Museum was handed over to the Prince of Wales Museum with effect from 1st January 1988, with Shri S. V. Gorakshkar, Director Prince of Wales Museum, as the Honorary Director, and Shri A. P. Fondekar, Sr Curatorial Assistant, Prince of Wales Museum as the Curator on Deputation. In order to implement the above project additional staff consisting of an Assistant Curator, Research Assistant, Photographer, as well as some staff in the Technical Labour category will be appointed.

This is a small department known as Special Vigilance Squad and is a branch of Municipal Commissioner's Establishment comprising of 5 officers and 7 men directly working under Municipal Commissioner and Additional Municipal Commissioners.

Duties and functions of this department are as follows:-

- 1. To make confidential, secret enquiries and to collect information of important nature, in case of mal-practices, frauds, evasion of taxes, misconduct and to carry out raids against those who are suspected to be evading municipal revenue.
- 2. The Squad supervises the Central Control Room at Municipal Head Office. They keep liaison with Police, Excise, Custom and other Government Agencies. They carry out only those investigations which are entrusted to them by the Commissioner or Addl. Commissioners.

During the year 1987-88, this Special Vigilance Squad conducted 85 investigations, carried out 159 surprise raids, about 475 visits and checkings and disposed of about 1,850 matters of miscellaneous nature including important cases of Confidential and Secret nature.

# DY. C. E. (VIGILANCE)

The special technical cell of the Municipal Commissioner's office/establishment works directly under Municipal Commissioner. This cell is put in charge of a technical head designated as Dy. City Engineer (vigilence).

#### 1) Main functions of the Cell :--

- a) The most important and the prima function of this cell is to keep an overall check and vigilance over all the technical matters mainly pertaining to the Civil Engg. works being executed by the various contracting agencies working under the supervision of various departments. These works include road constructions building constructions bridge construction drainage construction water supply and sewerage project works and various maintenance works executed by the ward officers.
- b) Municipal Commissioner forwards complaints received from the public Municipal Councillors, M.L.A. etc. for investigation and report from technical angle.
- c) In the wake of the case of fraudulent F.S.I. etc. M.C. desired that the bldg. proposal files shall be subjected to technical audit at random. Such technical audit is also being done by this cell.
- d) Dy. C. E. (Vig) also acts as an advisor to M.C. as and when desired by M.C., on all technical matters relating to Civil Engg. works and interpretations of relevant provisions of several statutory acts/rules/bye laws made thereunder.
- e) Dy. C.E.(Vig.) also acts as the co-oridinating agency amogst all the different engineering sections and assist the M.C. in the matters which need policy revision or lying down a new policy and implementations of policies.
  - f) This cell also keeps watch on the material test results obtained at the Municipal laboratory.
  - g) This cell checks at random final bills of the civil works carried out under various agencies,

#### 2) Worksing of the cell:

The irregularities descripancies lapses ommissions etc. are looked into and the findings are submitted to M.C. suggesting corrective and desciplnary actions to be taken against the erring contractors and the supervisory staff. Surprise inspections are carried out periodically on the Civil Engg. works like Road construction Bldg, construction Drainage construction W.S.S.D. works P.W.C. works in wards etc. which are being executed through contracting agencies. The inspections are carried out in view to verify whether the works are being carried out as per the design, specifications terms of contract etc. It is also verified whether the material being used on the works conform to the specified standards etc. The cases of deviations/irregularities/lapses etc. are noted down and these observations are forwarded to the concerned department for taking remedial/corrective actions and proposing desciplinary action against the contractors and the supervisory staff. This cell submits reports to M.C. proposing remedial/corrective actions and penalties rebates warnings degradation of the contractors and desciplinary actions against the supervisory staff depending upon the seriousness of the lapses. The M.C. sometimes forwards the complaints received from the public Municipal Councillors M.L.A. etc. for technical invertigation. This cell investigates such cases and submit investigation report to M.C. with suggestions and replies to complainant. Occasionally M. C. forwards the reports submitted by the department heads for the remarks of Dy. C.E.(Vig.) such cases are also scrutinized and remarks are forwarded for M.C.'s perusal.

The bldg. proposal files are sudited at random to verify whether the files are disposed off/dealt with as per prevailing rules/regulations such as D.C. Rules, bldg. bye laws, B.M.C. Act, M.R.T.P. Act. B.M.R.D.A. Act, U.L.C. & R Act etc. The report of such scrutiny is then submitted to the M.C. suggesting further course of action in the matter.

The construction material used on various construction works are sent for testing to the Municipal testing laboratory. The test result will indicate whether the materials conform to the specified standard. This office pursues the cases of failure of the materials and often directs the concerned department to carry out tests such as load test Hammer test etc.

The surprise element involved in the visits of the vigilance staff to various sites helps keeping the supervisory staff and contractors alert on the work to give better quality of work.

The technical scrutiny at random has also an element of surprise. The bldg, proposal staff takes adequate care while dealing with bldg, proposal files since noted failure in disposal of cases may lead to punishment.

The feeling that the work is likely to be checked and questioned keeps the related executing agencies alert to contract and deliver quality works.

Because of the feeling that the final bills of the work may be verified by the vigilance staff there is alertness in recording the measurements of the works carried out and payments made to the contractors.

# **DEONAR ABATTOIR**

The Abattoir functioned smoothly during the year 1987-88 except for a short period because of the strike like situation created by the licensees.

During the year under report, there is decrease in arrival and slaughter of sheep and goats, M. B. Cs. and pigs, whereas there is rise in arrival and slaughter of bullocks, buffaloes considering the arrival and slaughter of the last year. Moreover the export slaughter of sheep has gone down 40 to 50%, considering the export slaughter of last 3 years whereas the export slaughter of buffaloes has been increased slightly considering the slaughter of last two years, inspite of the fact that export slaughter of buffaloes was suspended by Government of Maharashtra for a short period due to the out-break of Rinderpest during 1987-88.

Cold Storage facilities could not be made available to the licensees through out the year as the cold storage plant was under repairs during the period from December 1986 to 11th October 1987 and again from 16th December 1987 onwards.

The Gobar gas plant, which was under repairs, has been closed down as the same was found uneconomical.

As usual special arrangements were made during Bakri-Id Festival for 'Sacrificial Slaughter' of horned cattle in one of the live stock market sheds and Municipal Meat Vans made available for the transportation of sacrificial meat.

Pharmacautical concerns like M/s. Griffon Laboratories, M/s. Raptakos Brett & Co., M/s. Cachet Pharmacauticals, M/s. Emcure Pharmacauticals, The Haffkine Institute and many other technical and research institutes continued to take benefit of the facilities for collection of blood, various glands, tissues etc., at Deonar Abattoir for pharmaceutical use and research purpose.

Educational Institutions like Bombay Veterinary College of Konkan Krishi Vidyapith Trainees from Marketing and Inspection Deptt., Govt. of India, Local Self Government Institution, Bombay and many other educational Institutes availed of the facilities for demonstration training etc.

Persons from various States and from abroad paid visit to the Abattoir and took advantage of the technical expertise available here.

#### **EVOLUTION:**

The Licence Department functions is created to fulfill the obligatory duties of the Corporation under section 61 (j) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act., which provides for the regulation of offensive and dangerous trades, etc.

This obligatory duty of the Corporation is discharged by executing the statutory provisions.

1) Under Section 394 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act by granting licences for storages of various commodities and trades under Schedule 'M', Section 394. For the purpose of administrative control in enforcing the provisions of this section in the larger interest of the life, health and property of the citizens, in addition to the decentralised ward staff, a stricter control is exercised through five Mass Raids by regular surprise inspections in the zonal wards for detection of new storages/trades, infringements of licence conditions etc.

So far in 488 cases, 14,18,470.28 Kgs. of such chemicals were seized after recovering Rs. 13,58,400.00 as warehousing charges,

In addition to the above, the Licence Department also controls and regulates.

A) Advertisement under Section 328/328/A of the —Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

Permissions for the advertisement hoardings (illuminated/plain etc.) are granted strictly in conformity of certain norms and guidelines finalised by the Administration.

- B) Projection licences such as Weather frame, Stall boards, Rolling shutters, Show-cases etc. licences are granted under section 313(1) of the B.M.C.Act. These licences are granted if they are in conformity with certain rules and regulations framed in this behalf.
  - C) Hawkers' licences under Section 313A/313B of the B.M.C.Act.

At present no new hawkers' licences are granted. Only cobblers' pitch licences are granted liberally if in conformity of certain rules and regulations framed in this behalf.

However, owing 5 financial constraints at the disposal of the administration for adequate man power and equipment, unauthorised occupation-cum-refuse removal charges are recovered at the rates of Rs. 5/— and Rs. 7/— (for perishable & non-perishable) from the unauthorised hawkers in each ward. Similar charges at the rates of Rs. 10/— and Rs. 20/— are recovered from unauthorised nocturanal hawkers dealing food articles in trays and handcarts respectively.

D) Removal of unauthorised encroachment under section 314(c) of the B.M.C. Act.

Each Ward has an encroachment removal staff with encroachment removal vehicle with Lorry Inspector and six labourers for Morning and Evening shift seperately. This staff take concentrates on encroachment removal actions against unauthorised hawkers. There is also a central Vigilance Squad under Seniorx Inspector (Licence) for surprise and stringent actions.

At the begining of the year 08 complaints were pending for investigation. During the year under report 664 complaints were received. At the close of the year 589 complaints were disposed of.

Similarly, at the beginning of the year 4573 prosecutions were pending disposal. During the year under report 13,864 prosecutions were launched and 12,171 were disposed of successfully.

An amount of Rs. 17,11,740/- was inflicted towards fine by the various court in the limits of Greater Bombay.

In the year 1987-88 there was excess of expenditure over income in the administration of the Shops & Establishments Act, 1948. The total expenditure incurred on different activities of the department during the year was Rs. 54,92,832.70 exclusive of provident fund, and leave contribution and supervision charges as a against this, an amount of Rs. 37,81,351.35 was realised by way of income or account of registration, renewal fees, selling of forms etc.

In the year 1987-88 9,162 visits of the shops, were paid for the purpose of enforcement under the Minimum Wages Act, 1948. Out of this, 4,719 were visits to the shops, 3,548 visits to the commercial establishments, 882 visits to restta./residential hotels, 13 to theatres. As a result of intervention of the Inspectors of this department, 1,498 employees were benefited to the tung of Rs. 10,64,453.80 by way of difference in actual wages and the Minimum Wages on account of increase in the rate of special allowances declared by the Competent Authority, at the interval of 6 months, i.e., in January and December. During the year under report, 1,487 Mass Raids were conducted for the purpose of enforcement of the various provisions of the B. S. & E. Act, 1948, Minimum Wages Act, 1948, Maharashtra Minimum Wages Rules 1963, 224 prosecutions for breaches of Maharashtra Minimum Wages Rules 1963 were launched, during the year under report, out of which 209 cases were decided realising a total fine of Rs. 14,900/-. One claim under Section 15 of the Payment of Wages Act, 1936 was filed, realising in Monetary Benefit of Rs. 17,975.63 to the employees. In accordance with the Administrator's Resolution No. 572, dated the 22nd October 1984, the Inspectorate under B. S. & E. Act 1948 have been collecting Trade Refuse Charges for the Solid Waste Management Department. These charges are equivalent to tariff of fees under the B. S. & E. Act, 1948 and Maharashtra S. & E. Rules 1961. The tariff is fixed by the State Government. During the year 1987-88 an amount of Rs. 29,97,284.65 were collected towards Trade Refuse Charges.

The Gardens department looks after the development and maintenance of gardens, playgrounds and traffic islands etc. besides plantation of trees and preservation of the existing treas, and is at present having 286 gardens, 167 playgrounds, 38 gardens attached to the Municipal Building, 142 traffic islands gardens, 60 water fountains, 13 Bandstand, 24 Nurseries and 3 sale counter all over Greater Bombay.

Veermata Jijabai Bhosle Udyan which is centrally located has remained one of the best attractions to the visitors as was in the past. Shady trees and modern play apparatas installed in the Garden regaled the childrens and visitors.

A Japanese Garden is constructed by Yokohama City landscape Consortium on behalf of the City Council of Yokohama at a centrally located plot of about 2,400 Sq.M. near fountain. At the centre of the Japanese Garden, there is a pond which is surrounded by a stream, a water-fall and a pergola. Another interesting feature of the garden is the Kabulki Gate which is made up of teak wood. It is one of the picturesque beauty spot in the V. J. B. Udyan. The pond is skirted by a passage from ne where one where can observe different facets of the garden while walking around it. There are artistic stones, stepping stones and wooden bridge. Besides there is a snow view stones lantern installed in the garden which represents its symbolic meaning as originally being used for lighting.

During the year 1987-88, 9 spotted deers, 6 Samber deers, 5 Grey Partridge, 20 Fainted pigeon, 4 painted stork, 4 Jackal and 8 Budgeriger Love Birds were born in the Zoo.

In addition 2 spotted deers donated by Ganeshpuri Ashram One Leopard', 2 Porcupine were donated by Sanjay Gandhi National Park and 14 Red Brested Parrot; 25 Alexandren Parrot, 100 Nos. Black headed Munia were donated by Deputy Director, Wild Life.

In addition to the above, 12 Blue Magpie exchanged with Shri Masrat Khan (authorised bird dealer) in exchange of 4 White Ibis, 6 Indian Goose, 2 Muscovi Duck and 2 painted stork.

#### **RECREATION ACTIVITIES:**

During the year under report 5 gardens, 5 playgrounds, 10 traffic islands gardens, 1 Nursery are added. The existing garden and playgrounds in the City, Eastern Suburbs and Western Suburbs were maintained properly.

During the year under report 2 fountains were dismantled and 2 new fountains are provided.

#### FOUNTAINS :

There are 60 fountains in Greater Mumbai Limit which have added to the beauty of the City with their cascading water and multi coloured lights.

#### Tree Plantation:

During the year 1987-88 a mass tree plantation programme was undertaken to combat the evil effects of Air pollution. 676 trees in the City, 2,558 trees in the Western Suburbs and 2,280 trees in Eastern Suburbs were planted. As a part of grow more campaign 26,033 plants were distributed to the public free of cost.

As per M. C.'s order under No. MDB/1065 of 22-12-83. Sobani Municipal Free Reading Room and Library was shifted in new premises at Panchashil Nivas Building Compound, 5 Lane, Bombay 400 008, and was opened temporarily to the public from 29-7-1984. Due to disputes raised by the people in the locality it was closed from 16-9-1984 as per Ward Officer's instruction. In mean time the first theft took place on 15-2-1985 and 2nd theft on 9-5-1986, so far said library closed permenantly.

Now the entier Establishment of Chief Librarian's Department transferred under Education Department vide M. C.'s order No. MOM/7170 of 17-2-1987. In the above letter M. C. agreed to open Sobani Municipal Free Reading Room and Library in the premises of Nagpada Municipal Primary School, therefore this library transferred at same place. Halai Memon Municipal Free Reading Room and Library was closed to the public from 29-8-1983 onwards, as the premises were required to be repaired by the trustees.

# DR. BHAU DAJI LAD MUSEUM

The Museum founded in 1853 and known as the Victoria and Albert Museum was handed over to the Corporation by the Bombay Government in 1885. On 1st November, 1975 it was renamed as the Dr. Bhau Daji Lad Museum.

The axhibits in the Museum are classified into different sections, such as Agriculture & Village-Life, Arms, Cottage-Industries, Ethnology, Fine-Arts, Numismatics, Geology and Old Bon.bay History. The Reference Library of the Museum contains books on Art, Archeology, History, Old Bombay etc. and most importantly eighteen volumes of specimens of old Indian Textiles that are available for reference on request.

Routine maintenance work was carried out through the year, inclusive of the special treatment against the menace of termites. Effort was also made to enrich the reference library through the purchase of new books as well as by reorganising the cataloguing so as to be of increased assistance to readers. In addition to the routine maintenance work, two major maintenance projects are scheduled to be taken up in connection with repairs to the Museum building.

- a) Repair of the dilapalated windows of the Museum
- b) Repair and replacement of the supports to the cornices on the Museum building

The Municipal Commissioner has proposed to reorganise the existing Museum set-up with a view of finally converting the Museum into a "City Museum" depicting and describing the history of Bombay city as well as reornanising some of the existing display.

In this connection, the administration of the Dr. Bhau Daji Lad Museum was handed over to the Prince of Wales Museum with effect from 1st January 1988, with Shri S. V. Gorakshkar, Director Prince of Wales Museum, as the Honorary Director, and Shri A. P. Fondekar, Sr Curatorial Assistant, Prince of Wales Museum as the Curator on Deputation. In order to implement the above project additional staff consisting of an Assistant Curator, Research Assistant, Photographer, as well as some staff in the Technical Labour category will be appointed.
