REVIEW OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COMMISSIONER FOR GREATER BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1950-51. (SUBURBS)

- *53. Under Bombay Municipal (Extension of Limits) Act, 1950 (Bombay Act VII of 1950) which came into force from 15th April 1950, the limits of the Bombay Municipal Corporation were extended upto Jogeshwari on the B.B. & C.I. Railway side and upto Bhandup on the G. I. P. Railway side i.e. over an area of about 68 square miles. The Municipal administration of the merged suburban area was placed under the immediate charge of an Assistant Municipal Commissioner aided by Senior Assistant Officers of the various Municipal departments.
- bodies in the suburbs as on 14th April 1950, amounted to Rs. 40.06 lacs and those under Capital Account amounted to Rs. 16.40 lacs. The rates of taxation which were in force before the merger were continued during the year. The Opening Balance as on 14th April 1950 was estimated at Rs. 15.44 lacs. Income and Expenditure for the year ending 31st March 1951 were estimated at Rs. 71.84 lacs and Rs. 72.38 lacs, respectively. The actual income however amounted to Rs. 61.17 and expenditure to Rs. 43.56. There was thus a Surplus of Rs. 17.61 lacs. with the addition of the Opening Balance the Surplus Cash Balance amounted to Rs. 33.04 lacs out of which grants amounting to Rs. 19.14 lacs were renewed for expenditure and certain amounts were advanced for purchase of Plant and Machinery. The Closing Balance thus amounted to Rs. 12.01 lacs on 31st March 1951.

The total loan liabilities at the end of the year stood at Rs. 32.66 lacs.

Expenditure on Loan Works was estimated at Rs. 28.48 lacs. In the Revised Estimates (8 months' basis) it was estimated at Rs. 41.78 lacs. The actual expenditure, however, aggregated to Rs. 5.50 lacs which was less than the Budget and the Revised Estimates by 80 and 82 per cent., respectively. It has been pointed out that as detailed plans and estimates could not be prepared for approval of the Works Committee and the Corporation and a very short period was left at the disposal of the departments much progress could not be made. It is hope that departmental action will be expedited in future so as to carry out the loan works according to the programme.

- 56. During the year a total length of 28 miles of functioning sewer was maintained at a cost of about Rs. 9,000. A sewerage Scheme for the whole of the Drainage and Sewerage. Suburban area is being worked out by the departments on a regional basis. As an immediate measure, however, it is proposed to lay sewers in Bandra and Santa Cruz areas at an estimated cost of Rs. 4.26 lacs. All the 4 pumping stations in the Suburbs were operating during the year. Early execution of the proposed sewerage scheme is necessary in the interest of health and sanitation of the suburban areas and it is hoped that the scheme will therefore be accelerated by adopting all possible measures.
- Repairs and main. was 122. During the year the work of renewal of about 53,578 square tenance of roads, Street yards of road surfaces was entrusted to Messrs. Recondo Ltd., while some re-surfacing work was carried out departmentally.

Street lighting was carried out both by electric and incandescent oil lamps numering, 3,796 and the cost amounted to Rs. 1.32 lacs.

Town Planning Schemes for Bandra, Santa Cruz and Ghatkopar were under preparation.

Water supply.

East Division and West Division, the former being supplied water from the 48", 32" and 24" Vehar Mains while the latter was supplied water principally from the 24" Tulsi Pipe Line. Total quantity of water supplied during the year to the suburbs was about 2,200 million gallins out of which 55 million gallons were supplied through 148 public stand pipes. Three new wells were completed during the year bringing the number of wells to 95 maintained by the Municipality.

All the seven Parks and Gardens in the Suburbs were looked after by the Water Works Department. The Madhu Park at Khar has been completely relaid and the work of renovating the Ishwarlal Park at Vile-Parle was taken in hand during the year.

- 59, Lincences and permits issued during the year (six months) numbered 3,481 as against Licences. 2,480 during the previous year, the fees realised therefrom being Rs. Licences. 36,503-3-0 as against Rs. 31,150-4-0 in the previous year. Fees amounting to Rs. 136-12-0, were received for the permits for exhibiting advertisements. Charges for parking cars, etc. at Juhu Foreshore collected during the year amounted to Rs. 12,000. The fees realised from the issue of licences to Hawkers and Squatters amounted to Rs. 4,253-5-0 as against Rs. 12,185-3-0 in the previous year. The decrease was due to the non-payment of fees by squatters at Juhu. A number of reserved areas have been proposed for the approval of the Commissioner of Police.

During the year 68 complaints were received out of which 64 were disposed of leaving 4 complaints pending at the close of the year. While 892 prosecutions were instituted during the year. The number of cases pending at the end of the year was 148. The total amount of fines realised was Rs, 0.25 lac, while a sum of Rs. 0.6 lac was received by way of Registration fees, etc. The total expenditure incurred in administering the Act was Rs. 0.18 lac. The grant-in-aid sanctioned by the Government for the year 1949-50 in respect of the administration of the Act in the suburban area was Rs. 6,174-4-9.
- 61. During the year there were 15 Municipal Markets, 5 Municipal Slaughter Houses and 3 Private Markets out of which 2 were proposed to be licensed and one at Bhandup was proposed to be closed down. 7 areas were selected for future markets to meet the growing demand for marketing facilities in the suburbs. During the year the licensing of stalls and outside meatshops was introduced for the first time in the suburbs. 149 applications were received for outside meat shops (including 48 shops already functioning prior to the merger) out of which 45 were approved 68 rejected and 36 were under consideration.

The total receipts of the Department during the year amounted to Rs. 2.94 lacs as against the estimated income of Rs. 2.78 lacs. The total expenditure incurred during the year was Rs. 0.72 lacs.

During the year, unwholesome articles of food such as meat, fish, vegetables, etc., weighing 5,595 lbs. were distroyed. It would appear that examination of articles of food carried on was not very extensive and thorough. More attention needs to be paid to this duty in the interest of public health in the suburbs so as to prevent out breaks of epidemics such as Cholera, etc.

62. At the time of the merger there were in the merged area 98 Municipal schools with 21,614 pupils on the roll and 535 ordinary teachers and 3 special teachers.

At the close of the year the number of ordinary teachers rose to 636.

There were 29 Municipal School buildings. Out of the 8 school buildings under construction at the time of the merger 4 were completed and 4 were still uder construction.

During the year 6 Marathi schools, 1 Gujarati School, 1 Hindi Class and 1 Urdu Class were opened while 1 private Hindi School was taken over and 5 Boys' and Girls' Schools were amalgamated. Administration of the Municipal Schools in the merged area was brought in line with the City Schools.

Scholarships to the tune of Rs. 990 were awarded to Harijan and Backward Class pupils and Freeships on the lines of the City Schools were introduced in the Suburban Schools also.

The Municipal Grant-in-Aid Code was made applicable to the Suburban Private Primary Schools which were paid a grant of Rs. 1,25,000.

63. The merged Suburbs have an area of 41,901 acres and a population of 5,10,151, Public Health. the mean density of population roughly being 12.175 per acre.

The number of live births recorded during the year was 8,335 which was more by 1,015 than that during the previous year (7320). The total number of deaths registered from all causes during the year was 3,625 as against 3,915 in the previous year. Deaths among infants under one year of age numbered 1,076 which exceeded by 112 the number in the preceding year,

the infant mortality rate for the year thus being 129.09 per 1,000 live briths. According to the Census of 1951, the death rate per thousand living persons worked out to 7.2 for the suburbs but like the birth rate the same could not be said to be accurate for want of proper registration of deaths, as all the cemeteries in the suburbs being private there was no Municipal control over them. The trustees of cemeteries were asked to register the cemeteries and the system followed in the City in regard to death registration, etc., is gradually being adopted in the Suburbs.

Small-pox caused 80 deaths; Enteric fever 19 deaths; Cholera 4 deaths; Diphtheria 3 ceaths and Malaria 86 deaths. High incidence of Malaria and of deaths caused by it were mainly due to the existence of large number of cesspools, insanitary milch-cattle stables, etc., and the consequent mosquito nuisance. Anti-malarial measures were carried out wherever mosquito nuisance predominated. It is hoped that campaign against malaria will be intensified so as to check the spread of malaria.

As the establishment of milch-cattle stables is disallowed in the City, hundreds of such stables have sprung up in the suburbs over which there is no sanitary control. The location of such stables near or in the midst of residential areas exposes the residents to nuisance from smell and breeding of house flies. A systematic inspection of stables was undertaken during the year to bring the stables under control and to improve them.

There are a number of slum areas in the suburbs which are overcrowded and consist of several unauthorised structures erected without proper planning and proper sanitary accommodation. In the interest of sanitation and health of these areas it is necessary that early steps should be taken to improve them by removal of unauthorized insanitary structures to begin with.

Private cemeteries in the suburbs number about 50 while there is one belonging to the Municipality. It is therefore desirable that steps should be taken to take over the private cemeteries and provide Municipal Cemeteries where necessary.

Medical Relief.—The two Municipal Hospitals one at Bandra and the other at Kurla together having 66 beds including 19 maternity beds and four Municipal Maternity Homes having a total accommodation of 21 beds were maintained during the year.

The total number of new in-door patients admitted in the Hospitals was 4,909 and the total attendance of out-door patients was 32,031.

In all there were 6 Municipal Dispensaries in the merged area. The total number of new outdoor patients treated in these dispensaries during the year was 98,984 and the total number of out-patient attendance was 2,27,759. The cases treated by the Mobile Hospital Unit numbered 25,298. Early steps require to be taken to provide medical aid on a larger scale at least by opening a few more Municipal dispensaries.

64. In conclusion, the Standing Committee desire to record their appreciation of the very valuable services rendered by Shri B. K. Patel, I.C.s., and Shri P. R. Nayak, I.C.s., whose high administrative abilities and financial acumen were of great help to the Committee. The Committee also place on record their appreciation of the services rendered by the other Municipal Staff.

Under Bombay Act VII of 1950, viz., the Bombay Municipal (Extension of Limits) Act, 1950, the limits of the Bombay Municipal Corporation were extended so as to include the Municipal' Boroughs, the Village Panchayats, the District Local Board, the District School Board, and 39 villages mentioned in the attached statement. The Assistant Municipal Commissioner was placed in immediate charge of the Municipal Administration of the merged suburban area subject to the control of the Municipal Commissioner and the Administration was carried on with the help of the following Heads of Departments:

According to the Budget Estimates the income, expenditure and deficit for the year were esti
Estimates and Actuals mated at Rs. 71.84, Rs. 72.38 and Rs. .54 respectively. However the actual of Income and Eximcome realised was Rs. 61.17 and the expenditure incurred was Rs. 43.56 resulting surplus of Rs. 17.61 at the end of the year.

The actual income during the year viz., 61.17 shows decrease of Rs. 10.67 in the estimated Variation in Income, income of Rs. 71.84.

The actual expenditure for the year viz., Rs. 43.56 shows also decrease of Rs. 28.82 in the estimated expenditure of Rs. 72.38. The decrease in expenditure is due mainly to the liabilities being carried over to the next year. The actual saving in expenditure amounted to Rs. 10.70.

The incidence of taxation per head for the year was Rs. 7-13-6.

Incidence of Taxation.

The net unhypothecated Surplus Balance on 31st March 1951 (including the minimum required Surplus Cash Balance. by law) was Rs. 12.01 against the opening balance of Rs. 15.44 on 15th April 1950.

The total amount of grants (including Additional grants) was Rs. 73.41 while the expenditure Expenditure Grants. amounted to Rs. 43.56 leaving an unexpended balance of Rs. 29.85. Out of this, grants aggregating to Rs. 19.15 are reserved for being renewed for expenditure in 1951-52 while Rs. 10.70 are treated as savings.

Additional grants sanctioned during the year aggregated to Rs. 1.03.

The expenditure on Capital Works during the year amounted to Rs. 5.50 against Rs. 31.78

Loan Works Expendiprovided for in the Revised Estimates under this head.

During the year a Loan amounting to Rs. 20 lakhs was raised at 3½ per cent. with 15 years' the year.

IV.—ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION

The rates of taxes remained the same as in the preceding year (1949-50). The total number of Taxation, Demand properties during the year was 25,113 as against 21,569 in the previous year, Collection and showing an increase of 3,544. The increase was partly due to the fact that outstandings.

The rateable value of all the properties was Rs. 1,67,09,272 against Rs. 1,57,79,070 for the previous year. This gave a rate of Rs. 32.12 per head of population.

The total number of vehicles and animals taxed during the year was 1,954.

For property and wheel taxes, 25,775 and 6,544 bills were respectively issued during the year. The bills issued for Water Rate were 18,888. The amount collected against net total demand of Rs. -45,77,855-8-0 and the arrears of Rs. -7,33,576-11-3 (on 1-4-1950) was Rs. 30,46,798-5-3. The percentage of totals recovery works out to 57.36.

Five claims for refund were admitted during the year and an amount of Rs. 2,981-12-0 was allowed on that account.

There were 687 complaints against the rateable values of properties under Section 81 of the Bombay Municipal Boroughs Act and 1,716 under Section 167 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. There were 6 appeals against the rateable values under Section 217 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

V.—SPECIAL ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT

- 1. In all 96 properties belonging to the Ex-Suburban Municipalities, under the control of the Upkeep and Maintenance of Municipal properties.

 Engineering Department were maintained at a cost of Rs. 10,037-12-0. Repairs and Petty works to different Municipal properties amounting to Rs. 6,418-2-0 were carried out during the year.
- 2. New Works estimated to cost Rs. 5,05,286 were provided for in Budget D for 1950-51 but

 New Works and Loan works programme, much progress could not be made due to the

 works. Works and Loan works programme, much progress could not be made due to the

 very short period left at the disposal of the Department after the Budget Estimates were sanctioned by the Corporation and also because the sanction of the Works Committee and
 the Corporation to the detailed plans and estimates for various works could not be obtained in time.
- 3. 5,402 Building proposals including some pertaining to pre-merger period were dealt with by

 Buildings Inspection and the Department during the year for the erection of new buildings and for addi
 Supervision of tions and alterations to the existing buildings.

Provisions of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act were rigidly enforced during the wear under report to check irregular, unauthorised and haphazard construction of buildings in the SuLurban area. 2,270 buildings residential and non-residential were constructed by private enterprise and Co-operative Housing Societies accommodating about 45,400 persons. 339 Completion, certificates were received and disposed of during the year.

- 4. Road length of 122.51 miles in the suburban area of Greater Bombay Municipal Corporation

 Maintenance of roads was maintained at a cost of Rs. 58,686-7-0 during the year. Renewal of road surfaces covering an area of about 53,578 square yards was entrusted to Messrs.

 Recondo Ltd., at an estimated cost of Rs. 1,90,934-0-0. Some renewal work was carried out departmentally. The cost of street lighting both by electric and incandescent oil lamps which number 3,796 amounted to Rs. 1,31,945-2-0.
- 5. As regular maps for the Suburban regions were not available a detailed city survey was City Survey of the undertaken to secure proper planning and orderly development and execution of drainage schemes for the Suburbs. A few districts of Bandra, Khar and Santa Cruz were surveyed and sheets drawn up on the scale of 40' to an inch. The survey of Ghatkopar and Kirol area has been entrusted to the Collector, (Bombay Suburban Districts) at an estimated cost of Rs. 23,000. The survey of other important areas will be taken up as funds permit.
- 6. In pursuance of Sub-Section (1) of Section 10 of the Bombay Town Planning Act GovernTown Planning ment were approached to grant permission to extend the time limit of one year for preparing and publishing draft variations in the Town Planning Schemes
 No. I, II, III, IV, V and VI for Bandra, No. III for Santa Cruz and No. I and II for Ghatkopar. Before the variations of T.P. Schemes are finalized, a policy, similar to the one followed in the City in respect of Mandvi and Mahim Town Planning Schemes in matter of allowing construction by taking a suitable agreement and demanding adequate deposit, has been adopted for the suburbs.
 - 7. As regards the work of street widening and laying out new roads much progress could not be Improvement of Road done except prescribing regular road lines under Section 297(1)(a) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act with the sanction of the Corporation.
- 8. 28 miles of functioning sewer length was maintained at a cost of Rs. 9,012-8-0 during the Sewerage and Pumping year. Sewerage Scheme being a long term project, it was decided to lay sewers as an immediate measure in Bandra and Santa Cruz area at an estimated cost of Rs. 4,26,215. 4 pumping stations were operating in the Suburbs one main Pumping Station at Bunderwadi and three other auxiliary pumping stations known as Chimbhai, Jaibharat and Khar. Total quantity of sewage pumped during the year was 248 million gallons approximately.
- 9. 20 Permits and licence cases relating to Factories Workshops and Work places were inspecte

 Inspection of Work and disposed of during the year. 3 Nuisance cases were attended to and 17 new cases were inspected.
- 10. With the merger, there was a great demand, by the Suburban Public for the civic amenities as at present enjoyed in the City proper. With the little time at the disposal of the department attempts were made to frame Budget estimates by incorporating the most essential amenities such as improvement in the existing roads and construction of relief

sewers, additional sewers, pumping stations on the basis of block estimates. Much progress even in the execution of important construction works could not be done owing to the non-availability of materials. and dearth of skilled labour. Partial relaxation of restrictions on building materials by Government and transfer of suburban Municipal administration to the City Corporation helped to some extent to stimulate building activities. In order to bring the suburbs to the City Standard by providing all amenities at present avaiable in the City, it is considered advisable to chalk out a five year programme involving an average expenditure of not less than Rs. 50 lakhs per year.

West Divison is supplied water principally from the 24" Tulsi Pipe Line having a maximum discharging capacity of 4.25 million gallons per day. While the East Divison recives its supply from the-48", 32" and 24" Vehar Mains.

Total number of connections in the merged areas is over 9,000. In addition, there were 148 connections to public stand pipes supplying about 55. million gallons per annum of water. gratuitously. Total quantity of water supplied to the Suburbs was about 2,200 million gallons per day

About 800 complaints were received regarding inadequate water supply and nearly 100 complaints regarding absence of piped supply.

There are 5 Reservoirs (Balancing Tanks) in the Suburbs 4 of them being in the West Division and I in the East Division.

Four pumping sets were operating, two at Malla Pumping station and two at Bandra Hill pumping station. 129 Public Stand pipes and 92 wells were maintained at a cost of about Rs. 7,860 and Rs. 4,000 respectively.

There are three Meter Workshops in the Suburbs namely (1) at Bandra Municipal Office: (2) at Kaurla Municipal Office and (3) at the Vile-Parle Reservoir, where 2,024 Municipal and private meters were tested and 2,843 meters were repaired and overhauled during the year.

About 556 new private meters were provided during the year on new connections.

The total Revenue derived from water supplied by meter measurement was about Rs. 20,17,620 during the year under review.

The revenue derived from meter hire during the year was about Rs. 72,610.

As regards Loan Works, it may be stated that 2,165 and 984 feet of 6" pipe line were laid for supply of water to Prabhat Colony Santacruz and Callina Village in 'H' Ward, respectively.

Three new wells, one at Madh, another at Anik and the third at Mahul were completed during the year.

There was general improvement in pressures in the distributory mains throughout the region, thereby minimising the short supply complaints from consumers. The trunk main feeding Vile-Parle was enlarged from 9" to 18">15">12".

There are in all seven Parks and Gardens being looked after by the Water Works Department in the Suburbs. The Madhu Park at Khar has been completely relaid. The work of renovating the Ishwarlal Park at Vile Parle was taken in hand during the year.

LICENCE DEPARTMENT

The provisions of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act pertaining to the Licensing Section were applied to the Suburbs from 1st October 1950. A restricted system of licensing existed in some of the merged Municipalities but it did not embrace all the items in Schedule 'M' to Section 394 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. The number of permits and licences totalling 3,481 issued during the year under report exceed that issued during the previous year by 1,001, the permit fees realised being Rs. 36,503-3-0 against Rs. 31,150-4-0 in the

There was no system of granting permissions for the display of advertisements in the merged Municipalities and the provisions of Sections 328 and 328A pertaining to the display of advertisements and the Rules framed by the Municipal Commissioner Sky signs and advertisements. thereunder were applied to the Suburbs for the first time from 1st 1 October 1950. Fees amounting to Rs. 136-12-0 were received for the permits for exhibiting advertisements; and a sum of Rs. 5,959-12-0 was held in deposit pending adjustment.

The system of licensing Hawkers existed only in Bandra, Juhu and Kurla Municipal areas. The provisions of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act pertaining to the Hawkers and Squatters were, however, applied to the Suburbs for the first time. A number of Reserved Areas were accordingly proposed to the Commissioner of Police for his approval but no approval was received till the end of the year. A lorry for the removal of encroachments on Public Streets in the Suburbs was also purchased at the end of the year but was not put into commission.

Charges for parking cars, etc., at Juhu Foreshore were collected by the Juhu Municipality.

These were recovered during the year and the proceeds therefrom amounted to Parking grounds.

VIII.—MARKETS AND SLAUGHTER HOUSES.

There were 15 Municipal Markets, 5 Municipal Slaughter Houses and 3 Private Markets out of which 2 were proposed to be licensed and the one at Bhandup not being in conformity with Market and Building Bye-laws was proposed to be closed down.

Prior to the merger there was no uniformity of administration in Suburban Markets. Each ex- local body had its own fee Schedule and stallage charges. 🕒 ber 🗗 bira in dag ath ar 🔐 o e

The stallage charges and fees were much below the standard. Steps were taken to revise the same from 1st April 1951, by applying Bombay Schedule with certain modifications to suit local

During the year licensing of stalls and outside meat shops was intoduced for the first time in the Suburbs. In all 149 applications were received for outside meat shops, including 48 shops already functioning prior to the merger. Out of these applications 45 proposals were approved, 68 rejected and 36 were under consideration.

With a view to expand the Marketing facilities to meet the growing needs of the Suburbs, 7 areas were selected for future Markets.

With a view to improve the standard of the Slaughter, it was considered desirable to centralize slaughter of animals for H & K Wards at Bandra Slaughter House and for L,M & Slaughter Houses. N Wards at Kurla Slaughter House. Steps were also taken to bring the Kurla Beef Slaughter House under one management and one set of regulations.

The total receipts for the year under report amounted to Rs. 2,93,802-5-3 including Rs. 32,160.

Income & Expenditure being the share of 'A' budget for the animals slaughtered for Bombay at Kurla Slaughter House, as against the estimated income of Rs. 2,77,723. In addition to this Rs. 25,761, being the share of entrance fee for animals admitted at Bandra Slaughter House and Rs. 9,000, being the fees for animals removed by private parties from Bandra Fair ground for slaughter in Suburbs, are recoverable from 'A' budget. The actual revenue exceeded the estimated income by Rs. 18,680 approximately.

The total expenditure incurred during the year was Rs. 71,690/-

Unwholesome articles such as meat, fish, vegetables at different Markets and Slaughter Houses weighing about 5,595 Lbs., were destroyed. Of these the total meat destroyed was 1,751 Lbs., approximately.

In all 23 raids were carried out for detecting unauthorised sale and slaughter of animals in different parts of the Suburbs. Prosecutions were launched resulting in 9 convictions. The total fines inflicted was Rs. 105. Rs. 245 were realized from the auction sale of confiscated meat.

During the year, 1,514 Buffaloes, 405 cows and bullocks and 36,366 sheep and goats were brought for slaughter at different Slaughter Houses, out of which 18 Buffaloes, 32 cows and bullocks and 1,067 sheep and goats were rejected on anti-mortem examination. The main causes for rejection were:—

(1) Advance stage of pregnancy; (2) Sheep pox; (3) Feet and mouth diseases and (4) Emaciation.

The approximate weight of Dressed meat of Buffaloes slaughtered at Kurla Slaughter House was 236.5 tons, that of cows and bullocks 36 tons and that of sheep and goats was 324.7 tons.

The right of collecting blood at Kurla Slaughter House was sold by ex-Municipality at Rs. 225 to Messrs. Chembur Fertilizer & Co., Ltd., during the year.

IX.—EDUCATION

Suburban Primary Schools.

The coming into force of the Bombay Municipal (Extensions of limits) Act, 1950, from the 15th of April 1950 brought under the jurisdiction of the Corporation an area of about 68 square Miles and the responsibility of maintaining and aiding the Primary Schools therein devolved on the Schools Comittee. The offices of the Bandra School Board and Bombay Suburban District School Board, Andheri, were amalgamated and were located at Andheri. Shri M. P. Shah, B.Sc., B.T., T.D. (Lond.), LL.B., Superintendent, Municipal Gujarati, Hindi and Aided Schools, was placed in charge of the administration in the Suburbs in addition to his own duties and he remained in charge of the schools during the year under report.

Smt. K. Khandvala, B.A., B.T. (Bom.), M.A. (U. S. A.), J.P., Secretary, Schools Committee, exercised general control over the administration.

At the time of the merger there were 39 schools in Bandra and 59 in Bombay Suburban District with 21,614 pupils on the roll. The number of private Primary Schools of Bandra and Bombay Suburban District was 61. There were 535 ordinary teachers and 3 special teachers at the time of the transfer. At the end of the year, the number of ordinary teachers rose to 638. The Suburban Office work was brought on the lines with that of the City Office.

Owing to the inadequate arrangement for storing drinking water, water vessels were supplied Furniture and Equip and immediate arrangement to appoint 113 peons in different Schools had also ment. to be made to bring children to schools. Arrangement to supply new furniture and several other articles was also made. These facilities increased the number of children in Suburban Schools and stabilised the attendance.

There were 29 Municipal owned buildings in which 28 schools were housed (as shown in Appendix B'). Out of 8 buildings under construction at the time of merger, 4 School Accommodation. have since been completed and 4 are still under construction.

Certain new buildings were secured for schools and a new building constructed by Government for Chembur Sindhi Camp was handed over to the Municipality under certain stipulations.

New Schools and during the year. One private Hindi School was taken over under Municipal Classes. Schools and management and five Boys' and Girls' Schools were amalgamated.

School timings diaries for teachers, Progress Cards for students and weekly tests were introduced of in accordance with the practice in the City Schools. The system of Annual Examination for standards IV to VI and promotion to students of Standards I to III according to their progress in weekly tests were brought in lines with the City Schools.

There was no Basic School in the Suburbs. But Card Modelling and Spinning as Crafts were continued to be taught in some of the Suburban Schools.

Harijan and Backward Class pupils were awarded Scholarships of Rs. 990. From March 1951 Scholarships Fees the rates of fees in Upper Primary Classes and the system of Freeships in the City Schools were introduced in the Suburban Schools also in the Suburban

- (A) Scouting and guiding were introduced in a few Suburban Schools. Mass Drill Rallies and Miscellaneous Activities. Annual Sports were held.

- (F) Other Functions.—The Schools in Suburbs also celebrated Independence Day, Republic

The Municipal Grant-in-Aid Code was made applicable to the Suburban Primary Schools which Aided and Recognised were paid a grant of Rs. 1,25,000.

On account of the enforcement of the Bombay Act XLVIII of 1950, from 1st January 1951 Second Amendment of the Suburban Accounts Office was brought over to the Gilder Tank Building under the Superintendent of Accounts, Education Fund. the Municipal Act.

MUNICIPAL HIGH SCHOOL, BANDRA,

The School was founded in 1902 as an Anglo-Vernacular School which was later on converted High School. into a High School.

Shri R. Y. Kulkarni and Shri S. N. Koppal held the posts of Head and Assistant Masters, respectively. The total strength of the School is 374. It is housed in three buildings of which one was recently constructed by the Ex-Municipality at a cost of Rs. 15,990.

The Middle School classes are held in the morning and High School classes in the afternoon All Teachers are trained and the Ghate-Parulekar scale of pay is applied to them. The School is entitled to Government grant.

MUNICIPAL MARATHI SECONDARY MIDDLE SCHOOL, GHATKOPAR.

X.—PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Area of Population.—The area of the Suburban merged area is 41,901 acres and the population as per census of 1951 is 5,10,151.

against 7,320 for the year 1949, being 1,041 in excess of that of the latter year.

Death registration.—The total number of deaths registered from all causes during the year was 3,625 as against 3,915 in 1949, being 290 less than that for 1949.

Infant mortality.—Deaths among infants under one year of age numbered 1,076, exceeding those of the previous year by 112. The infant mortality rate per 1,000 live births registered was 129.09 for the year 1950. The provided by 1.2. The Dock of the search of the se

Infectious diseases.—No deaths were reported from Plague, Influenza and Poliomyelitis

There were 80 deaths from Small-pox, 19 from Enteric Fever, 4 from Cholera and 3 from Diphtheria. Though the incidence of Cholera was a little high during July and August 1950, the disease was brought under control on account of the adoption of effective preventive measures.

Immunization. During the year 1,20,295 inoculations were performed against Cholera. The number of primary and re-vaccinations done was 8,068, and 12,961, respectively, at the 20 different Vaccination Stations.

Malaria. Malaria, which played an important role among the various causes of mortality in the Suburbs registered 86 deaths. This was mainly due to the existence of cesspools in non-drained areas, unlicensed and insanitary Milch Cattle Stables, slums and low-lying plots of land and the consequent mosquito nuisance in the merged areas. This nuisance is, however, being brought under control to some extent by the measures, such as D. D. T. spraying, dusting with B. H. Dysentery—Dysentery caused 105 deaths.

Other Principal Diseases. There were 194 deaths from Tuberculosis, 443 from diseases of the respiratory system, 173 rom Diarrhoea and Enteritis, 396 from Congenital debility and 256 from Senile debility. Leprosy caused only 1 death.

There was an accommodation for 66 beds in the Hospitals, including 19 for maternity cases and 21 beds in the Maternity Homes at Ghatkopar and Chembur. Louis da . E stat

The total number of new indoor patients admitted in the Hospitals was 4,909. The total attendance of indoor patients was 32,031.

The total number of new outdoor patients treated in all the dispensaries was 98,984 and the total number of outpatient attendance was 2,27,759.

The cases treated by the Mobile Hospital Unit numbered 25,298.

Removal Conservancy of Town Refuse.—The total length of roads to be swept is 149 miles. The total length of open drains is 51 miles. In all 519 dust-bins were kept in different places for collection of refuse. The contents of these bins were removed by 17 lorries and 7 bullock carts and the total quantity of refuse removed was about 16,000 tons, which was disposed of by reclaiming low-lying plots of land and in creeks. Removal of night soil.—Most of the Suburban area being undrained, there are privies with 12,323 seats on basket system with cesspools. The night-soil from these privies was removed in 59 lorries, 15 trailers, 4 moto-carts and 15 carts. The total quantity of night-soil thus removed was 24,86,250 gallons.

1507,5180 · Removal of cesspool water. For want of drainage removal of cesspool water forms an important factor of the Conservancy Services in the Suburbs. The total number of cesspools was 4,897. The cesspool water was removed in 34 lorries and 4 newly purchased moto-carts. The night-soil and sullage water thus collected were disposed of at 8 different spots near the creeks all over the Suburbs. The total quantity of cesspool water removed was 1,88,95,500 gallons.

Transport.—The total fleet employed for mechanical transport of refuse, night-soil and cesspool water at the time of the merger consisted of 16 refuse lorries and 1 refuse trailer, 34 cesspool lorries, 19 night soil trailers and 3 towing vehicles, to which were added, 1 tracter trailer and 1 G. M. C. lorry for removal of refuse, during the course of the year.

Drainage.—A major portion of Bandra and Khar is provided with drainage, sewage from which is pumped out at 4 pumping stations in different places. The approximate quantity of sewage pumped out was 24,79,74,600 gallons.

Rat Destruction.—No regular rat destruction could be resorted to. 596 rats were caught by trapping only. No rat was sent to the Haffkine Institute for examination.

Control of stray dogs.—In all 1,825 stray dogs were caught and destroyed at the lethal chamber at Mahalaxmi.

Dog Licensing.—Dog licensing in the Suburban Area was started from 1st August 1950 and 366 dogs were licensed upto 31st December 1950, which brought an income of Rs. 1,830 to the Municipality.

Milch Cattle Stables.—There are hundreds of unlicensed and insanitary milch cattle stables in the midst of residential localities. Most of them are in zawli sheds or in unauthorised structures with no arrangement for disposal of dung and stable litter. These are a great menance to Public Health and sanitation. The Municipality is considering how to tackle this problem.

Veterinary Service.—There is a Municipal Veterinary Dispensary at Khar in charge of a Veterinary Assistant Surgeon, appointed by Government, who attends to the Municipal bullocks of the Bandra Ward and also attends to private owned animals on payment of the prescribed fees. In all 944 inoculations were done and Rs. 722 were recovered by way of fees.

Food Sanitation.—Food samples obtained from grocers' shops, milk-shops, dairies, etc., were examined and 276 prosecutions were launched and fines of Rs. 9,114 were realised.

Inspection of factories, workshops, etc.—A Factory Inspector is appointed for inspection of factories, workshops, etc., for the Suburban area. In all 17 new proposals have been received for permits and licences.

General Reviews.—The registration of Vital Statistics which was unsatisfactory prior to merger is now placed on city lines.

There was no outbreak of any epidemic, except a little incidence of cholera which was brought under control before it took a serious turn and the Public Health remained satisfactory.

Though there will be no perfect improvement in the sanitation till the whole area is drained, there was some improvement during the year due to the addition in the equipment and regularisation of conservancy service.

The work of giving medical relief was placed on a better footing.

There were no cases in which the provisions of the Bombay Municipal Servants Act, 1890, were invoked during the period mentioned above.

There was a dispute between the employees of the ex-Parle Andheri Municipality and the ex-Parle Andheri Municipality, which was referred to the Industrial Tribunal of Shri Salim Merchant prior to Merger. Not merely the written statement of the Municipality was filed but the whole hearing was completed before the Merger. The Award, however, was not given till the end of the year.

There was also a dispute between the employees of the ex-Bandra Municipality and the ex-Bandra Municipality which was referred to the Industrial Tribunal of Shri Salim Merchant in January, 1950. Hearings were adjourned from time to time until Merger as a consequence of which the Greater Bombay Municipal Corporation became a party to the dispute. The written statements were filed by the Municipality and the hearing was over during the year. The Tribunal had submitted his Award dated the 16th March 1951 to Government, but it is was not published in the Government Gazette, till the end of the year.

No strike occurred in the Suburban Area.

Valuing the Municipal Debentures at par the market value of Sinking Fund Investments held on 31st March 1951 comes to Rs. 4,22,163 as shown in Appendix No. 15B. This together with the amount of interest accrued upto 31st March 1951, viz., 17,193 and cash in office Rs. 405 brings the total amount of Sinking Fund to Rs. 4,39,761 and more than covers the amount viz., Rs. 4,10,530 to which the Sinking Fund should have accumulated upto 31st March 1951. 17. In the Budget Estimates for the year the Income was originally estimated at Rs. 71.84, the expendi-

On the basis of eight months' actuals the Income for the year was further revised to Rs 72.71 and expenditure to Rs. 70.03 resulting in surplus amounting to Rs. 2.68.

The actual Income realised was Rs. 61.17 and expenditure aggregated to Rs. 43.56 resulting in a surplus of Rs. 17.61.

Reasons for decreases in Income are detailed in Statement'A'. Under para. 17 of Schedule FF of the Bombay Municipal (Extension of Limits) Act, 1950, the rates of taxation, prevalent in the various localities were to be continued for a period of one year unless the Corporation otherwise determined. So the rate of taxation for the year were not distrubed and in the villages where there was no taxation status quo was maintained.

The expenditue for the year was estimated at Rs. 72.38 and as per revised estimate (8 months basis) at Rs. 70.03. The final grants, however, sanctioned aggregated to Rs. 73.41 against, which the actual expenditure booked was Rs. 43.56 resulting in an unexpended balance of Rs. 29.85 at the close of the year. As against the unexpended balance of Rs. 29.85 the departments have proposed renewal of grants to the extent of Rs. 19.15 the balance of Rs. 10.70 has been treated as savings.

RATES OF TAXATION.

Under Para. 17 of Schedule FF to the Bombay Municipal (extention of limits) Act 1950, the existing taxes were to be continued for one year after the merger upto 31-3-1951. The trates of taxation levied by the Ex-Local bodies for the year 1950-51 on properties were as shown in Statement B and those for vehicles and animals were as shown in Statement C. The rates charged for the supply of water by meter measuement varied during the year from Annas 11 to Rs. 2 per 1,000 gallons according to the nature of the property or

PROPERTIES.

The total number of properties on 31st March 1951 was 25,113 as shown in Statement A. exempted from payment of taxes or not assessed at all (lands) were not entered in the Assessment Lists.

Properties newly erected enlarged and demolished during the year numbered 3,329, 1,038 and 151, respectively. 150501

RATEABLE VALUE.

The rateable value of all the properties in the Suburban Wards (H to N) on 31st March 1951 was Rs. 1,67,09,272 as against Rs. 1,57,79,070 on 31st March 1950. In 172 cases, the rateable value was increased by more than Rs. 2,000 per annum, each.

METER HIRE.

Receipts from Meter Hire amounted to Rs. 30,756-7-0 against the demand of Rs. 40,906-9-0.

REFUND.

Five claims for refund were admitted during the year and an amount of Rs. 2,981-12-0 was allowed on that account.

COMPLAINTS AND APPEALS AGAINST RATEABLE VALUES.

There were 687 complaints against the rateble values of the properties under Section 81 of the Bombay Municipal Boroughs Act and 1,716 under Section 167 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

There were 6 appeals against rateable values under Section 217of the Act of which 2 were settled out of Court, 1 was dismissed and 3 were withdrawn.

SUITS.

During the year under report, no suit was filed against any rate-payer for the recovery of taxes.

RIOT TAX.

The total amount of Riot Tax collected during the year in respect of the previous riots was Rs. 9,909-7-0, leaving a balance of Rs. 1,94,298 14-0 to be recovered as on 31-3-1951. The balance to be recovered was havy on account of the fact that the bills for the said tax in Kurla Ward were issued very late in the year.

URBAN IMMOVABLE PROPERTY TAX.

Rates of taxation of the Urban Immovable Property Tax continued to be the same as in the preceding year, namely, 7 per cent. in respect of properties having rateble value of Rs. 1,000 and above and 3½ per cent. for the properties having rateable value from Rs. 200 to Rs. 1,000. Properties, having rateable value from of less than Rs. 200 were exempted from the levy of this tax. The demand for the tax was Rs. 11,92,416-12-0 out of which an amount of Rs. 8,15,865-8-0 was collected during the year. The percentage of outstandings works out to 31.6 of the total demand.

GENERAL REMARKS.

Prior to the merger on 15th April 1950, the Suburban area had four Brorough Municipalities, namely, Bandra, Parle-Andheri, Kurla and Ghatkopar-Kirol, one District Municipality for Juhu and three Village Panchayats of Chembur, Bhandup and Versova Beach, while thirty-nine Villages had no Municipal Government of any type.

One case of defalcation was detected during the year. Ward Inspector, Jannary D'Souza, of the Bandra (H) Ward collected a sum of Rs. 858-4-0 on account of Municipal taxes from different ratepayers, but he did not credit it to the Municipal Treasury. He was suspended from Municipal service on 5th May 1950 and was sentenced on 5th April 1951 by the Presidency Magistrate, Bandra, to 3 months' Rigorous Imprisonment.

There was no occasion during the year when the provisions of the Bombay Servants Act had to be brought into effect.

Both the Indoor and Outdoor Staff worked with commendable zeal and devotion.

UPKEEP AND MAINTENANCE OF MUNICIPAL PROPERTIES.

2. The total number of properties belonging to the ex-Suburban Municipalities, under the control of this Department during the year was 96. Expenditure incurred on maintenance of the properties amounted to Rs. 10,037-12-0. Rs. 10,037-12-0.

NEW WORKS.

3. New works estimated at Rs. 5,05,286 were provided for in Revenue Budget Estimates for 1950-51 as shown in Appendix 'A'. All these works could not, however, be taken in hand. Expenditure booked upto the end of the year was Rs. 974-11-0.

LOAN WORKS.

4. Loan Works estimated at Rs. 22,52,786 were provided in Budget 'D' under Capital Works/Loan Funds as shown in Appendix 'B'. The expenditure booked during the year amounted to Rs. 5,14,041-14-0. As detailed plans and estimates could not be prepared for the approval of the Works Committee and the Corporation, much progress could not be made.

- 6. With the introduction of Bombay Municipal (Extension of Limits) Act, 1950, watch was kept over the irregular, unauthorised and haphazard construction of buildings in the Suburban area. The Act was rigidly enforced and prosecutions launched against the defaulting house-owners. In addition to the prosecutions that were pending in the Presidency Magistrate's Court in the Suburbs under the old Rules of the ex-Suburban Municipalities, 122 fresh prosecutions were launched for non-compliance with requisitions under various Sections of the Act.
 - 7. In all 667 Notices were issued under different Sections of the Municipal Actions provent of the

Stringent action was taken under Section 349 of the Greater Bombay Municipal Corporation Act for the removal of structures of inflammable materials. Several structures were removed by departmental action where the parties failed to remove them.

- 8. The total number of buildings constructed by private enterprise and Co-operative Housing Societies during the year was 2,270, 2,022 being residential and 248 non-residential, thereby providing accommodation for about 45,400 persons.
 - 9. In all 339 completion certificates were received and disposed of during the year.

 MAINTENANCE OF ROADS.

- 10. Out of the total length of about 122.51 miles of roads included within the extended city limits, there are 18.69 miles of bituminous roads, 45.80 miles of metalled roads, 49.39 miles of asphalt and concrete roads and 8.63 miles of non-metalled and kutcha roads and the expenditure incurred on their maintenance was Rs. 58,686-7-0 during the year against the sanctioned Budget provision of Rs. 2,00,000 under Maintenance of Roads.
- 11. Water bound and kutcha roads covering a length of 54.43 miles were watered on alternate days with available vehicles during dry season and the expediture incurred thereon amounted to Rs. 834-4-0.

 RENEWAL OF ROAD SURFACES.

12. The total cost of renewing the surfaces of roads in the Suburbs was estimated at about Rs. 4,43,736 as shown in Appendix "C" the provision for which was made in the Revenue Budget 'D' under New Works' VIII.—Roads, Drains and Sewers. As the estimates for this work were framed prior to the merger revised estimates had to be prepared and much progress could not therefore be done. The work of resurfacing an area of about 53,578 square yards by Recondo process entrusted to Messrs. Recondo Ltd., at an estimated cost of The remaining the property of the dead Rs. 1,90,934 was in progress.

PUBLIC LIGHTING. 13. Majority of public streets in the Suburban area are at present lighted with electricity. Incandescent oil lighting is resorted to only in places where electricity is not available. Messrs. Bombay Suburban Electric Supply Ltd., have been entrusted with the work of public street lighting in the entire suburbs except in Bhandup where Thana Electric Supply Co. is operating. The cost of maintaining and lighting streets both by electric and incandescent oil lamps, 3,796 in number, amounted to Rs. 1,31,945-2-0 during the year against the Budget provision of Rs. 1,75,949.

CITY SURVEY OF THE SUBURBAN AREA.

- 14. There are no maps available for the Suburban region excepting survey sheets to the scale of 330' to an inch drawn up from a survey undertaken years ago. These sheets are not upto date and being on a very small scale, they are not useful for the purpose of regional planning. For the proper and orderly development it is absolutely necessary to undertake a land survey of this region and prepare maps to the scale of 40' to an inch showing the general topography, character and use of land, existing roads, tracks, open drains, wells, private holdings, buildings with the number of storeys, public gardens, open spaces agricultural lands, waste lands, etc. These maps would be useful not only in planning the general development but also for the designing the drainage schemes for the Suburbs.
- on the scale of 40' to an inch. A similar survey for the Ghatkopar and Kirol area has now been entrusted to the Collector, Bombay Suburban District at an estimated cost of Rs. 23,000 against the provision of Rs. 20,000 earmarked in Budget 'D' for 1951-52. This survey will be self supporting as the amount will be refunded by Government to the Municipality on recovery of Sanad fees of equal amount from the property holders. The survey for the remaining area will have to be taken up and completed in the next two or three years after providing adequate funds in the Budget.

TOWN PLANNING SCHEMES.

- 16. Prior to the merger there were various Town Planning Schemes in various steps in the Suburban area. Though the ex-Bandra and Ghatkopar Municipalities obtained sanction from Government for variations in their original Town Planning Schemes, sulficient time was not available at the disposal of this department to go through the details and to prepare and pubilsh the draft variations of each scheme within the prescribed time limit of one year. Necessary permission of Government to extend the time-limit by one year has been applied for as required under sub-section (I) of section 10 of the Bombay Town Planning Act, for the nine Town Planning Schemes viz., Town Planning Schemes Nos. I, II, III, IV, V and VI for Bandra, Town Planning Scheme No. III for Santacruz, and Town Planning Scheme No. I and II for Ghatkopar.
- 17. The various Town Planning Schemes being framed and executed by different smaller authorities, exhibit no uniform policy or principles. After merger, it has become obvious that all the Schemes require variation so as to regulate them on a uniform basis. There are about 25 Town Planning Schemes which too require variation and the work was taken in hand. A policy similar to the one adopted in respect of Mandvi and Mahim Town Planning Schemes is now followed in the Suburban area in the matter of allowing construction prior to finalising the vairation by taking a suitable agreement and demanding adequate deposit. The cost of the work is likely to be recouped out of the advances of Town Planning work.

ner and the set to count if the state of the set of the 18. A great deal of improvement needs to be made in the existing roads in the suburbs. To start with steps have been taken to prescribe regular lines under Section 297(1)(A) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act to prevent construction of buildings on roadside lands which might be required for future widening. Plans have also been prepared showing the exact alignments of new roads (vide Appendix 'D') which have been approved by the Corporation under Section 348(1)(b).

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

- 19. The total expenditure incurred on the maintenance of functioning sewers extending to a length of 28 miles in the Suburban area amounted to Rs. 9,012-8-0 during the year against the provision of Rs. 38,000 made in Budget 'D' under VIII.—Roads, Drains and Sewers.
- 20. A sewerage scheme for the whole of the Suburban area is being worked out on regional basis and will be submitted to the Corporation in due course. In the meantime, it was decided to take in hand the work of execution on some of the sewers in Bandra and Santacruz area to the extent of Rs. 4,26,215 and tenders were invited for the works mentioned below:
 - (1) Sewers in Ghodbunder Road and South Avenue.

(2) Sewer in Linking Road, T. P. S. Bandra. (3) Sewer in 2nd Hashnabad Lane and Convent Avenue, Francis Avenue and St. Josephs Avenue (Santacruz).

A provision of Rs. 2,00,000 has been made in the Loan Works Budget 'D' for the year 1951-52 for these works

- 21. There are in all 4 pumping stations in the Suburbs, out of which Bunderwadi is the main pumping Station and Chimbai, Jaibharat and Khar are the auxiliary pumping stations.
- (a) Bunderwadi Pumping Station.—This pumping station worked non-stop throughout the year. It is equipped with three 13 H. P. pumps, each of 600 gallons per month capacity. Sewage pumped during the dry weather months amounted to 4,83,050 gallons per day, as against 5,08,725 gallons for the last year but during the monsoon, it amounted to 7,55,300 gallons per day as against 5,30,550 gallons for the last year.
- This pumping station is inadequate to cope with the quantity of sewage reaching it, from the areas directly connected to it especially during the rainy season. Due to this the other two pumping stations (Chimbai and Khar) remained closed in the monsoon and the sewage reaching them was allowed to overflow from the sump into the creek. Proposals for constructing additional sewers are under consideration and when these are provided, the capacity of the pumping station would be adequately increased by erecting, if necessary, an additional Pumping station by the side of the existing one.

- (b) Chimbai Pumping Station.—This Pumping Station worked satisfactorily. During the dry weather months it pumped 1,20,608 gallons per day against 1,08,330 gallons per day during the year 1949-50.
- (c) Jai-Bharat Pumping Station.—This station was taken over for maintenance in November 1950 from the Jaibharat Housing Society. There is only one horizontal Kirloskar Pump of 15 H. O., which worked satisfactorily. Only 32 houses are connected to this pumping station and consequently it worked daily for about 15 minutes in the morning and about 15 minutes in the evening during the dry season. As there is no stand by pump steps are being taken to install an additional pump.
- (d) Khar Pumping Station.—This pumping station did not work satisfactorily. It is equipped with two pumps of 15 H. P. each, designed for 440 V.50 V. A. C. supply. It suffers from one draw-back viz., that of under-voltage. Steps are being taken to remove this defect. Due to this, only one pump worked during the year and that too, for an hour or so, daily; the other pump being in need of heavy repairs was immediately attended to and is expected to be ready for use by the end of July 1951.

The quantity of sewage pumped during the year from the different pumping stations is given in Appendix 'E'.

INSPECTION OF FACTORIES, WORKSHOPS AND WORK PLACES.

22. The total number of permits and license cases inspected and disposed of during the year was 20. Three nuisance cases were attended to and necessary steps taken.

Surprise visits were also paid to several factories to find whether these factories were given permits. No notices were issued under Rule 392.

The total number of new cases inspected was 17.

Appendix 'F' gives the detailed information regarding the inspection of the factories and workshops.

GENERAL REMARKS.

- 23. Since the merger, the public in Suburbs have been demanding amenities as at present enjoyed by the Citizens of Bombay. It was very difficult to make provision in 'D' Budget in the initial stage of amenities on the lines immediately after the merger. Provision was made for the most essential amenities such as improvement in the existing system of roads in the Suburbs, construction of relief sewers, additional sewers, pumping stations, disposal works, in the Budget Estimates 'D' for 1950-51 on the basis of block estimates and subject to approval of the Works Committee and the Corporation to the detailed plans and estimates.
- 24. Scarcity of road materials and dearth of skilled labour were responsible for non-execution of important construction works provided in the Budget of 1950-51. Estimates framed for different roads and sewers by the Ex-Suburban Municipalities had also to be substantially modified to conform to the regional planing proposed in the Master Plan for Greater Bombay.
- 25. Proposals for construction of new private buildings have been steadily pouring in due to partial relaxation of restrictions on building materials. The transfer of Municipal administration of the Suburbs to the City Corporation has, to some extent, helped in stimulating building activities.

Large advances, it is found, will be necessary for implementing various Town Planning Schemes when the variations are finalised. These would, however, be subject to recoupment from various sources of contribution. Funds will also be required for the drainage and sewage disposal schemes, construction of new roads, improvement of the existing roads and lighting. To achieve this it would be advisable to chalk out a five year programme involving an average expenditure of not less than Rs. 50 lakhs per year.

(6) In the City water is supplied to consumers for a restricted period of 8 to 10 hours a day through two central reservoirs and directly from trunk mains, the supply for domestic purposes being charged on the basis of rateable value of the properties served. O consumer and the properties served.

In the Suburban areas, on the other hand, water is supplied for all 24 hours of the day, except for certain elevated localities in Bandra, namely Bandra Hill and Pali Hill, which receive water for 10 hours at night time through Bandra and Malla Pumping Stations respectively. Water supply for all purposes is charged on the

basis of measurement by meter.

(7) The Western Division comprising of H and K wards includes Bandra, Khar, Danda, Santacruz, Western Division.

The tanks at Juhu and Andheri were seldom put to use as these are more or less balancing reservoirs.

The Reservoir at Vile-Parle supplied water to areas around Paranipe and Tejpal Schemes which are about 1½ miles to the north-east of Vile-Parle Railway Station.

The Reservoir at Malla in Bandra is an underground one. (Water is pumped from this Reservoir by means of two electrically operated pumping sets to the localities on Pali Hill.

(14) About a hundred complaints were received from tenants regarding absence of piped supply to their premises. The Section in the Municipal Act, which enables the Municipality to compel the landlords to take water connections is not applicable in the Suburbs. Nor is it desirable to make that Section applicable by an amendment of the Act, until drainage is provided. Hence the landlords are persuaded to take additional connections and in a few cases, additional connections were taken. About 800 complaints were received regarding inadequate water supply. These were mostly due to local defects in service pipes. The owners were requested to get the service pipes cleaned or repaired in order to improve the supply. A few complaints, however, pertaining to defective layout of service pipes, indequate sizes of connections. tions, absence or inadequacy of facilities for storage of water, etc., were also received. In these cases also the owners were requested to remove the defects.

- (15) Four pumping sets (two at Malla and two at Bandra Hill) were maintained at a total cost of Rs. 5,010. Maintenance of Pumping As these were found to be inadequate, tenders were invited for the purchase of pumping sets.

IV.—METER SECTION.

- (20) There are three Meter Workshops in the Suburban areas. (1) at Bandra Municipal Office, (2) at Kurla Municipal Office and (3) at Vile Parle Reservoir. Municipal as well as private Meter Workshops. Meters were tested, cleaned, overhauled and repaired at these Workshops. As the necessity of having a Meter Workshop on modern lines with elaborate arrangements for repairing meters of all sizes was keenly felt, it was proposed to erect a Meter Workshop at Ghatkopar Water-Works Yard at an estimated cost of Rs. 68,000. The work was started in March 1951 and the new Workshop is expected to begin functioning in 1951-52.
 - (21) During the year 2,024 Municipal meters of different sizes were tested at the three Municipal Meter Workshops. In addition, 886 meters (both Municipal and private) were tested at the request of the owners. The revenue derived from testing of water meters amounted Testing of meters. to about Rs. 4,000.

Administrative approval for (1) laying of 6" main on Bandra Chodbunder Road connecting the existing dead ends of 3" mains at Vile Parle and Santacruz and (2) laying of 4" main along Besant Street, Santacruz, was obtained, but these works which were held up due to non-availability of C. I. pipes, would be taken in hand on receipt of asbestos cement pressure pipes for the purchase of which necessary arrangements are being made.

The Children's apparata was shifted to a convenient place and a new sliding chute and see-saws were installed. Four new entrances with bowers and turnstiles were also provided. The work of renovating the Ishwarlal Park at Vile Parle was also taken in hand and all the lawns were ex cavated for being relaid. The work of renovating the remaining five Parks in the Suburbs will be taken in hand next year for which sufficient provisions will be made in the next year's Budget. All these Parks were temporarily put in shape by cutting hedges, levelling pathways, etc.

The provisions of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act pertaining to Encroachments were applied from 1st October 1950. A system of licensing Hawkers and Squatters existed in the ex-Bandra, Kurla and Juhu Municipal areas only. The total fee realised came to Rs. 4,253-5-0 as against Rs. 12,185-3-0 realised during the year 1949-50. The fall was due to the non payment of fees by Squatters at Juhu. Besides a sum of Rs. 7,139-15-0 was received by Assistant Engineer (Suburbs) from unauthorized squatters and cabins at Kurla. No Licences under Sections 313 and 313A were granted during the period from 1st October 1950 to 31st March 1951. A number of Reserved Areas were proposed and the approval of the Commissioner of Police was awaited. A lorry for the removal of the encroachment was also purchased at the end of the year but had not been put into commission.

Parking Grounds.

Prior to merger; the Juhu Municipality collected charges on account of parking of cars, etc., at 4 parking grounds at Juhu. The Juhu Municipality had prescribed a schedule of fees for this purpose with the sanction of the Commissioner. N.D. and the same was continued during the year under report. One of these grounds had been taken on lease from the Government of India for which rent and a miety of net income is paid to the Government of India each year. The revenue from this source amounted to about Rs. 12,000. Prior to 1st September 1950 the work of collection of parking fees was done under the supervision of A.E. (Suburbs).

Prosecutions.—93 cases were pending at the close of the year 1949-50, and during the year 892 prosecutions were launched as against 226 filed in the year 1949-50. Of these, in 823 cases convictions were obtained, 3 cases were withdrawn and in 9 cases the accused were acquitted. One case was dismissed and one case abated because of the death of the accused. The number of cases pending at the end of the year was 148.

Fines.—The fines realised amounted to Rs. 24,968 as against Rs. 5,625 in the year 1949-50 giving an average of Rs. 30 per case. i e America govern american in it for the state.

Grant-in-Aid.—On a representation made by the Bombay Municipal Corporation, Government sanctioned a grant-in-aid of Rs. 3,828 for the year 1946-47, 1947-48 and 1948-49 in respect of the administration of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act in Bandra Municipal area, which was not claimed by that Municipality prior to merger. Government also sanctioned a grant-in-aid of Rs. 6,174-4-9 for the year 1949-50 in respect of the administration of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act in the Suburbas area. A sum of Rs. 4,510-8-0 was also received by way of Registration fees and fees for notice of change under Sections 7 and 8 of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act, 1948. The expenditure incurred on the administration of the Act was Rs. 17,645-11-6.

Shri V. G. Sukhthankar, Chief Inspector, was in charge of the Department from 15th April 1950 to 30th September 1950 and Shri T. K. Talwalkar, Assistant Superintedent of Markets (Suburbs) for the remaining period of the year.

There were 15 Municipal Markets and 5 Municipal Slaughter Houses as shown in Appendix 'A'. Besides, there were 3 Markets owned by private parties but only two were proposed to be licensed and the one at Bhandup, owned by Papa Miya, not being in conformity with Market and Building Bye-laws, was proposed to be closed

The Suburban area was divided into two Sections for administrative convenience-one on the east side of the G.I.P. Railway and the other on the west. Each section was supervised by a Senior Inspector.

Markets.

Prior to the merger, the Suburban markets were either under the Health or Engineering Departments of the ex-Municipalities. There was no uniformity of administration. Each Ex-Local body had its separate fee schedule and stallage charges, which were much below the prevailing standard. The stalls were also haphazardly arranged and some of them were let out for non-marketable commodities, resulting in congestion.

In 'H' Ward there were six markets. Prior to the merger these were under the control of a Superintendent of Markets, who was responsible for the sanitation of the Markets only, the revenue being collected by farming out the right bi-annually. On expiry of the contract on 30th September 1950, stallages and fees were recovered departmentally as per Schedule prevailing in the City Markets.

In 'K' Ward there were two Municipal Markets and the revenue was collected departmentally as per scale of fees laid down by the Ex-Municipality.

In 'L' Ward, there were two Markets. There was also an open air market, functioning as a squatter The revenues were collected departmentally as per scale of fees laid down by the Ex-Municipality.

In 'M' Ward, there was only one Market known as Chembur Municipal Market, established by the Ex-Gram Panchayat. Fees and stallages were collected departmentally on daily basis. And to find the first term of the fi

In 'N' Ward there were two Markets. (1) Vegetable Market in the compound of the Municipal Office and (2) Mutton Market, known as Chiragnagar Municipal Market. Fees were recovered departmentally on daily basis in respect of vegetable market, while the stallage charges for the mutton stalls were recovered

As the stallages and fees prevailing in the Suburban Markets were much below the standard, steps were taken to revise the same from 1st April 1951, by applying the Bombay Schedule with certain modifications to suit the local conditions.

In all, 149 applications were received for outside meat shops, including 48 shops already functioning prior to the merger. Out of these applications 45 proposals were approved, 68 rejected and 36 were under disposal.

With a view to expand the marketing facilities to meet the growing population in the suburbs, a survey was made and some areas were selected for new markets as under :

H Ward.

- (1) Danda near the quarry.
- (2) Plot ear-marked at Kherwadi.

K Ward.

- Vile Parle.
- Versova.

L Ward.

(5) One full-fledged market at a central place at Kurla.

M Ward.

(6) Proposed weekly bazar to be held on the plot adjacent to the Chembur Market, owned by Government.

N Ward.

(7) A plot in Town Planning Scheme ear-marked for a full-fledged market on Agra Road.

Slaughter Houses.

The condition of existing Slaughter Houses was much below the standard required. With a view, to raise the standard, it was considered desirable to centralise slaughter of animals for the B.B. & C.I. side at Bandra Slaughter House and G.I.P. side at Kurla Slaughter Houses. In pursuance of this, steps were taken at Kurla Beef Slaughter House to bring under one management and one set of regulations the slaughter of cattle intended for Kurla as well as City consumption. Further plans are being drawn for the centralisation of sheep slaughter also at Bandra Slaughter House for the entire Suburban area.

The total receipts for the year under report, amounted to Rs. 2,93,802-5-3 including Rs. 32,160 being the share of 'A' Budget for the animals slaughtered for Bombay at Kurla Slaughter House, as against the estimated income of Rs. 2,77,723. In addition to this a sum of Rs. 25,761 being the share of Entrance fees for the animals admitted at Bandra Slaughter House and also a sum of Rs. 9,000 being the fees for animals removed by private parties from the Bandra Fair Ground for slaughter in the Superior the same recoverable from 'A' Budget. Thus the actual revenue exceeded the estimated income by Rs. 18,680 approximately.

The total expenditure incurred during the year amounted to Rs. 71,690

Appendix 'B' shows the total receipts and expenses in respect of each market.

Appendix 'C' gives the amounts realised during the year under different items of revenue.

All markets were regularly inspected. Efforts were made to improve their condition. Careful supervision was exercised over the stalls with regard to the wholesomeness of articles offered for sale thereat. Unwholesome articles such as meat, fish, vegetables at different Markets and Slaughter Houses together with contraband meat weighing about 5,595 Lbs., in the aggregate were destroyed during the year. The

In all 23 raids were carried out for detecting unauthorised sale and slaughter of animals in different parts of the suburbs. Prosecutions were instituted against the offenders, resulting in 9 convictions. The total amount of fines inflicted was Rs. 105 during the year. Suburbs. EDUCATION.

Administration Report for the year 1950-51.

Suburban Primary Schools.

As a result of the merger, the Primary Schools in the area came under the control and management of the Schools Committee. The Bandra School Board and Bombay Suburban District School Board, Andheri, were amalgamed and brought under one roof at Andheri. Shri M. P. Shah, B.Sc., B.T., T.D. (Lond)., LL.B., Superintendent, Municipal Gujarati Hindi and Aided Schools, was placed in charge of the administration in the Suburbs in addition to his own duties and he reamined in charge of the schools during the year under report. Smt. Kapila T. Khandvala, B.A., B.T. (Bom)., M.A. (U.S.A.), Secretary, Schools Committee, exercised general control over the administration.

The Schools Committee was in possession of 39 Municipal Schools of Bandra and 59 of the Bombay Suburban District with 21,614 pupils on the roll. 61 Private Primary Schools 29 of Bandra and 32 of the Bombay Suburban District also came under the control of the Committee. Appendix 'A' gives the list of Municipal Schools in the suburbs. There were 535 ordinary and 3 special teachers in Municipal Schools at the time of transfer. The number of ordinary teachers increased to 638 at the end of the year. One Head Clerk's post was created for the Suburban Office and the office work was brought on the lines with that of the City Office. The supervision work of all the Schools in the Suburbs was entrusted to the Superintendents of the and the straight City schooks.

As the Suburban Schools had no adequate arrangement for storing drinking water and had no peons for cleaning school premises and for bringing children to schools, immediate arrangements Furniture and Equipment.

bad to be made to provide vessels and 113 peons were appointed in different schools for bringing children to schools. This facility increased the number of children and stabilised the attendance. Equipment such as Maps, charts, slates, drawing and science materials, sewing articles and new furniture such as benches, dual desks, infant seats, cupboards, trunks, chairs and tables were also provided in some of the schools.

There were 29 Municipal owned School buildings in which 28 schools were housed as shown in Appendix

1 accommodation B. Of the eight buildings under construction at the time of the merger the following four have since been completed.

(1) Madh Marathi School.

(2) Mahul Gavanpada Marathi School. (3) New Mandala Marathi School.

(4) Jogeshwari Gumpha Marathi School and Hindi Class.

The following four buildings are still under construction:

- (1) Shri Manilal Sundarji Gujarati School, Vile Parle, West.
- (2) Vile Parle (East) School. (3) Koldongri Marathi School.

(4) Agripada Marathi School.

A building for Kurla Hindi School will be constructed after a suitable site is secured.

New premises were secured for Kirol Marathi School, Govandi Station Marathi School, Machhlimar Sindhi School, Gavdevi (Andheri) Marathi School and Urdu Class, and Takya Gujarati School. A new building constructed by Covernment for the Chembur Sindhi Camp and Hindi Primary Schools was partially handed over to the Municipality by Government under certain stipulations.

Six Marathi Schools, one Gujarati School, one Hindi Class and one Urdu Class were opened during the year. One private Hindi School at Versova was taken over under Municipal management. Five Boys' and Girls' Schools were amalgamated. New Schools and Classes.

The Shift System which was in vogue for Standards I and II, was abolished and instead schools were beld in two sessions where the accommodation was found to be inadequate. School A:lministration of Schools. timings, diaries for teachers, Progress Cards for students and weekly tests were introduced in accordance with the practice in the City Schools. The system of common Annual Examination from Standards IV to VI was followed and promotions to students of Standard I to III were given according to the Student's progress in weekly tests.

There was no Basic Primary School in the Suburbs but cardboard modelling and Spinning as crafts were continued to be taught in some of the Suburban Schools with the help of Government Basic Education. trained teachers.

Scholarships to the extent of Rs. 990 were awarded to Harijan children and children of the labouring classes studying in Upper Primary Standards. From March 1951 the rates of fees in Upper Primary Schools and Free Studentships and half Free Studentships for the Scholarships, Fees and City Schools were also introduced on City lines.

(A) Physical Instruction and Scouting.—Full advantage was taken of the compounds and open spaces around the schools for imparting physical instruction. Scouting and Guiding was introduced in a few schools. Mass Drill Rallies were held at Bandra and Kurla. Miscellaneous Annual Sports for Suburban School children were also held along with the City Schools Sports.

- (B) SharadUtsav and Exhibition.—Sharad Utsav functions were held at five Centres by groups of schools at Bandra, Andheri, Kurla, Chatkopar and Chembur. Teachers and students enthusiastically co-operated in making the functions successful.
- (C) Vacation Libraries.—Vacation Libraries at five Centres during Summer Vacation of 1950 and six Centres during Diwali holidays were opened and the students in the area who had not gone out during the holidays took advantage of these libraries.

- (D) Census.—With the help of the staff of the City Attendance Office, a census of school-going age children was taken and it was followed up by a drive to bring in non-attending children to schools. There was a marked improvement in enrolling new children and in the attendance of pupils.
- (E) Opening Ceremonies of Schools.—The new school building constructed for the Madh Marathi School was declared open on 30th December 1950 by Shri S, K. Patil, the Mayor of Greater Bombay. The building for Jogeshwari Goompha School was declared open on 3rd September 1950 by Shri V. B. Worlikar, the Chairman, Schools Committee, when a function was held under the Presidentship of the Hon'ble Shri V. L. Mehta, Finance Minister, Government of Bombay.
- (F) Other functions.—The schools in the suburbs celebrated Independence Day, Republic Day, Social Education Week, Vanamahotsav with all enthusiasm and brought about contact with parents who were acquainted with the nature of work done in schools. This also attracted more pupils to schools. The teachers also cooperated in the collection of the Mayor's Assam Earthquake Relief Fund, Social Education Week Fund, Anti-Tuberculosis Fund and Blind Relief Fund.
- The Municipal Grant-in-aid Code was made applicable to the Suburban Private Primary Schools which came under Municipal control. They were visited and inspected by the Officers of the Schools.

 Aided and Recognised Aided Department in the City. As per rules, an amount of Rs. 1,33,615 was assessed as grant-in-aid in favour of the Aided Schools but a cut of 7 per cent had to be applied to accommodate the expenditure within the Budget Grant of Rs. 1,25,000.

On account of the enforcement of Bombay Act XLVIII of 1950 from 1st January 1951, the Accounts Second Amendment of the Suburban Office was brought over to the Gilder Tank Building and was placed under the supervision of the Superintedent of Accounts, Education Fund, under the Chief Accountant.

ADMINISTRATION REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1950-51 OF MUNICIPAL HIGH SCHOOL, BANDRA.

The School was founded in 1902 by the ex-Bandra Municipality originally as an A. V. School which was converted into a full-fledged High School in the year 1941, sending up students to the Secondary School Certificate Examination. The School is housed in 3 buildings of which one was constructed by the ex-Municipality at a cost of Rs. 15,990.

During the year under report, Shri R. Y. Kulkarni and Shri S. N. Koppal were Head and Assistant Masters respectively of the Municipal High School at Bandra. The strength of the High School was 374 (including 100 girls) of whom 115 belonged to advanced, 161 intermediate (including Muslims) and the remaining 54 belonging to the Scheduled Classes. In all 14 classes were maintained including 3 Urdu and 2 Gujarathi.

The School is working in two shifts from 7-15 A.M. to 11-45 A.M. for Middle School Classes and from 12 noon to 5-30 P.M. for High School Classes.

Out of 25 members on the Teaching Staff, 11 are B. T.s and 7 are fully trained lady teachers.

The Management of the School was taken over by the Corporation on 15th April 1950 with a balance of Rs. 1,876-14-10 in cash and Rs. 2,500 in Government Securities.

The Corporation had to bear a deficit of Rs. 14,792-5-0 as under:

Various extra curricular activities were organised by the staff and the students during the year.

Of the students sent up for the last Secondary School Certificate Examination 50 per cent were successful. All the students sent up for Drawing Examination were successful, two of them securing distinction and cash

The fees of the poor and deserving Muslim students attending the School were paid by the Muslim Welfare Union, Bandra.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT HEALTH OFFICER (SUBURBS).

for 1950.

Preliminary.—Dr. B. R. Master held the post of the Assistant Health Officer (Suburbs) from 15th April 1950, till the time of superannuation on 11th January 1951 and Dr. V. T. Vagh, held the charge of the post for the remaining period.

Review of the year.—Before the administration was taken over by the Bombay Municipal Corporation, the merged area was under the control of five different Borough Municipalities, three Village Panchayats and thirty-five villages under Bombay Suburban District Local Board as shown in the Statement A

After the merger on 15th April 1950, the area was divided into five administrative wards and demarcated as shown in Statement 'B'.

Prior to the merger no measures were undertaken as regards sanitation of villages, control of licensable commodities, trades and factories and improvement of the sanitary condition of milch cattle stables and dewlling houses in the suburbs. The work of collection and compilation of vital statistics, in the merged area, was carried out in a most rudimentary way.

Owing to influx of the displaced persons a good deal of population, is housed in unauthorized structures and the Suburbs are developed irregularly without any approach roads and proper planning. The standard of sanitary services rendered was also obsolete. The Public Health work in the suburbs was mainly confined to conservancy service. After the merger, steps were taken to improve the sanitary services.

With the integration of the services of different areas, the work was departmentalized and the question of improving the services, was taken in hand. With a view, to increase the efficiency of the Department and bring the same on modern lines, the following three main factors had to be considered

- (1) Augmentation and re-adjustment of the administrative and supervising staff of the Department.
- (2) Standardization of the grades of different categories and improvement of service conditions of the employees.
- (3) Provision of modern equipment, for the Conservancy and other out-door branches.

For the purpose of sanitary administration, the whole merged area was divided into two parts, viz., one on the east side covering the area of Kurla, Chembur, including Trombay, Ghatkopar, Bhandup and the others on the west side covering the areas of Bandra, and Parle-Andheri. Each of these two divisions was divided into two Wards and each ward was placed in charge of the Medical Officer of Health whose duties were :— et

- (1) Supervision over registration of Births and Deaths and collection of Vital Statistics.
- (2) Inspection and supervision of all premises, with a view to detecting sanitary defects and taking steps to rectify them.
- (3) Maintenance of premises, in a sanitary state, by taking action against defaulters and enforcement of sanitary regulations.
- (4) Sanitary control over factories, licensable trades and industrial workers.

The Medical Officer of Health in each ward was assisted by the sanitary staff consisting of Medical Assistants, Inspectors, Disinfecting Staff and Birth and Death Registration Karkoons.

For the purpose of Vital Statistics the Suburban area was divided into four districts consisting of 30 sections as shown below —

Prior to the merger, the sanitary staff was practically looking after the conservancy work. Immediate steps were, therefore, taken to separate the two functions. Accordingly, the staff of the Conservancy Branch, both in-door and out-door, was separated from the sanitary side and augmented to suit the modern requirements. The health of Suburbs depends upon the co-operation, with which the two branches, sanitary and conservancy work.

Area and Population.—The area of the Suburbs taken over by the Bombay Municipal Corporation is 41,901 acres and the population as per census of 1951 is 5,10,151.

The mean density of population roughly works out at 12.175 per acre.

Births and Birth Rate.—The total number of live births registered during the year was 8,335, which was 1,015 in excess of that in 1949.

The number of live births registered during each month of the years 1949 and 1950 is shown in Table No. I.

The birth rate was 16.7 per thousand for the Suburbs, but it cannot be regarded as accurate as the figure was based on the information given by the public.

Negligence on the part of parents, as well as the custom of the people sending mothers out of Bombay, soon after child-birth but before its registration, can be mentioned as two of the causes whereby births escape registration in the Suburbs. The system of registration was improved upon tand house to house enquiries were started with the help of the increased staff of birth registration Karkoons.

The number of still-births was not available.

Deaths and Death Rate.—The total number of deaths registered from all causes during the year was 3,625 as against 3,915 in 1949.

The death rate was 7.2 per thousand, on the estimated population of about 5,00,000. The death rate (like the birth rate) for the Suburbs could not be said to be accurate for want of proper registration of deaths. All the cemeteries in the Suburbs being private there was no Municipal control over them. The dead bodies were disposed of without obtaining previous permission from Municipal authorities. There was no system of issuing passes to the mourners as in the City, the death being reported at the Municipal Offices and the cause of death was assigned or determined, on the statement made by the relatives and friends of the deceased. The system followed in the City was gradually adopted in the Suburbs and the owners and trustees were asked to register the cemeteries as required by the provision of Section 435 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

Mortality figures.—Of the total number of 3,625 deaths in the year 1950, 1904 were among males and 1,721 were among females.

Principal Causes of Death.—The information regarding deaths from Epidemic Diseases and certain other principal causes of deaths in 1950 is given in Table No. III.

Mortality by Months.—Table No. II gives the number of deaths registered in each month of the year with the corresponding figures for 1949.

Copies of Death and Birth Certificates issued.—During the year 846 copies of registry of death and 223 copies of certificates of birth were issued. The total fees received amounted to Rs. 544-5-0.

Infant Mortality.—Deaths among infants under one year of age numbered 1,076 which exceeded by 112, the figure in the preceding year. The infant mortality rate was 129.09 per 1,000 live births for the year 1950.

Meteorology of 1950.—Table No. IV gives the meteorological data of 1950.

Rainfall.—The total rainfall in inches recorded at the Santa Cruz Observatory during the year 1950 was 70.54. The highest monthly rainfall was 32.74 inches in July 1950.

EPIDEMIC AND OTHER DISEASES.

Notification of Infectious Diseases.—Notification of infectious diseases was done to a greater extent by medical practitioners during the year under report.

Plague.—No plague case was reported and consequently no special measures for rat destruction, inoculation, etc., were taken.

Small-pox.—Small-pox caused 80 deaths, Calf lymph vaccination was offered as a measure of personal prophylaxis. The number of primary vaccinations done during the period under report was 8,068 and that of re-vaccinations was 12,961.

Cholera.—The incidence of cholera was reported to be on the increase in the suburbs in the Second Week of July 1950 and a temporary staff of 6 Medical Assistants, 4 Supervisors, 2 Junior Overseers and 44 Labourers was requisitioned for this purpose for a period of one month and the anti-cholera campaign was carried on from 20th July 1950 to 25th August 1950.

Free inoculation centres were opened at the following Institutions in the Suburbs:

(1) Bhabha Hospital, Bandra.

Ramkrishna Mission Ashram, Khar. Residents' Association Charitable Dispensary, Santa Cruz.

(4) N. J. Wadia Dispensary, Andheri.
(5) Yeshodabai Monji Vora Free Dispensary, Vile Parle.
(6) Bhabha Hospital, Kurla.

(6) Bhabha Hospital, Kurla.
(7) Municipal Dispensary, Chembur.

Cholera vaccine was supplied free, to Medical Practitioners on requisition. The campaign lasted for about a month, during which period 1,20,295 inoculations were performed.

All wells of the Suburbs were disinfected with potassium permanganate. Articles of food, exposed to dust and flies, were seized and destroyed. Places infected and likely to cause infection, were immediately dis-infected. Markets and sweetmeat shops were particularly watched and were treated with D.D.T. Particular attention was paid to cleaning of drains, etc., and sanitation in general. Propaganda in public places was carried on, by posters and by other literature on cholera-

All these measures had the desired effect and the disease was brought under control in a short time.

Influenza.—No deaths were reported.

Enteric Fever.—19 Deaths were reported from this disease. Inoculations against typhoid were per formed by the Medical Staff, as well as by Private Medical Practitioners to whom T.A.B. Vaccine was supplied free of charge.

Poliomyelitis.—No case was reported.

Policing Life Small-mer Merits

Diphtheria.—Attacks were not recorded but only 3 deaths were reported during the year.

Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis.—One death was reported;

Malaria.—86 deaths were reported from Malarial fever. Anti-mosquito measures under the supevision of the Insecticide Officer were started from 1st October 1950 in H and K Wards, where mosquito nuisance was in predominance.

-194 Deaths were reported and the death rate was 38 per 1,000. No special measures Tuberculosis.for the prevention of Tuberculosis, were undertaken and relief was obtained from the Institutions in the City

Venereal Diseases.—No special facilities were available to combat these diseases in the Suburbs.

Leprosy.—In the absence of Municipal Institutions for isolation and treatment of cases of this disease in the Suburbs and also in the City, the Acworth Leprosy Home at Matunga and Albless Leprosy Home at Trombay, have been doing valuable work, for control of this communicable disease.

Disinfection.—Disinfection of houses was carried out, wherever cases of Infectious Diseases occurred.

Food Sanitation.—276 Prosecutions were instituted and a fine of Rs. 9,114 was realised.

Information regarding the Court cases filed under different sections of the Borough Municipal Act and Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and the cases outstanding as on 1st January 1951 is given in Table No. V.

GENERAL REMARKS.

- (1) Milch Cattle Stables.—As the Bombay Municipality does not allow the establishment of a Milch Cattle Stable in the City, hundreds of Milch Cattle Stables, small and big, have sprung up in the suburbs for which no licences have been issued and on which there is no sanitary control. Most of the stables are in zavli sheds or in unauthorised structures very close to or in the midst of fully developed residential areas. There being no sewerage system in the suburbs, the discharges soak and saturate in the sub-soil near the stable. No arrangement exists for the collection, removal and disposal of dung and stable-litter at the sables and the vicinity is exposed to the risk of nuisance from smell and breeding of house flies. A systematic inspection of stables has been undertaken to bring them under control and to improve them.
- (2) Disposal of Waste Water.—On account of increase in the population, the amount of wastewater from all properties was tremendously increased, and the problem of disposal through underground drainage needs immediate attention. Soil has lost its capacity for any further absorption.
- (3) Unauthorised Structures.—A number of unauthorised structures sprang up during the last few years due to influx of population. Most of them were in insanitary condition without proper sanitary accommodation, thereby endangering public health.
- (4) Slums.—Improvement of slums is the most important problem as a number of areas in the Suburbe are overcrowded, with unauthorised structures without proper planning and proper sanitary accommodation.

(5) Planning Industries.—Factories established without permit and without sanitary accommodation were engaging the attention of the Sanitary Branch and a Factory Inspector was appointed from 16th December 1950 for inspection of these factories under the supervision of the Mechanical Engineer and preliminary information about the factories was collected.

Cemeteries.—There is no Municipal Cemetery in the Suburbs but there are about 50 private cemeteries. Steps are being taken, to take them over, wherever possible.

L-Municipal Hospitals.

History.—The Kharshedji Behramji Bhabha Hospital at Water field Road, Bandra, was erected on a plot admeasuring 7,690 square yards by the Bandra Municipality at a cost of Rs. 57,000. Generous contributions towards the cost were made by Bai Jajji, daughter of Jehangir Behmraji Gamudia to perpetuate the memory of her late husband Kharshedji Behramji Bhabha and by Government. The hospital was started in the year 1914 with one male and one female ward, each of 8 beds for indoor patients.

Subsequently, "Bai Navazbai Kharsedji Bhabha Maternity Ward" constiting of 6 beds was built by Khan Bahadur Hormusji Kharshedji Bhabha in memory of his sister Navazbai Kharsedji Bhabha and was opened on 16th February 1926.

An additional Ward called the "Bai Dinbai Kharshedji Bhabha Ward" was constructed by putting up an upper storey over the hospital building by the Bandra Municipality in the year 1939 at a cost of Rs, 25,405 of which Rs. 21,000 were donated by Bai Ratanbai, wife of Khan Bahadur Hormusji Kharshedji Bhabha in memory of Bai Dinbai, daughter of Kharshedji Behramji Bhabha and was opened on 26th January 1941. The upper storey consisted of two wards; one of 10 beds was reserved for medico-legal and accidental cases while the other one was kept vacant for want of requisite beds and other equipment due to financial stringency. It was being used as a recess and dressing room by the staff nurses. There is also an Operation Theatre and Bridge Long a Grant - Bridge 1

To meet the growing demand the number of beds on the ground floor was increased from 8 to 12 in each male and female wards. of the male and female wards.

Accommodation. Thus, the total accommodation at this Hospital was of 40 beds as detailed below. when the Bombay Municipal Corporation took over the Hospital administration:-

After the merger, it was proposed to utilise the vacant ward for a Maternity unit consisting of 10 beds and to increase the total accommodation from 40 to 50 beds.

Medico-legal as well as Post-Mortem work was carried out since the merger.

Staff.—This Hospital was in charge of a Government Resident Medical Officer, Dr. S. Y. H. Farooqui, M.B.B.S., F.C.P.S., B.M.S., (Class II) in the grade of Rs. 220-15-400-E.B.-20-500-E.B.-25-650 with private practice and rent free quarters. He was doing medical examination of the factory workers as required by the Factory Act. He was also detailed by Government to act as an Examiner for the issue of liquor permits. He was also a visiting Medical Officer for the labourers and other staff of the Aarey Colony. He was assisted by a Municipal Assistant Resident Medical Officer in the grade of Rs. 120-10-250 (plus Rs. 40) House Rent, if no free quarters are provided) plus Rs. 60 allowance for loss of private practice are provided) plus Rs. 60 allowance for loss of private practice.

Teaching.—Instructions are given to candidates appearing for the Assistant Midwives Examination held under the auspices of the Bombay Nurses and Midwives and Health Visitors Council and during the year under report 8 candidates who were trained and sent up for the Examination came out successful.

Disesases Treated.—Information regarding patients treated at the Hospital as in-door patients and the work done during three calendar years ending 31st Je ember 1950 is given in Appendix A.

Khan Bahadur Hormusji Kharshedji Bhabha Hospital, Station Road, Kurla.

History.—The Kurla Borough Municipality decided to provide a Civil Hospital in Telangwadi, Station Road, Kurla and Khan Bahadur Hormusji Kharshedji Bhabha offered a donation of Rs. 23,000 towards the construction of the Hospital including out-houses and other necessary structures in his own name. On 3rd March 1938 "Khan Bahadur Hormusji Kharshedji Bhabha Hospital" was erected at a total cost of Rs. 45,000 on Telangwadi site admeasuring about 8,548 square yards bearing No. 379, Survey No. 221, acquired by the Municipality and the building was opened by the Hon'ble Dr. M. D. D. Gilder, Minister for Public Health and Excise, Government of Bombay on the 1st of March 1939.

Accommodation.—The Hospital provides for an accommodation for 26 beds as follows:—

With the increase in the population of this area since 1940, it has been found necessary to increase the present accommodation by extending the building or erecting a storey over the present main building so as to meet with the public demand.

Medico-Legal as well as Post-Mortem work, which was being carried out prior to merger, was continued throughout the year.

Staff.—This Hospital was in charge of a Government Medical Officer, Dr. B. J. Mancharamani, M.B.B.S., B.M.S., (Class II) in the grade of Rs. 220-15-400-E.B.-20-500-E.B.-25-650 plus Rs. 18-12-0 as compensatory allowance per month with private practice and rent free quarters. He was transferred from 2nd November 1950 and Dr. N. S. Caitonde, M.B.B.S., B.M.S. Class II, took over charge of the Hospital from the same date. He was doing medical examination of the factory workers as required by the Factory Act. He was also detailed by Government to act as an examiner for the issue of liquor permits. He was assisted by a Lady Doctor in the grade of Rs. 160-4-200-8-240 per m nth with free quarters.

Quarters.—The Hospital provides free quarters to 3 Compounders, 1 Midwife, 1 Dai, 1 Male Dresser, 1 Peon and 1 Mali. The rest of the staff stay autside and are paid house rent allowance in lieu of free quarters San Bridge Committee Committee of

Diseases Treated.—Information regarding patients treated at the Hospital as in-door patients and the work done during the three years is given in a tabulated form in Appendix B.

Fees.—The in-door patients were charged fees at the following rates:—

I.—General Ward.—(i) With Hospital diet Rc. 0-12-0 per day.

(ii) Without Hospital diet Rc. 0-6-0 per day.

Those patients whose income was Rs. 40 or below were treated free.

II. Maternity Ward. With Hospital diet Rs. 4-8-0 for first day and Annas 12 for each subsequent day. Without Hospital diet Rs. 2-4-0 for first day and annas 6 for each subsequent day.

II. Municipal Maternity Homes.

(i) Shamabai Vithaldas, Khimji Municipal Maternity, Home, Ghatkopar,

History.—The Shamabai Vithaldas Khimji Municipal Maternity Home at Ghatkopar, was started in the year 1935 by a donation of a building at Oghadbhai Lane, Ghatkopar, given by the Trustees of the Shamabai Vithaldas Khimii Properties Trust for opening a Maternity Home to perpetuate the memory of the lady with a condition that the Municipality, will at all times, keep at least four beds in the Maternity Home, two of which shall be free beds and one of the two should always be reserved for women of Bhatia Community.

Accommodation.—The Maternity Home has got an accommodation of 15 beds out of which one is kept for 1st class patients, one for 2nd class patients and the rest for free and ordinary paying patients.

Staff.—This Maternity Home was in charge of a Lady Doctor, Dr. J. M. Kari, L.C.P.S., in the grade of Rs. 120-5-150 with free quarters and free lights and taps. Dr. C. M. Kamdar, D.R.C.O.G. (Lond.), L.M. (Rot), D.G.O. (Bom.), Gynaecologist and Obstetrician from Bombay rendered honorary consultation twice a week on Wednesdays and Saturdays for which he was paid an honorarium of Rs. 50 per month. If he was called on any other days. the patients had to pay his visit fees.

Building.—The present Maternity Home Building was sold years ago by the Ex-Ghatkopar Kirol Municipality for Rs. 30,000 and the Municipality pays a rent of Rs. 125 per month for the same place. The Municipality has got a sum of Rs. 35,447, out of the sale in the Maternity Home Building Fund and it is proposed that this amount should be spent in constructing a Maternity Wing in the proposed building of Seth V. C. Gandhi and Seth M. A. Vora Municipal Hospital in Rajawadi, Ghatkopar.

Quarters.—Free quarters have been provided to 1 Matron, 1 Nurse, 2 Ayahs, 1 Mali and 2 female sweepers, while the two Ayahs staying outside are paid house rent allowance of Rs. 6 each per month, in lieu of free quarters.

(3) For 2nd Class patients for 10 days, the charges are Rs. 60 and Rs. 6 per day for overstay.

(4) For ordinary paying class for 10 days, the charges are Rs. 20 and Rs. 3 per day for overstay.

MUNICIPAL MATERNITY HOME AT CHEMBUR.

History.—To meet the growing need for a Maternity Home at Chembur some leading residents of Chembur formed a Committee in 1944 with Prof. V. G. Rao as Chairman and collected from the residents donations of about Rs. 3,000 and some other gifts in the form of Hospital requisites—cots, furniture, utensils, etc., and also approached Covernment for help also approached Government for help. $(-\mathbf{r}_{i})^{-1} \cdot (\mathbf{r}_{i})^{-1} \cdot (\mathbf{r}_{i}$

As an immediate measure the Committee extended the Chembur Dispensary servant quarters at a cost of Rs. 5,000 and started the Maternity Home on 1st July 1944 with an accommodation for 6 beds. The Home was being run by the residents' Advisory Committee for three and half years.

At the end of the year 1947 the District Local Board took over complete charge of the Maternity Home.

In the year 1950, Messrs. D. K. Sandoo Bros., donated the sum of Rs. 8,000 towards the Building Fund and the District Local Board contributed Rs. 13,000 and constructed a separate building for the Maternity Home with an accommodation for 12 beds just near the old Maternity Home. The Maternity Home has been functioning at the new Building from 1st February 1951.

This Maternity Home was in charge of Dr. S. A. Muzumdar, M.B.B.S., who is the Medical Officer of the Seth Dwarkadas Tribhovandas Municipal Charitable Dispensary at Chembur. He was paid Rs. 50 per month for looking after the Maternity Home.

Quarters.—The Medical Officer has been provided with the free quarters attached to the Dispensary he rest stay outside.

DISPENSARIES.

I.—Sir Cawasji Jehangir Readymoney Dispensary, Bandra.

History—This Dispensary was originally located at Bazar Road, Bandra; and was subsequently amalgamated with the Khan Bahadur-Bhabha Hospital in the year 1914 when the building was newly constructed. It caters to the needs of the out-door patients. A nother of wardly part between suggestion

Attendance—Attendance of out-door patients for the last three years is given in Appendix. Colon out-

History-This Dispensary, was started on 5th May 1899 as a result of the donation given by Mrs. Peerozbai in memory of her husband Seth Nusserwanji Jehangir Wadia. It was conducted by the District Local Board, Bombay Suburban District under supervision of the Surgeon General with the Government of Bombay and the management was subsequently taken over by the Ex-Municipality in the year 1945. Government securities: of the value of Rs. 41,000 are held by the Municipality and the interest realized thereon forms part of the income of the Dispensary. An annual grant of Rs. 3,000 was received from the Government. The District Local Board Bombay Suburban District, contributed towards the expenditure of the Dispensary on the basis of patients attending the Dispensary from the District Local Board area. It catered to the need of outdoor patients.

Staff—This Dispensary was in charge of an experienced Medical Officer, Dr. J. M. Kotwal, M.B.B.S., in the grade of Rs. 250—50—400 plus Rs. 20 Personal Allowance with free quarters and private practice as per District Local Board and Bombay Civil Medical Service Rules.

Quarters-Only 1 Senior Compounder, 2 Junior Compounders and 1 male sweeper are provided with quarters besides the Medical Officer. One female servant (Ayah) is allowed house rent allowance of Rs. 6 per month in lieu of quarters.

Attendance — Attendance of patients treated during the three years and other information regarding operations performed and post-mortem examinations done are given in Appendix D.

III.—The Yashodabai Monji Vora Dispensary, Tejpal Road, Vile Parle (East).

History - This Dispensary, started in the year 1936, is housed in a rented building owned by Shri Mafatlal Ranchhoddas on a monthly rent of Rs. 30. It is run by the Municipality partly from the Municipal Fund and partly from the rents realised from an immoveable property named "Yashoda Niwas" on the Ram Mandir Road at Vile Parle (East) donated by Seth Monji Amidas Vora. No Medico-Legal or Post-Mortem work was done at this Dispensary and normal cases were treated.

Staff—This dispensary was in charge of a Medical Officer, Dr. G. J. Mendes, M.B.B.S., in the grade of Old-grade—Rs. 150—20—250—25—350.

New grade—Rs. 200—10—260—15—350

Attendance-Attendance of patients and other information is given in Appendix E.

IV and V—Bai Mithibai Hormasji Wadia Charitable Dispensary, Station Road, Kurla and Branch Dispensary at Old Kurla.

History—This Dispensary was started at Old Kurla in a building situated on Old Agra Road at a place called "Bail Bazar". It was opened on 1st January 1856 and is the oldest Charitable Dispensary in Kurla. As population of Old Kurla dwindled with the growth of present Kurla town, this dispensary was shifted to the town in a building known as Lavji Khimji Building and subsequently shifted to Lalji Dewraj Chawl, Kurla.

These buildings were rented at the rate of Rs. 70 per month and the Medical Officer's quarters were also rented on the same building at the rate of Rs. 70 per month which was paid by the Municipality.

The Old Kurla Dispensary at Bail Bazar came to be known as Branch Dispensary and worked for one hour from 5.30 to 6.30 P. M. (S. T.). The Medical Officer-in-Charge of the Main Dispensary attended this Branch Dispensary daily, except Sundays and holidays.

A Conveyance and Local allowance of Rs. 100 per month was paid to the Medical Officer for attending the Branch Dispensary. This allowance was reduced to Rs. 50 as Conveyance Allowance. He was allowed Rs. 18-12-0 as Compensatory Allowance. Both the allowances were paid by the Municipality.

On 3rd March 1938 the present K. B. H. K. Bhabha Hospital was erected and the Bai Mithibai Hormasji Wadia Dispensary was incorporated with the Hospital and a tablet was put up in a conspicuous place with the following inscription—

"This Tablet commemorates the Bai Mithibai Hormasji Wadia Charitable Dispensary Trust of Rs. 24,000."

The Branch Dispensary at Bail Bazar continued to work as before for one hour a day and it was conducted by the Medical Officer of the hospital.

Diseases treated—The diseases treated at these Dispensaries during the year under report are shown in

VI-Seth Dwarkadas Tribhovandas Municipal Charitable Dispensary, Chembur.

History—Seth Dwarkadas Tribhovandas, J.P., donated a sum of Rs. 30,000 out of which Rs. 12,000 were earmarked for Building and equipment and Rs. 18,000 in Government Securities for the supply of Drugs. A Building was constructed at Donor's cost and was handed over to the Local Board, permanently, for the upkeep and maintenance as per Trust Deed under Serial No. 2040 of 29th April 1929 for the benefit of the inhabitants of Chembur and Trombay Island Villages.

Seth Dwarkadas Tribhovandas, J.P., Municipal Charitable Dispensary was opened on 29th March 1930 by Hon'ble G. B. Pradhan, the then Finance Minister of Government of Bombay.

This Dispensary was under the control of the Bombay Suburban District Local Board until it was taken over by the Greater Bombay Municipal Corporation and was not on the list of Government for Grant-in-aid purposes.

Staff.—This Dispensery was in charge of a Medical Officer, Dr. S. A. Muzumdar, M.B.B.S., in the grade of Rs. 200-10-260-15-350 with free quarters.

Attendance.—Attendance of out-door patients treated during the three years and other information is given in Appendix 'F'.

VII.—Mobile Hospital Unit in Parle Andheri area.

Mobile Hospital Unit of the People's Mobile Hospitals, Parle Andheri.—The Ex-Parle Andheri Borough Municipality had entered into a contract with the Peoples' Mobile Hospitals, Bombay, for running a Mobile Dispensary Unit in the Parle-Andheri area on a fixed payment of Rs. 1,750 per month and the same arrangement was continued after the merger. In the absence of adequate Medical Relief by way of Municipal Dispensaries and Hospitals in the Suburbs, the Mobile Dipensary was the only Institution for rendering such kind of service in the far distant villages. The active duty of this unit does not exceed 6 hours a day and is distributed in two or three shifts to be spread over for a period not exceeding 8 hours in all during the day. The Mobile Dispensary works for six days a week with a weekly Holiday on Sunday. Proogramme of work of this Unit, showing the exact location and time on different days, is shown in Appendix 'K'.

This Mobile Dispensary was in charge of Dr. R. B. Mehta, L.C.P.S.

Attendance.—The total number of patients treated during the year under report was 25,298 and the average number of daily attendance worked out at 81.

Vaccination

The work of vaccination as a preventive measure against small-pox in the suburbs was done through Government agency by four vaccinators assisted by four peons, who were Government servants. The services of these employees were retained for a period of $2\frac{1}{2}$ months from 15th April to 30th June 1950 on the same terms on which they were holding the posts before, with a view to make integration of these areas smooth. The arrangement of vaccination at different places was as follows:—

Out of the above 16 Stations, 13 were permanent and 3 temporary. The permanent stations were notified in the Government Gazette and Leading local newspapers. The status quo was maintained from the date of the merger till 1st July 1950 when the Bombay Municipal Corporation took over charge of the vaccination service in the suburbs and organized a separate branch so as to bring the entire area on the city lines for carrying out the following activities:—

- (1) Conducting the Public Vaccination Stations to be kept open daily morning and evening for vaccination of children and others.
- (2) Follow-up work of noting the results of primary vaccination among children vaccinated at the Public Vaccination Stations but who were not brought again to show the results of vaccination.
- (3) Finding out unvaccinated children and advising the parents and others to bring them for vaccination.
 - (4) Taking action against those who keep their children unvaccinated against the provisions of the Vaccination Act.
 - (5) Arranging contact and mass vaccinations in the areas from which cases of small-pox were reported.
 - (6) Stocking of Vaccine Lymph and other material for the whole of the suburbs.
 - (7) Issue of Primary Vaccination certificates free of charge and of vaccination certificates on International forms to persons going abroad and recovery of fees at the rate of Rs. 2 per certificate.

The Government employees were relieved on 1st July 1950 and the Municipal Staff was taken on from the same date. The entire area was divided into four wards viz., two on B.B. and C.I. Railway line i.e., Bandra and Parle-Andheri and two on the east on G. I. P. Railway line i.e., Kurla and Ghatkopar and each ward was placed in charge of two Vaccinators, two vaccination Karkuns and two bigaries.

To coordinate the vaccination service in the entire area and to supervise the work of all these men, one Senior Vaccinator was appointed from 27th October 1950 and he was given clerical assistance to maintain statistics, to furnish the requisite returns, to issue certificates, etc., Prior to the appointment of the Senior Vaccinator, one of the Vaccinators who had vast experience in the City, started the organization after carrying out the spade work in the entire area and managed as far as possible to bring the vaccination service to the city level under the guidance and supervision of the Medical Officer of Health of respective wards.

In addition to the 12 permanent Stations, six more temporary stations were opened at the following places from the dates shown against their names:—

In all 21 Station (13 permanent, 6 temporary on week days and 2 temporary monthly) were working during the year under report.

Vaccine Lymph was brought daily from the Central Vaccination Depot, Parel, as there was no arrangement of keeping the vaccine lymph in cold storage.

Owing to the increase in the incidence of Small-pox in the merged area, precautionary measures were taken by arranging mass vaccinations in different localities, combing out the areas in which cases of small-pox were reported, removing the cases to A. R. Hospital and educating the public by means of propaganda.

The results of primary vaccinations according to ages are given in table No. 3.

Inspection of results.—(1) Usually, the results of primary vaccination are checked by Vaccinators. Their reports were checked by the Superintendent of Vaccination in 25 cases and by the Senior Vaccinator in 104 cases. the rate of successful vaccination was cent per cent.

- (2) Care was taken to check the Vaccinators' work in a number of cases that visited the stations for inspection after 7 days and the same was found satisfactory. By this inspection, it was also ensured that the vaccin used was of good potency.
- (3) As regards revaccination, it was not practicable to check the results except in the case of those who came for international certificates.

Fees.—Vaccination at Public Vaccination Stations was performed gratuitously but a Public Vaccinator, as provided under Section 13 of the Bombay Vaccination Act 1877 was allowed to charge a fee for vaccinating a child by request of the parent or guardian elsewhere than at a public vaccination. Whenever any rate-payer desired the work of vaccination to be performed at his private residence it was done without interfering with the vaccination at public vaccination stations and the following fee was charged:—

- (a) If the operation was performed by the Superintendent of Vaccination, the fee was Rs. 10 for the first person and Re. 1 for each additional person operated on.
- (b) If the Senior Vaccinator operated, the fee was Rs. 5 for the first individual and annas 8 for every succeeding individual operated on.
- (c) If the Public Vaccinator operated, the fee was Rs. 3 for the first person and annas 4 for each additional person operated on.

In addition to the above, charges for the lymph at annas 4 per individual vaccinated were recovered.

Income.—The total income derived from the sale of lymph, etc., and other sources during the period of six months from July to December 1950 amounted to Rs. 332-4-0. The details are as mentioned below:—

Prosecutions.—There were no cases of prosecutions for failure to bring infants for vaccination or failure to present them for inspection seven days after the operation.

Rane, Assistant Head Supervisor (Suburbs) took over the charge of the Conservices from the old administration. The Conservancy services consist of (1) Cleaning of roads, footpaths and open channel drains. (2) Collection, removal and disposal of refuse. (3) Collection, removal and disposal of finisht-soil and tesspool contents. (4) Licensing of dogs and destruction of stray dogs. (5) Rat destruction. (6) Removal and disposal of dead animals. (7) Rendering special conservancy and halalkhore service. (8) Veterinary services. The above services were not uniform in the suburbs, due to the fact that they were under differ ministrations which were governed under different rules and regulations. Unlike the ex-Municipal bit Bandra and Parle Andheri, the village Panchayats and the District Local Boards lacked the requisite material conservancy services. The total length of open drains is about 51 miles. Systematic cleansing of open drains was resorted to in Bandra and Kurla, where staff for the purpose was already in employment of these two local bodies, while this service could not be given in other areas as the requisite staff was lacking. Complaints about the nuisance from the open drains were prompt ly attended to

COLLECTION, REMOVAL AND DISPOSAL OF REFUSE.

For the collection of street sweepings and household refuse dust bins were placed on the road side in the whole of the suburbs, administered by the defunct local bodies, except the District Local Board. In all 519 dust-bins were placed at suitable places for this purpose. The contents of these dust-bins were removed by 16 refuse lorries and 7 bullocks carts and the total amount of refuse removed was about 16,000 tons.

The method of disposal of refuse resorted to was the reclamation of open low lying lands. The places for the disposal were-

(1) H Ward.—East of Bandra Railway Station, into creek. This is Government land taken on lease by Same and the second of the second of the second the Municipality for this pupose.

During the period under report, the reclamation of Municipal Tank at Pali, Bandra, admeasuing 5,000 square yards was also undertaken and carried out with controlled tipping.

- (2) K Ward.—The place appointed for the purpose was the Municipal plot of land at Oshivra. However, refuse from Juhu and Versova was disposed of by reclaiming low lying lands in the respective localities, as these areas were at a considerable distance from the main disposal place at Oshivra.
- (3) L Ward.—Private open plots were reclaimed by selling refuse thus bringing income to the Municipality. No Municipal disposal ground exists in this Ward.
 - (4) M Ward.—The refuse was disposed of in the creek and in low lying lands.
- (5) N Ward.—Refuse from Ghatkopar area was disposed of in the Municipal low lying plot of land which is being reclaimed at Bombay Agra Road. Refuse from Bhadup section was disposed of in the creek. "

No action was taken formerly for the provision of standard type of dust-bins for the collection of house." hold refuse. After merger, however, action under Section 368 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act was taken for provision of dust-bins in private premises. WEGFER CIAL MONTH

Collection and Removal of Night-soil.—Except some part of Bandra the whole of the suburbs is undrained and there are privies on basket system with cesspools. The night-soil from privies on basket system collected to night-soil from the privies into the drums supplied to the night-soil from the privies into the drums supplied to them by the Municipality. The contents of the drums were emptied into night-soil bullock carts and trailors placed at convenient positions in H, K and M and part of N wards. In L Ward and at Ghatkopar (part of N ward) such collection was emptied into the cesspool lorries and moto-carts in the absence of trailers. For this purpose 15 carts, 15 trailers, 4 moto-carts and 59 lorries were employed. 4 night soil trailers at Ghatkopar were out of commission at the time of merger. The introduction of 4 new moto-carts after the merger helped to regularise the work of removal of night-soil. Total quantity of night soil removed was 24,86,250 gallons.

The open lands and fields, which are commonly used for the purpose of answering calls of nature in the absence of privy accommodation in various localities, were attended to by the Halllkhore Staff employed for the cleansing of basket privies and it was disposed of at the different places specially reserved for the purpose.

Public Sanitary Conveniences.—The public sanitary conveniences in the suburbs are provided on basket system except in the drained localities of Bandra. There are blocks of public latrines having seats, and urinals

The latrines and urinals were regularly cleaned and disinfected with the help of Basket-cleaners, triangle Removal and disposal of cesspool contents.—Removal and disposal of cesspool contents form an important retem of conservancy services in the suburbs. The total number of cesspools is 4,897, which were emptied at an interval of about 21 days at the time of merger with the help of 34 lorries, each making 4 to 5 trips per day. interval of about 21 days at the time of merger with the help of 34 lorries, each making 4 to 5 trips per day. At some places the work was arranged in one shift i.e., from 6-30 A.M. to 2-30 P.M. and at others in 2 shifts from 6-30 A.M. to 10-30 A.M. and from 2-30 P.M. to 6-30 P.M. After merger and during the period under report, 4 moto-carts were added to this fleet, and the working hours were uniformly revised from 6-30 A.M. to ,2-30 P.M. The amount of work put in by each lorry was increased as a result of better organization, and consequently cleansing of cesspools was regularized. In the ex-Village Panchayat areas, the work of emptying cesspools was continued with the help of hired bullock carts. With a view to further improving the service to the cesspools, an experiment with a cesspool emptier equipped with a suction unit was successfully tried in the suburbs and immediate order was placed to purchase one such unit.

The places for the disposal of night soil collected from privies and the sewage contents from the cesspools were situated at eight different spots (four Municipal and four private) near the creeks all over the suburbs. The method of disposal was crude as it was dumped into the creeks to be washed away at high tide into the sea.

The service of collection, removal and disposal of night soil and cesspool contents was confined to the areas administered by the ex-local bodies, although quite a large number of privies and cesspools existed elsewhere. Service to these privies and cesspools was arranged on private basis and at times through the Municipal agency on payment of extra charges as these areas were not covered by taxation during the year under coportal Majority of the privies and cesspools in the suburbs being in undrained and undeveloped area, the task of regularising the services to all the areas alike, presented difficulties due to (1) inaccessible positions of privies and cesspools (2) unauthorised construction of houses (3) inadequate capacity and defective construction of cesspools.

Transport.—The position of transport which was employed for the removal of refuse and night soil cess-pool water is as indicated below—

At the time of the merger the total fleet of mechanical transport consisted of 19 refuse lorries and 1 refuse trailor, 47 cesspool lorries, 19 night-soil trailors and 3 towing vehicles, as obtained on the records of the defunct local bodies. Out of them 3 refuse lorries and 13 cesspool lorries not being in serviceable condition were proposed to be scrapped. During the period under report, new vehicles were added viz., 4 moto carts for removal of night soil and cesspool water, 1 Tractor Trailor combination and 1 G.M.C. lorry for removal of refuse.

Timely repairs and maintenance of these vehicles was a problem, because of the fact that a large number of them were old vehicles and there was no tecnical staff except mecanics who worked without technical supervision or guidance. The appointment of a qualified Transport Inspector was therefore made and under his supervision and guidance the repairs were effected and the maintenance of vehicles was organized.

DESTRUCTION OF DOGS.

At the time of merger, the ex-Bandra Municipality alone maintained a bullock cart and a staff of dog catchers for catching stray dogs. Dogs caught were let off in the creek outside its limits. After merger, a dogvan was constructed by converting one of the refuse lorries so as to speed up the operations and cover other areas also as there were complaints from all over the suburbs. In all 1,825 dogs were caught. Arrangement to dispose of the dogs caught were made at the lethal chamber at Mahalaxmi. The dogs were caught by specially prepared nets, rabid and unmanagable dogs being dealt with by means of iron tongs.

Dog Licensing.—Side by side withthe destruction of stray dogs the licensing of dogs was started from 1st August 1950 with a view to minimising the number of stray and ownerless dogs in the suburbs and reducing the incidents of hydrophobia and rabies. 366 dogs were licensed during the period from 1st August 1950 to 31st December 1950 and the amount of tax on dogs realised was Rs. 1,830.

RAT DESTRUCTION.

Regular rat destruction could not be resorted to in the suburbs. No rat was sent to the Haffkine Institute for examination. 596 rats were caught during the period under report. Only trapping was resorted to for catching rats.

REMOVAL AND DISPOSAL OF DEAD ANIMALS.

Dead animals in the suburbs were removed to (1) Kurla, (2) Bandra, (3) Oshivra depots and (4) other places away from human habitation. The place at Kurla was closed on account of complaints of vultures being source of danger to the aircrafts. In some villages of Parle-Andheri Area, Madhvis claimed removal and disposal of dead animals to be their hereditary right for which they filed a suit in the High Court. The G. I. P. and B.B. and C.I. Railways had their own contractors for the removal and disposal of dead animals from the Railway-Yards at Kurla and Bandra respectively. Dead animals from the other parts were removed and skinned at any one of the depots or places either by contractors or by persons who claimed to hold the hereditary rights. Right for skinning dead animals at Oshivra could not be sold owing to the dispute of Madhvis. Rs. 2,675 were realised by way of sale of these rights at the other two depots, viz. Kurla and Bandra.

RENDERING HALALKHORE AND SPECIAL CONSERVANCY SERVICE.

In the suburbs service was required to be given for removing the contents of cesspools and septic tanks, etc., Varying charges were levied by the defunct local bodies depending upon the number of trips made by the cesspool lorry, the number of men employed and the time taken for completing the work.

Conservancy and halalkhore service were also rendered to temporary establishments whenever required.

VETERINARY SERVICE.

There is a Municipal Veterinary Dispensary at Khar, which is in charge of a Veterinary Assistant Surgeon appointed by the Government. He attends to the Municipal bullocks of Bandra stable behind the Veterinary Dispensary. He also attends to the animals owned by private owners or stable keepers on payment of scheduled charges. 944 Inoculations against rinder pest were done during the period under report and the amount of fees recovered was Rs. 722.

OTHER SERVICES PERTAINING TO THE CONSERVANCY BRANCH.

Other services pertaining to the Conservancy Branch include action against (1)stray animals, (2) throwing of refuse in the streets and public places, (3) fouling of public roads by urinating and defecating, (4)indiscriminate spitting and (5) chokes in the drains.

The nuisance from stray animals was dealt with by the Police and also by the staff of cow-catchers allotted: to the Engineering Branch.

For dealing with other nuisance under items 2, 3 and 4, seven posts of nuisance detectors were created and a beginning was made to control these nuisances during the period under report.

Complaints of nuisance arising out of temporary chokes in the drains were attended to by the staff of drain-cleaners.

LABOUR.

Well-being of the labour staff forms an important item of the conservancy branch of the administration. As a first step after the merger, the labour staff of Grampanchayats, who were paid low salaries, were brought on the same scale of pay and allowances as were obtaining in the Ex-Local Municipalities. As regards earned leave, sick leave and casual leave, all the staff of the suburbs were allowed the benefits as per city scale. Additional housing accommodation of 60 new rooms was provided for at Bandra.

Co-operative Credit Societies were conducted for the benefits of the staff working in Bandra, Parle-The Management of the Societies was carried out by the members themselves through Andheri and Kurla. their office-bearers elected under the rules of the Co-operative Credit Societies. All - Co-operative Credit Societies. There was an epidemic of cholera during the months of July and August 1950. Steps were taken for (1) regular removal of refuse and excrementitious matters, (2) a concentrated clean-up campaign in the affected localities, (3) free use of disinfectants for systematic treatment of dirty and unhealthy spots, (4) maintaining the cleanliness of affected localities, (5) special attention to privies and cesspools. The epidemic was brought un der control within a month. The following table shows the refuse collected and removed in tons and other work done by the street cleansing section during the period from 15th April 1950 to 31st December 1950 and the population of the suburbs with the area in square miles. With Report of the Insecticidal Service.

Insecticidal Service. The insecticidal service of the City was extended to the suburbs during the year. As a first step towards the mitigation of mosquito nuisance in the suburbs, a scheme for necessary control measures in H and K wards was put into operation from 1st October 1950. Malaria vector species were not however found anywhere in these two wards, although Culicine mosquitoes were predominantly found breeding in the stagnant places. Control measures by treatment with D. D. T. formulations and other allied insecticides included.

(1) D. D. T. spraying of all collections of water in open lands, house compounds, drains and other potential breeding places.

(2) Large scale dusting with B. H. C. of refuse collections in kutcha drains and the vicinity of houses,

stables and such of the places where breeding of mosquitoes was detected.

(3) Treatment of markets and stalls for residual effects against adult mosquitoes and flies.

(4) Rendering D. D. T. services to private houses at the request of the owners on payment of fees
(5) "Tifa' fogging in certain areas where large scale treatment was found necessary.

Locations of Units.—Four Insecticide Offices were opened in Bandra, Khar, Vile Parle and Andheri, for distribution of equipment and materials to the staff for their daily routine work, which included inspection of house compounds and open lands and treatment of stagnations where mosquito breeding was noticed.

Insecticides used .- D. D. T. emulsion and B. H. C. suspension and dust were the commonest insecticides. used in the campaign with good results. Expenses on account of the insecticides only during the 3 months of the report were as under :-

Equipments in use.—Two power sprayers were purchased at a cost of Rs. 2,500 to deal with large areas requiring vigorous treatment and 10 stirrup pumps and 6 dusters were acquired at a cost of Rs. I,600.

The D. D. T. spraying of the 14 villages in other 3 wards falling within the limits of Greater Bombay will have to be undertaken during the next financial year.

- As a result of the control measures so far adopted in H and K wards, the innumerable breeding grounds which received treatment of D.D.T. regularly showed a substantial reducion in the rate of breeding, and the mosquito nuisance in these two wards was greatly reduced.
