

REVIEW OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON THE ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COMMISSIONER FOR GREATER BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1952, 53. (Suburbs).

- 53*. The Municipal administration of the suburban area continued to be carried on under the immediate charge of an Assistant Municipal Commissioner subject to the control of the Municipal Commissioner as in the previous year. The working of the various departments in the Suburbs was almost brought on the lines of the working of the departments in the City.
- 54. In preparing the Budget Estimates for the year under report an Opening Cash Balance of Rs. 6.64 lacs was estimated. On the final closing of the accounts for the year 1951-52, the actual Opening Balance was Rs. 17.81 lacs which was more by Rs. 5.81 lacs than the actual Opening Balance of the previous year, viz., Rs. 12.01. The total income was budgetted at Rs. 104.21 lacs but the actual realization amounted to Rs. 113.03 lacs showing an increase of Rs. 8.82 lacs over the budgetted amount and also showed an increase of Rs. 24.04 lacs over the actuals of the previous year viz., Rs. 88.99 lacs. On the Expenditure Side, the budgetted amount was Rs. 98.66 lacs which exceeded by Rs. 15.05 lacs the actuals of Rs. 83.61 lacs of the previous year but the actual expenditure at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 102.54 lacs which was more than the original estimate (Rs. 98.66 lacs) by Rs. 3.87 lacs. The anticipated surplus of Rs. 5.54 lacs was thus more by Rs. 4.95 lacs. In the preceding year the surplus amounted to Rs. 5.38 lacs. The financial transactions for the year ended with a Closing Balance of Rs. 31.67 lacs.

A detailed study of the Income Side reveals that there was a net increase of Rs. 8.82 lacs, compared with the original estimates comprising of gross increases amounting to Rs. 10.93 lacs counterbalanced by decreases to the extent of Rs. 2.11 lacs. The main increases were under General Tax Rs. 3.67 lacs, Interest and profit on Investment of Rs. 1.03 lakhs, Licensing and Remoyal of Encroachments Rs. 1.84 lacs and Grant-in-Aid from Government Rs. 1.80 lacs. The main decreases in income are under Water Works Rs. 0.47 lac, Market and Slaughter Houses Rs. 0.21 lac and Contribution from Capital Funds to Revenue on account of Loan Works Staff Rs. 0.39 lac.

The expenditure for the year, i.e., Rs. 102.54 lacs compared with the previous year Rs. 83.61 lacs showed a net increase of Rs. 18.93 lacs. The final sanctioned grant for the year aggregated to Rs. 122.42 laes against which the actuals amounted to Rs. 102.54 lacs leaving an unexpended balance of Rs. 19.89 lacs at the close of the year. Of this a sum of Rs. 10.44 lacs was being renewed for expenditure during the year 1953-54 and the balance viz., Rs. 9.45 lacs being treated as savings on final grants sanctioned.

The amount of the new loan proposed in the Budget for the year 1952-53 was Rs. 50 lacs. The Loan Works programme was revised on the basis of the urgency of works and a provision of Rs. 25 lacs was made in the Revised Budget Estimates. A provision of Rs. 15 lacs was also made for raising a loan from Government for the work of laying a pipe line for oil refineries at Trombay. The amount actually raised to finance the Capital Works expenditure including purchase of Plant and Machinery was Rs. 40 lacs.

The book value of investments of the Sinking Fund at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 9,13,395 made up of Rs. 9,13,178 being the book value of securities and Rs. 217 in cash with the Imperial Bank of India. Valuing the Municipal Debentures at par the market value of Sinking Fund Investments held on 31st March 1953 came to Rs. 8,97,474. This together with the amount of interest accrued upto 31st March 1953, viz., Rs. 19,468 and Cash with the Imperial Bank of India Rs. 217 brings the amount of Sinking Fund to Rs. 9,17,159 and more than covered the amount viz., 9,03,915 to which the Sinking Fund should have accummulated upto 31st March 1953. The excess in the Sinking Fund Investment account was thus Rs. 13,244.

The total amount at the disposal of the Education Committee for the year was Rs. 19.74

lacs. The total expenditure amounted to Rs. 16.39 lacs leaving a Closing
Balance of Rs. 3.35 lacs. An amount of Rs. 5.50 lacs was received
from Government towards the cost of Primary Education in the Suburbs.

Taxation, Collection and Outgo.

Taxation, Collection and II of Bombay Act XXX of 1951 was levied at 10 per cent. Of the rateable value. The rates for water supplied by meter measurement varied from As. 12 to Rs. 2-4-0 per 1000 gallons.

At the close of the year the total number of properties on the Assessment Register was 30,854 as against 29,448 in the previous year, showing an increase of 1,406. The rateable

value of all the properties was Rs. 305.31 lacs as against Rs. 291.19 lacs for the previous year. This gave a rate of Rs. 59.85 per head of population as against Rs. 57.08 in the previous year. The net total demand in respect of Property and Wheel taxes for the year was Rs. 74.71 lacs plus the arrears of Rs. 50.59 lacs from the previous year, while the amount collected during the year was Rs. 85.65 lacs, as against Rs. 61.29 lacs in the previous year. The taxes outstanding on 31st March 1953 amounted to Rs. 41.12 lacs, i.e., 32.82 per cent. of the net demand viz., Rs. 125.30 lacs.

Although the required legislation regarding taxation on properties in the villages had been passed and made applicable in September 1951, the figure of arrears has not reduced but on the contrary has shown an upward trend, which is not very satisfactory. The Commissioner is requested to pay his special attention to the collection work at an early date.

The rates of taxation during the first half of the year continued to be the same as in the previous year but the same were altered with effect from 1st October 1952. The reduced rates were 5 per cent. in the case of buildings and lands the rateable values of which were above Rs. 2,000 in each case and 2½ per cent. in the case of buildings and lands, the rateable values of which were Rs. 2,000 and below but not less than Rs. 500 in each case. The net demand in respect of the tax was Rs. 22.13 lacs and the amount collected was Rs. 12.72 lacs i.e., about 57.05 per cent. of the demand. It is hoped that necessary steps will be taken for the collection of taxes in time.

In the classification of properties according to the user, it is found that out of 29,944 properties with an approximate rateable value of Rs. 305.31 lacs, 24,839 properties only are used for residential purposes with an approximate rateable value of Rs. 196.65 lacs.

From the classification of properties according to the rateable values, it is found that as many as 29,694 properties come within the rateable value of Rs. 20,000, leaving only 60 properties having rateable values between Rs. 20,001 and Rs. 3,50,000 and above.

56. The sewerage system in the Suburban area was restricted to 'H' Ward only, in which 4 pumping stations exist. All the pumping stations worked satisfactorily throughout the year. Additional pumps were to be installed at Khar Pumping Station.

The survey of District No. III (Ghatkopar and Chembur comprising an area of 7,450 acres was carried and plans and estimates for sewer works amounting to Rs. 35.89 lacs were sanctioned during the year under Report. The total expenditure booked on the same work during the year was Rs. 10.41 lacs against the budget provision of Rs. 21.45 lacs. It is hoped that steps will be taken to complete the schemes already sanctioned in this behalf by the Corporation as soon as possible in the interest of health and sanitation of the areas.

57. The work of preparing an inventory of the Municipal properties in the Suburbs was in progress.

The total mileage of the roads in the Suburbs is about 124. Many of the approach roads to the villages were asphalted by Recondo process at an aggregate cost of Rs. 3.50 lacs during the year. Four new foot-paths were constructed and paved during the year in the Bandra and Andheri areas.

The ferry service between Versova and Madh was maintained during the year. The total receipts amounted to Rs. 17,492 as against the expenditure of Rs. 13,662-11-0.

The cost of street lighting, both by electric and incandescent lamps numbering 3,965 amounted to Rs. 1.62 lacs against Rs. 1.36 lacs in the previous year. The work of improving lighting on many of the Suburban roads was in progress. Most of the through and main roads were provided with lights. A scheme for improving street lighting on Ghodbunder Road and Bombay Agra Road was finalised.

There is an urgent need of constructing public sanitary conveniences at suitable sites in the suburbs. Plans and estimates for different areas were prepared but no progress was made for non availability of suitable sites. It is hoped that Government who have been approached to make available some of the sites selected will comply with the request early and it will be possible to make some progress in this behalf in the near future.

Special Building Bye-laws for the Suburbs, in addition to the Building Regulations in the City were brought into effect from 15th April 1952.

Proposals for the variation of nine Town Planning Schemes were found void in law and were therefore dropped. Two draft Town Planning Schemes, viz., No. III, Ghatkopar

and No. VI Santa Cruz were under preparation and ready for sanction. A new area at Vile-Parle was brought under provision of Town Planning Act.

The area of the Suburbs merged within the limits of the Bombay Municipal Corporation is very large and the Corporation's sources are limited. It will, therefore, take a long time to bring the suburban area to the standards obtaining in the City as regards various amenities. An all round effort was, however, made during the year to improve the condition of these areas and to provide additional amenities within the resources available.

58. Suburbs like the City were supplied with water by gravity from the three lakes viz., Tansa, Vehar and Tulsi. In the suburban area, water is supplied for 24 hours except for certain elevated localities like Bandra Hill and Pali Hill which receive water for 10 hours at night time. Water for all purposes was charged on the basis of meter measurement. There were in all 10,040 connections in the Eastern and Western Divisions of the Suburbs. About 3,140 million gallons of water was supplied to these divisions during the year.

There were 67 complaints regarding the absence of water supply and 800 about short supply. 32 fire calls were answered by the Suburban Departments and about 2.7 million gallons of water was used for the purpose.

98 miles of water mains of various sizes were maintained during the year. There were 79 bursts on various mains. 2,078 repair works were carried out during the year.

Nine Parks and Gardens were maintained during the year at a total cost of Rs. 9,300. Considerable improvements were carried out to keep these places in presentable conditions.

- during the previous year, showing an increase of 711, the fees realised therefrom being Rs. 1,66,133 as against Rs. 93,181 in the previous year. Fees amounting to Rs. 38,999 were received for permits issued for exhibiting advertisements, etc., as against Rs. 22,697-1-0 in the previous year. Charges for parking cars, etc., at Juhu Foreshore collected during the year amounted to Rs. 11,842-4-0 as against Rs. 14,150-12-0 in the previous year. A moiety of Rs. 2,962-9-0 and rental of Rs. 21 was paid to Government for the piece of land acquired from them for the purpose. The fees realised from the issue of licences to Hawkers and Squatters amounted to Rs. 29,545 as against Rs. 23,220-4-0 in the previous year.
- 60. As required under the Act, 1,696 Establishments were registered during the Administration of year and the total number of Establishments registered at the close of Shops and Establish the year was 8,729 as against 8,082 in the previous year. During the year 153 complaints were received and 26 were pending disposal at the beginning of the year; 167 complaints were investigated, leaving 12 pending at the close of the year. While 348 prosecutions were instituted during the year, the number of cases pending at the end of the year was 81. The total amount of fines realised was Rs. 8,305 as against Rs. 8,085 of the previous year, while a sum of Rs. 2,786 was received by way of Registration fees, etc., as against Rs. 2,399 in the previous year. The total expenditure incurred in administering the Act was Rs. 59,794 including the Dearness Allowance. The grant-in-aid sanctioned by the Government for the year 1951-52 in respect of the administration of the Act in the suburban area was Rs. 8,085 as against Rs. 24,968 in 1950-51.

Theatre Tax.—The concession of 20 per cent. rebate, if the tax was paid in advance before the 5th of the month was continued during the year. The total collection of receipts from this tax amounted to about Rs. 79,989 and a deposit amount of about Rs. 68,882 pertaining to the previous year was adjusted during the year.

61. During the year there were 18 Markets in the Suburbs out of which 16 were Municipal Markets and two owned by private parties. There were also Houses. The Five Year Plan for further expansion and development of marketing facilities had been implemented by including the proposal of acquisition of land and establishing a Market thereon at Kurla and Remodelling of the Khar Market and centralisation of slaughter of sheep and goats on the East side in the Kurla Kasaiwadi in the Loan Works Budget. Besides certain works in the nature of repairs were carried out during the year with a view to improving the general condition of the Markets and Slaughter Houses.

The total receipts of the Department during the year amounted to Rs. 4.42 lacs as against Rs. 4.59 lacs realised in the previous year. The decrease in the receipts was due to the amount of Rs. 61,430 outstanding in respect of the share of enhanced fee for animals admitted

to the Bandra Slaughter House and of about Rs. 15,000 in respect of the slaughter fee for the animals removed from the fair ground of the Slaughter House for slaughter in the Suburbs. If these amounts are taken into account, there would be an increase of Rs. 59,655 over the last year's figure. The total expenditure incurred during the year was Rs. 1.77 lacs excluding New Works and Debt Charges.

During the year unwholesome articles of food, such as, meat, fish, vegetables, etc., weighing 11,998 lbs. were destroyed as against 28,426 lbs. for the preceding year. The total meat destroyed was 6,135 lbs. as against 1,316 lbs. in the previous year. Out of the 11 prosecutions launched for unauthorised slaughter of animals during the year, 6 resulted in convictions, 2 in acquittals and 3 were pending. Total fines infleted upon amounted to Rs. 490.

62. There were in the merged area 93 Municipal Schools with 14 regular classes with a strength of 26,973 pupils on the roll and 739 teachers of whom 586 were trained and 153 untrained. Six new schools and classes were opened during the year. Two schools were closed and eight schools were converted into classes during the year due to lack of adequate number of pupils.

The number of Municipal owned school buildings at the beginning of the year was 31. During the year a new school building at Andheri was taken over by the Corporation. 30 Schools were accommodated in Municipal School Buildings and the remaining in rented buildings.

Physical Education was imparted as per the curriculum laid down by Government. Various extra curricular activities, viz., Sharadostay, vacation libraries, etc., were carried out in the schools on the lines of the City schools.

A census was taken for the enforcement of the Primary Education of non-attending children of school-going age and it was revealed that 5,414 children of compulsory age were non-attending and 3,265 of them were later admitted into schools. The number of compulsory age pupils attending Municipal schools was 18,275 as against 17,918 in the previous year.

There were 59 Aided Schools at the close of the year with 510 teachers for 15,245 pupils. Besides these schools, there were 8 Recognised Schools with 33 teachers for 723 pupils.

The Municipal High School at Bandra maintained 14 classes and the work was carried out in two shifts. The number of students was 330 and 21 teachers were engaged throughout the year. The working of the school showed a deficit of Rs. 7,190.

The Municipal Marathi Secondary Middle School, Ghatkopar, continued to be held in the rented premises. The number of the students was 56. The School had coaching classes for students of Standards VIII and IX. The annual results were very satisfactory. 49 out of 56 who appeared for the Examination came out successful.

63. The merged Suburbs have an area of 43,398.40 acres and a population of 5,10,151,

Public Health. the mean density of population roughly being 12.175 per acre.

The number of live births recorded during the year was 16,966 which was more by 2,559 than that during the previous year (14,407). The total number of deaths registered from all causes during the year was 6,005 as against 5,205 in the previous year. Deaths among infants under one year of age numbered 1,721 which exceeded by 154 the number in the preceding year, the infant mortality rate for the year thus being 101.4 per 1,000 live births for the year under report as against 108.8 for the previous year.

Small-pox caused 14 deaths, Enteric fever 53 deaths, Malaria 8 deaths, Influenza 1 death, Tuberculosis 220 deaths and Dysentery 106 deaths. The incidence of Malaria and of deaths caused by it were mainly due to the existence of a large number of cesspools in non-drained area, insanitary milch-cattle stables, etc. and the consequent mosquito nuisance. Anti-malarial measures, such as, D.D.T. Spraying and B. H. C. dusting of refuse collections, stables, etc., were carried out wherever mosquito nuisance predominated. It is hoped that the campaign against Malaria will be intensified still further so as to check the spread of Malaria.

There are many stables in the Suburbs some of which are located near or in the midst of residential areas exposing the residents to nuisance from smell and breeding of house flies, Vigorous attempts were made to conform them to essential Bye-laws by imposing sanitary

requirements on the owners of the stables. Arrangements have been made for the systematic removal of dung and stable refuse through a Municipal Contractor at their cost. It is hoped that attempts to have a proper control over the stables will be continued hereafter.

During the year under report considerable progress was made in the substitution of basket privies by water closets on full flushing system in the sewered part of 'H' Ward, Bandra, by having recourse to the Subvention Scheme.

There are a number of slum areas in the Suburbs which are over-crowded and consist of several unauthorised structures erected without proper planning and proper sanitary accommodation. Nothing short of slum clearance scheme would improve the sanitation of such areas. Sanitary requisitions were enforced to improve the condition of the premises and alleviate legitimate grievances of complainants. All available measures and experiments were, however, being adopted to improve the conditions.

The only Municipal Cemetery was at Charai Chembur in the merged area. The private cemeteries in the Suburbs were reported to number about 97.

Medical Relief—The two Municipal Hospitals, one at Bandra and the other at Kurla (with separate Maternity Wards attached to them) together having 76 beds, including 43 Maternity beds and two Municipal Maternity Homes, one at Ghatkopar and the other at Kurla having a total accommodation of 27 beds, were maintained during the year under review.

In all there were six Municipal Dispensaries in the merged areas and the total number of new out-door patients treated in all the Dispensaries including two mobile units was 1,24,652 and the total number of out-patients attendance was 3,39,061 as against 1,24,297 and 2,88,349 respectively, in the previous year.

Improvements in the existing Medical facilities should be carried out as well as the provisions of additional medical relief in the sururbs which is rapidly developing should be made at the earliest opportunity. Although no new Hospitals or Dispensaries could be opened in the near future on account of financial stringency, it is hoped that steps would be taken to expand, alter and improve the present institutions already in existence

Collection, Removal and Disposal of Refuse—A total length of 30,97,166 sq. yds. was required to be swept in the Surbubs which represented an increase of 4,94,843 sq. yds. swept last year. In order to give better cleansing service the area swept twice daily and once daily, was increased without augmenting the existing staff.

In all 87 miles of house drains and 50 miles of storm water drains in 16 Wards were cleaned. The total refuse removed during the year was, 30,683 tons as against 29,298 tons during the preceding year. Most of the refuse was utilised for filling in low lying areas. The total number of basket privies in the Suburbs was 13,551 and a total quantity of about 37,52,320 gallons of nightsoil and cesspool contents of about 2,45,42,825 gallons was removed in 8 bullock carts, 23 trailers 4 moto-carts, 48 lorries, and 1 Scammel mechanical emptier of 750 gallons.

Dog Licensing and Dog Destruction—2,478 licenees were issued during the year for pet dogs. During the year 5,519 dogs were caught and sent to the Mahalaxmi Siding in the Lethal Chembers and the Kennels, out of which only 42 dogs were retrieved by the owners and the remaining 5,477 were destroyed.

Rat Destruction—Number of rats caught alive during the year was 24,448 while that of dead rats collected was 1,386.

Food Sanitation—2,453 food samples obtained from grocer's shops, milk shops, dairies, etc., were examined chemically, out of which 456 samples were found adulterated. In all 1,130 prosecutions were launched and a sum of Rs. 32,480 was realized by way of fines.

64. In conclusion, the Standing Committee desire to record their appreciation of the very valuable services rendered by Shri B. K. Patel, I.C.s., J.P., and Shri P. R. Nayak, I.C.s., J.P., whose high administrative abilities and financial acumen were of great help to the Committee. The Committee also place on record their appreciation of the services rendered by the other Municipal Staff.

The Administration Report Of The Suburbs For the Year 1952-53

The Municipal Administration in the Suburbs continued to be under the immediate charge of the Assistant Municipal Commissioner, subject to the control of the Municipal Commissioner. The working of the various departments under the Assistant Municipal Commissioner was almost brought on the lines of the working of the City Departments.

Two Secondary Schools, viz., (1) The Municipal High School, Bandra and (2) The Municipal Marathi Secondary Middle School, Ghatkopar, continued to be under the control of the Assistant Municipal Commissioner.

II—HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS

- 1. Shri S. M. Y. Sastry, M.A., B.L., held the post of Assistant Municipal Commissioner from 1st April 1952 to 20th July 1952 and 21st January 1953 to 31st March 1953, while Shri K. R. Kelkar, B.A., held the post from 21st July 1952 to 20th January 1953, when the former was appointed as the Special Officer (Revision of Municipal Act).
- 2. Shri S. B. Bhide, G.D.A., held the post of Assistant Accountant (Suburbs) from 1st April 1952 to 18th February 1953, while Shri P. V. Kuriala held the post from 19th February 1953 to 31st March 1953, when the former was on leave.
- 3. Shri I. N. Mehta, B.A., held the post of Deputy Assessor and Collector, throughout the year.
- 4. Shri N. F. J. Bilia, B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E., held the post of Assistant Engineer, 1st Grade (Suburbs), from 1st April 1952 to 30th June 1952 while Shri N. K. Gandhi, B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E., Diploma (Town Planning) held the post from 1st July 1952 to 31st March 1953, when the former was transferred as Assistant Engineer (Arch.) from 1st July 1952.
- 5. (i) Shri T. M. Kandawalla, B.E. (Civil), held the post of Assistant Engineer, (Western Division), Water Works, throughout the year.
- (ii) Shri K. A. Mehta, B.E. (Mechanic and Electric), held the post of Assistant Engineer, (Eastern Division), Water Works, throughout the year.

III—FINANCIAL

According to the Budget Exstimates the Income, Expenditure and Surplus for the year were estimated at Rs. 1,04,20, 98,66 and 5,54 respectively. However, the actual income realised was Rs. 1,13,03 and the expenditure incurred was Rs. 1,02,54 increasing the surplus to Rs. 10,49 at the end of the year. The Actual Income realised viz., Rs. 1,13,03 showed an increase of Rs. 8,83 over the estimated income of Rs. 1,04,20.

lacidence of Taxation. The incidence of taxation per head for the year was Rs. 17-8-1.

The net unhypothecated Surplus Balance on 31st March 1953 (including the minimum required by law) was Rs. 31,67 against the opening balance of Rs. 17,81 on 1st April 1952.

The total amount of grants (including the Budget grants Rs. 98,66, Renewed grants Expenditure Grants. Rs. 10,94 and the Additional grants Rs. 12,82) was Rs. 1,22,42 while the expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,02,54 leaving an unexpended balance of Rs. 19,88. Out of this, grants aggregating Rs. 10,44 were reserved for being renewed for expenditure in 1953-54 while Rs. 9,44 were treated as savings.

The expenditure on Capital Works during the year amounted to Rs. 20,82 against Loan Works Expendir Rs. 64,44 provided for in the Revised Estimates under this head.

During the year a Loan of Rs. 40 lakhs (Rs. 25 lakhs from the public and Rs. 15 Loan floated during the lakhs from the Government) was raised at 4 per cent. with 12 years currency.

The Loan liabilities of the Corporation in respect of Budget 'D' at the close of the year stood at Rs. 97,66. The total Sinking Fund required up to 31st March 1953 was Rs. 9,04 but the actual value was Rs. 9,17

IV-ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION (SUBURBS)

The rates of taxes during the year under report were: — General Tax 173 per cent. (which includes 3 per cent. Fire Tax), and Halalkhore Tax at 3 collection and outstand-per cent. of the rateable value. The General Tax was levied at 10 per cent. of the rateable value of properties in 12 villages specified in List I of the Bombay Act XXX of 1951, (an Act to amend the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act), and on properties occupied for industrial purposes in the areas specified in List II, thereof.

The rates for water supplied by meter measurement varied from Annas 12 to Rs. 2-4-0 per 1000 gallons.

The total number of properties was 30,854 as against 29,448 in the previous year, showing an increase of 1,406.

The rateable value of all the properties was Rs. 305.31 lacs against Rs. 291.19 lacs for the previous year. The rateable value thus worked out to Rs. 59.85 per head of population.

The total number of vehicles and animals taxed was 3,589.

The total number of bills for property taxes and wheel tax issued during the year was 78,753 and 16,670 respectively. The bills issued for water charges were 21,232. The amount collected against a net total demand of Rs. 74,70,743 plus arrears of Rs. 50,59,218 for years prior to 1st April 1952 was Rs. 85,64,578. 183 claims for refund of taxes were admitted during the year and an amount of Rs. 27,234 was allowed on that account.

There were 1,665 complaints against the rateable values of properties under Section 167 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and 3,014 under Section 162 of the Act. There were 16 appeals against rateable values under Section 217 of the Act. Of these, 1 was decided, 5 were settled out of Court, 1 was dismissed, 1 was withdrawn and 8 were pending on 31st March 1953.

V-ASSISTANT ENGINEER (SUBURBS) DEPARTMENT

PUBLIC WORKS

I-Upkeep, Maintenance and Repairs

(a) Buildings.—The total expenditure incurred on normal repairs including monsoon repairs to Municipal buildings in the Suburbs, which are 96 in number, amounted to Rs. 18,886-1-6 as against Rs. 20,418-8-6 in the previous year. The amount spent on Departmental Works was Rs. 1,09,048-2-6 during the year as against Rs. 54,518-12-0 on works carried out through the Petty Works Contractors.

An Inventory of the Municipal properties in the Suburbs is under preparation.

(b) Roads.—The total mileage of the roads in the Suburbs is about 124. Many of the approach roads to the villages were asphalted through Messrs. Recondo Ltd. at an aggregate cost of Rs. 3,49,793-13-0.

Four new foot-paths were constructed and paved during the year in the Bandra and Andheri Areas.

The cost of street lighting, both by electric and incandescent lamps numbering 3,965 amounted to Rs. 1,61,754.

- (c) Sewers and Drains.—The sewerage system in the suburban area is restricted to 'H' Ward only, in which four pumping stations exist. Bunderwadi is the main Pumping Station and the remaining three viz., Jaibharat, Chimbai and Khar are the auxiliary ones. All the Pumping Stations worked satisfactorily throughout the year. Additional pumps are being installed at Khar Pumping Station.
- (d) Ferry service.—The ferry service between Versova and Madh was maintained during the year. The total receipts amounted to Rs. 17,492 as against the expenditure of Rs. 13,662-11-0. Some repairs to wharves at the both ends of the ferry were carried out.

(e) Inpsection of Factories, Workshops and Work Places.—105 permits and licence cases, relating to factories, workshops and work places, were inspected and disposed off during the year. Nine nuisance cases were also attended to.

II—Construction Works (Loan Works Programme)

A provision of Rs. 32,16,559 was made under Loan Works for constructing public buildings, roads and sewers; and works to the extent of Rs. 14,60,465-6-2 were carried out during the year as under:—

There is an urgent necessity of constructing sanitary conveniences in all parts of the Suburbs. Progress, however, could not be made owing to the non-availability of sites.

Land for constructing purification works at Khar was acquired at a cost of Rs. 90,000.

III-New Projects

Plans and Estimates for the following main proposals were sanctioned by the Corporation:—

- (3) Improvement of Storm Water Drains in the Suburbs.—Schemes for improvements of Storm Water Drains in the areas of Khar, Vile Parle—Rs. 70,022.
- (4) Public sanitary conveniences.—Sites were selected for providing sanitary conveniences in various parts of the suburbs. Many of the sites vest in the Government, who are being requested to hand them over free to the Municipality. Plans and estimates amounting to Rs. 34,820 were sanctioned.

IV—Sewerage Schemes for the Suburbs

The survey of District No. III (Ghatkopar and Chembur), comprising an area of 7,450 acres, was carried out and plans and estimates for sewer works amounting to Rs. 35,89,389 were also sanctioned by the Corporation during the year.

Negotiations for acquiring land at (1) Versova, (2) Kurla, (3) Ghatkopar and (4) Bunderwadi, Bandra, for the installation of pumping stations and Purification Works were opened with the Government.

V-Inspection and Supervision of Private Buildings

Special Building Bye-laws for the Suburbs, in addition to the Building Regulations . in the City, were confirmed by the Government and were brought into force from 15th April 1952.

859 proposals under Section 337 and 422 under Section 342, of the Bombay-Municipal Corporation Act were received for the construction of new buildings and additions and alterations to the existing buildings.

The total number of buildings newly constructed (including those wherein additions and alterations were made) by private enterprise was 447, out of which 342 were residential and the remaining non-residential. The number of buildings constructed by Co-operative Housing Societies and by employers for their employees was 14 and 1 respectively.

In all 663 Completion Certificates were disposed off and 529 Buildings were passed for occupation.

The total area of set-backs added to the roads during the year was 7,444 sq. yds. An important set-back added was at Nagardas Road, Andheri, which was widened from 10' to 40'. Most of this land was given free by the frontagers.

Regular lines for 8 streets were prescribed under Section 297(1)(a) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, and 13 layouts for plots and private streets were sanctioned by the Standing Committee under Section 303(1) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

VI—Town Planning Schemes

Proposals for the variation of nine T. P. Schemes were found void in law and were therefore dropped. Two draft T. P. Schemes viz., (1) T. P. Scheme No. III, Ghatkopar and (2) T. P. Scheme No. VI, Santa Cruz, were under preparation and almost ready for submission to the Corporation for approval. A new area at Vile Parle was brought under the provisions of the Town Planning Act.

VII—Concluding Remarks

The area of the Suburbs merged within the limits of the Bombay Municipal Corporation being very large and the Corporation's resources being limited the provision of amenities in the Suburbs on city standards will be a gradual process. However, an all round effort was made during the year to improve the condition of these areas and to provide additional amenities within the resources available.

VI—WATER WORKS (SUBURBS)

The Suburbs are supplied with water by gravity from Tansa, Vehar and Tulsi Lakes for 24 hours except for certain elevated localities in Bandra.

Water in the Suburbs is charged for by meter measurement. There are in all 10,040 connections in the Eastern and Western Divisions of the Suburbs. About 3,140 million gallons of water were supplied to these Divisions during the year under review. There were 67 complaints regarding the absence of water supply and 800 about short-supply. 32 Fire calls were answered by the Suburban Department and about 2.7 million gallons of water used for the purpose. 55 Connections were disconnected for non-payment of water dues and infringement of water Bye-laws. 27 Prosecutions were launched before the Presidency Magistrate resulting in 15 convictions. 4 Pumping sets were maintained at a total cost of Rs. 6,780. 98 miles of water mains of various sizes were maintained during the year. There were 79 bursts on various mains during the year. 2,078 repair works were carried out.

The testing of water fittings was done at Bandra and Kurla Water Works Offices and the revenue derived amounted to Rs. 6,344-5-0.

The new meter Workshop at Ghatkopar has been put into commission. 2,093 meters of different sizes were tested and 3,582 Municipal meters were repaired during the year. 512 'Kent' meters of various sizes from 1/2' to 4" were purchased during the year under review. The total revenue derived from meter hire was Rs. 1,18,549 and by meter measurement Rs. 20,35,675.

The existing water pipes at Juhu Road, Byramjee Road and Dr. Ambedkar Road, Bandra, were enlarged at a total cost of Rs. 1,98,733. New water mains were laid at a total cost of Rs. 3 lacs in Juhu Lane, Andheri, Squatters' Colony, Jogeshwari, Versova Road, Bombay Agra Road between Ghatkopar and Vikhroli, Jawahar Road and Jethabhai

Lane, Ghatkopar, Chembur Gaothan, and villages of Kirol, Sahar, Mandala, Bamanwada and Vikhroli. A new 15">12">9">6" water main was laid along Nehru Road, Station Road and Ghodbunder Road, Santacruz. 6 Metered stand pipes at Golibar, Santacruz, and Kol-Dongri, Andheri, were erected at a total cost of Rs. 5,905. In the new Squatters' Colony at Jogeshwari a 6"<9" pipe line was laid for a length of over 2,000 r.ft. and 16 large stand pipes and two large storage tanks with a hundred water taps were provided.

Nine parks and gardens were maintained during the year at a total cost of Rs. 9,300.

VII—LICENCE DEPARTMENT

Licences and permits issued during the year numbered 5,061 against 4,350 in 1951-52 showing an increase of 711 over the figures of the last year. Fees realised therefrom amounted to Rs. 1,66,133 as against Rs. 93,181 during the preceding year. At the end of the year an amount of about Rs. 696 was outstanding in respect of 27 notices of demand against an outstanding amount of Rs. 1,173-12-0 in respect of notices of the previous year.

During the year under report the loss of revenue incidental to the disuse or demolition of old licensed places amounted to about Rs. 4,511 as against Rs. 725 in the previous year.

The total number of permits issued for exhibiting sky-signs and advertisements was 937 which realised an amount of about Rs. 38,999, Sky-signs and advertise-as against 289 permits and Rs. 22,697-1-0 in 1951-52.

The total number of Hawkers' and Squatters' licences issued during the year was 2,602. The fees realised were Rs. 29,547 as against Rs. 23,220-4-0 collected during the previous year.

During the year, the Licence Department instituted 413 prosecutions for offences under Sections 328, 328A, 394 and 412A of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act as against 439 during the previous year. The total amount of fines inflicted in 131 convicted cases was Rs. 3,510 as against Rs. 3,569 in the previous year.

Shops and Establishments

The total number of Establishments as on 31st March 1953 stood at 8,729 as against 8,082 on 31st March 1952, 1,696 new applications for registration were received during the year, against which 1,049 Establishments had either closed down or changed hands; hence the net addition of 647. The registration fees amounted to about Rs. 2,786 as against Rs. 2,399 in the previous year.

During the year under report, 17,029 visits were paid to various Establishments. 153 complaints were received in addition to 26 pending from the preceding year. Of these, 167 were investigated leaving 12 complaints pending at the close of the year. For checking large areas, 76 mass-raids were carried out. In all 348 prosecutions were launched during the year, realizing an amount of Rs. 8.305 as fines, leaving 81 (excluding one on the dormant file) cases pending at the close of the year.

The Grant-in-aid from Government for the year 1951-52 was Rs. 8,085.

Grant-in-aid.

The total expenditure incurred on the Administration of the Act was about Rs. 59,794 including Dearness Allowance of Rs. 15,033.

VIII—MARKET DEPARTMENT

Markets.—There were 18 Markets as against 17 in the previous year, out of which 16 Markets were Municipal and two owned by private parties.

During the year, several improvements to Andheri, Bandra, Khar, Koli-Kalyan, Markets were carried out. Three works were included in the Loan Works Budget by way of implementation of a five year plan.

Slaughter Houses.—There were five Municipal Slaughter Houses during the year. The general condition of slaughter houses was appreciably improved during the year. Unwholesome articles such as meat, fish and vegetables weighing about 11,998 lbs. were destroyed at different markets and slaughter houses, as against 28,426 lbs. in the previous year. The total quantity of meat destroyed during the year was 6,135 lbs. as against 1,316 lbs. in the previous year.

During the year 5,066 buffaloes, 479 cows and 49,599 sheep and goats were brought for slaughter at the different slaughter houses, out of which 8 buffaloes, 1 cow and 1,361 sheep and goats were rejected on ante-mortem examination. Total approximate weight of dressed meat of buffaloes, cows and bullocks was 1,236 tons and that of sheep and goats 436.5 tons.

In all 14 raids were carried out for detecting unauthorized slaughter of animals in different parts of the suburbs. Out of 11 prosecutions launched, 6 resulted in convictions, 2 in acquittals and 3 cases were pending. Total fines inflicted were Rs. 490. Besides, 152 live goats were seized and 2,776 lbs. of confiscated meat destroyed as unwholesome. A sum of Rs. 160 was realized by way of sale of confiscated animals.

The total receipts of the Department were 4.42 lacs as against 4.59 lacs in the previous year. The decrease was due to the outstanding share of entrance fee recoverable from 'A' Budget.

The right of collecting blood was sold at Rs. 4,125 as against Rs. 2,500 realized during the previous year.

IX—EDUCATION (Suburban Primary Schools)

There were 93 Schools and 14 classes with a strength of 26,973 pupils and 739 teachers of whom 586 were trained and 153 untrained. Six new schools and classes were opened, two were closed and eight schools were converted into classes during the course of the year.

Cardboard modelling was taught in 20 schools, spinning in 4 schools and cooking Basic Education. in 3 schools.

The Education Officer and the Supervising Officers under her paid frequent visits to the Schools as usual.

Weekly examinations were taken and progress cards and progress registers maintained. Pupils of Standards I to III were promoted on the strength of their weekly progress and those of Standards IV to VII were subjected to written examinations. Out of 26,196 pupils who appeared at the annual examinations, 20,682 were successful giving a percentage of 79. 791 Pupils appeared at the Primary School Certificate Examination conducted by Government in April 1953 and 374 (i.e. 47%) were successful.

The number of Municipal owned school buildings at the beginning of the year was 34. During the year under review, one school building at Andheri was constructed partly out of the donations received from the public and partly at the cost of the Corporation.

The scheme of amalgamation of Boys' and Girls' Schools worked well in all the schools.

Fees were charged in Upper Primary Schools. All Harijan children were admitted free in Municipal Schools and children of employees of the Corporation, including the Bombay Electric Supply and Transport Undertaking, who were drawing a salary of up to Rs. 240 per month, were exempted from the payment of fees. 30 per cent. full freeships and 20 per cent. half freeships were also granted to poor and deserving pupils.

Text books for Suburban Schools were prescribed, as per the directions given by the Government, in Government Resolution, Education Department No. TBK/1051, dated the 11th January 1952.

Physical Education was imparted as per the curriculum laid down by the Physical Education. Government.

Various extra curricular activities, viz., Sharad Utsay, Vacation Libraries, In-Extra curricular actividependence Day and Republic Day Celebrations, School Anniversaries, Vana Mahotsay, Social Education Week and excursions to places of importance were carried out during the year.

Sports and Mass Annual Sports and Mass Drills were held during the year.

The usual activities of the Boy Scouts and the Girl Guides were carried out

Scouting and Girl during the year.

Guides.

A Census was taken for the enforcement of Primary Education of non-attending children of school going age. It was revealed that 5,414 children of compulsory age were non-attending and 3,265 of them were later admitted in Municipal Schools. The number of compulsory age pupils attending Municipal Schools was 18,275 as against 17,918 in the previous year.

There were 59 Aided Schools at the end of the year with 510 teachers imparting Aided and Recognised instruction to 15,245 pupils. The total amount of grants recommended for payment to Aided Schools for the year 1952-53 was Rs. 1,06,829 giving Rs. 7.7 as the cost per pupil to the Corporation. Besides the Aided Schools, there were 8 Recognised Schools with 33 teachers imparting instruction to 723 pupils.

The total amount at the disposal of the Education Committee for the year 1952-53

Income and Ex. was Rs.19,73,558-3-6. The total expenditure amounted to Rs.16,38,850-8-6 leaving a closing balance of Rs. 3,34,707-11-0. An amount of Rs. 5,50,000 was received from Government towards the cost of Primary Education in the Suburbs.

- (i) Gratis use of School premises.—School premises were allowed to be used gratis by recognised Educational Institutions outside school hours.
- (ii) Donations.—A donation of 5 steel cupboards was received from Shri Nanik G. Motwane, for the use of the Chembur Group of Municipal schools.

Municipal High School, Bandra

During the year under review, the Golden Jubilee of the Institution was held in December 1952 under the presidentship of Shri Dinkarrao Desai, B.A., LL.B. Minister: of Education, Bombay State.

The High School maintained 14 classes and the work was carried out in two shifts. The morning session was supervised by the Assistant Head Master and the afternoon shift by the Head Master. The number of students was 330 and 21 teachers (18 permanent and 3 temporary) were engaged throughout the year.

The income of the High School from all sources amounted to Rs. 49,044-10-0 as against an expenditure of Rs. 56,234.-9-3 leaving a deficit of Rs. 7,189-15-3.

Municipal Marathi Secondary Middle School, Ghatkopar

The School continued to be held in rented premises. The number of students in the school was 56. The school coached students of Standards VIII and IX. The arnual results were satisfactory. 56 students appeared for the examination out of whom 49 passed.

X-PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The total area of the Suburbs merged with the City is 43,398 acres, i.e., about Area and population. 67.81 square miles and the population as per census of 1951 is 5,10,151.

The total number of live births registered during the year was 16,966 as against Birth Registration.

14,407 for the year 1951.

The total number of deaths registered from all causes during the year was 6,005

Death Registration. as against 5.205 in 1951.

Deaths among infants under one year of age numbered 1,721, exceeding those of the previous year by 154. The infant mortality rate per 1,000 live births registered was 101.4 for the year 1952 as against 108.8 for the previous year.

No deaths were reported from Plague, Cholera, Cerebro-spinal meningitis and Infectious Diseases.

Poliomyelitis.

There were 14 deaths from Small-pox, 53 from Enteric Fever, 1 from Influenza and 220 from Tuberculosis.

The number of primary and re-vaccinations done was 24,000 and 70,564 respectively at the 25 different vaccination stations, as against 26,188 and 1,26,576 respectively in 1951.

Malaria registered 8 deaths. This was mainly due to the existence of cesspools in non-drained areas, unlicensed and insanitary Milch Cattle Stables, Slums and Low-lying plots of land and the consequent mosquito nuisance in the merged areas. This nuisance is, however, being brought under control to some extent by measures such as D.D.T. spraying and B.H.C. dusting of refuse collections, stables, etc., treatment of markets and stalls and also Tiffafogging.

Dysentry. There were 106 deaths from Dysentry.

Other Principal Diseases

There were 194 deaths from diseases of the respiratory system, 99 from Bronchitis, 279 from Diarrhoea, 1183 from Pneumonia, 745 from Congenital debility and 634 from Senile debility. Leprosy caused no deaths.

No special measures were adopted against these diseases, as relief was obtained from the City institutions in addition to those in the Suburbs.

The Institutions rendering Medical Relief in the merged area are as Medical Relief. under:

One Hospital at Bandra and the other at Kurla. One Maternity Home each at Municipal Hospitals Ghatkopar and Chembur and two Maternity Wards attached to the two Hospitals at Bandra and Kurla.

Two Mobile Hospital Units of the Peoples' Mobile Hospital were run by the Peoples' Mobile Hospitals in the Suburban area, one in H and K Wards and the other in L, M and N Wards.

There was a total accommodation of 70 beds for Maternity cases in the Hospitals and in the Maternity Homes at Ghatkopar and Chembur and of 33 beds for general tractment in the two Hospitals.

. The totall number of new in-door patients admitted in the Hospitals was 5,344.

The total number of new out-door patients treated in all the dispensaries including two Mobile Units was 1,24,652 and the total number of out-patients attendance was 3,39,061.

Attempts were made to bring the stables to conform to essential Bye-laws by imposing sanitary requirements on the stable-owners. An experiment of removal of wastes from the stables is proposed to be tried in Bandra through the agency of a contractor, working on behalf of the Municipality.

The Veterinary service was continued through the Veterinary Dispensary at Khar, which was placed in charge of a Veterinary Inspector. A scheme to introduce inoculations of cattle against Rinderpest was being contemplated.

Licenses were issued to all such trades as were found conducted in Municipal Other Licensable limits with a view to enforcing on them sanitary regulations. Pro-Tradés. Secutions had to be launched in several instances:

This included supervision and control through licensing of food-shops and establishments, inspection of food stuffs exposed for sale and seizure and destruction of food found unwholesome or unfit for human consumption.

To secure purity of articles of food exposed for sale, control was exercised through the enforcement of provisions of the Bombay Prevention of Adulteration Act 1925, as amended to date. Special attention was paid to sampling of milk under the Act. Out of 2,453 food samples examined chemically, 456 were, found adulterated. In all 493 prosecutions were launched and fines of Rs 26,790 were inflicted.

The Factory Inspector continued the inspection of factories etc., in the Suburban Inspection of Factories, workshops, etc.

area. The total number of permits issued was 163.

Disposal of sullage wastes from the premises into road side open storm water channels and drains was prohibited by a Public Notice and appropriate action was taken to prevent nuisance of smell, mosquito breeding etc., from the channels and drains. Slums and unauthorised old constructions, combined with the absence of sanitary conveniences in some cases and their inadequacy in others, resulted in the fouling of open spaces, yards, etc.

The greater portion of the Suburbs is undrained and unsewered. A good many premises have either inadequate or objectionable and inefficient sanitary conveniences and some have none at all. Statutory actions were, therefore, taken wherever possible, to enforce the provisions of appropriate sanitary accommodation:

Considerable progress was made in the substitution of basket privies by waterclosets on full flushing system in the sewered part of H Ward, Bandra, by having recourse to the Subvention Scheme.

Sanitary conditions in the numerous villages, gaothans and out-lying habitations have been far from satisfactory.

Nothing short of a slum-clearance programme will improve the sanitation of such areas. All available measures and expedients are, however, being adopted to improve conditions.

GENERAL REVIEW

There were no cases in the Suburbs in which the provisions of the Bombay Municipal Servants' Act, 1890 were invoked during the year.

An Award given by the Tribunal, Shri Salim A. Merchant, in connection with the dispute between the Bombay Municipal Subordinate Staff Union and the Bombay Municipal Corporation regarding revision of scales of pay of the clerical staff and other service conditions, was published in the Bombay Government Gazette on 5th July 1952. The terms of the above Award were extended to the entire concerned staff including the staff in the Suburbs during the year.

The estimated income for the year as per the Budget Estimates was Rs. 1,04,20,612 against which the Actuals amounted to Rs. 1,13,02,914 resulting in increase of Rs. 8,82,302 over the Budget Estimates and of Rs. 3,02,491 as compared with the Revised Exstimates viz., Rs. 1,10,00,423. LOAN FUNDS

10. The amount of new loan proposed in the Budget for 1952-53 was Rs. 50 lakhs. 'The loan Works programme was revised on the basis of urgency of works and the capacity of the departments to carry them out and a provision of Rs. 25 lakhs loan against Rs. 50 lakhs was made in the Revised Budget. A provision of Rs. 15 lakhs was also made for raising a loan from Government for the work of laying a pipe line for oil refineries at Trombay. The amount actually raised to finance the capital works expenditure including purchase of Plant and Machinery was Rs. 40 lakhs.

LOAN WORKS EXPENDITURE

11. The Opening Balance on the 1st April 1952 on account of Loan Funds, but excluding Trust Fund was Rs.27,78,908. Adding to this Rs. 40 lakks raised during the year the total funds available for expenditure were Rs 67,78,908. The total expenditure incurred during the year amounted to Rs. 21,99,697 leaving an unspent balance of Rs. 45,79,211 in the Loan Funds at the close of the year.

SINKING FUNDS

13. From Appendix No. 10 it will be seen that the bork value of investments of the Sinking Funds as on 31st March 1953 amounted to Rs. 9,13,395 made up of Rs. 9,13,178 being the book value of securities and Rs, 217 in cash with the Imperial Bank of India. Valuing the Municipal Debentures at par the market value of Sinking Fund Investments held on 31st March 1953 comes to Rs. 8,97,474 as shown in Appendix No. 16A. This together with the amount of interest accrued up to 31st March 1953, viz., Rs. 19,468 and cash with the Imperial Bank of India Rs. 217 brings the total amount of Sinking Fund to Rs. 9,17,159 and more than covers the amount viz., Rs. 9,03,915 to which the Sinking Fund should have accumulated up to 31st March 1953. The excess in the Sinking Fund Investment account was thus Rs. 13,244.

The average rates of interest on Current Account Deposits, Call Deposits and Fixed Deposits were 0.87 per cent. 2.48 per cent. and 3.10 per cent. as against 0.50 per cent., 2.06 per cent. and 2.38 per cent. for the preceding year respectively. The rate realized on Call Deposits ranged from 24 per cent. to 3 per cent. while that realized on Fixed Deposits ranged from 25 per cent. to 31 per cent. The maximum rates realized on Call Deposits and Fixed Deposits during the preceding year were 3 per cent. on both the deposits.

The average rate of interest on all Deposits was 2.70 per cent. as against 2.13 per cent. in the preceding year.

DEPARTMENTAL STOCK VERIFICATION

15. Verification of Stores, Dead-stock, Plant and Machinery in the various Suburban Offices was taken up from January 1952 and during the period ended 31st March 1953 verification of Stores of 40 Offices such as Hospitals, Conservancy Wards, Works Chowkies, Dispensaries, Maternity Homes, Markets, Public Health Department, Water Works, Assessment and Collection Department was carried out. The Dead Stocks of Schools at Bandra and Ghatkopar were also checked. Statements of unserviceable articles in various schools were scrutinized.

The scrutiny of accounts of Dead Stocks apparatus and appliances maintained by the various offices in the suburbs revealed that there was no uniformity in maintaining the accounts and the accounts were not properly maintained. There were several discrepancies of shortages and excesses.

The departments were asked to carry out rectifications wherever necessary and to maintain the books as on the City lines.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS

16. The provision made in the Revised Loan Works Budget for meeting claims on account of acquisition of set backs was Rs. 25,000 (excluding Rs. 50,000 earmarked for adding set back lands to roads) against which no expenditure was booked during the year. Thus there is a balance of Rs. 25,000. After deducting all ascertained timebarred claims the undischarged commitments upto 31st March 1953 in regard to set backs already acquired and sanctioned to be acquired amount to Rs. 10,744 as stated by Asstt. Engineer (Suburbs) against which we have a provision of Rs. 25,000 (excluding Rs. 50,000 earmarked for adding set back lands to roads) in the Budget for 1953-54. In addition to this, further liabilities may be expected on account of further acquisition of set backs that will be sanctioned during 1953-54.

GENERAL REMARKS

(000 Omitted)

17. In the Budget Estimates for the year the Income was originally estimated at Rs. 1,04,20, the expenditure Rs. 98,66, the surplus being Rs. 5,54.

On the basis of eight months' actuals the Income for the year was further revised to Rs. 1,10,00 and and expenditure to Rs. 1,14,35 resulting in a deficit of Rs. 4,35.

The actual Income realised was Rs. 1,13,03 and expenditure aggregated to Rs. 1,02,54 resulting in a surplus of Rs. 10,49.

Reasons for increases in Income are detailed in Statement 'A'.

The expenditure for the year was estimated at Rs. 98,66 and as per revised estimate (8 months basis) at Rs. 1,14,35. The final grants, however sanctioned aggregated to Rs. 1,22,42 against which the actual expenditure booked was Rs. 1,02,54 resulting in an unexpended balance of Rs. 19,88 at the close of the year. As against the unexpended balance of Rs. 19,88 the departments proposed renewal of grants to the extent of Rs. 10,44 for expenditure in 1953-54 and the balance of Rs. 9,44 was treated as savings.

The Opening Surplus Cash Balance was Rs. 17,81. The transactions for the year resulted in the surplus of Rs. 10,49. Thus the balance at the close of the year was increased to Rs. 28,30 and after taking into account the decrease in the reservation of advances as detailed in para. 2 the balance at the end of the year stood at Rs. 31,67.

The expenditure estimated for the year on Loan Works as detailed in para. No. 12 was Rs. 79,94 revised Rs. 64,44 against which the actuals amounted to Rs. 20,82 thus the actuals fell short of the Budget and Re vised estimates by 74 per cent. and 68 per cent. respectively.

The position regarding Sinking Fund was satisfactory as there was an excess accumulation of Rs. 13.

Before conclusion I would like to add that the staff had done their duty loyally and with commendable zeal.

ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION (SUBURBS.)

Shri I. N. Mehta was in charge of the Department till the end of the year under report.

Rates of Taxation.—The rates of taxation on buildings for the year were—General Tax (including Fire Tax) at 173 per cent. and Halalkhor Tax at 3 per cent. The general tax on properties in chargeable villages specified in list I and on the buildings and lands occupied for industrial purposes in the areas specified in list II of the Bombay Act of 1951 (an Act to amend the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act) was 10 per cent. Properties in the chargeable villages having rateable values of Rs. 75 and under were exempted from the tax. The tax on vehicles and animals was levied at the maximum rates as mentioned in Schedule G. The rates charged for the supply of water by meaurements varied from Annas 12 to Rs. 2-4-0 per 1000 gallons.

Properties.—The total number of properties on the 31st March 1953, was 30,854 as shown in Statement 'A'. Out of these properties, 29,107 were assessed to General Tax, 1,106 were exempted from General Tax under Section 143(1)(a) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and 190 which were wells, tanks, urinals, etc., were not assessed. The number of Municipal properties exempted from General Tax under Section 143(1)(b) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act was 451.

There were 1,685, 771 and 258 properties newly assessed, enlarged and demolished respectively, during the year. The corresponding figures for the year 1951-52 were 1,227, 510 and 450. The number of single-room tenements, double-room tenements and flats or blocks in the Suburbs on the 31st March 1953, was 65.053, 19,641 and 13,947, respectively.

Rateable Value.—The rateable value of all the properties in the Suburbs on the 31st March 1953 was Rs. 3,05,31,611 as against Rs. 2,91,19,370 on the 31st March 1952. It worked out to Rs. 59.85 (population 5,10,151) per head o' population as against Rs. 57.08 (population 5,10,151) in the preceding year. In 325 cases, the rateable value was increased by more than Rs. 2,000 each.

Meter Hire.—Receipts from meter hire amounted to Rs. 1,09,240.2-0 as against Rs. 46,819-0-0 in 1951-52. Rs. 38,743-2-0 remained to be collected at the end of the year.

Exemption.—The amount of full exemption allowed in respect of General Tax on properties entitled to such exemption under Section 143(1-a) (1-b) and partial exemption under Section 144(3) and 145(3) was Rs. 2,19.639-15-0.

Drawback,—64 claims for drawback were received during the year, out of which 40 claims were rejected and 24 were under scrutiny on the 31st March 1953.

Complaints and Appeals against Rateable values.—4,679 Complaints were registered during the year under report, out of which 1,665 complaints were registered under Section 167 of the Act and 3,014, were registered under Section 162 of the Act.

There were 16 appeals against rateable values under Section 162(2) of the Municipal Act. Of these 1 was decided, 5 were settled out of Court, 1 was dismissed, 1 was withdrawn and 8 were pending, on 31st March 1953.

Suits.—No suits were filed against ratepayers for recovery of taxes during the year under report.

Riot Tax.—The total amount of Riot tax co'lected during the year under report in respect of previous riots was Rs. 10,569-0.0, leaving a balance of Rs. 79,160-12-0 to be recovered as on 31-3-1953.

Miscellaneous Receipts.—Miscellaneous receipts realised from Notices of Demand, Distress Warrants, Bataki fees, Inspection fees and other items amounted to Rs. 15,975-5-0. The number of Notices of Demand issued and served and Distress Warrants issued and executed during the year was 40,360, 33,852 and 5,99,184 respectively.

Urban Immoveable Property Tax.—The rates of taxation during the 1st half of the year 1952-53 i.e., from 1st April 1952 to 30th September 1952 continued to be the same as in the preceding year, viz.,7 per cent. in the case of buildings and lands, the rateable values of which were above Rs. 1,000 in each case and 3½ per cent. in the case of buildings and lands, the rateable value of less than Rs. 200 per annum continued to be exempted. However, the rates of taxation of this tax were altered with effect from 1st October 1952 as per Government Notification Extra, No. 626, dated the 26th September 1952. The reduced rates were 5 per cent. in the case of buildings and lands the retable values of which were above Rs. 2,000 in each case, and 2½ per cent. in the case of buildings and lands, the rateable values of which were Rs. 2,000 and below but not less than Rs. 500 in each case. Properties having rateable value of Rs. 499 and below were exempted. The net demand in respect of the tax was Rs. 22,13,313 and the amount collected was Rs. 12,72,220. The collection of the Urban Immoveable Property Tax during the year amounted to about Rs. 57.05 per cent. of the demand.

General Remarks.—The Indoor Unit of the Department (Assessment and Bills Sections), stationed at four Ward Offices, was centralised at the new premises at St. Martin's Road, Bandra with effect from 1st June 1952.

All the lands in the merged area which were either enclosed or given for storage permanently were assessed to taxes for the first time from 1st April 1952. The General and Urban Immoveable Property taxes were levied on such lands.

The mode of issuing the bills for water charges was changed during the year and the bills were issued half yearly instead of quarterly. The bills for IV quarter 1951-52 (from 1st January 1952 to 31st March 1952 and I half 1952-53 (from 1st April 1952 to 31st August 1952) were issued during 1952-53. Thus the water consumption for 8 months only was accounted for and charged.

Special attention was paid to the work of collection of taxes and an amount of Rs. 85,64,578 was collected during the year against an amount of Rs. 65,05,227 collected in 1951-52.

There was no occasion during the year on which provision of the Bombay Municipal Servant Act had to be brought into effect.

Both indoor and outdoor staff worked with appreciable zeal and devotion.

STATEMENT 'A'

SPECIAL ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT

PUBLIC WORKS

Shri N. F. J. Bilia, B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E., held the post of Assistant Engineer, 1st Grade Suburbs upto 30th June 1952. Shri N. K. Gandhi, B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E., Dip. (Planning), was transferred to this post from 1st July 1952 and continued in that office during the remaining year.

A.-UPKEEP, MAITNENANCE AND REPAIRS

(1) Buildings.—An amount of Rs. 18,886-9-6 was spent during the year on normal repairs including monsoon works on about 96 Municipal buildings in the Suburbs. The works carried out under Special Repairs and New Works are shown in Appendices 'A' and 'B' respectively.

The works were carried out through the Contractors as well as departmentally. The amount on the Departmental Works, booked during the year, was Rs. 1,09,048-2-6 as against Rs. 54,518-12-0 on works carried out through Petry Works Contractors.

Plans and Estimates amounting to Rs. 53,71,068 for repairs and new works were prepared as per the requisitions from the various Departments for Budget purposes though the actual provision in the Budget was much less.

An inventory of all the Municipal properties in the Suburbs was under preparation,

(2) Roads.—The total mileage of the roads in the Suburbs is about 124, comprising 44 miles of water-bound surface, 71 miles of asphalt roads, 1 mile of concrete road and 8 miles of unmetalled roads.

The water bound and kutcha roads covering an area of 21.23 lacs sq. yds. were watered on alternate days during the year.

Many of the approach roads to the villages were asphalted with the provision made under New Works. The list of works carried out by the contractors at an aggregate cost of Rs. 3,49,793-13-0 is given in Appendix 5C.

About 300 name-boards in the different developed areas of the suburbs were either renovated or newly installed.

⁽iii) Street Lighting.—As the street-lighting contracts with the Bombay Suburban Electric Supply Limited, for the suburban areas, excepting Bandra, expired during the year fresh negotiations were carried on with the Company for the work of providing street lights in all the Suburban areas (excepting those at Bhandup under the jurisdiction of the Thana Electric Supply Co.) now included in the Bombay Municipality. The new rates sanctioned under Standing Committee Resolution No. 941, dated the 5th September 1952 were broughtinto force from 1st March 1953.

The general work of improving lighting on many of the Suburban Roads was in progress. The wattages of a number of lamps in the streets were increased generally from 25 to 60 watts and new street lights were provided on many of the roads in the areas, where there were no lights. Most of the through and main Roads were provided with light as against 3,323 street lights existing on 29th February 1952 there were 3,965 street lights on 28th February 1953. The annual expenditure on lighting during the year was Rs. 1,61,754-1-10 as against Rs. 1,36,317-10-6 during the last year.

A Scheme for improving street lighting on Ghodbunder Road and Bombay Agra Road, was finalised and it was proposed to provide 125 H.P. Mercury Vapur lamps on both these roads as also on some important junctions, the work being proposed to be done in three stages.

(3) Sewers and Drains.—Sewers—Only Bandra and Santa Cruz areas are sewered; cleansing of the sewers in these areas was attended to.

In this area there are four pumping stations at Bunderwadi, Chimbai, Jai Bharat and Khar, the last three Pumping Stations again discharging into the first named.

(i) Bunderwadi Pumping Station.—This is the main Pumping Station and it worked non-stop throughout the year. It is equipped with three 13 H.P. pumps, each having a capacity of 600 gallons per month. Sewage pumped during the dry weather amounted to 6,08,276 gallons per day, as against 6,70,186 gallons per day during the previous year, while during the monsoon the sewage pumped amounted to 11,76,057 gallons per day as against 9,54,213 gallons per day during the previous year.

This Pumping Station is inadequate to cope with the quantity of sewage reaching it from the areas directly connected to it, especially during the rainy season, with the result that Chimbai Pumping Station and Khar Pumping Station remained completely closed during heavy rains. The sewage from the latter two pumping stations, was, therefore, allowed to overflow into the creek during the monsoon. The proposal for remodelling Bunderwadi Pumping Station was sanctioned and the work would be taken in hand shortly.

- (ii) Chimbai Pumping Station.—This Pumping Station worked satisfactorily throughout the year. In dry weather, it pumped 1,22,162 gallons per day against 59,165 gallons per day during the last year, while in monsoon it pumped 1,38,282 gallons per day against 1,26,537 gallons per day during the previous year.
- (iii) Jai Bharat Pumping Station.—This Pumping Station worked satisfactorily throughout the year. During dry weather it pumped 44,012 gallons per day against 22,528 gallons per day during the last year, in monsoon, it pumped 77,064 gallons per day against 35,510 gallons per day during the previous year. The charges for electric current were still being borne by the Jai Bharat Society.
- (iv) Khar Pumping Station.—This Pumping Station has only two pumps of 15 H. P. each. An additional horizontal pump of like capacity has been provided in a small building near the existing pumping station. Construction of additional sewers in this locality was nearing completion; hence to cope with this increased sewage, two 9 M. G. capacity and 25 H. P. pumps from Mahim pumping Station were being installed. This Pumping Station pumped 5,35,369 gallons sewage per day during monsoon and 3,90,926 gallons per day during dry weather.
- S. W. Drainage.—There are at present open side drains by the sides of the roads, which are mostly kutcha so as to make the rain water flow properly. They were attended to during the year.

 As most of these drains carry sullage water, construction of paved drains in many cases is very urgent.
- (4) Miscellaneous.—(i) Ferry service. The Ferry Service running between Versova and Madh Island was maintained. The total receipts during the year amounted to Rs. 17,492 as against the expenditure of Rs. 13,662-11-0. Two boats required urgent repairs and repairs to one of them was carried out at a cost of Rs. 900-0-0 during the year. Frequent complaints were also received about the condition of the two wharves at either end of the ferry. Some repairs to them were carried out.
- (ii) Plant and Machinery.—Four tar boilers were purchased at a cost of Rs. 3,453-2-0. Tenders were invited for the supply of 1 steam road roller, 2 lorries for carrying materials and one water lorry for use, in t different wards.
- (iii) Maintenance of Electrical Works.—The work in connection with this is rapidly increasing. During the year under report, more than 400 works were attended to. These works mainly consisted of (a) Testing of electrical installations, (b) Submitting estimates, for repairs and new works and (c) Carrying out minor repairs to the existing electrical installations of Municipal Offices, Markets; Hospitals, etc., in the Suburbs.
- (iv) Inspection of Factories, Workshops and Work Places.—The total number of permits and licence cases inspected and disposed of during the year was 105.9 nuisance cases were attended to and necessary steps were taken.

Surprise visits were also paid to several factories to ascertain whether these factories were permitted or otherwise. No notices were issued under Section 392 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. Total number of new cases inspected was 34.—Detailed information with regard to this has been given in Appendix 'D'.

(iii) Improvement of private roads.—Plans and estimates for improving the two private roads, viz., New Nagardas Road, Andheri and Bulsroyce Colony at Santacruz, were prepared. It is proposed to take action under Section 377(I-A) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

- (iv) Village Amenities.—With a view to provide amenities in different villages, plans and estimates amounting to Rs. 4.45 lacs for improvement of the surfaces of the main passages and provision of side-drains were prepared and sanctioned by the Corporation.
- (v) Improvement of S. W. Drains.—It has been found that many of the areas in the Suburbs get flooded during the monsoon. The areas at Bandra, Khar, Santacruz, Vile Parle, Kurla and Chembur are the worst affected. The main cause of flooding is that many of the low lying lands were brought under development by filling them up, with the result that free storm water flow in many cases is obstructed; besides S. W. Drains in the areas have not been properly designed in proportion to the areas served by them. Estimates for the schemes for improvement of the S. W. Drains in the areas of Khar and Vile Parle, were sanctioned by the Corporation during the year.
- (vi) Public Sanitary Conveniences.—There is an urgent necessity of constructing public sanitary conveniences in all the areas of the Suburbs. Plans and estimates for different areas were prepared but the main difficulty is the non-availabality of suitable sites. Many of the selected sites vest in Government, who have been requested to make them available to the Municipality. Until these sites are available, not much progress can be had in this respect.

(D) SEWERAGE SCHEME FOR SUBURBS

The year under review commenced with a hectic activity in respect of Sewerage and Sewage disposal works in the Suburban area.

- (i) Work in progress.—The following works which were commenced either during the year under report or in the previous year, were completed except for some minor works such as vent shaft connections and departmental works of reinstatement of trenches:-
 - (1) Laying 9" Hume Pipe Sewer in Convent Avenue, etc., and in the 2nd Hasanabad Lane at Santa Cruz.
 (2) Laying 12"-9" H. P. Sewers in Linking Road from junction Pali Road to Junction Ghodbunder
 - Road at Bandra.
 - (3) Laying 9" dia. Hume Pipe Sewer in Ghodbunder Road from junction Society Road to Junction Church Avenue and 24" dia. H. P. Sewer in South Avenue from Junction Ghodbunder Road to Junction Linking Road, etc.
 - (4) Laying 9" sewer in Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Road from Junction 1st Road to Khar Pali Road. and 15"-12" Sewer in South Avenue from Junction Likning Road to Junction 1st Road at Khar.
 - (5) 9" S. W. Pipe Sewer in 15th, 16th and 17th Roads including 9" S. W. branch connections at Khar.
 - (6) 24" sewer in linking Road from Junction south Avenue to Manhole No. 17 at Santa Cruz.
 - (7) 24" sewer in Linking Road from Manhole No. 17, to Junction Road and 12"-9" Sewer in North Avenue, Ghodbunder Road and Tank Road.
 - (8) Laying 12"-9" Sewers in Station Road, Saraswati Road and 9" Sewer in St. Andrew's Road, Santacruz.

The total expenditure booked on the abovementioned sewer works during the year was Rs. 10,40,658-0-0 against the budget provision of Rs. 21,44,785-0-0.

- (ii) New Works to be undertaken.—Tenders were also invited for the following works, the execution of which will practically complete the sewage works of District No. 1 on the Western side of the Railway line up to Saraswati Road and Station Road, Santacruz (Excepting for the areas undet T. P. S. Bandra III and IV).
 - (1) Sewer in Khari Village, Khari Gaothan, 32nd Road, in T. P. S. III Bandra.
 - (2) 9' Sewer in Main Avenue, West Avenue, Croft Lane, Gurjar Lane, St. Andrew's Road and Old Tank Road with branch connections.
 - (3) Sewers in 18th, 19th and 20th, 21st, 1st and 14-A Roads at Khar.

- (iii) Sewerage at Ghatkopar.—Due to the insistant demand for the sewerage facilities particularly from Ghatkopar area, the suvery of Distrcit No. III (Ghatkopar and Chembur) comprising an area of 7,450 acres was completed during the year and plans and estimates amounting to Rs. 35 8,389 were also sanctioned by the Corporation under their Resolut on No. 1049, dated the 17th January 1953. Tenders were invited for four of the major sewer works in Ghatkopar-Kirol area costing about Rs. 13 lacs.
- (iv) Disposal Works.—Land required for the purification works at Khar was purchased form Government at # cost of about Rs. 90,000 and the work in connection with the purification works thereat would be started before the next monsoon.

Negotiations for acquiring land at Versova, Kurla, Gharkopar and Bunderwadi Bandra for the installation of pumping stations or purification works were opened with the Government during the year.

(F)-INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF PRIVATE BUILDINGS

- (i) Special Building Bye-laws for the suburbs.—The Speical Building Bye-laws for the Suburbs in addition to the existing Building Regulations in the City, finally approved by the Corporation were confirmed by the Government of Bombay, Local Self Government and Public Health Department under their Resolution No. 4311/33 dated the 15th April 1952, and were brought into force from that date.
- (ii) New constructions.—1281 applications were received for the erection of New Buildings and for additions and alterations to the existing buildings, out of which 859 were under Section 337 and 422 under Section 342 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

The total number of buildings newly constructed (including those wherein additions and alterations were made) by private enterprise was 447 during the year of which 342 were residential and remaining 105 non-residential buildings. The total number of buildings constructed by Co-operative Housing Societies and by Employers for their employees were 14 and 1 respectively. The non-residential buildings included garages, godowns, factory sheds, schools, sanitary blocks, etc.

In all 823 completion certificates were received, out of which 663 were disposed of during the year and 529 buildings were sanctioned for occupation.

- (iii) Unauthorised constructions.—A good deal of unauthorised building construction work is taking place in the Suburbs. On the one hand, owing to vastness of the area there is difficulty in detecting such structures. On the other hand punitive actions provided under the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act are neither deterrent nor expeditious. Moreover, when the unauthorised structure is completed and is occupied, it is the tenants who suffer, thereby adding further to the difficulty in getting the unauthorised works removed. It is urgently necessary to have more effective powers by amending Section 351 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.
- (iv) Complaints from the Public.—In all 1,300 complaints were received from the public during the year.

 Out of these 1,005 complaints were looked into and necessary action was taken. This leaves only 295 cases in which action was not completed at the close of the year.
- In all 2,747 notices were issued under different sections of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. 644 Prosecutions were launched against the house owners for non-compliance with the requisitions and the results of the proceedings are given in Appendix 'E.'
- (v) Building Collapse.—16 Buildings or portions thereof collapsed during the year. There were no casualities except an injury to a person in one case.
- (vi) Cement Authorizations to Private Owners—Cement continued to be in short supply and the work of issuing authorisations for cement to private house owners for urgent and essential repairs to their buildings was continued during the year. Authorisations aggregating to 130.05 tons were issued during the year after scrutiny of the applications by inspection of works a site.
- (vii) Regular lines of Streets and layouts of New Road.—Regular lines of the following streets were prescribed under Section 297 (1) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. (1) Pali Hill Road, Bandra; (2) Carter Road, Bandra; (3) Pali Gaothan Road; (4) Nagardas Road, Andheri; (5) Mahatma Gandhi Road, Vile Parle; (6) Takia Market Road, Kurla; (7) Road Joining Old Agra Road to New Bombay Agra Road, Kurla; (8) Ramji Asar Lane, Ghatkopar.
- (viii) Set-back lands added to the Public Road.—The total area of set-backs, added to the roads during the year was 7,444 square yards. The cost of acquiring 207 square yards of land amounted to Rs. 1,686. Set-back compensation for the remaining area was under consideration.
- The important set-back added during the year was at Nagardas Road, Andheri, where the road was widened from 10' to 40. A Major portion of the area was given free of cost to the Municipality.
- (ix) Layouts sanctioned under Section 302 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.—A list of layouts for plots and private streets sanctioned, with the approval of the Standing Committee, under Section 303(1) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act during the year is given in Appendix 'F.'
- (x) City Survey.—The work of carrying out the city survey in the Suburban areas was entrusted to the Government and an amount of Rs. 24,717 was deposited with them so far. The City Survey of Gnatkopar Area was in progress.

F-TOWN PLANNING SCHEMES

- (i) Variations.— The variations declared in connection with nine Town Planning Schemes vis., Bandra, I, II, III, IV, V, VI and Santacuz III, and Ghatkopar I and II, were found void in law, as the prescribed time-limits since the last date of Government's sanction had not elapsed.
- (ii) Schemes in progress.—The position as regards other schemes in progressis as follows.

 1. T.P. S.X—Bandra.—The Arbitrator has submitted, T. P. Scheme X, Banra, to the Government—for their sanction. After the sanction is received the work of the Tribunal of Arbitration will begin.
- 2. T.P. S. V.—Santacruz.—Arbitration proceedings were in the final stage and the award was expected shortly. One of the roads in this scheme was constructed during the year under review, at an estimated cost of Rs. 44,000 and the accounts thereof are being adjusted.
- 3. Draft T. P. S. III. Gratkspar.—The work of preparation of the Draft Schemes was duly completed and the same has been tentatively approved by the Corporation under C. R. No. 1559, dated the 30th March 1953.
- 4. Draft Town Planning Scheme VI, Santaeruz.—The work of preparation of the Scheme is in the final stage and will be submitted to the Corporation before the time allowed for the preparation of this scheme is over.
- (iii) New Draft Scheme.— In addition, another area in Vile Parle has been brought under the provision of T. P. Act. The Corporation have declared their intention to make a Town Planning Scheme (T. P. No. VI, Vile Parle), for this area, under C. R. No. 1499, dated the 17th March 1953, and preliminary survey in this connection is in progress. As this area is not city surveyed, Government have been requested to give top priority to carry out the city survey work of this area.
- (iv) Commencement Certificates.—Approval of the State Government to the form of Commencement Certificate to be granted in respect of the Draft Town Planning Schemes, Bandra X, Santacruz, V and VI, and Ghatkopar III, which were yet to be finalised was not received till the close of the year under report.

Applications for grant of Commencement Certificates received since August, 1952, were as follows:

(1) Town Planning Scheme, Ghatkopar III-No. 33.
(2) " " Bandra X - No. Nil.
(3) " " Santacruz V - No. 6.
(4) " " VI - No. 10.

These proposals were duly scrutinised and provisional permissions were granted to the owners of the proposed buildings after taking necessary deposits.

(v) Removal of Unauthorised Works.—Frequent compiaints were received from the Collector as well as from the private landlords for removal of the unauthorised structures in plots falling under different T. P. Schemes in the Suburbs. Most of these unauthorised works consist of sheds, constructed many years before the area was merged with the Bombay Municipal Corporation. Besides, owing to the shortage of housing accommodation, it was not considered desirable to take any drastic action for their removal. However, the matter was under review.

(G) CONCLUDING REMARKS

The area of the Suburbs merged within the limits of the Bombay Municipal Corporation is very large and the Corporation's resources are limited. It will, therefore, be a long time before all the amenities on City standards as demanded by the residents of the Suburbs are provided. However, an all-found effort was made during the year to improve the conditions of these areas and to previde additional amenities within the resources available. The patching work of the asphalted roads was attended to and all the existing roads were maintained in a state of good repairs. Some of the main approach roads to villages were asphalted. Street lighting on many of the roads was improved and new lights were provided in the areas which were hitherto unlighted. Sewerage facilities are being extended and public sanitary conveniences provided in all parts. A Fire Brigade Station was under construction at Andheri. There was also a proposal for providing a Maternity Home and a Mobile Hospital Unit at Ghatkopar. Problems with regard to flooging of the low-lying area, were under consideration and proposals for improvements of some of the areas were approved by the Corporation.

WATER WORKS

1. Shri K. B. Carnac, B.E. (Civil), M.I.C.E., M.I.E., was in charge of the Office of the Hydraulic Engineer during the year under review.

DISTRIBUTION OF WATER SUPPLY AND SUPPLY STATISTICS

- 2. Sources of supply.—Suburbs like the City are supplied with water by gravity from the three lakes, viz., Tansa, Vihar and Tulsi. Details regarding the arrangement of mains for supply of water from these lakes are given in the report of the Water Works Department of the City.
- 3. Supply System.—In the Suburban areas, water is supplied for all 24 hours except for certain elevated localities like Bandra Hill and Pali Hill, which receive water for 10 hours at night time through Bandra and Malla Pumping Stations respectively. Water for all purposes is charged on the basis of meter measurement at the rates prescribed by the Standing Committee from year to year.
- 4. Western Division.—This Division, which comprises of Bandra, Khar, Danda, Santacruz, Callina (H Ward), Juhu, Vile-Parle, Andheri, Versova, Jogeshwari and Majas (K Ward) was supplied water from 10 principal tappings on the 24" Tulsi Pipe Line, which has a maximum discharging capacity of 4.25 million gallons per day. The average quantity of water actually supplied by this main during the year from Tulsi Lake was 4.07 million gallons per day supplemented by a further supply from the 57" East Tansa main to give a total average daily supply of about 5.08 million gallons required for the western suburbs and other areas falling outside the Greater Bombay limits.
- 5. Eastern Division.—This Division comprises of Chembur and Trombay (M Ward), Kurla and Marol (L Ward), Ghatkopar, Vikhroli and Bhandup (N Ward) and was supplied water through 10 principal tappings on the 48" 32" and 24" Vehar main. A 6" connection from Tansa Duct Line along Powai Road supplies water to a group of factories at Vikhroli in N Ward. The total supply made to the Eastern Suburbs during the year was about 3.8 million gallons per day.
- 6. Number of connections.—The total number of connections in the merged areas at the end of the year was 10.040. In addition to this, there were 142 connections to public stand pipes and Municipal properties. 590 new connections varying from ½" size to 2" size were given during the year under review as against 423 of the previous year as shown in Appendix No. III.
- 7. Quantity of water supplied.—About 3,140 million gallons of water were supplied to the Suburban areas during the year as per details given below:—

(a) Domestic ... 2,127 million gallons.

(b) Non-domestic ... 807 million gallons.

(c) Charitable Institution ... 85 million gallons.

(d) Squatters' Colony and Municipal ... 26 million gallons.

(e) Public stand pipes ... 95 million gallons.

3,140 million gallons.

This quantity was supplied by Budget 'A' to Budget 'D' at the rate of As. 6 per 1,000 gallons. An amount of Rs. 8,88,750 was provided in the Budget Estimates 'D' for the year 1952-53 on this account.

- 8. Reservoirs (Balancing Tanks).—Out of five reservoirs (balancing tanks), two reservoirs—one at Malla and the other at Ghatkopar—were in use and were maintained at total cost of Rs. 344.
- Complaints regarding absence of Municipal water supply.—In all 67 complaints were received from tenants regarding absence of municipal water supply to their premises, and necessary action was taken against the owners of the premises.
- 10. Number of fire calls and quantity of water used.—The total number of fire calls attended by the Water Department was 32 and about 2.7 million gallons were used by the Fire Brigade for the purpose. In the absence of municipal water mains or hydrants, water for fire purposes was mostly drawn through Municipal and private wells.
- 11. Short supply complaints.—The number of short supply complaints received and attended to during the year was about 800. The complaints were mostly attributed to the strained relations between the tenants and the landlords.
- 12. Disconnecting water supply.—55 connections were disconnected for non-payment of water dues and infringement of Water Bye-laws.
- 13. Court Cases.—296 Notices were served on owners for the defects in water fittings at private premises and for infringement of the provisions of the Municipal Act and for violation of Bye-laws-relating to the Water Works. Arising out of these notices, 27 prosecutions were launched before the Presidency Magistrate resulting in 15 convictions and 6 acquittals and six cases were pending at the end of the year. The amount of fine recovered was Rs. 340.
- 14. Notice under Section 278(2) for repair to private meter .--1,073 notices were issued for repairs to private meters and action was taken in respect of 109 cases, where the owners failed to repair their meters.

II-MAINTENANCE OF WATER WORKS

- Stations) were maintained at a total cost of R. 6,780. As these pumping sets were of inadequate capacity, four sets of "PULSOMETER" Type, two-stage Centrifugal Pumps with "WITTON" 40 BHP, Induction Motors were purchased at a total cost of Rs. 32,147, which would be received in the middle of the next financial year.
- 16. Length of water mains and number of hursts.—98 miles of water mains of sizes varying from 1" to 18" were maintained during the year. There were 79 bursts as per details given in Appendix No. 11. In addition, a few heavy leaks were observed on the mains, which were repaired promptly 2,078 works pertaining to chokes. in service pipes and repairs to communication pipes, fire hydrants, road surface boxes, etc., were attended to The cost of temporary labour and materials was met from the grant under "General works and repairs including materials", and of permonent labour from the Establishment grant.
- 17. Public stand pipes and wells.—142 Public stand pipes and 93 wells were maintained during the year at a cost of about Rs. 3,576 and Rs. 2,877 respectively. About 95 million gallons of water was supplied gratuitously to public through public stand pipes.
- 18. Testing of water fittings.—The work of testing of galvanised iron pipes \(\frac{1}{2}\)" to 2" and galvanised iron fittings such as couplings, bends, tees, elbows, etc., brass and gunmetal fittings such as stop-teps, bib-taps, etc., and water closets cisterns, was carried out during the year at the Water Works Office at Bandra and Kurla. The total number of such pipes and fittings tested was 61,231. The revenue derived from testing of pipes, fittings, etc., sent by private parties amounted to Rs. 6,344-5-0.

III-METER SECTION

- 19. The two meter Workshops in the Suburbs—one at Bandra and the Second at Kurla were closed and the work of repairing meters was transferred to the new Central Workshop at Charkopar. The overhauling of private meters was also undertaken. The required machinery like Travelling Crane, Milling Machine, Lathe, Watch-maker's Lathe, Punching Machine Grinders, Buffing Machine, etc., were purchased and installed in the Workshop. Certain spare parts of meters like gear-wheels, pinions, etc., were also manufactured in the workshop. It is the ultimate aim to manufacture all spare parts of meters in this workshop.
- 20. Testing of meters.—During the year 2,093 Municipal meters of different sizes were tested at the Ghatkopar Workshop. In addition 221, meters (both Municipal and private as well) were tested at the request of the owners. The revenue derived from testing of water meters amounted to Rs. 9,703.
- 21. Repairs and overhauling of meters.—In all 3,582 municipal meters were repaired during the year under review.
- 22. Purchase of meters.—From the provision of Rs. 50,000 made in the Budget Estimates 'D' for the year 1952-53 under 'Plant and Machinery' from special funds, 512 'Kent' meters of sizes varying from ½" to 4" were purchased, and a further order was also placed for the supply of 586 meters of sizes varying from ½" to 8". These meters are expected to be received during the year 1953-54.
- 23. Number of connections.—Out of 10,040 connections in use in the Suburbs at the end of the year, 6,047 were provided with municipal meters, 3,711 had private meters while the remaining 282 connections were without meters.
- 24. Revenue from meter hire and from sale of water.—The total revenue derived during the year from meter hire was about Rs. 1,18,549 and that from the sale of water by meter measurement about Rs. 20,35,675.

IV-LOAN WORKS (Construction Branch)

- 25. Works carried out during the year.—For improving the water supply in the Suburbs, water mains of different sizes were laid at a total cost of about Rs. 5 lacs and the works were carried out from Capital Works Loan Funds.
- The benefit of piped water supply was extended to the villages of Shaar, Mandala, Vikhroli, Chembur Gaothan, Kirol, Bamanwada and Versowa. These villages, upto now, were depending on private wells, which frequently used to dry up during the hot season.
- the year.

 The following work was carried out for Assistant Engineer (Housing)—The following work was carried out during the year.

 Laying water mains for Squatters' Colony at logeshwari.—4.170 R.ft. of 9" to 2" pipes were laid for Squatters' Colony at Majas 1,157 feet of G.I. pipes 14" to 1" size were laid for connections to 16 large standpipes and two pontoons (storage tanks) for gratutious supply of water to squatters housed there.
- 27. Works carried out on behalf of private parties.—2,061 r.ft, of 4"> 2" water main was laid at Union Park, Bandra, on behalf of Messrs. Union Land and Building Society.

y works of interest

- 28. 6" Cross connection on 48" Old Tansa Mains.—Complaints were received from certain parts of Ghatkopart town regarding shortage of water. To overcome this, a 6" con nection was made on 48" Old Tansa main near Kirol Road, Chatkopar, and the same was connected to the existing 2" main in Kirol Road This has resulted in spareciable improvement in water supply to the locality.
- 29. Improvement in supply at Santa Cruz.—The work of laying 15">12">9">6" water main along Nehru Road, Station Road and Ghodbunder Road, Santa Cruz, which was undertaken by the Government during the previous year on behalf of the Municipality, was completed during the year under review. As a result of this, pressures in water mains in Santa Cruz have greatly improved and complaints regarding short supply minimised.

- 30. Provision of metered stand pipes.—The localities of Golibar at Santa Cruz and Kol-Dongri and Andheri, depended upon a few private wells for water supply. These wells used to dry up in hot season. To give relief to the residents of these localities, \$\frac{3}{4}\text{"G.I. pipe line and \$2\text{"Asbestos Cement pipe line respectively, were laid and 4 metered stand pipes were provided at Kol-Dongri and two at Golibar at a total cost of Rs. 5,905.
- 31. Repairs to east paraget wall of Bandra Tank.—The East paraget wall of Bandra Tank at Nawapada collapsed during the monsoon. Temporary earthen embankment was immediately provided as an emergent measure and, soon after the monsoon, the wall was rebuilt at a cost of about Rs. 4,000.
- 32. Water supply to Squatters' Colony at Jogeshwari.—As the Mankhurd Colony was found inadequate to house the squatters from the City, it was decided to remove them to Jogeneswari and for housing a colony thereat. As water facilities had to be provided at the colony before the squatters could be removed, a 6" <9" pipe line was laid for a length of over 2,000 r.ft. and 16 large stand pipes and two large storage tanks having in all nearly 100 water taps were provided for the newly laid-out squatters' Colony at Majas. Jogeshwari. As the supply to this area was not sufficient, a cross connection of the feeder main was taken with the 12" Government main for Goregaon. Arrangements were being made for providing a booster pumping station to improve the supply.
- 33. Improving the water supply at Juhu Road, Byramjee Road and Dr. Ambedkar Road, Bandra.—The existing water pipes at Juhu Road, Byramjee Road and Dr. Ambedkar Road, Bandra, were enlarged at a total cost of Rs. 1,98,733 from funds provided in Loan Works Budget.
- 34. New water mains.—New water mains were laid in the following localities during the year under review.—(a) 6" water main in Juhu Lane, Andheri; (b) 6" <9" water main for Squatters' Colony, Jogehshwaii; (c) 6" water main in Versowa; (d) 12" water main in Bombay Agra Road between Chatkopar and Vikhroli; (e) 4" water main in Jawahar Road, Chatkopar; (f) 4" main in Jethabhai Lane, Chatkopar, (g) 4" water main for Chembur Gaothan; (h) 4" water main for Kirol Village; (i) 4" 3" water main for Sahar Village; (i) 3" water main in Mandala Village; (k) 3" water main for Bamanwada, and (1) 2" > 1" water main for Vikhroli Village.

VI.—PARKS AND GARDENS

- 35. In all nine Parks and Gardens were maintained during the year 1952-53 at a total cost of about Rs. 9,300. (1) Madhy Park at Khar; (2) Park at Juhu; (3) Ishwarlal Park at Vile-Parle (West); (4) Keskar ark at Vile-Parle (East); (5) Malayiya Park at Vile-Parle (East); (6) Sir Lallobhai Park at Andheri; (7) Triangular plot garden at Bombay Agra Road, Ghatkopar; (8) Rajawadi Garden at Ghatkopar, and (9) Garden at the 10th Road, Chembur.
- 36. Malaviya Park at Vile-Parle (East) was completely renovated. The land was properly levelled, fenced and turned into a garden with hedges, new flower beds and lawns.
- 37. The vacant plot at Rajawadi Ghatkopar admeasuring about 9,000 square yards was properly fenced and levelled and an open drain was provided on all the four sides. Hedging was provided all round the garden and the lay out was marked with kutcha pathways and flower beds in half of the garden. Four lawns were completely laid out. The work was temporarily stopped; as the necessary funds were not provided for this year.
- 38. A tri-angular rlot of land at the junction of the Turner Road and Chodhunder Road was laid out into a garden. The laws, fountain and path-ways including hedging and fencing were completed. It is proposed to develop the garden further by providing children's appearate, etc.
- 39. The plot at Juhu, which was formerly a play ground, was taken up for laying out a garden and beginning was made by providing proper drainage and fencing. It would be possible to lay out the garden completely in the next year.
- 40. In the garden at Chembur 10th Road a spacious summer House and an ornamental gate were provided.

Besides advertisement fees, ground rent in respect of advertisements displayed on the Municipal properties was collected by this department and the receipt therefrom amounting to about Rs. 870 were held in deposit. In the past, ground tent in respect of advertisements dispalyed on Municipal lands was collected by the Engineering departments. Steps are being taken to open an appropriate Revenue Head under 12—Licensing, and Removal of Encroachments, etc.

Hawkers

No hawker licences were granted during the year under report as the licences were not recommended by the Commissioner of Police.

^{4.} Licences under Sections 313 and 313A—The total number of Squatter licences issued during the year was 2,602 and the fees realised therefrom amounted to about Rs. 29,547 as against Rs. 23,220-4-0 realised in the preceding year. The removal charges under Section 490 read with Section 314 amounted to about Rs. 7,374 whereas the realisation on this account amounted to Rs. 6,606-3-0 in the preceding year.

6. Parking charges at Parking Grounds, Juhu Foreshore.

The receipts from the parking charges amounted to Rs. 11,842-4-0 as against Rs. 14,150-12-0 realised in the previous year. A moiety of Rs. 2,962-9-0 and rental of Rs. 21 (from 1-4-1951 to 31-12-1952) was paid to Government for the piece of land acquired from them for the purpose in accordance with an agreement.

7. Revenue.—The total revenue of the department was about Rs. 2,57,221-13-0.

Shops and Establishments Section

- 8. As required under Section 7 of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act 1948, 1,696 Establishments were registered during the year and the total number of Establishments registered at the close of the year was 8,729.
- 9. Complaints.—During the year 1953 complaints were received and 26 were pending disposal at the beginning of the year. Out of these, 167 were disposed of leaving 12 complaints pending at the close of the year. Action was taken where complaints pertained to a locality, by arranging Mass Raid, wherever necessary.
- 10. Mass Raids.—76 raids were arranged during the year. Out of these 19 were Morning Raids and 57 were Night Raids. The Raids were arranged to check the employment of young persons and opening and closing hours.
- 11. Visits and Re-visits.—The number of visits paid to the Establishments was 17,029 as against 10,706 in the previous year.
- 12. Prosecutions.—49 cases were pending at the beginning of the year and 348 new prosecutions were launched as against 355 filed in the previous year. Out of these, 304 cases resulted in conviction and 9 were withdrawn. In one, the accused was acquitted, while one case abated due to the death of the accused. One case was pending on the dormant file. The number of cases pending at the close of the year was 81 (excluding the one on the dormant file).
- 13. Fines.—The total amount of fines inflicted amounted to Rs. 8,305 as against Rs. 8,085 of the previous year. The amount of fine gives an average of Rs. 27 per prosecution.
- 14. Grant-in-aid.—Government sanctioned a grant-in-aid of Rs. 8,085 as against a total expenditure of about Rs. 59,794 including Dearness Allowance. Thus it was less by Rs. 51,709 than the actual expenditure.
- 15. Registration Fees.—The registration fees amounted to Rs. 2,786 as against Rs. 2,399 in the previous year.
- 16. Theatre Tax.—The concession of 20 per cent. rebate, if the tax was paid in advance before the 5th of the mon.h was continued during the year. The collection of receipts from this tex amounted to rbout Rs. 79,989 and a deposit amount of about Rs. 68,882 pertaining to the previous year was adjusted during the year under report.

MARKET DEPARTMENT (SUBURBS)

Shri T. K. Talwalkar was in charge of the Department during the year.

The total receipts of the Department amounted to Rs. 4,42,235 as against Rs. 4,59,010 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 16,775. This was mainly due to the amount of Rs. 61,430 outstanding in respect of the share of enhanced entrance fee for the animals admitted to the Bandra Slaughter House during the year 1952-53, and about Rs. 15,000 in respect of the slaughter fee for the animals removed from the fair ground of the Bandra Slaughter House for slaughter in the suburbs. If these amounts are taken into account there would be an increase of Rs. 59,655 over the previous year.

There were 16 Municipal Markets as against 15 in the previous year, the Marol Weekly Market being taken over from 3rd January 1953. The particulars of each market with regard to the number of vacant stalls revenue and expenditure, etc., as compared with that of the previous year are given in Appendix 'A'.

The licence fee of Rs. 2,035 recovered in respect of two private markets in the suburbs was kept in deposit as the question of licensing them was not yet finalized.

The number of Municipal Slaughter Houses during the year was five only. The total number of animals slaughtered and the slaughter fee recovered from each slaughter house will be found in Appendix 'B'.

The five year plan has been implemented by including the following proposals in the Lean Works Budget.

(1) Acquisition of land, and establishing a market thereon at Kurla, (2) Remodelling of the Khar Market and (3) Centralization of slaughter of sheep and goats on the East side in the Kurla Kasaiwada. Besides certain works in the nature of repairs were carried out during the year, with a view to improving the general condition of markets and slaughter houses.

The amounts realized during the year under report under different items of revenue have been shown in Appendix 'C'.

All the markets and slaughter houses were regularly insepcted and strict supervision was exercised with regard to the wholesomeness of articles offered for sale and also the sanitation, etc., Unwholesome articles of food such as fish, fruits, vegetables, etc., in different markets and slaughter houses together with contraband meant, weighing 11,998 lbs. in the aggregate, were destroyed. The total meat destroyed was 6,135 lbs. as against 1,316 lbs. in the previous year. In all 14 raids were carried out for detecting unauthorized slaughter of animals during the year and 2,776 lbs. of unwholesome meat was destroyed. During the raids, 152 live goats were seized, and Rs. 160 were realized by way of penalty and sale of confiscated animals. Out of the 11 prosecutions launched during the year, 6 resulted in convictions, 2 in acquittals and 3 cases were pending for disposal. The amount of fine inflicted was Rs. 490.

The principal causes of ante-mortem rejection, were sheep-pox, feet and mouth diseases, advanced stage of pregnancy. The Chief causes of post-mortem condemnation were Liver Flukes, abscesses and bruises.

The approximate weight of dressed meat of buffaloes (cows and bullocks was 1,236 tons and that of sheep and goats was 436.5 tons. The total meat condemned at Kurla Slaughter House was 2.3 tons during post-mortem examination.

The right of collecting and removing blood at Kasaiwada was disposed of for Rs. 4,125 during the year as against Rs. 2,500 realized in the previous year.

EDUCATION

SUBURBAN PRIMARY SCHOOLS.

Shri M. P. Shah, B.Sc., B.T., T.D. (London), LL.B., Superintendent, Municipal Gujarathi Hindi and Aided Schools was in immediate charge of the Suburban Schools Administration under the supervision of the Education Officer.

There were 101 Schools and 2 Classes at the beginning of the year, some new Schools and Classes were Schools, Pupils and opened during the year and 2 Schools were closed down. 8 Schools were converted into Classes due to decrease in the number of pupils attending those Schools. Thus, there were 93 Schools and 14 Classes at the end of the year, i.e., on 31st March 1953. Out of the 93 Schools and 14 Classes, 32 were Upper Primary Schools.

The total number of Pupils on rolls on 31st March 1953 in the Suburban Municipal Schools stood at 26,973 of whom 4308 were in Upper Primary Classes and 22,665 were in Primary Classes. In spite of the restriction on admission of children below six years of age, there was a net increase of 1,564 pupils during the year. The highest number on rolls was 29,575 at the end of July 1952. The number came down to 26,973 at the end of March 1953. The average number of Pupils throughout the year was 28,273. The fall in the number of pupils at the end of the year, as compared with the figure of July 1952, was mainly due to restriction on the admission of fresh pupils upto 15th September 1952, striking of the names of pupils on account of their continuous absence and the migratory nature of the Labour Population.

At the end of the year there were 739 ordinary teachers imparting instruction to 26,973 puoils and 3 special Teachers in the Suburban Schools, as against 717 Teachers giving instruction to 25,409 pupils at the beginning of the year. Out of the 739 ordinary Teachers, 586 were trained and 153 untrained giving about 79.3 as the percentage of trained teachers. The statement showing the number of Trained, Untrained, permanent and temporary Teachers on the different sides is given below:—

The cost per pupil in the Suburban Schools as worked out on the basis of the total number of pupils on rolls on 31st March 1953 was Rs. 60.4 as compared to Rs. 43,9 of the previous year.

The cost per pupil worked out on the basis of the average number of pupils on rolls for the whole year 1952-53 was Rs. 57.7, as compared to Rs. 45.1 of the previous year.

Cardboard modelling was taught in 20 Schools, Spinning in 4 Schools and cooking in 3 Schools, Basic Education.

The Education Officer as well as the supervising officers paid frequent visits to the schools as usual and made useful suggestions to teachers to improve the tone of efficiency in teaching and discipline. For better and more effective supervision of the Suburban Aided Schools two Inspectresses were appointed from June-July 1952.

There were 59 Aided Schools at the end o the year with 510 teachers imparting instruction to 15,245

Aided and Recognised pupils. The total amount of grants recommended for payment to Aided Schools for the year 1952-53 was Rs. 1,05,829. The grants were recommended after applying varying cuts to the assessed grants, taking into consideration the income and other resources of the Institutions and the funds available for the purpose. The total expenditure incurred by the Suburban Aided Schools was Rs. 8,25,892. The average cost per pupil was Rs. 59.9 to the Aided Schools and Rs. 7.7 to the Corporation. Besides the Aided Schools, there were 8 Schools which were recognised but which did not receive any aid from the Corporation. There were 33 teachers in these Schools imparting instruction to 723 pupils.

The scheme of amalgamation of Schools and co-education which was extended to Suburban Schools

Progress of Pupils last year with a view to effecting economy and fostering feelings of fraternity among the pupils worked well. The curriculum was divided month by month at the beginning of the year and distributed to Schools for the guidance of the teachers. Teaching aids on different subjects were supplied to Schools and the Teachers themselves also prepared useful teaching aids with a view to making teaching more practical, easier and realistic. Teachers' Diaries, Progress Cards and Progress Registers were maintained in all Schools. Pupils of Primary Classes (Standards I to III) were promoted on the strength of their progress in weekly tests, whereas the written Annual Examinations of pupils from Standards IV to VII was held along with the Examination of City Schools. The following table gives the details of the results of the Annual Examination held in March April 1953:—

The percentage of pupils promoted from standard I was comparatively low because a large number of pupils who joined these classes in the latter part of the year could not complete the prescribed course during the period at their disposal. Text Books for Suburban Schools were prescribed on City lines as per the directions given by the Government in Government Resolution, Education Department No. TBK/1051, dated the 11th January 1952.

The number of Municipal owned School Buildings in the Suburbs at the beginning of the year was 34.

School Buildings.

During the year under review a new school building at Andheri viz., Suren Municipal Mrathi School Building was taken oer by the Corporation. It was constructed partly out of donations received from the public and partly with the aid of the Corporation, 30 Schools were accommodated in Municipal owned School Buildings and the rest were housed in rented buildings.

All Harijan children were admitted free in Municipal Schools. Till last year, the children of employees

of the Primary Education Department drawing a salary of Rs. 220 per month and children of the inferior staff of the other Municipal Departments were exempted from payment of fees. This concession has been further liberalised by the Corporation whereby children of all Municipal employees including the Bombay Electric Supply and Transport Undertaking who are drawing a salary upto Rs. 240 per month have been exempted from the payment of fees. Besides 30 per cent. Full Free-ships and 20 per cent. Half Freeships were granted to poor and deserving pupils.

Physical Education was imparted to children of all Schools as per the curriculum laid down by Government. The annual sports were held in the month of November 1952 and about 1000 ment. The annual sports were held in the month of November 1952 and about 1000 pupils from the Suburban Schools took part in the various competitions. The Prize Distribution Ceremony of the Annual Sports was held on 7th February 1953 on the Gilder Tank Playground, under the Presidentship of Shri M. D. Bhansali, I.C.S., the Chief Secretary to the Government of Bombay. A Mass Drill Display of about 1200 pupils from 21 Schools was held on 22nd December 1952 in the Petit Marathi School Compound, under the Presidentship of Shri P. G. Kher, B.A., LL.B., Municipal Councillor. The usual activities of the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides were carried out during the year.

The census of non-attending children in the Suburbs taken in the March and April 1952 revealed that 5,414 children of compulsory age were not attending Schools. Of these, 3265 children were admitted in Municipal Schools. There were 18,275 pupils of compulsory age attending Municipal Suburban Schools, at the end of the year, as against 17,918 at the beginning of the year. Efforts were made to bring in as many non-attending children as possible to Schools and to stabilise attendance.

Various activities were carried out during the year such as opening of Vacation Libraries in the Summer Vacation, Independence Day, Republic Day, School Anniversaries, Vana Mahotsava, Social Education Week, Excursions to places of importance, etc.

Sharad Utsav was celebrated at four different Centres in the Suburbs. All Suburban Schools were

and grouped together locality-wise. The functions consisted of two parts, viz., the
Exhibition of Educational Aids such as maps, charts, models, hand-work, etc., prepared by the teachers and pupils of various schools and a cultural programme of an
hour's duration. The functions were presided over by prominent personalities. The public and the guardians
of pupils showed a keen interest in these instructive Exhibitions and functions

The income for the year 1952-53 was estimated at Rs. 15,44,000 and the expenditure was estimated at Rs. 19,01,000. As the estimated income fell short of the estimated expenditure, the Budget Estimates were revised by reducing the provisions proposed. The actual Closing Balance for 1951-52 amounted to Rs. 3,74,155-7-6. The total amount at the disposal of the Education Committee was Rs. 19,73 558-3-6. The total expenditure for the year, amounted to Rs. 16,38,850-8-6 leaving a Closing Balance of Rs. 3,34,707-11-0. An amount of Rs. 5,50,000, was received from the Government towards the cost of Primary Education in Suburbs.

Centres, for Hindi, Hindustani Social Education Classes and Night Schools, conducted by recognised Institutions, outside School hours.

Shri Nanik G. Motwane, Municipal Councillor who presided over the Sharad Utsav function of the Chembur Group of Manicipal Schools donated five steel cupboards for the use of the Schools of the area The donation was accepted with thanks

The standard of education in Suburban Schools has reported on account of the better supervision and the guidance given to the teaching staff by the Supervising Officers A spirit of cooperation amongst teachers is pervading in the Schools and there is every hope of bringing all Suburban Schools on par with City Schools in respect of administration and education in the near future.

MUNICIPAL HIGH SCHOOL, BANDRA

Shri R. Y. Kulkarni and Shri S. N. Koppal were Head Master and Assistant Head Master respectively. During the year under report the Annual Inspection by the Education Department was not held.

The strength of the High School was 330. 14 Classes conducted by the High School were arranged, in two shifts, the morning shift from 7-15 A.M. to 11-45 A.M. being supervised by the Assistant Head Master of the High School and the afternoon shift comprising of Higher classes being supervised by the Head Master the working periods of the session being from 12 Noon to 5-30 P.M.

The Muslim Welfare Union Bandra helped the poor and deserving students of the community by paying their school fees as usual.

During the year under report two untrained undergraduate teachers secured teaching qualifications prescribed under the Ghate-Parulekar report. The staff consisted mostly of trained teachers viz.:—
11 B.Ts. 5 S.T.C.s. or T.D.s., 1 D.T.C., 1 Handicraft Teacher, 1 P. T. Instructor (Short Termer with S.T.C.), 1 Hindi with Shikshak Sanad (Untrained), 2 Matriculates.

The results of the S.S.C. Examination and that of the Drawing Examination were 28.5 per cent. and 90 per cent. respectively.

The extra curricular activities such as the 15th August (Independence Day) and the Lokmanya Tilak Jayanti were carried out by the school. Besides this, there were School Excursions, visit to the Legislative Assembly, Social Education Day, and Anti T. B. Seal—Collections by the students of the High School. The students of the school took an active part during the Social Education week programme.

The most important feature during the year under report was the Golden Jubilee Celebrations of the High School, which was held on the 20th December 1952 under the presidentship of Hon'ble Shri Dinkarrao Desai, B.A., LL.B., Minister of Education, Bombay State. The programme lasted for four successive days and it consisted of Dramas, Festival, Cricket Match, Sports, Tournaments, Folk Songs and various other variety entertainments. An amount of Rs. 2,000 was expended on the occasion.

The percentage of Free studentships was maintained according to the rules of the Education Department.

The income of the High School from all sources amounted to Rs. 49,044-10-0 as against the expenditure of Rs. 56,234-9-3 leaving a deficit of Rs. 7,189-15-3 to run the Institution in the year under report.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT HEALTH OFFICER SUBURBS

for 1952

Preliminary.—Dr. G. N. Kowshik, M.B., B.S., B.Hy., D.P.H., Deputy Executive Health Officer, was placed in charge of the Public Health Department in the Suburbs with effect from 9th April 1952 but he was on leave for 2 months from 16th May 1952 to 15th July 1952. Dr. V. T. Vagh, M.B.B.S., B.Hy., D.P.H. (Lond.), L.M. (Dub.), D.T. M & H. (Eng.), held the post of the Assistant Health Officer (Suburbs) during the year under report. He was, however, transferred to the City in a working arrangement to assist the Executive Health Officer in the Head Office with effect from 2nd January 1953.

Review of the year.—Sanitary supervision in the entire Suburban merged area which has been divided into 30 Sections was tightened with a view to improving sanitation. Special attention was paid to improve the condition of the slums like Chandranagar at Bhandup, Chiranagar at Ghatkopar and Khotwadi and Chunabhatti at Santa Cruz. The following measures were adopted for improving the sanitary condition of the Suburbs.

- (1) Inspection and supervision of premises and their environs with a view to rectification of sanitary defects through enforcement of sanitary regulations on owners and occupiers.
- (2) Sanitary control over factories and licensable trades.
- (3) Securing foods sanitation and enforcement of the detection of adulteration of articles of food.
- (4) Destruction of unwholesome food.

OUTSTANDING ACTIVITIES OF THE YEAR

- (i) Milch Cattle Stables.—Stables at Khotwadi and Chunabhatti in 'H' Ward were selected to begin with the enforcement of sanitary regulations. From the experience gained, the stables in the other areae would be tackled on similar lines. An undertaking was given by the stable owners that they would agree to have the dung, and stable refuse removed through a Municipal Contractor at their cost. This would help in keeping the stables and the surrounding area clean.
- (ii) Subvention Scheme for Bandra.—The Corporation Resolution No. 1738 of 13th March 1952 having sanctioned the enforcement of the Subvention Scheme formulated for the sewered parts of Bandra, 340 premises were subjected to the statutory action of substitution of their basket privies by water closets on full flushing system. The scheme intends to urge the owners of premises to expedite the conversion of basket privies by entitling them to receive from the Corporation Rs. 200 per privy seat substituted by a water closet, provided that the work is done as per plans approved by the Special Engineer and within the time specified in the relevant statutory notice.
- (iii) Factory Permits.—Pending finalisation of zoning of areas the Zoning Committee of this Municipality decided to give temporary Municipal permits under Section 390 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act for one year ending 31st March 1953 to all the existing factories and to review the cases individually from time to time as regards shifting the factories to conforming areas. Permits were issued in respect of 163 factories during the year.
- 2. Area and Population.—The total area of the Suburbs included in Greater Bombay is about 43,398 acres or 67.81 square miles with a population of 5,10,151 as per the Census of 1951.
 - 3. Density of Population.—The Mean density of population is 12,175 per acre.
 - 4. Meteorology.—Meteorological data for the year 1952 is given in Table 6.
- 5. Rainfall.—The total rainfall recorded at the Santa Cruz Observatory during the year 1952 was 94.72 inches as against 74.24 inches in the previous year. The wettest month of the year was July with 46.87 inches of rain as was the case in the previous year in which 32.75 inches was recorded for the same month.

VITAL STATISTICS

Births and Deaths.—16,966 live births (8,651 males 8,015 females) were registered during the year an increase of 2,559 over the preceding year's of 14,407. Total deaths registered were 6,005 there being an increase of 800 over the 1952 figure of 5,200. The natural increase in the population was 1,759. The Birth Rate was 33.3 and the Death Rate was 11.8 per 1000 of population. Part of the increase in registered births and deaths was due to the tendency of the public to give in formation to the Municipality for registration of births and deaths.

Registration of live births by months in 1951 and 1952 is given in Table I.

The number of still-births reported during the year was 564 or 3.3 per cent. of live births.

Mortality by sexes.—Of the total of 6,005 registered deaths in the year 3,189 were males and 2,816 were females.

Morality by Causes.—Vide Table No. 32.

Mortality by months.-Vide Table No. 2 with the corresponding figures for 1951.

Copies of Birth and Death Registry issued.—Registration of Births and Deaths has been systematically maintained from 1st January 1951 in the Head Office of the Public Health Department along with the City records. Figures of copies of birth and death registry pertaining to the Suburban population issued by the City Head Office and the Suburban Offices during the year under report are given below:—

Infant Mortality.—Total deaths among infants under one year numbered 1,721, an excess of 154, over the figure for the preceding year. This was probably due to a more complete registration of deaths. The infant mortality rate was 101.4 per 1000 live births for the year 1952 as against 108.8 for the corresponding rates of 1951. Classification of the Infant mortality for the year by principal causes and ages is given in Table 4.

Cemeteries.—The only Municipal Cemetery is at Charai Chembur, in the merged aera; about 97 non-Municipal cemeteries exist but have not yet been registered for want of the requisite particulars as per the provisions of Section 435 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

CONTROL OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

- (a) Notification.—Notification of infectious diseases by Medical practitioners was seen to have improved during the year under report.
 - (b) Plague.—No plague case was reported but measures for rat destruction were continued.
- (c) Small-pox.—Small-pox caused 54 attacks and 14 deaths. The incidence of this disease during the year was much below the cyclical high level.
- The number of primary vaccinations and re-vaccinations respectively was 24,000 and 70,564, as against 26,188 and 1,26,576 respectively in the previous year. Details of the vaccination service in the merged area are given separately.
 - (d) Cholera.—There was no incidence of Cholera during the year.
 - (e) Influenza.—Influenza was recorded as the cause of one death only.
- (f) Enteric Fever.—53 deaths were reported from this disease as against 48 in the previous year. The small increase was not of significance and might have been due to accurate certification of causes of deaths rather than to actual higher incidence. Inoculations against typhoid were performed by the Medical staff as well as by private Medical Practitioners to whom T.A.B. Vaccine was supplied free of charge.
 - (g) Poliomyelitis.—9 Attacks were reported.
 - (h) Diphtheria.-15 deaths were reported.
 - (i) Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis.—2 Attacks were reported.
- (j) Malaria.—Malaria was registered as the cause of 14 deaths. 613 Blood smears taken by Medical O. ficers in charge of the Municipal Dispensaries were examined at the Municipal Laboratory during the year out of which 29 showed malaria parasites. 1,120 Cases were treated for malaria at the Municipal Dispensaries Anti-mosquito measures were carried out in all the Wards by the Insecticide Branch as per details given in a separate section of this Report.
 - (k) Tuberculosis.—220 deaths were reported and the death rate was 0.1 per 1000 of population.
 - (1) Venereal Diseases.—Facilities have not yet been provided in the Suburbs to combat these diseases.
- (m) Leprosy.—The Acworth Leprosy Home at Matunga and Alb'ess Leprosy Home at Trombay were taken advantage of for the control of this diseases. One Lady Health Visitor for follow-up work in Leprosy Control in the merged area has been working since July 1951 under the guidance of the Superintendent, Acworth Leprosy Home, Matunga. The record of filed work done by the Health Visitor is given in Table 8.

Disinfection.—Terminal disinfection of houses was carried out and concurrent disinfection advised wherever cases of infectious diseases were known to have occurred.

SANITATION

Improvement of sanitation comprised of attention to.

- (a) Premises Sanitation, and (b) Food Sanitation.
- (a) Premises Sanitation.—Included inspection of premises and their environs, taking measures to remedy the detected defects, ensuring provision of adequate Sanitary Conveniences and control over establishing and working of factories and licensable trades, etc.

SANITARY CONDTIONS IN THE MERGED AREAS

- 1. Disposal of sullage waste from premises continued to be the difficult problem particularly in undrained areas and caxed the energies and resources both of owners of premises and the Municipal Authorities.

 Discharge of such wastes into roadside open storm water channels and drains was prohibited by a public notice
 and appropriate actions were taken to prevent nuisances of smell, mosquito breeding, etc., from the channels and
 drains.
- Clearance of wastes from privies in several areas has been more than ordinarily difficult on account
 of unsatisfactory or irregular construction, want of proper access for conservancy vehicles and water-logging
 of areas during monsoon.
- 3. Slums and unauthorised old constructions combined with absence of Sanitary Conveniences in some cases and their inadequacy in others resulted in fouling of open spaces, yards, etc., adding thereby to insanitation particularly in backward locatities.
- 4. By far the greater portion of the suburbs is undrained and unserwered. A good many premises have either inadequate objectionable or inefficient sanitary conveniences and some have none at all. Statutory actions were therefore taken wherever possible to enforce provision of appropriate sanitary accommodation.

Considerable progress was made in the substitution of basket privies by water closets on full flushing system in the sewered part of H Ward, Bandra, by having recourse to the Subvention Scheme.

5. Sanitary conditions in numerous villages, 'gaothans' and out-lying habitations have been far from satisfactory. The curious and uncontrolled development and growth of several rustic colonies or groups of insanitary dwellings, some of which unhappily are quite close to well developed urban housing colonies and inhabited areas, present peculiar problems and difficulties to the Municipal Authorities.

Nothing short or slum-cluarance Schemes would improve the sanitation of such areas. All other available measures and expedients are, however, being adopted towards ensuring relief from insanitary conditions.

Sanitary control of premises.—Routine inspections as well as inspections necessitated on account of complaints were systematically carried out by the Staff of Sanitary Inspectors and Medical Assistants working in the field, under the Supervision and guidance of their respective Medical Officers of Health in all the five suburban wards. Sanitary requisitions were enforced to improve the condition of the premises and to alleviate degitimate grievances of complaints (vide tables 7 and 10).

LICENSABLE TRADES

1. Milch Cattle Stables.—Particular attention was paid to stables, some of which exist too near human habitations to be tolerated.—Vigorous attempts were made to conform them to essential bye-laws by imposing sanitary requirements on the stable-owners. Removal of wastes from stables has proved to b. a formidabl and difficult problem and an experiment is proposed to be tried especially with regard to stables in Bandra. Stable refuse is proposed to be disposed of through the agency of a Contractor working on behalf of the Municipality, the owners of stables having agreed to pay Rs. 1-8-0 per cattle head per month for this serivce.

The Veterinary service was continued through the Veterinary Dispensary at Khar which was placed in charge of a Veterinary Inspector. A scheme to introduce inoculations of cattle against Rinderpest was being contemplated.

- 2. Other Licensable Trades.—Licenses were issued to all such trades as were found conducted in Municipal limits with a view to enforcing on them the minimum of hygienic and sanitary requirements. Such enforcement necessitated statutory actions and prosecutions in several instances.
- (b) Food sanitation.—This included supervision and control through licensing of food shops and establishments, inspection of food stuffs exposed for sale and seizure and destruction of food found unwholesome or unfit for human consumption (vide table 11).

To secure purity of articles of food exposed for sale control was exercised through the enforcement of provisions of the Bombay Prevention of Adulteration Act 1925, as amended to date. Special attention was paid to sampling of milk under the Act (vide table 10—prosecutions under Bombay Prevention of Adulteration Act.)

LABORATORY WORK

The analysis of samples of food, Municipal water supply, well water and clinical specimens from the merged area were carried out in the Municipal Laboratory by the Municipal Analyst.

During the year, 2453 samples of food stuffs were examined chemically out of which 456 samples were found adulterated as shown in Table 9.

The Municipal Analyst attended the Kurla, Bandra and Andheri Courts on ten occasions to give expert evidence in prosecutions under the Bombay Prevention and Adulteration Act.

HEALTH EDUCATION, PROPAGANDA

The Health Propaganda Section in the City was considerably strained in order to extend the service inthe Suburbs

The Section carried out in the Suburbs Health Education film shows, both open air and indoor. The latter were carried out at the request of welfare organisations and volunatary social service bodies. Talks on 'General Sanitation,' 'Good Habits,' 'Preventive measures against communicable diseases' etc., were generally given before the shows.

Anti-diseases campaigns, mass T. A. B. Inoculations and mass Vaccinations were carried out with the help of publicity through the propaganda van. Recorded music was played to attract public attention and when appreciable crowds gathered, microphonic talks were given exhorting them to accept protective inoculaton and vaccination against diseases. Such appeals were very effective in that numerous persons accepted inoculation and

vaccination.

More than a thousand posters and leaflets on different aspects of public health were displayed and distric-

buted in the Suburban area through bodies carrying on welfare and voluntary work.

A Health Week—The first of its kind in the Suburbs—was organised by the residents of Kurla. The Propaganda Section extended its fullest co-operation by putting up a Health Exhibition, by arranging health

education film-shows and by giving talks on certain aspects of public health.

The Propaganda Section with its existing staff and equipment tried its best to disseminate knowldge on healthy living and hygiene amongst the citizens of the merged areas through various effective publicity media mentioned above. It is, however, felt that a separate health education mobile unit for use exclusively in the Suburbs is an urgent necessity. Efforts are being made to acquire such a unit for the Suburbs. The following table shows the activities carried out by this Secion in the merged area during the year.

REPORT OF THE INSECTICIDE BRANCH

1. Organisation.—Control of mosquitoes and house flies in some of the merged areas has been a formilable problem, the ill developed localities Presenting the worst spots. The insecticide organisation with a staff of 1 Malaria Inspector, 10 Overseers and 40 Labouters was set up, under the Insecticide Office, in October 1950 as an experimental measure in 'H' and 'K' Wards only. The scheme was extended by appointing another, Malaria Inspector, 11 Overseers and 48 labourers for the remaining three Wards L. Mand N. from November, 1951. Their activities as to mosquito control are three fold, (1) elimination of Malaria vector species (2) destroying bothers one Culicines and (3) control of Aedes. The Malaria vector species (fluvialitis) is restricted to the control of 'Aedes' is of to the scattered villages, whereas, Culicines are more widely prevalent and the control of Aedes, is of importance in and around the Air port area.

Permanent measures include drainage, channelling or filling in of low-lying lands, control of storage tanks and cisterns and covering or filling in of wells. etc., and are long term measures. The routine measures carried on with the small staff over the extensive Suburbs include D. D. T. Treatment of the villages, systematic inspection of house-compounds and their environs, rendering stagnations mosquito-free by channelling or insecticide spraying etc.; Other insect control measures include dusting and fogging inscitcide formulations with appropriate appliances.

2. Equipments.—All the 22 squads are provided with stirrup pumps and dust blowers. For large scale applications, power sprayers are used. An insecticide fogging machine will soon be acquired for Suburban Service exlusively to effect extensive and immediate adult mosquito control.

3. Grants.—A total of Rs. 1,49,400 (approximately) was spent during the year, out of which the cost on insecticides alone amounted to Rs. 77,864-10-0.

- 4. Particular Measures Monsoon Actions.—Wherever possible treatment of stagnations to destroy mosquito breeding is undertaken in undeveloped areas during as well as after the monsoons stagnations continue to exist which require regular sprayings. A total of over Rs. 3,000 was collected as fees during the year for rendering D. D. T. services to private properties.
- 5. Malaria Control.—Huts in all the 14 villages were internally sprayed once quarterly with D.D.T. to destroy the prevalent Malaria vectorspecies.

6. STATISTICS-

- (a) Spleen Rate.—Examination for spleen index was carried out in Chandivali Village, which was known to be highly malarious in the past years, and the observed results are shown in Table 38.
- (b) House Inspection.—Inspection of houses for detection of mosquito breeding and its destruction were carried out systematically in all the Wards the year round. Details of the quantity and cost on insecticides used during such operations are given in Table 35. Tables 36 and 37 show the number of houses, cisterns, etc., found breeding Anopheles mosquitoes.
- (c) Blood Slides.—12 blood slides were taken by the staff at the time of computing a spleen index out of which 3 were found parasite positive, 2 showing the Malignant Tertian and 1 Benign Tertian Malaria parasites.
- (d) Wells.—(see tables 39 and 40) One hermetically concrete covered well and 3 open wells were filled in during the year as a result of action taken by this Department. The total number of wells in the Suburbs as on 1st January 1952 was 3042. Of these, 3014 were open. Action to induce the owners to close down the totally disused or unused and filthy wells was started during the year. Some Municipal wells also of the same kind will similarly be closed.
- (e) Cisterns.—Total number of cisterns so far enumerated in Suburbs as on 1st January 1953 is 3189 in 'H' and 'K' Wards only. Figures for L, M and N Wards are not known.
- (f) MillTanks.—Two Mill tanks owned by Swadeshi Mills and Kurla Mills respectively, were frequently inspected and larvivorous fish introduced into them to control mosquito breeding.
- (g) Precautions against Yellow Fever.—With an Air Port of international importance at Santacruz the Yellow Fever risk is to be reckoned with. The Airport Authorities enforce all measures within the Air Port area and all the incoming aircrafts are regularly sprayed with Pyrethrum and D.D. T. before landing. The Municipal staff carry out regular appropriate control measures against 'Aedes' in the vast environs of the Airport area in consultation with the Airport Health Authorities.

VACCINATION

During the year under report, a total of 25 stations (12 permanent, 6 temporary on week days, 1 temporary daily except Sundays and holidays, 2 temporary fortnightly and 4 monthly temporary stations) continued working as before.

One monthly temporary station at Janata Colony, Mankhurd was converted into a fortnightly station from 8th February 1952. Vaccine lumph was brought daily from Central Vaccine Depot, Parel, as no arrangement for a direct supply could be made during the year under report for want of cold storage facility in the Suburbs. Such facility will soon be provided to spend up work and ensure efficiency.

The incidence of Small-pox in the Suburban area was practically negligible in almost all the Wards except in K-Ward where a few sporadic cases did occur as the disease was in an epidemic form just beyond the Greater Bombay Municipal limits viz., at Borivli, Goregaon etc. However, timely vaccination campaigns, particularly in the border areas, effectively checked its spread to the other parts of the Suburbs, although similar work done in the previous year must have contributed in no small measure towards keeping the disease away during the year under report.

Preventive Vaccination Campaign

Vaccination was performed in Schools, Colleges, Mills, etc., during the cold season and mass Vaccination was carried out with the help of health propaganda consistently through the year in the Suburban area, with the following results:—

Inspection of results

(I) The results of primary vaccination were checked by Vaccinators. They were re-checked personally by the Superintendent of Vaccination in 384 cases and by the Senior Vaccinator in 3250 cases.

The rate of successful vaccination was-99.92 per cent.

- (II) On checking the Vaccinators' work in a number of cases that visited the stations for showing results on the 8th day after vaccination, the results were found satisfactory. Such inspections also ensured that the vaccine used was consistently of good potency.
- (III) The resufts of re-vaccination were checked only in the cases of those who called upon to obtain certificates in the International Form.

Postponement of Primary Vaccination

During the period under report, primary vaccination was postponed in only 20 cases in which valid certificates were received.

Prosecutions

There were no cases of prosecution for failure to bring infants for vaccination on failure to present them for inspection 7 days after the operations.

III Effects from Vaccinations

Not ill-effects due to vaccinations were observed on reported during the year.

Refugee Camp

There is one refugee camp at Chembur. The work of Vaccination in this camp was carried out by a special vaccinator appointed by Government. However, a Vaccinator of this Department also performed vaccination occasionally at the camp.

Improvements in the existing Medical facilities as well as the provision of additional medical relief in the Suburbs has been engaging the attention of the authorities ever since the merger. A well distributed and balanced provision of medical relief institutions in the rapidly developing Suburbs can however best be visualised, planned and provided after the Suburban developments in the matter of roads, housing, drainage etc. is precisely accertained. The medical needs of the Suburbs will also have to be adjudged and adjusted according to the size of population-in-different areas and in scattered population pockets, with a large number of outlying villages. As a first step in a comprehensive scheme in this direction, it is desirable to expand, after and improve the existing institutions. Provision of additional or new institutions and facilities is proposed to be taken up in the next stage; --

A—HOSPITALS

The two Bhabha Hospitals in the Suburbs are situated on the Western side at Bandra and on the Eastern side at Kurla respectively. The work done at these institutions is summarised below:—

- (xii) Classification by diseases of out-patients treated is shown in Table No. 5
- (xiii) Proposed Expansion and Improvements in Medical Relief Institutions.
 - (1) At the Bhabha Hospital, Bandra, the following works are proposed to be carried out:-
 - (a) to construct an upper floor over the existing male ward to accommodate about 10 more bedsfor male patients.
 - (b) to construct a new Maternity and Labour Ward at the rear of the existing male Ward on the gound floor to accommodate 15 beds so as to increase the bed-strength in Maternity Ward by 5, and
 - (c) to effect suitable alterations in the existing maternity and labour ward in order to adapt it for use as out-patients' department so that this department is desirably detached from the Hospital Wards and is at the same time adequate for the increasing out-patients' attendance.
 - (2) At the Bhabha Hospital, Kurla, the following Works are proposed to be carried out:-
 - (a) to construct an additional floor over the existing Hospital Building (consisting of a ground floor only) so as to accommodate about 40 beds i.e., 20 beds in male Ward and 20 beds in Maternity-Ward and thereby increase the bed-strength by 14, and
 - (b) to effect suitable alterations in the ground floor in order to adapt it for use as out-patients' Department and Ante-Natal and Post-natal as well as Family Planning Clinics so that these departments are desirably detached and conveniently arranged on the ground floor without inconvenience to the in-patients who will be accommodated on the proposed first floor extension only.
- (xiv) Staff Quarters.—It is proposed to construct new and adequate quarters for the Hospital employees in Superior as well as inferior services in substitution of the existing worn out and inadequate quarters.
- (xv) Municipal Free Dispensaries.—Five additional dispensaries, one in each of the five Wards, are proposed to be established as soon as suitable sites or premises are available for the purpose.

B-MATERNITY HOMES

Besides the maternity wards in the two Bhabha Hospitals, two Municipal Maternity. Homes exist viz., one at Ghatkopar and the other at Chembur. The unit at Ghatkopar is proposed to be shifted to the proposed new Municipal Hospital.

Free Family Planning Clinic was started at the S. V. K. Maternity Home, Ghatkopar since September 1952 with sessions between 9-0 and 11-0 A. M. twice a week on Mondays and Thursdays. During the period from September to December, 1952, the total attendance was only 5.

C.—DESPENSARIES

In addition of the two dispensaries attached to the above two Hospitals at Bandra and Kurla, there are 4 M inicipal dispensaries viz., at Andheri, Vile Parle, Old Kurla and Chembur respectively.

It is proposed as part of a comprehensive scheme in the matter of providing new Municipal Free Dispensaries, to set up one new dispensary in each of the five Wards in the Suburbs.

Table 5 shows the cases treated at the existing Municipal dispensaries during the year under report.

D.-MEDICAL RELIEF IN THE VILLAGES

Medical relief is also rendered in the villages in the Suburban merged areas through two mobile dispensary units, one serving the Western side and the other the Eastern side, according to a planned programme.

In the Five Year's Programme of Loan Works, a sum of Rs. 18,00,000 has been earmarked for the purpose of providing Medical Relief in Suburbs. Of this, a provision of Rs. 3 lacs has already been made in the budget for 1953-54 in the Loan works for the construction of a Maternity Home, a Dispensary and a Municipal Mobile Hospital Unit at Ghatkopar. In the subsequent years, the funds are proposed to be provided for expansion of Medical relief in the Suburbs as detailed below:—

#### Street Cleansing and Conservancy

#### General

Shri D. S. Rane, Assistant Head Supervisor (Suburbs), was in charge of the Conservancy Branch, throughout the year under report. He was assisted by four "Supervisors" in charge of Suburban Wards.

The main functions of the Conservancy Branch comprised of:

main functions of the Conservancy Branch comprised of :—

(i) Cleansing of roads, footpaths and open channel drains.

(ii) Collection, Removal and Disposal of Refuse.

(iii) Collection, Removal and Disposal of night soil and cesspool contents.

(iv) Dog Licensing and Dog Destruction.

(v) Rat Destruction

(v) Rat Destruction
(vi) Removal and Disposal of Carcasses of animals.
(vii) Labour Welfare
(viii) Veterinary service.
(ix) Conservancy Transport service.

#### I-Cleansing of Roads, Foot Paths and Open Channel Drains

Cleansing.—The extent of roads, foot paths and drains required to be conserved as on 1st January 1952 and the subsequent additions made during the year under report are shown in Appendix 1-3.

The added roads include those which were taken up for cleansing after being newly constructed and some in the villages to which this service was extended during the year.

The average frequency with which the area in each Ward was conserved is given in Appendix 2.

A total of 30, 97, 166 square yards was required to be swept in the Suburbs and this represents an increase of 4,94,843 square yards over 26,02,323 square yards swept last year. In order to give better cleansing service the area swept twice daily and once daily, was increased during the year.

This was an improvement brought about in the cleansing service introduced without any addition to the cleansing staf. Further improvement in this service would only be possible with appropriate increase in Labour

#### II-Collection, Removal and Disposal of Refuse

- (i) Collection of Refuse.—Household refuse and sweeping from the roads, were collected in dustbins placed at convenient places to facilitate temporary depositing of refuse. Actions under Section 372 (e) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act were taken to minimise indiscriminate throwing of refuse. Actions were also taken under Section 368 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act enforcing the Provision of approved type of sanitary bins for the collection of household refuse was enforced through recourse to actions under Section 368 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act vide Appendix 5 and 6.
- (ii) Removal of Refuse.—The refuse transport consisted of 14 vehicles, 2 trailers and 1 Commer pick-up The details of the total refuse removed, the frequency of the removal of refuse etc. are shown in Appendix 7 and 8.
- (iii) Disposal of Refuse.—The refuse was chiefly used for filling in low-lying lands. The major portion i.e., 25,657 out of the 30,683 tons of refuse collected was used for this purpose, while 4,0% tons of it was sold for reclaiming private lands. The details are shown in Appendix 8.

#### III-Collection, Removal and Disposal of Night Soil

(i) Collection and removal.—The particulars of privies on basket system are given in Appendix 9. Aqua type privies, being more suitable and desirable than basket privies, in the conditions prevailing in the Suburhs, owners of properties were encouraged to provide them in preference to basket privies. The Public privies so far provided are also on aqua type.

The location and type of public sanitary conveniences provided are shown in Appendix 10. The construction of 10 seats of aqua type privies at Tape village and four privy seats of the same type and four urinals at Marol Market was completed.

Arrungent need is felt for public sanitary conveniences at a number of places in the Suburban areas. They are not only required for the use of the passers by, but also for the use of the residents of the localities. Many of the houses in the built-up areas in the Suburbs viz., Gaothans are without any sanitary conveniences, and it is not possible to enforce the provision of such conveniences on owners of individual houses on account of lack of space for the purpose. This shortage of sanitary conveniences leads to fouling of localities, which is detrimental from the sanitary point of view and public health. It was felt that the only way to meet this situation is to provide the public sanitary conveniences at available and suitable sites. The following sites were, therefore, proposed for constructing such conveniences:—

(1) A four-seated water closet block with septic tank and attached washing place by the side of the 3-seated privy block at Danda Woreshore, Bandra.
(2) A four-seated urinal block opposite Sarveshwar Temple, Kurla.
(3) A four-seated water closet block with attached washing place at Dandapada Foreshore.
(4) A four-seated water closet block at Pai Gully, Vile Parle.
(5) A four-seated urinal block on East side of New Mill, Bombay Agra Road, Kurla.
(6) A four-seated urinal block on Shradhhanand Road Ghatkopar.

On account of the inadequacy of sanitary conveniences in the Suburbs generally, it is proposed to construct more public sanitary conveniences by allotting for the purpose a sum of Rs. 1,00,000 annually until the requisite number will have been provided.

In addition to the privies, there existed 681 commodes in the Suburbs as shown in Appendix 11. In the absence of proper conveniences, open plots and fields were fouled by public and these had to be cleansed of excreta by vacant ground-cleaners. The amount of night-soil collected daily and annually from all the latrines is mentioned in Appendix 12.

(2) Cesspool clearance.—The number of cesspool existing during the year and their capacity is shown in Appendix 13, and the frequency of attendance to them and the amounts of their contents removed during the year are shown in Appendix 14. It will be seen that there was an improvement in the attendance to cesspools; over 58½ per cent. of the cesspools were attended to fort-nightly as against only 17 per cent. during the year 1951. Consequently, there was a decrease in the percentage of cesspools attended to at 20-day intervals. There was slight increase in the number of cesspools attended to at 10-day intervals.

Transport used for the removal of night-soil and that for cesspool contents was interchanged according to exigencies. The total transport fleet for the removal of night-soil and cesspool contents was as under:

8 bullocks carts of 150 gallons capacity.

23 trailers of 225 gallons capacity.

4 Moto-carts of 250 gallons capacity.

48 Lorries of varying capacity (300-500 gallons) and

1 Scammel mechanical emptier of 750 gallons.

#### (3) Disposal of Night soil and cesspool contents:-

The night-soil and cesspool contents were continued to be disposed of at depots by discharging in the creeks at various points, except for a small quantity of night soil used for composting at Ghatkopar during the dry season. The places appointed for the purpose were:—

- (1) Bandra Creek-Bandarwadi Night Soil Depot.
- (2) Versova Creek .- Oshivra Night-Soil Depot.

(3) Sion Creek .- Sion Night-Soil Depot.

(4) Ghatkopar Creek. - Ghatkopar Night-Soil Depot.

The desirability of installing septic tanks for the disposal of night soil and sewage at Ghatkopar, Juhu and Deonar was further stressed. In the absence of sewers, this was considered a suitable substitute for disposal of crude night-soil and cesspool contents.

- (4) Special Halalkhore Service on payment was continued as under :-
  - (i) Internal cleansing of privies.
  - (ii) Cleansing of commodes.
  - (iii) Cleansing and removal of contents of septic tanks not connected to the Municipal drains and privies erected at temporary camps, fairs, etc.

#### IV.-Dog Licenging and Dog Destruction

The measures against stray dogs were further intensified. Prompt attention was also paid to complaints. The work included:—

- (i) Licensing pet dogs.
- (ii) Catching and destroying ownerless and stray dogs.

The Dog Licensing Inspector was in charge of the organisation and was assisted by five Junior Overseers, four Dog Catchers, I Clerk, and 2 Report Be irers. In all 2,478 Licences were issued. During the year 5,519 dogs were caught and sent to Mihilaxmi Siding in the Lethal Chambers and the Kennels, out of which, only 42 dogs were retrieved by the owners and remaining 5,477 dogs were destroyed. The facility to obtain licences either in the Ward Offices or in the Central Offices was continued. A new dog-van was purchased. Poisoning was resorted to only when it was absolutely necessary.

#### V.-Rat Destruction

The work was continued by drafting labour from conservancy services. The number of rats caught dead or alive, ward by ward is shown in the statement under Appendix 15. Examination of the Suburban rat-catch was begun from 2nd May 1952 at the Haffkine Institute. Necessary equipment of 150 rat-traps and 8 cynogas pumps to deal with the rat-pest complaints was proposed and sanctioned during the year under review.

In the month of August 1952 a suspected case of plague was reported from Ghatkopar and a concentrated anti-rat-campaign was conducted in the locality.

#### VI.—Removal and Disposal of Carcasses

The right of removing and disposing of the dead animals in H Ward including Bandra Slaughter House was sold to Messrs. Rathod & Co., and that in the wards 'K' (excluding th four villages, viz., Vile-Parle, Bandivali, Mogra and Andheri, under an interim injunction of the High Court), M (Chembur) and N (Chatkopar) was sold to Messrs Kurlawala and Sons. As regards Kurla, (with railway-yard and extended portion of L Ward) the contract entered into by the defunct Kurla Municipality with Messrs. Rathod & Co., was continued. The dispute between the Mudhvis and the Municipal Corporation on the question of the right of appropriating the carcasses still remained subjudice. Appendix 16 gives the particulars of the carcasses disposed of at the disposal ground.

## VII .- Labour Welfare

#### (a) Housing Accommodation for the labour staff:-

Statement showing the accommodation for the Conservancy Labourers and the number of employees housed therein are shown in Appendix 17. The construction of new chawls at Andheri was completed and the rooms were allotted to the labour employees.

- (b) Co-operative credit Society.—Facilities of a Co-operative Credit Society existed and the staff, who were members of the Society, took advantage of the same.
- (c) Welfare centres.—One more labour welfare centre was opened in K Ward (Andheri) and the centres afforded facilities for sports such as foot ball, volley ball, carrom, lejeem, lathi, etc. In the centre at Kurla, a Lady Teacher was appointed for teaching music and garba dancing and also a teacher for instructing the boys in playing games.

#### VIII.— Veterinary Dispensary at Khar

This dispensary was taken over by the Corporation from the Ex-Bandra Municipality to whom the building was donated by Seth Dayabhai Amersy in memory of his daughter Bai Nandubai in the year 1934 for the purpose of treating dumb animals.

Till March 1952, there were two Government Veterinary Surgeons. The immunization work was also done by them. However, after the dispensary was manned by Municipal staff, the work of immunization was discontinued and since then the same is being done by the Veterinary staff of the Government working under the Divisional Veterinary Officer at the First Aid Veterinary Post, Jogeshwari to which stable owners from the Suburbs are now directed to have their animals inoculated against rinderpest. The number of animals treated and inoculations done during the years 1950, 1951 and 1952 are given in Appendix 18.

Grant-in-aid was being given by Government in respect of this dispensary but as the whole work has been taken over by the Bombay Municipal Corporation, no grant-in-aid was paid for the year 1952. The total revenue realised during the years 1950-51 and 1951-52 and 1952-53 is given in Appendix 19.

#### IX.—Municipal Transport in the Suburbs

The fleet of motor vehicles and trailers of Municipal Transport consisted of 141 vehicles, 127 of which were employed for rendering conservancy services. Details of the vehicles and their allocation for the various services are given in Appendix 20.

#### Running of the Transport Vehicles

The transport vehicles were operated in the five Wards of the Suburban area including Versova, Bhandup and Chembur where bullock traction has since been discontinued. The services of the motor driven dog-vanwere utilised in the City area two days a week to augment the work done there by bullock traction.

#### Repairs and Maintenance Organization

The old conservancy vehicles taken over from the  $E_{\rm x}$ -local bodies, gave constant troubles due to break-down and for want of a suitable garage and a centralised work-shop, major repairs work was got done through Messrs. Sion Garage.

Effective and prompt attention was given by the Municipal staff to minor repairs and breakdowns on roads. The staff of mechanics operates at Khar, Vile-Parle, Kurla and Ghatkopar.

In order to enforce central and technical supervision over the staff at these 4 garages, 4 Mechanical overseers were appointed in the newly created posts during the year.

The existing garages are far too inadequate to house the increasing number of vehicles and trailers for essential services in the Suburban area. The feasibility of locating the garages at suitable sites is under investigation.

#### Addition to the Fleet and Equipment

The fleet was augmented by adding 4 "Scammell" Cess-pool emptiers with 4 Mechanical horses. This addition has appreciably strengthened and improved the cesspool emptying service as these emptiers are mechanically worked.

Two vehicles for the removal of refuse, 7 Trailers for the removal of Night-soil, one Pick-up, 3 Cosspool lorries of the manual loading type and one Station Wagon for the use of Accounts staff for making payments in the Suburban Wards were purchased during the year under report.

Two pick-ups were brought on loan from the City organisation to meet the needs of the Insecticide Branch.

During the year under report, orders were placed for the purchase of 10 Scammells, 48 Night-Soil Trailers

Pick-ups and 7 Refuse lorries. 2 Night Soil vehicles of the Scammell type were also ordered for trail purposes.

#### Three Year Plan

The three year programme, approved by the Corporation, to raise the standard of the essential services of the Health Department is being implemented as planned.

#### Insurance of Vehicles

The creation of our own Insurance pool proved to be economical. During the year Rs. 2,600 only were proposed as an ex-gratia payment in two cases of accidents.
