

REVIEW OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COMMISSIONER FOR GREATER BOMBAY FOR THE YEAR 1966-67.

The Administration Report submitted by the Municipal Commissioner, gives in detail the working of the various Municipal Departments for the year 1966-67.

CORPORATION

2. Shri S. R. Patkar was elected Mayor of Bombay for the year under report and he continued to hold that office throughout the year. Shri Taherbhoy E. Kachwalla was the Chairman of the Standing Committee, Dr. J. M. Lakhani, was the Chairman of the Improvements Committee and Shri A. M. Mandekar was the Chairman of the Education Committee for the year under report and they continued to hold their respective offices throughout the year.

Commissioner.

3. Shri J. H. Patwardhan held the post of Municipal Commissioner with effect from 16th April 1966 and continued throughout the year under report.

Complaints Section.

Complaints received from the public about repairs to buildings, water supply, drainage, sanitation, etc. Complaints were referred to the departments concerned, systematically followed up and the complainants were contacted if required in order to see that their grievances were redressed within a reasonable time. The Standing Committee feels that economy in the cost could be effected if Officers in the section are replaced by clerks.

Birla Kreeda Kendra.

Reservation of the Kendra by the public for various cultural activities commenced from 17th January 1966, the date from which the premises licence was granted by the Commissioner of Police. During the year under report, an amount of Rs. 64,412 was collected by way of revenue.

Documentaries and demonstrations of the electric toy trains, etc., were shown free of charge to the Municipal school children in the two halls for children.

FINANCIAL

4. The financial transactions have resulted in a surplus of Rs. 4,43.87 lakhs at the end of the year instead of the anticipated surplus of Rs. 1,60.63 lacs. This was due to the fact that the actual expenditure decreased by Rs. 2,55.67 lakhs over the Revised Budget Estimates while the income increased by Rs. 27.57 lakhs over the revised budgeted amount.

The Standing Committee desires that adequate care should be taken in framing the estimates so as to make them realistic and also to avoid a large number of proposals for additional grants during the year.

Variation in Income.

5. In preparing the Budget Estimates for the year under report, an Opening Cash Balance of Rs. 4,40.68 lakhs was estimated. On the final closing of the accounts for the previous year, the actual Opening Balance for the year under report amounted to Rs. 3,50.24 lakhs. The total income budgeted for was Rs. 33,04.90 lakhs, while the actual realizations amounted to Rs. 37,20.64 lakhs. On the expenditure side, the amount budgeted for was Rs. 32,37.72 lakhs whereas the actuals of expenditure were Rs. 32,76.76 lakhs.

Loan Funds

6. The Opening Balance on 1st April 1966 on account of Loan Funds excluding of Trust Funds was Rs. 1,76.05 lakhs for the City, Rs. 84.55 lakhs for the Suburbs inclusive the Trust Funds and Rs. 24.99 lakhs for the Extended Suburbs. Loans aggregating to

Rs. 9,20.62 lakhs for the City, Rs. 1.25 lakhs for the Suburbs and Rs. 90 lakhs for the Extended Suburbs were raised during the year.

The total Loan Funds available for expenditure during the year were Rs. 10,96.71 lakhs for the City, Rs. 2,09.55 lakhs for the Suburbs and Rs. 1,15.05 lakhs for the Extended Suburbs.

The actual expenditure amounted to Rs. 10,12.14 lakhs for the City, Rs. 1,58.04 lakhs for the Suburbs and Rs. 73.37 lakhs for the Extended Suburbs on Capital Works as against the budgeted figure of Rs. 20,36.32 lakhs for the City, Rs. 3,42.84 lakhs for the Suburbs and Rs. 1,75.55 lakhs for the Extended Suburbs.

Sinking Funds

7. The Book Value of investments of the Sinking Fund at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 18,11.76 lakhs for the City, Rs. 4,05.29 lakhs for the Suburbs and Rs. 68.91 lakhs for the Extended Suburbs, made up of the book value of securities and the amounts in cash with the State Bank of India. Valuing the Municipal and Improvement Trust Debentures at par, the market value of the Sinking Fund Investments held on 31st March 1967 came to Rs. 17,98.47 lakhs for the City, Rs. 4,00.75 lakhs for the Suburbs and Rs. 68.91 lakhs for the Extended Suburbs. The total amount of Sinking Fund thus inclusive of the interest accrued and cash with the Bank came to Rs. 18,13.90 lakhs for the City, Rs. 4,08.31 lakhs for Suburbs and Rs. 70.06 lakhs for the Extended Suburbs, the excess in the Sinking Fund Account being Rs. 1,01.01 lakhs for the City, Rs. 17.68 lakhs for the Suburbs and Rs. 1.91 lakhs for Extended Suburbs, respectively.

Improvement Schemes Account, General Account, Income and Expenditure

8. The total income for the City for the year amounted to Rs. 2,05.28 lakhs against Rs. 1,88.06 lakhs for the previous year, showing a net increase of Rs. 17.22 lakhs. The main increases were in respect of (1) Rent and other proceeds of properties—Rs. 1.51 lakhs; (2) Contribution from Municipal Corporation Rs. 4.71 lakhs, counter balanced by decreases (i) under Grant-in-Aid from Government for meeting the deficit in the General Account Rs. 10 lakhs; and (ii) Interest and profit on investment Rs. 1.47 lakhs and (iii) Miscellaneous Receipts—Rs. 0.48 lakh.

The total expenditure for the City for the year, viz., Rs. 1,98.76 lakhs as against Rs. 1,81.64 lakhs for the previous year, showed an increase of Rs. 17.12 lakhs on that of the previous year. This is made up of increase of Rs. 10.06 lakhs under maintenance of properties and streets and Rs. 7.05 lakhs under Debt Charges.

The Surplus of Rs. 6.52 lakhs in General Account is transferred to Capital Account.

Loan Account

The loan liability at the beginning of the year was Rs. 69,92.39 lakhs. The repayment of loan during the year was Rs. 4,03.24 lakhs of which Rs. 62.91 lakhs were repaid to Government and Rs. 2,93.79 lakhs to the debenture holders. The outstanding liability on loan account at the close of the year stood at Rs. 74,41.58 lakhs.

Capital Account

The year began with an Opening Balance of Rs. 67.02 lakhs. In the course of the year, receipts on account of Sale Proceeds of Lands and Buildings amounted to Rs. 2.85 lakhs and a Loan of Rs. 50 lakhs was raised. The total funds thus available were Rs. 1,19.88 lakhs. The total expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 59.97 lakhs. The surplus in the General Account for the year which amounted to Rs. 6.52 lakhs, was transferred to the Capital Account. The unspent balance at the close of the year was Rs. 66.44 lakhs.

The actual expenditure during the year on schemes amounted to Rs. 59.97 lakhs as against the Revised Estimates of Rs. 2,05.78 lakhs including Rs. 11.30 lakhs on account of the cost of Management and Establishment.

Sinking Fund in Improvement Schemes Account

The amount of Sinking Fund on 31st March 1967 was Rs. 7,14.20 lakks including cash with the State Bank of India. Valuing the Municipal and Trust debentures at par, the market value of Sinking Fund Investments at the end of the year under review amounted

to Rs. 7,15.88 lakhs. This together with interest accrued upto 31st March 1967, viz., Rs. 1.78 lakhs and cash with the State Bank of India brought the total amount of Sinking Fund to Rs. 7,17.67 lakhs against Rs. 5,74.57 lakhs, the amount to which the Sinking Fund should have accumulated at the close of the year. The excess in the fund thus amounted to Rs. 1,43.09 lakhs.

The Gross Capital Liabilities of the Improvement Schemes in the City stood at Rs. 16,29.95 lakhs at the close of the year under review and the assets at Rs. 37,13.60 lakhs including the book value of funds comprised in Schedules 'W' and 'X', resulting in a Surplus of Rs. 20,83.66 lakhs.

General Account, Slum Clearance—City and Suburbs

The total income during the year under Slum Clearance, City Section, amounted to Rs. 10.84 lakhs against Rs. 13.39 lakhs in the previous year showing the net decrease of Rs. 2.54 lacs. This is made up of increase of Rs. 0.19 lacs under Rent and other proceeds of properties and decrease Rs. 2.73 lacs under Interest and Profits on investment.

The expenditure on this account during the year amounted to Rs. 19.71 lacs consisting of Rs. 7.26 lacs on Maintenance of Properties and Streets and Rs. 12.45 lacs on Debt Charges resulting in a deficit of Rs. 8.86 lacs at the close of the year which was made good from the Capital Account.

The total income during the year under Slum Clearance, Suburban Section, amounted to Rs. 2.89 lacs as against Rs. 1.67 lacs in the previous year showing a net increase of Rs. 1.22 lacs. This is made up of increase of Rs. 1.13 lacs under Rent and other proceeds of Properties, and Rs. 0.9 lakhs under interest and profits on investment.

The expenditure during the year on this account amouted to Rs. 7.17 lakhs made up of Rs. 0.91 lakh under maintenance of Properties and Streets and Rs. 6.26 lakhs under Debt Charges. The net deficit of Rs. 4.28 lakhs was transferred to Capital Account.

Capital Account, Slum Clearance-City.

The Opening Balance under Capital Account, Slum Clearance, City, on 1st April 1966 was Rs. 14.93 lakhs. An amount of Rs. 9.27 lakhs was received from Government as loan and Rs. 12.24 lacs as grant-in-aid. Thus the total funds available for expenditure amounted to Rs. 86.44 lakhs, against which the expenditure incurred during the year amounted to Rs. 19.04 lakhs. The deficit in the General Account amounting to Rs. 8.86 lacs was transferred to Capital Account and Rs. 3.07 lakhs received in excess as Loan during 1959-60 were transferred to Suburb's Capital Account. The unspent balance at the close of the year stood at Rs. 55.47 lakhs.

Capital Account, Slum Clearance—Suburbs.

The Opening Balance under Capital Account, Slum Clearance, Suburbs, on 1st April 1966 was Rs. 22.87 lakhs. Rs. 2.47 lakhs were received from Government as loan, an amount of Rs. 0.62 lakh was received as sale proceeds of Lands and Buildings and Rs. 3.63 lacs as subsidy and Rs. 3.07 lakhs was transferred from the City Capital Account. A loan of Rs. 50 lakhs was raised from public. The total funds available for expenditure thus amounted to Rs. 82.65 lakhs against which expenditure incurred during the year amounted to Rs. 53.25 lakhs and deficit in the General Account amounting to Rs. 82.65 lakhs was met out of the Capital Account leaving an unspent balance of Rs. 25.12 lakhs.

The Standing Committee is much concerned to find such huge surplus under Slum Clearance Account of the Suburban areas especially as the Suburban areas which came under the control of the Corporation only a few years back are much backward and are in a great need of planned development. The slum areas in Suburbs require immediate attention in order that the evil of slum life is eradicated from these areas before it takes a gigantic form as in the City today. In this context, huge surplus balance under this account is not at all a healthy sign and indicates want of necessary foresight in City Planning and Development on the part of the executive. The Standing Committee, therefore, desires to alert the Executive in proper time and hope that the executive will be more vigilant and resourceful to spend all available funds under this account in years to come.

Education Fund.

9. The actual income for the year amounted to Rs. 5,96.99 lakhs resulting in an increase of Rs. 39.34 lakhs on the Budget Estimates and an increase of Rs. 1.26 lakhs on the Revised Estimates. The rate of Education Cess was 2½ per cent. of rateable value on

buildings and lands, the rateable value of each of which was not less than Rs. 300 per annum and 2 per cent. of the rateable value on buildings and lands, the rateable value of each of which was less than Rs. 300 per annum but not less than Rs. 75 per annum.

That total expenditure for the year amounted to Rs. 6,02.77 lakhs against the Budget Estimates of Rs. 6,09.17 lakhs.

The Opening Balance on account of Loan Funds excluding Trust Funds on 1st April 1966 was Rs. 84.09 lakhs. A new loan of Rs. 100 lakhs was proposed for 1966-67 but actually a loan of Rs. 50 lakhs was raised during the year. The total loan funds thus available amounted to Rs. 1,34.09 lakhs against which expenditure booked on loan funds amounted to Rs. 34.61 lakhs. An advance for purchase of furniture for new school buildings amounted to Rs. 61,424.7 lakhs out of which Rs. 4.60 lakhs were recouped. The closing balance at the end of the year in loan funds amounted to Rs. 1,03.45 lakhs.

The percentage of actual expenditure on Loan Works to the Loan Funds available was 26. The Standing Committee again note with concern the Executive's inability to expend the loan amounts sanctioned by the Corporation within the scheduled limit and hope that more strenuous efforts will be put in to augment the Loan Works Programme especially as a large number of Municipal schools is located in private premises which are quite unsuitable for imparting instruction and further as the accommodation is insufficient to provide for the increasing number of pupils seeking admission to our schools and as a result whereof quite a large number of our schools are forced to meet in two shifts.

Taxation, Demands, Collection and Outstanding.

10. During the year under report, the rates of taxation in the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs remained the same as in the previous year. The rates of taxation thus stood as follows:—

General Tax (including Fire Tax) at 24.75 per cent. Water Tax at 4.50 per cent. and Halalkhore Tax at 3.50 per cent. Tax on vehicles and animals was levied at the maximum rates mentioned in Schedule 'G' of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. Rates charged for the supply of water by meter measurement ranged between Rs. 1.70 to Rs. 5.50 per 10,000 litres according to the class of properties.

Education Cess was levied at a graduated scale. No Education Cess was levied on Properties having a rateable value below Rs. 75. The demand in respect of this cess in the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs was for Rs. 67,41,262.84, 56,33,521.72 and 18,84,704.52: with the collection amounted to Rs. 52,21,325.74, 27,78,153.52 and 8,76,347.29.

On the Assessment Register at the close of the year, there were 77,469, 70,065 and 31,459 properties in the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs, respectively. 73,790 properties in the City, 67,675 in the Suburbs and 30,508 in the Extended Suburbs were assessed to General Tax, while 1,864 properties in the City, 2,390 in the Suburbs and 951 in the Extended Suburbs were exempted from the General Tax, under Section 143(1)(a) and (b) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, while the Municipal properties exempted from the General Tax numbered 1,815.

The number of properties accounted for as newly erected, demolished and enlarged during the year was 2,013,346 and 1,094, respectively, the corresponding figures for the preceding year being 3,180,605 and 1,064. The figures for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs stood at 3,922, 3,511 and 286 and 1,544, 1,449 and 307, respectively.

The rateable value of all properties in the City on 31st March 1967 was Rs. 38,85,93,154 in the City, Rs. 15,10,10,810 in the Suburbs and Rs. 4,84,61,395 in the Extended Suburbs as against Rs. 37,02,74,639, Rs. 13,36,48,380 and Rs. 4,22,35,308 in the preceding year. It worked, out to Rs. 140.19, 145.73 and Rs. 140.96 per head of population as per the census of 1961 against Rs. 133.58, Rs. 128.99 and Rs. 122.88 in the preceding year.

Wheel tax in respect of hack-victorias, labour carts and hand carts was levied at Rs. 100, Rs. 35 and Rs. 6, respectively.

The total number of bills in respect of property taxes and wheel tax issued during the year was 1,39,855 and 2,74,508 respectively for the City, 1,40,978 and 51,725 for the Suburbs and 63,439 and 9,548 for the Extended Suburbs. The total number of bills for water charges by meter measurement issued during the year by the Hydraulic Engineer was 37,756 for the City, 53,288 for the Suburbs and 18,363 for the Extended Suburbs. As regards property taxes, out of the net demand of Rs. 20,20,03,227 an amount of Rs. 19,00,67,954 was collected

leaving the amount of Rs. 1,19,35,273 as outstanding, percentage of which to net demand comes to 18.96 for the City; the figures for Suburbs for net demand and collection stood at Rs. 10,23,76,369 and Rs. 8,68,32,318 leaving the balance at Rs. 1,55,44,051 and percentage at 63.20. The net demand and collection in the Extended Suburbs stood at Rs. 2,74,55,004 and Rs. 2,11,85,447 ,leaving the balance at Rs. 62,69,557 and percentage at 61.56.

In the case of Wheel tax in the City, the net demand was for Rs. 2,02,90,856 and the amount collected was Rs. 74,93,443, thus leaving an amount of Rs. 1,27,97,413 as outstanding, the percentage of which to net demand comes to 63.04. As regards Suburbs and Extended Suburbs, the net demand was Rs. 17,86,730 and Rs. 3,00,461 the collection at Rs. 7,09,050 and Rs. 1,37,982 and the percentage at 60.30 and 54.07, respectively.

2,071 complaints under Section 167 of the Act against the rateable values amounting to Rs. 3,40,76,214 and 1,831 complaints under Section 162 against the value amounting to Rs. 2,81,54,518 were disposed of during the year under report. The total number of complaints in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs under the aforesaid Sections was 4,067 and 1,919, resepectively.

The Urban Immovable Property Tax.

This tax was abolished from 1st April 1963. The arrears of the tax on 1st April 1966 were Rs. 15,98,658.97, Rs. 8,97,835.41 and Rs. 6,84,043.53 for the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs, respectively. Out of this amount, a sum of Rs. 17,28,711.56, Rs. 1,87,148.77 and Rs. 1,09,174.98, was collected.

The Standing Committee has expressed anxiety about the huge arrears of taxes due from Government and public bodies and desire that ways and means should be found out to recover in advance at least three fourths of the taxes due in case the claim is disputed.

Theatre Tax.

11. There were in all 40 Class I and 20 Class II Cinema Theatres in the City and 26 and 8 Cinema Theatres in Suburbs and Extended Suburbs, respectively, out of which 16 and 3 were Class I Cinema Theatres and the remaining were Class II Cinema Theatres. The tax was generally received regularly. Theatre Tax was also recovered in respect of various dramatic performances, dances, variety entertainments, etc., held at various places in Greater Bombay where admission was on payment.

The rates of Theatre Tax for the year under report were Rs. 10 per show for Class I Cinema Theatres, Rs. 7 per show for Class II Cinema Theatres, Rs. 7 per show for Drama, Concert, Variety Entertainment or Tamasha, Rs. 10 per day for Circus, Carnival or Fite and Rs. 7 per show for any other entertainment. The total income derived by way of Theatre Tax during the year under report was Rs. 7,51,565 in the City, Rs. 2,08,540.70 in the Suburbs and Rs. 81,397.20 in the Extended Suburbs.

Exemption from payment of Theatre Tax was granted to such Cinema shows, performances, etc., as were held in aid of bonafide charities or directed towards advancement of cultural or educational activities and exempted from payment of Entertainment Duty leviable by the Commissioner of Police under the Bombay Entertainments Duty Act, 1923.

The Standing Committee note with concern the high persistent percentage of outstand ings and hope that vigorous efforts will be made and if necessary, the collection machinery remodelled in order to reduce the outstandings to the minimum possible extent as the revenue collection is the mainstay of Municipal finance and hence also of the Civic Administration of this great City.

OCTROI.

12. The same rates of Octroi as specified in the Octroi Schedule 'H' to the B.M.C. Act as amended, continued for the year under report. However entry 22 of the Octroi Schedule was amended under the provisions of Maharashtra Act XXVII of 1966 to e fect a change in the Sub-Clauses of the entry and without revising the rate of Octroi. The Corporation also revised the rates of Octroi on 30-1-1967, on Calves' to 50 paise per head under their Resolution No. 1603, the effect to the above amendments was given from 1-4-1967. The gross collections from Octroi during the year amounted to 11,91,32,931 lakhs as against Rs. 7.37 lakhs from the Octroi in the preceding year. The amount refunded during the year under review was Rs. 1,25,77, lakhs as against Rs. 64.65 lakhs, in the previous year. Octroi gave a net revenue of about Rs. 49,315 lakhs as against Rs. 64.65 lakhs given by Octroi in the previous year. The total number of claims for refund was 59,334 as against 49,315 in the previous year.

Fees for stamping sugar bags, tea cases, etc., amounted to Rs. 14.27 lakers upins Rs. 18.07 lakes in the preceding year.

Elections.

13. As per the provisions of the B.M.C. Act, relating to Election amended under the provisions of the Maharashtra Act No. VIII of 1965, the next Municipal General Elections, are to be held early in 1968 on the basis of 140 single member constituencies.

VAITERNA-CUM-TANSA SCHEME.

14. Further awards for compensation for acquisition of lands in connection with the major works of the Scheme amounting to Rs. 1,96,880 were declared by the Acquisition Officers.

MASTER PLAN FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF WATER SUPPLY.

Worli Hill Reservoir was commissioned during the year and the work of construction of the Golanji Hill Reservoir was also completed.

Dahisar River Project.—Detailed plans and estimates for construction of dam and its appurtenant works along with a detailed project report were submitted to Corporation. While the tenders were under scrutiny the Government advised the Corporation to postpone the project for the present.

Upper Vaiterna Scheme.—Contracts for preparing formation for pipeline were awarded and the works are in progress.

The progress of the work in connection with Reservoir at Rawli Hill, Powai Hill, Pali Hill, Trombay Hill, Ghatkopar Hill, Veravali Hill was not as per Schedule.

The Irrigation and Power Department of the Government of Maharashtra prepared a detailed report on Bhatsai River Project. A three-man appraisal team from World Bank from whom loan has been sought for implementing the Project, inspected various sites of the Project and further investigations were made by the Consultants appointed by the State Government. Final report indicating the agency of implementing the Project is awaited.

The Standing Committee desire that all the Reservoirs should be completed and commissioned expeditiously in order to ensure equitable distribution of water supply and avoid hardships to citizens receiving supply, at odd hours at present.

The Government of Maharashtra permitted the Corporation to draw surplus water from Ulhas River. The Corporation approved the Scheme at a total cost of Rs. 2,88,70,000 which consists of pumping about 20 m.g.p.d. of raw water from Ulhas River. 67 acres of land required for the scheme was taken over by the Corporation from the Collector of Thana District.

Planning Section, Public Works.

15. The Architectural Planning Branch for the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs prepared in all 79 Plans, 9 Block Estimates and 55-Detailed Estimates costing Rs. 1,38,09,850 lacs and Rs. 2,26,24,523 lacs, respectively.

Municipal Properties.

16. The total number of properties both Municipal and ex-Trust maintained by the Maintenance Branch during the year was 13,712 as against 3,680 in the previous year. The amount spent on 497 buildings in the Suburbs and 158 in the Extended Suburbs for such works was Rs. 5,87,423 and Rs. 1,99,815, respectively. The work of upkeep and maintenance of buildings including school buildings was carried out partly by contracts and partly by departmental agency at a cost of about Rs. 33.41 lacs in the City and Rs. 9.07 lacs in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs.

Construction.

During the year under report works estimated to cost Rs. 2,93.62 lacs were completed. Works estimated to cost Rs. 1,010.08 lacs were in progress.

Private Buildings.

17. During the year, 1,369 applications were received for the construction of new buildings or additions and alterations to the existing ones. The total number of new buildings constructed by private enterprise during the year was 203 of which 94 were residential and 109 non-residential; 21 buildings were constructed by Co-operative Societies. If popper

encouragement and guidance is given, the Standing Committee is confident that the Cooperative Housing will be of great help in solving the baffling housing problem. The Standing Committee is of the view that if incentive is given in the form of concession in taxes, it would serves as an impetus for building activities.

In the case of dilapidated houses, the issue of notices and launching of prosecutions continued as before. In all 10,372 notices were issued for repairs and/or removal of unsafe buildings. In deserving cases, where the owners resorted to delaying tactics or refused to comply with Municipal requisitions, authorisations under Section 499 of the Act, were given to tenants to carry out repair works and to recover reasonable expenses incurred by them from the rents. In 144 cases such authorities were given during the year as against 130 in the previous year and 2,214 tenants took advantage of it.

In 298 cases, departmental action had to be taken to pull down unsafe portions of buildings in the interest of public safety, as the owners failed to comply with the Municipal Requisitions meeting the cost in the first instance from the special provision made for the purpose in the Budget and an expenditure of Rs. 63,887 was incurred therefor.

During the year, 97 buildings or portions thereof collapsed. The total number of persons injured was 68 and those killed was 11. The estimated damage to property was Rs. 3.50 lacs.

Slum Clearance, Housing and Land Acquisition.

18. The various works under the Slum Clearance Schemes during the year wer; in progress.

Clearance of Municipal Slums.—By the end of the year, 13 Slums were cleared and redeveloped. Clearance and re-development of 5 slums in stages was in progress.

Tenements under the Government of India's subsidised Slum Clearance Scheme.—Under the Scheme, 6,516 tenements were sanctioned. Out of these, no tenements were completed during the year, brigning the total number of tenements completed upto 31st March 1967 to 3,875. Construction of 1,232 tenements was in progress on 31st March 1967.

Financial Assistance from Government under subsidised Slum Clearance Schemes—The Corporation have received Rs. 11.74 lacs by way of loan and Rs. 15.87 lacs by way of subsidy from the Government during the year under report. The Corporation has thus so far received Rs. 1,04.95 lacs by way of loan and Rs. 1,29.22 lacs by way of subsidy upto 1st March 1967.

Six projects of Slum Clearance Scheme of total outlay of Rs. 116.688 lacs envisaging construction of 1,786 tenements in Greater Bombay were formulated and forwarded to Government for their sanction and Government sanction to this programme has since been received. The work in respect of 1,328 tenements was started, 120 tenements were completed, 700 tenements were in progress and 508 tenements were not taken up for various reasons during the year under report.

Drainage and Sewerage.

19. Padar Purification Works.—The Sewage Purification works at Dad r functioned satisfactorily throughout the year under report. The total quantity of sewage received at the Plant during the year was 6,317.76 Millon Gallons i.e., an average of 17.30 M. G. per day. The total quantity of sludge gas generated during the year was 7,74,77,000 C. ft. The total revenue realised during the year by sale of gas amonted to Rs. 2,21,504 as against Rs. 2,27,602 during the previous year.

Love Grove Pumping Station and Purification Works.

The working of the old and new pumping stations was satisfactory during the year ander report.

Dharavi Purification Works.

The Sewage Purification Plant worked normally. The revenue realised from the sale of gas supply amounted to Rs. 24,000 approximately.

Pumping and Compressor Stations and Ejectors.

The sewerage system of the City depends upon the satisfactory working of Pumping and Compressor Stations. Sewage from the sewerage system of the Cty was pumped through all pumping stations.

The work of laying sewers in various parts of the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs was in progress.

Transport.

20. During the year, 5,615 motor vehicles and 447 trailers (including Suburban fleet) were in commission.

The transport fleet for the removal of refuse consisted of 244 vehicles of different types. As this fleet was not sufficient to cope up with the daily output of refuse, extra vehicles from the Maharashtra State Transport Corporation and also from private agnecy had to be requisitioned for the removal of refuse. The average collection of refuse in the City worked out to 1,750 tons per day. The Standing Committee has noticed that the vehicles are not kept in proper condition and transport services often breakdown at inspections, and during dilivery of agenda etc. papers to Councillors, etc.

Repairs and Maintenance of Roads and Footpaths.

21. The total mileage of roads in the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs at the end of the year was 93,919, 174.00 and 111.64, respectively.

The work of maintenance of roads and footpaths was generally satisfactory throughout the year.

The number of street lights increased from 15.304 to 16,987 in the City, 9,260 to 9,821 in the Suburbs and from 2,884 to 3,329 in the Extended Suburbs at an expenditure of Rs. 48,00,000 and Rs. 3,11,869, respectively.

The lighting of 7 roads was improved with HPMV lamps under the 'All-in-Hire Scheme' and 22 roads were improved with Fluorescent lamps under All-in-hire rate. 8 roads were provided with new lighting arrangements.

Removal of Town Refuse.

22. As in the past a major portion of the City refuse was transported to Deonar for disposal.

The total number of wagons sent to Deonar during the year under report was 22,696 as against 23,485 during the preceding year.

As the number of Municipal wagons was insufficient to transport the huge quantity of city refuse, 61 wagons were taken on hire from Western Railway during the year at the charges of Rs. 4.50 per wagon per day.

The cost of maintenance of Mahalaxmi and Chembur Siding was Rs. 25,485.

Town Planning Schemes.

23. No progress was made in case of Town Planning Scheme, Bombay City No. I (Mandvi and Elphinstone Estate). No alternative accommodation could be provided to tenants likely to be affected.

The implementation of Town Planning Scheme, Bombay City No. IV (Mahim Area) was in progress.

Some were at arbitration stage.

In the year under reference Special Consulting Surveyor appointed by the State Government to scrutinize the development plans for K, H, P, M and L Wards for Suburban Areas and all Wards of the City Proper along with the Development Control Rules and the Development Plan of Greater Bombay with Development Control Rules with various modifications was finally sanctioned by the State Government on 7th January 1967. The implimentation of the sanctioned development plan was proceeded with the Development Control Rules were got printed and circulated. Copies of the Development Plan for various Wards in the City and the Suburban Areas are being prepared for the purpose of printing them for circulation and sale amongst the members of the public.

Conservancy.

24. Roads, footpaths and house gullies were swept twice daily. House gullies were flushed and roads were brushed and scrapped whenever necessary. The Standing Committee is of the opinion that the work of Sweeping roads should be completed early in the morning and steps must be taken to mechanize the service as far as possible. The total refuse collected and to toved by engaging stationary as well as mobile traction was 6.38 750 tons in the City, 1,38,020 tons in Suburbs and the Extended Suburbs.

1,056 Actions were taken in Suburbs and Extended Suburbs under the Municipal Act and the Bombay City Police Act during the year for committing nuisance by throwing refuse in the streets or public places or fouling roads by urinating, etc.

There were in all 1,153 privy seats in the City. The work of removal of night-soil was attended to regularly by 5 cesspool lorries.

There were 158 public sanitary conveniences in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs.

The number of basket privies existing was 10,682 as against 11,169 during the previous year. The reduction is due to the progress of sewerage schemes. In addition there were 4,071 cesspools.

Control of Stray Dogs.—31,004 stray dogs were caught and destroyed. The total income by way of dog licensing fees, etc., in the City was Rs. 55,172.45 as against Rs. 54,617.73 in the previous year.

The work of immunizing the milch cattle against Rinder Pest was continued and 45,599 milch cattle were inoculated as against 31,809 in the previous year. No cases of Rinder Pest were detected during the year.

In addition to the above, the Conservancy Branch also rendered special conservancy and halalkhore services to various circuses, exhibitions, fairs etc., in the City realising thereby Rs. 3,78,044.08. Besides Rs. 1,05,867 were paid by Government for services rendered for cleaning Government foreshores.

11,329 different kinos of tests were made by the Municipal Material Testing Laboratory during the year.

The Municipal Hot Mix Asphalt Plant at Worli worked for 275 days and remained closed for 90 days on account of rainy season. The number of boxes and tonnage turned out by the main plant and pegson plants were 34,041 boxes and 7,548 boxes, respectively.

The Crushers at Worli and Sewri worked satisfactorily during the year. The total output was 2,569 brass as against 3,248 brass in the previous year.

ESTATE AND LAND MANAGEMENT.

25. The Department continued to look after the work of preparation of layouts, etc., as before. There were no changes in the layout of ex-Truts Estates.

The undeveloped land at present with the Corporation is approximately 494 acres which covers the land at Dharavi Scheme 56.

No plots in Municipal Scheme have been disposed of in the year 1966-67.

The total area available for disposal in Municipal laid out schemes on 1st April 1967 was about 3,182.30 sq. meters, but the same is required for Municipal purposes, and therefore, area available for disposal is nil.

The total number of plots disposed of upto the end of 1965-66 was admeasuring 16,557.05 sq. meters and valued at Rs. 4,200.

The amount received by way of commutation of ground rent and premium etc., during the year was Rs. 3,33.114 as against Rs. 4.20 lacs in the preceding year.

The collection on account of rents from the permanent chawls during the year amounted to Rs. 22.05,251. The revenue actually collected on account of rents in respect of S. P. Sheds came to Rs. 17.59,058. The figures in respect of slum clearance tenements and acquired premises stood at Rs. 14,50,122 and Rs. 10,57,923, respectively.

500 tenements were constructed at Falkland Road, Haines Road, Ghatkopar and Santacruz, during the year under Slum Clearnce Scheme.

The recoveries of rent in the Squatters' Colonies at Mankhurd and Jogeshwari were Rs. 40,308 and Rs. 48,973 against the demand including the arrears of Rs. 14,90,118 and Rs. 4,49,252, respectively, and at Palton Road Dormitary amounted to Rs. 51,745, during the year.

During the year under review, the demand and recovery of taxes aggregated to Rs. 90,894 and Rs. 42,766, respectively. The arrears due for collection at the close of the year stood at Rs. 6,43,320.

The construction of Industrial Estates has been taken by the Corporation for rehabilitation of Industrial Units required to be shifted from the lands required for Municipal purposes. At the Clarke Road Industrial Estates 28 gallies for Industrial Estates were completed during the year.

Corporation have now permitted enclosures of open galleries or otlas free of charge.

Corporation used to charge the encroachment in the compulsory open spaces on prorata basis while the additional floors were charged at flat rate fixed by the Improvements Committee. However the Corporation have now decided to charge encroachments and additional floors alike on flat rates.

Corporation have now decided not to charge monsoon shelters on the private properties and on Municipal lands.

The Corporation have now permitted that any garage on municipal plot could be freely used for an ironing shop.

WATER SUPPLY.

26. The Tansa, Vaitarna, Vehar and Tulsi Lakes were the principal sources of the City's water supply.

The average daily supply to Greater Bombay during the year under report was about 917.86 mega litres as against 976.23 mega litres in the previous year. During the year, the quantity of water supplied to Greater Bombay was 3,35,033.55 mega litres as against 3,56,324.94 mega litres in the preceding year. Supply to the Thana Municipality, etc., was 5,232 mega litres as against 4,507.75 mega litres in the previous year. Total quantity of water supplied to bodies outside the limits of Greater Bombay was 11,789.00 mega litres as against 7,313.83 mega litres in the preceding year. Of the total supply to Greater Bombay, a quantity of 2,06,113.65 mega litres or 1154.19 per cent. was for domestic purposes as against 1,63,615.05 mega litres or 61.48 per cent. in the previous year. The average daily supply for all purposes per head in Greater Bombay was 187.20 litres, while that for domestic purposes only worked out to 61.52 litres. Percentage of total supply for domestic and other purposes worked out at 61.52 and 23.48, respectively.

The water from Powai Lake was used for non-potable purposes, viz., Irrigation and Aarey Colony stables.

The total number of water connections was 83,951 in the City, 26,650 in the Suburbs and 78,04 in the Extended Suburbs and new connections given were, respectively, 3,403, 2,198 and 884. The total number of meters maintained was 21,119. 456 metered stand pipes were given during the year. The total number of stand-pipes in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs was 1,288.

As per the order of the Government of Maharashtra, No. IDC/2465-61144-IND/I of 16-10-1965, the work of fixing the quotas of water for each major industry was taken in hand. Quotas of 850 major industries were fixed till the end of the year.

The number of complaints about short supply, etc., were 38,676, 9,209 and 2,845 in the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs, respectively.

302 new properties were metered in the City during the year. The total revenue derived from water supply by meter measurement was Rs. 4,06,29,714 for the City as against Rs. 4,08,12,795.05 during the previous year. The total revenue collected from Suburbs by way of meter hire in initial stages was Rs. 20,000 and that from supply of water by meter measurement about Rs. 4,30,855. An amount of Rs. 10,03,318 was recovered by way of charges. The figures for Extended Suburbs for these items are Rs. 15,855, Rs. 11,02,792 and Rs. 1,80,879, respectively.

With the creation of new ward offices the work of distribution and maintenance was decentralised and the same was entrusted to Assistant Engineers for each of the Wards.

36 Areas of City and Suburbs experiencing extreme shortage of water supply were studied and boosting stations were provided during the year.

The Standing Committee, however, feel that further steps are required to be taken to ensure equitable distribution of water till resources are adequately augmented.

Fire Brigade Department.

27. During the year, the total number of Fire Stations was 14, viz., 11 in the City-proper and 3 in the Suburbs as in the previous year.

The Fire Brigade received during the year 3,182 calls (including City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs) as against 3,251 calls during the preceding year. Out of these 1,755 calls were for actual fires as against 1,752 calls during the preceding year. 484 calls were false alarms of which as many as 254 were due to malicious interference with street fire alarms as against 188 in the preceding year. 654 calls as against 716 in the preceding year were for special services, such as, house collapses, rescue works, etc. Four persons were handed over to the Police for giving malicious calls.

The City was served by 213 fire alarm posts (including 98 private ones).

There were 14 serious fires during the year. The estimated total loss to property damaged by fire was about Rs. 95,76,772 lakhs as against Rs. 1,11,20 lakhs during the previous year. The value of the insurance of properties affected by fire was about Rs.78,28,420, as against Rs. 1,10,00,000 during the previous year and the total value of the property involved was worth Rs. 53,35 crores as against Rs. 18 crores in the preceding year.

During the year 36 persons lost their lives due to burns of which 18 were men and 18 women. 108 persons received minor injuries and 4 persons lost their lives in 179 incidents of house collapses during the year.

The approximate quantity of water used in extinguishing fires was 41,27,013 gallons out of which 19,22,755 gallons were drawn from Municipal mains, and the rest from the sea, wells, ponds, etc.

The total number of calls within the limits of Greater Bomb ay received during the year was 8,205 of which 1,416 were for accidents, 1,716 for maternity cases and 5,051 for hire cases.

First-Aid was rendered by the Ambulance staff on 246 occasions as against 376 occasions in the previous year.

The annual maintenance cost of the Fire Brigade Department including the ambulance service but excluding the supervision charges and Provident Fund, Pension, and proportion of general supervision and revenue and debt charges, etc., was Rs. 30,83,238.19 as against Rs. 24,03,774.46 in the preceding year.

In accordance with Government orders, Fire Brigade Department continued to be under the control of the Director of Civil Defence and Fire Adviser to the Government of Maharashtra.

The personnel of Fire Brigade rendered emergency service to the victims of two train accidents of serious nature on 13th and 28th June 1966 at Matunga and Wadala Railway Stations, respectively.

PUBLIC GARDENS.

28. During the year under report, the Department maintained 218 sites for public recreation, including 54 Gardens, 3 Fountains, 8 Band Stands, 8 Traffic Islands, 6 Open Spaces, 77 Recreation grounds, 3 Statues and 5 Box Hedges in the City, 39 Gardens, 2 Playgrounds, 1 Band Stand and 1 Traffic Island in Suburbs and 10 Gardens in the Extended Suburbs. During the year, development of 9 new sites into gardens and recreation grounds was undertaken, and development of 3 new sites into gardens was under progress at the end of the year under report.

During the year, 186 wild animals, birds and reptiles were treated in the Zoo Hospital and 144 specimens of pathobactericlogical interest were examined. The total livestock in the Zoo was 962.

The toal expenditure in all gardens and recreation sites in Greater Bombay was Rs. 13,43,429 as against an income of Rs. 2,82,277 including nominal entrace fee of 5 paise per adult introduced from 18th April 1966.

The Standing Committee feels that much improvement is needed to improve the Gardens and recreation sites in Greater Bombay and development of sites reserved in the Development Plan should be undertaken as early as possible.

s Victoria and Albert Museum.

29. The Museum was kept open to the public for 304 days as against 305 days in the preceding year. The total number of visitors during the year was 6.55 lacs as against 7.08 lacs in the preceding year.

The amount realised by the levy of admission fee was Rs. 16,205 as against Rs. 17,180 in the preceding year. The total expenditure on the maintenance of the Museum during the year was over Rs. 40 lakhs as against nearly 45 lakhs during the preceding year.

Municipal Free Reading Rooms and Libraries.

30. As per Corporation Resolution No. 114, dated the 24th May 1965, 14 Municipal Free Reading Rooms and Libraries out of 22 in Greater Bombay were handed over to the Mumbai Marathi Grantha Sangrahalaya for management. The total number of new books purchased in Libraries in the City and Suburbs was 1,500 and 432 and the number of visitors to the Reading Rooms and Libraries in the respective areas was 2.40 lacs, and 0.35 as against 3.45 lacs in the City and 0.80 lacs in the Suburbs during the preceding year. The income from the Libraries and Reading Rooms in the City and Suburbs stood at Rs. 481, Rs. 209, respectively.

Central Stores.

31. Tenders were invited for the purchse of stores during the year in 216 cases as against 222 in the previous year and the number of contracts entered into for the various scheduled articles was 262 as against 291 in the preceding year. The value of stores and other materials purchased including articles received from other Departments on Return Stores Mema, during the year amounted to Rs. 184.75 lacs as against Rs. 141.08 lacs in the previous year.

During the year about 10,711 Metric tons of cement worth about Rs. 20.96 lacs were purchased. Likewise 3,647 M. Tons of Iron materials worth about Rs. 33.02 lacs, 24,838 Meters of Galvd. Iron pipes worth about Rs. 1.32 lacs and 3,94,408 Meters of cloth worth about Rs. 5.14 lacs were purchased. Similarly the Department also purchased 3,742 quintal of wheat and rice for various Municipal Hospitals and Maternity Homes worth about Rs. 2.43 lacs. There were about 25 tenders for dietary articles amounting to Rs. 28.87 lacs approximately.

4,724 orders for the purchase of stores against 5,210 in the preceding year were placed with contractors and other dealers. Against these purchases and stock on hand, the consuming departments submitted 26,815 indents and Sales Mema. as against 25,630 in the preceding year. The total turnover of the department, viz., Receipts and Issues of stores during the year was Rs. 327.43 lacs as against Rs. 250.67 lacs in the preceding year. At the close of the year, the department had on hand stores of the value of Rs. 138.52 lacs against Rs. 96.46 lacs in the preceding year.

The total amount realised by the sale of unserviceable articles through private offers including mixed scrap amounted to Rs. 2.08 lacs as against Rs. 2.70 lacs in he preceding years.

LICENCE DEPARTMENT.

32. During the year the amount collected by way of licence fees, permit fees and transfer fees was Rs. 45.52 lacs.

From the permits issued for exhibiting sky signs, advertisements, etc., the total revenue realised was Rs. 7.51 lacs in the city. Rs. 1.83 lacs in Suburbs and Rs. 0.44 lac in Extended Suburbs the corresponding figures for the last year being Rs. 5.75 lacs in the City, Rs. 1.85 lacs in the Suburbs and Rs. 0.45 lac in the Extended Suburbs.

The Department instituted 2,534 cases in the City, 517 cases in the Suburbs and 1,334 cases in the Extended Suburbs for offences under Sections 328, 328A, 394 and 412A of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. The total amount of fines inflicted was Rs. 1,52,911 in the City, Rs. 1,03,593 in the Suburbs and Rs. 46,632 in the Extended Suburbs.

The number of squatters' and hawkers' licence, issued were 69,860 in the City, 11,842 in the Suburbs and 331 in the Extended Suburbs. The amount realised therefrom was Rs. 13,29,480 for the City, Rs. 3,38,922 for the Suburbs and Rs. 50,942 for the Extended Suburbs, respectively.

The Corporation had appointed a Committee regarding the question of suitably modifying the present policy of issue of hawkers' licences so as to provide more licences to the hawkers in the City (Vide C. R. No. 1816, dated 19th March 1964). Accordingly, new Reserve Areas are created and licences are being issued by the Ward Officers in consultation with the Ward Councillors.

The staff of the Encroachment Removal Section working under the supervision of Sr. Inspector (Lorries) was distributed under the respective Ward officers.

33. The total number of establishments under the various categories including Theatres, etc., on 31st March 1967 was 89,021 in the City, 19,311 in the Suburbs and 8,205 in the Extended Suburbs as against 84,334 in the City, 17,819 in the Suburbs and 7,500 in the Extended Suburbs in the last year.

During the year under report, 1,984, 313 and 89 complaints, respectively, pertaining to City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs were received in addition to complaints pending from the preceding year out of which 2,005, 306 and 89 were investigated leaving 39, 14 and 6 complaints pending at the close of the year.

At the beginning of the year 2,717, 1,851 and 383 prosecutions were pending while 2,534, 1,334 and 517 new prosecutions were instituted during the year. Of these prosecutions 1,131, 681 and 271 resulted in convictions, 79, 21 and 66 in acquitals and 1,791, 920 and 86 cases were withdrawn. The number of cases pending at the end of the year was 2,249, 1,563 and 477. The total amount of fines realised was Rs. 1,52,911, 1,03,593 and 46,632 as against Rs. 2,68,173, Rs. 48,085 and Rs. 11,840 in the previous year.

The total expenditure incurred in the administration of this Act, the Payment of Wages Act, the Minimum Wages Act, and the Workmen's Compensation Act, during the year was Rs. 4,67,636, Rs. 1,13,381 and Rs. 50,996 for the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs (exclusive of Provident Fund, Leave Contributions and Supervision Charges) against which a grant-in-aid of Rs. 3,33,913 was received from Goveenment for the year 1966-67 for meeting part of the expenditure incurred during the year 1965-66.

The total income by way of Registration fees, etc., for the year amounted to Rs. 2,34,289, Rs. 48,220 and Rs. 22,506 for the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs.

132 complaints pertaining to the Payment of Wages Act, in the City, 54 for the Suburbs and 24 for Extended Suburbs were received. Only 1 complaint was pending disposal at the close of the year under report.

Markets and Slaughter Houses.

34. The total income of the Department for the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs during the year was Rs. 74.50 lacs as against Rs. 69.41 lacs in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 5.09 lacs.

During the year there were 49 Municipal and 24 private markets and 7 slaughter houses. The number of outside meat shops was 199 in the City and 35 in Extended Suburbs. The licence fees realised from private markets and outside meat shops were Rs. 93,423 and Rs. 93,423, respectively, in the City. The work of collecting Scale fees at the Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Market continued to be carried out departmentally and the revenue collected therefrom amounted to Rs. 9,76,751 as against Rs. 8,90,848 during the previous year.

The work of shifting the Slaughter House from Bandra to Deonar was in progress.

Surprise raids to detect and prevent the smuggling of animals and contraband meat and unauthorised slaughter as also insanitation and congestion in markets were carried out during the year.

The total number of animals slaughtered during the year in the City was 14,65,921 as against 13,39,869 during the previous year.

Standing Committee feels that construction of additional markets be undertaken expeditiously to cater to the needs of ever-increasing population so that apart from augmenting the revenue of the Corporation, the nuisance of squatters can be also minimised by allotting stalls to them in the markets. The Standing Committee is also of the opinion that the Report should indicate progress of new Projects in order to assess the performance. The Committee also feels that the markets should be made more attractive and on the lines of Departmental Stores.

Municipal Printing Press.

35. During the year under report 351 metric tons of paper was purchased. The total number of printing jobs carried out was 15,494 and the number of pages printed was 42,803 as against 12,157 and 49,189 in the preceding year. The total quantity of paper consumed during the year under report was 349 metric tons and as against 359\frac{3}{4} metric tons in the previous year.

The transactions of the Press for the year closed with a working surplus of Rs. 24,301 on the total turnover of Rs. 20.05 lacs against the surplus of Rs. 1,09,079 and the turnover of Rs. 16.72 lacs for the preceding year. The labour staff as on 28th February 1967 consisted of 279 workers as against 291 on the 28th February 1966.

The Standing Committee is of the opinion that proper amenities of ventilation, temperature control, better working conditions, a well furnished canteen, etc., should be provided to workmen. Planned programme of jobs should be formulated and enforced to achieve maximum utilization of men and machinepower. The Standing Committee also feels that the additional floor or extension should be carried out to the existing building as the space is found inadequate.

K. E. M. Hospital.

36. The scheduled bed strengths during the year was 1,113. Throughout the year there was constant overcrowding in the Hospital particularly in the Children Wards and the Medical and Surgical Wards for females. The total number of in-patients admitted during the year was 1,436 as against 5,221 in the previous year. The average number of days each patient was resident was 9.82 days as against 9.39 days in the last year. The average cost per in-patient per day was Rs. 14.39 as against Rs. 13.03 in the previous year.

The total number of new out-patients treated was 3,19,476 as against 3,14,699 in the preceding year. The out-patients attendance including casualty patients during the year came to 7,57,622.

Cardio Vascular and Thoracic Centre was opened during the last year under report having out patient Department and two wards with an accommodation of 80 beds, two air conditioned operation threatres and Physio and occupational Therapy Department for the benefit of the Public.

19,176 operations were performed on in-patients and 35,131 operations were performed on out-patients.

The Dr. Jivraj N. Mehta Pharmaceutical Laboratory attached to the Hospital manufactured many injectables viz., 96,669 transfusion bottles 500 ml. (14 different types), 10,303 A.C.D. bottles 80 ml, Bulk injections and sterile solutions (Eight types) 28 Litres, 73 litres stains and solutions for clinical use. The market value of the above product was 3,27,210.03. The Blood Bank works satisfactorily and during the year 9,358 Blood samples were supplied for transfusion and 9,647 samples of blood were collected including the voluntary doners at a cost of Rs. 60,244. The amount was paid from the Poor Box Charity Fund.

A Family Planning Centre, which is aided by the Government of India, continued to work satisfactorily during the year. 182 vasectomy operations were performed at the centre.

3,222 Food Handlers working in hotels and restaurants in the City were referred to the hospital for examination of which 1,477 persons attended. 328 persons did not give their stools, etc., for pathological examination and hence their reports were still pending.

The work of construction of 19 rooms in Nurses Home Compound for the nursing staff was completed.

The works of construction of an additional wing to the Gynecological Ward and of an additional Ward over the X-Ray Department were under progress.

The total expenditure incurred during the year for the maintenance of the Hospital was Rs. 75.79 lacs as against Rs. 75.16 lacs in the previous year.

Seth G. S. Medical College.

37. During the year under report 160 admissions were made. One student was admitted in the Second M.B., B.S., on transfer basis. There were 61 overseas students on the roll.

The number of male students residing in the Male Students' Hostel during the year was 148, while the number of lady students accommodated in the Lady Students' Hostel was 86. In order to meet the increasing demand for under graduate students as also internees, research students, etc. The Dormitory at Naigaum has been converted into Hostel to accommodate 95 students. During the year 229 students took advantage of these hostels.

The different departments of the College and the Hospital, in addition to their normal teaching and departmental works, conducted various researches under the auspices of the Indian Council of Medical Research, Council of Scientific and Industrial Research, K. E. M. Hospital and Seth G. S. Medical College Staff Research Society and other institutions, etc.

The progress of other activities like Library, Museum, Gymkhana, etc., was satisfactory.

E. N. T. Hospital.

38. The Hospital has a provision for 100 beds and all the 100 beds were commissioned for the use of in-patients during the year under report. The total number of patients admitted in the hospital during the year was 4,976. Excepting out of which 4,446 were cured, 257 were relieved, 169 were otherwise discharged, 31 left aganst medical advice and 11 died leaving 62 patients under treatment in the hospital at the close of the year. The highest number of patients admitted on a single day was 32 in the 26th September 1966.

The daily average attendance of Out-patients was 200. The highest number of Out-patients on a single day was 301 on the 2nd August 1966.

In all 6,336 operations were performed of which 1,682 were on out-patients and the remaining 4,654 on the in-patients during the year.

An amount of Rs. 4,42.548 was collected in the Poor Box Charity Fund. Seth Mangoomal A masingh, Managing Trustees of Atmasing Jenasing Charitable Trust, who has donated Rs. 2½ lakhs to the hospital was requested to donate the articles mentioned in the deed of agreement already executed in the last year.

39. The Hospital has an accommodation of 336 beds, fully occupied throughout the year. During the year, on an average 488.84 in-patients were admitted in the Hospital as against the scheduled bed strength. The total number of in-patients admitted during the year was 24,160 as gaainst 24,892 during the previous year. The total number of in-patients treated was 24,647. The average cost per day per in-patient was 15.93 as against Rs. 13.73 during the previous year.

The total number of out-patients treated was 3,39,189 as against 3,24, 489 during the previous year and the average number of outpatients' attendance per day was 1,194.79 as against 1,056.95 of the previous year.

Dr. Bhajekar Municipal Hospital at Khetwadi continued to be under the supervision of the Dean, B. Y. L. Nair Charitable Hospital.

The total expenditure incurred on the maintenance of the Hospital including liabilities amounted to Rs. 36.33 lacs against Rs. 32.51 lacs during the last year.

Construction of a new building with ground and eight upper storeys is under progress for the Hospital with a bed capacity of about 500. 10 Air Conditioned fully equipped Operation Theatres and accommodation for out-patient services is expected to be completed before the end of the year 1967, which would ease the present rush only to some extent. In the second phase of the expansion programme adequate facilities are proposed mainly for specialized services. The Standing Committee is of the view that the Ambulance and Hearses facility at the Hospital are inadequate and should be augmented.

Topiwala National Medical College.

40. The College had 644 under-graduate students on the roll at the close of the year, out of whom 333 were lady students. Besides, there were 160 post-graduate students including 48 lady students.

The total expenditure incurred on the maintenance of the College amounted to Rs. 12.94 lacs as against Rs. 13.46 lacs during the previous year. The total income by way of tuition fees, miscellaneous, etc., receipts amounted to Rs. 2.74 lacs as against Rs. 2.69 lacs during the last year.

. 1409 books were added to the Library during the year of which 631 were received by way of presents. The Library had at the end of the year 13,233 books as against 11,826 in the previous year.

Nair Hospital Dental College.

41. During the year under report, 43 students including 13 ladies passed the Final B.D.S. and M.D.S. Examinations of the Bombay University from the College. The College has 127 Dental Chairs, 100 Dental Units and 3 Dental X-Ray Machines and other equipments to give dental treatment on most modern lines and also to facilitate teaching of dentistry. During the year, 85,375 patients were treated as against 89,730 during the previous year. 7,120 municipal school children were treated in the clinics. The total expenditure incurred was Rs. 6.05 lacs as against Rs. 6.30 lacs in the preceding year and the total revenue was Rs. 1.84 lacs, against Rs. 1.89 lacs during the preceding year.

Lokmanya Tilak Municipal General Hospital, Sion, and Bai Annapurnabai Deshmukh Hospital for Women and The Lokmanya Tilak Municipal Medical College, Sion.

42. The bed accommodation of the Hospital was 475 (415 non-paying, 50 part-paying and 10 reserved for B.E.S. & T. employees). 36,866 patients were admitted during the year as against 35,958 during the preceding year. The daily average number of in-patients was 752.7 as against 676.8 in the preceding year. The average number of days each patient was resident was 7.4 as against 6.6 during the preceding year.

The average cost per in-patient on diet per day was Rs. 1.48 as against Rs, 1.54 in the preceding year. The total average cost per day per in-patient was Rs. 18.82 as against Rs. 17.98 in the preceding year.

The total number of new out-patients was 1,87,786 with a daily average of 607.72 as against 1,84,306 and 600.3 respectively in the preceding year. The total number of out-patients attendance was 6.85 lakhs. The highest number of out-patients attendance on a single day was 3,330 as against 3,205 in the preceding year.

The Paying Bed Scheme which started from 1st September 1951 worked satisfactorily. The number of patients admitted in the General and Special rooms during the year was 1,376 as against 1,372 during the preceding year.

The approximate total expenditure during the year under report was Rs. 48.66 lakhs as against Rs. 46.09 lakhs in the preceding year.

Municipal Medical College attached to this Hospital which was started in November 1964 entered into in its third academic year. 'The name of the College has been changed to 'The Lokmanya Tilak Municipal Medical College'. The first batch of 60 students and second batch of 52 students entered the Second M.B.B.S. Class.

6 Additional departments, viz., Paediatric follow up Clinic and IV Gynaec Unit were started at the Hospital during the year.

Group of T. B. Hospitals, Sewri.

43. The total number of beds for T. B. patients at the Corporation's disposal was 1,288 viz., Group of T. B. Hospitals, Sewri 800; Isolation Centre attached to the Ramkunwar Daftary T. B. Clinic, Dadar, 88, and Sarvodaya Hospital, Ghatkopar, 400 (reserved for the Corporation). The total number of patients treated was 6,709 as against 5,934 during the previous year. Of these 5,477 were discharged as improved, 187 were non-Tuberculosis cases, 577 left prematurely against advice, 468 died and 719 remained under treatment at the close of the year. Mortality figures revealed high incidence in the age group of 26-30 years. The rate of death per cent. to the total number of patients treated was 6.9. Major lung operations were performed in 387 cases.

As many as 2,275 patients attended the follow-up examination for check up after discharge from the hospitals during the year.

The total expenditure incurred during the year on the Group of T. B. Hospitals, Sewri was Rs. 33.36 lacs against Rs. 26.17 lacs in the previous year. The average expenditure per patient per day was Rs. 12.33 as against Rs. 9.79 in the previous year.

The expenditure incurred during the year by the Corporation for treatment, etc., at the Sarvodaya Hospital, Ghatkopar, was Rs. 9,26,227 lacs as against Rs. 6,27,147 lacs for the previous year. The expenditure incurred by the Corporation on the 4 T. B. Clinics attached to G. T. B. Hospitals was 6,48,430 lacs. The total expenditure thus incurred by Corporation on Tuberculosis Services amounted to Rs. 49,11,046.

The Administration Report for the year 1966-67 reveals that the heaviest mortality during the year was in the age groups of 26-30 years. The Standing Committee reiterate that in the interest of the City's health, it is necessary that steps should be taken for detection of such cases in primary stage and for thorough treatment so that high incidence of mortality due to this disease may be reduced and infection at young age may be arrested.

Legal Department.

44. During the year under report, the Department continued to attend to contested matters and other legal proceedings in the High Court, City Civil Court, Small Causes Court and Police Courts as also to other legal matters. During the year, the Department received 25,237 files, addressed 3398 letters to outside parties or their legal advisers and the opinions on different departmental matters and the advices on 247 cases were given.

The income by way of costs recovered amounted to about Rs. 31,742 and expenditure to about Rs. 6,22,941.

Municipal Courts for conducting enquiries under Section 105(B) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act were placed in charge of the Legal Department during the year under report. 8534 cases were registered in 1966 and 2,036 cases were disposed of.

The Standing Committee considers it essential to speedily deal with pending inquiry cases and also to adopt measures to expedite disposal of Court Cases including vacating of numerous injunctions against the Corporation.

Education

45. At close of the year, there were 4,74,468 pupils in 872 Schools and 118 classes in Greater Bombay, the number in the City being 2,71,939 pupils in 497 Schools and 48 classes; in the Suburbs 1,55,077 pupils in 279 schools and 49 classes and in Extended Suburbs 47,452 pupils in 96 Schools and 21 classes. During the year, there was a net increase of 24,354 pupils in Municipal Schools. The total number of teachers in Greater Bombay at the end of the year was 13,491 including special teachers.

With a view to avoiding over-crowding in classes and to facilitate proper attention to pupils, it was laid down that oridinarily a class should not have more than 50 pupils. In schools housed in hired residential buildings, over-crowding on account of inadequate space was an impediment in the way of efficient instruction. Out of 990 schools and classes, about 693 schools and classes were required to be run in two sessions and more than two sessions for want of sufficient accommodation.

The number of Municipal owned buildings at the beginning of the year in the Greater Bombay was 170. 16 schools were built during the year under report. The total number of municipal owned school buildings in the Greater Bombay at the end of the year was 186.

470 schools (including classes) were housed in Municipal owned school buildings, 500 schools including classes were housed in rented buildings and 20 schools were housed in rent free buildings. Due to yearly increase in the number of pupils, it has become practically impossible to accommodate them in the existing accommodation. A steady and planned progress towards acquisition of private plots and structures, etc., wherever possible and construction of school buildings is therefore being made. The Standing Committee is, however, of the opinion that under the Development Plan, sites have been reserved for schools and as such speedy efforts should be made to construct buildings on vacant plots which are in possession.

The Rahimtoola Currimbhoy Urdu Training Institute for Women continued to function. There were 4 divisions of Second Year Class comprising 3 divisions of S. S. C. passed candidates and one division of P. S. C. Passed candidates with 193 trainees at the end of the year.

The Municipal Urdu Teacher's Training Class, started in July 1958, continued to function during the year under report. Out of the 50 trainees in the Class (one year's course) only 46 appeared for the P. T. C. Examination and 36 were declared successful, the result being 78 per cent.

The Corporation continued to impart vocational education through 33 Vocational Classes in 22 Vocational Schools.

The Educational Guidance Centre opened during the last year to help students to receive edudational, vocational and developmental guidance continued to function. The Centre undertook the extra-curricular activities such as Guidance Conference, Career Information Centre at each ward.

The total number of Aided Schools in Greater Bombay during the year was 223 ont of which 133 were in the City, 53 in the Suburbs and 37 in the Extended Suburbs as against 254 in the previous year. The total number of teachers in Aided Schools was 1,885 (1,653 ordinary and 232 special) imparting education to 55,787 pupils. The number of pupils in Aided Schools in the City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs decreased during the year under review from 65,411 to 55,787. The total number of Recognised Schools not receiving Grantin-Aid was 331 (200 in the City, 96 in the Suburbs and 35 in Extended Suburbs) with 2,897 ordinary and 567 special teachers imparting education to 1,03,629 (58,697 in the City, 34,703 in the Suburbs and 10, 229 in Extended Suburbs) pupils.

The revised Grant-in Aid came into force from 1st April 1964. The amounts of grants payable to private Primary Schools for the year under report were Rs. 7,07,439.

The average cost per pupil in the Municipal Schools calculated on the basis of the average number of pupils on rolls as on 31st March 1967 for City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs was Rs. 127.03.

The total expenditure for the year amounted to Rs. 6,02,76,412 which was met from Municipal contribution (Rs. 4,60,56,780),—Government Grant (Rs. 62,99,960), Education Cess (Rs. 1,03,36,802) and miscellaneous receipts (Rs. 9,38,053.)

Secondary Schools.

The Corporation started five more secondary schools in addition to 17 Secondary Schools in 16 different wards in the City, with 95 divisions of Std. VIII which were conducted in the City during the last yearnd er report. During the year there were 158 Divisions of Std. VIII and 74 Divisions of Std. IX. The total number of pupils attending these schools was 10,161.

The Standing Committee has requested the Municipal Commissioner to consider the desirability of converting Municipal Secondary Schools into Technical ones. Efforts should continue to raise the standard of education in Municipal Schools.

In all 1,10,084 pupils were medically examined out of whom 92,023 were found to be suffering from one defect or the other. Amongst the common defects noticed, general debility, dental lymphatic glands, throat were most predominant.

The Standing Committee reiterate that the question of constructing new School Buildings should be given top priority so as to ensure qualitative upgrading of primary education in Municipal Schools.

Research Unit.

46. The Research Unit carried out special experiments in selected schools on several educational problems such as, how to make classes interesting, to increase attendance, to minimise the failure, etc. Reading habits of children were studied and a language Development Project in Standards I to IV in model schools was undertaken.

Labour Department.

47. During the year, 18 Recognised Trade Unions represented Municipal employees, with a view to promote cordial relations between the staff and the Administration, the total number of Joint Councils representing labour staff which continued to function was 22, their scope being wide enough to permit discussions on various matters relating to grievances and conditions of service of the staff. Peshi Committees for enquiring into the mis-conduct of employees were also formed. A four-stage grievance procedure has also been introduced in all Departments for redressal of the employees' grievances. The recognition of the Bombay Municipal Kamgar Sangh was withdrawn for want of Union's representative character in those departments.

The Department dealt with 13,468 complaints (including Suburbs) as against 17,639 in the previous year, regarding service conditions, recruitments, promotions, transfers, etc. Of these complaints 12,982 were redressed, 394 were found not genuine cases and 92 cases were pending at the close of the year.

The Corporation also gave approval to start a Welfare Centre for Sion Hospital Nursing Staff.

The recreation, educational hygienic, cultural and social activities, indoor as well as outdoor, organised by the Welfare Branch of the Department, for the benefit of Municipal workers and their dependents, were continued. The average daily attendance of adults and

children at the different Welfare Centre was 1,750 and 1,680, respectively, as against 2,139 and 1,814 during the preceding year.

Under the scheme for granting scholarships to the children of Municipal employees, 447 applications were received out of which 209 eligible applicants for secondary education and 158 for higher education were awarded scholarships at a total cost of about Rs. 20,000. 448 applications were received for medical assistance and help aggregating to Rs. 20,000 was given in 433 deserving cases. The total strength in Scout and Guide Sections was 3,754 as against 3,233 during the preceding year.

64 disputes were referred to the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Conciliation Officer, 1st Labour Court, etc.

Two Nursery Classes started two years ago were functioning satisfactorily during the year and they were also found to be popular among the labour staff of Bapty Road Chawls.

In addition to Lovegrove, Dadar and Dharavi Co-operative Societies, two more Societies, one each at Versova and Colaba plants for grow more food project have been formed under the guidance of Labour Officer. Profits were distributed to share holders by the Commissioner at Dadar Purification Works.

Publicity Department.

48. This Department effected general publicity about the various activities and services rendered by different Departments. The Department also worked as a "clearing house" in respect of criticisms and suggestions appearing in local newspapers. If also carried out herlth education work and dissemination of information to the public through various media.

Besides participation in various important celebrations, such as, World Health Day, National Cleanliness Day, World Leprosy Day, etc., and undertaking printing of a Civic Guide-cum-Diary, 1966, a new series of informative publications were issued which comprised of pamphlets, with a view to convey correct information to citizens about Civic affairs.

M. G. M. O. Swimming Pool.

49. During the year under report the working and progress of the Mahatma Gandhi Memorial Olympic Swimming Pool at Shivaji Park was satisfactory.

The Pool was kept closed for 16 days from 15-7-1966 to 30-7-1966 due to water shortage and was re-opened on 31-7-1966 for Swimming

Facilities to polio-crippled children were given to 25 children free of charge.

The Pool premises were given for use, free of charge, to the Maharashtra State Aquatic Association and the University of Bombay, for holding their competitions. The total reservation hours of the Pool by private parties were 411 which brought a revenue of Rs. 9,175. As many as 35,468 casual swimmers including labourers and factory workers availed themselves of the facilities of swimming. Reservation of the Pool at a concessional rate of Rs. 100 per month for two hours a week was also allowed as usual to 6 Educational Institutions. Sixteen membrs of the Pool were included in the Maharashtra State Aquatic Association's team for participating in the 23rd National Swimming Championship held at Patiala in October 1966. Seventeen Members of the Pool participated in 1966 in the Swimming Competitions held at Delhi by the National Swimming Club of India, Delhi.

7,714 new Members joined the Pool during the year under report. 4,096 beginners were trained during the year. An amount of Rs. 2,48,476 was collected by way of fees as a sainst Rs. 1,76,000 during the previous year.

Administrative Officer (Enquiries) Department.

50. The Department functions in three Sect ons, vi_{2} ., (1) Enquiries, (2) Stock Verification and (3) Security Force.

During the year, the Enquiries Section dealt with 1,064 cases which included cases of alleged acceptance of illegal gratification, misconduct, mis behaviour, theft of Municipal property, breaches of provisions of Municipal Bye-laws, infringement of litence conditions, use of municipal vehicles by unauthorised persons, sub-letting of rooms, etc. In 219 cases punishments varying from dismissal, removal from service to censures and warnings were meted out. 189 cases were filed as the allegations were found to be either false, or too vague. In 265 cases, Departments concerned were asked to take necessary remedial actions. In 391 cases enquiries were in progress at the end of the year.

The distribution of relief from the Mayor's Fund to the families affected by fires, house collapses and other natural calamities was also carried out by the Department.

Important cases of pilferages were brought to light by Bombay Municipal Security Force from different installations.

Industrial Home Guards Unit of 250 Home Guards (of all Municipal employees) which was established during the preceding year was functioning well. The unit would be of vital importance for maintaining essential services of the Corporation during emergencies.

The Bombay Civic Journal.

51. As usual twelve monthly issues were published. A special number was taken out as an Independence Number in August 1966. Efforts to bring in revenue by advertisements and increase in circulation were made during the period under report.

The Standing Committee feel that efforts should continue to make the magazine more popular and informative which will result in enhancing its usefulness besides increasing its circulation and revenue.

Organisation and Methods Division.

52. The Organization and Methods Division works as an Advisory Unit of the Municipal Commissioner's Office. The work done by the this Department includes inter-alia codification of Municipal Commissioner's orders and circulars of standing nature, standardisation of forms, etc. During the year under review, an Appreciation Training Programme on Management and Productivity for Top Executives was started in order to expose Corporation's Top management to modern management and Productivity Techniques for the solution of day to day problems of the Corporation.

The Standing Committee desires that the Division should be called upon to undertake reorganization of the functioning and staff pattern in various Departments and in Ward Offices.

Public Health.

53. Population Census.—The mid-year estimated population of Greater Bombay was 47,84,000.

Births and birth rate.—The total number of live births recorded in Greater Bombay during the year was 1,47,986 which were 5,205 more than in 1965 and 9,017 above the average of the quinquenium 1961 to 1965. The birth rate was 30.9.

Deaths and death rate.—The total number of deaths registered from all causes during the year was 50,492 as against 54,223 in 1965 being 5,952 more than the mean mortality of the preceding 5 years and the death rate was 10.6 against 11.7 in the year 1965. Of 50,492 deaths 29,105 deaths were among males and 21,387 among females. The excess of deaths amongst males may be ascribed to the slight preponderance of males. The death rate among females was, however, actually higher than among males, the male death rate being 11.7 and the female death rate 12.9 against 12.3 and 14.2, respectively, in 1965. Diseases of the respiratory system claimed the highest number of deaths in the past with death rate of 1.65 per 1,000. The causes coming next on the list for the year were congenital malformation and diseases of early infancy (1.11) tuberculosis 0.98, diarrhoea, enteritis fever and dysentry 0.80.

Deaths among infants under one year of age numbered 12,660 which were 1,079 less than in the preceding year and 1,235 more than the annual average of the previous quinquenium (1961-65). The infant mortality rate for the year was 85.5 per 1,000 live births as against 96.2 in 1965.

Maternity and Child Welfare.—During the year under report, services were rendered through 15 Municipal Maternity Homes and 27 Maternity and Child Welfare Centres. The number of deliveries conducted in these Homes was 42,308 during the year. The average stay of mothers at the Maternity Homes was 5 days.

Advice and instruction in spacing births was given by trained doctors to married men and women at the Family Welfare Planning Centres. Health Visitors paid domiciliary visits for follow-up work and propoganda. I. V. C. D. (Loops) were inserted to 7,333-married women.

Communicable Diseases.—The total number of cases of infectious diseases reported during the year was 12,527 as against 10,231 in the preceding year. Infections Hepatitis caused 5880 attacks and 308 deaths. Small-pox caused 360 attacks and 141 deaths. Influenza

caused 5 deaths. Enteric Fever caused 519 attacks. Diphtheria caused 2,087 attacks and 124 deaths. Cerebro-spinal meningitis caused two attachs and one death. Tuberculosis took a toll of 4,726 lives and the death rate of Tuberculosis was 0.9 per 1,000 of mid-year estimated population. Whooping Cough caused 80 attacks and two deaths.

441 cases of Acute Anterior Poliomyetitis and 82 deaths thereby were reported during the year.

Municipal Group of Tuberculosis Hospital at Sewri has an accommodation for 800 in-patients; besides 400 beds are reserved at the Sarvodaya Hospital, Ghatkopar. The advance cases of T. B. were isolated at the Daftary Municipal Isolation Wards at Dadar.

During the year 10,61,781 persons were inoculated against Cholera and 9,96,202 persons were inoculated with T. A. B. Vaccine.

The Standing Committee view with concern the existence of di'ferent kinds of diseases especially of Filariasis and stress that the precautionary measures, such as inoculations, vaccinations, isolation, etc., if continued with full vigour in the Greater Bombay, will, in the near future, minimise the toll of life of citizens, if not eradicate it. So far as Tuberculosis is concerned there is not much improvement although B. C. G. vaccination campaign is pursued vigorously. The Standing Committee, therefore, feel that medical authorities should investigate this problem with a view to find other remedial measures to meet the growing menace of this dreaded disease to the citizens of this City.

Dispensaries.

54. The number of new cases treated at the 59 dispensaries and 11 mobile dispensaries was 17,07,527 as against 17,36,088 in the year 1965. In addition to the above dispensary work, women and children's clinics were conducted by three part-time lady doctors at six Municipal dispensaries for two hours, thrice a week. The number of new cases treated at these dispensaries was 2,264 (2,001 women and 263 children) as against 2,640 in 1965. The total attendance was 19,074. These figures include the visits of lady doctors to patients at their homes. At 27 Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics, 99,498 new cases (78,127 women and 21,371 children) were treated. The total attendance was 3,58,870.

The Standing Committee emphasizes the urgent need to upgrade all municipal dispensaries so as to provide, X-Ray Pathology and the facilities was to render both service to patients attending them and to reduce congestion at the General Hospitals.

The Municipal Eye Dispensary and Hospital at Kamathipura was attended by two Honorary Ophthalmic Surgeons by turns throughout the year. The Hospital has an accommodation for 20 beds each for males and females with an operation theatre and a full-time resident Nurse. The total attendance of patients was 92,826 as against 82,341 in 1965. The total number of new cases treated was 26,254 as against 26,352 in 1965. The number of indoor patients among the new cases treated and the total attendance of indoor patients were 1,079 and 11,296, respectively.

Leprosy.—The control of Leprosy in the City was exercised as before through the Acworth Leprosy Hospital, Wadala, with an accommodation of 500 beds. In addition to this the Institution conducts a well enquipped out-patients' clinic, the entire cost of which is borne by the Corporation. The Corporation also bears the cost on account of 48 beds for the voluntary patients and 150-170 beds for the Bombay resident patients. Besides, the payment of cost of Domiciliary Services and Rs. 10,000 for rendering Sulphone treatment, the Corporation pays one third of the recurring expenditure of Greater Bombay Leprosy Control Scheme activities as also the entire cost of Capital Works.

The average daily attendance of patients was 193.00 and the total number of new cases treated at the Acworth Leprosy Clinic was 3,639 and the average daily attendance of patients was 260.67 and the total number of new cases treated at the Greater Bombay Leprosy Control Scheme was 1,568.

Venereal Deseases.

55. For combating Venereal Diseases free medical facilities both preventive and curative were continued as in the preceding year. During the year 21,28, (19,008 males and 2,278 females) cases were treated for Venereal and 2,306 (1,281 males and 1,025 females) in non-Venereal cases were also treated.

School Health Work.

56. During the year, out of about 5,14,455 municipal school children in the City, 92,023 children were found to be defective. 2,780 cases with minor ailments among the children were treated in the municipal dispensaries. 44,824 Children with major ailments were treated at the School Clinics at the K. E. M. Hospital, Nair Hospital and the L. T. M. G. Hospital, Sion.

29,107 children from Municipal Schools were B. C. G. vaccinated and 83,428 children were given T. A. B. inoculation and 23,165 children were given vaccination against small-pox. The Mobile Health Unit examined 33,926 children in 144 Municipal Schools.

Kasturba Hospital for Infectious Diseases, Arthur Road.

57. Except Tuberculosis and Lepprosy, patients suffering from other infectious diseases are admitted to the Hospital. The total number of patients admitted during the year was 29,461 as against 26,317 in the preceding year. They included 360 cases of Small-pox, 414 of Enteric fever.

There were as many as 2,081 cases of Diphtheria out of which 114 proved fatal showing he fatality rate of 5.8 per cent. The cases were admitted predominantly from parel, Lalbaug, tByculla and Girgaum localities.

360 cases of Small-pox were admitted in the hospital out of which 141 died, giving a fatality rate of 39.2 per cent.

The total expenditure of the Hospital during the year was Rs. 33,25,538 as against Rs. 29,47,461 in the preceding year.

The Standing Committee regrets to note that the question of setting up an Infectious Diseases Hospital in Suburbs is kept pending since over 6 years.

Health Propaganda.

58. The Health Propaganda and Education was carried out through the Public Relations Department.

The Water Sampling Programme was continued as usual and samples were collected from all the wards.

Audit.

59. This year also the Municipal Chief Auditor's Report has not been included in the Municipal Commissioner's Administration Report, as required by Section 137(4) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act.

The Standing Committee are of the considered opinion that every effort must be made by the respective Heads of the Departments to comply with the statutory provisions. The Municipal Chief Auditor's Report would have been of much help to the Standing Committee in their scrutiny of the various facts and figures incorporated in the Report of the Municipal Commissioner. The Report, however, will be forwarded to the Corporation separately when received.

Acknowledgement.

'60. In conclusion, the Standing Committee desire to record their appreciation of the very valuable services rendered by Shri J. H. Patwardhan who held the office of the Municipal Commissioner throughout the year and whose administrative abilities and financial acumen were of great help to the Committee.

The total number of properties on the Assessment Book during the year was 77,469 of which 73,790 properties were assessed to General Tax and 1,864 private properties and 1,815 Municipal properties were exempted from General Tax.

The rateable value of all properties on the 31st March 1967 was 38,85,93,154 against Rs. 37,02,74,639 and Rs. 35,89,80,736 in the previous two years. This gives a rate of Rs. 140,19 per head of population against 133,58 in the preceding year.

The total number of vehicles and animals taxed during the year (including those taxed under the Public Conveyance Act of 1920) was 93,533.

The total number of bills for property taxes and wheel tax issued during the year was 1,39,855 and 2,74,508 respectively. The number of bills for water charges by meter measurement issued was 37,756. The amounts collected against the total demands of Rs. 2,020.03 lacs and Rs. 202.91 lacs for property taxes and wheel tax, respectively, were Rs.1,540.15 lacs and Rs. 74.93 lacs which work out to 76.25 and 36.96 per cent of the respective demands. The total amount outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 607.86 lacs, the details of which are shown in the body of the report under the head "Break up of outstandings".

The total amount of exemption from General Tax allowed in respect of different properties during the year was Rs. 88.80 lacs against Rs. 81.19 lacs during the preceding year. The increase was due to enhancement of rateable value.

The total number of complaints against the rateable values disposed of during the year was 3902. There were 129 appeals against the rateable values.

The rateable value of all the properties was Rs. 15,10,10,810 as against Rs. 13,36,48,380 for the previous year. The rateable value thus worked out to Rs. 145.70 per head of population as against Rs. 128.99 in the preceding year.

The total number of bills for property taxes issued during the year was 1,44,283. The bills issued for water charges were 71,830. The net total demand was Rs. 10,82,85,179,03 and the total collection including arrears was Rs. 5,63,62,219.40. In all 2036 claims for refund of taxes on account of vacancy and overcolleconwere admitted during the year and an amount of Rs. 2,53,334.11 was allowed on that account.

There were 4067 complaints against the rateable value of the properties during the year of which 2701 were received under Section 167 and the remaining 1366 under Section 162 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. There were 111 appeals against rateable value under Section 217 of the Act out of which 12 were settled and the remaining 99 were pending decision on 31st March 1967.

The total number of properties was 31,459 as against 30,015 in the previous year.

The rateable value of all the properties was Rs. 4,84,61,395 against Rs. 4,22,35,308 for the previous year. The rateable value thus worked out to Rs. 140.96 per head of population as against 122.88 in the preceding year.

The total number of bills for property taxes issued during the year was 65,528. The bills issued for water charges were 23,186. The net total demand was Rs 2,83,79,015.52 and the total collection including arrears was Rs. 1,33,35,408 26. In all 706 claims for refund of taxes on account of vacancies and over collection were admitted during the year and an amount of Rs 72,067.06 was allowed on that account.

There were 1919 complaints against the rateable values of the properties during the year of which 1396 were received under Section 167 and the remaining 523 under Section 162 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. There were 220 appeals against rateable values under Section 217 of the Actout of which 3 were withdrawn, 21 were settled and the remaining 196 pending decision on 31st March, 1967.

ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION DEPARTMENT

Rates of Taxation.—The rates of taxation on lands and buildings continued to be the same. Thus the rates of taxation stood as follows: General Tax (including \$\frac{2}{2}\$ per cent. The tax on vehicles and animals was levied at the maximum rates prescribed in Schedule G of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. The rates charged for the supply of water by meter measurement ranged between Rs. 1.70 and Rs. 5.50 per 10,000 litres according to the class of properties.

Properties'—The total number of properties on the 31st March 1967 was 77,469 of which 73,790 properties were assessed to General tax and 1,864 were exempted from it under Section 143(1)(a) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. Vacant lands owned by Government are not assessed till they are beneficially occupied while Railway lands are assessed in lump. The number of Municipal properties exempted from General Tax under the provisions of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, during the year was 1,815.

The number of properties accounted for as newly erected, demolished and enlarged during the year was 2,013,346 and 1,094 respectively, the corresponding figures of the preceding year being 3,180,605 and 1,064.

Rateable Value—The rateable value of all properties in the City on the 31st March 1967 was Rs. 38,85,93,154 as against Rs. 37,02,74,639 on the 31st March 1966. It worked out to Rs. 140,19 per head of population of 27,71,933 as per the census of 1961 of the City proper against Rs. 133,58 in the preceding year.

Unier Section 185 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, Wheel Tax in respect of Hack-victorias, Labour carts (without pneumatic tyre) and hand-carts (without pneumatic tyres) ordinarily leviable at Rs. 112, Rs. 40 and Rs. 8 per annum respectively, was compounded for the year 1966-67 at Rs. 100, Rs. 35 and Rs. 6 respectively.

The tax collected on hand-carts and bullock carts for the year 1966-67 amounted to Rs. 1,20,377,00 as against Rs. 1,14,933.00 in the preceding year.

Bills.—The total number of bills in respect of property taxes and wheel tax issued during the year was 1,39,855 and 2,74,508 respectively, of which 3,886 and 21,662 respectively were for previous years and 1,35,969, and 2,52,846 respectively for the year 1966-67. The total number of bills for water charges by meter measurement issued during the year was 37,756 of which 2,744 were for previous years and 35,012 for the year 1966-67.

It will be seen from the above that out of the total outstandings of Rs. 607.86 lacs, a sum of Rs. 430.25 lacs was beyond the control of the Department for effecting recovery before 31st March 1967.

(Note: From April to July 1967, the amount recovered out of the outstandings noted above is about Rs. 1,00,00,000).

Miscellaneous Receipts: Miscellaneous receipts realised from notices of demand, distress warrants, battakifees, inspection fees and other items amounted to Rs. 1,87,376.89 against Rs. 1,65,448.53 in the preceding year.

Meter Hire: Receipts from meter hire amounted to Rs. 4,64,214.75 against Rs. 4,29,620.25 in the previous year.

Exemptions.—The amount of full exemption allowed in respect of General Tax on properties entitled to such exemption under Section 143(a)(1b) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and under Article 285 of the constitution of India and the amount of partial exemption under Section 144(3) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and Section 36 of the Bombay Port Trust Act 1879, aggregated Rs. 81,19,189.36 on the 1st April 1966, against Rs. 71,66,956.21 during the preceding year. The increase was due to enhancement of rateable values.

Complaints and Appeals against rateable values.—2,071 complaints under Section 167 of the Act against the rateable value amounting to Rs. 3,40,76,214 and 1,831 complaints under Section 162 against the value amounting to Rs. 2,81,54,518 were disposed of during the currency of the year. The assessments were on investigation of complaints reduced to Rs. 3,02,27,252 and Rs. 2,78,31,438 respectively and the reduction amounting to Rs. 38,48,962 and Rs. 3,23,080 gives a percentage of 11.30 and 1.15 respectively.

There were 129 appeals against the rateable values of which 15 were settled out of Court, 10 were dismissed by the Court, 5 were decided by the Court, 41 were withdrawn by the party and 58 were pending at the close of the year.

Attachments: In 97 cases, action under Section 203 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act was resorted to with a view to effecting early recovery and an amount of Rs. 4,90,003.01 was recovered during the year.

The Urhan Immoveable Property Tax.—The arrears of the tax as on 1st April 1966 were Rs. 15,98,658.97 which were increased to Rs. 30,55,703.01 on account of supplementay demand for the period prior to 31st March 1963 issued during the year under report. Out of this amount, a sum of Rs. 17,28,711.56 was collected leaving a balance of Rs. 13,26,991.45 at the close of the year.

State Education Cess.—The rate of taxation continued to be the same as in the preceeding year, i.e 2 per cent. of the rateable value of buildings and lands in Greater Bombay. The buildings and lands having rateable value of Rs. 74 and below were, however, exempted from the levy of this cess. The arrears of the Cess as on 1st April 1966 were Rs. 28,90,547.64 which were increased to Rs. 28,96,851.56 on account of increase in rateable values. Out of this amount a sum of Rs. 17,84,150.74 was collected during the year and the balance was Rs. 11,12,700.82 at the close of the year. The demand in respect of the Cess for the year 1966-67 was Rs. 67,41,262.84, collection Rs. 52,21,325.74 while Rs. 15,19,937.10 remained outstanding at the close of the year. The total collection of State Education Cess thus amounted to Rs. 70,05,476.48.

There were in all 40 Class I and 20 Class II Cinema Theatres and the tax was generally received regularly. Theatre tax was also recovered in respect of the various dramatic performances, dances, variety entertainments, etc., held at various Halls Theatres and other places in the City, whereever admission was on payment of charges.

Exemption from payment of Theatre Tax was granted to such cinema shows, performances, etc., as were held in aid of bonafide charities or directed towards advancement of cultural or education activities and were exempted from payment of Entertainments Duty leviable under the Bombay Entertainments Duty Act, 1923. by the Commissioner of Police.

The total income derived by way of Theatre Tax during the year under report was Rs. 7,51,565.31 as against Rs. 7,30,185.65 in the preceding year.

General Remarks

The assessment of Railway properties (Central & Western) for the Quinquennia 1954-59 and 1959-64 has not been finalised. The question of appointment of an arbitrator is under the consideration of Central Government.

The assessment of the B.P.T. properties for the quinquennium 1959-64 has been finalised. The work regarding finalization of the assessment for the quinquennium 1964-69 is in progress.

Shri Pestonji P. Kapadia, F. R.I.B.A. (London) B.A.B.E. (Civil) M. I. Struct. E. (London) M.I.E. (India) J.P. has been appointed to fix the rateable value of the buildings and lands in Greater Bombay vesting in the State Government and the Central Government for the quinquennium 1964-69. The work is in progress.

With regard to the Central Government properties eligible to exemption from the levy of General Tax, under article 285 of the Constitution of India, the Central Government have agreed to pay with effect from the 1st April 1954, charges for the specific services rendered by the local authorities and as directed by the Central Government, the State Government have been requested to fix the percentage of such charges payable in lieu of the General tax. The matter is still nder correspondence.

Tax amounting to Rs. 6,306.84 representing a charge on 1,994 race horses brought to City during racing season was recovered through the Western India Turf Club as against Rs. 5,315.97 during the preceding year.

Exemption.—The omount of exemption allowed in respect of General Tax on properties entitled to such exemption under Section 143(1a) and (1b) was Rs. 36,58,022.49 and Rs. 5,50,338.80 in respect of Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively.

Meter Hire.—Receipts from meter hire amounted to Rs. 3,80,291,84 and Rs. 68,334.90 in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively as against Rs. 2,54,823.93 and Rs. 43,659.31 in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively.

Complaints and Appeals against rateable values.—4,067 and 1,919 complaints for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively were registered during the year under report out of which 2,701 and 1,396 complaints for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively were registered under Section 167 of the Act and 1,366 and 523 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs were registered under Section 162 of the Act. There were 111 and 220 appeals against rateable values for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively, out of which 12 and 21 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs were settled and 3 in respect of Extended Suburbs were withdrawn and remaining 99 and 196 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs were pending decision on 31st March 1967.

Miscellaneous Receipts.—Miscellaneous recipts realized from notices of demand, distress warrants Bataki fees Inspection fees and other items amounted to Rs. 3,03,799.68 and Rs. 1,26,561.11 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively.

Education Cess.—The net demand for Education Cess was Rs. 56,33,521.72 and Rs 18,84,704.52 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively and the amount collected was Rs. 27,78,153.52 and Rs. 8,76,347.29 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively.

State Education Cess.—The net demand for State Education Cess was Rs. 44,13,095.11 and Rs. 18,84,704.52 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively and the amount collected was Rs. 22,21,110.69 and Rs. 8,76,347.29 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively.

The Urban Immoveable Property Tax.—The net demand on account of arrears in respect of Urban Immoveable Property tax was Rs. 8,97,835.41 and Rs. 6,84,043.53 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively and the amount collected was Rs. 1,87,148.77 and Rs. 1,09,174.98 for Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively.

There were in all 26 and 8 Cinema Theatres in Suburbs and Extended Suburbs, respectively out of which 16 and 3 were Class I Cinema Theatres in Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively and the remaining 10 and 5 in Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively were Class II. The tax was generally received regularly. Theatre tax was also re-covered in respect of the various dramatic performances, dances, variety entertainments, etc., held at various halls, theatres and other places in the Suburbs and Extended (Suburbs), wherever admission was on payment of charges. The exemption from payment of Theatre Tax was granted to such Cinema shows, performances etc., which were held in aid of bonafide charities or directed towards advancement of cultural or educational activities and exempted from payment of Entertainment Duty leviable under Bombay Entertainment Duty Act, 1923, by the Commissioner of Police. The total income derived by a way of Theatre Tax during the year under report was Rs. 2,08,540.70 and Rs. 81,397.20 in Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively.

OCTROI DEPARTMENT

Rates of Octroi: The same rates of octroi as specified in the Octroi Schedule 'H' to the B. M. C. Aet as amended, continued for the year under report. However entry 22 of the Octroi Schedule was amended under the provisions of Maharashtra Act XXVII of 1966 to effect a change in the sub. clauses of the entry and without revising the rate of octroi. The Corporation also revised the rates of octroi on "Calves" under item No. 12 of the Octroi Schedule to 50 paise per head under their resolution No. 1603 of 30-1-1967. The effect to the above amendments was however to be given from 1-4-1967. In view of the amendment in the rate of Crude Oil, the oil companies who had dispured the payment of octroi on crude oil last year paid the arrears of octori at the revised rate during the year under report.

WATER SUPPLY PROJECTS DEPARTMENT

This Department continued to be under the overall supervision of the Hydraulic Engineer Shri D. R. Bhise, B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E. (India), Shri L. G. Dhayagude, B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E. (India) continued to be the Executive Engineer in charge of the Master Plan works till 17-7-1966. He also looked after the duties of Deputy Project Engineer till 17-7-1966 and was appointed as Deputy Project Engineer from 18-7-1966. Shri S. S. Mankar, B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E. (India) continued as Executive Engineer (Dahisar) upto 10-8-1966 and was appointed as Executive Engineer Master Plan from 11-8-1966. Shri Y. H. Kamat, B.S., B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E. (India) continued as Executive Engineer Upper Vaiterna Scheme. Shri K. D. Mulekar, B.E. (Civil), M.E. (P.H.) continued to be in-charge of the Bhatsai River Project. Shri H. N. Chavan, B.E. (Civil) continued to be Executive Engineer for the Ulhas River Scheme. Shri B.D. Dani, B.E. (Electrical and Mechanical) was Executive Engineer for the Mulumd Pumping Scheme upto 22-5-1966. Shri T. M. Kandawalla, B.E. (Civil), A.M.I.E. (India) was appointed as Executive Engineer (Dahisar) River Project from 11-8-1966. Shri B. R. Gole, B.E. (Civil) (Hons.), A.M.I.E. (India) was in-charge of investigations of field Surveys for Gargai and Poshir River Projects from 1-11-1966 onwards.

The activities of this Department are grouped under the following heads:-

- VIII.—Gargai and Poshir River Projects.
 - IX.-Miscellaneous works such as Replacements and Enlargements of Trunk mains, etc.

PART I

VAITARNA-CUM-TANSA SCHEME

The Scheme works have been completed long since and only some land acquisition matters were in progress.

Land Acquisition.—Out of the total area of 3,995 Acres consisting of private, Inam and Government (Revenue and Forest) lands acquired for major works of the Scheme, awards of Compensation amounting to Rupees 11,63,654.64 in respect of private and Inam lands were declared by the Government Acquiring Officers. Forestlands have been disforested and placed in charge of the Revenue Department. Correspondence with the Revenue Department for the transfer of Government lands to the Bombay Municipal Corporation was in progress during the year.

Further awards of Compensation amounting to Rs. 1,96,880.79 (Rs. 1,94,832.79 plus 2,048) in respect of Private, Railway, Custom and Milk Scheme lands were declared by the Government Acquiring Officer and other respective authorities. Correspondence regarding the transfer of Government lands was in progress with the Revenue Department during the year.

PART II

MASTER PLAN FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF WATER SUPPLY TO GREATER BOMBAY

- (a) Worli Hill Reservoir.—The Reservoir was commissioned and handed over to H.E.'s Department for maintenance long back.
- (b) Rawli Hill Reservoir.—(1) The construction of reservoir could not be started for want of cement even though a contract for construction of two circular prestressed concrete tanks was awarded to Messrs., Tolani Brothers at a cost of Rs. 20.88 lacs. Later when cement was available Messrs. Tolani Brothers showed unwillingness to carry out the work as the cost of labour and material had gone up considerably. The contract was therefore terminated. Fresh tender will be reinvited in due course.
- (2) (i) The work of laying inlet and outlet mains upto Reservoir was completed in the year 1964-65. The work of connecting these mains to the trunk mains will be carried out side by side with the reservoir works.
- (ii) The work of laying 1200 mm. dia. main as an extension of one of the Rawli Outlet (from King's Circle to Khodadad Circle) was started on 25-1-1965 and was completed during this year at a cost of Rs. 3,53,094.00 approximately, as against the total cost of Rs. 3,91,928.25.
 - (3) The work of construction of approach road to Reservoir was completed in the year 1964-65.
- (4) The site for construction of staff Quarters was cleared by demolishing the old structure a year back. The work of construction could not be taken up due to the shortage of Cement The tenders for Quarters will be invited in due course.
- (c) Gollanji Hill Reservoir.—(1) The work of construction of reservoir was started on 4th November 1963. The work had to be slowed down for want of cement. The work was completed during the year. The Contractors Messrs. Ghanekar & Co., had claimed extra payment for rise in cost of labour and materials and 13 per cent. increase was granted vide S.C.R. No. 2121 of 31-10-1966. The cost of the work comleted works out to Rs. 6,01,945.03 approximately.

- (2) The work of laying inlet, outlet mains was completed in the year 1964-65.
- (3) The work of construction of staff quarters was completed in the year 1965-66, at the cost of Rs. 1,43,317.39. The electrical wiring work was carried out departmentally.
- (4) After inviting tenders order was placed for supply and erection of chlorination treatment plant, costing Rs. 36,540.00, on Messrs Indian Engineering Corporation vide S.C.R. No. 3221 of 19-1-1966. The plant was put into commission and handed over to H.E.'s Department for maintenance in September 1966
- (5) The approach road to the reservoir from Parel Tank Road was under construction through C.E.'s Department.
- (6) Electric Supply of 153 KWS was obtained at Golanaji Hill Reservoir from the B.E.S.T. Undertaking as sanctioned by the Government of Maharashtra
- (d) Pali Hill Reservoir.—(1) The work of reservoir proper was in progress through Messrs. Kusum-kant & Co., vide S.C.R. No. 1142, dated 5-8-1964. The cost of work done upto 31-3-1967 was Rs. 5,77,361.00 approximately, as against the total cost Rs. 6,79,276.50. The Progress of the work was slow during the year for want of cement. Contractors have claimed extra payment, on account of rise in cost of labour and material and the same was under consideration.
- (2) In view of inadequate working space, the work of construction of quarters was not taken up. It will be done after completion of the reservoir work.
- (3) Messrs. Candy Filters Ltd., were awarded a contract, for supply and erection of chlorination equipment, at the cost of Rs. 35,742.00 plus Sales Tax, General Tax and about 80 per cent. of the work was completed.
- (4) The Government of Maharashtra sanctioned a load of 120 K.Ws. The Electric Supply was obtained from Messrs B.S.E.S. Ltd., after constructing a sub-station structure at Municipal cost. The estimate for the supply was Rs. 13,241.00 and the estimated cost of construction of Sub-station was Rs. 10,900.00.
 - (5) The Control room wiring was being carried out departmentally at an estimated cost of Rs. 1,600,00.
- (e) Powai Hill Reservoir (High Level).—(1) The construction of the High Level Reservoir, started in March 1962, was at a stand-still from June 1965 to November 1966 for want of cement. The contractors had claimed increase for rise in cost of materials and labour. 15 per cent. increase was granted under S.C.R. No 1852 of 5-10-1966.

The cost of the work done so far was approximately Rs. 11,11,185.00 as against total cost of Rs. 22,11,274.00.

An electrical substation was erected in the year 1965-66 at the site of reservoir to meet power requirements. This and other power stations near Powai Office were maintained during the year.

- (f) Powai Low Level Reservoir.—(1) The tenders were invited with alternative designs and offer of Messrs. Tolani Brothers, consisting of shell walls, flat slab, etc., had been accepted under S.C.R.No. 3 dated 8-4-1964. The work of hill cutting for preparing formation for the reservoir, was completed but the work on reservoir proper could not be taken up for want of cement. The contractors expressed their mability to do the work due to rise in cost of labour and materials and hence the contract was terminated. Tenders will shortly be invited for the reservoir work.
 - (2) The work of laying inlet and outlet mains was completed in the year 1964-65.
- (g) Trombay Hill Reservoir.—(1) This reservoir was to be built on the priority basis, as the Fertilizer Factory, being built up at Trombay by the Government of India, had to be supplied water from this storage. The work of preparing formation was completed earlier and the construction of reservoir was started in November 1963. The work had to be slowed down for want of cement. The cement was obtained from Messrs. Fertilizer Corporation of India and one compartment was completed without roof and was put into commission in 1965-66. The cost of work done upto 31-3-1967 was approximately Rs. 19,17,613.00. The remaining works were in progress. The contractors for this reservoir were also granted 12 per cent. increase on account of rise in cost of material and labour, vide S.C.R. No. 2253 of 19-11-1966.
- (2) The construction of staff quarters was started on 1-5-1964. The work was completed during the year at the cost of Rs. 1,37,520.00 approximately. The progress was slow as sufficient cement was not available. The Electrical wiring work was carried out departmentally at a total cost of Rs. 3,346.00.
- (3) The Contract for purchase and erection of chlorination equipment for this reservoir was given to Messrs. Indian Engineering Corporation at a cost of Rs. 43,350 plud S.T. & G.T. The equipment was supplied by the firm in February 1967. Its erection will start after control room is ready.
- (4) The structure of sub-station for receiving electricity from Messrs. Bombay Suburban Electric Supply Ltd., was constructed during the year, at a cost of about Rs. 12,000.00. The B.S.E.S. Lt.d, have agreed to give the supply of an estimated cost of Rs. 42,086,00.
- (b) Ghatkopar Hill Reservoir.—(1) The work of cutting the hill to the required formation was completed 3 years back.
- (2) The work of construction of reservoir was started in January 1964 but had to be stopped in June 1964 for want of cement. The work was restarted in November 1966. The cost of work done was approximately Rs. 4,45,125.00. The Contractors Messrs. Gopaldas Vasudeo & Co., had claimed rise in cost of labour and materials, and were granted 16 per cent. increase in the rates, vide S.C.R. No. 2021 dated 19-10-1966.
- (3) The construction of staff quarters was completed in 1965-66. The electrical wiring was carried out departmentally at a total cost of Rs. 4,453.00.

- (4) The work of laying inlet and outlet mains was started in May, 1964 at a cost of Rs. 7,79,240.70. The work was in progress and the cost of work done till 31-3-1967 was approximately Rs. 4,44,051.00. The work of laying 30° dia. outlet, across Central Railway tracks at Ghatkopar, could not be taken up, as the Railway Authorities had not constructed the culvert for crossing the Tracks even though the cost was paid by the Corporation.
- (5) The electric supply was obtained from Messrs. Bombay Suburban Electric Supply Co. for staff quarters at a cost of Rs. 1,380.
- (i) Veravali Hill High and Low Level Reservoirs.—(1) The work of constructio of High and Low Level Reservoirs was entrusted to Messrs. Bhupal Construction Co., vide S.C.R. No. 3819 of 26-2-1964. The construction of low level reservoir was started on 1-4-1964. The work of preparing formation for the reservoir was completed in 1964-65. The work of construction of resrvoir was in progress. As cement was in short supply the progress of work had to be slowed down. Lime was used in the outer portion of side walls, in order to save on cement.

The work of high level reservoir could not be started earlier, as the possession of the land was not received till May 1966.

The formation work was started in June 1966 and completed in February 1967. The construction of reservoir proper was in progress. The contractors were granted 9 per cent, increase in the rates to meet the rise in cost of labour and mateials, vide S.C.R. No. 2218 of 9-11-1966.

- (2) The work of laying inlet main, Jogeshwari outlet and part of Vile-Parle outlet was compeleted in 1964-65. The work of laying the remaining part of the Vile-Parle outlet was started in January 1965 at a cost of Rs. 7,35,150.27 and was in progress through Messrs. New Great Construction Co. The cost of the work completed by 31-3-1967 was approximately Rs. 6,44,434.00.
- (3) The work of construction of Staff quarters could not be started for want of cement till January 1966, although the same was entrusted to Contractors Messrs. Vikram Construction Co., pide S.C.R. No. 1182 or 14-8-1964. The cost of the work done till 31-3-1967 was Rs. 1,75,558.00 as against the allotment of Rupees 3,07,237.74. The work was nearing completion. The contractors claimed rise in the rates due to the increase in the cost of labour and materials and the same was under consideration.
- (4) Order was placed on Messrs. Bombay Suburban Electric Supply Co., to supply the electric energy at an estimated cost of Rupees 6,777.00 and with a gurantee of minimum consumption of the value of Rs. 4,650 00 per annum. An estimate for wiring of quarters and control room of Veravali was prepared.
- (j) Bhandup Hill Reservoir.—(1) Alternative designs were called for at the time of inviting tenders. The offer of Messrs. Chattarsingh Motisingh & Co., (vide S.C.R. No. 4161 of 18-3-1964) consisting of colcrete walls was accepted at a cost of Rs. 19,22,319.00. The work of preparing formation of work was completed and construction of reservoir proper was started in January 1967. The cost of work done till 31-3-67 was approximately Rs. 8,32,467.00. Claims for higher rates due to the rise in cost of labour and materials were under consideration.
- (2) The work of laying in let and outlet mains was started in April 1965. The work was in progress through Messrs. Shah & Pandya. The cost of work done upto 31-3-1967 was approximately Rs. 4,08,121.00 as against the allotment of Rs. 8,55,427.45. A portion of the outlet could not be laid due to unsuthorised hutments along the alignment of the mains.
 - (3) Thetenders for Staff quarters will be invited in due course.
- (k) Fabrication of Steel Pipes and Specials.—The work of fabricating and supplying pipes and specials required for Illrd stage of the Master Plan was in progress. The cost of work carried out was about Rs. 8,30,163.00 as against contract amount of Rs. 19,64,634.00. Messrs. Structural Engineering Works Ltd.. were the contractors.
 - (1) Filteration of Water Supply.—(1) Model Filter Laboratory at Powai:—
- (i) 2'×2'×12" thick Resin bounded porous slab supplied by Messrs. Ashim Filters, was fitted on model filters and tested as under drains.
- (ii) Regular analysis were carried out at Powai Laboratory for waters of Dahisar River, Kalu River, Bhatsai River, Ulhas River, Powai Lake, Vehar Lake, Tulsi Lake and Tulsi filter effluent.
- (iii) The samples of water from three mains at Powai, i.e., 72" West Tansa main, 72" East Tansa Main and 96" Vaiterna Main were collected and tested regularly, bacteriologically for M.P.N. and for different types of organisms.
 - (2) Pilot Filteration Station at Vailarna.—All the four pre-treatment units, viz.
 - (i) Candy's Hopper bottom clarifier, 28'-6"×28'-6" at top, 28'-0" deep.
 - (ii) Dorr's Hydrotreator of size 22'×22'×13' (height).
 - (iii) Dorr's clarifloculator of size 24 × 24'×15' (height).
- (iv) Paterson's accelerator of size 24'×24'×15' (height) and 4 filter beds (2 beds of Candy's Filters of 10'-10"×9-11" and 2 beds of Paterson's type of 10 -0"×11'-0") were put into commission and the following experiments were conducted:—
 - (a) Determination of the most effective and economical coagulant.
 - (b) Determination of the optimum loading of pretreatment unit.
 - (c) Determination of the filter rate.
 - (d) A study of the feasibility of direct filteration, bye-passing the pre-treatment units.
 - (e) Determination of corrosiveness of Vaiterna Lake Waters.

The experiments were conducted with both, surface waters and waters drawn from the tunnel at 416 T.H.D. Various r eadings were properly recorded in log books maintained at site.

Laboratory at Vaiterna continued the routine testing of waters from Pilot Filteration Plant at the various stages of filtration. It continued the detailed Limnological study of Vaiterna Lake. Routine tests were carried out for Bhatsai River Waters, Tansa Lake Waters and Water flowing through Trunk Mains to Jamboli.

- (3) Construction of 20 M.G.D. Vehar Water Treatment Plant.—The work was awarded to Messrs. Vinay Construction Co. The work was started on 20-12-1966. The cost of work done during the year was Rs. 65,018.00 approximately against all otment of Rs. 13,84,215.00 and was in progress. The excavation for the Two clarifiers was completed. Screed concreting for one clarifier was completed. 36" dia. Hume pipe for inlet to one clarifier and 8' dia. C.I. Sludge pipe for both the clarifiers have been brought on site.
- (4) Vaiterna and Upper Vaiterna Water Treatment Plant.—Tenders for 108 M.G.D. capacity water treatment Plant for Vaiterna Lake Waters at Bel nala in the Tansa Catchment area were received and scrutinized.

⁽n) Renovation of Duct.—The contract for the work of renovating the masonry duct between Tansa and Ghatkopar by laying 72" dia. R.C.C. pipeline, at a total cost of Rs. 1,13,92,211,25 was taken in hand in 1961 and was to be completed in four years, vide S.C.R. No. 2011 of 3rd October 1960. The contract period had to be extended upto 31st May 1967 on account of various difficulties such as shortage of cement, restriction of working period during National Emergency etc. The Contractors Messrs. Structural Engineering Works Ltd. have renovated only 21,974 Rft. of the duct, out of a total length 1,21,670 Rft. upto 31st March 1967.

Action was being taken to terminate the contract due to unsatisfactory progress of the work. The expenditure upto 31st March 1967 was Rs. 37,06,487.43 including Deptt. works which amounted to Rs. 8,99,129.03.

- (o) Land Acquisition.—The possession of the sites for the construction of proposed service Reservoirs at (1) Golanji Hill, (2) Pali Hill, (3) Veravali Hill (Low level), (4) Trombay Hill, (5) Rawli Hill, (6) Veravali High Level was taken over by the Municipality from the Government land Acquisition Officers and that part possession of Bhandup Hill Reservoir site and possession of Bhandup Filtration Plant site was taken over from the land owners by negotiations. Awards in respect of the sites acquired for Reservoirs at (1) Golanji Hill, (2) Pali Hill, (3) Trombay Hill (4) Rawli Hill (5) Veravali Hill Reservoir (High Level) have been declared by the Government and further proceedings regarding the payment of compensation for the reservoir site at Veravali Hill (Low level) were in progress in consultation with the Government authorities.
- (b) Negotiations for transfer of the required areas out of the milk Scheme lands were in progress with the Director, Greater Bombay Milk Scheme.

PART III

DAHISAR RIVER PROJECT

- 1. (a) Composite Dam.—Tender Specifications for constructing a composite Dam were completed and the tenders were invited. In all 6 Tenders were received. While they were under scrutiny, the Government advised the Municipal Corporation to postpone the project for the present. All the tenders were therefore, rejected.
- (b) Diversion of Aarey-Borivali Road.—For the reasons stated in 1(a) above, the contractors Messrs. Ram and Company, who were awarded the contract for this work were informed not to start the work.
- (c) Experiments at the Central Water and Power Research Station at Khadakwasla.—The experiments for Nappe and the Downstream protection works with modification suggested by this Department were carried out. Similarly, experiments for the undersluices were also in progress during the year.

The models were inspected by the Executive Engineer (Dahisar) and his assitants. Further experiments had to be suspended as the project was postponed. The Executive Engineer of the Research Station has informed that an expenditure of Rs. 48,618.65 has been incurred on the preparation of models.

- (d) Construction of a Semi permanent Office and Stores Shed.—A Semi-permanent Office and Stores Shed were under construction during the year and total expenditure incurred upto the end of the year was Rs. 11,000.
- 2. Land Acquisition.—(i) Goot. Land.—The possession of Milk Scheme lands admeasuring about A.-736 G.-17-As. 07 required for Dahisar Project and tunnels Project (Driving tunnels between Mulund and Kandivali) have been taken over from the Milk Scheme Department, through the Collector, B. S. D. pending finalisation of occupancy price etc. in due course. The work of enumeration of tree growth on the said area of A.-736 G.-17 As.-07 was completed and steps were being taken to clear the area of the tree growth. Joint servey work by the Government Surveyor was in progress.
 - (ii) Private Land.—About 8 acres of land were acquired from the private parties.
- (iii) Clearing the Tree growth.—Tenders for clearing the tree growth standing on the land were invited and received. While they were under scrutiny, it was decided to postpone the project. Hence the tenders were rejected.
- (3) Gauging and Rainfall Records.—The records for hourly rainfall and river-flow were maintained in Monsoon from 1st June 1966 to 31st October 1966.
- (4) Expenditure.—An expenditure of about Rs. 9,73,000.00 was incurred on the staff both superior and inferior and also on purchase of consumable stores, stationaery articles, transport charges, charges for experiments carried out at the Research Station, Khadakwasla and those for services of Geologist, Geological Survey of India.

PART IV

UPPER VAITARNA SCHEME

(A) OUTSIDE CITY DIVISION

- (a)(i) Bel Nala-Pachhapur Section (length about 23 K.m.) Contract for preparing formation for laying 3000>2750 mm. dia. main between Bel Nala and Pachhapur was awarded to Messrs. New Asian Construction Co., vide S.C.R. No. 1378 dated 25th August 1965, at a cost of Rs. 1,56,49,840.50 and the work was started on 1st November 1965 and is to be completed in twenty months i.e by 30th June 1967. Due to difficulties, such as delay in acquisition of land, the progress was slow. The total expenditure booked upto 31st March 1967 was Rs. 37,48,576.01. The work was in progress.
- (ii) Pachhapur Pogaon Section (Length: 20.8 K.m.)—Contract for preparing formation for laying 2750 mm. dia. pipeline between Pachhapur and Pogaon was awarded to Messrs. Kusumkant & Co. vide S.C.R. No. 896 dated 14th July 1965 at a cost of Rs. 59, 56, 755.00. The work was started on 8th March 1966 and contract period was 16 months. The progress was slow due to delay in acquisition of land. Expenditure upto 31st March 1967 wqs Rs. 8,79,738.68. The work was in progress.
- (iii) Pogaon Bhandup Section.—(Length 24 K.m.)—Contract for preparing formation for laying 2750 mm. > 2500 mm. dia. pipeline between Pogaon and Bhandup was awarded to Messrs. Patel Engineering Covide S.C.R. No. 1292 dated 18th August 1965 at a total cost of Rs. 93,21,240.60. The work was started on 20th November 1965. The contract period was 18 months. The progress was slow due to difficulties such as delay in acquisition of land. The total exenditure upto 31st March 1967 was Rs. 14,83,245.88. The work, was in progress.

- (iv) Tunnel Across hill at Aghai. Tenders for the work were invited and necessary administrative approval to entrust the work to suitable Constructors (Messrs. Hindustan Construction Co. Ltd.) was being obtained. The work was expected to start in the month of May 1967.
- (v) Bridge across the Tansa River near Mohili.—Tenders for the work were invited and necessary approval of the Standing Committee to entrust the work to the lowest tenderer was being obtained, The work was expected to start in October-November 1967.
 - (vi) Tenders were invited for the work of:-
- (a) Development of yard and Construction of office and Stores buildings, at Agra Road. As the tendered amount was about 70% higher than the estimated cost it was proposed to reject the tenders and reinvite the same.
 - (b) Tender for construction of Office building at Kapurbawdi were invited.
- (vii) The work of fabricating and supplying pipes and specials for Upper Vaitarna Tunnel Project was started in April 1965. The work was in progress. The cost of work done was about Rs. 5,67,790 as against contract amount of Rs. 7,33,068.00 Messrs. Structural Engineering Works Ltd. were the contractors.
- (viti) The work of fabricating pipes and specials for Bel-Nala-Pogaon and Mulund-Dharavi section of Upper Vaitarna Project was started in April 1965. The vork was in progress. The cost of work done was about Rs. 46,45,777 as against contract amount of Rs. 1,40,30,030,70 Messrs. Structural Engineering Works Ltd. were the Contractors.

The construction of two units, superior 'A' type at Agra Road started in 1965-66 could not be completed in 1966-67 due to shrotage of building material such as bricks and sand. They were expected to be completed by October, 1967.

(B) BHANDUP DHARAVI SECTION

- (i) Laying 2500 mm.dia, pipeline between Powai Bandra section was started in December, 1965. The work was in progress through Messrs. Concrete Construction Co. The cost of work done was approx. Rs. 3, 37, 441 as against contract amount of Rs. 57, 24, 827, 10 The work was slowed down partly because permission to lay pipeline in Aerodrome area and along Express Highway was not received.
- (ii) Sanction of Standing Committee was received for awarding contract of laying 2500 mm. dia. pipe line in Bhandup Powaiand Bandra Dharavi Sections to Messrs. S. V. Shah at a cost of Rs. 34,79,460 vide S. C. R. No. 4087 dated 21-3-1967. The work will be started in October 1967 i.e. after monsoon.
 - (iii) Survey of alternate site for Trombay Hill Reservoir was in progress.
 - (iv) The Draft Tenderfor Veravali Hill Reservoir was under preparation.
 - (v) The Draft Tender for Bhandup Hill Reservoir was under preparation.

(C) MULUND-KANDIVALI TUNNEL AND PIPELINE SECTION

(1) Driving of Tunnels:-

- (i) The work of driving of tunnels between Mulund and Kandivali was entrusted to Messrs. Patel Engineering Co. Ltd., at a total cost of Rs. 1, 19, 16, 270.88 (vide S.C.R. No. 3288 dated 28th January 1963). The work was started on 1-3-1963 and was to be completed within 18 months time. The above estimate was based on the assumption that the tunnels will mostly pass through massive basalt formation and thus will not require cement concreate lining except at places of poor rock formation. Subsequently, it was revealed that the tunnels pass through highly weathered, jointed and fissured basalt and agglomerate formation which necessitated provision of 12" thick reinforced cement concrete lining for the entire length of tunnels. The cost of the work was therefore, revised to Rs. 1,82,55,210.52 (vide S.C.R. No. 1476 dated 1-9-1965).
- (ii) Excavation.—Excavation of both tunnels aggregating to a total length of 19,060 ft. was completed by the end of last year.
- (iii) Reinforced Cement Concrete Lining 1: 2: 4:—The concrete lining was done in two stages, First the invert and the curb and then the side and the arch.
- (a) Invert and Curb.—About 1000 Rft. of Tunnel No. 2 were concreted during the year. With this, invert and curb concrete of both the tunnels was completed.
- (b) Side and Arch.—About 2100 Rft. of Tunnel No. 1 and about 6500 Rft. of Tunnel No. T2 were concreted during the year.
- (iv) Grouting.—Contact grouting of Tunnel No. 1 was completed. Deep grouting of the same tunnel was done for a length of 4,000 ft.
- (v) Time Schedule.—The work was behind the schedule due to (a) non-availability of land in the beginning, (b) non-availability of cement in adequate quantity for concrete linning and (c) rock-falls in tunnels due to weak strata and considerable sub-soil and seepage water met with during excavation.
- (vi) Cost of the work.—The cost of the work done during the year was Rs. 31,08,972.73 without supervision charges.
 - (2) Laying of 96" dia. > 48" dia. and 36" dia. > 24" dia. pipe Line:
 - (a) Laying of 96" dia. > 48" dia. M. S. Pipe line:

The work of laying 96" dia. M. S. Pipe line at Tunnel faces and in between Tunnel face and 48" dia. M. S. Pipe Line beyond tunnel face at Kandivali upto Western Express Highway was entrusted to Messrs. New Asian Construction Co. vide S. C. R. No. No. 3918 dated 4-3-1964.

The total cost of the work was Rs. 17,76,070.00 exclusive of Supervision.

The work of laying 96" dia. M.S. Pipe line was started on 8-4-1964 and was still in progress. The work was delayed entirely on account of lack of organisation on the part of Contractors.

The work of laying 48" dia. M. S. Pipe Line between face at Kandivali and Western Express Highway was started on 10-10-1965. Pipe Line was laid under-ground. The total cost of both these works done upto of 31-3-1967 was Rs. 8, 34, 459.55 exclusive of Supervision Charges. The total cost of laying the 96" 48" pipes during the year was Rs. 2,79,445.16 exclusive of Supervision charges.

(b) Laying of 36" dia. > 24" dia . C. I. Pipe Line:-

The work of laying 36" dia. > 24" dia. C. I. Pipe Line was entrusted to Messrs. Vinay Construction Company at a total cost of Rs. 8,00,200.00. The work was started on 20-10-1964. The lead required for jointing C. I. Pipes was not freely available in the market as a result of which the progress of the work suffered.

Experiments were, therefore, carried out on mineral lead compound proposed to be used as jointing materials (to be substituted for pig lead). The substitute, on test, was found satisfactory. Accordingly, further work was carried out by using Mineral Lead as jointing material.

Cost of the work done upto 31-3-1967 exclusive of Supervision charges was Rs. 4,87,961.47. The cost of the work done during the year was Rs. 2,33,035.13 exclusive of Supervision charges.

- (3) Construction of Chlorination House at Mulund.—The work was entrusted to Messrs. S. W. Mungale vide S. C. R. No. 127 of 23-4-1966 and the work was started on 28-10-1966. The cost of the work done upto 31-3-1967 was Rs. 10,293.17. The work was delayed entirely due to lack of organisation on the part of the Contractors.
- (4) Borivali Hill Reservoir.—Tenders for this work were invited with tenderer's design. The tender of Messrs. Bhupal Construction Co. for a design consisting of colerete walls and R.C. Roof slab and costing Rs. 16,69,325.00 exclusive of Supervision Charges was accepted vide S. C. R. No. 1354 of 24-8-1966. The work was started on 29-12-1966. The work of preparing formation was in progress. The progress was slow, as during excavation peculiar type of strata having large boulders mixed with earth were met with. Cost of the work done upto 31-3-1967 was approximately Rs. 1,55,000.

(D) LAND ACQUISITION

- 1. For laying the 2750 mm, dia welded mild steel pipe line from Bel Nalla to Mulund, 445 acres of private land, 35 acres of Government land and 161 acres of Forest Land is required.
- 2. The private land admeasuring A.-445 G.-14As.-14 under acquisition is from different 45 villages of Bhiwandi, Shahapur and Thana Talukas. 45 Proposal were forwarded to the Special Land Acquisition Officer

Supplementary proposal for small pockets left out were also submitted to the Government. Notification-under Section 4 of the L. A. Act was published in respect of 42 cases and notification under section 6 of the L. A. Act in respect of 32 cases and the declaration of award was awaited in respect of all these cases. Possession of Private land admesuring A.-96 G.-18 As.-12 was obtained through Special Land Acquisition Officer and that of A.-279 G.-02 As.-12 area was taken privately from the land owners.

- The service of the Special Land Acquisition Officer and this allied staff have been continued as the land acquisition work was still not completed.
- 4. The land acquisition proceedings in respect of reservoirs at Malad was in progress with Special Lnad Acquisition Officer (8). The possession of Milk Scheme lands of the Borivali Reservoir has been taken over from Collector, B. S. D. pending settlement of transfer proceedings in due course.
- 5. The proceedings for acquisition of private langs for about 50 Acres required for tunnels project were in progress with Special Land Acquisition Officer (8) and were nearing the award stage. The advance possession of lands was taken over from the respective land-lords pending acquisition proceedings in due course, on usual terms and congitions.

A site for a reservoir, for Trombay area, near Polychem Ltd. was surrendered to Atomic Energy Establishment as the same was required by Government for defence purposes. An alternative site was being obtained from the Atomic Energy Establishment. Another site near Esso Nagar was selected and preliminaries regarding the same were in progress.

6. Laying 108" dia. water main from Muluud to Bhandup.—About 20 Acres of private land was naoposed tobe acquired for this purpose. Proposals for the same were forwarded to the Government. The acquisition proceedings were started by the Special Land Acquisition Officer (8).

PART V

BHATSAI AND KALU RIVER SCHEMES

(A) BHATSAI RIVER SCHEME

The preliminary survey and allied works which were starte, in May 1964, were in progress and were completed during the year under report. In view of the non-availability of foreign exchange from Central Government free resources, use of pre-stressed Concrete Pipes was considered and accordingly enquiries were made and it revealed that these pipes can be economically manufactured indigeneously and will reduce foreign exchange component considerably. For making the use of pre-stressed Concrete Pipes for the entire length from dam site to Bombay, another suitable alignment was surveyed. Consequently, sites for Camp Colony, Filtration Plant and Fa tory for manufacture of pre-stressed Concrete Pipes were required to be investigated. These works were in progress as detailed below:

I.—SURVEY WORK:—

- (i) Alternative alignment (No. II) for laying 2500 mm. dia. twin Pre-stressed Concrete Pipes from Dam site to Kapurbavdi with one pipe upto Chembur and another upto Bhandup was surveyed in detail for a total length of about 64 Kms, and the Longitudinal section was plotted.
- (ii) Detailed cross sections along this alternative alignment were also taken and the plotting work for the same was in progress from dam site to Yewai-for a length of about 40 Kms.
 - (iii) Contour survey for Filtration Site near Vadapa Hill on the above alignment was completed.
- (iv) Contour Plan for the preposed camp site at Vasind, at a distance of about 22 kms. from dam site and abutting on Bombay Agra Road was completed.
 - (v) Work of fixing of conter-line stones along the alignment from Dam site to Yewai was completed.
- II.—: Camp Colony:—A comprehensive proposal for the construction of a full-fledged camp Colony with 104 staff quarters office building, dispensary, garage, community hall etc with electricity, water supply and drainage arrangements, was prepared and the same was approved by the Corporation under Corporation Resolution No. 1544 dated 16th January 1967 and was ready for invitation of tenders. Cost of this work as per office estimate was Rs. 21.70 lakhs.
- III.—Project Report.—Detailed report on conveyance and distribution system for the entire project was prepared. Total estimated cost of the project was Rs. 67.2 crores with the use of pre-stressed Concrete Pipes and including the cost of construction of Dam. This report along with the detailed drawings was submitted in the month of January 1967 to the State Government.
- IV.—Land Acquisition.—Detailed plans for the acquisition of land for the pipeline along the alignment No. II was prepared. Proposal for acquiring about 25 acres of land for Camp Colony at Vasind was submitted to the Forest Department of State Government. Proposal for acquisition of land required for camp site were under preparation.
- V.—Office Accommodation.—A temporary shed almeasuring about 200 Sft, was constructed for dispensary, during the year under report.
- VI.—Test Bore Work.—Work for the soil investigation by taking bores along the tunnel alignment (alignment No. I) was completed in all respects and the Superintending Geologist of Geological Survey of India has already inspected the cores. His impression was that in general, strata met with was satisfactory for driving tunnel. His detailed report was awaited.
- VII.—G auging Work.—River and rain gauging was continued at the proposed dam site near Sajivali Village during the mansoon of 1966. This was accompanied by rain gauging at Vashala (a village in the Bhatsai Catchment).

- VIII.—Water Samples.—Water Samples were collected from time to time during monsoon and tested at Vaitarna laboratory for ascertaining the quality of water.
- IX.—General.—A three-man appraisal team from World Bank inspected various sites, in connection with the Project, in the month of January 1967. Further investigations were being made by the consultants, Messrs. Binnie & Partners (India) Ltd. appointed for the purposes, by the State Government. The preliminary report from these consultants was awaited. The question as to whether this project should be implemented by the Municipal Corporation or by a Specially appointed statutary authority is yet to be decided.

(B) UPPER KALU RIVER SCHEME

- 1. Tenders for the soil investigations of the dam site and along the tunnel alignment were prepared. The work was, however, kept in abeyance, since this scheme was not likely to be implemented till 1975.
- 2. The river and rain gauging works were continued during the monsoon at the proposed dam site. The work of gauging the river at two places near Khapri Village and rain gauging at two places, i.e. at Dam site near Village Khapri and in the catchment area near Village Moroshi was carried out during the year under report.

PART VI

ULHAS RIVER SCHEME

- 1. This scheme consists of Pumping about 20 million gallons of raw water per day from Ulhas River near existing Mohone Weir at Kelyan into a 1200 mm. dia. rising steel main up to a water treatment plant near Pogaon and again pumping treated water into the existing trunk main system at Pogaon.
- 2 Fabrication of Pipes.—The work of fabricating 1200 mm. d'a. pipes and specials was entrusted to Messrs. The Indian Hume Pipe Co. Ltd., at a total cost of Rs. 7,62,996 (wide S.C.R. No. 3794 of 23rd February 1966). The Company started the work on 10th March 1966 and the same was nearing completion at the end of the year.
- 3. Laying of Pipes.—The pipe laying work between Mohone Weir and Pogaon, covering 13.2 Kilometers was divided into three sections viz (i) Mohone Weir to Pandavbandh, (ii) North of Pandavbandh to Chaudarpada and (iii) Chaudarpada to Pogaon. The works of laying of pipeline in these three sections were entrusted to three different contractors viz. (i) Messrs. Kusumkant & Co., (ii) Messrs. New Great Construction Co. and (iii) Messrs. C. M. Shah respectively, at the cost of Rs. 10,70,979.00 Rs. 11,94,742.50 and Rs. 11,14,159.20 vide S.C.R. Nos. 4253 of 25th March 1966, 4097 of 16th March 1966 and 4103 of 16th March 1966 respectively.

Messrs. Kusumkant & Co. started the work on 25th April 1966 and the same was nearing completion at the end of the year. Messrs. New Great Construction Co. started the work on 5th April 1966 and completed the same on 8th March 1967 and Messrs. C. M. Shah started the work on 29th March 1966 and the same was in progress.

- 4. Construction of Intake Channel with Pump House at Mohone Weir.—This work was entrusted to Messrs. Patel Engineering Co. Ltd. at a total cost of Rs. 12,96,000 including supervision and contingencies (vide S.C.R. No. 155 of 20th April 1966). 20 M.G.P.D. capacity pumps with adequate stand byes were installed. The pump house size was constructed to allow for duplication, in future. The Contractors started the work on 15th June 1966 and the same was nearing completion at the end of the year.
- 5. Bridge across Kalu River.—The work of construction of a bridge across Kalu River, for carrying 1200 mm. dia. pipeline, was entrusted to Messrs. The Hindustan Construction Co. Ltd. at total cost of Rs. 26,88,949.67 (vide S.C.R.No. 155 of 20th April 1966). They were also entrusted with the ancillary works, such as (i) laying of pipeline on bridge portion, (ii) construction of anchor blocks, thrust blocks etc. Messrs. The Hindustan Construction Co. Ltd., started the work on 1st May 1966 and the same was nearing completion at the end of the year.
- 6. Fileration Plant at Pogaon.—The work of construction of 20 M.G.D. Capacity Treatment Plant was entrusted to Messrs. Candy Filters (India) Pvt. Ltd. at a total cost of Rs. 21,23,178.75 (vide S.C. R. No. 1054 of 20th July 1966). They commenced the work on 11th August 1966. About 60 per cent of the work was completed by them at the end of the year.
- 7. Purchase of Pump and Erection thereof.—The pumps required for this Scheme were purchased from Messrs. Voltas Ltd. at a total cost of Rs. 10,77,840.00 vide S.C.R. No. 4244 of 25th March 1966. They supplied the pumps on 30th March 1967. The work of erection of pumps at Mohone and Pogaon Pump houses has also been entrusted to them, at a total cost of Rs. 6.24,865.15 They have commenced the work on 10th February 1967 and the same was nearing completion at the end of the year.
- 8. Construction of Pump House at Pogaon, approach road to Filteration Plant, staff quarters, Office, stores at Kalyan Bhiwandi Bridge.—This work was eriginally entrusted to Messrs. ACE Construction Co. Ltd., vide S.C.R. No. 547 of 27th May 1966. However, as the contractors could not show any progress, the contract was terminated and the firm was blacklisted. The work was there after entrusted to Messrs. Vikram Construction Co., at a total cost of Rs. 11,23,720.00 vide S.C.R. No. 1954 of 12th October 1966. They commenced the work on 21st November 1966 and have completed the construction of the pump house at Pogaon.
- 9. Construction of pernment staff quarters at Mohone & Pogaon.—This work was entrusted to Messrs. Steel & Roof Construction Corporation at a total cost of Rs. 8,97,099.00 (vide S.C.R. No. 4026 of 21st March 1967) and the work will be started in the first week of April 1967.
- 10. Purchase of appurtenances.—The appurtenances, such as sluice valves, air valves, concussion relief valves etc, were purchased from Messrs. Larsen & Toubro at a total cost of Ra 1,19,808.73 vide S.C.R. No. 447 of 11th May 1966.

- 11. Fabricating pipes and specials.—The work of fabricating pipes and specials for Ulhas Work was entrusted to Messrs. Indian Hume Pipe Co. Ltd. vide S.C.R. No. 3794 of 23rd February 1966. The work was in progress during the year.
- 12. Land Acquisition.—The private lands admeasuring about 67 Acros of land from different 11 villages of Kalyan and Bhiwandi Talukas of Thana District has already been requisitioned under the Defence of India Act. 1962, for the period of 5 years, on payment of rental compensation and the same has been utilised for the purpose of laying pipe line, construction of Filtration Plant etc. The question of fixing rental compensation for the aforesaid land was under the consideration of Special Land Acquisition Officer, Upper Vaitara Scheme, Thana. As this land admeasuring 67 Acres would be required permanently, the proposals for acquiring the same were being processed

As regards the tansfer of Government land under Revenue and Forest Department, the transfer proceedings were in progress with the Government authorities.

PART VII

MULUND PUMPING SCHEME

The Scheme to provide a pumping Station at Mulund Anchor Block was found to be not feasible on account of some technical difficulties. Investigations for alternate schemes to boost up pressures in trunk mains were carried out. Necessary proposal in this connection was formulated for submission to the Works Committee (City) and the Corporation for their sanction.

PART VIII

GARGAI AND POSHIR RIVER PROJECTS

Introductory.—In the meeting held on 11th October 1966 of the Water Committee appointed by the Government of Maharashtra, it was decided that the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay should undertake the field surveys in the basins of the Rivers Poshir (a tributory of Ulhas) and Garagai with a view to stabilise the supplies received from 1) Ulhas River and 2) Upper Vaitarna Project, respectively. Accordingly the Works Committee (City) under their resolution No. 383 of 6th January 1967 sanctioned a block estimate amounting to Rs. 1,37,500 for preliminary survey work.

The Poshir River Scheme consists of Constructing a dam near village Kalamb, in Karjat Taluka of Kolaba District to supply about 40 to 60 M.C.P.D. The water is to be let out into the river so that it will feed the pumps at Mohone weir (Ulhas River Scheme). This will ensure a steady and increased supply for pumps against 20 M.C.P.D. promised by the State Government.

The Gargai River Scheme consists of constructing a dam near village Ogda, in Vada Taluka of Thana District, to supply about 60 M.G.P.D. on 95 per cent. reliability. This is to be connected by a tunnel to Vaitarna lake. The Upper Vaitarna Scheme is designed to give 120 M.G.P.D. on 75 per cent. reliability or 60 M.G.P.D. on 95 per cent. reliability. The Gargai will thus stabilise Upper Vaitarna to give a combined supply of 120 M.G.P.D. on 95 per cent. reliability.

A Camp was established at Neral for carrying out survey work in Poshir catchment and the other relevant data was collected. Accommodation at Vada was being secured for Gargai Camp.

The Government of Maharashtra, informed by end of January 1967 that the schemes be dropped. The survey work was suspended immediately.

PART IX

MISCELLANEOUS WORKS

(a) Laying 1400 mm. dia. Main Round the Race Course

(1) Work of extending 1400 mm. dia. pipe line from Haines Road junction to Clerk Road was entrusted to Messrs. Concrete Construction Co., vide S.C.R. No. 1454 of 1st September 1965. The work was started in October 1965 and was in progress. The cost of the work done upto 31st March 1967 was Rs. 2,86,302.00 approx. against contract amount of Rs. 4,90,239.25.

(b) Strengthening the Powai Masonry Dam

Tenders were invited for the work of investigation of masonry dam at Powai. The work was entrusted to Messrs, Cementation Co. vide S.C.R. No. 4368 of 30th March 1966.

The work was completed during the year under review.

(c) Replacing Pipe Line between Bandra & Dharavi

The draft tender specification for fabrication and laying for replacement of two, 57" dia. existing pipe lines between Bandra and Dharavi by Two 1800 mm. dia. pipe line were prepared and sent to C.A./M.C. for approval to invite tenders.

(d) Steel Plates and Bars

Steel Plates and reinforcement bars required for the various works were purchased in advance, in view of their scarcity, so that the work may not suffer.

In order to facilitate issue of M. S. Bars etc. from Powai Stores, lorry weighing machine was purchased and erected at Powai during the year under review.

(e) Enlargement work between Gundavli and Kasheli

Contract for this work was awarded to Messrs. Structural Engineering Works Ltd. at a cost of Rs. 17.45,167.17 vide S.C.R. No. 1214 of 14th August 1964. The work was started on 17th October 1964 and the contract period has been extended to 31st May 1967 on account of difficulties such as shortage of comment etc. The total expenditure incurred up to 31st March 1967 was Rs. 11,46,885.79.

Departmental works such as construction of Anchor Blocks etc. estimated to cost Rs. 3,85,271.00 were a progress. Expenditure booked upto 31st March 1967 was Rs. 2,45,099.

(f) Additional tunnel between Vaitarna and Tansa

It has been decided to provide an additional tunnel between Valtarna and Tansa, more or less, parallel to the existing tunnel and detailed plans and estimates for preliminary works and block estimates for the main work totally estimated at Rs. 3,96,00,000.00 were being put up for administrative approval.

Tenders for taking trial bores for determining the nature of under-ground strata were prepared.

(g) Laying 108" dia all welded steel diversion Main between Gundovali and Kapurbawdi

Plans and estimates for Rs. 3,05,57,580.00 for laying a 108" dia. all welded steel diversion steel main, from Gundovali Anchor Block to meet the Kalher face of the undercreek tuni el accross Bessein Creek and from Kolshet end of the tunnel upto Kapurbawdi Anchor Block, were prepared and were being sent for necessary administrative approval.

(h) Miscellaneous work at Bel Nalla and Tansa

Detailed estimates for carrying out remedial measures at Bel Nalla for better operation and maintenance amounting to Rs. 1,63,430.00 was approved under W.C.R. No. 167 dated 13th October 1965 and that for providing masonry wall over the south abutment of the Tansa Dam and raising the footbridge over Tansa Spill way amounting to Rs. 1,53,645 was approved under W.C.R. 57 of 24th June 1966.

Tenders for the works were prepared after investigations and collection of necessary data during the year under review.

(i) Repairs to Atgon Tansa and Tausa Bel Nalla Road

The Works Committee (City) during their visit to Tansa and Vaitarna on 16th July 1966 had noticed the deterioriated condition of this road and had recommended that repairs to the same be immediately carried out. Necessary survey, collection of data, investigations for reprire to the road was carried out during the year and estimates were being prepared for submitting the same to the Works Committee and the Corporation for their approval.

(j) Maintenance of Tools & Plants

Toois and Plants consisting of a motor trolley, I Loco, 2 Welding plants (diesel). 3 concrete maixers, one lime unit, 2 vibrators, one weigh batcher, 4 compressors were maintained in running condition.

A workshop with lathe, a transformer welding set and gas welding and cutting set and a grinder was maintained for machining and fabricating works of miscellaneous departmental jobs connected with reservoirs such as repairs of valves, fabrication of level recorder panels, fabrication of walk way etc.

New purchases, comprising of exhaust fan, a stationery compressor for the workshop, gas welding and cutting equipment and electrical energy meters were made by inviting sealed tenders and quotations.

A 30,000 K. gm. weighbridge type lorry weighing machine was purchased from Messrs. Avery & Co. at a total cost of Rs. 38,775 plus taxes and erected.

The work of foundation, cabin and road etc, for the same was done departmentally.

Float level recorders and level indicator pannels were erected at Golanji Hill Reservoir.

The Executive Engineer (Vigilance) is in charge of the Vegilance Branch attached to M. C.'s office and he is assisted by Two Asstt. Engineers and two Sub. Engineers in the working of this unit. He continues to discharge multifarious duties including rendering guidance to the staff in Technical and establishment matters, scruitny of technical staff proposals, surprise checks on construction works in progress to determine if the work is being executed as per design and specifications and for exercising control on workmanship, investigating various complaints of a serious nature connected with Engineering branch received from public, etc. The department also functions as a co-ordinating agency of the work of different units of Engineering section, assisting the administration in matters where policy revision, etc., is involved, overall supervision and checking over the normal working of different branches and Ward Offices, co-ordinating the different wings of the Municipal administration for implementing the decisions of Statutory Committees and the Municipal Commissioner.

The Vigilance branch assists the Municipal Commissioner in all technical matters and maintains the minutes of the M.C.'s rounds. In addition this branch assists the Municipal Commissioner in arranging Co-ordinating meetings of all officers in the Municipal Corporation and maintains minutes of such meetings. The Department has plans to organise itself and vigorously persue implementation of Development Plan in particular co-ordination of various branches of the Corporation by arranging Review Co-ordination meeting for progressive execution of various works earmarked for public pruposes in the Development Plan of Greater Bembay.

I-(G) Slaughter House Project at Deonar

During the year under report, two contracts (one with Australian firm Messrs. W. J. Powell Overseers Pvt. Ltd., for the supply of foreign contents: and the second with Messrs. Steel Plant Pvt. Ltd., for indigeneous contents) amounting to Rs. 98,05,441.00 were executed for the supply and erection of Machinery and Electrical Equipment for the Slaughter House. The contract period is fixed at twenty months from the date of singing the contracts i.e. from 6-1-1967.

As per the terms of the aforesaid contract, the Corporation is required to construct buildings to house the Machinery. Accordingly, detailed plans and estimates for the civil works based on the sketch plans submitted by the Australian firm are being prepared and the work of construction of two buildings for (i) sheep and Goat and (ii) Pig Slaughter Houses, has been entrusted to Messrs. Rajpuria Construction Corporation at atotal cost of Rs. 19,93,800. Preparation of detailed plans and estimates for other works is in progress."

I-(H) Slum-Clearance

This branch is mainly concerned with the following functions.

- 1. Preliminary survey of Slum Areas, declaration of slum areas as 'Clearance Areas' making of 'Clearance orders' and 'Compulsory Acquisition Orders' under the provision of section 354R of the B.M.C. Act
- Acquisition of Slum properties falling under the clearance areas, rehabilitation of slum dwellers demolition of the buildings in the clearance areas.
- Formation of schemes for the development of clearance areas, with financial assistance from the Govt. under the Govt. of India's Slum Clearance Scheme.

The progress of various works under the slum Clearance schemes during the year under report was as and er:

4-Clearance of Private Slums.

Name of the Clearance area. Progress. (1) Clearance area of Dhobi Chawls. No progress was made by the owner during the year under report to develop the property in response to the clearance order served on him. Negotations for amicable settlement between the owner and the tenants were in progress, but to no effect. (2) Clearance area, 'Hirvi Chawls' It was not possible during the year under report to get the acquired Arthur Road, Tardeo. property vacated for demolition as the tenants insisted upon alternative accommodations in the same area. (3) Clearance area-Gora Gandhi and Ganjawala Chawls, Arthur Road, The compulsory Acquisition order No. 12 was confirmed by the State Govt. and published in the Govt. Gazette and Local news papers on 3-11-1966. The order became operative from 15-12-1966. The state Govt, was thereafter requested on 1-3-1967 to appoint a Special Officer to start acquisition proce-Tardeo. dings and the same was awaited. A proposal to grant authority to the M.C. to acquire the properties by a 'Compulsory Acquisition Order' was referred back to the M. II-(B) Road Construction Branch (City)

This branch is in charge of the work of (i) preparing plans and estimates of Resurfacing of existing roads, construction of New Roads, Wideniag of roads and Improving private Streets, (ii) invitation of Tenders and awarding contracts of road works (iii) Supervision of road works and (iv) invitation of tenders in respect of supply of Road metals, Quarry materials, Bitumen etc. During this year this branch has completed the work of (1) Resurfacing 6 roads (ii) Construction of new roads at 9 sites and (iii) widening 6 roads as shown in the appendix No. 2 Resurfacing works include (1) removal and resurfacing of Tram Tracks on the abandoned routes (II) Cleaning the grouted roads with Asphaltic Concrete and (III) providing new asphalt carpet by removing old asphalt crust. A number of roads in the City were widened in order to meet the growing traffic demands. The work of constructing new roads in Town Planning Schemes Mahim, Dharavis development Scheme, Raoli Camp, Hornby Vellard Estate, Scheme or 6 Sion etc. was carried out.

At present the works of resurfacing 5 roads, constructing new roads at 7 sites and widening 4 roads are in progress which are shown in Appendix No. 3. The work of Construction of approaches to Kennedi Bridge which is being widened is also in progress.

A—Municipal and Ex-Trust Properties

Total number of building and other properties in Greater Bombay during the year ending 31st March 1967, was-13712

The work of maintenance is classified under three major heads (1) Normal Repairs (2) Special Repairs and (3) New works. Normal Repairs include works of monsoon repairs, Special Repairs cover the works which are likely to increase the life of buildings or structures whereas the works of additions and alterations to the buildings as also those of proividing additional amenities fall under the category of New work.

For the purpose of giving contract works for annual repairs etc. the city was divided into 10 divisions. The contractors and the rates quoted were as shown below (Prevailing for the period from 1st October 1966 to 30th September 1967.).

III.-B-Roads and Footpaths

The total length of the roads in the city at the close of the year was 939.19 Km. as on 31-3-67.

An amount of Rs 9,75,383 was spent on repairs to potholes on carriageway during the year and the total cost inclusive of general overhead charges and Miscellaneous charges amounted Rs. 11,01,630. 1,27,817 sq. yds. of different types of road surfaces were improved departmentally during the year as detailed below:—

As usual an amount of Rs. 2,13,342 was paid to the Bombay Port Trust for cleaning and repairing the Port Trust wharves and roads.

III.—C-Miscellaneous Works in connection with Roads and footpath

- (a) Road watering.—No roads and footpaths were watered at suitable intervals during the dry season.
- (b) Street Name Boards.—The existing street name boards were repaired and maintained at a cost of Rs. 21.303.
- (c) Maintenance of Public Monuments.—All the statues were periodically cleaned and maintained at a total cost of Rs. 3,374.
- (d) Widening of Road's consequent upon the acquisition of setback.—The cost of adding to the roads the setback lands acquire in different parts of the city inclusive of the cost of incidental works such as shifting trampoles, electric cables, etc. amounted to Rs. 1,12,028 for 21,149 Sq. yds. added.
 - (e) Benches.—383 benches on roads and footpaths were maintained.
 - (f) 3,380 sq. ft. of guard railings were maintained during the year.

III.-D-Road Rollers

During the year there were 30 road rollers out of which 23 diesel driven, 5 steam driven, and 2 petrol driven,

III.-E-Permits

- (a) Opening of Roads and footpaths.—During the year 4781 permits were issued for excavation in roads and footpaths. The cost of reinstatement of disturbed surface was charged to the respective permits holders and the trenches were repaired at a total cost of Rs. 20,99,309. The total amount of road opening fees recovered was Rs. 2,555.
- (b) Occupation of roads and footpaths.—Action under section 322(b) of the B.M.C. Act was taken to prevent the unatuthorised occupation of roads and footpaths by dumping building materials 109 notices were issued for contravening the provisions of the Act. Fees were also recovered for the use of roads for stacking materials and putting up scaffoldings. The total amount collected under this head was Rs. 9876 from 497 permit holders. In addition, 484 permits were also issued for occuupation of roads for erecting mundops, placing chairs and benches etc. and the total amount realised there from was Rs. 13,771. Permission for new 27 bus shelters on roads and footpaths was granted.

III (F) ASPHALT PLANT AND CRUSHERS

The work of Asphalting footpaths as approved by the Corporation was continued during the year and footpaths of roads covering an area of 21,209 Sq. Yds. were asphalted at a cost of Rs. 57,053.07.

I.—Asphalt Plant and Crushers

- (a) The Municipal hot mix plant at Worli was in operation throughout the year except during the monsoon from 11-7-1966 to 19-10-1966. The pegson plant worked for taking out Asphalt ship mixture and cold materials required to fill in the pot holes in the City and Suburbs. The labourers for running the asphlat plant were engaged by the Contractor.
- (b) The total area 2,28,231 Sq. Yards (Exclusive of potholes area of 13,286 Sq. Yds.) of roads and footpaths was repaired and renewed during the year as against 247,0908 Sq. Yds. repaired and renewed during the previous year.
 - (c) Different roads admeasuring 3,552 Sq. Yds. were repaired with 3" asphalt.
- (d) Capital roads admeasuring 50,979 Sq. Yds. were repaired by Grit Coats or chip coats. The sea coating has also been done on miscelleneous roads measuring about 9541 Sq., Yds.
- (e) During the year under report the roads renewed with 3" Asphalt admeasuring Nil Sq. Yds. were-carried departments.
 - (f) Footpath covering an area of 21,209 Sq. Yds. were asphalted with seal coat.

Hot Mix asphalt Plant

The hot mix plant worked for 275 days and remained closed for 90 days on account of rainy season, Sundays, Holidays and break down of Plant.

The rates adopted for booking the expenditure for different mode of construction were the same as per previous year.

The total expenditure for renewing the road surface, the cost of which was chargeable to repair grant amounted to Rs. 47,725.44.

The area of 1,10,175 Sq. Yds. was repaired by providing 3/4 Asphalt Premix carpet on grouted roads. 2386 Tests were carried out in the Asphalt Plant Laboratory on different Asphalt mixtures. The total no. of boxes turned out by the main plant and pegson plant were 34041 and 7548 boxes respectively.

Crushers at Worli and Sewri

There are four crushers and one Granulator at Worli and three crushers at Sewri. On an average two laushers at Worli and two crushers at Sewri worked.

The total out put of crushers during the year was 2569 brass as against 3248 brass during the previous year. The work of crushing the rubble stones at both the crushers was carried out by departmental labour. Rubble at Worli and Sewri was obtained thorugh the contractors. In additional to this, setts excavated from groads were received and crushed at Worli. The value of stock at hand at the end of the year was Rs. 30,320 at Worli Crushers and 4,002 at Sewri Crushers.

Sewri Crushers were closed down from 5-11-1966.

III-G.-PUBLIC STREET LIGHTING

Total number of lamps (Gas and Electric) at the end of the year was 16,987 as against the previous years' 45,304.

ROAD EXCAVATION PERMITS

Opening of roads and footpaths in the City and Suburbs.

During the year 3221 permits were issued for excavation in roads and footpaths.

The work of issuing road Excavation permits in respect of old roads and footpaths has been transferred to respective ward offices with effect from 1st November 1966.

III.—I. IMPROVEMENT OF PRIVATE STREETS

Private Street section was in charge of Dy. City Engineer (Roads). New action under Section 305 and 377 (1-A) of the B. M. C. Act was not taken during the year under report in view of C. R. No. 1297 of 10-1-1963.

The details of actions for the improvement of private streets at three localities in the city reported to be in progress during the last year are given in Appendix No. 6.

Government passages were not taken over for improvement and maintenance during the year under report.

The improvement work of the two private streets shown in appendix No. 7 is in progress. The underground drainage work of both the streets are completed and road surfacing work will be statted after monsoon. Both the streets are improved at the cost of the frontagers without resorting to action under section 305 of the Act.

Action under Section 305 of the Act is proposed to be taken against the frontagers of the two private streets (1) private streets in Tokersey Jivraj Adda and (2) private streets in Sunderjee Liladhar wadi.

Notices under section 305 of the B. M. C. Act were issued against the frontagers of the two private streets (1) private street joining Vithalbhai Patel Road and Kakad wadi and (2) private street off Bhulabhai Desai Road leading to Dhakleshwar temple. But the prosecution for non-compliance of requisition was held up in view of C. R. No. 1297 of 10-1-1963. Improvement work of both the streets was carried out under the provisions of section 489 of the B. M. C. Act and expenses thereof will be recovered from the frontagers.

Improvement of passages in private holding

The work of improvement of passages in private holding was not undertaken during the year under report.

Recoveries in respect of improvement of private streets including deposit sinterests, etc. from the frontagers of the streets for the works carried out in the past and proposed to be carried out amounted to Rs. 13,981.66 during the year under report as against Rs. 45,511.61 during previous year. Recoveries were affected during the last two years as new actions under section 305 and 377 (1-A) of the B. M. C. Act were not started in view of C. R. No. 1297 of 10-1-1963.

No occasion arose to take action under section 494 of the Act for declaring the expenses incurred by the Corporation as improvement expenses.

New references under section 503 of the Act were not filed during the year under report.

Out of fourteen revision applications reported to had been referred back by the High Court to the Small Causes Court, five were dismissed by the Small Causes Court, three were decided in favour of the B. M. C. and four are pending in the Small Causes Court and one reference was rejected by the High Court as shown in the appendix No. 8.

Notices declaring the intention of the Corporation to improve the street at Municipal cost and then treat it as public street, reported to had been put up in respect of two private streets (1) private street around Banganga Tank, Walkeshwar and (2) private steel off Arthur Bunder Road near Strand Cinema Colaba were partially improved. Both these streets will be treated as public after complete improvement.

Private street off Sophia Colleege lane, Bhulabhai Desai Road was declared public under section 306 of the B. M. C. Act with effect from 8-7-1966.

M. C. had approved priority list of 14 private streets in different wards in city limits as shown in Appendix No. 9 Notices declaring the intention of the Corporation to improve these streets at Municipal cost and then treat them as public will be put at site and if the owners of the street do not raise any objection then the streets will be improved at Municipal cost.

IV-MAINTENANCE OF DRAINS AND SEWERS

The work consists of (1) cleansing and maintenance of all under ground sewers and storm water drains and open channels. (2) Making street connections of the drainage system of properties to sewers and storm water drains.

Desilting of main sewers.—A toal lengths of 2523 miles of main sewers was cleaned by dragging scrapers either manually or with the heldp of o.k. champion machine and 28764 tons of silt was removed therefrom.

The total length of pipe sewers cleaned was 411.84 miles, and the total silt removed was 7368,68 tons.

General comments.—Total rain fall as recorded was 57,450 milimeters. Cleansing work was carried out at the Biological installation at Banganga at a total cost of Rs. 5 000. 385 chokes were removed by the mobile ganges. Special gangs were also detailed for prevention of or abuting the flooding nuisance in the city).

V.—PRIVATE BUILDINGS CONSTRUCTIONS (CITY)

Buildings proposals.—1369 Proposals were received during the year. Out of these 581 were under section 337 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. for erection of new buildings and 788 were under section 342 of the said Act for additions and alterations to the existing buildings. The corresponding figures of the proposals under section 337 and 342 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation for the previous year were 724 and 802 respectively.

The number of proposals for non-residential buildings by private enterprise is 109.

Building Collapses.—97 buildings or portions thereof collapsed during the year as against 130 building during the previous year. 68 persons wereinjured and 11 were killed as a result of these collapses. The estimated damage to property was Rs. 3,49,490.

Actions under relevant sections of the Municipal Act.—10372 notices were issued during the year under different section of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. 5871 were complied during the year and 4501 were still pending compliance at the close of the year.

Repairs to Buildings.—During the year 2737 notices under section 354 of the Act were issued against the house owners, out of which 1035 were complied with and 150, were pending at the close of the year.

Removal of unsafe buildings.—298 unsafe buildings or portions were removed departmentally under section 489 of the Act as against 219 removed in the previous year. The following table showns the comparative figures for the two years.

Authorities granted under section 499 of the Act.

Authorities to carry out repairs were granted to tenants under section 499 of the Act in respect of 144 buildings as against 130 buildings during the previous year. 2214 tenants as against 2115 during the previous year took advantage of the same.

Removal of unauthorised works.—Sanction for the removal of unauthorised structures was obtained in Nill cases during the year.

Complaints from the public.—17,841 complaints were received from the public during the year as against 16,652 during the previous year. Out of these 14,396 complaints were looked into and disposed of at the close of the year.

Technical Unit.—During the year special technical officer continued to scrutinise the structural designs (both R.C.C. and R.S.) submitted by Architects or structureal Engineers for the erection of new Buildings and for the additions and alterations in the city of Bombay. He also insected the work of buildings periodically.

He also inspecteed buildings in Bombay in referred to him by other departments, and offered his remakrs as regards structural stability or soundness.

House Numbering.—The work of assigning numbers to the newly constructed properties and fixing number plates was continued. Re-numbering of properties in 'D' and 'E' wards was completed.

VI.—MECHANICAL BRANCH

Municipal Workshop

During the year under review the Municipal Workshop received 3371 fresh Jobs. Total number of Jobs completed during the course of the year was 2872. The total expenditure on the departmental works amounted to Rs. 6,88,080 as against Rs. 7,53,627 in the previous year. The upkeep and overhead charges amounted to Rs. 1,45,603 which works out to 21.16 percent incurred on labour and stores.

This year 100 rectangular dust bins were manufactured in the boiler shop. These bins were prepared by using old asphalt drums. These bins were kept on road side, for collection of refuse. Similarly M-S. handcarts and wheel barrows were fabricated for the use of various Municipal Departments.

In the Carpentry shops.—besides day to day maintenance and repair works, various types of articles were manufactured such as workmen's benches for the transport department, wooden racks for printing press, hand carts for road department, wheel barrows for conservancy branch. The work of 50 Nos. of dunlopillo cushions seat chairs and 8 Nos. of sunmica top dining tables, required by K. E.M. Hospitals was nearly in the final stage of completion. For education department sample furniture articles like sunmica top table, veneer cup-boards, notice-board, book-trolley, book shelf unit, newspaper stand, chairs, etc., were prepared in the Carpentry shop.

In the paint shop various jobs of painting were carried out including painting of transport vehicles handcarts, steel furniture, shopital furniture and wooden boards for schools and hospital, etc.

Municipal Foundry

During the year under report the cupolas and pit furnaces worked regularly.

The rates for the different types of castings were sanctioned by the Municipal Commissioner for the year 1966-67 depending upon the cost of raw materials and labour cost as the foundry is working on Suspense Account basis.

The total output during the year along with the sanctioned rates for the castings amounted to Rs. 2,84,284.37.

Many intricate and special type of castings, ferrous and non-ferrous were manufactured in this year like pump castings, Impellers, nozzles, special impellers for A.E. Head Works Vaitrana and other castings required for all the pumping stations and purification works.

Similarly castings required for H. E.'s department like, O. P. boxes, S. T. large boxes, eccentric couplings bracket, etc. were manufactured, Aluminium Hydraulic couplings were manufactured as required by Road Roller section with other castings.

Special type C. I. frame for Dhapa required by F/N Ward and C. I. gratings for Municipal Power Laundry were also manufactured.

The castings required by the various departments including cast iron circular manholes heavy type (as per new design suggested by the Productivity Council) and other drainage castings were also manufactured in the Municipal Foundry.

The quality and soundness of product was also up to the mark.

The rates compared favourably with those in the local market.

Design Section

This section carried out the work of preparing estimates for all types of Mechanical works of this department. This section prepares drawings, blue prints, specifications for machinery, furniture and other

mechanical equipments for various departments, invites tenders and sealed quotations for all types of mechanical jobs. The following important items were carried out during the year under report:

- (1) Specifications, estimates and drawings, etc. of furniture for the Municipal Primary Schools.
- (2) Specifications, estimate, etc. for the furniture of secondary school libraries.
 (3) Estimate for fixing additional pump 10 M. G. D. for Matunga Pumping Station. (4) Design and drawings of additional 2 furnaces for chandawadi Electrical Crematorium.

(5) Removal of the ventshaft at Balaram Street Corner.

(6) Estimates and drawings for the chimneys at K.E.M. Hospital, Kasturba Hospital and Municipal Foundry at workshops.

(7) Renewal of rollers and repairs to clevland Bunder Flood gates.

(8) Fixing R. S. Joints for screening house of pumping station No. 2 at L. G. P. Station.

(9) Fifixing of new plate to the statue of Sir Phirozsha Mehta at Boribunder.

(10) Repairs to Blowers and doing the foundations, etc., of Rat incinerator at Haffkine Institute.

This year 20 tenders including sealed quotations were invited. This section submitted 148 estimates amounting to Rs. 35,5590. This year about 1054 outdoor Mechanical jobs were carried out at a total cost of Rs. 3,30,728/—110 new drawings were prepared 25 Nos. retracings were done and 150 sketches were drawn. 1150 Nos. of blue prints of various drawings were prepared. 40 Nos. ferro paper rolls were used for taking out blue prints.

Electric Section

The Electrical Section was decentralised on 6-1-1966 and since then this section has to look after the works of maintainance of.
(1) Pumping and Compressor Stations in the City.

(2) Purification Plants.

- (3) Hospitals and Medical Colleges.
 (4) Chandanwadi Crematorium.
 (5) A. C. Cold Storage.
 (6) Asphalt Plant.
 (7) Science Pool

- (7) Swimming Pool.

All repairs and jobs of electrical machinery for all the above departments are also attended to by this section.

This section also attends to repairs of air conditioning machinary, refrigeraters, water coolers and cold mortuaries at hospitals.

The electrical section during the year under review has attended to 620 indoor as well as out door jobs amounting to Rs. 2,20,575 Major jobs were at L. T. M. G. Hsopital Sion, G. S. Medical College, Kasturba. Hospital, Nair Hospital and Open Air Theater at Victoria Garden.

77 Estimates were submitted for various departmental works amounting to Rs. 4,47,344.00

The electrical section also attends to works with B. E. S. T. and filling in the prescribed requisition forms for the required electric load and obtaining Govt. sanction for the same and regularising the electrical installations with P.W.D. through B.E.S. & T. as required under Indian Electricity Act.

This section also attends to the lifts and their repairs keeping the appointments with Lift Inspectors P.W.D. and follows up the works recommended by the Inspector of Lifts during the periodical inspections and as per requirements of the Indian Lift Act.

Recently the Plant and Machinary section from revenue budget grants is transferred to this section.

The proposal for one additional Crematorium Furnance at Chandanwadi and one at Shivaji Park has been sanctioned by the Corporation at the total of Rs. 4,12,900 exclusive of taxes and the tencers for the Civil work will be received shortly.

SEWAGE PURIFICATION PLANTS

Love Grove Sewage Pumping and Treatment Plant

Pumping station: (1)Old Pump House The two vertical sulzer pumps as well as one vickers sill pump were operated during the year.

The two vertical sulzer pumps were in operation for 5325.00 hours and one vickers gill pump for 2208.15 hours during the alministrative year. The other vickers gill pump is cut of commission for replacement of shrounding for which order has been placed with a local contractor and the work is in progress.

The old pump house pumped out 9744.62 M.Gallons of Sewage directly to sea 83160 ouft. of silt and 3600 cft. of screenings were removed from the sewage.

(2) New Pump house: All the four pumps were working satisfactorily. They have actually worked a total of 13605 hours and 15 minutes discharging in all 26393.75 M. gallons of sewage, Prior to pumping 3384 cft, of screenings were removed from the sewage.

Sufficiently low levels of sewage were maintained curing the night time in the fair season to facilitate the work of cleaning main sewers.

(3) Detrious Plants: The work of providing and erecting electrically operated medium screens penstocks etc. was completed and the plant put into commission from the second week of September 1966. Durin; this period 5790 cft. of screenings and 7200 cft. of silt were removed.

(4) Purification Plant: The Plant was put in to commission in the second week of Septemb 11966 after completion the work of the Detritus plant, since then the Plant worked satisfactorily:—

(5) Flood-gates. The flood gates at Clevland bunder, L. G. P. and Dharavi were in proper working order.

Dadar Sewage Purification Works

The Dadar Purficiation works was under the supervision of E. E. Mech. It was brought under the administrative control of E. E. Mech (North & Project) at the fag end of the year.

General: Sewage Purification works at Dadar functioned satisfactorily through out the year. The total quantity of sewage received for treatemnt at the Plant during the year was 6317.76 Million Gallons, with an average of 17,30 M.G. per day as against 7638.20 M. G. with an average of 22,90 M.G. per day during the year 1965-66. Out of the 17,30 M.G. sewage flow received per day for treatment 5.5 m.g. per day Sewage flow received secondary treatment and the remaining 12,80 m.g. per day Sewage flow received only the primary treatment.

Sewage Pumping Station Dadar: During the current year, the sewage pg. Station, Dadar, located within 110 n ice of the plant pumped 1711.76 M. G. Sewage as against 2366,33 M. G. pumped during 1965-66.

Enclosed Forced Draft Filters: (a) Filter No. 1-1.50 M.G.D. Capacity.

The filter worked very satisfactorily, adopting recirculation of the effluent back to the filter ((Recirculation Ratio 1:1) worked satisfactorily. The B.O.D. of the effluent, turned out, remained below 20 p.p.m. Thereafter, the quantity of the effluent started deteriorating due to the frequent ponding of the filter media. Attempts were made to remove the ponding by resting, loosening & chlorinating the media. These methods no doubt tempororily improved the condition. But now the frequency and the exten of the ponding has increased so much that it is now decided to overhaul and replace the worned out media with new filtering media of increased size. The present media seems to have disintegrated and it causes the ponding of the media.

The resulting deterioration of the quality of the effluent turned out has practically held up our contemplated studies of working of the pilot, Tertiary Treatment Plant.

(b) Filters Nos. 2 & 3:2 m.g.d. capacity each.

These filter worked fairly well and turned out effluent having 40-60 p. p. m. B. Q. D.

Sludge Digestion Tanks 2 Nos. each having capacity 1,60,000 Cft.

(A)Dig. Tank No. 1. The digestion Tank worked satisfactorily through out the year. The resulting digested sludge was free from odour and was dried on open sludge drying beds without causing nuisance. During the year 48,350,000 Cft. gas was generated as by product.

The Digestion tank No. 2 worked satisfactorily till 15th November 1966, since when it was emptied for the replacement of its wornout. M.S. Floating Roof. Till 15th November 1966, the tank generated 29,126,700 Cft. Gas.

As the Digestion Tank No. 2 had to be emptied for replacement if its M. S. Floating Roof, the entire sludge was thickned and pumped to the Dig. Tank No. 1. Prior to 15th Nov. 66, about 50,000 gls. of sludge, was pumped to the Dig. Tank No. 1 per day. But since 16th Nov. 66 the rate of the sludge addition to the Dig Tank No. 1 was stepped up to 66,000 gls. per day. Based on earlier laboratory studies carried out on this type of high rate digestion, the load on Dig. Tank No. 1 was slowly stepped up even before commencement of emptying of the D. Tank No. 2. Since 16th Nov. 66 it became possible to digest the entire sludge in the Dig. Tank No. 1 satisfactorily. No doubt to the increased concentration of the sludge frequentchoking of the digested sludge pipe required attention. We have no doubt found a satisfactory solution of sludge digestion during the repairs to the Dig. Tank No. 2. The Dig. Tank capacity provided during this period was less than 0.4 cft. per capita, as against about 1.5 cft. capacity provided per capita. In view of the frequent choking of sludge pipes encountered, it is felt that not less than 0.8 cft. per capita capacity need be provided for sludge digestion. During this period, the gas generation per cu. ft. of Dig. Tank capacity increased from 0.66 cu. ft. per day to about 1.2 cft. per day. The sludge gas generation per million gallons of sewage during the period was minimum 12,260 cft. against 11,410 cft. per m. g. generated earlier.

Sludge Gas: Digestion tanks Nos, 1 and 2 generated 7,74,77,000 Gu. ft. of sludge gas as against 8,72,65,60 Cu. ft. of sludge gas in 1965-66. The revenue realised from the scale of sludge gas to (1) Hospitals, (2) Municipal Staff (3) Private Parties, (4) D.P.W. Laboratory during the year under report amounted to Rs. 2,21,504 as against Rs. 2,27,602 during 1965-66.

As regards the work IIIrd digestion tanks which was started on 16-11-1963 by the Contractor is:

Dried Digested Sludge Manure: During the current year, 520 Brass dried digested sludge wasremoved by the contractors. Since 1-10-1966, the Maharashtra State Farming Corporation have undertaken the contract for the removal of the manure. The total revenue realised by the sale of the manure amounted to Rs. 5295 as against Rs. 7707 realised during 1965-66. The reduction of quantity of sludge sold was partly slue to our emptying digestion tank No. 2 for repairs since 15th Nov. 1966.

Laboratory: During the current year preliminary work of Pilot Tertiary Treatment Plant studies was carriedout by the Laboratory. Similarly the laboratory examined the samples of different units of Dadar Plant

Dharavi Purification Plant

The Dharavi Purification Plant which was under the supervision of E. E. Mech. It was brought under the administrative control of E. E. Mech (North & Project) at the fagend of the year.

Sewage Treatment Plant (General: This plant worked normally through out the year. The gas supply was regular except in the month of July, August and December 1966. The gas supply was stopped to the private gas consumers, and Sion Hospital during the month of July 1966 due to drop in Cas generation.

- (1) Screening Mechanism: In addition to existing old course Screen one New Screen was put into commission. The working of the same is under observation.
- (2) Sewage Pumps: All the three Pumps of 5 m.g.d. and 3 pumps of 10 m.g.d. worked satisfactorily throughout the year without a major breakdown.
- (3) Detritus Unit: The new unit worked satisfactorily throughout the year. The old one was out of commission for a part of the year for major repairs.
- (4) Primary Settelement Tank: Unit was required to be kept idle for major overhaul during major portion of the year. During the period secondary clarifier was used as primary clarifier.
- (5) Fillers: This unit worked satisfactorily. Unit was kept working till the period the primary clarifier was in commission. Filters were forced to be kept idle due to major overhaul and repairs to primary clarifier units for part of the period.
- (6) Final Settlement Tank: On completing the repairing work and replacing M. S. Rails & Sludge collecting Boxes, in the month of June, this unit was put into commission and thereafter it is working O. K.
- (7) Digestion Tank and Gas Holder: All the screw pumps, installed on the Digestion tank were over hauled completely. This unit worked satisfactorily during the year.
 - (8) Sludge Pump: This Unit was fromed working satisfactorily
 - (9) Drying Beds: Performance was satisfactory throughout the year.
- (10) Gas Generation and Consumption: The daily average gas generation was 40,000 c. ft./ day in fair season. Total gas supplied during the year was 5077000 cu. ft. The revenue from this gas was Rs. 24,000 approximately.

Colaba Purification Plant: The Plant Comprises of:

- (a) Colaba Air Compressor station and ejectors in the southern part of Bombay.
- (b) Afghan Church Pumping Station.
- (c) Colaba Purification Plant.
- (a) Both the compressors and the seven ejectors worked satisfactorily.
- (b) & (c) Colaba Purification plant and pumping station:

The complete over huling work of final settlement tanks No. 1 & 2, Aeration Row No. 2 and Primary settlement tank No. 1 was carried out.

The cement concrete bottom surface floor of the final settlement tank No. 1 had been completely deteriorated. Repairs to the same were carried out by Ward Office Staff.

Painting of iron and steel material is undertaken at least thrice in a year as there is a lot of corrosion due to vicinity of sea as well as presence of H₂, S. in the surroundings.

Three 6" sluice valves were provided on the discharge activated sludge pipe lines of the final settlement tank, but the results were not appreciable.

The work of providing sluice valves for the other final settlement tank is in progress,

Sewage Pumping and Compressor Stations

In prusuance of our policy of replacing the obsolete ejectors by modern pumping stations, three new pumping stations were constructed at Chinchpokli, Harvey Road and Nepean-Sea Road, each having and installed capacity of 13 M. G.D. 4 M. G.D. and 8 M. G.D. respectively. With the commissioning of these three new pumping stations, the ejectors at Chinchpokli, Harvey Road and Nepean-Sea Road were rendered idle. The air compressor station at Bhulabhai Desai Road was also put out of commission because all the ejectors motivated by this air compressor station were rendered idle with the starting of new pumping stations at Harvey Road and Nepean-Sea road. All machinery housed in the air compressor station at Bhulabhai Desai Road was removed and shifted to the stores at Matunga, and the empty premises were handed over the W.O. "D" Ward.

MUNICIPAL POWER LAUNDRY

The work of installation of machinery, etc. involved in the 1st stage and nd stage was completed during the year under report. Work order for the supply and installation of a new Boiler of higher capacity was placed with the Contractor Messrs. Greaves Cotton and Company, Limited and the work will be taken in hand soon.

The Municipal power Laundry had rendered washing service to the following institutions of the Corporation.

The rate of washing was fixed at Rs. 25 per 100 pieces of linen. The total No. of linen pieces washed during the year under report was 26,23,700.

VII.—TRANSPORT BRANCH

The main function of this branch is to maintain and operate the vehicles for various Municipal Departments for rendering several obligatory and discretionary civic services. By and large this function has been carried out satisfactorily by the department.

The department has a fleet consisting of the vehicles of various types and makes. Majority of the vehicles have crossed their useful life and the parts thereof are also not readily available. This therefore occasionally hampered the smooth working. As the maintenance of the fleet with various types and makes was' not found to be suitable, it was decided to standardize the fleet in order to do away with the different types and makes of vehicles which were creating lot of difficulties in the maintenance of the fleet. With this view in mind, the tenders for the purchase of 300 Nos. of vehicles were invited last year and are underway.

The department provided crane vehicles at the disposal of the Traffic Department for lifting the vehicles found discarded for causing obstructions to traffic on busy streets roads.

During the year, the re-organization of Transport Stores was undertaken with a view to rationalizing the purchase and issue of transport stores and bringing down the maintenance and operational cost of the fleet. The complete inventory of stores on hand is being taken. Other steps such as appointment of special staff for stores, rearrangement of materials, etc., are being taken simultaneously.

City Fleet.—At the beginning of the year, the City fleet consisting of 335 vehicles and 402 trailers. As many vehicles had outlived their useful life and had become unserviceable 8 of them were sold by auction or inviting quotations. 23 self-propelled vehicles were added as 22 were donated by different organizations and I was purchased.

The vehicles are garaged as under:--

For infectious diseases Ambulances and Hearses, V. I. P. Cars, School Clinicbuses, etc.

For meat vans, offals and other vehicles.

Servicing and battery charging of all Municipal vehicles was carried out at the Municipal Transport Workshops at Foras Road. The expenses of the department are met from the Suspense Account and the same are reimbursed by preferring the bills against the department utilizing the vehicles.

VIII.—FACTORY SECTION

During the year under report 803 new permits were prepared and 1155 temporary permits were renewed and issued. Under Section 390 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, 1511 prosecutions were launched against the owners of the factories for running the same without permits and the amount of Rs. 50,253. was recovered as fine. In all 478 complaints were received and the same were investigated and action taken wherever necessary. Total revenue collected was Rs. 2,92,337.

IX.—COMMON HOUSE GULLIES

As previously reported under the Administration Report for the year 1965-66, the work of improvement of Common House Gullies was pursued vigourously in B, C, D and E wards. Some of the Common House Gullies in other Wards where conditions were far from satisfactory were also tackled. Improvement thus carried out has definitely gone a long way in inducing better sanitation and removing the cause of mechanical transmission of gastro intestinal diseases. This work of improving the Common House Gullieshas been undertaken under Section 63(k) of the B. M. C. Act at the Municipal cost and as such only long common house gullies on which a number of properties depend for their drainage arrangement, are tackled under the programme. Hither to, notice action taken under Section 257(1)(a) of the B. M.C. Act had not yielded any fruitful results since stray improvement done by the isolated landlords did not help to improve the general conditions as is being noticed under the programme.

During the year under report, 38,969 Rft. of common house gullies have been improved at a total cost of Rs. 7,89,297.19 as against the anticipated length of 35,650 Rft. at a cost of Rs. 12,93,885. Details of work Ward by Ward are given below:—

The excess length over the anticipated length of 35,650 Rft, resulted on account of the inclusion of certain gullies not originally included in the programe at the instance of local Councillors as well as the Ward staff who have appreciated this sort of improvement.

Incidentally, the question of tacking short common house gullies under the programme was discussed It was brought out that extending this programme to the short house gullies would virtually amount to an encouragement to the laxity, lethargy and negligence of the landlords to discharge their legitimate duties an also the financial commitment would run into several lakhs of rupees. It was therefore decided that in case of short house gullies the Wards should take action under Section 257(1)(a) of the B. M. C. Act and in case of landlords failure to carry out the works of improvement, the same should be got done by the Municipality at the risk and cost of the landlords by appointing contractors for doing the works. This course of action will be kept under observation and a report made next year.

X-CONSERVANCY BRANCH

Refuse Collection, Removal and Disposal

Roads, footpaths and house gullies were sewpt twice daily. Roads were brushed and scraped wherever necessary. Refuse collected was removed by engaging stationery as well as mobile traction to the place of disposal daily. Refuse taken to the Mahalaxmi Refuse siding was transported to Deonar daily by two refuse trains. A part of refuse from the City was sent to Dharavi Pumping Ground for filling in Low Lying Land. Total collection of the refuse during the year was about 6,38,750 tons out of which 5,48,489 tons was household refuse, 90261 tons was trade refuse and the remaining was collection from the markets.

Transport (Refuse Fleet)

The working strength of the refuse fleet consists of 244 vehicles of different types as detailed below:-

As this fleet was not sufficient uring the year under report, to cope up with the removal of daily output of refuse, extra vehicles from Maharashtra State Road Transport Corporation and also private agency had to be hired for removal of refuse.

The refuse vehicles worked in two shifts from 6-30 A.M. to 2-00 P.M., 2-00 P.M. to 10-00 A.M. on average 1750 tons of refuse was daily collected and removed.

Collection, Removal and Disposal of Night Soil

Basket privies, cesspools and septic tanks were attended to by the Halakhore Staff. In the City there are only 1,153 privy seats, steps are being taken to connect all the Cesspools to drains so as to bring the number of Cesspools to the minimum. Night soil from the privies and vacant places was removed and disposed of regularly. 5 Cesspool lorries were employed to cope up with the work of cleansing of basket privies and cesspools. In the City, public sanitary conveniences are provided at different suitable places which were also attended to and maintained clean regularly.

Dog Licensing Desctruction and Immunization work

With a view to minimising the number of stray dogs and reducing the incident of Hydraphobia and Rabies, the work of licensing dogs, destroying and immunization of dogs was carried out. During the year 8460 Licences were issued and 31,004 stray dogs were destroyed. Total revenue of Rs. 55,172.45 was collected on account of dog licensing work. Anti-Rabic Treatment was available at the Haffkine Institute, K. E. M. Hospital and other Government Hospitals.

Removal and Disposal of Dead Animals

Dead animals from the City were removed to Deonar. 464 big animals and 4,493 small animals were removed to the Mahalaxmi Sidings from which Rs. 17,152,64 were realised.

Eradication of Nuisances.—Actions under Section 115 of the Bombay Police Act were taken to eradicate nuisance caused by throwing of refuse in the streets, gullies and public places. fouling of public roads by urinating and defecting.

Veterinary Services.—The veterinary section of this Branch was in charge of the Hospital of Infectious Diseases of animals at Mahalaxmi Sidings. Animals from private owners were also admitted in these Hospitals on payment of fixed fees. Immunization of pet dogs was also carried out at different Anti Rabic Centres and 376 dogs were immunized.

Private stables were visted for detecting infections of of Rinderpest. Milch Cattle arriving in the City were immunized against Rinder-pest. The total number of animals immunized was 45,599. No cases of Rinderpest were detected during the year.

Conservancy and Special Halalkhore Services.—These services were rendered to Circuses, Exhibtions Big Concerns Industrial Establishments, tc. onpayment of Scheduled charges and an amount of Rs. 3,78,044.08 was collected on this account. Besides this, a sum of Rs. 1,05,867 was received from the Government for the services rendered for cleaning Govt, Foreshores.

Sweepers' Chawls.—The labour Chawls in charge of Conservancy Branch were regularly inspected and promt action taken for rectifying sanitary as also structural defects noticed. Out of 7000 employees about 50 per cent. staff have been provided with housing accommodation.

Comperative Credit Societies for the Labour Staff.—There are in all 12 Co-operative Credit Societies with an aggregate membership of 5364 members for the benefit of the Labour employees of this branch. The Share capital subscribed is Rs. 31, 15,010.00 The working of the Co-operative Credit Societies is satisfactory.

Removal and Disposal of Town Refuse at Deonar

About one thousand acres of land spread over about four portion of deep creek at Deonar is taken over on lease from the Government by the Corporation to face the problem of disposal of City refuse as well as to reclaim the low laying Creek level in the Khajans at Deonar.

The area is considerably large and the site being useful for reclaiming the land by City refuse may last for about 55 years. The major portion of city refuse is generally collected at Mahalaxmi siding and transported from there to Doenar reclaimed ground for disposal by two trains daily each containing of about 37 refuse loaded wagaons having an average capacity of each wagaon about 17 tons and the rest is dumped at Dharavi dumping ground.

As the No. of wagons are in sufficient to deal with the huge quantity of City refuse 61 wagaons are take on hire from Western Railway. To minimise the charges required to be paid for this hire it is proposed to purchase 100 Nos. of serviceable wagons from Central Railway. The hire charges per day for each wagon are Rs. 4.50 P. The cost of maintenance of siding at Mahalaxmi and chembur was Rs. 25,485.

The length of mainline and loop siding was 6700 Rft. The length of temporary siding varied from time to time in order to extend the scope of refuse dumping operations by extending tracks. The materials *i. e.*, sleepers, Bolts and nuts, w. i. spikes, key wooden, etc., were purchased to the extend of Rs. 24,000.00.

No additional land was reclaimed during the year under report, only depressions caused due to heavy down pour and tidal water in the creck and fires in the reclaimed land were reclaimed.

Total in-come derived from various sources i.e. (i) sale of ringt of fishing in the Khajans (2) Cultivation, (3) ground rent of lease, recl simed land, etc. was amounting to Rs. 80,516.00.

There were many incidents of major fire at refuse siding at Deonar, during the year and 5 major incident of Cerailmentof wagons, but during all these incidents the work of hauling and unloading refuse was not hampered. The damage caused to the municipal property was negligible.

The amenities e.q. primary education, home, welfare centre, etc. provided in the municipal labour camp are continued.

XI.-DEVELOPMENT BRANCH

In the year under reference, the Special Consulting Surveyor appointed by the State Government scrutinised the Development Plans of K. HP, M. & L. Wards for the Suburban areas and all wards of the City proper along with Development Control Rules and the Development Plan of Greater Bombay along with Development Control Rules with various modifications was finally sanctioned by the State Government on 7-1-1967. The implementation of the sanctioned Development Plan was proceded with and the Development Control Rules were got printed and circulated. Copies of the Development Plan for various wards in City and Suburbs are being prepared for purpose of printing them for circulation and sale among the members of the public.

Acquisition of lands (Within City Limits)

Possession of 6 properties was obtained, through Acquisition proceedings and proceedings in respect of 40 properties are in progress. Awards were made by the Special Land Acquisition Officer in respect of 3 properties and in 60 set-back cases land values were fixed for payment of compensation of land acquired for widening of various roads and lanes.

Acquisition of lands (Within Suburban Area Eastern and Western).

Possession of 6 properties was obtained through Acqusition proceedings and proceedins in respect of 55 properties are in progress. Awards were made by the Special Land Acqusition Officer in respect of 5 properties and in 332 set-back cases, land values were fixed for payment of compensation at land acquired for widening of various roads and lanes.

XII.—TOWN PLANNING SCHEMES

Town Planning Scheme for the Bombay City No. 1 (Mandvi and Elphinstone Estate)

The scheme has come into force from 1-12-1957. The work of its implementation was immediately started. No progress could be made during the year under report, due to difficulties in providing alternative accommodation to the persons affected by the implementation of the scheme. However physical possession of 27 plots falling within the public sites of the scheme has been taken so far and further steps to take over remaining plots are in progress.

Contribution amounting to Rs. 14,271.09 was collected from the plot owners during the year under reference, and the total expenditure booked for the scheme work so far is Rs. 22,17,168.55.

T. P. Sch. No. II (Mahim Area).

The implementation Notice work of the Scheme is already completed excepting for a small portion of road and the passage, all the proposed roads in the Scheme are constructed. As soon as alternate accommodations will be available, the work of the aforesaid incomplete portions of the road and the passage will be carried out.

As regards the development of the 10 F. Psallotted to the Corporation for different public purposes two plots reserved for Garden have already developed and the development of 3 F. Ps is to be done on priority basis as per the programme drawn up for the purpose. The development works of these three plots will commence prior to 1-12-1968 as tentatively fixed in the programme.

An amount of Rs. 3,02,533.96 has been recovered from the different owners in the Scheme by way of their shares of Contributions till 31st March 1967.

The properties in respect of which the Compensations are paid up, have been duly taken in Municipal possession. They will be managed till such time, the encumbrances thereon are cleared by providing alternate accommodations and these sites will be made available for the purpose for which they are earmarked in the final Scheme.

T.P. Scheme No. III (Mahim Area).

Most of the work of constructing proposed roads in A & B Parts of the Scheme has been completed, excepting those portions of roads which are heavily encumbered and which cannot be cleared for want of sufficient alternate accommodations for the bona-fide tenants occupying the affected sites. As soon as the newly constructed Municipal tenements near Jasmine Mills are made available for providing alternate accommodations to the affected tenants, it will be possible to offer some of them to the tenants affected due to widening of Mori Road. However the affected sites at Mori Road could not be cleared for want of alternate accommodations for shops. The work of constructing the centralised Ward Office Building on F. P. No. 20 has been completed upto the 1st floor level and the Municipal offices have been also shifted to the new Bldg. The work of constructing the portion of Manmala Tank Road leading to Lady Hardinge Road was also completed by pursuing the matter with the State Govt. for the removal of the compound wall of the David Sasoon Reformatory.

The work of constructing the roads in part 'C' of the Scheme was also taken in hand by selecting such portions of the proposed roads which were not heavily encumbered. As soon as sufficient tenements at Dharaviare available, the work of constructing the remaining roads in this part will be taken in thand in the next fair season by offering alternate residential accommodations to the affected tenants.

In the 'D' part of the Scheme which is mostly a low-lying land and encumbered with hutments, the work of laying underground drainage services has been completed and the development of this part of the Scheme will be gradually done in the next fair season, depending upon the removal of the hutments.

As regards the development of the 25 G. Ps allotted to the Corporation for different public purposes. 4 F. Psare fully developed and one is partly developed and the development of 7 F. Ps is to be done on priority basis as per the programme drawn up for the purpose. The development works of these plots will commence prior to 1st December 1968 as tentatively fixed in the programme.

An amount of Rs. 16,42,396.40 has been recovered from the different owners in the sacheme by way of their share of contribution till 31st March 1967.

The properties in respect of which the compensations are paid up, have been taken in Municipal possession. They will be managed till such time the encumbrances thereon are cleared by providing a alternate accommodations and the sites will be made available for the purpose for which they are earmarked in the Final Scheme.

T. P. Scheme No. IV.

The Scheme being largest in area, smong the three schemes, has been split up into three parts viz. AB & C Part B has been further split up into two parts B, & B2. Most of the works of laying underground services in part A, B & C have been completed. Most of the roads also in these parts have been constructed bearing only such portions which are heavily encumbered.

In part B2 the sites affected due to proposed road are congested with residential tenements and hutments and efforts are being made for the provision of sufficient alternate accommodations. In the next fair season it is proposed, on top priority basis to clear new Prabhadevi Road, joining Gokhale Road (South) and Swatantrya Veer Savarkar Marg (Cadell Road) and the proposed 40' Road between Sayani Road & New Prabhadevi Road.

As regards the development of 40 F. Ps allotted to the Corporation for different public purposes, the development of 5 F. Ps is to be done on priority basis as per the programme drawn up for the purpose. The development works of these plots will commence prior to 1st December 1968 as tentatively fixed in the programme.

An amount of Rs. 4,94,753.59 has been recovered from the different owners in the Scheme by way of their shares of contributions till 31st March 1967.

The properties in respect of which compensations are paid up, have been taken in Municipal possession. They will be managed till such time the encumbrances thereon are cleared by providing alternate accommodations and the sites will be made available for the purpose for which they are earmarked in the Final Scheme.

The Corporation have declared their intention to vary this Scheme and the work in respect of the same is entrusted to Executive Engineer, (Development Plans). As desired by the Corporation, the question of acquiring vacant plots within the area of the three T.P. Schemes is being examined and the advice of the State Government on the issue is being obtained. These plots are intended to be acquired for constructing Municipal Hsg. for providing alternative accommodation to persons dishoused due to implementations of Schemes works.

(B) Road Construction Branch (Suburbs)

This branch is in charge of the works of (i) preparing plans and estimates of Resurfacing of existing roads, construction of new roads, widening of roads and improving private streets and construction of storm water drains coming within the road way (ii) invitation of tenders and awarding contracts of road and storm water drains works. (iii) Supervision of road and storm water drains works.

During the year this branch has completed the work of construction of new roads, widenting of the exsting roads with footpaths and storm water drains etc. as shown in the appendix Nos. 12 and 13.

At present the works shown in the accompanying appendix Nos. 14 and 15 were in progress.

The total expenditure of Rs. 1,05,13,503 was incurred during the year 1966-67.

(C) Upkeep, Maintenance and Repairs to Municipal Properties

Buildings

An amount of Rs. 5,87,423 was spent during the year on normal repairs and monsoon works on 497 Municipal Buildings in the Suburbs whereas an amount of Rs. 1,99,815 was spent on 158 Buildings in the Extended Suburbs. The repairs works were carried out either departmentally or through the Petty Works contractors. The expenditure on special repairs was Rs. 5,86,932 on works carried out departmentally and Rs. 1,89,569 on the works carried out by petty works contractors in the Suburbs. The expenditure on special repairs works carried out departmentally and through petty works contractors in Extended Suburbs arrived at Rs. 1,13,927 and Rs. 16,212 respectively.

Normal maintenance of Asphalt roads was carried out during the year at a total cost of Rs. 32,60,263 in the Suburbs including cost of reinstatement of trenches opened by various departments and public utility concerns, and at a total cost of Rs. 8,96,630 in the Extended Suburbs.

- (2) Foot paths: 3 miles of foot-paths were constructed during the year in the Suburbs and 9 miles of foot-paths were constructed in the Extended Suburbs.
- (3) Street Name Boards: An amount of Rs. 30,837 was spent on fixing new street boards and repairs to the existing ones in the Suburbs as against Rs. 14,200 spent in the Extended Suburbs.

SEWERS AND DRAINS

The works of cleansing pipe sewers, ovoid sewer, storm water drains, and open drains was attended to and the total silt removed from the Suburbs during the year was 4,80,479 cft. as against 7,75,465 cft. removed in the Extended Suburbs. The work of paving of the following katcha drains was done during the year in L & M Wards—

Ferry Service

Service between Versova & Madh

K Ward: A royalty of Rs. 4,000 was received for the Ferry Service between Versova and Madh. The service was operated through private contractors.

P Ward: Service between Marve and Manori and (2) Borivali and Gorai.

The Ferry service in respect of the above continued to be operated through private contractors. The total receipt during the year amounted to Rs. 6,001.

STREET LIGHTING

The number of street lights maintained in the Suburbs was 9,821 during the year and 3,329 in the Extended Suburbs and the expenditure incurred was Rs. 11,85,262 in the Suburbs as against the total expenditure of Rs. 3,11,869 in the extended Suburbs.



(iv) Unauthorised structures.—During the year no sanction for the removal of unauthorised structures was obtained in the Suburbs as against 1106 cases in Extended Suburbs. In addition 2339 cases of the previous year were pending disposal in the Suburbs as against 486 in the Extended Suburbs., Unauthorised works in 513 cases in the Suburbs and 396 cases in the extended Suburbs were removed by the parties themselves while in 1921 cases in the Suburbs and 217 cases in the Extended Suburbs, the works were removed departmentally either under the Standing Committee's sanction or under the provision of section 352A of the Act.

Complaint from the Public.—The number of complaints received from the public in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs was 4387 and 3272 respectively. The same were investigated and remedial measures were taken whenever necessary. Action in cases 2261 in the Suburbs and 2667 cases in the Extended Suburbs was in progress.

Notices Issued.—The number of notices issued under different relevant section of the B.M.C. Act in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs was 3152 and 2818 respectively. Prosecutions were launched against the house-owners for non-compliance.

Building Collapses.—The number of buildings or portions thereof collapsed during the year in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs was 9 and 2 respectively, and the number of persons killed and injured was nil and 13 in the suburbs and one and nil in Extended Suburbs.

Set-back lands added to public roads.—The total area of set-back land added to the public roads in the Suburbs during the year was 44761.59 sq. yds. as against 77224.50 sq. yds. in the Extended Suburbs and the Compensation claims settled during the year were Rs. 3,89,865 and Rs. 24,849 respectively.

House Numbering.—The work of fixing Aluminium House Number plates was started and the same is in progress in N & T Wards.

Town Planning Scheme in Suburbs in N & T Wards.

Town Planning Scheme No. I (Varied) final-Ghatkopar

This varied final scheme came into effect from 1st January 1962. The imolementation work is nearly completed. The work of recovering contribution charges from and paying compensation to the owners of the reconstituted plots is in progress.

Town Planning Scheme No. III-(Ghatkopar)

This scheme came into effect from 1st April 1959. Construction of Roads is in progress. Due to acute shortage of alternate accommodation, structures coming on roads and reservation plots could not be removed. Hence the speed of implementation work was checked.

G.—SUBVENTION SCHEMES

(1) In all 120 notices under section 231 were served and for 32 cases parties submitted their proposals and in 24 cases house owners have carried out the work in compliance the with notices served on them.

In all 45 notices under section 248(i)(c) of the B.M.C. Act for conversion of basket privies into water closets on full flushing system were served on the house owners. In 61 cases privies converted into water closet on full flushing system. The total amount of subsidy paid during the year was Rs. 20,150.

- (2) The Corporation under their resolution No.2102 dated the 17th March 1958 and No. 858 dated the 17th November 1958 approved of granting subsidy of Rs. 200 per acqua privy seat and also similar subsidy for commodes being converted into W. C. on full flushing system on the basis of Basket privies.
- (3) Similarly the owners from Suburban Areas have also been allowed to daw subsidy of Rs. 50 each per W.C. seat of the premises having septic tanks for disconnecting the flow of waste water from septic tanks and connecting the same to the Municipal Sewer as per Corporation Resolution No. 794 dated the 24th October 1958.

H.-MECHANICAL BRANCH (North and Project)

Mechanical Branch (North & Project).—At the fag-end of the year the mechanical department was reorganized and the additional post of Executive Engineer Mechanical (North & Project) was created under whose administrative control all the works of Mechanical and Electrical installation in suburbs and two Purification Plants viz. Dadar & Dharavi were brought, which were hitherto looked after under the supervision of Executive Engineer Mechanical.

(1) Sewage Pumping and Purification Plants in suburbs.—There are in all eitht Pumping stations and three Purification Plants in Suburbs. Appendix No. 16. In general sewage Pumping stations worked quite satisfactorily.

- (2) Purification Plants.—There are three Purification Plants in suburbs each having treatment capacity of 2 MGD. All these Purification Plants except during major break downs worke satisfactorily. During the year, 161, Brass of Manure of approximate cost of Rs. 1610 was produced and sold. November 1966 on wards, the Sludge Manure is being sold to Maharashtra State Farming Corporation.
- (3) Augmentation of capacities at Sewage Pumping Station.—The works of augmenting the Pumping station capacity by 4 MGD. & 3 MGD at Kurla and Jaibharat Pumping Station respectively are in progress.
- (4) Use of Sewage Effluent for cultivation.—During the year under report 114 M. Gallon of Sewage was given to Messrs. Modern Gultivator for cultivations purposes at Deonar.
- (5) Maintenance of Electrical instal ation in Suburbs.—On reorganisation of the electrical Department, necessary staff consisting of a Unit of Overseer, electrician, Wiremen, and Labours is kept at the disposal of each ward office in subs. and Extended Suburbs for the work of maintenance of electrical installation in the respective juridiction of the Ward, the working of which is under observation.

The work of maintenance of electrical installation and rewiring work of the Municipal properties in suburbs and extended suburbs were carried out through the above mentioned staff at a cost of Rs. 1,14,907.42.

(6) Road Roller Section.—There are 23 Road Rollers for the entire area of suburbs and extended suburbs out of which 8 are steam Rollers and remaining 15 are of Diesel Rollers.

All the Road Rollers were in working order except for the period of repairs and Survey of Boiler inspect-

(7) Mechanical Repairs.—Out door mechanical repairs at various institutions, Hospitals, Markets, and gardens in Suburbs and extended suburbs were carried out. The repairs works generally consisted of repairs to collapsible Gates, Rolling shutters, Iron Gates, Tar Boillers, Water tanks and such other minor mechanical jobs costing Rs. 17,141.00 approximately.

I.—TRANSPORT SECTION (Suburbs and Extended Suburbs)

The Suburban Transport Section is in charge of the Assistant Engineer Transport (Subs.) and is responsible for the repairs and maintenance of Refuse, Cesspool and other Water Works vehicles for the Suburban-Municipal Departments and Master Plan vehicles.

Repairs to all these vehicles are carried out in Municipal Workshops.

(2) Collection, Removal and disposal of Refuse Collection.—(A) House Hold Trace Refuse and sweepings from roads were collected in all 1750 municipal dust bins and Nil refuse Trailors placed at convenient places as against, 1,584 (municipal dust-bins) in the previous year.

Municipal dust bins and Refuse Trailors were attended to daily, alternate days and weekly as per density of the population. Out of 1,38,020 tons of refuse collected, 1,38,020 tons of refuse was utilised for reclamation of municipal lands and Nil tons sold the private parties for reclamation of their land.

- (3) Prevention of Nuisance.—During the year 277 cases under Section 372(e) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act for indiscriminate throwing of refuse and 779 cases for urinating on public roads were filed in the court under Section 115(a) of the B. C. P. Act.
- (4) Cleansing of open Drains (municipal and private).—The work of cleansing of Read side sullage drains was carried out and 8,52,081 Sq. Yds. area was cleansed.
- (5) Collection Remov 1 and disposal of Night Soil.—There exists 10682 Pasket privies as against 11,169 for the previous year and 688 basket privies were either demolished or converted during the year.

The total number of Public Sanitary Conveniences is 158 having 1012 seats.

During the year under report 15,521 gallons of Night Soil from latrines were colleted and removed every day. The open plots and fields fouled by public were also cleansed and in all 21,87,361 gallons of Night Soil removed.

Cesspool Clearance.—During the year there exist 4071 cesspool existing in range I, II and III were attended to and a total 2,95,98,395 gallons of cesspool contents were removed.

- (7) Disposal of Night Soil.—The Night soil and cesspool contents collected at the following Depots (1) Khar purification Plant (2) Versova Night Soil Depot, (3) Oshivra Night Soil Depot, (4) Gorai Road Borivali were disposed of in the creeks at different points.
 - (8) Special services on payment were continued as under:
 - (1) Removal of trade refuse from private markets.
 - (2) Cleansing of Commodes.
 - (3) Cleansing of temporary privies erected for dramas, Tamashas, etc.
- (9) Dog Licensing, Immunisation and Destruction.—(i) Dog Licensing.—During the year 3327 dogs were licensed in the various Wards under Range No. I, II, and III on payment of dog tax.
 - (ii) Dog Immunisation. During the year 48 dogs were immunised.
- (iii) Dog destruction.— During the year the work of catching dogs for destruction was carried out and all 25145 dogs were caught and sent to lethal chambers'at Mahalaxmi.
- (10) Removal and disposal of carcasses.—The work of removal and disposal of carcasses was carried out with the help of contractors.

(11) Labour Welfare.— There are seven welfare Centres working at (1) Khar (2) Andheri at the Municipal Labour Staff Quarters (3) Versova (4) Municipal Staff Quarters Kurla, (5) Vikhroli, (6) Chembur (7) Mulund.

In addition to the above there are Co-operative Credit Societies from which staff members took advantages.

- (12) Veterinary Dispensary at Khar.—Junior Veterinary Inspector, Khar who was incharge of veterinary dispensary carried out the work of Inspection of Miltch Cattle stables treated 2615 and 90 animals and birds were treated respectively and 130 inoculations were done.
- (13) Income.—The total income (Revenue) from various sources earned by Conservancy Branch (Range, I, II and III) during the year was Rs. 2,18,957.25.

Cos. exceeded the total number of tenements demolished by 44,223.

The recoveries of rent in both the colonies were Rs. 40,308.00 and Rs. 48,973.00 against the demand including the arrears of Rs. 14,90,118.00 and Rs. 4,49,252 respectively.

4. The recoveries of rents of the dormitory a Palton Road amounted to Rs. 51,745 during the year.

VII—DISPOSAL OF LANDS

Long leases

The number of plots let during the year was 4. The total area of the land thus disposed of admeasures 3,909.75 sq. meters valued at Rs. 4,28,902. The total number of plots disposed of upto the end of 1966-67 was 4334 with an area of 51,50,705.30 sq. meters and valued at Rs. 13,15,54,900 yielding an annual rent of Rs. 47,03,285. In respect of plots for which premium or commutation amounts had not been received the rate at which ground rent was commuted was 224 years, purchase of plots let before 23rd November 1920 and 18 years' purchase thereafter upto May 1948 the ground rent for the Plotswas charged at 5 per cent per annum (instead of 6 percent per annum charged since 1920) on the value of land and the amount of commutation was fixed at 21 times the annual ground rent (vide Corporation Resolution No. 157, dated the 6th May 1948).

Where the period of commutation expired, the Lessees were allowed to commute at the rate of 28 times the annual ground rent reserved (vide C. R. No. 1031, dated the 11th February 1943) but commutation now is being discouraged. Now the rate of ground rent is charged at 7 per cent (vide C. R. No. 557, dated the 20th September 1962) from 1st July 1962 but commutation is stopped.

The progress in the disposal of Trust lands on permanent basis during the year is shown in Appendix No. 2.

The details of lease in Sion Matunga etc., are shown in Appendix 3.

The amount received by way of commutation of ground rent and premium etc., during the year was Rs. 3,33.114

The amount received by way of commutation of grount rent and premium since the amalgamation of the Improvement Trust with the Municipality are shown in Appendix No. 10.

A comparative statement showing the number of permanent tenancies with the demand and collection as on 31st March of the past four years is given in Appendix 4.

A percentage of 27.08 arrears could be attributed mostly to the usual tendency on the part of the new building tenants to withhold payment of ground rent to the extent to cash security deposited by them with a view to getting the same adjusted towards the ground rent. The main items of arrears can be classified as under:—

(2) Short Leases

No temporary leases were granted during the year under report.

The number of vacant land tenancies of both ex-Trust and Municipal Estates was 4,444 and 861 respectively at the close of the year. The demand for vacant land tenancies in ex-Trust Estates and Municipal lands for the year under report was Rs. 8,94,639 and Rs. 5,36,076 and the recovery was Rs. 11,10,761 and Rs. 5,37,058 respectively inclusive of arrears.

VIII.—MANAGEMENT OF PROPERTY AND COLLECTION OF REVENUE

A .- Trust Section

(a) Chawls Permanent.—The gross demand of tenements in the chawls for the year was Rs. 23,12,490 on 31st March 1967 as against Rs. 23,12,420.

The concessional rent includes the rents of rooms let out to the peons of the different departments in lieu of house rent allowance and rent free quarters allowed to 193 sweepers of this department.

The collection on account of rents from the permanent chawls during the year amount to Rs. 22,05,251 deducting therefrom the charges on account of outgoings amounting to Rs. 26,79,848 net loss comes to Rs. 3,74,597.

The capital expenditure incurred on the chawls including the value of the land is Rs. 246 lakhs. The Corporation have to pay interest and sinking fund charges at the rate of 4.61 per cent. per annum on the capital expenditure prior to 1919-20 and 6.35 per cent. per annum on the capital expenditure incurred in subsequent years, and 4.24 per cent. in respect of those constructed after 1950. This amounts to Rs. 12.96 lacs per annum (vide-Appendix 12). After a dding the amount of net loss into the amount of interest and sinking fund charges the accounts for the chawls show a loss of about Rs. 1876,556.

(b) Semi Permanent Sheds.—The gross demand in respect of 7,264 rooms in the Semi Permanent Sheds including Labour Camps for the year was Rs. 16,52,541. The net demand after excluding the concessional rent and vacancies was Rs. 16,34,993 The revenue actually collected comes to Rs. 17,59,058 which was equivalent to 64,70 per cent. of the total recoverable rent including arrears of Rs. 10,83,809 for the previous year.

General remarks in chawls and semi-permanent sheds. The average population in these chawls during the year 1966-67 was 1,38,861 against 1,17,541 in 1965-66 and 1,06,758 in 1964-65 respectively while the corresponding figures for semi-permanent sheds including the labour camp were 78,905 and 74,765 and 70,954 respectively.

Persuant to the Standing Committee Resolution No. 80, dated the 15th April 1946, 193 scavengers out of 570 belonging to the Department were allowed rent free occupation and the remaining members were in receipt of house rent allowance.

The percentage of out goings in respect of the chawls and semi-permanent sheds are shown in Appendix 5 on the basis of annual rental of Rs. 22,55,399 for chawls and Rs. 16,34,993 for semi-permanent shed total outgoing being 126.32 per cent and 92.77 per cent. respectively.

Amounts transferred to Rent Equalisation Fund and Amenity Fund were Rs. 1,78,174 and Rs. 59,391 respectively. The difference between the standard rents worked out on 5 per cent of the cost of land and 10 per cent, on the cost of construction of post-war residential tenements and the subsidised rents actually charged are to be met from the Rent Equalisation Fund.

Revenue collected from tenements constructed from slum clearance was Rs. 14.50,122 against the demand of Rs. 21,53 379 inclusive of arrears. The tenements constructed under slum clearance (City and Suburbs) are shown in Appendix No. 14.

Acquired Properties—At the commencement of the year there were 481 acquired or surrendered buildings in charge of this department containing 5,612 tenancies. At the close of the year there were 5,733 tenements in 466 buildings.

The gross demand of 5.733 tenements in the acquired and re-entered buildings was. Rs. 10,62,702 After excluding the amount for concessions in rent and vacancies the net demand for the year was Rs. 10,55,123.

The revenue actually collected amounted to Rs. 10,57,923 which was equal to 68.95 per cent. of the total recoverable amount including arrears of Rs. 4,88,849 for the previous year.

Summary of Revenue —The total collection of revenue from permanent leases, short leases, monthly tenancies and slum clearance properties can be seen from Appendix No. 6 and Appendix No. 6A.

Requisitioned Buildings.—The management and collection of rent in respect of 17 properties having 426 tenancies requisitioned from private landlords for A. R. P. purposes were continued to be looked after by this department. The demand in respect of these tenancies for the year was Rs. 70,986 and the recovery was Rs. 62,191 which was equal to 49.41 per cent. of the total recoverable amount including arrears of Rs. 54,879.

During the year under review, the demand and recovery of taxes aggregated to Rs. 90,894 and Rs. 42,765 respectively. The arrears due for collection at the close of the year stand at Rs. 6,43,320.

B.-MUNICIPAL SECTION

Details of the total collection of revenue in respect of Municipal properties under Budget 'A' are shown in Appendix No. 7.

Tenements constructed under Budget 'A' for Municipal General staff are shown in Appendix No. 9.

General

- (1) Gallery Enclosures.—Formerly if gallery encroachments were made without the previous approval of the Improvements Committee, a fine was imposed before regularising the construction. However, it was noticed that such gallery enclosures were carried out in good faith by the tenants as protection against theft. birds, etc., while actually the lessee was being fined for no fault of his. The Improvements Committee by their, Resolution No. 643, dated the 21st December 1965 decided to levy no fine for such gallery enclosures and the policy was confirmed by the Corporation by their Resolution No. 37, dated the 6th May 1966.
- (2) Properties held by the Trust.—In some of the Leases, there is a provision that the premises shall not be assigned without the previous consent of the Corporation. When the properties were held by the Trust, there have been often changes in the names of the trustees due to deaths, resignations etc., and consequently new trustees being appointed. In such cases, the Decds of appointment of new Trustees were executed without obtaining prior sanction on the understanding that the Trust was the same. We used to regularise this breach by approaching the Improvements Committee, and by payment of fine. It has now been decided that so long as the Trust is the same, the Deed of Appointment of new trustees may not be deemed as an assignment, and it can be executed without our consent.
- (3) Monsoon Shelters.—Monsoon shelters are permitted free on private properties during monsoon period. Howeve, so far as the Municipal lands were concerned, we used to charge fees for such shelters during monsoon period and were also recovering fine if the shelters continued beyond monsoon period. As this is discrimination, the Improvements Committee by their Resolution No. 35, dated the 19th April 1966 have decided not to charge monsoon shelters even on Municipal lands. The policy has been confirmed by the Corporation by their Resolution No. 232, dated the 25th July 1966.
- (4) Encroachments.—After the introduction of Development Plan, the construction as admissible under the Development Plan is permissible also on Municipal lands. But we used to charge the encroachment in the compulsory open spaces on prorata basis, while the additional floors were charged at a flat rate fixed by the Improvements Committee. Thus a Lessee who had a smaller base and went to a higher height had to pay much less as comparent to a lessee who preferred to have a broader base and lesser height, though both enjoyed the same floor area. With a view to remove this discripancy, the improvements Committee by their resolution No. 212, hate I the 23rd August 1966 have decided to charge encroachments and additional floor clike on flat rates. The policy has been confirmed by the Corporation by their Resolution No. 627, cated the 19th September 1966.

- (5) Galleries.—Formerly galleries used as means of air access were charged prorata, taking into consideration as part and parcel as Office premises. Subsequently, it was considered that the galleries which were only means of access of light should not be heavily charged on the basis of business. The Improvements Committee by their Resolution No. 152, dated the 26th July 1966 have approved the policy by charging galleries at flat rates.
- (6) Ignoring the change of user of motor garages.—The Corporation had decided to ignore the change of user of motor garages made prior to 1959 upto November 1966. The Improvements Committee by their resolution No. 479, dated the 7th February 1967 have extended the period upto December 1969. By their Resolution, the Improvements Committee have permitted that any garage on Municipal plot could be freely used for an ironing shop.
- (7) The shop tenements in slum clearance schemes were previously not transferred in the name of occupants on goodwill basis, but Improvements Committee under their resolution No. 469, dated the 7th February 1967 have sanctioned to permit the shop tenements in slum clearance schemes to be transferred in the names of occupants on goodwill basis, subject to the certain terms and conditions. The policy has been confirmed by the Corporation by their resolution No. 1909, dated the 6th March 1967.

HYDRAULIC ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT

I.-LAKES AND TRUNK WATER MAINS

During the year supply was given from the Vaitarna, Tansa, Vehar and Tulsi Lakes. Statistics

Sources of water regarding lakes head works quantities of water drawn etc. are given in Appendix II. Details regarding water lost due to evaporation in various lakes are given in fall and contents.

Details regarding water lost due to evaporation in various lakes are given in Appendix III.

The Vaitarna, Tansa, Vehar, Tulsi and Powai Lakes recorded rain fall of 1686.0 mm. (66.60 ins.); 2006.10 mm. (79.0 ins.) 2094.36 mm. (82.5 ins.); 2459.92 mm. (96.7 ins.); and 1871.47 mm. (73.70 ins.) respectively. Appendices IV, V, VI VII & VI: I give details of annual rain fall in different lakes and in the City.

The levels of Vaitarna, Tansa, Vehar and Tulsi lakes on 1-10-1966 were 162.45 Mt. (532.97 ft.); 128.46 Mt. (421.46 ft.): 79.60 Mt. (261.18 ft.) and 138.87 Mt. (455.61 ft.) resepectively above the Town Hall Datum, and the corresponding contents above the lowest outlets of the lakes were 17.48.51 Ml. (38,463 Mg.): 1,81,666. Ml. (39,962 Mg.): 35,986 Ml (17,916 Mg.) and 10,019 Ml. (2,204 Mg.) respectively.

The water from Powai lake was used for non-potable purposes viz. irrigation and Aarey Colony stables. About 3000 brass of silt was removed from the bed of this lake. Investigations were carried out to determine the stability of the masonry dam at Powai and the necessity of strengthening the same.

An average supply of 917.86 Mega Litres (201.91 Mg.) per day was given to Greater Bombay during the year. Appendices IX and X give the supply statistics for the various purposes and the quantity of water used for different purposes respectively during the year.

II.—HEADWORKS MAINTENANCE DIVISION

This Division looks after the maintenance of Vaitarna and Tansa Headworks including catchment areas, trunk mains, tunnels and duct line in the Mandola Division and residential colories at Headworks.

The following are the broad outlines of maintenance works at Vaitama and Tansa:

Fifteen Numbers of Hydraulic gates as per Appendix XI were maintained during the year. Eight Spillway gates functioned satisfactorily. 270 ft. high all concrete dam constructed in 1955 did not present any major maintenance problem. The maximum intensity of flood handled was 59195 cusecs on 6-9-1966. The lake reached full supply level 162.64 Mt. (535,00 ft.) T. H. D. on 29-7-1966 when the rainfall recorded at Vaitarna was 976.9 mm. (38.5 ins.). The undersluice gates were not operated.

Goliath crane (14 tons) was maintained. Goliath Crane.

During the year under report the rainfall was delayed till 13-7-1966 and the citys supply position was considerably affected and had created an anxiety amorgst the citizens. The rain fall recorded till 13-7-1966 was only 286 mm. (11.3 ins.) against 1250 80 mm. (49.3 ins.) in 1964 and 757.9 mm. (29.9 ins.) in 1965. The year had very poor monsoon viz. 1686.00 m.m. (66.36 ins.) against average of 3199 mm. (125.50 ins.).

The power house at Vaitarna consisting of 3 units of 100 Kw. capacity diesel generators and 440 volts

Diesel power house.

overhead transmission lines of about 4.82 K.m. (3 miles) in length, were maintained to ensure independent and reliable power supply for operation of gates, lighting, water supply, pilot filtration plant, gallery pumps, etc.

Direct supply from Vaitarna lake to City was continued during the year except for a period from Direct supply from 1-6-1966 to 3-7-1966, 18-7-1966 to 19-8-1966 and 10-9-1966 to 19-11-1966. This was due to high percentage of turbidity in Vaitarna Waters.

About 65529 Ml. (14414.36 M.g) of water was transferred from Vaitarna Lake to Tansa during the Transfer of water from period from 18-7-1966 to 19-8-1966.

Vaitarna to Tansa Lake.

Tunnels 3.2 Mt. (10½ ft.). dia of an aggregate length of 7.52 Km. (4.67 Miles) between Vaitarna-Belnala Tunnel between Vaitarna Belnala-Tansa as per Appendix XII were maintained. The rollers under 3000 mm. (120 ins.) dia. main and expansion joints functioned satisfactorily.

The break pressure tower on 3000 mm. (120 ins.) dia. main between Belnala and Tansa functioned Culverts and bridges, satisfactorily.

- 56 Nos. of culverts and bridges as shown in the Appendix No.XII were miantained during the year.
- 38 Nos. of Automatic shutters on spillway of Tansa Dam and 11 Nos. penstocks for the outlet Automatic shutters on well, were maintained and functioned satisfactorily. 14 Nos. of rates operated Tansa dam.

 automatically on 5-9-1966 and continued to overflow upto 6-9-1966. The maximum intensity of flood handled was 8147.40 cusecs on 6-9-1966. The lake reached full supply level of 128.63 Mt. (422.00 ft.). T. H. D. on 3-9-1966 at 11.55 p.m. when the rainfall recorded at Tansa was 1593.8 mm. (63 ins.)

About 16 Km. (9.94 miles) of 2400 mm. (96"), dia. pipe line, 1800 mm. (72") East and 1800 mm. (72")

18-7-1966 and from 19-11-1966 to date, on account of duct renovation work undertaken by the Water Supply Project Department. During the rest of the year, the duct was commissioned for supply of water to the City. The duct line was patrolled during the monsoon period.

A 10 Kw., 110 volts D.C. generating set was maintained for lighting the Inspection bungalow and other quarters at Tansa. The set was run 6 hours a day upto 18-11-1966 and 4 hours a day from 19-11-1966. The supply during the rest of the day was maintained through storage batteries. A set of 20 Nos. 6 volts new batteries were purchased during the year.

The Tansa lake was patrolled to prevent pollution of water by cattle. About 296 heads of cattles were Prevention of tress passers and stray cattle impounded. in the catchment area.

The gardens attached to main bungalow at Tansa and the guest house, health resort colony and dam at Gardens at Vaitarna and Tansa.

Vaitarna were maintained during the year.

The health resort camp at Vaiterna consisting of three class I and six class II types quarters, equipped with furniture and kitchenware, was maintained during the year and there was good response from the public.

Both Vaitarna and Tansa lakes continued to be popular with picnic parties during the year under Picnic parties.

The representatives of the World Bank visited Tansa and Vaiterna in January 1967 in connection with Visit of the representatives of the World Bank. the loans required for the Bhatsai River Project.

Security measures such as guarding the headworks by the District Superintendent of Tansa were Security Measures. continued during the year.

III-MAINTENANCE DIVISION (OUTSIDE CITY).

This division is entrusted with the work of repairs and maintenance of trunk mains, embankments, cuttings, culverts, bridges, trolley tracks, head works at lakes supervision over lakes, catchment areas, disinfection of water supply, maintenance and repairs of vehicles, trolleys and other machineries and maintenance of buildings.

There were seven major bursts on the water mains in the division during the year.

61 Major and 1142 minor leaks on the trunk mains and 98 lakes on the masonry duct and 1094 leaks on the syphon mains were repaired during the year.

Duct between Tansa and Pogaon was put out of commission from 19-11-1966 for replacing the duct line by 1800 mm. (72") dia. Hume pipe.

A power house having three units of 24 kw. (40 H.P.) diesel driven generators, was maintained at Powai

Chlorination plant as a standby, as the electric supply was available from Messrs. Thana

Electric Supply Co., for the whole year.

The city's water supply was disinfected at the Central Chlorination Plant at Powai, and at smaller units

Disinfection of water at Mulund, Bhandup, Tulsi lake and Veravali. The dosage of chlorine at different plants was as under:—

Strict measures were taken for preventing pollution of lake water and 58 persons were arrested and Prevention of trees passers in the catchment prosecuted. 341 cattle were impounded in the municipal land.

Motor vehicles and equipment such as compressors, welding plants, concrete mixers, generating sets, outboard engines for boats, pumping units, venturi meters together with the other plants and machinery purchased during National Emergency as detailed in Appendix XIII were maintained.

The total number of structures maintained was 219.

Extensive patchplating was carried out on 1400 mm. (57") East and West Tansa Steel mains in Bandra Creek to prevent wastage of water from the leaky portions.

Repainting of steel mains was done for an area of 52,600 sq. metres.

Leaky expansion joints on the 2400 mm. (96') Vaitarna main were repaired in various sections by isolating them for a period of 20 to 28 hours. For the first time since the 2400 mm. (96") Vaitarna main was laid, the section between Bandra and Dharavi which connects all the reservoirs of the city, was isolated for carrying out repairs to the leaky expansion joints.

- (1) Six pitometer instruments with six portable tents were manufactured in the workshop. Six more

 Works of importance pitometer instrument with 6 portable tents were under preparation.
- (2) Two mild steel covers were fabricated and fixed on the Expansion joints of 2400 mm. (96") Vaitarn main to prevent tampering of the joints.
- (3) One under pressure cutting machine for making connections on the trunk mains was prepared in the workshop for the sizes of connections from 80 to 450 mm. (3" to 18").
- (4) One manometer block for chlorine control panel, similar to the original one was fabricated at Ghatkopar Workshop for the chlorination plant at Powai.
- (5) One P. V. C. solutionizer of 30 lbs. per hour capacity, was fixed in place of the cast-iron one with ebonite lining.
- (6) Two panels of 30 lbs. per hour capacity have been converted into 50 lbs. per hour capacity by changing the orifice plate and manometer scale.
- (7) As an experiment to prevent wastage of water from the masonry ducts at Bhandup about 152.48 metres (500 ft.) of the duct was provided with a polythene sheet lining. This was successful in preventing leakages.
 - (8) Three filterbeds at Tulsi filtration plant were repaired and regraded.
- (9) The work of extending culvert No. 20-A covering 600 mm. (24") dia. Tulsimain at Bandra for providing separate Railway lines for Harbour branch between Mahim and Bandra was completed by the Western Railway.
 - (10) Canteen for the staff was constructed in Ghatkopar Yard at an approximate cost of Rs. 28,000.
- (11) Improvements of gardens at Powai and Vehar lake was entrusted to an expert landscape gardener and the work was in progress.
 - (12) Due to failure of monsoon, water supply to various industries were curtailed and regulated.
- (13) Kasheli bridges were guarded by the S. R. P. Thana District. Police patrol was also carried out along the pipe lines.

The work of extension of Emergency Pumping station and installation of additional diesel driven pumps thereat was taken up in hand at a total cost of Rs. 8,90,000. This extension to the pumping station is installed to provide adequate mechanical stand-by break down of proper supply.

IV-MAINTENANCE DIVISION (INSIDE CITY).

The Maintenance Division at 566, N. M. Joshi Marg. Byculla, continued attending to major works of repairs and bursts onbig size water mains, maintenance of testing-house, meter workshop, pumping stations at the reservoirs and other places in the city and chlorination equipment at various places in the City etc. This division also attends to other emergent works connected with repairs to damaged pipes etc., after office hours on Sundays and Holidays.

The total length 876 Km. (544.31 miles) of water mains was maintained during the year.

There were 29 bursts and 21 leakages on large sized water mains during the year. The details of bursts

(1) Malabar Hill Reservoir

The existing pumps 2 Nos. 100 H.P., 2 Nos. 75 H.P. and 2 Nos. 40 H.P. were maintained. The total Pumping stationat Reserving power of the pump house remained at 430 H.P.

(2) Bhandarwada Hill Reservoir

Existing two pumps of 275 H.P. were maintained.

(3) Parel Pump House

The pump house was completely shut down during the year and it was shifted to the pump house at Golanji Hill Reservoir.

(4) Golanji Hill Reservoir

One 80 H.P. pump of Parel Pump House was shifted to Golanji Hill Reservoir pump house and commissioned during the year. One more 100 H.P. pump was added to the pump house bringing the total number of pumpsto 3 Nos. 2 of 100 H.P. and 1 of 80 H.P. and the total capacity to 280 H.P.

The total capacity of pumping units at Reservoirs in City was thus brought to 1260 H.P. and the total maintenance cost incurred was Rs. 2,13,000. In addition to the above pumping units, 6 small pumping sets were maintained for playing fountains and for watering the reservoir gardens.

Five Boosting stations at places as shown at Serial No. 1 to 5 in Appendix XV were commissioned during the year and were maintained.

Re-chlorination was done at various places in the City for maintaining required residual chlorine in the water mains in the city. Permanent chlorination equipment continued to work at Chlorination Plants. (a) Futka tank King's Circle (6) Malabar Hill Reservoir (c) Bhandarwada Hill Revoir (d) Worli Hill Reservoir and (e) Golanji Hill Reservoir which was commissioned during the later half of the year. In addition to this portable chlorination plants 5 Nos. were used on the water mains in City wherever additional chlorine dose was necessary due to suspected contam ination cases.

The total quantity of chlorine consumed during the year was about 3295 cylinders with chlorine of 225 M. Ton approximately.

The total number of pipes and fittings tested during the year was approximately 6,50,000 out of which 4,16,400 pieces were for private parties and the remaining for the municipal works, realising a revenue of Rs. 1,03,150. A total number of pieces tested and revenue recovered during the previous year were 7,62,192 pieces and Rs. 1,38,581 respectively.

The total number of meters maintained was 21,119. Municipal meters repaired during the year were 7,570 and total number of meters tested was 7,990 out of which 6,410 were municipal meters.

The total number of new meters purchased during the year was 232 Nos.

In order to give speedy relief to the consumers whose pumps had gone out of order, 15 Nos. of pumping

Booster pumps for hire sets (HP 1 to 5) were maintained and hired for short duration of one month or so to public.

Two plastic tanks each of 11,000 gallons capacity wee also offered on hire.

The routine maintenance works such as painting, minor repairs, replacement of storage tanks, repairs

The work of granting new water connections was carried out by the maintenance staff of the respective wards. The total number of new water connections granted during the year was as shown in Appendix XVI as against 3,403 in the previous year. The grand total of water connections existing in different premises in the city came to 83,951 as against 1,441 during the previous year. Similarly, water connections cut off during the year were 230 as against 1,441 during the previous year. Other odd jobs such as cleaning of dirt boxes, meter strainers, etc., during the year were 4,822 as against 5,884 during the previous year.

The works of special mention that were carried out during the year are as under :-

(1) 450 mm. (18") sluice valve on Bhulabhai Desai Road. Outlet at Malabar Hill Reservoir, Compartment No. 2, was provided with electric actuator by modifying an old existing 600 mm. (24") electrical actuator.

- (2) 450 mm. (18") sluice valve on Bhulabhai Desai Road outlet at Malabar Hill Reservoir, Compartment No. I, had to be replaced on an emergency basis.
- (3) Modifications in the electrical circuit for Malabar Hill Pumping House were carried out to utilise the 2 Nos. of electrical generatoring sets during emergency.
- (4) 600 mm. (24") sluice valve on Dongri Outlet was repaired by providing a gate of a similar another sluice valve. This measure saved leakage of water through the sluice valve from the elevated tank.
- (5) A new 1200 mm. (48") electrically operated sluice valve was provided on 1200 mm. (48') Babula Tank outlet at Bhandarwada Hill Reservoir, replacing the old one. This also affected in saving of water due to stoppage of leak through the old sluice valve.
- (6) A new electric actuator of improved pattern was manufactured in the workshop suitable for a 300mm. (12") sluice valve.
- (7) The Test-house was under reorganisation during the later part of the year. A simpler method for testing of C.I. pipes upto 300 mm. (12') dia. was deviced and put into use.
- (8) Exhibition of water meters was arranged for the benefit of the staff of the Water Works Department. Latest literature on water meters was also made available to the staff.

V—DISTRIBUTION DIVISION (CITY)

Distribution division deals with distribution and regulation of water supply within city limits. It also deals with investigation of short supply complaints, granting permissions for new connections, additional fittings and their certification, taking court actions for enforcement of sections of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act relating to public and private water supply, rewashering of leaky taps, issue of notices for defective fittings and metering of water supply.

With the creation of the new Ward Offices in the year 1964, the work of distribution and maintenance Separation of Ward has been decentralised. Each Ward, A to E was in charge of one Assistant Engineer Offices.

and Wards Fand G were divided into two sub-divisions, each sub-division in charge of an Assistant Engineer.

The Central Control Station was maintained at Babula Tank, under the Assistant Engineer, Water Central Control Station. Works, (B Ward and Control). This station deals with the daily control and regulation of water supply and with emergencies such as fires, bursts, etc. It also maintains record of half hourly levels in Reservoirs and pressures at all representatives stations on the trunk mains right from the sources and hourly discharges from major trunk mains feedings the distribution system. It records and communicates to the Wards concerned complaints received on telephone from the public Being manned for 24 hours, the station is responsible for control, operations within city limits and the trunk mains feeding the suburbs and extended suburbs.

For the purpose of distribution of supply, the city is divided into five main divisions, each division receiving supply from (a) Malabar Hill Reservoir, (b) Bhandrawada Hill Reservoir (c) Worli Hill Reservoir, (d) Golanji Hill Reservoir and (e) directly from trunk mains. The details of areas served by the four reservoirs and the direct supply area are shown in Appendix XVII.

The hours of supply in the city are shown in Appendix XVIII.

The number of prosecutions launched during the year was 477. The number of convictions was cases were withdrawn after compliance with notice and 134 cases were pending disposal at the end of the year. The total amount of fine recovered was Rs. 4,292. Besides, aove. 4,129 Notices under Section 278(2) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act were served on the owners for defectst in water fittings xeluding those in respects of unauthorised works infringing the provision of Section 287 A and B of the Municipal Act and non-compliance of Water Bye-laws, and as a result of these 420 prosecutions were launched. The number of convictions was 496 and the amount of fines recovered was Rs. 3,072.

The number of cases reported to the Standing Committee for severing water connections for non-payment of taxes and using unmetered water supply was 1,224 against 521 in the previous year. In 230 cases, the supply was cut off. In the remaining cases the execution of disconnection orders were not carried out as the consumers complied with the Municipal requirements.

The total number of calls received by the Babula Tank Control Station from the Fire Brigade Department was 2,375 as against 2,519 received during the previous year. Out of these 385 calls were false. 125 calls were on account of collapse of houses and 76 calls were on account of serious fires. As per the estimate of the Fire Brigade Department, the total quantity of water actually used to put out the fires was about 5.27 M.L. (1.18 Mg.). However, as a result of the fires, a far greater quantity of water was released from Reservoirs and trunk mains as high pressure supply had to be given for the duration of the emergencies in the localities in which they occurred. In order to enable the staff to attend fires promptly one more fire van was maintained at E. Ward making the total number of vans as five. The other four vans were stationed at (i) A Ward (ii) Babula Tank, (iii) F (South) offices, (iv) (South) offices.

In order to enable the fire brigade staff to distinguish size of mains from which hydrants took off, the

following colour scheme of painting the hydrants was maintained.

As a result of low pressure in the municipal water mains and increase in number of pavement dwellers, hydrants were found opened in various localities in the City by use of a crude keys. This, apart from wastage of water and low pressures created problems; as hydrants were rendered in-operable due to damage to spindle gates. In order to minimize wastage due to unauthorised opening of hydrants, two flying squads, each consisting of overseer, two police men and two labourers operated throughout the year except during the monsoon. During this period, 2,197 hydrants were closed, 158 keys, 27 masaks, 4,008 tins, buckets and vessels were confiscated.

Revenue derived from returning utensils to the public on payment of a small fee was about 5,665 and through auction of unclaimed confiscated utensils was Rs. 2,406.

In view of the overall shortage of water being experienced in Bombay during recent years, quotas have Fixing of quotas to been fixed to limit the consumption of all industries consuming more than 1,50,000 Industrial Concerns.

The work of making a detailed study of large industrial consumers [i.e., those drawing more than 4,54,600 litres (1,00,000 gallons) of water per day] has also been taken up by the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay with the help of expert firms. The purpose of the survey is to find ways and means of economising on the use of water by rationalising the use of water and re-using it wherever possible.

Owing to the extra-ordinary delay in the arrival of the monsoon, a critical situation arose during the first fortnight of July 1966 when the lake levels were already at their lowest. Emergent measures had to be taken to combat the situation. The quantity conveyed to the Greater Bombay area was cut down by about 25 per cent. and the two-period supply prevalent so far was replaced by a single period supply. A large number of wells in the City were opened and cleaned up for being used to meet the shortage partially and five shallow tube wells were also bored on and experimental basis in different parts of the City.

The public co-operated admirably in preventing wastage and conserving the limited stocks of water available, and by the middle of July with the arrival of heavy rains in the catchments of the Vaiterna and Tansa Lakes, the situation eased. Since then, gradually by stages, the supply has been stepped up, but the single period supply has been retained, and by doing so, a reserve has been created for meeting a similar situation, should it again arise in the ensuing season.

VI-METER DIVISION

17,626 Meters of sizes varying from 15 mm. (1/2") to 300 mm. (12") were on the connections as detailed in Appendix XX. The number of meters exchanged was 9,183 and those fixed on new connections were 999 About 3,850 meters were removed from the existing connections.

The number of new properties metered during the year was 302. Premises metered during the Progressive metering programme. was and new residential buildings on flat-system.

The total revenue derived from water supply by meter measurement was Rs. 4,06,29,714 as against Revenue from metered connections.

Rs. 4,08,12,795,05 during the previous year.

A new post of Ward Officer (Meters) for Greater Bombay was created from 4-11-1966. The incumbent was put in charge of the process starting from the date a property is metered to the recovery of the bills for water charges.

VII—QUALITY CONTROL OF WATER SUPPLY AND WASTE PREVENTIVE DIVISION

This division was in charge of the following:-

(a) Quality Control of Water Supply for purposes of desirable standard of purity.

- (b) Regular detection and prevention of underground leakage in water mains, appropriate pipes etc.
- (c) Rewashering of leaky taps in private premises.
- (d) Gauging the flow of water through the water mains by Pitometer to determine the average quantity of water supplied to different areas and the flow characteristics in different water mains.

In all the wards of the city and suburbs, there were two groups of sampling points per ward, from which

Bacteriological analysis. water was sampled for the purpose of chemical and bacteriological examinations. The

Bacteriological analysis. sampling points being on service mains were representative of the quality of water

supply obtainable in different iccalities as well as in the entire distributions system of Greater Bombay.

Samples of water were collected by mobile squads of trained personnel of the Municipal Analyst's department every day, except on Sundays, from each ward.

Out of 2065 routine samples taken during the year, 91.81 per cent, were free from Coli-form Bacteria, from which it will be seen that the purity of Bombay's water supply conformed to the International Standard for Drinking Water prescribed by the World Health Organisation.

In addition to the above, this division collected 5,447 special samples from areas where incidence of casse sef water-borne diseases were reported by the Health Officer. 90.29 per cent, of the samples were free from coli-

The total number of samples collected for chemical analysis during the year, both from the lakes and the distribution system was 267. In addition 40 special samples were collected by this division for chemical analysis with a view to ascertain the quality of water while investigating complaints. of bad quality of water.

- (a) Breakages and leakages in communication and consumers' pipes were repaired. Corroded portions were renewed and pipes in the vicinity of drains were diverted. Leaky hydrants and sluice valves were repaired. Disused connections were cut off on the mains. Consumer pipes in the house gulleys were raised 2 to 3 ft., above the gulley floor level. Leaks in watermains were repaired.
- (b) There was a regular programme for flushing hydrants about once in two months for removal of accumulated seciments, if any

As consumer pip es lying on the floor of house gulleys were a health-hazard, special staff was appointed

Special preventive for raising pipes above gulley level in congested localities. Pipes were raised in 124

measures in congested house gulleys in parts of B, C. D, and E Wards.

Incalities.

Detection of wastage was done in Greater Bombay by 'Soundings' of underground water mains, appurtenances and communication pipes during supply hours and by in spection of Sounding of water consumers pipes in house-gulley. Further, premises facing the roads where water' mains were sounded were subsequently inspected and leaky taps, if noticed, were rewashered.

1055 Pitometer observations were taken during the year to gauge the quantity of water conveyed by trunk and distributary mains for finding out the average daily break up of the total supply in the different zones of Greater Bombay and the flow characteristics in particular distribution system for adjustments.

VIII-WORKS DIVISION (INSIDE CITY)

The Works Division (Inside City) carried out the work of laying of water mains and other construction works as per the provisions in the Loan Works Budget. It also carried out the works of diverting the water mains, laying of additional mains in connection with the resurfacing of Roads and other emergent works for improvement of water supply. Works on behalf of the private parties, sister departments, government bodies and making new connections above 80 mm. (3) dia. in size were also done by this division.

These works were carried out departmentally, the total strength of staff being 750.

The cost of the Budgetted works executed is Rs. 12,50,000 and that of unbudgetted works is Rs. 13,50,000.

XX-PLANNING AND RESEARCH DIVISION.

The most important work assigned to this division is the planning of water supply districts including zones therein for the existing and the proposed reservoirs. The work requires presupply districts.

Planning of water paration of drawings showing the existing mains, survey of the ground levels, forecasting population and water supply demands, assessing the industrial demands, for
followed by analysing the existing and the proposed networks of water mains and
suggesting improvements. As the analysis of the flow pattern involves volumious calculations, it is practically impossible to analyse large networks that are to be dealt-with. The division had perfected a programme
for the analysis of networks with the aid of the CDC/3600/160A computer the previous year and had been
using it since that time.

In the previous year the division has planned the zones for two of the outlets of the Malabar Hill Reservoir viz. Girgaum and Kalbadevi outlets, and analysed themwith the aid of the computer. The latter required some works and on completion of the same fresh trial was taken which gave satisfactory results. Further work of planning the adjoining zone to be fed by two of the outlets viz. Dhobitalao and Thakurdwar Outlets (of the same reservoir) was completed during the year.

Earlier a zone having a demand proportional to the capacity of the inlet main was planned for the Pali-Hill Reservoir However, due to the development of the creek land on the South of the 'H' Ward, the earlier work was required to be modified. The revised work was nearing completion.

Similar work pertaining to Worli Hill Reservoir and proposed service reservoirs at Rawli, Vervali, and Trombay are in progress.

Some large networks of mains were planned with the use of System Introspection Method developed and improved by this division. The major works attended by this method were the planning of the independent zones for the proposed Backbay Reclamation scheme block III and IV. This zone is proposed to be fed by an independent outlet from the reservoir at Malabar Hill. An independent closed zone for the proposed reclamation of creek land at Bandra to the west of Swami Vivekanand Road at the end of Mahim Causeway was also planned. This area is proposed to be governed from a storage tank to be built inside the development.

During the previous year, the division was entrusted with the planning of temporary boosting stations

Planning of Temporary to improve the state of acute shortage of supply at some place both in the City and boosting stations.

Suburbs. On detailed study, boosting stations were recommended to 14 places. The work was continued and duringthe current year four more boosting stations were planned. The work involved survey of the ground level, of the areas, the survey of the prevailing condition of supply including ranging of the mains etc.

In view of the acute water shortage in Bombay a Scheme for supplying treated sewage effluents to major

Scheme for supplying inclustries in the vicinity thereof was worked out. In the first stage it is proposed to
treated sewage from treat and supply about 2.5 mgd. only stepping up the figure in the second stage
Dadar Sewage Purification Plant.

The division have earlier planned and commissioned the reservoir making a smooth change over from direct supply to reservoir supply in the area. Subsequently it also planned the zones for the three outlets of the reservoir. The remaining work of modifying the existing pump house to suit the proposed zones and planning for the various pump units required, was attended to during the year.

The existing ward plans showing the water mains in Suburban wards were rapidly becoming inadequate in view of the very rapid development taking place all over the Suburbs. The work of preparation of suburban Ward plan using the development plans of these wards as basic matrix was taken up by this division. The work of word plans pertaining to L & T wards was complete in all respects and that pertaining to M, H & K was nearing completion. The set of drawings pertaining to each ward was bound in a file.

In 'H' ward supply was required to be given for longer hours as the distribution mains in this ward were of small size. Besides, the mains branching off from the trunk mains and feeding this ward were old and long in length. In spite of the long hours some areas situated at far distances with respect to the feeder mains and at higher elevations were suffering. As a remedy, a part of the 750 mm. (30") dia. inlet main of the Pali Hill Reservoir was commissioned and was used as a main feeder to this area. This not only facilitated the curtailment of supply hours but also improved the supply position. The change over and the subsequent curtailment of hours was planned and monitered by this branch.

The water supply position in Nanavati Hospital in Vile Parle was surveyed as a pilot to the main survey.

The objective of the survey was to assess the adequacy of the existing water supply, and to suggest means to ensure adequate water supply even in the scarce conditions.

A comprehensive report of the findings and suggestions was prepared. A survey of all the major hospitals in the City on these lines is proposed to be conducted.

An experiment in connection with the losses in the meter and its other ancilary units like strainers and non-return valve showed that the losses in the non return valve are as high as the Head losses in meter itself and as a result of this the losses in the entire meter assembly were very high. In view of the prevailing low pressures in the distribution system, it was necessary to save on the losses in the meter assemblies, it was therefore, suggested that a meter of the next larger size as compared the size of the connection be used. The steps were being taken to introduce the larger sized meter after removing certain administrative difficulties.

Due to intense activities of the Maharashtra Housing Board and other co-operative Housing Societies, many works such as working out the sizes of the connections, planning the internal lay out of water mains, planning of the arrangement of supply, examining the adequacy of the mains proposed to be laid in the municipal roads were referred to this branch. These proposals were scrutinized, keeping in view of the future zoning of the areas concerned and the suggestions were made accordingly.

XI—GENERAL

XII—DISTRIBUTION DIVISION (SUBURBS AND EXTENDED SUBURBS)

Distribution of water supply in the Suburbs & Extended Suburbs

The suburbs and the Extended Suburbs are supplied water by gravity through several tapping points on the trunk mains comming from the lakes. For distribution purposes, the areas Distribution system. are divided into two zones viz. the Western and the Eastern. The former drives supply from the tappings on the 2400 mm. (96") Vaitarna, 1450 mm. (57") East and West Tansa and 600 mm. (24") Tulsi mains between Powai and Bandra, and the latter through tappings on the 1800 mm. (72") West Tansa main, the duct line, the 1200 > 800 > 600 mm. (48">32">22">24") Vehar main and 1200 mm. (48") new and old Tansa mains.

The hours of supply of different localities in the Suburbs and extended Suburbs are shown in Appendix.

- (a) Tunnels.—As an immediate measure of relief, work for driving a 3.96 Mt. (13 ft. diam.) tunnel

 Measures to improve from Mulund to Kandivli is taken in hand. This tunnel will be connected to the

 Tansa main at Mulund and will be able to bring supply upto 45 megalitres by a short route from the North towards South which will assure better pressures. The work is expected to be completed by December 1967.
- (b) Veravali Outlet—The 600 mm (24") arm along Western Express Highway is being extended upto Daftary Road junction Highway. It will be commissioned shortly. This will improve the supply of the badly affected areas of Pushpa Park and Quarry Road.

Statistics as regards quantity of water supplied to the area in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs during Quantity of water the year is shown in Appendix IX and X.

The particulars of connections made during the year are given in Appendix XVI. The total number of new connections granted was 2198 in the Suburbs and 884 in the Extended Suburbs.

The total number of connections at the end of the year was 26,665 in the Suburbs and 7804 in the Extended Suburbs.

Metered stand pipes were given for group of not less than 20 persons on receipt of their applications.

During the year 482 such stand-pipes were given, of which 456 were in Suburbs and 26 in Extended Suburbs. The total number of metered stand-pipes is 1288. Out of these, 1183, are in Suburbs and 105 in Extended Suburbs vide Appendix XXII.

As the position of water supply had improved due to laying of more water mains in Extended Suburbs and consequent increase in the number of water connections given to the consumers, sanction of the Corporation was obtained to cut off the free stand pipes in the Extended Suburbs vide Corporation Resolution No. 1649 dated 11th February 1963. The action remained stayed in view of High Court injunction. However, the Corporation have now sanctioned continuation of these free stand pipes vide Resolution No. 1568 dated 16th January 1967.

The number of short supply complaints received for various reasons and attended to during the year

Short Supply complaints.

from the areas in the Suburbs and Extended suburbs was 9206 and 2845 respectively as detailed in Appendix XIX.

91 Notices for suburbs and 172 for Extended Suburbs, under Section 271(2) and 274(1) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, were issued and in 73 cases of Suburbs and 95 cases of Extended Suburbs

The total number of fire calls attended in Suburbs and Extended Suburbs was 135 and the quantity of water used to put out fire was about 22.82 and 1.10 M. L. (5.02 and 0.24 MG.)

Fire attendance.

Notices Under different Section of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act, 1408 and 183. notices were issued respectively in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs for defective Notices & Court Cases. fittings, more chokes, service pipes, unauthorised works etc. The court action was taken 307 and 28 cases respectively. The amount of fine recovered was Rs. 792 and Rs. 1001 in the area of Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively.

Disconnection orders issued in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs numbered 343 and 471 Disconnection Orders. respectively.

XIII—MAINTENANCE DIVISION (SUBURBS AND EXTENDED SUBURBS)

Water mains of sizes varying (from 50 mm. (2") to 900 mm. (36") 540.55 Kms. (335.87 miles)

Maintenance of Water and 250.71 Kms. (155.79 miles) in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs,

respectively were maintained. The total number of bursts on mains from 80 mm.

(3") to 600 mm. (24") diameter were 5 in Suburbs and 24 in Extended Suburbs. The details of bursts on mains 600 mm. (24") and above in diameter ware shown in Appendix XIV.

Fourteen new pumping stations were installed during the year and a total number of thirty one stations

Maintenance of pumping were maintained as detailed in Appendix XV. Vehar pumping station having a 1800 sets.

H. P. pumping capacity was worked for 6480 hours during the year.

The work of testing small sized galvanised iron pipes and fittings was carried out at Water Works Testing of water fittings. Chatkopar Workshops. Revenue from the testing of pipes, fittings, etc. submitted by the private parties amounted to about Rs. 25.960.

With the exceptions of few free stand pipe, Municipal properties, benevolent and charitable Institutions water is supplied to all the properties in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs through metered connections.

There is a Meter Workshop at Ghatkopar, where meters are tested, cleaned, over-hauled and repaired.

Repairs
Meters.

Water In all 4855 municipal meters were repaired and about 21350 municipal meters were maintained during the year.

Detailed of plant and machinery maintained during the year are as shown in Appendix X.

Maintenance of plant and machinery.

Total revenue collected during the year in Suburbs Water Works offices by way of meter hire in initial stages was Rs. 20,000 and that from the supply of water by meter measurement about Rs. 4,30.855. In addition to this, an amount of Rs. 10,03,318 was recovered as compounded charges. The figures for the Extended Suburbs for these items are Rs. 15.855 Rs. 11,02.792 and Rs. 1,80.879 respectively.

XIV-CONSTRUCTION DIVISION (SUBURBS AND EXTENDED SUBURBS).

The Construction Division carried out the works of laying water mains, making cross connections, shifting of mains in the carriage ways, repairs to major bursts, making new connections above 50 mm. (2") construction of pump houses etc.

Details of water mains of sizes 80 mm. (3") and above laid during the year are given in Appendix XIV.



BOMBAY FIRE BRIGADE

The Bombay Fire Brigade was taken over by the Government of Maharashtra under the Defence of India Rules and placed under the control of the Director of Civil Defence and Fire Adviser to the Government of Maharashtra with effect from 17th January, 1963. It continued to be under his charge during the year under report with Shri S. Fredilis as the Chief Fire Officer.

There were 14 serious Fires during the year (vide Appendix !).

House Collapse:

The Brigade attended calls to 179 fallen buildings as against 210 in the previous year. 4 persons lost their lives and 108 persons were injured. The figures of last 4 years are given below.

There were 215 calls for other services which included leakage of poisonous gases and dangerous fmu spilling, of acids, falling of trees, shocks due to leakage of electricity, vehicle accidents etc. 7 persons lost their lives in such accidents and 97 persons received injuries.

Rescue Service:

The Brigade attended 260 calls of various types of Rescue work such as persons fallen in wells, sea, station, etc., trapped in lift cages, drainages, marooned in flooded areas etc., 196 persons died in such cases and 272 were injured. Majority of deaths (125) were by drawning. The Brigace also rescued 11 animals and birds. Two serious incic ents of rescue service are mentioned below:—

Central Railway Accident at Matunga-

On 13th June 1966 at about 07.03 hours the above accident occurred a little north of Matunga Railway Station as a result of collision of two local trains running in opposite directions. Many coaches of both the trains were badly damaged trapping several persons therein. A number of persons dead or injured were lying all along the tracks. The Brigade immediately sent 27 appliances consisting of fire engines, Ambulances, Staff Vans, etc. The injured were immediately removed to the City hospitals not only in Ambulances and Staff Vans but even in Fire Engines. Simultaneously rescue operations were started. In all 192 persons (injured or resuced) were removed to the hospitals. 68 persons died in the accident.

Central Railway Accident at Wadaia Railway Station, Raoli Junction:

On 28th June 1966 at 09.09 hours, a down local train heading for Kings Circle collided against a stationary down train on the same track bound for Mankhurd. The accident occurred at Wadala Railway Station near Raoli Junction. Several bogies of both the trains were damaged resulting into injuries to a number of persons. 32 injured persons were speedily removed to nearby hospitals in Brigade Ambulances.

Burning Casualties:

There were 214 casualties due to burns out of which 36 lost their lives (18 males and 18 females). 178 persons received burns and subsequently recovered. Out of the total deaths of 36, fourteen were believed to be cases of suicide-3 males and 11 females.

The total loss due to fire was approximately Rs. 95,76,772. The insured property affected by fire was Rs. 78,28,420. The total property involved was Rs. 53,34,74,075.

Water Supply:

The approximate quantity of water used for extinguishing fire was gallons 41,27,013. Out of which 19,22,755 gallons were drawn from Municipal mains and rest from sea, wells, ponds, etc.

The number of hydrants for City and Suburbs was 9,220.

New Zonal System:

The zonal system was introduced from March 1965 in which the Greater Bombay was divided into two regions each in charge of a Dy. Chief Fire Officer. The regions were divided into zones and the zones into sectors. This system facilitated the work of the Brigace and was continued in the year under report.


Fire Prevention:

During the year 9,000 cases were received as against 8,384 in the previous year out of which 8,811 cases were disposed of. The cases received included 7,747 cases from Municipal Departments like Licence, Factory and Health, 125 cases from the Commissioner of Police, 135 cases for Public entertainment, 553 Miscellaneous cases and 440 complaints.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

(1) Republic Day Parade: The Fire Brigade personnel participated in the ceremonial parace route march along with Defence and other services on 26th January 1967. The Fire Brigade personnel also participated in the Moharashtra Day parade on 1st May 1966.

(2) Annual Drill Competition: As usual annual Fire Drill competitions were held. During the year competitions were held in (i) Fire Trailer Pump Drill (ii) Fire Escape and Motor Pump Drill. 38 teams from different Fire Stations participated. The finals were held under the Presidentship of Dr. J. Leon D'Souza, Mayor of Bombay. The prizes to the winning teams were distributed at the Mayor's hands. The best performance Rotating Trophy was awarded to Fireman Harishchandra Balkrishna Sawant.



(3) Awards and Prizes:

The award of Best Fireman of the year (cash prize of Rs. 100) was awarded to Fireman Kashiram Govind Shinde of Memonwada Fire Station. Long Service and Good Conduct Medal was awarded to ex-Driver Operator Putlaji Vithoo Mahadik. Silver Medal and cash prize of Rs. 250 was awarded to Station Officer S. K. Deshmukh for extra ordinary gallantry in rescuing a fireman at great personal risk from under the debria of a building that collapsed on account of fire at Zakeria Masjid Street on 7-2-1966.

(4) Awards of scholarships to children of Brigade employees:

As in previous years during the year under report scholarships ranging from Rs. 10 to Rs. 65 were given to school going children of the Brigade employees who passed the annual examination with credit from Standard IV to XI. 61 applications for the scholarship were received. Maximum number of scholarships was 28. The scholarships were distributed on 14th January 1967 and an amount of Rs. 800 was utilised for the purpose.

(5) Deputation of Officers:

ShriR.R.Rao, Station Officer, who was deputed to Home Guards Organisation as Fire-Fighting Instructor with effect from 18-5-1964 continued to be on deputation during the year under report. Sub-Officer Waman Krishnaji Rane also on deputation to the Directorate of Civil Defence from 31-8-1964 continued to be on deputation. Shri V. V. Rao who was deputed to Civil Defence Directorate from 5-10-1965 was repatriated from 1-1-1967.

(6) Medical Unit:

A Medical Unit conducted by the Women's Volunteer Corps and Red Cross Society at Fire Brigade Headquarters, Byculls, Bombay, forthe benefit of members of families of the Brigade personnel continued to function during the year. Similar additional Centres were opened at Chembur, Memonwada and Worli Fire Stations. The following Honorary Physicians and Surgeons attended the Centres.

In all 8,117 persons were removed in Ambulances. First aid was rendered on 246 occasions. The total receipts during the year on account of hire cases amounted to Rs. 49,382 including arrears as against Rs. 49,085 in the previous year.

MUNICIPAL GARDENS

Gardens (City)

During the year 1966-67 the department maintained 164 sites consisting of 54 gardens 77 recreation grounds, 3 fountains 8 trafic islands, 6 open spaces, 8 band stands 5, box hedges and 3 statues.

3 New sites were developed into gardens and development of other 3 sites was under progress during the year under report.

Victoria Gardens

Victoria Garden which is already an attraction to the visitors to Bombay has been recently added with single mosaic chairs to bring about novelty over tepical wooden and mosaic benches. Cages and fencing have been decorated by multi colour paintings.

Queens Road Garden

The old European cementry of Bombay which is at present known as visitors paradise and the main attraction of the Bombay City, is the first of the pains poured in by this department. The attractive fencing prepared out of pictures of grills, makes the visitors to flock in which are then further attracted by a number of novelties in this garden.

Sion Fort Hill

One of the neglected corners of the city which was in charge of the Archeological Department of Govt. of India has been taken over by the Corporation and handed over to this department. The site is under the project of land scape gardening. The water fall giving natural appearance is the main attraction of this site. The attractions treated from the circulating water is one of the main features of this project.

Land scaping with flowing waters and fountains is also one of the attractive features. These attractions are making this corner more and more crowded and adding the beauty to the city.

Benches were provided in all the gardens according to requirements. Lawns and roads in all the public gardens are maintained in good condition.

1,900 tree saplings were planted on the roadsides and its growth is satisfactory, as new system of planting grown up saplings instead of small ones is adopted.

Elephant, camel, pony and boating rides were the main attractions of Victoria Gardens.

Wild life week was celebrated and it was great success.

This department took part in the vegetable, fruit and flower show as usual.

A nominal entrance fee of Rs. 0-05 per adult above 12 years was introduced from 18-4-1966 for entry the Victoria Gardens Zoo and total income of Rs. 1,44,997, is derived during the year under report.

Increase: 873 mammals and 85 birds were born, 155 mammals, 7 birds and 2 reptiles were received a present 22 mammals, 37 birds and 12 reptiles were purchased.

Decrease: 38 mammals, 60 birds and 20 reptiles died, 645 mammals, 39 birds and 2 reptiles were sold.

During the year 186 wild animals, birds and reptiles were treated in the Zoo hospital and 144 specimens of pathobacteriological interest were examined at Sr. Veterinary Inspector's office and Bombay Veterinary College.

Veterinary students were taken round the Zoo and instructions were imparted on the subject of securing wild animals, their treatment, feeding and management, etc.

The total expenditure and income of all the gardens and recreation grounds in Greater Bombay is Rs. 13,43,429 and Rs. 2,82,277.

Gardens (Suburbs.)

5 new gardens were laid out during the year bringing the total No. of gardens to 39. Besides 2 play grounds 1 bandstand and 1 traffic island were maintained.

Juhu Park Santa Cruz

It is the main attraction of suburban Lites as Lion Club has provided with modern type of childern's play apparata at the cost of Rs. 80,000 in the Park.

80 tree saplings were planted on the roadsides.

Gardens (Extended Suburbs)

1 New garden was laid out during the year bringing the total No. of gardens to 10. Besides I statue is maintained and benches were provided in a few gardens according to the requirements.

CENTRAL STORES

Tenders and Contracts.—Tenders were invited for the purchase of Stores (other than Plant & Machinery and Dietary articles) during the year under Report in 216 cases as against 222 cases in the preceding year. The number of contracts for the various schedule articles entered during the year was 262 as against 291 in the preceding year. The number of casual or market enquiries or quotations invited for articles not covered under the schedule was 483 as against 656 in the preceding year.

Plant & Machinery and Furniture Section—This Section has made various purchases of Plant & Machinery and wooden & Steel Furniture, Electrical and Automobile Accessories including tyres, tubes, petrol, diesel and lubricating oils for Municipal departments. For this purposes 99 tenders by public advertisement and 30 sealed quotations were invited involving a total cost of Rs. 38,69 lakhs approximately. 115 Contracts for various articles under Plant & Machinery and Furniture Section were entered into during the year. Wooden & Steel Furniture required by various departments and Hospitals were standardised purchased and inspected by the staff of this Section.

Diet Section—25 Tenders amounting to Rs. 28.87 lakhs approximately were invited for the supply of dietary articles to Hospitals and Maternity Homes. In respect of item other than dietary articles 15 tenders were invited involving a total amount of Rs. 11.85 lakhs approximately. 25 Contracts for various articles under Diet Section were entered during the year. For various hospitals and maternity homes about 3,742 quintals of wheat and rice worth about Rs. 2.43 lakhs were also purchased.

Sale of unserviceable articles:—The total amount realised by the sale of unserviceable articles including mixed scrap (excluding cast iron scrap which was retained for Municipal use) by private offers during the year. a mounted to Rs. 2.08 lakhs as against Rs. 2.70 lakhs in the preceding year.

Steel & Cement:—Statutory control over prices and distribution of iron and steel other than M.S. Plates, sheets, etc. was with-drawn by Government with effect from 1st March 1964 and the position continued to remain so. M.S. Rounds were available in Open Market and the contractors were allowed to purchase the same directly from the market. Some quantities, however, were purchased to meet requirements against some of the contracts in which M.S. Rounds were to be supplied to the contractors.

Statutory control over distribution of cement was also withdrawn by Government with effect from. 1st January 1966 and there is no change since then. The price and allotment of cement in large quantities, however, were controlled by Cement Allocation & Co-ordinating Organization (CACO). The practice of giving subauthorisations to Municipal Contractors for making their own arrangements to obtain cement from suppliers and transport the same to sites of works continued. As however, some difficulty was experienced in this practice, more cement was purchased and stored in Municipal Godown for issue to Municipal contractors against sub-authorisations.

No cement was issued during the year to private parties against the notices issued by City Engi. n eers' Department for house repairs, set-back works, etc.

During the year about 10711 M. Tons of cement worth about Rs. 20.96 lakhs, 3647 M. Tons of Iron materials worth about Rs. 33.02 lakhs, 1,49,690 Metres of Cast Iron Pipes worth about Rs. 60.77 lakhs, 24838 Metres of Galvd. iron pipes worth about Rs. 1.32 lakhs and 3,94,408 Metres of cloth worth about Rs. 5.14 lakhs were purchased.

The value of stores and other materials purchased for stock at Central Stores during the year, including articles received from other departments on Return Stores Mema amounted to Rs. 184.75 lakhs as against Rs. 141.08 lakhs in the preceding year. Purchase of articles by Direct Debit to departmental grants amounted to Rs. 9.49 lakhs approximately.

Most of the articles purchased were of Indian Manufacture due to Import Restrictions and the value thereof amounted to Rs. 175,61 lakhs and the value of foreign goods purchased amounted to Rs. 9.14 lakhs approximately.

4724 orders for the purchase of stores were placed with the contractors and other dealers as against 5210 orders in the preceding year.

26815 Indents and Sales Mema were received from the departments as against 25,630 in the preceding year.

The total turn over of this department viz. the receipts and issues of stores during the year came to Rs. 327.43 lakhs as against Rs. 250.67 lakhs in the preceding year.

The balance of stock on hand on 31st March 1967 was worth Rs. 138.52 lakhs as against Rs. 96.46 lakhs in the preceding year.

LICENCE DEPARTMENT

Licence Department functions in various wings namely (1) Licence Section, (2) Encroachment Section (3) Stall Board Section, (4) A Evertisement Section and (5) Shops and Establishments Section and deals with Sections 394, 412A, 393, 313A, 313B, 414, 328 and 328A of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act 1948, Payment of Wages Act 1936, Minimum Wages Act 1948 and Workmen Compensation Act 1923.

LICENCE SECTION

This Section issues licences under Section 394, 412A and 393 of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act with a view to regulate storages of hazardous and combustible goods, trades, steam whistle and steam trumpets on recovery of licence fees as per the schedule approved by the Corporation vide Corporation Resolution No. 1947 of 26-3-1964.

Development Control rules are made strictly applicable to the cases where the storages and trades have come up on and after 1-4-64. Those prior to this date are allowed on merits. A "Guide for licensing of storages and trades vis-a-vis Development Control Rules" is published for the guidance of the staff.

Total number of licences issued during the last three years under Sections referred to above is shown in Appendix 'A'.

ENCROACHMENT SECTION

This Section functions with double purpose namely controlling hawkers and squatters by Licensing under Section 313A and B of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and prohibiting unauthorised hawkers from the roads and footpaths under Section 314 with the help of encroachment removing forries. The total number of licences given to hawkers and squatters is given in Appendix 'B'.

As reported last year, Hawkers 'Sub-Committee has been appointed by the Corporation, to consider the question of suitably modifying the existing policy of issuing hawkers licences with a view to finding out some solution for hawkers nuisance and also to provide more licences to hawkers by creating more R.As. at suitable places without detrement to the traffic and other requirements. Accordingly, new Reserved Areas are created and licences are being issued by the Ward Officers in consultation with the Ward Councillors.

During the year, 2,831 auction sales of the articles seized by the encroachment removal staff but not redeemed by the parties were held out of which 2,713 were in respect of perishable goods and 118 were in respect of nonperishable goods. Amount of Rs. 32,515 was realised as auction sale proceeds as against Rs. 30910 last year.

STALL BOARD SECTION

This Section deals with issue of licences for erection of Stall Board, Weather Frame, Overhanging Awning Show Cases, Steps, Cupboards etc., under Section 313(1) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. The total number of licences issued and the amount realised by way of licence fees during the last three years is given in Appendix 'C'.

ADVERTISEMENT SECTION

This Section enforces Section 328 and 328A of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and thereby regulates various types of advertisements in Greater Bombay.

A booklet containing the "Policy and Procedure for advertisement permits" has been printed for the guidance of the staff.

PROSECUTIONS

During the year under report, the prosecutions were launched for the offences against the provision of the Section 394, 328, 328A and 412. The details thereof along with the details of the preceeding two years are given in Appendix 'E'.

MASS RAIDS

The Mass Raid Section created two years back was found effective for control on locating unauthorised estorages and in keeping the roads and footpaths clean, the same was, therefore, continued during the year under report. This Section has taken 41 mass raids during the year and the results thereof are shown in Appendix 'K'.

SHOPS AND ESTABLISHMENTS SECTION

This Section administers Bombay Shos april Establishments Act 1948, Payment of Wages Act 1936, Minimum Wages Act, 1948 and Workmens' Compensation Act 1923.

The total number of establishments registered under Section 7 of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act 1948 is given in Appendix 'F'.

The number of complaints pending at the close of the previous year, received and investigated during the year and pending at the end of the year is shown in Appendix 'G'.

A statement showing number of prosecutions launched, fines inflicted etc., during the preceding year and the year under report is shown in Appendix 'H'.

Financial.—The Government sanctioned a total grant-in-aid of Rs. 3,33,913 for the year 1966-67 a part of expenditure towards administration of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act 1948, during the year 1965-66. Out of the above grant, a share of Rs. 2,72,926 was allocated for City (Budget A Division I), Rs. 48,937 for Suburbs (Budget 'A' Division II) and Rs. 12,050 for Extended Suburbs (Budget 'A' Division III). The income by way of registration etc., fees for the year 1966-67 was Rs. 2,34,289,98 for City, Rs. 48,220.48 for Suburbs and Rs. 22,506.40 for Extended Suburbs, The figures of income for the previous year were Rs. 2,51,096,95, Rs. 48,582,99 and Rs. 20,167.73 for City, Suburbs and Extended Suburbs respectively. The expenditure on account of the administration of the Bombay Shops and Establishment Act, 1948 and Payment of Wages Act, 1936, etc., during the year 1966-67 was Rs. 4,67,636.20 for City Rs. 1,13,381,43 for Suburb and Rs. 50,996,46 for Extended Suburbs (exclusive of Provident Fund and leave contributions and supervision charges).

Payment of Wages Act 1936.—The number of complaints received and disposed of during the year is shown in Appendix I. During the year under report 3 cases were filed under the Act out of which 2 havebeen decided and 1 is pending at the close of the year.

Minimum Wages Act, 1948.—The total number of visits paid to the establishments covered under the Act for the enforcement of the Act during the year are as under:—

As a result of intervention of the Inspector of this Section, an amount of Rs. 24,316.14 was distributed to 455 employees from City Rs. 424.25 to 5 employees from Suburbs and Rs. 730 to 2 employees from extended suburbs by way of increase in wages, difference, etc. The number of complaints received and disposed of during the year is shown in Appendix J.

Workmens' Compensation Act, 1923.—During the year under report only one establishment from Suburbs was visited for the purposes of investigation of complaint received under the above Act and nothing actionable was detected thereat by the Inspector.

GENERAL

The Wardwise Administration is continued and fully implemented. The Licensing Section of the P and R Wards were located at Malad Office which have now been bifurcated for the convenience of the public. The section of the 'P' Ward is situated at Malad Office and that of 'R' Ward at Borivali.

Renewal of licences under Section 314, 412A and 313A (Stall board projection etc.) was done during the month of April 1966. As per the usual practice, mass raids were held for licence, advertisement, encroachment section as well as for the purpose of Bombay Shops and establishment Act and the Minimum wages Act as in the Appendix 'K' and 'L' respectively.

MARKET DEPARTMENTS

(CITY)

- 1. Receipts.—The total income from the Markets and Slaughter Houses was Rs 74,50 lacs as against Rs. 69.41 lacs in the preceding year.
- 2. Markets. In all there were 42 Markets in the City 26 Municipal and 16 Private Markets (Licensed by the Bombay Municipal Corporation). The licence fees recovered from the owners of these private markets amounted to Rs 93,423.00 as against Rs 1,14,551,00 during the previous year.
- 3. Outside Shops.—There were 199 (188 meat and 11 fish) outside Shops in the City licensed by the Municipal Corporation in addition to meat and fish stalls in Municipal and Private Markets, for sale of mutton, beef, pork and fish. The licence fee realized was Rs. 18,875,00. 59 licences were issued to Private parties for the sale of imported meat, refregerated meat, frozen fish, Ham, Bacon and Sausages and the licence fee realised was Rs. 5,662.
- 4. Scale-shed.—During the year under report the total fees collected at the Scale-shed Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Market amounted to Rs. 9,76,751,00 as against Rs. 8,90,848,00 during the previous year.
- 5. Fish Season.—During the year under report the total quantity of fish brought to the markets was about 30,374 Metric tons as against 29,825 Metric tons during the previous year. The arrival of fish was normal during the year.
- 6. Cold Storage facilities.—The cold storage Plant at Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Market continued to meet the requirements of preservation of fish, vegetables, fruits, meat, eggs, milk and milk products etc. The plant consisted of 3 chambers, one for storing fish at 28 F to 31°F, one for mutton at 30°F to 37°F and one for vegetables etc., at 35°F to 40°F. The plant is worked by the FREON 12 system with four wasting House condensing units and direct expansion coolers. OZONE generator for deodourising and disinfecting Bacteria in chambers is also provided.

- 7. Receipts.—The total receipts during the year amounted to Rs. 74,50,700.00 as against Rs. 69,41,610.00 during the previous year. There is slight increase in the total receipts on account of improved receipts under stallages, squatter fees, slaughter fees and fair fees.
- 8. Stalls and spaces in Markets. In all Markets in the City there were 4,048 regular stalls provided for sale of different commodities such as flowers, fruits, vegetables, fish, mutton, beef, pork, poultry, eggs etc. The stalls continued to be well occupied throughout the year. In addition to these regular stalls, there were about 600 spaces in the Municipal Markets in the City provided for persons doing day to day business. Spaces provided for on daily payment basis also were continuously occupied throughout the year.
- 9. All markets including private markets were regularly supervised. The Veterinary Officers and qualified Public Health (Sanitary) Inspectors, carried out the work of inspection of articles of food such as meat, fish, fruits, vegetables etc., with a view to preventing the exposure of unwholesome food articles for sale for human consumption. During the year under report 2,60,003 kilograms of unwholesome food articles in the aggregate were destroyed as against 2,23,793 kilograms in the previous year.

Special mention may also be made of the inspection carried out by the Veterinary Officers of Livers and Blood consignments imported by certain pharmaceutical firms from various centres outside Bombay. The amount realised by way of Import and inspection fees was Rs. 37,907.00 during the year.

10. Surprise Raids.—Surprise raids to detect the smuggling and unauthorised slaughter of animals and also the import and sale of contra band meat were carried out by the staff specially appointed for this purpose. During the year 1,12,982 kilograms of contraband meat was seized and destroyed as against 1,05,526 kilograms in the preceding year. In all 2,066 seizures were effected in different parts of the City and 1,955 prosecutions were instituted. The fine imposed amounted to Rs. 14,380.40. The amount realised by selling seized animals and skin etc., was Rs. 59.50. In addition to this an amount of Rs. 2,084.00 was recovered by way of penalty from the different parties who were found importing animals into the City without requisite permits.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES

11. Two main Municipal Slaughter Houses viz., one at Bandra for slaughter of horned cattle, buffaloes, sheep and goats and other at Arthur Road for slaughter of pigs were continued to be operated during the year. The slaughtering chamber at Delisle Road Sheep Market meant for slaughter of sheep and goats for religious purposes was continued during the year to meet the demands from the public. The Jhatka Slaughter House at Arthur Road, which was owned privately and licensed by the Corporation was also in operation during the year as usual. The revenue derived from this source amounted to Rs. 21,87,763.00 as against Rs. 18,33,913.00 during the previous year.

Licences granted for slaughtering of frogs at Dharavi were further renwed during the year.

- 12. The main Slaughter House at Bandra is old and outdated. The proposed shifting of the same to Deonar was in progress.
- 13. The number of animals brought to the fair ground at Bandra Slaughter House and the number of animals slaughtered thereat as compared with them those of the previous year were as under:—

- 14. The number of Pigs and Piglings brought to Arthur Road Pig Slaughter House for the slaughter during the year under report was 12,786 and 36 respectively, out of which 12,550 and 35 were slaughtered as against 13,934 pigs and Nil piglings slaughtered during the previous year.
- 15. Government Veterinary Staff as usual inspected the horned cattle, buffaloes and male Buffalo calves in the Slaughter House as per the provisions of Cattle Preservation Act. Animals intended for slaughter were subjected to proper ante-mortem and post-mortem inspection by qualified Veterinary Staff. Unwholesome meat detected was seized and destroyed by the staff of the Slaughter House.
- 16. The principal causes of ante-mortem rejection of animals were Emaciation, Exhaustion, pregnancy, Sheep-pox, foot rot, Actinomycoisis Brucellosis and Febrile conditions, diarrhoea and other diseases of infectious nature rendering meat unfit for human consumption. In case of buffaloes and horned cattle Most of rejections were due to animals being young and fit for breeding, milch, farm or cart purpose.
- 17. The main causes of post-mortem condemnation were cysticercus boivis, liver fluke, Abscesses, bruises, Sarcocystis, Hydatidosis Septicamia and other parasitic and Nodular infections of liver and lungs. The causes for rejection of pigs were Tuberculosis, Cysticercus, Cellulosae, Bruises, Hydatodosis etc.
- 18. The approximate weight of dressed carcass meat of buffaloes and cattle was 10,480.60 Metric tons that of sheep and goats 13,763 Metric tons and that of pigs 314.60 Metric tons. Most of this meat produced was for meeting the demand in the City. The quantity of the meat rejected and destroyed, as unfit for human consumption was 34.2 Metric tons of beef, 12.2. Metric tons of mutton and 4.1 Metric tons of pork which worked out to 0.39,0.09 and 1.20 per cent. respectively of the total meat.
- 19. Lectures and Demonstrations on Food Inspection, Meat Hygiene etc., were given to Medical and Veterinary students of Different Medical and Veterinary Colleges, Students Nurses visiting from various hospitals as also to the students preparing for Public Health Inspectors' Examination from Bombay Municipal Corporation and Local Self Government Institute.

The total meat destroyed at Kurla Slaughter House was 3,344 Kgs. during the post-mortem examination.

The unwholesome articles of food such as fish, fruits; vegetables, meat etc., weighing 17,550 Kgs. were destroyed during the year in different markets.

The total meat destroyed was 18,401 kgs. as against 28,030 Kgs. during the last year.

EXTENDED SUBURBS

There were 10 Municipal Markets including 3 Open Air Markets and 6 Private Markets during the year.

The slaughtering of animals (Sheep and Ccats) was done at the slaughtering chambers attached to Borivli, Kandivli and Mulund Markets and at Private Markets at Goregaon and Malad. The total number of animals brought for slaughter at the Municipal Slaughtering Chambers during the year was 2,36,29 out of which 11 were dead and 163 animals were rejected on ante-mortem examination. The total number of animals slaughtered was 23,288 as against 23,087 slaughtered in the previous year. The balance of 167 animals remained for slaughter during the next year. The main causes of rejection were pregnancy and ill-health.

The approximate weight of dressed meat was 2,32,880 Kgs. There were 35 outside meat-shops during the year out of which 30 were mutton shops, 4 for sale of beef and one was for sale of ham, bacon and sausages.

Twelve outside shops in the New Borivli Market on Swami Vevekanand Road, near Borivli Station and temporary market at Sainath Road, Malad were constructed during the Year.

During the year 631 Kgs. mutton 1,171 Kgs. Fish 1,832 Kgs. Vegetable, Fruit 578 Kgs. were destroyed on inspection in the markets.

In all 17 raids were carried out for detecting unauthorised slaughter and sale of animals in the Extended Suburbs during the year. In all 17 cases were filed and resulted in conviction. Total fine inflicted was Rs. 340. Besides 231 Kgs. of meat was seized and destroyed as unwholesome during the year.

For the first two weeks the newly admitted students were taken in batches in the K.E.M. Hospital Ward to acquaint them with the medical relief activities. Few introductory lectures, demonstrations were given before-

The teaching in the subjects of Physiology, Anatomy and Biochemistry were integrated as far as possible so that all the three departments were tackling the same topic simultaneously.

Students attended a series of lectures on "Growth and Development" given by the Heads of various departments like Anatomy, Physiology, Psychiatry, Paediatrics and Gynaecology.

Medical Examination of University students from various colleges in Bombay for the purpose of N. C. C. and Physical Training was undertaken by the Preventive and Social Medicine Departments at the request of University of Bombay.

A programme of Medical Checkup and medical care for the students of this College was continued during the year 1966.

National Caset Corps continue their activities in the College compound.

Scientific and Educational Films were shown during the year to the staff, students and members of the Nursing Staff of these Institution.

Research Activities

A number of Research projects were undertaken at the College and Hospital under the auspices of the Indian Council of Medical Research. The Council of Scientific and Industrial Research, The National Institute of Health U.S.A. and through the help of some Pharmaceutical firms like Unichem.

Hostels

Pharmacological Research Unit C. S. I. R. screened 295 compounds received from R. R. L. Hyderabad Dr. Deliwala, Haffkine Institute, Bombay and the P. and D. Committee for C. N. S. activity (Primary screening of these compounds, 22 have been screenedin greater detail. 4 of these 22 compounds (2 Phenylethylamines an 2 Trimethoxyphenyl derivatives) showed promising tranquilising properties. 126 compounds, received for screening as diuretics, from the same sources, have been screened. 28 of these compounds showed diuretic activity. 32 compounds have been screened for their anti-inflammatory activity. N-M 3, 4—dimethxoy phenylethyl anthranilic acid (RH—15) showed promising activity and has been screened in detail. 37 compounds have been screened for anti-tussive properties and 2 of them were found to be active anti-tussive agents. Further screening is in progress.

ADMINISTRATION

Internship Programme.—The department continued to organise the General Internship Programme for all departments for the year 1966-67.

Urban Health Internship Programme.—Dr. D. N. Pai is solely in-charge of the Urban Health Internship Programme for the Medical Interns from all the City Medical Colleges.

Department of Pathology and Bacteriology

Full Time Department of Medicine

The Department of Medicine was functioning with its full-time staff of 1 Professor-Director of Medicine, 1 Asstt. Professor of Medicine, 1 Senior Registrar during the year 1966. Dr. Bhorade M.D., Asstt. Professor of Medicine was deputed to U.S.A. to specialise in the study of diseases of the Kidneys on study leave from 10th September 1966.

The teaching and clinical duties were carried out by the above staff and by the Honorary and Honorary Associate and Asstt. Physicians.

The Haemodialysis Unit is functioning with the Alwall's Artificial Kidney system. In addition to this one more dialyzer vir., 'Kiil Dialyzer' with the Quinton Seattle System received recently has also been installed and is functioning satisfactorily.

The Endocrinology and the Gastrointestinal Clinics attached to the Department of Medicine have been functioning well.

The research activities of the Department inclued studies on peptic ulcer, hook-worm diseases, and malasorption starts after gastric surgery.

There has been a shortage of laboratory technicians in the specialised laboratorise. Their number needs urgent and immediate augmentation.

Accomodation of Patients and their particulars.

The number of Schedule bed strength during the year was 1,113. As usual there was constant over crowding in the hospital, particularly in the Children Wards and Medical and Surgical Wards for females.

During the year 1966 the average number of In-patients in the hospital was 1,436 as aagainst 1,300 and 1,213 during the year 1965 and 1964 respectively indicating clearly the increasing demand for the hospital beds. Even after imposing restrictions on routine admissions in order to control overcrowding, the total number of patients admitted for hospitalization during the year under report was 53,335 as against 52,210 and 50,394 respectively during the two preceding years. The average stay of In-patient was 9.82 days during the year nder report as against 9.39 in the year 1965 and 8.02 in the year 1964.

Results of Treatment of Indoor Patients.

Out of the total number of 54,577 patients includin g 1,242 brought over from previous year, 10,710 discharge as cured; 30,125 were relieved an 8,704 left the hospital either against medical advice or were otherwise discharged and 3,668 died (excludin g 443 Still Borns and Neonatal Deaths). At the end of year 1,370 patients were in the hospital under treatment.

The total number of Confinement was 5.342.

Deaths Classified

Out of the 3,668 deaths, 1,429 died within 24 hours of admission; 492 after 24 hours but within 72 hours of admission and the rest 1,747 deaths took place after three days from the date of admission. The figures are exclusive of 443 Still Borns and Neonatal Deaths. Death rate was 6.7.

Total number of autopsies performed during the year under report was 1, 681 as against 1,582 and 1,377 for the years 1965 and 1964 respectively. Autopsy rate was 45.8 for the year 1966 as against 44.2 and 42.6 for the year 1965 and 1964 respectively.

Out Patient Department

The total number of new cases issued during the year under report was 3,19,476 as against 3,14,699 and 2,94,408 in 1965 and 1964. The total number of Out-patient attendance (New and Old Cases including Casualty Cases) was 6,86,064 bringing the average total attendance 2,250 per day.

Casualty Cases registered during the year were 71,558 as against 70,176 and 65,309 during the year 1965 and 1964 respectively.

The highest number of patients treated on a single day was 3,009 on August 2, 1966. The highest number of Casualty Cases treated on one day was 330 on August 2, 1966.

19,176 Operations were performed on In-patients and 35,131 were performed on Out-patients.

Physio-therapy Centre and School

The Physio-therapy Centre and School is a joint venture of the Government of India, Government of Maharashtra and the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay; the Corporation sharing the major portion of expenditure. A two years Post-Graduate Programme in Physical Therapy leading to a Cerfiticate in Advanced Physical Therapy was started in September 1964 and student had registered for the Course. 12,480 Patients: were referred to this Section and the total number of treatment given was 1,57,541

43 New students were admitted in July 1966 bringing the total number of students undergoing training to 82.

Occupational-Therapy Centre and School

The total number of patients treated at the Centre was 7,158 and 1.17,711 treatments were given as against the figure, 8,495 patients treated and 1,02,708 treatments during the year 1965. The work is the weaving, tailoring and printing Sections is being carried out satisfactorily. 34 students were admitted during the year under report, bringing the total to 63.

Nursing Staff

During the year under report 65 Nurses were sent up for General Nursing Part I Examination, 113 Nurses for Part II Examination and 44 Nurses for Mid-wifery Examination. Outof these 65, 89 and 40 Nurses respectively have been declared successful in the respective examinations held by the Maharashtra Nursing Council.

The total number of Nursing Staff during the year was 623 inclusive of the Superior Staff.

The arrangement of sending Nurses to the Kasturba Hospital for training in Infectious Diseases was continued during the year. 12 Student Nurses were directed to the Kasturba hospital every month in two batches of 6 each for training for a period of 15 days.

Nurses Welfare Fund

This fund instituted in 1931 for promoting the welfare of and providing amenities to the Nursing Staff of this hospital. It is mananged by a Committee of which the Dean is an Ex-Officio President. The corpus of the fund amounting to Rs. 28,500 is held in Government and Municipal Securities and fixed deposit which are deposited with the Bank of Maharashtra for safe custody. The fund is being utilised for providing amenities and extra curricular activities to the Nursing Staff.

Prophylactic Immunization Centre

The total number of patients treated during the year was 35,336 as against 38,571 in the previous year. 8,317 New Cases were registered during the year. On may 30, 1966. 177 patients attended the Centre, figure-showing the highest attending on a single day. Besides anti-rabic treatment, immunization against Typhoid. Cholera, Plague, Diptheria and Small-pox was also done at the Centre.

Leprosy Clinic

The Clinic is conducted by the Greater Bombay Leprosy Control Scheme and the patients suspected to be suffering from Leprosy are examined at this Clinic. 549 New Cases were treated and the total attendance of patients was 7,207. The average attendance of patients was 46.5. 710 Biopsies were taken.

Neuro-Surgical Department

During the year under report 722 New patients and 1,467 Old patients were treated at the Out-patient Department and 301 cases were admitted as In-patients. The number of Neuro-surgical Operation performed was 438.

Neurology Department

During the year under report 1,340 New patients and 2,684 Follow-up patients were treated at the Out-patient Department, and 508, patients were admitted as In-patients.

Cardiology Department

During the year under report, 1,464 New patients and 5,909 Follow up patients were treated at the Outpatients Department. 9,884 Electro Cardiograms were taken during the year under report, as against 10,053 and 10,100 during the years 1965 and 1964. 104 Cardiac Catheterization and 40 Angio Cardio-graphy were performed during the year under report.

Family Health Centre

The Family Health Centre continued to function satisfactorily during the year under report.

Facilities for the Patients and their Relatives

Gift Shop.—This is a sort of Sales Service started in the year 1950. Many additional items are being stored for sale.

Recreation Room and Library

A small Library-cum-Recreation Room has been maintained for the benefit of In-patients. A Radio Receiving Set Carromboard and draughts are provided for the recreation of patients, in addition to News Papers and Magazines.

Advisory Medical Board

During the year under report, the Advisory Medical Board held 10 meeting of the Honorary and Professorial staff.

Staff Society Clinical Meetings

The staff Society of the K.E.M. Hospital and Seth G.S. Medical College held ten meetings during the year, when papers on various subjects were presented.

Dr. N. A. Purandare Gynaec & Obstetric Research Centre

In Dr. N. A. Purandare Gynaecological and Obstetric Research Centre cases of Gynaecology disorders of harmonal origin are being studied from the point of view of research, investigation and therapy. Oral contraceptive tablets are also being issued by the above Centre.

Family Planning Centre

The total attendance of the Centre was 1259 during the year under report and the total number of Cases registered was 386. As regards the contraceptives, accent was mainly on Condon and Jelly method. 182 Vasectomy Operations were performed during the year.

Some of the patients were referred to Dr. N. A. Purandare Gynaecoloigcal and Obstetric Research Centre for oral contraceptives.

Food Handlers' Scheme

The Scheme of periodical examination of persons handling food employed in city hotels, catering houses and restaurants made satisfactory progress during the year under report.

3,222 persons were directed for examination by the Health Department, out of which 1,477 persons attended for examination. 328 persons did not give their stools, blood, etc., for pathological examination and hence their reports are still pending. In all 777 fit certificates and 372 unfit certificates were issued during the year under report.

SHANTILAL MATHURADAS BLOOD BANK

(Bombay Municipal Blood Centre)

The total number of blood samples including those from voluntary donors was 9,647 and the amount of Rs. 60,244 was paid out of the Poor Box Charity Fund. The number of blood samples supplied for transfusion was 9,358. Out of the 9,647 blood samples collected, 2,012 were voluntary donors and 2,690 were from relative donors.

Expenditure out of Poor Box Charity Fund

The total expenditure incurred on the maintenance of the hospital during the year 1966-67 including liabilities at the end of the year but exclusive of the cost of extension scheme amounted to Rs. 75,79,125 approximately. The expenditure was inclusive of the cost of maintenance and treatment of In-patients, Outpatients and Establishment Charges on Medical, Nursing, Administrative and Labour Staff as well as the cost of the Staff for maintenance and repairs of the buildings.

E. N. T. HOSPITAL

The Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital was started at the Improvement Trust Bldg., 7, Napier Road, Fort Bombay, on the 15th December, 1962 for providing medical and surgical treatment to patients suffering from Ear, Nose and Throat diseases.

The scheduled bed strength of the hospital is 100 and all the 100 beds were commissioned for the use of inpatients during the year under report. The total number of patients admitted in the hospital during the year was 4,976. The average stay of an in-patient in the hospital was 3,37 days during the reporting period. Out of the total number of 4,976 in-patients, 4,446 were cured, 257 were relieved, 169 were otherwise discharged 31 left against medical advice, and 11 died leaving 62 patients under treatment in the hospital at the close of the year.

The highest number of patients admitted on a single day was 32 on the 26th December 1966.

Out-Patient Department

The total number of new case papers issued during the year 1966-67 was 24,637 and the total number of Out-patient attendances (New 24,637 and Old 36, 553 cases) were 61,190, bringing the daily average attendance of Out-patients to 200.62. The highest No. of out-patients on a single day was 301 on the 2nd August 1966.

Operative Work

As many as 6,336 operations were performed out of which 1,682 were performed on out-patients and the remaining 4,654 on the In-patients during the year.

Donations

Seth Mangoomal Atmasing, Managing Trustee of Atmasing Jessasing Charitable Trust, who has donated Rs. 2½ lakhs to the hospital was requested to donate the articles mentioned in the deed of agreement already executed in the last year.

Lecture Series

A few lectures by the Honorary Staff were arranged at the E.N.T. Hospital for the benefit of M.S. (ENT) students during the course of the year. Some very interesting clinical demonstrations were also given by the said staff.

Poor Box Charity Fund

Cash boxes were continued to be kept in the hospital to enable the patients to drop in their voluntary contributions towards Poor Box Charity Fund. An amount of Rs. 4,425.48 was collected for the Fund through these boxes during the year 1966-67. The fund was utilised for the welfare of the poor and deserving patients attending the hospital.

Hospital:

The number of schedule beds is 336. Though simple Surgical operative cases such as Hydrocele, Hernia, Pilesetc., and a few Orthopedic cases are transferred to Dr. Bhajekar Hospital, Khetwadi, Bombay 4, which is under the control of this hospital, it has not much helped to reduce the overcrowding of indeor patients at the hospital.

Expansion:

A phased programme of the expansion of the hospital to meet the ever-increasing demands has already been finalised.

An extension building, a miniscraper with ground and eight upper storeyed having a bed capacity of about 500, 10 Air conditioned operation theatres, accommodation for some out patient services and quarters for Resident Medical Officers, is expected to be ready for occupation by the end of 1967. These extra beds and additional facilities are expected to ease the present over crowding to some extent.

In the second phase of expansion programme which is to start immediately on the completion of the new extension building, adequate facilities are proposed mainly for specialised services.

Indoor Patients:

The total number of patients admitted during the year was 24,160 against 24,892 and 25,649 during the years 1965 and 1964 respectively.

On an average, the daily number of patients was 488.84 as against a schedule bed strength of 336.

The highest number of in-patients on a single day was 544 and highest number of admissions on a single day was 107.

Out of total number of 24,647 in patients including 487 brought from the previous years balance, 22,850 were discharged, 1,340 died leaving a balance of 457 patients at the end of the year.

Out of 1,340 deaths 216 were within first 24 hours of admission, 373 were after 24 hours but within 72 hours of admission and the remaining 751 died after a period exceeding 3 days from admission.

Out-patients Department:

The working hours of the out-patient clinics and registry section are the same. The working hours of almost all the special service units like Cardiology, Gastro-enterology etc., are fixed from 11.30 A.M. to 1.30 P.M. This timing has been found to be more helpful in reducing the waiting period of the patients.

The total number of O. P. D. attendance including Casualty patients during the year was 3,69,189 as against 3,24,486 for the year 1965 giving a daily average of 1,194,79 against 1,056,95 for the previous year.

The highest number of attendance on any one day was 1,593 as against 1,498 for the previous year. The highest number of new and old cases on a single day was 642, and 1,054 respectively.

A close look at the in-patient numbers and out-patient attendance will show that there is some decrease in the in-patient number. This is mainly due to the fact that due to the shortage of X-ray plates, the radiological investigations etc., had to be restricted to urgent and deserving cases.

Some Surgical cases were treated at Dr. Bhajekar Hospital and more complicated cases were operated at the hospital which caused a slightly higher average stay of the patients.

Blood Bank:

Demand for blood was found to be pressing as usual. During the year approximately 4,100 transfusions (excluding plasma transfusions) were administered as against 4,003 for the previous year.

Response from the voluntary donors was not found so encouraging and only 69 voluntary donors were bled during the year as against 504 during the previous year.

Due to the ever lasting and pressing gemand for blood it was thought desirable to request the relations of the patient in need of blood, to donate blood. Response for request was found encouraging and as many as 247 relations gave blood. Open heart surgery technique has been modified, needing now less number of blood donors and quantity of blood for the Heart Lung Machine.

Cardiology Medical and Surgical Services:

572 new and 1,072 old cases attended at the O. P. D. 155 were admitted for indoor treatment. During the year 68 Cardiac operations and 52 Cardiac Catheterisation and Cardio-angiography were performed. During the year under report 5,306 cardiograms were taken as against 4,878 for the previous year.

Gastro-Enterology (Medical) Service:

During the year 407 new cases attended the O. P. D., in addition to the follow up cases which were on a verage 16. 228 patients were admitted for Indoor treatment.

A regular follow up is under taken of all the cases. The department carried out routine investigations in addition to special investigations such as Peritoneoscopy, Sigmoidoscopy, Gastric Biopsies, Gejunal Biopsy, Liver Biopsies, Colon Biopsies, Oesophagus Biopsy and Gastroscopy.

Gastro-Enterology (Sargical) Service:

During the year 434 new cases were attended in addition to the regular old cases. 800 cases were admitted for investigation out of which 25 were operated. The Department carried out 400 Barium investigations, 200 gastric Analysis including gastric analysis with insulin study and 12 Cholecytography investigations.

Neurology Service:

This specialised service functions twice a week. During the year 602 patients were examined in the O. P. D. and 67 were admitted for indoor treatment.

The department also examined 125 indoor patients referred by other services.

Indian Council of Medical Research (Government of India) sanctioned a grant for this department for a Clinico-Arteriographic and Pathologic study on acute stroke cases admitted to this hospital which was carried out during the year.

Neuro Surgical Service:

153 New and 134 Old cases were attended at the O. P. D. 76 were almitted for indoor treatment. 105 operations were performed.

Rheumatic and Collagen Disesses Department:

This department conducts out-patients clinic on one day in a week and 367 patients attended the

Thoracic Surgery Service:

During the year 704 patients attended the out-patient department and 144 wer admitted for indoor treatment. During the year 246 operations were performed.

A regular follow up of the cases was un lertaken. A regular "Bronchoscopy" session was conducted every Tuesday for nearly 6 months and on an average 2-3 bronchoscopies were done at each session.

Genito Urinary Surgical Service:

90 new and 137 old cases were attended at the O. P. D. During the year 181 operations were performed.

Plastic Surgery Service:

The department functions once a week. During the year 122 new cases attended the department. 150 cases were admitted for surgery and 220 operations were performed.

Preventive and Social Medicine Department:

The lepartment provided clinic services to two types of socio-occupational groups, Sweepers at Arthur

Road and White collared workers at Gilder Lane.

The department continued to undertake follow-up work of cases referred from the hospital. During the year "Tuberculin" testing was carried on 3,333 children attending Paediatric O. P. D. of the hospital and B. C. G. vaccination was administered to 1,996 new borns and 781 children from Paediatric out-patient

Home visits were undertaken as usual. 1,374 neo-nates were given small-pox vaccine.
The department is engaged on a special study of "Coronary" patients, attending out-patient department, and University Professors.

Audiology and Speech Therapy Department:

The demand for the services of this department is ever increasing. During the year 854 new cases were registered. The total number of cases treated was 8,441. The daily average attendance of the patients is approximately 14.

Looking to the needs of new trained personnel in this specialised branch, a school for training of personnel is started from August 1966 with a first batch of 10 students. The course is of 2 years duration leading to the award of a "diploma". The entrance qualification is I.Sc. (B Group). It is proposed to make this course a regular Degree course and the matter is under correspondance with the University of Bombay.

The department has secured services of visiting lecturer in Speech Pathology from the United States under Full-Bright Programme. Dr. George Bryan the visiting lecturer from Oklohoma, U.S.A. joined the department from September 1966.

School Clinic Department:

A clinic for Medical examination of School Children from the Municipal School in A to E wards, was opened at this hospital from 1st July 1965. The clinic worked in three services, Paediatric, Aural and Ophthalmic from Monday to Friday between 2-30 P.M. to 4-30 P.M.

During the year 2,017 new cases, and 13,016 old cases were examined. 199 child ren were operated upon for Tonsils,4 for Mastoid and 3 for disease of sight. X-rays were taken in case of 327 children, Cardiograms were taken in 22 cases. 108 children were given glasses from the clinic.

N ursing Staff:

During the year 34 candidates passed the Senior examination of the Maharashtra Nursing Council and 29 Nurses passed the Mid-wifery examination held by the council.

Poor Patients Fund:

Donation to the extent of Rs. 20,379.74 were received during the year in addition to Rs. 11,575 collected from the boxes kept in the wards and O. P. D. of this Hospital.

An amount of Rs. 4,486,63 was spent from the fund towards Medicine, Drugs, etc., for the Poor Patients.

Health Check up Centre:

231 patients took benefit of this subsidised facility during the year under report.

Although citizens have not taken full advantage, it is being patronised and with adequate propaganda a greater number of citizens will utilize the service. The service is open on week days from 6 P.M. to 7-30 P.M. and on Saturdays from 2-00 P.M. to 3-30 P.M.

Annual Expenditure:

The total expenditure incurred on the maintenaance of the hospital including liabilities at the end of the year amounted to Rs. 36,33,460 as against Rs. 32,50,735 for the previous year.

TOPIWALA NATIONAL MEDICAL COLLEGE

The college has been permanently affiliated to the University of Bombay for teaching the courses of studies leading up to M.B., B.S. and B.S.C., (Med.) Degree Examinations. The University of Bombay has discontinued Diploma Courses in Medical subjects and M.Sc. (Medical) courses since June 1966 and instead commenced Degree courses.

The college is also affiliated with the College of Physicians and Surgcons of Bombay for Post-graduate Diploma Courses.

Admission:

The number of undergraduate students on the roll at the close of the year was 644 out of which 333 were lady students. The number of post-graduate students was 160 including 48 ladies. Students registered for college of Physicians and Surgeons of Bombay for Diploma courses were 87 including 24 lady students.

The arrangements of sending students to the L.T. Municipal General Hospital for clinical training was discontinued from 18th December 1966. However, in view of the shortage of beds at the attached Nair Hospital, the University has been approached to allow to make use of one clinical unit each in Medicine, Surgery, and Gynaecology at that Hospital.

Lectures, Seminars and Research:

During the yerar, Clinico-Pathological Conferences and Clinical meetings were held.

Research Society:

A Research Society of this College and Hospital was formed on 16th September 1964 and continued their work as usual.

The College subscribed to 200 periodicals during the year as against 196 during the last year. In all, the library continued to receive 306 periodicals as against 287 during the preceding year. The college library has at the end of the year 13233 books as against 11826 in the last year and 4465 bound volumes of periodicals as against 3437 during the last year.

Two books were lost and written off.

Naval Medical Unit:

The Naval Medical Unit of the National Cadet Corps continued their activities at the Maharashtra. Naval Medical Unit, Haji Ali Park.

Gymkhana And other Activities:

National days were celebrated. The Annual College Day was celebrated on 22nd Janury 1967 when Shri S. R. Patkar, Mayor of Bombay was the Chief Guest.

Annual Cost and Revenue:

The total expenditure of the College amounted to Rs. 12,93,397 during the year under report as against Rs. 13,46,101 during the previous year. The net revenue of the College by way of Tution Fees miscellaneous receipts, etc. amounts to Rs. 2,74,681,24 as against Rs. 2,69,140.61 during the preceding year.

DR. BHAJEKAR SURGICAL HOSPITAL

DR. BHAJEKAR STREET, BOMBAY -4.

This hospital with a schedule bed strength of 45 is attached to the B.Y.L. Nair Charitable Hospit al and is under the overall administrative control of the Dean, B.Y.L. Nair Chairtable Hospital.

Patients attending Nair Hospital and needing minor surgical operations, such as Hydrocoele, Hernia, Piles, etc., are admitted and operated at Dr. Bhajekar Hospital. An out-patient Department also functions on Saturday at Dr. Bhajekar Hospital and patients are admitted. Out of 45 beds, 11 beds are for orthopedic cases.

Orthopedic patients from Nair Hospital in convalescent stages and needing routine treatment are transferred to Dr. Bhajekar Hospital, to reduce overcrowding in orthopedic wards and admit new cases requiring active and urgent treatment.

The Honorary Surgeons from the Nair Hospital attend to the patients at Dr. Bhajekar Hospital, A.M.O. at the Nair Hospital looks after the general working of the Bhajekar Hospital under the overall supervision and control of the Dean.

During the year, 431 new cases were examined at O.P.D. 1114 patients were admitted for indoor treatment out of which 1070 were on surgical side and 44 were on orthopedic side. Total number of eperations performed was 1133 out of which 36 were "Vasectomy Operations."

The expenditure of the hospital for the year 1966 amounted to Rs. 1,40,568.

The hospital has to a certain extent helped to reduce the overcrowding of the in-patients at B.Y.L. Nair Charitable Hospital.

THE NAIR HOSPITAL DENTAL COLLEGE

The College conducts four years' Course in Dentistry leading to the Degree of the Bombay University. The College also conducts Post-graduate Courses in 7 subjects since June 1959.

This College is recognised as Training Centre in India to train candidates for L.D.S., R.C.S. (Eng). Examination and Felowship in Dentistry Examination of the Royal College of Surgeons, England and Edinburgh.

The admission standard for student is Intermediate Science Examination of the Bombay University or an examination equivalent to it and the course extends for four years.

During the year under report 43 students including 13 ladies have passed the Firal P.D.S. and M.D.S. Examinations. The following are the principal departments of the College:—

The College has an academic Council to look after the academic affairs of the College.

The College has 127 Dental Chairs, 100 Dental Units, 3 Dental X-Ray Machines and other equipments to give Dental Treatment on most modern lines.

Students Gymkhana

The College has provided all facilities for indoor and outdoor sports.

During the year under report Dr. Jan Johansen, a Foreign Expert from Norway was invited as Guest Teacher by the Dental Council of India to give lectures to the M.D.S. Students.

Resume of work done in the Clinics

The total number of patients treated during the year under report was 85375 (both in the morning and evening Clinics) which included 41502 Males, 21935 Females and 21938 Children. Details of work done, operations performed, etc., are given in Appendix 'A' and 'B'.

During the year under report a total revenue of Rs. 1,84,791.00 was collected by way of fees from students and patients as against Rs. 1,89, 372.00 during the preceding year. The total expenditure incurred came to be Rs. 6,05,178.00 as against Rs. 6,30,786.00 during the preceding year.

Poor Box Fund

During the year under report 914 sets of the upper and lower Artificial Teeth, 409 Partial Sets of Teeth 100 Repairs of Sets of Teeth and 620 X-Rays were given free to Poor deserving patients from the Fund. The total amount in the Fund was Rs. 37,345.48 at the close of the year.

7120 Municipal School Children were treated in the Clinics during the year.

This institution has completed 19 years of its existence in the year 1966-67. A short report of the staff, departments and the work done in the departments during the year under report in this institution is given below:—

Administrative staff—Dr. V. N. Panse, M.D., M.D.M., Prof. of Preventive and Social Medicine, L.T.M. M. College, Sion, has been asked to look after the duties of the Dean, of the L.T.M.G. Hospital and L.T.M. M. College, Sion from 1st April 1966, in addition to his own.

Dr. (Smt.) A. S. Punde, M.D. (Bombay) held the post of Superintendent of the L.T.M.G. Hospital Sion, during the year under report. She was on leave from 27th December 1965 to 8th January 1966 During her leave period Dr. V. S. Shevde, M.B., B.S., Asstt. Medical Officer and Fire Brigade Surgeon was lookin after her duties.

Municipal Medical College, Sion.—The Municipal Medical College, Sion, started in November 1964 with 60 students.

The first batch of 60 students was sent in April 1966 for first M.B., B.S. Examination of the Bombay University and 33 students passed. In October 1966 the Second batch of 52 students, in addition to the first one entered the Second M.B.B.S. Class.

The name of the College has been changed to "The Lokmanya Tilak Municipal Medical College".

The total number of students of the College is 204 including 25 seats admitted in November 1966.

The second floor having area of 27,000 sq. ft. has been constructed over the existing O.P.D. Building or accommodating additional departments of Pharmacology, Pathology and Preventive and Social Medicine Departments which have started functioning from June 1966 for Second M.B.B.S. students.

Clinical training in Medicine and Surgery has also begun since June 1966.

The students participated in Inter-Collegiate Sports.

N.C.C. Training is arranged and the students are being given necessary facilities to attend the camps etc. arranged during the College vacation.

Ambulance Service:—As the Casualty and O.P.D. departments have been shifted to the old barracks, round the clock Ambulance service is maintained for reaching the admitted patients to the various wards.

Flying Maternity Squad:—The Flying Maternity Squad, donated by the Indian Red Cross Society, Bombay City branch, is doing immense valuable work of attending lady patients, when they are in difficulties of deliveries.

Theservice is kept alert round the clock. One Registrar and one Staff Nurse is attached to the squad. Whenever a Medical practioner in the city or suburbs, finds that a maternity case needs immedicate special attention, such as supply of Oxygen, Blood transfusion or Hospitalization, a call can be made to 4,71,257, and the Flying Maternity Squad reaches there within the minimum time and provides the necessary assistance.

During the year under report the Squad has attended 73 calls, out of which 69 patients were brought to the L.T.M.G. Hospital, Sion, for further treatment.



GROUP OF T. B. HOSPITALS, SEWRI

The total number of patients examined at the Registration Centre of the Croup of T. B. Hospitals and put on waiting list during the year was 10,984.

The total number of patients in the various stages of Pulmonary Tuberculosis treated during the year was 6,709; out of these 5,477 discharged as improved, 187 discharged as Non-tuberculous cases, 577 left against medical advice, 468 died and 719 remained under treatment at the close of the year. Mortality figures revealed the high incidence in the age group of 26-30. Ratio of death percentage of total treated was 6.9. Major lung operations were performed during the year in 387 cases.

FOLLOW UP OF DISCHARGED CASES

The total number of patients who attended the Group of T. B. Hospitals for Follow up examinations after discharge from the hospital was 2,275 during the year.

P. P. REFILL WORK

595 P. P. Refills were given in the wards to the indoor patients of Group of T. B. Hospitals. Dischaged patients on P. P. Refill treatment continued subsequent P. P. Refills at the Group of T. B. Hospitals. 1332 P. P. Refills were given.

TEACHING

Clinical teaching in tuberculosis was given to batches of undergraduate medical students of Seth G.S. Medical College and to the post-graduate D.P.H. students of Bombay University as in previous years. Lectures were also delivered in Medical, Surgical and Preventive aspects of Tuberculosis to the students of Bombay Homeopathic College by the Medical Staff of this institution.

Group of T.B. Hospitals and the four T.B. Clinics continued to be recognised for diploma course in Tuberculosis, i.e. T. D.D. by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Bombay as well as for the degree course i.e. M.D. (Tuberculosis) by the University of Bombay.

RESEARCH WORKS

During the year Group of T. B. Hospitals participated in the Second Thiacetazone Side-Effect cooperative investigation sponsored collectively by the World Health Organisation, Medical Research Council of Great Britain and Indian Medical Research Council.

RAMKUNWAR DAFTARY T. B. ISOLATION CENTRE, DADAR

Advanced infectious tuberculosis patients are admitted to this centre primarily from the view-point of segregation and sympatomatic amelioration from the surrounding areas. The total number of patients treated during the year was 369; out of these 136 were discharged as improved. 170 as not improved, 96 left against medical advice and 38 died.

MUNICIPAL T. B. CLINICS.

Four T. B. Clinics, viz. at Princess Street, Foras Road, Dadar and Khar continued to serve as diagnostic centres for Pulmonary Tuberculosis patients and treatment centres with specific anti-tuberculosis drugs. They also serve as out-patient centres for admission to the Group of T. B. Hospitals, Sewri or Sarvodaya Hospital, Ghatkopar (on Municipal beds). Health Visiting is also done through the T. B. Clinics; the total number of health visits during the year was 9086. 618 P. P. refills were also given at four T. B. Clinics.

EXPENDITURE

The average expenditure per patient per day at the G. T. B. Hospitals was Rs. 12.33. The expenditure on diet per patient per day was Rs. 2.94. The total annual expenditure on the Group of T. B. Hospitals amounted to Rs. 33,36,389 as against Rs. 26,16,570 during the perevious year.

The rate of charges for the patient hospitalised at Sarvolaya Hospital, Ghatkopar, on behalf of the Bombay Municipal Corporation was Rs. 7 per patient per day and Rs. 2 per day per vacant bed. The expenditure incurred on the patients accommodated on the reserved beds at the said Hospital was Rs. 9,26,227 as against Rs. 6,27,147. for the previous year, mainly due to the reservation of additional 100 beds from September 1966.

The total expenditure on the four T. B. Clinics attached to the Group of T. B. Hospitals, Sewri was Rs. 6,48,430. Thus the total expenditure incurred by the Corporation on Tuberculosis Services was Rs. 49,11,046.

Poor Box collection including fees for issue of Medical Certificates was Rs. 13,115.47. This collection is utilised for the benefit of the poor and needy patients and incidental expenses in consequence.

LEGAL DEPARTMENT

During the year under report Shri A. M. Desai, M.A., LL.B., Solicitor to the Corporation was in charge of the Legal Department.

This department attended to the following works:-

- (6) Amendments of the Municipal Act, Rules and Bye-laws.

During the year under report 25237 files were received from Various Departments and 7862 letters were received from the outside parties. 3398 letters were addressed to the out-side parties or their legal Advisors. The opinions on different departmental matters and the advices on 247 documents were given.

On the principle of providing higher standards for 35 children or more in the city and suburban and 25 children or more in the out-lying far away areas, Higher Standards 25 of Standard V, 23 of Standard VI and 23 of Standard VII were opened during the year under report.

The total No. of Upper Primary (including vocational) and Lower Primary Schools and classes was 566 and 424 respectively as against 530 and 416 during the preceding year.

The total No. of pupils on roll at the end of the year in Municipal Schools and classes in Greater Bombay stood at 4,74,468 as against 4,50,114 in the previous year (*Vide* Appendix I). Thus there was a net increase of 24,354 pupils in Municipal Schools and classes. The average attendance of pupils throughout the year was 4,20,065 as against 4,13,850 in the preceding year.

Teachers in Municipal Schools

The total number of teachers in Municipal Schools during the last year was 12,79! out of which 523 were special teachers. The No. stood at 13,491 (special teachers 585) during the year under report. Out of 12,906 ordinery teachers 12,460 (i.e., 96.5%) were trained as against 11,765 out of 12,268 (ie., 95.9%) in the previous year.

The requirements of teachers as assessed are as per Class-room formula, as adopted by the Education

Supervision of Municipal Schools

The supervision of Municipal Schools continued as it was in the year 1965-66. 16 Administrative Officers are appointed and they are entrusted with the full Administrative work and executive work to some extent in respect of all the schools in the Ward. The Beat Inspectors are entrusted with the effective supervision of the schools.

No new Beats were formed during the year under report. The position of the Beats at the end of the year under report is—

Teachers, Diaries and pupils progress cards and registers continued to be maintained as usual and parents were kept informed of the progress, conduct and attendance of their wards by forwarding the progress cards to them every month.

Double promotion examinations were conducted in July 1966, as per rules by the Inspectors of the Municipal Schools.

Written examination of the pupils of Stds. I to VII was held in the months of March and April 1967 by a Central Ex amination Board including representatives of the Municipal Teachers' Federation, Shikshak Sabha and Municipal Teachers' Association, specially constituted for the purpose.

The following factors, inter alia hampered the progress of pupils in Municipal Schools.

- (1) Largeness of certain classes,
- (2) Lack of suitable school buildings,
- (3) Inadequate facilities to pupils to study at home.
- (4) Economic conditions of the parents resulting in irregular attendance and long and continuous absence of pupils.

With a view to avoiding over-crowding in classes it was laid down that ordinarily a class should not have more than 50 pupils to facilitate proper attention to pupils. However, in schools with bigger class-rooms, the number of pupils in classes some times reached a figure of 55-60 rendering the class unwieldy and unmanageable for the class teacher. Consequently the necessity for doing teaching work, in details by giving individual attention to the pupils could not be fulfiled in some of the schools. On the other hand, in schools housed in rented buildings, over-crowding on account of inadequate accommodation was an impedimint in the way of efficient instructions. Out of 990 schools and classes, about 693 schools and classes were required to be run into two sessions and more than two sessions for want of sufficient accommodation. This measure is hampering instruction besides causing a lot of inconvenience to the pupils, teachers and the parents. A programme of construction of new municipal owned school buildings which is being implemented on a large scale would, it is hoped improve the situation considerably in a few years.

As per the decisions of the State Government teaching of English in Upper Primary Standards was introduced in our schools since 1960. Refresher courses for the benefit of the teachers teaching English language have been continued during the year under report and response to the class is encouraging.

The existing curriculum for standards I to VII as revised by the Government is being followed in Municipal Schools.

As required under proviso to Section 62BB of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act and the city of Bombay Primary Education (Amendment) Act 1950 the same Text Books which were used during the last year were used during the year under report in accordance with directions of the Government. Changes in the use of Text Books, wherever effected, were made with the sanction of the Government as per the proviso to the above quoted Section of the Act.

Rahimtulla Currimbhoy Urdu Training Institute for Women

As only S.S.C. passed candidates were admitted to the Institute, there was no F.Y. Class There were 4 divisions of the second year class comprising 3 divisions of S.S.C. passed candidates and one division of P.S.C. passed candidates with 193 trainees at the end of the year under report. The teaching staff included a Head Mistress, 7 full time Instructors (including one Instructress for teaching Gujrati and Hindi) and 4 parttime Instructors for teaching special subjects like Drawing, Drill, Music Sewing, etc.

This year 193 trainees have been sent up for the Junior P.T.C. Examination held in April 1967.

Municipal Urdu Teachers' Training Class, Mahim

During the year under report, there were 50 trainees, in the class. The teaching staff included one Head Master, 3 full-time Instructors for regular subjects and 6 part-time Instructors for treaching special subjects.

In all 46 trainees appeared for the P.T.C. Examination held by the Government, out of whom 36 passed the result being 78%.

Loan Scholarships

An amount of Rs. 75 per month was given as Loan Scholarship to Municipal Teachers who underwent training at the Municipal Training Class or any other Training Institution. This Scholarship was given to the teachers on their request only.

The amount of Trust Funds, Prizes, Freeships etc., interests accrued on various trusts and endowments were distributed among the eligible pupils in accordance with the terms and conditions of the respective trusts.

School Furniture and Equipment

Amount spent for the supply of furniture articles etc., out of Loan Funds for the year under report was Rs. 61,424.00.

16 new school buildings were added to the existing No. of 170 during the year under report bringing the total No. of 186 in Greater Bombay. On some Municipal School buildings additional floors were constructed wherever possible and thereby increasing the number of class-rooms for additional accommodation for classes. The school buildings at 8 places are under construction and extension in respect of certain school buildings are in progress. 470 schools (including classes) were accommodated in Municipal owned school buildings, 500 schools (including classes) were accommodated in rented buildings and 20 schools (including classes) were housed in rent-free buildings.

While the No. of pupils in Municipal schools has been increasing from year to year it has become practically impossible to acquire additional accommodation except by way of constructing buildings or extending the existing ones.

II.—Municipal Aided and Recognised Schools

Aided Schools

On 31st March 1967 the No. of Aided Schools was 223 (133 in City 53 Suburbs and 37 Extended Suburbs) as against 254 (153 in City, 61 in Subs. and 40 in Extended Suburbs). The No. of pupils in Aided Schools in the City, Subs. and Ext. Subs. decreased during the year under review from 65,411 to 55787. The average number of pupils on roll in Aided Schools during the year was 55428 as against 64 556 in the previous year. The average daily attendance being 51171 (92.3%) as against 60518 (94% of the previous year.

Out of 1885 teachers 1087 were trained and 798 were untrained as against 2158 teachers in the preceding year, out of whom 1293 were trained and 865 were untrained. The percentage of trained teachers in Aided Schools worked out to 57.5% which compared unfavourabley with the percentage of trained teachers in Municipal Schools which is 96.5%.

The power of administering grants to Aided Schools vests in the Corporation under Section 62(c) (3) of the Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. The rate of the maximum admissible expenditure per pupil per annum in respect of the Aided Schools is Rs. 25. The revised Grant-in-Aid Code came into force from April 1964. The amount of grant paid to the schools during 1966-67 as per the revised code is Rs. 7,07,439.

Several grievances were received from teachers against the school Managements during the year under report. The complaints related mainly to (i) irregular and abrupt termination of services without any ground or on incorrect grounds, (ii) Non-payment of salaries, (iii) non-payment of Provident Fund amount or interest thereon. These were attended to by the Inspecting Officers and the Incharge Superintendent.

Many schools were asked to adopt service conditions as laid down in the Government Grant-in-Aid Code for Secondary Schools and leave rules as per Municipal teachers but generally response was not effective.

The practice of discouraging recognition and registration of schools with untrained teachers and inade-quate accommodation continued.

A large number of pupils including children of Government servants and armed forces sought assistance from this office for special admission to the classes in addition to the maximum number of pupils. Most of the applicants were those whose mother-tongue was other than English. All the requests could not be complied with but efforts were made to accommodate as many pupils as possible in these schools by relaxing the rules. In order to raise the teaching efficiency of teachers working in private primary schools symposiums and seminars were arranged.

Unaided and Recognised Schools

Besides the Aided Schools there were 331 other schools (200 in City, 96 in Suburbs and 35 in Extended Suburbs) which were recognised but which did not receive aid from the Corporation. 2,897 organize teachers and 567 special teachers (2,088 in City, 1,068 in Suburbs and 308 in the Extended Suburbs) were working in these schools imparting education to 1,03,629 pupils (58,697 in the City, 34,703 in the Suburbs and 10,229 in the Extended Suburbs).

III-Vocational Education

There were 33 vocational classes in 22 vocational schools—16 carpentry, 12 tailoring, 1 sign-board painting, 1 printing, 1 Book-binding and 2 clock Repairing.

During the year under report, the Educational Guidance Centre undertook the following extra curricular activities:—

- (1) Started career information centre in each ward.
- (2) Guidance conference was held.
- (3) Lectures on 'How to study' and 'How to choose a career' were given in primary schools and secondary schools respectively.
- (4) Organised a talk on "P.S.C.-What Next?"
- (5) Hald Career Exhibition, Career visits, career conferences and career films were shown to the studentsof primary and secondary schools.

IV-Physical Education

The Government Syllabus in Physical Education in lower primary and upper primary schools in the state continued to be followed in Municipal Schools this year also with suitable modifications to suit the local conditions which are the direct result of the shortage of open spaces and play-gounds adjoining the schools.

Following were the main activities of Physical Education Section during the year under report..

- (i) 4 Mass Drill Displays.
- (ii) 30 Model Schools Functions.
- (iii) Physical Training Class for Teachers.
- (iv) Annual Sports at 76 Centres.
- (v) Picnics and Educational Excursions.
- (vi) Games and Drills competitions.
- (vii) Refresher class in Physical Training for Teachers.
- (viii) 15 Bal Bhavan-cam-Play Centres.

V-Scout and Guide Movement

The total No. of Scouts and Cubs is 9,360 while that of Guide and Bulbuls is 8,800.

Following are some of the important activities that were conducted during the year under report

(1) Explanatory Training Camp, (2) The First Class Scout/Guide Rally, (3) Preliminary Training Camp for Teachers, (4) Patrol Leader's Training Camp for Scout and Guides (5) Cub-Bulbul Excursions, (6) President's Scout/Guide Rally—Delhi, (7) Annual Scout/Guide Sports were conducted at 8 Zonal Centres, (8) Scout/Guide Rallies, (9) Hikes for teachers, (10) Scout/Guide Week. During this week activities such as Scout/Guide Rally, Camp fires, etc., were organized, (11) Proficiency Badge workshops for Scout and Guides in different zones, (12) Scout/Guide Centres.

V-Audio Visual Education

Educational Films on various subjects were shown to the Municipal School Children by five Projectionists of this department in different wards.

Audio Visual Aids were exhibited as medium of modern teaching elements at the time of Science seminar.

Special classes were conducted for teachers attending science course in Refresher classes and they were shown how to operate Epidiascopes and other visual Aids.

VI-FINANCE

The principal sources of income of Primary Education Department are (i) five times actual the net realisation of the Corporation in the preceding year under the Head of General Tax (uncluding arrears and payments in advance) divided by the rate fixed for the General Tax for the said financial year, (ii) Government grant towards Primary Education, (iii) Education cess, (iv) Interest on Endowment and Investments, (v) Rent and other proceeds of properties, (vi) Interest on profits on investments of surplus loan and other balances and (vii) Other Miscellaneous Receipts.

The opening balance as on 1st April 1966, was Rs. 46,88,577

The total expenditure for the year including office amounted to Rs. 6,02,76,412. The closing balance as on 31st March 1967 (after taking into account decrease in Renewed Grant) was Rs. 53,39,131.

VII—RESEARCH UNIT (Education)—1966-67

The Research unit carried out the following studies during the year 1966-67.

- (1) To make the classes interesting and to increase attendance, activitity method of teaching was introduced in standards I and II.
- (2) An experiment of parallel classes for slow learners and to minimise the failures was tried and on this basis an experiment of ungraded unit has been introduced recently.
- (3) Special experiment in remedial teaching in Arithmetic and language was conducted and literature in the effective teaching of these two subjects has been prepared for the guidance of teachers.
- (4) Reading habits of children were studied with a view to helping the children to comprehend the material read and to cultivate reading habits.
- (5) Language Development Project in Standards I to IV in model schools was undertaken to vitalize the routine class-room teaching of language and to help the childen to learn habits of oral and iwritten communication.

- (6) Supervision Project was undertaken in multilingual schools to study (1) attendance of teachers and the pupils (2) Discipline and cleanliness, (3) Actual teaching in the class, (4) Parental co-operation, (5) Educational Excursions, (6) Correction work done by the teachers and (7) Use of teaching aids.
- (7) An experiment in ungraded unit course has been started in the first two years of Primary Education with a view to reducing the number of failures resulting in stagnation, drop-outs and wastage.
 - (8) Preparation of graded assignment in Arithmetic and language for Standard 1.

VIII—Secondary Schools

During the year under report the Corporation has started 5 more secondary schools in addition to the existing 17 ones in 16 different wards of the city. During the year there were 158 divisions of Std. VIII and of divisions of Std. IX. The number of teachers in 22 schools was 349 (inclusive of 56 specialteachers) and that 74 pupils on rolls was 10,161.

IX-General

During the year under report Medical Inspection of children studying in Standards I and III, as well as those of Standard II and IV who remained unexamined during the last year was done. The total number of children examined was 1,10,084 out of whom 92,023 were found to be suffering from one defect or the other. Amongst the common defects noticed were general debility dental, enlarged glands, throat etc., were the most predominant.

The clinical treatment to pupils in suburban and extended suburbs was given at L.T.M.G. Sion Hospital and Nair Hospital while major ailment were directed to the school clinicat K.E.M. Hospital, Parel. Pupils with communicable diseases were promptly detected and the pupils were disallowed from attending schools during the infectivity period.

Immunization work was carried out as per programme by Mobile Health Unit.

Some of the outstanding activities undertaken by Medical Officer (Schools) are as under (1) Health Education (2) Health Ministry, (3) Health Trophy Scheme, (4) Health Parades, (5) Supply of Milk to attending children, (6) Emergency care.

The students attending the Municipal Secondary Schools were also examined

Municipal Teachers' Library, Gilder Tank and Santacruz

The total number of books at the end of the year was 26,501 (19,667 at Gilder Tank and 6,834 at Santacruz) as against 24,787 in the previous year. The total number of Newspapers and periodicals subscribed was 82. The total No. of books issued was 16,404 showing an average of 55 books per day at Gilder Tank and 10,492 from Santacruz Library showing an average of 35 books per day. 260 new members (192 at Gilder Tank and 68 at Santacruz were enrolled during the year under report.

Gratis Use of Schools Premises

The use of Municipal Schools premises for running Government Milk Centres and for conducting social Education Classes, Hindi Classes Night Schools, etc., under the auspices of Educational and School Welfare Institutions was continued to be allowed grates or at nominal fees outside regular school hours on prescribed conditions with the consent of the landlord of the building concerned.

Extra Curricular Activities

(a) Sharad Utsav (Autumn Festival) at 20 Centres in Greater Bombay, (b) Dramatic and Folk Dance Competitions (c) Schools Anniversaries—Dassera Festival, Independence and Republic Day were celebrated in a number of Municipal Schools when special invitations were given to the parents so as to bring them into close contacts and variety entertainments were arranged on such occasions. (d) Democracy in schools and model schools, class panchayats (Prefect courts) and school Parliaments were introduced in a number of schools with a view to inculcating a sense of discipline and self-Government among pupils, (e) Excursions, (f) Educational Seminars Exhibition and cleanliness week. Municipal teachers spread over in 44 beats in Greater Bombay participated in these seminars, (g) Milk Scheme—Under this Scheme the undernourished children were eatered with 200 ml. of toned pasturised milk in sealed bottles on every school working day except during the period of June, July and April when the attendance of the pupils is irregular. Under this scheme all schools in city get milk, some schools in suburbs and Extended Suburbs where Government milk Trucks cannot get access to the school premises do not get the benefit of free milk supply. The scheme to supply skimmed milk to all the children attending the Municipal Schools from the donation offered by the CARE to the Municipal Corporation has been implemented during the year under report (h) Vacation Library at 50 centres.

Industrials Relations.—There was no occasion on which the provisions of the Bombay Municipal Servants Act, 1890, had to be brought into effect. No new Union was recognised duringthe year under report. However, the Municipal Workers' Union has been granted recognition to represent the labour staff in K. E. M. Hospital, Rota Printing Unit, Municipal Workshop and E. E. Transport and the Bombay Municipal Hospital Employees' Union had been granted recognition to represent the nursing staff of the Kasturba Hospital. The recognition of the Bombay Municipal Kamgar Sangh to represent K. E. M. Hospital, Transport Branch and H. E. (A. E. C.) Department was withdrawn for want of Union's representative character in those departments.

The award on the disputes regarding linking of Dearness Allowance with the Cost of Living Index raised by the Municipal Kamgar Mahagai Bhatta Andolan Samiti and the payment of Dearness Allowance to all the Municipal employees as it is given to the B. E. S. T. employees raised by some of the Municipal Unions given by the arbitrator, Shri Salim M. Merchant appointed under Section 10 (A) of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 was received. The dispute regarding demands about Accommodation, House Rent Allowance etc. referred to the arbitration of Shri Salim M. Merchant, along with the above disputes is pending before the Arbitrator. The dispute regarding the demands about revision of grades, conveyance allowance etc. of the executive staff referred to the arbitration of Shri Purshettam Kanji, Chairman of the Wage Board is also pending.

Sixty four disputes were referred to the Assistant Commissioner of Labour, Conciliation Officer, Ist Labour Court, payment of Wages Court, Arbitrator or Industrial Tribunal by different Unions of the Municipal employees and by employees individually as indicated in Appendix 'A'.

Shri R. L. Rambhad, Conciliation Officer and Shri Salim M. Merchant, Arbitrator, heard respectively 9 and 60 applications under Section 33(2) (b) of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 submitted by the administration for approval to the actions of dismissal or removal proposed by it against the delinquent employees. the approval orders in 36 applications were received during the year under report.

The following five awards: First two of the Arbitrator, Shri Salim M. Merchant and last three of the industial Tribunal of Shri Taki Bilgrami were received and published during the year under report:—

- (1) Interim Award in Municipal Arbitration Reference No. 1 of 1966 in the matter of ad-hoc increase in Dearness Allowance.
- (2) Final Award in Municipal Arbitration Reference No. 1 and 3 of 1966 in the matter of linking of Dearness Allowance with the cost of living Index and payment of Dearness allowance as paid to B.E.S.T. employees.
- (3) Award in Ref. (IT) No. 227 of 1966 in the matter of withdrawal of notice of change for payment of over time.
- (4) Award in Ref. (IT) No. 299 of 1966 in the matter of payment of retention allowance in Main Sewer Department.
- (5) Award in Ref. (IT) No. 352 of 1966 in the matter of the post of Head Clerks and assurance given by the Corporation in that behalf.

Labour Management Co-operation —With a view to promoting cordial relations between the employees and the administration the following steps were taken:—

- (i) Joint Council.—The total number of Joint Councils constituted by the end of the year under report were 22.
- (ii) Peshi Committees.—Peshi Committees were formed with a representative of labour as well as Administration to inquire into the misconduct comitted by the municipal employees in Hospitals, Clinics, Maternity Homes, etc.
- (iii) Grievance Procedure.—A four stage grievance procedure is laid do wn to redress the grievances of the employees in all Municipal Departments. The grievance committee consists of the representatives of the labour and the Management which investigates the grievances of the employees.
- (iv) Individual Grievances.—Complaints received by the Labour Officer from the employees and also from the Unions were of various nature. The following table gives the number and the nature of the grievances received an dealt with by the Labour Officer.

The scholarship to the children of Municipal employees:-

During the year report, 447 applications for scholarship were received and 158 scholarships were granted to applicants for Higher Education and 209 for Secondary Education. The total amount given by way of scholarships to the Municipal employees was Rs. 20,000.

Medical Assistance Scheme to the Municipal Employees:-

448 employees applied for Medical assistance under the above scheme. Out of which 433 employees were given aid amounting to Rs. 20,000.

Attendance at Welfare Centers.—The average attendance of adults and children at different Welfare Centres during the year .e. April 1966 to March 1967 was 1,750 and 1,680 respectively as against 2,139 and 1,814 during the preceding year.

Film Show.—Film Shows were organised at the beginning of the year at the different centres. Films were taken on loan from Visual Education, Film Division, U.S. I.S. and British Information Services. The films were on serveral subjects such as Food Values, sanitation, Folk Dances and Folk Songs of India.

Nursery School.—Two Nursery Classes started two years ago were functioning satisfactorily during the year and they were also found to be popular among the labour staff of Bapty Road Chawls.

Picnics.—Three hundred Municipal employees of the different Welfare Centres were taken to Nasik, Goa and Mount Abu during the year. An excursion to Mysore, Bangalore and Ootacamund was organised in the month of November 1966 for 80. Nurses of different Municipal Hospitals and Maternity Homes. The Municipal Corporation has given the approval to start a Welfare Centre for Sion Hospital Nursing Staff. It will be started in the near future.

Scouting.—The total strength in Scout and Guide Section's was 3,754 as against 3,233 during the preceding year. The organisation gave the following outstanding services during the year under report.

They carried out traffic duties and assisted in maintaining law and order at the time of several celebrations, exhibitions and festivals in the City.

The Scout/Guides and Scouters/Guiders attended and participated in several Scout activities in the City as well as outside the City.

Grow more Food Project.—In addition to Lovegrove, Dadar and Dharavi Co-operative Societies, two more Societies, one each at Versova and Colaba plants have been formed under the guidance of Labour Officer. Profits were distributed to share holders by the Commissioner at Dadar Purification Work.

Annual Athletic Meet.—Annual Athletic Meeting was held at Purandare's Stadium on 28th February and 1st March 1967. Nearly 2000 competitors from different Welfare Centres took part in various items. Dr. Shanti Patel distributed the prizes to the winners in the presence of Dy. Municipal Commissioner (Labour). Labour Officer and members of other staff.

PUBLIC RELATIONS DEPARTMENT

Shri N. A. Mistri, M.A., D.J., Dip. s.w., Public Relations Officer, continued to be in-charge of the department during the year 1966-67.

The Department effected general publicity about the various activities and services rendered by different Municipal Departments and worked as a clearing house in respect of criticisms and suggestions in local newspapers. It also carried out health education work and dissemination of information to the public through various media.

INFORMATIVE PUBLICATIONS

The Civic Guide-cum-Diary 1966, comprising of a guide to civic affairs and other useful information was published in English and Marathi. Two revised editions of the booklets, containing names, addresses and telephone numbers of Municipal Councillors, names of members of different Committees, names of Councillors representing different wards together with a list of imoprtant Municipal Officers were also published. Other publications revised and reprinted during the year are Development Control Rules for Greater Bombay and Broad Outlines of Bombay's Traffic and Transport Study.

INFORMATION COUNTERS

Two Information Counters—one each at the main and extension buildings—continued to prove as useful adjuncts in giving necessary guidance and information to the public and sales of various publications

OTHER IMPORTANT ACTIVITIES

(1) The Public Health Museum at Bombay Sanitary Association, (2) Civic Sense Gallery at the Victoria and Albert Museum, (3) Permanent displays at Venereal diseases and Family Planning Clinics at Bellasis Road continued during the year.

IMPORTANT CELEBRATIONS

The Department participated in observance of World Health Day, National Cleanliness Day, Anti-fly Week, National Smallpox Eradition Week, World Leprosy Day, Prohibition Week Social Education Week, Sharad Utsav, Family Planning Fortnight, Local Self-Government Day, and also in various Health Drives, Exhibitions etc., organised by the Lions Clubs, Bombay Civic Trust, and such other social welfare organisations. Special educative propanganda was also carried out in connection with the Triennial Census of non-attending children of Compulsory Age in Municipal Schools.

During the year under report, a special Collection Drive for the Mayor's Fund was carried out when full-fledged activities, such as publication of a souvenir, holding of a cultural programme, collection of donations from institutions and individuals, etc., were undertaken. As in the past, the entire work pertaining to this Special Collection Drive was entrusted to this department and the same was carried out in the required manner. This department also assisted in the work of collection of donations for the National Flag Day and Lal Bahadur Shastri National Memorial Fund.

In addition to providing information to various civic bodies in India and other Government departments, information both in write-ups and pictures was culled, collated, and furnished to various foreign countries, many of them coming through the Mayor.

Sub:—Administration Report for the year 1966-67.

- (1) 7.714 new members joined the Pool during the year under report.
- (2) 4.096 Beginners were trained during the year.
- (3) 35,468 Casual Swimmers including Labourers and Factory Workers availed of the facilities of swimming during the year.
- (4) Six Educational Institutions availed of the swimming facilities at a concessional charge of Rs. 100 per month during the year.
- (5) A 17 member M. G. M. O. Swimming Pool Team participated in August 1966 in the Swimming Competitions held at Delhi by the National Swimming Club of India, Delhi and the Team won 4 trophies 2 for Juniors and one for women Championship and one for Water Polo Championship.
- (6) 16 Members of the M.G.M.O. Swimming Pool participated in the 23rd National Swimming Championship held at Patiala in October 1966 on behalf of the Maharashtra State Ametuer Aquatic Association. Their expenses were borne from the Municipal fund.
- (7) On medical advice, 25 Polio-crippled children availed of the free swimming facility at the Pool during the year.
- (8) The Pool was closed for 16 days from 15-7-1966 to 30-7-1966 due to water shortage and was reopened on 31-7-1966 for Swimming.
- (9) The Inter-collegeate Swimming Competitions were held at the M.G.M.O. Swimming Pool in September 1966.
 - (10) Collection of fees during the year was Rs. 2,48,476 as against 1,76,000 during the previous year.
 - (11) Private partles reserved the Pool for 411 hours by which a revenue of Rs. 9,175 was collected.
- (12) The total annual expenditure was Rs. 1,99, 296 including establishment cost of Rs. 71,127 during the year.
 - (13) There was no drowning accident during the year under report.
- (14) 14th Anniversary of the M.C. M.O. Swimming Pool was observed on 27th April 1966 by holding swimming competitions of the members of the Pool. Prizes were awarded by Shri S. R. Patkar the then Mayor of Bombay.
- (15) The Eleventh Annual Long Distance Sea Race from Dadar Chowpatty to Bandra and back was held on 5th February 1967. Prizes were distributed to winners by Dr. (Mrs.) M. R. Tamboli.
- (16) The quality of the water of the Pool was maintained fit for swimming by effective filtration and chlorination. Samples of the water were tested every week in the Municipal Laboratory.

Work done by the Stock Verification Section-

Verification of Reserved Stores including capital stores at the Central Stores and Sub-Depots was carried out during the year as usual. Periodical checking of balance of petrol, dieseloil etc. at the various Municipal Pumps was also done and quarterly live stock statement of bullock as well as increase and decrease statements of live stock at the Victoria Gardens were verified, checking of the unserviceable articles needlessly occupying considerable space in Municipal Schools was also carried out, 189 Schools and other Ward Offices were visited and unserviceable articles lying there were auctioned on the spot as per procedure laid down.

This section also helped the Enquiries Section in keeping a watch etc, at different places and times for detection of malpractices and investigation work such as scrutiny of voluminous records in specific cases.

The other important work attended to by this Section was the distribution of relief grants from the Mayor's Relief to the persons and families affected by fire, house collapses and other natural calamities.

Administration Report of the Bombay Municipal Security Force for the year 1966-67.

The Bombay Municipal Security Force continued to be under the supervision of the Officer on Special Duty during the year under report. He was assisted by I Security Officer and 3 Asset. Security Officers who are on deputation from Police Department.

During the period under review many important cases were brought to the notice of the authorities by the Bombay Municipal Security Force. With the tightening of the Security measures at various installations, pilferages thereat have been checked to a great extent. In appreciation of outstanding work and as an incentive to other members of the Bombay Municipal Security Force, the employees who had shown courage and sense of duty in apprehending the culprits, some of them even at the risk of their lives were awarded cash prizes in token of appreciation of their services. In a few cases, some outsiders who assisted the staff of B. M. S. F. in detecting the thefts etc. were also awarded cash prizes. In all 29 persons including 4 outsiders were rewarded with a total amount of Rs. 369 out of which Rs. 75 went to the outsiders.

The Industrial Unit of the Home Guards is also functioning well and the members of the Unit turn out smartly at the parades and are at par in efficiency with the regular Home Guards under the control of Government.

Efforts to bring in revenue by advertisements and increase in circulation were made during the period under report.

- (vi) Scrutiny of standardised furniture proposals.
- (vii) Supervision of Office Procedure and other works as could generally contribute to quality control in administration.

During the year under report, an Appreciation Training Programme on Management and productivity for Top Executives was started from February 1967. The primary objective of this programme was to expose our Top management to modern Management and Productivity Techniques for the solution of our day to day problems.

Administrative Report of the Executive Health Officer for the year 1966-67

Population.—The mid-year estimated population figure for Greater Bombay viz. 47,84,000 for 1966 has been taken as the basis for rates for vital statistics.

Rainfall.—The total rainfall in millimeters recorded at the Colaba Observatory was 1560.7. It was below normal by 253.3 mms. It rained on 95 days as against 87 in 1965 and 105 days in 1964. The wettest month of the year was July with a rainfall of 883.9 mms.

At the Santacruz Observatory the total rainfall was recorded as 1630.7 mms, as against 2597.1 mms, in 1965. July was the wettest month with a rainfall of 944.0 mms.

PUBLIC HEALTH ADMINISTRATION

(I) GENREAL SANITATION

- (A) Food Sanitation. etc.—This includes enforcement of sanitation and hygiene in food establishments, check on hawkers of food and destruction of unwholesome articles of food.
- (B) Grading of Eating Houses.—The scheme for grading of eating houses introduced from the year 1961 contemplates improvement of sanitary etc. conditions obtainable in eating houses by introducing the element of competition amongst the licensees. Grades I, II or III are determined on the basis of marks secured out of 100 allotted for the observance of the conditions of eating houses licences and provision of special arrangements as sterilising of all utensils, cups, dishes, etc. additional arrangements for periodical cleanliness of the premises and tables, cleanliness of the servants and their uniforms refrigeration for food preservation, and periodical medical examination of all employees, etc. The grade allotted to an eating house is required to be exhibited in a prescribed form, at a conspicuous place at the entrance of the eating house. Eating houses securing less than 35 marks out of 100 are not allotted any grade, not allowed to be licensed and they come under prosecution till they either improve the conditions or vacate.
- (C) Grading of bakeries.—Almost on similar lines as grading of eating houses, grading of bakeries in Greater Bombay has been introduced from September 1964 so that the conditions obtainable in bakeries may be improved by competition. The special arrangements that will upgrade a bakery are, interalia arrangements for cleansing and sterilizing all utensils and other appliances, personal hygiene of the staff, special retiring room for workers, perfect fly-proofing of the bake-room and the store-room, use of electric oven for baking, etc. Bakeries securing less than 35 marks out of 100 are not allotted any grade, are not allowed to be licensed and are subjected to prosecutions till they either improve or are discontinued.
- (D) Water supply.—The city continued to receive chlorinated water supply. Constant check on quality of water supply and dosage of chlorine was exercised through systematic sampling and analysis of water at various points in the supply and distribution system. As the pipe-water supply is yet to reach in certain distant parts of the suburbs and the extended suburbs, chlorination of well-water was continued during the year.
- (E) Drainage.—The work of laying sewers and S.W. Drains in Mahim T.P.S. No. III in roads bounded by Sitladevi Temple, Swatantryaveer Savarkar Marg and Lady Jamshedji Road were carried out except for roads encumbered by obstructions. Similarly, works were carried out in Mahim T.P.S. No. IV in roads bounded by sea beach Nariman Road, Drainage channel, Western Railway Lines, N.C. Kelkar Road exten sion to sea beach.
- (F) Prevention of Food Adulteration—This includes sampling of articles of Food stored, sold or exposed for sale etc. for checking adulteration and mistrading of food under the Prevention of Food Adulteration Act 1954. This work is being done by the Food Inspectors appointed for the purpose under the provisions of the Act. There is a counter check over the Food Inspectors by Mobile Squad provided with a Van for swifter and surprise sampling.

(II) VITAL STATISTICS

Births and Birth rate-

The live births registered during the year were 1,47,986 which were 5,205 more than in 1965 and 9,017 above the average of the quinquennium 1961 to 1965. Of the registered births, 76,982 were males and 71,004 were females, giving a proportion of 108.4 males to 100 females. The birth rate was 30.9

Deaths and Death rate-

The deaths registered from all causes were 50,492 as against 54, 223 in 1965 being 5,952 more than the mean mortality of the preceding 5 years.

The death rate was 10.6 against 11.7 in the year 1965. 25% of the total deaths were among infants below 12 months. Out of these 41.9 per cent were recorded as due to congenital malformation and diseases of early infancy.

Mortality by sex and age

Of the 50,492 deaths, 29,105 were among males and 21,387 among females. The excess of deaths among males may be ascribed to the slight preponderance of males in the population, their number being nearly 60.1 percent of the total population. The death-rate among females was, however, actually higher than that among males. The male death rate was 11.7 and the female death rate 12.9 as against 12.3 and 14.2 respectively in 1965.

Principal causes of Deaths-

Diseases of the respiratory system claimed the highest number of deaths as in the past, with a death-rate of 1.65 per 1000 of population. A large proportion of deaths from respiratory diseases occurred among infants and children under 5 years of age. The causes coming next on the list for the year were congenital malformation and diseases of early infancy (1.11); tuberculosis (0.98); diarrhoea, enteritis and dysentery (0.80).

Infant Mortality-

Deaths among infants under I year of age numbered 12,660 which were 1,079 less then in the preceding year and 1,235 more than the annual average of the previous quinquennium (1961-65). The infant mortality rate for the year was 85.5 per 1,000 live births as against 96.2 in 1965.

Of the 12,660 infant deaths, 11,638 i.e., 91.9 per cent, were among the infants born in Greater Bombay and 1022 i.e., 8.1 per cent, were among those born outside Greater Bombay. The births of these 1,022 infants were naturally not registered in the Greater Bombay birth registry. Excluding these 1,022 deaths, the infant mortality rate would be 78.6. How much of this reduction in the rate could be set off against the deaths of infants occurring outside the Greater Bombay though born and registered in the Greater Bombay cannot be estimated but in the absence of any specific cause or evidence of emigration, the number must be small and therefore, the infant death rate after correction for residence would not be much above 78.6 i.e., 8.1 less than the recorded rate of 85.5.

Causes.—8,473 or nearly 66.9 per cent, of the total infant deaths were due collectively to diseases of the respiratory system, congenital malformation and diseases of early infancy as against 10,028 or 72.9 per cent. in 1965. Diarrhoea and Enteritis caused 1,656 deaths, Dysentery 31 and convulsions 30 deaths. Deaths from S null-pox and Measles numbered 31 and 39 respectively while poliomyelitis caused 23 deaths.

Quinquennial average.—Compared with the annual average of the preceding five years, the total deaths among infants in 1966 were 1,237 more. Decrease of 17 under convulsions, 80 under small-pox, 33 under measles, 6 under Dysentery, 229 under congenital malformation and diseases of early infancy was recorded. Increase of 15 under Poliomyelitis, 443 under Diarrhoea and enteritis and 241 under diseases of respiratory system was recorded.

Age at death.—The infant deaths in the 1st week of life were 4,662 or 36.8 percent, and in the age group of 1 to 4 weeks it was 2,404 or 18.9 per cent, of the total. Thus 7,066 infant deaths or 55.8 per cent, of the total number occurred in the first month of life. In the next two age-groups viz., 4 weeks to 6 months and 6 to 12 months, the infant deaths numbered 3,198 and 2,396 respectively constituting 25.3 per cent, and 18.9 per cent, of the entire infant mortality.

The maternal mortality numbered 159, the rate being 1.1 as against 1.1 during the year 1965.

Cemeteries.—The Work of registering the cemeteries in the Suburbs was continued during the year. Certain amenities were provided in a few private cemeteries.

Notification.—The total number of notifications of infectious diseases received during the year was 12,527 as against 10,231 in 1965. Of these 12,427 (99.2 per cent.) were from the District Registrars and 100 (0.8 percent.) were from the Medical Practitioners.

Infective Hepatitis caused 5,880 attacks (including 199 originating in other local areas of India) and 308 deaths.

Plague was absent during the year.

Anti-plague Measures-

(i) Rat destruction.—The total number of rats caught and destroyed in Greater Bombay during the year was, 6,28,034 (including 1,25,151 Rattus Rattus and 2,72,158 Gunnomys Kok) as against 6,55,562 in 1965. No, rat was found plague infected. Periodical immunity tests on the rats against plague could not be carried out during the year at the Haffkine Institute as the incinerator was not into commission.

(ii) Other anti-plague measures namely Flea destruction, especially through DDT dusting of rat holes and DDT spraying of houses etc., and also through cleansing of areas, were also carried out.

Smallpox caused 360 attacks (including 148 originating in other local areas of India) and 141 deaths.

Cholera.—Cholera was absent during the year. Preventive measures such as anti-cholera inoculations, disinfection of well water, destruction of overripe and rotten fruits, were carried out. 10,61,781 persons were inoculated against cholera.

Influenza.—Influenza caused 5 deaths as against 14 in 1965.

Enteric Fever.—The number of notified cases viz. 519 (including 19 originating in other local areas of India) was 125 less than that in 1965. The total number of deaths was 74 as against 42 in 1965. 9,96,202 persons were inoculated with T.A.B. Vaccine. Other preventive measures including D.D.T. spraying as an anti-fly measure, surprise inspection of food establishments, etc., destruction of unwholesome food-stuff, propaganda etc., were carried out as usual, besides treating all cases of typhoid with chloramphenicol, etc., at the Kasturba Hospital for infectious Diseases.

Acute Anterior Poliomyelities-

441 cases (62 originating in other local areas of In Iia) and 82 deaths were reported due to this disease. 1,03,001 children were immunized against Polio.

Diphtheria-

2,087 cases were notified. Of these 152 were originating in other local areas of India. 124 cases proved fatal.

Cerebro-spinal meningitis-

This disease caused two attacks and one death.

Tuberculosis-

Tuberculosis took a toll of 4,726 lives and the death rate of tuberculosis was 0.9 per 1,000 of mid-year catimated population.

Examination of specimen-

Sputum specimens sent by the medical practitioners were examined free of charge at the Municipal

laboratory.

Cases of Tuberculosis were admitted to the Municipal Group of Hospitals for Tuberculosis at Sewri which has an accommodation for 800 in-patients, besides 400 beds are reserved by the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay at the Sarvodaya Hospital, Ghatkopar. The cases directed by the 4 Clinics at Princess Street, Foras Road, Dadar and Khar were admitted as per the waiting list maintained at the hospital out door department after examination by the Honoraries. A.P. and P.P. refills and screening were done at the Hospital as also at the above 4 clinics. Advance cases of T. B. were isolated at the Daftary Municipal Isolation wards at Dadar.

Venereal Diseases: Contact Investigation Centre Follow up work and education:

The two medico-social workers, one for the male patients and the other for female patients and the Clinic Nurse helped in inducing the defaulting patients, married partners, to take continued and complete treatment and impressed upon their minds the disastrous after effects of the disease. Some female patients who were willing to be rescued were given aid and were rescued through the Association of Moral and Social Hygiene and the Vigilance Branch of the police department.

The clinical diagnosis of all cases was confirmed by the latest methods of tests in the laboratory at this clinic. Blood samples and urethral smears of patients sent by private medical practitioners were tested and examined microscopically and reports were sent to them confidentially and free of charge. Frei's Test was also started anew.

Latest methods of treatment were followed at this clinic. Male and female patients were examined and treated in separate wings of the clinic, maintaining absolute privacy and secrecy.

Antibiotics like penicillin 'G' in oil, strepto-penicillin, acromycin capsules etc. were the drugs of choice used in the treatment of venereal diseases.

Infra red Short-wave etc. were done in all indicated cases.

Medical interns, private practitioners, health visitors, nurses, students of Sanitary Inspectors Class etc. were given instructions, demonstration and training in the control of venereal diseases.

757 samples of blood were received from Municipal Maternity Homes (603 anti-natal and 154 post-natal) for opinion. Out of these, 85 were positive for Kahn's, V. D. R. L. or Frei's Test. These positive cases were treated in the respective maternity homes for the convenience of the patients.

As many as 21281 (19003 males and 2278 females) Venereal and 2,306 (1281 males and 1025 females) non-Venereal cases were treated during the year.

Out of 21281 Venereal Cases, 6095 were syphilis, 6221 were gonorrhoea and 8965 were cases of nonsyphilitic sores.

Leprosy: The Acworth Leprosy Hospital has been doing commendable work for over 75 years and is also conducting clinics, 5 in city and 4 in the suburbs, eight of which are maintained by Greater Bombay Leprosy Control Scheme and one is attached to the hospital. The hospital provides for isolation of 500 patients either voluntarily admitted or committed by the Magistrates, under the Leprosy Act, The figures of attendance at the 9 clinics are given below:

The Corporation bears the entire cost of the Out patient Clinic attached to the Acworth Leprosy Hospital and also the additional cost on account of :-

- (1) 48 beds for the voluntary patients domiciled in Bombay
- (2) Approximately 150-170 beds for the resident patients (domiciled in Bombay Committed under the Leprosy Act.)
- (3) Domiciliary Services of Health Visitors.
- (4) Rs. 10,000 every year for Sulphone treatment to Outpatients.
- (5) One-third of the recurring expenditure and the entire cost of Capital works such as construction etc. on account of the Greater Bombay Leprosy Control Scheme activities.

Six Health Visitors, appointed by the Municipal Corporation of Greater Bombay including 1 for the Suburbs and 1 Medical Social Worker and 3 non-Medical Assistants, appointed by the Acworth Leprosy Hospital, 7 Health Visitors and medical staff appointed under the Greater Bombay Leprosy Control Scheme are doing the important work of letecting cases of the disease among the contacts of the patients. The Medical Assistants in charge of the Municipal free dispensaries have also been specially trained for detection of early cases of leprosy.

The Leprosy Home at Trombay was also taken advantage of.

Malaria: —Inspections for detection of Mosquito breeding places were carried out and breeding detected was destroyed promptly by treating with larvicides. The Urban Vector A. Stephensi (Larvae) was detected on 71 occasions in Greater Bombay limits.

Wells:—46 open wells and 1 H.C.C. well were filled in and 17 open wells were rendered H.C.C. 950-H.C.C. wells were opened by the Hydraulic Engineer's Department during the water crisis in June-July 1966 and they were closed subsequently.

Cisterns:—The total number of cisterns in Greater Bombay was 1,25,404 (City 92,290 Saburbs 28,764 and Extended Suburbs 4350).

Overhead Tanks:—All the 267 overhead tanks on mills and other similar premises were maintained in mosquito proof condition.

Mill Tanks:—There were 80 mill tanks in Greater Bombay which were periodically inspected and necessary measures to prevent or destroy mosquito breeding in them adopted promptly. Some of these mill tanks were kept under insecticide treatment also.

Precautions against yellow Fever:—Campaign against Aedes Aegypti mosquito, the vector of yellow fever and dengue was continued throughout the year. Breeding of A. Aegypti was detected on 105 occasions and stegomyia index for the year was 0.003.

Statutory actions were taken against the owners of premises etc. to keep their compounds free from breeding of mosquitoes.

Insecticide Services:—Fly and other insect-pests likely to cause nuisance were reduced as a result of regular anti-fly and other disinfectation measures adopted by the Insecticide Branch.

Filariasis:—An entomological survey to assess & delimit the transmission of filariasis by mosquitoes was continued during the year.

Private treatments on payment of fees:—This work was continued and insecticide squads operated in all the wards of Greater Bombay. A sum of Rs. 2,14,390 was received as fees for rendering these services.

Insecticide Fogging Operations:—Insecticide fogging operations were carried out throughout Greater Bombay with the help of three squads covering all the areas where insect infestation was high.

National Malaria Eradication Programme:—All the Three Units viz. (1) Western and Extended Suburbs, (2) Central Suburbs and Extended Suburbs and (3) City continuied their working during the year. These areas under the scheme were covered by both Active and Passive Surveillance. Blood smears collected daily were examined at the surveillance Laboratory located at Municipal Maternity Home Building, Andheri, Bombay 58 and the results were conveyed to both active and passive agencies.

Blood smears examined by the Laboratory Technicians were also checked by the Unit Officers and Assistant Health Officer and 2.5% and 5% of total monthly collection were sent to Baroda and Thana for cross checking, to eliminate the possibility of missing any positive case.

On detection of a positive case, radical treatment was administered to the patient, and epidemiological investigation was carried out. Focal spray was also carried out by the Insecticic Branch. Three mass surveys were carried out at an interval of a month, in the locality reporting a positive case, to find out whether the positive case had transmitted the infection in the locality. Follow-up of each positive case was carried out by obtaining blood smears every month for 8 successive months to ascertain the results of radical treatment.

In an imported case, the respective unit of the state was alerted to take precautionary measures.

Nomadic tribes appearing in suburbs and extended suburbs were also screened and blood smears from each member of the group were collected for examination of malaria parasites and if a positive case was detected the patient was treated immediately. Certificates were also issued to them regarding their blood examination for the information of the other units of their visit.

The Surveillance Unit during the year was placed in "CONSOLIDATION" phase by the Government on the recommendation made by an Independent Apprisal Team. Watch was also kept on the professional blood donors to prevent them from becoming carriers of malaria parasites. The Surveillance staff was in constant touch with the medical practitioners to get information about the fever patients attending their dispensaries.

(III) HYGIENE

The Maternity and Child Welfare services were rendered through the 15 Municipal Maternity Homes and two hospitals with Maternity Wards and 27 Maternity and Child Welfare Centres. The schedule strength of Maternity beds was 520, the number of deliveries conducted being 42,308. The average stay of mothers in the Maternity Home was 5 days.

Domiciliary care was rendered to impart health education and to carry out health propaganda among mothers. The mothers were also guided how to bring up their babies well and persuaded to take alvantage of the services at the centres. The Medical officers in charge Maternity Homes also paid domiciliary visits to supervise and guide the Health Visitors in their work.

Institutional care included ante-natal, natal, post-natal, infant and pre-school age child care, follow upwork, and health education by propaganda through posters, leaflets, group talks, demonstrations and film-shows, etc.

During the natal period, each mother was explained importance of family planning.

Milk was given free to the poor and needy expectant and nursing mothers three months before and three months after delivery at the Maternity Homes. Poor mothers who delivered at their homes were also given help in the shape of milk.

Arrangements for the post-mortem examination in cases of certain deaths occurring in municipal maternity homes were continued at the B. Y. L. Nair Hospital.

B.C.G. Vaccination was given to 37,774 new born babies at 15 Municipal Maternity Homes and two hospitals with Maternity beds after obtaining consent of their parents.

Well baby clinics and Child Health Centres at six Maternity Homes and Paediatric Centres at the Maternity Homes at Victoria Road, Bellasis Road and Naigaum. The Paediatric centres were conducted with a view to (i) Producing a service to the community in which efficient, effective and comprehensive paediatric care c and be given outside the hospital by promoting good growth and development, providing immunisation facilities teaching family and community health as also nutrition; (ii) to reducing the load of hospital out patients departments by referring cases for different medical care and (iii) to providing a teaching field and educational experience in an urban centre, doctors nurses and allied workers.

Infants and children aged 6 months and above were immunised with triple vaccine at the Maternity Homes. Polio Vaccine was given to the infants and children upto the age of 6 years at the Maternity Homes.

Family Welfare Planning.—Advice on spacing of births was given by trained doctors to married men and women at the Family Welfare Planning Centres. Health Visitors paid domiciliary visits for follow-up and propaganda.

I. U. C. D. (Loops) were inserted to 7333 married women.

School Health Work.—(1) Medical Inspection of School children-The total number of pupils in Standards I to IV and V to VII in 848 schools and I20 classes in the Greater Bombay, was 5, 14, 455.

The Medical Inspection was conducted in 712 schools by the Assistant Medical Officers (Schools) and 1,10,084 children (57,976 boys and 52,108 girls) from I to III standards, as also those from Standards II and IV who had remained unexamined during the last year, were medically examined during the year under report.

As many as 92,023 children were found defective. The defects noticed were communicated to the guardians of the pupils. The total defects noticed amongst the children were 2,11,265. The guardians of 3773 children were interviewed by the Assistant Medical Officers (Schools) and were explained the necessity of their wards undergoing clinical and dispensary treatment.

(2) Correction of defects.—In all 44,824 children with major ailments were treated at the K.E.M. Hospital, the Nair Hospital and L.T.M.G. Hospital. 2,780 cases with minor ailments were treated in the Municipal dispensaries. 2,301 children were referred to the Honoraries of the out-patients Department of the K.E.M. Hospital for expert opinion. 530 cases of tonsilitis were treated at the Clinics. 675 children suffering from scabies, ringworm and boils were treated in the schools by the Assistant Medical officers (Schools). All the Municipal schools were supplied with emergency outfit. 804 new and 4,864 repeated cases with dental defects were treated at the Nair Hospital Dental College. 445 children were supplied with spectacles, free of charge. 117 children suffering from infectious skin diseases were disallowed from attending schools and their parents were advised the importance of regular treatment.

Screening of 160 suspected T. B. cases was done at the Municipal T. B. Clinics, out of whom 6 children who were suffering from tuberculosis were treated.

- (3) Follows up work.—6,552 domiciliary visits and 817 visits were paid by the school Health Nurses to guide the guardians of ailing children as regards care and diet, etc., of their wards.
- (4) Health Education.—658 and 1,815 health talks were given in schools by Assistant Medical Officers (Schools) and School Health Nurses respectively. With a view to inculcating health habits among school children 16 meetings of parents and teachers were organised in the schools premises when educational films were shown as well as informative talks were given.

Health Ministry was formed in selected upper primary schools. Health trophy was awarded to first 2 schools which were judged the best and first six schools were given certificates of merits. The first two children from each class who secured highest number of marks during Health parade were given prizes as an encouragement to their health babits.

- (5) Supply of toned milk to the ailing children.—During the year 9,415 ailing children attending the school clinic at the K.E.M. Hospital and 4,088 children attending the dental clinic at the Nair Hospital Dental College were supplied with pasteurised toned milk, 200 ml. each and 200 ml. double toned milk to 3891 and 3387 children at the school clinics at the Nair Hospital and L.T.M.G. Hospital, Sion respectively.
- (6) 1723 children were examined in 4 schools in Agripada Municipal School building by the Child Welfare Centre at Nair Hospital.

(8) Emergency Care.—First aid was rendred at the time of sports, mass drills and scout rallies sharadotsay, etc. organised by the Municipal education department.

3887 students studying in 17 Municipal Secondary Schools were examineed.

Lectures were delivered by Medical Officer (Schools) on school health services for students of D.C.H., Course, Sanitary Inspectors course, and Post certificate Paediatric Nursing Course.

- (9) Mobile Health Unit.—Dr. D. N. Pai, Professor of Preventive & Social Medicine, Seth G. S. Medicalcollege continued to be Hon. Dierector Mobile Heath Unit & Special Officer Family Planning. The following activities were carried out during the year.
- (1) Comprehensive health care to Municipal School Children.—Mobile Health Unit assisted the medical inspection branch by conducting medical examination in 144 Municipal Schools and 33,926 children from 1 to 7 Stds. were medically screened.
- (2) Control of communicable diseases.—A total number of 9,59,743 immunisation procedures against various communicable diseases were performed both in schools and field as follows:—

⁽³⁾ Health Drives and Family Planning Exhibitions.—9 Health Drives and Exhibition on Family Planning were organised, in Greater Bombay during the year in collaboration with other social organisations, 31,859, people attended the exhibitions and health drives of whom 18,964, individuals sought a total medical check up and 62,748 patient days of medicines were dispensed.

The Family Planning Fortnight, as per the directives from Government of Maharashtra, was observed in Greater Bombay between 5th December 1966 to 20th December 1966. During this period meetings and health camps were organised in 15 community areas. Lectures by eminent speakers on Family Panning and film

shows were arranged at these places. Besides, a special exhibition on Family Planning was arranged at Churchgate Railway Station during this fortnight. People were explained the importance and need for family planning by the medical personnel on duty at the exhibition. The literature on family planning was also distributed to the public. Response from public was considerably encouraging. 423 ladies and gentlemen were referred to various family welfare planning centres in Greater Bombay for sterilization or I.U.C.D. from Churchgate during this period.

- (4) Training of medical and paramedical personnel.—334 interns from the City Medical Colleges were trained in Urban Health Practice.
- (5) Any other medical care emergency.—4,175 N. C. C. cadets were medically examined for physical fitness and were given health advice.

(IV) MEDICAL RELIEF

Municipal General Hospitals—The public Health Department conducted four small general hospitals in the Suburbs and Extended Suburbs.

Free Dispensaries —The number of new cases treated at the 59 dispensaries and 11 mobile dispensaries was 17,07,527 as against 17,36,088 in 1965. The total attendance was 64,95,506 as against 69,99,320 in 1965 including visits by the dispensary medical officers to patients at their homes.

Clinics for Women and Children—were conducted by three part-time Lady Doctors at 6 Municipal dispensaries for two hours thrice a week. The number of new cases treated was 2264 (2001 women and 263 children) as against 2640 in 1965. The total attendance was 19074. These figures include visits by the Lady Doctors to patients at their homes. At the 27 Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics, 99,498 new cases (78127 women and 21,371 children) were treated. The total attendance was 3,58,870.

The Eye Dispensary and Hospital—at Kamathipura, were attended by Honorary Ophthalmic Surgeons, by turns. The out-patients departments remained open every day from 7 A. M., to 10-30 A. M. except on Sundays and Holidays. The hospital had an accommodation of 20 beds for males and 20 for females with an operation theatre and a full-time resident Nurse. The total number of new cases treated at this institution was 26,254 as against 26,352 in 1965. The total attendance was 92,826 as against 82,341 in 1965. The number of indoor patients amongst the new cases and amongst the total attendance were 1,079 and 11,296 respectively.

The Medico-Social Unit which was established in April 1957 at Kherwadi, Bandra, by appointing a Medico Social Worker, in order to carry out an integrated practice of medicine based on the family and community asunit continued working. The Medical personnel specialising in different fields of medicines and working at the Kherwadi Family and Community Health Centre a Voluntary social organisation, rendered honorary services at our Unit.

Ambulance Services—Ambulances were stationed at the two Central places, viz. one at the Municipal Maternity Home at Andherion West and the other at the dispensary at Rajawadi, Ghatkopar on the east. The ambulances under the Fire Brigade also attended to medical, maternity and accidental cases. The ambulances and hearses under Asstt. Engineer (Transport) removed cases of infectious diseases and dead bodies respectively.

(V) HEALTH PROPAGANDA AND EDUCATION

The health propaganda and education was carried out through the Public Relations Department.

(VI) MUNICIPAL LABORATORY

The Laboratory received 32,340 samples as against 32,769 in the preceding year. Categorywise, they arrange themselves into the following groups:—

The water sampling programme continued as usual and samples were collected daily (except on Sundays) from all the wards, the sampling points in each ward being changed on successive days, in a fortnight.

42 milk samples were examined from the Government milk distribution centres. They included 14 of toned milk and 28 of whole milk.

The Municipal Analyst attended courts in the city on several occassions to give evidence in 53 cases under the Prevention of Food Adulteration Act and Bombay Municipal Corporation Act. The additional Public Analyst attended courts on 40 occassions to give evidence in the cases under the Prevention of Food Adulteration Act, 1954.

- Chemical.—(1) Samples of food-stuffs examined chemically were 11,737. Out of these, 9,858 were examined under the prevention of Food Adulteration Act, 1954.
- (2) Of the 1288 samples of water examined, 199 well-water samples and 354 water samples collected from other sources were found to be unfit for potable purposes.
- (3) As many as 929 samples of different kinds such as soap, paints, varnishes, articles of stationery (i.e. various kinds of inks and gums), drugs, chemicals, etc. were received from different departments and from members of the public.

Bacteriological.—(1) of the 13,894 samples of water from the city and suburbs examined, 484 well-water samples and 995 water samples collected from othe sources were found to be unfit for potable purposes. From the Bombay Port Trust area, 412 samples were collected and none was found to be unfit for potable purposes.

- (2) 20 samples of disinfectants were examined to determine the Rideal Walker Co-efficient,
- (3) Out of 2,624 samples of food-stuffs examined, 152 were found to be unfit for human consumption.

Clinical.—(1) Out of 33 samples of urine examined, 13 samples were received from private individuals and 20 from Municipal institutions.

- (2) 16 samples of blood were examined.
- (3) 57 samples of miscellaneous nature such as stools, semen, etc., were also examined.

(VII) KASTURBA HOSPITAL FOR INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Dr. R. S. Deshpande, M.B., B.S., D.P.H., Assistant Medical Officer, continued to be in full charge of the administrative work of the Medical Superintendent in addition to his own throughout the year.

The four Hon. Physicians continued to visit the hospital twice a week and they were helped by the four Assistant Physicians (Part-time).

The Laboratory was manned by Dr. S. M. Purandare from 5th March 1966 to 15th December 1966, Dr. D. U. Antani from 17th December 1966 onwards, Dr. R. K. Batliwala from 1st June 1966 and Dr. K. N. Vaidya, Part-time Pathologists.

Besides, the consulting Honorary staff of 13 Specialists was attached to the Hospital.

Admissions.—During the year 29,461 patients suffering from various acute Infectious and Communicable diseases except Tuberculosis and Leprosy were admitted in the Hospital as against 26,317 during the previous year. They included 360 of Small-pox, 414 of Enteric Fever and 2,081 of diphtheria.

The daily average number of patients was 665. The case fatality rate in the total admission was 2.9 per cent,

The Hospital had a total of 680 beds in 30 Wards.

Smallpox.—In a total of 360 cases a lmitted in the hospital, 141 died giving a case fatality rate of 39.2 per cent. Excluding 74 deaths which occurred within 48 hours of admission of cases in a moribund condition, the case fatality rate was 20.6 percent only. December was the month of heaviest admissions. Administration of broal-spectrum antibiotics and steroids did have the uniform effect in respect of clinical course of illness, but had encouraging results as far as the control of incidence of secondary complications was concerned.

Diphtheria.—The total number of cases admitted during the year was 2,081 excluding 3,366 found negative on laboratory investigations. Out of these, 2,081 cases, 114 proved fatal. The case fatality rate was 5.8 percent. Excluding the 75 moribund cases that died within 48 hours of admission, the case fatality rate was 1.9 per cent. The operation of trecheotomy was required to be performed at this hospital in 35 cases of Diphtheria with Laryngeal obstruction, 13 of whom succumbed to the disease. 8 cases were transferred to this Hospital from other Institutions after tracheotomy operation, out of whom 3 succumbed. Cases were admitted from all parts of the City, predominantly from Byculla, Parel, Lalbaug, and Girgaum localities.

Board-Spectrum antibiotic viz: Erythromycin along with steroids particularly Hydro-cortisons and Dexamethasone were administered in secondary laryngeal and 'Bull's neck' variety cases with severe toxaemia. These anti-biotics and Steroids helped to reduce the fatality rate of the disease which is mainly due to Myocarditis.

The highest incidence of the disease was in the age group of 2-5 years. The youngest patient admitted was a male child aged 1 month and the same expired and the oldest a male aged 54 years was discharged cured.

At the immunisation centre established at the Hospital premises for immunising contacts and visitors against infectious diseases, 6,097 persons were immunised against diphtheria, 8,549 against enteric fever, 8,549 against Cholera and 18,154 against smallpox.

Enteric fever.—Admissions during the year numbered 414 as against 493 during the previous year. All these cases were confirmed by Widal Test in rising titre and/or by isolation of organisms from Clot culture. August was the peak month for admissions. Meningeal symptoms developed in 5 cases and 4 had relapse. Signs of intestinal perforation were detected in 8 cases which were transferred to the General Hospital for further treatment.

5 cases proved fatal giving a case fatality rate of 1.2 per cent. Excluding 1 death which occurred among cases admitted in a moribund condition and within 48 hours of their admission, the case fatality rate was 0.9 per cent.

Special treatment.—(1) High caloric diet was given to all cases (except when it was contra-indicated due to abdominal complications such as distension, diarrhoea, haemorrhage, perforation etc.).

- (2) Wholeblood transfusion was given in all cases who had intestinal haemorrhage.
- (3) Chloramphenicol was administered orally to all the cases. Injection Chloramphenicol along with steroid was also administered to cases who were in a very toxic and delirious condition and unable to take the drug orally.

Incidence of Enteric fever was highest in the age-group of 21 to 30 years. The youngest patient admitted was a male child of 3 years who was cured and the oldest a male of 60 years who expired.

Cholera and Plague—There was no incidence of Cholera and Plague during the year.

C.S. Fever.—Only one case of C.S. Fever was admitted to the Hospital. It was amale patient who was discharged cured.

Anterior Poliomyelitis.—401 cases of Poliomyelitis were admitted, 17 of Bulbar variety. 3 of Spino Bulbar variety and the rest of Spinal variety. 57 cases proved fatal, of whom 1 belonged to Spinal variety. 11 to Bulbar variety and 45 to Spino-bulbar variety. All these deaths were due to respiratory paralysis.

Whooping Cough—80 cases were treated for Whooping Cough, out of whom 2 died due to Broncho Pneumonia and/or Encephalitis as complications.

Infectious Hepatitis.—5746 cases of Infectious hepatitis were admitted. An O.P.D. was opened in August 1966 specially for the cases of this disease who did not require hospitalisation. Indoor cases requiring hospitalisation were admitted in the Wards and 7,136 cases were prescribed medicines by the Medical Assistants incharge of the O.P.D.

Out of 5,746 cases, 91 proved fatal, out of which 81 were due to hepatic coma, 26 were admitted in a moribund condition and died within 48 hours of admission.

Other diseases.—Of the 447 cases of Measles, 432 of Mumps an ¹ 1,057 of Chickenpox admitted, 35 of Measles and 9 of Chickenpox proved fatal. Majority of the cases were from Children's Homes, Convents, etc. The deaths were generally due to the complications of Broncho-pneumonia and/or Encephalitis.

Research Work.—Fortnightly meetings with the Physicians, Part-time Physicians and Pathologist were held in the office of the Medical Superintendent to discuss the problems of medical relief work and research, thereof. During the year, the following three papers were read one of which was published in publication of Grant Medical College, J.J. Hospital Journal and the other two were read by Dr.S.A. Kamat and Dr.R.S. Deshpande at the Annual Conference held in November 1966.

- (1) Haemorrhagic Smallpox.—Published in J. J. Hospital Journal.
- (2) Infectious Hepatitis.—A clinical study of 200 cases by Dr.S.A. Kamat and Dr.R.S. Deshpande
- (3) Barbarine in Cholera:

Clinical trials with barbarine Hydrocloride for the control of Diarrhoea in acute Gastro Enteritis by Dr. S. A. Kamat and Dr. R. S. Deshpande read at the 7th Annual Conference of India Society of Gastro Enteritis in Bombay held on 11th September 1966 at Bombay.

Clinical Laboratory.—The number of investigations carried out in the laboratory was 75,501 and blood transfusion done were 290.

The Welfare Centre.—The Welfare Centre for the labour staff carried out its activities satisfactorily. The works Committee was not held for want of agenda from the Labour Unions. 7 Peshi Committee meetings were held during the year.

Teaching.—Instructions in Infectious Diseases were given to 549 M.B., B.S., D.A.S.F., Homeopath and 64 post-graduate students preparing for the examination of D.C.H. (Diploma in Child Health) and Diploma in

Student Nurses, Nurses, Health Visitors etc., from different institutions in Bombay also received instruction in nursing management of Infectious Diseases and Infectious Diseases Hospital.

334 Interns were given training in Infectious Diseases.

Members of the medical staff took advantage of the medical Library and the recreation facilities provided at the Hospital.

Blood Transfusion.—Instead of supplying donors, sealed bottles containing blood of dieffrent groups were supplied by the Bombay City Red Cross Blood Transfusion service which were stored in the Laboratory at this Hospital so that blood was available for transfusion at any time.

Nurses Welfare Fund.—The total amount received during the year was Rs. 93.00 as subscription from the members of the nursing staff, the balance at the end of the year being Rs. 2,200.67.

Expenditure.—The total expenditure during the year was Rs. 33,25,538.00 as against Rs. 29,47,461.00 during the previous year.

VIII.—VACCINATION

Cyclic increase was noticed in the incidence of smallpox during December though the peak was not as high as during the previous cycle. Vaccination drive was intensified throughout Greater Bombay and additional staff of 100 vaccinators was appointed for this purpose.

An additional staff of 148 vaccinators-cum-enumerators was appointed under the National Small-pox Eradication Programme, and 75 per cent. of the cost on account of this is to belorne by the Government.

A total of 16,53,796 persons were vaccinated of whom 1,75,195 were primary vaccinations and 14,78,601 were re-vaccinations. Of the children primary-vaccinated, 1,46,976 were born in Greater Bombay.

The total births registered during the year were 1,47 986 of whom 1,46,796 children born in Greater Bombay were vaccinated.

Out of 84 permanent public vaccination stations, 7 functioned daily, 8 functioned twice a week and the remaining stations worked 2½ hours once a week by rotation. On an average, 19 stations worked every day.

The results of vaccination done were verified by inspecting the children brought to the vaccination stations on the 8th day of the vaccination operation.

No certificate of postponement of vaccination was issued by medical practitioners, on the ground of ill-health.

No case of complication due to vaccination was reported except 10 cases of Tetanus reported after vaccination which were found on investigations to be due to the negligence of instructions given to the parents. They applied foreign material inspite of instructions given to them.

During the year, 601 medical students and 148 students attending Sanitary Inspectors' course conducted by the Local Self Government Institute and Public Health Inspector's Class were imparted thethe oretical instructions and practical training in vaccination.

5,106 pilgrims proceeding to Haj during the year were vaccinated and they were issued certificates in the International Health Certificate forms.
