

## FOREWORD

Official estimates of cereal production fire framed on the basis of crop estimation surveys carried out by the Sucre Governments under the technical guidance of the Directorate of National Simple Survey. Independent estimates of cereal production are also available since 1357-58, through crop surveys carried out as in integral part of the Socio-econvmic rounds
 Wide divergences were noticed in the two sets of estimates of production based on the two series of surveys, necessitating a deeper probe of the reasons for such divergences. On the recommendation of a Technical Committee set up by the Planning Commission, type studies, designated type 2 studies, were organised on maize in Bihar and paddy in andhra Pradesh during 1763-64. The present report deals with the results of study carried out on paddy in andhra Pradesh.

## 1. Intruduction

1.1 Official estimntes of production of crops are ubtainud foi uach atate as a rroduct of tho acrage under the crops and tho corresparding avirape yieid rites. The ocrage, under crons is, mostly obtqined through complete fiotd to fizld enumoration by tha villago patwaris of the Revenue Department while averare yield ratzs are obtained throurh crop ostimation surveys, the techninue for which Wns originaily developed by the Indien Council of Agricultursi Research. Th; field work of these surveys is earried out by the staff of tho Departments of Agriculture na/or Revenue as normel derartmental routine. The surveys are orean ised under the technical guidance of $a$ unit located in the Directorate of National Sample Survey, largely desifned to $\begin{gathered}\text { nsure } \\ \dot{\theta}\end{gathered}$ uniformity in concepts, definitions and other detzils of the surveys cinrried out by the different aiatus. Lus uait sis aisc arostire with the responsibility of corsolidatinf tha rosults of surveys for gll-India nupnosns. Those survors which were initioted two decades ngo on rilot basis on ricc and wheat, now cover all the principal food and non-food crons in the major strtes of the tinion.
1.2 Since 1957-59, independent estimntes of cerogl production are 3 lso be ing mnde through crop surveys carried out $n s$ an integrel part of the Socio-sconomic rounds, ormanis?d by the Directornte or Netionel Sample furvey. This work is carrizd out under tho technical guidance of the Indien Strtisticol Institute. They provido for estimation of both aren nnd vield of cereals through sampling
and are carrisd out br whole time adenuntely trained Investifetors, on th: besis of uriform soncepts and definitions.

## 2. Rocomrendations oi the ixchn:an Committee

2.1 The two sats of estimates of producion of cereals, on $\rightarrow$ besed on the ëtate officinl seriss nd the ot rer on the NSS-ISI series of suryjrs werv fund to be widely divergent. 2.2 Type 1 studies: In accordance with the recommendations of the Tochnical committee, Type 1 studies ware oreanised during 1960-61 on jowr in Bundi (Roinsthen) nod on whert in Barh (Biher). Tha rasults of the studies showed taat unver lavoratury sorditans, field rotes of crops sotained by the i:su uechniques afrecd closely in Bundi nad 2arh.

considered the rosults of the studies ond recommended organisotion of Tyme 2 studizs alone with the extrand ad crop surveys of the 13 th round of TSS (1963-64) on one crop in each of the Strtan, is mentioned below:-

2. 1 The Teçnichl Committes outlinod tho nain objective as a comparatiro study of the estimates of yiuid rates obtained from the two tyres of proedures (State and NSS procedures) and recommended thet it would be necessary to have, at the Stet? level, naired comporisons of yleld rates of the State and NSS cuts in about 200-300 fields. The committee, furthin, rocommended that it woild be also essontial to have arimn aricnts made for harvesting of the whole fields seiectea for mars comparisons. In view, howower, of the cifficultins in creanising whole field harrest, it ins gareed that this aspect would not be insister in districts or tracts there labour shortape was likely to bo experionced. From the operational point of view, it would bo praferable to seloct villages falling in the NSS sample for the. st udy. Accordingly, a study was organised in And bra prodesh on nody durine the wintor season of the 1963-64. Th. presont report deals with the results of the study.
3. Details of dosifn and rolatod sispects

3.2 Whole field harvest was proposed to bo orearised in 56 villages of the 112 villages. In viow of the practicol difficulties for whole fiقld harvest operations, it was docided at mieting of the represertativ:s of the CSO, ISI, NSS and Stote Statisticri Burau, thrit 56 villoges taken for the purpose should be those which aed propir fecilities for getting the equipment and to be easily accessible and where sdenunt, fncilities for lnbour, stornge, thrishing yards, co-oforntion of cultivntors for? ava*lable.

3.4 Erancy: tu sieli work relatine to the circular cut wes carried out by the $I_{n}$ arstifators of the state and Cenirel $\mathrm{H} B \mathrm{~S}$, whiae tise recianfular cuts were ertrusted to the Pevenu: Inspociorg end Africultural Domonstrotors, which was the rormai acency for cropestimation survers for cie state nun-Nou series. The whole field haryest was entrusted to 50 Fieldmen $\operatorname{specially}$ recruitud for the nurnos. That worizen undor the guidance of and were assisted bv Prondess Assisimnts, end Taluk Statistical Assistants. 3.5 İlection of íl Ids: In each sample village, two fields arowinf paddy wore salected by the State official procedure by thr arency fospasivis for crop-cutting experiments on rectameulan cut (non-NSS stato). It was also the responsibility uf tro agency to secure the permission of the cultivators concerned and fix up dates of harvest for the selectea fields: It was a lso renuired to make availoble
 of the serected rields well akead so that the two types of cuts were csixen bv the suaff of the respuctive acencies on

3.6 Number of outs: In each sample field one roctancular cit ant ron circular cut were conducted. Ins
 of $\operatorname{sr}$ ac $(0,3)$ wite the circular cut consistad of two

3.7 Location and marking of cuts: Since both types of cuts were to be located in the same field, the following mocedure was indicated for gdoption by the field staff:-
i) In the first field in ench villace, the circuler cut would be loceted first and then the rectangular cut. Similarly, In the sacond field, the rectancular cut was first to de located and then tne circular cut;
11) Over-lepping of the two types of cuts wer 3 to bo ornider by selecting fresh nairs of random numbers.
3.8 Harvesting: The respective goencias viz. Revenue Inspectors and Agricultural Demonstrators for rectangular cuts and the Invostirators for circular cuts were to supervise the harvesting to be done according to the procsdure followed normally by them and record the weight of gra in.
3.9 Driage: The produce from 2'-3" circle was retained by the Investigator for further processins while the produce from the rectangular cut was ratained by the Agriculcural Demonstrator/Revenue Inspector.
3.10 Whole field harvest: whole field harvest was arranged in outn theficlus in 56 villages where aderuate facilities were available for labour, storape, threshing vards, cn-nforation nf cultimators, $/$ The villages were also to be easily accessible. The harvesting operations of whole field were to be completad in a day in the presence of the representatives of different agencies. After the produce of the circular and rectanfular cuts was removed, the remaining portion of the fiald was harvested. The produce along with the produce from the annular portion of the circular cut was stored for driage. Elaborate procedures were prescribed and followed for dryinf the produce of the whule ficla and recurding the weirht of dried grain.

## 4. Organisation of field work

4.1 The programme was directly under the administrative control of the Director, Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Andhra Pradesh. The sanction to the study was recelved during the second week of October, 1964, leaving very little time for completing the preliminary work well ahead of the commencement of harvesting of paddy. The schedules and instructions ware finalised at a meeting held un. the 9.th and loth jeptamber, 1963 among the representatives of the State Statistical Bureau, Central Statistical Oragnisation, Tndian Statistical Institute and the Nationgl Samnta Survey.
4.2 : The scheme provided for the appointment of a full complement of staff consisting of 1 Super intendent, 6 senior Investiqators, 50 Field-men and necessary clerical assistance. The orifinal arran ament of obtaining the services on loan of experianced Field-men from the Directorate of Agriculture, Andhra Pradesh for the ir unit did not come of $f$ and conseauently recourse was taken to the recruitment of fresh candidates to the posts of Field-mon, necessiteting the need for an intensive tra in inc before they were put on the field.
4.3 IThe District Stitisticql Officers, Senior Investigators, Frogress Assistrnts, Taluk Statistical
 Sunerintond ents of the NSS were imparted trining at 7 contres by the Assistant Director (SES) of the Buresu of Economics \& Statistics and by the Superintendents and Assistant Statistician of the National Sample Survey. Simultaneously, trainling was organised and could, therefore, be completad in a short pariod of about•10 days from the 21st to 31 st October, 1963. As all the Field-men did not
report before the commancement of training, subsenuent had
 newly recruitod staff at 3 contres.
s. 4 Although the recruitment and training of staff took naturally some time, the field prorramme was not.... allow $\begin{aligned} & \text { do } \text { suffor on this account. Arraneemants were made }\end{aligned}$ quickly tu jotala tas necessary co-operation from the state Departmints like Rovenue and Africulture by issuing suitable instructions to the Golloctors, District Africultural Off icars, District Surveyors and Block Development Officers to assist in th 3 conduct of typa. 2 study. In order to avoid cqsualty, the selectod villapes were visitod by the representatives of the participatine apencios for selection of fi三lds and for $\begin{aligned} & \text { agmin } \\ & \text { inf } \\ & \text { the suitability and facilities }\end{aligned}$ available for whole field harvost. The Field-men were available in the sample villaees (for wholy field harvest) immediately after. the ir troininf, for ensuring all the prelimingry work connected with. the exper iments. Harvesting of samnle fields commenced in the first wrek of November, 1963 and lasted till the first week of February, 1964. auwever, the ualk ur the narvesting, more than 50 per cent of the samplo fialds, took place during a shrt intorval of 3 wheks, from 15 th Norembor, 1963 to 5 th December, 1963. 4.5 4lthouph Type 2 studies as envisqped provided only for the quantum of insection normally exercised for both tyres of cuts, the introduction of whole field harvest in 56 out of the 112 villafes largely enhanced the ouantum of inspection at various stapes of the ficld work. In all these 56 villag?s, one of the other of the supervisory officars from the State was present at the time of operations like harvesting, threshinf, driact and recording the weifht of grain. Besides there was intensive suporvision
of the suporior officors of the Central NSS and the Bureau of Economics \& Statistics. In addition, tochnicians from Indian Statistical Institute inspэcted the work in 11 villages. The Regional staff of the Agricultural Statistics Division of the NSS which normally participates in the inspection of the field work of stete official series visited 13 villag 3 . Thus to a large extent, the normal fiold concitions aid not obtain in this study but that was inevitable.
4.6 Tt mat he racalled that the scheme provided for measuring separately the demarcated crop area and the ail or bund $r$ ilating to the sample fields and also for preparing a sketch map giving the actual measur ments.' The actual measurement was made by Taluk Surveyors in the Andhra Region and Measurement Circle Inspectors in the Telengana Region. The off-set mathod which was adopted, proved to be convenient and easy and at the same time accurate. According to the State Director of Bureau of Economics \& Statistics, the arcas on re-measurement by suparvisory officers did not differ by more than one tenth of one per cent. Area of the bunds was calculated by measuring the width of the base.of tho ounds by using 2 spikus to fet the recirdings at 5 : points on gach side, and erea of the bunds calculated on all ths sides. Hnif the total arsa thus arrived, was recorded is the orea under bund for ench field.
4.7 According to the provisions of the scheme one set of forms for each of the circular, rectangular and whole field harvest was dospatched to the following agencies:-
i) Indian istatistical Institute, Calcutta;
ii) Bureau of Economics \& Statistics, Andhra Pradesh, Hyderabad;
iii) Diractorate of National Sample Survey, New Delhi; and
iv) Institute of Agricultursl Research Statistics, Ministry of Food \& Agriculture, Nəw Delhi.
4. 6 Reçlpt of forms was spred over more than 7 months. Tho first batch was received during the first weok of $N$ かuember, 1963. The bulk of the sch odules was received by the end of March, 1964, although they 2 ontinued to be received in small batchos till about third week of Aupust, 1964. In quits a few cases repeatod referonces wero necessary to the State \& Central field agencies in reqard to the despatch of the schedules.
4.9 Of the 112 villages selected for paired comparisons, experiments could not be carried out in 15 villages due mostly to the fact that thore was no paddy crop in the sample villages (12). In one village, the crop in the sample fields was harvested by the cultivator ahead of the date fixod for harvosting with-out prior intimation to the state field staff. In 2 other villafes, expariments were Iost because the nrimary worker failed to report the date fixed for harvost. In the case of 5 othor villages, the work of rectangular cut was carrind out by the representative of District Statistical Officer as the Agricultural Assistant or the Revenue Inspector entrusted with the work. was not present on the scheduled date. It is, however, hoartening to note that all the experiments in villages selected for whole field harvest were carried zithout any mishap. 4:10 A detailed scrutiny of filled-in schedules was undertaken by the National Sample Survey. In quite a few cases, schedules received were found to be incomplete and consequently roferenco wis mado to the fiold staff for clarification. The Directorata also arrangad for a joint vorification and ra-conciliation of the primary data shoets propared, from the schedules received at heqdauarters with the corresnondinf information avallable at ISI.
5. Results
5.1 Tha data co'lacted in the study lend themselves to analysis in two different aroups of villafes:
i) All villaces, where the whole field harvest was undertaken in addition to tha rectangular and circular cuts; and

1i) All villares, where only rectangular and circular cuts were oresnised.

For the first set of villages, paired comparisons are possible between whole fiold and rectangular cuts, whole field and circular cuts and rectangular and circular cuts. It will be recalled that the weirht of green produce was not taken in the case of whole fields. Honce-all. cumpiarisuns relate to dried grein (rice in busk): For circular cuts, the retio. of dried grain to freen paddy obtaind in rasmect of produce from circular cuts of radius $2^{\prime}-3^{\prime \prime}$ was apnliod to the produce from the circular cut of 4' radius for obtaining the weight of dried grain. Before making comparisons, individual plot yields were reduced to kams per acre, using aporopriate convarsion factors. In the case of whole field, the ar ander crop exciuding the area under ails or bunds only was considered. All comparisons relate to gross un-gdjusted yield rates. The table below gives the avarage jield rates in kems per acre in rospect of the whole fields, roctanfular cuts and circular cuts for the first group of villages. It also
gives the sampling orrors absolute as wəll as percentage serarately for oach of the sub-samrle, State and Central and all samples toge ther.

It is seen that the averare viuld of peddy is estimatod at 894, 881 and 931 kgms por acre rospectively on the basis of whole fisla, ractaneular end circular cuts. The average yield is the lowest for rectoncular cut and highest for the circular cut. Tr torms of percentopes the gverofe yield rate for ractancular cut is low than tho averare yield rati from the whole fiald by 1.5 par cont, whily the average yisld from circular excoeds the one for whole field harvest by 4 per cent. It is interestine to note that the average yield rates from circular cut are consistently high $\begin{gathered}\text { for than }\end{gathered}$ the ones for rectangular cuts and whole field harvest for all sub-samplos, whereas no such consistency is sean in the comparisons of yield ratos from whole field harvest and rectangular cuts;
5.2 An attempt has baen made to test whe ther the differences obsErved are statistically significant. The rosulus if the analysis are presented in the Table 0.3. 5.3 Individuel differences between yiuld rates of whole fief and ractaroular cuts, whole field and circular cuts and rectangular and circular cuts are obtained for oach village, cumulated and averaged over all flelds for group 1 villages. The table also furnishes sampling errors of the mean differences and also the value of Students' 't:. It is seen that mean difference is not statistically significant in rospect of any of the comporisons lending to the inference that differences in yield ratas between whole field and rectangular cuts, whole field and circular cuts and rectangular and circular cuts can be attributed to the sampling flucturtions.

5.5 Althoufh an apprəciable difference is noticod in the viold rates betwien circuler and roctancular cuts in the case of Contral sample (i) both for the sample of ficius wacle whole ficld harvest was not orfanised and for all fields considerod tofcther, the differences are not statisticelfur simificart. based as they are on a small number of observations. At the nool əd leval the results EO to confirm the statement made earlier that there are no differencas between yiald rates obtained on the besis of rəctaneular and circular cuts. Differences noticed can be
attributed to sampling fluctuations.
5.6 The mapnitude of the differences at individual
field levil between various types of cuts hes also been studied. A renuency distribution of the number of fields, accuruany tu tin maf $n$ tude of differencos botwoen two types of cuts both positive and nerative, has bzen prenaredi for facilite of onst comprohension, a summery of the positive gnd nerative differences betwzen tvpes of cuts is presented below: -

5.7 It is saen that the number of positive
differences is obout equol to the number of negative
differences in the case of whole $f$ ield and rectangular
cut comparisons while the number of necative differences
is predominantiy greater than the number of positire differences for comparisons $f$ or whole field and circular cuts. It is soen that this is so not only at the pooled level but consistently so for all sub-samples. In the case of differences between rectenfular and circular cuts it is interesting to note thet the number of negative differences is predominantly hicher then the number of positive difforences in resfect of group 1 villapes, whereas it is aoout same in tho case of group 2 villages. Pooled over
group 1 and froin ? rillapes, the number of nefative
is seer to be hifher than no. of tve differences Aifferencesfor both the sub simples of the Central sample. whereas it is about the same order in the case of the subsamples of the State sample.


## 6. Conclusion

6.1 The results of the study show that there is no significant difference in the yield rates obtained from the whole field harvest; rectangular cuts and circular cuts. The normal field conditions which ought to heve. obtained for tho study dit not however prevail in view of the or canisation of whole field harvest in 50 per cent of the sample which necessitated the presence of the Supervisory Ufficors for onsuring accuracy of all operations. It will, therofore, be interosting to see how far and to what extent $\mathrm{pre}-\mathrm{conditioning} \mathrm{of} \mathrm{investigating} \mathrm{staff} \mathrm{and}$ the intensive inspection of field work has affected the quality of field work as judged by the yield rates, by . obtaining yield rates of paddy based on crop cutting experiments carried out in villages other than those salected for this study in both Central and State NSS, as also gross yiell ratos based on rectangular cuts of the State of ficial seriョs for forecasting yield rates.

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7. surnialy
7.1. i) A type 2 study was orfanis əd in Andhra Pradesh on paddy in NSS villages selected for cron cuttine sxreriments (both Central and State):
ii) Both rectangular and circulor cuts were taken in two fields orech in 112 villages and whole field harvest in 56 of these villares;
1ii) The results show thet the averace yield rate of paddy (rice in husk) is, the lowast for rectangular cut. Tho yield rate obtained frm whole field harvest and circular cuts although higher than the yield rate for the rectancular cuts are not statistically (sirnificantly) difforont.
iv) Normal $f$ iold conditions which ought to have provailyd in type 2 study did not. obtain in Andhra Pradash in respect of supervision of field work due to the orpenisetion of whole field harvest in 50 par cent of the cases.
