

CHAPTER-I

1. INTRODUCTION:

1.1 Introduction and Location:

Bhir district was known to history as Asmaka during Vedic, Epic and Puranic ages. Panini refers to Asmaka which included a portion of modern Bhir district. In the days of Pandvas, it was known as Durgavati and later on during the regime of queen Champavati it was named as Champavatinagar. It was ruled by the Andharas, Chalukyas, the Rashtrakutas and the Yadvas and subsequently went under the rulers, of Delhi. At the time of Mohamed Tughlak, the district was named as Bhir. The history of its name is rather shrouded in mystery. The district is strewn with ancient religious places, the notable amongst them being (1) Kankaleshwar temple (at Bhir town), (2) Yogeshwar temple (at Ambejogai town), (3) Vajjnath temple (at Parli town). The Vajjnath temple of Parli, referred to above is one of the twelve jyotirlingas.

At the advent of modern period of history the Bhir district was the erstwhile Hyderabad State. Following the reorganisation of states in 1956, the district of Bhir along-with other districts of Marathwada became a part of the then Bombay State, which was bifurcated in 1960 to form the present Maharashtra State.

The eastern portion of the district is situated in the central part of Marathwada. It lies between $18^{\circ} 23'$ to $19^{\circ} 30'$ north latitude and $74^{\circ} 54'$ to $76^{\circ} 57'$ western longitude, with a total geographical area of 10,921.8 sq. kms.

1.2 BOUNDARIES:

The district is bounded on the north by Aurangabad and Parbhani district, and on the east by the southern portion of Parbhani district. On the west, it is touched by Ahmednagar district. Osmanabad district lies to the south of this district. The district has natural boundaries carved by rivers, the Godavari in the north and Manjra on the southern side.

1.3 ADMINISTRATIVE SET UP :

The district is divided into two sub-divisions for administrative purpose as eastern and western parts. In all there are seven talukas in the district and they are put under two sub-divisions as detailed below:

- (1) Bhir Sub-Division. = Bhir, Ashti, Patoda and Georal.
- (2) Ambejogai Sub-Division = Ambejogai, Kaij and Manjlegaon.

The district comprises of seven towns and 1,031 inhabited villages with a population of 10,01,466 according to 1961 Census. Every town has a Municipality and all the villages have been covered by Grampanchayats. Three, out of every four persons in the district gain their livelihood directly from the soil. During the period 1968-69 and 1969-70 there were 7 Panchayat Samities functioning in the district under Zilla Parishad, Bhir and 838 Gram Panchayats including Group Grampanchayats in 1969-70. The Zilla Parishad had in all 161 members out of which 141 were elected, 10 were associated members and the remaining ten were co-opted. Each Panchayat Samiti had a chairman and a Deputy Chairman. The Zilla Parishad has 12 sections and the chairman of the Panchayat-

Samities were ex-officio members of the Zilla Parishad, There were different committees to help the President of Zilla Parishad in the discharge of official duties.

1.4 AREA:

As per 1961 Census, the district has an area of 10,921.8 sq.kms. out of which 10,599.0 sq.kms. is Rural area. In terms of area, the district ranks 13 th in the state and last in the region, being the smallest. Since a decade there were no territorial changes in the district, The urban area of the district was more in 1951 when there were 8 towns in it. But in 1961 Pangaon, in Ambejogai taluka treated as urban unit during 1951 Census, was de-urbanised and therefore the urban area of the district at present is 322.8 sq.kms. only. Within the district on the basis of area, Kaij taluka ranked first, followed by Ambejogai, Georai and Patoda.

1.5 TOPOGRAPHY:

The district is partly tableland and partly in broken country with elevations between 300 to 900 metres. The hill ranges of Balaghat spread over in the central part of the district. Conditions in general in the western part of the district comparing, Bhir, Patoda and Ashti taluka are not so favourable as in the eastern part which possesses more fertile soils and receives assured rainfall. A portion of the district on north and south side is plain. Due to the ranges of Balaghat, the district is divide into uplands locally called "Gangathadi", some portion of Kaij and Ambejogai talukas is also touched by these ranges.

1.6 HILLS, RIVERS AND SOIL:

The central part of the district is a hilly tract occupied by Balaghat ranges and the major part of Patoda and Ashti talukas is covered by the hills and appears deserted, when compared with Kaij and Ambejogai talukas. The Balaghat ranges are spread over the northern part of Ashti taluka, most of Patoda and central part of Bhir taluka. The main rivers of the district are Godavari, Manjra, Sindphana, Kundka, Bindusara, Wan and Sina. Manjra rises from the hills of Patoda. Rivers Kundka, Wan, Sindphana rise from Balaghat hills. The small rivers in the district are Mehkari, Kambli and Kadi.

The entire district is situated in the trap region and its soils are mostly fertile black cotton soils, especially so in Georai and Manjlegaon talukas. Deep, medium and shallow soils are also prevalent in the district. They are dark gray to black in colour, blacky in structure and clayey in texture. The soils are retentive of moisture. They become sticky when wet and crack freely in the dry weather. The soil from the western part of the district indicates the existence of salt to the extent of 0.5 %. The soils along with the banks of Sindphana, Godavari and Manjra, are more fertile and are useful for any kind of crop. Nearly half of the cultivable area of the district is generally cropped under kharif and about one fourth of the area is generally under Rabi crops. Jowar, Bajra and Wheat are the most important food crops of the district. Other crops include groundnut, rice, pulses, safflower, cotton and sugarcane.

1.7 CLIMATE:

The geographical and climatic conditions of the district have greatly influenced, its economic and social life. The climate of the district is pleasant and agreeable during the greater part of the year. Patoda and Kaij talukas have cool climate even in summer. The village Chincholi, in Patoda has highest elevation from the sea level and its weather in summer season is akin to that of hill station. Among all the talukas, climate of Ambejogai is very pleasant and T.B.Sanatorium was started there mainly on climate consideration. The climate of Bhir, Manjlegaon and Georai on the low lands is warm and humid.

1.8 TEMPERATURE:

During the year 1968 the maximum temperature of 40.7°C was recorded in May as against the maximum temperature of 41.7°C recorded in the same month of 1969. The minimum temperature during the year 1968 and 1969 was 13.4°C and 13.9°C respectively. Thus the temperature for the district on an average was 26.5°C during 1969 as against 25.7°C in 1968.

1.9 RAINFALL:

The district is divided into high and low level tracts by the central ghats, running through Bhir and Patoda talukas. The normal rainfall as recorded by calculating the simple average at the raingauge stations for the district is 668.4 m.m. The highest rainfall recorded in Manjlegaon taluka during the year 1969 whereas the highest rainfall was received in Bhir taluka in 1968. The rainfall is not uniformly

distributed during the monsoon. Talukas situated in eastern part of the district, received generally assured rainfall during monsoon period which starts in June and continues till October. In 1969 the rainfall for the district on an average was 654.9 m.m. and it was 575.8 m.m. in 1968. The following statement shows the rainfall recorded during the year 1968 and 1969 at selected centres.

CHAPTER - II

Explanatory notes on scope and limitation of Statistics presented in District Statistical Abstract.

2.1 Purpose.

This is 8 th issue since the year 1958-59 of the District Statistical Abstract which is being published in the year 1970-71. In this Abstract exhaustive statistics about important socio-economic indicators of the economy have been presented. District Statistical Abstract covers many topics to make it useful as a reference book for research, planning and further socio-economic studies about the district. In most of the tables the data for the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 has been given. In case of a few tables the data for the publication year is not available, so the data for the latest available year have been furnished. The purpose of publishing this Abstract is to present background of statistical material on as many socio-economic characteristics of the district.

The statistical material presented here is initially compiled by various departments of State Government, Government of India and Local bodies etc. The footnote showing the sources from which the material has been obtained have been indicated at the end of each table.

2.2 District At a Glance.

In this statement the data is given for the district in comparison with the divisional level figures which brings forth salient features of the district. The reference period for the figures concerning the district and division is the same for each item.

2.3 The scope and limitations of the information in this Abstract is discussed in the following paragraphs.

2.4 Climate and Rainfall:

2.4.1. Table No.1 presents monthwise information regarding rainydays and actual rainfall relating to 8 centres in this district. Most of these rainfall recording stations are at taluka headquarters. The normal rainfall recorded for each centre is the average rainfall of prolonged period usually of 80 years.

2.4.2. Table No.2 gives monthly maximum, minimum and average temperatures at only one selected centre Bhir in the district. The maximum temperature shown in the table is not actual maximum but average of maximum temperatures during various months.

2.5 Area and Population.

2.5.1. The data of 1961 Population census is presented in the table alongwith the information pertaining to variation in population data of 1951 and 1961. The various concepts and definitions adopted at the time of census regarding village, town, worker, household etc. have been clarified in detail in the publication of Census Hand Book 1961.

2.5.2. Table No.3 gives districtwise figures of area, rural and urban population, density of population and variations with 1951 Census. Table No. 4 shows the talukawise classification of villages according to population ranges in 1961 census while classification of towns according to population ranges have been indicated in table No. 5. Table No.6 presents the talukawise figures of number of workers according to livelihood classes. The distribution of non-workers is also given for different talukas in the same table.

The distribution of population according to age-group, mother tongue and religion is presented in table No. 7. Table No. 8 indicates talukawise scheduled caste and scheduled tribes population according to 1961 Census.

2.5. Agriculture :

2.6.1. Table No. 9 to 19 on agriculture included in this section give information of land utilisation, area under different crops, yield per hectare and outturn, area irrigated by crops and sources, number of irrigation wells, minor irrigation works, major and medium projects etc.

2.6.2 The major part of the data on agriculture has been collected from the Annual Season and Crop Report of the district for 1967-68 and 1968-69 prescribed by the Statistician, Department of Agriculture, Maharashtra State, Poona.

2.6.2. Table No. 9 gives the information regarding land utilisation for the year 1967-68 and 1968-69. Table No.10 presents area under different crops while table No.11 indicates the figures of outturn and average yield rate per hectare of principal crops for the district. Table No.12 shows the distribution of net irrigated area by sources of irrigation. The figures of area irrigated under principal crops of each tehsil have been shown in table No.13. Next table No.14 gives the number of irrigation wells in use and not in use for each taluka. Table No.15 and 16 give data relating to minor irrigation works and major and medium irrigation projects in each taluka. Table No.17 gives the information regarding agricultural wage rates for the selected three centres while table No.18 provides the data on different type of agricultural machinery and implements in each taluka as enumerated in the year 1966 ^{biennial} Livestock Census.

The Famine and Scarcity data is shown in table No.19.

2.7 Animal Husbandry, Forest & Fisheries.

2.7.1. Animal Husbandry.

Table No.20 presents talukawise data relating to the different categories of livestock poultry etc. enumerated at the time of quinquennial Livestock Census 1966. Table No. 21 gives information regarding development activities of veterinary department in the district and details about veterinary aid extended. Diseasewise Livestock mortality in the district has been shown in table No.22 while table No.23 indicates information of the recognised slaughter houses including licensed slaughter houses and number of animals slaughtered in them.

2.7.2. Forest.

Two tables included in this section give details of area under different ranges and estimates of different forest produce and give production of major and minor forest product in 1968-69 and 1969-70.

2.7.3. The activities of inland fisheries is limited, as such information is not collected in the prescribed proforma.

2.8. Employment, Industry, Mining and Electricity.

2.8.1. Industries and Employment.

The factory statistics is shown in table No.25, 26 and 27 covering following types of factories, registered under factory act 1948.

(1) Those factories using power and employing 10 or more workers .

(2) Those factories not using power but employing 20 or more workers.

(3) Those factories not covered by (1) & (2) above but notified by the Govt. as covered by Factories Act.

2.8.2. Table No.25 indicates the data for each industry, the total no.of working factories, the no.of man days for which they worked during the year and the average daily employment classified by male and female only. The industries are classified as per standard classification.

Table No.26 presents the information pertaining to distribution of working factories according to their working strength. The table No.27 indicates the distribution of factories according to number of days worked.

2.8.3. All the three tables presents usual employment exchange statistics except table No.30 which indicates the volume of employment in different industries.

2.8.4. Table No.31 and 32 give the data of Government servants in respect of Class-I,II,III and IV employees of the State Government and do not cover any other category as per Census conducted by the Bureau of Economics & Statistics, Bombay in the year 1966.

2.8.5. Table No. 33 and 34 present the data regarding electricity consumption as well as number of towns and villages covered under electrification programme .

2.9 Co-operation.

In all 8 tables included in this section under which statistics relating to various activities of co-operative movement in the district are shown. Table No. 35 gives information in a summary form regarding number of different types of societies while table No.36 indicates the statistics relating to co-operative banks. The information in respect of talukawise primary agricultural credit societies maintained in table no.37 and table No.38 presents the data regarding other co-operative societies of different types.

The operation of primary co-operative marketing societies is shown in table No.39 while table No.40 gives the operation of different societies. Table No. 41 indicates the ~~operation of different societies~~ activities of regulated markets in each taluka. The number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them presented in table No.42.

2.10. Medical and Public Health.

There are 4 tables in this section. Table No.43 represents the information about medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies excluding private clinics run by individuals in each taluka. Table No. 44 and 45 give information about vital statistics. Table No. 46 indicates the vaccination statistics and cholera inoculation.

2.11. Education.

There are eight tables in this section. Table No. 47 indicates literacy in each taluka according to 1961 Census. Percentage of literacy has been shown separately sexwise as well as for rural and urban areas. As the literate is defined as a person who can read and write simple letter, persons having higher education are also included in this category. Table No.48 and 49 indicates the education in rural and urban areas in the district as per 1961 Census,. Table No.50 gives no.of institutions type-wise and enrollment therein for the year under review. The information is given districtwise pertaining to strength of beneficiaries of backward class pupils in Table No.51.

Table No.52 indicates the strength of students getting benefits of the concession under the scheme of economically backward Class concession of free education. Expenditure on primary education by way of grants-in-aids to Local bodies is indicated in Table No.53. The classification of villages having no primary schools is indicated in table No.54 which shows the number of villages having no schooling facilities and the growth of education in the villages in each taluka of the district.

2.12. Transport and Communication.

Under this section the statistics relating to various modes of transport are given. Table No.55 gives the railway length according to different types of rail gauges in Bhir district. The road length according to the category as well as type of surface of roads is given in table No.56. This table also includes the roads constructed by the different agencies such as Municipal Councils, Zilla Parishad, and B.&C. Department. Table No.57 gives relevant statistics regarding no. of motor vehicles in operation in Aurangabad division as separate data is not available for Bhir district. The next table No.58 gives operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport according to S.T. Divisions Aurangabad and Nanded as Bhir district is covered under the above two state transport divisions. No separate State Transport division for Bhir district is yet established. The traffic census on important roads conducted by the B. & C. Department in Bhir district is indicated in table No. 59. Table No. 60 indicates growth of the postal facilities extended to urban and rural areas of the district since 1961-62, 1963-69 and 1969-70. Table No.61 presents the statistics regarding rural broadcasting in Bhir.

Table No.61 presents the statistics regarding rural broadcasting in Bhir district.

2.13. Local Bodies.

The available statistics about village panchayats, Municipal Councils and Zilla Parishad are given in this section. Table No.62 shows the income and expenditure of the local bodies mentioned above for the year 1968-69 and 1969-70. The number of villages covered under Gram-Panchayats is also shown in this table. Table No. 63 presents Panchayat Samiti-wise data regarding Income and Expenditure of Gram Panchayats. Similarly the headwise receipts and expenditure of Zilla Parishad is indicated in the Table No. 64-A and 64-B. The financial position with opening balances of Zilla Parishad is also shown in these tables. Table No. 65 gives figures of income and expenditure for each Municipal Council according to different classification and sub-heads during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70.

2.14. Plan and Community Development.

Five tables are included in this section. The first two tables give the details of expenditure and physical achievement under various schemes included in the Annual Plan, for the year 1968-69 and 1969-70. Table No. 68 gives particulars of C.D. Programme implemented in the district. The entire rural of the district is now covered by the Community Development programme. In the next table No.69 expenditure under C.D.schematic funds only incurred in different stages of each blocks is shown while the physical achievement under selected items by all C.D./Stage-I/Stage-II blocks. Operating in each block in this district is shown in Table No. 70.

2.15 Prices.

Table No. 71 presents monthwise average retail prices of important commodities at district head quarter during the calender year 1968 and 1969, while the details of consumers price index for working classes is shown in table No. 72 for Aurangabad and Nanded centres. The consumer price index number for working classes is based on the price level of 1961.

2.16. Judicial and Administrative.

There are in all 3 tables included under this section. The relevant statisticaā data relating to the police department and judicial courts is included. Table No. 73 gives the statistical data of strength of police force. The next table No. 74 gives the crime statistics of this district for the calender years under review. Table No. 75 gives the details of work disposed off in civil and criminal courts during the year 1968 and 1969.

2.17 Miscellaneous.

Table No. 76 deals with the cinema statistics, while table No. 77 gives the Banking offices established in Bhir district. Table No. 78 pertains to joint stock companies while the table No. 79 gives the data about insurance statistics. The amount collected under the Small Saving Scheme is given in table No. 80. The land revenue statistics for each taluka and the data of general election held in 1967 is incorporated in the table No. 81 and 83 respectively.

Table No.82 gives the number of daily, biweekly and weekly news papers published in this district. The number of printing presses existing in this district is also given in this table. This chapter deals with important selected indicators furnishing comparative study of the achievements in important selected sectors of economy.

3.1 Percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown.

This indicators shows the extent of double cropped area in relation to the net cropped area of the district . It will be clear from the table given below that the proportion of gross cropped area to net area sown in the district is insignificant. Lack of adequate irrigation facilities and assured rainfall accounted for low proportion of double cropped area in Bhir district. During the year 1961-62, 1966-66, 1966-67, 1967-68 and 1968-69 the percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown was 105.9, 106.8, 105.8, 105.4 and 105.5 respectively as can be seen from the table given below:

3.2.2. The table given above indicates the yield and production of important crops. The yield rates showed decreasing trends under most of the important crops as compared to the year 1961-62. The yield rate of rice declined from 603 kg. per hectare in 1961-62 to 449 kg. in 1968-69. Similarly the

yield rate of gram, tur, cotton and groundnut came down from 346 kg., 252 kgs., 108 kgs., 787 kgs. per hectare in the year 1961-62 to 338 kgs., 244 kgs., 98 kgs., 705 kgs., in the year 1968-69 respectively. However, the yield per hectare of the important crops of wheat, jowar kharif, jowar rabi, bajari, sugarcane and chillies went up from 371 kgs., 542 kg., 559 kgs., 286 kgs., 4,633 kgs., and 481 kgs., to 415 kgs., 645 kgs., 573 kgs., 324 kg., 8,184 kg. and 495 kg. in the year 1968-69 respectively.

As a result of increase in the yield rate of wheat, the outturn of the crop increased from 155 hundred m.tons in 1961-62 to 171 hundred m.tons in 1968-69. In case of gram the yield rate decreased by 8 kg. per hectare in 1968-69 over the year 1961-62 and the production also decreased by 18 hundred m. tons during the same year. The production of all crops except wheat, jowar kharif, bajari and sugarcane decreased in the year 1968-69 over the year 1961-62. The yield rate per hectare of chillies in 1968-69 when compared to the year 61-62 was more but its production was slightly decreased from 27 hundred m. tons in 1961-62 to 25 hundred m.tons in 1968-69.

3.3 Gross Value of Agriculture production.

The gross value of important crops except cotton and groundnut recorded an increase in the year 1968-69 over the year 1961-62. During the year 1967-68 the gross value of groundnut only showed decreasing trend, as compared to the year 1961-62.

3.3.2. The table below gives the gross value of agri. production.

During the year 1967-68 only 3 important crops of jowar, bajari and groundnut. The agriculture value of jowar indicated an increase of Rs. 1.75 lakhs in the year 1967-68 over the year 1961-62 whereas the same has increased by Rs. 2.53 lakhs in the year 1968-69 over the same year of 1961-62. Similarly the trend of increase in value of production has also been shown under the crops wheat, bajari, gram, tur and sugarcane etc. The value of production in respect of

groundnut and cotton decreased during the years 1968-69 over the 1961-62 due to the fact that the acreages brought under these crops were less than the year 1961-62. However the value of groundnut went up due to price ^{that} ~~soared~~ ^{high} during 1967-68.

3.4.1. Percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area.

In the year 1968-69 the net area irrigated in the district was 51 thousand hectares. It increased to 12 thousand hectares as compared to the net irrigated area during the year 1961-62 i.e. by 30.8 %. The gross irrigated area increased from 44 thousand hectares in 1961-62 to 57 thousand hectares in the year 1968-69 showing an increase by 29.5 %.

During the year 1966-67 there was slight decrease in the irrigated area due to paucity of rains. The table given below indicates the gross and net irrigated area in Bhir district during the years 1961-62 to 1968-69.

The table above indicates the percentage of net irrigated area increased in all the years under review as compared to the year 1961-62. The percentage of net area irrigated to net area sown has fallen in the year 1967-68 as compared to the year 1965-66 due to the fact that net area sown has started increasing over the year 1965-66 and also the net irrigated area has shown decrease in the same period. The highest percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown is witnessed in Ashti taluka during the period under review, as medium projects were taken up particularly in that taluka, under development activities since second five year plan.

3.5 Changes in the crop pattern.

3.5.1. It is found from the table below that area under total food crops as well as nonfood crops in the year 1967-68 and 1968-69 was more in the district than it was in 1965-66 and less than what it was in 1961-62. The percentage of

total foodcrops to the gross cropped area was increased in the years under review as compared to the year 1961-62 where as the percentage of total non-food crops to the gross cropped area in the district decreased during the same period from 25.5 % in 1961-62 to 24.0 %, 23.1 %, 21.8 % and 21.1 % in the years 1965-66, 1966-67, 1967-68 and 1968-69 respectively. The percentage of foodcrop area was highest in Patoda taluka as compared to other talukas in the district.

3.5.2. In Bhir district food crop is predominant as it accounts for nearly three fourth of the net cropped area. Reviewing the cropping pattern it was observed that the percentage of food crops recorded an increase in the year 1967-68 and 1968-69 as compared to that in the year 1961-62. This indicates a slight shift in cropping pattern in favour of food crops

3.5.3. Regarding the irrigated crops in the district it was found that the irrigated area under cereals and pulses showed an increase in 1968-69 as compared to the same with the year 1961-62. The percentage of total irrigated food crops to the gross irrigated area decreased from 95.6 % in 1961-62 to 92.9% and 93.4 % during the year 1967-68 and 1968-69 respectively, whereas the same in respect of irrigated nonfood crops had increased from 4.4 % in 1961-62 to 7.1 % and 6.6 % during the year 1967-68 and 1968-69 respectively. It is interesting to note that 100 % irrigated area was under the total food crops only during the period under review in Manjlegaon taluka.

3.6. Increase in the Agricultural credit outstanding dues and Gross Value of Agricultural production.

During the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 the agricultural credit outstanding dues were about three to four times respectively more than they were in 1961-62. These dues were more in Georai, Ashti and Ambejogai talukas in the year 1968-69 and the same were found more in the year 1969-70 in Georai, Ambejogai and Kaij talukas as compared to other talukas of the district.

3.6.2. Average prices of all important crops in the district increased in 1968-69 and 1969-70 as compared to the average prices of 1961-62. This increased the gross value of agricultural production even though the production of few crops decreased over the year 1961-62.

3.7. Agricultural wage rates.

The agricultural wage rates of different categories of the labourers were collected from three different selected centres of the district, namely Umapur, Kada and Renapur in talukas of Georai, Ashti and Ambejogai respectively. Even within the district the average wage rates of different categories fluctuated very widely during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 among these three centres.

3.7.2. The average wage rates of agricultural labourer in the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 in the district were found to be more as compared with the rates of 1963-64. The rates showed an upward tendency in all the three centres of Umapur, Kada and Renapur selected for collecting the data of wage rates of agricultural labourers. Amongst all type of labourers, wage rates of skilled labourers and black smith were found high in the district.

The table below gives changes in the wage rates during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 over 1963-64.

3.7.4. It is evident from the above table that considerable increase was observed in the wage rates of carpenter, blacksmith and field labourers at all the selected centres.

3.8. Livestock per hectare of land.

Livestock is the major source of power in agricultural industry in India.

Comparison with the cultivable area with bovine population indicates as to what extent the bovine population caters the needs of agricultural industry,. According to 1966 Livestock Census, the total bovine and avine population in the district showed an increase by 10.47 lakhs in 1961 to 10.53 lakhs in 1966, although the bovine population had decreased from 7.45 lakhs in 1961 to 7.21 lakhs in 1966. Cultivable area per pair of male bovine population over three years worked out to 7.0 hectares in 1965-66 as compared to 7.3 hectares in the year 1961-62 in the district. The cultivable area per pair of bovine and avine population worked out to 1.9 hectares during both the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

3.9 Poultry as compared to population.

According to 1966 Live stock census the total poultry in the district was about 1.6 lakhs which showed decrease of 33.3 % over that in the year 1961. As a result of this the poultry per thousand population declined from 239 in 1961 to 156 in 1966. Within the district the ratio of poultry per thousand population in Kaij taluka varied from 251 in 1961 to 128 in 1966.

3.10 Electricity per capita consumption.

Electricity was first introduced in the district in the year 1957 when only one town out of seven was electrified in the district. In the beginning of the third five year plan the generation of electricity was only 49.2 thousand K.W.H..

No electricity was generated during the last ^{four} years under review in the district as the supply of electricity is made available from Koyana and Paras grids except the waterwell consumption which 6098 K.W.H. in thermal type of generation.

3.10.2. The per capita consumption of electricity rose from 0.4 K.W.H. in 1961-62 to 6.1 and 7.9 K.W.H. in the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The consumption of electricity including that on agriculture and industries etc. rose from 3.76 lakhs K.W.H. in the year 1961-62 to 79.30 lakhs K.W.H. in 1969-70 and 60.81 lakhs K.W.H. in 1968-69.

3.11. Increase in the no. of candidates enrolled in the Employment Exchange and vacancies notified.

In the year 1968-69 the number of candidates enrolled was 5,447 which showed an increase of 2092 candidates over 1961-62 and at the end of 1969-70 the number of candidates enrolled was of the order of 6,401 which is increased by nearly twice over the year 1961-62. The number of candidates placed in services in 1968-69 and 1969-70 was 417 and 468 respectively. This number went up by 51 in the year 1969-70 against the year 1968-69 whereas the same had decreased by 7 in 1969-70 over the year 1961-62.

3.11.2. The number of vacancies notified in the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 were 551 and 620 respectively as against 1,057 vacancies notified during the year 1961-62. For the year 1968-69 the number of candidates placed in employment was 63.8 % to total no. of vacancies notified in 1961-62 whereas the same was reported 75.7 % and 75.5 % during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

3.12. Increase in the indoor and out-door patients treated in Hospitals and dispensaries.

During the year 1961 about 4 lakhs outdoor patients received treatment in Govt. hospitals and dispensaries functioning in the district. The number of outdoor patients recorded about 8 lakhs and 5 lakhs in the year 1968 and 1969 respectively. The number of indoor patients rose from about 6 thousand in the year 1961 to about 13 and 16 thousand in the year 1968 and 1969 respectively. As regards the out-door and indoor patients treated, the number of ^{is} more in Ambejogai taluka followed by Bhir taluka in the district.

3.12.2. The number of beds per lakh of population increased from 40 beds to 53 and 59 during the year 1968 and 1969 respectively. The ratio as regards beds per lakh of population is more in Ambejogai taluka followed by Bhir taluka in the district.

3.13. Increase in the number of students in different categories in Bhir district.

The spread of education in Bhir district during the Third Five Year Plan was significant. The literacy percentage increased from 8.60 in 1951 to 15.09 in 1961. The percentage of literacy in Marathwada region increased from 9.09 % to 16.29 % in the same period. All the inhabited villages were covered by educational facilities by opening primary school in each remaining villages during the year 1966-67. Thus no village remained in the district without schooling facilities.

The number of primary schools increased from 993 in 1961-62, 1,319 in 1965-66 and 1,374 in 1967-68 to 1,377 in 1968-69. Similarly an enormous increase is seen in the strength of primary students. This increased from 65,395 in 1961-62, 98,347 in 1965-66, 1,03,889 in 1966-67, to 1,04,623 in 1968-69. The strength of the primary teachers showed an increase from 1,874 in the year 1961-62 and 3,356 in 1967-68 to 3,391 in 1968-69. The number of primary schools decreased in Manjlegaon and Ashti talukas in the year 1967-68 as compared to the year 1966-67 due to conversion of primary schools in secondary schools where as the number of primary schools increased by 1 and 2 in Georal and Manjlegaon talukas respectively during the year 1968-69 as compared to the year 1967-68-

3.13.2. Secondary schools.

Under secondary education the number of institutions and the number of students and teachers increased appreciably in the year 1967-68 as compared to the year 1961-62. The number of institutions increased from 38 in 1961-62, 115 in 1966-67, to 125 in 1967-68. The same showed decrease in the year 1968-69 and stood at 124 schools in 1968-69. The number of students including boys and girls increased from 10,675 in 1961-62, 35,610 in 1966-67 and 38,161 in 1967-68 to 40,931 in 1968-69. Similarly the strength of the teachers went up from 531 in 1961-62, 1,428 in 1966-67 and 1,549 in 1967-68 to 1,661 in 1968-69.

Teacher student ratio in secondary schools during 1968-69 worked out to one teacher per 25 students and in primary schools for the same period it came to one teacher per 31 students.

3.13.3. Higher Education.

The number of institutions rose from 2 in 1961-62 to 4 in 1968-69. The number of colleges during 1965-66 to 67-68 remained at 3 constantly. The number of teaching staff and students increased from 73 and 1,513 in 1966-67 to 104 and 2,739 during the year 1968-69. The ratio of teaching staff and college students worked out to one teacher per 26 students in the year 1968-69 in Bhir district.

3.13.4. Special Schools.

Besides the above institutions the district was provided with special schools. During the year 1967-68 there were 5 special schools against 3 schools ^{during} the year 1961-62. During the year 1968-69 the enrollment and strength of teaching staff came down from 390 and 37 to 487 and 39 in the year 1967-68. The teacher student ratio for these schools worked out to 1:13 in 1967-68 and it came to 1:10 in 1968-69.

3.14. Increase in the road length per 100 sq. km.

The road length in Bhir district per 100 sq. km increased from 7.8 in the year 1961-62 to 10.8 and 10.9 in the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The increase was the result of sizable increase in the road length constructed by the state and local sector.

3.15. Increase in the Banking facilities in proportion to population:

At the beginning of the Third Five Year Plan there were only 9 banking offices in the district in 1961-62 and this number was increased by 25 and 31 during the year 1967-68 and 1968-69 respectively. The average population per bank comes to 4,274 in the year 1968-69 and the same was 109 61 in 61-62.

3.16. Prices average retail prices collected at Dist. H.Q.:

During the past few years prices have risen by more than 10 percent per annum which is adversely affecting the economy. The table given below indicates the instability of prices showing a rise of prices of all the essential commodities.

3.16.3. From the above table it is seen that the prices of almost all commodities in the district showed an increase of about 50 % in the average prices 1969 as compared to the prices prevailing in the year 1962. The prices of wheat medium and wheat coarse in the year 1962 rose from Rs. 0-66 and 0-63 to Rs. 1-22 and 1-19 in the year 1966 and the same increased to Rs. 1-33 and 1-27 in the year 1968 respectively. The prices of jowar white in the year 1962 was Rs. 0-57 which went up to Rs. 0-70 and 0-69 in the year 1968 and 1969 respectively. The price of Arhardal started rising from Rs. 0-83 in the year 1962 to Rs. 1-37 and 1-51 in the 1968 and 1969 respectively.

Similar is the tendency of an increase in the prices of all the pulses from 1963 to 1969. The prices of Gur only fell in the year 1965 as compared to the year 1962 and for the rest of the years it drifted onwards. The prices of groundnut oil increased significantly in 1966 and stood at Rs. 4-46 and in the later years 1968 and 1969 it came down to Rs. 3-34 and 4-36 respectively. The price of vanaspati dalda showed an enormous increase from Rs. 3-33 in 1962 to Rs. 5-86 in the year 1969. The prices of remaining commodities also showed an increase with some slight fluctuation in between the years from 1962 to 1969.

CHAPTER- IV.

PLANNING.

PLAN REVIEW 1968-69 and 1969-70.

4.1. This chapter comprises the plan review of two years i.e. 1968-69 and 1969-70. 1968-69 is considered as one of the Annual Plans of three intervening years viz. 1966-67, 1967-68 and 1968-69. The plan programme of 1969-70 marks the commencement of the Fourth Five Year Plan.

4.2. During the years 1968-69 and 1969-70, the total expenditure incurred was to the tune of Rs. 149.98 and 158.70 lakhs on district level plan schemes against the annual budget provision of Rs. 219.78 and 173.15 lakhs forming 68.2 % and 91.6% during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.3. The broad objectives, which were likely to be adopted for the IV Plan, were kept in view in drawing up the Annual Plan of 1969-70 which was the first year of the Fourth Plan. The salient features of programme included in the Annual Plan 1969-70 are given below:

4.4. The agriculture and allied programmes occupied an important place in the developmental efforts. The table below indicates the major headwise expenditure incurred during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 along with the percentages to the total expenditure ~~incurred during the years~~ against each developmental head on district level plan schemes in Bhir district.

It is observed from the table that the agricultural programme accounted for highest percentage i.e. 54.57 in the year 1968-69 and 65.32 in the year 1969-70 due to emphasis laid for the stepping up of agriculture production.

4.5 Agricultural programme.

The various programmes of agricultural production included in 1968-69 and 1969-70 aimed to increase the production potential with the base year 1965-66.

This was done through various programmes by undertaking land development like soil conservation, provision for irrigation and propagation of improved agricultural practices by using of new hybrid and high yielding varieties of seeds, fertilizers and plant protection measures which proved successful for the past two years, were vigorously pursued during both the years under review.

4.6. Agricultural production:

This subhead of development programme aimed at increasing agricultural production. The expenditure incurred on the schemes of agricultural production was to the tune of Rs. 13.21 and 15.00 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and 69-70 utilising 12.42 % and 14.47 % respectively of total expenditure made on agricultural programme.

4.7. Under this development programme the improved seeds of jowar were distributed to the extent of 542 and 660 quintals during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The improved seed of wheat were distributed to the order of 610 and 600 quintals respectively during the years under review. The additional area covered by fruits was about 192 and 1,475 hectares during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The chemical fertilizers such as ammonium sulphate, super phosphate, fertilizers mixture, urea and others distributed are as given below:

24,187 and 9,473 compost pits were dug during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. 58,175 and 23,682 m.tons compost was prepared and 91 and 2,000 hectares area was covered by green manuring during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. 1,037 and 253 improved agricultural implements for propogation were distributed during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.8 Soil Conservation.

To prevent soil erosion and to maintain productivity of soil, bunding programme was under taken in large scale and 25,016 and 19,414 hectares were bunded during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. Similarly 63 and 46 hectares of land was reclaimed during both the years under review respectively. The expenditure incurred during 68-69 was about Rs. 42.39 lakhs and Rs. 42.28 lakhs in 1969-70 utilising 39.84 % and 40.78 % of the total expenditure incurred under agricultural programme respectively.

4.9 Minor irrigation.

The minor irrigation works programme was taken up with a view to provide the irrigation facilities as this programme is less expensive as compared to major and medium irrigation projects. This programme consisted of items such as (1) construction of ground water wells and repairs to old ones (2) installation of lift irrigation (3) construction of small tanks and (4) installation of pumping sets and bandharas costing less than Rs. 15 lakhs. This programme was given high priority in the district level plan. Under this programme 5,159 and 2,766 new wells were constructed, 171 and 125 old wells repaired and 1,311 and 938 pump sets were installed during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. Under the programme of construction of bandharas, 36 bandharas were constructed in the year 1968-69 and 33 in the year 1969-70. Only three old bandharas were repaired during the year 1969-70. Under all the schemes under this programme the additional irrigation potential created was about 11,956 and 9,180 hectares during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The expenditure incurred was about Rs. 48.55 lakhs and 45.24 lakhs during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.10. Animal Husbandry.

In a predominantly agricultural economy animal husbandry plays a vital role both for supporting agricultural operations and for supplementing food grains by subsidiary foodstuffs. As such the programme of

increasing cattle wealth was undertaken during the years under review. Under this programme only two veterinary aid centres were started during the year 1969-70. The expenditure was incurred to the tune of Rs. 0.26 and Rs. 0.12 lakhs during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.11. Ayacut Development programme.

The Ayacut development programme comprised the activities given below:

1. Survey of land under command.
2. Land development of area under command.
3. Establishment of irrigation units for extension works and
4. Establishment of trail cum-demonstration farms.

Rs. 45.8 thousand and Rs. 7.9 thousand were spent under this programme of Ayacut development during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.12. Dairy Development.

The objective of this programme is to develop milk production as a rural industry by providing remunerative business to cultivators. For this purpose incentive such as loans, marketing facilities etc. were given to milk producers in selected areas having potentialities of milk production. The rural dairy extension programme provided measures such as community milking sheds, supply of pregnant buffaloes and buffalo calves to milk producers. The expenditure incurred under this programme of dairy development was to the order of Rs. 0.4 thousands during the year 1968-69. No expenditure was made in the year 1969-70 as there was no plan provision made in the year under review. However under this scheme three co-operative milk societies were started during the year 1969-70.

4.13 Forest.

The forest development programme aims at stabilizing the agriculture by maintaining soil fertility and, ensuring adequate supply of firewood and timber. Under this development sub-head, afforestation of forest area 99 and 58 hectares was achieved during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The expenditure to the extent of Rs. 21.8 thousands and 62.3 thousands was made during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.14 Fisheries.

The principal aim in the programme for development of fisheries is to increase fish production by promoting Fishermen co-operative societies providing marketing facilities and preservation of fish. Under this programme individual fishermen, their registered group and co-operative societies were assisted with loans and subsidies. The total expenditure on fisheries schemes during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 amounted to Rs. 24.0 thousands and 16.7 thousands respectively. 300 and 400 thousand fingerlings were stocked during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. 190 quintals and 110 quintals fish were netted during the years under review.

4.15. Ware housing and Marketing.

The object of the scheme was to give financial assistance to market committees so that the necessary facilities may be provided by way of market yards, office building, sheds halls, rest houses etc.

Under this programme the amount of Rs. 105.1 thousands and 15.6 thousands were spent utilizing 0.99 % and 1.50 % of the total expenditure incurred under the agricultural programme during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. Under this programme one society was assisted by way of subsidy and 6 societies were given loan for development of agricultural marketing.

4.16. Co-operation and Community Development.

The successive five year plans have given an important place to co-operation as a major form of organisation which now embraces many branches of economic activities both in agriculture and industry, in marketing and processing and also in organising supplying services. The state Government has always adopted a liberal policy in fostering the growth of co-operative movement and in pursurance of this policy various steps were taken to strengthen the co-operative credit structure for mopping up local resources, to build up an efficient structure of co-operative marketing and processing of agricultural produce. These measures have enabled co-operative structure to increase the availability of short and medium term credit for purpose of agricultural production.

Under this major head of development programme, the total expenditure was to the order of Rs. 13.06 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and 5.55 lakhs in the year 1969-70 to strengthen and to support co-operative structure for effectively discharging the vital functions through financial assistance and to make better socio-economic conditions for rural population through Community Development programme.

4.17. Co-operation.

Co-operation in rural areas was particularly emphasised with two fold purposes. firstly to infuse the spirit of self help amongst the cultivators and secondly to provide for their credit needs and other requirement on co-operative basis. An expenditure of Rs. 4.34 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and Rs. 1.21 lakhs in the year 1969-70 was incurred in the district, which formed about 33.22 % and 21.83 % of the total expenditure of this major head of development.

4.17.2. During the Annual plan period 8 agricultural credit societies were formed with additional 480 members in the year 1968-69 and 3 societies with 2,375 additional members during the year 1969-70. Similarly one each co-operative farming society with additional members 33 and 31 were formed during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Two processing societies with additional membership numbering 1,168 were also formed in the year 1969-70. The short term loans advanced by the agricultural credit societies amounted to Rs. 177.5 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and Rs. 300 lakhs in the year 1969-70. Under long term loans Rs. 163.3 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and Rs. 175 lakhs in the year 1969-70 were advanced by the agricultural credit societies. The percentage of recovery of loans advanced by the agricultural credit societies was about 47.0 % in the year 1968-69 and 53.8 % during the year 1969-70 in the district.

4.17.3. Community Development.

The Community Development programme was started during the year 1953 in this district as a method for organising the rural community for undertaking numerous activities for the benefit of the local area with active participation of the people. The programme aims at integrated advance in all spheres of village life. The main fields of activity are agriculture, animal husbandry and irrigation which are the mainstay of rural life. Attention is also paid to the development of means of communications and to such items as health, education housing and social and cultural activities.

Under this sub-head of development, expenditure was incurred to the tune of Rs. 8.72 lakhs forming 66.78 % of the total expenditure of this major head in the year 1968-69 and Rs. 4.34 lakhs forming about 78.17 % of the total expenditure in the year 1969-70. The entire rural area of this district was already covered under the Community Development programme. There are nine community development blocks with C.P.A. pattern 12.50, functioning in the district. The intensified phase of development in stage-I was completed in all the blocks excepting in one block of Manjlegaon.

The Applied Nutrition programme which is substantially aided by the UNICEF was taken up in three selected blocks of Ashti, Manjlegaon and Bhir in this district. Under this programme arrangements were made for supply of nutritious food to the people, attention being particularly given to the expected and nursing mothers and school going children in rural areas.

Special attention to production of nutritive foods like poultry, fish, fruits and vegetables and provision of facilities for training and education in the production, preparation and consumption of these foods are the salient features of this programme.

4.18. Industries and Mining.

The role of the state in this sector of development was to give aid to small scale industries in rural and under developed areas of the state with the object to develop agroindustrial economy and to provide employment to local landless agricultural workers.

4.18.1. Small Scale and Cottage Industries.

With a view to encourage traditional industries in rural areas, the financial and technical assistance was provided to small scale industries. The total expenditure amounting to Rs. 75.0 thousands was incurred in the year 1968-69 and Rs. 79.4 thousands in the year 1969-70.

4.18.2. 3 and 5 industrial co-operative societies with 36 and 84 additional members were formed during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. Further one and four handloom weavers co-operative societies adding 35 and 170 members were formed during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.19. Transport and Communication.

The road system in the country should be well balanced with regard to the needs of rural as well as urban areas for economic growth of the country. The lack of transport facilities is one of the factors arresting the economic growth of this district.

The programme covered the construction of district roads and rural roads in the district with an aim to link up industrial areas and trading centres to the primary producing centres in the rural areas.

4.19.2. Under this development programme of road construction Rs. 6.23 lakhs and Rs. 10.64 lakhs were spent during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The new roads were constructed to the length of 82.7 km. in the year 1968-69 and 50.2 km. in the year 1969-70. 11.5 km. and 11 km. of road length was modernised during the period under review. Two each in the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 C.D. works were completed. About 13.4 km. and 39.5 km. rural roads were constructed during the year under review. Only one bridge was constructed under this programme in the year 1968-69. About eight culverts were constructed in the year 1968-69 and seven were constructed in the year 1969-70.

4.20. Social Services.

In the field of social services the programme aimed at the consolidation, improvement and efficient maintenance of facilities already created. Adequate attention was proposed to be given to initiate the process of re-orientation of educational system with a view to afford maximum employment and building up of healthy attitudes towards social and national integration, and for the Family Planning programme. For the benefit of rural areas, the scheme for the construction of hostels for students and for expansion of school buildings, the programme was undertaken during the period under review.

4.20.2. The total expenditure made under this major development head was to the order of Rs. 67.75 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and Rs. 37.83 lakhs in the year 1969-70 forming 34.75 % and 23.83 % of the total annual plan expenditure.

4.21. Education.

In the field of education the programme was oriented towards qualitative improvement, diversification of general education and expansion of technical education facilities. Under the sub-head of general education the total expenditure made during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 was to the tune of Rs. 21.30 lakhs and Rs. 7.22 lakhs utilising 31.44 % and 19.09 % of the total expenditure of this major head respectively in the district.

4.21.2. In the year 1969-70, 40 school buildings and 40 rooms were added to the existing buildings. In the year 1968-69, 400 teachers were trained and in the year 1969-70 only 47 teachers were trained. Only three primary schools were started in the year 1968-69 where as 35 primary schools and 3 secondary schools were started in the year 1969-70.

4.21.3. Under the sub-head general education, one technical high school was functioning in the district.

4.22. Medical Nursing.

No expenditure was booked during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 under this sub-head of development.

4.23. Public health.

In the field of public health the programme on communicable diseases was intensified. The Family Planning Programme was continued to check the growth of population.

Primary Health Centres were also maintained to improve the general health conditions in rural areas. Malaria eradication programme was also undertaken during the period under review.

4.23.2. Under this sub-head expenditure was incurred to the tune of Rs. 13.00 lakhs utilising 19.19 % of the total expenditure on the social services during the year 1968-69 where as it was Rs. 0.44 lakhs forming 1.15 % of the total expenditure in the year 1969-70, one family planning unit was started during the year 1969-70. 4 doctors and 7 nurses were also appointed in the same year. During the year 1968-69, 8 nurses were appointed in the district.

4.24. Water Supply and Drainage.

In many towns of Bhir district existing water supply is inadequate and requires augmentation to remedy the deficiencies. ~~The programme~~ The progress depends upon the initiative and efforts on the part of the municipal body and raising resources. Government is trying to tackle the problem of providing drinking water in rural areas in two ways.

- (1) by constructing drinking water wells and
- (2) by supply of water through pipes.

Both these programmes are being implemented through Zilla Parishad, Bhir. State sector also has increased its activity in supplying the piped water in rural areas. The schemes under this development sub-head contributed to prevent water born diseases. Total provision under this programme made was to the order of Rs. 26.18 lakhs and Rs. 27.85 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The percentage utilised was about 38.64 % in the year 1968-69 and 73.61 % in the year 1969-70 of the total annual plan expenditure made on the head Social Services.

4.24.2. Under this programme 80 drinking water wells in the year 1968-69 and 156 in the year 1969-70 were constructed and 101 villages in the year 1968-69 and 172 villages in the year 1969-70 were benefitted under rural water supply scheme. The number of villages with piped water supply schemes and other plan schemes in the district were 53 and 59 during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.25 Housing.

Housing is one of the essential requirements of life. In the organisation of community life whether in villages or in urban areas, provision for housing has to be made in view of the threatening growth of population. The activities under this programme are to solve the problem of housing including the activities pertaining to preparation of development plans of towns and lay-outs extension of gaothans and resettlement of villages by assisting local bodies.

4.25.2. Under this programme expenditure to the tune of Rs. 101.3 and 39.1 thousands were spent in year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively on low income group housing scheme and village housing scheme in the district. 2 houses under low income group housing scheme were completed in the year 1968-69 where as 139 and 11 villages were covered by the village housing scheme in the district during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

4.26 Urban development.

No scheme was implemented in the district during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70.

4.27 Welfare of Backward classes .

Under this sub-head attempts were made to remove the social and economic disabilities of communities comprising Backward Classes. The expenditure to the order of Rs. 2.45 lakhs and Rs. 1.07 lakhs was booked on various schemes for uplift of backward class people utilising 3.62 % and 2.83 % of the total expenditure under the major head of social services during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. Under this programme 5 members of housing co-operative societies were assisted in the year 1968-69.

4.28 Social Welfare:

Under the sub-head of social welfare no scheme was implemented during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 in the district.

4.29. Labour and Labour welfare:

Under the programme of labour and labour welfare, only one scheme pertaining to technical and vocational training was implemented during the years under review in the district. This scheme aimed to meet the requirement of skilled craftsmen for various industries as defence purposes.

4.29.2. The total expenditure incurred under this programme was Rs. 3.81 lakhs and Rs. 0.87 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. About 135 and 239 pupils were trained during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively and 2 members were added to the strength of the staff under this programme during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70.
