SOCIO-ECONOMIC REVIEW *

I) Physical Features

1. The District of Dhulia lying between 20-31° and 22-2' North latitude and 73-35' and 75-17' East Longitide is situated in the North Eastern part of Maharashtra State. Administratively it is bounded on the North by Nashwa Panchayat, on the west by the Gujarat State, on the South by the District of Nasik and on the East by the District of East Khandesh.

2. The area of the District is 5163.2 square miles, covering 1364 towns and villages with a total population of 1060278, according to the 1951 census. The District is divided into nine Talukas and One Mahal, viz. 1)Dhulia 2) Shirpur 3) Sindkheda 4) Nandurbar 5) Sakri 6)Shahada 7) Nawapur 8) Taloda 9)Akkalkuwa and 10) Akarani Mahal. Akarani Mahal and the Talukas of Nawapur and Akkalkuwa are classified as scheduled areas under the constitution.

3. Stretching nearly 54 miles along the Tapti and parts of Surat and Bharoch, districts and varying in breadth from 32 miles to 76 miles, the District forms an upland basin, the most northerly section of the Deccan Plateau.

4. An upland basin, draining into the Tapti with a gentle westerly slope, this district includes most varied tracts of country, wild hill and forest, rich garden and grove stretches of green plain, and low rolling rocky hills. From East to west, parallel with the Tapti are three well-marked belts of the country, in the middle the rich Tapti Valley, in the North the high and wild Satpudas and in the South-West and South, bare ridges and rich wellwatered valleys flanked by the Sahyadri ranges.

5. The Tapti banks are high and bare, and the land on both sides is seamed by tributary rivers and streams. Now and again from the North, spurs of the Satpuras Stretch close to the river bank, and on the South rise some low hill ranges of Sahyadri. With these exceptions, the long central plain is an unbroken stretch of deep alluvial soil. On both sides of the river cultivation is wide-spread. Towns and villages are relatively better-off. The Tapti plain of Shirpur, Shahada, Taloda, Nandurbar and Sindkheda Talukas is rich. Shahada is one of the richest black-soil plains in the whole District. This region is inhabited more by Shahu-gujars and Rajput-Patils.

6. Satpuras: North of Tapti the whole length of the rich alluvial plain is bounded by the steep southern face of the Satpuras, a belt of mountain land from twenty to thirty miles broad. There are high mountain peaks in its ranges rising from 3,000 to 1,800 feet. The grandest hill of the range is Toranmal in Akarani Mahal which rises upto a height of 3318 feet. This was once a seat of the rulers of Mandu and consists of a long narrow table land about 16 square miles in area. Lately, it is being developed as a Hill-Station. The Satpuda ranges are full of forests inhabited by wild life and Adivasis. They cover the hilly part of Akkalkuwa, Taloda, Shahada and Shirpur Taluka and the whole of Akarani Mahal.

7. Sahyadri : South of the rich Tapti valley, the country is more varied than either in the centre or in the North. In the East, drained by the Bori, wide stony, thorny plains rise in low broad topped basaltic ridges, or sink in rich valleys studded with fruit gardens and prosperous villages. West of the Bori, the land as it draws nearer the Sahyadris, grows wilder and more picturesque. Ranges of quaintly cut out hills separated by the well-watered valley of the Panjhara,

the Kan and the Borai, stretch far East across the District. The extreme west of these Sahyadri ranges is wild and hilly, thick with forests. This part is inhabited by wild beasts and Adivasis, while the rich valleys and plain stretching East are populated by the Ahirani. The region comprises of Nawapur, Sakri and Dhulia Talukas, and the non-Tapti parts of Nandurbar and Sindkheda Talukas.

8. Rivers

There is only one Major river, a few minor rivers and many rivers of no consequence in the district. The Major river is Tapti. As pointed out earlier its course in the district runs to 54 miles. The water-level of this river, however, being too low as compared to its banks, the river cannot be used for minor irrigation. The important contribution of this river to this district, is the silt that it deposits on either side of its banks, especially during floods. This has resulted into changing the area of Shirpur and Sindkheda, Shahada and Nandurbar, Talukas, flanking this river, into the grainary of this District. The minor rivers are Panzara, Kan, Bori, Borai, and Gomai. Of these Panzara, Kan and Gomai are having a considerable net-work of minor irrigation works. Most of these are kacha bandharas. They are mainly fair weather friends supplying water for irrigation during monsoon months and one or two months more. The bandharas are unable to supply water in the dry months when crops need water most.

9. Climate

Climate of this district is not temperate, temperature soaring high upto 116°F . in the summer months of April and May, while falling as low as 40°F . to 44°F . in the winter months of December and January. The daily variation in day and night temperatures, too, is of the order of 25°F . to 30°F . As far as humidity is concerned this district is dry. However, in case of rain-fall this district has got a unique position. It is bounded on the west and part of its south by the Sahyadri ranges while in the north it is bounded by the Satpuras. Hence, even though this District does not get abundant rains (as it comes in the watershed of the Sahyadri) it gets assured rains rather unevenly spread over 3 to 5 months.

10. Season

Summer and winter are the two seasons in this district. The summer months are mid-March to mid-October while the winter months are mid-October to mid-March. The summer months are interrupted by rains for a short period. The number of rainy days, in this district, is about 30 days, spread over about three and a half months- late June to early October. However, on such days in these months when there are no rains the season is purely summer.

11. Rainfall

The rainfall in the district (for the year 1958-59) was 29.75" spread over an average of 30 days, the rainy months being late June to early October. There were local rains in May and scanty rains in November, too. Details of rain fall are shown in Table No. 1. In the year 1958-59 the rainfall was heavy in Nawapur Taluka.

12. Following are the figures of total rainfall for each taluka during the year 1957-58 and 1958-59.

Administrative Set Up.

13. The district is sub-divided, administratively, into three sub-divisions, nine Talukas and one Mahal. The Table below details the administrative set up.

:- P O P U L A T I O N :-

Growth:-

14. The population of the district according to the 1951 census was 1060278 i.e. 3.3 percent of the total population of Maharashtra State. This shows an increase of 25.4 over that of 1941 census population which in turn was higher by 18.2 percent over the 1931 census population. The population of this district has increased by 136.2 percent during 1901-1951. The rate of increase of urban population has been slightly more in the preceding decades, as compared to the rate of increase of rural population. In the decade 1941-1951 the former was 31.1 percent while the latter was 24.1 percent. In the decade 1931-41 they were 25.5 percent and 16.8 percent respectively. In the fifty years (1901-51) they were 149.0 percent and 133.8 percent respectively.

Density:-

15. The District has an area of 5163.2 sq.miles(according to the Survey of India),i.e.4.4 percent of the area of the Maharashtra-State, while its percentage share of population is smaller (3.3 percent) with the result that the general density of population of the district(205) is lower than that of the State(270). The density of the urban population of the district

in 1951 was 1671. The density of rural population was (171). Such low density of rural population is largely due to the extensive area (33 percent) of this district covered by forests, which are very thinly populated. This district is one of the most thinly populated districts of Bombay Division. The density per sq.mile of population of Bombay Division is 414, and that of the adjoining districts of Nasik and Jalgaon is 237 and 322 respectively.

Rural /Urban Distribution :-

16. Hardly 18.4 percent of the population of this district lives in urban areas. Comparing this with the similar percentage of Maharashtra State(28.8), can be seen that this district is predominantly rural in character. Development of urban area is mainly conditioned by either trade or industry, or administrative functions or communications facilities. The communication facilities being rather poor in this district, and there being no large industries worth the name in this district, the impact of urbanisation is not forceful in it.

17. The rural population(864807) which formed 81.6 percent of the total population of the district is scattered over 1352 villages. Average population of a villages of this district was, in 1951, thus 643. That of an average villages of a Maharashtra State, too, was 640 in that year. The villages of this district are, however, essentially smaller in size. About 57.0 percent of the villages had population less than 500 in 1951, about 25.1 percent of villages had population between 500-1000, about 13.4 percent of the villages had population between 1,000 -2,000, while the remaining 4.5 villages had population of 2,000 or above. Akkalkuwa Taluka and Akarani Mahal, the two administrative units which are essentially backward in development and through which the ranges of Satpura traverse, however account for a sizeable percentage(37.2) of the smaller sized villages (with population less than 500).

18. A place which had a population of 5,000 or more and exhibited urban characteristics was declared as an urban locality in 1951 census. However, two towns of this district, according to 1951 census, had population less than 5,000 and were essentially rural in character. Their inclusion in the list of towns inflated the number of towns, without inflating the urban population to similar extent. As a result the 12 urban places in this district range in population from 4162 to 76,880, their mean population being 15,456, much lower than the mean urban population 24703 in Maharashtra State.

19. There was no town with a population more than 100,000 in this district. One town viz. Dhulia had population between 50,000 to 100,000. Its population accounted for 39.3 percent of the urban population of the District. One town viz. Nandurbar had population between 20,000 to 50,000, accounting for 15.4 percent of the urban population. Four towns viz. Shirpur, Taloda, Dondaicha and Shahada, had population between 10,000 and 20,000 thus accounting for 25.5 percent of the urban population. Four towns viz. Sindkheda, Nawapur, Thalner and Pimpalner had population between 5,000 and 10,000 accounting amongst themselves for 15.2 of the urban population. Two towns viz. Betawa and Ranala had population less than 5,000 each thus accounting for 4.6 percent of the urban population.

Livelihood Pattern :-

20. The basis of classification of population, at the 1951 census, was economic. The population was classified as belonging to the agricultural classes and the non-agricultural classes. The essentially agrarian characteristic of this district can be gauged from the fact that not only a very large proportion(81.6 percent) of population is rural, but

also a very large proportion of population (76.09) is dependent upon agriculture. The proportion of agricultural population, in Maharashtra-State, is 63.9 percent.

21. The Table below gives the percentage distribution of population of this district in the eight main livelihood classes :-

The Agricultural Population :-

22. 94.8 percent of the agricultural population of this district hailed from rural areas, the remaining 5.2 percent being from urban areas. 69.6 percent of the agricultural population was cultivators of land wholly or mainly owned and their dependents, 25.7 percent was agricultural labourers and their dependents, 4.0 percent was cultivators of land wholly or mainly unowned and their dependents, and 0.7 percent was 'non-cultivating' owners of land, agricultural rents receivers and their dependents. Thus, it appears that 'owner cultivators' was the predominant class amongst agriculturists, the land-less agricultural labour following them. Even then the percentage (25.7%) of the latter class is fairly high and will be of great significance while facing the problem of settling them in some permanent fruitful occupation. The remaining two agricultural classes account for quite meagre proportions.

23. The composition of the class of 'non-cultivating' owners of land, agricultural rent receivers and their dependents is rather peculiar. It is the only class in which females out-number males; again it is the only class in which the proportion of self-supporting females is fairly high as compared to the similar proportions for any other class.

The non-Agricultural Population :-

24. Hardly 23.9 percent of the population of this district is dependent upon activities other than agriculture, the proportion of non-agricultural population for Maharashtra State being as high as 36.6 percent. 63.7 percent of the non-agriculturists hailed from urban areas, while 36.3 percent hailed from rural areas. Even though more than 35 percent of the non-agricultural population hailed from rural areas, they amount for more than one tenth of the rural population. It can thus be seen that the importance of non-agricultural population in the rural economy has been quite meagre. The non-agricultural population in urban areas accounted for a very high percentage (77.3) percent of the urban population.

25. 31.6 percent of non-agricultural population earned their livelihood from production other than cultivation, 19.7 percent from commerce, only 2.5 percent from transport while as high as 46.2 percent from other services and miscellaneous sources. It can thus be seen that the largest proportion of non-agricultural population was accounted by 'other services and miscellaneous sources' a class which does not necessarily 'produce' anything 'materially'.

26. 53.8 percent of the population dependent upon 'production other than cultivation' hailed from urban areas while 46.2 percent came from rural areas. Thus a large percent of these people is spread over vast rural areas, thereby complicating more the problems of making concerted efforts to uplift them.

27. The following table gives the distribution of self-supporting persons as employers, employees and independent workers in industries and services. It reveals that for the district, as a whole 54.5 percent of them are independent workers, 35.7 percent are employees while only 9.8 percent are employers. The very large proportion of independent workers is a pointer to the small (or even cottage) scale on which the enterprises are run. The same is generally true for the rural as well as urban areas.

Dependency Pattern :-

28. An analysis of the dependency pattern of the District reveals that 24.9 percent of the population was 'self-supporting', 17.9 percent was 'earning dependent' and 57.2 percent was 'non-earning dependent'. It is thus seen that 42.8 percent of the population was economically active.

29. The main difference in the dependency pattern of the agricultural classes as against non-agricultural classes was that whereas 20.6 percent of the population from agricultural classes was earning dependents only. 8.6 percent of the population from non-agricultural classes was earning dependents. The high proportion of earning dependents in agricultural population may firstly be due to the fact that females and children help in a long way in agricultural operations than in the non-agricultural ones and secondly due to that fact that whenever members of a family are working in the family enterprise (the way in which agriculture is run in this district) only, the general tendency is to show the head of the household only a self-supporting person and others as earning or non-earning dependents, depending upon whether they work or not. It also shows that 44.8 percent of the agricultural population is economically active while 35.7 percent of the non-agricultural population is economically active.

30. Table below gives the dependency pattern under each of the eight livelihood classes:-

Self-supporting persons:-

31. 24.2 percent of the population in agricultural classes and 27.1 percent of the population in non-agricultural classes were returned as self-supporting. The highest percentage(27.3) of self-supporting persons was, found in the class 'Production other than Agriculture'. In the agricultural classes the percentage of males returned as self-supporting was 41.4 while that amongst the non-agricultural classes was 46.4. The corresponding percentages in respect of females were 6.8 and 6.1 respectively.

Non-earning dependents :-

32. 55.0 percent of the agricultural population and 64.3 percent of the non-agricultural population was found to be non-earning dependents. The high percentage of non-earning dependents in non-agricultural classes is largely due to a very high percentage (82.8) of females from those classes being returned as non-earning dependents, probably due to the nature of work in non-agricultural pursuits where females may be unsuitable.

33. The highest percentage (63.4) of non-earning dependents amongst agricultural classes was found in the class 'non-cultivating land lords and rent-receivers' while that (67.5) amongst non-agricultural classes was found in the class 'commerce'. The class of people engaged in commerce being relatively well-to-do it is possible that that class could bear a much high proportion of non-earning dependents. The percentage of male non-earning dependents was 47.1 both in agricultural and non-agricultural classes; that of the females was however, 63.2 and 82.8 respectively in those classes.

Earning dependents :-

34. The agricultural classes had a higher percentage (20.8) of earning dependents as compared to the one(8.6) in non-agricultural classes. This may probably be due to the nature of work in these two categories. Certain types of jobs in agriculture being neither of a skilled nor of a hazardous nature, females could perform them, with the result that as high as 30.0 percent of females in agricultural classes were returned as earning dependents as compared to the small percentage (11.1) of female earning-dependents in non-agricultural classes.

35. The lowest percentage (10.0) of earning dependents in agricultural classes was found in the class "non-cultivating, land-lords and rent-redeivers" while that(5.5) amongst the non-agricultural classes was found in the class "commerce". The highest percentage (26.4) of earning dependents in agricultural classes was found in the classes 'Cultivating labourers' while that (10.1) among the non-agricultural classes was found in the 'production other than agricultural class'.

Size and composition of family house-hold :-

36. The average size of House-hold for this district was 5.5 persons comprising of 2.8 males and 2.7 females. Size of the house-hold in rural areas was 5.7 while that in urban areas was 5.2. The average number of males and females in rural household was 2.8 for both while that in an urban household was 2.7 and 2.5 respectively. Even though an average household in the district was of medium size(i.e. having persons between 4 to 6) only 46.0 percent of the households were small in size(i.e. with 3 members or less) 19.6 percent of the households were large in size(i.e. with 7 to 9 members) and 8.9 percent of the households were very large in size (i.e. with 10 or more members).

37. An analysis of household members exclusive of servants and acquainted persons reveals that heads of households accounted for about 18 percent of the household members while their wives accounted for about 16 percent of the same. Considering that polygamy was prevalent in this region, a smaller percentage of wives of the heads of the households than that of the heads of the households can be explained away by the fact that generally the eldest male member of the family is termed as head of the household, and that it is quite likely that such old male heads of the house-holds were widowed. The sons of the heads of the

house-holds accounted for about 23 percent of the household members while the daughters accounted for about 13 percent of the same. The lower percentages of daughters is probably due to the fact that they normally leave their father's house immediately upon their marriages and hence cease to be a member of their father's household. The sons on the other hand continue to live with their father and hence their larger percentage. They are also joined by their wives thus swelling the number of other females. As such similar situation does not exist in the case of males it is found that percentage (about 10 of other male relations is much lower than that (about 15) of other female relations.

Civil conditions :-

38. The 1951 census collected data on civil conditions, too. It is presented very briefly after studying a 4 percent sample of the households and rather elaborately on studying an approximately 10 percent systematic sample of the individual slips. Both the studies reveal rather conflicting results. The 4 percent sample indicated that there were 104 married females per 100 married males, while the 10 percent sample indicated that there were 97 married females per 100 married males. The former result is obviously correct considering that polygamy was practised till a few years back.

39. About 47 percent of the total population of this district was unmarried, about 46 percent was married and about 7 percent was either divorced or widowed. Corresponding percentages for rural areas were about 47, 46 and 7 respectively and those for urban areas were about 43, 47 and 8 respectively. Of the total males of this district about 51 percent were married about 46 percent unmarried and about 3 percent either divorced or widowed. Corresponding percentages for all the females of this district were about 43, 46 and 11 respectively. About 2 percent of the widowed or divorced persons were divorced and the rest were widowed. The above percentages indicate that re-marriage of either widowed or divorced females is not quite prevalent in this district.

40. An analysis of the data on civil conditions reveals that 92 percent of the population between the ages 5 to 14 was unmarried, slightly less than 8 percent was married and a very negligible percentage was either widowed or divorced. It also revealed that those within the ages 5 to 14 and married formed nearly 2 percent of the sample population. It thus indicates that child-marriage was not quite extinct from this district. Of the total males in this age-group more than 2 percent males were married, the similar percentage for females was about 13. It, thus, is clear that child marriage of females is practised on a scale that cannot be termed as small.

41. Hardly 11 percent of the sample population with ages 15 and over was unmarried, about 77 percent was married and about 12 percent was either widowed or divorced. 90 percent of the unmarried of this age-group were of the ages 15 to 25 while the rest were with ages 25 and above. About 80 percent of the males with age 15 and above were married, about 15 percent unmarried and about 5 percent either widowed or divorced. The similar percentages for females of this age-groups were about 72, 7 and 21 respectively.

The table below gives the above data in a nut-shell.

Sex-Ratios :

42. There were 970 females to 1,000 males in this district as a whole. In the past few censuses, too, the member of females per 1,000 males has been found to be less. It was 980, 978, 975, 970 and 969 respectively in 1901, 1911, 1921, 1931 and 1941 censuses.

43. In rural areas of the district the number of females per 1,000 males was 976 while in urban areas it was 9.42. It thus appears that males were migrating to urban areas for their Livelihood, leaving the females behind.

44. The number of females per 1,000 males in agricultural population of this district was 986 while that in the non-agricultural population was 903. It thus appears that males(in rural areas) from agricultural classes migrated to urban areas for non-agricultural occupations.

Backward Classes :

45. A considerable proportion (45.1 percent) of the population of this district comprises of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes. The data on other backward (non-scheduled) classes not being available the exact proportion of backward classes in this district cannot be gauged. However, it can be said that at least 50 percent of the population of this district is from backward classes.

46. The population of scheduled tribes of this district out-numbers that of scheduled castes overwhelmingly. 87.4 percent of the total populations of scheduled castes and scheduled tribes is that of scheduled tribes, remaining 12.6 percent being that of scheduled castes.

47. The large majority of these people lived in rural areas, accounting for, amongst themselves 51.5 percent of the rural population of this district. Their urban counterpart accounted for 13.9 percent of the urban population of this district. 80.8 percent of the scheduled caste people lived in rural areas while 19.2 percent in urban areas. Similarly percentages for scheduled tribes are 96.8 and 3.2 respectively. It can thus be seen that any programme to uplift them has to be essentially rural in character and spread over vast regions.

48. 72.6 percent of the population of scheduled tribes was concentrated in Nandurbar, Nawapur, Akkalkuwa, Shahada, and Taloda Talukas and Akarani-Mahal of this district while the remaining 27.4 percent of them were spread over Dhulia, Sakri, Sindkheda and Shirpur Talukas. Considering the backward character of the region and large concentration of scheduled tribes Nawapur and Akkalkuwa Talukas and Akarani-Mahal are declared as schcduled areas.

Literacy:-

49. The census definition of literacy was ability to read and write a simple letter in any language. The percentage of literacy in this district, according to this definition was 19.2.(1,92,174 persons). The percentage of literates in Urban areas, however, was 38.5(i.e.69,682 persons) while that in rural areas was 15.2 (1,22,492 persons). Better facilities for learning in urban areas and growing consciousness amongst the urban folk may be the reasons of wide-spread literacy in urban areas.

50. It is found that amongst the males of this district the percentage of literacy was 30.6 (1,53,181 males) while that amongst the females was only 7.4 (i.e.38,993 females). Such low percentage for females is an indicator of the indifference of masses towards the education of females.

51. Age-group-wise the picture of literacy is much heartening. 12.2 percent of those within the age-group 5-9 were literate, 35.2 percent of those within the age-group 10-14 were literates while 22.2 percent of those with ages 15 and above were literates. It thus can be seen that more and more persons of the school-going age are literate.

52. It was found that of the total population deriving its livelihood from non-agricultural occupations 33.5 percent was literate while the similar percentage for agricultural population was only 13.4. Thus there appears to be more consciousness, in this respect, in the non-agricultural classes, than in the agricultural ones.

53. The following table epicts the position of literacy in this district in brief :-

55. According to the census of Agricultural holdings held in 1952.53 there were 116182 holdings in district of Dhulia the area owned being 1741154 acres. Thus average area owned per holding came to 14.9 acres or about 15 acres. Table above reveals that 11.10 percent of the total holdings in the district were in size upto 2.50 acres and the area owned in this class was 1.10 percent of total area owned 14.37 percent of the holding were in size exceeding 2.50 acres but not 5 acres and the area owned by their class was 3.75 percent of the total area owned. Of the two upper classes of holdings 2.75 percent were of size exceeding 50 acres but not exceeding 100 acres, owning 11.92 percent of the area and 0.52 percent of the holdings were of the size exceeding 100 acres and owning 7.22 percent of the area. It is thus seen that a very large percentage of holdings were pretty small in size owning small percentage of land while very few holdings were considerably large in size owning most of the land.

Soil:-

56. Five different types of soil viz. deep black-soil, deep black soil with lesser depth, medium black soil, light-type soil and very light or murmad soil is found in the District. Of the total area under cultivation hardly 12 percent is under deep black soil, 22 percent is under deep black soil with lesser depth, 18 percent under medium black soil, 20 percent under light type soil and 28 percent under murmad soil. It is thus seen that more than two-thirds soil is of quality medium or low.

57. As has already been pointed out the seasons in this district are mainly Summer and Winter, with the Monsoon rains interrupting the summer for a short period. The rains, too, in this district, though assured, are not abundant. Also they are unevenly spread over the different tracts. As has been described elsewhere, the net area under irrigation in this district is hardly 5 percent of the net cropped area.

58. A large number of small holdings, coupled with medium or low quality of soil and total reliance on rains have conditioned the agriculture of this district to a very large extent.

Land Utilisation :-

59. The following table shows the cultivated and uncultivated land in the district. The cultivated land consists of net cropped area and fallows. The uncultivated land comprises of lands classed as culturable waste, forests and other lands which are not available for cultivation.

60. The area under cultivation formed 45.55 percent and 45.42 percent of the total geographical area of the district, in the years 1957-58 and 1958-59, respectively. Forest accounted for 35.03 percent and 35.19 percent in 1957-58 and 1958-59 respectively. Culturable waste contributed nearly 2.18 percent and 2.15 percent in those years respectively, while land not available for cultivation was 17.24 percent in those years. As is quite natural, during the two immediate years the land utilisation did not show any changes.

Irrigation :-

61. The percentage of net area irrigated to net area sown increased from 5.17 to 5.19 in those years. This extremely low percentage of irrigated area makes agricultural operations dependent upon monsoon. Hence double cropping is practically not in existence in this district. More than 60 percent of the irrigated area is irrigated by well-irrigation, the rest being by other sources.

62. The cropwise distribution of the irrigated area in the district during the year 1957-58 and 1958-59 is given below.

63. It can thus be seen that barring sugarcane and Chillies where the area irrigated is nearly 100 percent a sizeable proportion of the area, under wheat only is irrigated. For all other crops the percentage of irrigation is either meagre or negligible. About 40 percent to 45 percent of the area irrigated is under food grains the rest being under non-food grains.

Crop Pattern:-

64. Irrigation facilities being quite meagre in this district the cropping pattern has been mainly determined by the climate, rainfall and soil only. Consequently such crops as necessarily have to be irrigated for better produce are not grown on a large scale. The table below gives the cropwise details of sown area for 1957-58 and 1958-59.

65. It can thus be seen that more than 70 percent of the gross cropped area was put under food-crops in those two years while the non-food-crops claimed less than 30 percent area. Amongst the food-crops food-grains were overwhelmingly grown, they claiming about 97 percent of the area under food-crops the rest being under non-food grains. Amongst non-food-crops edible oils were the most prominent claiming 60.25 percent and 64.33 percent, of the area under non-food crops, in 1957-58, and 1958-59 respectively. Fibers, non-edible oils and others followed suit, the area accounted for by them being 36.12 percent and 33.09 percent, 1.38 percent and 1.09 percent, 1.75 percent and 1.49 percent respectively in 1957-58 and 1958-59 of the total area under non-food-crops.

66. The most extensively grown crop was Jowar which claimed nearly one-fourth of the gross cropped area. The next was Bajara which accounted for about 18 percent of the same, Groundnut followed suit with nearly equal area as under Bajara. Cotton was claiming about one-tenth of the gross cropped area. Other prominent crops were wheat, rice, horse-gram black-gram and sesamum the area accounted for by them ranging from about 5 percent for ~~wheat~~ to about 1 percent for sesamum. Chillies, too, are an important crop of this district, the area under it being 1.4 percent and 1.3 percent in those years.

The Table below gives the relative importance of various major crops in the Taluka of this District.

67. Jowar was an uniformly wide-spread crop in all the talukas of the District, the acreage under Jowar ranging from 10 percent of the gross-cropped area in Sakri Taluka to 42 percent of the gross-cropped area in Taloda Taluka. Of the cropped area under Jowar (in the District) minimum (4 percent) was found in Akarani-Mahal while maximum (16) percent was found in Nandurbar Taluka.

68. Bajara was a widely grown crop in Dhulia and Sakri Talukas (33 percent and 31 percent of the gross cropped area of the Talukas respectively) while it was not at all important in the cases of Akkalkuwa (1 percent), Nawapur (less than one percent), Taloda (less than 1 percent) Talukas. Of the gross cropped area under Bajara (in the District) 33 percent was claimed by Sakri Taluka alone while it was less than one percent in Akkalkuwa, Nawapur and Taloda Talukas.

69. Ground-nut claimed very meagre shares of gross cropped area (3 percent, 1 percent and 3 percent) of Akkalkuwa Taluka, Akarani-Mahal and Nawapur Taluka, while in other talukas, it claimed from 15 percent (Taloda Taluka) to 25 percent (Dhulia and Sindheda Talukas). 22 percent of the cropped area under this crop (In the District) was in Dhulia Taluka, while it was less than one percent in case of Akkalkuwa Taluka and Akarani-Mahal and only about 2 percent in case of Nawapur Taluka.

70. Like groundnut, cotton, too, was not grown on a uniform scale in all the Talukas. It claimed zero percent of the gross cropped area in Akarani-Mahal, only about 2 percent in Sakri Taluka while as much as 24 percent in Shirpur Taluka. Of the total cropped area under cotton, (in this district) 19 percent and 18 percent was claimed by Shirpur and Sindheda Talukas while 4 percent or below by Sakri, Nandurbar and Taloda Talukas and Akarani-Mahal.

71. Wheat was not one of the widely grown crops of the District. It claimed less than 9 percent of gross cropped area of 8 Talukas ranging from less than one percent in Akarani Mahal to about 9 percent Nandurbar Taluka. Only in case of Shahada and Taloda Talukas the percentage was 11 and 14 respectively. Of the total cropped area under wheat (in this district) 24 percent and 23 percent of it was claimed by Shahada and Nandurbar Talukas, while Shirpur, Nawapur and Akkalkuwa Talukas and Akarani-Mahal claimed less than 5 percent.

72. The picture for rice, too, was rather similar to that for wheat. It was grown on a large scale only in Nawapur and Akkalkuwa Talukas (21 percent and 18 percent of the gross cropped areas of the Talukas) while on a small-scale in other 8 Talukas (6 percent or below of the gross cropped area of those Talukas). 46 percent of the total cropped area under rice in this district was claimed by Nawapur Taluka, 16 percent by Akkalkuwa Taluka and 16 percent by Sakri Taluka. The rest was accounted for by the remaining 7 Talukas, Sindheda and Shirpur Talukas claiming less than one percent each.

73. Speaking from the point of area coverage, chillies, an important crop of this district, is not a major crop. In as many as 7 Talukas the area claimed by chillies is less than 1 percent of the gross cropped area of those Talukas. The highest percentage (4) is found in Nandurbar Taluka. Of the total area under chillies in this district 38 percent was claimed by Nandurbar Taluka, 21 percent by Shahada Taluka, 18 percent by Sindheda Taluka and the rest by the remaining 7 Talukas.

***Live-Stock :-**

74. According to 1953 census of Live-stock the total number of Live-stock in this district was 8,34,868 of which 4,75,576 were Bulls, Cows and Young Stock while, He-buffaloes, She-Buffaloes and Mouny-stock were 74,146. The remaining were sheep, goats, Donkey's, Horses, Pigs etc. Of the nine Talukas and one Mahal of this District the largest number (207369) of Live-stock was found in Sakri Taluka followed by Dhulia Taluka (147500). The lowest number of Live-stock was found in Akkalkuwa Taluka (32852) preceded by Akarani-Mahal(35,855). The number of ploughs, according to this census, in this District was 78,349, the largest number being found in Sakri Taluka (21146) while the lowest number being found in Taloda Taluka(2156). The gross cultivated area of this District, in 1958-59, being 18,33,611 acres, the ration of working bull to that of area comes to 8.89 acres per working bull while that of ploughs to that of area comes to 25.06 acres per plough.

Forests:-

large

75. A very large area of this District (35 percent of the total area) is under forests and therefore it has become necessary to have two forest divisions in the District, one for the forests to the North of Tapti and other for the forests to the South of Tapti. Of the total area under forests 66 percent is to the North of Tapti while 34 percent is to the South of Tapti. Of the total area under forest the highest (37 percent) is claimed by Akarani-Mahal while the lowest (1 percent) is claimed by Sindkheda Taluka.

77. More than 60 different types of trees are found in the forests of both the Divisions. The trees, important from the point of forest economy are Sag, Sisal, Bili, Kair, Tivas, Sahad etc. while those important from the point of their abundance are Salai, Anjan, Kalal, Dhawada etc. Along with these trees different kinds of Shrubs and climbers are found in the District Dhulia.

Co-operation:- *

78. Co-operative societies, the significant institutions geared to develop the rural economy (both agricultural as well as non-agricultural), had increased in number in the years 1957-58 and 1958-59. The following table gives in brief their progress during those two years.

79. Thus the total number of Co-operative societies increased from 940 in 1957-58 to 992 in 1958-59. The primary agricultural credit and multipurpose societies were the most important followed by the primary non-agricultural non-credit societies.

The Agricultural Credit and Multipurpose societies.

80. Agriculture being the most important economic activity in the district it is but natural that societies catering to the needs of agriculturists should get prime importance in the district. As indicated earlier the number of Primary Agricultural credit societies increased from 672 in 1957-58 to 692 in 1958-59. The average membership per society was 72 in 1957-58, it was 84 in 1958-59. The average working capital per society was Rs.19.3 thousand in 1957-58, and Rs. 21.2 thousand in 1958-59. The average working capital per member was Rs.0.26 thousand in 1957-58 while it increased to Rs.0.30 thousand in 1958-59. An average society of this type had advanced loans of Rs. 12.4 thousand in 1957-58 and Rs. 19.9 thousand in 1958-59, loans repaid to it amounted to Rs.12.4 thousand in 1957-58 and Rs.15.4 thousand in 1958-59 while the loans outstanding with it were Rs.17.3 thousand in 1957-58 and Rs. 20.9 thousand in 1958-59.

81. As far as Primary Agricultural Non-credit societies are concerned their number was 114 in 1957-58 and 119 in 1958-59. Their average membership was 119 and 112 respectively in those years. Their average working capital was Rs. 25262 and Rs.29089 respectively in those years.

82. The number of Primary non-agricultural credit societies in the district remained at 24 in both years. Their average membership was 401 and 406 respectively in those years. Their average working capital in those years was Rs. 199804 and Rs. 216470 respectively in those years. Loans advanced by an average society of this type in those years amounted to Rs. 159220 and Rs. 178762 respectively while loans repaid were Rs. 153553 and Rs. 167633. Loans outstanding per society amounted to Rs. 1,11,145 and Rs. 1,22,295 respectively in those years.

83. The number of Primary Non-agricultural Non-credit societies in the district was 130 and 157 in 1957-58 and 1958-59 respectively. Their average membership was 96 and 84 respectively in those years, while their working capital per society was Rs. 12078 and Rs. 21726 respectively in those years.

84. Looking to the membership of primary agricultural societies (credit as well as non-credit) it is found that about 51.8 percent of the agricultural population was brought under the co-operative fold in 1958-59, the third year of the Second Five Year Plan.

85. There was one Central Bank at Dhulia. 113 individuals and 644 societies were members of this bank during the year 1957-58. The membership increased to 115 individuals and 709 societies in the next year. The other details were as follows:-

* Industries:-

86. Dhulia, Sakri, Sindkheda, and Shahada are the important industrial centres in the District. The organised industries of the District include Gur Factories, Cotton Ginning and Baling, Oil-Mills, Textiles and Engineering works. The total number of registered factories in the district during 1958-59 was 130 and these offered employment to 8184 persons daily. Of the 130 factories in this district 37 were located in Dhulia Taluka, 25 in Sakri Taluka, 18 in Shahada Taluka, 16 in Sindkheda Taluka, 16 in Nandurbar Taluka, 9 in Nawapur Talukas, 7 in Shirpur Taluka and 2 in Teloda Taluka. There were no factories in Akkalkuwa Taluka and Akarani Mahal. But for Dhulia Taluka, the factories from all other Talukas were either of Cotton Ginning and Baling, Gur Manufacture or Oil and Dal Mills, while in Dhulia Taluka, in addition to the above types of factories there was one cotton Mill, one printing publishing industry and one Electric Power House at Dhulia.

***Joint Stock Companies :-**

87. There were 13 joint stock companies in Dhulia District on 31.3.1959. 6 were private and 7 were public companies. The total authorised capital for private companies, was Rs.16,25,000 while the paid-up capital amounted to Rs.5,72,000. The corresponding figures for the public companies were Rs.63,00,000 and Rs. 33,18,189 respectively. The average authorised capital per company was Rs. 6,09,615.

89. The only arts and science college at Dhulia started functioning in June, 1956. In the year 1958-59 it was running degree classes in Arts and Science. There was an increase of 149 in the number of students in years 1957-58 and 1958-59.

90. The number of secondary schools during 1957-58 was 21; it increased to 24 in 1958-59. There were 9 and 12 middle schools in the District in those years respectively. The average number of students per secondary schools was 304 in 1957-58 and 305 in 1958-59. In absolute terms the number of students increased by 1842 in 1958-59.

91. As regards primary education facilities were provided in all the villages with population 400 and above. 129 Villages with population below 400 had no primary schools in 1958-59. Akarani Mahal and Akkalkuwa Taluka had 67 and 39 villages respectively without schools. However, these are the two backward tracts wherein there are many very small villages. The number of students in 1958-59 was 142744. The girl students formed 32.4 percent of the student body in primary schools.

92. There were in all 1110 primary schools in the district in 1958-59. The following table gives the distribution of schools in the Talukas of this District.

93. It can thus be seen that the highest number of schools was in Dhulia Taluka while the lowest number of schools was in Shirpur Taluka. As regards female education it can be seen that the highest percentage of females students to total student body was found in Dhulia Taluka while the lowest was found in Akkalkuwa Taluka.

94. As regards special schools their number as well as enrollment in them declined during the two years under reference by 4 and 327 respectively.

* -: Medical and Public Health ;-

95. There was 1 Civil Hospital and 10 Allopathic dispensaries in the District in 1958-59. The number of doctors was 16 while that of nurses and midwives was 28. The number of beds in the hospital was 122 out of which 76 were for males, 40 for females and 6 for children. Of the 122 beds, 70 were located in Dhulia only while the remaining 52 were dispersed over the District.

96. The total number of indoor patients in the District was 3868 of which 1397 (36%) were males, 1516 (39%) were females and 955 (25%) were children. The total number out-door patients in these hospitals and dispensaries was 129,285 in that year of which 54,911 (42%) were males, 31,919 (25%) females and 42,455 (33%) children.

97. The estimated population of the District in that year was 12.87 lakhs. Thus there was 1 doctor in the district for every 82,000 population, and 1 nurse or midwife for every 47,000 population, and 1 bed in the hospital or dispensary for 11,000 population.

***Vital Statistics.**

98. The total of number of registered births in the district in 1958 were 52810 (or 40 per 1000 persons) and deaths registered were 30244 (or 23 per 1000 persons). Estimated population of the District in that year was 12,04,000. Registered infant deaths in that year were 6687 or 22% of the total deaths. Of the 52810 children born in that year 27213 (or 521 per 1000 children born) were male children while 25597 (or 479 per 1000 children born) were female children.

99. Infant mortality in the district in 1958 was 1266 infants died per 1000 children born. It was the lowest (74) in Nawapur Taluka and the highest (161) in Taloda Taluka. The following table gives a comparative picture of infant mortality in the district.

100. During 1958 Sakri Taluka had highest birth rate. It was 52 per thousand persons, while the lowest birth rate of 40 was for Akkalkuwa Taluka. The highest death rate of 30 per thousand persons had been observed for Taloda Taluka. It was 29 (Second highest) for Nandurbar, Sakri and Sindkheda. Nawapur had the lowest death rate of 22 per thousand persons. The corresponding figures of birth rate and death rate for the district were 46 and 26 per 1000 respectively, on the basis of 1951 census population. As pointed out earlier, for the estimated population of 1958, they were 40 and 23 per 1000 respectively.

* Electricity and Water supply :-

101. In 1958-59, Dhulia, Nandurbar, and Shirpur were the three places which were electrified and piped water supply too, was available to these three places only. This district is particularly backward in this respect. In the same year of the two adjoining Districts of this District, District Nasik had 8 towns and 1 villages electrified, while District Jalgaon had 15 towns and 3 villages electrified.

* Transport :-

102. Railway:- There are two Railway Systems running through this district, one being Central Railway and the other being Western Railway. Both the systems are broadgauge. A small section of the Chalisgaon-Dhulia Branch line of Central Railway terminates in this District. Its railway route mileage in 1958-59 was 19.79. It served Dhulia Taluka of this district only. A much larger section of the Surat Busaval Branch line of Western Railway runs through this district. Its railway route mileage in 1958-59 was 94.75. It entered this district in Sindheda Taluka in the east, passed through Nandurbar Taluka and through Nawapur Taluka into Surat District on the west.

103. Nationalised Road Transport :- There were in all 5 depots of State Transport located in this district in 1958-59. They were (1) Dhulia (2) Sakri (3) Nandurbar (4) Shahada (5) Shirpur. Average number of scheduled vehicles on road in that year was 61, average daily mileage operated was 7182 and average number of passengers carried was 18091. Road surface operated (lying within the Jurisdiction of the district) as on 31.3.1959 was 715 miles.

Community Development :-

104. This significant movement designed with a view to imbibing into the people the idea of self-help and to bringing about an overall development of smaller units, was started in this district as early as October, 1953. As on 31-3-1959 there was one Stage II Block at Shahada (C.P.A. Pattern One), four Stage I Blocks one each at Sakri (C.P.A. Pattern Two), Shahada (C.P.A. Pattern One), Akkalkuwa (C.P.A. Pattern One) and Taloda (C.P.A. Pattern One,) and one Multipurpose Development Project at Akarani. There was also one Pre-extension Block at Nawapur. The paragraphs below outline the progress of the Blocks at Shahada (Stage II) and Sakri, Shahada, Akkalkuwa and Taloda (All Stage I).

105. The number of villages covered by the Stage II, Stage I and Multipurpose Block was 736 (i.e. 54.4 percent of the total number of villages in the District.) The population covered by these Blocks was 377,122 (i.e. 35.6 percent of the total population of the District). The Table below shows the Block-wise number of villages and towns and their population according to 1951 Census.

106. The progress expenditure inclusive of committed expenditure of the 5 Blocks viz. Shahada (St.II), Sakri, Shahada, Akkalkuwa and Taloda (All St.I), upto 31-3-1959 was Rs.3,240 thousand. It was composed of Rs.749 thousand on Project Head-Quarter, Rs.91 thousand on Agricultural extension and Animal Husbandry, Rs.1,243 thousand on Irrigation and Reclamation, Rs.245 thousand on Health and Rural Sanitation, Rs.501 thousand on Education, Rs.168 thousand on Social Education, Rs.177 thousand on Communication, Rs.160 thousand on Rural Arts, Crafts and Industries, Rs.21 thousand on Housing and Rs.65 thousand on others. Economically Backward Areas:-

108. Extensive areas of this district are economically back-ward. That more than 35 percent of the area of this district is under forests and that more than 45 percent of the population of this district is of either scheduled castes or scheduled tribes speak for themselves. Considering the essentially backward characteristics of certain areas of this district the President, under the Constitution, had already declared whole of Nawapur Taluka, Akarani-Mahal and Akkalkuwa Taluka as scheduled areas. The total area of this tract is more than 1300 Sq.miles and nearly 90 percent of the population of this tract is of scheduled tribes.

109. In addition to these areas there are large tracts in this district which, too, are economically backward, more or less on the lines of the tracts pointed out above. They are 1) whole of Taloda Taluka, 2) Western part of Nandurbar Taluka, 3) Western and Northern parts of Sakri Taluka, 4) Northern part of Shahada Taluka and 5) Northern part of Shirpur Taluka. The area of these tracts is more than 1100 Sq.miles and there are more than 350 villages in these tracts. More than 75 percent of the population of these tracts is tribal. (The list of villages which are essentially backward but are not included in the scheduled areas is given in the Statistical Abstract Part of this issue).

100. Akarani Mahal, Akkalkuwa Taluka, Taloda Taluka, and Northern parts of Shahada and Shirpur Talukas are situated in the Satpuras, while Nawapur Taluka, Western part of Nandurbar Taluka and Western and Northern part of Sakri Taluka are situated in the ranges of Sahyadri. The villages are scattered and are on the slopes of mountain ranges. The population within the villages, too, is scattered. This has aggravated the problems transport, communication, education and health. The economy of the people there is very primitive and is wedded to the forests in that area.
