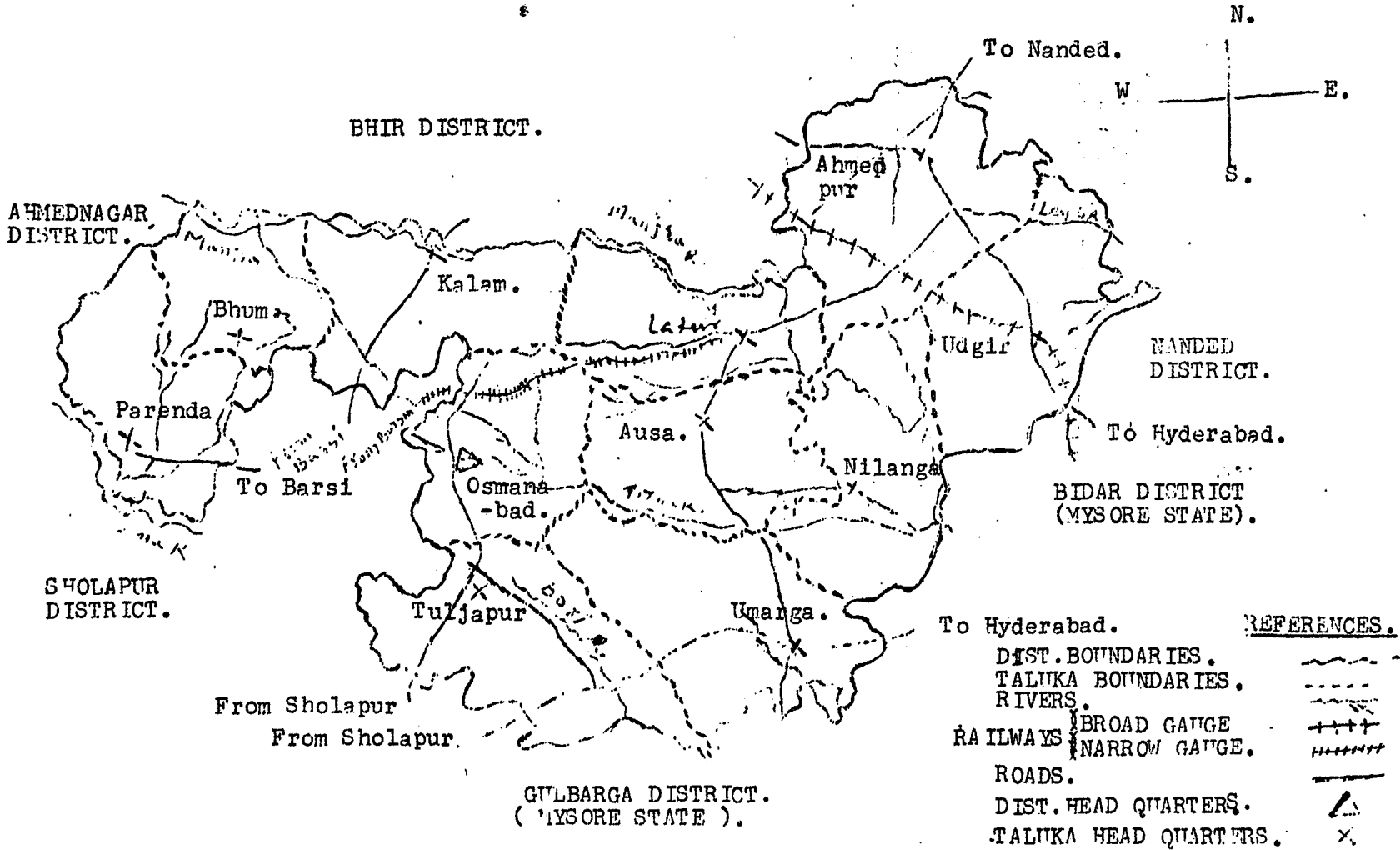

CHAPTER I:  
INTRODUCTION .

1.1:- Location.

Osmanabad District is to the extreme south of Marathwada and lies between 17.5 to 18.8 latitude and 75.2 to 77.3 longitude. The Sholapur-Aurangabad road passes through the Osmanabad district and its two towns of Osmanabad and Tuljapur on route. The Latur-Wiraj railway line and the Parli-Hyderabad railway line (both of the Central railway) pass through this district. Latur is the biggest railway station in this district. But the more convenient railway station for the inhabitants of this district is Sholapur which is on Bombay-Madras main line.

1.2 Boundaries.

Osmanabad district is bound by Sholapur district on the south, Bhir district on its north, Nanded district and Bidar district (Mysore State) on its east and Ahmednagar and Sholapur districts to its west. Sholapur is the nearest district headquarter about 43 miles from Osmanabad town and it has, therefore close commercial and socialties with Sholapur city. Parsi taluka in Sholapur district is almost surrounded by the Osmanabad district. Next to Sholapur, this is about 80 miles from the Osmanabad town and is nearly half way on the road connecting Aurangabad with Osmanabad towns. Nanded is about 136 miles and directly connected with Osmanabad by State Transport Bus service between Nanded and Sholapur.

### 1.3: Administrative Set up:

Osmanabad town is the head quarter of Osmanabad district which was named after Meer Osman Ali Khan the Nizam of Ex-Hyderabad State on the occasion of his coronation in 1910. The original name of Osmanabad town is 'Dharashiv'. Naldurg was the head quarter of this district before 1861. This district was included in Hyderabad State in 1953, & formed part and parcel of it upto 1956. During States Reorganisation in 1956, this district was merged in bi-lingual Bombay State on 1-11-1956 and was subsequently merged in Maharashtra in 1960. This district formerly consisted of eight talukas viz. 1) Osmanabad, 2) Tuljapur, 3) Paranda, 4) Bhum, 5) Kalam, 6) Latur, 7) Ausa, and 8) Umerga in former Hyderabad State. After the re-organisation of states, three talukas viz. 1) Milanga, 2) Udgir and 3) Ahmedpur of the former Bidar district in Hyderabad State (now merged in Mysore State) having an area of 1777.3 Sq. miles (4603.2 Sq. Kms.) were transferred to this district. Under the States Re-organisation Act 1956 (Union Act. No. XIX.VII of 1956). This district consisting of 11 talukas is presently in Aurangabad Division called as Marathwada comprising five district viz. 1) Aurangabad, 2) Parbhani, 3) Nanded, 4) Bhir and 5) Osmanabad. Almost all district Offices of Osmanabad district are located at Osmanabad town which is situated on bank of river 'Bhoyawati'. Yedshi is the nearest railway Station (about 13 miles) from the Osmanabad town. Among the districts of Marathwada, Osmanabad had the biggest area under the Nizams' own crown estate

called Sarf-e-Khas. The Sarf-e-Khas was merged with the Government area under the Sarf-e-Khas (merger) Regulation in the year 1948. All the Jajir areas were abolished and taken over under direct Govt. administration in the same year. There are 13 towns having Municipalities and 1,388 inhabited villages in this district.

In 1951 census there were 12 towns, but as the definition of town was changed in 1961 census, only 13 of them were classified as towns. Out of 13 town 11 are taluka headquarters. Latur and Udgir have got City Municipalities and all other remaining 11 towns have Town Municipalities.

All the 11 taluka places mentioned above are towns in addition to Murum ( in Umerga taluka ) and Naldurg ( in Tuljapur taluka ) towns.

These are in all 1,423 revenue villages in this district, and out of these revenue villages 12 villages are merged in urban areas and 23 villages are uninhabited villages.

Zilla Parishad Pattern:

The Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad came into existence on 1st May 1962. The Parishad consists of 58 members, out of which, 52 are elected, 4 are associated members and 2 are lady co-opted members. The talukawise distribution of elected members is as under:

The four associated members of the Parishad are 1) Chairman, District Central Co-Operative Bank, Latur 2) Chairman, District Marketing Society Ltd. Latur 3) Chairman, District Industrial Co-Operative Association, Ltd., Latur, 4) Chairman, District Co-operative Board, Osmanabad. The President vice-President and two Chairman incharge of different committees are amongst the elected members. The President is in charge of the Zilla Parishad Meetings and Standing Committees. The Vice-President is the Chairman of Health and Works Department Committees. There are two other Chairman, one in charge of Education and Finance Department Committees and the other incharge of Agril. Animal Husbandry, Co-Operative and Industries Departments, Committees. For Administration purpose, the Chief Executive Officer is the head of the Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad consists of 11 branches. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer, assists the Chief Executive Officer, in the overall administration. The names of branches and the concerned head of departments are as under:-

The Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad has increased its income by increasing the local cess from Rs.0.40 to Rs.1.00 i.e. local cess is being recovered from Agricultural equal to land revenue.

1.4. Area:

The area of the Osmanabad district is 5510.3 square miles (14,271.7 sq. kma.) according to the figures furnished by the Surveyor General of India which is 22.05% of the area of Marathwada and 4.68% of the area of Maharashtra. The rural area of this district is 5345.5 sq. miles ( 13,845.0 sq. km.) and the urban area is 164.8 sq. miles ( 426.7 sq. km). The area reported by the Director of Land Records, Maharashtra, for Osmanabad district is 5504 sq. miles. In Marathwada Region this district is next to the Aurangabad District in size. In terms of area Osmanabad district ranks seventh among the 26 districts of Maharashtra. The average area of a district of Marathwada works out to 5,135 sq. miles and the average area per district in Maharashtra is 4,556 sq. miles.

A major portion of this district is a ~~large~~ laterite plateau with an average height of 2,000 feet above sea level. This district is covered with small hills and offshoots of Balaghat. Parts of Bhim, Ausa, Kalam, Osmanabad and Tuljapur talukas are situated on Balaghat ranges and unlike other talukas situated on table land.

The district lies partly in the upper Godavari basin and partly in the Bhime basin. Ahmednagar, Udeir, Kalam, Ausa, Latur and Nilanga talukas are situated on the plateau of the Balaghat and lie in the valley of the Manjra which is an important tributary of the Godavari. Osmanabad and Umerga talukas are drained by the Terna, an important feeder of the Manjra. Paranda taluka and parts of Bhim mahal, Tuljapur and Umerga talukas are in the basin of the Sina river which is a tributary of the Bhime.

#### 1.6 : Hills, River system, Soils:

The main system of hills is the Balaghat and its offshoots. A branch of the Balaghat enters the district from the north-west corner from Ahmednagar and <sup>stretches</sup> to the south-east. It divides the district into two portions, a plateau to the north-east and east and low lands to the west, south-west and south. The general slope of the plateau is from south-west to north-east.

The western part of the district is hilly and the rest of it is a plateau. There are no large streams or rivers in the district except the Tawarda river and the Terna river which flow across the district from west to east.

The river Manjara flows on the northern border and has demarcates this district from the Bhir district. In addition, due to hill ranges the district abounds in a net work of rivulets running from all sides.

The Manjra which rises in Patoda taluka of Bhir district runs towards east along the northern boundary as far as the north-eastern corner of Latur taluka where it takes a southerly direction before entering Bider district of the Mysore State. Its length in the district is about 65 miles.

The Terna flows from west to east in Osmanabad Ausa, Umarga and Nilanga talukas and meets Manjara river near the eastern boundary of the district. The Manyad is also a tributary of the Manjra. It flows towards north-east through Ahmedpur taluka and enters Nanded district to meet the Manjra on the eastern boundary of the district. The Tawraja which drains Latur taluka joins the Manjra at Siwani village. The Sina flows on the western border of Paranda taluka from north to south. The Bori flows through Tuljapur and joins the Sina river lower down in Sholapur district. Even though there are a number of small rivers and rivulets streaming in the district like the Bori in Tuljapur taluka or the Manyad in Ahmedpur taluka or the Bennitura in Umarga taluka or the Banganga in Bhim taluka, they are practically dry for most part of the year as the water from them drains down out of this district from the high plateau. This leads to considerable shortage of water in the district.

There are small tanks like Balubhai and Ramdhara in Tuljapur taluka, and Kala and Lal Lakes in Nilanga taluka

The water is used for drinking purpose as well as for irrigation.

The soil can be divided into 3 zones viz. 1) The eastern part consisting of Ahmedpur, Udaipur talukas and part of Latur and Ausa talukas, 2) Osmanbad, Kalam talukas and part of Latur, Ausa and Umarga talukas, 3) Tuljapur, Paranda and Bhim talukas.

The first zone consists in general of light and light medium soils. They are of inferior type, not retentive of moisture and are, therefore, suitable only for cultivation of kharif crops. The soils in some parts of Milanga are of laterite type.

The second zone consists of changing types of soils. Heavy, deep black cotton soils as against shallow light soils are found in this zone. Due to this peculiarity of the soil, kharif and rabi crops are both grown in this area. Broadly it can be said that eastern parts of Osmanbad, Latur, Ausa and Kalam talukas grow more kharif crops than of rabi crops, while the western parts of these talukas predominantly grow rabi crops.

The third zone consists of heavy soils which are more retentive of moisture. Hence rabi crops are the major crops in this area. The mountainous ranges in this zone have formed, typical strips suitable for paddy growing. This is a peculiarity of this zone. Even though the soil types are classified above on a broad basis, varieties in types of soils are found within the talukas and more within the zones categorised above.

The forests in this district are scattered but are somewhat dense in Tuljapur, Kalem and Udair talukas. But comparatively there are less forests in this district. This has resulted in soil erosion to a large extent.

1.7 : Climate Temperature and rainfall.

As the district forms part of the Deccan Plateau, its climate is dry and is subject to extremes,. The year can be divided into rainy season from middle of June to the end of September, a sultry period from about the end of September to the middle of November, winter from the middle of November to the end of January, a dry period during February and March and Summer during April, May and the middle of June. Summer is, in general, full of gales and gusty winds. Even though the variation in temperature is large in general, and the weather is subject to extremes of heat or cold, to some extent, the summer season in the district is cooler than in the other districts of Marathwada region. This is due to the fact that the district is situated at a higher altitude. In general, the climate of Osmanabad district is considered to be bracing and salubrious.

Osmanabad district gets rains from South west monsoon like other districts of Deccan plateau and the rains start in the middle of June, become intense in July and cease by the end of September. The normal rainfall of the Osmanabad district is about 31" (787 mms.). But it is observed that it has increased during the last few years. Among the various taluka, on the east end Tuljapur and Osmanabad talukas on the west usually get about 45" of rainfall. Ausa, Umerga and Nilanga talukas usually get



53" to 40" of rainfall, while Paranda and Bhun talukas get near about 30" to 35" of rainfall. This part comes in the shadow of Western Ghat and is therefore, called "rain shadow" area. Because of the low rainfall in the Paranda and Bhun talukas there is always a fear of scarcity and shortage of water. It may be noted that these talukas are adjacent to the Ahmednagar district, which is frequently hit by scarcity. These talukas are hilly and are backward as compared to the other talukas in Osmanabad district. The northern part of Ahmedpur taluka is also some times affected by scarcity of water. But in general Osmanabad district is not considered as a scarcity area.

The average rainfall of Osmanabad district was 892 millimeters ( 35.12 inches ) during 1961, 964 millimeters (37.95) inches during the 1962 and 903 millimeters (35.75 inches) during 1963.

The highest rainfall recorded at Ahmedpur was 1,235.63 mms. and the lowest recorded at Paranda was 555.4 mms. during the year 1961. In 1962 the highest rainfall was recorded at Osmanabad 1,146.6 mms. and the lowest at Ahmedpur 841.1 mms. In 1963 the highest rainfall was recorded at Udgir, 1,184.2 mms. and the lowest was recorded at Paranda 603.7 mms. In 1964 the highest rainfall recorded at Osmanabad was 1048.6 and lowest recorded at Kalam 621.1.

: CHAPTER II:

EXPLANATORY NOTES ON THE TABLES INCLUDED IN THE  
DISTRICT STATISTICAL ABSTRACT 1964-65.

1. CLIMATE :

Table No. 1.1:- This table deals with the number of rainy days and total rainfall at all centres in Osmanabad district during 1963 and 1964.

From the above table it can be seen that the highest rainfall was recorded at Osmanabad (1048.6 mms) and the lowest rainfall was recorded at Kalem (621.1 mms) taluka during the year 1964.

## (2) AREA & POPULATION

Table No. 2.1:- This table indicate talukawise rural and urban population and density of population according to 1961 census together with variation in population during last 50 years. Percentage increase in population was 9.85 in 1951 over 1941 population and 22.12 in 1961 over 1951 population. The percentage variation in dist. population during 1901 to 1961 was + 89.95. The rate of increase in the population appears to be high during the last decade. The general density of population in the district was 84 persons per <sup>square</sup> kilometre in 1961.

It is a very significant fact that density per sq. kilometre in rural areas in Osmanabad district, is more than <sup>in</sup> any other district in Aurangabad division and even slightly more than that of Maharashtra State, due to perhaps the absence of any urbanisation worth the name.

Villages in Osmanabad district on an average are more thickly populated than those in any other dist. in Aurangabad Division and Maharashtra State. The density per square kilometre in urban areas in Osmanabad dist. is very low when compared to urban density in any other district in Aurangabad Division. Latur taluka is the most thickly populated where as Tuljapur taluka is the most sparsely populated. The obvious reason for highest density of Latur taluka is due to Latur town being a commercial and an industrial centre in the district

Table No. 2.2:- This table indicates classification of villages according to population ranges according to 1961 census in Osmanabad district. Out of 1388 inhabited as many as 933 villages or 67% of the total number of villages have population of less than 1000 each showing that the district comprises an overwhelming majority of small villages. Average population per village in Osmanabad dist. works out to 950. One of the reasons for this is that the district is mainly dependent on agriculture.

Table No. 2.3:- This table gives talukewise classification of towns according to population ranges in 1961 census. Out of 13 towns 7 towns fall in population range of 5000 to 9999 and 4 towns in the range of 10,000 to 19,999. Latur alone has a population of more than <sup>Forty thousand</sup> (40,913) and this is obviously because of its commercial and industrial importance. Osmanabad and Udgir towns are the other two big towns. The slow growth in population of Osmanabad town, though a district head quarter, is on account of keen commercial and industrial competition it faces from Sholapur city and Barsi and Latur towns. Osmanabad town also suffers from stunted growth due to absence of railway.

Table No. 2.4 :- This table gives data on number of workers in each taluka of Osmanabad district. As much as 83.5% of the population in the district is dependent on agriculture and the remaining 16.5% of it is dependent on non-agricultural occupations. The district ranks 3rd amongst the 26 districts of Maharashtra in so far the number of workers engaged in agriculture including labourers are concerned.

Table No. 2.5:- This table gives number of non-workers in each taluka of Osmanabad district. Due to more student population in urban area, the percentage of non-workers there seems to be higher than in rural areas amongst other reasons. The number of females per 1000 males amongst non-workers is higher in urban areas when compared to rural areas everywhere. Non-workers form the 48.00% of the total population of the district.

Table No. 2.6:- This table gives scheduled <sup>castes</sup> and scheduled tribes population in Osmanabad district. Scheduled caste and scheduled tribe population in the district form 13.29% and 0.03 % respectively <sup>to</sup> the total population of the district. Out of them 1,85,799 persons belonging to scheduled castes are in rural areas and 12,033 in urban areas. None of the persons belonging to scheduled tribes reside in urban areas. The population of scheduled castes appears to be almost uniformly distributed in all the talukas. However, it is comparatively more in Udgir, Ahmedpur, Nilanga and Osmanabad talukas. The population of scheduled tribes appears to be concentrated in Kalam, Osmanabad Nilanga and Parenda talukas.

Table No. 2.7:- This table gives population of urban areas in Osmanabad district. The urban population of the district constitutes 10.5% of its total population. The three towns of Udgir, Latur and Osmanabad together constitutes nearly 50% of the total urban population of the district.

( 3 ) AGRICULTURE:

3.1:- This table deals with the land utilization statistics in Osmanabad district during 1962-63 and 1963-64.

It is seen that the area under forest formed 0.09% of the total geographical area of this dist. during 1963-64. Tuljapur, Kalam, and Hair talukas of this dist. share the forest areas of the district. Only 2.79% of the land was not available for cultivation. The percentage of land put to non-agricultural use worked out 1.71% and the percentage of barren and un-culturable land worked out to 1.08 during 1963-64. The area under culturable waste formed 11.53% and that of permanent ~~was~~ pastures was 2.78% of total geographical area during that period. The percentages of land under misc. trees, crops etc. accounted for 0.53%. Whereas fallow lands accounted for 14.61% of the total geographical area in 1963-64.

The net area sown has increased by 1.04% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63. The percentage of area sown more than once during the year 1962-63 was 3.61% to the total net area sown and the same increased to 3.91% in 1963-64. Nilanga talukas stood first in respect of area sown more than once (2.35%) during 1963-64.

Table No. 3.2: This table deals with the area under different crops in each taluka of Osmanabad dist. during the years 1962-63 and 1963-64.



The area under food crops during the year 62-63 was 74.98% of the total net area sown and the same rose to 75.07 % during 1963-64. The area under non-food crops was 22.64% in 1962-63 of the total net area sown and the same increased to 23.84% in 1963-64. In all 52.35% of the total net area sown was covered by cereals during the year 1962-63 and the same decreased to 51.98% in 1963-64. Osmanabad district stood second in the production of Kharif Jowar in Aurangabad Division. Kharif Jowar occupied 19.11% of the total net area under crops during 1962-63. During 1963-64 the area under Kharif Jowar however formed 19.16% of the total net area sown. The area under Rabi Jowar during 1962-63 formed 21.21% of the net area sown and the same increased to 21.22% in 1963-64. The area under total pulses during the year 1962-63 was 19.76% of the total net area sown and the same increased to 20.30% in 1963-64. Similarly the area under cotton was 4.91% of the total net area sown during 1962-63 and the same increased to 5.03% in 1963-64.

The area under oil seeds during 1962-63 was 20.38% of the total net area sown and in 1963-64 it rose to 21.04%. The area under groundnut was 13.52% of the total net area sown during the 1962-63 and the same increased to 13.61% in 1963-64.

The gross cropped area in the district has increased by 1.32% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figures of 1962-63.

Table No. 3.3:- This table shows the yield per hectare and outturn of principal crops in Osmanabad district for the year 1962-63 and 1963-64.

It is seen that the percentage of outturn of total cereals has decreased by 5.10% during 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63. The outturn of rice has decreased by 1.44% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63 whereas that of wheat has also decreased by 3.27% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63.

The outturn of Jowar has also decreased by 3.95% in 1963-64 over the previous figure of 1962-63 and the outturn of pulses has increased by 1.37% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63. The outturn of gram has decreased by 13% over 1962-63. The outturn of Tur has increased by 16.59% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63. The outturn of sugarcane has increased by 37.11% in 1963-64 over the figure of 1962-63 whereas that of cotton has decreased by 11.30% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure in 1962-63. The outturn of groundnut has increased by 28.82% in 1963-64 over the previous figure of 1962-63 and the outturn of linseed has however decreased by 5% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63.

Table No. 3.4:- This table deals with the area irrigated by different sources in each taluka of Osmanabad district during 1962-63 and 1963-64. It is seen that the total net area irrigated has increased by 4.58% in 63-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63, and similarly

the total gross area irrigated has increased by 4.79% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63. There is a preponderance of well irrigation in this district. The area irrigated by wells was 93.25% of the total net area irrigated in 1963-64, and the area irrigated by Govt. canals worked out to 1.80% in 1963-64. The area irrigated by tanks is very negligible being only 0.37% of net area irrigated in 1963-64. Kalam taluka stood first in respect of well irrigation and Udpir taluka stood last in this respect. Kalam taluka also stood first in having largest number of wells in use and Dhum taluka stands last in this respect. The area irrigated per well works out to 2.49% hectares.

Table No. 3.5:- This table deals with the area irrigated under different crops in each taluka of Osmana- bad district in 1962-63 and 1963-64.

It is seen that 96.05% of the gross irrigated area was under food crops and 3.94% area was under non- food crops in the year 1963-64. Again 64.28% of the gross area was irrigated under total cereals during the year 1963-64 and it increased by 3.75% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63.

The irrigated area under total pulses during the year 1963-64 was 5.13% which increased by 3.32% in 1963-64 over the previous figure of 1962-63.

As much as 10.40% of gross area irrigated was under sugarcane during the year 1963-64 and the same has increased by 3.72% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63.

Ausa taluka stood first in having the largest number of land irrigated under rice 1.84% of the total gross irrigated land under rice. Parenda taluka stood first in claiming the maximum <sup>gross</sup> irrigated area under cotton being 40.21% of the total gross irrigated area under cotton in district.

Table No. 3.6(a):- This table deals with the number of irrigation wells in each taluka of Osmanabad district during 1962-63 and 1963-64.

In all 33.35% wells were in use out of the total number of wells in the district during 1963-64. Kalam taluka stood first in accounting for the highest number of wells in use i.e. 16.57% during 1963-64 whereas Bhum taluka ranked last in this respect.

Table No. 3.6(b):- This table deals with the minor irrigation works in Osmanabad district as on 31-3-65.

In all 61.28% of land was irrigated by Zilla Parishad irrigation works where as 33.72% area was irrigated by private or co-operative irrigation works as on 31-3-65.

Table No. 3.6(c):- This table shows the major and medium irrigation projects in Osmanabad district as on 31-3-65.

The highest area was irrigated by Khasapur project being 68.2% whereas that irrigated by Chandani project formed 7.75%. Thirna project accounted for 19.37% irrigated area and that by Harni project formed only 4.65% of the total irrigated area.

Table No. 3.7:- This table deals with the

percentage distribution of households engaged in cultivation classified by interest in land and size of land cultivation in Osmanabad district according to 1961 Census.

In all 81.36% of the cultivating households cultivate their own lands and 4.36% of them cultivate leased in lands. The remaining 13.73% of them cultivate lands which were partly owned and partly taken on lease. The following table shows the percentage distribution of cultivation holdings in 1961 according to their different sizes.

In all 96.15% of the cultivating households which cultivated land owned or held from Govt. were from rural areas and 81.92% of them which cultivated land held from private persons or institutions on payment in money kind or share were also from rural areas. Similarly 97.13% of the cultivating households which cultivated lands partly held from Govt. and partly from private persons were also from rural areas.

Table No. 3.8:- This table indicates the agricultural wage rates in Osmanbad district for the years 1964 and 1965.

The average wage rates at Kingaon centre for unskilled males were Rs. 1.46 in 1964 and Rs. 1.35 in 1965 and that for females were Rs. 0.69 in 1964 and Rs. 0.71 in 1965.

At Killari Centre the average wage rates for unskilled males were Rs. 1.11 in 1964 and Rs. 1.65 in 1965 and that for females were Rs. 0.70 in 1964 and Rs. 0.85 in 1965. At Mankeshwar centre the wage rates for unskilled males were Rs. 1.41 in 1964 and Rs. 1.49 in 1965 and that for females were Rs. 0.75 in 1964 and Rs. 0.79 in 1965.

Table No. 3.9:- This table shows the number of agricultural implements in each taluka of Osmanbad district in 1961.

Iron ploughs formed 50.59% and wooden ploughs formed 49.41% of the total number of ploughs enumerated. In all 46% of sugarcane crushers were worked by power and the rest 54% of them worked with the help of bullocks.

In all 97.95% of the pumps operated due to oil-engines and electric pumps accounted for only 2.05%. There were only 589 oil ghanis in this district. X

The following table gives the number of wells to each pump in talukas of Osmanbad District.

It is seen from the above figures that progressive cultivators in AUSA and Umarga are extensively using pumps for irrigation purposes whereas those in Udgir do not use this facility owing to hilly tract and fewer wells therein. The area under sugarcane comes to 3.34% per sugarcane crusher in 1963-64. The total area under sugarcane was 5686 hectares in 1963-64 and the number of sugarcane crushers was 1,700. From the same table it can be seen that the highest number of wooden ploughs (about <sup>4%</sup> of the district total) was in Udgir taluka. The least number of wooden ploughs was in Bhum taluka. The maximum number of iron ploughs was in Kalam taluka and the least in Umarga taluka. Maximum number of sugarcane crushers was in Kalam taluka and the lowest number <sup>in</sup> Parenda taluka. From the same table it can be seen that the maximum number of oil engines were in Umarga taluka and the lowest in Bhum taluka.

Table No. 3.10:- This table deals with the famine, scarcity and skin to scarcity data in Osmanabad district for the year 1963-64. <sup>No</sup> Famine or scarcity was <sup>declared</sup> in this district during 1963-64.

Table No. 3.11:- This table shows the progress under soil conservation and land reclamation in Osmanabad district during 1963-64 and 1964-65.

The area <sup>of</sup> bunded and contour bunded has increased by 101-12% in 1963-64 over the corresponding figure of 1962-63.

Note:- Figures in hectares indicated in Table No.s. 3.1 to 3.5 and B-16 are calculated by using the conversion factor 1 Acre = .40 Hectares.



(4) ANIMAL HUSBANDARY, FOREST & FISHERIES.

Table No. 4.1:- This table deals with the summary of live stock census in Osmanabad district for 1956 and 1961 census. The total cattle population during the quinquennial from 1956 to 1961 increased by 18.82%. The male cattle of this district are mostly of "Deoni" breed. The Deoni bulls are very popular and useful for agricultural purposes. Cattle and buffaloes together covered 77.70 % and 75.26 % of the total live stock of this district during 1956 and 1961 livestock census respectively. The number of goats has increased by 80.27 % in 1961 livestock census over their corresponding population in 1956 livestock census where as sheep and horses and ponies decreased by 5.80 % and 4.05 % respectively during the same census. The increase in the number of poultry was of the magnitude of 114.92% during 1961 census mainly due to poultry farming being more and more popular as a subsidiary occupation.

In general the total livestock population has registered an overall increase of 25.36% in 1961 livestock census over the corresponding number in 1956 livestock census.

Table No. 4.2:- This table gives important categorywise livestock population in each taluka as per 1961 livestock census. The young stock of cattle formed nearly less than one third of the total cattle population. The highest number of cattle is found in Udgir taluka ( 94,166 ) whereas <sup>their</sup> lowest number ( 45,294 ) is found in Paranda taluka of this district.

However, highest number of buffaloes ( 29,127 ) is found in Udgir taluka whereas lowest number ( 7,084 ) is found in Parendra taluka in of this district. The total live-stock population in Udgir taluka is highest being 1,65,076 whereas, the lowest number is registered in Bhum taluka being 74,828.

Table No. 4.3:- This table gives the statistics regarding the <sup>veterinary</sup> facilities available in each taluka of this district. There was one fullfledged hospital located at Osmanabad town, the dist. Head Quarters and 10 dispensaries during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. The number of animals treated in hospital, dispensaries and aid centres increased significantly during the year 1964-65 over the corresponding year 1963-64. The Veterinary Dispensaries and Aid Centres under take preventive as well as curative measures against animal diseases.

Table No. 4.4:- This table deals with the diseasewise livestock mortality in this district. Among the cattle and bovines diseases like Haemorrhagic, septicemia and black quarter were commonly found to prevail during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. It is seen that sheep breeders do not avail the <sup>veterinary</sup> facilities as highest number of deaths of sheep and goats were recorded on account of contagious and parastic diseases. It can also seen that Ranikhed disease took away a high toll of poultry population.

Table No. 4.6:- This table gives rangewise forest area in Osmanabad district. There is only one forest range namely Barsi range which covers part of Kalam and Tuljapur

talukas of this district. There was no change in forest areas during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. There is no reserved/<sup>or</sup> protected forest in the district and only " unclassified forest " has covered the area of 1537.2 hectares of this district.

Table No. 4.7:- The data for this table is not available.

Table No. 4.8.- This table gives fishery statistics for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65 in Osmanabad district. Fishery is not well developed in the district. Fish is generally netted from small tanks, as there are no big rivers or lakes. Only one fish farm exists in Parenda taluka. There were only two co-operative societies during the year 1963-64 and three in 1964-65.

(5) : INDUSTRIES, MINING & ELECTRICITY:

Table No. 5.1:

This table gives the data regarding number of working factories and average daily number of workers employed during 1963 & 64. There were two cotton ginning and baling factories and one gurx factory during 1963 & 64. The units engaged in manufacture of edible oil increased by 7.69% in the year 1964 over the corresponding figure in 1963. The total number of factories in 1964 increased by 4.35% over 1963 where-as the <sup>average</sup> daily number of workers increased by 6.47% in 1964 over the corresponding figure in the preceding year. The district of Osmanabad is devoid of any industry worth the name. The industrial backwardness of the dist. is due to lack of railway transport and lack of forest produce and mineral wealth. There is a possibility of more Agro-Oriented industries being set up in future.

Table No. 5.2

This table indicates the distribution of factories according to the category of industry and the number of workers therein. Majority of factories could be termed as Agro industries like cotton ginning and pressing, Oil Mills etc. which are mostly concentrated in Latur, Udgir and Osmanabad towns.

Table No. 5.3:- This table gives the distribution of factories according to number of days worked in Osmanabad district. It is seen that most of the factory units in the district are of seasonal nature, barring a few units engaged in manufacture of food (other than beverages) and workshops engaged in repair of motor vehicles engaged at Latur town.

Table No. 5.4:- There is no industrial (cotton yarn, cotton cloth) production in the district except production of soap in 1963-64 and sugar in 1964-65. This spells the utter industrial backwardness of the district.

Table No. 5.5:- This table indicates the Statistics relating to handlooms and power looms in the dist. The number of powerlooms remained steady both in 1963-64 and 1964-65 where as handloom production increased by 7.39% during 1964-65 over the production<sup>in</sup> /previous year. Powerloom production also increased during that period by 2.34%.

Table No. 5.6:- This table gives monthwise information regarding registrations, number of vacancies notified and number of placements during 1963-64 and 1964-65. Registration is found to be on increase during June and July following the publication of examination results. During the year 1964-65 registration decreased by 4.57 % whereas placement decreased by 46.34 % over the corresponding figure in earlier year.

Table No. 5.7:- This table indicates the occupational distribution of total registrations, vacancies notified and placements etc. in Osman bad district. The vacancies notified decreased in the year 1964-65 by about 3.69 % over the corresponding year 1963-64. Similarly, the placements also decreased in the year 1964-65 by 46.34 % over the placement in the year 1963-64. The number of candidates on live register in 1964-65 has slightly increased by 11 as compared to the corresponding number in 1963-64.

Table No. 5.8:- This table indicates the changes in the volume of employment in Osmanabad district in the year ending 31st December 1964 and 31st March 1965. The volume of employment in the year 1964-65 has decreased by 0.2 % as compared to the corresponding number in 1964. The decrease in the volume of employment occurred mainly in case of manufacturing industry by 30.18 % during 1964-65 over the corresponding year ending on 31st Dec. 1964. The majority of employees in the district appears to be in public sector covering 92.38 % of the total employment in the district during 1964-65. It is observed that majority of 1) manufacturing and 2) Trade and commerce and miscellaneous industries are run by private sector covering 97.95% and 70.95 % respectively of the total number of employees during the year 64-65.

Table No. 5.9:- This table gives the statistics relating to annual survey of industries in Bhair and Osmanabad district, as districtwise break up for these two districts is not available. The data for 6 reporting factories is given in the table which have produced goods worth Rs. 73,69,000 during 1961.

Table No. 5.11:- This table indicates the number of towns and villages electrified and the population covered in Osmanabad district, for 1963-64 and 1964-65. By 31st March 1964 twelve towns had been electrified. Naldurg town was electrified during the year 1964-65. Thus all the thirteen towns had been electrified upto 31st March 1964. The numbers of villages electrified increased from 7 at the end of 31st March 1964. to 19 at the end of 31st March 1965. covering only 2.53 % of the rural population. In all 12.30 % population of this district was covered by electrification both in town and villages at the end of March 1965.

Table No. 5.12: This table indicates the installed capacity and electricity generated in Osmanabad district during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 . Installed capacity and generation increased by 65.24 % and 132.14 % respectively during 1964-65 over the corresponding year 1963-64.

(6) : CO-OPERATION:

Table No. 6.1:- This table presents statistics relating to District Central Co-Operative Bank, Dist. Industrial Co-Operative Bank, and District Development Bank in Osmanabad district. The number of branches of district central co-operative Bank increased by 15.3% in 1964-65 over the corresponding number in 1963-64. The share Capital of the bank increased in 1964-65 by 21.0%, reserve fund by 47.53%, working capital by 15.08%, short term loans 47.87 % and medium term loans by 112.66 %

over the corresponding amount in 1963-64. There were 12 branches of Dist. Development Bank and Share Capital of the same increased in 1964-65 by 104 %, reserve fund by 30.94%, working capital by 67.72 % and long term loans advanced by 36.92 % over the corresponding figures in 1963-64.

The increase in short term and medium term loans in case of Dist. Central Co-Operative Bank and that in the case of long term loans in Dist. Development Bank shows that these banks are the providing for more and more agricultural finance in the district.

Table No. 6.2: This table indicates that in all nine types of Co-Operatives Societies functioned in Osmanabad district during 1963-64 and 1964-65. There is an increase in general in each type of Co-Operative Society in the district in the year 1964-65 over their corresponding numbers in 1963-64. The share capital of Agril.

marketing societies increased by 252.16 % in 1964-65 over the corresponding amount in 1963-64 where as working capital increased by 125.61 % during that period. The Agril. marketing societies, Labourers Industrial Societies, Agril., Producer's Societies, Credit Resource Societies etc. were some of the prominent types of societies working during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. There is no significant rise in the total number of co-operative societies during 1964-65 over the corresponding number in 1963-64. Their share capital increased by 21.42 % in 1964-65 as compared to previous year and reserve and other fund increased by 50.62 % working capital by 524.76 % and loan advanced by 33.41 % during that period.

Table No. 6.3: - This table gives the data regarding agricultural co-operative societies for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 in Osmanabad district. The number of co-operative societies increased by 0.52 % in 1964-65 as compared to the figure in 1963-64. However individual membership, share capital, and working capital increased by 23.59 % 36.84 % & 7.12 % during 1964-65 over the corresponding figures in 1963-64 respectively.

Table No. 6.4:- This table deals talukewise number of Agricultural Marketing Societies and their Agricultural commodities and requisites, in each taluka of this district. There was one Dist. Central Marketing Society and 13 Primary Agril. Marketing Societies in both the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. There were two each Primary Agri. Marketing Societies in Parenda and Tuljapur talukas and one each in the remaining nine talukas of this district. The value of sale of Primary Agril. Marketing



Society had registered a decrease of 23.10% during 1964-65 as compared to the position in 1963-64.

Table No. 6.5:- This table indicates the number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them in Osmanabad district, for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. The number of registered money lenders decreased by 12.76% during 1964-65 over the corresponding year 1963-64. The percentages of loans advanced to traders and to non-traders were 85.27 % and 14.73 % respectively during the year 1963-64 and 29.31 % and 70.69 % in 1964-65.

: MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH

Table No. 7.1:- This table indicates the number of persons engaged in medical and public health services in Osmanabad district according to 1961 census. There were about 16 Physicians, Surgeons and Dentists per lakh of population in rural area and in urban areas their proportion was 137 per lakh of population. There were only 12 hospital beds per lakh of population as per 1961 census and the district ranked 25th in this regard among the 26 districts of Maharashtra during 1961.

Table No. 7.2:- This table deals with the medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies in each taluka of this district during the year 1963-64. There were only two hospitals one at Osmanabad town and other at Latur town. These two hospitals are fully equipped with operation theatres and X-ray facilities. There were 32 dispensaries in the district located at taluka Head Quarters and important villages in the district. The number of doctors decreased from 46 in 1963 to 40 in 1964 and one each maternity homes

opened in Ahmednagar and Tuljapur talukas during the year 1964. Each medical and public health institution covered approximately a total population of 27,800 in the year 1963 and a population of 27,380 in 1964.

Table No. 7.3:- This table gives the disease-wise classification of number of indoor and outdoor patients treated in the year 1963 and 1964.

Dysentery, Diarrhoea, Phrexis of uncertain origin and other diseases due to infection, diseases of the blood and spleen, urinary organs excluding tumoury, and diseases were some of the main ailments for which outdoor and indoor patients were treated in general.

Table No. 7.4:- This table deals with the number of births and deaths and also the number of infant deaths registered in this district during the year 1963 and 1964. The number of births decreased by 5.92 % during the year 1964 over the corresponding number in 1963 where as the number of deaths and the number of infant deaths increased by 23.38% and 4.39 % during 1964 over the figure in 1963.

Table No. 7.5:- This table indicates the number of deaths due to important causes in Osmanabad district during the year 1963 and 1964. The number of deaths due to fever and other causes is high as compared to other diseases. In general more deaths occurred due to fever, and respiratory diseases during both the years under reference. There were no deaths due to plague epidemics during the years 1963 and 1964.

Table No. 7.6:- This table gives the number of vaccinations and cholera inoculations in this district during the year 1963 and 1964.

Vaccination and cholera inoculation programmes slowed down during 1964, as compared to 1963 as seen from

the fact that the number of primary vaccination and cholera inoculations fell by 69.36 % and 4.36 % respectively during the year 1964. Hence there was perhaps a considerable increase in the number of deaths due to cholera <sup>the</sup> in 1964 over/death in 1963.

Table No. 7.7:- This table gives the data on B.C.G. Vaccination in Osmanabad district during 1963 and 1964. The Positive cases formed nearly 50% of the total number of cases tested in 1963 and nearly 9% in 1964 in this dist.

Table No. 7.8:- This table indicates the hygienic drinking water supply sources available in the rural areas of Osmanabad district. Out of the total number of 1388 inhabited villages 15.41 % of the villages have no hygienic drinking water supply and 30.33 % of them have inadequate water supply. Out of the total number of 112 inhabited villages in Umerga taluka 58 villages or 51.78% of the villages have inadequate water supply and out of 180 inhabited villages in Nilanga taluka, 46 villages or 25.55 % villages have without drinking water supply facilities.

(8) : EDUCATION :

Table No. 8.1:- This table indicates the number of literates and the percentage of literacy in each taluka of Osmanabad district according to 1961 census. The percentage of literacy in the district rose from 10.06% in 1951 to 17.05 % in 1961 census. Male literacy was 27.52 % and among the females it was 6.02 % in 1961. According to the literacy of male and female the district ranked 23rd and 22nd among the 26 districts in 1961 of Maharashtra State. The highest literacy of 20.96 % <sup>during 1961</sup> is found in Latur taluka and lowest literacy of 12.37 % is found in Parenda taluka

of this district. The percentage of literacy in urban areas is highest in Osmanabad taluka being 42.24% whereas its lowest urban literacy is in Bhim Mahal being 26.92%. In rural area, Umarga taluka registered highest literacy percentage of 16.98% and lowest literacy percentage is found in Parenda taluka being 11.43%. Osmanabad dist. stands second in Aurangabad Division in respect of literacy according to 1961 census. In rural literacy the dist. however stands first in Aurangabad Division.

Table No. 8.2: This table indicates the number of literates and educated persons in rural areas in each taluka of this district according to 1961 census. In all 85.11% of the rural population is illiterate. Among the literates in rural areas 73.79% were mere literates without any educational standards and remaining 26.21% were having different educational standards. A negligible percent of the rural population i.e. 0.29% had completed matriculation standard of education. This indicates that the rural population in the district is too far behind in educational field as compared to the urban population of the district.

Table No. 8.3:- This table indicates the educational attainments in urban areas in Osmanabad dist. as per 1961 population census. In all 64.63% of the urban population was illiterate. The literate without any educational level formed 52.81% and persons having education upto primary and matriculation standard formed 38.73% and 6.84% respectively, of the total urban population of the district. Matriculates formed 2.42% of urban population in the district. The technical and non-technical diploma holders formed 0.93% whereas graduates and post-graduates other than technical formed 0.30%. Technical graduates and post

graduates formed 0.05 % of the urban population. All this indicates that a very negligible percentage of even urban population had successfully completed university education. This was due to the lack of higher educational facilities in the district particularly for technical diploma, technical degrees and post graduations! In so far as provision of number of seats for technical training upto diploma level is concerned, Osmanabad district ranked 14th in the 26 districts of Maharashtra State.

Table No. 2.4:- This table indicates the data regarding number of educational institutions, pupils and teachers in Osmanabad district in 1964-65. So far as primary education is concerned, the average number of students per institution was 97.91 where as the average number of students per teacher was  $\Delta$  <sup>36.57</sup> during 1964-65. The percentage of trained teachers in primary school was 55.18 % during 1964-65 and it was 48.19% in secondary schools during that period. The average number of students per secondary school worked out to 307.34 and the average number of students per teacher worked out to 25.48 during 1964-65. The ratio of boys to girls in secondary schools was about 4:1. The ratio of boys to <sup>girls,</sup>  $\Delta$  in higher institutions was about 12:1.

Table No. 3.5:- This table deals with the beneficiaries and concessions to backward classes in Osmanabad district, in 1964-65. The relative percentages of scheduled caste, scheduled tribes and other backward classes in the total enrolment were 33.00% , 2.66% and

Contd. 11-----

64.23 % respectively. Out of the total monetary educational concessions granted to students the percentage of the grants to scheduled caste, scheduled tribes and other backward classes worked out to 29.58 % 3.30 % and 67.11 % , respectively. The concession granted to students at primary level were however not in commensurate with their numerical strength.

Table No. 8.6:- This table gives information regarding concessions of free education granted to economically backward class students. The total number of beneficiaries pertaining to secondary schools were 15000 during the year 1964-65 and the concession granted to them amounted to Rs. 7,68,000 during that period.

Table No. 8.7:- This table indicates the expenditure on primary education by way of grants-in-aid to local bodies in Osmanabad district during the year 1964-65. The grants were given only to the zilla parishad, Osmanabad which was solely entrusted with primary education in the district.

Table No. 8.8:- This table deals with the classification of villages and towns with and without primary schools by population range in Osmanabad district for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. There was no town in the district without primary schools during 1963-64 and 1964-65. The highest number of villages without primary schools during 1964-65 was found in Ahmedpur taluka. All villages having a population above 200 were covered with primary schools.

( 9 ) TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS.

Table No. 9.1:- This table gives the information on length of railway route in Osmanabad district for the years ending 31st March '64 and 31st March '65. There was no increase in railway length during the year 1964- & 1965. & the total railway length in the district is only 113 Kms. Osmanabad district is therefore said to be a backward district from commercial and industrial point of view, which amongst other reasons is also due to a lack of railway facilities.

Table No. 9.2(A). This table shows the extra municipal road length according to category and surface in Osmanabad district for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65.

From the above table it can be observed that road way is the main type of communication in this dist.

The Hyderabad-Sholapur National Highway which connects Andhara Pradesh, Maharashtra and Mysore states, passes through Osmanabad district over distance of about 78.03 Kms. Osmanabad town is about 54.4 Kms from the National Highway. There are 11 State highways passing through this district. The length of National highways during 1964 and 1965 remained unchanged whereas that of State highways did not increase significantly. Water - bound Macadam road length <sup>formed</sup> 62.53% of the total road length in the district during 1964-65.

Table No. 9.2(B):- This table relates to the length of Municipal roads surface wise for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 in Osmanabad District.

The length of cement concrete roads was negligible in both the respective years. The length of in waterbound macadam roads has increased by 13.13% over

the corresponding figure of 1963-64. The length of lower types decreased by about 50% over the corresponding road length in 1963-64.

Table No. 9.3:- This table shows the motor vehicles in operation in Aurangabad Division as on 31-3-64 and 31-3-65.

As the districtwise break-up is not available with the Road Transport Office at Aurangabad, it is not possible to spot light the position <sup>obtaining in</sup> this district.

The total number of vehicles in this region increased by 5.31% during 1964-65 over 1963-64. The increase was mostly in the number of motor cars, taxi cars, autorickshaws, ( which ply only in Aurangabad town) stage carriages, public carriages, ambulances, trailors, tractors and others. The increase in public carriages was due to growing expansion of State Transport department.

Table No. 9.4:- This table gives the information on Operational Statistics of Nationalised road transport in Aurangabad region as on 31st March 1964 and 31st March 1965.

The districtwise break-up of these figures is not available with the Road Transport Office at Aurangabad. It is seen that the number of routes in 1964-65 increased by 10.59% over those in 1963-64. Similarly the average service distance and the average daily earning in 1964-65 increased by 12.4% and 9.99% respectively over 1963-64. The average earnings per vehicle per day and the number of passengers travelled per day in 1964-65 increased by 2.2% and 19.1% respectively over 1963-64. All this illustrates the growing popularity



of transport facilities of State Transport.

Table No. 9.5:- This table shows the traffic census on State Highway/<sup>National</sup> highways in Osmanabad district as on November '66.

The highest traffic intensity (1,306 vehicles per day) is observed on Poona-Sholapur-Hyderabad National highway No. 9.

Table No. 9.6:- This table indicates the information of Postal, telegraph and telephone statistics, in Osmanabad district for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65.

The number of post offices have slightly increased by about 1% during 1964-65 over the previous years figures. The number of letter boxes has also increased by about 1% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. The number of telephones has increased by 39.93% over the figure of 1963-64 and the number of radio licences issued has also increased by 10.62% over the figure of 1963-64.

Table No. 9.7:- This table gives the information on availability of postal facilities in Osmanabad district.

From the above table it can be seen that only 0.26% villages out of 1383 villages are having post offices within the village whereas 42.87% villages are having the post offices at a distance of 3-6 Kms. Osmanabad taluka has the highest number of 45 villages with post office within the villages and Bhim taluka has the lowest number of only 19 villages with post offices within the villages. A majority of villages ( 595 out of 1383 villages) had postal facilities within

3-6 Kms. distance from them.

Table No. 9.8:- This table shows the rural broad casting statistics in Osranabad district for the year 31-3-64 and 31-3-65.

The number of receiving sets has increased by 10.57 % in 1964-65 over the figure of 1963-64. <sup>Number</sup> of receiving sets installed has increased by 0.67% over 1963-64.

The rural population of villages having receiving sets has increased by 5.72% over the corresponding population covered in 1964-65.

It is noticed that <sup>31.02%</sup> of the rural population ( 1961 census) is covered by rural broad casting sets.

#### ( 10 ) LOCAL BODIES:

Table No. 10.1:- This table deals with the income and expenditure of local bodies in Osranabad district.

The number of village panchayats has increased by 1.63% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figure in 1963-64.

Whereas the number of villages covered has also increased by 0.28% during that period. The income of these village panchayats increased by 0.13% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figure for 1963-64. and their expenditure increased by 51.92% during that period.

The income of Zilla Parishad has increased by 27.15% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. Whereas the expenditure has also increased by 1.8% during that period. The income of Municipalities has also increased by 57.16% in 1964-65. over the previous figure of 1963-64 and the expenditure also has increased by 73.40%

during the same period.

Table No. 10.2:- This table deals with the panchayat samitiwise income and expenditure in Osmanabad district for the years 1962-63 and 1963-64.

The incomes of village panchayats has increased by 19.47% in 1963-64 over the figure of 1962-63. Ahmedpur panchayat samiti stood first in respect of income in 1963-64. The lowest income is registered by Paranda panchayat samiti during 1963-64. Ahmedpur Panchayat samiti stood first/making highest expenditure in 1963-64. Paranda panchayat samiti stood last in this respect during that period.

Table No. 10.3(A): This table indicates the headwise receipts of Zilla Parishad during 1963-64 and 1964-65.

It is seen that the revenue receipts of Zilla Parishad have increased by 21.37% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1963-64. The total self raised resources have also increased by 21.73% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. Govt. grants have increased by 21.3% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1963-64.

Table No. 10.3(B):- This table gives the headwise expenditure of Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65.

It is seen that the total revenue expenditure has increased by 100.23% during the year 1964-65 over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. This is obviously because developmental expenditure on items such as education, agriculture, medical and health etc.

Table No. 10.4:- This table deals with the constitution of municipalities in Osmanabad district.

From the above table it is evident that there are in all 13 municipalities functioning at 13 towns of this district, covering a total population of 1,56,266 persons. Out of these 13 municipalities, the municipalities of 1) Latur, 2) Udgir and 3) Osmanabad are classified as city municipalities and the remaining 10 municipalities are classed as town municipalities.

Table No. 10.5:- This table deals with the income and expenditure of municipalities.

The total income of these municipalities was Rs. 12,99,859 in 1963-64.

( 11 ) PLAN & COMMUNITY  
DEVELOPMENT.

Table No. 11.1:- This table deals with the expenditure in third five year plan on different schemes in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 to 1964-65.

During 1962-63 and 1963-64 the third five year plan was in its second and third year of implementation respectively and the different plan schemes were categorised as 1) State Level, 2) Division Level, and 3) Dist. Level schemes. During the third five year plan, 67 district level schemes were included and implemented in this district. A total plan provision for all these schemes was with tune of Rs.634.46 lakhs. The total expenditure increased by 62.06% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figure of 1963-64.

An amount of Rs. 6.40 crores is provided for all

the district level plan schemes in the third plan of this district. This outlay was roughly of the order of Rs. 42 perhead in the district, according to the total district population of 14,77,656 persons enumerated as per 1961 census. It may also be observed that the expenditure under co-operation and community development <sup>-is</sup> highest being Rs. 127.637 lakhs upto 1964-65, whereas the expenditure under industries and mining is very low being only Rs. 1.903 lakhs upto 1964-65 when compared to other schemes. The expenditure under Agriculture and irrigation was also high being to the tune of Rs. 49.120 lakhs upto 1964-65.

The percentages of expenditures in third five year plan for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 with corresponding budget provisions on different heads of development are given below.

Table No. 11.2:- This table gives the physical achievements of different schemes implemented in Third Five Year Plan in Osmanabad district, (1961-62 to 64-65)

It is seen that Osmanabad district has made remarkable progress under the scheme "IN-2" Installation of pumping sets " which may be due to the lack of major irrigation projects in this district.

Table No. 11.3:- This table indicates the community Development programme in Osmanabad as on 31-3-65.

As per C.P.A. pattern there were 17.50 blocks as on 31-3-65. The area covered by stage I blocks was 52.43% of the total rural area. Similarly the area covered by stage II blocks was 41.56% of the total rural area.

In all 63.35% of the total rural population was under stage I blocks and that covered by stage II blocks was 41.45% of the total rural population. It is also evident that 55.78% villages have been covered by stage I blocks, where as 44.22% villages are covered by stage II blocks.

Table No. 11.4:- This table deals with the expenditure incurred in C.D. blocks under different stages in Osmanabad district as on 31-3-64 and 31-3-65.

It may be observed that Osmanabad Block stood first for having incurred highest expenditure (Rs.514000) during the year 1964-65 and Tuljapur Block (Rs.415000) stood second in this respect.

Table No. 11.5:- This table shows the physical achievements on selected items in different blocks of Osmanabad district during 1963-64 and 1964-65.

From the above table it is observed that Ausa Block stood first in respect of fertilisers distributed

during the year 1964-65. The increase in fertilisers distributed is very significant being 194.34% over the corresponding figure in 1963-64. From the same table it can be seen that Ausa block is also ahead in respect of improved seeds distributed during the years 1963-64, and the increase in respect of improved seeds distributed is very remarkable being 79.17% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figure of 1963-64.

This block of Ausa is also ahead of all other blocks in respect of people's contribution during the years 1963-64 and in 1964-65, <sup>the</sup> Block of Perenda topped the list. Osmanabad Block stood first in the district in 1964-65 accounting in all for 1521 family planning operations.

Table No. 11.6:- This table gives blockwise index numbers of physical achievements and expenditure in Osmanabad district during 1963-64 and 1964-65.

According to achievement index during 1963-64 there was one block under "A" special category, 4 blocks under "A", 4 blocks under "B" and 2 blocks under "C", whereas during 1964-65 there were 6 blocks classed as "A" special, 2 blocks under "A", 4 under "B" and 1 under "C". According to block expenditure 2 blocks were categorised under "A", 2 under "B", and only one under "C" during 1963-64. Again during 1964-65 11 blocks were categorised under "A" with none under "B" and "C".

Whenever the percentage of achievements to the norms was more than 150% the block was classified as "A" special, when it was between 100% to 150% it was

classified as "A" and when it was between 50% to 100% it was regarded as "B" class Block. The Blocks having 50% achievements were classified as "C" class Blocks.

Whenever expenditure exceeded 75% of the expected expenditure for that period, a Block was classified as "A". When the percentage of expenditure was 50 to 75 % the Block was classed as "B" and when it was less than 50 % it was classified as "C" class.

#### ( 12 ) PRICES:

Table No. 12.1:- This table deals with the average rural retail prices of important commodities at Osmanabad town which is the district head quarter during the year 1964.

Jowar, Tur, Gram, Mung, Urid, Groundnut, Safflower, gur and cotton are the main crops of this district and wholesale trade is carried on in all of them. For this purpose Latur market had been established in 1931. Regulated markets were started at Latur, Udgir, Kalam, Ahmadpur, Osmanabad, Tuljapur, Murud and Chakur.

The speculative transactions and the increased demand from Bombay and other markets in the neighbouring States like Andhra Pradesh, and Madras play an important role in determining the prices of agricultural commodities of this district

Commoditywise price fluctuations are shown below.

Rice:- It is observed that rice was available throughout the year 1964 and the average retail prices of rice ( fine ) was Rs. 1.43 per Kg. The prices of rice



were high being Rs. 1.62 per kg. during the months of March, April, May '64. The lowest price prevailed during the month of July '64.

Wheat:- The prices of wheat have also shown an upward trend during the year 1964. The average retail prices of wheat were Rs. 0.96 per kg. The prices were high being Rs. 1.38 during Dec. '64 and lowest being Rs. 0.59 during January '64.

JOWAR:- It is the principal crop of this dist. The average retail price of Jowar (White) was Rs. 0.61 per kg. during 1964. The highest rise in prices is observed during the month of October '64, when the average retail price went upto Rs. 0.90 per kg. The lowest prices of Jowar were observed during the month of January '64 being Rs. 0.44 per kg.

GRAM :- Gram is one of the principal crops grown in this district. The prices of gram dal have shown an upward trend during the year 1964. The average prices of gram dal during the year 1964 was Rs. 1.00 per Kg. This was due to less supply of the commodity in the market among other reasons. The maximum rise was observed during the month of December '64. During this month the prices have gone upto Rs. 1.81. The lowest prices were observed during the month of January '64 being Rs. 0.66 per kg.

ARHAR :- The prices of Arhar dal have shown an increasing trend during the year 1964. This was due to less supply of Arhar dal from Sholapur market amongst other reasons. The average retail price of

Arhar dal during the year 1964 was Rs. 1.20 per kg. The highest price was observed during the month of Dec. '64. when the average price shot up to Rs. 1.52 per kg.

MUNG:- The prices of Mung have also shown upward trend during the year 1964. This was due to less supply of Mung dal in the market. The average retail price of Mung was Rs. 1.17 per Kg. during the year 1964. The maximum price of Rs. 1.365 per kg was observed during the month of December '64. Prices of Mung dal were low being Rs. 0.94 per kg. during the month of January '64.

URID:- The average price of urid dal during the year 1964 was Rs. 1.09 per kg. During the month of Jan. '64 the price was low being Rs. 1.00 per kg. From February '64 onwards the prices remained constant at Rs. 1.10 per kg.

GROUNDNUT OIL:- The price of ground-nut oil has shown an increasing trend during the year 1964. The average retail price of groundnut oil was Rs. 2.39 per kg. The price of groundnut oil during the year Sept. '64 was highest being Rs. 3.08 per kg. and it was lowest at Rs. 1.87 per kg. during the month of January '64.

Prices of cloths have remained steady. No significant increase or decrease has been observed in the prices of clothing.

Table No. 12.2:- This table shows the operation of regulated marketing in each taluka of Osmanabad district during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65.

At Ahmedpur, Osmanabad, Latur, Murum, Udgir, Kalam, and Milanga the Agricultural produce market committee function;

The outturn of annual arrivals of Ahmedpur Market committee during 1964-65 have increased by 34.00% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. The value of the same increased by 62.38% over the corresponding figure during 1963-64. During 1964-65 annual arrivals of Osmanabad market committee have decreased by 47% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. The value of the same has increased by 2.95% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64.

The annual arrival of Latur market committee has also decreased by 18.53% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. Whereas the value of the same has increased by 0.20% over the previous years figure.

The annual arrival of Jalgaon market committee has increased by 49.82% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64 and its value has decreased by 24.37%

The annual arrivals of Kalam market committee has decreased by 27.96% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. Whereas the value has also decreased by 6.32% over the figure of 1963-64.

The annual arrivals of Nilanga market committee has decreased by 27.65% over the corresponding figure of 63-64 and its value has decreased by 0.03% over the previous years figure.

Table No. 12.3:- This table gives the consumer price index numbers for working class in Aurangabad & Wanded centres.

No price index numbers are worked out for Osmanabad district as there are no industrial establishments in this district.

: (13) MISCELLANEOUS :

Table No. 13.1:- This table deals with the strength of police force and crime statistics in Osmanabad district for the years 1963 and 1964.

The total police strength has increased by 0.07% over the corresponding figure in 1963.

The number of cognisable crimes reported as increased by 60.20% in 1964 over the corresponding figures of 1963. Non-cognisable crimes reported have also significantly increased by 929.46% over the previous figure of 1963.

Table No. 13.2:- This table shows the work disposed in civil and criminal courts of Osmanabad dist. for the years 1963 and 1964.

From the above table it can be observed that the number of criminal cases decided were significantly high when compared to that of civil cases. The number of civil cases ( regular ) have increased by 2.17% over the previous figure of 1963. The number of criminal cases ( original ) have decreased by 2.54% in 1964 over the corresponding figure of 1963.

Table No. 13.3:- This table gives the information on Cinema statistics in Osmanabad district for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65.

No increase or decrease was observed in number of Cinema theatres during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. There were 12 permanent theatres in both the years. There is one touring theatre located at Turori village (Taluka Umarga.).

Out of these 12 theatres, five theatres are located at Latur only and as such Latur is the main attraction for cinegoers in this district. In the six towns of Bhuni, Ausa, Naldurg, Umerga, Murum and Parenda there is no cinema theatre.

The total seating capacity of all these 12 theatres is 9,360 per show.

Table No. 13.4:- This table shows the pay range-wise number of Government employees in 1961 in Osmanabad district.

It can be observed that there are only 10 gazetted class one officers in the district. Only 0.13% official government employees were class one officers. Whereas class II formed 1.30% of the total employees. Class III government employees formed 22.33% whereas class IV servants formed 16.23% of the total number of government employees.

It is seen that 49.39% of the employees are in the pay range of Rs. 75 to Rs. 100 and only 0.01% of them are in the pay of above Rs. 900.

Table No. 13.5:- This table shows the number of banking offices in Osmanabad district for the year 1965.

Twenty four towns and villages had 30 banking offices. These banks covered in all 13.85% of the district population. The banking facilities are very meagre in this district.

Table No. 13.6:- This table gives the number of joint stock companies in Osmanabad district during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65.

There were only 5 joint stock companies in the year 1963-64. This was due to industrial backwardness of this district in general.

Table No. 13.7:- This table gives the information on number of insurance policies issued and amount insured in Osmanabad district during the year 1963-64 & 64-65.

The number of insurance policies issued decreased by 19.33% over the figure of 1963-64 and the amount insured has also decreased by 24.18% over the

corresponding figure of 1963-64.

Table No. 13.8:- This table gives the collection of small savings in Osmanabad district during 1963-64 and 1964-65.

The gross collection decreased by 24.47% over the figure of 1963-64.

Table No. 13.9:- This table shows the information of land revenue collections in Osmanabad district during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65.

From the above table it can be observed that the demand increased by 96.48% over the figure of 1963-64. and collection/<sup>has</sup> also increased by 24.63% over the previous years figure.

Table No. 13.10:- This table indicates the receipts of excise revenue/sales tax/Entertainment tax in Osmanabad district for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65.

From the above table it can be observed that the receipts of excise revenue have decreased by 43.04% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. Whereas receipts of sales tax have increased by 30.73% over the

entertainment  
previous years figure. Collection of tax  
registered a decrease of 17.01% over the figure of 1963-64.

Table No. 13.11:- This table indicates the number of documents registered, income and expenditure therefrom and value of property transferred in each taluka of Osmanabad district for the year 1963 and 1964.

Transactions in properties significantly increased in the year 1964. The number of documents registered increased by 21.69% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. Income from registration has also increased by 23.54% over the previous years figure and the net income has increased by 92.43% over the corresponding figure of 1963-64. Ahmedpur taluka stood first during 1964 for having registered the highest number of documents.

Table No. 13.12:- This table shows the statistics relating to general elections held in 1962 in Osmanabad district.

From the above table it can be observed that 56.85% of votes were polled to total electorate. Nilanga taluka stood first for having polled 70% of votes, whereas only 46% of voters voted in Udgir taluka.

Table No. 13.13:- This table gives the taluka-wise percentage distribution of households according to the number of rooms occupied and the percentage distribution of these rooms to the population in Osmanabad district according to 1961 census.

The number of households having no regular rooms formed 14.18%, to the total number of households.

As compared to remaining talukas of the district, Ausa taluka seems to be poorest among the talukas of this district in having the largest number of households with no regular room. As many as 4.63% of the households in this district are having no regular room. Another 67.94% of the households are staying in one room. The percentage of households staying in three rooms in this district is being 4.75 and that of four rooms is 1.80% and that of five rooms is 1.24% respectively.



THIRD FIVE YEAR PLAN ANNUAL PLAN PERIOD 1964-65 OSMAWABAD DISTRICT.

1. GENERAL:

The Third Plan of the State represents a phase in a programme of long term development which seeks to transform the economy of Maharashtra over the next three or four plan periods. It seeks to build an agro-industrial society in the State. The investment contemplated in the plan will contribute substantially to the building of the social and economic overheads necessary for generating a high rate of growth in income and employment. It is hoped that over this period economic planning would also rectify the various inter Regional <sup>inbalances</sup> and even out the disparities that exist to-day. The experience of more than a decade of planning gives considerable room for optimism that given effective implementation and joint responsibility of the agencies in both the public and the private sectors, it would usher in an era of prosperity and plenty. The output potential in Maharashtra State would increase by about 30 percent during the Third Plan period according to a modest estimate. It is expected that the <sup>democratic</sup> decentralisation of administration initiated in the State during the year under reference will provide the means for the effective association of the people with the Plan and that the necessary dedicated leadership would be forthcoming at all levels in ample measure so as to respond creatively to the challenges of the Plan.

## 2. SIZE OF THE STATE PLAN.

The extent of realisation of the plan objectives in the period of the Third Plan depends upon its size, while the same in turn is determined on the basis of the resources of the state as supplemented by assistance from the Centre. The size of the Third Plan for the State has been fixed at about Rs. 390 crores comprising Rs. 224 crores to be found by the State and Rs. 166 crores of central assistance. The size of the Second Plan of the State was Rs. 204.41 crores and as such the size of the Third Plan works out 91.27 percent more than of Second Plan. This means that the per capita outlay, which may be taken to have been Rs. 57.74 during the Second Plan has increased to Rs. 98.72 for the Third Plan period. This represents the outlay on the part of State Government. Apart from above, there are complementary outlays together to the extent of Rs. 125 crores, by other agencies namely the Govt. of India on Centrally Sponsored Schemes, the Reserve Bank of India on Share Capital participation in the Co-Operative structure, All India Commodity Committees on certain agricultural schemes, All India Boards on some industrial schemes, Land Development Banks on schemes of minor Irrigation etc.

## 3. DISTRICT LEVEL SCHEMES:

Out of the 499 schemes formulated in the State's Third Plan, 67 schemes involving a total plan outlay of Rs. 634.45 lakhs have been classified as District Level Schemes of Osmanabad district. This classification has been roughly done on the basis of benefits of the scheme,

singularly assigned to any district. The schemes benefiting more than one districts are classified as Divisional or State Level Schemes, depending upon the scope of the scheme. Though the scope of this review is to the extent of District Level Schemes only, it may be stated at the outset that Osmanabad District is also benefited by many more Divisional and State Level Schemes, involving quite a sizable outlay. The particulars showing different major heads of development, no. of local and state sector schemes under each head, and the plan outlay are given below.

#### 4. PROGRESS OF EXPENDITURE.

The actual expenditure incurred on the District Level Schemes during 1964-65 was to the tune of Rs.180.945 lakhs, thus utilising as much as 27.5 percent of the

plan outlay. The following table shows major headwise expenditure incurred during 1964-65 and its percentage to budget provision for 1964-65.

The above table reveals that progress of expenditure under major heads 'Agricultural' and 'Co-Operation and Community Development' was quite substantial. Similarly budget and 'Social Services' were nearly exhausted by the end of March '65, to the extent of 96.7% and 94.9% respectively. The progress of expenditure under Major head 'Industry and Mining' was rather low i.e. 35.8%, as compared to other major heads.

The details of expenditure incurred and achievements made during 1964-65, under different sub heads are given below

1) Agricultural Production:- The Agricultural

Development programme included in the plan aims at increasing the production from the lands already under cultivation by way of increasing the yield per acre, by undertaking measures, such as use of improved varieties of seeds, fertilisers, and improved agricultural practices with better facilities of irrigation, land improvement, soil conservation and crop protection. Under this sub-head, there are in all 11 schemes, out of which, four are state sector schemes, while the remaining seven are local sector schemes. The expenditure incurred under this sub-head was more than the budget provision i.e., Rs. 4.67 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 4.125 lakhs. The progress of expenditure under all the schemes was satisfactory, as compared to budget provision. The progress of expenditure in respect of scheme of Establishment of new agricultural schools and strengthening of the existing agric. schools, Co-ordinated Cotton Extension Scheme, Development of Sugarcane and Integrated oil Seeds development Scheme were lagging behind as compared to plan provision, as these schemes were implemented late. In respect of scheme Establishment of taluka Seed Farms, the expenditure incurred upto 31-3-65 was Rs. 0.75 lakhs, as against plan provision of Rs. 10.09 lakhs. This was due to the fact that the land acquisition cases were to be finalised.

2) Land Development:- One aspect of land development is the consolidation of land which involves regrouping of holdings so as to reduce their number and to increase their size. Under this head, there is only one scheme, namely Consolidation of holdings, which was not

taken up, in this district, due to the fact that record of rights is not up-to-date " Hissa " or " Pot Hissa " wise in this district.

3) Soil Conservation P. With the possibilities of irrigation being limited, moisture conservation in the soil assumes particular importance in the low and precarious rainfall bunding is specially beneficial to such areas. In Osmanabad district having precarious rainfall and limited irrigation facilities, bunding programme has been taken in Third Five Year Plan on large scale. There is only one scheme under this head namely scheme for contour bunding, Nala bunding and contour trenching. The expenditure incurred under this scheme was Rs. 41.65 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 42.85 lakhs and the total expenditure incurred upto 31-3-65 was Rs. 72.04 lakhs as against plan provision of Rs. 55.01 lakhs. Similarly in respect of physical achievement, area bunded was 86605 acres, during 64-65, as against the target of 68000 acres. Thus this scheme is ahead of the targets both in expenditure and physical achievement.

4) Minor Irrigation:- The development programme for minor irrigation for this district, provides for construction of 1600 irrigation wells on loan-cum-subsidy basis and installation of 700 pumping sets for lift irrigation. Besides the programme also envisages construction of three bandharas and six tanks.

Under the two schemes namely construction of irrigation wells and installation of pumping sets, the expenditure incurred was Rs. 2.713 lakhs and Rs.6.006 lakhs,

as against budget provisions of Rs. 1.72 lakhs and Rs. 0.53 lakhs respectively. Similarly the number of wells and pumping sets for which subsidy was given were 129 and 285 as against targets of 695 and 235 respectively. Scheme MIN-7 Minor Irrigation Works is implemented in both ~~xxx~~ state and local sectors. In State Sector works on three tanks namely Devnagarwadi, Sonari and Bhairoba were spill over works, of 2nd five year plan and are completed during the Third Five Year Plan. New works namely 3 bandharas and four tanks are taken up, in State Sector. The progress in respect of expenditure and physical achievement was quite satisfactory. In local Sector, two tanks namely Dongari and Banchai have been taken up, out of which, one is completed and finalised and the other is in progress. The expenditure incurred under this sub-head during 64-65 was Rs. 21.533 lakhs as against budget provision of Rs. 14.13 lakhs. The percentage of expenditure is 152.3

5) Animal Husbandry:- Animal Husbandry has always been an integral part of agriculture. The objective of planning is to gradually eliminate the uneconomic cattle population by the process of mass castration and to transform the present marginal group in the course of time by planned breeding. This necessitates creation of sufficient breeding facilities which imply availability of sufficient number of pedigree bulls supplemented by artificial insemination centres. The development programme contemplated in the district level schemes of this district aims at providing Veterinary

aid facilities for the prevention of contagious diseases and improvement and development of selected breeds of cattle. In this district work of constructing five Veterinary dispensaries have been undertaken and the same is in progress. Two cattle breeders Societies were organised during 64-65. Similarly the target of providing 31 premium bulls during 1964-65 has been fully achieved. The progress of expenditure under this sub-head was quite satisfactory.

6) Dairy Development:- The programme of Dairy Development in this district aims at supply of milk to Sholapur and Udgir Govt. Creamery projects and organisation of milk producers' societies and federations.

Under MLK-3, Ghee refinery has been started at Udgir, late in Sept. '64. Hence expenditure incurred upto March '65 was too low i.e. 0.25 lakhs as compared to Plan provision of Rs. 2.55 lakhs. As regards, achievement, 20 kgs. of cream per day on an average was collected and about 8 kgs. of Ghee was manufactured during 1964-65. Under scheme No. MLK-11, three Unions one at Yermala, in Kalam taluka; Second at Maldurg in Tuljapur taluka and third at Mogha, in Ahmedpur taluka are registered. The dairy societies affiliated to the above Unions are supplying milk. Milk collected at Maldurg and Yermala is supplied to Sholapur Govt. Milk scheme, whereas the milk collected at Mogha dairy Union is supplied to Udgir Govt. Creamery project. The expenditure incurred during 1964-65 was Rs. 0.18 lakhs as against budget provision of Rs. 0.20 lakhs.



7) Forests: The development programme included in the plan aims at survey of unsurveyed forests and to arrest soil erosion on hill slopes by afforestation. The programme further provides for technical guidance and financial assistance to the village panchayats in the form of loans and grants to enable them to develop grazing pastures in lands vested in them. The object of this programme is to encourage village communities to build up remunerative and economic <sup>assets</sup> ~~assets~~. The two schemes namely assistance to V.Ps. for afforestation and afforestation for soil conservation sanctioned under this sub-head, for this district, however, have not been implemented, so far.

8) Fisheries:- The development programme of the district provides for supply of fishery <sup>requisites</sup> ~~requisites~~ viz. 1920 Kg. Nylon 3200 Kg. Cotton twine, 500 yds. S. cloth, and 24000 Nos. Fish hooks. But this scheme could not be implemented in this district, so far, as the fishermen and fisheries co-op. societies of Osmanabad district are economically backward. Two schemes namely stocking of tanks with carp fry and development of fisheries in deep reservoirs are implemented too late in this district and hence expenditure incurred is too low, as compared to plan provision. During 1964-65, 1.68 lakhs of carp fry was stocked and a catch of 320 kgs. was netted.

9) Warehousing and Marketing:- Agricultural production thrives better in an environment where marketing of produce is not subject to malpractices of exploitation. The elements of a programme calculated

to prevent exploitation are timely market information, regulation of markets, Warehousing grading and co-operative marketing of agricultural produce under the scheme of development of Agril. marketing, each market committee is eligible for Rs. 1500/- per year, for meeting the cost of staff maintained for it. Accordingly during 1964-65, the budget provision of Rs. 0.11 lakhs was fully utilised. Seven Market Committees were given subsidy as against the target of four. Under the scheme of development of grading, three graders have been appointed and attached to Market Committees at Latur and Udgir, on a consolidated salary of Rs. 235/- per grader.

10) Co-Operation :- The agrarian economy contemplated under the plan aims at enabling the cultivator to stand on his own feet as an equal partner with the town dweller as a citizen of the country. By making available to him the improved implements a necessary technical guidance, lending him the required money for investing in agriculture, by helping him to market his produce and secure him fair prices and in many other ways, the state Govt. is helping him to help himself. An important link between the above mentioned arrangements for the availability of requisites and services and their actual utilisation by the cultivators is the Co-operative structure which serves both as the agency for channelising the requisites and services to them.

Under the scheme of subsidy to service co-operatives, a budget of Rs. 28000 was fixed, against which

Rs. 11000 were only utilised, as the societies were unable to fulfil the required condition. Under the scheme of uneconomic branches of Central Financing Agencies, the District Central Co-Operative Bank Ltd., Latur, opened five branches during 64-65. The target fixed for subsidy to uneconomic branches was Rs. 45809 and the same was fully utilised. The target fixed for the coverage of agril. population under co-op. fold for 64-65 was 20,000. This target was achieved in this district by taking membership drive in Feb. and March '65, enrolled 19292 members in Agril. Credit Societies. Under the scheme of development of Co-Op. Marketing, it is proposed to grant financial assistance in form of share capital, management subsidy, loan and subsidy for construction of godowns. Expenditure incurred under this scheme was Rs. 11.14 as against the budget provision of Rs. 11.35 lakhs.

With the progressive change in the general outlook about agriculture and agricultural methods, co-operative farming is expected to play a vital role and accordingly there are two schemes included in the dist. plan. Under the scheme of co-operative farming in pilot areas, one co-op. farming society was provided with an assistance of Rs. 0.008 lakhs. Under the scheme of Co-operative farming outside the pilot areas, 10 co-op. farming societies were provided with an assistance of Rs. 0.59 lakhs. Two schemes namely 'Grain Depots. for backward classes' and 'organisation of Co-operatives and persons depending on transport services' are not implemented in this district as the same are dropped by Govt.

### 11) Community Development and Village Panchayats:-

The community Development Programme was started in this district in the year 1954-55, with the object of bringing about an all round social and economic development of the rural population. The development programme included in the Third Five Year Plan envisages opening of 6½ C.P.A. Unit blocks, thus covering the entire district under the programme. The target is fully achieved during the year 1962-63. Expenditure incurred under this scheme was Rs. 34.51 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 33.68 lakhs.

Under the scheme of " financial assistance to Rural Local bodies for local development works programme", local development works, such as approach roads, drinking water wells etc. have been undertaken in this dist. and they are in progress. Expenditure incurred during 1964-65 was Rs. 0.35 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 0.72 lakhs.

The plan provides for giving special financial assistance to village panchayats in backward areas of the district as the normal grants to which they are eligible are found to be short of their requirements. Under this scheme, two villages panchayats are being financed by way of L.R. grants. An amount of Rs. 500/- sanctioned for 64-65 was fully utilised.

### 12) Small Scale Industries:-

The development programme included in the State's third Plan aims at organisation of artisans, Craftmen, and persons engaged in traditional cottage industries

into co-operatives, so that they are enabled to tackle better, their problems of setting up common facilities, obtaining credit, procurement of raw materials and sale of finished products.

The schemes included in the District plan provide for financial assistance of Rs. 2.03 lakh to Handicraft Co-Operative while an assistance of Rs. 3.07 lakhs would be rendered to the Handloom Weavers' Societies during the five years of the plan period. During 1964-65, an assistance of Rs. 0.32 lakhs was provided to 13 handicraft societies. An amount of Rs. 1500/- was given as rebate on sale of handloom cloth to one Handloom Weavers' Co-Op. society. Two new handicraft societies were organised during 1964-65.

13) Road Development:- Even in area well provided with railways, roads play an increasingly important role in the administrative, Social Cultural and economic life of its people. The importance of roads is all the more in Osmanabad district, where the railway length is only 126.99 kilometres, while the road length is 834.91 kilometres at the end of March '65. The basic objective of the road development in any area is to ensure by linking different kinds of roads, such as National Highways, State Highways, Major district roads, other district roads and village approach roads, that people all over the state have all-weather access to places, with which they require contacts for the purpose of supplies, medical aid, education, social, cultural and administrative relationships and above all for the disposal of their produce or services.

Target fixed for construction of district roads for 1964-65 was 11 miles, out of which, work of 8 miles was completed. Twelve new roads with a road length of 231 miles have been taken up, for construction during 1964-65, out of which work of material collection of 117 miles was completed upto March '65. Expenditure incurred under the scheme ' District Roads ' was Rs. 23.856 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 24.00 lakhs.

Under the scheme ' construction of rural roads, target fixed for the construction of approach roads to villages was 185 miles out of which, work of 45 miles was completed. Expenditure incurred was Rs. 0.85 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 1.55 lakhs.

14) Education:- General education as providing the necessary base for the development of human capital is the key to progress. Provision of adequate facilities for education at all stages specially in rural areas where ignorance and illiteracy are rampant and linking up the programmes of education with work and opportunities for employment is therefore one of the main objectives of planning. Under the programme of expansion of primary education, 274 teachers were appointed during 1964-65. The policy of progressively converting primary schools into basic schools is continued in the Third Plan. During 1964-65, 730 teachers received training. There is also a scheme seeking for construction of 120 class rooms for conducting primary classes. Out of this, 80 class rooms were completed and finalised, 13 class rooms practically completed and 6 rooms were in progress upto March '65. Under the scheme of development and opening

of technical high school, Govt. Technical high school, Latur is under development, by providing additional staff and equipments. Expenditure incurred under this scheme during 1964-65 was Rs. 0.67 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 0.60 lakhs.

The State Plan has given high priority to technical education, having regard to the likely level of construction activity during the fifth plan period and expected level of industrialisation by then. The Dist. plan provides for the development of Govt. Polytechnic at Latur, by providing additional staff and equipments. Expenditure incurred during 64-65 was Rs. 1.68 lakhs as against budget provision of Rs. 2.83 lakhs.

15) Public Health:- For all the times, healthy people have constituted rich, wealthy, wise and strong nations. Even in good old days nations have dealt with health problems, at the national level. This problem comes more acute, where there is poverty and illiteracy. In our country, man power is one of the main resources, which must be properly harnessed for development and progress of nation.

Public Health measures include provisions for preventive services, eradication and control of communicable diseases, family planning etc. The Third Plan provides for the maintenance of Primary Health Centres taken over by Public Health Department after stage I period of C.D. block is over. Accordingly three centres are taken over by Public Health Department by the end of March '65. There is a scheme to intensify family planning campaign

by encouraging sterilisation as a positive measure for population control. The programme also provides for establishment of a mobile Vasectomy Unit, in the district, for performing vasectomy operations. In this district 2907 persons have undergone sterilisation operations during 1964-65, as against target of 3207. The scheme of malaria control has been continued in the Third Plan and the surveillance Units set up for detecting malaria parasites in human beings with a view to eliminate them, have continued their work. One more scheme namely B.C.G. Vaccination for T.B. Control has been continued in the Third Plan of the district. The object of the scheme is to take protective measures against T.B. by mass B.C.G. Vaccination, for securing immunity from T.B. The expenditure incurred during 1964-65, on all the above-mentioned schemes, was satisfactory.

The provision of pure drinking water supply in villages is the most important among the rural amenities. It was been the policy of the Govt. that every village in the state which has no public source of drinking water should be provided with facilities of pure drinking water. The primary responsibility for providing this amenity has now been fixed on rural local bodies viz. village panchayats. It is therefore proposed that hereafter programme for rural water supply should be taken by rural local authorities, on public participation basis except for work which have already been started or for which commitments have been made by Govt. Under well water supply scheme, work of 75 wells have been undertaken, in the Third Five Year Plan. The work could not



be started during 1964-65, for want of cement, explosive materials and shortage of technical hands. Expenditure incurred was Rs. 0.01 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 0.003 lakhs.

16) Housing:- Housing condition in the country is appalling. The quality of structures is also equally appalling. The deficiency is more acute in urban areas where the absence of proper town planning and neglect of housing for low income groups have resulted in congestion. The situation is steadily worsening on account of inadequate programme of house construction not keeping pace with the growth of population. A housing programme of Rs. 8.35 lakhs has been included in the district plan. Under village housing project scheme, programme of constructing houses has been undertaken. Expenditure incurred during 64-65 under this scheme was Rs. 1.97 lakhs as against budget provision of Rs. 2.00 lakhs. Under the scheme of extension of village Gaothans and provision of house sites, villages developed and area covered in acres were 55 villages and 165 acres as against target of 80 villages and 300 acres respectively. Expenditure incurred under this scheme was Rs. 0.76 lakhs as against plan provision of Rs. 0.79 lakhs. The schemes namely subsidised industrial housing, and low income group housing were not implemented in this district upto 1964-65.

17) Social Welfare:-

The programme envisaged in the District Plan aims at extension of the welfare services for women and children through the social welfare Extension Projects set up,

by the State Social Welfare Advisory Board. During 1964-65, 11 balawadies, 1 literacy class and 12 Arts and craft classes were started in the district.

13) Labour and Labour Welfare:- The development programme for labour and labour welfare provides for improvement of the working conditions, recreational facilities and facilities for training of industrial workers to enable them to learn alternative trades during periods of unemployment. Under the scheme of technical and Vocational training, work of constructing main building and work shop for industrial training institute at Latur has been undertaken and the work is in progress. Expenditure incurred during 1964-65 was Rs. 3.00 lakhs, as against budget provision of Rs. 3.43 lakhs. Under the scheme of extension of employment services, Employment Assistance and Information Bureau has been opened at Ahmedpur from 16-7-64. Thus the plan target is fully achieved. Scheme of Collection of employment market information is a staff scheme. But no staff was appointed upto March'65, for want of sanction. Scheme was being implemented with the existing staff of District Employment Office.
