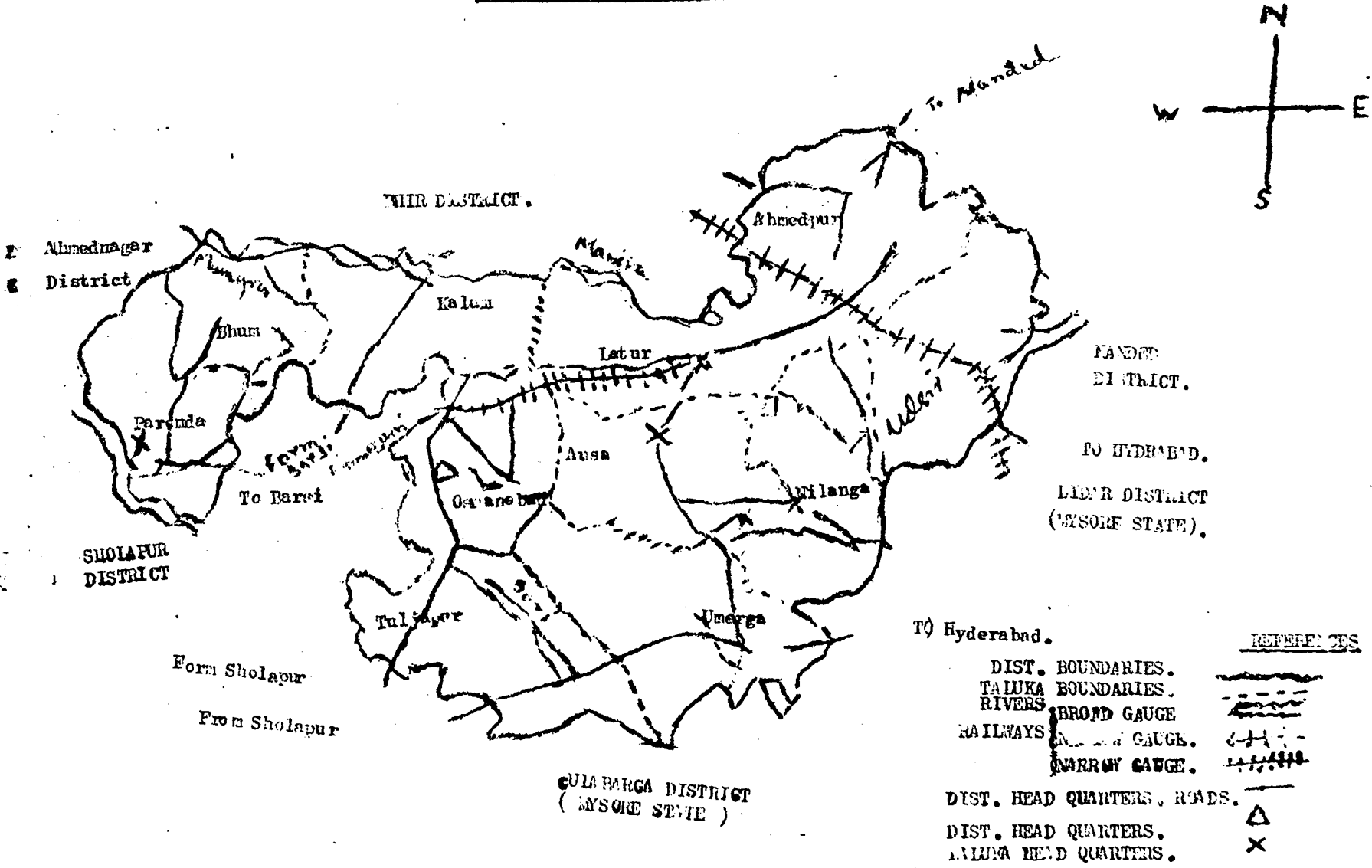



: CHAPTER I :
: INTRODUCTION :

1.1: Introduction and Location.

The age-long famous temple at Taljapur town of this district enshrines Bhavani, the popular deity of Maharashtra. The cult of Goddess is very ancient one and finds mention even in Vedas where she is called " Aditi ". The earliest inscriptional evidence regarding its antiquity can not go beyond 1398 A.D. The Goddess was the principal deity of Chatrapati Shivaji and the Chatrapatis and Peshwas donated quite generously to the temple. Tagara, modern Ter of this district is also an ancient place. It finds mention by

Ptolemy in his work " Periplus of Eyrathrean sea " (1st Century A.D.). Here an ancient Buddhist chaitya has been converted in later period into a Brahmical shrine by installing the image of God Veshnu and is at present known as Trivikrama temple. Ter is also the native place of poet saint Gora Kumbhar. The Rashtrakutas who succeeded chalukyas of Badami in 753 A.D. had their epithet " LATTANRAPURIA-VAHADHISA " suggested that they were the inhabitants of Latur. ३

Osmabad district is to the extreme south of Maharashtra and lies between $17^{\circ}35'$ and $18^{\circ}40'$ North latitude and $75^{\circ}16'$ and $76^{\circ}40'$ East longitude. The Sholapur-Auragabad road passes through the district and its two towns of Osmabad and Taljapur. The Latur-Hiraj railway line and the Parli-Hyderabad railway line (both of the Central railway pass through this district. Latur is the biggest railway station in this district. But Sholapur is the more convenient railway station for the inhabitants of this district which is located on Bombay-Madras main line.

1.2:- Boundaries:

Osmanabad district is bounded by Sholapur district on the south, Bhir district on its north, Nanded district and Bidar district (Mysore State) on its east and Ahmednagar and Sholapur districts to its west. Sholapur city is the nearest district headquarter about 43 miles (68.8 Kms) from Osmanabad town and it has therefore close commercial and social ties with Sholapur city. Barsi taluka in Sholapur district is almost surrounded by the Osmanabad district. Next to Sholapur Bhir town is about 80 miles (128.0 Kms.) from the Osmanabad town and is nearly half way on the road connecting Aurangabad with Osmanabad towns. Nanded town is about 136 miles (217.6 Kms.) and directly connected with Osmanabad town by state Transport Bus service between Nanded and Sholapur.

1.3:- Administrative Set up:

Osmanabad town is the head quarter of Osmanabad district which was named after Meer Osman Ali Khan the Nizan of Ex-Hyderabad State on the occasion of his coronation in 1910. The original name of Osmanabad town was ' Dharashiv '. Maldurg was the head quarter of this dist. before 1861. This district was included in Hyderabad State in 1853, and formed its part and parcel upto 1956. During States Reorganisation in 1956 this district was merged in bi-lingual Bombay State on Ist November, 1956 and was subsequently included in Maharashtra on Ist May 1960. This district formerly consisted of eight talukas viz.

1) Osmanabad 2) Tuljapur, 3) Parenda, 4) Bhun, 5) Kalam

6) Latur, 7) Ausa and 8) Umarga in former Hyderabad State. After the Re-organisation of States, three talukas viz. 1) Nilanga, 2) Udgir and 3) Ahmedpur of the former Bidar district of Hyderabad State (now merged in Mysore State) having an area of 1,777.3 Sq. Miles (4,603.2 Sq. Kms.) were transferred to this district. Under the States Re-organisation Act 1956. This district consisting of 11 talukas is presently in Aurangabad Division called as Marathwada comprising five districts of 1) Aurangabad, 2) Parbhani, 3) Nanded, 4) Bhir and 5) Osmanabad. Almost all district offices of Osmanabad district are located at Osmanabad town which is situated on bank of river 'Bhogawati'. Yedshi is the nearest railway Station about 13 miles from the Osmanabad town. Among the districts of Marathwada, Osmanabad had the biggest area under the Nizams' own Crown Estate called 'Sarf-e-Khas'. The 'Sarf-e-Khas' was merged with the Government area under the Sarf-e-Khas (merger) Regulation in the year 1949. All the Jagir areas were abolished and taken over under direct Govt. administration in the same year. There are 13 towns having Municipalities and 1,388 inhabited villages in this district.

In 1951 census there were 19 towns, but as the definition of town was changed in 1961 census, only 13 of them were classified as towns. Out of 13 town 11 are taluka headquarters. Latur, Osmanabad, and Udgir have got City Municipalities and all other remaining 10 towns have Town Municipalities.

All the 11 taluka places mentioned above are taluka Head quarter towns in addition to Murum (in Umerga taluka) and Valdurg (in Tuljapur Taluka) towns.

There are in all 1,423 revenue villages in this district, and out of these revenue villages 12 villages are merged in urban areas and 23 villages are uninhabited villages.

The Collector is incharge of general administration, law and order, treasury, land revenue and civil supplies,. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector

in his office and three Deputy Collectors who hold charge of the three revenue divisions and have their headquarters at Osmanabad, Latur and Udgir respectively. Ten Tahsildars are incharge of ten taluka offices and the Joint-Tahsildar is incharge of Bhum Mahal.

Zilla Parishad Pattern.

The Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad came into existence on 1st May 1962. The Parishad consists of 53 members, out of which, 52 are elected, 4 are associated members and 2 are lady co-opted members. The talukawise distribution of elected members is as under.

Latur 4) Chairman, District Co-Operative Board, Osmanabad. The President, Vice-President and two Chairmen incharge of different committees are amongst the elected members. The President is in-charge of the Zilla Parishad Meetings and Standing Committees. The Vice-President is the Chairman of Health and Works Department Committees. There are two other Chairman one in-charge of Education and Finance Department Committees and the other incharge of Agril. Animal Husbandry, Co-Operative and Industries Departments, Committees. For Administration purpose, the Chief Executive Officer is the head of the Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad consists of 11 branches. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer, assists the Chief Executive Officer, in the overall administration. The names of branches and the concerned heads of departments are as under:-

The Zilla Parishad, Osmanabad has increased its income by increasing the local cess from Rs. 0.40 to Re. 1.00 i.e. local cess is being recovered from Agricultural equal to land Revenue.

1.4 Area:

The area of Osmanabad district is 5,510.3 square miles (14,271.7 Sq. Kms.), according to the figures furnished by the Surveyor General of India which is 22.05% of the area of Marathwada and 4.68% of the area of Maharashtra. The rural area of this district is 5,345.5 sq. miles (13,845.0 Sq. Kms.) and the urban area is 164.8 sq. miles (426.7 sq. Kms.). The area reported by the Director of Land Records, Maharashtra, for Osmanabad district is 5,504 sq. miles. In Marathwada Region this district is next to the Aurangabad District in size. In terms of area Osmanabad district ranks seventh among the 26 districts of Maharashtra. The average area of a district of Marathwada works out to 5,135 sq. miles and the average area per district in Maharashtra is 4,556 sq. miles.

1.5: Topography:

A major portion of this district is a laterite plateau with an average height of 2,000 feet above sea level. This district is covered with small hills and offshoots of Balaghat. Parts of Bhum, AUSA, Kalam, Osmanabad and Tuljapur talukas are situated on Balaghat ranges and unlike other talukas which are situated on table land.

The district lies partly in the upper Godavari basin and partly in the Bhima basin. Ahmedpur, Udgir, Kalam, AUSA, Letur, and Nilanga talukas are situated on the Plateau of the Balaghat and lie in the valley of the Manjra which is an important tributary of the Godavari. Osmanabad and Umerga talukas are drained by the Terna, an important feeder of the Manjra. Paranda taluka and parts of Bhum mahal, Tuljapur and Umerga talukas are in the basin of the Sina river which is a tributary of the Bhima.

Bhum town commands the highest elevation of 2,500 feet from sea level whereas Paronda town has the least ^{height} of 1,735 feet from sea level amongst the towns of the district.

The average height of the plateau is 2,000 feet above sea level. The low land portion to the south of the plateau lies in the Bhima basin.

1.6: Hills, River system, Soils:

The main system of hills is the Balaghat and its offshoots. A branch of the Balaghat enters the district from the north-west corner from Ahmednagar and stretches to the south-east. It divides the district into two portions, a plateau to the north-east and east and low lands to the west, south-west and south. The general slope of the plateau is from south-west, to north-east.

There are two broad natural zones in the district viz. 1) The Balaghat plateau drained by Manjira and Terna rivers and their tributaries, and 2) the Southern low land plain which is in the Bhima basin. The river Manjira flows on the northern border and demarcates this district from the Bhir district. In addition, due to hill ranges the district abounds in a net work of rivulets running from all sides.

The Manjira which rises in Patoda taluka of Bhir district runs towards east along with the northern boundary as far as the north-eastern corner of Latur taluka where it

takes a southerly direction before entering Bidar district of the Mysore State. Its length in the district is about 65 miles.

The Terna flows from west to east in Osmanabad, Ausa, Umerga and Nilanga talukas and meets Manjra river near the eastern boundary of the district. The Manyad is also a tributary of the Manjra. It flows towards north-east through Ahmedpur taluka and enters Wanded district to meet the Manjra on the eastern boundary of the district. The Towerje which drains Latur taluka joins the Manjra at Siwani village. The Sina flows on the western border of Paranda taluka from north to south. The Bori flows through Tuljapur and joins the Sina river lower down in Sholapur district. Even though there are a number of small rivers and revulets streaming in the district like the Bori in Tuljapur taluka or the Manyad in Ahmedpur taluka or the Bennitura in Umerga taluka or the Banganga in Bhum taluka, they are practically dry for most part of the year as the water from them drains out of this district from the high plateau. This leads to considerable shortage of water in the district.

There are small tanks like Balubhai and Ramdhara in Tuljapur taluka, and Kala and Lal Lakes in Nilanga taluka. The water is used for drinking purpose as well as for irrigation.

The soil can be divided into 3 zones viz. 1) The eastern part consisting of Ahmedpur, Udgir talukas and part of Latur and Ausa talukas, 2) Osmanabad, Kalam talukas

and part of Latur, Ausa and Umerga talukas, 3) Tuljapur, Parenda and Bhun talukas.

The first zone consists in general of light and light medium soils. They are of inferior type, not retentive of moisture and are, therefore, suitable only for cultivation of Kharif crops. The soils in some parts of Nilanga are of laterite type.

The second zone consists of changing types of soils. Heavy, deep black cotton soils as against shallow light soils are found in this zone. Due to this peculiarity of the soil, both kharif and rabi crops are ~~gwn~~ grown in this area. Broadly it can be said that eastern parts of Osmanabd, Latur, Ausa and Kalam talukas grow more kharif crops than of rabi crops, while the western parts of these talukas predominantly grow rabi crops.

The third zone consists of heavy soils which are more retentive of moisture. Hence rabi crops are the major crops in this area. The mountainous ranges in this zone have formed, typical strips ~~xxxx~~ suitable for paddy growing. This is a peculiarity of this zone. Even though the soil types are classified above on a broad basis, varieties in types of soils are ^{found} ~~xxxx~~ within the talukas and more within the zones categorised above.

The forests in this district are scattered but are some what dense in Tuljapur, Kalam and Udgir talukas. But comparatively there are less forests in this dist. This has resulted in soil erosion to a large extent.

1.7: Climate Temperature and rainfall.

As the district forms part of the Deccan plateau, its climate is dry and is subject to extremes. The year can be divided into rainy season from middle of June to the end of September, a sultry period from about the end of September to the middle of November, winter from the middle of November to the end of January, a dry period during February and March and Summer during April, May and the middle of June. Summer is, in general full of gales and gusty winds. Even though the variation in temperature is large in general, and the weather is subject to extremes of heat or cold, to some extent, the summer season in the district is cooler than in the other districts of Marathwada region. This is due to the fact that the district is situated at a higher altitude. In general the climate of Osmanabad district is considered to be bracing and salubrious.

Osmanabad district gets rains from South west monsoon like other districts of Deccan plateau and the rains start in the middle of June, become intense in July and cease by the end of September. The normal rainfall of the Osmanabad district is about 31" (787. mms.). But it is observed that it has increased during the last few years. Among the various talukas, on the east and Tulia-pur and Osmanabad talukas on the west usually get about 1,123.00 mm. or 45" of rainfall. Ausa, Umerga and Nilanga talukas usually get 1,346.20 to 1,016.00 mm or 53" to 40" of rainfall, while Parenda and Bhum talukas get

near about 762.00 to 888.00 mm. or 30" to 35" of rainfall. This part comes in the shadow of Western Ghats and is therefore, called "rain shadow" area. Because of the low rainfall in the Parenda and Bhum talukas there is always a fear of scarcity and shortage of water. It may be noted that these talukas are adjacent to the Ahmednagar district, which is frequently hit by scarcity. These talukas are hilly and are backward as compared to the other talukas in Osmanabad district. The northern part of Ahmedpur taluka is also some times affected by scarcity of water. But in general Osmanabad district is not considered as a scarcity area.

The Fact Finding Committee appointed by the former Government of Bombay in 1960 has reported that rainfall is not dependable in the following areas and they are likely to be affected by scarcity conditions as shown below.

The highest rainfall recorded at Ahmedpur was 1,235.63 mms. and the lowest recorded at Parenda was 551.4 mms. during the year 1961. In 1962 the highest rainfall was recorded at Osmanabad 1,146.6 mms. and the lowest at Ahmedpur 841.1 mms. In 1963 the highest rainfall was recorded at Udgir, 1,184.2 mms. and the lowest was recorded at Parenda 603.7 mms. In 1964 the highest rainfall recorded at Osmanabad was 1,048.6 and lowest recorded at Kalam 621.1 mms.

EXPLANATORY NOTES ON THE TABLES INCLUDED IN THE
DISTRICT STATISTICAL ABSTRACT 1965-66

1. CLIMATE

Table No. 1.1 :- This table deals with the number of rainy days and total rainfall at selected centres in Osmanabad district during 1961 and 1965. From the above table it can be seen that during the year 1961, highest rainfall was recorded at Ahmadpur i.e. (1, 155 Mms) and the lowest at Bhum i.e. (347.80 Mms). Even in the year 1965, Ahmadpur was the taluka to receive the highest rainfall i.e. (647.60 Mms) and the lowest was recorded at Nilanga i.e. (348.33 Mms). The average rainfall of Osmanabad district was 629.52 Mms in 1961 and the same was decreased to 503.72 Mms in 1965.

2. AREA & POPULATION

Table No. 2.1 :- This table indicate talukewise rural and urban population and density of population according to 1961 census together with variation in population during last 50 years.

~~Percentage~~ increase in population was 9.85 in 1951 over 1941 population and 22.12 in 1961 over 1951 population. The percentage variation in district population during 1901 to 1961 was + 89.95. The rate of increase in the population appears to be high during the last decade. The general density of population in the district was 84 persons per square kilometre in 1961. It is a very significant fact that density per sq. kilometre in rural areas in Osmanabad district, is more than in any other district in Aurangabad Division and even slightly more than that of Maharashtra State, due to perhaps the absence of any urbanisation worth the name. Villages in Osmanabad district on an average are more thickly populated than those in any other district in Aurangabad Division and Maharashtra State. The density per

square kilometre in urban areas in Osmanabad district, is very low when compared to urban density in any other district in Aurangabad Division. Latur taluka is the most thickly populated, whereas Tuljapur taluka is the most sparsely populated. The obvious reason for highest density of Latur taluka is due to Latur town being a commercial and an industrial centre in the district.

Table No. 2.2 :- This table indicates classification of villages according to population ranges according to 1961 census in Osmanabad/district. Out of 1388 inhabited as many as 933 villages or 67% of the total number of villages have population of less than 1000 each showing that the district comprises an overwhelming majority of small villages. Average population per village in Osmanabad/district works out to 950. One of the reasons for this is that the district is mainly dependent on agriculture.

Table No. 2.3:- This table gives talukawise classification of towns according to population ranges in 1961 census. Out of 13 towns 7 towns fall in population range of 5000 to 9999 and 4 towns in the range of 10,000 to 19,999. Latur alone has a population of more than Forty thousand and this is obviously because of its commercial and industrial importance. Osmanabad and Udgir towns are the other two big towns. The slow growth in population of Osmanabad town, though a district head quarter, is on account of keen commercial and industrial competition it faces from Sholapur city and Barseil and Latur towns. Osmanabad town also suffers from stunted growth due to absence of railway.

Table No. 2.4 :- This table gives data on number of workers in each taluka of Osmanabad district. As much as 83.5% of the population in the district is dependent on agriculture and the remaining 16.5% of it is dependent on non-agricultural occupations. The district ranks 3rd amongst the 26 districts of Maharashtra in so far the number of workers engaged in agriculture including labourers are concerned.

Table No. 2.5 :- This table gives number of non-workers in each taluka of Osmanabad district. Due to more student population in urban area, the percentage of non-workers there seems to be higher than in rural areas amongst other reasons. The number of females for 1000 males amongst non-workers is higher in urban areas when compared to rural areas everywhere. Non-workers form 49.00% of the total population of the district.

Table No. 2.6 :- This table gives scheduled castes and scheduled tribes population in Osmanabad district. Scheduled casts and scheduled tribe population in the district is 13.39% and 0.03% respectively to the total population of the district. Out of them 1,85,799 persons belonging to scheduled castes are in rural areas and 12,093 in urban areas. None of the persons belonging to scheduled tribes reside in urban areas. The population of scheduled castes appears to be almost uniformly distributed in all the talukas. However, it is comparatively more in Udgir, Ahmedpur, Nilanga, and Osmanabad talukas. The population of scheduled tribes appears to be concentrated in Kallam, Osmanabad, Nilanga and Parenda talukas.

Table No. 2.7: This table gives population of urban areas in Osmanabad district. The urban population of the district constitutes 10.59% of its total population. The three towns of Udgir, Latur and Osmanabad together constitutes nearly 50% of the total urban population of the district.

3. AGRICULTURE

Table No. 3.1 :- This table deals with land utilization statistics during 1964-65. May portion of the land was available for cultivation. Next in order was the fallow land the percent of which was 14.59% to the total geographical area. Barren and unculturable land, and land put to non-agricultural use together accounted for 2.79%. The proportion of cultivable waste was 1.53% and that of permanent pastures was 2.78%. Only a fraction of the total land was under forest i.e. 0.90%. The net area sown increased by 4.87% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. Area sown more than once decreased by 1.47% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. Nilanga taluka with its 27.32% stood first in respect of area sown more than once during 1964-65.

Table No. 3.2 :- This table deals with the area under different crops in each taluka of Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1964-65. The area under food crops during the year 1961-62 was 75.98% of the total net area sown and the same was 75.13% during 1964-65. The area under non-food crops was 28.04% in 1961-62 of the total net area sown and the same rose to 28.53% during 1965-66. In all 53.37% of the total net area sown was covered by cereals during the year 1961-62 and the same decreased to 52.46% in 1964-65. Of the total net area sown in 1961-62 kharif Jowar accounted for 19.42% and the same increased to 20.11% in 1964-65. The area under Rabi Jowar during 1961-62 was 22.79% of the net area sown and the same decreased to 20.54% in 1964-65. Similarly the area under cotton was 5.73% of the total net area sown and the same decreased to 4.42% in 1964-65. The area under oilseeds during 1961-62 was 20.08% of the total net area sown and it rose to 21.50% in 1964-65. The area under

groundnut was 12.22% of the total net "gross cropped area" in year 1961-62 and the same increased to 13.68% in 1964-65. The gross cropped area in the district increased by 4.62% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62.

Table No. 3.3 :- This table gives the information regarding yield per hectare and out-turn of principal crops in Osmanabad district in the year 1961-62 and 1964-65. From the table it can be seen that the out-turn of rice increased by 28.23% during 1964-65 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. However out-turn of wheat showed a decline of 6.18% during 1964-65 than the figure of 1961-62. The out-turn of Jowar also decreased by 20.53% during 1964-65 as compared to the figure of 1961-62. The out-turn of Bajra showed an increase of 8.33% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62. The out-turn of cereals as a whole decreased by 16.36% in 1964-65 than what it was in 1961-62. There was a decline of 18.69% in the out-turn of gram in 1964-65. The out-turn of Tur increased by 11.11% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62. The out-turn of Pulses as a whole decreased by 5.96% in 1964-65 than what it was in 1961-62. The out-turn of sugarcane increased by 30.43% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62. The out-turn of groundnut increased by 19.79% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62. The out-turn of sesamum however decreased by 6.25% in 1964-65 than that of the out-turn in 1961-62. There was a decrease of 50% in the out-turn of tobacco in 1964-65 than what it was in 1961-62.

Table No. 3.4 :- This table deals with the area irrigated by different sources in each taluka of Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1964-65. It is seen that the area irrigated in the district increased by 17% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62 and similarly the total gross area irrigated increased by 18.38% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62. There is a preponderance of well irrigation in this district. Of the total net irrigated area in 1964-65, the area irrigated by wells was:

92.95% and irrigated by Government Canals worked out at 3.04%. The area irrigated by tanks was very negligible being only 0.27%. The area irrigated by other sources was 0.73% in 1964-65. Kallam taluka with its 20.85% and Udgir taluka with its 1.35% stood first and last respectively in respect of irrigation by wells. The area irrigated by wells increased by 15.94% in 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62.

Table No. 3.5:- This table deals with the area irrigated under different crops in each taluka of Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1964-65. It is evident from the above table that 96.78% of the gross irrigated area was under food crops and 3.22% under non-food crops in the year 1964-65. Of the total gross and 3.22% under non-food crops in the year 1964-65. Of the total gross area irrigated cereals accounted for 63.04% during the year 1964-65 showing an increase of 7.58% over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. The percentage of irrigated area under pulses to the total irrigated area was 4.61 during the year 1964-65 reflecting, however, a decrease compared to the previous figure of 1961-62. Sugarcane accounted for 10.36% during the year 1964-65, which showed an increase of 28.04% over the figure of 1961-62. Within the district Ausa Taluka accounts for major area under rice, (i.e 41%). Of the total area irrigated under cotton Paranda claimed 55.29% which was the highest.

Table No. 3.6(a):- This table gives the number of irrigation wells in each taluka of Osmanabad district during 1961-62 and 1964-65. Of the total number of wells in the district in 1961-62 about 88% of wells were in use. The total number of wells increased by 14.80% during 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62.

The number of wells in use increased by 15.32% during 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62. Kallam taluka with its claim of 10.06% wells stood first during 1964-65 where as Bhim taluka ranked last (i.e. 4.63%) in this respect.

Table No. 3.6(b)

This table deals with the minor irrigation works in Osmanabad district as on 31-3-66. Of the total irrigated land only 21.36% was irrigated by Zilla Parishad irrigation works and the rest i.e. 78.64% was irrigated by state Government irrigation works.

Table No. 3.6 (c) :-

This table shows the major and medium irrigation projects in Osmanabad district as on 30-6-66. Khasepur Project irrigated an area of 1,680 hectares which was the highest. Thirna project was next to follow in this regard with its irrigated area of 1,135.83 hectares. The total area irrigated by four projects namely Khasepur, Chandni, Thirna and Harni was 4300.67 hectares as on 30-6-66. The work of Kurnoor project was in progress.

Table No. 3.7

This table deals with the percentage distribution of households engaged in cultivation classified by interest in land and size of land cultivation in Osmanabad district according to 1961 Census.

In all 81.86% of the cultivating households cultivate their own lands and 4.36% of them cultivate leased in lands. The remaining 13.78% of them cultivate lands which were partly owned and partly taken on lease. The following table shows the percentage distribution of cultivation holdings in 1961 according to their different sizes.

In all 96.15% of the cultivating households which cultivated land owned or held from Govt. were from rural areas and 91.92% of them which cultivated land held from private persons or institutions on payment in money kind or share were also from rural areas. Similarly 97.13% of the cultivating households which cultivated lands partly held from Govt. and partly from private persons were also from rural areas.

Table No. 3.8 :-

This table indicates the agricultural wage rates prevailing in Osmanabad district in the year 1965 and 1966. The average wage rates at Killari centre for unskilled males were Rs. 1.80 in 1965 and Rs. 1.93 in 1966 and for females Rs. 0.79 and Rs. 0.89 in respective years. The average wage rates at Mankeshwar centre for unskilled males were Rs. 1.49 in 1965 and 1.82 in 1966 and for females Rs. 0.79 and 0.89 in 1965 and 1966 respectively. The wage rates of skilled labour at Kingon centre were Rs. 3.21 for carpenters,

Rs. 3.04 for blacksmith and Rs. 2.67 for cobblers in the year 1965 and the same were increased to Rs. 3.50, Rs. 3.50 and Rs. 3.42 respectively. The average wage rates of skilled labour at Killari centre were Rs. 2.00 for carpenters, Rs. 2.00 for blacksmiths and Rs. 2.00 for cobblers and same rates were observed to be prevailing in 1966. The wage rates at Mankeshwar centre for skilled labour were Rs. 2.98 for carpenters, Rs. 2.81 for blacksmiths and Rs. 1.85 for cobblers in the year 1965. In the year 1966 the wage rates for carpenters, blacksmiths and cobblers were Rs. 2.98, Rs. 2.92 and Rs. 1.91 respectively.

Table No. 3.9 :-

This table shows the number of agricultural implements in each taluka of Osmanabad district in 1966. Of the total ploughs enumerated, Iron ploughs formed 49.21% and wooden ploughs formed 50.79%. Of the total sugarcane crushers 43.46% were poweroperated and the rest i.e. 56.54% were operated with the help of bullocks. Majority of the total pumps (i.e. 87.60) were operated by oil engines, and electric pumps accounted for only 13.40% of the total pumps. There were 116 oil ghans in the district. From the same table it can be observed that Udgir accounted for 40.18% of the district total of wooden ploughs. The maximum percentage of iron ploughs was in Kalam taluka (i.e. 13.20) & the least was in ~~Udgir~~ taluka (i.e. 2.73). Maximum percentage of sugarcane crushers was in ~~Udgir~~ taluka (i.e. 12.12) and the lowest percentage of oil engines was found in ~~Udgir~~ Parenda taluka (i.e. 4.52). From the same table it can be seen that the maximum percentage of oil engines, was in ~~Udgir~~ Umarga taluka (i.e. 21.96) and the lowest was in Osmanabad taluka (i.e. 3.77). The number of electric pumps was significantly more in Umarga Assa, Tuljapur and Latur talukas due to availability of power

Umarga with its total electric pumps stood first in this respect.

Table No. 3.10

This table deals with famine, scarcity and akin to scarcity data in Osmanabad district for the year 1965-66. No. famine or scarcity was declared in this district during 1965-66.

(4) ANIMAL HUSBANDRY & FISHERIES

Table No. 4.1 :- This table gives categorywise livestock population of important animals in each taluka as per 1966 livestock census. From the table it can be seen that the higher number of cattle and buffaloes (88,587 and 31,721 respectively) were found in Osmanabad taluka of the district. The total livestock population in Udgir was the highest being 1,45,409 where as the lowest number was recorded in Osmanabad taluka being 29,911. The highest number of cows (11,622) was found in Udgir taluka where as Osmanabad taluka stood last in this respect. Umerga taluka stood first in claiming the highest number of sheep (i.e. 10,241) where as Osmanabad taluka stood last (2,023) in this respect. As far as goats are concerned Parenda taluka stood first in registering the highest number (i.e. 32,255) where as Osmanabad taluka stood last (i.e. 5,210) in this respect. The proportion of poultry population was high (i.e. 18,319) in Umerga taluka and the same was observed to be low in Kallam taluka (i.e. 6,403). The net cultivable area per pair of bullocks worked out at 9.52 hectares.

Table No. 4.2 :- This table gives the statistics regarding veterinary aid facilities available in each taluka of Osmanabad district. There were two fullfledged veterinary hospitals located at Osmanabad and Udgir towns. In addition there were 16 veterinary dispensaries located at different taluka headquarters and big villages during the year 1965-66. The number of dispensaries increased by 60% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. The number of animals treated in these hospitals increased by 15.11% during 1965-66 over those

treated in 1961-62. The percentage of animals treated in dispensaries also increased by 32.21% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. The number of animals treated in aid centres showed an upward trend resulting in an increase of 28.39% during 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. The number of insemination centres rose from one in 1961-62 to five in 1965-66. The number of animals inseminated also increased by 15.29% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. The veterinary dispensaries and aid centres undertake preventive as well as curative measures against animal diseases. Udgir taluka accounted for the highest number of animals treated in the district during 1965-66.

Table No. 4.3 :- This table deals with the disease-wise live-stock mortality in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. During the year 1961-62 the percentage of deaths to number of attacks was 24.13 and the same was reduced to 6.19 during the year 1965-66. During the year 1965-66 the number of attacks increased tremendously i.e. four times over the corresponding figure of 1961-62 due to the outbreak of foot and mouth disease. It is seen that Ranikhet disease took a heavy toll of poultry population.

Table No. 4.4 :- This table deals with the number of recognised slaughter houses and animals slaughtered in each slaughter house in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. There was no increase in the number of recognised slaughter houses during 1961-62 and 1965-66. Only three big towns namely Latur, Osmanabad and Udgir were having recognised slaughter houses. The number of animals slaughtered increased by 24.70% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62.

Table No. 4.5 :- This table gives the area under forest in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. There was no change in the forest area during 1965-66 as compared to that of 1961-62. There was no reserved or protected forest in the district. An unclassified forest covered an area of 1,522 hectares in this district. The area under forest, however, is negligible in relation to the total geographical area of the district.

Table No. 4.6:- This table deals with the major and minor forest products in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. The value of total forest products was very negligible. It amounted to Rs. 1,525 during the year 1965-66.

(5) INDUSTRIES, MINING & ELECTRICITY

Table No. 5.1 :- This table gives the data regarding number of working factories and average daily number of workers employed during 1963 & 1964 . There were two cotton ginning and baling factories and one gur factory during 1963 & 64. The units engaged in ^{the} manufacture of edible oil increased by 7.69% in the year 1964 over the corresponding figure in 1963. The total number of factories in 1964 increased by 4.35% over 1963 whereas the average daily number of workers increased by 6.47% in 1964 over the corresponding figure in the preceding year. The district of Osmanabad ^{district} is devoid of any industry worth the name. The industrial backwardness of the district is due to lack of railway transport and lack of forest produce and mineral wealth. There is a possibility of more Agro-Oriented industries being set up in future.

Table No. 5.2 :- This table indicates the distribution of factories according to the category of industry and the number of workers therein. Majority of factories could be termed as Agro industries like cotton ginning and pressing, oil Mills etc. Which are mostly concentrated at Latur, Udgir and Osmanabad towns.

Table No. 5.3 :- This table gives the distribution of factories according to number of days worked in Osmanabad district . It is seen that most of the factory units in the district are of seasonal nature, barring a few units engaged in manufacture of food (other than beverages) and workshops engaged in repair of motor vehicles engaged at Latur town.

Table No. 5.4 :- This table indicates the statistics regarding handlooms and powerlooms operating in Osmanabad district. During the year 1964-65 there were 211 handlooms and 15 powerlooms. During the year 1965-66 however, the number of handlooms and powerlooms decreased to 12 and 10 respectively. The production of handlooms decreased by 63.64% during the year 1965-66 than ^{what} it was in 1964-65. The production of powerlooms increased by 137.50% in the same year. The average daily employment in handlooms decreased by 41.37% and that of powerlooms increased comparatively by 209.30% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1964-65.

Table No. 5.5 :- This table gives month-wise information regarding number of registrations made, number of vacancies notified and the Employment Exchange in Osmanabad district. Registration for seeking employment found to be on the increase during June and July following the declaration of examination results. During the year 1965-66 registration increased by 35.13% over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. The number on live register increased by 31.44% during 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. Placements also increased by 15.37% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. It may be seen from this table that nearly all persons who were provided with employment were employed in the public sector. This was obviously because of the insignificant commercial and industrial activities in this district.

Table No. 5.6 :- This table deals with the registrations and placements according to national classification of occupation in Osmanabad district during 1963-64 to 1965-66. From table it can be seen that the number regarding registrations increased by 0.75% in 1965-66 over the figure of 1963-64. The number of placements decreased by 45.1% in 1965-66 as compared to the figures of 1963-64. The following table shows percentage distribution of placements made in different occupational groups in the district during the year 1965-66.

More than 85% of the registered persons were placed in professional, technical and clerical jobs.

Table No. 5.7 :- This table indicates the changes in the volume of employment in Osmanabad district during the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. The study of the table revealed that 5.27% of the total employees reported were in trade, commerce and miscellaneous, 11.09% in construction, 2.14% in manufacturing and 1.25% in agricultural establishments.

Table No. 5.8 :- This table gives the information regarding industries in Osmanabad district, their productive capital, employment, gross output and value added for the year 1961. There were only 23 registered factories in Osmanabad district in the year 1961. Of the total factories 78.26% were manufacturing food preparations and 21.74% belonged to other types. Food preparation factories accounted for 26.83% and all others accounted for 73.17% of the total productive capital. Miscellaneous food preparation factories employed 33.80% and other types of factories employed 66.20% of the total workers. The gross out-put of miscellaneous food preparation factories was 84.84% and that of other types was 15.16%. Of the value added by factories, miscellaneous food preparation factories accounted for 45.28% and that of other types accounted for 54.72%. It can be seen from the above table that majority of factories belonged to food preparation as the raw material of the sort was easily available in this district.

Table No. 5.9: - This table gives the statistics relating to generation and consumption of electricity in Osmanabad district during 1964-65 and 1965-66. From this table it can be seen that there was no change in installed capacity during the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. Electricity generated decreased by 20% during 1965-66 than what it was in 1964-65. Electricity purchased significantly increased and the increase was more than double over the corresponding figure of 1964-65. Remarkable increase is also observed in electricity sold. As compared to previous years figures domestic consumption increased by ~~28.86%~~, commercial light and small power by 25.18% during the year 1965-66. Industrial power and public lighting also increased by 41.96% and 17.20% respectively during the period 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1964-65.

Table No. 5.10. :- This table indicates the number of towns and villages electrified and population covered by these towns & villages in Osmanabad district as on 31-3-66. By 31st March 1961 only four towns had been electrified in the district. Up to March 1966 all the 13 towns and 88 villages in the district had been electrified. The villages electrified accounted for only 7.45% of the ^{rural} population in the district. In all 17.24% of the total population of the district was benefited by electrification at the end of

March 1966.

6 CO-OPERATION

Table No. 6.1 :- This table deals with different types of co-operative societies working in Osmanabad district during 1965-66. From this table it can be observed that during the year 1965-66, 1002 agricultural credit societies were functioning in this district. The number of agricultural non-credit societies was 324 and that of non-agricultural non-credit societies was 179. Of the total number of co-operative societies the percentage of different types of co-operative societies was as follows. Agricultural credit societies formed 73.41%, non-agricultural credit societies accounted for 2.11%, agricultural non-credit societies were 10.32% and non-agricultural non-credit societies were 13.50%.

Table No. 6.2 :- This table presents statistics relating to ~~District~~ District Central Co-operative Bank, District Industrial Co-operative Bank and District Development Bank in Osmanabad district during 1965-66. The number of branches of the District ~~Central Co-operative Bank~~ was 35 in 1965-66 where as in the year 1961-62 there was not a single branch of this bank. This enormous increase in number of branches might be due to increasing responsibilities that the District Central Co-operative Bank is shouldering to provide the agriculturists, with cheap credit facilities as also aid in kind like improved seeds, implements, fertilizers etc. During the year 1965-66 ^{share} the/capital of the bank increased by 135.72%, reserve fund by 467.51%, working capital by 323.63% and short term loans by 304.34% over the corresponding figures of 1961-62.

Table No. 6.3:- This table gives the data regarding primary agricultural credit societies for the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. The number of primary agricultural credit societies increased by 3.20% during 1965-66 over those in 1961-62. However, individual membership, share capital and working capital increased by 83.99% , 235.44% , 283.87% respectively during 1965-66 over the corresponding figures of 1961-62 respectively.

Table No. 6.4:- This table gives the information regarding financial position of different types of co-operative societies other than agricultural credit societies in Osmanabad district during 1961-62, 1964-65 and 1965-66. From the above table it can be seen that there was an increase in the number of most of the Co-operative Societies viz, agricultural marketing, fisheries, animal husbandry, farming, agricultural processing, salary earners, housing and other non-agricultural non-credit societies. The share capital of all these societies increased by 179.75% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. Reserve and other funds also showed an increase of 19.11% in 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. The working capital however decreased by 42.19% in 1965-66 than in 1961-62.

Table No. 6.5 :- This table deals with the taluka-wise number of agricultural marketing societies and their agricultural commodities and requisites during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. It is seen that at the apex there was the district central co-operative marketing society located at Osmanabad the district headquarter. In addition there were 13 primary co-operative marketing societies in the district viz, two each in Parenda and Tuljapur talukas and one each in the remaining

~~talukas~~ of the district. The value of sale of agricultural produce increased three times in 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. The value of sale of jowar however decreased by 99.82% in 1965-66 than that of 1961-62.

Table No. 6.6 :- This table indicates the operation of other co-operative societies of different types in Osmanabad district during 1961-62 and 1965-66. The achievements in agricultural marketing societies, milk and milk products societies, farming societies were remarkable. The value of agricultural produce in respect of agricultural marketing societies, showed significant increase i.e. 255.53% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. Milk and milk products societies also showed an increase of 801.14% in this respect during the year 1965-66 over the corresponding figures of 1961-62. The increase achieved by processing societies in respect of sale was 22½ times more in 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62.

Table No. 6.7:- This table indicates taluka-wise information regarding the number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them in Osmanabad district for the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. The number of registered money lenders, decreased by 68.96% during the year 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. The above decrease in the number of money lenders might be due to the increased credit facilities by co-operative banks, and to some extent by scheduled banks to agriculturists on easy terms. The decrease in the number of registered money lenders was observed in almost all the talukas. The percentages of loans advanced to traders and non-traders were 21.68 and 78.32 respectively during the year 1961-62 and 41.16 and 58.84 respectively in 1965-66.

7. MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH

Table No. 7.1 This table indicates the number of persons engaged in medical and public health services in Osmana-bad district according to 1961 census. There were about 16 physicians surgeons and Dentists per lakh of population in rural area and in urban areas their proportion was 187 per lakh of population. There were only 12 hospital beds per lakh of population as per 1961 census and the district ranked 25th in this regard among the 26 districts of Ma-harashtra during 1961.

Table No. 7.2 :- This table deals with the medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies in each taluka of this district during the years ^{1961 &} 1965. There were only two hospitals one at Osmanabad and other at Latur during the years 1961 and 1965. These two hospitals were fully equipped with operation theatres and X-ray facilities. In addition ~~there~~ there were 31 dispensaries located at taluka headquarters and important villages in the district during 1961. In the year 1965 there was an increase of only one dispensaries which brought this total to 32. The number of doctors increased by 4.33% during 1965 over the figure of 1961. Latur taluka along accounted for 52.56% of the total indoor patients treated in the district during 1965. Kallan and Udgir talukas stood last in this respect. The number of out-door patients treated showed an increase of 90.20% during 1965 over the figure of 1961. In the year 1965 Ausa taluka stood first in registering the highest number of outdoor patients treated and Parenda taluka was the last in this respect.

Table No. 7.3 :- This table gives the disease wise classification of number of indoor and outdoor patients in Osmanabad district during the years 1961 & 1965. Dysentery, diarrhoea, pyrexia of uncertain origin, other diseases due to infection, diseases of the blood and spleen, urinary organs excluding tumoury were some of the main ailments for which outdoor and indoor patients were treated. During the year 1965 the highest deaths 64.05 of total deaths reported due to sickness were registered due to diarrhoea.

Table No. 7.4 :- This table deals with the number of birth and deaths and also the number of infant deaths registered in this district during the years 1961 and 1965. The number of births increased by 11.17% during the year 1965 over the corresponding number of the year 1961. The number of deaths decreased by 15.99% during 1965 than the corresponding figure of 1961. The number of infant deaths also decreased by 8.40% during 1965 than corresponding figure of 1961.

Table No. 7.5 :- This table indicates the number of deaths due to important diseases in Osmanabad district during the years from 1961 to 1965. In general more deaths occurred due to fever and respiratory diseases during the years from 1961 to 1965. The percentage of deaths due to fever was significant i.e. 37.29% during 1961. It was remarkable that the number of deaths due to fever was continuously decreasing from 1961 to 1965. There was no death due to plague epidemic during the years 1961 to 1965 in the district.

Table No. 7.6 :- This table gives the number of vaccinations and cholera inoculations in this district during the years 1964 and 1965. The pace of vaccination and cholera inoculation programmes slowed down during 1965 as compared to 1964 as seen from the fact that the number of primary vaccination and cholera inoculations fell by 22.16% and 14.46% respectively during the year 1965.

Table No. 7.7 :- This table gives the data on B.C.G. vaccination in Osmanabad district during 1964 and 1965. The positive cases formed nearly 9% of the total number of cases tested in 1964 where as the same proportion was observed to be 50% in 1965.

Table No. 7.8 :- This table indicates the hygienic drinking water supply sources available in the rural areas of Osmanabad district. Out of the total number of 1388 inhabited villages 15.41% of the villages have no hygienic drinking water supply and 30.03% of them have inadequate water supply. Out of the total number of 112 inhabited villages in Umerga taluka 58 villages or 51.78% of the villages have inadequate water supply and out of 180 inhabited villages in Nilanga taluka, 46 villages or 25.55% villages have without drinking water supply facilities.

(8) EDUCATION

Table No. 2.1 :- This table indicates the number of literates and the percentage of literacy in each taluka of Osmanabad district according to 1961 census. The percentage of literacy in the district rose from 10.06% in 1951 to 17.05% in 1961 census. Male literacy was 27.52% and among the females it was 6.02% in 1961. According to the literacy of male and female the district ranked 23rd and 22nd among the 26 districts in 1961 of Maharashtra State. ¹⁹⁶¹ The highest literacy of 20.86% was found in Latur taluka and lowest literacy was of 12.87% found in Paranda taluka of this district. The percentage of literacy in urban areas is highest in Osmanabadd taluka being 42.24% where as it lowest urban literacy is in Bhum Mahal being 26.92%. In rural area, Umerga taluka registered highest literacy percentage of 16.98% and lowest literacy percentage is found in Parenda taluka being 11.43 Osmanabad district stands second in Aurangabad Division in respect of literacy according to 1961 census. In rural literacy the district however stands first in Aurangabad Division.

Table No. 2.2 :- This table indicates the number of literacy and educated persons in rural areas in each taluka of this district according to 1961 census. In all 85.11% of ^{the} rural ~~78~~ population is ^{was} illiterate. Among the literates in rural areas 73.79% were mere literates without any educational stadards and remaining 26.21% were having different educational standards. A negligible percent of the rural population i.e. 0.29% had completed matriculation standard of education. This indicates that the rural population in the district is too far behind in educational field as compared to the urban population of the district.

Table No. 2.3 :- This table indicates the educational attainments in urban areas in Osmanabad district as per 1961 population census. In all 64.63% of the urban population was illiterate. The literate without any educational level formed 52.31% and persons having education upto primary and matriculation standard ^{formed} 38.73% and 6.84% respectively, of the total urban population of the district. Matriculates formed 2.42% of urban population in the district. The technical and non-technical diploma holders formed 0.93% whereas graduated and post-graduates other than technical formed 0.30%. Technical graduates and post-graduates formed 0.05% of the urban population. All this indicates that a very negligible percentage of even urban population had successfully completed university education. This was due to lack of higher educational facilities in the district particularly for technical diploma, technical degrees and post graduations%. In so far as provision of number of seats for technical training upto diploma level is concerned, Osmanabad district ranked 14th in the 26 districts of Maharashtra State.

Table No. 2.4 :- This table indicates the data regarding number of educational institutions, pupils and teachers in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. So far as ^{education is} primary/secondary concerned the average number of students per primary school was 100 and 109 during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66 respectively. The average number of students per teacher was 38 in 1961-62 and 37 in 1965-66. The average number of students per secondary school was 304 during 1961-62 and during 1965-66 it was 346. The average number of students per teacher in secondary schools worked out at 24 in 1961-62 and 30 in 1965-66 respectively. The ratio of boys to girls in secondary institutions was about 3:1 in 1965-66. The ratio of

boys to girls in higher institutions was about 12:1 in 1965-66. The percentages of trained and untrained teachers in primary schools during the year 1965-66 were 63.12 and 36.88 respectively and those of secondary schools were 53.65 and 46.35 respectively.

Table No. 8.5 :- This table deals with the educational concessions given to backward class students in Osmanabad district in 1965-66. The relative percentages of scheduled caste, scheduled tribe and other backward classes in the total enrolment were 39.15, 3.68 and 57.17 respectively. Out of the total monetary educational concessions granted to students the percentages of the total grants given to ^{scheduled} caste, scheduled tribes and other backward classes worked out at 20.47, 3.38 and 76.15 respectively.

Table No. 8.6 :- This table gives information regarding concessions of free education granted to economically backward class students during the year 1965-66. The percentage of beneficiaries in respect ⁱⁿ secondary schools to the total number of beneficiaries worked out at 91.05 and the concessions granted to them worked out at 95.97. The percentages of beneficiaries of arts and Science and other courses worked out at 8.83 and 1.22 respectively and the concessions granted to them worked out at 3.41 and 0.62 respectively to the total amount of concessions granted.

Table No. 8.7 :- :- This table gives information regarding the expenditure on primary education by way of grants-in-aid to local bodies in Osmanabad district during the year 1965-66. The grants were given only to the Zilla Parishad Osmanabad which was solely entrusted with primary education in the district. The percentages of recurring and non-recurring expenditure to the total plan expenditure was 87.81 and 12.19 respectively. The percentage of normal and plan expenditure to the total expenditure was 68.84 and 31.16 respectively.

Table No. 8.8 :- This table deals with the number of villages and towns without primary schools in different population ranges in each taluka of Osmanabad district during the years 1965-66. (The percentage of villages having no schools was 3.75 to the total number of villages in 1965-66). Of the total 1388 villages only 52 had no primary schools. Latur, Kallam and Unerga talukas had primary schools in all the villages.

(9) TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION

Table No. 9.1 :- This table gives the information about length of railways in Osmanabad district for the years ending 31st March 1961 and 1966. The total length of railways was only 118 Kms. in the district. It can further be observed from this table that regarding the expansion of railways facilities there was no progress in the Third Five year Plan (1961-66). The district had 0.83 Kms. of railways for 100 sq. Kms. of area.

Table No. 9.2 (A) :- This table shows the extra municipal road length according to category and surface in Osmanabad district for the years 1960-61 and 1965-66. As compared to railway length it can be observed that roads were the primary mode of communications in this district. The Hyderabad - Sholapur national highway which connects Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra and Mysore state passes through Osmanabad (Tuljapur & Umerga talukas) covering a distance of about 78.83 Kms. Osmanabad town is 54.4 Kms. away from the National highway. There are 11 State highways passing through the different talukas of this district. The length of National highway during 1960-61 and 1965-66 remained unchanged where as those of state highways increased by 45.87% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1960-61. Viewing the road length according to type/surface it is seen that water bound macadam road length formed 42.05% of the total road length in the district during 1965-66 where as black topped formed 57.40%. The percentages of national highways, state highways and major district roads were 8.49, 54.15 and 25.89 respectively.

Table No. 9.2 (B):- This table indicates the length of municipal roads surface wise for the years 1960-61 and 1965-66. The length of cement concrete roads increased by 122.78% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1960-61. The length of black topped roads however decreased by 36.31% during 1965-66 than what it was in 1960-61. The length of water bound macadam roads increased by 11.85% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1960-61. Granular material roads also showed an increase of 12.37% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1960-61. Lower type roads also increased by 11.54% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1960-61.

Table No. 9.3 :- This table shows the motor vehicles in operation in Aurangabad division as on 31-3-61 and 31-3-66. As the district wise break-up is not available with the road transport office at Aurangabad, it is not possible to spot light the position in this district in respect of motor vehicles in operation. The total number of vehicles in this region increased by 86.08% during 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1960-61. The increase was mostly in the number of motor cars, taxis, autorickshaws (which ply only in Aurangabad town), stage carriages, trailers, tractors and others. The increase in public carriages was due to growing expansion of State Transport activities.

Table No. 9.4 :- This table gives the information on operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Aurangabad region as on 31-3-61 and 31-3-66. The district-wise break-up of these figures is not available with the Road Transport office At Aurangabad .

It is seen that the number of routes in 1965-66 increased by 370.21% over the corresponding figure of 1960-61. The above increase in routes might be due to increase in approach roads to various villages. Similarly the average service distance and the average daily earnings in 1965-66 increased by 417.54 % and 239.4 % respectively over the corresponding figures of 1960-61. The average number of passengers travelled per day in 1965-66 increased by 416.53% over the corresponding figure of 1960-61.

Table No. 9.5 :- This table shows the traffic census on state and national highways in Osmanabad district as on May 1965. The highest traffic intensity i.e. (1163 vehicles per days) was observed on Poona Sholapur-Hyderabad national highway No.9. The percentages of the traffic intensity of light motor vehicles, medium heavy vehicles and slow moving vehicles to the total number of vehicles per day were 12.92%, 70.94% and 16.08% respectively. It is evident from the above table that the traffic intensity of medium heavy motor vehicles was high and that of light and slow motor vehicles was low.

Table No. 9.6 :- This table indicates the information on postal, telegraph and telephone statistics in Osmanabad district for the years 1961-62, 1964-65 and 1965-66. During the years 1965-66 there was a slight increase in the number of post offices. The number of telegraph offices also increased by 71.43% during 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62.

The number of postmen increased by 12.50% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. The number of telephones increased significantly by 199.39% during the year 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. The increase in number of telephones might be due to increase in Govt. offices and commercial activities. The number of radio licences issued also increased significantly by 103.31 during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62.

Table No. 9.7 :- This table gives the information on availability of postal facilities in Osmanabad district. Of the total villages 27% villages had post office within the village, 13.76% within 3 Kms. of the village, 39.70% villages had post offices at a distance between 3 to 6 Kms. and 19.39% villages had the post offices beyond 6 kms. Umerga taluka had the highest number of villages i.e. 44 with post-offices within the villages where as Parenda and AUSA had the lowest number of villages i.e. 22 with post offices within the villages. Majority of villages (i.e. 81% of the total) had postal facilities within 6 km. distance from them.

Table No. 9.8 :- This table shows the rural broadcasting statistics in Osmanabad district for the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. The percentage of receiving sets in the district at the end of March 1966 significantly increased by 79.78% when compared with the corresponding figure of 1964-65. It was observed that 53.28% of the total rural population in the district was enjoying radio facilities at the end of March 1966.

(10) LOCAL BODIES

Table No. 10.1 :- This table deals with the income and expenditure of local bodies in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. The number of village panchayats in the district increased from 980 in 1961-62 to 997 in 1965-66. The income of municipalities also increased tremendously by 214.48% during the year 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. At the same time the expenditure also increased ^{by} 203.33% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. The Zilla Parishad was not in existence during the year 1961-62. It started functioning from May 1962.

Table No. 10.2 :- This table deals with the panchayat Samiti-wise income and expenditure in Osmanabad district for the years 1961-62 and 1964-65. The income of village panchayats significantly increased by 55.10% during 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62. The income of Udgir panchayat Samiti was the highest and that of Parenda was the lowest during 1964-65. The expenditure of village panchayats also showed significant increase of 84.51% during 1964-65 over the figure of 1961-62. Udgir panchayat samiti incurred the highest expenditure whereas Parenda panchayat Samiti stood last in this respect during 1965-66.

Table No. 10.3(A) :- This table gives the head-wise expenditure of Zilla Parishad during 1964-65 and 1965-66. It is seen that the revenue receipts of Zilla Parishad increased by 30.83% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1964-65. The total self raised resources, however, decreased by 63.54% Govt. grants increased by 42.91% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62.

Table No. 10.3 (B) :- This table gives the head-wise expenditure of Zilla Parishad Osmanabad for the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. It can be seen from the above table that the total revenue expenditure increased by 31.49% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1964-65. This was on account of marked developmental expenditure incurred on education, agricultural and medical and health programmes. During the year 1965-66 expenditure on education increased by 26.21%, on animal husbandry by 21.23%, on social welfare by 38.44% on irrigation and buildings and ^{Communications} by 2.50% and 23.90% respectively. Expenditure on agriculture increased by as many as 6 times over and above the expenditure for the year 1964-65. This enormous increase in expenditure on agriculture might be due to Govt's special directives to Zilla Parishad to give greater emphasis and allot maximum funds to grow more food campaign.

Table No. 10.4 :- This table deals with the income and expenditure of municipalities in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. The income of municipalities tremendously increased by 214.48% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62 and at the same time expenditure also showed an upward trend. It increased by 203.33% in 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62. Latur municipality was on the top in both the respects.

(11) PLAN & COMMUNITY
DEVELOPMENT

Table No. 11.1 :- This table deals with the expenditure in the Third Five Year Plan under different developmental sub-heads in Osmanabad district during the period from 1961 to 1965. During 1965-66 the Third Five Year Plan was in its last year of implementation. The different plan schemes were categorised as 1) State Level 2) Division Level and 3) District Level schemes. During the Third Five Year Plan as many as 67 district level schemes were included and implemented in this district. The total plan provision for all these schemes was to the tune of Rs. 634.46 lakhs. An amount of Rs. 6.40 crores was provided for all the district level plan schemes in the Third Plan of this district. This outlay was roughly of the order of Rs. 42 per head in the district according to the total district population enumerated as per 1961 census. It can also be seen from the same table that the expenditure under agricultural programmes was the highest being Rs. 285.60 lakhs up to 1965-66. The expenditure under industries and mining was only Rs. 2.36 lakhs which was very low as compared to other sub-heads. The percentages of expenditure in the Third Five Year Plan for the years from 1961 to 1966 to the total expenditure are given below.

Emphasis was laid mainly on the development of agriculture. Next in order of priority was co-operation and community development which consumed away major portion of the amount allotted. Industry and mining however could claim negligible percentage of the total outlay.

Table No. 11.2 :- This table gives the physical achievements of different schemes implemented in the Third Five year Plan in the district (1961 to 1966). It can be seen that almost in all fields the progress made during 1961-66 was ~~xxx~~ satisfactory. Specially progress made under the scheme MIN 2 i.e. installation of pumping sets, and the achievements in respect of I.U.C.D. was remarkable. Achievements in aforementioned schemes were above the targets fixed.

Table No. 11.3 :- R This table indicates the community development programme in Osmanabad district as 31-3-66. By the end of March 1966 there were 17.50 blocks in the district, as per C.P.A. pattern. Of the total rural area of the district, the area covered by ^{Stage I,} Stage I and [&] stage III blocks was 65.81%, 24.04% and 10.15% respectively. The percentages of villages covered by different stages were as follows: stage I covered ^{65.70,} stage II and covered 26.36 and stage III covered 7.94 of the total villages.

Table No. 11.4 :- This table shows the expenditure incurred in community development blocks under different stages in Osmanabad district as on 31-3-65 and 31-3-66. It can be observed from the above table that Udgir block stood first in accounting for the highest expenditure of Rs. 22.94 lakhs Ahmedpur part I block stood second in this respect.

Table No. 11.5 :- This table shows the physical achievements on selected items in different blocks of Osmanabad district during 1964-65 and 1965-66. From the above table it can be observed that Ausa block stood first in respect of quantity of fertilizers distributed during the year 1965-66. Ausa block was also ahead in respect of improved seeds distributed during the same year. Faranda block was leading ^{in the} collection of ~~people's~~ people's contribution during 1965-66. Osmanabad block stood first in the district in 1964-65 and 1965-66 for registering the highest number of family planning operations. Kallam taluka stood first in respect of drinking water wells constructed during the year 1965-66.

(12) PRICES

Table No. 12.1 :- This table deals with the average retail prices of important commodities at Osmanabad during the years 1964 and 1965. Jowar, Tur, Moong, Urid, Groundnut, Safflower, gur and cotton are the main crops of this district. These are traded on wholesale basis. They find their way to Latur market. The speculative transactions and the extent of demand from Bombay and other markets play an important role in determining the prices of agricultural commodities in this district. Commodity-wise price fluctuations are shown below.

Rice:- It is observed that rice was available throughout the year in 1964. However during 1965 rice was not available in the market. The average retail prices of different varieties of rice per kg. were as follows in 1964. Champakali rice Rs. 1.12, Amritsar rice Rs. 1.43 and local Rs. 1.07.

Wheat :- The price of wheat showed an upward trend in 1965. It increased from Rs. 0.96 per Kg. in 1964 to Rs. 1.19 in 1965. The highest price of wheat was observed in the month of January which was Rs. 1.68.

Jowar :- It is the principal crop of this district. The average retail price of jowar (White) and jowar Yellow was Rs. 0.61 per kg. and Rs. 0.50 respectively during the year 1965.

Gram :- Gram is one of the principal crop grown in the district. The price of gram showed an upward trend during the year 1965. It rose from Rs. 0.72 to Rs. 1.28 per kg. and was at its peak (i.e. 1.60 per kg.) in the month of January 1965.

Arharis The price of arhar dal also showed an upward trend and rose from Rs. 1.20 in 1964 to Rs. 1.36 per kg. in 1965. The price was the highest during the month of January 1965.

Mung-dal :- The price of mung dal ^{increased} also from Rs. 1.17, to Rs. 1.35 per kg. in 1965.

Urid :- The price of urid dal increased from Rs. 1.17 to Rs. 1.35 during 1965 and was the highest being Rs. 1.10 in the month of January 1965.

Groundnut oil :- As in case of other commodities the price of groundnut oil also increased from Rs. 2.39 to Rs. 2.82 per Kg. during 1965. It was at ^{its} peak in the month of November. The price of clothes remained more or less steady.

Table No. 12.2 :- This table deals with the operation of regulated markets in Osmanabad district. Ahmedpur, Osmanabad, Latur, Murum, Udgir, Kalam, and Nilanga are the places where there are agricultural produce market committees during the year 1965-66 the animal arrivals of Osmanabad Market committee showed ~~small~~ decreased as compared to the committees during the year 1961-62, the figure of 1961-62. The value, however, showed significant increase of 169.91% over the figure of 1961-62. There was also a decrease of 29.04% in the arrivals of Latur market committee during 1965-66 as compared to those of 1961-62. The value, however, increased by 14.80% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1961-62.

The annual arrivals of Kalam market committee showed a decrease of 9.65% in 1965-66 than what it was in 1961-62. The annual arrivals of Udgir market committee showed decrease of 38.33% in 1965-66 as compared to the figure of 1961-62 and the value also decreased by 5.52% in 1965-66 as compared to the figure of 1961-62. The annual arrivals of Nilanga market committee increased by 11.46% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62 and the value also increased by 75.82%. The figures of Murum market committee were not available as it was not functioning during the year 1961-62. There was 65.89% increase in the value of commodities in 1965-66 over the value in 1961-62.

Table No. 12.3 :- This table gives the consumers price index number for working class at Aurangabad and Nanded centres. No. price index numbers are worked out for Osmanabad district as there are no industrial establishments in this district.

(13) MISCELLANEOUS

Table No. 13.1 :- This table deals with the strength of police force and crime statistics in Osmanabad district for the years 1961 and 1965. The strength of police force decreased by 10.91% during the year 1965 as compared to the figure of 1961. The above decrease might be the result of the reorganisation of the police force in 1962. The number of cognizable crimes reported increased by 20.99% during the year 1965 over the corresponding figure of 1961. The total cost of the police force was increased by 19.33% during 1965 over the figure of 1961.

Table No. 13.2 :- This table shows the work disposed of in civil and criminal courts in Osmanabad district for the year 1961 and 1965. From the above table it can be observed that the number of criminal cases decided was significantly high as compared to that of civil cases. The number of regular civil cases (i.e. original) increased by 3.34% during 1965 over the corresponding figure of 1961. The number of regular criminal cases (Original) also increased by 11% in 1965 over the corresponding figure of 1961. The percentage of regular appellate civil cases decreased by 2.33% during the year 1965 as compared to the figure of 1961. ^{The number of regular} appellate cases increased by 17.10% during 1965 over the corresponding figure of 1961.

Table No. 13.3 :- This table gives the information on cinema statistics in Osmanabad district for the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. Neither increase nor decrease was observed in the number of cinema theatres during the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. Out of the 12 theatres in the Osmanabad district, five were located at Latur, two each at Osmanabad and Udgir, one each at Ahmednagar, Kallam, Tuljapur and the one located at Turori (Tq. Umargh) was a kind of semi-permanent. The total seating capacity of all these 12 theatres was 9,360 per show.

Table No. 13.4 :- This table shows the number of banking offices in Osmanabad district for the year 1965-66. There were 34 banking offices functioning in the district. These banking offices covered in all 14.36% of the district population. However, as compared to the total population, it can safely be said that the banking facilities were very much below the requirements in the year under question.

Table No. 13.5 :- This table gives the number of joint stock companies in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66 respectively. There were only 5 joint stock companies in the year 1961-62 and 1965-66. There was no increase in the number of joint stock companies during the Third Plan period.

Table No. 13.6 :- This table gives the information on number of insurance policies issued and amount insured in Osmanabad district during the year 1964-65 and 1965-66. The number of insurance policies issued increased by 26.28% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1964-65 and the amount insured also increased by 54.45% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1964-65.

Table No. 13.7 :- This table gives the collection of small saving in Osmanabad district during the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. There was a remarkable increase in collection in 1965-66. ~~It~~ Gross collections ~~is~~ increased by 22.01% during 1965-66 over the figure of 1964-65.

Withdrawals decreased by 11.22% in the same period.

Table No. 13.8 :- This table deals with the information of land revenue collections in Osmanabad district during the years 1961-62 and 1965-66. From the above table it can be observed that the demand was decreased by 8.12% during 1965-66 as compared to the figure of 1961-62.

Collection also decreased by 17.70% during the year 1965-66 as ~~xxxxxx~~ compared to the figure of 1961-62. There were no arrears to be recovered by the end of the year 1965-66 as the total amount of demand was ~~is~~ collected during that year.

Table No. 13.9 :- This table indicates the number of documents registered, income accrued and expenditure incurred and value of property transferred in each taluka of ~~Osman~~ Osmanabad district during the years 1964 and 1965. The number of documents registered increased by 4.14% during the year 1965 over the corresponding figure of 1964. Consequently ^{Income} from registration also increased by 4.73% during the same period over the corresponding figure of 1964. The net income, however, decreased by 5.80% during the year 1965 over the corresponding figure of 1964. Ahmedpur taluka stood first during the years 1964 and 1965 for having registered the highest number of documents and Paranda taluka was the last in this respect.

Table No. 13.10 i- This table shows the statistics relating to general elections held in 1962 in intsmonebad district.

From the above table it can be observed that 56.93% of votes were pooled to total electorate. Nilanga taluka stood first for having pooled 70% of votes, where as only 43% of votes were pooled in Wasa taluka.

Table No. 14 :- This table deals with the progress made during the period from the first plan to the end of the Third Plan under different items such as population, agriculture and irrigation, live-stock and agricultural implements, factory employment, electricity, co-operation, education, medical and Health, transport and communication community development and local self Government. The achievement in 1950-51 indicates the preplan position. The year ~~1955-56~~ gives the position after first five year plan and the period between 1965-66 gives the position after Third Five Year Plan. The position of all items in 1965-66 is given in the explanatory notes of each table. The density of population increased from 220 per sq. Kms. in 1951 to 268 per sq. Kms. in 1961. The rate of increase appeared to be quite high during the decade of 1951 to 1961. Now we will examine the progress achieved during the preplan and plan period in respect of agriculture. The area under food grains was 565,927 hectares in 1950-51 and the same increased by 26.98% in 1955-56. During the year 1960-61 the area under food grains again increased by 4.43 % over the figure of 1955-56. The net irrigated area also showed an increase of 46.95% in 1955-56 over the figure of 1950-51. During 1960-61 it increased by 32.96% over the figure of 1955-56. After the first two plans the net irrigated area was nearly doubled when compared to the net irrigated area before the plan period. There was a preponderance of well irrigation. The area irrigated under food increased by 84.68% in 1965-66 over the figure of 1950-51 and the same increased by 48.28% in 1960-61 over the figure of 1955-56. There was an increase of

25.35% in the livestock population during the 1961 census over the figure of 1956 livestock census. Poultry population also increased considerably showing an increase of 114.92% during the 1961 census over the figure of 1956 livestock census. The position of number of factories and daily employment was as under the number of factories increased by 128.57% during the year 1960 over the figure of 1951. The number of workers employed in registered factories per lakh of population was 35 and the same increased to 160 in 1956 and decreased to 80 in 1960. Significant progress was also achieved in respect of supply of electricity. There was no electricity during the year 1950-51. At the end of the year 1965-66, in addition to 13 towns electrified, as many as 101 villages were electrified. Unlike the progress made in other respects there was little progress in the field of co-operation. The increase observed was only 0.48% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1960-61. The number of primary schools significantly increased by 52.40% in 1955-56 over the figure of 1950-51 and in 1960-61 it increased by 60.63% over the figure of 1955-56. The number of secondary schools also increased by 48.48% during the year 1955-56 over the figure of 1950-51, and in 1960-61 the same again increased by 30.61% over the corresponding figure of 1955-56. The health progress achieved under medical and public health was as follows. There were 13 dispensaries and two hospitals during the year 1951. During the year 1965 there were 32 dispensaries and 2 hospitals.

The progress achieved under the item transport and communications was as follows. The road length increased by 21.21% in 1955-56 over the figure of 1950-51 and significantly increased by 67.92% in 1960-61 over the corresponding figure of 1955-56. However, the length of railway remained unchanged. The number of post offices increased by 12.41% over the figure of 1950-51 and the same increased to 15.14% in 1960-61 over the corresponding figure of 1955-56. Remarkable progress was observed also in the field of community development. There was only one C.P.A. pattern block in the district, during 1955-56. However, during 1961-62 there were as many as 12.50 blocks based on C.P.A. pattern. The progress of local self Government is given below. The number of village panchayats during the year 1960-61 was 978 and the same increased to 980 in 1961-62. The number of municipalities increased from 10 in 1950-51 to 13 in 1960-61. The number of banks increased from 7 in 1950-51 to 16 in 1960-61.

CHAPTER III
Notes on Selected Indicators

14. This chapter is devoted to the description of important Selected Indicators, providing comparative study of the percentage achievement in some important selected fields viz. agriculture, animal husbandry, education, power, public health, road development etc. between the years 1960-61 and 1965-66. The respective indicators serve as a pointer towards the extent of progress made in concerned fields of developmental activity.

Indicator No. 1 :- Percentage of gross area sown to net area sown.

1. The percentage of gross area sown to the net area sown was 103.29 in the district in the year 1960-61. It increased slightly to 103.78 during 1964-65. This indicates that proportion of double cropped area to net area sown is quite insignificant in Osmanabad district. Lack of adequate irrigation facilities accounts for such a low proportion of double cropped area in the district. Osmanabad district was very low i.e. 19th in Maharashtra state in regard to proportion of double cropped area. Within the district it is observed that only Nilanga taluka which had rather both irrigational facilities and relatively significant proportion of gross cropped area to net cropped area (111.64%) in 1964-65. In the rest of the talukas this proportion was even below the par for the district as a whole.

The following table shows the percentage of gross cropped area to the net cropped area in talukas of Osmanabad district in 1960-61 and 1965-66.

Thus it is clearly observed that while the productivity of rice, bajra, tur, pulses, sugarcane and sesamum showed definite increase it decreased in respect of wheat, jowar total cereals, gram, groundnut and tobacco during 1964-65

Indicator No. 3:- Gross Value of Agricultural Production

The gross value of agricultural production in 1964-65 was more than double the value of the same in 1960-61. This can be seen from the following. It increased from Rs. 21,23 crores in 1961-61 to Rs. 3,321 crores in 1964-65. This can be seen from the following. This enormous increase however, was more an outcome of spiral increase in prices of all the commodities than an increase in agricultural production. The gross value of all the agricultural produce increased which can be seen from the following table.

3. Major changes are to be witnessed in taluka-wise percentage of gross area irrigated to net area irrigated. An increase is observed in respect of Umerga Parenda and Nilanga talukas.

respectively from 159.83%, 109.30% and 105.85% in 1960-61 to 174.15%, 113.8% and 112.95% respectively. Whereas the percentages of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area are seen to be decreased in respect of Osmanabad, Latur, Aurangabad and Kallam talukas from 153.82, 115.07, 110.27 and 100.00 respectively in 1960-61 to 145.76, 100.00, 106.39 and 100.00 respectively in 1964-65. However, irrespective of this major decrease or increase, as the case may be, in taluka-wise percentages, the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area of the district remained more or less unaffected.

Indicator No. 5:- Change in the Cropping Pattern

1. In the period between 1960-61 and 1964-65, the cropping pattern of the district underwent a change. Of the total cropped area in 1960-61, food crops occupied 73.58%, and non-food crops accounted for 26.42%. During 1964-65, however, there was a slight decline in the percentage of food crops to 72.40 and an increase in non-food crops to 27.60. This indicates a change in cropping pattern in non-food crops.

2. The following table shows taluka-wise area under food crops during 1960-61 and 1964-65 and the percentage change that occurred during 1964-65 over the figures of 1960-61.

3. It could be seen from the above table that Kalam and Nilanga registered the highest increase and decrease respectively in area under food crops in 1964-65. Amongst the rest, while Umarga, Ausa, Bhoom, Parenda, Osmanabad showed an upward trend, Ahmedpur, Tuljapur recorded a decrease. The percentage change, on the whole, recorded was only 3.83.

5. It is observed from the above table that with the exception of Ausa and Umarga, all the talukas recorded an increase in area under non-food crops in 1964-65. An overall percentage change, in non-food crops in 1964-65 was 10.27% which was 6.38 more than percentage change in food crops. This shows definite increase in the area under non-food crops reflecting a change in the cropping pattern of the district.

Indicator No. 6 :- Increase in Agricultural Credit and gross value of agricultural produce :-

1. Consequent upon the growing participation of Co-operative Sector in financing different operations of agriculture such as purchase of seeds, chemical fertilizers, implements, marketing of agricultural produce etc. there has been an enormous increase in agricultural credit, dues outstanding. The value of agricultural produce also increased due to rise in prices. This can be substantiated from the following table.

It is observed that the number of societies increased by 3.20% followed by similar increase in the working capital, share capital, reserve and other funds and loans overdue by 283.87% 235.44% , ~~30.5%~~ ^{39.34%} and 201.63% respectively in 1965-66 over the corresponding figures of 1961-62. The gross value of agricultural produce also showed an increase of about 20.58% during the period under reference .

Indicator No. 7 :- Agricultural Wage rates :-

1. Even today mechanised farming is a rare scene to look at Indian agriculture is still heavily dependent on human factor. Many operations like sowing weeding, harvesting, winnowing are done by hired labourers in the field. They are paid daily wages.

2. Kingaon (Ahmedpur taluka) Killari (Ausa taluka) and Mankeshwar (Parrenda taluka) are the three selected rural centres from where the wage rate data has been collected.

Kingaon centre:-

3 The average wage rate for carpenters, black smiths and cobblers, who are generally treated as skilled workers, were Rs. 3.21, Rs. 3.04 and Rs. 2.67 respectively in 1965. The same however, increased to Rs. 3.50 and Rs. 3.50 / ^{& Rs. 3.42} respectively in 1966. The wage rates for unskilled males and females were Rs. 1.35 and 0.71 respectively in 1965. They increased to Rs. 1.74 and 0.84 in 1966. The wage rate of hardman was Rs. 1.25 in 1965 and increased to Rs. 1.50 in 1966.

Khillari Centre

4. There was no change in the wage rates of carpenters, blacksmiths and cobblers, which was Rs. 2.00 for both the i.e. 1965 and 1966. The average rates for unskilled males and females were Rs. 1.80 and Rs. 0.85 in 1965 and increased to Rs. 1.93 and Rs. 0.89 in 1966. The other agricultural male labourers were getting Rs. 1.75 and ^{Rs.} 2.00 in 1965 and 1966 respectively. Whereas the wage rates of female agricultural labourers were Rs. 0.87 and Rs. 1.00 in the years under question.

Mankeshwar Centre :-

5. The daily wage of a Carpenter was Rs. 2.98 in both the years i.e. 1965 and 1966. The blacksmith was getting Rs. 1.85 in 1965 and Rs. 1.91 in 1966. The wages of an unskilled male were Rs. 1.49 in 1965 and Rs. 1.82 in 1966 and that of a female were Rs. 0.79 and Rs. 0.89 in 1965 and 1966 respectively

Indicator No. 8 :- Livestock per hectare of land

1. Livestock is the part and parcel of Indian agriculture and plays very important role in the cultivation of land. The bullock is the only motive power conducting various agricultural operations.

2. Osmanabad district has already established its name in the field of livestock. Udgir and Ahmedpur talukas of the district are famous for Deoni breed of bullocks which have won number of prizes in the All India agricultural cattle shows. Besides "Red khandari" & "Khillari" are the other well known breeds of cattle in this district.

The following table shows bovine and ovine livestock population their ratio to cultivable land and ranking of talukas as per the 1961 census.

2. Thus, it is observed from the above table that Udgir Latur and Nilanga talukas had maximum number of livestock population, whereas Ausa, Tuljapur and Osmanabad had the lowest number. From the above table it can be observed that Udgir, Latur and Nilanga talukas accounted highest livestock per hectare of land i.e. 1.17, 1.10 and 1.07 respectively. Whereas Parenda Latur Bhum, Kalam, Umerga, Ausa, Tuljapur and Osmanabad accounted for 0.87, 0.86, 0.85, 0.82 0.75, 0.77, 0.63 and 0.26 respectively.

Indicator No. 9:- Poultry as compared to Population.

1. The population of the district was 14.77 in lakhs and poultry population was ^{2.75 lakhs} as per the 1961 census. Accordingly the proportion of the poultry to per 1000 human population was 190. Kalam and Udgir had the highest and the lowest poultry population respectively and proportion thereof to per 1000 human population was 253 and 120 respectively.

2. In 1966 the poultry population of the district showed remarkable decrease of nearly 50.59% i.e. from 2,74,700 in 1961 to 1,35,725 in 1966. This could be seen from the following table.

3. The decrease in the poultry population had affected the proportion. Taking human population of 1961, the proportion of the poultry to per 1000 human population worked out to only 92 which was much below the figures 1961. Kalam, ranked first in 1961, had been replaced by Parenda, the proportion of which was 200% to per 1000 human population Udgir taluka re-gained its lowest ebb, though the proportion per 1000 human population came down to 40 which was 120 in 1961.

Indicator No. 10:- Per capita consumption of Electricity :-

1. The per capita consumption of electricity in 1961-62 to as only 0.65 K.W.H. when only 8 ^{of} few the number of the towns were electrified. It, however, increased to 3.22 K.W.H. during 1965-66 with the electrification of rest of the towns and some villages.

2. The following table gives the purpose wise consumption of electricity during the period from 1961-62, to 1965-66

3. It could be seen from the table that domestic as well as industrial consumption of electricity increased by about three times during 1965-66. The total consumption also increased from 964 K.W.H. during 1961-62 to 4754 K.W.H. in 1965-66.

Indicator No. 11:- Increase in the Candidates enrolled and vacancies notified

1. It was only in January 1961 that the Employment Exchange was set up at Osmanabad, the district headquarters. Since then it made remarkable progress in the enrolment of candidates. The number of candidates enrolled showed an increase of about 35.13% in 1965-66 over the corresponding figure of 1961-62. The number of vacancies notified, however, declined by 20.35% in 1965-66.

Indicator No. 12:- Increase in the number of indoor and outdoor patients :-

1. There are two hospitals in the district located one each at Osmanabad and Latur. Which are well equipped. The Civil hospital at Latur has a pathological laboratory and radiology unit and also has T.B. clinic. Besides, rest of the taluka places have civil dispensaries.

2. The following table gives the talukawise number of indoor patients treated in the aforementioned hospitals and civil dispensaries.

2. Though there were variations in the number of indoor patients treated in different talukas indicating either increase or decrease, as the case may be, the total number decreased from 8646 in 1961 to 6325 in 1965. Another peculiarity was that of the total indoor patients treated in 1965, Later alone accounted for about 52.56%.

3. Unlike indoor patients, the number of outdoor patients increased tremendously during 1961-65. The number was more than five lakhs in 1961 and rose up to ten lakhs in 1965 indicating an over all increase of about 90.20%. Of all, the highest increase was registered in Ausa taluka.

Indicator No. 13 :- Increase in the number of students in different categories (boys & girls separately)

i. With the implementation of the programme of educational expansion as contemplated in the five year Plan in succession, the number of students and educational institutions increased remarkably in the ^{district} during the period between 1961-62 and 1965-66. This is visible in the following table.

2. From the abovementioned table the following facts are noticed. Educational institutions in all categories viz. Primary, secondary and higher as well, showed increase in 1965-66 over the corresponding figures of 1961-62. Alongwith the increase in institutions, the number of students, boys as well as girls, also rose to a new height in 1965-66. But the percentage increase in the number of students (257.10) to that of educational institutions (126.31) was proportionately more.

3. The highest percentage increase in the number of boys was observed in the higher education i.e. 185.49. In Primary and Secondary education the percentage increase in the number of girls was more than the boys indicating percentage increase of 85.92 and 222.09, which was the highest respectively. The number of girls attending higher education also increased considerably though not coping up with the everincreasing number of boys.

Indicator No. 19: Increase in road mileage per 100 square
Kilometre :-

1 With the implementation of five year plans, the mileage of roads has been constantly increasing at faster rate. In 1960-61 the total road mileage was 528.99 kms. and the same increased to 929.03 kms. in 1965-66. The percentage of roads to the total mileage was 81.73 during 1960-61 and increased to 82.73 during 1965-66. The ratio of road mileage to total geographical area of the district was 3.71 Kms. during 1960-61. It increased to 6.51 km during 1965-66.

Indicator No. 15 :- Increase in Banking facilities in Proportion to population :-
=====

1. There were 17 banks in the district during 1961-62 and the average population covered by each bank was 86,920. This condition was really unsatisfactory and the facilities provided by them were too inadequate. In spite of the fact that the number of banks increased to 34 and the population covered by each bank reduced to 43,460 during 1965-66, the progress made was not upto the mark and the facilities were below the requirement. The number of banks per lakh of population worked out to 1.15 during 1961-62 and 2.30 during 1965-66.

Indicator No. 16 :- Prices

1. The period from 1960-61 to 1965-66 was the period of strains and stresses on our economy due to food shortages, was with the China and Pakistan in 1962 and 1965 respectively. Country wise strikes and lock outs in different industrial units and other like disturbances affected the production of different commodities. This also helped in a large measure to create artificial scarcity of articles of daily consumption. All these factors together made deep impact on the prices and consequently the prices of almost all the commodities ^{rose} spirally. This could be clearly seen from the following table where a comparative study of prices of 1962 and 1965.

It is observed from the above table that the prices of pulses of pulses, vanaspati, chillies etc. were increased. The sale of the food articles like rice, Jowar were brought under control by the Govt. and were not available in the open market.

CHAPTER IV

PLANNING -PART-I (EXPENDITURE) :

1) GENERAL :

The Third Plan of the State represents a phase in a programme of long term development which seeks to transform the economy of Maharashtra over the next three or four plan periods. It seeks to build an agro-industrial society in the state. The investment contemplated in the plan will contribute substantially to the building of the social and economic overheads necessary for generating a high rate of growth in income and employment. The output potential in Maharashtra state would increase by about 30 percent during the Third plan period according to a modest estimate.

Out of 499 schemes formulated in the state's Third Plan, 60 schemes involving a total plan outlay of Rs. 609.97 lakhs have been classified as District level Schemes of Osmanabad district. Though the scope of this review restricted to District Level Schemes only, it may be stated at the outset that Osmanabad district is also benefited by many Divisional and State Level Schemes involving quite a sizable outlay.

The following table gives major head-wise expenditure and their percentages to total expenditure during Third Plan period i.e. 1961 to 1966.

It is remarkable to note that 40.53 percent of total expenditure was spent on Agricultural Programmes, for this district during Third Five Year Plan. Importance was given to Soil Conservation scheme, from Agricultural programme.

The amount of Rs. 151.88 lakhs was spent on Soil Conservation scheme and it was 53.16% to total expenditure (i.e. Rs. 285.69 lakhs) of Agricultural programmes.

Next to Agricultural programmes, importance was given to Co-operation and community Development, and the expenditure was 24.55% to total expenditure. The amount of 135.42 lakhs was spent on community development projects (C.D.P.) and it was 78.26% to total expenditure (i.e. 173.04 lakhs).

Sector for Social services also played important roll for this district and the expenditure was 23.35% to total plan expenditure.

The amount of Rs. 53.04 lakhs was spent on Normal expansion of primary education and Expansion of universal

free and compulsory education (GE-K2) and it was 32.23% to total expenditure (i.e. 164.58 lakhs.) of social services.

Transport and Communication accounted for only a negligible expenditure which was only 11.24% to total expenditure.

The amount of Rs. 75.46 lakhs was spent on district roads (T & C -10) and it was 95.24% to total expenditure (i.e. 79.23Lakhs) of this sector i.e. transport and communication.

Least importance was given to Industry and Mining and it was only 0.32 percent to the total expenditure. The amount of Rs. 2.21 lakhs was spent on industrial co-operatives including co-operative of handicraft workers (SSS-II) and it was 93.64% to total expenditure of this sector i.e. Industry and mining.

PROGRESS OF EXPENDITURE :

The actual expenditure incurred on the District Level schemes during 1965-66 was to the tune of Rs. 284.03 lakhs, thus utilising as much as 46.56% of the total plan out lay. The progress of scheme-wise expenditure is given below.

I. Agricultural Programme : Agricultural production.

AGR-21 ESTABLISHMENT OF NEW AGRICULTURAL SCHOOLS AND STRENGTHENING OF EXISTING SCHOOLS:

This is a local sector scheme, under which new agricultural schools are to be established . An expenditure of Rs. 3.32 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 for construction of school building. The percentage of expenditure is 55.33 to the total plan provision of Rs. 6.00 lakhs, allotted for this scheme.

AGR-24:- SCHEME FOR PROPAGATION OF IMPROVED AGRIL.

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 0.21 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 for purchase of improved implements. The percentage of expenditure is 12.00 to the total plan provision of 1.75 lakhs allotted for this scheme.

AGR-25 COORDINATED COTTON EXTENSION SCHEME

This is a state sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 0.96 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 under this scheme. The percentage of expenditure is 18.28 to the total plan provision of Rs. 5.25 allotted for this scheme.

AGR-26 :- DEVELOPMENT OF SUGARCANE

This is a state sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 0.05 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 under this scheme. The percentage of expenditure is 1.78 to the total plan provision of Rs. 2.80 lakhs allotted for this scheme.

AGR-27:- INTEGRATED OIL SEEDS DEVELOPMENT SCHEME

This is a state sector scheme. An amount of Rs. 0.68 lakhs is spent during 1965-66 under this scheme. The percentage of expenditure is 22.67 to the total plan provision of Rs. 3 lakhs allotted for this scheme.

AGR-31 GENERAL HORTICULTURE DEVELOPMENT SCHEME

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 0.72 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 under this scheme. The percentage of expenditure is 72.00 to the total plan provision of Rs. 1.00 lakhs provided for this scheme.

AGR-32 DEVELOPMENT OF LOCAL MANURIAL RESOURCES

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 0.22 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 under this scheme. The percentage of expenditure is 25.88 to the total plan provision of Rs. 0.85 lakhs provided under this scheme.

AGR-33:- SCHEME FOR EXPANSION OF PLANT PROTECTION SERVICE

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of 0.19 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 under this scheme. The percentage of expenditure is 4.10 to the total plan provision of Rs. 4.63 lakhs provided under this scheme.

AGR-36 :- ESTABLISHMENT OF TALUKA SEED FARMS :

This is a state/scheme sector. An expenditure of Rs. 1.57 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 under this scheme. The percentage of expenditure is 15.56 to the total plan provision of Rs.10.09 lakhs, provided under this scheme.

NEW SCHEME ADJ :- KHARIF AND RABI CAMPAIGN.

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 16.35 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66 under this scheme. The percentage of expenditure is 98.49 to the total plan provision of Rs. 16.60 lakhs provided under this scheme.

NEW SCHEME ADJ :- ESTABLISHMENT OF IRRIGATION UNITS UNDER PROTOTYPE PACKAGE PROGRAMME.

This is a local sector scheme. This scheme is not implemented in this district, though a plan provision of Rs. 0.18 lakh is provided for this scheme.

AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION :-

Under this sub-head the above mentioned 11 schemes are included, out of which 7 schemes are local sector and the remaining four are state sector. The expenditure incurred under this sub-head is Rs. 24.27 lakhs, the percentage of which is 12.24 to the total plan provision of Rs. 198.21, provided under the major head "Agricultural programmes". The percentage of expenditure is 16.48 to the total expenditure of Rs. 147.27 lakhs incurred under the major head "Agricultural programmes" during 1965-66.

2) LAND DEVELOPMENT

LAND-I:- CONSOLIDATION OF HOLDINGS:

This is a state sector scheme. This scheme comes under the sub-head 'Land Development' and the same is not implemented in this district.

3) SOIL CONSERVATION :

Under this sub-head, there is only one scheme, namely contour bunding, Nala bunding and contour trenching. The total expenditure incurred under this sub-head during 1965-66 is Rs. 80.37 lakhs. The percentage of expenditure is 4.055 to the total plan provision of Rs. 198.21, provided under the major head 'Agricultural Programmes'.

CONS-I :- CONTOUR BUNDING, NALA BUNDING, AND CONTOUR TRENCHING

This is a state sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 80.37 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66. The percentage of expenditure is 147.06 to the plan provision of Rs. 54.96 lakhs provided under this scheme.

CONS-A) SUPPLY OF DRY FARMING SETS :

This is a state sector scheme. The scheme is not implemented in this district, though the plan provision of Rs. 0.05 lakh was provided for this scheme.

4) MINOR IRRIGATION :

Under this sub-head, there are three schemes, two of which are local sector schemes and the third one i.e. Minor Irrigation works is both state and local sector scheme. The expenditure incurred under this sub-head during 1965-66 is Rs. 40.03 lakhs. The percentage of expenditure is 20.19 to the total plan provision of Rs. 198.21 lakhs provided under the major head 'Agricultural Programmes'. The percentage of expenditure is 27.18 to the total expenditure of Rs. 147.27 lakhs incurred under the major head 'Agricultural programmes' during 1965-66.

MIN-1 : CONSTRUCTION OF IRRIGATION WEIRS :

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 3.43 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66. The percentage of the expenditure is 43.42 to total plan provision of Rs. 7.90 lakhs provided under this scheme.

MIN-2 INSTALLATION OF PUMPING SETS :

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 2.06 lakhs is incurred during 1965-66. The percentage of expenditure is 211.55 to the total plan provision of Rs. 3.81 lakhs provided under this scheme.

MIN-7 MINOR IRRIGATION WORKS :

This is both local and state-sector schemes. The expenditure under local sector during 1965-66 is Rs. 2.54 lakhs while the expenditure under state sector scheme during 1965-66 is Rs. 26.00 lakhs. The percentage of total expenditure i.e. Rs. 28.54 lakhs is 42.7 to the total plan provision of Rs. 66.83 lakhs, provided under this scheme.

5) ANIMAL HUSBANDRY

Under this sub-head, there are three schemes, which are local sector schemes. The expenditure under this sub-head, during 1965-66, is Rs. 1.13 lakhs. The percentage of expenditure is 0.57 to the total plan provision of Rs. 198.21 lakhs provided under the Major head 'Agricultural Programmes'. The percentage of expenditure is 0.77 to the total expenditure of Rs. 147.27 incurred under the major head Agril. programmes during 1965-66. The details of the schemes are as under.

AH-6 : CONSTRUCTION OF BUILDINGS FOR AND ESTABLISHMENT OF VETERINARY DISPENSARIES AND VET. AID CENTRES :

AH-7 SUPPLEMENTARY CATTLE BREEDING CENTRES AND ORGANISATION OF BREEDER'S SOCIETIES :

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 0.10 lakh is incurred during 1965-66. The percentage of expenditure is 15.62 to the total plan provision of Rs. 0.64 lakh provided under this scheme.

AH-8 : DISTRICT PREMIUM BULLS SCHEME :

This is a local sector scheme. An expenditure of Rs. 0.49 lakh is incurred during 1965-66. The percentage of expenditure is 45.37 to the total plan provision of Rs. 1.08 lakhs, provided under this scheme.

6) DAIRY DEVELOPMENT :-

Under this sub-head there are three schemes, which are state sector schemes. The expenditure incurred under this sub-head, during 1965-66, is Rs. 0.82 lakh. The percentage of expenditure is 0.44 to the total plan provision of Rs. 198.21 lakhs provided under the major head, 'Agricultural programmes'. The percentage of expenditure is 0.56 to the total expenditure of Rs. 147.27 lakhs, incurred under the Major head 'Agricultural programmes,' during 1965-66. The details of the schemes are as under:

From the above it will be seen that under 'Agricultural programmes' the percentage of expenditure is the highest.

This is due to the fact that the percentage of expenditure under the sub-head 'Soil conservation' is 147.06 to the plan Rs. lakhs provision of 54.96/provided under this sub-head. In Osmanabad district, the percentage of rain fall is low and hence most of the M land in this district is brought under bunding during the Third Five Year plan period. Similarly heavy expenditure is incurred in the plan period for construction of bandharas and tanks. The major head Transport and communication stands second in expenditure. This is due to construction of district and rural roads during the Third Five Year Plan period. The low expenditure under the Major head 'Industry and Mining' is the lowest as no small scale industries are established in this district.

This scheme is implemented since 1963-64. The works started under this scheme are in progress.

III. INDUSTRY & MINING

SSI-11 - Industrial co-operatives including co-operatives of handicraft workers.

Under this scheme, 25 industrial societies of handicraft workers are organised during the plan period. Similarly 3 societies have been assisted with loan & subsidy for tools & equipments and other expenses during 1965-66.

SSI-12 Development of handloom weavers' Co-operative societies:

Under this scheme, 13 weavers' societies have been assisted with subsidy during plan period. Similarly rebate is given to 7 weavers' societies during the plan period. Subsidy to Central Financing Agency is given during 1965-66.

IV. TRANSPORT & COMMUNICATION

T & C -10 District Roads:-

Out of 7 spalled over road works having 99 miles, work of 88 miles has been completed during the plan period.

Out of 12 new road works having 231 miles taken during the plan period, earth work of 213/ miles, material collection of 150 miles & 67 C.D. works have been completed during the plan period.

T & C 12 Construction of rural roads :-

This scheme was taken up, during 1964-65 only. The road works taken up, under this scheme, are in progress.

V SOCIAL SERVICES

1. General Education

GE-1 & 2 : Expansion of Primary education and Extension of Universal free & compulsory education :-

Under this scheme, 1928 primary teachers have been appointed during plan period, as against the plan target of 1578. The percentage of achievement is 122.18. During 1965-66, 605 Primary teachers have been appointed as against of target of 827, fixed for 1965-66. The percentage to target fixed for 1965-66 is 73.15.

GE-4:- Basic training of Primary teachers :

Under this scheme, 2354 Primary teachers are trained in basic training during plan period, as against the plan target of 729. The percentage to plan target is 301.79. Similarly 2200 xxxag teachers have been appointed under this scheme, during the plan period, as against the plan target of 729. The percentage to plan target is 302.88.

GE-6 Construction of buildings for primary Schools

Under this scheme, work of 144 class rooms, ^{has} have been completed during plan period as against the plan target of 277 rooms. The percentage to plan target is 51.98. During 1965-66, work of 66 school rooms has been under taken & the same is in progress.

GE-13 Provision of additional classes in Govt. Secondary Schools :-

During plan period, 313 additional classes have been opened, as against the plan target of 165 classes. The percentage to plan target is 189.70. Similarly 313 teachers have been appointed during plan period, as against the plan target of 250. The percentage to plan target is 125.20.

GE-18 Scholarships in secondary Schools :-

During 1965-66, Scholarships to 12 students have been given as against the target of 35, fixed for 1965-66. The percentage to target fixed for 1965-66 is 34.28.

GE-21 Development & opening of technical high Schools :-

Under this scheme, one technical high school has been started at Latur, during the plan period, as per the plan target.

2) TECHNICAL EDUCATION

TE-4 Development of existing polytechnics and taking over of private polytechnics :-

Under this scheme, the private polytechnics at Latur has been taken over, by Govt. during the plan period, for development. Additional intake capacity of the polytechnic is 60.

3) MEDICAL & NURSING

MED-8 :- Provision of additional beds for tuberculosis at district hospital:-

Under this scheme, work of constructing building for chest clinic at Latur was undertaken during the Second Five Year Plan period. This work is completed during the Third Five Year Plan period.

4) PUBLIC HEALTH

PH-1 Primary Health Centres :-

This is a staff scheme. Under this scheme, 6 primary health centres are established during plan period.

PH-7 :- Strengthening of establishment for vaccination against small pox :-

Under this scheme, staff i.e. vaccinators are appointed for vaccination against small pox.

PH-8 Family Planning:-

During 1965-66, 2350 sterilisation operations as against the target of 2125, have been performed. The percentage to target fixed for 1965-66 is 110.16. Similarly, 6051 I.U.C.D. insertions as against the target of 5170 for 1965-66 have been done. The percentage to target fixed for 1965-66 is 117.04. The plan achievements under sterilisation operation & 'I.U.C.D. insertion' are 8137 & 6051 as against the plan targets of 10409 & 5000 respectively.

The percentages of plan achievements to plan targets pertaining to sterilisation operations & I.U.C.D. insertions are 78.17 & 121.02. respectively.

PH-2 National Malaria Eradication Programme.

Unit is entered into consolidation phase, from attack phase. Eradication of Malaria is done in Latub, AUSA Bhum, Parenda Kallam, & Gsemanabad talukas. Malxxx

Maintenance phase is started in Latur, Ausa, Kallam, Bhum, & Parenda talukas.

5) WATER SUPPLY AND DRAINAGE

WS-5 Village well water supply scheme :-

No achievement is made under this scheme, during 1965-66.

6) HOUSING

HSG-4 Villages housing project scheme:-

Scheme is implemented in 13 villages out of 14 villages. 201 houses have been constructed during plan period & 294 are under construction.

7) SOCIAL WELFARE

SW-11- Welfare Extension Project:-

Under this scheme, 43 balawadies, 22 literacy classes, 11 maternity centres & 24 Arts & craft classes have been started during the plan

8) LABOUR AND LABOUR WELFARE

LAB-1 Technical & vocational training :-

Under this scheme, Industrial training institute is established at Latur, during plan period. Construction work of main building & workshop of Industrial training Institute Latur is in progress. The additional Intake capacity is 168, as against the plan target of 264. The percentage to plan target is 63.64.
