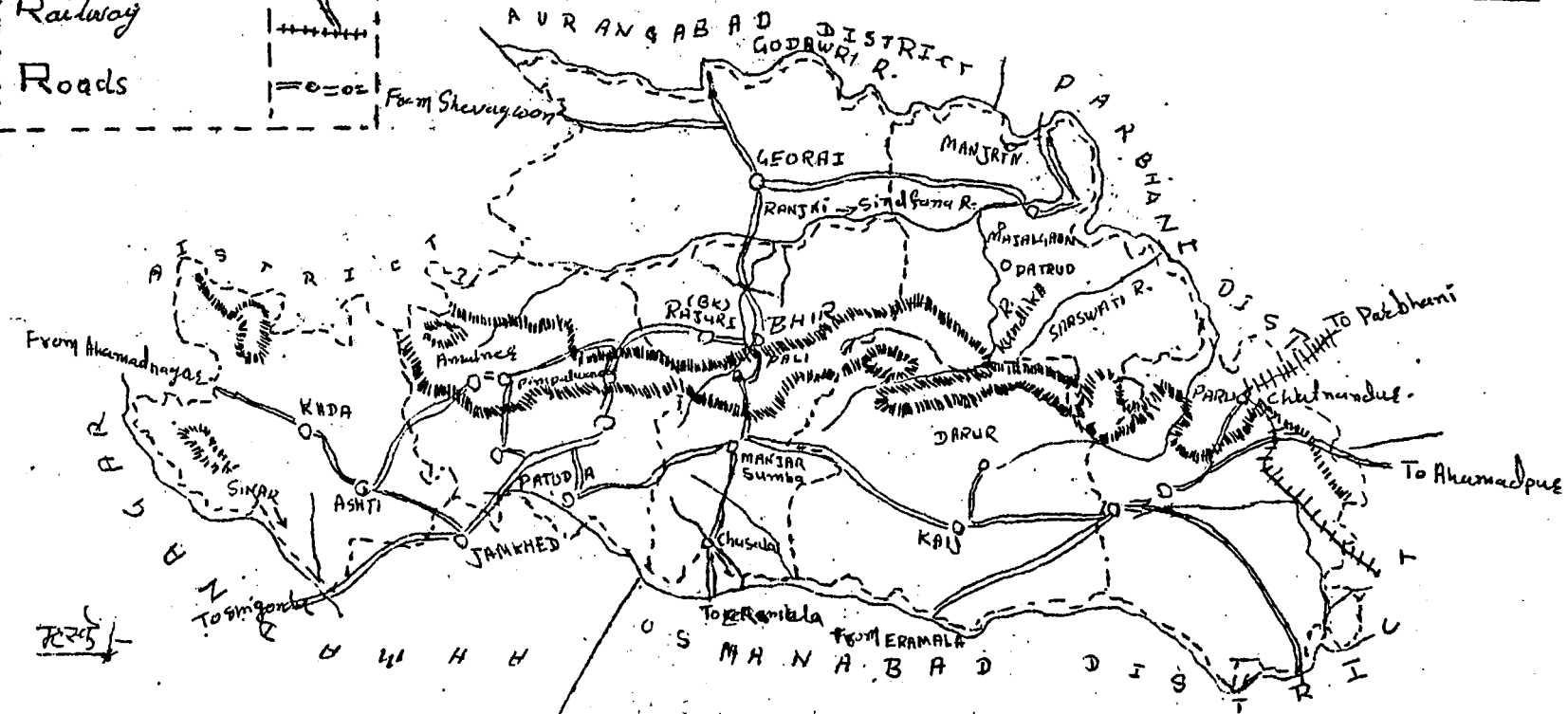

SOCIO-ECONOMIC REVIEW 1967-68

1. Introduction.

1.1 Introduction and Location.

The district of Bhir was known to history as Asmaka during Vedic, Epic and Puranic ages. Panini refers to Asmaka which included a portion of modern Bhir district. In the days of Pandvas, it was known as Durgavati and later on during the regime of queen Champavati, it was named as Champavatinagar. It was ruled by the Andharas, the Chalukyas, the Rashtrakutas and the Yadvas and subsequently went under the rulers of Delhi. At the time of Mohamed Tughlak, the district was named as Bhir. The history of its name is rather ~~sh~~ shrouded in mystery. The district is strewn with ancient religious places, the notable amongst them being (1) Kankaleshwar temple (at Bhir town) (2) Khandeshwari temple (at Bhir) Khandoba temple (at Bhir town) (4) Kapildhara temple tirth (near Manjar-sumba village in Bhir taluka) (5) Yogeshwari temple (at Ambejogai town) (6) Vajjnath temple (at Parli town) (7) Renukadevi temple (at Renapur in Ambejogai taluka) (8) Umadevi temple (at Umapur village in Georai taluka) and (9) Nine Ganesh temple (at Rajuri Navgan, in Bhir taluka). In addition, the "SAMADHI" (tomb) of Mukundraaj, the first poet of Marathi, is situated on a ravine called Ghod-Dari ~~low~~ two or three miles away from Ambejogai town. In this town itself there is the "SAMADHI" tomb of Dasopant, a saint, poet and contemporary of Eknath. The Vajjnath temple of Parli, referred to above, is one of the twelve jyotirlingas.

The original temple is lost and another temple at the same site is constructed by Ahilyabai Holkar. Stylistically it is similar to Ahilyabai's temple at Ellora. At the advent of modern period of history the Bhir district was under the regime of Nizam of Hyderabad. Following the reorganisation of states, the district of Bhir along with other districts of Marathwada became a part of the then ~~state~~ state of Bombay and with the creation of Maharashtra in 1960, it formed the part of a new state.

The eastern portion of the district is situated in the central part of Marathwada. It lies between $18^{\circ} 23'$ to $19^{\circ} 30'$ north latitude and $74^{\circ} 54'$ to $76^{\circ} 57'$ western longitude, with a total geographical area of 10,921.8 sq.kms.

1.2. Boundaries.

The district is bounded on the north by Aurangabad and Parbhani districts, and on the east by the southern portion of Parbhani district. On the west, it is touched by Ahmednagar district. Osmanabad district lies to the south of this district. The district has natural boundaries carved by rivers, the Godavari in the north and Manjra on the southern side.

1.3 Administrative set up.:

The district is divided into the sub-divisions for administrative purpose as eastern and western parts. In all there are seven talukas in the district and they are put under the two ~~sub~~ subdivisions as detailed below:

- (1) Bhir Sub-division. Bhir, Ashti, Patoda and Geora

(2) Ambejogai Sub-division. Ambejogai, Kaij and Manjlegaon.

of
The district comprises seven towns and 1,031 inhabited villages with a population of 10,01,466 according to 1961 Census. Every town has a Municipality and all the villages have been covered by Grampanchayats. Three, out of every four persons in the district gain their livelihood directly from the soil. During the period 1967-68 there were 7 Panchayat Samities functioning in the district under Zilla Parishad, Bhir and 755 Grampanchayats including Group Grampanchayats. The Zilla Parishad had in all 161 members, out of which 141 were elected, 10 were associate members and the remaining ten (10) were co-opted. Each Panchayat Samiti had a chairman and Deputy Chairman. The Zilla Parishad has 12 sections and the chairman of the Panchayat Samities were ex-officio members of the Zilla Parishad. There were different committees to help the president of Zilla Parishad in the discharge of official duties.

1.4 Area.

As per 1961 Census, the district has an area of 10,921.8 Sq.kms., out of which 10,599.0 Sq.kms is rural area. In terms of area, the district ranks 13 th in the state and last in the region, being the smallest. Since a decade there were no territorial changes in the district. The urban area of the district was more in 1951 when there were 8 towns in it. But in 1961 Pangaon, in Ambejogai taluka treated as urban unit during 1951 Census, was deurbanised and therefore the urban area of the district at present is 322.8 Sq.kms. only. Within the district on the basis of area, Kaij taluka ranked first, followed by Ambejogai, Georai & Patoda.

1.5 Topography.

The district is partly table-land and partly in-broken country with elevations between 300 to 900 metres. The hill ranges of Balaghat spread over in the central part of the district. Conditions in general in the western part of the district comprising, Bhir, Patoda and Ashti talukas are not so favourable as in the eastern part which possesses more fertile soils and receives assured rainfall. A portion of the district on north and south side is plain. Due to the ranges of Balaghat, the district is divided into uplands locally called, Ghat or Balaghat and low-lying portion in the north called "Gangathadi", some portion of Kaij and Ambejogai talukas is also touched by these ranges.

1.6 Hills, Rivers and Soil:

The central part of the district is a hilly tract occupied by Balaghat ranges and the major part of Patoda mahal and Ashti taluka is covered by the hills and appears deserted, when compared with Kaij and Ambejogai talukas. The Balaghat ranges are spread over the northern part of Ashti taluka, most of Patoda and central part of Bhir taluka. The main rivers of the district are the Godavari, the Manjra, the Sindhphana, the Kundka, the Bindusara, the Van and the Sina. The Manjra rises from the hills of Patoda. Rivers the Kundka, the Van, the Sindhphana rise from Balaghat hills. The small rivers in the district are the Mehkari, the Kamblī and the Kadi.

The entire district is situated in the trap region and its soils are mostly fertile black cotton soils especially so in Georai and Manjlegaon talukas. Deep, medium and shallow soils are also prevalent in the district. They are dark gray to black in colour, blacky in structure and clayey in texture. The soils are retentive of moisture. They become sticky when wet and crack freely in the dry weather. The soil from the western part of the district indicates the existence of salt to the extent of 0.5 %. The soils along with the banks of the Sindhaphana, the Godavari and the Manjra, are more fertile and are useful for any kind of crop. Nearly half of the cultivable area of the district ^{is} generally cropped under kharif and about one fourth of the area is generally under Rabi crops. Jowar, bajra and wheat are the most important food crops of the district. Other crops include groundnut, rice, pulses, safflower, cotton and a sugarcane.

1.7 Climate.

The geographical and climatic conditions of the district have greatly influenced its economic and social life. The climate of the district is pleasant and agreeable during the greater part of the year. Patoda and Kaij taluka have cool climate even in summer. A village, namely Chincholi, in Patoda has highest elevation from the sea level and its weather in summer season is akin to that of hill station. Among all talukas climate of Ambejogai is very pleasant and a T.B. sanatorium was started there mainly on climate consideration. The climate of Bhir, Manjlegaon & Georai on the low lands is warm and humid.

1.8 Temperature:

During the year 1967 the maximum temperature of 41.4 C^o was recorded in May as against the maximum temperature of 39.8 C^o recorded in the same month of 1966. The minimum temperature during 1966 and 1967 was 12.0 C^o and 11.9 C^o respectively. Thus the temperature on an average for the district was 26.7 C^o during 1967 as against 26.4C^o in 1966.

1.9 Rainfall:

The district is divided into high and low level tracts by the central ghats, running through Bhir and Patoda talukas. The highest rainfall recorded in Manjlegaon taluka during both years under report. The rainfall is not uniformly distributed during the monsoon. Talukas situated in eastern part of the district, received generally assured rainfall ~~for~~ during monsoon period which starts in June and continues till October. In 1961 on an average the rainfall for the district was 706.8 m.m. and it was 661.2 m.m. in 1967.

CHAPTER-II.

Explanatory notes on scope and limitation of Statistics
presented in District Statistical Abstract.

2.1 Purpose.

This is 7th issue of the District Statistical Abstract to be published since the year 1958-59. In this abstract exhaustive statistics about important Socio-Economic indicators of the economy have been presented. District Statistical Abstract covers many topics to make it useful as a reference book for research, planning and further Socio-Economic studies about the district. In most of the tables the data for the year 1967-68 has been given. In case of a few tables the data for the publication year is not available, so the data for the latest available year have been furnished. For the sake of comparison efforts have been made to furnish similar data for one of the earlier years.

The statistical material presented here is initially compiled by various departments of State Governments, Government of India and Local bodies etc. The footnotes showing the sources from which the material has been obtained have been indicated at the end of each table.

2.2 District At a Glance.

In this statement the data is given for the district in comparison with the divisional level figures which brings forth salient features of the district. The reference period for the figures concerning the district and division, is the same for each item.

2.3 The scope and limitations of the information in this abstract is discussed in the following paragraphs.

2.4 Climate and rainfall.

2.4.1. The table No. 1 presents monthwise information regarding rainydays and actual rainfall relating ^{to} eight centres in this district. Most of these rainfall recording stations are at taluka head quarters. The normal rainfall recorded for each centre is the average rainfall of prolonged period usually ^{of} eighty years.

2.4.2.

Table No. 2 gives monthly maximum, minimum and mean temperatures at selected eight centres in Bhir district. The maximum temperature shown in the table is not actual maximum but average of maximum temperatures during various months.

2.5 Area and Population.

2.5.1. The data of 1961 Population census is presented in the table alongwith the information pertaining to variation in population data of 1951 and 1961. The various concepts and definations adopted at the time of census concerning village, town, worker, household etc. have been clarified in detail in the publication of Census ~~xx~~ Hand Book 1961.

2.5.2. The table No.3 gives districtwise figures of area, rural and urban population, population density and variations with 1951 Census. The table No. 4 shows the talukawise classification of villages according to population ranges in 1961 Census, while classification of towns according to population ranges have been indicated in table No. 5 .

The table No. 6 presents the talukawise figures of no. of workers according livelihood classes. The distribution of non-workers is also given for different taluka in ~~the~~ the same table. The distribution of population according to age-group, mother tongue and religion is presented in table No. 7. The table No. 8 indicates talukawise scheduled caste and scheduled tribes population according to 1961 Census.

2.5 Agriculture.

2.5.1. The table No. 9 to 19 on agriculture included in this section gives information of land utilisation, area under different crops, yield per hectare and outturn, area irrigated by crops and sources, no. of irrigation wells, minor irrigation works, major and medium projects.

2.5.2. The major part of the data on agriculture has been collected from the Statistician, Department of Agriculture, Maharashtra State, Poona.

2.5.3. The table No.9 gives utilisation of land according to standard heads of utilisation for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67, Table No. 10 presents area under different crops while table No.11 indicates the figures of outturn and average yield rate per hectare of principal crops for the district. Table No.12^{shows} the distribution of net irrigated area by sources of irrigation. The figures of area irrigated under principle crops of each Tehsil have been shown in the table No.13. Next table No.14 gives the no. of irrigation wells in use and not in use for each taluka. The Table No.15 and 16 gives data relating to major irrigation works and major and medium irrigation projects in each taluka.

Table No.17 gives the information regarding agricultural wage rates for the selected centres while the table no.18, provides the data regarding agricultural implements in each taluka per 1966 Livestock Census. The Famine and Scarcity data is shown in the table No. 19.

2.6 Animal Husbandry, Forest and Fisheries.

2.6.1. Animal Husbandry.

Table No. 20 presents talukawise data relating to the different categories of livestock poultry etc. enumerated at the time of quinquennial Livestock Census 1966. The table No.21 gives information regarding development activities of veterinary department in this district and details about veterinary aid extended. Diseasewise Livestock mortality in Bhir district has been shown in table No.22 while the table No.23 indicates information of the recognised slaughter houses including licenced slaughter houses and no. of animals slaughtered in them.

2.6.2. Forest.

Two tables included in this section give details of area under different ranges and estimates of different forest produce.

2.6.3. The activities of inland ~~xxx~~ fisheries is in very small scale, for which no proforma has been prescribed.

2.7. Employment, Industry, Mining and Electricity.

2.7.1. Industries and Employment.

The factory statistics is shown in table No.25, 26 and 27 covers following types of factories, regarding registered under Factory Act 1948.

- (1) Those factories using power and employing 10 or more workers.
- (2) Those factories not using power but employing 20 or more workers.
- (3) Those factories not covered by (1) and (2) above but notified by the Government as covered by Factories Act.

2.7.2. The table No.25 presents for each industry the total no.of working factories, the no.of man days for which they worked during the year and the average daily employment classified By adults, adolescents and children. The industries are classified as per standard classification.

Table No.26 presents the information pertaining to distribution of working factories according to product and their working strength. The table No.27 indicates the distribution of factories according to number of days worked.

2.7.3. All the three tables present usual employment exchange statistics except the table No.30 which indicates the volume of employment in different industries.

2.7.4. The table No.31 and 32 gives the data of Govt. servants as per Census conducted in the year 1966.

2.7.5. The table No.33 and 34 presents the data regarding electricity consumption as well as no.of towns and villages covered under electrification programme.

2.8 Co-operation.

In all 8 tables included in this section under which statistics relating to various activities of co-operative movement in the district ^{are} shown .

Table No.35 gives information in a summary form regarding number of different types of societies while the table No.36 indicates the statistics relating to co-operative banks. The information in respect of talukawise primary agricultural credit societies maintained in table No.37 and the table No. 38 presents the data regarding other co-operative societies of different types. The operation of primary co-operative marketing societies is shown in table No.39 while the table No.40 gives the operation of different societies. The table No.41 indicates the activities of regulated markets in each taluka. The number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them presented in the table No. 42.

2.9 Medical and Public Health.

There are 4 tables in this section. The table No. 43 represents the information about medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies in each taluka. The table No.44 and 45 gives information about vital statistics. The table No.46 indicates the vaccination statistics and cholera inoculation whereas the information regarding hygienic drinking water supply sources in the rural area is given in table No.47.

2.10. Education.

There are eight tables in this section. The table No.47 indicates literacy in each taluka according to 1961 Census. Percentages of literacy have been shown separately sexwise as well as for rural and urban areas. As the literate is defined as a person who can read and write simple letter, persons having higher education are also included in this category.

Table No.48 and 49 indicates the education in rural and urban areas in the district as per 1961 Census. Table No. 50 gives no.of institutions typewise and enrollment therein for the year under review. The information is given districtwise pertaining to strength of beneficiaries of backward class pupils in table No.51. The table No.52 indicates the strength of students getting benefits of the concession under the scheme of economically backward class concession of free education. Expenditure on primary education by way of grant-in-aids to Local bodies is indicated in table No.53. The classification of villages having no primary schools is indicated in the table No.54 which shows the growth of education in villages in each taluka of the district.

2.11 Transport and Communication.

Under this section the statistics relating to various modes of transport are given. The table No.55 gives the railway length according to different types of rail gauges in Bhir district. The road length according to the category as well as type of surface of roads is given in the table No. 56. This table also includes the roads constructed by the different agencies such as Municipal Councils, Zilla Parishad and B. & C. department. Table No.57 gives relevent statistics regarding no.of motor vehicles in operation in Aurangabad division. as separate data is not available for Bhir district. The next table No.58 gives operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport according to S.T.divisions Aurangabad and Nanded as Bhir district is covered under the above two state transport divisions.

No separate State Transport division for Bhir district is yet established. The traffic census on important roads conducted by the B.&C. department on 6th November 1966 in Bhir district is indicated in the table No. 59. The table No.60 indicates growth of the postal facilities extended to urban and rural areas of the district since 1961-62 to 1967-68. The table No. 61 presents the statistics regarding rural broad casting in Bhir district.

2.12. Local Bodies.

The available statistics about village panchayats, Municipal Councils and Zilla Parishad are given in this section. The table No.62 shows the income and expenditure of the local bodies mentioned above for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68. The number of villages covered under Gram-Panchayats is also shown in this table. Table No.63 presents Panchayat Samiti-wise data regarding income and expenditure of Gram Panchayats. Similarly the headwise receipts and expenditure of Zilla Parishad is indicated in the table No.64-A and 64-B. The financial position with opening balances of Zilla Parishad is also shown in these tables. The table No.65 gives figures of income and expenditure for each Municipal Council according to different classification and sub-heads.

2.13. Plan and Community Development.

Five tables are included in this section. The first two tables give the details of expenditure and physical achievement under various schemes included in the Annual Plans, for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68. The table No.68 gives particulars of C.D. programme implemented in the district.

In the next table No.69, expenditure incurred in different stages of each block is shown while the physical achievement under selected items by all C.D./ Stage-I/ Stage-II blocks operating in each block operating in this district is shown in table No.70.

2.14 Prices.

Table No.72 presents average retail prices of important commodities at district head quarter during the calendar year 1966 and 1967, while the details of consumers price index for working classes is shown in table No. 72 for Aurangabad and Nanded centres. The consumers price index number for working classes is based on the price level of 1961.

2.15 Judicial and Administrative.

There are in all 3 tables included under this section. Table No.73 gives the statistical data of strength of police force. The next table no. 74 gives the crime statistics of this district for the calendar years under review. Table No. 75 gives the details of work disposed off in civil and criminal courts.

2.16. Miscellaneous.

The table No.76 deals with the cinema statistics, while the table No.77 gives the Banking offices established in Bhir district. Table No. 78 pertains to joint stock companies while the table No.79 gives the data about insurance statistics. The amount collected under the Small Saving scheme is given in table No.80.

The land revenue statistics for each taluka and the data of general election held in 1967 is incorporated in the table No. 81 and 83 respectively. The table No. 82 gives the number of daily, biweekly and weekly news papers published in this district. The no. of printing presses existing in this district is also given in this table. The table No. 84 indicates trends in the selected items during the years 1950-51, 1955-56, 1960-61, 1966-67 and 1967-68.

CHAPTER-III.AN ANALYTIC REVIEW:3.1 Percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown:

This indicator shows the extent of double cropped area in relation to the net cropped area in the district. It will be clear from the table given below that the proportion of gross cropped area in relation to net cropped area in the district is insignificant (less than 7 %). Lack of adequate irrigational facilities and assured rainfall accounted for the low proportion of double cropped area in the Bhir district. During the year 1961-62, 1965-66 and 1966-67, the percentage of double cropped area was 105.9 %, 106.8 % and 105.8 % respectively as can be seen from the table. This indicates that there was no much variation as regards the proportion of double cropped area in both the years 1965-66 as compared to the year 1961-62. However a slight decline in the proportion of double cropped area in the year 1966-67 may be attributed to the inadequate and untimely rainfall. During the year under review, within the district, Patoda taluka had relatively higher proportion of double cropped area.

3.2 Productivity of important crops.

The figures in the table given below pertain to yield and production of important crops. The yield rate of all important crops in the district had shown decline in the year 1966-67 over the year 1961-62 where as the yield rate of sugarcane and dry chillies went up in the year 1965-66 in comparison with the year 1961-62. In respect of production except sugarcane and dry chillies all the remaining crops had shown decline in the production in 1965-66 as compared to the year 1961-62. Similarly the production of Rabi jowar and sugarcane has recorded increase in the year 1966-67 as compared to year 1961-62. The remaining crops in their production drifted downward as compared to the year 1961-62. The production of wheat, Rabi jowar, Bajri, Gram and Tur crops had increased in the year 1966-67 over the year 1965-66.

During the year 1961-62, the net area irrigated in the district was 39 thousand hectares which constitute 4.7 % of the net cropped area. As a result of Govt. efforts to increase the irrigational potential under plan development programme, the gross irrigated area in the district is increased to 58 thousand hectares in 1965-66 accounting for 31.8 %. During the year 1966-67, however, there has been slight decrease in the area under irrigation due to paucity of rains.

3.4.2. Georai, Ashti, Patoda and Kaij taluka showed an increase in the percentage of irrigated area in 1966-67 as compared to the year 1961-62.

3.4.3. Percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown.

The table above indicates that the percentage of net irrigated area increased in both the years under review when compared with the year 1961-62. The percentage increased was about 2.3 % and 2.2 % in 1965-66 and 1966-67 over the year 1961-62. The irrigation potential has increased under plan.

3.5. Changes in the crop pattern (Total and Irrigated).

It is found from the table below that area under total food crops as well as under non-food crops in 1965-66 and 1966-67 was less in district, than it was in 1961-62. The percentage of total food crop to the gross cropped area ^{increased} was/in both the years 1965-66 and 1966-67 as compared with the year 1961-62. The percentage of total non-food crops to the gross cropped area in the district decreased during the same period from 25.5 % in 1961-62 to 24.0 % and 23.1% in the years 1965-66 and 1966-67 respectively. Within the district Georai taluka has recorded an increase only under food crops in both years 1965-66 and 1966-67 over the year 1961-62, whereas the talukas of Bhir, Kaij and Ambejogai showed decrease in percentage of total food crops to gross cropped area in the year 1966-67 as compared to the years 1961-62 and 1965-66.

In Bhir district, food crops are predominant as it accounts for nearly 3/4 th of the net cropped area. Reviewing the cropping pattern, it was observed that percentage of food crops has recorded slight increase in the year 1966-67 (76.9 %) ^{as} compared to that in the year 1961-62 (74.5 %). This indicates a slight shift in cropping pattern in favour of food crops.

3.5.2. Regarding irrigated crops in the district it was found that the irrigated area under cereals and pulses showed an increase in the year 1966-67 as compared to the same with the year 1961-62. But both the crops recorded a fall in 1966-67 as compared with the same over the year 1965-66. The percentage of total irrigated food crops to the crops irrigated was reduced from 95.6 % in the year 1961-62 to 94.2 % in 1965-66 and 92.3 % in 1966-67; whereas the same in respect of irrigated non-food crops had increased from 4.4 % in 1961-62 to 5.8 % in 1965-66 and 7.7 % in 1966-67.

During the year 1967-68, the out standing dues were $2\frac{1}{2}$ times more than they were in the year 1961-62. Coming to talukawise position regarding this dues, it was found that Georai, Ashti and Ambejogai talukas had more dues in 1967-68 as compared to other talukas of the district.

The average prices of all important crops in the district went up in 1966-67 when compared with the average prices of 1961-62. This had naturally increased the gross value of Agriculture's production even ~~thru~~ though the production of few crops had decreased over the year 1961-62.

3.7 Agricultural wage rates:

The average wage rate paid to a field labourer and other agricultural labourer in 1967-68 in the district were found to be more as compared with the rates of 1963-64 and onwards. The rates showed their tendency as moving upward in all the three centres of Umapur, Kada and Renapur selected for collecting the data of wage rates of agricultural labour^{ers}. Among all types of labourers wage rates of skilled labourer and blacksmith were highest in the district.

The district being industrially backward, agricultural labourers in the district has no advantage to supplement their income by doing work in factories during the slack periods in agricultural operations. Owing to various reasons prices of essential commodities are soaring high consequently there was demand for increase in wage rates.

3.8 Live Stock per hectare of land.

The total bovine and ovine population in the district showed an increase from 10.47 lakhs in 1961 to 10.53 lakhs in 1966, although the bovine population was decreased from 7.45 lakhs in 1961 to 7.21 lakhs in 1966. Cultivable area per pair of male bovine population over 3 years worked to 6.9 hectare in 1966 compared to 7.3 hectares in the year 1961 in the district.

3.9 Poultry compared to population:

According to 1966 livestock census, the total poultry population in the district was about 1.6 lakhs which showed decrease of 33.3 % over that in the year 1961. As a result of this, the poultry per thousand population declined from 239 in 1961 to ¹⁵⁶ in 1966 in the district. Within the district, the ratio of poultry per thousand population in Kaij taluka varied from 251 in 1961 to 128 in 1966.

3.10.1. Electricity per capita consumption:

Electricity was first introduced in the district in the year 1957 when only one town out of 7 in the district was electrified. In the beginning of the third five year plan the generation of electricity in the district was only 497.2 thousand KWH.

This was increased by nearly five times in ~~1966~~ 1966-67 and further to 4,650.2 thousand KWH in the year 1967-68. Thus the per capita consumption of electricity rose from 0.4 in 1961-62 to 4.6 KWH in the 1967-68.

3.10.2. Similarly total consumption including domestic, Industrial etc. rose from 3.76 lakhs KWH in the year 1961-62 to 46.50 lakhs KWH in the year 1967-68. The utilisation of energy out-put in all sectors was found to be considerably more in 1967-68 as compared to the year 1961-62 and 1965-66.

3.11 Increase in the No. of candidates enrolled by the employment exchange and vacancies notified etc.

In the year 1967-68 the number of candidates enrolled on the live register of district employment exchange was 5,914 which showed an increase by 2,559 over 1961-62. The number of candidates placed in services in 1967-68 decreased as compared to the year 1965-66 and 1961-62. During 1967-68 number of candidates placed in employment was only 334 as against 685 and 432 in 1966-67.

Similarly the vacancies notified were 546 in the year 1967-68 as against 1,057 and 2,003 vacancies notified during the year 1961-62 and 1965-66 respectively.

3.12 Increase in in-door and out-door patients treated in hospitals and dispensaries.

During the year 1961 about 4 lakhs and in the year 1965 about 6 lakhs outdoor patients received treatment in Govt. ~~hospit~~ hospitals and dispensaries existing in the district. The number, however, increased to 7 lakhs during the year 1967. Similarly the number of in-door patients rose from about 3 thousand in 1961 to about 12 thousand during the year 1967.

The number of beds available per lakh ^{of} population increased from 40 beds in 1961 to 45 beds in 1965 and to 58 beds in 1967. As regards beds per lakh ^{of} population, the ratio is more in Ambejogai taluka and followed next by Bhir taluka.

3.13. Increase in the number of students in different categories in Bhir district.

The spread of education in Bhir district during the third five year plan was significant. The literacy percentage increased from 8.60 in 1951 to 15.09 in 1961. The percentage of literacy in Marathwada region increased from 9.09 % to 16.29 %. All the inhabited villages have been covered by educational facility by opening primary schools in each remaining villages during the year 1966-67. Thus no village remained in the district without schooling facilities.

3.13.2. The number of primary schools increased from 1,319 in 1965-66 to 1,374 in 1967-68 in the district. Similarly the enormous increase is seen from the table in primary students. This had increased from 98,347 in 1965-66 and 1,03,889 in 1966-67 to 1,05,432 in the year 1967-68. This indicates an increase ~~by~~ by 63 percent over the year 1961-62 and 3 percent over the year 1966-67. The strength of the primary teachers had showed an increase from 3,210 in 66-67 to 3,356 in 67-68.

The number of primary schools decreased in Manjlegaon and Ashti talukas in the year 1967-68 as compared to the year 1966-67 due to conversion of primary schools into secondary schools.

3.13.3. Secondary education:

Under secondary education, the number of institutions and the number of students and teachers increased appreciably in the year 1967-68 as compared to the year 1961-62. The number of institutions increased from 38 in 1961-62 and 115 in 1966-67 to 125 in 1967-68. The number of students including boys and girls increased from 10,675 in 1961-62 and 35,610 in 1966-67 to 38,161 in 1967-68. The strength of teachers also increased from 531 in 1961-62 and 1,428 in 1966-67 to 1,549 in 1967-68. Teacher student ratio in secondary schools in 1967-68 worked out to 1 teacher per 26 students and in primary schools for the same period it came to 1 teacher to 31 students.

3.13.4. Higher education.

Under higher education the number of institutions rose from 2 in 1961-62 to 3 in 1966-67. The number of colleges remained the same in 1967-68 as in 1966-67. The number of teaching staff and boys increased from 73 and 1,513 in 1966-67 to 80 and 2,122 during 1967-68 respectively. The ratio of teaching staff and college students worked out to 1 to 27 during the year 1967-68 in Bhir district.

3.13.5. Special Education.

Besides the above institutions district has been provided with special schools. During the year 1966-67 there were 6 special schools existing.

The same number was reduced by one during 1967-68 so the enrolment in remaining 5 school decreased during the year 1967-68 by 3 students and strength of teaching staff was decreased by 4. The teacher student ratio for these school worked out to about 1 : 13.

3.14 Increase in the road length per 100^{sq.}/km. District Bhir.

The road length in Bhir district per 100^{sq.}/km. increased from 6.4 kms. in 1961 to 9.8 kms in 1966 to 10.5 kms. in 1967 and to 10.8 kms. in 1968.

3.15 Increase in Banking Facilities proportion of population:

At the beginning of the third five year plan, there were only 9 banking offices in the district in 1962, and this number was double in 1966. It rose from 18 in 1966 to 34 in 1968.

3.16 Average retail prices collected at the Dist. H.Q.:

It will be seen from the following table that prices of almost all commodities in the district were an increase. In some cases they had went up two times the prices prevailing in 1962. The prices of wheat medium and wheat coarse moved from Rs. 0.66 and Rs. 6.63 in the year 1962 to Rs. 1.33 and Rs. 1.27, in the year 1967. The prices of Gramdal started rising from Rs. 0.64 in 1962 to Rs. 2.39 in 1967. Thus it increased to nearly four times prices in 1962 during the year 1967. Similarly, all pulses, showed the tendency of an increase in prices since 1963 to 1967. The price of gur fell only in the year 1965 as compared to the year 1962, and for the rest of the years it drifted upwards. The prices of groundnut oil and Vanaspati Dalda increased significantly in the year 1967 as compared to the prices prevailing during the year 1962.

The prices of remaining commodities have shown an increase with some slight fluctuation in between the years from 1962 to 1967.

CHAPTER - IV.PLAN REVIEW 1967-68 (PLANNING).

4.1 In order to keep the tempo of development works an annual development programme is implemented till the fourth five year plan of the country is finalised by the Government of India.

4.2 In drawing up the annual plan of 1967-68, the main object and policies of the State's fourth plan is to lay emphasis on the production sectors of the plan and to include provisions for the key programmes. The key-note of the annual plan has been to consolidate the gains already made and enlargement of those areas of operation where optimum gains accrue with the shortest possible time.

4.3 During the annual plan period of 1967-68, the total expenditure made on plan schemes in the district was to the tune of Rs. 157.44 lakhs, thus utilising 92.2 % of the total district annual plan provision. Attempt has been made below to discuss in brief sub-headwise financial and physical achievements made during the plan period under review.

4.4. The table below indicates the major headwise expenditure incurred during the year 1967-68 alongwith the percentage to the total expenditure incurred against each developmental head on district level schemes in Bhir district.

It is observed from the above that the agricultural programme accounted for highest percentage of the total plan expenditure (i.e. 60.32 %) due to emphasis laid on to step up agricultural production.

4.5 Agricultural programme.

As in the past, the programme for agricultural production has been assigned the highest priority with aim to increase the area under cultivation and to improve agricultural productivity. This is done through variety of programmes by undertaking measures for land development, like soil conservation, provision for irrigation and propagation of improved agricultural practices through better input factors like improved seeds, fertilizers etc.

4.6. Agricultural production:

This sub-head of development programme aimed at increasing agricultural production. The expenditure incurred on the schemes on agricultural production was to the tune of Rs. 15.19 lakhs which worked out to 16.0 % of the total expenditure made on agriculture programme.

4.7 Under this development programme the quantity of improved seeds of jowar and wheat produced was about 700 and 832 quintals during 1967-68. The additional area covered under fruits was 398 hectares. The chemical fertilizers such as, ammonium sulphate, super phosphate, fertilizer mixture, urea and others have been distributed to the extent of 466, 107, 741, 141 and 375 metric tonnes respectively during the year under review. 16,141 compost pits were dug, 18,947 metric tonnes compost was prepared and the area of 329 hectares was covered by green manuring.

4.8 Soil Conservation:

The purpose of soil conservation programme is to prevent soil erosion, to correct erosion where it has already set in and further to build up soil productively continuously. To stop erosion of soil, bunding programme was undertaken on large scale and the area about 29,735 hectares was bunded and area of 17 hectares was terraced in the district during the year under review by incurring an expenditure of Rs. 39.406 lakhs forming 39.4 % of the amount spent under the development programme of Agricultural sector.

4.9 Minor Irrigation:

The minor irrigation works programme was taken up with a view to provide quick irrigation facilities to the cultivators. Under this programme of development the expenditure incurred was to the order of Rs. 36.85 lakhs forming 38.8 % of the total expenditure on the major head of agricultural programme. This expenditure has provided assistance to cultivators for construction of new wells, installation of pumping sets.

The work of construction of 3 bandharas was completed. In all 3,775 new wells were constructed and 463 pumping sets were installed. The additional irrigation potential of 1,283 hectares was created under this programme of minor irrigation.

4.10 Animal Husbandry.

In a agricultural economy animal husbandry plays an important supporting role. So the programme of increasing improved cattle wealth was undertaken during the year under review. The amount of Rs. 0.50 lakhs were spent during the year 1967-68, under this development heads.

4.10.2. Under this programme 4 veterinary aid centres and two cattle breeding centres were started and cattle shows and rallies were held during the year under review.

4.11. Dairy Development:

Under this programme no scheme was implemented during this year 1967-68 in this district.

4.12 Forest:

The forest development programmes have laid down emphasis on ensuring adequate supply of firewood and timber to meet the demand for these products. (For afforestation of area and plantation of valuable trees during the year under review in Bhir district.)

Under this development programme the expenditure incurred was about Rs. 0.73 lakhs which forms 0.8 % of the expenditure made under the major head of agricultural production.

4.13 Fisheries.

In the context of the current food situation and acclaimed policy of self-sufficiency in food the importance of fisheries development has enhanced more than ever before.

Plan programme for the development of fisheries aims at raising the output by breeding of fast growing varieties (carp fry) through co-operatives working in the field, organisation of the market and facilities for preservation, transport of fish and training to fishermen.

4.13.2. The total expenditure on fisheries schemes ^{during} ~~during~~ the year 1967-68 in Bhir amounted to Rs. 0.71 lakhs utilising 0.7 % of the total expenditure under major head of agricultural production. In pursuance of making the schemes successful under this sub-head in Bhir district efforts have been made for fish rearing in fresh water which depended on supply of carp fry. Over 125 hundred finger lings were stocked and 123 quintal of fish were netted under this programme during the year 1967-68 in this district.

4.14 Ware-housing and marketing.

The object of the scheme was to give financial assistance to market committees so that necessary facilities may be provided by way of market yards, office building, shed, halls, rest houses etc.

4.14.2. Under the programme the amount of Rs. 2.05 lakhs were spent forming 2.1 % of the total expenditure incurred under the agricultural programme.

4.14.3. Under the scheme for development of agricultural marketing about 4 societies have been given financial assistance for development of market yards during the year under report.

4.15. Co-operation and Community Development.

Under this major head of development programme the total expenditure was to the order of Rs. 9.89 lakhs to strengthen and support cooperative structure for effectively discharging its vital functions through financial assistance under cooperation and to make better socio-economic condition of rural population through community development programme.

4.15.1. Cooperation.

Cooperation in rural areas is particularly emphasised with two fold purpose (1) to infuse the spirit of self help among cultivators and (2) to provide for their credit needs and other requirements on cooperative basis. An expenditure of Rs. 2.73 lakhs was incurred in the district during the year under review forming about 27.6 % of the amount spent on the major head of developments.

4.15.2. During the annual plan period agricultural credit society the total membership of 2,994 persons were enrolled. The short term and medium term loan advanced was to the extent of Rs. 169 lakhs and Rs. 7 lakhs respectively. The recovery made was about 90 % from agricultural credit societies during the year under report in the district.

4.15.3. Community Development.

This programme includes all important activities concerning rural population such as agricultural production, health and rural sanitation, social education, communication.

Rural arts, crafts and industries and rural housing. Under this sub-head of development expenditure incurred was to the tune of Rs. 7.16 lakhs forming 72.4 % of the total expenditure under the major head cooperation and community development on existing 9 community development blocks which covered the entire rural population of the district .

4.16 Industry and Mining.

The role of the state in this sector of development is to give aid to small scale industries in rural and under-developed areas of the state with the object to develop agro-industrial economy and to provide employment to local landless agricultural works.

4.17 Small Scale and Cottage Industries.

With the view to ~~encourage~~ encourage the traditional industries in rural areas, the financial and technical assistance was provided to small scale industries. During the annual plan of 1967-68 an expenditure of Rs. 1.37 lakhs, forming 120.2 % of the total expenditure under this major development head for the district was incurred for the purpose. Under this programme 4 cooperative societies of Handloom weavers were formed during the year under review.

4.18. Transport & Communication.

The whole of Marathwada has few transport facilities as compared to the current needs of this region. The programme covered the construction of district roads and rural roads in the district with the aim to link industrial areas and trading centres to the primary producing centres in rural areas.

4.18.2. Under the road construction programme the amount of Rs. 3.90 lakhs has been spent in the district during the year 1967-68. During this plan period 9 km. of new road under district road programme was constructed and 12 km. road was modernised. About 15 C.D. works were completed.

4.19 Social Services.

Under this development programme more emphasis was laid on the general education than on other sub-heads of development. The total expenditure made under this development head was to the order of 47.55 lakhs, forming 30.20% of the total annual plan expenditure.

4.20. General Education.

In the field of education, the programme has been oriented towards qualification improvement, ~~and~~ diversification of general education and expansion of technical education facilities.

4.20.2. Under this sub-head of general education the total expenditure made during the year under review was about 16.67 lakhs utilising about 34.2% of the total expenditure incurred on the development programme of social services.

4.20.3. Under the programme of education 2 school buildings were constructed and 2 rooms were added to the school buildings. To improve the qualitative aspect of education 399 teachers were trained during the year under report in this district. 31 new primary schools were opened and 7 secondary schools were also started due to which the strength of pupils increased by 10,646 and 1,424 pupils in primary and secondary schools respectively in the district.

4.21 Technical Education.

On the technical education programme the amount spent was to the order of Rs. 0.11 lakhs forming about 0.2% of the total expenditure under the major head of social services to increase the intake capacity of students in the existing institutions.

4.22 Medical & Nursing.

Under this sub-head schemes of curative services have been implemented with the aim to improve the general health particularly in rural areas.

4.22.2 The programme under this sub-head included expansion of facilities in civil hospitals and training of nurses and mid-wives.

4.22.3 To attain this objectives an expenditure of Rs. 2.03 lakhs was made under this programme during the year 1967-68, providing additional strength of 48 beds and other activities in civil hospitals.

4.23 Public Health.

In the field of public health, the programme on communicable diseases was intensified. The Family Planning programme was continued to limit the growth of population. Primary health centres were also maintained to improve the general health conditions in rural areas. Malaria eradication programme was also undertaken during the year under review.

4.23.2. Under this sub-head the expenditure incurred was to the tune of Rs. 13.86 lakhs utilising 29.1 % of the total expenditure made on the major head of social services.

4.23.3. Under this programme a new family planning unit at Manjlegaon was started in the district during the year under report.

4.24. Water Supply and Drainage.

The schemes under this development sub-head aimed at to provided potable drinking water which contributed to prevention of water born 'diseases'. The total provision under this programme made was to the order of Rs. 7.73 lakhs which formed 16.2 % of the total annual plan expenditure during the year 1967-68 in this district.

4.24.2. Under this programme 5 drinking wells were constructed and 20 villages were benefitted under rural water supply scheme during the year under report in the district.

4.25- Housing.

Housing is one of the essential requirement of life. In the organisation of community life whether in villages or in urban area, provision for housing have to be made in view of the thretening growth of population. The activities under this programme to solve the problem of housing included the activities pertaining to preparation of development plans of towns and lay-outs for extension of gaothans and residing villages by assisting local bodies.

4.25.2. Under this programme of housing low-income group housing scheme and village housing scheme was implemented during the year under review. 7 houses under low-income group housing scheme were completed and 53 villages have been covered by village housing scheme in the district during the year under review.

4.26 Welfare of Backward classes.

Under this sub-head efforts have been made to remove the handicaps of backward classes in all the Socio-Economic fields. The expenditure of Rs. 1.79 lakhs was incurred on various schemes for up-lift of backward class people utilizing 3.8 % of the total expenditure under the major head of social services.

4.26.2. Under this programme 29 members of mixed cooperative societies were assisted for purchase of share, 76 backward class pupils were granted scholarships and 2 backward class societies and 2 Vimukt jatis societies were given financial assistance under the scheme cooperative housing society during the year under report.

4.27 Labour and Labour welfare.

Under this programme, labour and labour welfare only one scheme pertaining to technical and vocational training was implemented during the year 1967-68 in this district. This scheme aims at to meet the requirement of skilled craftsman for various industries as well as for defence purposes.

4.27.2. The annual plan provided an out-lay of Rs. 5.99 lakhs for the year 1967-68 for this district.

4.27.3. The total expenditure incurred under this programme during this year was to the order of Rs. 4.43 lakhs utilizing 73.9 % of the annual provision. About 48 pupils were trained and 9 members were added to the strength of the staff under this programme during 1967-68.
