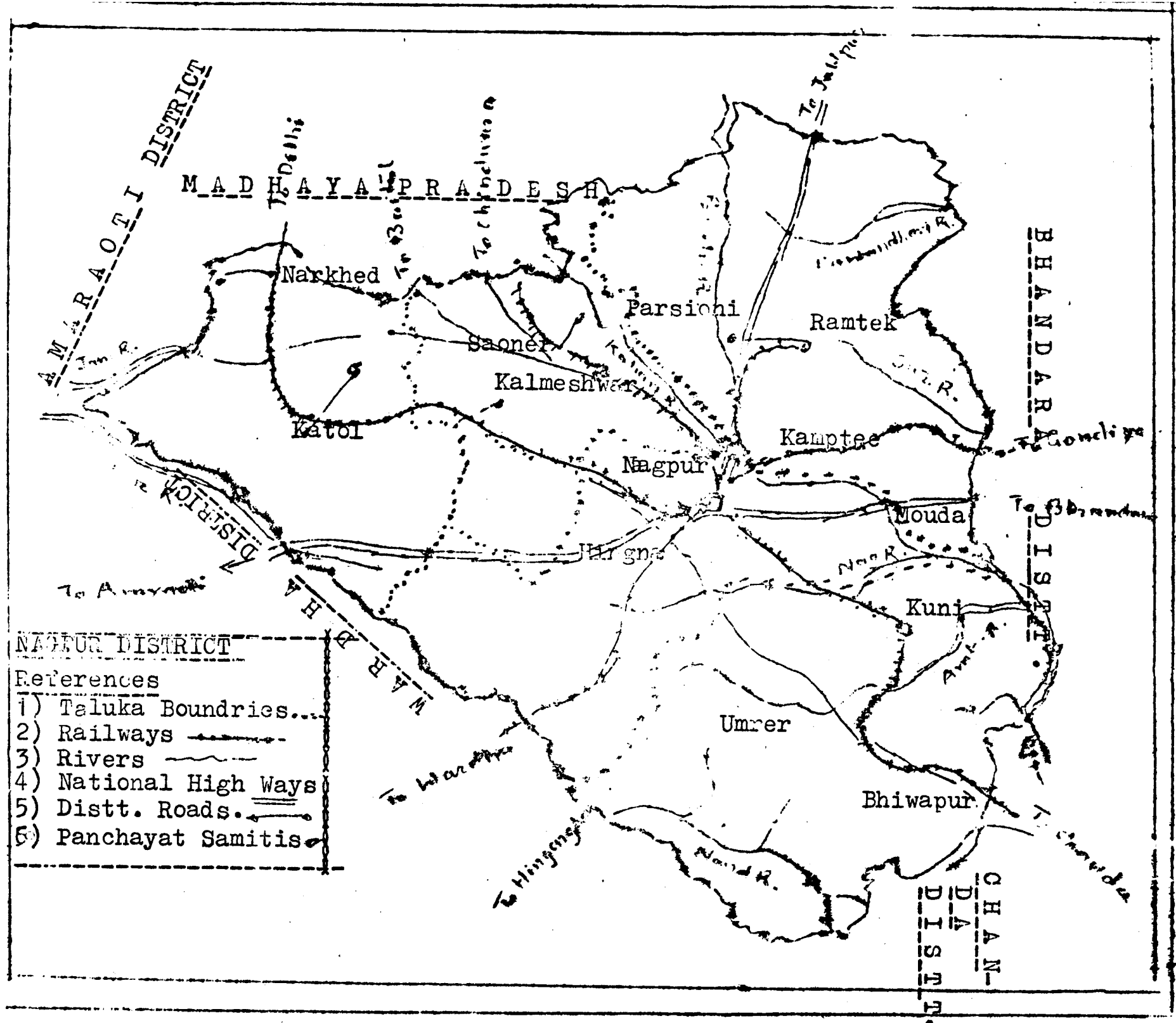

CHAPTER - I

INTRODUCTION

1.1 Introduction and location :-

The district is one of the eight districts of Vidarbha, which according to "MAHABHARAT" was the kingdom of Princess Damayanti. The royal house of Vidarbha was matrimonially connected with several princely families of North India. The Vidarbha princess Damayanti, Indumati and Rukmini who married Nal, Agi and Lord Krishna respectively, are well known in Indian literature. Several great Sanskrit and Marathi poets from Kalidasa onwards have drawn the themes of their works from their romantic lives. It is also mentioned in the "MAHABHASYA", "YOGITANTRA", "BHAGWAT PURAN", "BRIHATSAMHITA".

According to the historical records, Nandivardhan, the well-known ancient capital of the Vakatakas, is now represented by the village Nandardhan(Nagardhan) about three miles from Ramgiri(Modern Ramtek). Nagpur, which was situated near it, may have marked the original site of the modern town of that name. Tradition, however, gives the credit for settling the city of Nagpur to the Gond king Bakht Buland, the most distinguished ruler of Devagad in 1702. He founded the city of Nagpur by joining the twelve small hamlets formerly known as Rajapur Barsa. He constructed roads, divided the city into wards and erected a strong wall around as a protective measure. Much of the credit for the development of agriculture, industry and commerce in Nagpur goes to him. He brought industrious settlers into his domain by offering them liberal grants. The superstructure of the Maratha administration erected by the Bhosles, stood on the ground work prepared by Bhakt Buland. Seldom can one see anywhere such harmonious blending of antiquity, history & modernity. For architectural wonders brush shoulders with Sitaburdi fort & both suite benignly on the expanding progressive city.

The administrative system obtaining in Nagpur and the territory to its east during the Gond period was semifeudal. Nagpur proper then formed part of Devagad below the ghats. Part of old Nagpur is even today known as Burhanshah's killa named after the last deposed king of Gond dynasty.

Nagpur attained importance under Chanda Sultan, the son and successor of Bhakht Buland. Burhan Shah was the last Gond Ruler, after which the area passed into the hands of Bhosale dynasty, which ruled till 1853, when it was annexed by Lord Dalhousie. Raghujii Bhosale was mainly responsible for the prosperity of Nagpur. He brought along with him a number of families from Western Maharashtra and infused new order and life in the administration of Nagpur. Cultivation of Nagpur improved under Raghujii and a number of cultivator families settled in the territory under him. The credit of settling the weavers also goes to him. He died ^{at} Nagpur on 14 th February 1755 and soon after, Nagpur became a hot bed of political intrigues. Dasara festival at Nagpur during the reign of Raghujii Bhosale II was a brilliant spectacle displaying his grandeur and glory.

The district, as at present was formed in 1854. In 1861, the portion with Saugar and Narbada territories was formed into the Central Provinces by Lord Canning with Nagpur as its capital. The district lies between $20^{\circ} 35'$ and $21^{\circ} 44'$ North latitude and $78^{\circ} 15'$ and $79^{\circ} 47'$ East longitude in the plain, to which it gives its name at the southern base of the Satpuda Hills.

1.2 Boundaries:-

The district is bounded on the north by the Chhindwada and Seoni districts of the Madhya-Pradesh, on the east by Bhandara, on the South and west by Chandrapur and Wardha districts respectively; and along a small strip on the north-west by Amravati district.

It has an area of 9930 square kilometers (3834 Sq.miles) forming 3.34 percent of the total area of Maharashtra, with a population of 15,12,807 according to 1961 census i.e. 3.82 percent of the population Maharashtra. In size, it ranks 18 th in the Maharashtra and eleventh in terms of population.

1.3 Administrative set-up :-

The district comprises 5 sub-divisions or tahsils viz, Katol, Saoner, Ramtek, Nagpur and Umrer. It has 12 urban centres and 1653 rural settlements.

The Collector as the head is in charge of General Administration, Law and order, Treasury, Land Revenue, Civil Supplies etc. He is also a District Magistrate. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector in his office and by Deputy Collectors looking after different branches. One of the Deputy Collectors is vested with Magistrerial powers and is designated as the Additional District Magistrate. A Sub-Divisional Officer is put in charge of the administration of each of the five talukas of the district.

The sub-Divisional Officers is assisted by Tahsildar and Naib-Tahsildars in his administrative functions. There is also one Additional Tahsildar for Tenancy law. Each tahsil has been divided into 4 to 5 revenue circles, each being put in-charge of a Revenue Inspector. Patwaries are appointed for Halkas each containing on an average 3 to 4 villages depending upon the size of the village.

Besides the Collectorage, there are many other Regional and District Offices of different departments located in Nagpur city dealing in departmental matters.

Democratic Decentralisation :-

Zilla Parishad :- The "Balwantrai Mehta Committee" recommended the formation of Gram Panchayats, Panchayat Samitis and Zilla Parishad. These three responsible functionaries in the decentralisation of administration, which are entrusted

with the implementation of the developmental schemes came into existence under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act, 1961.

For promoting development of democratic institutions and for securing greater participation of the people on the development plans, local and government affairs, the Zilla Parishad constituted with the councillors, chosen by elections from the electoral divisions, was set up on 1st May 1962. It has 44 Councillors with no nominated members. Out of these, one seat is reserved for Scheduled Castes and 4 women councillors have been co-opted by the elected councillors. There are 5 associate councillors, who are Chairmen of the Five Federal Co-operative Societies. The Parishad has its jurisdiction corresponding to the former district Boards but excluding the Municipal Corporation, Municipal Towns and the Cantonment Board. The Parishad is presided over by the President, who is elected from amongst the councillors.

The work of the Zilla Parishad is carried out through 7 Subject Committees viz, Standing Committee, Finance Committee, Education Committee, Co-operation Committee, Agriculture Committee, Works Committee and Health Committee; which control the respective departments. For an overall administration, there is a competent machinery headed by the Chief Executive Officer of Senior I.A.S. rank. He has been vested with full administrative powers for carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act, 1961. He is assisted by the Deputy Chief Executive Officer and other Officers of various departments. The Finance branch is controlled by the Chief Accounts and Finance Officer and works on the lines of Finance Department of the State Government.

Panchayat Samiti :- Under Section 57 of the Act, a Panchayat Samiti has been provided for every Block, comprising all the elected and co-opted councillors from the area of the Block

and a Chairman of a Co-operative Society in the area of the Block is a co-opted members. Two members of village Panchayats are elected as members of the Panchayat Samiti. The Samiti is headed by a Chairman and the Block Development Officer works as a Secretary with the executive authority vested in him.

Village Panchayats :-

The last but not the least important ring in the chain of Government is provided for by the panchayats, which form the basis of Government. After the re-organisation of States, The Bombay Village Panchayat Act 1958 was made applicable to the district from 1st June 1959. The coverage programme under Village Panchayats, as envisaged under the Second Five Year Plan is now complete in the district. There are 652 Village Panchayats covering 1653 villages. The entire rural area of the district is now covered by the village Panchayats.

1.4 Area and territorial changes :-

The area, number of villages, population etc. covered by each taluka according to 1961 census is shown in the following table.

Nagpur district previously included the areas, which now are partly in Wardha and partly in Bhandara districts.

The area now constituting Wardha district was separated in 1862. There were only four talukas upto the year 1908, when a new taluka was created with its headquarters at saoner. There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district or talukas from 1911 onwards. With the Re-organisation of States, the district was transferred from Madhya-Pradesh to the erst-while Bilingual Bombay State and subsequently formed part of the Maharashtra since 1st May 1960.

1.5 Topography.

The district has an average elevation between 274.50 and 305 metres (900 and 1000 feet) above sea-level; Its bold relief is characterised, by and large, by the residual hill - ranges of the Satpudas and their detached, hillocks enclosing between them underlating black-soil valleys. Much of the topography is typically one of the Deccan Trap having flat-topped and terraced feathres, low buttressed sides and isolated knolls. East-wards and north-eastwards, the landscape changes in an interesting manner due to the change in the underlying rocks. The rocks of Gondwana Series are not only important because of their coal and manganese deposits, but in their surface expression, they present a low rolling topography within a poor soil cover and vegetation.

The greater part of the district is an undulating plateau with a variation in height between 652.70 metres (2140 feet) above sea-level on the upland ridges in the north and about 274.50 metres (900 feet) near the Kanhan river. This plateau surface of the district falls into three district drainage basins. The north-eastern and east-central portion, which is about two-thirds area of the the district, is drained by the Wainganga and its tributaries & the central and southern portion by the Wunna river, which is itself a tributary of the Wardha. The north-western fringes are drained by the Wardha and its tributaries-the Jam and the Kar.

east. Immediately south of these upland ranges, stretch the Ambagad Hills, the western extremity on which lies in the district. The historic temple of Ramtek is situated on a spur of this range signifying the Hill of Rama also known formerly as "Sundergiri (Vermilion Mount)" Tapogiti" (Hill of Penance). The western boarder of the district is marked by a low hill range extending more prominently from the environs of Mohli to the south of Umrer, with the break of the Wunna river almost in the middle. The Pilkapar hills in Katol tahsil are a smaller counterpart of this hill range. There are several detached hills, notably that of Sitabuldi in Nagpur City, which is visible from a long distance. These isolated hills or knolls attain no great altitude, hardly raising from 91.50 to 106.75 metres (300 to 350 feet) above the surroundings, but they present a characteristic appearance of flat or slightly rounded tops, covered with thin forests or brush wood and in some cases completely bare and stony.

1.6 Hills, Rivers and Soils :-

The Satpuda Hills :-

The main system of hills is the Satpuda and its offshoots. The northern range of hills extends along the whole border, being pierced only in two places where the Kanhan and the Pench rivers have broken through. On the west, it consists merely of the outlying foothills of the Satpudas, the plateau properly lying behind them in Chhindwada. But from the Kanhan to the Pench, it is the major range of the Satpudas themselves which denominates the landscape and the ascent of the Khamarpani plateau is made in Nagpur. Along this length, the hills well-wooded and

picturesque and there is some striking scenery on the PENCH river. The old Gond fort of Bhivagad stands on this range. Government managed forests in this district mainly cover to these hills between the Kankar and the Bawanthari. The cultivated villages are scattered here and there in the river-valleys, and the landscape is very pleasing and well-wooded, open glades alternating with patches of forest and clearings of cultivation, abounding in Mahua trees and tanks.

A few miles to the south of the main Satpuda range are two minor lines of hills, to the west and east of the PENCH. Those to the west lie between Bhivagad and Parseoni, terminating in the peak of Tekadi 508.34 metres (1669 feet). East of the PENCH are the Mansar hills, both these and the western range, being now denuded of trees and after a gap of a few miles, come the well-known Ramtek hills, raising to 427 metres (1400 feet) at Ramtek town. Timely measures by the Government have helped in retaining the wooded character of this range. Three miles east of Ramtek, the Sur river has forced a passage through the hills. Beyond this point, they are called the Ambagad range of Bhandara. The Ramtek hills terminate on the west in the form of a horse-shoe curve, its inner sides enclosing the beautiful and sacred tank of Ambala, one of the most charming pieces of scenery in the District. The temple hill at the extremity of the ranges, raising 183 metres (600 feet) sheer above the level of the plain, is at once a landmark on the surrounding part and a vantage-point from which the great Wainganga plain may be seen spread out below, its irregularities of surface softened into smoothness by the height from which one looks down upon it.

Minor Hills :-

The second main hill tract extends along the south-east of the district from Khargad on the Wardha river, where there are some fine waterfalls, to the

junction of Warora and Chauda with Nagpur. They separate the valley of the Kar from that of the Jam up-to Kondhali and further south - east from the water - shed between the latter river and the Bor. Near Bori, they become the Kauras plateau and here terminate to afford a passage for the Wardha river, continuing afterwards south - eastwards and dividing the valley of the Nand from the Wainganga plain. West of the Wunna, the range is mostly well-covered with picturesque valleys and ravines, among which are the narrow strips of rich well-irrigated land of great fertility. But to the east towards Umrer, the range has lower levels and is un-interesting. It consists of low bare hills which are grass-covered and boulder-strewn, except where, overlooking the Nand valley some excellent teak is grown.

The third main range runs northwards through the Katol tahsil from Kondhali to Kelod, separating the Wardha and Wainganga valleys. The highest peak of it is at Pilkapar.

Rivers :-

The Wardha and the Wainganga are the main rivers of the district. The Wardha flows along the part of the western border and controls the drainage system of the western part of the district. The principal tributaries of the Wardha are the Bor, the Wunna, the Jam and the Kar. The ~~It~~ rises in the hills near Bazargaon and rushes down a winding and rocky channel between Kondhali uplands and the Kauras plateau, passing into the Wardha to join the Wunna. Its narrow valley is very fertile and the high well-wooded cliffs on either side render it a wild and beautiful spot in the whole of the district.

The Wunna rises near the hill of Mahadagad in the Pilkapar range and flows along the northern base of the Kauras plateau past Hingna and Bori, where it is crossed by the Central railway.

It leaves the district at Ashta. The small Krishna river joins it at Bori.

The Jam rises among the hills south of Kondhali and flowing northwards into the centre of the Katol tahsil takes a westernly turn past Katol and joins the Wardha at Jalalkheda. The Kar rises in the same range, but flows directly south-west, separating the Wardha and Nagpur districts till it joins the Wardha river at Khargad, the trijunction point of the two districts with Berar. The Nand flows across a small strip in the south of the district and joins the Wunna beyond the border of Wardha.

The Wainganga flows along the part of the eastern border and controls the drainage system of the eastern and central portions of the district. It forms the district boundary with Bhandara district for some distance.

The Kanhan and PENCH are the most important tributaries of the Wainganga, both of which flow from the Satpuda range in the Ghindwada district and meet near Kamptee, where they are also joined by the Kolar. The Kanhan, entering the district near Baregaon, takes a south-eastern course past Khapa to Kamptee, where it receives the PENCH and Kolar. In its subsequent course, it makes the boundary of Ramtek tahsil and after receiving the Nag river near the hills of Bhivakund, finally empties itself into the Wainganga. The Kanhan river provides drinking water to Nagpur city.

The Kolar rises in the north-east corner of the Katol tahsil and after passing through the rocky part of Lohgad in Pilkapar range, emerges into the fertile plain of Saoner and separates Nagpur from Ramtek tahsil until its place as a boundary river is taken by the Kanhan.

Its bed is generally rocky. At Patansaongi, it receives the Chandrabhaga, which brings in the drainage of Kalmeshwar plain.

The other rivers of some importance are the Bawanthari, the Sur and the Gaothala-sand, which drain the eastern half of Ramtek tahsil. The Sur is remarkable for its shallowness, but its fertile properties produce sugarcane and garden crops.

Soils :-

In the Archaean area, the rocks are hidden beneath a considerable thickness of alluvial soil, deposited by the tributaries of the Kanhan and Wainganga rivers. In the trappean area, the soil is usually black cotton soil known as regur with Kankar, which is also found in the soils on the Archaean areas.

The main soils of the district are Kali (Medium deep black cotton), Morand (comparatively light deep and light brown in colour) and Bardi (red graver with boulders).

Medium deep black soil is found around Kalmeshwar and Saoner in the Wardha Valley and in the Nagpur and Kamptee plains. The principal soil of the district is known as Morand. It is very suitable for cotton and jowar and is found in almost all the talukas. In the part of Ramtek taluka especially in the valley of the Sur river, the moral morand soil is of very light colour. Khardi is the regular rice-land in the eastern part of the district. Bardi is found on the summits and slopes of hills, principally in the Katol tahsil.

1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall.

Climate :-

The climate of this district is characterised by a hot summer. It is generally dry and sultry.

Nagpur city is , however, one of the hottest places in India.

Temperature :-

The only meteorological observatory in the district is at Nagpur . The cold weather commences towards the end of November. However, December is usually the coldest month with the mean daily maximum temperature at 27.7°C (81.8°F) and the mean daily minimum at 14.0°C (57.2°F). In the wake of western disturbances, which pass across the North India in the cold season, the district is sometimes affected by cold waves when the minimum temperature falls to 4°C (39°F). From the beginning of March, the temperature begins to rise rapidly, May is the hottest month with the mean daily maximum temperature at 42.7°C (108.8°F). The heat in the summer season is severe during the day, the nights being comparatively cooler. The afternoon heat is sometimes relieved by the thundershowers. The onset of the south-west monsoon by about the second week of June brings welcome relief from the heat, with a considerable drop in the temperature. With the withdrawal of the south-west monsoon by the beginning of October, the day temperature shows a slight increase in October and thereafter begins to fall, while the night temperature decreases after September. // The highest maximum temperature recorded at Nagpur was 47.8°C (118.1°F) on 26th May 1954 and the lowest minimum temperature was 3.9°C (39.0°F) except on 7th January 1937. During the monsoon season when the humidity is high, the air is generally dry. The summer season is the driest part of the year when the relative humidity goes down to 20% or less particularly in the afternoons.

Rainfall. :-

The skies are mainly heavily clouded to overcast in the south-west monsoon season. In the post-monsoon months, moderate cloudiness is common.

In the rest of the year, the skies are usually clear or highly clouded. But in the cloudiness increases on many a summer afternoon.

Winds are generally light to moderate with some increase in speed in the later part of the summer season and the monsoon months. During the monsoon season, winds are mostly from directions between south-west. In the period from October to December, the winds are mainly northerly to north-easterly in the mornings and north-easterly to easterly in the afternoons. In January, the winds from directions between north-west and north-east are common in the mornings and between north-east and south-east in the afternoons. While the winds in the mornings of February and March are as in January, the afternoon winds become variable. In the rest of the summer season, the winds are mostly from the directions between south-west and north-west.

The average annual rainfall in the district is 1161.54 Mms. (45.73 inches). The rainfall generally increases from the west to the east in the district. The south-west monsoon usually reaches the district in the second week of June. The rainfall, during the period i.e. June to September constitutes about 90 percent of the annual total, July being the month with the highest rainfall. The variation in the annual rainfall from year to year is not very large.

On an average, there are 59 rainy days (i.e. days with rainfall of 2.5 Mms. or more) in a year. This number varies from 55 at Parsoni to 63 at Tharsa and Nagpur. The heaviest rainfall in 24 hours recorded in the district was 330.20 Mms. (13 inches) at Umrer on 14 th August 1953.

Rainfall is not uniform in all parts of the district. It is comparatively light in the west and heavy in the east. The average rainfall on the western-

most taluka of Katol is 1011 Mms. while it is 1211 Mms. in Ramtek-the eastern-most taluka. In the monsoon months, depression from the Bay of Bengal move westwards across the central parts of the country and affects the district and its neighbourhood causing widespread heavy rain and strong winds. Thunderstorms occur in all the seasons, although their frequency is very small in the period from November to January. The frequency of occurrence is highest in June, when the incidence of the thunderstorm is as high as once in three days. Dust raising winds and less frequently, the dust-storms occur in the summer season. Hail pours down occasionally in large stones, thereby causing damage to the spring crops. The showers in hot months are accompanied by dust-storms of considerably severity.

The district has rarely suffered on account of shortage of rains. The Food Finding Committee appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 has opined that the district is free from the famine and scarcity conditions.

CHAPTER - IIExplanatory Notes

The Statistical data presented in this Abstract are divided into 13 sections. Explanatory notes as sources, concepts and definitions of terms used in certain tables under sections are given in the following paragraphs.

I) Rainfall and Climate :-Table No. 1 :-

Normal rainfall in Col. 3 denotes the average of rainfall during the years 1957 to 1966. As regards rainy days a day is treated as rainy day if during the twenty four hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 M.M. of rainfall. The rainfall generally increases from the west to east in the district. The south-west monsoon usually reaches the district in the second week of June. The rainfall during the period from June to Sept. constitutes about 90 percent of the annual total, July being the month with the highest rainfall. The seasonal distribution of rainfall is more or less uniform in all the parts of Nagpur district. The rainfall during the period under review was slightly high in comparison to the last year.

The climate of Nagpur district is dry and salubrious. Nagpur city has the only Meteorological Centre Nagpur and therefore the temperature recorded at Nagpur (Sonagaon) Aerodrome is reported.

II Population :-Table No. 3:-

The terms "Rural" and "Urban" under Col. 3 are defined as follows as per 1961 census.

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has :-

- 1) A municipal Council, a cantonment or civil lines or
- 2) (i) A population of 5,000 or more and
- (ii) At least $\frac{2}{3}$ or more of the male workers are engaged in the non-agricultural pursuits.

Rural population is a population of all the villages in a revenue unit.

A village is statutorily recognised village having a well defined boundry and separate land records. Hamlets, wadies or padas have, therefore, not been shown as as separate villages. On the other hand, the statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as "un-inhabited " villages. The term village includes forest villages which are population centres situated within reserved forest areas comprising mostly forest labourers and their families . Their land records are however not mantained by Revenue Department.

Table No. 5 :-

" Town " is a urban area as defined under Table No. 3.

Table No. 6 :-

The concept of dependancy, which was adopted during the 1951 Census had been abandoned for economic classification in 1961 census. Instead, the population had been classified as workers and non-workers. The workers were further classified into 9 categories of economic activities.

A person in classified as worker of in c case of the seasonal work like cultivation, live-stock, dairying, household industry etc. he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season; and (b) in the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, he was employed during a any of the 15 days preceeding the day of enumerators visit to the household.

The workers are classified into the the following 9 Categories of economics activity:-

(1) As cultivator (2) As agricultural labourer (3) In mining , quarrying, live-stock, forestry, fishing, hunting, plantation of orchards and allied activities (4) At household industry (5) In manufacturing; other than household industry (6) In construction (7) In trade and commerce (8) In transport , storage and communications. (9) In other services.

Table No. 7 :-

" Mother tongue " is defined as language spoken by the person's mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of ~~Anderson's~~ classification.

Table No. 8 :-

The scheduled castes notified for the district are as follows.

Defination of land utilisation

For defination of terms used in Col.5 to 13 are as follows.

1) Total Geographical Area

A) By professional Surveys.

B) By village papers.

VI) Forests :-

All actually forested area on the lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests, whether state owned or private.

iii) Barran and unculturable land :-

All the barran and unculturable land like deserts etc (i.e. land which can not be brought under cultivation at all or unless at a high cost) is classed as an unculturable one, whether such land is in an isolated block or within any cultivated holdings.

IV) Land put up to non-agricultural uses:-

All lands occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under waters e.g. rivers, canals and other lands put to uses other than agricultural use.

V) Cultivated waste :-

All lands available for cultivation, whether or not taken up for cultivation or abandoned after five years for one reason or the other. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles, which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or unassessed and may be in an isolated blocks or within any cultivated holdings, but not cultivated for five years in succession is also included in this category at the end of the 5 years.

VI) Permanent pastures and grazing grounds :-

All grazing lands, whether permanent pastures and meadows or otherwise come under this category.

VII) Land under miscellaneous tree crops and groves not

included in the net area sown :-

All available land which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Lands under miscellaneous trees, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves used for fuel etc. which are not included under "Orchards" will be classified here.

VIII) Current Fallows :-

" Current fallow " means land not cultivated for one year.

IX) Other Fallow :-

" Other Fallow " means, land not cultivated for more than one year and less than 5 years.

(X) Net area Sown :-

Net area sown represents the area sown to crops, counting the areas sown more than once in the same year only once. This represents the difference between the total geographical area and sum of area under forest, barren and unculturable waste, permanent pastures and other grazing lands, miscellaneous tree crops and groves not included in the net area sown, other fallow land and current fallows.

XI) Area sown more than once :-

Area sown with two or more than two crops and counted more than once in the same year. This is also called as the "double cropped area".

XII) Total cropped area :-

This is the total of net area sown and area sown more than once.

XIII) Minor & Medium Irrigation :-

- A) The cost of "Minor Irrigation Project" is upto a maximum of Rs. 20 lakhs.
- B) The cost of a "Medium Irrigation Project" ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 crores.
- C) All the works costing Rs. 5 crores and above come under the "Jamori Irrigation Projects".

Agriculture :-

The area figures in the various agricultural tables are given in hectares. One acre is equivalent to 0.4047 hectare.

The data regarding classification of the total area of the district according to the various heads of land utilisation, not only reflect the extent of development of agricultural activities, but also represent to some extent the cultivation potentials of the area.

The main sources of water supply for the purpose of irrigation are the Govt. Canals, Wells and tanks.

IV Animal Husbandry, Forest and Fisheries .

i) Animal Husbandry :-

The figures of live-stock and poultry are enumerated at the time of live-stock Census 1966 are reproduced. There are quinquennial censuses conducted throughout country on an uniform basis of conceptions & methods of enumeration. At these censuses all the live-stock is enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care is taken to enumerate live-stock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. The number of veterinary hospitals, dispensaries, aid-centres functioning in district along the animals treated therein have been given in Table No.

ii) Forest :-

The area under forests is classified into three types viz. the "Reserved Forest" "Protected Forests" and the "Unclassed forests". In the year 1879 the Govt. declared the forests in Nagpur Division as "Protected" under the Indian Forest Act VII of 1878. These forests thereafter were constituted into "Reserved Forests" under the Indian Forest Act during the period from 1879 to 1893. Reserved forests are those which are intended mainly for timber production in which rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forest the restrictions are not so rigid. Rights of grazing and cultivations are allowed with certain limitations and restrictions. The unclassed forest refers to the inaccessible forests are unoccupied waste. The working of forest was not, however regulated then by any scheme or plan.

III Fisheries :-

The Commercially imported varieties of the fish
In absence of any coastal line, fishing activities in the District are naturally restricted to inland waters only. Rivers, tanks and ponds are the main sources of fishing activities. The Commercially imported varieties of fish found in the District are Murrel, Dhadkya, Padhan, Tambu, Karwadi, Pasiti etc.

V Industry, Mining, Employment & Electricity :-

i) Industry :-

The factory statistics cover following types of factories registered under Factories Act.1946.

(i) Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (ii) Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power and (iii) those registered under section 85 of the Act, under which the State Government makes applicable to the provisions of the Act even through the above conditions are not fulfilled. The tables under this head give the distribution of working factories according to the size of factory in terms of average daily employment and industrywise distribution of working factories according to working strength.

ii Mining :-

Nagpur district is outstanding^{ly} rich in mineral wealth. In addition to the already known occurrences in the district, quite a large areas still remained unexploited for preliminary prespecting. The valuable minerals like manganese, coal dolomites, white clay, yellow ochre etc are found in the district.

iii Employment :-

In this section 4 table are devoted to give data on .

- 1) Registration of candidates, notification of vacancies and placement of candidates in employment by the ^{help} /board of Employment Exchange.
- 2) Occupational distribution of total registration of placement with the hold of Employment Exchange.
- 3) Volume of employment in different industries as reported by Employment Exchange.
- 4) Census of State Government employees as on 1-7-1966 conducted by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics. The data presented are restricted to class I,II,III,& IV employees of State Government and do not cover any other category. Such as work charged personnel Class IV employees, paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, part time or ordinary workers.

V Electricity :-

Electricity generation centre is Khaparkheda power Station in Saoner Tahsil. Two tables are provided to give the figures/ generation and consumption of electricity and progress of electrification of towns and villages. In Nagpur city supply of Electricity is made by Nagpur Electric light and Power Co. Ltd .Nagpur.

VI Co-operation :-

The data in respect of the following of groups of Co-operation institutions are given to 7 tables under this section.

- 1) General table giving total Co-operative Societies under (i) Agri. Credit, (ii) Non .agri. credit (iii) Agril. non-credit (iv) Non-agri. non-credit.
- 2) Co-operative Banks (3) Primary Agri.credit Societies.(4) All other Societies except agril. credit.(5) Primary Co-operative Marketing Societies and their activities .(6) Other co-operative Societies and their activities excluding primary co-operative marketing societies (7) Regulated Markets .

One more table under this section is devoted to give information about money lenders holding valid licences and details of loans given by them to traders and non-traders.

VII Medical & Public Health :-

In all 5 tables given in this section give information regarding (i) Medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies in Nagpur district . The table covers all State and Central Government institutions, institutions owned by the Municipal Council and also private aided. Talukawise break-up was not available . (2) Registration of births and deaths.Talukawise information about inoculation. Here also talukawise break-up is not available (4) Deaths due to important Cases (5) Hygienic drinking water supply Schemes. The figures in and table are of survey undertaken in the year 1964.

VIII Education:-

Salient features of progress of education in all the talukas of the district are presented in this section in the following 8 tables.

- (1) No. of literates and literacy percentage as given in the 1961 census publication.
- (2) No. of illiterates, Literates without educational level and literates with educational level in Rural and Urban areas as given in the 1963.

In this Chapter, the progress of development covering roughly the period of III Five Year Plan and first and Second Annual Plan 1966-67 and 67-68 has been reviewed by presenting talukawise Sectional trends based on certain important indicators of development. Comparative talukawise figures of 1961-62 and 67-68 (for agricultural activities 1960-61 and 66-67) have been given.

Indicator No. 1:-

Percentage of gross sown area.:-

The district accounted for the lowest percentage of area sown more than once to the net area sown in Nagpur Division as well as in Maharashtra during the year 1961-62 when it stood last amongst the 26 th district of Maharashtra and 8 th district of this region. The following table shows the percentage of gross cropped area to the net cropped area.

From the above table it is seen that the proportion of gross cropped area has increased in all the talukas of the district as a result of reclamation of fallow land in sizeable percentage and increase in deable cropped area over the year 1960-61 due to a few irrigational facilities.

Indicator No. 2

Productivity of important crops.

The year 1960-61 was supposed to be the best agricultural year which have broken all the past records of out-turn of crops.

The productivity of crops is dependent on the equitable distribution of rain and growing irrigational facilities. The following table shows out-turn of different crops during 1960-61 and 1966-67.

From the above, ^{and} ^{grain} it is seen that the production of all crops except groundnut has gone down as compared to 1960-61 but however improved as compared to 1965-1966. The production of groundnut had increased mainly due to increase in area under groundnut during the year 1966-67 as compared to 1960-61. Similarly the production of gram had increased as the result of increase in double cropped area. The percentage of decrease in production during ¹⁹⁶⁶⁻⁶⁷ as compared to 1960-61 was maximum in the case of production of "Total Cereals" "Tur" and "Pulses".

Ramtek and Umrer talukas and predomaintly paddy areas where there was sbsolutely megre rainfall during the months of Aug. and Sept 1966 and since Oct. 1966 there was no rainfall. As a result of this paddy crop under "Cereals" was haavily damaged.

Due to shortage of rains and Cloudy weather there was a attack of insects and pests on Pulses . Hence this crops was also demaged .

Indicator No. 3

Gross Value of Agri. Product P-

As the relevent Price data required are not available , the gross value of Agri. Produce could not be calculated.

Indicator No. 4 :-

Percentage of irrigated area :-

Irrigation facilities are very scarce in the district which can be seen that only 5.7 percent net area was irrigated during the year 1966-67 out of the total net area sown in the district. Irrigation facilities slightly increased in the year 1966-67 over that of 1960-61. The following table shows the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area.

The area under irrigation had slightly increased in the year 1966-67 over 1960-61 and the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area had also proportionately changed for the district as a whole . The percentage remained constant in Katol, Nagpur tahsils while it increased in Saoner Tahsil and decreased in Umrer and Ramtek Tahsils .

The irrigated area in Katol, Saoner and some parts of Nagpur tahsil was mostly under oranges where the possibility of Seasonal Crop is ruled out.

It is seen that the net area irrigated had increased to 5.92 % during the year 1966-67 from 5.17 % in 1960-61. The increase was due to increase in number of wells, pumping sets facilities made available to the cultivators, Besides this minor irrigation works excluding wells and medium irrigation projects have helped to increase the irrigational potentials of the district.

Indicator No. 5 :-

Changes of crop pattern :-

In Nagpur district Katol, Saoner and part of Nagpur talukas grow mainly Kharif Jowar and Cotton while other areas the district grow paddy, rabi-jowar, wheat and linseed. Amongst the food-crops, ^{main} crops under irrigation are oranges, other fruits and vegetables and paddy, while cotton is the main irrigated crop under non-food crops.

The following table shows the percentage under food and non-food crops in each taluka during 1960-61 and 66-67.

From the above table it is seen that area under foodcrops had decreased while area under non-food-grain had increased in all the talukas of the District

during the last 7 years . Area under food-crops was nearly thrice the area under non-food crops. Under food crops, area under Orange , Chillies and Vegetables had increased at the cost of foodgrains as they are main cash crops in the district. Similarly area under cotton, Oil seeds have increased in all most all the talukas. The decrease in area under food crops during the year 1966-67 over 1960-61 was mainly due to non- sowing of r in crops such as Wheat rabi, Jowar etc. due to insufficient rain and growing preference of cultivators for cultivating cash crops in general. The area under food-food-crops was comparatively more in Ramtek and Umrer talukas as the lands in these areas are not suitable for cotton ,Oil-seeds etc . The area irrigated in Umrer and Saoner accounted for higher percentage of area irrigated under cereals. Area irrigated in Umrer was mostly under paddy and wheat while in Saoner taluka it was under Oranges and vegetables. Area irrigated in other talukas was mostly under Oranges, Chillies and food-grains. Among non-food crops Cotton was the main irrigated crop particularly in Katol, Ramtek and Nagpur Talukas.

Increase in Agri. areas and outstanding dues

Agricultural Credit . . . plays an important roll in development of Agriculture. The number of Agricultural credit Societies was the largest in the district in the period under review. The following table shows the number of primary agricultural Credit Societies , loans advanced and outstanding dues during the year 1966-67 and 1967-68. The number of societies during 1965-66 and 1966-67 remained unchanged in the district as a whole though there was slight increase in Umrer and decrease in Ramtek and Nagrpur Talukas. The amount of loans advanced however got reduced by 17 percent during the year 1967-68 as compared to 1966-67. mainly due to a large number of defaulters / ^{the} amount of loan outstanding the increased by 2.23 percent as compared to 1966-67. In 1961-62 there were 651 primary agricultural credit societies in the district. The amount of loan advanced during 1961-62 was Rs. 9,311 thousands and the amount of loan outstanding was Rs. 14,654 thousands which meant that there was an increase of 71.72 percent in the amount of loan advanced and decrease in loan outstanding by 68.84 percent in 1967-68 as compared to 1961-62.

Agricultural wage rates.

Since last ten years the price lime has shown as upward trend. Agricultural wage rates have also increased during the year 1967 as compared to the year 1966. Agricultural wage rate were collected regularly from June 63 at three selected centre viz. Mouda in Ramtek taluka, Kuhi in Umrer taluka and Dhapewada in Saoner taluka.

As it is generally found that no carpentors, black-smiths, Cobblers and herdsmen are employed in rural area on daily wage basis, the wage rates for these categories were not available.

The average wage rates for males and females during 1967 were highest at Mouda and lowest at Dhapewada. The ordance factory at Jawanar nagar is near to Mouda where labourers were attracted in large numbers and hence the wage rates at Mouda had gone up. In general the wage rates for both males and females had increased during the year 1967 as compared to those in the year 1966.

Increase in agriculture wage rates for males was 15 percent at Mouda, 4 percent at Dhapewada and 2 percent at Kuhi in 1967 over 1966 while in case of females the corresponding increase was of 22 percent at Mouda and 20 percent at Kuhi. The overall average in district for males was 7 percent and for females was 15 percent.

The live-stock per hector of cultivated land had increased in Saoner and Nagpur talukas in the year 1966-67 over 1960-61, while it had decreased in the 3 remaining talukas. The live-stock per hector of cultivated land was highest in Saoner taluka while it was lowest in Umrer taluka in the year 1966-67. During the year 1960-61 it was found to be highest in Saoner taluka and lowest in Nagpur taluka.

Indicator No. 9 :-Poultry as compared to Population.

Indicator No. 10 :-

Per Capita Consumption of Electricity .

The only power generating station is at Khaparkheda which supplies power to other districts also . The Khaparkheda power station is connected by grid system with Ballorsah in Chanda district and Paras in Akola district. As the power station at Paras was out of order till dear 1968 , regular normal power supply was affected to some extent. As a result of this, total consumption of electricity had decreased by about 15 % during the year 1967-68 over 1966-67 . The consumption of electricity has considerably increased during the period of 7 years from 1961-62 to 1967-68 (Confirmed figures of 1960-61 are not available.)

The per capita consumption had gone up to 117.30 KWH during the period of 7 years. There was a rise of 46 percent during the year 67-68 over 61-62.

The proportion of electricity used for industrial purposes was about 94 percent of the total , the total electricity consumed. All the 12 towns in the district have been electrified , since long covering 52.07 percent of its population . Out 1,653 inhabited villages, 30 percent of them have been electrified ^{up to} the end of 1967-68. The total population covered by electrification worked out to 75 % and this high percentage is obviously due to coverage in Nagpur city.

Indicator No. 11:-Increase in number of candidates enrolled in employment exchange and vacancies notified.

Because of increase in population and literacy, the registration in Employment Exchange had increased by 29.18 % in the year 1967-68 as compared to 1961-62.

The following table shows the figures of registration, vacancies notified and placement during the year 1961-62 and 1967-68 in Employment Exchange Nagpur.

It is observed that registration of candidates had increased by 29.18 % as compared to 1961-62 while notification of vacancies decreased 41.58 % . Similarly the percentage of placement of candidates in employment decreased by 31.29 in the year 1967-68 over 1961-62. The percentage of placement to vacancies notified which was 59.77 in 1961-62 had gone up to 72.83 during the year 1967-68.

Indicator No. 12 :-Increase in indoor and outdoor patients treated in hospitals.

During the III rd Five Year Plan period a number of schemes such as Malaria Eradication, Small-pox eradication, B.C.G. Vaccination, Leprosy Control etc. were implemented by the Public Health Deptt. through out the state. The medical facilities had also been extended to the Rural area by establishing primary health centres, apkeeping dispensaries, starting off new dispensaries, due to eradication of malaria on large scale, which was supplied to be most common, the number of outdoor patients decreased after 1961. The following table indicates number of patients treated in different medical institutions during 1961 and 1967.

The above table indicates that the number of indoor patients had increases by 49.28 percents in 1967 as compared to the year 1961 while the number of out-door patients decreased by 17.50 percent. This decrease in number of patients has started from 1962 onwards as most of the above schemes were implemented in 1961-62 onwards. In Nagpur district the number of out-door patients are very high because, there are good medical facilities where people from the arrounding districts of Vidarbha & M.P. come in large numbers for expert medical opinion and treatment.

Indicator No. 13 :-Increase in number of students in different categories.

By the end of 1967-68, primary education had covered almost all the rural area of the district.

At present every village in the district is within the vicinity of a primary school. Secondary education has also made a tremendous progress up to the year 1967-68 as compared to 1960-61 which can be seen from the table below.

From the above, it is seen that there was a rapid growth in the primary as well as Secondary education. The percentage increase of 88.22 in the number of girls attending primary schools was mainly due to the extension of secondary school facilities in rural areas and change in the traditional outwork of village on female education.

The enrollment in higher stage of education had also shown an increase as new higher institutions were established year after year at some important towns of the district.

Indicator No. 14:-

Increase in Road length per 100 Sq.Kms.

The road development programme for 3rd Five Year Plan and Annual Plan 1966-67 and 1967-68 were formulated in accordance with the objectives laid down in Nagpur Road Development Plan 1961-1981. The broad objectives of the Nagpur Plan are that no village in a developed agricultural area should remain more than four miles from a metalled road and more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from any type of road.

From the above table it is seen that the road length per 100 Sq.Kms has increased from 8.06 Kms in 1961-62 to 9.79 kms in 1967-68. Road Kilometerage in 1961-62 and 1967-68 was highest in Nagpur taluka because of road length in Nagpur city. Whereas it was lowest in both the years in Ramtek taluka. According to road length in 1962 the district ranked 6 th in the District. The road length per 100 Sq. Kms is below the corresponding district average in Ramtek and Umrer talukas due to large forest areas in these two talukas.

Indicator No. 15 :-

Increase in banking facilities in proportion to to population.

The district has presently better facilities of banking as compared to other districts of Nagpur Division, due to their concentration in Nagpur city. There were 38 banking offices in the district during the year 1961. This number had gone upto 60 during the year 1968. The following table shows the banking facilities per lakh of population.

The number of banking offices per lakh of population had gone up from 2.51 in 1961 to 3.96 in 1968 .

Similarly the population served by each banking office had decreased from 39,387 to 25,213 from 1963 to 1968 . There were 14 places where banking facilities were available in the district in the year 66-67. Due to rapid industrialisation of Nagpur City and Surrounding area, banking facilities of all types were move concentration in Nagpur City.

Prices :-

The price collection work at all the district Head Quarters was started in the month of Nov. 1962. Since the declaration of Emergency in the Country. The price quotations for some essential commodities are obtained on weekly basis. As the prices are collected only at the same selected shops every week at the district H.Qr.; they can not be taken to indicate the true fluctuation in price levels on different commodities . At the same time , they serve as the broad indication of the price structure during the period under review. The following table indicates prices collected at nagpur.

From the above table , it is seen that the prices of all the commodities had increased as compared to year 1962. The maximum price increase was observed in case of of gram dal while minimum was in respect of tea leaf.

CHAPTER - IV

ANNUAL PLAN 1967-68

The year 1967-68 was the second year of the Fourth Five Year Plan. Since, the Fourth Plan of the country could not be finalised for several reasons, the yearly developmental programmes have been drawn up, keeping in view the main objectives of the long-term plan and the limited resources that would be available for the year.

In drawing up the Annual Plan, the main objectives and policies of the State's Fourth Five Year Plan as set out in the memorandum of the Fourth Plan have been kept in view. The Annual Plan laid emphasis on the productive sectors of the plan and included provision for the key programmes. The key note to the Annual Plan, however was the consolidation of gains already made, avoidance of inflationary spending and enlargement of those areas of operation, where optimum gains accrued within the shortest possible time and almost economy.

The total Annual Plan outlay for 1967-68 for Nagpur district was Rs. 285.71 lakhs on six major heads of development as cited below. (Rs. in lakhs)

No regular budget provision was made under the head "Irrigation & Power". However, necessary allotment was given to meet out the expenditure for irrigation and electrification of the proposed villages.

Under the State Sector and Local Sector, 64 percent and 36 percent of total provision was earmarked for their schemes respectively. The programmes under "Social Services" were given priority by allotting about 53 percent of the total provision : which was set out for the development of Education, Housing, Water-Supply, Public Health etc. All the Plan programmes were mostly implemented as per targets in the district and the total expenditure incurred was to the tune of Rs. 245.04 lakhs (i.e. 86 percent of the total provision). The major and minor headwise expenditure along with physical achievements are given in the following paragraphs.

I AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMME.

The programmes of agricultural development were generally aimed at increasing the area under cultivation and improving agricultural productivity . This was done through a variety of programmes like measures of Soil Conservation, minor irrigation, tractor ploughing, propagation of improved agricultural practices , better input factors like improved seeds , fertilisers, compost manure, crop protection from pests and diseases etc. The programme of development of Dairy , Forest, Marketing, Fisheries, Animal Husbandary etc. were also included as other agricultural programmes. The table below shows the budget provisions and expenditure against the minor heads of expenditure included under the major head " Agricultural Programme ".

1 Agricultural Production :-

These were 11 schemes under this sub-head, out of which 6 schemes were in local sector. As against the total provision of Rs. 6.00 lakhs for various schemes, total expenditure of Rs. 5.51 lakhs was incurred. The schemes relating to the horticultural development, production of high yielding variety seeds, intensive also implemented with special emphasis. Taluka Seed Multiplication Farms were established in the district with certain facilities to augment the work of multiplication of seeds. Besides the above schemes the schemes of Consolidation of Land -holdings was also implemented under the above sub-head of development. The table below shows the physical achievements under this programme in the district.

2) Soil Conservation :-

Soil Conservation works were undertaken in 48,000 acres of Land incurring an expenditure of Rs. 32.27 lakhs as against the a provision of Rs. 32.65 lakhs & the target set-out for the district was attained fully.

3) Minor Irrigation.

Minor Irrigation Works Programme consisted of construction of storage, diversion schemes, percolation tanks, re-novation of tanks and construction of new wells etc. Out of the provision of Rs. 31.85 lakhs, an expenditure of Rs. 16.17 lakhs was incurred by the Zilla Parishad Nagpur for grat of subsidy for the construction of wells, installation of pump sets and re. renovation of ex-malgujari tanks.

Besides the above programme of deepening of wells by Blasting and Air-Comprassors was implemented under the State Sector by incurring the expenditure of Rs. 2.25 lakhs . Moreover, Rs. 5.53 lakhs were spent for the completion of the spilt-over minor irrigation projects viz. Adegaoon, Nandera, Shakkardhara, Khursapar and Khadki out of which the work of Adegaoon and Khursapar has been completed during the period under review .

4) Animal Husbandry :-

The development programme for the year 1967-68 provided an amount of Rs. 0.37 lakhs for maintaining the existing Vetarinary Aid-Centres , raising basic amenities in the vetarinary dispensaries, improvement of cattle breed and for encouragement of poultry farming. Rs.0.35 lakhs were spent on these schemes . As a result of this , one new dispensary was started with certain basic amenities, 10 pre-degree bulls were distributed and four persons were given loans of Rs. 1000/- each.

5) Dairy Development :-

During the Annual Plan 1967-68, a budget provision of Rs. 4.94 lakhs was made, as against which an amount of Rs. 4.15 lakhs was spent on the construction of building, installation of machinery and purchase of equipments for Nagpur Dairy Development scheme, with the result that the milk handling capacity of this project increased to 10,700 litres per day.

6) Forests :-

(45)

An outlay of Rs. 4.00 lakhs was included in the annual plan 1967-68 for continuance of all the schemes which were in the annual plan of the last year .

Rs, 3.91 lakhs were spent on the plantation of fuel-wood, general utility timber , bamboos, packing-case timber , Eucalyptus etc. The schemes of fodder resources, forest communications, forest labour welfare and forest parks were also undertaken. The target of plantation of trees in 1433 acres was completely, achieved.

7) Fisheries. :-

An outlay of Rs. 0.54 lakhs was earmarked during the year 1967-68 for cotinence of the schemes which were already in operation during 1966-67. An expenditure of Rs. 0.22 lakhs was incurred on two schemes vix. "Fish farming in an impounded waters " and " Supply of fishery requisites for fishing ? The percentage of expenditure to the provision worked out to 41.

8) Warehousing and Marketing. :-

An amount of Rs. 0.81 lakhs was spent for rendering assistance for development of agricultural marketing with a provision of Rs. 1.71 lakhs. The percentage of expenditure to budget provision worked out to 47. New Market Committees could not obtain recognition for them and as such the amount earmarked to these committees remained the unutilised.

II-CO-OPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT :-

1. Co-operation :-

An expenditure of Rs. 0.92 lakhs was incurred during the year 1967-68 against the provision of Rs. 0.97 lakhs . All the expenditure was mostly made for meeting of managerial subsidy, contribution towards share capital and for construction of godowns, In all 12 co-operative institutios of various kinds were benefitted.

2. Community Development :-

Under the Community Development and other allied programmes, the annual plan of 1967-68 had provided an outlay of Rs. 14.73 lakhs. The provisions for various schemes included in this programme along with the expenditure incurred thereunder the physical achievements are enumerated below:-

III- IRRIGATION AND POWER.:-

In all an amount of Rs. 10.90 lakhs were spent on the Rural Electrification programme by the Maharashtra State Electricity Board, Nagpur . The objective behind this project was to provide power for agricultural purposes. Besides , the domestic supply of power is its subsidiary aim. The number of villages where the power supply was made up-to the end of 1967-68 was 488 .

IV - INDUSTRY AND MINING.

Small Scale and Cottage Industries :-

Under this programme, a provision of Rs. 9.37 lakhs was made, for two important schemes, of which one scheme was for " Development of Handloom Industry" implemented under the State Sector, under which the loan and subsidy to the tune of Rs. 7.60 lakhs were distributed to two Central Financial Agencies , 102 Handloom Industrial units and 4 Handloom Centres in the district . An amount of Rs. 0.84 lakhs were provided for the other schemes viz." Financial Assistance to Industrial Co-op- eration including co-operatives of Handicrafts". Under this scheme financial assistance of Rs. 0.47 lakhs was given to three societies. Besides , Rs. 0.04 lakhs were spent upon other miscellaneous schemes. The percentage of expenditure under this programme to the corresponding budget provision worked out to 89.

V TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS .Road Development :-

The schemes in Annual Plan 1967-68 were those which were also taken up in the year 1966-67. The total provision was Rs. 27.96 lakhs, against which an expenditure of Rs. 22.13 lakhs was incurred. Out of this expenditure, an amount of Rs. 18.81 lakhs was spent by the Zilla Parishad, Nagpur. An expenditure of Rs. 3.32 lakhs was incurred by the State Sector on the maintenance of existing roads alone. The Zilla Parishad had undertaken the work of construction of roads of 40 kilometres and 2 bridges. All these works were in progress during the plan period under review.

VI SOCIAL SERVICES :-

The table below enumerates the budget provisions and expenditure thereon incurred against each sub-head of development under the major head "Social Services "

1) General Education :-

As against the total outlay and expenditure the Zilla Parishad share of expenditure was Rs. 31.49 lakhs out of the total provision of Rs. 36.55 lakhs placed under its disposal, which accounts for 90 percent. Sizeable expenditure was incurred on expansion of primary education; Rs. 3.66 lakhs (i.e. 97 percent) on non-government secondary schools, Rs. 24.84 lakhs (100 Percent) on basic training to primary school teachers ; Rs. 1.34 lakhs (Cent percent) were expended respectively. However, no expenditure was incurred on the adult literacy programme. So far it relates to the physical achievements, 132 new primary teachers were appointed. Besides 67 teachers were employed in the Secondary schools, Loan Scholarships were given to 9 teachers and grant-in-aid was given to 16 schools.

2) Technical Education :-

The entire expenditure of Rs. 2.60 lakhs was incurred on the existing Polytechnic at Nagpur.

3) Medical and Nursing:-

Rs. 2.11 lakhs were spent on the training of 122 nurses at the Medical College Hospital, Nagpur.

4) Public Health :-

Small - Pox eradication, Family Planning and Malaria Eradication were the major programmes taken up under this sub-head of development, under which 2,75,144 persons were vaccinated and re-vaccinated. Besides the ^{Ka}ccectomy operations were performed on 14,823 cases and loops were instated in 1,311 cases. Malaria Eradication Programme was undertaken throughout the district intensively and with the help of Nagpur Corporation at Nagpur city. Out of the budget provision of Rs. 13.90 lakhs lakhs earmarked under this head, over and Rs. 15.74 lakhs were spent over and above the budget provision.

5) Water-Supply and Drainage :-

The work of the Piped -water supply was undertaken at 3 villages viz. Besur and Panehohar (both in Katol tahsil) and Dhapewada (Saoner tahsil). All these works were incomplete during the year under reference.

The Wunna Water Supply Scheme and Corporation water-Supply were the Siill-over schemes from the last year . The work of both the schemes was incomplee during the year 1967-68 . Similarly, the Mohpa Water Supply Scheme was also incomplete. Out of the Budget provision of Rs. 49.56 lakhs , an expenditure of Rs. 26.95 lakhs was incurred on the above schemes.

6) Housing :-

Except a small amount of Rs. 0.24 lakhs set aside for the scheme of expansion of Village Gaothan, the entire expenditure was incurred on the construction of 652 tenaments and on ⁶¹⁰ / new tenaments by way of s: ill over. All these works werks were in progress during the period under review.

7) Welfare of Backward Classes, Social Welfare and Labour Welfare.

On the above programmes, Rs. 6.76 lakhs were spent ; out of a total budgett allotment of Rs. 8.58 lakhs. In all 303 persons derieved benefits from the above schemes.
