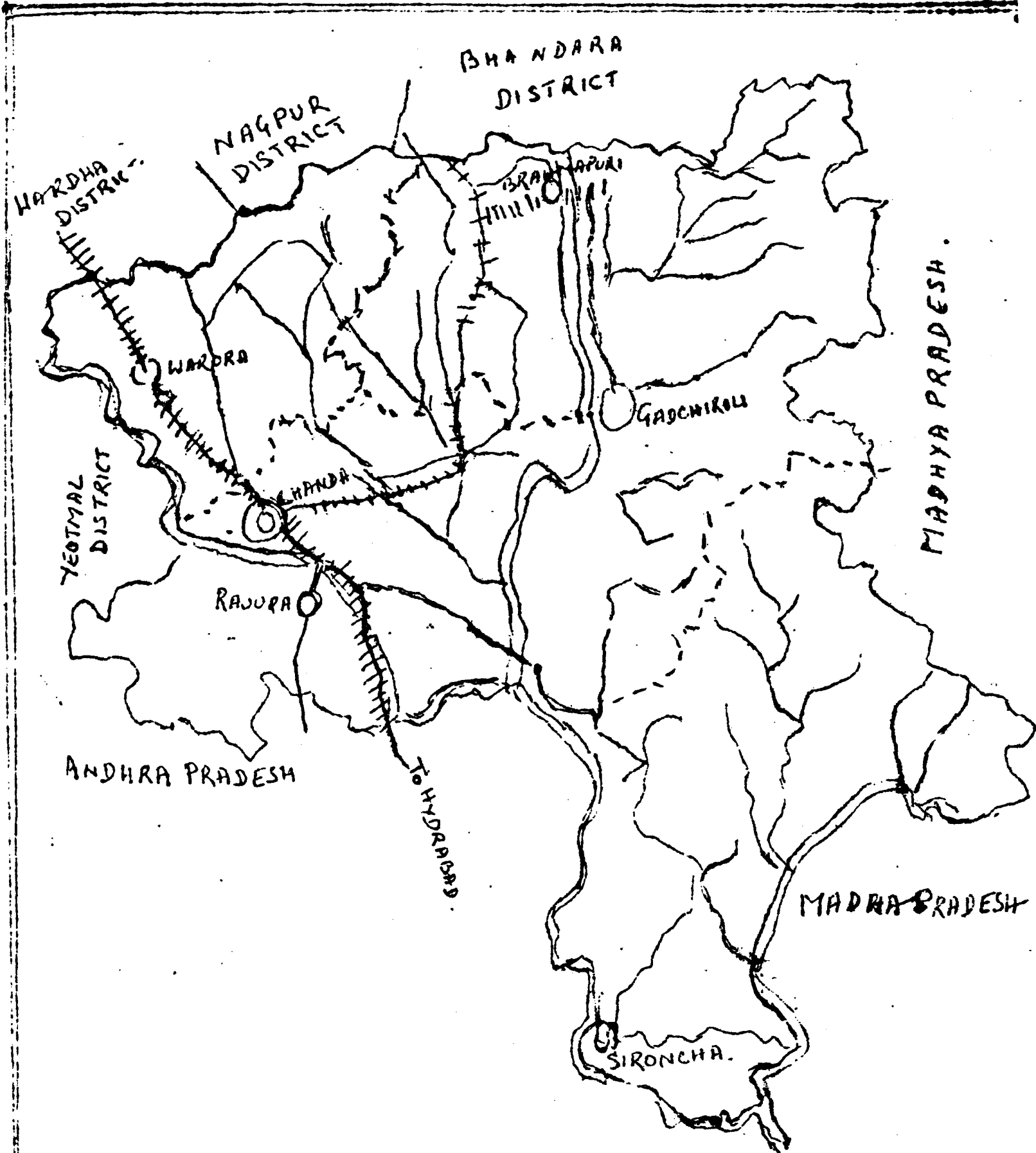

CHAPTER I.

I. Introduction.

1.1 Brief history & Location.

Chandrapur district forming part of the kingdom of Raghuji Bhonsle was finally brought to an end by the East India Company in 1854. The Bhonsle dynasty had acquired the district from the Gond Kings and ruled the territory from 1751 to 1853 when Raghuji Bhonsle died heirless in 1853 and Nagpur district was created for administrative purposes by the Company. Prior to the reign of Bhonsle dynasty the district was under the rule of Gond Kings from about 1240 to 1751. The Gond King Ballarshah founded the Chanda fort. The early history of Chandrapur district, prior to the rule of the Gond Kings, has to be pieced together from different inscriptions found in the district. The Gond Kings occupied this territory from Mana Kings of Wairagarh. Earlier to Manas the Buddhist Kings known as Kosala Kings were ruling over this part whose capital according to one source was Chandrapur and from the other sources was at Bhadrawati and Wairagarh. However it is in connection with Kosalas that we arrive at the first authentic historical record in the history of the district. Hsien Tsiang, the Chinese pilgrim, records that he visited the capital of Kosalas in 639 A.D. . It is also conjectured that a strong Kingdom ruled in the early days at Bhadrawati with flourishing civilisation existing there.

Chandrapur district lies in the Godawari Basin and was formed as an independent district in 1854. Up to 1874 the district comprised only three tahsils of Mul, Warora, and Branhapuri, In 1874 upper Godawari district of Madras was abolished and four talukas were adjoined to Chandrapur district to form one tahsil with Sironcha as its headquarters. The Zamin-dari estates from Branhapuri and Chandrapur were merged into a new tahsil with headquarters at Gadchiroli. In 1907 three tahsils of Cherala, Albake and Nagur were transferred to Madras State.

In 1956 with the Reorganisation of States the district was transferred from former Madhya Pradesh to Bilingual Bombay State.

Rajura Taluk of Nanded district was transferred to Chandrapur District in March 1959 and was notified as an independent district and division under the Collector Chandrapur and the Commissioner Nagpur respectively.

The District with a population comprising the Marathas, Telugu, and Gonds is of peculiar interest from a linguistic and ethnological point of view. It has also many other claims to distinction. In mineral wealth it is remarkably rich; it possesses vast forests and its area under Government forests is bigger than the entire area of a few other districts in Maharashtra.

Its systems of agriculture are usually varied and in some respect unique in the Division. The system of irrigation is very extensive and its sporting possibilities, though no longer what they were in the past are still unsurpassed in few parts of the country.

The district lies between $18^{\circ} 41'$ and $20^{\circ} 50'$ north latitude and $78^{\circ} 48'$ and $80^{\circ} 55'$ east longitude.

1.2 Boundaries.

Chandrapur district is bounded by Wardha, Nagpur and Bhandara district on the north, Madhya Pradesh on the east, Andhra Pradesh on the south and the south West - Yavatmal and Wardha districts towards the west and north west. The whole of the western & Southern border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha the pranhita and the Godawari rivers. The Indrawati river flows along south east boundary of the district.

1.3 Administrative set up.

The Wainganga river cuts the district into two halves. The eastern portion comprises. Simoncha and Gadchiroli Talukas, which are in the term of area, two largest talukas in the State, occupying together 59.1 % the total area of the district. The western portion consists of four talukas of Bramhapuri, Chanda, Rajura and Warora and accounts for the remaining 40.9 % of the area of the district. Administratively the district is presently divided into the six talukas or Revenue Divisions. The area, number of towns 1961 population and the per centages of area and population of each taluka are shown in the following table:-

The district forms part of the Nagpur Division and the Collector is its administrative head. He is in charge of general administration, law and order, land revenue, food and civil supplies. He is assisted by Resident Deputy Collector in his Office and six Deputy Collectors known as Sub-Divisional Officers who hold the charge of six revenue divisions and have their headquarters at each of the six Taluka headquarters. The Sub-divisional Officer is assisted by one Tahsildar and a few Naib-Tahsildars depending upon the size of the Tahsil and volume of work. The Tahsil is divided into revenue circles and further sub-divided into patwari halkas comprising 4 or 5 revenue villages in each.

Zilla Parishad set-up:-

With a view to promote democratic decentralisation and to secure greater participation by the people in development plans and local Government affairs, the Government of Maharashtra enacted the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samiti Act of 1962 to establish in each district an autonomous institution of Zilla Parishad at the district level and Panchayat Samities at the Taluka or Block level.

Accordingly a Zilla Parishad and 18 Panchayat Samities were established. The Zilla Parishad covers entire district except Municipal towns. Sasti urban area which does not have a municipal council is however included under the jurisdiction of Zilla Parishad and the Panchayat Samiti concerned. The Zilla Parishad covers 99.79 percent of area of the district, and 98.70 percent of its total population.

The Zilla Parishad consists of 51 elected councillors & out of them, 2 seats are reserved for scheduled castes and 7 for scheduled tribes. In addition a woman councillor has been coopted by the elected councillors. There are five associate councillors who are chairmen of the five Federal Cooperative societies conducting business in the district. The elected chairmen of Panchayat Samities are also ex-officio councillors.

The Panchayat Samiti at the Block level consists of all elected and coopted councillors from the area of the block and a chairman of a cooperative society conducting the business of purchase or sale of agricultural produce in the area of the Block, as an associate member and a chairman of a cooperative society conducting business in agriculture in the area of the Block as a coopted member. The Sarpanchas elected by members of Village Panchayats are also elected members of Panchayat Samiti. Two Sarpanchas from each electoral division in the area of the Block are thus returned to each panchayat Samiti.

The first election of the Zilla Parishad was held in 1962 and after the term of five years, second elections were held in 1967. The President and Vice president have been elected by the elected councillors.

A senior officer of I.A.S. scale works as Chief Executive Officer to execute powers and functions of the Zilla Parishad. The Block Development Officers act as Secretaries to the Panchayat Samities. The Zilla Parishad functions through a standing committee presided over by the president and six Subject Committees for Finance, Works, Agriculture, Cooperation, Education and Health. Two subject committees are presided over by the vice president and four by the two chairmen elected by the Zilla Parishad. The Deputy Chief Executive officer works as secretary of the standing committee and District Heads of Departments as Secretaries to the subject committees concerned.

1.4 Area.

Chandrapur district has a total area of 26,128.7 Square kilo metres (10088.3 Square miles.) The length at the northern extremity from east to west is about 192 kilo metres while the length from Southern point to the northern base is about 240 kilo metres. In terms of area the district is the biggest in the whole of Maharashtra.

1.5 Topography.

The district is broader on the north and gradually tapers down towards the south. Topographically the district can be divided into the following four zones :-

1) The plain fertile region in the west in the Wardha valley with its rich black soil and moderate rainfall with Cotton, Jowar and Wheat as the main crops. This zone includes western half of Warora and Chandrapur talukas and the whole of Rajura taluka and acc counts for about one sixth of the total area of the district.

2) The western upland hilly region between Wardha and Wainganga basins. It comprises parts of Warora and Chandrapur talukas and a major part of Bramhapuri taluka. It has sandy soil and sufficient rainfall. Rice, Jowar and irrigated sugarcane are the main crops. Numerous hills have facilitated the construction of tank for irrigation purposes. This zone makes about one-sixth of the area of the district.

3) The Wainganga basin. This zone comprises the eastern parts of Bramhapuri and Chandrapur talukas and western part of Gadchiroli taluka. It has the fertile black soil, sufficient rainfall, rice being the main crop.

4.) The eastern uplands. This region comprises major part of Gadchiroli Taluka and the whole of Sironcha taluka. It is hilly and has thick forests, heavy rainfall, and large tribal population. Rice is the main crop. It makes nearly half of the total area of the district.

1.6 Hills, River system, Soil, etc.

The soil of the district falls into clearly defined tracts and each of these tracts displays cropping pattern of a wholly different kind. The most fertile tracts are found in the Wardha in the Wainganga valleys. The varieties of soil in the district are numerous, and are known by many local names but they could be grouped under the following representative classes, namely Kali, Kanhar, Bersi kanhar, Morand, Khurdi, Wardi, Retaxi or Bardi, Bardiari and Kachhar which is found in Sironcha taluka along the banks of the Godawari.

On the extreme west, on the left bank of the Wardha and subsequently the Godawari, there is a broad strip of black soil known as Koli, retentive of moisture and suitable for cotton, Wheat, Gram, Jowar and linseed. Further in the interior, but immediately adjoining this open tract there is a range of small hills with poorer soil at their feet and in the intervening strips. This soil is of little use without irrigation. With irrigation, it is an ideal soil for rice and sugarcane. Further eastward again, on either banks of the Wainganga, the black loam reappears and is accompanied by a few rice growing Villages.

Towards the east of Wainganga valley, the soil becomes poor and hills are abundant. Rice is the staple crop of this tract.

The main rivers of the district are the Wainganga, the Wardha, the Pranhita, the Indrawati and the Godawari. The whole of the western border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha, the Pranhita and the Godawari rivers. During its course in the south-easterly direction the Wardha river receives the Wainganga at village Sorni on the right bank and the Tari on the left. After its confluence with the Wainganga the combined stream is known as Pranhita. The Pranhita joins the Godawari near Sironcha. Further south at the southern corner of Sironcha taluka, the Indrawati flows in to the Godawari along the south-east boundary of the district.

The Wainganga ~~entirely~~ entirely the district near the centre of the northern boundary and slices it into two unequal parts, the ~~Western part~~ containing Warora, Chanda, Bramhapuri, and Rajura ~~talukas~~ talukas and the eastern part comprises Gadchiroli and Sironcha talukas.

Save in the extreme south, the Wainganga is the recipient of numerous tributaries on either banks and ultimately receives the drainage of the entire central portion of the district. The Chief rivers flow from north to south, the Kathani & the Potphodi meeting from the left and the Andhari on the right.

The Wardha, the Wainganga, the Pranhita and the Godawari are the perennial rivers of the district.

The whole of eastern portion of the district and the southern portion, all along the eastern border is hilly and forms part of the eastern upland natural zone. The important hill ranges lie in the south. They are mainly the Tipgarh Range, the Sirkonda near Sironcha, the Gadulgahta hills which are a continuation of the eastern Ghats and the Surajgarh hills.

To the south-west of Surajgh hills, beyond Indrawati river, river lies the famous Bhairagadh hill which overlooks confluence of three mountain rivers and is noted as an unrivalled beauty spot in the district.

The Tipagarh range rises to an elevation of 609 metres and Sirkonda range is 548 metres above sea-level. The other ranges in Sironcha taluka attain a height of 609 to 914 metres. The highest peak in the district is in the Gadulgutta range 967 metres.

The western upland comprises the main ranges of Chinur and Mul hills. They are of little height and serve as watersheds between the numerous Valleys formed by the tributaries of the Wardha and the Wainganga. The Chinur hills commence east of Chinur in the north of Varora Tahsil and stretch south-wards with breaks from north to south with an average elevation of 137 metres above the surrounding plain. The range is 32 km. in length and 9.6 kms in breadth. The highest peak is 409 metres.

The Mul hills lie further to the south passing 4.8 Kms. west of Mul village. It is 28.8 kms. from east to west with a height of 122 metres above the plain. At the foot of these hills lies the famous Tadoba lake.

Parasgarh hills runs east and parallel to Chinur hills and form a boundary between Varora and Brahmapuri Tahsils.

The general height of the plain country is about 274 metres above sea level in the north of the district falling to 200 metres at Chanda and 640.6 at Sironcha.

1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall.

Chandrapur district is considered to be one of the hottest district of Maharashtra. Chandrapur town the district head-quarter is slightly hotter than Nagpur city. The nights remain cool upto end of April and become uncomfortable in the months of May and June which are considered to be the hottest months of the year. The intense heat combined with high percentage of humidity due to the large forests in the district makes the climate uncomfortable. Winter is equally severe. The highest temperature on record is 48.4 degrees centigrade on 18 th May 1897 and the lowest on 10 th January 1899.

May is the hottest month of the year. The Temperature recording is done at Chanda, Bramhapuri and Sironcha. During the year 1957 the highest temperature recorded at these centres was 42.8, 42.6, 42.5 centigrade respectively. The minimum temperature was 14.2, 12.9, & 15.9 degrees centigrade. Winter is more severe in December.

The South western Monsoons are the Chief source of rain in the district which is divided into three rainfall zones viz. (1) the eastern zone comprising Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Bramhapuri talukas having heavy and assured rainfall the mean rainfall being about 1524 m.m. or 60 inches, (2) The central zone comprising Chanda and Rajura talukas with sufficient rains the normal rainfall being 1302 m.m. or 50 inches and (3) the western zone comprising Waro^a taluka having moderate rainfall - normal being 1143 m.m. or 45 inches.

CHAPTER II.

Explanatory Notes:-

The statistical data in this abstract is presented in 84 tables pertaining to 13 sections. The statistical data is obtained from the various offices and Departments of Government, and Local bodies such as Zill Parishad, Panchayat Samities, Village panchayats and Municipal committee.

District at a glance.

Some general particulars about the district are given in the table "District at a glance" which presents data on certain important items pertaining to the district.

The concepts of certain terms & limitations of the data appearing in different tables under each of the 13 sections are explained in the following paragraphs:-

I. Climate.

The table No. 1 gives monthwise information on "normal rainfall" number of rainy days" and rainfall recorded at six centres happening to be the taluk^a headquarters. The table No. 2 gives "mean maximum" "mean minimum" and "mean" temperature for three centres of the district. The mean maximum and mean minimum recorded daily during the year. The minimum temperature is the average of the maximum and minimum temperatures. The average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature thus arrived at. As regards rainy days a day was treated as rainy day if during the twenty four hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 m.m. of rainfall.

II. Area and Population.

The information relating to 1961 population census for the district is given in tables 3 to 8. The table No. 3 gives talukwise information about Area, Rural and Urban population density per square kilometre and percentage variation over 1951. The area of the district is given both in square k.m. and square miles in this table, as available with the Registrars Central Government of India, and slightly differs from the total area as obtained from the Village records. The terms rural and urban used in table No. 3 are defined as follows according to 1961 census.

A town or urban area is defined as a place which has-

1. A Municipality a Cantonment or Civil lines
or

- 2(i) A population of 5000 or over and
(ii) Atleast $\frac{1}{3}$ or more of male workers are engaged
in non-agricultural pursuits.

Rural population is a population of all villages in a revenue unit.

A "Village is a statutory recognised Village having a defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadies or Padas have therefore, not been shown as separate Villages. On the other hand statutory recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as uninhabitated" Villages. Villages comprising mostly forest labour^{ers} & their families. The Villages classified according to population ranges are given in table no. 4 /^{while} classification of towns according to population ranges is given in table no. 5 . The table no. 6 gives talukawise information about workers and non-workers with rural and urban details. Abandoning the dependency concept adopted in 1951 population census, the economic classification of population was adopted in 1961 population census and the population is classified into workers and non-workers. A person is classified as worker if

(a) In case of a seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry etc, he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season and

(b) In the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, Service, business or commerce he was employed during any of the 15 days preceeding the day of enumerators visit to the household. Workers are are classified into nine categories.

The table no. 7 gives information on three different aspects viz. (1) population according to age groups (2) Population according to mother tongue and (3) Population according to religion.

The term mother tongue used in this table is defined as language spoken by the person's mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Griersons classification. The table no. 8 gives population of scheduled caste and scheduled-tribes in each taluka of the district. III. Agriculture

Statistics on agriculture and allied subjects is presented in table 9 to 19 tables. The data on land utilisation area under crops, area under irrigated crops, irrigation by different sources and no. of irrigation wells as given in tables 9 to 14 is being collected for compilation of season and crop report by the village patwaris. This data are compiled at the circle, Tehsil and district Superintendent of land records. The Director of Agriculture finally releases the season and crop report for each district.

The land utilisation data in table no. 9 provides information about the mode of land use in the district and each taluka. The standard heads of land of utilisation are explained below:-

1. Geographical area, It is the total area of the district whose break up according to its use is given in table 9. This area is maintained in village records (Khasra and ginnaswar by the Patwaris.

2. Forest All actually forested area on the lands classed or administered as forests under any local enactment dealing with forests, whether state owned or private.

3. Barren and unculturable Land:-

All Barren and unculturable land like mountains deserts etc; (land which cant not be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost) is classed as unculturable whether such land is included in block or within cultivated holdings.

4. Land put to non-agricultural uses:-

All lands occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture.

5. Culturable Wastes:-

All land available for cultivation whether not taken taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession.

6. Permanent Pastures or other grazing lands-

All grazing lands whether permanent pastures and meadows or otherwise.

7. Land under Miscellaneous trees and groves not included in the net area sown.

All cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use lands under Casurina trees, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves used for fuel, etc which are not included under "orchards" will be classed under this item.

8. Other fallows:

All lands which are taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years.

9. Current fallows:-

This class comprises areas which are kept fallow during the current year. If any seeding area is not cropped again the same year, it is also treated as current fallow:-

10. Net area sown.

Net area sown represents the area sown to crops, counting area sown more than once in the same year only once.

The total of all items from two to ten mentioned above should be equal to the total geographical area of the district.

11. Area sown more than once.

Area sown more than once.

Area sown with two or more than two crops and counted more than once in the same year.

12. Total cropped area.

This is the total of Net area sown and area sown more than once.

The table no. 10 gives area under different food and non-food crops under food crops separate area is given for 10 major crops Besides information about area under other cereals, total cereals, other pulses, total pulses, total foodgrains, condiments & Spices, Fruits and Vegetables, Miscellaneous food crops and total food crops. Under non-food crops independent area figures are given for five crops while combined figures are given for other fibers, total fibres, other oil seeds, total oil seeds, other drugs, total drugs, miscellaneous non-food crops and total non-food crops. The table gives information for each of the taluka.

The information about yield per hectare and outturn of about 23 crops is given in table Nos. 11

Table 12 to 16 relate to irrigation. Area under irrigation by different sources is given in table 12 while breakup of gross irrigated area under different crops is given in table 13. ~~This table is on the lines of table 10. Estimated figures of total irrigation wells etc details of wells etc are not use~~ is given in table no. 14. Table no. 15 gives no. of minor irrigation works other wells in the district. The district has sufficient number of small tanks and bandharas for irrigating paddy crop. The number of such tanks under state and local sectors are given in this table with details of net area irrigated during 66-67. Besides these tanks with Govt. and Zilla Parishad there are quite a few tanks with private individuals. Information for such private tanks is not available & hence could not be given in this table. The information about one Major irrigation project which is in progress and three medium irrigation project is given in table No. 16. Agricultural wage rates as given in table no. 17 are collected from three rural centres every fortnight from the selected cultivators. The wage rates given for each month for skilled and unskilled labour are average rates of the two fortnight. At the end of the year the twelve months average is given. The wage rate includes the imputed value of wages given in kind and are given separately for male and female. The table 18 relates to the information about agricultural implements in each taluka as collected in the quinquennial livestock census 1966. Scarcity is declared by the collector if the crops are affected and damaged due to excess or shortage of rains and due to other reasons. This information is given in table 19.

IV. Animal Husbandry and Forest.

A) Animal husbandry.

Four tables on animal husbandry are provided in this Abstract. The various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the Chandrapur district at the time of livestock census 1966 are given in table no. 20. The livestock census is conducted every fifth years on an uniform basis of concepts and method of enumeration.

The livestock census is conducted by enumerating livestock poultry and agricultural implements etc, by house to house enquiry. The table 21 provided information about the existing veterinary aid facility available in the district and in each taluka by giving details of no. Veterinary hospitals, dispensaries and centres and animals treated in them. Attacks of different diseases on livestock and poultry and mortality under each disease is given for 67-68 with comparative figures of 66-67 in table No. 22. The information about animals slaughtered under different recognised slaughter houses as supplied by District Animal husbandry officer is given in table No. 23.

D) Forest.

There are only two tables in this Statistical Abstract which provides Statistics of forests. The table No. 24 (a) gives area under forests under different categories for the years 66-67 and 67-68. The total area under forests as reported by Forest Department and given in this table the year 66-67. does not tally with the area under forests as compiled by District Supt. of Land Records and given in table No. 9. In the Reserved Forests broadly speaking every thing is an offence that is not permitted while the protected forest nothing is an offence that is prohibited. Reserved forests are those which are mainly intended for timber production & in which rights of grazing & Cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests the restrictions are not so rigid, rights of grazing or cultivation are allowed out certain limitations & restrictions are imposed. The protected forests usually comprise private forest now transferred to Government under the abolition of Malguzari & Zamindari. The table No. 24(b) gives information about major and minor forest produce such as teak, fuel, Bamboo etc, for the years 66-67 & 67-68.

V. Industry, Employment and Electricity.

a) Industry.

The information relating to factories is given in table 25, 26, and 27. The information is based on the annual returns collected by Chief Inspector of Factories and Boilers in respect of factories Registered under the Factories Act. The Factories Act cover -

1) Those factories employing ten or more workers on any day and working with the aid of power (Section 2 u: (i) and

2) Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power (Section 2 m (ii)). Table no. 25 gives information about average daily employment in factories grouped under standard Industrial classification for the year 1967. The other two tables give information for the year 1967 about distribution of factories according to number of workers employed and distribution of working factories according to number of days worked.

B) Employment.

Employment Exchange Statistics is given in tables 28 to 30 for the years 66-67 and 67-68. The information about number of registrations with the employment exchange, no. of vacancies notified number on live register, and number of candidates placed in employment are presented in table no. 28, while table 29 gives occupational distribution of registrations and placements for both the years 66-67 & 67-68. Change in volume of employment in different industries as on 31st March 66 & 67 is given in table 30. A census of Govt. employees as on 1st July 1966 was conducted in 1966 and the tabulated results are given in tables 31 and 32. The table 32 gives distribution of employees under class I, II, III and IV categories according to Basic pay ranges and emoluments paid ranges. The table 32 gives number of employees under various departments in the district.

C) Electricity.

The information about electricity generated and consumed in the district for the year 1967-68 with comparative figures of last year is given in table number 33 while progress on electrification of towns & Villages are given in table no. 34 which gives information about villages & towns electrified as on 31st March 1961, 1966, 1967 and 1968. The electric supply in this district is made sold by Maharashtra State Electricity Board and information for private companies is nil.

VI. Cooperation.

The Statistical position regarding the activities under the Cooperative movement in the district is presented in this section under tables 35 to 42.

The table no. 35 is the summary statement giving no. cooperative institutions in existence at the end of the year June 1968. The cooperative institutions are divided into credit and non-credit institutions or societies with further sub-division and agricultural and non-agricultural. Tables 36, 37 and 38 give important information about the number of societies, membership, share capital, working capital loans advanced and recovered etc. for the year 1967-68 with comparative figure for last year for 1) Central financing agencies like District Cooperative Bank, District Development Bank and urban banks 2) Primary Agricultural credit Societies (Service Cooperative Societies etc.) 3) Other cooperatives including grain banks, agricultural non-credit societies, non-agricultural credit societies and non-agricultural non-credit societies. Operations of primary cooperative marketing societies are given in table no. 39 for each taluka while operations of other important cooperative societies are given in table no. 40. These two tables enable to know the value and quantity of goods handled etc or the business done. The information of regulated markets giving the quantity and value of annual arrivals in the markets for different commodities for the year 1966-67 & 1967-68 is given in table no. 41. There are nine market committees in the district of which only 3 are working. The table no. 42 gives information about registered money-lenders and loans advanced by them for the year 66-67 & 67-68.

VI. Medical and Public Health.

Four tables on medical and public health are presented in this Abstract. Information on Medical facilities available through public and public aided medical institutes is given in table number 43. The table gives information about no. of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, primary health-centres, number of doctors, number of nurses, number of beds and patients treated for the year 1967-68 with comparative data for last year. The data on patients treated relates to only 86 medical institutions out of 103 institutions as the information for all the medical institutes under local sector was not made available. A hospital is considered to be that medical institution where facility of indoor treatment exists along with other facilities like X Ray, Pathological laboratory, Operation theatre etc. The primary health centres though they possess a few beds for treating indoor patients are not classified as hospitals.

Table no. 44 gives vital statistics of births and deaths registered during the years 1966-67. This information is obtained from Director of Public Health Poona. The table no. 45 gives information about number of death in the district during 1967 due to important causes such as Malaria Cholera, Small Pox etc. The information about primary Vaccination, revaccination and Cholera inoculation is given in table no. 46.

VII.I Education.

The first three tables under this section i.e. tables 47, 48, 49 are based on literacy data collected in 1961 census. The table no 47 gives information about number of literates and percentage of literacy under each taluka separately for Rural and Urban while tables 48 and 49 gives break up of literates in rural and urban areas respectively according to educational levels for each of the taluka and separately for male & female. Institutional growth in education can be had from table 50 where no. of institutions, enrolment and teachers for pre-primary, primary secondary and higher education is given for the district for the year 1967-68 with comparative figures for last year. The information is collected from Directorate of education for the whole district & the talukawise information is not available. The two tables 51 & 52 number of Beneficiaries under the schemes of Backward class concession and concession of free education to economically backward class/pupils are more whose annual income is less than Rs. 1200. The table 51 gives information for 2 years i.e. for 1966-67 & 1967-68 while table 52 gives information for the years 1961-62, 1965-66, 1966-67 & 1967-68. The table 53 gives information on expenditure on primary education in the district for the year 1967-68. The expenditure on primary education is incurred through Zilla Parishad and Municipalities. The break up of expenditure under plan & Non-plan is also provided. Table number 54 provides information about the number of villages without primary schools by population groups for the year 1967-68.

IX. Transport and Communications.

The section provides statistics on various modes of transport and communications. The table no. 55 gives length of Railway route in the district as on 31st March 1968. The Railway length is worked out by referring to the railway time table and length of the railway is calculated upto the last railway station within the boundary of the district.

Hence a part of the length beyond a particular station upto the district boundary is left uncovered as it is difficult to know the distance from the railway map. Table no. 56 is providing the road statistics for the years 1960-61, 1966-67 and 1967-68. Road length in the district under different categories like National Highway, State Highway, Major district roads, other District roads and village roads is given in this table. The road length as per type such as cement concrete Black topped, Water Bound Macadam and lower type is also given. Besides Municipal road length is also given in this table. Road plan upto March 1967 the existing categories were taken into account while information for year ending March 68 relates to categories based on 61-81 plan.

The increase in length of state highway as on 31-3-68 is due to change in classification as per 1961-81. Table no. 57 about Motor Vehicles in operation is given for the years ending 31-3-67 and 31-3-68. The information relates to the Nagpur Region as Regional Transport officer does not compile this information districtwise. Similarly information of operational statistics of road transport as given in table 58 relating to the Nagpur Division comprising of four districts of Nagpur, Bhandara, Wardha and Chanda as data are maintained Divisionwise by the Divisional controller. The information on traffic census on five state Highways at different points is given in table no. 59. The information is supplied by Buildings & Communication Department. Postal statistics giving details of number of Post offices, Telegraph-offices, letter boxes, telephones & Radio licences issued for the years 1961-62 and 1964-65 to 1967-68 is given in table 60. Information about rural broadcasting for the year 1967-68 is given in table 61 talukawise. It gives details of number of Villages with a receiving set population covered and radio farm forums operating.

X. Local Bodies.

This section gives data on income and expenditure of local bodies viz village panchyats, Zilla Parishad and the Municipal councils. The table no. 63 is the summary table of subsequent three tables and provides information on total income and expenditure of the above mentioned three institutions of local self Government. The income & expenditure given here related only to revenue receipts and expenditure.

Information about coverage of villages by village Panchayats is also given. The details of income and expenditure of Village panchayats under each one of the Block is given in table 63 for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68. The figures for 1967-68 are provisional as the Annual Administration Report for 1967-68 was yet to be finalised, and information was collected separately from individual Blocks. The information about income is given for certain important heads of receipt such as grants, contributions, Donations, Taxes and fees. Similarly expenditure is given for major sub-heads like sanitation, & health, public works, Social- & Moral Promotion, Administration Agriculture & animal husbandry etc. The tables no. 64 (a) & 64 (b) give details of income & expenditure of the Zilla Parishad. The receipts side is given for income by way of self raised resources on various items, Grants from Govt: Besides income under Debt section is also given. The opening balance and remittances are also given and grand total is obtained. Under expenditure revenue expenditure is given under various departmental heads, Besides expenditure under debt section remittances and closing balance is also given. The table no. 65 is giving information about the income & expenditure of municipalities on important items.

XI. Plan and Community Development.

Under this section two tables are provided for information relating to Annual plans and three tables relate to the community Development. The progress of the district level plan schemes are reported in each quarter by the implementing officers to the office of the District statistical officer which compiles the quarterly progress report for submission to Govt. through the collectors. Based on these quarterly report financial and physical progress under the sub-heads of development is given for the annual Plan 1967-68 with comparative figures for 1966-67 in table no. 66 & 67. The expenditure is given separately for state and local sectors while physical achievement in table 67 relates to important items under various sub-heads. The tables 68-to 70 relates to Community Development Programme where in table 68 no. of Blocks of CPA size, Area in square kilometres, no. of populated and deserted Villages and total population of the blocks within different stages is given.

This table is recently : revised and the population figures are slightly modified. So also the information about populated and deserted villages is now given which was so far reported as not available. The table no. 69 gives information about expenditure of each block incurred under different stages viz. stage I, Stage II, or Stage III. The physical achievement given in table 70 relates only to 13 important items reported in the quarterly or Annual Progress Reports submitted by the Blocks.

XII. Prices.

With the declaration of Emergency in 1962 the price collection work of important commodities is started in the district since November 1962 and Prices from selected shops are collected regular on every Friday for about 49 items. The prices for the years 1966 & 1967 during each of the month is given in table no. 71. The monthly prices reported are averages of prices reported for every week. Prices are collected for cereals, pulses, edible oils, condiments & spices, vegetables, fruits, & nuts, Beverages, Fuel, clothing, utensils and other miscellaneous items and relate to retail prices. The table no. 72 gives information of consumer price index Revised series for working class for Nagpur centre since no working class consumer price Index is worked out for any centre in the district, the Index for Nagpur centre is included in the Abstract to know the general trend.

XIII. Miscellaneous.

This section includes various miscellaneous items strength of police force, crime statistics, work disposed of in civil & criminal courts cinema statistics, number of Banking offices, number of joint stock companies, number of Insurance policies issued, collection of Small Saving & Land Revenue and statistics of general election. Information about strength of police force according to various officials with details of police stations, outposts, lock up etc for the years 1966 & 67 is given in table 73. The crime statistics on different cognisable and non-cognisable crimes is given in table no. 74 for the year 1967 with comparative figures for last year.

No. of cases decided in civil and criminal courts with subdetails of original and appellate cases are given in table 75.

Talukawise information about number of permanent, Semi permanent and touring talkies with the seating capacity is given in table no. 76 for the year 1967-68 with the comparative figures for last year.

Tables 77 and 78 give information of Banking offices (scheduled and cooperative) and Joint Stock companies limited by shares under public & private sectors. Information of no. of insurance policies issued and amount insured is given in table no. 79.

Table no. 80 supplies the information of collection under small savings for the year 1967-68 under different schemes such as National Defence Certificate, Post Office Saving Bank etc.

Details of Land Revenue collection in each taluka for the year, 1967-68 and comparative figures of 66-67 with details of previous arrears, Demand for the current year, collection for the current year, and arrears at the end of the year are given in table no. 81.

Information about number of news papers and periodicals printed and published is given in table 82.

The details about general election held in 1967 for parliamentary & legislative Assembly constituencies is given in table 83. The information in this table pertains to number of electors who voted against total voters and also the partwise position of votes polled..

At the end of this section table no. 84 is given which gives trends in selected indicators in the district. In this table summary data on important items under sub-heads like area & population, Agriculture, Soil Conservation, Live stock Industry, Employment etc is given to a series of years 1950-51, 1955-56, 1960-61, 1966-67, & 1967-68 to give a trend in development taken place at the beginning of First, Second & Third plans end of third plan and by the end of annual plans 66-67 & 67-68.

CHAPTER III .

Important Indicators

In order to depict sectorial trends, position of the district in the Division and the disparity existing between talukas a few indicators of development have been worked out and given below.

Indicator No. 1 Percentage of gross area sown.

The proportion of gross cropped area to the net cropped area indicates the extent of area sown more than once. The district has sufficient scope of double cropping. It ranks third in this respect in 1961-62 in Nagpur Division and fifth in the whole Maharashtra. The percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area during 1966-67 was 107.05, and was less as compared to the corresponding percentage found in the year 1960-61 and 1961-62. The double cropping is possible due to availability of sufficient rains during Monsoon to keep enough moisture in soil for taking a rabi crop. The reduction in the percentage of gross area sown to net area sown can therefore be attributed to insufficient rains both in the years 1965-66 and 1966-67. The talukawise percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area is given below:-

Within the talukas the percentage of gross area sown to net area sown is highest in Bramhapuri Tahsil followed by Gadchiroli and Chandan Tahsils / both in 1960-61 and 1966-67. These three Tahsils have more area under paddy and hence a second crop of Kulktha (Pulses) is taken after paddy. Moreover these Tahsils have sufficient irrigation facilities and also fall under assured and high rainfall zone.

Rajura Tehsil does not have any area under double cropping. Warora Tehsil also has less area under double cropping due to its cropping pattern while Sironcha Tehsil has the lowest percentage.

Indicator No. 2 Productivity of important crops.

The total production of a crop depends upon area occupied by that crop, fertility of Soil, climatic conditions such as adequate rains, absence of crop disease etc. It also is dependent on the adoption of improved practices such as usage of improved seed, adoption of Fertilisers etc. Within the district with the fertility of soil remaining more or less same, the productivity is usually affected by the first and third factor mentioned above. The production of different crops was not better as compared to 66-67. Only in case of Jowar the percentage increase in production during 1966-67 surpassed the percentage increase in the area of that crop. In the case of gram there is found to more production in 1966-67 though there was fall in area. In the case of other crops the area and out turn both decrease in 1966-67 as compared to 1960-61 the decrease in production surpassed the percentage decrease in area. In the case of cotton the area increased by 18.08 % while increase in out.turn was only 0.96%. The table below given comparative figures of area and outturn of important crops with percentage increase or decrease.

Indicator No. 3 Gross value of agricultural production.

In absence of the price data, this indicator could not be worked out.

Indicator No. 4 Percentage of Irrigated Area.

Due to the cropping pattern of the district with large areas under paddy and because of high average rainfall, the district has a high percentage of area under irrigation. It ranked second in the Division and the state during 1960-61 in so far as the percentage of gross irrigated area to net area sown was combined. Paddy is the main food crop in this district which occupies 32.03 percent of total cropped area during 1966-67 and it also requires sufficient water. Small tanks have been constructed for irrigating paddy and the percentage of area under irrigated paddy to the gross irrigated area was 95.6 during 1966-67.

The high percentage of area under irrigation is found in Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Chanda Taluhsils, which are rice growing areas. The table below shows the talukawise percentage of net area irrigated net area sown.

The practice of taking two successive irrigated crops is not in vogue in this district and hence the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area is found to be only 100.42. Indicator No. 5 Changes in crop pattern.

The District is mainly a food grain growing area and has very little area under non-food crops. Thus during 1966-67 out of the total gross cropped area 84.84 % was under food crops and 15.16 percent under non-food crops. Among food crops rice occupies the prominent place as the percentage of area under paddy during 1966-67 to the gross cropped area was 31.96. After paddy Jowar is the most important crop of the district and 29.94 percent of the gross cropped area was under Jowar during 1966-67. The Jowar in this district unlike in other districts of the Division, is sown in Rabi season. Pulses are also grown in considerable proportion of the total cropped area percentage being 14.66. Among non-food crops cotton and oil seeds occupy the major area of the area under crops. These two crops occupied 4.30 and 10.06 % of the gross cropped area in 1966-67. With the high percentage of area under Jowar, the percentage of area under coarse grain is also considerable i.e. 30.08 % of the gross cropped area in the year 1966-67. This percentage is high in Warora, Chanda and Rajura Tahsils where Rabi and Rabi Jowar is the main second crop after paddy and cotton. The less fertile land which can not be used for paddy or cotton is used for growing Jowar. In Warora and Rajura Tahsil Jowar is grown as a rotational crop with cotton. The table below shows talukewise percentages of area under important crops to gross cropped area.

The above table shows that there is a marked difference in cropping pattern of eastern and Western talukas of the district. The Talukas of Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Sironcha have more than 94 % of the gross cropped area under food-crops, while the lowest percentage of foodcrops was found in Rajura taluka i.e. 69.25. Rice and Jowar are the main foodcrops of the district while the area under wheat has some significant percentage in Warora taluka. Among non-food crops oilseeds occupy a major portion of area under non-food crops followed by cotton which is grown mainly in Warora & Rajura talukas.

As regards the cropping pattern adopted for irrigated crops, it can be seen from the table given below that irrigation was done mainly to foodcrops and during 1966-67 only 65 acres were under irrigated non-food crops.

Indicator No. 6 Increase in Agricultural credit and outstanding due.

The cooperative movement was primarily started to provide easy credit facilities to the cultivators and in the district it has achieved this purpose to a large extent. The primary agricultural credit societies (Service cooperatives etc) are now covering almost all the villages of the district. These societies provide short term loans to cultivators which help them in conducting this agricultural operations. The increase in agriculture credit through these primary agriculture credit societies is considerable since the third plan period. Taking the amount of loans advanced by all Agricultural credit societies for the year 1960-61 as 100, the index of loan advanced during the subsequent years is as follows :-

Indicator No. 7 Agricultural Wage Rates:-

Agriculture labour is one of the important class of workers. As per 1961 population census the agriculture labour formed 26.06 percent of the total workers. Data on agriculture wage rates has been collected from three rural centres viz. namely Ghugus, Sindewahi and Mul. The Mul centre is selected from January 1964 by replacing Chimur centre. The wage rates for Ghugus centres are not available from May 66 onwards as the selected cultivator is not supplying the information. It is seen that the wage rates are usually high during the months May to October when the agricultural operations are collected every fortnight and the average for two fortnights is given in the table below. The wage rate structure more or less remained unchanged during 1967 as compared to 1966 except a little higher wage rates in August and September in Sindewahi centre and high wages were paid in July for Mul centre.

The yearly average is found to be higher in 1967 as compared to 1966 for both Males and Female in both the centres. The comparative figures are given below:-

Bovine population per hectare of cultivable land is found to be more in Taluqs of Sironcha, Gadchiroli and Bramhapuri. which form the rice tract of the district and the draught power is required more in rice tracts, than in other areas.

Indicator No. 9 Poultry as compared to population.

Much stress has been given in the plan periods in popularising poultry keeping specially in rural areas for giving additional income to cultivators and to bridge over food shortage. As per 1961 livestock census, poultry keeping was much flourishing in Chandrapur District when the district stood second for possessing 319.13 birds per 100 households. Per capita poultry during the year 1961 worked out to 0.66. However poultry in 1966 as per quinquennial census decreased considerably. The per capita poultry in 1966 as per projected population in 1966 (worked out as 18,89,000 according to census Hand book) was 0.20 only. Poultry development needs accduation as the per capita poultry is very low. The table below gives talukawise position of poultry per 100 households in 1961 and 1966. The number of households enumerated in 1961 census has been adopted for working out poultry birds kept per 100 household

Indicator No. 10 Per Capita Consumption of Electricity.

Indicator No. 11 Increase in number of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchange and vacancies notified.

The media of Employment exchange is being utilized both by employment seekers as well as employers. Due to the increase in level of educated personnel and due to various employment avenues created in the development process both the registration of employment seekers and vacancies notified have tremendously increased during the third plan and during the two subsequent annual plans.

Indicator No. 13. Increase in number of Students in different categories.

Much stress was given on the development of education under the Social Services during the plan periods. Both the number of institutions and the number of pupils attending have increased tremendously since 1960-61. Remarkable progress is noticeable in education of girls where the percentage increase in number of students is 174.79 and 213.31 respectively for primary and Secondary standards in 1967-68 over 1960-61. The price collection work in all the district headquarters were started in the month of November 1962 i.e. since the declaration of Emergency in the country. The Trend in prices since 1962 is found to be upward but the increase in prices during 1966 and 1967, the years of scarcity and draught were more severe. Average prices for the year 1962, are worked out from the monthly average prices for November and December 1962.

The above table shows that prices have increased heavily since 1962. Maximum price increase was found in the case of gramdal where percentage increase is 280%. The prices of almost all commodities also registered increase over 1966 prices except for groundnut oil prices and washing soap prices . x
which are less as compared to last year.

CHAPTER IV

Plan Development.

The phase of plan Development in the country was started in 1951 when the First Five Year Plan was implemented. Within the broad outlines of the National Plans, State plans were formulated accomodating the various Socio-Economic aspects which required concentrated efforts. The second and Third Plans followed subsequently. The First and Second Plans were formulated in such a way that it covered the overall needs of the State and lesser attention were therefore paid to the needs and requirements of small administrative areas such as district though some benefits had accrued to the district by schemes thus formulated. However, the Third Plan widening its scope accomodated to some extent needs of the district and for the first time separate financial outlays were earmarked for the development schemes to implemented at district level and below.

The Third Plan ended on 31 st March 1966 and was not followed by the Fourth Five year plan immediately. The finalisation of the countrys Fourth plan had been delayed due to various unforeseen circumstances like hostilities in 1965, successive droughts in 1965 and 1966, suspension of Foreign credits and fall in export earnings. The devaluation of Rupees in June 66 also necessitated the assessment of overall situation of available resources. All these factors hampered the growth of economic prosperity and the National Development Council therefore decided to remodel the Fourth Five year plan both at the States and central level. In the meantime it was decided to continue the process of planning by formulating Annual Plans. These Annual plans were formulated without prejudice to the magnitude and dimensions of the Fourth Five year plan of the State.

The Annual Plan for 1966-67 envisaged an outlay of Rs. 185.29 lakhs for the district level plan schemes of this district. Against this allotment an expenditure of Rs. 161.37 lakhs was incurred.

The Annual plan for 1967-68 had been drawn within the resources in sight as the Foreign exchange position continued to be uncertain. The state Annual plan for 67-68 drawn in this background provided an outlay of Rs. 181.42 lakhs for the district level plan schemes for the year 1967-68 out of which an amount of Rs. 94.08 lakhs was under State Sector and the amount of Rs. 87.34 lakhs was under local Sector.

Sub-headwise expenditure and physical achievement during Annual Plan 1967-68 is given in the following paragraphs.

I. Agricultural Programmes.

Agricultural programmes were given priority in the Annual plan 1967-68 as the percentage of outlays on Agriculture and Allied programmes to the total outlay for the district formed 56.86 percent. An outlay of Rs. 82.77 lakhs was provided for this head of development against which an expenditure of Rs. 71.08 lakhs was incurred forms 84.9 % of the outlay. Different schemes under the sub-heads Agriculture production, Land Development, Soil Conservation and Minor irrigation were aimed at improvement in agriculture to boost up production by scientific methods of production.

The programmes under other sub-heads of Animal husbandry, Forests, Fisheries and Warehousing & marketing are allied agricultural programmes and are thus included under this head of development. The sub-headwise allotment and expenditure for the year 1967-68 under this head of Development are given below :-

Agricultural Production.

A total outlay of Rs. 1.78 lakhs was provided for nine schemes under this sub-head of development against which an expenditure of Rs. 0.95 lakhs was incurred. The schemes of Gram Sevak training Horticulture Development, distribution of green manure seed, Plant protection, Intensive cultivation of Food Crops were continued during this year. Under the scheme of Intensive cultivation of food crops and about 1.75 lakh. acres were covered under intensive cultivation programme.

Minor Irrigation.

The programme under this sub-head of development consisted of Boring and blastings of irrigation wells, and construction and repairs of minor irrigation works. Under the former schemes 444 feet boring was done to wells and 1736 holes were blasted in wells and an expenditure of Rs. 1.65 lakhs was incurred as against an provision of Rs. 1.24 lakhs. The major programme was of construction and repairs of minor irrigation works. The district has many of the tanks of ex-malguzars which required repairs. About 49 tanks were repaired by the end of year 67-68 and an expenditure of Rs. 27.55 lakhs was made as against a budget of Rs. 31.61 lakhs, percentage of expenditure being 87.15 of the corresponding outlay.

Soil Conservation.

A provision of Rs. 27.26 lakhs had been made for the bunding and terracing programme against which an expenditure of Rs. 22.24 lakhs was made during 1967-68 forming 81.48 % of the outlay. The programme of terracing and bunding was started in the first year of Third Five Year plan. During 1967-68 9930 acres of land was banded while 5372 acres of area was terraced. Cumulative areas banded and terraced by end of March 1968 were 40,046 acres and 10079 acres respectively.

Animal Husbandry.

No new scheme has been undertaken under this sub-head and a provision of Rs. 0.35 lakhs was made for these schemes. An expenditure of Rs. 0.24 lakhs was incurred during 1967-68 the percentage of expenditure being 68.47 to the corresponding outlay. An expenditure of Rs. 0.03 lakhs was made on remaining works of Veterinary Dispensary buildings while a amount of Rs. 0.09 lakhs was spent on cattle breeding centres.

On the scheme of premium bulls an amount of Rs. 0.05 lakhs was spent and for cattle shows and rallies a total amount of Rs. 0.02 lakhs was expended.

Forest.

Chandrapur district is endowed with the Forest wealth and about 70 % of the district area is under forests. Hence an amount of Rs. 19.63 lakhs was provided for various schemes under this sub-head against which an expenditure of Rs. 17.81 lakhs was incurred in 1967-68 the percentage of expenditure being 90.73 of the corresponding budget provision. Under the scheme of plantation of general utility timber plantation in 847 acres was done by incurring an expenditure of Rs. 3.52 lakhs. Plantation of bamboos was done in 325 acres. On Forest roads and Bridges there was a provision of Rs. 3.95 lakhs against which an expenditure of Rs. 3.32 lakhs was incurred. Road construction was in progress in 14.75 K.M.S. . An expenditure of Rs. 0.11 lakhs was made on the scheme of Fodder development. For the benefit of forest labour^{es} Rs. 0.20 lakhs were spent. Plantation of eucalyptus and Bamboo was undertaken under the scheme of Quick growing species which has been included under state plan from this year and an expenditure of Rs. 8.41 lakh^s was included in it

Fisheries

For the development of Fisheries a provision of Rs. 0.67 lakhs was made for five schemes and an expenditure of Rs. 0.46 lakhs was incurred during 1967-68. Fish farming is undertaken in impounded waters and carp fry numbering 28.57 lakhs were stocked in the year 1967-68. About 3.00 lakh K.G. of fish was netted during this year. Subsidy on purchase of nylon twine was grouped to the extent of Rs. 0.08 lakhs under the scheme of Assistance for purchase of fishery requisites and the fishermen purchased about 185 k.g. of nylon twine. Non-geirals subsidy and share capital contribution was provided for under the scheme of development of Fishery cooperatives.

Warehousing & Marketing.

Under this sub-head there is only one scheme viz. Development of Agricultural marketing under which assistance is provided to market committees for improvement of market yards. An expenditure of Rs. 0.08 lakhs was incurred under this scheme against a provision of Rs. 0.27 lakhs.

Cooperation and Community Development .

Cooperation.

The programme under this sub-head consisted of strengthening of cooperative field. A provision of Rs. 2.05 lakhs was made for this purpose and against which an expenditure of Rs. 4.28 lakhs was incurred. Under the schemes of Development of Marketing and Organisation of Labour contract societies the expenditure incurred exceeded the budget for the year. An amount of Rs. 0.07 lakhs was spent of the scheme of extension of Agricultural credit. For ^{the} cooperative Farming inside & outside pilot areas a provision of Rs. 0.72 lakhs was made and an expenditure of Rs. 0.24 lakhs was incurred.

Community Development.

The total provision made available for this sub-head was Rs. 13.16 lakhs against which an expenditure of Rs. 11.91 lakhs was made. The percentage of expenditure to total provision worked out to 99.5. The programme of Community Development had already covered all the Rural areas and 20 Blocks are functioning under various stages, An expenditure of Rs. 10.50 lakhs was made on Community Development programme. Applied Nutrition programme was taken up in Brahmapuri Block and an expenditure of Rs. 0.33 lakhs was made on it.

The Rural Manpower scheme which was under the centrally sponsored programme so far was included under state plan. A provision of Rs. 2.16 lakhs was made for this scheme against which an expenditure of Rs. 1.08 lakhs had been made.

Small Scale & Cottage Industries.

The sub-head included three schemes with a total provision of Rs. 1.85 lakhs and the expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 1.04 lakhs forming 56.22 % of the corresponding provision. The weavers cooperatives were given financial assistance by way of rebate or loans and an expenditure of Rs. 0.32 lakhs was incurred for the same. Industrial cooperatives were also provided financial assistance of Rs. 0.32 lakhs while under the scheme of state aid to small industries an amount of Rs. 0.40 lakhs was spent.

Transport and Communication.

Road Development.

For the development roads for which the district is particularly lagging behind a provision of Rs. 10.56 lakhs was made and an expenditure of Rs. 9.60 lakhs had been made for the same.

Under the scheme of District Roads an expenditure of Rs. 7.59 lakhs was incurred forming 94.17 % of the corresponding provision. Work on 11 miles was in progress under this scheme. Rural roads under the scheme of roads under public participation were undertaken and work on 16 miles was in progress under this scheme for while an expenditure of Rs. 1.32 lakhs was made. An expenditure amounting to Rs. 0.69 lakhs and 0.10 lakhs was incurred under schemes of Roads of economic importance and roads in inaccessible and hilly areas.

Tourism

The scheme of development of National Park at Tadoba is included under this sub-head and an expenditure of Rs. 0.30 lakhs has been booked against a budget allotment of Rs. 0.36 lakhs.

Social Services.

The programme under Social Services included the following sub-heads & the budget provision & expenditure under each of them is given below:

Financial assistance of Rs. 3.75 lakhs was given to Seven Non Govt. high schools under the scheme of Development of Non-government high schools.

Under public health : the scheme for Malaria eradication was implemented extensively and expenditure of Rs . 11.33 lakhs was incurred. D.D.T. spraying was done in Rural & Urban areas. Family Planning programme was also under taken extensively and an expenditure of Rs. 5.80 lakhs was incurred. About 3000 sterilisation operation were performed water supply through construction of Drinking water wells was undertaken under scheme of Local Development and an expenditure of Rs. 4.28 lakhs was made . Newly 27 wells were constructed and work on 408 wells was in progress.

Information & Publicity.

For the scheme of Rural broadcasting an expenditure of Rs. 0.24 lakhs was booked against provision of Rs. 0.23 lakhs.
