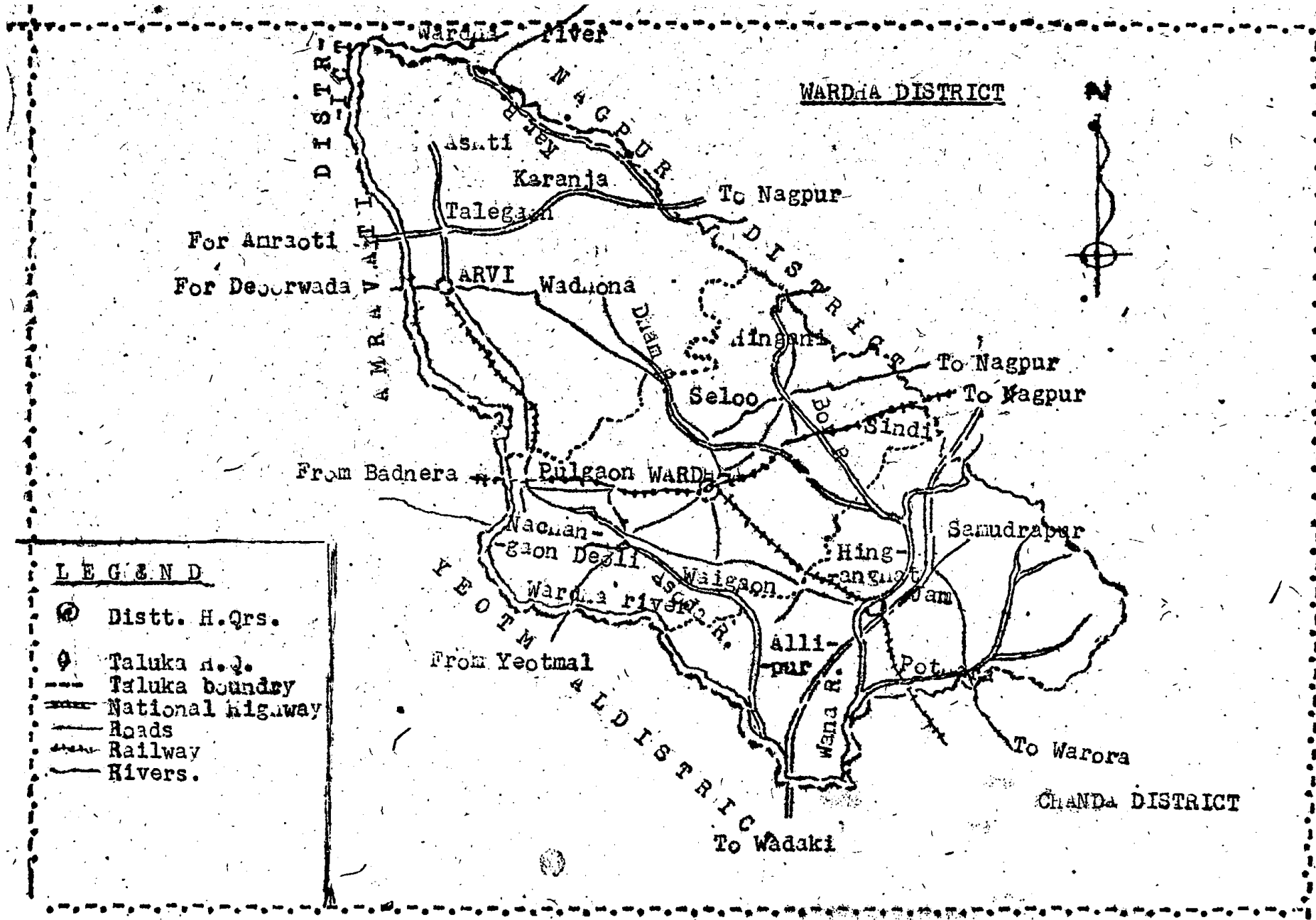

CHAPTER - I

INTRODUCTION

PHYSICAL FEATURES

1.1 LOCATION

Wardha District deriving its name after the Wardha river which flows all along the western border of the district. The district was formed in the year 1862 due to the bifurcation of Nagpur district. The Wardha valley forms western portion of the district consisting of a long strip of land, running from North-West to South-East of the district, occupies the western portion of Nagpur plain and lies at the foot of Satpura hills adjoining Amraoti district. It lies between $20^{\circ} 18'$ and $21^{\circ} 21'$ north latitude and $78.30'$ and $79.15'$ east longitude and is very narrow at the northern extremity and gradually enlarges ^{its} width towards South.

1.2 BOUNDARIES

The District is surrounded by four districts of Vidarbha with Nagpur District on the east, Chandrapur district on the south, Yeshwantpur district on the south-west and Amraoti district on the west, north-west and the north. The Wardha river separates the district all along the western border from Amraoti and Yeshwantpur districts.

1.3 ADMINISTRATIVE SET UP

Revenue Set Up

The district is administratively divided into three Revenue sub-divisions named Arvi, Wardha and

and Hinganghat each comprising one Taluka. The talukas are further sub-divided into 14 Revenue circles in the district which in turn are divided into groups of villages called 'Patwari halka.' As such, village is the smallest unit in the administrative set up.

The district forms part of the Nagpur division and is administered by the Collector. The Collector is in charge of general administration, law and order, treasury, Land revenue and civil supplies besides of being the head of the office for the Revenue department. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector and other Deputy Collector in his office and three sub-divisional officers of the rank of Deputy Collectors in charge of three revenue sub-divisions. He is also the District Magistrate and the District Registrar. The Revenue circle and Patwari halka, are in charge of Revenue Inspector and Patwari respectively.

ZILLA PARISHAD SET UP

With a view to promote development of democratic institutions and to secure greater measure of Participation by the people in Development plans and in local and government ^{all} officers by democratic decentralisation of powers and functions, an autonomous body of Zilla Parishad at district level and seven panchayat Samities at block level, have been established on the 1st May, 1962 under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act of 1962. The Zilla Parishad covers 99.2 percent of entire ^e rural area of the district and 76.3 percent of the total population of the district. It has been vested with many statutory powers and various functions of the state Government and those

earlier performed by District Local Boards, Janpada Sabhas, District Development Boards and School Boards in the local development sphere have been transferred to the Zilla Parishad.

An elected President is the head of the Zilla Parishad comprising elected members. The elected Parishad forms six subject committees to deal with Finance, Works, Agriculture, Co-operation, Education and Health.

An Officer in the senior scale of I.A.S. works as the Chief Executive Officer in the Zilla Parishad. The Parishad is also assisted by various departments. Officers of Class I and class II service under State Govt. are heads of those departments at the district level. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as a Secretary to Zilla Parishad.

At the Block level the Panchayat Samitis have elected chairmen and Deputy Chairmen. The Block Development Officers work as Secretaries to the Panchayat Samitis. The Panchayat Samiti consists of all elected and Co-Opted councillors from the areas of block and the Chairmen of a Co-operative Society conducting the business in agriculture in block area as a Co-opted member. Sarpanchas elected by members of village, Panchayats are also elected members of Panchayat Samitis.

The executive authority for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act is vested in the Chief Executive Officer and the Block Development Officers.

At the village level, the Gram Panchayat is the elected body responsible for the developmental activities of the village. The Gram Panchayat elected Sarpancha and Deputy Sarpancha. The Gram Sewak or Assistant Gram Sahayak works as Secretary to the Gram Panchayat.

Besides, the Revenue Department and Zilla Parishad, the major department of Government, functioning in the district are police, Co-operation, Buildings and communications, courts forest etc.

1.4 AREA

The area of the district is 2434 square miles (6304.1 K.Ms.) and its population according to 1961 census is 6,34,277. In terms of area and population it constitutes 1.06 percent and 1.59 percent of area and population of Maharashtra which rank the district as the smallest in Maharashtra excluding of course greater Bombay. Its head quarters were first located at Kaottha a village near Pulgaon, but it was subsequently transferred to the present site, at Palakwadi village subsequently named as Wardha after the name of the river the Wardha. The maximum length of the district is about eighty miles and its breadth at the Southern extremity is about 36 miles. There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district, on its administrative divisions since 1911, though it formed a part of erstwhile states of Madhya Pradesh and bilingual Bombay. Due to State Reorganisation since 1st May, 1960 the district forms a part of Maharashtra.

1.5 TOPOGRAPHY

Wardha district naturally divides itself into two parts. The northern part comprises hilly parts due to underlying spur of Satpura and covers a major portion of Arvi tahsil. While on the South, lies undulating plain intersected by streams, and broken here and there by isolated hills rising abruptly from its surface. It covers most of Wardha tahsil and the entire Hinganghat tahsil. No peak in the range exceeds 2,000 feet and the average height of their summits is not more than 1,300 to 1,400 feet above the level of the plain. The length of the hilly tract from North-West to South-East is 50 miles and its greatest width is less than 20 miles. It occupies about one fourth of the whole area of the district. The elevation of the plain country is between 700 and 950 feet. The slope of the district is from north-west to South-East.

1.6 HILLS RIVER SYSTEM AND SOIL

There is only one main system of hills, which is the offshoots of the Satpura ranges. The length of the hill from North-West to South-East is about 50 miles and its maximum width is 20 miles. The highest points in the district are the peaks of a Garamsur (1976 feet.), Nandgaon (1760 feet) and Malegaon (1615 feet) in the hills of Arvi Tahsil. The trigonometrical survey stations is near Nachangaon (1227 feet) and that near Kolhar is 1132 feet.

RIVERS

The Wardha is the only important river of the district which rises from the Multai Plateau on the Satpura range and flows all along the northern and western borders dividing the district from former Berar. The main tributaries of the Wardha are the Yashoda, the Wana and the Bakali. The other notable rivers in the district are the Bhadadi, the Dham, the Bor and the Bothara. Although these rivers pose great threat and danger to the villages situated on their banks when they are in spate only in monsoon season there is hardly any water in summer. Secondly the beds of these rivers are too deep to make them fit for canal irrigation. The river Bor is harnessed for irrigation purposes by constructing a dam named 'Yeshwant Dharan'.

SOIL

To the south of a large number of villages around of Anji and Hingani and slightly to the north of Nagpur -Bombay Road, the country is hilly and the remaining parts of Wardha and Hingangaht tansils are fertile plains with the exception of some low foot hills running along the northern boundary of Wardha tansil and of few small hills in the South East of Hingangaht tansil. The level portion of the Arvi tansil in the north, is the most fertile part of the district and consists of a strip of land lying between the hills and the Wardha river. The soil here is formed of the detritus brought down from the hills and is highly productive growing a singularly fine crop of cotton. The plains of Wardha

and Hinganghat tansils, are not so renowned for fertility but they are covered over most of the surface with a coating of fertile black or brown soil of varying depth above the basaltic rock. The black cotton soil which covers the trap is believed to be formed by the denudation of basalt combined with the deposit of vegetable matters. The thickness of the soil in the district varies from 10 feet to a few inches, the average thickness being about 2 feet. The soil is generally found intermixed with calcareous tufa of 'Kankari'. The types of Soil that are met with in the district are Kali I, Kali II, Morand and Khardi-Bhardi. The black soil occupies nearly 84 percent of the area of the district.

The soils are mostly originated from Deccan trap. The Black soil contracts in Summer and becomes fissur with rocks.

1.7 CLIMATE, TEMPERATURE AND RAINFALL

CLIMATE

The climate of the district is hot and dry and somewhat cooler than Nagpur. The days are hot and nights are cool. Both Summer and winter seasons are severe. The heat of the mid-day in summer is a little lesser than the hottest parts in India. The Summer sets in roughly from the middle of February and continues up to the middle of June or till Monsoon sets in. The winter usually starts from the middle of October and ends by middle of February though the nights in February continues to be quite cold.

* The maximum temperature was 43.5⁰ centigrade in the month of January while as the minimum temperature was 14.03 centigrade in January, 67

The observatory was started in the month of June, 1966 at Wardha. The temperature record shows that the month of May is the hottest while January is considered to be the coldest month of the year.

Over the whole district the major supply of rain is from the South-West monsoon, which sets in about the middle of June, and lasts till the end of October. The rainfall data are recorded at three taluka headquarters of Wardha, Arvi and Hinganghat. During the wet season, the month of August usually has the greatest intensity of rains followed by July. From Taluka to taluka the average rainfall is more or less the same but it decreases as one proceeds from north to South.

* During the year 1967 at all the three centres of the district, named Arvi, Wardha and Hinganghat, the rainfall was 1155.7, 963.0 and 938.5 m.ms. against the normal rainfall of 494.5, 1134.4 and 1141.5 m.ms. respectively.

CHAPTER -II

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The different tables of the Abstract are grouped under thirteen sections. Explanatory notes on sources concepts, definitions of certain terms and limitations of Statistics presented in abstract are given below sectionwise.

I- CLIMATE

The table No. 1 gives monthly normal rainfall and number of raindays in each month of the three selected centres of the district where the rainfall is recorded. In this tables the data of rainfall is given for the calender year 1966 and 1967 and annual totals are given. As regards rainy days a was treated as rainy day of during twenty ^{four} hours the raingage recorded a minimum of 2.5 m.m. of rainfall.

The table No. 2 shows, maximum, minimum and average temperature of the above three centres for the year 1965 and 1966. The average temperature is a simple average of maximum and minimum temperature.

II- AREA AND POPULATION

The table No. 3 gives comparative figures of area, male, and female, rural as well urban population of the district for 1951 and 1961 census. It also gives population per square mile during both the censuses, for rural and urban area of the district as well as for the district as a whole. Percentage variations over 1951 census are also shown for the district, as well as rural and urban area in each tansil.

Table No. 4 indicates taluka wise classification of inhabited villages according to population ranges in 1961 census and for the district. The number of uninhabited villages is also shown in col. 19 of the table.

Table No. 5 shows taluka wise classification of towns according to population ranges in 1961 in Wardha district. A town or an urban area is a place which has 1. (a) a municipality, a cantonment or a civil lines or 2. (i) a population of 5000 or over and (ii) at least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits. Rural population is the population of all the villages in a revenue unit "village" is a statutorily recognised village having a defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, wadis or padas have, therefore not been shown a separate village. On the other hand, statutorily recognised villages having no population are uninhabited villages. Villages also includes forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families.

The table No. 6 deals with the number of workers according to livelihood classes in each taluk for urban and rural area and for the district. Similarly the number of non-workers are also given vide serial No. 11 of the table. The term 'workers' used in this table is defined as noted below.

According to 1961 census, a person is classified as a worker if (a) In case of seasonal work like cultivation, live stock dairying, house hold industry, etc, he had some regular work of more than one hour per day,

throughout the greater part of the working season and (b) in case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service business or commerce, he was employed during any of the 15 days preceding the day of enumerators visit to the household. Those who did not conform to the above concept (Women doing house hold work, students, rent receivers beggars and unemployed persons etc.) were classified as non workers. Here 'work' ^{means} gainful work. The workers were further classified into nine main categories of economic activity. Category I includes both owner cultivators and tenant cultivators. Category II covers all other persons working on land as labourers on wages without holding any right upon the land workers in household industry are included under category IV. Household industry is defined as an industry conducted at home in urban areas or within the village in rural areas by the head of the household himself and or mainly by the member of the household. A Household industry is not run on the scale of a registered factory and relates to repairing or making of goods. Manufacturing (category V) includes all types of productions, processing, servicing or repairing of goods. This category does not include production, processing etc. already classified as household industry in category IV. Category VI covers workers engaged in construction and maintenance of buildings, roads, railways, bridges, telegraph and telephone lines, waterways reservoirs etc. under category VII, workers engaged in any capacity in wholesale, or retail trading activity, and commercial transactions relating to imports and exports, real estate properties, stocks and shares,

insurance, money lending banking, etc. are included.

Category VIII includes workers engaged in transport activities by air, rail, road and water and in services

identical to transport such as packing carting, loading, unloading etc. Workers engaged in storage, warehousing,

communications services such as posts, Telegraphs, Telephones, wireless signalling. Information and Broadcasting

are also included in this category workers engaged in (i)

public utility services like electricity, gas or water

supply and sanitary services, (ii) central, state, Quasi

Government or associations, recreation services, etc. are

covered under category IX.

Table No. 7 shows distribution of population according to age group, mother tongue and religion for

each tahsil as well as for the district as a whole. The

term 'Mother tongue' used in this table, is defined as

a language spoken by the persons mother to the persons in

his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects

have been included in the main languages on the basis

of Grierson's classification.

Table No. 8 indicates number of scheduled castes

and scheduled tribes in both rural and urban area of

each tahsil of the district. Scheduled castes notified for

the district are (1) Balani (2) Basar (3) Bhangi (4) Chanar

(5) Dhor (6) Don (7) Ganda (8) Kaikadi (9) Katia

(10) Khatik (11) Madgi (12) Mahar and (13) Mang (including

mang Garudi) (14) Bahua (15) Guasi and (16) Sansi. Except

last three all the first thirteen Scheduled castes were

reported in the district. No scheduled tribes are notified for the district.

The table No. 9 gives tahsilwise figures of

land utilization under the standard heads of utilization.

Against each tahsil the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land is shown. The changes in the geographical area over the years are mainly due to the progress of cadastral surveys. The area according to village papers is calculated from the village returns prepared by the village patwaries for revenue purposes. There are difference between the figures of total area of the district according to the Surveyer general and according to Village papers because the latter is calculated by totalling up village returns while the former is calculated in Blocks. Moreover, allowances made for areas covered by water, buildings, roads etc. are different in two cases under 'Forests' are included all actually forested area or lands classed or administered as forests, under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether state-owned or private. If any portion of land is not actually wooded but ^{put} to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land. Land put to non agricultural use stands for all lands occupied by buildings, roads, railways or under water i.e. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agricultural Barren and uncultivated lands covers all barren and uncultivable land like mountains, deserts etc.. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as uncultivable, whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. Cultivable wastes includes all lands available for cultivation whether or not taken up for cultivation or abandoned after five years for one reason or the other. Such lands may be either fallow or covered

with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or unassessed and may be in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. Lands once cultivated but not cultivated for five years in succession is also included in this category, at the end of the five years permanent pastures or other grazing land cover all grazing lands whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. Land under miscellaneous tree crops and groves not included in the net area sown is included all cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use. Lands under casurina trees, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves for fuel etc., which are not 'orchards' are classed under this category. Current fallow comprise cropped areas which are left fallow during the current year. If any seedling area is not cropped again the same year, it is also treated as current fallow. Other fallow lands includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years. The reasons for keeping such lands fallow may be inter-alia one of the following (1) poverty of cultivators (2) inadequate water supply (3) malarial climate, (4) silting of canals and rivers or (5) unremunerative nature of farming etc. The net area sown consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, This represents the difference between the total geographical area and sum of area under forests, barren and uncultivable land, land put to non agricultural uses, cultivable wastes,

permanent pastures and other grazing lands, miscellaneous tree crops and groves, not included in the net area sown, other fallow land and current fallows. Area sown more than once includes area sown with two or more than two crops and counted more than once in the year. The gross cropped area represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once on the same land during the same year, with the same or different crops. The table No. 10 gives area under different crops in each talukas in the district for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67. The figures for 1965-66 are based on final forecast estimates. The data about area are compiled from village records. The table No. 11 gives yield per hectare and outturn of principal crops in the district for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67. The estimates of outturn are based partly on the results of crop cutting surveys and partly on "annewari" method. On the basis of the figures of cropwise outturn, the area under each crops in hectare is divided and the yield per hectare is worked. The table No. 12 gives irrigated area by different sources in each tansil of the district for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67, and the figures for 1965-66 are provisional. Table No. 13 indicates area irrigated under different crops in each tansil of the district for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67. The figures of area are recorded from the village papers. The table No. 14 shows the number of irrigation wells in each taluka of the district for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67. Since the figures for wells not in use in Wardha tansil were not available with the Statistician Department of Agriculture Poona, the total number of

wells not in use, includes the figures of Arvi and Hinganghat tahsil only. Table No. 15 indicates the number of minor irrigations works in use and not in use and the net area irrigated by these works during the year 1966-67 constructed by the Zilla Parishad, state Government and private Co-operatives in the district. Minor irrigation works includes lift irrigation also. The table No. 16 shows, Major and medium project as on 30-6-68 in the district. The cost of minor irrigation project is upto a maximum of Rs. 20 lakh; whereas the cost of medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 crores and that of a major irrigation project is Rs. 5 crores and above. The table No. 17 gives the data of agricultural wage rates. The ^{term} agricultural wages denotes the wages paid to those rural workers who are employed on wages in agricultural operations. The agricultural workers are further classified into skilled unskilled workers. The skilled workers comprises carpenters blacksmith and cobblers where as unskilled workers are inclusive of field labourers, other agricultural labourers and herdsmen. Since the data was collected fortnightly, average for each ^{centre} is given in the table. Similarly average for whole of each centre is also given at the end of the table. The table No. 18 indicates the data on different type of agricultural machinery and implements as enumerated at 1965 live stock census. In 1966 (i) improved harrows and cultivators, (ii) improved seed drills, (iii) improved threshers, (iv) rotary chaff cutters, (v) sprayers and dusters and (vi) two wheel walking tractors or power tillers were enumerated for the first time. Only those instruments which were in use for agricultural purposes

were enumerated. The table No. 19 shows data at famine^c Socarcity and akin to searcity in the district declared by the collector during the year 1967-68.

IV- ANIMAL HUSBANDRY, FOREST AND FISHERIES

The table No. 20 gives the number of various types of live stock and poultry as enumerated in the district at the time of 1966 Livestock census which is a decennial occurrence. At this census all the live stock is enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate animals in transit. The table No. 21 gives live stock in slaughter house-s, stray animals and statistics regarding various veterinary facilities available in the district, number of animals and poultry treated and number of animals inseminated in the year 1966-67 and 1967-68. Table No. 22 shows disease wise attacks and deaths or livestock in the year 1966-67 and 1967-68. Table No. 23 shows the number of recognised slaughter houses and animal slaughtered therein in the year 1966-67 and 1967-68 .

Table No. 24(a) gives detailed area under different types of forest. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status in to reserved forest-s, protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forest Act XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber productions and in which rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid, right of grazing and cultivation is allowed but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forests refer to the inaccessible forests or unoccupied

waste. The unclassified forest are under the possession of the revenue department. The forest area shown in table No. 24-A do not tally with the area under forest shown in table No. 9 of land utilization in agriculture. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons (i) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooded area under the control of the Forest Department is taken as area under forests while in agricultural statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilization (ii) The forest department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest area, the actual utilization of these areas is not so important from their point of view as it is in the land utilization statistics for agricultural statistics (iii) Forest Department returns relate to the financial year and agricultural statistics relate to the agricultural year. The table 24 - B gives productions of major and minor products for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68.

V- EMPLOYMENT INDUSTRY, MINING AND ELECTRICITY

The factory statistics shown in table No. 25, 26, and 27 cover the following types of factories registered under the factory act, 1948 (i) Those employing, ten or more workers, working with the aid of power (ii) those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power and (iii) those registered under section 85 of the act under which the state Government makes applicable the provisions of the act even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However defence factories are excluded. The Table No. 25 gives the number of working factories and average daily employment therein according

to the major groups of industries. It must be mentioned here that the number of workers shown in these three tables are the average number of workers working daily throughout the year and not the total number on the roll of the factories. The Table No. 26 shows industry wise distribution of working factories according to working strength for the year 1967. The table No. 27 shows distribution of factories according to number of days worked.

The table No. 28 gives important statistics relating to employment exchange for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68. The table No. 29 shows occupational distribution of total registrations and placements in employment exchange. The table No. 30 indicates the volume of employment in different industries. "Occupation" of a worker is the function which he personally performs by engaging himself in work in any branch of economic activity which is called his industry. The concept of "Occupation is thus distinct from that of "Industry". The latter is defined as a sector of economic activity in which a worker is engaged. The table No. 31 and 32 present the results of the census of state Government employees as on 1-7-1966 conducted by the Bureau. The data presented in table No. 31 is restricted to class I, II, III, and IV employees of the state Government and do not cover any other category such as worked charged personnel, class IV employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, parttime workers or honorary workers. The distribution of employees according to specified basic pay ranges is shown separately in respect of class I, II, III, and IV employees. The table also

shows distribution of employees according to monthly emoluments ranges. The table No. 32 indicates the strength of employees under different departments of the State Government in the district.

The table No. 33 gives the figures of generation of electricity as well as its consumption under various purposes. The table No. 34 shows the upto date progress of electrification of towns and villages upto the year 1967-68 in the district.

VI- CO-OPERATION

Table No. 35 shows all co-operative societies in the district during the year 1967-68 including central Co-operative bank and Land Development. These societies are divided into two classes viz credit and non credit societies. Credit societies are further subdivided into two classes (i) agricultural credit and (ii) non-agricultural credit. Similarly non credit * societies are divided into (1) Agri. non credit and (ii) non-agricultural. Since the main function of agricultural credit societies is to advance credit to the people, the information about their members, share capital, reserve and other funds, working capital, short term, medium term and long term loans advanced during the 1966-67 and 1967-68 in respect of District Central co-operative Bank, and district Land Development bank is given in table No. 36. Similarly information in addition to the above, regarding loans advanced, recovered, outstandings, overdues and percentage of recovery in respect of primary agricultural credit societies for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68 is given in table No. 37. Table No. 38 shows the information of members share capital Reserve and other funds

and working capital in respect of agricultural, not credit societies, non agricultural credit societies and non-agricultural non-credit societies. The table no. 39 indicates the value of goods purchased and sold as owner and agent by the co-operative market societies in the district, including agricultural requisites sold as owner and as agents. Table No. 40 shows other co-operative societies of different type indicating silent features at their non-credit activities such as value of goods received, produced, marketed, area irrigated, cultivated etc. The table No. 41 shows statistics of regulated markets in the district for each market separately with the specific commodities marketed by them during the year 1966-67 and 1967-68. The table no. 42 give details of number of money lenders, and loans given by them to traders and non traders for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68.

VII- MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH

The table No. 43 in this section gives information regarding number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, health centres, primary health centres, doctors, vaidyas, nurses, beds, and indoor and outdoor patients treated in each tahsil of the district for the calendar year 1965 and 1966. The table covers all state and central Government institutions, institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies and also private and local bodies and also private and unaided institutions. Thus private clinics run by individuals are not included. The table no. 44 gives the information of number of births and deaths as well number of infant deaths separately in each tahsil of the district by giving classification of male and female. The table No. 45 shows

the number of deaths due to various diseases and table No. 46 gives the figures of primary vaccinations, re-vaccinations and cholera inoculations in each tansils.

VIII- EDUCATION

The table No. 47 gives the number of literates and percentage of literacy in each tansil according to 1961 census. The table No. 48 shows the number of illiterates, literate without education level, primary or junior basic and above matriculation level of rural area in each tansil of the district according to 1961 census

Where as table No. 49 gives the number of illiterate literate without education level and various educational levels in urban area according to 1961 census. The table No. 50 gives information regarding number of institutions, enrolment trained and untrained teachers therein by 'type' of educations. Since tansilwise figures are not available information for the district is given in this table.

The table No. 51 shows the number of beneficiaries of scheduled castes, Scheduled tribes and other backward classes 'by type of education' under the concessions of backward classes. The table No. 52 indicates the number and amount of concessions granted to the economically backward class concession of free education according to the levels of educations for the year 1961-62 and from 1965-66 to 1967-68.

The table No. 53 shows the expenditure on primary education incurred by Municipalities and Zilla Parishad of the district. The table No. 54 gives the towns and villages without primary school and according to population ranges

IX- TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS

In this section, statistical information on various modes of transport is given. The table No. 55 gives length of railway route^{te} in the district. The length of railway route was compiled by referring to Railway time table and the figures presented in this table are approximate as the length of railway only upto the last railway station near district boundary is accounted. Hence the distance from the last railway station to the border of the district is ignored. The table No. 56 gives road length according to category and surface. In this table roads maintained States Buildings and communication Department and the local bodies i.e. Zilla Parishad and Municipalities are given separately. The table No. 58 gives operational statistics of nationalised road transport of Nagpur division. The table No. 59 gives traffic census of on important roads i.e. on national¹ highways and state highways as on 6-11-66. The table No. 60 gives information regarding number of post and telegraph offices, letter boxes, postmen Telephones and radio licenced issued and renewed together. The table No. 61 gives the number of villages in which a receiving sets are installed by the Broad Casting Department and the rural population covered by them as well as number of radio farm ~~forms~~

X- LOCAL SELF GOVERNMENT

Statistics regarding village Panchayat Zilla parishad and Municipalities are shown in this section. Table No. 62 gives figures of village panchayats villages covered by them and their income and expenditure.

The income and expenditure of Zilla Parishad and municipalities are also shown in this table. The table No. 63, 64 and 65 shows the break up of income and expenditure under the various heads and subheads in respect of village Panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities in the district.

XI- PLAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The table No. 66 gives details of plan expenditure under each major heads and subheads therein of the district level plan scheme of the annual plan for the year 1967-68. The table No. 67 gives the important achievement of the district level plan schemes during the year 1967-68. The table No. 68 shows type of C.D. block and their C.P.A. pattern area, villages and population of those type of blocks. The table 69 gives the figures of expenditure during stages of each block upto 31-3-67 and during the year 1967-68. The table No. 70 gives physical achievement on selected items in all the blocks of the district for the year 1965-66 and 1966-67

XII- PRICES

The table No. 71 gives monthly average retail prices of important commodities prevailing at district head quarter during the year 1966 and 1967. Since the consumer Price Index number of working class for Wardha district has not been calculated, in Vidarbha, Index number of working class is calculated only for Nagpur city. The Table No. 72 shows consumer price index number of working class of Nagpur only for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68 on the base year 1960.

XIII- MISCELLANEOUS

Twelve tables are included in this section. The table no. 73 gives the strength of police force in the district. The table no. 74, shows crime statistics regarding number of offences committed by type and the persons tried, convicted and acquitted therein. The table no. 75 indicates the disposal of original and appellate cases by civil and criminal courts during the year 1966 and 1967. The table No. 76 cinema statistics regarding number of permanent and town theatres in each tahsil and their seating capacity per show. The table 79 gives number of insurance policies issued and the amount insured during the year 1966-67. The table no 80 shows the comparative figures of small saving regarding, target, gross collection, withdrawals and net collections for the year 1966-67 and 1967-68. The table No. 81 gives figures of land revenue collections, demand and arrears at the end of year for each tahsil. The table No. 82 gives the number of presses, news papers and periodicals published daily, weekly and monthly for each language separately in each tahsil. The table No. 83 gives statistics in the district, regarding total number of electorate, the number of male and female electors who voted, percentage of votes polled to total electorate and party-wise number of vote polled, both for parliamentary and assembly constituencies in the district. The table No.84 shows the trends in selected indicators of various items of the sections shown in the district statistical abstract.

CHAPTER - III

In this chapter the progress of development of covering the period of third five year plan and the second year of annual plan has been reviewed by presenting talukawise seasonal trends based on certain important indicators of development with available talukawise figures to bring out pace of development .

INDICATOR NO.-1

PERCENTAGE GRASS SOWN AREA

Land gives employment to the bulk of the people and is the main source of national income. At the end of 1966-67, gross sown area in the district was 68.43 percent of the total geographical area. The district accounted for 1.36 percentage of area sown more than once net area sown. Following table gives the percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area.

The above table indicates that during the year 1965-66 had increased to 101.36 percent from 100.84 percent for the district. Similar are the trends of the percentage of gross sown area to net sown area in each tahsil and the propotion of double cropped area is lower in Wardha tahsil as the major portion of area is under

cotton, Kharif Jawar and some other cereals and pulses and consequently fewer rabi crops are grown. Moreover oranges are generally grown in the district on well irrigation where the possibility of a second crop is ruled out for 3 to 4 years in orchard areas.

INDICATOR NO. 2

As in the past productivity of important crops all the programmes for agricultural production have been assigned highest priority. Accordingly, the programme, for the multiplication of improved seeds, use of fertilizers, irrigation soil conservation etc. were implemented to yield the utmost benefits within a shortest time. Following table indicates the yield of important crops in the district as compared with the corresponding position in the year 1960-61 which was supposed to be an exceptionally good year.

The above table indicates that the over all food production, i.e. total food grains, had decreased by 19.42 percent as compared to the year 1960-61 mainly because of sizable decrease in production of Tur by 63.50 percent.

Among non-food crops, the productivity of groundnut, sesamum and cotton had increased by 133.50 percent, 4.97 percent and 13.41 percent respectively in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61, whereas the productivity of linseed had decreased by 54.00 percent in the year 1966-67 in comparison with the year 1960-61.

GROSS VALUE OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION

As relevant price data required are not available the gross value of agricultural production could not be calculated.

INDICATOR NO.4

(a) PERCENTAGE OF IRRIGATED AREA

In Wardha district only one minor irrigation tank at Asati is completed with an irrigation potentials of 900 acres and most of the work on the sites of Bor irrigation project have been completed except in work of some distribution system. As such wells are the major source of irrigation. The following table shows the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area.

The above table indicates that during the period of seven years, the percentage of area under food crops to gross cropped has decreased from 58.43 percent in the year 1960-61 to 54.78 percent in the year 1966-67. Whereas the percentage of area under non food crops to gross cropped area had increased to 45.22 percent in the year 1966-67 from 41.57 percent in the year 1960-61 due to growing tendency of agriculturists to grow more and more cash crops since cotton is the important cash crops in the district.

During the year 1966-67, the percentage of irrigated area by wells to the total gross area irrigated in the district was 69.10 percent. The following table shows the percentage of irrigated area under food and non food crops to grass irrigated area of the district.

The above table indicates that the percentage of irrigated area of food crops to gross irrigated of the district decreased to 83.11 percent in the year 1966-67 from 94.02 percent in the year 1960-61. Similar, decreasing trend was observed in all the tansils in the district whereas the percentage of are irrigated under non food crops had increased from 5.98 in 1960-61 to 16.89 in the year 1966-67. The percentage of irrigated area under food crops was lowest in 1966-67 in Wardha tansil and it was lowest in hinganghat tansil in that year in so far as the percentage of non food crops is concerned.

According to 1966 census, the percentage of poultry per lakh of woman population has decreased by 15.9 percent for the district in comparison with 1961 census. This percentage decrease was highest in Hinganga-ghat tahsil where as it was lowest in Wardha tahsil. According to 1961 live stock census data, it was estimated that the number of poultry per hundred household was 97.94 (96.74 fowls and 0.13 ducks) as against 129.01 (127.61 fowls and 0.22 ducks) per 100 households in Vidarbha and 137.40 (136.47 fowls and 0.35 ducks) per hundred households in Maharashtra.

Similarly it was estimated that during 1961 census there were 0.75 percent of improved fowls to total number of fowls in the district as against 1.07 percent in Vidarbha and 1.69 percent in Maharashtra. It was estimated that during 1961 each hen fetched 71 eggs per year in the district as against 61 in Vidarbha and 84 in Maharashtra.

CHAPTER - IV

ANNUAL PLAN 1967-68

Each of the three five year plans had been visualised as a step forward in the intensive effort, to lay sound foundations of self-sustained economic growth, to provide opportunities of employment to all those who seek it, and while narrowing economical and social disparities to ensure a minimum level of living to every family, and its shape and strategy have been designed accordingly.

Since, however, the Fourth Five year plan of the country could not be finalised for several reasons the Annual Plan 1966-67 was drawn up keeping in view the main objectives of the long term plan and the limited resources that would be available for that year. The states annual plan was formulated as an integral part of the National annual plan and the basic objectives visualised in the National plan were adopted in the state plan also.

During annual Plan 1967-68 the total expenditure on the district level plan schemes implemented in the district amounted to Rs. 111.88 lakhs being 82.08 percent of the total outlay of Rs. 136.30 lakhs. Out of the total expenditure incurred during Annual Plan 1967-68, 62.90 percent and 37.10 percent of the outlay incurred under state and local sector respectively. The allocation and expenditure under the different heads of development during the year 1967-68 under state and local sector are as under.

I- AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMME

A priority in the Annual Plan for 1967-68 is given for the development of agriculture and allied programme since agriculture is primarily a highly personalised occupation nursed by the agriculturist himself in a traditional way. The programmes of agricultural development have aimed at increasing the area under cultivation and improving agricultural productivity through variety of programmes. Besides the above programmes, the development programmes of animal husbandry, dairy, forest fisheries, warehouse and marketing and ayat development were also included as other agricultural programmes. For the development of agriculture and allied programmes an expenditure of 46.52 percent of the total expenditure of the district level plan schemes was incurred. Out of the total expenditure under this programme 79.48 percent and 20.52 percent was incurred under state and local sectors respectively. The allocation and

expenditure under different sub heads of developments during the year 1967-68 under state and local sector also are enunciated below:-

1. AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION

The annual Plan earmarked an amount of Rs. 11.36 lakhs for agricultural production against which an expenditure of Rs. 8.58 lakhs has been incurred forming 75.93 percent of the outlay under this programme including both sectors. During the year 1967-68 an expenditure of Rs. 2.00 lakhs was incurred for building construction work of agricultural school Selsura which has been nearly completed except for minor items, for imparting agricultural education to the sons of agriculturists. On the schemes for development of crops viz taluka seed Farms and establishment of nurseries on it, manures and fertilizers, plant protection, cotton and horticulture development an amount of Rs. 6.58 lakhs^{was} incurred, under the scheme distribution of improved seed, an expenditure of Rs. 6.58 lakhs

Rs.1.35 lakhs was incurred and 2066 Quintals of seed was distributed. Similarly cotton 6175 quintals of cotton seed was also distributed to the cultivators. During the year 1967-68, 239 quintals of sannseed was procured and distributed to the cultivators under the subhead manures and fertilizers for which an expenditure of Rs. 0.08 lakh was incurred. On the scheme plant protection an expenditure of Rs. 1.16 lakhs was incurred. During the year 1967-68, loans of Rs. 0.97 lakh was distributed to cultivators for establishing Orange gardens under horticultural development and an area of 12 acres has been covered. One nursery of village Bori has been established under this scheme and land development operations are in progress. Under the scheme for intensive cultivation programme an expenditure of Rs. 0.63 lakh was incurred which covered propagation of improved agricultural practices through crop campaigns. During the year 1967-68, 56 sprayers and dusters were distributed under the scheme plant protection appliances and grant-in-aid to 10 village panchayats was released for purchase of fire arms etc.

2. SOIL CONSERVATION

Since low agricultural productivity, is the existence of large areas of light and medium soil with poor capacity for moisture retention and low as well as precarious rainfall, the soil and moisture conservation by contour bunding was under taken in the district. Under this programme bunds on the cultivators land of 0.31 lakhs of acres at a cost of Rs. 20.30 lakhs. During the year 1967-68 soilsurvey of 10,185 acres of land has been carried out in the district and soil samples have

been sent to Agricultural College Akola for analysis.

3. MINOR IRRIGATION

The programme for construction of new wells was closely linked with the programme for soil and water conservation through contour bunding. Following the emergency in 1962, both these programmes as also the programmes for erection of pumping sets and minor irrigation works were stepped up. This necessitated the strengthening of the machinery for boring of wells, air-compressor-drilling and blasting. During the year 1967-68, as many as 870 new wells for irrigation purposes came up, while 339 wells were equipped with pump sets. Boring of 621 feet in 9 wells and 9643 holes were drilled and blasted. The work of wagholi Bandhara and Dongargaon tank was in progress and after completion of these works an additional area of 1426 acres will be brought under irrigation. The expenditure of Rs. 10.81 lakhs was incurred during the year under report for this programme.

4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY

The total amount of Rs. 2.0 lakhs was expended on various programmes of which Rs. 0.41 lakh and 0.21 lakh on veterinary facilities and on control of disease respectively. Amount of Rs. 0.13 lakh, Rs. 0.12 lakh, and Rs. 1.13 lakh were spent on cattle, sheep and poultry development in the district. Under the scheme expansion of eggs collection, on an average 12000 eggs per month were marketed during the year. Under poultry training, 114 trainees received training in the scheme.

5. DAIRY DEVELOPMENT

Under the schemes assistance to milk unions and federations an amount of Rs. 0.09 lakh was incurred as an assistance by managerial subsidy. Including the schemes viz schemes for supervisory staff and construction of wallowing tanks and wells total expenditure of Rs.0.45 lakh was incurred as against the provision of Rs,0.48 lakhs.

6. FOREST

During the annual plan for 1967-68, emphasis was laid on programmes of economic plantations, planned exploitation of forests and afforestation of denuded areas. Out of the total allotment of Rs. 1.00 lakh an expenditure of Rs. 0.99 lakh was incurred which formed 99 percent of total allotment. During the year afforestation in 100 acres of area was done and work on improvement at Ashti Sarwadi road was in progress.

7. FISHERIES

The programme for development of fisheries aimed at increasing production of fish, and improvement in socio economic conditions of fishermen, encouragement to fishery co-operatives, assistance, assistance for purchase of fishery requisites and development of inland fisheries. The expenditure incurred under this programme was Rs. 0.41 lakhs as against the provision of Rs. 0.46 lakhs. During the annual plan, 406 thousands fingerlings were stocked while 76 quintals of fish netted.

8. WARE HOUSE AND MARKETING

Under this sub head of development, out of a

total outlay of Rs. 0.78 lakhs. An expenditure of Rs. 0.74 lakhs was incurred as a loan to one market committee, subsidy for supervisory staff and appointment of gradens at three market committees in the district.

9. AYACUT DEVELOPMENT

Ayacut development programme was specially given to this district. The staff schemes of the third Five year plans have been continued during Annual plan, viz establishment of irrigation unit, and sub Divisional office for Bor Project and establishment of trial cum-demonstration farm and agricultural research station. The total expenditure of Rs. 0.31 was incurred against the provision of Rs. 0.34 lakh. During the year 622 acres of area was brought under irrigation.

II-CO-OPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

1. Co-OPERATION

The annual plan has sought to promote Co-operative organisations at all levels through active financial support in the form of subsidies, share capital investments and loans according to the needs of situation and also to encourage initiative and leadership at the grass root level so as to build up a sound organisations at the village level for undertaking a manifold activities need in the rural economy.

Out of the total outlay of Rs. 2.10 lakhs provided for various programmes under Co-operation an expenditure of Rs. 0.79 lakhs was incurred forming 38 percent of the outlay. During the year 1967-68 subsidy and loan of Rs. 0.40 lakh to marketing societies and

financial assistance of Rs. 0.23 lakh to one society under Wardha plan was granted. Similarly land development loan and management subsidy was granted to new four Co-operative farming societies. During the year 1967-68 membership of agriculture credit societies added by 1300.

2. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The total provision amounted to Rs. 9.72 lakhs against which an expenditure of Rs. 8.51 lakh was made under community Development programme which was conceived as an effective machinery for all out rural reconstruction with a view to promote better living for all sections of the community.

The expenditure on activities under community development projects was of Rs. 3.26 lakhs implemented in 7 blocks of 8.5 C.P.A. pattern of which two were in stage II phase and the remaining in post stage II Phase.

The applied nutrition programme, with the object of establishing an effective field service to improve local diets through production preservation and use of protective foods was taken up in Wardha and Arvi blocks and the expenditure incurred under this programme was reported to the Rs. 1.27 lakh, during the annual plan 1967-68. Under the programme local development works an expenditure of Rs. 1.43 lakh was incurred as a state share on public contribution for rural water supply scheme. During the year 80 new wells were constructed 22 old wells repaired and 288 works were in progress at the end of the year under report.

an expenditure of Rs. 2.63 lakh was incurred out of the total outlay of Rs. 3.50 lakh under Rural works programme Road works were in progress at the end of the year 1967-68.

III- Industries & Mining

Under this head of development an expenditure of Rs. 0.75 lakh was incurred out of the total outlay of Rs. 0.92 lakh for the year 1967-68. For development of handloom industry rebate of Rs. 0.30 lakh was paid to five weavers co-operatives and financial assistance for purchase of tools and equipment to four weavers societies was given.

IV -TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION

Since Wardha district was specially selected for integrated planning, 15 roads were taken up under Wardha plan. The expenditure incurred under this programme was Rs. 20.14 lakhs out of the total outlay of Rs. 25.42 lakhs. During the year 1967-68 new roads of 22 miles were constructed, roads 10 miles in length were modernised and rural road of 2 miles was also constructed.

V- SOCIAL SERVICES

Out of the total expenditure of Rs. 29.64 lakhs, an expenditure of Rs. 10.87 lakhs was incurred on general education. During the year 1967-68, 64 teachers were trained for the qualitative growth in education. The expenditure, under public Health, water supply and drainage Housing, welfare of backward classes, and labour welfare was of Rs. 3.66 lakhs, Rs. 10.26 lakhs, Rs. 1.22 lakhs, Rs. 0.51 lakhs and Rs. 2.80 lakhs respectively.
