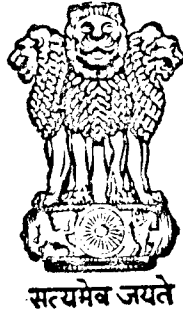

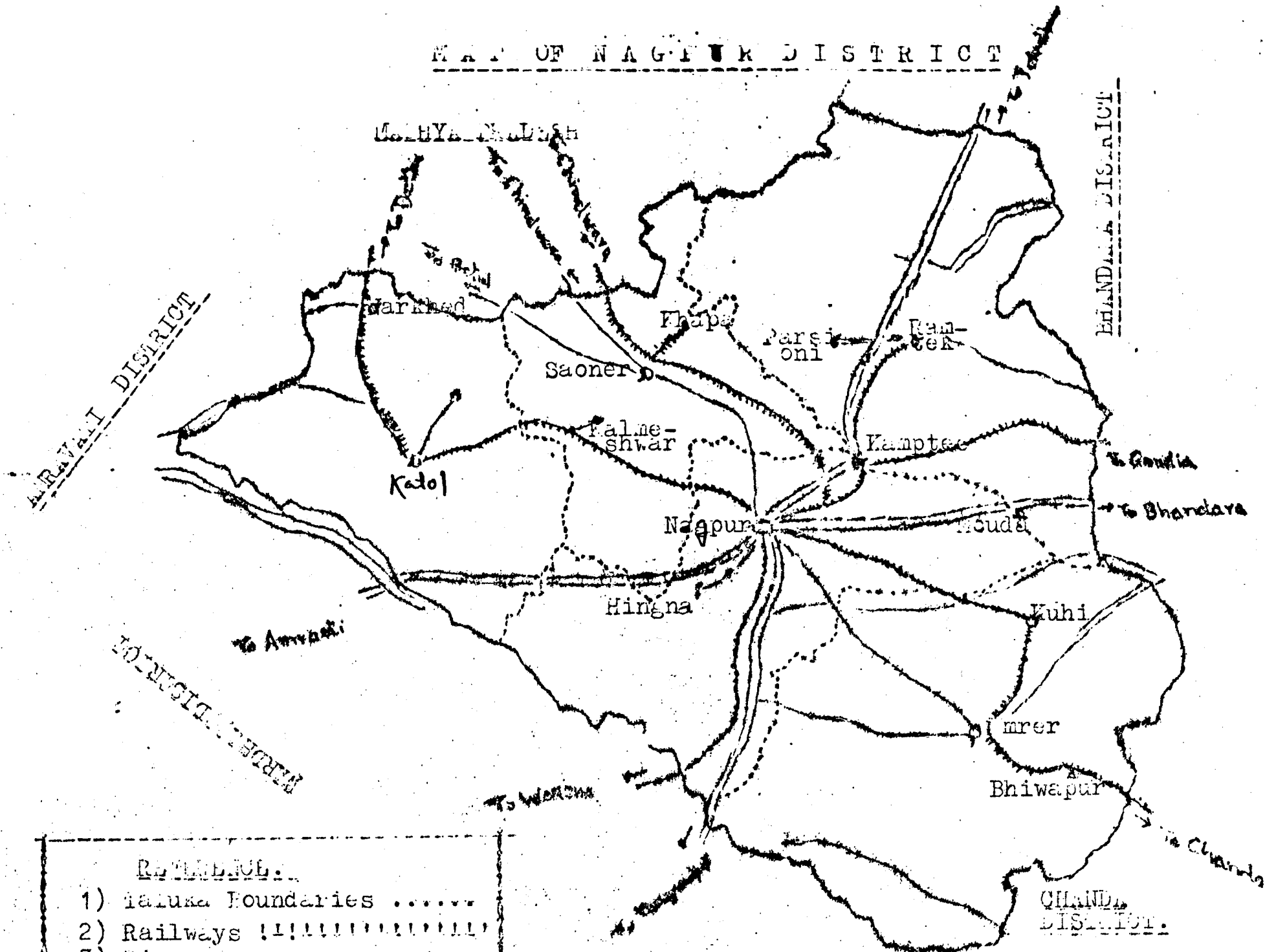

Introduction

1.1 Introduction & Location :-

Nagpur district with a glorious ancient past was a district of ex-Madhya Pradesh till the reorganisation of States in 1956, when alongwith the other seven districts of vidarbha region it formed a part of the bilingual state of Bombay. In 1960 the state of Maharashtra came into existence with Nagpur district as one of its twenty six districts. Nagpur city, the head quarters of the district, enjoys the status of second capital of Maharashtra.

The district lies between $20^{\circ}35'$ and $21^{\circ}41'$ North latitudes and $78^{\circ}15'$ and $79^{\circ}40'$ East longitudes & is triangular in shape.

1.2 Boundaries .

The district is bounded on the north by the Chhindwada and Seoni districts of the Madhya Pradesh on the east by Bhandara, on the south and west by Chandrapur and Wardha districts respectively, and along a small strip on the north - west by Amravati district of Maharashtra .

It stretches over an area of 9,930 square kilometres (3834 Sq. miles) forming 3.34 percent of of the total area of Maharashtra . The population of the district according to 1961 census is 15,12,807 forming 3.82 percent of the total population of the Maharashtra . In terms of area, it ranks 18 th and 11 th in terms of population of the Maharashtra .

1.3 Administrative Set-up.

The district is divided into 5 subdivisions or talukas namely, Nagpur, Ramtek, Umred, Katol and Sagar .

There are 12 towns or urban centres and 1653 inhabited villages in the district.

The Collector is the head of district administration and in so far as the need and exigencies of the district administration are concerned, he is expected to supervise the working of all departments in the district. He is also a District Magistrate. He is assisted by Resident Deputy Collector and Deputy Collectors attached to Collectorate in day to day working of revenue administration. A Sub-Divisional Officer who is of the rank of Deputy Collector is put in - charge of each Sub-division. A Tahsildar is in - charge of the Taluka Office.

Each tahsil has been sub -divided into 4 to 5 revenue circles and revenue circles are divided into Patwari Halkas for administrative convenience.

Besides Revenue administration, there are district & divisional officers of other departments with different administrative set up. Nagpur city, being the Head Quarters of one of the four Revenue divisions of the Maharashtra has divisional offices of various departments.

1.4 Zilla Parishad .

A district level body, known as " Zilla Parishad " constituted with the councillors, Chosen by election from electoral divisions, with 44 councillors is functioning in the district since 1st May 1962. Further, there are 13 Panchayat Samities at Block Level and the chairman of the 6 Panchayat Samities are the ex-officio members of the Zilla Parishad. Two women members are co-opted and 10 more members are nominated by the Zilla Parishad.

Chairmen of 5 Federal Co-operative Societies are also ^{work}ing as the associate members. The nominated members and the associate members have no right of voting while the ex-officio members and co-opted members have full rights of the elected members. The Parishad is presided by the President, who is elected amongst the councillors.

The area under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad is the entire district area, excluding Cantonment, and Corporation area. The area under the jurisdiction of a Panchayat Samiti corresponds to the Block area.

The work of the Zilla Parishad is carried out through 7 subject committees viz., standing Committee, Finance Committee, Education Committee, Co-operative Committee, Agriculture Committee, works committee and Health Committee. The Chief Executive Officer is the head of the administrative machinery in Zilla Parishad. He has been vested with full administrative powers for executing the provisions of the Zilla Parishad Act and is assisted by officers of various departments. The Finance branch of the Zilla Parishad is controlled by the Chief Accounts and Finance Officer and this branch works on the lines of the Finance department of the state Government.

Village Panchayats. :-

The institution of Village Panchayat is the lowest tier in the set-up of democratic decentralisation. After the reorganisation of states, The Bombay Village Panchayat Act, 1958 was made applicable to this district from 1st June 1959.

The coverage programme under village Panchayats , as envisaged under the Second Five Year Plan is complete in the district . There are 652 village Panchayats covering 1,653 inhabited villages. The entire rural area of the district is now covered by the village Panchayats.

1.5 Area and territorial changes. :-

The area , number of villages , population etc., covered by each taluka according to the 1961 census is shown in the following table.

Nagpur district previously included the areas , which are now partly in Wardha and partly in Bhandara districts . The area now constituting Wardha district was separated in 1862. There were only four talukas in Nagpur district upto the year 1,908, when a new taluka was created with its headquarters at Saoner .

There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district or talukas from 1911 onwards .

1.6 Topography :-

The district has an average elevation between 274.50 and 305 metres (900 and 1000 feet) above sea-level; Its bold relief is characterised, by and large, by the residual hill-ranges of the Satpudas and their detached , hillocks enclosing between them underlating black soil valleys . Much of the topography is typically one of the Deccan Trap having flat-topped and terraced features , low buttressed sides and isolated knolls. East - wards and north eastwards, the landscape changes in an interesting manner due to the change in the underlying rocks . The rocks of Gondwana Series are not only important because of their Coal and manganese deposits, but in their surface expression, they present a low rolling topography within a poor soil cover and vegetation.

The greater part of the district is an undulating plateau with a variation in height between 652.70 metres (2,140 feet) above sea-level on the upland ridges in the north and about 274.50 metres (900 feet) near the Kanhan river . In the north, the upland ranges are an extension of the Satpuda ranges ; they are narrow in the west but widen to a breadth of about 19 kms. (12 miles) towards the east . Immediately south of these upland ranges, stretch the Ambagad Hills, the western extremity of which lies in the Nagpur district. The historic temple of Rantek is situated on a spur of this range signifying the Hill of Rama also known formerly as " Sundergiri " (Vermilion Mount)" Tapogiri" (Hill of Penance) . There are several detached hills, notably that of Sitabuldi in Nagpur city which is visible from a long distance. These isolated hills or knolls attain no great altitude.

1.7 Hills, Rivers and Soils :-

The Satpuda Hills :-

The main system of hills is the Satpuda and its offshoots. The northern range of hills extends along the whole border, being pierced only in two places where the Kanhan and the Pench rivers have broken through. On the west, it consists merely of the outlying foothills of the Satpudas, the plateau proper lying behind them in Chhindwada. But from the Kanhan to the Pench, it is the major range of the Satpudas themselves which dominates the landscape and the ascent of the Khaparpani plateau is made in Nagpur. Along this length, the hills are well wooded and picturesque and there is some striking scenery on the Pench river. The old Gond fort of Bhivagad stands on this range.

A few miles to the south of the main Satpuda range are two minor lines of hills to the west and east of the Pench. Those to the west lie between Bhivagad and Parsoni, terminating in the peak of Tekadi 508-34 metres (1669 feet). East of the Pench are the Mansar hills, both these and the western range, being now denuded of trees and after a gap of a few miles come the wellknown Ramtek hills, raising to 427 metres (1,400 feet) at Ramtek town. Timely measures by the Government have helped in retaining the wooded character of this range.

Minor Hills :-

The second main hill tract extends along the south-east of the district from Khargad on the Wardha river, where there are some fine waterfalls to the junction of Warora and Chanda with Nagpur. They separate, the valley of the Kar from that of the Jam up to Kondhali and further south-east for the water - shed between the Jam river and the Bor.

Near Bori they become the Kauras plateau and here terminate to afford a passage for the Wardha river, continuing afterwards south-eastwards and dividing the valley of the Nand from the Wainganga plain. West of the Wunna, the range is mostly well-covered with picturesque valleys and ravines, among which are the narrow strips of rich well-irrigated land of great fertility. But to the east towards Umrer, the range has lower levels and is un-interesting. It consists of low bare hills which are grass - covered and boulder stream, except where, overlooking the Nand valley some excellent teak is grown.

The third main range runs northwards through the Katol tahsil from Kondhali to Kelod, separating the Wardha and Wainganga valleys. The highest peak of it is at Pilkapar.

Rivers :-

The Wardha and the Wainganga are the main rivers of the district. The Wardha flows along the part of the western border and controls the drainage system of the western part of the district. The principal tributaries of the Wardha are the Bor, the Wunna, the Jam and the Kar. The Bor rises in the hills near Bazargaon and rushes down a winding and rocky channel between Kondhali uplands and the Kauras plateau passing into the Wardha to join the Wunna. Its narrow valley is very fertile and the high well-wooded cliffs on either side render it a wild and beautiful spot in the whole of the district.

The Wunna rises near the hill of Mahadaged in the Pilkapar range and flows along the northern base of the Kauras plateau past Hingna and Bori, where it is crossed by the Central railway. It leaves the district at Ashta. The small Krishna river joins it at Bori.

The Jam rises among the hills south of Kondhali and flowing northwards into the centre of the Katol tahsil takes a westernly turn past Katol and joins the Wardha at Jalalkheda. The Kar rises in the same range, but flows directly south - west, separating the Wardha and Nagpur districts till it joins the Wardha river at Kharagad, the trijunction point of the two districts with Berar. The Nand flows across a small strip in the south of the district and joins the Wunna beyond the border of Wardha.

The Wainganga flows along the part of the eastern border and controls the drainage system of the eastern and central portions of the district. It forms the district boundary with Bhandara district for some distance.

The Kanhan and pench are the most important tributaries of the Wainganga, both of which flow from the Satpuda range in the Chindwada district and meet near Kamptee, where they are also joined by the Kolar. The Kanhan, entering the district near Bor-gaon, takes a south-eastern course past Khapa to Kamptee, where it receives the Pench and Kolar. In its subsequent course, it makes the boundary of Ramtek tahsil and after receiving the Nag river near the hills of Bhivakund, finally empties itself into the Wainganga. The Kanhan river provides drinking water to Nagpur city.

The Kolar rises in the north-east corner of the Katol tahsil and after passing through the rocky part of Lohgad in Pilkapar range, emerges into the fertile plain of Saoner and separates Nagpur from Ramtek tahsil until its place as a boundary river is taken by the Kanhan. Its bed is generally rocky.

At Patansaongi , it receives the Chandrabhaga , which brings in the drainage of Kalmeshwar Plain .

The other rivers of some importance are the Bawanthari, the Sur and the Gaothak-sand, which drain the eastern half of Ramtek tahsil. The Sur is remarkable for its shallowness but its fertile properties produce sugarcane and garden crops .

Soils :-

The main soils of the district are kali (Medium deep black cotton), Morand (comparatively light deep and light brown in colour) and Bardi (red graver with boulders).

Medium deep black soil is found around Kalmeshwar and Saoner in the Wardha Valley and in the Nagpur and Kamptee plains. The principal soil of the district is known as Morand. It is very suitable for cotton and Jowar and is found in almost all the talukas. In the part of Ramtek taluka especially in the valley of the Sur river , the morand soil is of very light colour. Khardi is the regular rice-land in the eastern part of the district . Bardi is found on the summits and slopes of hills, principally in the Katol tahsil.

1.8 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall :-

Climate :-

The climate of the district is characterised by a hot summer , well distributed rainfall and dryness except in rainy season . The winter season sets in from December to February and is followed by the hot season from March to May. The south-west monsoon season is from June to September while the period October - November constitutes the post-monsoon season.

Temperature :-

The cold weather commence from November and lasts till February. December is usually the coldest month with the mean daily minimum temperature at 14° C (57.2° F). In the wake of western disturbances the district is sometimes affected by cold waves when the minimum temperature drops down to 4° c (39° F). Temperature begins to rise from march onwards. May is the hottest month with the mean daily maximum temperature at 42.7° c (108.0° F). Nights are comparatively cooler in summer season. The onset of the south - west monsoon by about the second week of June brings welcome relief from the heat with a considerable drop in temperature. The temperature shows slight increase in October and thereafter begins to fall.

Except during the monsoon season when the humidities are high, the weather is generally dry. The humidities go down to 20% or less in summer season.

Rainfall :-

The district gets its rainfall from south-west monsoons originating from the Arabian seas. The average annual rainfall throughout the district amounts to 1016 mm. (40"). However it ranges from 762 mm.(30") to 1143 mm.(45") in different parts. It is usually lightest in the west and increases gradually in the eastern parts. Ramtek and Umred tahsils receive maximum rainfall, between 1016 mm.(40") and 1143 mm.(45"), perhaps due to the hills and forest tracts in these areas. Rainy season usually starts in early June and lasts upto October. Occasional showers in other seasons, such as winter and summer, are also not uncommon. In the hot season, the light showers are sometimes followed by severe dust storms. The rainfall, during June to September constitutes about 90 percent of the annual total rainfall.

The variation in the annual rainfall from year to year is not very large though the agricultural season is affected from year to year due to the vagaries of rainfall. On an average , there are 59 rainy days (i.e. days with rainfall of 2.5 mms.-10 cents or more) in a year. The heaviest rainfall in 24 hours recorded in the district was 330.20 mms. (13 inches) at Umred on 14 th August 1953.

Famine :-

The district has rarely suffered on account of shortage of rains after 1947 . The Fact Finding Committee appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 has opined that the district is free from the famine and scarcity conditions.

1.9 Nagpur city .

The city of Nagpur and its suburban extensions which now almost reaches upto the industrial nucleus of Kanhan form the nerve centre not only of the district but also of Vidarbha . Originally, a vantage point of defence, Nagpur grew into an Urban centre under the Bhonsales of the Maratha confederacy. With the formation of the Central Provinces under the British regime, the town acquired a new importance as the administrative capital. Its growth coincided with the economic development of the surrounding region abounding in cotton crop . As in the case of larger cities , Nagpur developed a complex structure based on administrative , economic and social forces , which finds expression in its urban and suburban areas. It draws a greater strength from the new industrialisation and rightly competes with Bombay and Poona in its economic and social growth.

CHAPTER II

Explanatory notes on the scope and limitations
of the Statistical data presented in the Part II
(Statistical Abstract)

I. Purpose :- The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important Socio-Economic indicators of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1969 - 70 have been indicated with data for 1968 - 69 or even for earlier years. In the tables wherein data for 1968 - 69 and 1969-70 could not be presented, the same for the latest two years, for which they were available, have been shown. In case of population (1961), Livestock (1966) and Census of Government employees (1966), however, the data for latest Census have been presented. All the data are collected from the state and Central Government Offices, local bodies and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. District at a Glance :- This table presents a birds - eye-view of the Socio - Economic indicators of development in Nagpur district and Nagur division, under different heads, such as, area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication, Plan and C. D. programme, Local bodies and other miscellaneous statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

III . Contents , scope & limitation :- The statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts . The contents of the tables and the scope and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below .

1. Climate :-

Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Nagpur district.

The table No. 1 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the years 1968 and 1969. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as " rainy day " if during the 24 hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. " Normal rainfall " is the average rainfall over a period ranging from five to eighty years .

The table No. 2 gives monthwise 'mean', 'mean maximum' and ' mean minimum' and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the years 1968 and 1969. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological Centre at Nagpur. The mean maximum and mean minimum temperature denotes the average of the maximum & minimum temperature recorded daily during the month. The mean (average) temperature is the simple average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature .

2. Area and Population :-

In all 6 tables i.e. tables Nos . 3 to 8 are included in this section . Data for 1961 Census are indicated in all the tables except table No. 3 wherein data for both 1951 and 1961 Censuses are shown as reference period of the 1961 Census was sunrise of 1 st March 1961 .

The table No. 3 indicates sexwise rural and urban population enumerated in 1951 and 1961 Censuses , along with variation in between the two Censuses . The population figures for 1951 Census shown in the table have been adjusted to cover the boundaries or areas of the District and talukas as they existed at the time of 1961 Census. According to 1961 Census , the term urban area as used in col. 3 of the table were defined as under :-

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has -

1. A municipality, a Cantonment or Civil lines or
2. (i) A population of 5,000 or over and -
(ii) Atleast 3/4 or more of male workers are - engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

Table No. 4 gives talukawise classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges . The term village (i.e. rural area) used in the table denotes a statutorily recognised village having a well defined boundary and separate land records . Hamlets , wadies or padas have , therefore, not been shown as separate villages . On the other hand , statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as ' Uninhabited ' villages . Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families . Total population of the villages in each range is also indicated in the table . Table No. 5 gives talukawise classification of Towns according to population ranges in 1961 in Nagpur district .

The table No.6 gives number of workers and non-workers in each taluka of Nagpur district according to 1961 Census , and they are classified according to standard livelihood classes . The population according to livelihood classes is shown separately for rural and urban area and also

for the district as a whole. The concept of dependency has been abandoned for economic classification at the 1961 Census. Instead, the population is classified into workers and non-workers. The emphasis is now on work and not on income or economic dependence. A person is defined as worker if (a) . In case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry, etc., he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season; and -

(b) In the case of regular employment in any trade, a profession, service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceding the day of the enumerator's visit to the household.

Persons like beggars, pensioners, agricultural or non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend receivers etc. who earn an income but who are not participating in any productive work in any occupation. A person who had been offered work, but who had not actually joined has been classified as a non-worker.

The table No. 7 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother tongue and (C) Religion, separately for Rural and Urban area and for the district as a whole. Here 'Mother tongue' is defined as a language spoken by the person's mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's classification.

The table No. 8 gives talukawise details of scheduled caste and scheduled tribes separately for rural and urban area and also for the district as a whole.

(ii) Scheduled Tribes :-

No caste is notified as scheduled tribe in Nagpur district.

3. Agriculture :-

In all 11 tables i.e. table Nos. 9 to 19 are included in this section.

The table no. 9 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the years 1967-68 and 1968-69. Against each taluka, the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable wastes, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown. Under 'Forests' are included all actually forest areas of land classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether state owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be. 'Land put to non-agricultural uses' stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture.

'Barren and unculturable land' covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as 'barren and unculturable land' whether such land is in isolated block or within cultivated holdings.

'Culturable waste' includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings.

'Permanent pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. 'Land under miscellaneous tree crops etc. not included in the net area sown' are included in all cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo and other for fuel etc. which are not included under 'orchards' are classed under the category 'Current fallows' comprise cultivable areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. 'Other fallow' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and more than five years. The 'net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The 'gross cropped area' represents the sub total of area total cr under all crops. The difference between the gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area

sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No. 16 gives the information on Major and Medium Projects in this district . Both completed and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30 th June 1970. The cost of Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 crores, whereas that of a Major irrigation project, it is Rs. 5/- crores and above.

Table No. 17 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1968 and 1969 . This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected Rural centres viz 1) Mouda (2) Kuhi and (3) Dhapewada .

4) Animal Husbandry and Forest :-

A) Animal Husbandry :-

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 20 to 24 -B are included in this section.

Table No. 20 gives talukawise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the livestock Census, 1966. The Census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years . During the livestock census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses , stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age-groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table.

B.- Forest :-

The table No. 24 (A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Data regarding forests under the control of the State Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the State Government's Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act, XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production, wherein the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forest refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are called 'leased forests'. There is no classification of ex-proprietary forests as such but in Nagpur division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as ex-proprietary. The forest area shown in the Table No. 24 (A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in Table No. 9. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

(1) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under forests, while in Agricultural statistics, it is classified according to its actual

utilisation (ii). The Forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics under agricultural statistics. (iii) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and agricultural statistics relate to the agricultural year.

5. Employment, Industry and Electricity -

In all 9 tables i.e. table Nos. 25 to 33 are included, in this section.

The factory statistics shown in Table Nos. 25, 26 and 27 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948.:-

- i) Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2 (i)).
- 2) Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power (Section 2 (ii) and
- 3) Those registered under Section 85 of the Act, under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act, even-though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

The table Nos. 31/and 32 present the results of the census of Government employees as on 1-7-1966, conducted by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Bombay. The data presented in these tables are restricted to the Class I, II, III and IV employees of the State Government and do not cover any other category such as work-charged personal, Class IV employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, part-time workers or honorary workers.

The distribution of employees according to specified basic pay /emoluments ranges is shown separately in respect of Class I, II, III and IV employees.

The distribution of the employees according to monthly pay and emolument ranges is shown in table No. 31.

The table No. 29 gives occupational distribution of total registration and placement in the employment exchange for the years 1968 - 69 and 1969 - 70 according to Standard National Classification.

The Table No. 33 ^{deals} within the results of the annual survey of industries indicating industrywise working and reporting factories employment, fixed, working and productive capital, total value of production and value of production and value added for the years _____

This survey is carried out by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Bombay, annually.

6. Co-operation :-

In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos. 35 to 42 are included in this section.

Table No. 35 gives the no. of co-operative Credit and non-credit societies of different types as on 30-6-1970 in Nagpur district .

Table No. 36 presents data of central Co-operative Banks, Land Development Banks and Urban banks in the district.

The table No. 37 gives talukawise number of primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, reserve and other funds, working capital, - loans advanced and recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan - advanced for the years 1968 - 69 and 1969 - 70.

' Working capital ' includes paid up capital , deposits , reserved and other funds ^{and} borrowings . Loans outstanding includes outstanding in respect of loans , cash credits and overdrafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted . 'Overdues ' refer to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

The Table No. 38 and 40 presents the No. of societies , their membership, share capital , working capital and operation respectively for each type of co-operative societies .

The Table No. 39 shows the value of purchases and sales of Agril. produce, Agricultural requisits and consumer goods made by the primary Marketing societies during 1968 - 69 and 69 - 70 .

Table No. 41 gives data regarding the quantity of cotton and groundnut handled by the Agril. produce Market committees in Nagpur district.

The table No. 42 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during 1968 - 69 and 1969 - 70 . Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been furnished in ^{the} table . The transactions of money ^{lending}.

in the state are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money Lenders Act , 1946. According to the Act, No money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence , and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence .

7. Medical and Public Health :-

In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos. 43 to 46 are included in this section.

The table No. 43 given in this section indicates number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary Health Centres, doctors, nurses, vaidyas, beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated as well for the years 1968 and 1969. The table covers all the State and Central Government Medical institutions, and also institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are, however, not included in the table.

The table No. 44 gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sexwise classification ^{of} births, deaths and infant deaths for 1968 and 1969 is not available for each taluka and hence the total under each category is given in the table for these year.

The Table No. 45 gives No. of deaths due to important causes in Nagpur district during 1968 and 1969. Table No. 46 gives talukawise statistics of Vaccination and revaccination for small -pox and cholera inoculation during 1968 and 1969.

8. Education :-

In all 8 tables i.e. Table Nos. 47 to 54 are included in this section.

The table No. 47 gives sexwise number of literates and percentage of literacy separately for rural and urban areas of each taluka according to 1961 population census.

As per 1961 Census definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language .

Table No. 48 and 49 presents talukawise and sexwise and educational levelwise statistics in rural and urban areas respectively of Nagpur district according to 1961 census.

The table No. 50 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the years 1968 - 69 and 1969 - 70. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many Secondary Schools, which also impart education in primary course. Never-the-less, the entire enrolment of students is included under 'Secondary' education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV or stand. I to VII/VIII or less and teach the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions coach students for Standard VIII to X or XI/XII with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary School Certificate Examination, which leads to a Degree examination.

The table No. 51 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as scheduled caste, Scheduled-Tribes and other backward classes for the years 1968 - 69 & 1969 -70. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships, freehips etc.

Table No. 55 gives number of villages without primary school or schooling facilities according to population ranges at the end of the years 1968 - 69 and 1969 - 70. Villages without schooling facilities include smaller villages (generally below population of 300 persons), which cannot be given independent school for economic reasons, and are, therefore, attached for school facilities to bigger villages or urban areas within 'walking distance' of one mile from them. The deserted villages as per 1961 Census are also included in the population range 0-99.

9. Transport and Communication :-

In all 8 tables i.e. Table Nos. 55 to 62 are included in this section.

Table No. 55 gives total railway length as at the end of 1968-69 and 1969-70 according to type of routes Broad Gauge, Metre Gauge and Narrow Gauge. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each type of route are, therefore, approximate and not accurate.

The table No. 56 gives road length according to different categories and surface type for the roads of Zilla Parishad and B.& C. department.

The table No. 57 gives the motor vehicles in operation in Nagpur division as on 31-3-69 and 31-3-70.

The Table No. 58 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road transport in Nagpur division as on 31-3-1969 and 31-3-1970. For this table, the S.T. Division comprises of (1) Nagpur (2) Wardha (3) Bhandara & (4) Chanda districts of Nagpur region.

The table No. 59 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted in Buildings and Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. Data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count-post. Type of surface carriage way, No of light, Medium and heavy Motor Vehicles and total traffic intensity in tons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

The Table No. 60 and 61 relates to communication system. No. of post offices, telegraph offices, No. of letter Boxes, telephone numbers and Radio licenses renewed during 1968 - 69 and 1969 - 70 are shown in table No. 60 while rural broadcasting statistics in Nagpur district is given in table No. 61.

10. Local Bodies :-

In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos. 62 to 65 are included in this Section.

The Table No. 62 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as Village Panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years 1968 -69 and 1969 - 70. The number of Village Panchayats includes number of independent Village Panchayats as well as group Village Panchayats.

11. Plan and Community Development :-

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 66 to 70 are included in this section.

12. Prices :-

Only 2 tables i.e. tables Nos. 71 and 72 are included in this section.

The table No. 71 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarter Nagpur.

The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the years 1968 and 1969 alongwith units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Office. every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average price of each commodity, for the year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at District Headquarter, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table No. 72 gives consumer price index numbers (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the years 1968 - 69 and 1969 - 70 commencing from April, and also averages for the years 1968 - 69 and 1969 - 70 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index (new series) is 1960. The Index Numbers of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Advisor to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952 - 53. The method of construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Numbers of Wholesale prices in India revised series (1956) issued by the office of the Economic Advisor to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index Numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as Multiplier.

13 . Miscellaneous :-

----- In all 12 tables i.e. Table Nos. 73 to 84 are included in this section.

CHAPTER - III

An assesment of the impact of Plan on different sectors of economy of Nagpur district has been attempted in this chapter by presenting certain important indicators. The stage of development during 1969-70 has been compared with the corresponding position in 1960-61 which was the first year of Third Five Year Plan by treating it as a base year. Wherever the data for 1960-61 were not available, the data for the year nearer to 1960-61 have been used for comparison. Agricultural data have been presented for the year 1968-69. Talukawise disparity in pace of development has also been reviewed wherever possible.

Indicator No. 1. :- Percentage of Gross Sown area to net sown area.

Talukawise comparative percentage of gross sown area to net sown area during the years 1960-61 and 1968-69 have been shown in the following table.

A negligible variation in percentage of gross sown area to net sown area is seen during the period from 1960-61 to 1968-69. The percentage has been increased in Rantek and Nagpur tahsils during the year 1968-69 as compared to 1960-61.

Irrigation facilities such as well irrigation etc. in this district are mainly used for orange crop. There is very limited scope in the district to increase the area under double crop for want of any other source of irrigation other than wells.

Indicator No. 2 :- Productivity of Agricultural Crops .

Timely and sufficient rainfall or assured irrigation are the necessary prerequisites for good crops. The year 1960-61 was quite good and had brought in bumper crops. Comparative figures of outturn of crops in Metric tonnes during 1960-61 and 1968-69 and the percentage increase (+) or decrease (-) of outturn during 1968-69 over 1960-61 has been given in the following table .

From the above table, it is seen that though outturn of Rice and Jowar has increased during 1968-69 as compared to 1960-61, overall outturn of total cereals and total pulses had decreased, resulting in a decrease of 17.7%

into outturn total food grains . The outturn of Ground-nut and cotton had shown an increase . . . 88 % & 13.0 % during 1968-69 over 1960-61.

In general the overall production of crops during 1968-69 was found to be lesser than the production of crops during 1960-61 .

Indicator No. 3 :- Gross Value of Agricultural Produce .

As the farm harvest prices of various commodities are not available , the indicator has not been worked out .

Indicator No. 4 :- Percentage of Irrigated area .

The following table indicates the talukawise percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown and the percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area during the years 1960-61 and 1968-69 in this district.

The percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown in Nagpur District was 5.17 during 1960-61 which rose to 5.79 during 1968-69 . Low percentage of net irrigated area to area sown indicated that the irrigation facilities were very meagre in the district during the period under review . There was slight increase in percentages of net irrigated area to net area sown in all the talukas during 1968-69 as compared to 1960-61 . The increase was larger in Itol, Rantek and Unred tahsils than it was in Saoner and Nagpur tahsils .

The percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area in the district had increased to 105.0 during 1968-69 over 1960-61 when it was 102.0. The percentage increase was mainly in Saoner and Ramtek talukas. There is no change in percentage of gross irrigated area in Katol and Nagpur tahsils while a slight increase was noticed in Saoner and Ramtek tahsil, there is a slight decrease in Umred tahsil.

Indicator No. 5 :- Changes of Crop Pattern.

The district can be divided in two parts on the basis of two distinct cropping patterns followed. The first part comprises of Katol & Saoner tahsils and part of Nagpur tahsil where mainly kharif Jowar and Cotton crops are grown. The other part consists of Ramtek & Umred tahsils and part of Nagpur taluka where paddy, rabi - Jowar, wheat and linseed crops are predominantly grown.

The table below shows the percentage of food and non-food crops to gross cropped area in each taluka during the years 1960-61 and 1968-69.

It is seen that during 1960-61 the area under food crops / ^{was} nearly three times the areas under non-food crops in the district. The areas under food crops during 1968-69 show decrease as compared to the area under food crops during 1960-61 in all talukas of the district. Reverse is the case with the areas under non-food crops.

Under food crops, areas under oranges, chillies and vegetables have been increased as these are cash crops. Areas under cotton, oil seeds have also increased under non-food crops. These are also cash crops. The decrease in areas under food crops during the year 1968-69 over 1960-61 was mainly due to non-sowing of rabi crops due to insufficient rains and due to the increasing tendency on the part of the cultivators to cultivate cash crops in general.

The percentage utilisation of total irrigated area under food crops and non-food crops has been shown in the table below.

During the year 1960-61 almost all irrigated area was under food crops except 2.44 percent of it which was under irrigated non-food crops. The area under irrigated food crops in 1968-69 decreased to 90.97 percent while the area under irrigated non-food crops increased to 9.03 percent as compared with corresponding figures for 1960-61.

Indicator No. 6:- Increase in Agricultural Credit and Outstanding dues.

Agricultural credit is the backbone of the Co-operative movement eventhough its sphere has been enlarged to marketing, processing, Industry, Labour etc. There were

1840 co-operative societies in Nagpur district during the year 1969-70 out of which 651 were agricultural credit societies.

The agricultural credit facilities given by the agricultural credit societies play a vital role in the rural economy. The following table shows the position of loans advanced and outstandings of loan during 1961-62 and 1969-70 in Nagpur district .

The percentage increase in the amount of loans advanced during 1969-70 over the corresponding amounts of loans advanced during 1961-62 worked out to 139.7. On an average Rs. 0.34 lakhs were advanced by each of the agricultural credit societies during 1969-70 while the loans advanced per member works out to Rs. 323.

The percentage increase in loans outstandings during 1969-70 over 1961-62 works out to 85.4. On an average Rs. 0.42 lakhs were outstanding per Agril. Credit Society during the year 1969-70.

The average wage rates both for males & Females/ⁱⁿ the district have increased during 1969 as compared with the wage rates during 1963. The increase in average wage rates of males and females is 52.6 and 98.3 percent respectively. The average wage rates in all the three centres have been increased during 1969 as compared to average wage rates during 1963.

The practice of utilizing the services of carpenters, Blacksmiths, cobblers and herdman for all the whole year on annual payment in kind called 'Baluta' at the time of harvest is still followed in the centres selected from this district. The daily cash wage rates of these categories of persons were, therefore, not available.

Indicator No. 3 :- Live Stock per hectare of Land .

Poultry per person was highest in Rantek in 1966 and lowest in Nagpur talukas. It was less in Nagpur taluka due to sizable population of Nagpur city. As compared to the 1961 livestock census, poultry population increased in Rantek, Umred and Katol tahsils while it had increased in Saoner and Nagpur talukas.

Indicator No. 10 :- Per Capita consumption of electricity.

Electricity is generated in thermal power station at Thaparkheda in Nagpur district from where it is distributed to Nagpur and other districts also. As a consequence of rapid development in rural electrification, the per capita consumption of electricity has increased considerably in this district as is seen from the table given below.

The consumption of electricity has more than doubled during 1969-70 as compared to during 1961-62. The number of villages electrified increased from 216 during 1960-61 to 549 at the end of the year 1969-70. The percentage of villages electrified to total number of villages in the district works out to 32.6. There is still much scope for the progress to be made in rural electrification. To fulfil this need of the district as well as the demand from this region, one more thermal power station is being set up at Koradi and the work of this project has been started.

Indicator No. 11 :- Increase in number of candidates enrolled in employment exchange and vacancies notified.

It is seen from the above table that the number of indoor patients and outdoor patients treated during 1969 over 1961 increased by 1.2 % and 38.0 % respectively. There is a remarkable increase in number of outdoor patients treated as the people from other districts of Vidarbha region come to Nagpur Medical College Hospital for expert medical opinion and treatment as this is one of the biggest institution in Asia. The number of outdoor patients treated per lakh population during 1961 and 1969 in this district works out to 1.37 lakhs and 1.90 lakhs respectively.

Indicator No. 13 Increase in number of students in different Categories.

The increase in secondary education ^{was} greater than the increase in the primary schools in this district during the period from 1960-61 to 1968-69 as the percentage increase in number of institutions, enrolment and teachers was 68.87, 128.38 and 75.12 respectively. The percentage increase in girls enrolment was 128.38 as against 101.54 in primary schools.

The progress in higher stage of education is also noteworthy due to opening of new higher institutions in important towns in the district.

Indicator No. 14 :- Increase in road length per 100 Kms.

Indicator No. 15 :- Increase in Banking facilities in proportion to population.

Banking facilities are better in this district in comparison with those in other districts of this region because of their concentration in Nagpur city. The number of banking offices has increased to 67 during 1969 from 38 during the year 1961, the increase being 76 per cent. The following table indicates the banking facilities per lakh population and also population served by each banking office during 1961 and 1969 in Nagpur district.

It has been seen that prices of all commodities have been considerably increased during the period from 1963 to 1969. Out of the 21 commodities the percentage increase in prices is more than 100 in the case of 3 commodities i.e. Gram dal, sugar and groundnut

Commodities i.e. Dry Chillies , Char - Coal and Dhoti, between 51 to 75 percent in the case of 7 commodities i.e. Arhar, Vanaspati, Goat meat , Eggs , Brass, Pan, & Dowar , between 26 to 50 percent in the case of 7 commodities i.e. wheat , Gur , Potato, Kerosene Oil, washing ship, Bidi and Supari and less than 25 percent in the case of only one commodity namely ; Tea leaf. The average prices of essential commodities such as ground nut oil (124 %), Dry Chillies (88 %), Charcoal (97.3) Eggs (63 %) and Meat (61 %) have increased considerably as shown in brackets against each of them.

CHAPTER - IV.Progress Under Plan Schemes during 1968-69 and 1969-70 .

Planning is a method of utilizing scarce resources , which have alternative uses , to yield maximum benefit to the greatest number in a given time. It also envisages effective mobilization of resources so that priority project at least can be undertaken , resulting in meeting the pressing needs of the people in as short a period as possible . India has completed three Five Year Plans and during formulation of Fourth Five Year Plan , the intermitant period from 1966-67 to 1968-69 was treated as state annual Plan period .

The year 1968-69 was , therefore , the year of Third State Annual Plan. Though the Fourth Five Year Plan of the country was to take a final shape , the year 1969 - 70 was considered to be the first year of the Fourth Five Year Plan. The objectives of the Fourth Five Year Plan are also in consonance with the basic objectives adopted in the long term development programme . These objectives are (i) to lay a sound foundation for self sustained economy (ii) to provide apportunities of employment to all who seek jobs and (iii) to ensure a minimum level of living for everybody.

The State's Annual Plan for 1968-69 and the Fourth Five Year Plan for 1969-70 have been implemented in Nagpur district through the " state" level, "Divisional " level and " district " level schemes. The total outlay of Annual Plan 1968-69 for Nagpur district was Rs. 333.98 lakhs of which 61.4 percent was under state sector schemes and 38.6 percent under local Sector Schemes.

The Financial outlay for the year 1969-70 was Rs. 221.27 lakhs of which 66.6 and 33.4 percent was under state and Local sector schemes respectively. The development headwise and sectorwise details of budget allocation for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 has been shown in the table below.

No regular budget provision was made under the head " Irrigation and Power " . However, necessary allotment was given to meet out the expenditure for electrification of the proposed villages .

The Plan for the district for the year 1968-69 was drawn - up for an outlay of Rs. 333.98 lakhs which was greater in size than that for the years 1966-67 and 1967-68 , to remove the backlog and for substantial stepping up of the development activities. The programme for the year 1969-70 was smaller in size as compared to during 1968-69 as a result of overall pruned programme for the state . The heads of development with higher plan outlays were Social Services and Agricultural Programme in both the years 1968-69 and 1969-70.

All the plan programmes were mostly implemented as per targets for the district and the total expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 296.54 lakhs in the year 1968-69 and Rs. 217.69 lakhs in 1969-70.

The following table shows the development headwise expenditure on plan schemes during 1968-69 and 1969-70 and the percentage of expenditure to the budget provision.

The financial and physical progress under different Heads & sub-Heads during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 is discussed in the following lines :

Agricultural Programmes :-

Agricultural and allied programmes occupy the vital position in developmental efforts envisaged for 1968-69 and 1969-70 . About 26 percent in 1968-69 and 35 percent of the total approved outlay was earmarked for these programmes in 1969-70. The strategy of emphasis on the use of new hybrid and high yielding varieties of seeds , fertilisers, and plant protection was vigorously pursued and attained better results.

The programmes , like soil conservation , minor irrigation, tractor ploughing etc. were also taken to strengthen agricultural production programme . These and other measures have brought good results in stepping up agricultural production. The programme of development of Dairy , Forest , Marketing, Fisheries , Animal Husbandry etc. were also included in other agricultural programmes. The table below shows budget provisions and expenditure against minor heads included under major head " Agricultural Programmes".

Agricultural Production :-

In all 11 & 10 schemes were implemented during the Annual Plan 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively and 6 schemes were common during both the years . The schemes relating to horticultural development , intensive production of food crops , intensive cultivation opening of new blocks ,

intensive production of vegetables, hybrid seed production are the important schemes implemented during the period of 1968-69 accounting for 76 percent of expenditure to the corresponding budget provision. Similarly horticultural development scheme was also continued during the period of 1969-70 as a major important scheme of that year accounting for 73 percent of expenditure to the corresponding budget provision. The taluka seed farms in the district were provided with certain facilities to augment the work of multiplication of seeds. The total expenditure of Rs. 0.67 and Rs. 0.09 lakhs was incurred during the year 1968-69 and 1969-70 on the scheme. This scheme is supplemented by introducing one more scheme during the year 1969-70 viz "Establishment of seed processing Unit" incurring an expenditure of Rs. 0.85 lakhs. With the introduction of high yielding varieties programme in the district, the training programme had however become necessary and hence "Multi-crop demonstration scheme" was taken up during the Annual Plan 1969-70 incurring an expenditure of Rs. 0.11 lakhs. There is one Agricultural School at Sawangi in the district with an intake capacity of 50 students. It required land and building for its development and during the year 1968-69 an expenditure of Rs. 1.56 lakhs was incurred for purchase of 135 acres of land. Though there was a provision of Rs. 1.00 lakh in Annual Plan 1969-70, no expenditure was incurred for construction of building.

Following are the important physical achievements made during the plan years 1968-69 and 1969-70.

Minor Irrigation :-

The programme of minor irrigation consists of items such as (1) renovation of ex-malguzari tanks (2) Construction of ground Water wells and repairs to old wells.(3) Instalation of pumping sets (4) digging of wells by blasting and air compressor and (5) Construction of Small tanks and bandharas costing less than Rs. 15 lakhs.

The Annual Plan 1968-69 and 1969-70 provided an outlay of Rs. 17.77 and Rs. 19.12 lakhs towards the grant of subsidy to cultivators for construction of wells including repairs , installation of pump sets and renovation of ex-malguzari tanks . Against these items an expenditure of Rs. 12.39 and Rs.16.0 lakhs was incurred during above plan periods as detailed below .

Besides Rs. 7.21 and Rs. 16.70 lakhs were spent for completion of 9 spill over minor irrigation works as against the provision of Rs. 6.87 lakhs and Rs. 11.15 lakhs respectively during 1968-69 and 1969-70. During the year 1968-69, 5 new works were taken up and are continued during 1969-70. These were (1) Dongartal (2) Salaimendha (3) Nawegaon (4) Zilpa and (5) Paradsinga. All the spill-over works are nearing completion and after completion they are expected to add to the existing irrigation potential by 650 acres.

Soil Conservation :-

Soil conservation works were undertaken in 35,595 and 19,261 acres of land with an expenditure of Rs. 33.09 and Rs. 27.33 lakhs respectively during 1968-69 and 1969-70. Contour bunding work was undertaken in 17,892 acres during 1969-70 and terracing was done in 1356 acres.

Animal Husbandry:-

The development programme for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 provided an amount of Rs. 0.34 and Rs. 0.80 lakhs for maintaining existing veterinary aid centres, raising basic amenities in the existing dispensaries, improvement of cattle breed and for encouragement of poultry farming. Against these provisions, an expenditure of Rs. 0.23 and Rs. 0.29 lakhs was incurred during 1968-69 and

As a result of implementation of schemes, 2 dispensaries were provided with certain basic amenities, 14 bulls were distributed, 9 veterinary dispensary buildings were financed for certain minor works and 3 persons were given loans of Rs. 1,000 each during the plan period under review.

Dairy Development :-

During the Annual Plans 1968-69 and 1969-70 provisions of Rs. 10.20 and Rs. 8.90 lakhs respectively were made for Dairy Development Programme. Against this provision, expenditure of Rs. 7.20 and Rs. 5.63 lakhs was incurred in 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively for construction of building, installation of machinery and purchase of equipments for Nagpur Dairy Development Scheme. As a result of this, milk handling capacity of this project has been increased to 12,125 litres and 19,224 litres per day during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively.

Forest :-

The area under forest in this district is 1,84,446 hectares accounting for 18.62 percent of the area of the district. Schemes for plantation of fuel-wood, general utility timber, bamboo plantation, packing case timber and plantation of eucalyptus trees etc., were implemented under this sub-head for development of forest - wealth of the district. The schemes for development of fodder resources, forest roads, forest labour were also implemented. An amount of Rs. 3.65 lakhs and Rs. 4.55 lakhs as against the provision of Rs. 3.64 and Rs. 2.34 lakhs was spent during 1968-69 and 1969 - 70 respectively under these schemes. The percentage of expenditure to plan outlay was 100 and 194.4 respectively.

Fisheries :-

The Nagpur Distt. has potential of inland fisheries next to Bhandara and Chandrapur distt. in

Nagpur division. Ramtek taluka of the district particularly has got more number of lakes wherein the inland fisheries can be very well developed .

In all 4 schemes under this sub-head have been implemented in this district during 1968-69 and 1969-70. An expenditure of Rs. 0.28 and Rs. 0.56 lakhs as against the provision of Rs. 0.38 and Rs. 0.55 lakhs was incurred on these schemes during 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. The percentage of expenditure to budget provisions works out to 73.7 and 101.8 respectively . In all 8 lakhs and 15.90 lakhs carp fry were stocked in tanks during 68-69 and 69-70 respectively.

Warehousing and Marketing :-

Regulated Agricultural produce Market Committees were sanctioned financial assistance for development of Market yards and providing amenities to cultivators under the scheme implemented under this sub-head. An amount of Rs. 0.30 lakhs was sanctioned to one Market Committee during 1968-69 as against the provision of Rs. 0.50 lakhs forming 60 % of the corresponding provision . No assistance could be granted during 1969-70 as all regulated market committees had already been assisted financially in the district.

Co-operation and Community Development .

I . Co-operation :-

The schemes for strengthening of co-operative credit structure at district level and below , development of Co-operative marketing, Co-operative Agricultural processing, Co-operative farming were implemented under this sub-head . In all Rs. 2.90 and Rs. 2.10 lakhs were provided for these schemes for the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively . The expenditure incurred during 1968-69 and 1969-70 was Rs. 1.10 and 1.55 lakhs forming 37.9 and 73.8 percent of the corresponding budget provisions respectively.

Since the financial assistance under these schemes was granted on the performance of the co-operative societies, their financial position etc., the full provisions under this sub-head could not be spent.

II-Community Development :-

For community Development and other allied programme, the Annual Plans 1968-69 and 1969-70 provided an out-lay of Rs. 10.39 and Rs. 4.90 lakhs respectively. The provisions under the schemes included in this sub-head and expenditure incurred thereunder have been shown below alongwith the physical achievements.

During the years 1968-69 and 1969-70, 9 blocks were given grants for carrying out development activities envisaged under this programme. The post-stage II blocks were, however, not paid such grants & for want of funds, the development activities are hampered in post-stage II blocks.

Applied Nutrition Programme was taken in Hingna and Nagpur Blocks of the district. The Rural Works Programme was discontinued in the year 1969-70 in the state.

Irrigation and Power :-

In all Rs. 19.09 and Rs. 12.47 lakhs were spent by Maharashtra State Electricity Board for rural electrification, primarily to provide power for agricultural purposes. Domestic supply of power is however a subsidiary aim. The total number of villages electrified during the years under review was 35 and 23 respectively.

Industry and Mining :-

Small Scale and Cottage Industries :-

The Schemes for development of Handloom Industry and financial assistance to other industrial co-operatives including co-operatives of handicraft workers were implemented under this sub-head. A provision of Rs. 9.64 lakhs and Rs. 15.75 lakhs was made under the scheme of development of Handloom industry for granting rebate on sale of handloom cloth and for granting assistance to Co-operative handloom societies for other amenities such as share capital contribution, sale Depots, purchase of Tools and equipments and Co-operative Hand-loom societies were granted rebate of Rs. 7.53 lakhs and Rs. 12.53 lakhs respectively during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. Again Rs. 0.01 lakhs and Rs. 0.19 lakhs were sanctioned during 68-69 and 69-70 respectively for providing other facilities. No amount was sanctioned during 1968-69 and Rs. 0.19 lakhs were sanctioned during 1969-70 to 6 Co-operative societies under the second scheme.

Transport and Communication :-

Road Development :-

The schemes of road development in Annual Plan 1968-69 and 1969-70 were those which were already taken up since 1966-67. The total budget provisions of Rs. 48.38 lakhs and Rs. 22.38 lakhs were made in the Annual Plans

1968-69 and 1969-70 . An expenditure of Rs. 41.06 lakhs and Rs. 22.00 lakhs was incurred in 1968-69 & 1969-70 respectively on maintenance of existing roads and construction of new roads . In all Rs. 23.47 lakhs and Rs. 3.85 lakhs were spent in state sector and Rs. 18.59 lakhs and Rs. 18.15 lakhs were spent in local sector by Zilla Parishad , during the years 1968-69 & 1969-70 respectively.

Social Services :-

The table below shows budget provision and expenditure incurred against each sub-head of development under Social Services .

General Education :-

The programme included under general education aims at providing adequate educational facilities so as to ensure minimum standards of knowledge and , opportunities for developing skills of the entire population and for reforms in the system and methods of education having regard to the requirements of Economic development and Social order. With these objectives , the schemes implemented

under general education laid more emphasis on primary education . All villages excepting 482 in Nagpur district are covered by primary schools . So far as the physical achievements were concerned 59 and 80 primary teachers were appointed during 1968-69 and 1969-70 . Loan Scholarships were given to 1 teacher and grants -in-aid was given to 34 schools during 1969-70.

2) Technical Education :-

The budget provision of Rs. 4.35 lakhs and Rs. 3.57 lakhs were given during the years 1968-69 and 69-70 for development of existing polytechnic schools and starting of new schools . In all Rs. 3.06 lakhs and Rs. 1.33 lakhs were spent on this schemes during 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively . Nine Teachers were appointed / ^{under} this scheme during the period under review .

3) Medical and Nursing :-

The budget provision of Rs. 0.87 lakhs was made during 1968-69 for strengthening of casualty department at Medical college , Nagpur and for training of Nurses. As against this Rs. 1.00 lakhs were spent during the year 1968-69. The new scheme of installation of kidney Unit / ^{at} Medical College Hospital , Nagpur was undertaken during the year 1969-70 for which an amount of Rs. 1.45 lakhs was provided . Similarly Rs. 0.01 lakhs were given for appointment of addl. Staff at Medical College, Hospital , Nagpur & an amount of Rs. 0.17 lakhs was spent against this provision.

4) Public Health :-

Under this sub-head of development, the programmes for prevention of communicable diseases such as Malaria , Filaria, Small Pox were under-taken. The Family Planning Programme was also carried out with utmost vigour . An expenditure of Rs. 12.00 lakhs and Rs. 10.32 lakhs was incurred during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively as against the budget provisions of Rs. 11.63 lakhs

and Rs. 11.78 lakhs respectively. In all a total number of 278644 persons were vaccinated and revaccinated against small pox and sterilization operation were performed on 5651 and 11628 females during 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. Again 655 loops were also inserted under the Family Planning Programme. These schemes were implemented with the help of Nagpur corporation in Nagpur city.

5. Water - Supply and drainage :-

The scheme of Rural water supply and 6 schemes of Municipal water supply were in progress during the year 1968-69 for which an amount of Rs. 34.63 lakhs was spent as against the provision of Rs. 35.07 lakhs. In addition to above schemes for water supply to Kalmeshwar, Bela and Shiwa was implemented during the year 1969-70. Total budget provision for 1969-70 was Rs. 14.08 lakhs as against which an amount of Rs. 29.54 lakhs were spent during this year.

6) Housing :-

Under this - sub-head, subsidised Industrial Housing Scheme, Economically Backward welfare section housing scheme, Low and Middle income group housing scheme and land acquisition and development schemes were implemented. A total amount of Rs. 22.05 and Rs. 37.07 lakhs was provided under these schemes during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively against which Rs. 21.01 and Rs. 19.34 lakhs were spent. In all 116 and 224 tenements were constructed under these schemes during 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively and 74.75 acres of Land was acquired.

7) Welfare of Backward Classes, Social Welfare and Labour

Welfare :-

An amount of Rs. 1.24 lakhs and Rs. 0.73 lakhs as against the budget provisions of Rs. 0.52 lakhs and Rs. 0.81 lakhs was spent during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively on various schemes of welfare of Back-

ward classes , social welfare and labour welfare implemented in Nagpur district .

8) Rural Broadcasting :-

Rs. 0.29 lakhs and Rs. 0.07 lakhs was spent on Rural broadcasting schemes during the years 1968-69 and 1969 - 70 respectively as against the provision of Rs. 0.28 lakhs and Rs. 0.25 lakhs respectively. A total number of 124 and 106 radio sets were distributed during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively in Nagpur district under this scheme.
