CHAPTER - I
INTRODUCTION

....

1.1 LOCATION :

The district of Sangli is a part of the famous Deccan plateau. It lies between 16° 45' and 17° 33' North latitude and 73° 42' and 75° 40' East longitude. It is bounded on the north by the districts of Satara and Sholapur, on the east by the Bijapur district of Mysore State, on the south by the districts of Kolhapur and Belgaum (Mysore State) and on the west by the Ratnagiri district.

The district has an area of 8591.3 Sq. Km. (3317.1 Sq. miles) with a total population of 12.31 lakh according to 1961 population Census which work out to be 2.80 percent and 3.11 percent respectively of the State of Maharashtra.

1.2 TOPOGRAPHY :

(1) SOIL : The soil in the district varies from the deep black in the river valleys to shallow murmad red or grey in the hilly areas.

The soil in the western part of the district comprising area from the tahsil of Shirala is formed from red laterite mixed with hard murum due to the hilly nature of the zone.

The central portion of the district which covers areas of Walwa, Tasgaon (part) and Miraj (part) tahsils has deep black soils capable of yielding bumper kharif crops. These soils, which are highly retentive of moisture also grow Rabi Jowar, Wheat and gram. They are also good for irrigated

crops like sugarcane, turmeric, chillies etc. This central portion is thus the rich agricultural tract of the district.

The hilly tract comprising parts of Khanapur, Tasgaon and Miraj tahsils grows Jowar and Bajri, while the eastern zone comprising areas of Jath, Atpadi and Kavathe-Narajal tahsils track with a very low rainfall and poor prospects.

(ii) RIVERS: The Krishna and the Warna are the principal rivers of the district. The Yerla, the Morna, the Manganga, the Nanni, the Agrani and the Bor are the other small rivers flowing through this district. During rainy season the flood waters entail much soil erosion, while during the dry part, they resume a slender course. These rivers go dry in summer season.

(iii) HILL RANGES: There are two main systems of hills. The Sahyadri range and its off-shoots, and the off-shoots of Mahadev range. The Sahyadri system includes the main range of the Sahyadris which forms the western boundary of the district. One of the spurs of the Mahadeo range known as Mahimanagad-Panhala spur stretches up to Khanapur. At Khanapur it splits in two branches - one branch passes 32 km. in the south till it ends in the old Panhala Fort, 24 km. from Atpadi road Railway Station. The other branch stretches south-east to Belur about 8 km. south-west of Jath. It forms the water parting between the valley of the Yerla, a tributary of the Krishna on the right and the valley of the Man, a tributary of the Bhima on the left.

(iv) MINERALS: There are no important mineral deposits except building stones, clay and limestones. The limestone is associated with trap formation and the quality is not uniform. Good clay for bricks and tiles is found on the banks of the rivers.

1.3 CLIMATE:

1) Rainfall: The rains start sometime in the middle of June and last till the end of September in the district. Major portion of rainfall in the district is received between July and September. During the first half of monsoon, most of the days are cloudy with drizzling rains, whereas during the latter half it rains a bit heavily.

Rainfall is the heaviest in the regions of Sahyadri. Western portion of Shirala tahsil on an average gets rainfall over 2,000 mm. in a year. The central and the eastern portions receive annual rainfall measuring about 750 mm. The north-eastern portion receives the lowest rainfall in the district averaging to about 500 mm. in a year.

Rainfall recorded at three selected stations, during 1968, 1969 and 1970 and its deviation from the normal rainfall is presented in the following table No.1.

ii) Temperature:

Monthly temperature records are available in the district for two stations viz. Miraj and Sangli. Naturally the temperature data available, is not representative for the district as a whole. The district does not experience abrupt changes in temperature. The seasons are considerably uniform. During the rainy season climate is cool and is followed by sultry weather in October and November. Winter sets in thereafter till January end. Dry hot climate is experienced in February and March followed by hot climate till monsoons set in.

Altitude modifies the average temperature in different seasons. In the western part climate is cool and healthy in hot weather and is chilly during the rainy season. Temperate climate persists on the plains of Walwa and Miraj tahsils. The eastern part experiences hotter climate than the central and the western parts of the district.

1.4 NATURAL ZONE :

The district can be broadly divided into four zones. The western zone has heavy rainfall, forests and the soil is hard and less fertile and grows crops like paddy and nachani. This zone makes more than 7 percent of the area of the district. The hilly area of Shirala tahsil is covered in this zone. The central zone making about 41 per cent of the area of the district comprises of the rich agricultural tracts of the Miraj, Walwa and Tasgaon tahsils. The Krishna and the Yerela flow through this zone with the result that good irrigation facilities could have been developed in this part. Jowar, Wheat, gram, chillies, sugarcane, turmeric are the principal crops of this zone.

The hilly tract comprises parts of the Khanapur, Tasgaon and Miraj tahsils with medium type soil and low rainfall, This zone grows jowar and bajari crops.

The eastern zone is a scarcity prone area consisting of Jath and Atpadi tahsils and part of Khanapur tahsil. It receives low rainfall and has poor soil. Bajari is the main crop of this zone.

1.5 TERRITORIAL CHANGES:

The areas now constituting Sangli district were up to 1948 partly included in old Satara district and partly in the former Indian States of Aundh, Jath, Sangli, Kurundwad (Senior), Miraj (Senior), Miraj (Junior) and Wadi. The new district known as South Satara district was formed in 1949 with headquarters at Sangli. It included four talukas of Tasgaon, Khanapur, Walwa and Shirala peta transferred from old Satara district and two new talukas of Miraj and Jath formed out of the parts of former Indian States merged in the new district.

With the Reorganisation of States in 1956, the district was included in Bombay State. Since 1960 it forms a part of Maharashtra.

The name of the district was changed from South Satara district to Sangli district in the year 1960. In 1964, for administrative convenience, Miraj and Khanapur tahsils were split up into two additional tahsils viz. (1) Kavathe-Mahankal and (2) Atpadi, respectively.

1.6 (I) DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION:

(i) State Govt. Administration:

The Collector of the district is in-charge of General Administration, Law and Order, Treasury, Land Revenue and Civil Supplies etc. He is assisted by a Resident Dy. Collector and two Dy. Collectors who hold charge of the two Revenue Divisions and have their head quarters at Sangli and Miraj. For each of the eight tahsils a tahsildar is in charge of the respective tahsil. Area, number of towns and villages and population for

each tahsil in the district are presented in table no.2, below.

2) The judicial proceedings of the district are looked after by the District and Sessions Judge. The District and Sessions Judge is assisted by two Assistant Judges and Additional Sessions Judge. They attend to civil and criminal work both original and appellate.

3) The District Superintendent of Police looks after the administration of Police force in the district. His head quarter is located at Vishrambag-Sangli. The police force has

divided into different branches such as local Crime Branch, Local Intelligence Branch, Anti-curraption Branch etc.

4) The office of the Divisional Soil Conservation Officer is located at Miraj. The office looks after Bunding and Terracing work in the district.

5) The District Deputy Registrar of Co-operative Societies who is assisted by three Assistant Registrars deal with all the aspects of the co-operative movement in the district.

6) Moreover offices of the Executive Engineer, Irrigation Division and Executive Engineer, Road Projects are located at Sangli; while offices of the Krishna Valley Milk Project and Intensive Cattle Development Project are located at Miraj.

1.6 (II) CENTRAL GOVT. ADMINISTRATION :

Offices of the Superintendent of Central Excise, Income-Tax Officer and Superintendent of Post Offices are located at Sangli city. All India Radio has also an office at Sangli headed by a Station Director.

1.6 (III) LOCAL BODIES:

A Zilla Parishad and eight Panchayat Samities have been established in the district under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities Act of 1962 with a view to promoting and securing participation by the people in the developmental works by decentralisation of powers and functions. The Zilla Parishad has 49 directly elected councillors. Out of these 49 seats, 4 seats are reserved for Scheduled Castes. In addition, a woman councillor has been co-opted by the elected councillors. There are five associate councillors who are chairmen of five federal co-operative societies conducting business in the district. The elected chairmen of all Panchayat Samitis are also ex-officio councillors.

At the Block (taluka) level, the Panchayat Samiti consists of all elected and co-opted councillors from the area of the Block and a chairman of a co-operative society conducting the business of purchase or sale of agricultural produce in the area of the Block as an associate member and a chairman of a co-operative society conducting the business in agriculture in the area of the Block as a co-opted member. Sarpanchas elected by members of Village Panchayats are also elected members of the Panchayat Samiti. Their number is at the rate of two for each electoral division in the area of the Block.

An Officer in the senior scale of I.A.S. works as the Chief Executive Officer to the Zilla Parishad. The Parishad is also assisted by various departments and the heads of those departments at the district level are Officers of Class I or Class II Service under the State Government. At the Block level, the Panchayat Samitis have Elected Chairmen and Deputy Chairmen. The Block Development Officers work as Secretaries to the Panchayat Samitis. The executive authority for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act vests in the Chief Executive Officer and the Block Development Officers. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as Secretary to the Zilla Parishad.

The towns of Sangli, Miraj, Islampur, Ashta, Tasgaon and Vita are under the Municipal administration. The areas under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samiti correspond to the district and tahsil boundaries except in case of Municipal towns. The Sangli Zilla Parishad covers 96.7 percent of district area and 84.4 percent of the total population of the district.

1.6 (IV) PUBLIC BODIES ADMINISTRATION :

For rapid development of an area, the services of the State Transport and State Electricity Board are of vital interest. The office of the Divisional Controller S.T. Division, Sangli is functioning at Sangli for the Sangli district. The offices of the Superintending Engineer and Executive Engineer of Maharashtra State Electricity Board are also located at Sangli. The branch office of the Life Insurance Corporation is functioning in Sangli under its divisional office at Satara.

1.7 DEMOGRAPHY :

a) General :

The population of the Sangli district in 1901 was 6.45 lakhs which rose to 12.31 lakhs in 1961. The district population has thus increased by 91 per cent during the last 60 years. During 1941-51 and 1951-61 the population has increased at the rate of 23 per cent or so. It was estimated in 1961 that the population of the district in 1971, 1976 and 1981 will be about 16.33 lakhs, 18.60 lakhs and 21.07 lakhs respectively. However, the population of the district as per 1971 Census is 15.36 lakhs (provisional) which indicates the rate of increase at 25 per cent during 1961-71 decade and not 33 per cent as was estimated in 1961.

As regards the working population, a different concept has been adopted in 1971 Census. Due to this, eventhough, there is a 25 per cent increase in the total population, there is an decrease of 10.27 per cent in the working population in 1971 Census as compared to 1961 Census. According to 1961 Census, all those seasonal workers who had some regular work of more

than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the season were treated as workers; while in 1971, the persons who had worked in the current or last working season for the greater part of the season were treated as workers. Thus, 1961 definition gave scope for the inclusion of a number of housewives as workers, who had helped in cultivation or in the household industry, carried on by other family members, for an hour or more. The working population thus enumerated in 1971 Census comes to 4,76,872 (provisional) as against 5,31,478 workers in 1961 Census.

b) Density:

The density of population of the district was 143 per sq.km. in 1961 as against 129 for the State of Maharashtra as a whole.

Among the tahsils Walwa and Miraj tahsils are thickly populated, densities of 261 and 339 respectively. The high density in Miraj tahsil is partly due to large urban population in Sangli and Miraj townships and partly due to fertile soil under intensive cultivation. Walwa tahsil is the most densely populated rural area in Sangli district. The soil in the tahsil is very fertile and rich, People are generally progressive and have adopted intensive cultivation methods in recent years.

Very low density is observed in Jath tahsil. It is 61 per Sq.km. Land in this tahsil is of poor quality and the area is often prone to scarcity conditions.

c) Urban and Rural Population:

The net growth in urban population of the district over that of 1901 is 102.52 per cent as against 246.96 per cent for the State.

In 1961 the district is less urbanised than Maharashtra State. The proportion of urban population in the district in 1951 was almost equal to that in the State. The drop in the number of towns in 1961 is due to the declassification of 21 towns, as a result of a change in the definition. The All-India definition of urban areas has been so rigidly applied in 1961 that the number of towns in 1961 is reduced only to six against 11 in 1901.

No new town has been added in the 1961 Census. Sangli and Miraj are the two most important towns. Population of Sangli has increased by 262.6 per cent over 1921 and 338.8 per cent over 1901. Population of Miraj has increased by 149 per cent over 1921 and 189.5 per cent over 1901. During the last decade the population of the two towns taken together has increased by 40.52 per cent. Together they now make 1.27 lakhs population and because of their nearness to each other may as well have been treated as a City.

The net increase in rural population of the district has been 88.94 per cent over that of 1901 and 106.01 per cent over that of 1921. The same figures for the State are 75.53 per cent and 67.08 per cent, respectively.

The rates of variation in rural population have never followed any trend. The urban population had grown faster at the expense of rural population. As a result, the rural population

increased at a lower rate than the total population. The percentage of rural population gradually decreased both for the district and the State since 1911. In 1961 it has shown an opposite trend, mostly due to declassification of 21 towns, whose population is now included in the rural population of the district.

d) Sex Ratios :

Since 1901 the sex ratio of the population of the district changed from 984 to 957 while that of Maharashtra varied between 978 and 936. Excepting 1911 and 1921, the district had always a higher sex ratio than the State.

Rural urban differences in sex ratios have widened from 6 points in 1901 to 54 points in 1961. It may indicate that urban areas are attracting more and more male migrants from rural areas.

Rural sex ratio is higher for Maharashtra but urban sex ratios are consistently higher in the district than in the State.

Sex ratio is the lowest in the age-group 35-59 for total and urban areas of the district.

Sex ratios by tahsils also show that urban sex ratio is lower than that of rural areas. Miraj tahsil which includes Miraj and Sangli towns has the lowest sex ratio (920) and Shirala tahsil which has entirely rural population has the highest sex ratio (1,038). Rural sex ratio is the least in Miraj tahsil (928). The rural-urban differentials within the tahsils are wider than the differences from tahsil to tahsil. Jath tahsil has exclusively rural population but has a low sex ratio of 939. Shirala and Khanapur have high sex ratios and appear to be mainly contributing to the flow of out-migration from the district.

e) Dependency Ratio:

The ratio between dependents and supporting population has an economic significance.

The dependency ratios are higher in Sangli district than those for Maharashtra due to a part of the supporting population

migrating for work out of the district. The dependency ratios for the State and the district are both higher in 1961 than those for 1951. Both the components of youth and aged have increased. The increase in dependency may be the result both of high fertility and declining mortality. The 1961 population in the district, thus, has a larger load of dependents than that of 1951. The dependency load is larger in rural areas than in urban areas.

f) Literacy:

The percentage of literacy for the district population in 1961 was 28.07 as against 17.20 in 1951. In case of female literacy the progress is worth mentioning. It has more than doubled during the 10 year period of 1951-61. Table No.3 below gives sexwise percentage of literacy for the district for 1951 and 1961 alongwith the corresponding figures for Poona and the Maharashtra State.

In case of Miraj taluka the percentage of literacy is the highest in the district which is mainly due to clubbing of two big urban centres namely Sangli and Miraj.

g) Household size:

On the basis of 20 per cent sample study, the following observations are made in respect of household size in the district.

Households with 4 to 6 members are more common (41 per cent) than others. The single member and two to three member size households are more (36 per cent) in urban areas than in rural areas (27 per cent). The average size of the household is 5.47 persons for the district.

h) Livelihood classification:

Of the total population of the district, 43 per cent are classified as workers. As much as 81 per cent of this working population is deriving its livelihood from agricultural pursuits, while the rest from non-agricultural activities such as construction, industry, trade and commerce, transport and other services. The proportion of workers dependent on agriculture in the district is very high against that of the State which is about 72 per cent. The ratio of cultivators to agricultural labourers is also very high in the district, which is 5:1 as against the State ratio of 2:1.

It will be seen from the livelihood classification that

hardly 2.81 per cent workers are engaged in the manufacturing other than household industry in the district of Sangli. However, this percentage is two times more than the district percentage, in the tahsil of Miraj which also corresponds to the State percentage. This is mainly due to the availability of desired infrastructure in the vicinity which is leading to the rapid industrial development of Sangli-Miraj town group area.

CHAPTER - II

: EXPLANATORY NOTE :

PURPOSE AND SCOPE:

1.1 In this Abstract, comprehensive statistics are presented so as to provide necessary basic data for further studies in the Socio-Economic aspects of the Sangli District. Wherever possible tahsilwise position on different topics for the years 1969-70 & 1970-71 is given in the Abstract.

The source of the data is shown at the end of each table. Besides, notes explaining the major deficiencies in the tables are also given at the end of the concerned table.

In the following paras, the concepts of certain terms, sources and limitations etc. of the statistics presented in this Abstract are given.

DISTRICT AT A GLANCE:

The table gives some general particulars about the Sangli District and the Poona Division. Against each item, mention of the reference period is made. The data on location; population, area, no. of villages, towns, total workers and non-workers, literacy are presented in this table alongwith other important information pertaining to agriculture, industry, animal husbandry, electricity, co-operation, education, transport and communications etc..

1. CLIMATE :

The table No.1 gives monthly normal rainfall, number of rainy days and actual rainfall of 9 rain gauge stations viz. Atpadi, Vita, Shirala, Islampur, Tasgaon, Jath, Kavathe-Mahankal Miraj and Sangli in the Sangli district. The figures of normal

rainfall are worked out by the India Meteorological Department on the basis of actual rainfall for the periods ranging from a minimum of five years to a maximum of eighty years. As regards rainy days a day is treated as a rainy day on which the rainfall is recorded in the rain gauge during the 24 hours of that day.

The table No.2 gives the maximum, minimum and average temperatures of Miraj and Sangli stations. The mean maximum and mean minimum are the averages of maximum and minimum temperatures observed daily during the month. The mean temperature is the average of the mean maximum and mean minimum temperature this arrived at.

2. AREA AND POPULATION :

1961 population census data are presented in this section in respect of density of population, population variation, population break-up as urban-rural, villages and towns according to population ranges, total number of workers and non-workers, distribution of population according to age-group, mother tongue and religion and scheduled castes and Scheduled Tribes population in this district. Besides, Table No.3(A) giving provisional figures of 1971 population Census is also included in this section.

As per Census definition an urban area is a place which has a municipality, a cantonment or a civil line or a population of 5,000 or over and at least 3/4ths of male population dependent on non-agricultural pursuits. A population enumerated in urban areas is urban population and the population enumerated in all other places is rural population.

As far as a worker and non-worker is concerned, a person is classified as worker (..)if - (a) in case of seasonal work like cultivation livestock, dairying, household industry, etc., he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season; and

(b) in the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceding the day of the enumerator's visit to the household.

A person who was working but was absent from his work during the fifteen days preceding the day on which enumerated or even exceeding the period of fifteen days due to illness or other causes has been treated as a worker. A person who had been offered work but had not actually joined has been treated as a non-worker.

The population classified as workers here is the economically active population including family workers but not including unemployed persons.

3. AGRICULTURE :

Under this section data regarding land utilisation, area under different crops, irrigated area, yield rate and production, minor, medium and major irrigation projects and famine and scarcity condition etc. are presented.

The table No.9 gives tahsilwise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of utilisation. Against each tahsil, the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land used is shown. The changes in the geographical area over years are mainly due to the progress of cadastral surveys. The area according to the village papers is calculated from the village returns prepared by the village officials for revenue purposes. There are differences between the figures of total area according to the Surveyer General and according to the Village paper because the latter is calculated by totalling up village returns while the former is calculated in blocks.

Under 'forests' area includes all actually forested area or lands classed or administered as forest under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether stateowned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land. Land put to non-agricultural uses stands for all lands occupied by buildings, roads and railways etc. and other lands put to uses other than agricultural. Barren and unculturable land covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which can not be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as unculturable, whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. Permanent pastures and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands. Village common grazing lands and grazing within forest areas are included under this head. Under "miscellaneous tree crops and groves not included in the net area sown" , is included all cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use. Lands under casuarina trees, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other trees for fuel etc. which are not included under 'Orchards' are classed under this category. Culturable waste includes all lands available for cultivation whether or not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more, in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs. Current fallows comprise cropped area which is kept fallow during the current year. If any seedling area is not cropped again in the same year, it is also treated as current fallow. Other fallow land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of a cultivation for a period of not ..

less than one year and not more than five years. The net area sown consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The gross cropped area represent the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once on the same land during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No.11 presents the outturn and average yield per hectare of principal crops in the district. The estimates of outturn are based partly on the results of crop-cutting surveys and partly on "anawari" method. The table No.15 gives the information on number of minor irrigation works completed and allied information regarding irrigation in Sangli district. The table No.16 gives the information on area commanded, irrigation potential, irrigated area and other items in connection with major and medium irrigation works in Sangli district. The table No.18 presents the figures of Agricultural implement enumerated in the 10th Live Stock Census 1966.

4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY & FORESTS :

Under this section data regarding Live-Stock, Veterinary statistics, Livestock mortality, Slaughter houses and animals slaughtered, forest area and major and minor forest products are presented.

The table No.20 gives the number of various types of livestock, poultry etc. as enumerated at the time of 1966 Live-Stock Census. In this census, all the livestock was enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. The table No.23 shows the information regarding slaughter houses and animals slaughtered in the recognised

slaughter houses in the district. The information regarding animals slaughtered in non-recognised slaughter houses and those slaughtered by butchers in rural areas is not available. The table No.24(a) gives figures of area under forest in the district. The forest area figures in this table are different from the figures in the table on land utilisation. The concepts of classifying areas by the ~~the~~ two departments are different.

5. EMPLOYMENT, INDUSTRY, MINING & ELECTRICITY :

The statistics regarding factories and factory workers employment exchange activities, Census of Govt. employees, generation of consumption of electricity, and electrification of towns and villages are shown under this section.

In this section, statistics regarding employment in industries is given. The table No.25 gives average daily employment and mandays worked in the factories which have submitted prescribed return under the Act. The table No.26 throws light on another important aspect of factory employment. The classification of factories according to working strength is denoted. The table No. 27 gives the classification of factories according to No.of days worked during the year. Table No.33 is designed to depict the position of registered factories as collected in the Annual Survey of Industries. In this table, data regarding number of factories, their employment as workers and other than workers and their financial position is presented. The table No.34 gives information regarding generation and consumption of electricity in the district. The table No.35 gives progress of electrification in the district. The table includes villages and towns which are electrified by the Maharashtra State Electricity Board and Private electric agencies viz. 1) Jubilee Electric Works, Sangli , the Co-operative Electric Supply Society Ltd. Vita, the Tasgaon Electricity General Co-op. Society limited Tasgaon & Miraj Elect. Supply Co. Ltd. Miraj.

6. CO-OPERATION :

This section depicts the major activities of co-operative movement such as categorywise organisation of societies, activities and of co-operative Banks, Primary Agril. credit societies, marketing societies, other co-operative societies of different types, Agril. Produce Market Committees and money lending activity in the district.

The main functions of Agril. Credit societies are to help members by way of providing short and medium term loans for meeting their agricultural necessities like improved seeds, fertilizers, Agril. improved implements etc. The help is also extended in the matters of storage, transportation and sales of the Agril. produce.

The agricultural non-credit societies look after the work of better farming by way of educating the agriculturists in the adoption of improved agricultural practices, crop-protection etc. The societies also undertake educational, economical, cultural and house building activities so as to uplift the standard of living of the agriculturists.

Urban Banks, Urban credit co-operative societies and Salary earners co-operative societies fall under the category of Non-Agril. credit societies. Their main function is to promote the qualities of economy, and co-operation amongst the members and also to make them industrious. They also augement the saving habits of the people by way of making the banking facilities easily available. They give loans to the members on the securities like gold, immovable property, Govt. securities, commercial goods etc. They also provide loans to the Artisans and small traders.

The main functions of Non-Agril. Non-Credit Societies are to run printing presses, to provide electricity to members and

consumers for domestic industrial and Agricultural purposes, to x run Montessories, Primary schools and educational institutions for educational spread and things of the kind.

7. MEDICAL & PUBLIC HEALTH :

This section includes five tables containing the data regarding medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies, births and deaths, infant deaths, deaths due to principal causes, vaccination and cholera inoculations, and hygienic drinking water supply sources. The statistics on medical facilities do not cover the facilities available through private institutions run by individuals or associations.

8. EDUCATION :

There are six tables under this section which enumerates the data regarding sexwise literacy and illiteracy, educational institutions along with their strength educational concessions to Backward class and Economically Backward class students and expenditure on Primary Education in this district. The no. of educational institutions relate to the academic year ending June while the no. of pupils is as on 31st March of the respective years. There is not a single village in this district having no schooling facility.

9. TRANSPORT & COMMUNICATION :

In this section, statistical information relating to various modes of transport is given. The table No.56 gives information on length of railway route in the district. There are two gauges viz. meter and narrow gauge in this district. Rail length in this district has been calculated by referring to Railway time table and the district map showing rail routes therein. In table No.57 figures of road length as at the end of each year is shown.

Roads maintained by municipal authorities are given separately. The table No.58 presents data about motor vehicles in the Kolhapur Region. The data is presented for both Kolhapur and Sangli districts as separate figures for this district are not available. The table No.59 relates to Nationalised Road Transport. A separate S.T.Division opened at the lag end of the year 1969-70 is functioning for this district as full fledged division. This division has supplied the information for Sangli District. In table No.60 the data of traffic census is given. The table No.61 gives some important postal statistics. The table No.62 gives statistics on rural Broadcasting in this district.

10. LOCAL BODIES:

Statistics regarding village panchayats, Municipalities and Zilla Parishad are shown in this section. The table No.63 presents material on income and expenditure of Village Panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities. It is a summary table of tables 64,65 and 66. In table No.64 the break-up of the information on income and expenditure of village panchayats is given. This break-up is in two-way. On the one hand the information for V.P.under each Panchayat Samiti is given separately and on the other hand, total income and expenditure is further divided into major heads such as income from taxes, fees, donations, contributions and expenditure on administration, public works, sanitation etc.. The table No.65-A and 65-B give particulars of income and expenditure of Sangli Zilla Parishad. The receipts are sub-divided into self raised resources, Govt. grants for and debt section. The expenditure is likewise divided into many sub-heads of development. The table No.66 gives information on income and expenditure on different sub-heads in respect of Municipalities. Under income, information is separately shown under grants, taxes and other income. Under expenditure, --

further break-up into general administration, public safety, public works etc. is shown.

11. PLAN & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT :

Statistics regarding expenditure and achievement under Annual Plans, Community Development Programme etc. are given. The table No.67 gives plan expenditure under different development sub-heads in Sangli district. In table No.68 the details regarding important physical achievements during 1969-70 and 1970-71 are shown. The table No.69 shows the position of Community Development Programme in the district. The information regarding no.of blocks of Community Project Administration pattern in each stage, the population covered etc. is given. Each C.P.A. pattern Block covers an area having 66000 population. The table No.70 gives information about the expenditure incurred according to stages for the period upto 31-3-1971 and also for the year 1970-71. The table No.71 gives information on important physical achievements on selected items in all the blocks in Sangli district.

12. PRICES :

The table No.72 gives the monthly average prices of important commodities at Sangli Head Quarter during 1969 and 1970. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that also from only one shop in the district Head quarter, the averages shown above for individual commodities cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time. The table No.73 gives consumer price index number for working class of Sholapur and Poona centres for the year 1970-71. For the calculation of Index the year 1960 and 1961 are taken as base years for Sholapur and Poona centres, respectively.

13. MISCELLANEOUS :

In this section, statistics regarding miscellaneous subjects like police force, crime statistics, banks, joint stock companies, insurance, small savings, cinema theatres, land revenue collection exclusive of Local Fund Cess, printing press, news papers and periodicals, and the statistics on the general elections held in the district during the year 1967 and 1971, is presented.

Moreover, important indicators in the fields of development such as agriculture, livestock, industry, education, health etc. are indicated for the years 1950-51, 1966-67, 1969-70 and 1970-71. These selected indicators are very useful for assessing progress in various fields over important periods in the recent past.

14. SELECTED INDICATORS:

Eight tables regarding selected indicators of development for each tahsil of Sangli District are appended at the end. Topics like population, agriculture, electricity, factory workers, road kilometerage, education, medical facilities etc. are covered. An effort is also made in one more table to show the position of each tahsil in relation to its development under each item by way of ranking, on the basis of the latest available data.

CHAPTER - III

AN ANALYTICAL REVIEW OF SECTORIAL TRENDS

1970-71

3.1 The facts and figures regarding various socio-economic features of the Sangli District, which occurred as a result of the developmental activities are presented in section. The impact of these activities can be gauged more accurately from the sectorial trends in respect of agriculture and allied fields like livestock and poultry, employment, electricity consumption, medical facilities or civic amenities, education, communications, extent of credit and banking facilities etc. for which purpose the position obtained in 1960-61, 1965-66, 1968-69, 1969-70 and 1970-71 is taken into consideration.

3.2 Agriculture:

Agricultural backwardness is one of the prominent features of our Agro-Economy even to-day. The State of Maharashtra and the district of Sangli are no exception to this. In fact in this area it is more pronounced. Hilly region, rocky or poor soils, scanty and uncertain rains in the eastern zone, inadequate irrigational facilities, poor use of chemical fertilisers, all these have marred the productivity of the soil.

3.3 The figures furnished below will vividly throw light on the important aspects of agriculture in Sangli District. It also indicates the position of Sangli District in the Poona Division and the position of different tahsils in the district.

3.4 Percentage gross sown area:

The position regarding percentage of gross cropped area to net sown area i.e. the extent of double cropping can be assessed from the following table.

3.5 From the above figures, it will be seen that the percentage of gross cropped area to the net area sown for the district as a whole was constant during the years 1968-69 and 1969-70. However it decreased by two percent ~~with~~ in the Poona Division during 1969-70 as compared to the previous year. The district percentage is smaller than the percentage of Poona Division during the years 1960-61, 1965-66 and 1968-69 while in 1969-70, it is identical.

3.6 It can be seen from the above table that there was no decrease during 1968-69 and 1969-70 for district as a whole. However, the decrease was observed during 1969-70 for Walwa and Shirala tahsils. The highest percentage of double cropped area is observed in Shirala tahsil of this district for both the years 1968-69 and 1969-70.

3.7 Productivity of Important Crops:

The principal crops of the district are jowar, bajara, rice, wheat, gram, tur, groundnut, and sugarcane. The following table will furnish this information and the position of the district in the Poona division will also be seen from this.

3.8 From the above figures it is seen that yield rates in 65-66 were decreased as compared to 1960-61 due to scarcity conditions in Sangli district. However, the position was little bit improved during 1968-69 and 1969-70 to some extent in respect of Bajari,

rice and tobacco crops. In case of Sugarcane (in terms of gur) the production was less in 1968-69 and 1969-70 due to the diversion of sugarcane to sugar factories. The production of Jowar was also found to be decreased due to late rains in 65-66 and 69-70 as compared to 1960-61. When compared to yield rates of Poona Division it will be seen that the yield rates of Sangli District for Jowar, Wheat, Rice, Gram, Tur and Cotton were better in 1969-70.

3.9 Irrigation :

In Sangli district, percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area was 115 in 1965-66, 117 in 1968-69 and 119 in 1969-70. The figures for Poona division were 117 percent and 122 percent and 118 percent in 1960-61, 1965-66 and in 1968-69 and 1969-70 respectively. Percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown was 6.73 in 1960-61, 7.60 in 1965-66, 8.85 during 1968-69 and 9.11 during 1969-70.

The tahsilwise position of gross irrigated to net irrigated area can be seen from the following table No.4-A.

3.10 From the above figures, it will be seen that in 1969-70 in all tahsils, except Shirala & Walwa, the area irrigated more than once was on the hillier side of ten percent of the net area irrigated, with Kavathe-Mahankal topping the list. The percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area can be seen from the table No.4-B given below.

3.11 Increase in the percentage of net irrigated area is seen during 1969-70 as compared to that in 1960-61 in Atpadi, Shirala, Walwa, Tasgaon, and Miraj tahsils. In the remaining tahsils the same is found to have decreased. The position of Poona Division in respect of percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area, shows an increasing trend during the reference years.

3.12 It will be revealed from the above table that the percentage of net irrigated area to the net cropped area is the highest in Miraj tahsil and the lowest in Shirala and Khanapur tahsils in 1969-70 due to hilly nature of the tahsils.

3.13 Changes in the cropping pattern:

The figures supplied below throw light on the changes in the cropping pattern during 1960-61, 1965-66, 1968-69 and 1969-70.

3.14 It will be seen from the above table that the percentage of area under rice, bajra and sugarcane increased while the same decreased in respect of other crops during the year 1969-70 as compared to 1968-69.

3.15 Agri. Credit and Outstanding dues:

Agri. Credit is the vital need of our agro-economy. The figures presented below show the extent of credit facilities made available by agri. co-operative societies, Land Development Bank, membership etc. during 1960-61, 1965-66, 1969-70 and 1970-71 in Sangli district.

3.16 It is apparent from the above table that the loans advanced by Agril. Co-operative societies increased by 148 percent during 1965-66 as compared to 1960-61 and by 83% and 85% during 1969-70 and 1970-71 respectively, as compared to 1965-66. The amount outstanding increased by 1330% during 1969-70 and by 1563% during 1970-71 as compared to the position at the end of the Third Plan. Loan advanced per member was Rs. 189 in 1960-61 which rose to Rs. 312 in 1965-66 Rs. 493 in 1969-70 and Rs. 487 in 1970-71.

3.17 The loans advanced by Land Development Bank increased more than fourfold as compared to 1965-66. However, there was decrease in loan advancing during 1970-71 due to lack of demand. Huge outstanding amounts are due to the policy of advancing long term loans for agril. development for which the recovery is spread up over a longer period.

3.18 As regards the over dues it will be seen from the above table that the amounts of over dues has been greatly increased during 1969-70 and 1970-71 due to the scanty rains in the district

in general and in eastern part of the district in particular, which has severely affected the recovery programme in the district.

3.19 Agril. Wage Rates:

Agril. wage rates in each district of Maharashtra State are being collected since 1962-63. For each district, three centres are selected and from these selected rural centres data on agril. wage rates are being collected.

3.20 In the Sangli district the selected centres are (1) Madhavnagar from Miraj Block (2) Jath from Jath Block and (3) Atpadi from Atpadi Block.

3.21 Generally, it is seen that wage rates in respect of males (unskilled) at Madhavnagar centre were more in the years 1970 and 1971 as compared to other centres due to the nearness of towns. The male field labourers get wages between Rs. 2.00 to 4.00 and female labourers get Rs. 1.00 to Rs. 2.75 .

3.22 It will be seen that due to the overall rise in prices agril. wage rates are also found to have increased during 1970 and 1971.

3.23 Livestock:

In the year 1966, the 10th quinquennial livestock census was carried out throughout India. Animal Husbandry in India, from the point of view of its substantial contribution by way of providing income and drought power to farmers, subsidiary food to human population etc. has a great impact on our rural economy.

3.24 The number of livestock per 100 hectares of cultivable land in 1961 was 128 while it was 117 in 1966, in Sangli district. The figures for Poona Dn. are 124 and 116 in the years 1961 and 1966 respectively. The position of Sangli district appears to be good in both the years as compared to the figures of Poona Dn. The Population of working bullocks decreased during 1966. Gross cropped area per pair of working bullocks was 9.39 Hectares during 1961 and 9.71 Hectares during 1966 in this district.

3.25 Within the district, the tahsil of Atpadi had the largest No. of livestock per hectare of cultivable land. The tahsils of Shirala, and Walwa also have the livestock more than the district average. The remaining tahsils have the livestock less than the district average, the lowest ^{being} in the tahsils of Jath and Kavathe-Mahankal.

3.26 Poultry:

In 1961, total poultry in Sangli district was 4.98 lakhs while it was 6.25 lakhs in 1966. The No. of poultry per 1000 population thus increased from 405 in 1961 to 509 in 1966. The rate of increase in poultry per 1000 human population in Sangli district was 26 percent from 1961 to 1966, while it was only 10 percent in respect of Poona Division. This comparison, however, is based on constant human population for both the years 1961 and 1966.

3.27 Consumption of Electricity:

The per capita consumption of electricity in Sangli district in 1961-62 was 15.32 KW while in 1965-66 it rose to 36.53 KW, in 1969-70 to 70.55 KW and in 1970-71 to 78.53 KW. There ^{appears} rapid increase in the consumption of electricity. This was mainly due to the massive programme of rural electrification in this district.

3.28 Enrolment at Employment Exchange and Vacancies notified.

Employment generation is one of the most important aims of planning in a over populated country like India. Employment exchange statistics give an indication of the magnitude of the unemployment problem though a limited extent because the majority of the unemployed persons do not avail of the facilities provided by the Employment Exchanges.

3.29 The position of Sangli district as regards registration in the employment exchange and the vacancies notified etc. can be seen from the figures supplied in the table given below:

3.30 From the above figures, it is seen that registration increased during 1970-71 while the vacancies notified decreased as compared to the previous year. Employment provided by private sector, but not through the employment exchange, is generally substantial and hence it will not be correct to draw final conclusions regarding the unemployment problem on the basis of employment exchange statistics, alone.

3.31 Increase in indoor and outdoor patients treated:

The comparative position can be seen from the following table.

3.32 During 1970, there was decrease in the indoor patients treated while the increase was seen in outdoor as well as total patients treated. The increase is about 26 and 39 percent during 1969 and 1970 when the figures of 1969 and 1970 are compared with those of 1965. There were 53 and 58 doctors working in public and public aided institutions during 1969 and 1970 respectively and thus for per lakh of population, there were 4.31 and 4.71 doctors respectively. There were 123 and 135 nurses working in such type of institutions during 1969 and 1970 i.e. there were 9.99 and 10.97 nurses per lakh of population. This position is not quite representative as the statistics regarding doctors and nurses in private sector are not considered here.

3.33 Increase in No. of students of different categories:

Education is the backbone of socio-economic development. The percentage of pupils taking education either in primary, secondary or higher has increased during 1969-70. The figures supplied below will show the percentage increase in 1969-70 over 1968-69 in respect of different types of education.

3.34 The increase in respect of girl students is notable for primary and secondary types, while there was a fall in the percentage in respect of girls taking higher education. As regards the the proportion of teachers and pupils, it is seen that the number of students per teacher in primary and secondary education was --

more or less constant as there was increase in the no. of students and teachers simultaneously.

3.35 Increase in road length per 100 Sq. km. :

Roads constitute one of the important items in the infrastructure of an economy. The extent of road facilities available can be judged by working out road length per 100 sq.km.

3.36 In Sangli district, the road length per 100 sq.km. was 39.00 km. in 1960-61, while in 1969-70 and 1970-71, the same was 46.71 km. In 1960-61 the total road length was 3350.92 km. The same increased by 662.25 km. in 1970-71.

3.37 Increase in Banking facilities in proportion to population :

In 1961 there were 34 banks of different types in Sangli district. The same rose to 79 and 88 as at the beginning of 1969 and 1970 respectively. That means in 1961, there were 3 bank offices per lakh of population in Sangli district. In 1970 there were 7 bank offices per lakh of population, indicating increased banking facilities.

3.38 Prices:

Since November 1962 the work of collection of prices at each district head quarter in the Maharashtra State was entrusted to the District Statistical Offices of the Bureau of Economics and Statistics. From data collected the trend in the prices of important commodities during 1969 and 1970 can be ascertained.

3.39 The prices in respect of items like cereals and pulses under food, sugar, gur, edible oil and vanspati, condiments and spices, vegetables and shirting, sarees, dhotis etc. under clothing, kerosene, charcoal, match box, firewood etc. under fuel, tea and

coffee under beverages, and washing soap, pan, supari, tobacco, cigarettes, hair oils, penicillin, etc. under miscellaneous articles have shown a rising trend since 1962.

3.40 The consumer Price Index for Sholapur centre is applicable to Sangli district. The General Index Numbers of Sholapur centre for 1969-70 and 1970-71 were 176 and 185 respectively.

CHAPTER - IV
ANNUAL PLAN
1970 - 71

INTRODUCTORY :

- 4.1 After the end of the Third Five Year Plan, Annual Plans were implemented in the State of Maharashtra, as elsewhere in India, without departing from the basic objectives or fundamental aims of our five year planning. The year 1968-69 was the last year in the series of Annual Plans, while the year 1969-70 was the start of the Fourth Five Year Plan.
- 4.2 Progress of the district level plan schemes during the year 1970-71 can be gauged by comparison with the progress made during 1969-70.
- 4.3 The table on the following page gives the details of budget allocation and expenditure under various major heads of development for the first two years of the Fourth Five year Plan.

4.4 During the second year of the Fourth Five year Plan i.e. 1970-71, there was increase in expenditure on all heads of development as compared to the expenditure incurred during the 1st year of the Fourth Five Year Plan i.e. 1969-70. This increase was prominently visible under Agril. programme and Social Services as it was the urgent need of the time. The percentage distribution of expenditure amongst the various major heads of development for the year 1969-70 and 1970-71 was as follows :

4.5 The percentage of expenditure under Social Services for the year 1970-71 was high due to the introduction of the new scheme of piped water supply under the State sector.

4.6 During 1969-70 the percentage of expenditure under State and Local sectors was 62.84 and 37.16 while in 1970-71 the same was 67.04 and 32.96 respectively.

I- AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMME :

A) Agricultural Production :

4.7 During 1969-70, 7 schemes were implemented under this sub-head; out of which 5 schemes were executed under Local Sector, and the remaining 2 under the State Sector. Total expenditure under this sub-head was Rs. 14.86 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs. 15.05 lakhs. Except the progress under Town compost scheme from the State sector and multicrop demonstration scheme from the local sector, the progress under all the remaining schemes was satisfactory. Under the scheme of Agril. School at Digraj, work of electrification in the building was in progress. New plantation and rejuvenation was carried out in 107 acres and in 135 acres respectively under the scheme of General Horticultural Development. Construction of godown at Islampur was in progress under the Taluka programme. Seed godown scheme. The work of bunding, construction of wells, distribution of oil engines was carried out as per the scheduled programme under the scheme for Small Holders. Construction of building was under-taken under the scheme of Taluka seed farm. Compost of 13,252 tonnes had been prepared as against the target of 19,000 tonnes by spending an amount of Rs. 0.03 lakhs under the scheme of Town compost. Five demonstration plots were organised under the multicrop demonstration scheme with an expenditure of Rs. 0.02 lakhs.

4.8 As against 7 schemes in 1969-70, during 1970-71, 11 schemes were executed under this sub-head, 5 in State and 6 in Local sector. The scheme for Small Holders has been transferred from State sector to local sector. Moreover, scheme like distribution of San Seed for green manuring, scheme for utilisation of private tractors or purchase of tractors, scheme for pilot --

project for evaluation of Groundnut and the scheme for establishment of seed processing plant were newly taken in the year 1970-71. The progress of expenditure under all these schemes except multicrop demonstration scheme under local sector, was appreciable. Out of Rs. 9.50 lakhs, Rs. 9.38 lakhs were expended. The fencing work was still in progress for Agril. school; 14,319 tonnes compost was prepared as against the target of 19,000 tonnes; an area of 593 acres was covered under the scheme of distribution of San Seed; 8 demonstration plots were organised on cultivators field under multicrop demonstration scheme; plantation and rejuvenation in 181 acres and 93 acres, respectively, were done under the scheme of General Horticultural Development; building works were still in progress under the schemes of Taluka seed farm and taluka seed godown at Islampur; under the Small Holders scheme, individual plans for 740 cultivators were prepared, employment for 8,759 labourers was provided and besides, the soil conservation work in 2763 hectares was carried out; loans amounting to Rs. 10,000 were provided to 25 farmers and area of 200 acres was ploughed under the scheme for utilisation of private tractors or purchase of tractors.

MINOR IRRIGATION :

4.9 Under this sub-head, 5 schemes were implemented during 1969-70 and 1970-71; out of which 3 schemes were under the State sector, one under the local sector and the remaining one under both State and local sectors. The progress under all these schemes for both the years was satisfactory.

4.10 During 1969-70, by way of spending Rs. 2.04 lakhs and Rs. 2.76 lakhs, 415 wells were constructed and 403 oil engines -

were distributed respectively. By spending whole provision of Rs. 4.36 lakhs, 4,940 acres of land were brought under irrigation through lift irrigation schemes. Out of Rs. 1.00 lakh, Rs.0.78 lakhs were spent for 119 community wells which were already in progress. Progress under minor irrigation was very good as the expenditure amounting to Rs. 41.17 lakhs exceeded the budget provision of Rs. 40.27 lakhs. Out of 9 bandharas and 2 tanks, 3 bandharas and one tank were completed. Canals of 1,725 rft. were excavated and works of 55 bandharas, 315 Budki wells, 26 percolation tanks and 26 vasant bandharas, undertaken by Zilla Parishad, were in progress.

4.11 During 1970-71, 630 wells were constructed and 641 oil engines were distributed. Acreage of land brought under irrigation through lift irrigation scheme was 985 acres. One bandhara and 3 tanks out of 2 bandharas and 14 tanks under State sector were completed while 12 bandharas, 2 percolation tanks, 10 lift irrigation schemes, undertaken by Zilla Parishad, were in progress. Besides, canal of 1.10 km. as against target of 1.72 km. was excavated. The target only in this respect could not be achieved due to land acquisition difficulties.

SOIL CONSERVATION :

4.12 During 1969-70, three schemes namely contour bunding and Nala bunding, reclamation of saline and alkaline lands and afforestation for soil conservation were implemented. The progress of the scheme of afforestation for soil conservation was shown under the sub-head 'Forest' during the year 1970-71. The progress of the schemes in both the years was good. Bunding was undertaken in 18,904 hectares during 1969-70, while it was --

undertaken in 21,172 hectares in 1970-71. Under reclamation of saline and alkaline lands, an area of 23 and 25 hectares was covered during 1969-70 and 1970-71 respectively.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY :

4.13 Two schemes were implemented under the local sector during 1969-70 while only one scheme namely opening of veterinary aid centre was implemented in 1970-71. The progress was fairly good in both the years.

DAIRY DEVELOPMENT :

4.14 There were 3 schemes under this head and all these were implemented under the State sector. Progress under all the three schemes was good for both the years. Under this programme, the procurement of milk reached upto 22,788 litres per day during 1969-70 and 26,013 litres per day during 1970-71. Moreover, loans amounting to Rs. 3.70 lakhs were disbursed to three federations for purchase of milch cattle and also subsidy amounting to Rs.7 thousand was given to 6 societies.

FOREST :

4.15 Four schemes were implemented under this sub-head during 1970-71; while only two were executed in 1969-70. The progress of expenditure in both the years was good and thus the execution of the schemes of farm forestry, Minor Forest produce, afforestation for soil conservation and development of pastures and fodder resources was satisfactory.

FISHERIES :

4.16 The schemes of fish farming in impounded water and development of fishery co-operatives were satisfactorily implemented during both the years under review. Fortynine thousand fingerlings were stocked and 22,000 kg. of fish were netted during 1970-71 as against 16,000 stocking of fingerlings --

and 848 kg. netting of fish during the year 1969-70.

W A R E HOUSING & MARKETING :

4.17 Development of agricultural marketing was the only State sector scheme implemented under this head. The whole budget provision was spent by way of subsidy and loans to A.P.M.C.s during both the years under review.

II- CO-OPERATION & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT :

A) CO-OPERATION :

4.18 There were 6 State sector schemes under this sub-head. The progress in expenditure was good in both the years under review. In 1969-70 Rs. 1.64 lakhs were spent while in 1970-71 Rs. 3.37 lakhs were spent.

4.19 During 1970-71, 84 societies were assisted by way of financial assistance, 2085 members were added to agril. credit societies, share capital was given to two marketing societies, assistance was rendered to 5 labour contract societies, 5 co-operative farming societies were assisted with funds and 2 marketing societies were assisted for distribution of consumer articles; while in 1969-70, subsidy to 139 societies was given, 5 new branches of D.C.Banks were opened, 3013 members were added to agril. societies, 7 labour contract societies were assisted, and 4 societies were helped to run consumers stores.

B) COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT :

4.20 Two schemes namely community development programme and composite programme for women and pre-school going children were implemented under this sub-head during 1970-71. In 1969-70, instead of composite programme for women and pre-school going children, the programme of Applied Nutrition was executed.

4.21 The expenditure amounting to Rs. 4.41 lakhs and Rs. 3.27 lakhs was incurred in the existing stage I and stage II C.D. Blocks, during the years 1970-71 and 1969-70, respectively. Under the new scheme of composite programme for women and pre-school-going children an amount of Rs. 3,000 was spent for two Mahila Mandals and one Balwadi.

III- IRRIGATION AND POWER :

Normal Development :

4.22 The programme of domestic lighting and connecting agricultural pumps in rural areas was undertaken by the Maharashtra State Electricity Board. But due to the paucity of funds only Rs. 10.96 lakhs and Rs. 8.86 lakhs were spent during the year 1970-71 and 1969-70 respectively. The amounts spent were indeed meagre when compared with the year 1968-69, where-in Rs.85.36 lakhs were incurred on this programme. Under the circumstances, no village could be electrified during 1969-70 and only 1577 agricultural pumpsets were connected; while in 1970-71, 5 villages were electrified and only 13 pumpsets were energised.

4.23 To meet the situation, a separate programme of connecting agricultural pumps was launched, outside the plan, by spending loan amount of Rs. 57.85 lakhs obtained from Agril. Finance Corporation.

IV INDUSTRY AND MINING :

Development of Small Scale Industries:

4.24 Progress of all the three schemes implemented under this sub-head was good in both the years under report. Amounts of Rs. 2.91 lakhs and Rs. 2.51 lakhs were spent during 1970-71 and 1969-70 respectively. Under S.A.I.Rules, the Zilla Parishad had --

granted loans amounting to Rs. 1.80 lakhs to 279 loanees during 1970-71, as against Rs. 1.90 lakhs and 147 loanees during 1969-70. Besides, financial assistance was given to 100 societies in 1970-71 as against 12 in 1969-70.

V- TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION :

ROAD DEVELOPMENT :

4.25 Four schemes - 3 in local sector and one in state sector were implemented under this head during 1970-71. The scheme of Roads of Economic Importance was executed in 1969-70 in addition to the four schemes as implemented in 1970-71. During 1969-70 an amount of Rs. 17.93 lakhs was spent while in 1970-71 the amount spent was Rs. 20.00 lakhs. Under the scheme of District Road 2 bridges were completed in 1969-70 and work of new bridge on Yerela river was undertaken during 1970-71. Besides, village roads of 15 km. and 20 km. and hilly roads of 2 km. and 8 km. were constructed in 1970-71 and 1969-70, respectively. Under the roads in sugarcane area 4.20 km. road ^{was} improved in 1970-71, while in 1969-70 3.54 km. road was newly constructed.

VI - SOCIAL SERVICES :

A) General Education :

4.26 Ten schemes - 6 from state sector and 4 from local were implemented under this sub-head in 1970-71. The progress on all these schemes was satisfactory both in 1970-71 and 1969-70. The schemes namely providing a jeep to Education officer, improvement in teaching of science education and merit scholarships to the students in secondary schools were newly taken up in the year 1970-71.

B) Public Health including Medical and Nursing :

4.27 There were 4 schemes under this sub-head-3 were under state and 1 under local sector during 1970-71. The progress of expenditure on the scheme of deep X-ray Therapy plant was only 20 percent as the deep X-ray tube was out of order. Moreover, the progress under primary health centre scheme was also not upto the mark both in 1969-70 and 1970-71. The progress under the scheme of Malaria Eradication and building for infectious diseases centre was satisfactory in both the years. Under the scheme of Malaria eradication programme, blood smears collected and examined numbered 1,75,472 and 1,76,778 during 1969-70 and 1970-71 respectively.

C) Family Planning :

4.28 This programme was implemented on a very large scale by spending an amount of Rs. 9.54 lakhs in this district during 1970-71. In 1969-70 also, an amount of Rs. 8.82 lakhs was spent. Insertion of loops and sterilisation numbered 131 and 12,269 during 1969-70 and 232 and 11,839 during 1970-71, respectively, under the scheme of Family Planning.

D) Water Supply :

4.29 Four schemes were implemented under this sub-head. Expenditure on all the schemes was satisfactory. Piped water supply scheme implemented under local sector with a meagre budget was also taken up under state sector, with a huge provision during the year 1970-71. Further, municipal water supply and drainage schemes in all the six municipal towns were in progress as per schedule, in both the years 1969-70 and 1970-71. Rural water supply scheme (wells) and piped water supply scheme were also satisfactorily implemented under local sector during both the years. Ninetyfive drinking water wells and 349 bores were completed during 1970-71 as against 193 wells and 163 bores in 1969-70.

12 schemes were in progress during 1970-71, under piped water supply scheme.

E) Housing :

4.30 Three schemes were implemented under this programme. Thirteen villages have been covered under Extension of Village Gaathan scheme by spending an amount of Rs. 37,000 in the year 1970-71 as against 5 villages in 1969-70. Ten thousand rupees were spent under Low Income Group housing scheme in 1970-71 as against Rs. 2,000 in 1969-70. Village Housing project scheme was implemented under local sector and Rs. 1000 were spent for two houses in 1970-71 and Rs. 5000 were expended in 1969-70.

F) Urban Development :

4.31 In 1969-70 one municipality was provided with financial assistance while in 1970-71 two municipalities were assisted for implementing development plans. The progress was not upto the mark in 1970-71.

G) Welfare of Backward Class :

4.32 Eight schemes were implemented under this sub-headline in 1970-71, while only 5 schemes were executed in 1969-70. Expenditure under all the schemes was satisfactory in both the years. Under this programme, various types of facilities such as grants for irrigation wells for development of lands; grant of tuition fees, scholarships and examination fees; grants for hostels; loan-cum-subsidy for cottage industries; grants for individual housing and grants to Vimukta Jatis for educational purposes were made available to the backward class community.

H) Labour and Labour Welfare :

Technical and Vocational Training :

4.33 Under this programme, funds were placed with the Industrial Training Institute, Sangli for the scheme of craftsman training and apprenticeship training. Construction of building was in progress in both the years. In 1969-70, 440 seats were filled in ; while in 1970-71 additional 32 seats were filled in. Expenditure in both the years was satisfactory.

VII - Miscellaneous :

Information and Publicity :

4.34 Programme of Rural Broad-casting was implemented in both the years by providing Radio sets to the Gram Panchayats. Expenditure amounting to Rs. 16,000 was incurred in 1970-71; while Rs. 6,000 were spent in 1969-70 and 20 and 104 radio sets were installed during these two years respectively.
