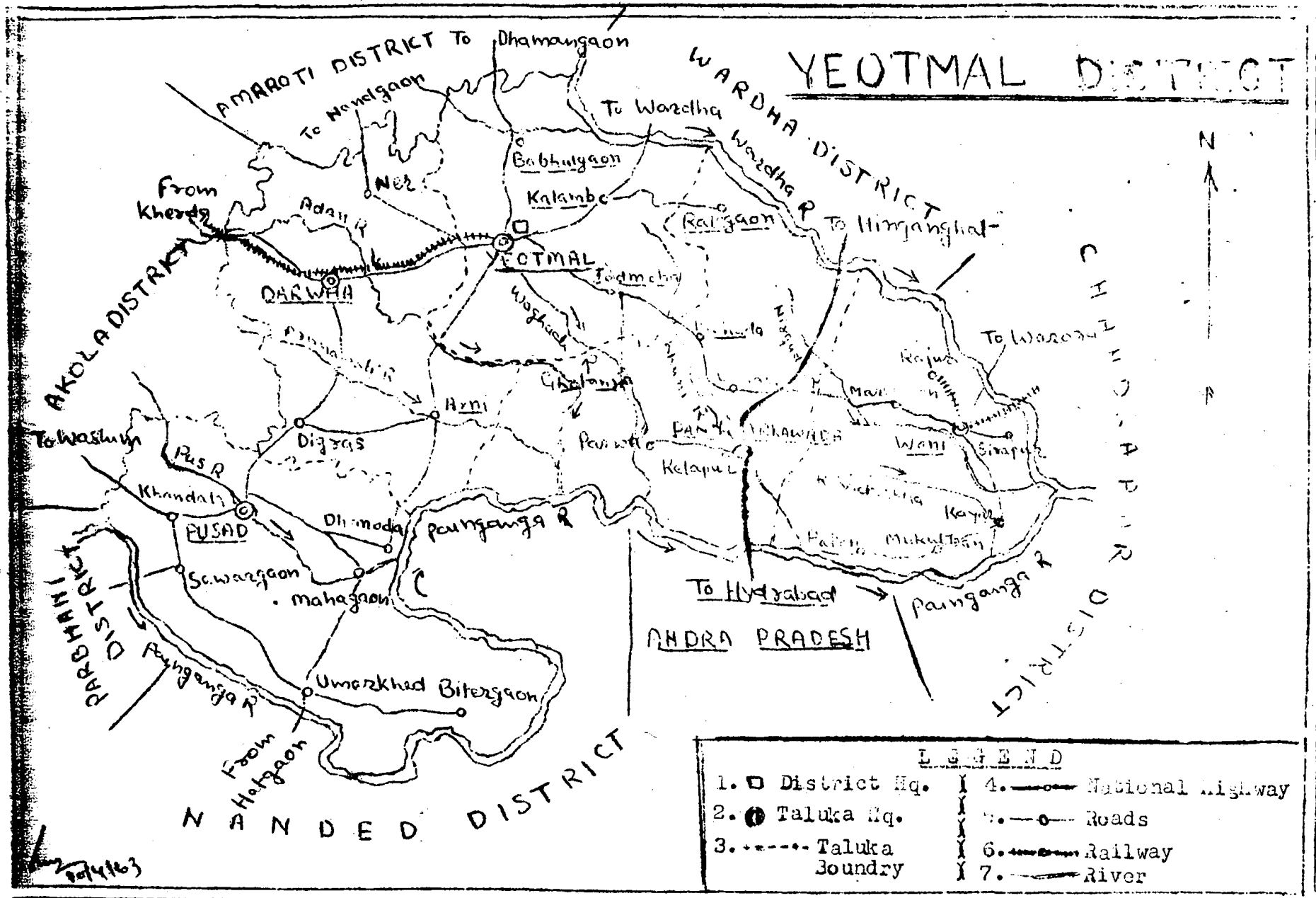

CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

1.1 Location

Yeotmal district is one of the four Berar districts of Vidarbha. It lies between 19°-26' and 20°-42' North latitudes and 77°-18' and 79°-9' East longitudes. Most of the district is covered by the Balaghats i.e. southern plateau of Berar.

1.2 Boundaries

It is surrounded by Amraoti district in the North, Akola and Parbhani districts in the West, Nanded district and Adilabad district of Andhra Pradesh in the south and Chandrapur and Wardha districts in the east. The district is quite extensive in size. As compared to other districts it ranks 2nd in Nagpur Division and 8th in the entire Maharashtra State in terms of area.

The district has a natural boundary in the east and south. The Wardha river separates the district from the districts of Wardha and Chandrapur in the east and the Painganga separates it from Nanded district and Adilabad District of Andhra Pradesh in the south.

1.3 Administrative set up

The district is divided into five talukas for administrative purpose at present. The Collector is in charge of the district. He is responsible for general administration, Law and order, Land revenue and civil supplies. He is assisted by Resident Deputy Collector and four Deputy Collectors at Head quarters and five Sub-Divisional Officers of the Deputy Collector's grade posted at five Sub-divisions. There is one revenue sub-division for each taluka. The Tahsildar

appointed by a few taluk headquarters in the district of the tahsil and assists the Sub-Divisional officer in his duties.

The judiciary is entirely separated from the executive and the District and Sessions Judge is the head of the Judicial department in the district. However the Collector continues to be the District Magistrate, but the powers are limited to security, law and order. The District and Sessions Judge is assisted by one Civil Judge (Sr. Division) and five Civil Judges (Jr. Division) and first class Judicial Magistrates whose headquarters are at tahsil places.

The Police force in the district functions under the District Superintendent of Police. In addition to these there are various district heads of the offices under various departments.

Local Bodies, Panchayat Samiti and Zilla Parishad

With a view to promote democratic decentralisation and secure greater participation of the people in the developmental activities in the district, the Zilla Parishad and 14 Panchayat Samitis have been formed in the district on 1st May, 1962. The area under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad is the entire rural area of the district excluding municipal area. There are eight municipalities to look after the development of urban areas. The area of the Panchayat Samiti covers the area of the Community Development Block.

There are 49 directly elected councillors. Out of these two seats are reserved for scheduled castes and five for scheduled tribes. (In recent Z.P. elections there are total nine reserved seats for S.C. and S.T. i.e. 2 for scheduled castes and 7 for scheduled tribes) There are five associated members who are presidents of the five Co-operative societies

conducting business in the district. Elected members of 14 Panchayat Samities are also Ex-officio councillors of the Zilla Parishad. At block level the Panchayat Samiti consists of elected and co-opted councillors from the area of the block. The Zilla Parishad is headed by its President assisted by Vice-president, both of whom are elected from the elected councillors. An officer of the Collector's rank works as Chief Executive Officer of the Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad comprises various departments and the heads of these departments at district level are officers of class I or II service under State Government. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as secretary to Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad functions through a standing committee presided over by the president and seven subject committees viz. Finance, Works, Agriculture, Co-operation, Education, Health and Social Welfare. At the Block level the Panchayat Samities have elected chairman and vice-chairman. The Block Development Officer works as secretary to the Panchayat Samiti which do not have subject committees. There are 1,114 village panchayats in the district. There are elected members from the village or the group of villages. The Sarpanch is elected from these elected members who look after the development activities at his village level.

1.4 Area and Territorial changes

The area of the district is 13,517 sq. kms. (5,219 sq. miles) which is 14.5% of the total area of the Nagpur Division and 4.4% of the total area of Maharashtra. Its maximum length from east to west is 192 kms., whereas its maximum breadth from North to South is 160 kms.

Yeotmal district, which is one of the four districts of Berar was handed over by the Nizam to the Government of India,

In 1850, upto 1905 it was a part of East Berar District. In 1864, new Wani (Wani) district was formed by separating Yeotmal, Wardha, Kelapur and Wani talukas from east Berar District. In 1905 Pusad Taluka from Basim district was transferred to this Wani district and Yeotmal District was newly constituted. There were no major changes in the constituents of the district till 1956 when the district was transferred to the then bilingual Bombay State from Madhya Pradesh, due to State Reorganisation. Now it is a part of Vidarbha Region of the Maharashtra State since 1st May 1960.

1.5 Topography.

The district has an undulating topography. The whole district is covered by the Ajantha ranges broken by broad river valleys and partially surrounded by plains. The central portion of the district is a plateau with steep Ghats with an elevation of 300 to 500 metres (1000' to 1500') above mean sea level. Both the Wardha and the Painganga rivers and their tributaries provide strips of plains in many parts along their course. The width of these plains varies from 5 to 15 kms.

1.6 Hills, River, system, Soil etc.

The main system of hills is the Ajantha mountains. The whole district is occupied by small east west ranges of these mountains. The off shoots of Ajantha ranges are at places broken by the broad valleys of the tributaries of the Wardha and the Painganga.

The main rivers of the district are the Wardha and the Painganga, both of which flow along north eastern and southern boundaries of the district respectively. They have numerous tributaries which traverse the heart of the district. The bed of the Wardha is broad and deep but the banks are over-

along the Bembra and the Nimguda. The Nimguda has its entire course in Wahi tahsil and the Bembra flows across the North of Yeotmal tahsil below the Ghats. The Painganga has six important tributaries viz. the Pus, the Arunawati, the Adan, the Waghadi, the Khuni and the Vidarbha. The Pus flows through Pusad tahsil, the Arunawati and the Adan through Darwaha tahsil, the Waghadi through Yeotmal and Kelapur tahsils and the Vidarbha through Wani tahsil. All these rivers maintain their flow for a greater part of the year.

The soils of the district/^{as} a whole are uniformly good in texture and vary in colour from black to dark brown. They are, however, slightly inferior in fertility to those in Akola and Amraoti districts of Vidarbha.

Three defects are commonly seen in the soils of the district, viz. (1) a mixture of pieces of Chunchadi (Limestone) (2) sloping surface and (3) an excessive admixture of sand. However the soil varies from very fertile alluvial tracts in the valleys to hilly and hard/^{parts} on the plateaus.

In Wani taluka the soil is uniform but coarse in texture and of a redish colour.

In Kelapur tahsil and central and southern parts of Yeotmal tahsil and hilly parts of Pusad tahsil, the soils are of coarse gravelly or loose friable texture and of a colour varying from light brown to grey.

In eastern parts of Yeotmal tahsil and in middle of Darwaha and Pusad talukas rich fertile alluvial soils are found. The district can be divided into three natural Zones. (1) the Bembra Wardha basin in the north (2) the plateau portion at the centre and in the southwest of the district and (3) the plain fertile lands of the Pus Painganga basin in the south.

1.7 Minerals

Coal and limestone are only important minerals found in the district. There is only one coal field near Pisgaon in Wani tahsil, extending over 12 sq. miles. The reserves are estimated at 240 million tonnes. The limestones can be better utilised for production of cement. Near Chanakha in Kelapur tahsil superior type of cement stones are found. The estimated reserves are 39 million tonnes and a cement factory is proposed to be erected there. A third mineral called 'farshi' stones are found in Kelapur tahsil of the district.

1.8 Climate, Temperature, and Rainfall.

The climate of the district is in general hot and dry. Generally there is a breeze in the summer season rendering it tolerable and pleasant. The temperature ranges from 15°C (59°F) in winter to 41°C (105°F) in summer.

The south-west monsoon brings rain to Yeotmal district. The rainy season lasts from June to October. In the month of August the intensity of rainfall is highest. The rainfall varies from 889 mms. (35 inch) to 1125 mms. (45 inch). In the past few years the monsoon is very irregular. It is also not uniform in the district. It increases from west to east. Wani tahsil gets an average of about 1125 mms (45 inch) rains and the lowest is in Darwaha tahsil which gets about 889 mms (35 inch) of rains. The central region covering Yeotmal tahsil gets on an average nearly 1099 mms. (42 inch) of rain.

As per fact finding committee's report, there is no tract in the district which can be regarded as a chronic scarcity area. However during 1970-71 scarcity was declared in 1803 villages in the district because of devastating damages to standing crops due to excessive rainfall. Scarcity works were under-taken through-out the district. But during 1971-72 there

was declared in 24 villages from Pusa tahsil and 48 villages from Darwaha tahsil and scarcity works were undertaken in these villages.

1.9 Demography

The total population of the district was 1098470 as per 1961 census. The population has increased to 1420758 (provisional) in 1971 census. The percentage of increase (29.34%) is above state average (27.26%) and is next to Chandrapur in the state. The density of population was 79 persons per sq.kms. (210 per sq.mile) during 1961 census, the same has increased during the decade and in 1971 there were 102 persons per sq.kms. (272 persons per sq.mile). The literacy percentage was 23.48% at the end of 1961 census, the same has increased to 31.56% during the decade. The progress made in the literacy is outstanding in context of a large tribal population and small proportion of urban population (13.65% urban population to total population.)

The gram gaurao and eradication of illiteracy mohim helped increasing the literacy in the district during the decade. There were 54.17% workers as compared to total population during 1961 census. But at 1971 census the percentage of total workers to total population has decreased to 43.32%. During 1971 census out of the total working population the percentage of cultivators is 26.50% and percentage of agricultural labourers is 57.52%.

CHAPTER II**Explanatory notes on the scope and limitations of the Statistical data presented in the Part-II (Statistical Abstract)****I. Purpose-**

The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important socio economic indicators of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been presented as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, the data for 1971-72 have been indicated with data for 1970-71 or even for earlier years. In the tables wherein data for 1970-71 and 1971-72 could not be presented, the same for the latest year for which they were available have been included. In case of population(1971), Livestock(1966) and census of Government employees(1966), however, the data for latest census have been presented. The provisional population totals based on 1971 census have been presented. All the data are collected from the state and central Government offices, local bodies and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. District at a Glance-

This table presents a bird's eye view of the Socio Economic indicators of development in Yeotmal district and Nagpur division, under different heads, such as areas, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication, plan and C.D. programme, local bodies and other miscellaneous statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in the tables.

III. Contents, Scope and Limitations-

The Statistical Tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped in 13 parts. The contents of the tables and the scope and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below-

1. Area and Population

In all seven tables i.e. table no.1 to 7 are included in this part. Data for 1971 census are indicated in all the tables except table no. 2 wherein data for 1901 to 1971 censuses are shown and table no.6 wherein data for 1961 census are shown. Reference period for the 1961 census was sunrise of 1st March, 1961 and that of the 1971 census was sunrise of 1st March, 1971.

The table no.1 indicates area of the district, density of population per sq. km, no. of villages and towns, no. of occupied houses and households and sexwise rural and urban population. The area figures have been given in sq. kms. One square kilometre is equal to 0.386 sq. miles.

The table no.2 indicates sexwise rural and urban population enumerated in 1901, 1911, 1921, 1931, 1941, 1951, 1961 and 1971 censuses alongwith decade variations and percentage decade variations for Yeotmal district.

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has -

1. A Municipality, a cantonment or civil lines or
2. (i) a population of 5,000 or over and
(ii) at least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

The table no.3 gives classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges in the district. The term village (i.e. rural area) used in the

Table denotes a statutorily recognised villages having a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, wadies or padas have therefore, not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand, "statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as "uninhabitated villages". Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families. Male, Female and Total population as per 1971 census of the villages in each range is also indicated in the table.

The table no.4 gives data regarding area, occupied houses, households, male, female and total population, scheduled caste and scheduled tribes population, liberates, workers and non-workers in each municipal areas in Yeotmal district as per 1971 population census.

The table no.5 indicates number of workers and non-workers in Yeotmal district according to 1971 census and they are classified according to standard livelihood classes. The population according to livelihood classes is shown separately for rural and urban area for the district as a whole. The concept of dependency has been abandoned for economic classification at the 1971 census. Instead the population is classified into workers and non-workers. The emphasis is now on work and not on income or economic dependence. A person is defined as worker if (a) in case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry, etc. he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day through^{out} the greater part of the working season, and (b) in case of regular employment in any trade, a professional services, business, or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceding the day of enumerator's visit to the household.

Persons like beggars, pensioners, agricultural or

non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend receivers, etc. who earn an income but who are not participating in any productive work in any occupation and also persons who had been offered work but who had not actually joined, have been classified as non-workers.

The table no.6 gives distribution of population according to (a) age-group, (b) mother tongue and (c) religion separately for rural and urban area and for the district as a whole as per 1961 population census. "Mother tongue" is defined as a language spoken by the persons' mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main language on the basis of Grierson's classification.

The table no.7 gives details of scheduled caste and scheduled tribes separately for rural and urban area in Yeotmal district.

2. Climate

Only two tables are included in this part pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Yeotmal district.

The table no.3 gives monthly rainfall and number

of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1971. The data is collected through Revenue agencies.

A day is treated as a "rainy day" if during the 24 hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 m.m. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table.

"Normal rainfall" is the average rainfall over a period ranging from fifty to eighty years.

The table no. 39 gives monthwise maximum and minimum temperature and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1971. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological centre at Nagpur. The maximum and minimum temperature denotes the average of the maximum and minimum temperature recorded daily during the month. The annual maximum and minimum temperature is the simple average of maximum and minimum temperature.

3. Agriculture

In all 11 tables i.e. table nos. 10 to 20 are included in this part.

The table no.10 indicates talukewise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the year 1969-70 and 1970-71. The break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown against each taluka. Major constituents of the geographical area are forest, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and un-cultivable land, cultivable wastes, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown. Under "forests" are included all forest areas of land classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether State owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded

but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or un-cultivated land as the case may be. "Land put to non-agricultural uses" stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals. and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. "Barren and un-cultivable land" covers all barren and uncultivable land like mountains, deserts, etc. Land which can not be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as "barren and uncultivable land", whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. "Culturable waste" includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken for cultivation or taken up cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may either be fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. "Permanent pastures" and other grazing land" cover all grazing lands whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common and grazing land within forest area are included under this head. "Land under miscellaneous tree crops, etc" not included in the net area sown" is the land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc. which is included in cultivable land but are not included under orchards, "Current fallows" comprise cultivable areas which are kept fallow during the current year. "Other fallow" includes all land which are taken up for cultivation, but are temporary out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and more than five years. The "net area sown" consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The "gross cropped area" ~~represents the sum total of area under all crops in all years~~

xiv

represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total or gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table no.11 gives talukawise area under different crops for the year 1969-70 and 1970-71 while table no. 12 includes the out-turn and yield rate of the principle crops during the same years. Table no.13 gives talukawise area irrigated by different sources while table no.14 includes talukawise area irrigated under different crops during the year 1969-70 and 1970-71. The table no.15 gives talukawise number of irrigation wells while other minor irrigation works excluding irrigation wells, are included in table no.16.

The table no.17 gives the information on major and medium irrigation projects in this district. Both completed and incompletd projects are covered in this table. The position as it was on 30th June, 1972 is presented. The cost of the medium irrigation projects ranges between Rs.20 lakhs to 5 crores, whereas that of major irrigation projects, it is Rs.5 crores and above.

Table no.18 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1971. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected rural centres in Yeopul District, viz.(1) Ner, (2) Kalamb, (3) Maregaon. Only one centre is selected from a taluk. The data for the year 1971-72 on Famine, scarcity and akin to scarcity is presented in table no. 20 (a) and (b)

4. Animal Husbandry and Forest

(A) Animal Husbandry

In all 5 tables i.e. table nos. 21 to 25(3) are included in this part.

Table no.21 gives talukwise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the Livestock Census 1966. The census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in five years. During the Livestock Census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age-group-wise classification of livestock is also indicated in the table.

Table no.22, 23 and 24 give talukwise veterinary statistics, disease wise livestock mortality and number of slaughter houses and animals slaughtered in them for the year 1970-71 and 1971-72.

(3) Forests

The table no.25(A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the year 1970-71 and 1971-72. Data regarding forests under the control of the State Government's Forest Department and those under control of the State Government's, Revenue Department are shown separately. The area under forest are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forest Act XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are intended mainly for timber production, wherein the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forests referred to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private indivi-

duals for management on lease basis or called "leased forests". There is no classification of expropriatory forests as such but in Nagpur division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forest Act which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as expropriatory. The forest area shown in table no.25 (A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in table no.10. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

(1) In the Indian Forest Statistics returns the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of forest Department is taken as area under forests, while in Agricultural Statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.

(ii) The forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics, under agricultural statistics.

(iii) Forest Department returns relate to financial year and Agricultural Statistics relate to the agricultural year.

5. Employment, Industry, Mining and Electricity

In all 11 tables i.e. table nos. 26 to 36 are included in this part.

The factory statistics shown in table no.26,27 and 28 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948.

(i) Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (section 2(i))

(ii) Those employing 20 or more workers and working without the aid of power (section 2(ii))

(iii) Those registered under section 25 of the Act, which State Government makes applicable provisions of the

(iii) Those registered under section 85 of the act under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

The table no.29 gives the registrations, vacancies notified and placements during the year 1970-71 and 1971-72.

The table no.30 shows occupational distribution of total registrations and placements in the employment exchange for the year 1970-71 and 1971-72 according to standard National Classification. Table no.31 gives the volume of employment in different industries as on 31st March, 1972.

The table nos. 32 and 33 present the results of the Census of Government Employees as on 1st July 1966, conducted by the Bureau of Economics & Statistics, Bombay. The data presented in these tables are restricted to the Class I, II, III and IV employees of the State Government and do not cover any other category such as work-charged personnel, class IV employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, part-time workers or honorary workers. The distribution of employees according to specified basic pay/emolument ranges is shown separately in respect of Class I, II, III and IV employees. The distribution of the employees according to monthly pay and emolument ranges is shown in table no.32 while table no.33 gives departmentwise total number of employees.

The table no.34 is devoted to Annual Survey of Industries. The data pertaining to nine types of industries available from 1966 annual survey is shown.

The table no.35 and 36 present the consumption of electricity for different purposes during the year 1970-71 and 1971-72 and the data regarding towns and villages electri-

ended upto 31st March, 1972 respectively.

6. Cooperation

In all 8 tables i.e. table nos. 37 to 44 are included in this part.

The table no. 39 gives talukawise number of primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced during the year 1971-72.

"Working Capital" includes paid-up capital, deposits and borrowings. Loans outstandings include outstandings in respect of loans, cash credits and over drafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. "Overdues" refer to amount of loans^{or} instalments which are due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by the competent authority.

The table no. 41 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them during 1971-72.

Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been shown in the table. The transaction of money lending in the State are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money Lenders Act, 1946. According to the act, no money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence.

7. Medical and Public Health

In all five tables i.e. table nos. 45 to 49 are included in this part.

The table no. 45 in this part indicates talukawise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, health centres and primary health centres, doctors, nurses, vaidyas,

beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated during the year 1970. The table covers all the State and Central Government Medical Institutions and also institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are however not included in this table.

The table no.46 gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sex-wise classification of births, deaths and infantx deaths during 1971 is shown for each taluka in the district.

The table no.47 deals with data regarding deaths due to important causes during 1969, 1970 and 1971, while vaccination statistics for 1971 is indicated in table no.48.

The table no.49 gives number of family planning centres as on 31st March, 1972 and number of sterilisation operations done in each centre during the year 1971-72.

8. Education

In all seven tables i.e. table nos. 50 to 56 are provided in this part.

Table no.50 gives sexwise number of literates and percentage of literacy separately for rural and urban areas according to 1971 population census. As per 1971 census definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language.

The table nos.51 and 52 are devoted to classification of rural and urban population according to different levels of literacy respectively as per 1961 population census.

The table no.53 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the year 1969-70 and 1970-71. Sexwise enrollment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions is also indicated.

In this table, the classification of institutions according to "type" is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many Secondary schools, which also impart education in primary courses. Nevertheless, the entire enrollment of students is included under "secondary" education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV or standards I to VII/VIII or less and teaches the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions coach students for standards VIII to X or XI with or without lower standards. Higher education is the education after passing Secondary School Certificate Examination, which leads to a degree examination.

The table no. 54 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes for the year 1969-70 and 1970-71. Beneficiaries for this table are the pupils who are getting educational concessions, of either type such as scholarships, freeships, etc. The table no. 55 gives data regarding number of beneficiaries and an amount of concessions granted during the years 1969-70 and 1970-71.

The table no. 56 gives expenditure incurred on primary education during the year 1969-70, 1970-71 and 1971-72, by different agencies such as Zilla Parishad, Municipalities, etc.

9. Transport and Communication

In all seven tables i.e. table nos. 57 to 63 are included in this part.

The table no. 57 gives total railway length as on 31st March, 1971 and 1972 according to type of routes i.e. broad gauge, metre gauge and narrow gauge. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the

disputed boundaries. The figures of length of each type of road are therefore approximate and not accurate.

The table no.58 gives road length according to category of roads and surface classification as on 31st March, 1972.

The table no.59 indicates the number of motor vehicles in operations as on 31st March, 1972 in Yeotmal District and Nagpur Division.

The table no.60 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Amraoti Division. The S.T. Division comprises of (i) Amraoti and (ii) Yeotmal districts for this table.

The table no.61 depicts the results of traffic census on important roads conducted by Building and Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. The data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and locations of count-posts. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tonnes per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

10. Local Bodies

In all four tables i.e. table nos. 64 to 67 are included in this part.

The table no.64 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as village panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial year 1965-66, and 1968-69 to 1971-72. The number of village panchayats includes number of independent as well as group village panchayats.

The table no.66 is divided in three parts (A), (B) and (C). The table no.66(A) gives the total receipt of Zilla Parishad; Yeotmal derived from self raised sources, Government grants, debt section and remittance. The table no.

no.66(B) indicates the receipts of Zilla Parishad from different Government grants. The table no.66(C) gives the total expenditure incurred by Zilla Parishad. The expenditure is divided into two parts viz. (i) Revenue expenditure and (ii) debt section including remittances. Data for the years 1969-70(actuals), 1970-71(revised) and 1971-72 (estimates) are shown in the table.

The table no.67 gives income and expenditure figures of the municipal councils in the district separately and the district total for the year 1971-72.

11. Plan and Community Development

In all five tables i.e. table nos.68 to 72 are included in this part.

The data for the year 1971-72 is produced in all tables except table no.70 where the position as on 31st March, 1972 is shown.

12. Prices

Only three tables i.e. table nos. 73 to 75 are included in this part.

The table no.73 gives the monthly wholesale prices of important agricultural commodities at regulated market centres in the district during the year 1971. Only important agricultural commodities such as wheat, jowar, bajara, rice, tur, moong and urid, groundnut and cotton are included in this tables. Price average for the year is worked out by simple arithmetic average.

The table no.74 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at District Head-quarter, Deotnal. The average prices of each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1971, alongwith units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been recorded. The data are regularly collected by District Statistician.

every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average price of each commodity for the year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at district headquarter, the average price for individual commodity can not be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a brought indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table no.75 gives consumer price index numbers (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the year 1971-72 commencing from April and also averages for the year 1970-71 and 1971-72 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index(revised series) is 1960. The index numbers of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Advisor to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of construction of the index is given in the Appendix to the Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India series (1956), issued by the Economic Advisor to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index Numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as multiplier.

13. Miscellaneous

In all 12 tables i.e. table nos.76 to 87 are included in this part.

The table nos.76 and 77 gives the data regarding strength of police force in Yeotmal district in 1971 and crime statistics for the year 1971-72 respectively.

The table no.78 gives talukawise cinema statistics for the year 1971-72. Number of permanent, semi-permanent and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show has also

been indicated in the table.

The table no.83 gives data pertaining to small saving collections during the year 1971-72. Gross collections, withdrawals and net collections during the year 1971-72 under different kinds of savings are indicated in the table.

The table no.87 brings out the trends in selected indicators in Yeotmal District.

CHAPTER III

In this chapter, the pace of development of Yeotmal district in various sectors has been reviewed in the following lines by presenting tahsilwise sectorial trends, by spotlighting the development during the year 1971-72 in comparison with development in 1960-61. Data for the 1970-71 have been used for agriculture as the data for the 1971-72 are not available.

Indicator No.1

3.1 Percentage of gross sown area

The following table shows the percentage of gross sown area to net sown area in 1960-61 and 1970-71.

It is seen from the above table that there has been very little increase in the percentage of gross cropped area as compared to net area sown during a span of a decade, from 1960-61 to 1970-71. There was an increase of 89.54 % in the double cropped area during 1970-71 as compared to 1960-61. The percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area was increased from 100.72 in 1960-61 to 101.24 in 1970-71.

The percentage of double cropped area to net area sown was highest in Kalapur tahsil(1.45 %) and lowest in Darwha tahsil(1.02 %). Though Pus project and Saikhedra project have been

completed in this district, well irrigation is the main source of irrigation, and the other irrigation facilities i.e. tanks etc. are very meagre in this district. After completion of the work of sub-channels and field channels in Pus project and Saikheda project area in Pusad and Kelapur tahsils, the double cropped area in these tahsils will be increased to the extent of 5 to 10 percent of the net sown area.

Indicator No.2

3.2 Productivity of important crops

The productivity of crops is mainly dependant on the equitable and timely distribution of rains, as the irrigation facilities are too meagre in the district.

The following table shows the production of different crops in 1960-61 and 1970-71.

It is observed that the production of the majority of the important crops was less during 1970-71, as compared to the production in the year 1960-61. Only groundnut, rice, wheat and sugarcane(gur) showed an increase in production during 1970-71 as compared to 1960-61. It is because of the fact that the year 1960-61 was of bumper production.

There is slight increase in the production of rice and wheat during 1970-71 as compared to the production in 1960-61. The increase in sugarcane and groundnut production is due to use of better farm practices such as improved seeds, chemical fertilizers and irrigation facilities. But the decrease in the production of other crops is due to failure of crops in comparison to 1960-61 crop conditions in the district.

Indicator No.3

3.3 Gross value of agricultural production

As the farm harvest prices of various commodities are not available, this indicator could not be worked out.

Indicator No.4

3.4 Percentage of Irrigated area

The following table shows the percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown and the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area during 1960-61 and 1970-71.

Though there was considerable increase in the irrigated area, it is very insignificant as compared to net sown area. Only 0.90 % of the net area sown gets the benefit of the irrigation facilities at present. The irrigated area during 1970-71 has doubled in case of Darwaha and Pusad tahsils as compared to the corresponding area in 1960-61. The increase in irrigated area is mainly due to the construction of irrigation wells and installation and energizing of pumps for irrigation purposes on wells. The increase is remarkable in Darwaha tahsil followed by Pusad tahsil which ranked second in this regard, while Kelapur and Wani tahsils ranked 4th and 5th in 1970-71.

The area irrigated more than once had increased from 1.88 % to 18.35 % during the span of ten years i.e. from 1960-61 to 1970-71. The percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area was highest in Wani tahsil (131.35%) and lowest in Kelapur tahsil (110.51%).

Indicator No.5

3.5 Change in the Crop Pattern

The following table shows the changes in the area of food crops and non-food crops for the year 1960-61 and 1970-71 and adoption of irrigation for food and non-food crops for the above period.

It is seen that 54.77 percent of the gross cropped

area was under food crops during 1960-61 which dropped down to 50.53 percent during 1970-71. There was a decline in area under food crops in all tahsils. Wani tahsil had the highest percentage (55.39) of gross cropped area under food crops in 1970-71. The lowest percentage was observed in Darwaha tahsil (15.50) in that year. The decline in the percentage of food crops is due to the tendency of cultivators to grow cotton and groundnut to a larger possible extent in preference to Jowar and paddy as these are cash crops and fetch handy money to the cultivators. The acreage of groundnut is also increasing as a second crop is possible on this crop in rabi season. wherever irrigation facilities are available.

The utilisation of irrigated area for food crops and non-food crops has been indicated in the following table.

It is observed that during 1960-61 as high as 89.12 percent of the gross irrigated area was under food crops. It increased slightly to 89.56 percent during 1970-71. During 1970-71 Darwaha tahsil had the highest percentage (21.63) of irrigated area under non-food crops while during 1960-61 Kelapur tahsil had highest percentage of irrigated area under non-food crops. On the other

hand Kelapur tahsil had highest percentage (93.13) of irrigated area under food crops during 1970-71. Wani tahsil has no irrigated area under non-food crops during 1960-61 but it had 3.70 percent of irrigated area under non-food crops during 1970-71. There is remarkable increase in irrigated area under non-food crops in Darwa tahsil while significant decrease is noticed in Kelapur tahsil during 1970-71. Yeotmal tahsil showed little decrease in irrigation of non-food crops during 1970-71.

Indicator No.6

3.6 Increase in agricultural credit and outstanding dues

No doubt, agricultural finance through short term and long term loans is assisting the green revolution in the Country. The cooperative credit especially primary agricultural credit societies (service cooperatives) are playing an important role in the district in meeting the immediate demand of the cultivators for seasonal agricultural finance at moderate cost alongwith other financing agencies like Land Development Bank and other Nationalised Banks. However, the financing by other agencies is on long term and medium term basis. The following table shows the credit advanced by the primary agricultural credit societies on short term basis during 1960-61 and 1971-72.

It will be seen from the above table that the number of primary agricultural societies has increased in Darwaha, Yeotmal tahsils while the number of primary agricultural societies has reduced in Pusad, Kelapur and Wani tahsils though the total number of primary agricultural societies were constant during the year 1960-61 and 1971-72.

The short term agricultural loans advanced by the primary agricultural societies during the year 1971-72 showed an increase of 165 percent over 1960-61. The highest increase is observed in case of Pusad tahsil (408 %) and lowest increase is in case of Yeotmal tahsil (75 %). The outstanding dues have mounted up and during 1971-72 the magnitude was to the tune of Rs. 467 lakhs as against 6.6 lakhs during 1960-61. Rs.116.92 lakhs were overdue out of the outstanding dues of Rs.467.09 lakhs. Darwaha tahsil had the highest outstanding dues while Wani tahsil had the lowest amount of outstanding dues. The highest amount of overdues is observed in Pusad tahsil (47.52 lakhs Rs.) while Yeotmal tahsil had lowest amount of overdues (3.98 lakhs Rs.) during 1971-72.

Indicator No.7

3.7 Agricultural wage rates

The agricultural wage rates were collected regularly at three rural centres in the district since 1963. The average daily sexwise wage rates for field labourers in respect of selected three centres for the year 1963 and 1971 are shown in the table given below. They may not be representative of the tahsil as a whole but give a general trend of the agricultural wage rates prevailing in the tahsil and the district.

The average wage rates for agricultural field labourers had increased from Rs.1.71 during 1963 to Rs.2.91 during 1971 for males and from Rs.0.79 to Rs.1.61 in case of females during the same period. Thus the increase in wage rates amounts to 70 percent for males and 104 percent for females. Kalamb and Maregaon centres had higher wage rates than Ner centre in respect of male workers while Maregaon centre had higher wage rates than Ner and Kalamb centres for female workers.

The following table gives centrewise/wage rates for skilled labours such as carpenter, blacksmith, cobbler and herdsman.

It is observed that wage rates for skilled labour and other agricultural labour had considerably increased during the period 1963 to 1971. In general the variation from one centre to other centre were not very large during the year 1971 except the wage rates for cobbler in respect of Kalamb centre. The wage rates of cobbler for Kalamb centre were lowest (Rs.2.50) as compared to wage rates for Ner and Maregaon centres during 1971.

3.8 Livestock population (Bovine and Ovine) per hectare of Cultivable land.

Livestock (bovine and ovine) population plays an important role in agriculture in India in spite of the propagation and use of modern mechanical devises and use of electric pumps. Although chemical fertilizers are used by the cultivators for increasing agricultural production cowdung manure has still its own importance in Indian farming as organic manure retaining the fertility of land.

The livestock population per hectare of cultivable land has decreased from 1.12 in 1961 to 1.06 in 1966. It may be

due to increase in cultivable land. The livestock population per hectare of cultivable land was highest in Wani tahsil (1.23) and lowest in Kelapur tahsil (0.84) in 1966. It was highest in Pusad tahsil (1.25) and lowest in Kelapur tahsil (1.00) during 1961. The decrease in the livestock population is steep in Kelapur, Pusad and Yeotmal tahsils. On the other hand Wani tahsil showed a slight increase in the livestock population per hectare of cultivable land in 1966 as compared to 1961.

3.9 Poultry as compared to population

The total poultry population in the district according to 1966 livestock census was 2,28,225 and it has decreased by about 49 percent during 1966 over 1961.

As per 1961 livestock census poultry per 100 persons in the district worked out to 41 which sharply decreased to 21 in 1966 livestock census. The poultry per 100 persons was highest in Wani tahsil (33) while it was lowest in Pusad tahsil (15) in 1966. The decrease in poultry was highest in Kelapur tahsil (58 %) while it was lowest in Darwaha and Yeotmal

tahsils (43 %) during 1966 as compared to corresponding figures in 1961. According to 1961 livestock census, it was estimated that the district had on an average 189.64 poultry birds per 100 households as against 129.01 in Vidarbha and 137.04 in Maharashtra. Similarly the district had 1.75 % of improved fowls to total number of fowls as against 1.07 % in Vidarbha and 1.69 % in Maharashtra. It was also estimated that the number of eggs produced per hen per annum in the district was 47 as against 61 in Vidarbha and 84 in Maharashtra.

At the beginning of the third five year plan, the per capita consumption of electricity was 5.68 KWH. There was a rapid development in rural electrification during third five year plan period and subsequent annual plans, the per capita consumption of electricity increased to 22.86 KWH at the end of 1971-72. The percentage of increase by the end of 1971-72 is 302 % over 1960-61.

The progress of rural electrification was very rapid in the district during these eleven years. At the end of 2nd five year plan only 1.56 percent of the total villages were electrified. But during the third five year plan, considerable progress has been made in rural electrification work and 9.82 percent villages were electrified upto the end of third five year plan. At the end of the year 1971-72 in all 30.67 percent of the villages were electrified. It gave an impetus to the agricultural production in the district as these villages were mainly electrified for energizing the irrigation crops. Darwha tahsil topped in respect of villages electrified (38.82 %). The rate of progress is very rapid in the district except in Wani tahsil where only 14.58 percent of the total villages were electrified upto 31st March, 1972.

3.11 Increase in number of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchanges and vacancies notified.

It is observed that the registrations of candidates was less by 26 percent during 1971-72 as compared to 1960-61. Similarly 45 percent less vacancies were notified during 1971-72 as compared to 1960-61. However, it is observed that there is little generation of employment potential in this district.

It is seen that the percentage of the vacancies notified to registrations had gone down from 15 % during 1960-61 to 11.05 % during 1971-72. Placements were only 9 and 8.20 percent of the registrations during the year 1960-61 and 1971-72 respectively. It is observed from the percentage of placements to vacancies notified that only 74 percent of vacancies notified were filled in by the candidates registered with employment exchange during 1971-72, while during 1960-61 only 59 %

as the vacancies notified were filled in by the candidates from employment exchange.

The medical facilities available through public aided bodies, are inadequate as compared to the extensive size of this district.

It will be seen that the medical facilities such as hospitals and dispensaries had increased by 50 percent during the span of ten years (i.e. between 1961 to 1971). The highest increase is observed in Wani tahsil (100 %) where the facilities have doubled in these ten years as compared to 1961. The lowest increase of 20 % was seen in Pusad tahsil during the same period.

As the facilities of hospitals and dispensaries

... the number of beds in the hospitals and dispensaries have increased proportionately except for Wani tahsil which showed a decrease of 10 percent during 1971 as compared to 1961. The highest increase is observed in Pusad tahsil (81 %) in respect of beds per lakh of population in 1971 as compared to 1961.

It is observed that at the end of 1961 in all 53,416 outdoor and 1,084 indoor patients were treated per lakh of population in the district. The people are taking advantage of the increased medical facilities. An increase of 114 percent in indoor patients and the decrease of 25 percent in outdoor patients treated per lakh of population in the district is observed during 1971 as compared to 1961. The highest percentage of increase in indoor patients treated per lakh of population during 1971 as compared to 1961 was seen in Kelapur tahsil (410 %) while Darwaha tahsil showed decrease for the same period by 42 % percent. The outdoor patients treated in hospitals and dispensaries per lakh of population has showed decrease

in the district by 25 percent during 1971 as compared to 1961. The highest percentage of increase in outdoor patients treated per lakh of population during 1971 as compared to 1961 was observed in Kelapur tahsil (167 %). While maximum decrease was seen during the same period in Wani tahsil (56 %).

3.13 Increase in the number of students in different categories

According to 1961 census 23.48 percent (35.34 % males and 11.27 % females) of the population of this district was literate as against 27.88 percent of Vidarbha division and 29.82 percent of Maharashtra State. During the decade ending 1970-71 the percentage of literacy had increased considerably and at the end of 1970-71 the literacy has increased to 31.56 percent (43.43 % males and 19.53 % females) as against 39.06 percent of Maharashtra State. But the district is still backward in educational facilities.

The growth of primary education in the district during the third five year plan was note-worthy. There were 83 thousand students attending 1135 primary schools during

1960-61 and their number increased by 81 percent and there were 156 thousand students attending 1681 primary schools at the end of the year 1970-71. Considerable increase (81 %) in primary education of girls is observed during 1970-71 as compared to 1960-61.

As regards secondary education, tremendous progress was made by starting secondary schools in many remote places in the district. There were 155 secondary schools in 1970-71 as against 59 schools in 1960-61, the increase being 163 percent. There were nearly 18 thousand students taking secondary education in 1960-61. Their number had increased to 37.4 thousand at the end of 1970-71. The percentage of increase in secondary school students during 1970-71 as compared to 1960-61 was 112 percent (96 % of boys and 169 % of girls.) Female students from rural areas of the district are taking primary and secondary education due to Socio Economic impact on rural masses and due to availability of educational facilities nearby to residents. Higher educational facilities have also been increased in the district and there were 5,776 students taking higher education in the district during 1970-71 as against 1,188 students during 1960-61, showing an increase of 388 percent. There were eleven institutions imparting higher education in the district during 1970-71.

Indicator No.14

3.14 Increase in road length per 100 sq. kms.

The district being hilly, it suffers from low road mileage in the division. There is one narrow guage railway line linking district headquarter Yeotmal to Nagpur-Bombay main line at Murtizapur in Akola district and one broad guage line linking Wani town and Rajura village to Majri on Nagpur-Madras main line. Both these railway lines are only useful for goods transport, and they did not have any impact on the economic development of the

district.

The road length per 100 sq. kms. was increased to 21.75 kms. as on 31-3-1972 from 9.80 kms. as on 31-3-1961. The increase in the road length per 100 sq. kms. was mainly due to construction of lower type roads viz. village roads and other district roads, etc. In addition the district has 1165.8 kms. of forest roads as on 31st March, 1972. The road length per 100 sq. kms. as on 31-3-1972 increases to 30.38 kms if the forest roads are considered.

3.15 Increase in the Banking facilities in proportion to Population.

Banking facilities are most essential for economic development of the region. The Scheduled Banks as well as the Co-operative Banks are lending necessary credit to the cultivators in their pursuit for green revolution. There are 17 Nationalised Scheduled Banks functioning in the district at taluka and other trade centres.

There were 12 Scheduled banks and 12 Cooperative banking offices during 1961 giving credit to strengthen economic development in the district. Their number has however increased to 17 Scheduled banks and 27 Cooperative banks (including one Urban Cooperative Bank) at the end of the year 1971-72, the percentage increase being 83. The increase is more remarkable in Pusad tahsil (150%) while it is least in Yeotmal tahsil (57%). The availability of banking offices was 2.18 banking offices per lakh of population during 1961. It has increased considerably and there were 40 banking offices available per lakh of population in the district during 1972. The Yeotmal tahsil had 5.29 banking offices per lakh of population while Wani tahsil had lowest i.e. 3.45 banking offices per lakh of population during 1971-72. The number of banking offices per lakh of population are based on 1961 population census data. While considering 1971 provisional population of the district the availability of banking offices per lakh of population is 3.10 being the increase of 42 percent over 1961.

It will be seen that the average prices of almost all the commodities had increased during 1971 as compared to 1963 prices. The increase was more than 40 percent on all the commodities except kerosene where the least increase

ly
was observed (38 %). The maximum increase was observed in case of Tur dal and Banana where the prices have nearly tripled (153 % increase). It is seen that the average prices of food-grains had shot up and in most of the cases the average prices were more than doubled in 1971 as compared to 1963 prices. The average prices of essential commodities such as groundnut oil (130 %), meat (72 %), eggs (64 %), dry chillies (105 %), banana (153 %), tea (72 %), fire wood (115 %), kerosene (38 %), washing soap (42 %), salt (100 %) and sugar (67 %) had increased considerably causing hardships to the common man. The average prices of supari increased by 68 percent and that of tobacco by 70 percent as compared to 1963 prices.

4.1 The fourth five year plan was deemed to have started from 1-4-1969. But annual plans which were visualised and started to utilise the available resources to the maximum possible extent for the schemes of shorter duration were continued further. And annual plan 1971-72 is the 3rd such plan as a part of 4th five year plan.

4.2 A budget provision of Rs. 348.791 lakhs was made for the annual plan 1971-72. The following table gives the major headwise break up of the allotment for the district during 1971-72.

It is observed that the highest share of budget provision was available for major head Irrigation & Power (34.19 %) as energising of pumps and rural electrification Programme was given more emphasis in the district in order to increase agricultural production in the district. Agricultural programme and Social Services accounted for 26.27 % and 25.36 % of the budget provision respectively. The remaining budget provision was allocated amongst Co-operation

and Community Development (8.64 %), Industry and Mining (0.88%), Transport & Communications (11.04 %) and Miscellaneous sectors (0.12 %).

4.3 During the annual plan 1971-72 an expenditure of Rs. 313.632 lakhs was incurred in the district against the budget provision of Rs. 348.791 lakhs. The percentage of expenditure being 89.92 % to the total budget provision. Headwise expenditure is as given below-

4.4 Agricultural Programme

More than 70 % of the population of the district depends on agriculture and allied activities as its main source of livelihood. Schemes pertaining to land development and soil conservation on water shed basis, minor irrigation through wells and tanks, intensive cultivation of crops through propagation and adoption of improved package practices, forest, fisheries, dairies, warehousing and marketing were included in agricultural programme.

The table below gives the expenditure under these sub-heads.

Schemes pertaining to agricultural production, minor irrigation, soil conservation, were attached more importance in the district. The district has an undulating topography and hence soil erosion is a problem in the district. As a measure of soil conservation bunding was done in 25,272 hectares of land, 29 hectares of land was reclaimed and 25 hectares of plantation was done as a measure of soil conservation. 26,000 metric tonnes of town compost was produced in the district. Mass plant protection measures were undertaken on 21,421 hectares of cotton and 12,352 hectares of area was covered under intensive cultivation of food crops.

To increase irrigation potential in the district, construction of 15 minor irrigation tanks and 17 percolation tanks was undertaken of which one irrigation tank and two percolation tanks were completed. 64 community wells were completed and subsidy was given for 134 new wells and 150 pumps installed in earlier years.

Under the intensive poultry development programme loan of Rs. 30,000 was granted to 10 loanees. Plantation of teakwood was undertaken in 220 hectares, bamboo plantation in

in 30 hectares, plantation of quick growing species in 30 hectares and fodder development plantation in 50 hectares were undertaken in the district during 1971-72.

New irrigation tanks have provided a new scope for development inland fisheries in the district and accordingly stocking of 9.635 lakhs of carp fry was done in these tanks and netting of 1,000 lakhs Kgs. of fish was done in the district. Its market value is more than three lakhs of Rs. A scheme for production of fish seed is undertaken at both the irrigation projects i.e. Pus and Saikheda and the construction work of storage tanks were in progress. Six societies were helped with managerial subsidy and three were given share capital. 172.240 kgs of nylon twine was supplied at subsidised rates to the fishery societies for nets.

4.5 Co-operation and Community Development

On co-operation and community development Rs.7.659 lakhs were spent during 1971-72. Under the programme existing community development blocks were continued and applied nutrition programme was also continued in three blocks. Kitchen gardens and feeding programme to school going children were undertaken in 30 villages from these three blocks.

Under the sub-head ^{of} co-operation, share capital, loans and subsidy were given to primary agricultural societies to strengthen the cooperative structure at village level.

4.6 Irrigation and Power

Under this head schemes relating to rural electrification and energizing of pumps were undertaken in the district. The 33 K.V. line from Pandharkawada to Wani was completed and two sub-stations at Kalamb and Ladkhed were completed during the year 1971-72. During the year 94 villages were electrified and 466 pumps were energized. Now there were 606 villages electri-

ried in the district and 5,849 total number of electric motor pumps.

4.7 Industry and Mining

An amount of Rs.95,310 was spent on the schemes under this head and loans were given to 158 artisans and six industrial co-operative societies for the development of small scale and cottage industries during 1971-72.

4.8 Transport and Communication

The district is not well served with railways and hence roads are of significant importance in the development of the district. At the beginning of 1971-72 there were 2949.38 kms. of extra municipal roads in the district. During the year 94.30 kms. of pucca roads more were constructed and 44.50 kms. of kacha roads were constructed. Two bridges and 35 C.D. works on the existing roads were completed. Black topping was nearly completed for 10 kms. during the year.

4.9 Social Services

For socio-economics development of the district and improvement of economic conditions of weaker section of the society, Rs.81.575 lakhs were spent during the year 1971-72. The following table gives the break-up of expenditure under this head according to different sub-heads of various schemes included in social welfare programme of the district during 1971-72.

Under general education, primary education was given importance. During the annual plan 1971-72, loan scholarships to 33 teachers for training and stipends to 140 teachers under training were given. Educational concessions to economically backward classes were granted to 2436 students and 236 wards of primary teachers were given educational concession. Grants were given to local bodies for construction of 23 primary school rooms and 5 secondary schools, 6 new classes were opened in existing multipurpose highschools in their expansion programme. 400 adults were made literate during the year.

The construction of staff quarters and hostel rooms were undertaken at Govt. polytechnic at Yeotmal and the work was in progress. The preliminary work of 252 bedded civil hospital at Yeotmal has started and construction work of 3 primary health centres were in progress during the year. D.D.T. was sprayed in 183,492 houses during the year as a part of malaria eradication programme. 10161 family planning operations and 42 I.U.C.D. insertions were performed in the district in 21 family planning centres.

Municipal water supply schemes for four municipal areas were in progress and the drainage scheme for Wani municipal area was in progress and 50% of the work was completed. The water supply scheme at Pandharkaoda was nearly complete. Rural water supply schemes at Arni, Bathulgaon, Balegaon, Lakhi, Digras block and Mahagaon block

were in progress. Also piped water schemes of 36 individual villages in the district were in progress. 147 new drinking water wells were completed out of 250 undertaken during the year to provide drinking water.

Housing sites were provided to 36 developing villages as a measure of gaathan extention.

For backward class welfare schemes Rs.2.642 lakhs were spent during the year 1971-72 for providing various socio-economic and agro-industrial amenities to them. Under labour and labour welfare scheme programme apprenticeship training and part-time classes for industrial workers were introduced in the district.

4.10-Miscellaneous

Under this major head of development Rural broadcasting facilities were provided in 34 villages and Rs. 40,000 were spent for provision of radio sets and other facilities.
