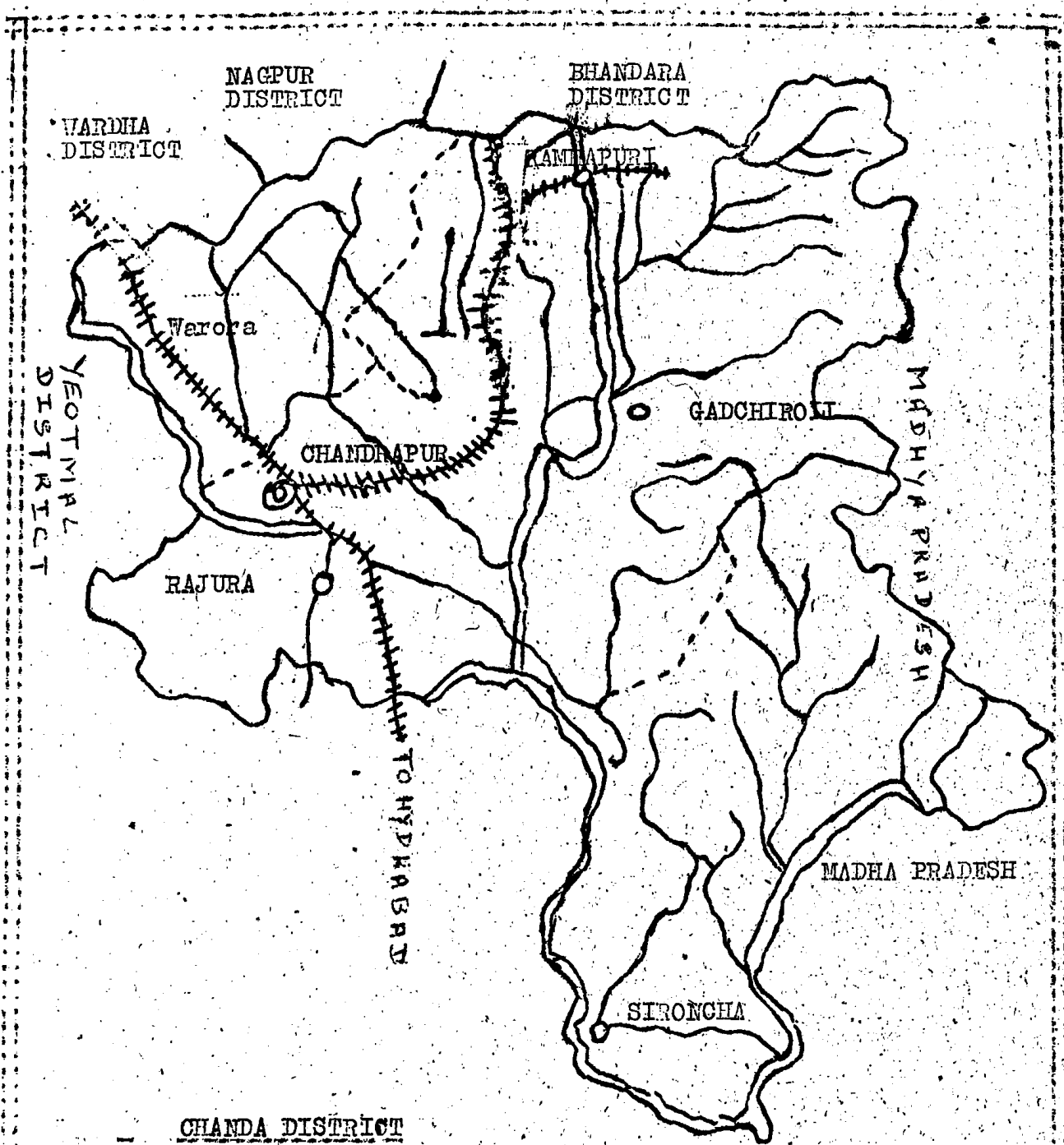

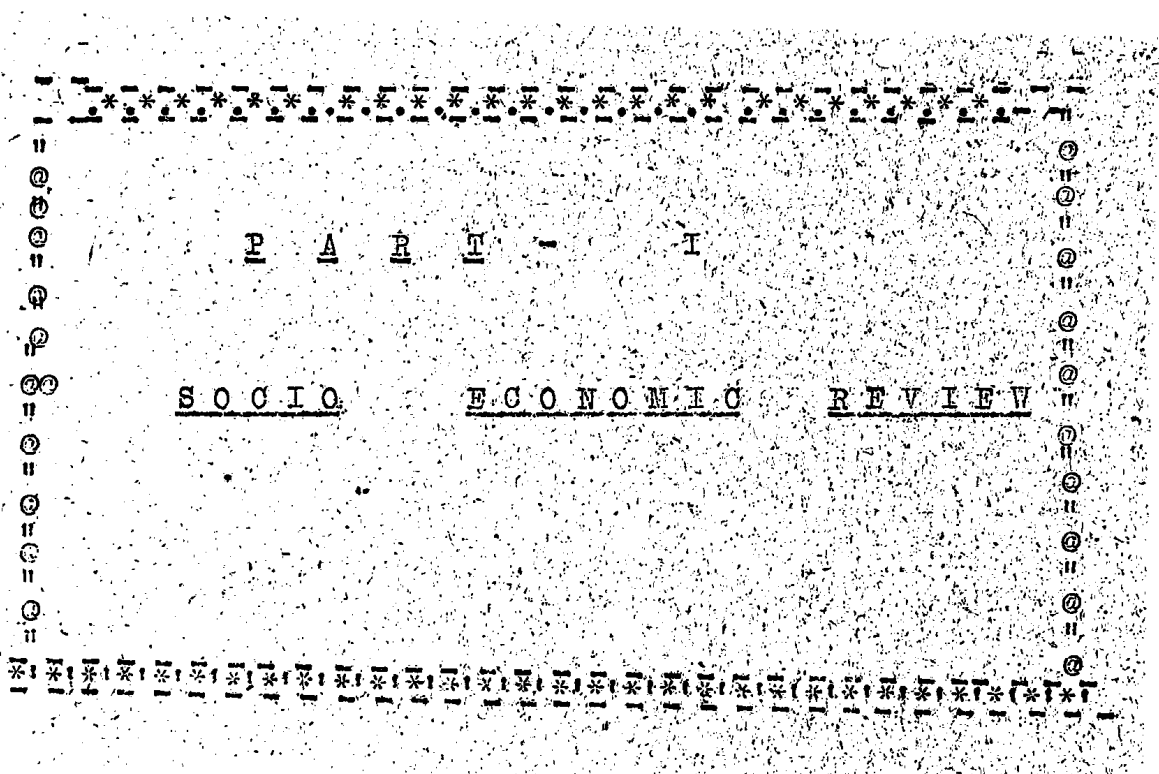

CHAPTER I

I. Introduction.

1.1 Brief history & Location.

Chandrapur district forming part of the kingdom of Raghuji Bhonsle was finally Annexed by the East India Company in 1854. The Bhonsle dynasty had acquired the district from the Gond Kings and ruled the territory from 1751 to 1853 when Raghuji Bhonsle died heirless in 1853 and Nagpur district was created for administrative purposes by the Company. Prior to the reign of Bhonsle dynasty the district was under the rule of Gond Kings from about 1240 to 1751. The Gond King Ballarshah founded the Chanda fort. The early history of Chandrapur district, prior to the rule of the Gond Kings, has to be pieced together from different inscriptions found in the district. The Gond Kings occupied this territory from Mana Kings of Wairagarh. Earlier to Manas Buddhist Kings known as Kosala Kings were ruling over this part whose capital according to one source was Chandrapur and from the other sources was at Bhadrawati and Wairagarh. However it is in connection with Kosalas that we arrive at the first authentic historical record in the history about the district. Hsiun Tsiang, the Chinese Pilgrim records that he visited the capital of Kosalas in 639 A.D. It is also conjectured that a strong Kingdom ruled in the early days at Bhadrawati with flourishing civilisation existing there.

Chandrapur district lies in the Godavari basin and was formed as an independent district in 1854. Upto 1874 the district comprised only of three thasils of Mul, Warora and Bramhapuri. In 1874 upper Godavari district of Madras was abolished and four talukas were adjoined to Chandrapur district to form one tahsil with Sironcha as its headquarters. The Zamindari estates from Bramhapuri and Chandrapur were merged into a new Tahsil with headquarters at Gadchiroli. In 1907 three tahsils of Cherala, Albaka and Nagur were transferred to Madras State.

In 1956 with the reorganisation of States the district was transferred from former Madhya Pradesh to Biligval Bombay State.

Rajura tahsil of Nanded district was transferred to Chandrapur district in March 1959 and was notified as an independent district and division under the Collector, Chandrapur and the Commissioner, Nagpur Division Nagpur respectively. Now it has become a Tahsil of the Chandrapur District under the Collector Chandrapur and its connection with the Aurangabad Division is completely revised.

The District with a population comprising the Marathas, Telugu, and Gonds is of peculiar interest from a linguistic and anthropological point of view. It has also many other claims to distinction. In mineral wealth it is remarkably rich, it possesses vast forests and its area under Govt. Forests is bigger than the

entire area of a few other districts in Maharashtra.

Its system of agriculture is usually varying and in some respect unique in the Division. The system of irrigation is very extensive and its sporting possibilities, though no longer what they were in the past, are still unsurpassed in few parts of the country.

The district lies between  $18^{\circ} 41'$  and  $20^{\circ} 50'$  north latitude and  $78^{\circ} 48'$  and  $80^{\circ} 55'$  east longitude.

#### 1.2 Boundaries.

Chandrapur district is bounded by Wardha, Nagpur and Bhandara districts on the north, Madhya Pradesh on the east, Andhra Pradesh on the south and the South west, Yeotmal and Wardha districts towards the west and north west. The whole of the Western and Southern border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha, the Pranhita and the Godavari rivers. The Indrawati river flows along south east boundary of the District.

#### 1.3 Administrative set up.

The Wainganga river cuts the district into two halves. The eastern portion comprises, Sironha and Gadchiroli Talukas, which are in the term of area, two largest talukas in the State, occupying together 59.1 % the total area of the district. The western portion consists of four talukas of Bramhapuri, Chanda, Rajura.

and Warora and accounts for the remaining 40.9 % of the area of the district. Administratively the district is presently divided into the six talukas or Revenue Divisions. The area, number of towns, 1961 population and the percentages of area and population of each taluka are shown in the following table :-

The district forms part of the Nagpur Division and the Collector is its administrative head. He is assisted by Resident Deputy Collector in his Office and six Deputy Collectors known as Sub-Divisional Officers who hold the charge of six revenue sub-divisions and have their headquarters, at each of the six

Taluka headquarters. The Sub-divisional Officer is assisted by one Tahsildar and few Naib-Tahsildars depending upon the size of the Tahsil and volume of work. The Tahsil is divided into revenue circles and further sub-divided into patwari halkas comprising 4 or 5 revenue villages in each.

Zilla Parishad Set-up :-

With a view to promote democratic decentralisation and to secure greater participation by the people in development plans and local Government affairs, the Government of Maharashtra enacted the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samiti Act of 1962 to establish in each district an autonomous institution of Zilla Parishad at the district level and Panchayat Samities at the Taluka or Block level.

Accordingly a Zilla Parishad and 18 Panchayat Samities were established. The Zilla Parishad covers the entire district except Municipal towns. Sasti urban area which does not have a Municipal council is, however, included under the Jurisdiction of Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samiti concerned. The Zilla Parishad covers 99.79 percent of area<sup>s</sup> of the district and 97.70 percent of its total population.

The Zilla Parishad consists of 51 elected councillors and out of them 3 seats are reserved for scheduled castes and 8 for scheduled tribes. In addition a woman councillor has been coopted by the elected councillors. There are five associate councillors who are chairmen of the five federated cooperative societies-

conducting business in the district. The elected chairman of panchayat Samities are also ex-Officio councillors.

The Panchayat Samiti at the Block level consists of all elected and coopted councillors from the area of the block and a chairman of Cooperative society conducting the business of purchase or sale of agricultural produce in the area of the Block, as an associate member and a Chairman of a cooperative society conducting business in agriculture in the area of the Block as a coopted member. The Sarpanchas elected by members of village panchayats are also elected members of panchayat Samiti. Two sarpanchas from each electoral division in the area of the Block are thus returned to each panchayat Samiti.

The first election of the Zilla Parishad was held in 1962 and after the term of five years, second election was held in 1967. The Third elections of the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities were held in 1972. The President and Vice President have been elected by the elected councillors.

A senior officer of I.A.S. scale works as Chief Executive Officer to execute powers and functions of the Zilla Parishad. The Block Development Officers act as Secretaries to the Panchayat Samities. The Zilla Parishad functions through a standing committee, presided over by the President and seven subject committees for Education, Finance, Health, Works, Agriculture Cooperation and Social Welfare. Two Committees are



presided over by the vice president and other five by the three Chairmen elected by the Z.P. Thus the two elected Chairmen have to preside two subject committees each while Committee for Social Welfare is under one Chairman only. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer, works as Secretary of the Standing Committees and District Heads of Departments as Secretaries to the Subject committees concerned.

#### 1.4 Area .

Chandrapur district has a total area of 25521 square kilometres (9900 square miles). The length at the northern extremity from east to west is about 192 kilometres while the length from Southern point to the northern base is about 240 kilometres. In terms of area the district is the biggest in the whole of Maharashtra.

#### 1.5 Topography.

The District is broader on the north and gradually tapers down towards the south. Topographically the district can be divided into the following four Zones :-

1). The plain fertile region in the west in the Wardha valley with its rich black soil and moderate rainfall with Cotton, Jowar and Wheat as the main crops. This Zone includes western half of Warora and Chandrapur talukas and the whole of Ratnara taluka and accounts for about one sixth of the total area of the district.

2). The western upland hilly region between Wardha and Wainganga basins. It comprises parts of Wamona and Chandrapur taluka and a major part of Bramhapuri taluka. It has sandy soil and sufficient rainfall. Rice, Jowar and irrigated sugercane are the main crops. Numerous hills have facilitated the construction of tank for irrigation purposes. This Zone makes about one-sixth of the area of the district.

3). The Wainganga basin - This Zone comprises of the eastern parts of Bramhapuri and Chandrapur talukas and western part of Gadchiroli talukas. It has the fertile black soil, sufficient rainfall, rice being the main crop.

4). The eastern uplands - This region comprises of major part of Gadchiroli Taluka, and the whole of Sironcha taluka. It is hilly and has thick forests, heavy rainfall, and large tribal population. Rice is the main crop. It makes nearly half of the total area of the district.

#### 1.6 Hills, River system, Soil etc. :-

The soil of the district falls into clearly defined tracts and each of these tracts display cropping pattern of a wholly different kind. The most fertile tracts are found in the Wardha and in the Wainganga valleys. The varieties of soil in the district are numerous and are known by many local names but they could be grouped under the following representative classes, namely Kali, Kanhar, Barsi Kanhar, Morand,

Khurdi, Wardi, Retari or Bardi, Pandhari and Kachhar which is found in Sironcha taluka along the banks of the Godawari.

On the extreme west, on the left bank of the Wardha and subsequently the Godavari, there is a broad strip of black soil known as Kali. Retentive of moisture and suitable for cotton, Wheat Gram, Jowar and linseed. Further in the interior but immediately adjoining this open tract there is a range of small hills with poorer soil at their feet and in the intervening strips. This soil is of little use without irrigation.

It is an ideal soil rice and sugarcane. Further eastward and on either banks of the Wainganga the black loam reappears and is accompanied by a few rice growing villeges.

Towards the east of Wainganga valley, the soil becomes poor and hills are abundant. Rice is the stable crop of this tract.

The main rivers of the district are the Wainganga, the Wardha, the Pranhita, the Indrawati and the Godawari. The whole of the western border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha. During its course in the south easternly direction the Wardha river receive the Wainganga at village Seoni on the right bank and the Earai on the left. After its confluence with the Wainganga the combined stream is known as Pranhita. The Pranhita joins the Godawari near Sironcha. Further south at the southern corner of Sironcha taluka, the

Indrawati flows into the Godawari along the south-east boundary of the district.

The Wainganga enters the district near the centre of the northern boundary and slices it into two unequal parts, the Western part containing Warora, Chanda, Bramhapuri and Rajura talukas and the eastern part comprises of Gadchiroli and Sironcha talukas.

Save in the extreme south, the Wainganga is the recipient of numerous tributaries on either banks and ultimately received the drainage of the entire central portion of the district. The Chief rivers flowing from north to south, the Kathani/ & the potphodi meeting from the left and the Andhari on the right.

The Wardha, the Wainganga, the Pranhita and the Godawari are the perennial rivers of the district.

The whole of eastern portion of the district and the southern portion, all along the eastern border is hilly and forms part of the eastern upland natural zone. The important hill ranges lie in the south.

They are mainly the Tipagrah Range, the Sirkonda near sironcha, the Gadulgatta hills which is a continuation of the eastern Ghats and the Surjagadh hills.

To the southwest of Surjagadh hill, beyond Indrawati river, lies the famous Bhanragadh hill which overlook confluence of three mountain rivers and is noted as an unrivalled beauty spot in the district.

The Tipagrah range rises to an elevation of 609 metres and Sirkonda range is 548 metres above sea-level. The other ranges in Sironcha taluka attain

a height of 609 to 914 metres.

The highest peak in the district is in the Gadulgatta ranges (967 metres). The western upland comprises the the main ranges of Chimur and Hul hills. They are of little height and serve as watersheds between the numerous valleys formed by the tributaries of the Wardha and the Wainganga. The Chimur hills commence east of Chimur in the north of Warora Tahsil and stretch southwards with breaks from north to south with an average elevation of 137 metres above the surrounding plain. The range is 32 Kms. in length and 9.6 kms in breadth. The highest peak is 409 metres.

The Hul hills run east and parallel to Chimur hills and form a boundary between Warora and Bramhapuri Tahsils.

The general height of the plain country is about 274 metres above sea level in the north of the district falling to 200 metres at Chanda and 649.6 at Sironcha.

#### 1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall:-

Chandrapur district is considered to be one of the hottest district of Maharashtra. Chandrapur town the district headquarter is slightly hotter than Nagpur city. The nights are cool upto end of April and are uncomfortable in the months of May and June which are considered to be the hottest months of the year. The immense heat combined with high percentage of humidity due to the large forests in the district makes the climate uncomfortable. Winter is equally severe.

The highest temperature on record is 48.4 degrees centigrade on 18 th May 1897 and the lowest on 10 th January 1899.

May is the hottest month of the year. The temperature recording is done at Chanda, Bramhapuri and Sironcha. During the year 1971 the highest temperature recorded at these centres was 41.3°, 40.40 and 40.1° centigrade respectively. The minimum temperature was 9.80, 10.60 and 11.80 centigrade during the year 1971. Winter is more severe in December.

The South western Monsoons are the Chief source of rain in the district which is divided into three rain fall zones viz. (1) the eastern zone comprising Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Bramhapuri talukas having heavy and assured rainfall, the mean rainfall being about 1524 m.m. or 60 inches, (2) The central Zone comprising Chanda and Rajura talukas with sufficient rains the normal rainfall being 1302 m.m. or 50 inches and (3) The western zone comprising Warora taluka having moderate rainfall, normal rainfall being 1143 m.m. or 45 inches. The monthwise rainfall figures are shown in table no. 8. The rainfall is less in 1971 in three thesils of Chanda, Warora and Rajura while for the Thesils Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Sironcha the rainfall in 1971 is more as compared to 1970.

C H A P T E R - II.

Explanatory notes on the scope and limitation of the Statistical Data presented in the Part II ( Statistical Abstract ).

I. Purpose :- The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important Socio-Economic indicators of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables data for 1971-72 have been indicated while for few tables comparative data for 1970-71 and 1971-72 or even for earlier years. In the tables wherein data for/could not be presented, the same for the latest years, for which they were available, have been shown. In case of population (1961), Livestock (1956) and census of Government employees (1966), however the data for latest Census have been presented. All the data are collected from the State and Central Government Offices, local bodies, and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. District at a Glance :- This table presents a birds eye-view of the Socio-Economic indicators of development in Chandrapur district and Nagpur division, under different heads, such as, area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport -

and communication, plan and C.D. Programme, local bodies and other miscellaneous Statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

III. Contents, Scope & Limitation :- The statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts. The contents of the tables and the scope and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below :-

1. Area and Population :-

In all 7 tables i.e. tables nos. 1 to 7 are included in this section. Data for 1971 population Census for the district as a whole as made available from the Primary Census Abstract of 1971 is given in all the tables except table no. 6 in which case data for 1961 census is given. Reference period of 1971 population census was sunrise of 1 st July 1971.

The table no. 1 indicates area in square Kilometers, number of inhabited and uninhabited villages, number of towns, urban areas, number of occupied residential houses, number of households and sexwise population as per 1971 census for the rural and urban areas for the district as a whole. Talukawise figures are not yet finally released with details; hence they are not included in the table. The area of the district as supplied by the Surveyor General of India is less than area of 1961 census and is therefore is to be treated as provisional.

Table Number 2 shows decadal variation in population of the District since 1901.



Table number 3 gives classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village (i.e. rural area) used in the table denote a statutory recognised village having a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadis or Padas have, therefore, not been shown separately as villages. On the other hand, statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as "uninhabited" villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families. Total sexwise population of the villages in each range is also indicated.

Table number 4 gives demographic details of each of the town and urban area with details of area. Occupied residential houses, no. of households for each of the town or urban area. A town or urban area is defined as a place which has :-

- 1) A Municipality, a cantonment or Civil lines or
- 2)(i) A population of 5000 or over and  
(ii) Atleast 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agriculture pursuits.

The towns having municipalities are suffixed with letter " M " where as the urban areas without municipalities are not suffixed with any letter.

Table No.5 gives number of workers classified into 9 categories alongwith total number of non-workers.

The table no. 6 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother tongue and (C) Religion separately for Rural and Urban areas, and for the district as a whole for the 1961 Census. Such details for 1971 Census are not yet made available. Here "Mother tongue" is defined as a language spoken by the person's mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's classification.

The table no. 7 gives details of literate and educated persons, scheduled caste and Scheduled tribes for rural and urban areas. Talukwise details are not yet available hence only the district totals are shown.

2. Climate :- Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Chandrapur district.

The table No. 8 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1971. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as a "Rainy-day" if during the 24 hours the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. "Normal-rainfall" is the average rainfall over a period for ten years for four centres and of nine years for centres Warora and Rajura.

The table no. 9 gives monthwise 'Maximum' and 'Minimum' and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1971. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological Centre at Nagpur. The maximum and minimum temperature denotes the average of the maximum and minimum temperature recorded daily during the month.

3). Agriculture :-

In all 12 tables i.e. table Nos. 10 to 20-B are included in this section.

The table No. 10 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the years 1969-70 and 1970-71. Against each taluka, the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable wastes, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown. Under 'Forests' are included all actually forest areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether State owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be. Land put to non-agricultural uses stands -

for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railways of under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. 'Barren and unculturable land' covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost is classed as 'barren and unculturable land' whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Culturable waste' includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and Jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Permanent pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. 'Land under miscellaneous tree crops etc, not included in the net area sown' includes all cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casuring tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc. which are not included under 'Orchards' are classed under the category. 'Current fallows' comprise cropped areas, which are kept fallow during

the current year. 'Other fallow' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years. The 'net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The 'gross cropped area' represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total or gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The total no. 12 gives yield per hectare and outturn in hundred metric tonnes for important crops for the years 1969-70 and 1970-71. The yield rates and outturn for 1970-71 are worked out on the revised forecast and may be treated as provisional. The production of sugarcane is in terms of gur while cotton production is in terms of Bales of 180 K.G. each.

The table No. 17 gives the information on Major and medium projects in this district. Both completed and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30th June 1970. The cost of Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 Crores, whereas that of a Major irrigation project, it is Rs. 5/- crores and above.

Table No. 18 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1971. This data is collected

fortnightly throughout the year from three selected Rural centres viz. 1) Sindewahi 2) Hul and 3) Ghugus.

Table No. 20-B is a new table this year which will provide the history of famine and scarcity areas under each Revenue circle in each taluka by giving the no. of villages affected for the years 1867-68 to 1971-72. The data in this table relates to Agriculture year while data for Table 20-A is for financial years. Hence villages affected as given in table 20-A will not tally with 20-B.

4). ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AND FOREST :-

A - Animal Husbandry :- In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos. 21 to 24 are included in this Section.

Table No. 21 gives talukawise number of various types of Livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the Livestock Census, 1966. The Census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the livestock Census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age-groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table.

B. Forest :- The table No. 25(A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the year 1971-72. Data regarding forests under the control of the State Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the State Government's

Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassified forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act, XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production, wherein the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassified forest refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are called leased forests. There is no classification of ex-proprietary forests as such but in Nagpur division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as ex-proprietary. The forest area shown in the Table No. 25(A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in Table No. 9. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

(1) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under Forests, while in Agricultural Statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.

ii) The Forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purposes and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics under Agricultural statistics.

iii) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and Agricultural statistics relate to the agricultural year.

5. Employment, Industry and Electricity :-

In all 11 tables i.e. table Nos. 26 to 36 are included in this section.

The factory statistics shown in Table Nos. 26, 27 and 28 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948. :-

- 1). Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2 (i).
- 2). Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power (Section 2 (ii) and
- 3). Those registered under section 85 of the Act, under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, Statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

The table No. 30 gives occupational distribution of total registration and placement in the employment exchange for the years 1970-71 and 1971-72



according to Standard National Classification.

The table Nos. 32 & 33 present the results of the census of Government employees as on 1.7.1966. Conducted by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics Bombay. The data presented in these tables are restricted to the Class I, II, III and IV employees of the State Government and do not cover any other category such as work-charged personal, Class IV employees paid from contingencies, daily rated workers, Part-time workers of honorary workers. The distribution of employees according to specified basic pay/emoluments ranges is shown separately in respect of Class I, II, III and IV employees.

The distribution of the employees according to monthly pay and emolument ranges is shown in Table No. 32 while no. of employees in each Department is given in table 33.

#### 6. Co-operation :-

In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos. 37 to 44 are included in this section.

The table No. 39 gives talukawise number of primary agricultural credit societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced for the year 1971-72. 'Working Capital' includes paid up capital deposits and borrowings. Loans outstanding include outstanding in respect of loans, Cash credits and overdrafts and

the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' referred to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

The table No.44 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during 1971-72. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the State are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money Lenders Act, 1946. According to the Act, no money lenders shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence, and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence. The registered Money lenders numbered 369 in the year 1971-72 but the information of loans advanced is not received from all of them. Hence information for loans advanced to traders and non-traders as given in cols. 4, 5 and 6 of the table 44 relates to 165 money lenders who have submitted the returns.

#### 7. Medical and Public Health :-

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 45 to 49 are included in this section.

The table No. 45 given in this section indicates talukawise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary Health centres, doctors, nurses, vaidyas, beds and total

number of indoor and outdoor patients treated for the year 1971. The table covers all the State and Central Government medical institutions, and also institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are, however, not included in the table. The information about Patients treated does not include information for 6 institutions (dispensaries) who have not furnished the data.

The table No. 46 gives vital Statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sexwise classification of births, deaths and infant deaths for 1970 and 1971 is presented for each Taluka. A new table (49) on Family planning performance for the year 1971-72 in the district is given in the Abstract.

#### 8). Education :-

In all 7 tables i.e. Table 50 to 56 are included in this section.

The table No. 50 gives sexwise number of literates and percentages of literacy separately for rural and urban areas and for males and females.

As per 1971 Census definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language.

The table No. 53 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the years 1969-70 and 1970-71. Sexwise Enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these

institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many Secondary Schools, which also impart education in primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrolment of students is included under 'Secondary' education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV or standards I to VII/VIII or less and teach the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The secondary institutions coach students for Standard VIII to X or XI/XII with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary School Certificate Examination, which leads to a Degree examination.

The table No. 54 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as Scheduled caste, Scheduled-Tribes and other backward classes for the year 1971-72. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships, freeships etc.

#### 9. Transport and Communications :-

In all 7 tables i.e. table Nos. 57 to 63 are included in this Section.

The table No. 57 gives total railway length as at the end of March 1972 according to type of routes Broad Gauge, Meter Gauge and Narrow Gauge,

The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each type of route are, therefore, approximate and not accurate.

The table No. 60 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Nagpur Division. For this table, the S.T. Division comprises of 1). Nagpur 2). Bhandara 3). Wardha and 4). Chandrapur districts of Nagpur region.

The table No. 61 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted in Building and Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. Data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count-post. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

10). Local Bodies -

In all 4 tables i.e. tables No.s 64 to 67 are included in this Section.

The Table No. 64 gives Abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as Village Panchayat, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years 1971-72. The number of village panchayats includes number of independent Village Panchayats as well as group Village Panchayats.

11). Plan and Community Development :-

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 68 to 72 are included in this Section.

12). Prices :-

Only 3 tables i.e. tables Nos. 73, 74 and 75 are included in this Section.

Table No.73 is a new addition this year which gives month and spot wholesale prices per quintal for the important commodities for the year 1971-72 for each of the regulated market.

The Table No. 74 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarter Chandrapur. The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1971 alongwith units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted.

The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Office, every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average price of each commodity for the year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one location and that too only from one shop at District Headquarter, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table No.75 gives consumer price index numbers (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the Office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the year

1971-72 commencing from April and also average for the year 1971-72 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index (new series) is 1960. The Index Numbers of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Adviser to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India revised series (1956) issued by the Office of the Economic Adviser to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index Numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as Multiplier.

13). Miscellaneous :-

In all 12 tables i.e. Table 76 to 87 are included in this Section.

The table No. 79 gives talukwise Cinema Statistics for the year 1971-72. Number of permanent, Semi-Permanent and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show has been indicated in the table.

CHAPTER - III.

Important Indicators of Development-

In this Chapter an attempt has been made to present certain important indicators of development by presenting certain selected trends to indicate the impact of development and the disparities, if any, between talukas. The indicators worked out show the comparative position during the year 1960-61 the year before the commencement of the Third Five year Plan and the year 1971-72 or 1970-71 in a few cases, where data for the year 1971-72 is not available.

Indicator No. 1 :- Percentage of gross area sown to net area sown.

The proportion of gross cropped area to the net cropped area indicates the extent of area sown more than once. The double cropping is solely related to availability of irrigation facilities, assured and sufficient rainfall during monsoon and the moisture retentive capability of soil for the growth of a second crop in Rabi. The district has got sufficient scope for double cropping as the moisture in the paddy fields irrigated during the Kharif season enable the growth of a second crop like wheat, gram, lakh and linseed. The district has got a large number of small size tanks but all these tanks are only able to irrigate paddy in the Kharif season and very few tanks could provide irrigation for Rabi crops. Hence double irrigated crop is not very much practiced and only second crop is taken on the irrigated rice fields. Comparative percentages of gross area sown to



net area sown for the years 1960-61 and 1970-71 are given in the table below. It can be seen from the figures given below that the position of the second crop has not changed over this decade. The percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown has increased very negligibly i.e. from 107.76 in 1960-61 to 108.82 in 1970-71.

The percentage of double cropping is more in paddy growing areas where paddy is followed by wheat, gram, kultha and lakhs as a second crop. As such the percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area is higher in the three Thesils of Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Chandrapur predominantly growing paddy. These talukas also fall under assured and high rainfall Zone. Rajura Taluka does not have any area under double cropping while Warora and Sironcha talukas have very negligible proportion.

Indicator No. 2 :- Productivity of important crops.

The production of a crop depends upon area occupied by that crop, fertility of Soil. Climatic conditions such as adequate and timely rains and absence of crop diseases etc. Higher production is also achieved by adoption of improved agricultural practices such as usage of improved, hybrid and high yielding seeds, adoption of fertilizers, application of pesticides to check spread of diseases and irrigating the crops. Within the district with the fertility of the Soil remaining more or less the same, the production of crops is affected by the second and third factors mentioned above besides usage of improved seeds and improved practices. Since 1961 upto 1969-70 the weather conditions remained more or less favourable to the crop growth the percentage increase in production of crops over 1960-61 level surpassed the corresponding increase in area under these crops over 1960-61 level. Moreover in certain cases the production showed an increase in 1969-70 <sup>over</sup> 1960-61 whereas there was a reduction in area in 1969-70 over 1960-61 level. The year 1970-71 is not a good year for the crops when untimely rains or in certain cases late start of monsoon has affected the production of most of the crops except paddy where the percentage increase in production during 1970-71 over 1960-61 surpassed the corresponding percentage increase in area in 1970-71 or 1960-61 level.

This could be possible due to adoption of hybrid and high yielding varieties of Paddy. The table below gives the comparative figures of area and outturn of important crops for the years 1960-61 and 1970-71. The outturn figures are worked out on the forecast figures and are provisionally included in the Abstract.

The above table indicates that production of rice increased by 63.76 percent over 1960-61 level of production while increase in its area is to the extent of 12.89 percent over 1960-61 level. The irregularity in rains during 1970-71 has not affected the growth of paddy crops and additional production of paddy could be

Possible, due to adoption of improved and high yielding seeds and increase in application of fertilizers. The increase in production of gram surpassed the percentage increase in area. This additional yield is possible because the gram is taken on the Paddy fields which are being fertilised for paddy during the Kharif period. The production of sugarcane increased by 33.33 percent in 1970-71 over 1960-61 where as the area under sugarcane in 1970-71 decreased by 37.17 percent over 1960-61 level. The late rains and untimely rains at the end of the period affected adversely the growth of Jowar, Tur, and Cotton crops especially and the production is far below the 1960-61 level though the area of these crops increased in 1970-71 as compared to 1960-61 level.

Indicator No. 5. Gross value of Agriculture Production.

In absence of the price data this indicator could not be worked out.

Indicator No. 4:- Percentage of Irrigated area.

The district has high percentage of area under irrigation. The paddy is the main crop of the district and is given protected irrigation by way of small tanks and bodies. It occupied 95.59 percentage of total irrigated area during 1970-71.

High percentage of area under irrigation is found in Bramhapuri (42.97), Gadchiroli (23.41) and Chandrapur (21.84) talukas which are paddy growing areas. The percentage of net irrigated area to net

cultivated area slightly rose from 15.81 in 1960-61 to 17.13 in 1970-71. The table below shows talukwise percentage of net irrigated area to net cultivated area.

The practice of taking two successive crops is not in vogue in major part of this district and hence the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area is found to be only 100.82 during 1970-71. Moreover this year the reporting of gross irrigated area in the season and crop report is not proper for the Sironcha, Gadchiroli, and Warora Thesils since the gross irrigated area and net irrigated area is reported equal unlike earlier years. Hence the figures are provisionally included in this Abstract. Comparative figures of percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area for the years 1960-61 and 1970-71 are given below :-

Indicator No. 5 :- Changes in cropping pattern :-

The Chandrapur district mainly grows food crops and has 85.54 percent of the gross cropped area under food crops during 1970-71, and only 14.46 percent of the gross cropped area is under non-food crops during this year. Among food crops rice occupies 32.36 percent of the gross cropped area and 38.42 percent of the total area under food crops in 1970-71. Jowar is the second important food crop accounting for 28.64 percent of the gross cropped area or 33.48 percent of the total area under food crops in 1970-71. Jowar in this district is sown in Rabi season and is known as "Rabi Jowar". Pulses are also sown in considerable proportion accounting for 15.63 percent of the total cropped area in 1970-71. Among non-food crops cotton and oil seeds occupy the major area i.e. 5.11 and 9.00 percent respectively of the gross cropped area and 35.36 & 62.24 percent of the total area under

non-food crops in 1970-71.

The area under coarse grain was quite high in the district i.e. 29.55 of the total gross cropped area during 1970-71 because high percentage of area under Jowar crop. This percentage was high in Warora, Chandrapur and Rajura talukas where the area under Jowar was higher than the area in any other crop. In these talukas oil seeds and cotton are the other important crops. The table below gives taluka-wise percentage of area under important crops to gross cropped area for the years 1960-61 and 1970-71.

The above table shows that there is a marked difference in the cropping pattern of Eastern and Western talukas of the districts. The talukas of Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Sironcha have more than 94 percent of the gross cropped area under food crops while lowest percentage under food crops is found in Rajura taluka i.e. 65.24 in 1970-71. Rice and Jowar are the main food crops of the district while the area under wheat has some significant percentage in Warora taluka. Among non-food crops oil seeds occupy major proportion of area under non-food crops followed by Cotton crop which is grown mainly in Wardra and Rajura talukas.

There is no change in the cropping pattern of the district and talukas since 1960-61. Only noticeable change to some extent is found in Warora and



Rajura Talukas where area under paddy is decreasing reducing the area under Jowar, so also area under cotton is also increasing reducing the area under oil seeds.

As regards the cropping pattern adopted for irrigated crops, it can be seen from the table below that food crops alone are irrigated.

Sironcha Taluka has got only 6 hectares of land under irrigated tobacco and Warora taluka is having 7 hectares of land under cotton.

Indicator No. 6 :- Increase in Agriculture credit and outstanding dues.

The Cooperative movement was primarily started to provide easy credit facilities to the cultivators as the inadequacy and high cost of finance is the major obstacle in the way of rapid development of agriculture. To meet this end, extension of Cooperative

credit to the village level is made by establishing primary agricultural credit societies (Service Cooperatives) which provide short term loans to cultivators to facilitate them to carry out different agricultural operations with more ease and confidence. The increase in agriculture credit through these primary agriculture credit societies is considerable since the Third Plan period. The table below gives the figures of loans advanced by these societies since 1960-61 with percentage increase since that year.

The table above indicates a downward trend in loans advanced for the years 1964-65 to 1966-67. It went up considerable in the years 1967-68, 1969-70 and 1970-71 and remained very low for the years 1968-69 and 1971-72. The loan advances by Agriculture credit societies depend on their position of loan

recovery and extent of loan overdues. During 1971-72 the percentage of recovery was only 39 % and the overdues went upto Rs. 213.62 lakhs as compared to Rs.153.13 lakhs over dues by end of 1970-71. Hence the societies were not be in a position to advance more loans to the defaulters as their borrowing capacity becomes limited due to non-repayment of loans.

The comparative position of loans advanced by the Agriculture credit societies for the years 1970-71 and 1971-72 for each taluka is as follows. There is a considerable fall in loans advanced under each taluka except Sironcha Taluka.

Indicator No. 7 :- Agricultural Wage rates -

Agricultural Labour is one of the important classes of workers. As per 1971 census the numerical strength of Agricultural labour formed 34.45 percent of the total number of workers. The data on agricultural wage rates are being collected from selected cultivators in the three centres viz. Ghugus, Mul, and Sindewahi in Chandrapur district. The data on wage rates from Ghugus centre for the months January 1970 to June 1970 was not collected as the selected cultivator was not supplying the data. However wage rate collection was resumed from this centre from July 1970. The monthly averages of the wage rates collected show that the wage rates in Mul and Sindewahi are higher in 1971 as compared to 1970, for male workers. In Mul centre the wage rates for male workers increased from yearly

average of Rs.2.48 in 1970 to Rs. 3.00 in 1971 while the yearly average wage rates in Sindewahi centre were from Rs. 2.37 in 1970 to Rs. 3.00 in 1971. The wage rates for male labourers were found to be higher in Ghugus centre and remained constant at Rs. 3.50 per worker for both the years. The wage rates for female workers in both Mul and Sindewahi centres were more or less constant at the rate of Rs. 1.00 throughout the year 1971 with exception that in Mul in the heavy season of July 71 the female workers were paid at the rate of Rs. 1.25 per female worker. Thus the wage rates for female workers on an average were found to be lower in 1971 comparatively with 1970. The wage rates for female workers also were found to be higher in Ghugus centre and stood at Rs. 1.25 per female worker during both the years 1970 and 1971. The monthly average wage rates for the three centres during 1970 and 1971 are given below :-

Indicator No. 8 :- Livestock per hectare of land -

Livestock plays an important role in agriculture development as it is the main source of supply of draught power and also manure. The proportion of bovine population per hectare of cultivable area has therefore been worked out for the years 1961 and 1966 and is given below. The 1971 Livestock census figures are not finalised as yet; hence 1971 Livestock Census data could not be utilised for working out this indicator.

For calculating per hectare population of male female of cattles & buffaloes only adults over three years were considered while Total includes all cattles including young ones. Bovine population per hectare of cultivable land was found to be more in



talukas of Sironcha, Gadchiroli and Bramhapuri which form the paddy growing tract of the district where the draught power is required more than the other areas.

Indicator No. 9 Poultry as compared to Population -

Much stress has been given in the plan periods in popularising poultry keeping specially in rural areas for giving additional income to cultivators and to bridge over food shortage. As per 1961 Livestock Census, poultry keeping was flourishing well in Chandrapur district accounting for 319.13 birds per 100 households. Per capita poultry during the year 1961 worked out to 0.66. However poultry in 1966 as per quinquennial census decreased considerably. The per capita poultry in 1966 as per projected population in 1966 (Worked out at 18,89,000) was only 0.20. The table below gives talukewise position of poultry per 100 households in 1961 and 1966. The number of households enumerated in 1961 census has been adopted for working out poultry birds kept per 100 households.

The poultry keeping is very popular in tribal areas as such Gachiroli and Sironda talukas having considerable tribal population showed high averages of poultry birds per 100 households.

Indicator No. 10 :- Per capita consumption of Electricity.

Chandrapur District is having very less spread over of electricity as by end of March 1972, there were only 353 village and 5 towns electrified of total 2755 villages and 5 towns as per 1961 census. The per capita electricity consumption for Domestic purposes as well as total electricity consumption inclusive of all purposes for the years 1960-61 and 1971-72 are given in the table below :-

It can be seen from the above table that the per capita consumption of electricity for the year 1971-72 works out to 90.76 KWH. This is somewhat high because of heavy electricity consumption for Industrial establishments like Ballarpur paper Mill, A.C.C. factory Ghugus and Defence Project, Bhadravati. However the per capita Domestic consumption during 1971-72

is as low as 2.11 KWH. The per capita consumption in 1971-72 works out to 2.11 KWH for Domestic consumption and 90.76 for Total consumption is low as compared to 1970-71 because 1971 population census has been adopted for working out per capita consumption for 1971-72 while for the year 1970-71 the population of 1961 census was applied. Talukawise figures of electricity consumption are not available.

Indicator No. 11 :- Increase in number of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchanges.

The media of employment exchange is being utilised both by employment seekers as well as employers due to increase in number of educated personnel and due to various employment avenues created in the development process both the registrations of employment seekers & Vacancies notified by the employers have increased considerably after 1960-61 i.e. during the Third Plan and the subsequent Annual Plans. The comparative figures of registrations, Vacancies notified and placements for the years 1960-61 and 1971-72 are as follows:-

Thus it can be seen that the registrations in 1971-72 were more by 95.72 % over 1960-61 level while corresponding percentage increase in notification of vacancies and placements is not noticeable widening the gap of unemployed personnel since the increase vacancies notified is only 78.62 percent while placements increased only by 42.17 percent in 1971-72 over 1960-61 level. On the other hand the percentage of placements to the registrations was high in 1960-61 i.e. 13.10 % as compared to 1971-72 when the percentage of placements to the total registrations fell down to 9.5. The employment position is not sound after Third Five Year Plan when new jobs were scarcely created because of limited resources available for undertaking new schemes in the Fourth Five year Plan.

Comparing the employment position during the year 1971-72 and the previous year it can be seen that registrations increased by 23.12 percent during 1971-72 over 1970-71 while vacancies notified increased only by 6.40 percent and conversely the placements fell by 30.54 percent over 1970-71. Indicator No. 12 :- Increase in the outdoor and indoor patients treated.

The data on the indoor and outdoor patients treated in hospitals, dispensaries, primary health centres and maternity homes are given in table no. 45. The data for 6 medical institutions and talukawise figures of patients treated for the years prior to 1963 are not available. The table below gives comparative figures of patients treated during the years 1963 and 1971.

The above table indicates that number of indoor patients treated is at an increase in all the talukas and overall 78.23 percent increase in indoor patient treated is found for the district as a whole during the year 1971. The number of outdoor patients showed decrease in all the talukas except Gadchiroli -

and Chandrapur. The reason for decrease in other talukas might be that for 1963 the outdoor patients treated are abnormally high in these talukas. The over all increase in outdoor patients treated during 1971 is 23.72. This is also found to be low as compared to 1971 because of figures for Leprosy hospital Warora are not available.

Indicator No. 13 :- Increase in number of Students in different categories.

Much stress was given on the development of education under the Social Services during the Plan periods. The Primary education was made compulsory during the Third plan. As such tremendous increase in both the number of Institutions and Pupils attending has been noticed since 1960-61. Remarkable progress was also noticeable in education of girls where the percentage increase in number of students was 183.17 and 265.47 respectively for primary and secondary standards in 1970-71 over 1960-61. The comparative figures of number of students and number of institutions for the years 1960-61 and 1970-71 are given below :-

The above table indicates that primary and Secondary schools have increased by 87.62 and 118.03 percent respectively by March 1971 over the strength as at the end of March 1961 while the percentage increase in students during this decade is 110.18 and 132.16 respectively. The college education facility has also increased enormously by the end of 1970-71 and no. of Colleges increased to 9 as four new Colleges were opened during 1970-71. The percentage increase in students attending Colleges was 1031.48 by the end of 1970-71 over 1960-61 level.

It may also be pointed out here that the no. of primary schools decreased by 5 during 1970-71 as compared to 1969-70 but the number of primary school pupils retained the upward trend while in Secondary education no. of schools have gone up from 112 in 1969-70 to 133 in 1970-71 but the number of boys attending

Secondary schools during 1970-71 decreased over 1969-70 level.

Indicator No.14:- Increase in Road mileage per 100 square Kilometers.

The district lacks very much in a good communication system and by the end of March 1972 there were only 10.41 Kilometers of roads per 100 square Kilometers of area. The position has improved considerably since 1960-61 since the road length per 100 square Kilometers rose from 2.54 Kilometers in 1960-61 to 10.41 in 1971-72. Comparative figures for the years 1960-61 and 1971-72 are given in the table below :-

There is a substantial increase in number of scheduled banks and its branches since 1961 as the number increased from 7 in 1961 to 16 in 1971 percentage increase being 128.57. The Cooperative banks increased by 5 during this period. The comparative position is as follows :-

The prices have increased considerably since 1963. The prices were much more high in the years 1966, 1967 but have gone down slightly in 1968 and 1969 as compared to earlier two years.

The prices of Rice, moongdal, udiddal and groundnut oil in 1971 are more than double the prices prevailing in 1963, while 90 to 100 percent increase is found in the prices of Wheat coarse, Gramdal, Masurdal, and Lutton. As compared to 1970 the prices of all commodities showed an upward trend except the prices of wheat medium, wheat coarse, Gramdal, groundnut, oil and supari where the prices are slightly low than the average prices prevailing in 1970.

CHAPTER - IV

Plan Development .

The phase of plan Development in the country was started in the year 1951 when the First Five Year Plan was launched. Within the broad outlines of the National Plan, State Plans were formulated accommodating various Socio-Economic aspects. The Second and Third plans followed subsequently. The First and Second plans were formulated in such a way that they covered the overall needs of the State and less attention was, therefore, paid to the needs and requirements of small administrative areas such as district though some benefits had been accrued to the districts by schemes thus formulated. However the Third plan widening its scope accommodated to some extent needs of the districts and for the first time District level Plan schemes were accommodated in the State Plan frame. This brought the concept of Plan Development for as small administrative unit as possible.

The Three Five year plans have firmly settled the course of Economic Development in the country and the Fourth Five year plan was to follow immediately after the close of the Third Five year Plan. But the finalisation of the Country's Fourth Five Year Plan <sup>had</sup> been delayed due to various unforeseen circumstances like hostilities, suspension of Foreign credit and fall in export earnings. The intervening period of three years i.e. 1966-67 to 1968-69 was covered under the Annual Plans.

It can be seen that highest provision was made for the Agriculture and allied programmes as the allotment under this Head of Development constitutes 46.2 percent of the total allotment. Next is Social Services where the percentage of allotment is 34.1 followed by Transport and Communication having 12.2 percent of the total provision. During the year 1971-72, Rs. 165.62 lakhs were spent against the provision of Rs. 174.01 lakhs percentage being 95.2. In the subsequent paragraphs financial and physical progress under each sub-head is discussed.

#### I. Agriculture Programme

The whole economy of the State and also of the District is Agriculture oriented. Hence the Agriculture and Allied programmes got a lions share from the total outlay of the District. A provision of Rs. 80.35 lakhs is made available for the programmes under this Head which covers sub-heads of Agriculture production, Soil Conservation, Minor irrigation for

boosting up agricultural production alongwith allied programmes like Animal Husbandry, Forests, Fisheries and Ware housing and Marketing. The sub-head-wise provisions and expenditure under this Head of Development for the year 1971-72 are given below :-

Agricultural Production.

The sub-head of Agricultural production was provided with an allotment of Rs. 10.40 lakhs during the year 1971-72 against which an expenditure of Rs. 9.56 lakhs was incurred over the schemes of Development of existing Taluka seed farms, grant of subsidy for manure production, Distribution of Sann seed for green manuring, horticulture development, Intensive cultivation, construction of Building for Agriculture school and Development scheme for small holders. About 641 Tons

of compost was produced by the municipalities and Gram panchayats during 71-72 while 906 Quintals of Sann seed were distributed for green manuring. Under horticulture development 515 fruit trees were planted during 71-72 bringing 42 acres under horticulture. Intensive cultivation Blocks created earlier are continued and 1.07 lakhs acres of land was brought under intensive cultivation during this year. The work of construction of Agricultural school building was in progress. Two Block for Development of Small holders were taken i.e. Bramhapuri and Nagbhir where application of fertilizers was done in 246 acres and improved seed Land development was taken up in 441 acres were adopted by farmers for 30 acres. About 119 buffaloes were distributed and 100 poultry units were established. An expenditure of Rs. 5.45 lakhs was incurred under this scheme against a provision of Rs. 6.00 lakhs.

#### Minor Irrigation.

Facility of Irrigation is essential for boosting up Agriculture production. The district has presently 15 percent of the gross cropped area under irrigation. There are number of big and small tanks which were under the control of ex-malguzars which required repairs and renovation. During the year 1971-72 Rs. 29.53 lakhs were provided under this sub-head for construction and repairs of minor irrigation tanks and to provide subsidy for Irrigation wells constructed and pump sets installed. Against this provision Rs. 29.66 lakhs were spent during this year. During 71-72 about 164 new wells were constructed and

36 pumpsets were installed. Subsidy worth Rs. 0.75 for well construction and Rs. 0.25 lakhs for pump sets installed was given under construction of minor irrigation scheme work on 6 tanks are in progress under State Sector and 3 tanks were completed during 71-72, while repairs and renovation work on 75 tanks was in progress in Local Sector.

#### Soil Conservation

The Soil conservation programme taken up at the end of the Third Plan in the district is continued and 5195 hectares of land was covered under graded bunding and 1141 hectares under Terracing during 1971-72. An expenditure of Rs. 22.16 lakhs was incurred over this programme during the year under report as against the budget of Rs. 22.42 lakhs utilising 98.9 percent of the budget.

#### Animal Husbandry

A provision of Rs. 0.13 lakhs was made under this sub-head in the local sector during 1971-72 against which Rs. 0.12 lakhs were spent and two new aid centres were established.

#### Dairy Development

Although there was a provision of Rs. 0.17 lakhs for providing assistance to Dairy unions and federation, it could not be utilised as the federation of Dairy Societies is not yet formed in the district.

#### Forests

Chandrapur district has a very vast area under the rich forests and nearly half of the district is covered by the forests. Hence the development of



Forests occupies a prominent place in the development programmes of the district. During the year 1971-72 a provision of Rs. 14.84 lakhs was made available for developments of forests and an expenditure of Rs. 13.14 lakhs was incurred on the 8 plan schemes being implemented in the district. Plantation in 44 hectares under the scheme of farm forestry, 300 hectares under the scheme of Bamboo plantation, 742 hectares under the scheme of plantation of general utility timber and 455 hectares under the scheme of plantation of fast growing species was done during 71-72. An extensive programme of forest Communication is under taken every year and during 71-72 Rs. 4.73 lakhs were spent over the construction of forest roads by completing 35 K.M. of roads. Scheme of development of fodder is undertaken in two divisions and during 71-72 fodder plantation in 16 hectares was completed. Under the scheme of Forest exploitation workshop sheds at Sironcha unit. Amenity of drinking water wells working sheds are being provided to forest labourers under the scheme of Forest labour Welfare. Seven wells were completed during 71-72. The work of developing National Park under the Scheme of Nature conservancy was undertaken and Rs. 0.28 lakhs were incurred.

#### Fisheries -

The programme of fishery development under the Annual plan 71-72 aim at increase in fish production, improvement in Socio-Economic conditions of fishermen by providing them financial assistance-

and supply of fishery requisites at subsidised rates. Preliminary work of construction of Nursery under the scheme of Fish seed production. During 1971-72 about 44.64 lakhs of carp fry were stocked under the scheme of Fish farming in impounded waters. The netting of fish was 509 thousand K.G. under this scheme and subsidy of Rs. 0.19 lakhs was also given. To popularise synthetic rayon for making fishing nets 1118 K.G. of Nylon twine was supplied. Loans worth Rs. 0.08 lakhs was given during 1971-72 and financial assistance worth Rs. 0.33 lakhs was given to the Fishery Cooperatives.

#### Warehousing & Marketing.

Under this head Three market committees were given loans for development of market yards and one market committee was given subsidy for initial expenses during 1971-72 by incurring an expenditure of Rs. 1.29 lakhs. One more grading unit is established during the year 1971-72 and Rs. 0.06 lakhs were spent on the staffs appointed.

#### II. Cooperation and Community Development -

##### Cooperation :-

The cooperative sector is sufficiently strengthened in the Five year plans covering most of the economic activities like agriculture credit, marketing, farming and Labour contracts etc. A provision of Rs. 1.35 lakhs was provided under this sub-head during 1971-72 against which an expenditure of Rs. 1.00 lakhs could be spent. The scheme of "Credit" aims at strengthening the agricultural credit facili-

ties at the village level. Short and <sup>medium</sup> term loans worth Rs. 1.72 crores were distributed by the Primary agriculture credit societies and long term loans worth Rs.0.14 crores. To facilitate the marketing facilities to the Cooperatives financial assistance for construction of large, medium and small sized godowns was provided. Two medium sized and one small sized godowns were completed during 71-72 under the scheme of Development of marketing. The provision of Rs. 0.18 lakhs meant for managerial subsidy for farming societies during 1971-72 remained unutilised as no new farming society was established. Rs. 0.25 lakhs were spent during 1971-72 over the staff scheme of Coordination of secretaries of cooperative societies while financial assistance worth Rs.0.13 lakhs was provided to the Labour contract Societies.

Community Development

The Community Development programme under National Extension Service has been extended to the entire district and by the end of 71-72 following blocks were functioning .

The total expenditure on these blocks was Rs.6.75 lakhs against a provision of Rs. 8.98 lakhs, under the scheme of composite programme for women and Children

three blocks were selected and Rs.0.20 lakhs were spent during 1971-72.

III. Industry and Mining, Small Scale Industries :-

Development programme for Small Scale Industries aim at helping the small scale and cottage industries to overcome the handicaps such as inadequate capital resources, lack of knowledge of modern technique methods of production and improvement of marketing of products. The provision made available for this sub-head during 1971-72 was Rs. 1.46 lakhs against which an expenditure of Rs. 1.85 lakhs was incurred. For the development of handloom industry rebate subsidy for the sale of handloom cloth was continued to be given to the Seven Weavers cooperatives in the district and Rs. 0.36 lakhs were spent. About 22 artisans were given financial assistance worth Rs. 0.80 lakhs under State Aid Industrial rules during 1971-72. Financial Assistance to 4 Societies in the State Sector and 6 Societies under the local sector was also given to the Cooperatives of handicraft workers and Rs.0.69 lakhs were spent during the year.

Transport and Communication -  
Road Development :-

Chandrapur District lacks very much in good communication system. The Road development programme was provided a sum of Rs. 21.26 lakhs in the Annual plan for 71-72 against which an expenditure of Rs. 20.32 lakhs was incurred under the scheme of District roads about 21 K.M. of roads and 7 minor bridges were

completed in the local sector while work on one major Bridge is in progress. About 10. K.M. of Village roads were also completed during 1971-72. Besides Roads work on hilly an inaccessible areas is also in progress and Rs. 0.78 lakhs in the State Sector and Rs. 0.48 lakhs in the local sector were spent during 71-72 and about 11 K.M. of such Roads were completed in 71-72 in the local sector. The Roads of interstate importance were provided a provision of Rs. 0.01 lakhs and Rs. 0.05 lakhs were spent during the year under report. The programme of Block topping the existing roads was also taken up and an expenditure of Rs. 0.51 lakhs was spent during 1971-72. To develop the National Park at Tadoba a sum of Rs. 1.05 lakhs was provided to the Forest Dept. under the sub-head Tourism and Rs. 0.11 lakhs were spent on construction of 2 Nakas. One First Aid centre is also established at Tadoba and One electric generator is purchased.

#### Social Services

The Annual Plans by sufficient stress on the development of education, public Health, Housing, Water supply, Backward class Welfare and Labour Welfare. The Budget and expenditure on various sub-heads under this Head of Development for the year 1971-72 are as under.

The schemes under Public Health are taken under centrally sponsored programme. Hence no provision for sub-head " Public Health " is shown for the State Plan during 1971-72.

Education .

For the promotion of primary education 5 District level schemes were included in the Annual Plan 1971-72. For the extension of Primary education which is made compulsory to the age group 6 to 11 grants of Rs. 1.94 lakhs was given to Zilla-Parishad and Rs.0.61 lakhs to the Municipal Councils. About 75 additional teachers were appointed in the local sector and 24 teachers were appointed by the Municipal Councils. To have a watch on the progress of Primary education 3 Inspecting Officers were appointed. To promote girls education in scheduled areas special-

facilities like provision of states, books etc. are being provided. During 1971-72 the benefit was given to 1040 girls students of scheduled tribes. Grants to the tune of Rs. 1.09 lakhs was given to the local bodies during 1971-72 for the construction of Primary school buildings and 24 school rooms were constructed. Provision of Rs. 0.12 lakhs under the scheme of creation of head masters posts in primary schools could not be utilised as posting of headmasters could not be made due to administrative difficulty. There are about 8 schemes for the development of Secondary education. For the development & expansion of non-government Secondary schools Rs. 20.09 lakhs grants was given to 24 schools. Eleven teachers were appointed under the scheme of upgradation of Primary-cum-middle schools. Zilla Parishad was given grants to the tune of Rs. 1.74 lakhs for the construction of Buildings and class Rooms in 6 schools while loans to Voluntary agencies for construction of Buildings were given and two buildings are completed. About 100 scholarships were given to secondary students incurring an expenditure of Rs. 0.14 lakhs. Expansion of Technical High school is also undertaken by introducing new professional courses. An expenditure of Rs. 0.45 lakhs was incurred during 1971-72. Under the scheme of strengthening of multipurpose schools two posts were filled during 1971-72 under the scheme of providing training facilities to primary teachers about 24 teachers were trained while loan scholarships for teachers training were given to 521

primary teachers. The Gram Sirshan Mohim is continued under the Eradication of illiteracy. During 1971-72, 11,550 adults were made literate. Economically Backward class concessions were given under the Plan scheme to 750 pupils. Rs. 0.09 lakhs were spent under the scheme of Free education to sons and daughters of primary school teachers and Rs. 0.09 lakhs for the scheme of Improvement of science teaching and the posts of Method Master and laboratory Assistants created in 1969-70 are continued.

#### Water Supply & Drainage.

The scheme of Municipal Water supply and drainage schemes were taken up in Ballarpur, Warora and Rajura towns. The drainage scheme of Ballarpur and Water supply scheme at Warora are nearly completed while work is in progress at Rajura.

Piped water supply scheme in the Rural areas was taken up in Mul, Bramhapuri, Sindewahi, Nagbhid and Bhadravati. Out of these works on water supply schemes at Mul and Bramhapuri were completed during 1971-72 while the rest were in progress. Schemes for Sironcha and Armori were under the stage of starting, during 71-72.

In the local sector 5 rural water supply schemes are finalised and work on them will be taken next year. Providing water supply under simple measures by way of Wells also progressed well and 291 Wells were completed during 1971-72 incurring an expenditure of Rs. 9.39 lakhs.



Housing.

Out of the 4 schemes included under this sub-head only the scheme of Extension of Village Gaothans was in progress for which Rs. 2.07 lakhs were spent. Agency for constructing 200 tenements at Ballarpur under the subsidised Industrial Housing was not fixed while the schemes for constructing 100 tenements under Economically weaker section housing and 90 tenements under Low income group housing are not yet administratively approved.

Urban Development.

The provision of Rs. 0.10 lakhs under this sub-head under the scheme of Financial assistance to Municipal Councils for implementation of Development plans remained unutilised as Development Plans of no Municipal Councils in this district are finalised.

Welfare of Backward Classes.

There are about 11 schemes under this sub-head aiming at Social and economic uplift of the Backward classes. Grants were given for the scholarships, Tuition fees and examination fees and about 2032 pupils were benefitted during 1971-72. Four Hostels belonging to Backward classes received grants while Rs. 12 lakhs were spent on the scheme of grant-in-aid for rent to Backward class Hostels. Under the economic uplift programme 25 S.C. & S.T. Beneficiaries were given aid for purchase of improved seed under the scheme of propagation of Improved implements amongst schedule Tribes and Schedule caste. Financial

assistance to 4 Backward class cooperative Societies was given during 1971-72, Rs. two thousand each were spent under the schemes of " Development of land belonging to Scheduled tribes and scheduled caste " and " construction of new irrigation wells & repairs to old ones " during 71-72. Financial Assistance to 30 beneficiaries was given during 1971-72 as a Housing aid to Backward classes. Four Ashram Schools were functioning by end of March 1972 and an expenditure of Rs. 0.82 lakhs was incurred over the scheme of Ashram schools in 1971-72.

Labour Welfare.

Additional courses under the I.T.I. are introduced under the craftsman training scheme and staff is appointed. Rs. 0.53 lakhs were spent during 1971-72.

Miscellaneous.

Under this head Statistical Organisation of Agriculture dept; is strengthened and staff is appointed. Rs. 0.07 lakhs was spent during 71-72. Under the rural broadcasting scheme about 83 radio sets were installed in the rural areas and Rs.1.05 lakhs were spent during 1971-72.
