

C H A P T E R I.

I. Introduction.

1.1 Brief History & Location.

Chandrapur district forming part of the Kingdom of Raghuji Bhonsle was finally Annexed by the East India Company in 1854. The Bhonsle dynasty had acquired the district from the Gond Kings and ruled the territory from 1751 to 1853 when Raghuji Bhonsle died heirless in 1853 and Nagpur district was created for administrative purposes by the Company. Prior to the reign of Bhonsle dynasty, the district was under the rule of The Gond King Ballarshah founded the Chanda fort. Gond Kings from about 1240 to 1751. The early history of Chandrapur district, prior to the rule of the Gond Kings, has to be pieced together from different inscriptions found in the district. The Gond Kings occupied this territory from Mana Kings of Wairagarh earlier to Manes, Buddhist Kings known as Kosala Kings were ruling over this part whose capital according to one source was Chandrapur and from the other sources was at Bhadravati and Wairagarh. However, it is in connection with Kosalas that we arrive at the first authentic historical record in the history about the district. Hsiun Tsiang, the Chinese pilgrim records that he visited the capital of Kosalas in 639 A.D. It is also conjectured that a strong Kingdom ruled in the early days at Bhadravati with flourishing civilisation existing there.

Chandrapur district lies in the Godawari basin and was formed as an independent district in 1854. Upto 1874 the district comprised only of three tahsils of Mul, Warora and Bramhapuri. In 1874 upper Godawari district of Madras was abolished and four talukas were adjoined to Chandrapur district to form one tahsil with Sironcha as its headquarters. The Zamindari estates from Bramhapuri and Chandrapur were merged into a new Tahsil with headquarters, at Gadchiroli. In 1907, three tahsils of Charala, Albaka and Nagur were transferred to Madras State.

In 1956 with the reorganisation of States, the district was transferred from former Madhya Pradesh to Bilingual Bombay State. At present it is a part of Nagpur Division of Maharashtra State since May 1st 1960.

Rajura tahsil of Nanded district was transferred to Chandrapur district in March 1959 and was notified as an independent district and division under the Collector, Chandrapur and the Commissioner, Nagpur, Division, Nagpur respectively. Now it has become a Tahsil of the Chandrapur District under the Collector, Chandrapur and its connection with the Aurangabad Division is completely revoked.

The District with a population comprising the Marathas, Telugu, and Gonds is of peculiar interest from a linguistic and anthropological point of view. It has also many other claims to distinction. In mineral wealth it is remarkably rich, it possesses vast Forests and its area under Govt. Forests is bigger than the entire-

area of a few other districts in Maharashtra.

Its system of agriculture is usually varying and in some respect unique in the Division. The system of irrigation is very extensive and its sporting possibilities, though no longer what they were in the past, are still unsurpassed in few parts of the country.

The district lies between  $18^{\circ}.41'$  and  $20^{\circ}.50'$  north latitude and  $78^{\circ}.48'$  and  $80^{\circ}.55'$  east longitude.

### 1.2 Boundaries.

Chandrapur district is bounded by Wardha, Nagpur and Bhandara districts on the north, Madhya Pradesh on the east, Andhara Pradesh on the south and the South west, Yeotmal and Wardha districts towards the west and north west. The whole of the Western and Southern border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha, the Pranhita and the Godawari rivers. The Indrawati river flows along south east boundary of the district.

### 1.3 Administrative set up.

The Wainganga river cuts the district into two halves. The eastern portion comprises, Sironcha and Gadchiroli Talukas, which are in terms of area, two largest talukas in the State, occupying together 59.1% of the total area of the district. The western portion consists of four talukas of Bramhapuri, Chanda, Rajura and Warora and accounts for the remaining 40.9% of the area of the district.

Administratively the district is presently divided into the six talukas or Revenue Divisions. The area, number of towns, 1971 census population and the percentages of area and population of each taluka are shown in the following table:-

The district forms part of the Nagpur Division and the Collector is its administrative head. He is assisted by Resident Deputy Collector and some Deputy Collectors in his Office and six

Deputy Collectors known as Sub-Divisional Officers who hold the charge of six revenue sub-divisions and have their headquarters, at each of the six Taluka headquarters. The Sub-divisional Officer is assisted by one Tahsildar and few Naib-Tahsildars depending upon the size of the Tahsil and Volume of work. The Tahsil is divided into revenue circles and further sub-divided into Patwari halkas comprising 4 or 5 revenue villages in each.

Zilla Parishad Set-up :-

With a view to promote democratic decentralisation and to secure greater participation by the people in development plans and local Government affairs, the Government of Maharashtra enacted the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samiti Act of 1962 to establish in each district an autonomous institution of Zilla Parishad at the district level and Panchayat Samities at the Taluka or Block level.

Accordingly a Zilla Parishad and 18 Panchayat Samities were established. The Zilla Parishad covers the entire district except Municipal towns. The urban areas such as Ghugus and Sasti which do not have Municipal Councils, however, are included under the Jurisdiction of Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities concerned. The Zilla Parishad covers 99.68 percent of areas of the district and 90.63 percent of its total population.

The Zilla Parishad consists of 51 elected councillors and out of them 3 seats are reserved for scheduled castes and 8 for scheduled

tribes. In addition, a woman councillor has been co-opted by the elected councillors. There are five associate councillors who are chairmen of the five federal Co-operative societies conducting business in the district. The elected Chairmen of Panchayat-Samities are also ex-officio councillors.

The Panchayat Samiti at the Block level consists of all elected and Co-opted councillors from the area of the Block and a Chairman of Co-operative Society conducting the business of purchase and sales of agricultural produce in the area of the Block, as an associate member and a Chairman of a Co-operative society conducting business in agriculture in the area of the Block as a Co-opted member. The Sarpanchas elected by members of village panchayats are also elected members of panchayat samiti. Two Sarpanchas from each electoral division in the area of the Block are thus returned to each Panchayat Samiti.

The first election of the Zilla Parishad was held in 1962 and after the term of five years, Second election was held in 1967. The Third election of the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samities was held in 1972. The President and Vice-President have been elected by the elected councillors.

A senior officer of I.A.S. scale works as Chief Executive Officer to execute Powers and functions of the Zilla Parishad. The Block Development Officers act as Secretaries to the Panchayat-Samities. The Zilla Parishad functions through a standing committee presided over by the President and six subject committees for Education, Finance,



Health, Works, Agriculture, & Co-operation and Social Welfare. Two Committees are presided over by the vice-president and other four by the three Chairmen elected by the Zilla Parishad. Committee for Social Welfare is under one Chairman only. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer, Works as Secretary of the Standing Committees and District Heads of Departments as Secretaries to the Subject committees concerned.

#### 1.4 Area.

Chandrapur district has a total area 25641 square kilometres ( 9900 square miles). The length at the northern extremity from east to west is about 192 kilometres while the length from Southern point to the northern base is about 240 kilometres. In terms of area, the district is the biggest in the whole of Maharashtra State.

#### 1.5 Topography.

The District is broader on the north and gradually tapers down towards the south. Topographically the district can be divided into the following four Zones :-

1). The Plain fertile region in the west in the Wardha valley with its rich black Soil and moderate rainfall with Cotton, Jowar and Wheat as the main crops. This Zone includes western half of Warora and Chandrapur Talukas and the whole of Rajura taluka and accounts for about one sixth of the total area of the district.

2). The western upland hilly region lies between Wardha and Wainganga basins. It comprises parts of Warora and Chandrapur taluka and a major part of Bramhapuri taluka. It has sandy soil and sufficient rainfall. Rice, Jowar and irrigated sugercane are the main crops. Numerous hills have facilitated the construction of tanks for irrigation purposes. This Zone makes about one-sixth of the area of the district.

3). The Wainganga basin- This zone comprises of the eastern parts of Bramhapuri and Chandrapur talukas and western part of Gadchiroli Taluka. It has the fertile black soil, sufficient rainfall and rice being the main crop.

4). The eastern uplands - This region comprises of major part of Gadchiroli Taluka, and the whole of Sironcha taluka. It is hilly and has thick forests, heavy rainfall and large tribal population. Rice is the main crop. It makes nearly half of the total area of the district.

#### 1.6 Hills, River system, Soil etc.:-

The soil of the district falls into clearly defined tracts and each of these tracts display cropping pattern of a wholly different kind. The most fertile tracts are found in the Wardha and in the Wainganga valleys. The varieties of soil in the district are numerous and are known by many local names but they could be grouped under the following representative classes, viz, Kali, Kanhar, Barsi-kanhar, Norand, Khurdi, Wardi, Retari or Bardi,

Pandhari and Kachhar which is found in Sironcha Taluka along the banks of the Godawari.

On the extreme west, on the left bank of the Wardha and subsequently the Godawari, there is a broad strip of black soil known as Kali which is retentive of moisture and suitable for Cotton, Wheat, Gram, Jowar and linseed. Further in the interior but immediately adjoining this open tract there is a range of small hills with poorer soil at their feet and in the intervening strips. This soil is of little use without irrigation.

It is an ideal soil for rice and sugarcane. Further eastward and on either banks of the Wainganga the black loam reappears and is accompanied by a few rice growing villages.

Towards the east of Wainganga valley, the soil becomes poor and hills are abundant. Rice is the staple crop of this tract.

The main rivers of the district are the Wainganga, the Wardha, the Pranhita, the Indrawati and the Godawari. The whole of the western border is uninterruptedly bounded by the Wardha. During its course in the south easterly direction, the Wardha river receives the Wainganga at village Seoni on the right bank and the Earai on the left. After its confluence with the Wainganga the combined stream is known as Pranhita. The Pranhita joins the Godawari near Sironcha. Further south at the southern corner of Sironcha taluka, the Indrawati flows into the Godawari along the south east boundary of the district.

The Wainganga enters the district near the centre of the northern boundary and slices it into two unequal parts, the Western part containing Warora, Chanda, Bramhapuri and Rajura talukas and the eastern part comprising of Gadchiroli and Sironcha talukas.

Save in the extreme south, the Wainganga is the recipient of numerous tributaries on either banks and ultimately received the drainage of the entire central portion of the district. The Chief Rivers flowing from north to south, the Kathani & the potphodi meeting from the left and the Andhari on the right.

The Wardha, the Pranhita and the Godawari are the perennial rivers of the district.

The whole of eastern portion of the district and the southern portion, all along the eastern border is hilly and forms part of the eastern upland natural zone. The important hill ranges lie in the south. They are mainly the Tipagrah Range, the Sirkonda near Sironcha, the Gadulgatta hills which is a continuation of the eastern Ghats and the Surjagadh hills.

To the south-west of Surjagadh hill, beyond Indrawati river, lies the famous Bhamragadh hill which over-look confluence of three mountain rivers and is noted as an unrivalled beauty spot in the district.

The Tipagarh range rises to an elevation of 609 metres and Sirkonda range is 548 metres above sea level. The other ranges in Sironcha taluka attain a height of 609 to 914 metres.

The highest peak in the district is in the Gadulgatta ranges (967 metres). The western land comprises the main ranges of Chimur and Mul hills. They are of little height and serve as watersheds between the numerous valleys formed by the tributaries of the Wardha and the Wainganga. The Chimur hills commence east of Chimur in the north of Warora Tahsil and stretch south-wards with breaks from north to south with an average elevation of 137 metres above the surrounding plain. The range is 32 Kms. in length and 9.6 Kms. in breadth. The highest peak is 409 metres.

The Mul hills run east and parallel to Chimur hills and form a boundary between Warora and Bramhapuri Tahsils.

The general height of the plain country is about 274 metres above sea level in the north of the district falling to 200 metres at Chanda and 649.6 at Sironcha.

#### 1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall :-

Chandrapur district is considered to be one of the hottest district of Maharashtra. Chandrapur town, the district headquarters is slightly hotter than Nagpur city. The nights are cool upto end of April and are uncomfortable in the months of May and June which are considered to be the hottest months of the year. The immense heat combined with high percentage of humidity due to the large forests in the district makes the climate uncomfortable. Winter is equally severe.

The highest temperature on record is 48.4 degrees centigrade on 18 th May 1897 and the lowest on 10 th January, 1899.

Generally May is the hottest month of the year. The temperature recording is done at Chanda, Bramhapuri and Sironcha. During the year 1973 the highest temperature recorded at these centres was 45.5° , 44.6° and 44.5° centigrades respectively. The minimum temperature was 13.6°, 13.8° and 13.6° centigrades during the year 1973. Winter is more severe in December.

The South western Monsoons are the Chief source of rain in the district which is divided into three rain-fall zones viz. (1) The eastern zone comprising Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Bramhapuri talukas having heavy and assured rain-fall, the mean rainfall being about 1524 m.m. or 60 inches. (2) The central Zone comprising Chanda and Rajura talukas with sufficient rains the normal rainfall being 1302 m.m. or 50 inches. (3) The Western Zone comprising Warora taluka having moderate rainfall, normal rainfall being 1143 m.m. or 45 inches.

C H A P T E R - II

(Explanatory notes on the scope and limitations of the Statistical Data presented in the Part II Statistical Abstract.)

I. Purpose :- The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important Socio-Economic indicators of development.

Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the Tables, data for 1973-74 have been indicated while for few tables comparative data for 1972-73 and 1973-74 or even for earlier years are given. In the tables wherein data for 1973-74 could not be presented, the same for the latest years, for which they were available, have been shown. In case of population 1971 and Livestock 1972, the data for latest Census have been presented. All the data are collected from the State and Central Government - Offices, local bodies, and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. District at a Glance :- This table presents a birds eye-view of the Socio Economic indicators of development in Chandrapur district and State under different heads, such as, area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication, plan and C.D. Programme, Local bodies and other miscellaneous Statistics.

Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

**III. Concepts, Scope and Limitations :-** The Statistical tables presented in the District Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts. The concepts of the tables and the scope and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below :-

1. **Area and Population :-** In all 7 tables i.e. table No.s 1 to 7 are included in this section. Data for 1971 population Census for the district as a whole as made available from the Primary Census Abstract of 1971 is given in all the tables. Reference period of 1971 population Census was sunrise of 1 st July 1971.

The table no.1 indicates area in square Kilometres, Population density in Sq.Km; number of inhabited and uninhabited villages, number of towns, number of occupied residential houses, number of households and sexwise population as per 1971 census for the rural and urban areas for the district as a whole. The area of the district as supplied by the Surveyor General of India is less than the area of 1961 census and is, therefore, to be treated as provisional.

Table number 2 shows decadal variation in population of the District since 1951.

Table number 3 gives classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village (i.e. rural area) used in



the table denote a statutory recognised village having a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadis or Padas have, therefore, not been shown separately as villages. On the other hand, statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as "uninhabited" villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly of forest labourers and their families. Total population of the villages in each range is also indicated.

Table number 4 gives classification of towns and urban area according to different population ranges. Total population of the towns and urban area in each range is also indicated. A town or urban area is defined as<sup>a</sup> place which has :-

- 1) A Municipality, a contonment or Civil lines or
- 2) (i) A Population of 5000 or over and (ii) Atleast 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

The towns having municipalities are suffixed with letter "M" whereas the urban areas without municipalities are not suffixed with any letter. Table No.5 gives number of workers classified in to 9 categories alongwith total number of non-workers.

Table No.6 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group and (B) Religion separately for Rural and Urban areas, and for the district as whole as per 1971 Census.

The table no.7 gives details of scheduled castes and Scheduled tribes for rural and urban areas and district as a whole.

2. Climate :- Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Chandrapur district.

The table No.8 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1973. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as a "Rainy day" if during the 24 hours, the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. "Normal rainfall" is the average rainfall over a period for ten years for four centres and of nine years for centres Warora and Rajura.

Table No. 9 gives monthwise "Maximum" and "Minimum" and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1973. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological Centre at Nagpur. The maximum and minimum temperature denotes the maximum and minimum temperature recorded daily during the month.

### 3). Agriculture :-

In all 12 tables i.e. tables No.s 10 to 21 are included in this section.

The table No.10 indicates talukwise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the years 1971-72 and 1972-73.

Against each taluka the break-up of the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable wastes, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown. Under 'Forests' are included all actually forest areas of lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether State owned or Private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be.

'Land put to non-agricultural uses stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses, other than agriculture. - 'Barren and uncultivable land' covers all barren and uncultivable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost is classed as 'barren and uncultivable land' whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Cultivable waste' includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken<sup>up</sup> for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and Jungles

which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Permanent pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head. 'Land under miscellaneous tree crops etc, not included in the net area sown' includes all cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc; which are not included under 'Orchards' are classed under the category.

'Current fallows' comprise of cropped areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. 'Other fallow' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years. The 'net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The 'gross cropped area' represents the sum total of area under all crops. The difference between the total gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

The table No.12 gives yield per hectare and outturn in hundred metric tonnes for important crops for the years 1971-72 and 1972-73. The yield rates and outturn for 1972-73 are worked out on the

revised forecast and may be treated as provisional. The production of sugarcane is in terms of cum while cotton production is in terms of bales of 180 Kgs. each.

The table No.17 gives the information on Major and medium projects in this district. Both completed and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30 th June, 1973. The cost of Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs.20 lakhs to Rs.5 Crores, Whereas that of a Major irrigation project, it is Rs.5/- crores and above.

Table No.18 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1973. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected Rural centres viz. 1) Sindewahi 2) Mul and 3) Ghugus from January 73 to August 73 and 4) Kothari from September 73 to December 1973. As per 1971 census Ghugus is declared as urban area and hence this centre is changed subsequently from September, 1973 and Kothari centre is selected for rural price collection onwards.

Table No.21 will provide the history of famine and scarcity areas under each Revenue circle in each taluka by giving the no.of villages affected for the years 1968-69 to 1973-74. The data in this table relates to Agriculture year while data for Table 20 is for financial year. Hence villages affected as given in table 20 will not tally with table 21.

4) ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AND FOREST :-

A- Animal Husbandry :- In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 22 to 26 are included in this Section.

Table No.22 gives talukawise number of various types of Livestock and Poultry as enumerated in the district in the Livestock Census, 1972. The census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. However, the Livestock census, 1972 was conducted after a period of 6 years. During the livestock Census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry. Particular care was taken to enumerate livestock and slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age- groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table.

B. Forest :- The table No.26 (A) gives details of area in different types of Forests during the year 1973+74. Data regarding forests under the control of the State Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the State Government's Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under Forests are classified according to Legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act, XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production, where in the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed.

In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid, Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forest refer to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or Private individuals for management on lease basis are called leased Forests'. There is no classification of Ex-proprietary forests as such but in Nagpur division some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as ex-proprietary. The Forest area shown in the Table No.26 may not tally with the area under Forest shown in Table No.10. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

- (i) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooden area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under Forests, while in Agricultural Statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.
- (ii) The Forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose to indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department, as it is in the land utilisation statistics under Agricultural statistics.
- (iii) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and Agricultural statistics relate to the agricultural year.

5. Employment, Industry and Electricity :-

In all 9 tables i.e. table Nos. 27 to 35 are included in this section.

The factory statistics shown in Table No.s 27, 28 & 29 cover following types of factories registered under the Factories Act, 1948 :-

- 1). Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2 (i)).
- 2). Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid of power (Section 2 (ii) and
- 3). Those registered under section 85 of the Act, under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, Statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

The table No. 32 gives occupational distribution of total registrations and placements in the employment exchange for the year 1973-74 and according to Standard National Classification.

6. Co-operation :-

In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos. 36 to 43 are included in this section.

The table No. 38 gives talukawise number of primary agricultural credit societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and recovered, loans outstanding and over dues and percentage of recovery



to total loan advanced for the year 1973-74.

'Working Capital' includes paid up share capital, deposits and borrowings. Loans outstanding include outstanding in respect of loans, Cash credits and overdrafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' referred to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

The table No.43 gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during 1973-74. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the State are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money lenders Act. No money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence, and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence. The information for loans advanced to traders and non-traders as given in cols. 4,5 & 6 of the table 43 relates to those money lenders who have submitted the returns.

#### 7. Medical and Public Health :-

In all 5 tables i.e. tables Nos. 44 to 48 are included in this section.

The table No.44 given in this section indicates talukawise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary -

Health centres, doctors, nurses, vaidyas, beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated for the year 1973. The table covers all the State and Central Govt. medical institutions, and also institutions owned by municipalities and local bodies engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are, however, not included in the table.

The table No.45 gives vital Statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district for the year 1973. Table 48 relates to Family Planning performance for the year 1973-74 in the district.

#### 8). Education :-

In all 5 tables 49 to 55 (except Table Nos. 50 & 51) are included in this section.

The Table No.49 gives sexwise number of literates and percentages of literacy separately for rural and urban areas and for males and females. As per 1971 Census definition, a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language.

The table No.52 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the year 1972-73. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many Secondary-

Scjools, which also impart education in primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrolment of students is included under 'Secondary' education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV or standards I to VII/VIII or less and teach the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions coach students for Standard VIII to X or XI/XII with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary School Certificate Examination, which leads to a Degree examination.

The table No 53 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as Scheduled caste, Scheduled Tribes and Other backward classes for the year 1972-73. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships, freeships etc.

### 9. Transport and Communications :-

In all 7 tables i.e. table Nos. 56 to 62 are included in this Section.

The table No. 56(A) gives total railway length as at the end of March 1974 according to type of routes - Broad Gauge, Meter Gauge and Narrow Gauge. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each type of route are, therefore, approximate and not accurate.

The table No.59 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Nagpur Division. For this table, the S.T. Division comprises of 1). Nagpur 2). Bhandara 3). Wardha and 4). Chandrapur districts of Nagpur region.

The table No.60 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted by Building and Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra. Data of the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count-post. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

10). Local Bodies :-

In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos.63 to 66 are included in this Section.

The table 63 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as Village - Panchayat, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years from 1965-66 to 1973-74. The number of village panchayats includes number of independent village Panchayats as well as group Village Panchayats.

11). Plan and Community Development :-

In all 5 tables i.e. table Nos. 67 to 71 are included in this Section.

12). Prices :-

Only 3 tables i.e. table Nos. 72, 73 & 74 are included in this Section.

Table No.72 gives month and spot whole-sale prices per quintal for the important commodities for the year 1973-74 for each of the regulated markets.

The Table No. 73 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district-head quarter, Chandrapur. The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1973 alongwith units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Office, every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average price of each commodity for the year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at District Head quarter, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend in changes in retail prices over the period of time.

The table No. 74 gives consumer price index numbers (revised series) for working class of Nagpur centre published by the Office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the year 1973-74 commencing from April and also average for the year 1973-74 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index (New-Series) is 1960. The Index Numbers of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Adviser to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India revised series (1956).

issued by the Office of the Economic Adviser to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as Multiplier.

13). Miscellaneous :-

In all 11 tables i.e. table 75 to 85 are included in this Section.

The table No. 78 gives talukawise Cinema Statistics for the year 1973-74. Number of Permanent, Semi-Permanent and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show has been indicated in the table.

CHAPTER III.Important Indicators of Development :-

In this Chapter an attempt has been made to present certain important indicators of Development by presenting certain selected trends to indicate the impact of development and the disparity, if any, between talukass. The indicators worked out show the comparative position during the year 1960-61, the year before the commencement of the Third Five Year Plan and the year 1973-74 or 1972-73 in a few cases, where data for the year 1973-74 is not available.

Indicator No. 1 :- Percentage of gross area sown to net area sown.

The proportion of gross cropped area to net area sown indicates the extent of area sown more than once. The double cropping is solely related to availability of irrigation facilities, mainly from tanks and the paddy fields which retain sufficient moisture after monsoon to enable the cultivators to take second crop of Wheat, Gram, Lakh and Linseed. The second crop is locally known as "Ttera" and sown by broadcasting method including crops like linseed, Lakh and other pulses. The district has got a large number of small size tanks which are locally named as "Bodies" but all these tanks are only able to irrigate paddy crop in Kharif season and used as a protective measure. Double irrigated crop is

not very much practiced and second crop is generally taken in the irrigated area of paddy fields. Comparative percentage of gross area sown to net area sown for the years 1960-61 and 1972-73 are given in the following table.

It can be seen from the above table that there is no improvement in taking second crop in a period of eleven years. The percentage of double cropping appears to be more practiced in all the paddy grown talukas. As Rajura being the non paddy crop area the double cropping appears to be not practiced. The percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown is higher in Bramhapuri and Gadchiroli Talukas than the district average. Though Sironcha taluka is mainly the paddy growing tract the double cropping appears to be not practiced in that area. The fact that the cultivators who are mostly tribals do not understand the economical aspect of double cropping.



Indicator No. 2 :- Productivity of Important Crops.

Agriculture is the most important activity and among the least productive, though it is the primary occupation of 80 percent of the working population.

The programme for agricultural development have all along received a high priority. The average annual food grains production from the first plan period rose from 2.62 Lakh metric tonnes to 3.18 lakhs metric tonnes by the end of third plan period. The average annual food grains production after the expiry of third plan period to the year 1971-72 was 3.42 Lakh metric tonnes. The increase in food production is mainly due to increase in acreage under various food crops and also due to increase in acreage under agricultural practices. A comparative picture for the base year 1960-61 and 1972-73 of some important crops is shown in the following table.

Because of failure of monsoon in the year 1972-73 the foodgrains production has shown a sizeable decrease over the year 1960-61. The production of Rice, Wheat, Jowar, total pulses, sesamum and Linseed declined in the year 1972-73 over the year 1960-61, but at the same time the production of Gram and Cotton shows a remarkable increase in the year 1972-73 over the year 1960-61. However the percentage increase in area under all food-grains in the year 1971-72 over the year 1960-61 shows a marginal increase. There is a very little scope for extending the crop area in this district. However the area under irrigation can be increased considerably and would significantly increase the productive capacity of the land.

A great deal more can be done by way of improving seed strains and cultural practices,

encouraging the use of fertilizers and control of pest etc.

Indicator No. 3:- Gross value of Agricultural-Products.

Though the district ranks second in whole of Maharashtra in case of percentage of gross area irrigated to gross area sown, it stands 22 nd in case of Gross Value of agricultural product per hectare. The data available for the 1967-68 reveals that the gross value of agricultural product per hectare is Rs.402 for this district as against Rs.540 for the State as a whole. The main factor responsible for such poor productivity of land is that a majority of cultivators are small holders having land less than 5 acres, who are unwilling to adopt the methods of improved agricultural practices because of uneconomical holding size.

Indicator No. 4 :- Percentage of Irrigated area.

The district has high percentage of area under irrigation and stands second in rank in whole of Maharashtra. The paddy is the main crop of the district and irrigation to this crop is adopted as a protective measure after the monsoon season is over.

High percentage of area under irrigation in the year 1972-73 is found in Bramhapuri (41.86), Gadchiroli (25.99) and Chandrapur (21.02) talukas than the district average (16.63). The table below

shows the talukawise percentage of net area irrigated to net area cultivated during the years 1960-61 and 1972-73.

It appears from the above table that the percentage of net area irrigated to net area cultivated slightly rose from 15.88 in 1960-61 to 16.63 in 1972-73 in the District as a whole. A significant rise in the percentage of net area irrigated to net area sown is observed in Gadchiroli taluka only. In Sironchataluka the percentage of net area irrigated to net area sown is decreased from 5.50 in 1960-61 to 5.03 in 1972-73. Percentage decrease may be due to sizeable increase in net area sown where as the net irrigated area shows slight increase in the year 1972-73 over the year 1960-61.

The table below shows talukawise percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area during the years 1960-61 and 1972-73.

It is seen from the above table that the practice of taking two successive irrigated crops is not in vogue in major part of this district and hence the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area is found to be only 100.63 during the year 1972-73. The practice of taking two successive irrigated crops does not appear to be followed in Chandrapur, Gadchiroli, Rajura talukas because the water resources which are available at present are just enough to irri-

gate any single crop. It is however possible to irrigate larger area if the efficiency of water use is increased. There appears to be considerable scope for reducing the seepage and other losses in carrying water from the reservoir to the fields, as well as by reducing the per hectare consumption of water without effecting yields. The potential benefits by way of increase in the area which can be served by the available water resources, could be very substantial and could be worthwhile for the district to investigate these possibilities.

Indicator No. 5 :- Changes in Cropping Pattern.

The Chandrapur district mainly grows food crops and has 83.38 percent of the gross cropped area under food crops and remaining 16.62 percent area under non-food crops during the year 1972-73. Among food crops, Rice occupies 38.23 percent of the total food cropped area. Jowar is the second major food crop of the district and accounts for 36.21 percent of the total food cropped area during 1972-73. Jowar is sown both in Kharif and rabi seasons. Pulses are also sown in sizeable proportion accounting for 16.03 percent of the total food cropped area in 1972-73. Among non-food crops, oil seeds and Cotton occupy 62.67 percent and 35.51 percent

respectively of the area under non-food crops for the year 1972-73. The following tables give the percentage of food and non-food crops for the years 1960-61 and 1972-73.

It is seen from the above tables that there is no change in the cropping pattern of the district and also within talukas since the year 1960-61. An increase in the food cropped area is observed in talukas viz. Chandrapur, Warora, Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and district as a whole because of increase in area of rice and Jowar crops in the year 1972-73 over the year 1960-61. A decrease in the food cropped area is observed in other talukas viz. Sironcha and Rajura because of sizeable decrease in area under pulses. It is also observed that there is a marked difference in the cropping pattern of eastern and Western talukas of the district. The talukas viz. Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Chanda have more than 87 percent of the gross cropped area under food crops while low percentage under food crops is found in Rajura (63.48) and Warora (71.41) which is less than the district average (83.38). The fact that Warora and Rajura talukas are the rain shadow areas where cotton and Oil seed crops are the major non-food crops which cover sizeable area. It is also observed that within talukas the changes from food crops to non-food crops and vice versa are marginal and mainly depend on rainfall.

Indicator No. 6 :- Increase in Agriculture credit and Outstanding dues.

The Co-operative movement was primarily started to provide easy credit facilities to the cultivators as the inadequacy and high cost of finance are the major obstacles in the way of rapid development of agriculture. To meet this end, extension of Co-operative credit to the village level is made by the District Co-operative Bank through primary agricultural Credit societies (Service Co-operatives) which provide short term loans to the cultivators to facilitate them to carry out different agricultural operations with more ease and confidence. The Second agency engaged in meeting the agricultural needs of the cultivators is the District Land Development Bank which finances the cultivators directly by granting them long term loan. The total agricultural credit made available to the cultivators by the Service Co-operatives and the District Land development bank, together was of the order of Rs.321.11 lakhs in 1973-74. The table below indicates the loans advanced by the primary credit Co-operative Societies and outstanding dues during the years 1961-62 and 1973-74.

The primary agricultural Credit societies had advanced loan to their members to the tune of 239.40 Lakhs in the year 1973-74, showing an increase of 288.01 percent over the year 1961-62. Whereas the amount of Loans outstanding in the year was to the tune of Rs. 351.07 Lakhs thus showing an increase of 134.15 percent over the year 1961-62. As the scarcity conditions were prevailing in the consecutive last three years in this district the amount of loan advanced and amount of loan outstanding show a steep rise.

Indicator No. 7 :- Agricultural Wage Rates.

Agricultural Labour is one of the important classes of workers. As per 1971 census the percentage of agricultural Labourers to total workers was 35.17. The data on agricultural wage rates are being collected from selected cultivators

in the three centres viz. Ghugus/Kothari together, Mul and Sindewahi in Chandrapur district. As per 1971 Census Ghugus is declared as Urban area and hence this centre is substituted by Kothari centre and prices are being collected from Kothari centre from September 1973. The annual average of wage rates for the years 1964 and 1973 collected from these three centres are shown in the table below.

It is seen from the above table that wage rates of agricultural male and female workers show a noticeable increase at all centres in the year 1973 over the year 1964. The increase in agril. wage rate in case of Male agril. worker at Ghugus/Kothari centres together is found to be highest in the year 1973 as compared to corresponding wage rates at other two centres. The fact that the cement factory which is set up after 1964 at Ghugus, part of

the Agril. Labour force is absorbed in the factory as workers on higher wages. Because of higher wages in factory the wage rates of Agril. Labourers show a noticeable increase. The wage rates collected at Kothari centre for the last four months during the year 1973 appears to be higher than the other two centres in case of Male workers. The fact that as the Kothari is surrounded by cash crop area such as cotton and chillies the wage rates of Male workers appears to be higher

Indicator No. 8 :- Livestock per hectare of Land:-

Animals besides providing most of the draught power required for agricultural operations are an important source of food and raw material. Bovine population comprises the population of buffaloes and cattle where as ovine population comprises the population of sheep and goats. The following table gives total Livestock(excluding pigs, horses & Ponies) per hectare of cultivable land in each taluka.

Livestock per hectare of cultivable land is found to be higher in Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Sironcha talukas than the district average. The reasons for higher ratio are that 1) the talukas viz. Bramhapuri, Gadchiroli and Sironcha are mainly the paddy growing tracts where the requirement of draught animals is generally higher than the other tracts and 2) The percentage of cultivable area is comparatively much less because of most of the area is covered with forest.

Indicator No. 9 :- Poultry as compared to Population.

Development of poultry is essentially a cottage industry without being linked up with hatcheries, commercial commercial/feed industry and organised marketing of poultry products. Much stress has been given in the plan periods in popularising poultry keeping specially in rural areas as an additional source of income and also to bridge over food shortage.

As per 1961 Livestock Census, Poultry keeping was flourishing well in Chandrapur district accounting for 319 birds per 100 Households. Per capita poultry during the year 1961 worked out to 0.66. However poultry in 1972 as per Livestock Census decreased considerably. The per capita poultry in 1972 was worked out as 0.51. The table below gives talukawise position of poultry per 100 households in 1961 and 1972. The number of households enumerated in 1961 and 1971 censuses has been adopted for working out poultry birds kept per 100 Households.

The poultry keeping appears to be more popular in tribal areas such as Gadchiroli, Sironcha and Rajura talukas having considerable tribal population. In almost all talukas except Warora and Rajura talukas number of poultry birds per 100 households shows considerable decrease in the year 1972 over the year 1961. The overall decrease may

probably be the result of lack of good market in the vicinity to promote this industry and also due to decrease in the gap between the rate of consumption and the rate of production.

Indicator No. 10 :- PerCapita consumption of -  
Electricity.

Rural electrification has a special significance in the development of the Rural Economy. Apart from providing power for agricultural purposes small consumers, industries and domestic use, it helps in modernising the out look of people, living in Rural areas.

The district has not made any significant progress in Rural Electrification as compared to other districts of the state. By 31 st March 1961, only 353 villages and 5 towns were electrified whereas as on 31 st March, 1974 their corresponding number increased to 455 villages and 7 towns. The per capita consumption of electricity for domestic purposes as well as total electricity consumption inclusive of all purposes for the years 1960-61 and 1973-74 are shown in the table given below.

It can be seen from the above table that the per capita consumption of electricity in the year 1973-74 was 102.16 KWH which is somewhat high because of heavy electrical consumption by Ballarpur paper Mill, A.C.C. factory, Ghugus and Defence Project, Bhadrawati. However, the per capita domestic consumption during 1973-74 is as low as 2.43 KWH. The percentage increase in per capita domestic consumption during the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61 is mainly due to increase in number of electrified villages as well as increase in number of households consumers.

Indicator No. 11 :- Increase in number of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchange.

The media of employment exchange is being utilised both by employment seekers as well as employers. Due to increase in number of educated persons and due to various employment avenues created in the development process, the number of registrants and the number of vacancies have increased considerably after 1960-61. The comparative figures of registrations, Vacancies notified and placements for the year 1960-61 and 1973-74 are as follows :-

Thus it can be seen that percentage increase in number of Registrations is very high over 1960-61 level where as corresponding percentage increase in number of vacancies notified and number of placements are not noticeable. The fact that increase in registrations with the Employment-Exchange is mainly due to 1) The growth of population. 2) Changes in the age composition of the population and 3) The behaviour of participation rates because of spread of education. After the Second Plan period the new jobs were scarcely created because of limited resources available for undertaking new schemes in the Third and Fourth Plan periods and unnoticeable Industrial development in the private sector in the district in general, and that is why the number of vacancies notified and number of placement do not show a sizeable increase comparing to number of registrations in the year 1973-74 over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No. 12 :- Increase in the Outdoor and-  
Indoor patients treated.

The district has made significant progress in providing curative and preventive health services over the last two decades. Life expectancy has increased considerably and the death rate has declined to 13.00 per One thousand population as compared to the year 1947. The achievement has been mainly due to better availability of medical and health facilities in the district as compared to pre-independence period

In table No.44 the data on the indoor and outdoor patients treated in public sector hospitals, dispensaries, Primary health centres and maternity homes is compiled and given for the years 1963 and 1973. As the data prior to the year 1963 was not available talukawise and also because of incomplete coverage, the data for the <sup>year</sup> 1963 is given in the following table as a base year for comparison with the year 1973.

The above table indicate that number of Indoor patients treated show a upward trend in all talukas and district as whole. An increase in indoor patients treated may be due to increase in number of beds during the corresponding year 1973. The indoor patients treated per bed during the years 1963 and 1973 worked out as 16 and 35 respectively. Similarly there is an overall increase in outdoor patients in almost of Talukas except Rajura taluka, in the year 1973 over the year 1963.

Indicator No. 13 :- Increase in number of students in different Categories.

Much stress was given on the development of education under Social Services during the Plan periods. The primary education was made compulsory during the Third Plan. As such tremendous increase in both the number of Institutions and pupils enrolled has been noticed since 1960-61. Remarkable progress was also noticeable in education of girls where the percentage increase in number of students was 188.94 and 315.24 respectively for primary and secondary Standards in the year 1972-73 over the year 1960-61. The increase in the number of girl students is mainly due to increase in number of primary and secondary schools in rural areas and also because of change in the traditional outlook of villagers who were not very much keen in the past to send their wards to schools. The comparative figures of number of institutions and number of Students, for the years 1960-61 and 1972-73 are given below.

The above table indicates that the Primary and Secondary Schools have increased by 86.31 and 149.18 percent respectively by March 1973 over the strength as at the end of March 1961 while the percentage increase in students during the decade is 113.40 and 145.04 respectively. The College education facility has also increased enormously by the end of the year 1972-73 and number of Colleges increased to 12 as three new Colleges were opened during the year 1972-73. The percentage increase in students attending Colleges was 1405.55 by the end of year 1972-73 over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No. 14 :- Increase in road mileage per 100 Square Kilometers.

The road development programmes for the Thire and Fourth Five year plans had been formulated in accordance with the broad objectives

laid down in the Twenty year Road Development plan for the period 1961-81, which had been drawn up by the Chief Engineers of the State and the Central Government. The broad objective of this plan was that no village in a developed and agricultural area should remain more than four miles from a metalled road and more than one and half miles from any type of road.

Facilities of transport and Communications are poor in this district. In fact, this is one of the main reasons for the economic backwardness of this otherwise potentially rich district. The position has improved considerably since 1960-61. The road length per 100 Square Kilometres of area rose from 2.54 Kms. as on 31.3.1961 to 11.01 Kms. as on 31.3.1974. Comparative figures for the years for these two reference periods are given in the table below.

Indicator No. 15 :- Increase in Banking facilities in proportion to population.

There is a substantial increase in number of scheduled banks and its branches since 1961 as the number of scheduled banks increased from 7 as on 31 st December 1960 to 24 as on 31 st December, 1972, showing the percentage increase as 242.85. Similarly the Co-operative banks increased by 6 during the same period showing the percentage increase as 30.00. The comparative position of banks and population served by them during these two reference periods is shown in the following table.

It is seen from the above table that though the no. of banking offices show a noticeable increase, the corresponding figure of banking offices per lakh population does not show a sizeable increase. The fact that due to -

increase in population in the last decade the No. of banking offices per lakh population show a marginal increase. It is also found that out of 50 banking offices 17 banking offices are located in 5 urban towns and remaining 33 banking offices are located in 21 villages.

Indicator No. 16 :- Prices.

The price collection work at the district head quarters was started in November, 1962 since the declaration of emergency in the country. The prices of some important essential commodities are obtained every week, ending Friday from the selected shops. These price quotations are confirmed to selected shops only and hence they can not be said to be fully representative, but still they serve as broad indicator of trends in the prices over a period of time. The following table shows the average yearly prices for the year 1963 and 1973 respectively of some important commodities.

The prices of Rice, Wheat, all types of pulses, Sugar, Ground nut oil and meat in 1973 are more than double the prices prevailing in 1963, while 50 to 100 percent increase is found in the prices of Gur and Washing Soap only. The prices of almost all commodities have shown sizeable increase in the year 1973 over the year 1963.

" CHAPTER - IV "ANNUAL PLAN 1973-74

General :- Chandrapur district was passing through a period of scarcity during the last three successive years. During the years 1970-71, 1971-72 and 1972-73 about 1193, 509 and 764 Villages were affected by scarcity. During the year 1973-74 because of sufficient and timely rainfall the Agricultural production particularly of paddy crop was slightly higher than normal expectations. The irrigation tanks were full even after the Kharif harvest of paddy crop and the cultivators under the command area were encouraged to take second crop of summer paddy during this year.

The Fourth Five Year Plan has been Officially announced to have commenced from 1 st April 1969. But the process of planning is continued through the Annual Plans keeping in view the broad policies and programmes contemplated for the Fourth Five Year Plan.

The outlay of the Annual Plan 1973-74 for the district level programmes of this district was of the order of Rs. 233.54 Lakhs, against which the total expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 233.96 Lakhs. Agricultural Programmes were given the highest priority in this district. About 46 percent of the total Annual plan outlay was earmarked for the various agricultural programmes. The programme for Co-operation and Community Development shared 6 percent of the total plan outlay, while social services -

accounted for a total outlay of about 32 percent of the total plan outlay of the district. Transport and Communications and Miscellaneous Programmes were allotted 13 percent and 2 percent of the total outlay respectively where as Industries and Mining were allotted the remaining one percent of the total plan outlay.

The overall performance under various programme was substantial though not upto the mark except the programmes under Social Services and Miscellaneous. The provision set aside for almost all programmes except social services and Miscellaneous however remained unspent to some extent.

AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMMES.

The various schemes under Agricultural programmes were specially aimed at improvement of agricultural productivity. The district was covered under Intensive cultivation of food crops particularly of paddy crop because of its maximum irrigation potential for increasing the food production. Soil-Conservation measures, Minor Irrigation Works, Development of Forest and Fisheries were the other Programmes, that were implemented in the district. The following table indicates the allotments and expenditure on these various programmes.

### AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION.

The sub-head of Agricultural production was provided with an allotment of Rs. 8.49 Lakhs during the year 1973-74, against which an expenditure of Rs. 8.10 Lakhs was incurred over the schemes of development of existing taluka seed farms, grant of subsidy for manure production, horticulture development, Intensive cultivation, construction of building for agriculture school, development scheme for small holders and scheme of mass training of farmers. #### SOIL CONSERVATION.

Contour bunding and terracing were completed in an area of 3032 hectares & 1093 hectares respectively and the total expenditure incurred on these works was of Rs. 10.03 Lakhs.

#### MINOR IRRIGATION.

Minor Irrigation works play an important role in the agricultural economy of the district. There are many large number of Ex-malguzari tanks in the district. The programme of renovation of these tanks for providing quick irrigation facilities was launched on a large scale. New irrigation wells and repairs to old wells were also taken up. The total expenditure on these minor irrigation works was of Rs. 61.95 Lakhs as against the total provision of Rs. 66.35 Lakhs. In all 471 new irrigation wells and two tanks were constructed during the period under review. In all 126 pumpsets were installed during the period under review.

ANIMAL HUSBANDARY.

Amongst the programmes of Animal Husbandary the main emphasis was focussed on the improvement and development of cattle breeds. The expansion of Veterinary services was also envisaged. The total expenditure on the programme in the district was Rs. 0.16 Lakhs and was a bit more than centpercent comparing to total provision under this sub-head. During the period under review 25 premium bulls were distributed, 13602 animals were castrated and 2179 improved birds were supplied.

FOREST.

Forests form one of the most important resources of the district and their abundance is a striking feature. Forests cover about 56 percent of the district's total area as against 20 percent in the state. The development programme of forest was therefore quite important. In all Rs. 19.13 Lakhs have been expended on the various development schemes in the district as against the total allocation of Rs.19.79 Lakhs. The plantation of valuable trees such as teak was done on 955 hectares area. In addition to this achievement farm forestry work was done on 165 hectares of land and forest roads of about 51 Kms. of length were constructed during the plan year under review.

FISHERIES.

The aim of the programme was to increase the production of fish and to improve the Socio-Economic conditions of the fishermen-working in the field. The district is naturally endowed with-

good potential of water resources. It has 5 perennial rivers all measuring 672 Kms. In addition to above there are four seasonal rivers in the district. There are 1454 tanks suitable for fishing, covering about 20653 acres of water spread area. An expenditure of Rs.1.58 Lakh was incurred on various schemes as against the plan provision of Rs. 1.98 Lakhs under this sub-head. During the year under report about 47.50 Lakhs fingerlings were stocked and 459 metric tonnes fish was netted.

#### CO-OPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

##### CO-OPERATION.

Co-operative movement has taken tremendous strides in Maharashtra. The state five year plans had sought the promotion of Co-operative organisations through financial supports, for undertaking different economic activities in the form of subsidies, share capital investments and loans according to needs. The programmes during the third Plan was however continued during the fourth plan and was concerned mainly with the development of Co-operative marketing. Credit facilities were taken to the doors of the agriculturist Co-operatives and Co-operative farming were also extended.

An outlay of Rs. 2.33 Lakhs was fixed up for the various programmes under Co-operation. The total expenditure during the plan year was reported to be Rs. 1.11 Lakhs. Under the scheme of agricultural credit one society was registered.

Short term loan to the tune of Rs. 990.30 Lakhs was distributed to the members of primary agricultural credit societies and managerial subsidy, share capital contributions were also given to Agril. Marketing and and labour contract societies.

#### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT.

Community development was described as a method of rural extension and as a agency through which the transformation of the social and economical life of villages was to be initiated. The concept of rural extension has broadened into that of Panchayat-Raj. One of the principal tasks in the Third Five-Year Plan was to ensure the growth and working of Panchayat Raj institutions so as to enable each area to realise its maximum development potential on the basis of local man-power and other resources, Co-operative self help and community efforts and effective use of the available resources and manpower.

During the plan period under review, the blocks as shown below were functioning.

- 1) Stage I - Nil. 2) Stage II - 2.00
- 3) Post Stage II - 12.50 and 4) M.D.P. & T.D. Blocks 6.00.

During the plan year under review, the provision made for the programme was to the tune of Rs. 11.48 Lakhs. Where as the expenditure incurred was of Rs. 9.82 Lakhs. Composite programme for women and Children was continued in the five selected Blocks. Special Nutrition programme was also continued during the year under review in 11 blocks. Similarly the



Applied Nutrition Programme was continued in the five selected blocks.

#### SMALL SCALE AND COTTAGE INDUSTRIES.

Development Programme for Small Scale- industries aim at helping the small scale and cottage industries to overcome the handicaps such as inadequate capital resources, lack of knowledge of modern technique, methods of production and improvement of marketing of products. The provision made available for this sub-head during the year under review was Rs. 1.63 Lakhs against which an expenditure of Rs. 1.03 Lakhs was incurred. For the development of handloom industry, rebate subsidy for the sale of handloom cloth was continued to be given to the five weavers Co-operatives in the district and Rs.0.67 Lakhs were spent. Financial assistance to the Industrial Co-operative was given worth Rs. 23 Lakhs during the period under review.

#### TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION.

Transport by road has much significance in this district as it is ill equipped with railway facilities. The total road length in the district as on 31 st March 1974 was 2825 Kms. which in other words meant 11.01 Kms. of road per 100 Sq.Kms. of area. During the plan period under review the amount expended on road development programme was Rs. 29.76 Lakhs under which 22 Kms. of new roads 51 culverts and 132 Kms. of rural roads were constructed.

SOCIAL SERVICES.

The Programme of general education was emphasised as an important aspect of development. The total amount spent on this programme was Rs. 27.99 Lakhs, out of which Rs. 6.54 lakhs were spent on primary education. During the year under review secondary schools were opened raising the total number of schools to 150.

In addition to above 29 new primary schools were opened and 13 rooms were constructed.

Under the water supply and drainage scheme the amount of Rs. 53.31 Lakhs was expended on rural and urban water supply schemes. The water supply scheme in Ballarpur, Desaignanj, Warora and Rajura were completed.

Under the sub-head of housing out of the total provision of Rs. 4.13 Lakhs, the amount expended was Rs. 1.25 Lakhs.

Under the sub-head of welfare of backward classes out of the total provision of Rs. 4.60 Lakhs, the amount expended was Rs. 3.51 Lakhs, during the year under report. The programmes such as Grants of scholarships, Tuition fees and examination fees to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes, Grants to Backward classes, Hostels, construction of new irrigation wells, propagation of Improved Agril. practices and Housing aid to Backward Classes, Scheduled Tribes

and Scheduled castes were the major schemes implemented during the year under review.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Under this sub-head against the total provision of Rs. 4.17 Lakhs an amount of Rs. 4.70 Lakhs was expended during the plan period under review.
