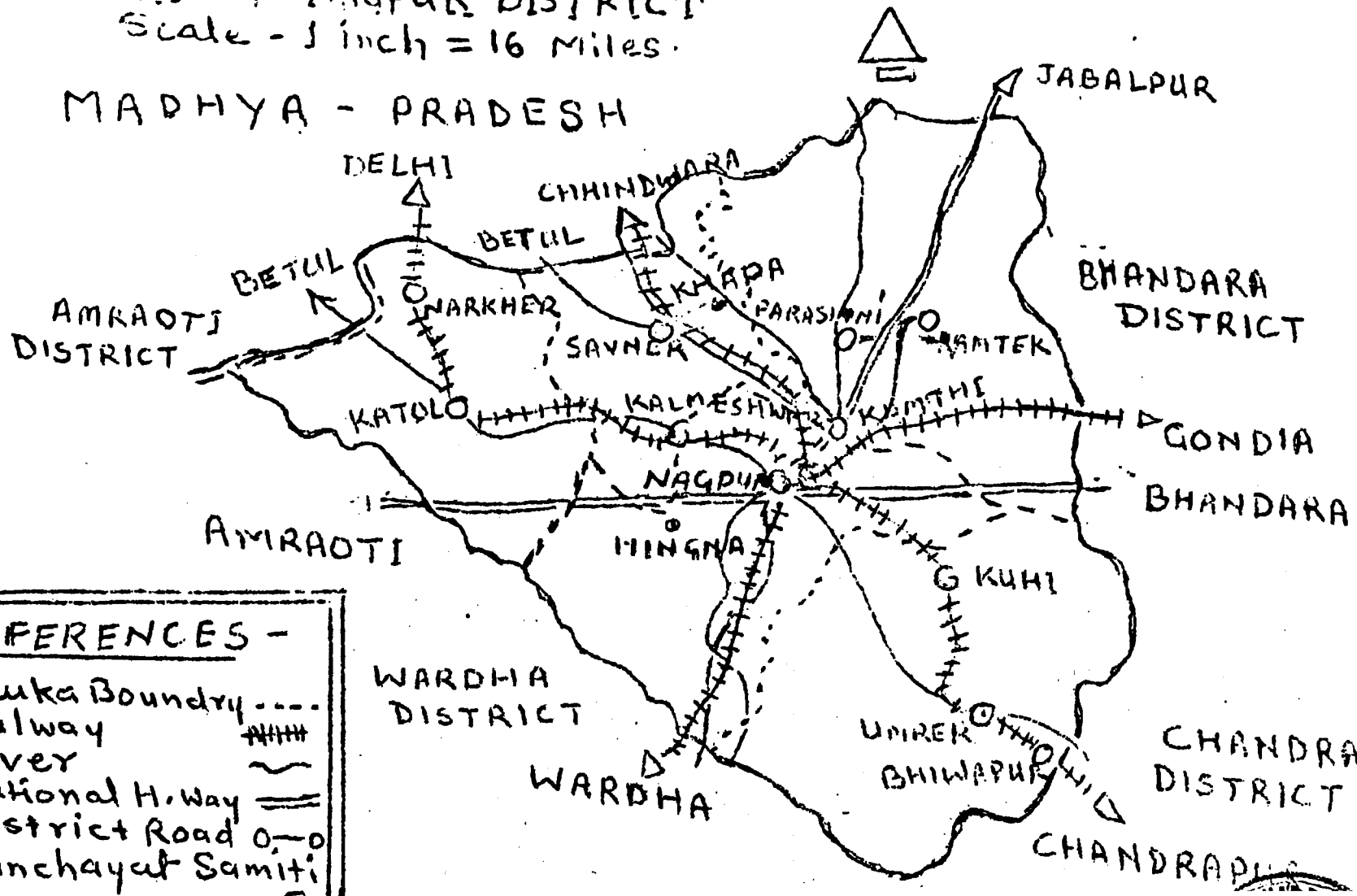

CHAPTER -- I

I N T R O D U C T I O N

1.1 Introduction and Location:-

Nagpur district was one of the Districts of Ex-Madhya Pradesh till the reorganisation of States in 1956 when alongwith the other seven districts of Vidarbha region, it formed a part of the bilingual state of Bombay. The State of Maharashtra came into existence on 1st May, 1960, with Nagpur District as one of its twenty six districts. Nagpur district is one of the important district of the four C.P. districts. The headquarters of the district is at Nagpur which was the capital of Ex-Madhya Pradesh State and now enjoys the status of the second capital of Maharashtra State.

This district lies between $20^{\circ}35'$ and $21^{\circ}44'$ North Latitudes and $78^{\circ}15'$ and $79^{\circ}40'$ East longitudes and it is triangular in shape.

1.2 Boundaries:- This district is bounded on the North by the Chhindwada and Seoni districts of the Madhya Pradesh on the East by Bhandara, on the South and West by Chandrapur and Wardha districts respectively, with a small strip on the north-west by the Amraoti district of Maharashtra state.

The area of the district is 9930 square Kilo Metres (3,834) forming 3.34 percent of the total area of Maharashtra upto 1969-70 when 10 villages measuring an area of 4,094 hectares or 24.56 Kilometres is transferred to Bhandara district.

The population of the district according to 1961 Census is 15,12,807 forming 3.62 percent of total population of the Maharashtra. According to 1971 Census the population of the district is 19,42,688 forming 3.85 percent of the total population of the Maharashtra.

1.3 Administrative Set Up:-

For administrative convenience the district is divided into 5 sub-divisions or Taluka Viz. Nagpur, Ramtek, Umred, Katol and Savner. The Collector is the head of the district administration and in so far as the need and exigencies of the district administration are concerned, he is expected to supervise the working of other departments also. He is also district Magistrate. The Collector, being incharge of the district, is entrusted with the duties regarding General Administration, Law and order, Land Revenue and Civil supplies. He is also assigned with the work of District Planning as Member of the District Planning and Development Council and also of Employment Guarantee in the district under State and Local Sectors. He has also to look after the above said work in addition to the Collection of Small Savings and Family Planning, the most important subjects of the present day with the Co-operation of various departments and elected bodies in the district.

The Collector is assisted by Resident Deputy Collector and Deputy Collectors attached to the Collectorate in the working of Revenue administration. A sub-divisional Officer of a rank of Deputy Collector is put in charge of every sub-Division. A Tahasildar (Mamlatdar) is incharge of every Taluka Office.

Each Tahsil is sub-divided into 4 to 5 revenue circles and revenue circles are further divided into Patwari Halka for administrative convenience. There are in all 21 Revenue Circles and 373 Patwari Halkas in 5 Tahasils of Nagpur District.

The District and Sessions Judge, Nagpur is the head of the Judicial Department in the district. The judiciary is entirely separated from the executive. The ~~judi~~ separation of the Judiciary from the executive has been brought about in the district, in 1959. The District and Sessions Judge is assisted by one Assistant and Additional Sessions Judge and two Extra Assistants and Additional Sessions Judges. They have jurisdiction over the entire revenue district.

Besides Judicial and Revenue administration, there are district and divisional Officers of other departments with different administrative set up. Nagpur city, being the divisional Headquarters of one of the four Revenue divisions of Maharashtra State, has an office of Divisional Commissioner acting as co-ordinating agency in between Divisional Offices, Zilla Parishads and State Government.

1.4 Police:- The Nagpur city, being one of the biggest cities and second Capital of the State, has got Commissioner of Police to look after the main functions such as maintenance of Law and order, security to life and property of Citizens, to obtain intelligence concerning the Commission of cognizable offences, enforcement of Police regulations for preventing breach of peace etc.

In addition to above there are offices of Deputy Inspector General of Police, Nagpur Range, Nagpur, Superintendent of Police for Rural areas and city, Superintendent of Railway Police, and Commandant of Police Force (Reserve). There were 47 Deputy Superintendents of Police, 9 Assistant Commissioners of Police, 2 Superintendents of Police, 1 Asstt. Superintendent of Police, and 46 Inspectors of Police in Nagpur District during the year 1974-75.

There is also a Police Constables Training School at Nagpur which caters to the training of unarmed constabulary of the districts in the Nagpur Range. It functions on regional basis and is in charge of a Superintendent of the rank of the Deputy Superintendent of Police. He is assisted by the necessary staff of Instructors.

Zilla Parishad:- With a view to promote democratic decentralisation and ^{to} secure greater participation of the people in the developmental activities, a district level body known as "Zilla Parishad" constituted with councillors chosen by election from electoral divisions with 44 councillors is functioning in the district since 1st of May, 1962. There are 13 Panchyat Samities at Block level and the Chairman of six P.S. are the ex-officio members of the Zilla Parishad. Chairman of 5 Federal Co-operative Societies are also working as the associate members. The nominated members and the associated members have no right of voting while the ex-officio members and co-opted members have full ~~right~~ rights of the elected members. Two women members are co-opted and 10 more members are nominated by Zilla Parishad.

The area under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad is the entire district area excluding Cantonment, Municipal Councils and Nagar Corporation area. The area under the jurisdiction of a Panchyat Samiti corresponds to the Block area.

The work of the Zilla Parishad is carried out through 6 subject committees viz. Standing Committee, Agricultural and Co-operative Committee, work committee, Health Committee, Education Committee, Social Welfare Committee. The Chief Executive Officer is the Head of the administrative Machinery in Zilla Parishad. He has been vested with full administrative powers for executing the provisions of the Zilla Parishad ^{Act.} He is assisted by officers of various departments. The Finance Branch of the Zilla Parishad is controlled by the Chief Accounts and Finance Officer generally taken on deputation from the Accounts and Treasuries Department and this branch works on the lines of the Finance Department of the State Government.

1.4 Area and the Territorial Changes:-

The area, number of villages population etc. covered by each Taluka according to the 1971 Census is as

The population figures for 1971 Census which are available show that the population of the district has been increased to 19,42,688 of which 10,55,357 is in Urban areas and 8,87,331 in rural areas. There are 10,10,911 males and 9,31,777 females. The percentage increase in population of 1971 Census over 1961 census is 28.68 percent. According to 1971 census population of 1971 census ~~xxxx~~ population, the District ranks first in Vidarbha region and eleventh in the Maharashtra State. The total number of workers are 6,89,276 in which 3,45,319 are Agricultural cultivators and Agricultural Labourers, as per the figures of 1971 census. The percentage of workers in the district to the total population is 35.48.

1.5 Topography:- The district has an average elevation between 274.50 and 305 metres (900 and 1,000 Feet) above sea level and its relief features are characterised, by and large, by the residual hill ranges of the Satpadas and their deattached members enclosing, between them undulating black soil valleys. Much of the topography is typically one of the Deccan Trap having flat topped and terraced features, low buttressed side and isolated knolls. Eastwards and north eastwards, the landscape change in an interesting manner due to the change in the underlying rocks. The rocks of Gondwana series are not only important because of their coal and manganese deposits, but in their surface expression they present a low rolling topography within a poor soil cover and sparse vegetation.

The greater part of the district is an undulating plateau with a variation in height between 652.70 meters (2,140 feet) above sea level on the upland ridges in the north and about 247.50 metres (900 feet) near the Kanhan river. This plateau surface of the district falls into three district drainage basins. In the North, the upland ranges are an extension of the Satpuda ranges, they are narrow in the west but widen to a breadth of about 19 Kms. (12 miles) towards the east. Immediately south of these upland ranges, stretches the Ambagad Hills, the western extremity of which lies in the Nagpur district. The historic temple of Rantek is situated on a spur of this range signifying the Hill of Rama also known formerly as "Sundergiri" Vermilion Mount "Tapogiri" (Hill of Penance) These isolated hills or knolis attain no great altitude.

1.6 Hills, Rivers and Soils:- The main system of hills is the Satpuda and its offshoots. The northern range of hills extends along the whole border, being pierced only in two places where the Kanhan and the Pench rivers have broken through. On the west, it consists merely of the outlying foothills of the Satpudas, the plateau proper lying behind them in Chindwara. But from the Kanhan to the Pench, it is the major range of the Satpudas themselves which dominates the landscape and the ascent of the Khamarpani Plateau is made in Nagpur. Along this length the hills are well wooded and picturesque and there is some striking scenery on the Pench river. The old Gond fort of Bhivagad stands on this range. Government managed forests in this district mainly belong to these hills between the Kanhan and the Bawanthari.

A few miles to the south of the main Satpuda range are two minor lines of hills to the west lie between Bhivagad and Parashioni terminating in the peak of Texadi.

508.34 metres (1,669 feet) of the Pench are the mansar hills both these and the western range being now denuded of trees, and after a gap of a few miles, come the well known Rantek hills, rising to 427 metres (1,400 feet) at Rantek proper. Timely measures by the Government have helped retaining the wooded character of this range.

Minor Hills:- The second main hill tract extends along the south east of the district from Khargad on the Wardha river where there are some fine waterfalls to the junction of Wardha and Chandrapur with Nagpur. They separate the valley of the Kar, from that of the Jam up to Kondhali and further south east forms the watershed between the latter river and the Bor. Near Bori, they become the Kauras Plateau and here terminate to afford a passage for the Wardha river, continuing afterwards southeastwards and dividing the valley of the Nand from the Wainganga Plain. West of the Wunna the range is mostly well covered with picturesque valleys and ravines, among which are narrow strips of rich well-irrigated land of great fertility. But to the east towards Umred the range has lower levels and is uninteresting. It consists of low bare hills which are grass covered and boulder strewn, except where overlooking the Nand valley, some excellent teak is grown.

The third main range runs north wards through the Katol Tahsil from Kondhali to Kelod, separating the Wardha and Wainganga Valleys. The highest peak of it is at Pilkapar.

RIVER:- The Wardha and the Wainganga are the main rivers of the district. The Wardha flows along the part of the Western border and controls the drainage system of the of the Western part of the district. The principal tributaries of the Wardha are the Bor the Wunna, the Jam and the Kar. The Bor rises in the hills near Bazargaon and rushes down a winding and rocky Channel between Kondhali uplands and the Kauras Plateau, passing into the Wardha to join the the Wunna. Its narrow valley is very fertile and the high well wooded cliffs on either sides render it a wild and beautiful spot in the whole of the district.

The Wunna rises near the hill of Mahadagad in the Pilkapar range and flows along the northern base of the Kauras plateau past Hingna and Bori, where it is crossed by the Central railway. It leaves the district at Ashta. The small Krishna river joins it at Bori.

The Jam rises among the hills south of Kondhali and flowing northwards into the centre of the Katol Tahsil takes a westernly turn past Katol and joins the Wardha at Jalalkheda. The Kar rises in the same range, but flows directly south west separating the Wardha and Nagpur districts till it joins the Wardha river at Khargad, the trijunction point of the two district with Berar. The Wand flows across a small strip in the south of the district and joins the Wunna beyond the border of Wardha.

The Wainganga flows along the part of eastern border and controls the drainage system of the eastern and Central and portions of the of the district. It forms the district boundry with Bhandara district for some distance.

The Kanhan and pench are the most important tributaries of the Wainganga, both of which flow, from the Satpuda range in the Chhindwada district and meet near Kamthi where they are also joined by the Kolar. The Kanhan, entering the district near Borgaon, takes a south easternly course past Khapa to Kamthi where it receives the Pench and Kolar. In its subsequent course, it makes the boundry of Ramtek tahsil and after receiving the Nag river near the bills of Bhivakund, finally empties itself into the Wainganga. The Kanhan river provides drinking water to Nagpur city.

The Kolar rises in the north east corner of the Katol tahsil and after passing through the rocky part of Lohagad in Pilkapar range, emerges into the fertile plain of Savner and separates Nagpur from Ramtek tahsil until its place as boundry river is taken by the Kanhan. Its bed is generally rocky. At Patansawangi, it receives the Chandrabhaga, which brings in the drainage of Kalmeshwar Plain.

The other rivers of some importance are the Bawanthari, the Sur and the Gaotala Sand, which drains the easter half of Ramtek tahsil. The Sur is remarkable for its shallowness but its fertile properties produce sugarcane and garden crops of the land.

Irrigation Project:- By the end of 30.6.1974 Medium Irrigation projects viz. Ramtek, Wunna, Pandharbodi, Umri, Khursapar and Kesarnala, Chandrabhaga were completed in this district and the work of Kanholi, Kesar Nala, Makardhokda and Mordhan were in progress. Total estimated cost of the projects is Rs. 666.24 lakhs and gross command area is 27268 Hectares. An area of 10777 hectares will be irrigated by all these projects after fully completed.. Details of cost irrigation potential and area irrigated for the Medium project is given as follows:-

A Pench Irrigation project is being constructed in Ramtek Tahsil of Nagpur district at the cost of Rs.36.00 crores, as per latest estimates. The Pench Multi-purpose project comprises of two parts viz. (i) construction of storage dam at Totaladoh which includes of a power House at the dam site and would be storing water mostly for irrigation purposes and (ii) construction of pick up weir at Kamthi Khori with erection of gate over it Kamthi Khori weir alone can store enough water after erecting gates over it to ensure a water supply of 100 M.g.d. / i.e. 50 m.g.d. for super Thermal Station and 50 M.g.d. for water supply to Nagpur city. The water stored in the storage dam at Totaladoh would be let out in the river and picked up at the pick up weir at Kamthi Kheri from where irrigation canals as well as water supply canal would take off. The project will be a boon to Nagpur district for its rapid economic and industrial growth.

Power Generation:- At present the power station at Khaparkheda some 15 Kilometres away from Nagpur city has got an installed capacity of 120 M.W.H. in addition to this there are power generation stations at Paras, Ballarsha, Bhusawal, Bldari and Nasik. The power generated at these power stations will be not sufficient for the ever increasing future need of Maharashtra State. Specially the demand for power in Vidarbha is going to be much more. Therefore, a Thermal Power Station having an installed capacity of 1030 Mg. is being established at Koradi near Khaparkheda. The work of the schemes has advanced to a great extent and the first generator of 120 M.W. capacity at Koradi power station has been commissioned in June 1974. After completion of this project, there will be no dearth of power in this district and region and a rapid industrialisation of the district can be achieved. In addition to the Koradi Thermal power station at Koradi, Hydro Electrical Power station on Pench river is under construction. The cost of the project is Rs. 22.00 crores. This is an inter state project. Civil works of the project are to be executed by the M.S.E.B. (Maharashtra) State and E. & M works is to be executed by the Government of Madhya Pradesh, The expenditure so far incurred on this work is, therefore, is the nature of commitment. It is expected that in 1978-79, 53 M.W. energy would be generated by this project.

Soil:- The main soils of the district are Kali (Medium deep black cotton) Morand. (Comparatively light deep brown in colour) and Bardi (Red graver with boulders)

Medium deep black soil is found around Kalmeshwar and Savner in the Wardha Valley and in the Nagpur and Kamthi Plains. The principal Soil of the district is Known as Morand. It is very suitable for cotton and Jowar and is found in almost all the talukas. In the northern part of Ramtek taluka and especially in the valley of the Sur river. The morand soil is of very light colour Khardi is the regular rice land in the eastern part of the district. Bardi is found on the summits and slopes of hills, principally in the Katol tansil.

1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rain fall:-

Climate:- The climate of the district is characterised by a hot summer, well distributed rainfall and dryness except in rainy season. The winter season sets in from December to February and is followed by the hot season from March to May. The south-west monsoon season is from June to September while the period October - November constitutes the post Monsoon.

Temprature:- The cold weather commences from November and it lasts till February. December is usually the coldest month with the mean daily minimum temperature at 14°C (57.2°F) In the wake of western disturbances the district is some times affected by cold waves when the minimum temperature drops down to 4°C (39°F) Temperature begins to rise daily maximum temperature at 42.7°C (108.0°F) Nights are comparatively cooler in summer season. The on set of the south west monsoon at about the second week of June brings welcome relief from the heat with a considerable drop in temperature. The temperature shows slight increase in October and thereafter begins to fall.

Except during the Monsoon season when the humidities are high, the weather is generally dry. The humidities go down to 20% or less in summer season.

Rain fall:- The district gets rain fall from south-west monsoon originating from the Arabian seas. The average annual rainfall throughout the district amounts to 1016 mm. (40") and 1143 mm (45") perhaps due to the hills and forest tracts in these areas. Rain season usually starts in early June and lasts upto October. Occasional showers also not common. In the severe hot season, the light showers are sometimes followed by severe dust storms. The rain fall during June to September constitutes about 90 percent of the annual total rainfall. ^{the variation in the annual rainfall} from year to year is not very large, though the agricultural season is affected from year to year due to vagaries of monsoons. The heaviest rainfall in 24 hours recorded in the district was 330.20 Mms. (13 inches) at Umred on 14th August, 1953. The year 1969-70 was the year of plenty of rain fall.

Famine:- The district has recently suffered on account of shortage of rains after 1947. The Fact Finding Committee, appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 has pointed that the district is free from the famine and scarcity conditions. However, during 1972-73 many villages in the district had condition akin to scarcity because of untimely and short rain fall.

1.9:- Nagpur City:- The city of Nagpur and its suburban extensions which now almost reached upto the industrial nucleus of Kanhan from the nerve centre not only of the district but also of Vidarbha. Originally, advantage point of defence, Nagpur grew into an urban centre under the Bhonsales of the Maratha confederacy with the information of the Central Provinces under the British regime the town acquired a new importance, as the administrative capital. Its growth coincided with the economic development of the surrounding region abounding in cotton crop. As in the case of large cities, Nagpur developed a complex structure based on administrative, economic and social forces, which finds expression in its urban and suburban areas. It draws a greater strength from the new industrialisation and rightly competes with Bombay and Pune in its economic and Social growth.

C H A P T E R -II

Explanatory notes on the scope and limitations of the Statistical data presented in the Part-II Statistical Abstract.

I. Purpose:- The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive Statistical data on important Socio-Economic indicators of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1974-75 have been indicated with data for 1972-73 or even for earlier years in the tables where and data for 1972-73 and 1974-75 could not be presented, the same for the latest years for which they were available, have been shown. In case of 'Live stock and Census of Government employees', however, the data for latest Census have been presented. The population data have been shown for 1971 Census and also provisional figures for 1971 census on certain items. All the data are collected from the State and Central Government Offices, local bodies and other relevant agencies. The footnotes below each table indicate the source from which the data have been collected.

II. District at a Glance:- This table presents a birds eye-view of the Socio Economic conditions of development in Nagpur District and Nagpur division, under different heads, such as area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication plan and C.D. programme local bodies other miscellaneous Statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in each table.

III. Contents, Scope and Limitation:-

The Statistical tables presented in the Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts. The contents of the tables and the scope and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below:-

(1) Area and Population:-

In all 7 tables i.e. table Nos. 1 to 7 are included in this section. The figures for 1971 census are also indicated in table No. 1 to 7.

Table No. 1:- This indicates area No. of Houses and population according to 1971 Census in Rural and Urban areas of Nagpur district. Total area figures of the district as on 1st July 1971 are as supplied by the Surveyer General of India. Also the area figures of Urban areas are as supplied by Municipal Corporations or Councils. For any place to be recognised as an urban area (town) for the 1971 census, it was to have a municipal corporation or an area under a municipal council or a cantonment or a civil line. If it did not have any of these urban local bodies to administer its affairs, the following empirical tests were applied (a) a minimum population of 5,000 (estimated for 1971) (b) a density of not less than 400 per Km² (1,000) per Sq.mile) (c) 75 percent of the male working population pursuing occupations falling outside agriculture (d) the place should have, according to the Director, of Census operations of the State, a few pronounced urban characteristics and amenities. The area figure in table 1 have been given in sq. km. One sq. km. is equal to 0.386 sq.miles.

Table No. 2:- It indicates decadal variations in population since 1951. Table No. 3:- Gives classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village i.e. (Rural area) used in the table denotes a statutorily recognised village having well defined boundary and separate land records, Hamlet, Wadies or Padas have therefore not been shown as separate village.

Table No. 4:- This gives talukawise classification of Towns according to population ranges in 1971 census in Nagpur district.

Table No. 5:- It gives number of workers and non-workers in Rural and Urban areas of the district according to 1971 Census and their classification according to standard Livelihood classes. The population according to livelihood classes is classified under rural and Urban classification.

Table No. 6:- The table No. 6 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother Tongue and (C) Religion separately for Rural and Urban areas and for district as a whole according to 1971 Census. Here "Mother Tongue" is defined as a language spoken by the persons 'Mother' or the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects, have been included in the main language on the basis of Giersious classification.

Table No. 7:- It gives talukawise details of total population of scheduled caste scheduled tribes and Neo Buddhist in Rural and Urban areas with the population of Males and Females, under above mentioned Categories according to 1971 Census in Nagpur district. The scheduled castes notified for this district according to 1971 Census are as follows:-

1) Scheduled tribes:- No caste is notified as scheduled tribe in Nagpur district.

Climate:- Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Nagpur district.

Table No. 8:- Gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1974. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as 'Rainy Day' if during the 24 hours, the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.5 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table 'Normal Rainfall' is the average rainfall over a period ranging from fifty to eighty years.

Table No. 9:- Gives monthwise, maximum minimum and also annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1974. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological Centre at Nagpur. The maximum and minimum temperature denotes the Maximum and Minimum temperature on any day during the month.

3. Agriculture:- In all 12 tables, i.e. table Nos. 10 to 21 are included in this section.

The table No. 10 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the years 1972-73 and 1973-74. Against each taluka the break up of the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forests, land put to non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable wastes, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous trees, crop not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown.

Under 'Forest' are included all actually forest areas of land classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests whether state owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be. Land put to non-agricultural uses, stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and Railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. Barren and unculturable land covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost is classed as 'Barren and unculturable land, whether such land is in isolated or within cultivated holdings. Culturable waste includes all land available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and next last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallows or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in blocks or within cultivated holdings. Permanent Pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are Permanent Pastures or meadows or not. Village common and grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head 'Land Under Miscellaneous tree crops etc. not included in the net area sown, are included in cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use.

Land under casurina tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves used for fuel etc. which are not included under 'Orchards are classed under the category 'Current fallows' comprise cultivable areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. Other fallow land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and more than five years. The net area sown consists of net area sown, which crops and orchards area sown more than once being counted only once. The gross cropped area represents the sub-total of area under all crops. The difference between the total of gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

Table No. 11:- Shows the area under different crops in each taluka. It gives break up of the total gross cropped area according to major group of food and non-food crops.

Table No. 12:- Gives yield per hectare and out turn of principal crops in the district.

Table No. 13:- Depicts the picture of talukawise area irrigated by different sources whereas table No. 14 shows an area irrigated under different crops in each taluka.

Table No. 15:- Shows the talukawise number of irrigation wells in the distt.. A quinquennial census of irrigation wells takes place after every five years. For any intermediate years the village officers are instructed to note the number of new wells constructed or old wells which have gone out of use and thus bring upto date the earlier census figures of number of wells. The minor irrigation works are shown in table No. 16.

Table No. 17:- Gives the information on major and medium projects in this district. Both completed and incomplete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30th June, 1974. The cost of medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 25 Lakhs to Rs. 5 Crores where as that of a major irrigation project, it is Rs. 5 crores and above.

Table No. 18:- Deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1974. This data is collected fortnightly throughout the year from three selected Rural Centres in Nagpur District viz. (1)Mouda (2)Kuhi (3)Dhapewada.

Table No. 19:- Deals with agricultural implements in each taluka. The implements are wooden and Iron Ploughs, Carts, Sugarcane Crushers operated with power and Bullocks, oil Engines with pumps for irrigation purpose, Electric pumps for the irrigation purpose, Tractors and Oil Guanis (Less than 5 Kg and above 5 Kg.) according to 1972 Census.

Table No. 20:- Deals with Famine Scarcity and akin to scarcity data in the district for the year 1974-75.

Table No. 21:- Gives the position of Determination of precarious and other scarcity areas according to the history of scarcity in the district.

4 Animal Husbandry and Forest:-

Animal Husbandry:- In all 7 tables i.e. table No. 22 to 26 -C are included in this section.

Table No. 22:- Gives talukawise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the livestock census, 1972. The census is conducted through out the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the Live stock Census Operations the Livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry particular area was taken to enumerate, enumerated livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table. Table No.23: 24 and 25 gives talukawise veterinary Statistics, disease-wise Live stock mortality and No. of slaughter houses and animals slaughter in them for the year 1974-75.

B- Forest:- The table No. 26 (A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the year 1974-75. Data regarding forests under the control of the State Governments' Forest Department and those under the control of the State Government's Revenue Department are shown separately. The areas under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forests and unclassed forests. The legal status refers to the classification of forests under the Indian Forests Act XVI of 1927.

Reserved forests are those that are intended, mainly for timber production, wherein the rights of grazing and cultivation is allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions not so rigid. Right of grazing of cultivation is allowed, but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forests refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management or lease basis are called 'leased forests'. There is no classification of expropriatory forests as such but in Nagpur division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian Forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as expropriatory. The forest area shown in the Table No. 26(A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in Table No. 10. The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

- 1) In The Indian Forest Statistics, the whole area including non wooded area under the control of Forest Department is taken as area under forest, while in Agricultural Statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.
- 2) The Forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and the actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department as it is in the land utilisation Statistics under Agricultural Statistics.

3) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and Agricultural Statistics relate to the Agricultural year.

Table No. 26(B):- Gives the information on major and minor forest production in the District during the year 1974-75.

5. Employment, Industry, Mining and Electricity:-

In all 9 tables, i.e. tables Nos. 27 to 35 are included in this section. The factory statistic shown in table No. 27, 28 and 29 cover following types of factories registered under the Factory Act 1948.

1) Those employing ten or more workers working with the aid of power (Section 2 m (i)).

2. Those employing twenty or more workers and working without the aid or power (Section 2(ii) and 3) Those registered under Section 85 of the Act. under which the State Government means applicable the provisions of the Act, even though the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, Statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

Table No. 30:- Deals with the Annual Survey of Industries indicating industriwise working of and reporting factories, employment, fixes, working and produce capital total value of production, and value added for the year 1966. This survey is carried out by the Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Bombay, annually.

Table No. 31:- Shows the employment Exchange statistics for 1974-75.

Table No. 32:- Gives occupational distribution of total registrations and placements in the employment exchange for the year 1974-75 according to Standard National Classification.

Table No. 33:- Gives the volume of employment in different industries as on 31st March, 1975.

Table No. 34:- Gives the figures of Consumption of Electricity during 1974-75 and table No. 35 gives progress of electrification of towns and villages and population covered in the district during last decade.

6- Co-operation:- In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos. 36 to 43 are included in this section.

Table No. 36:- Gives the number of co-operative credit and non-credit societies of different types during the year 1974-75 as on 30th June, 1975 in Nagpur district.

Table No. 37:- Presents data of central co-operative Banks, Urban Banks in the District.

Table No. 38:- Gives talukawise number of Primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, Reserve and other funds, working capital, Loans advanced recovered, loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loan advanced for the year 1974-75. Working Capital includes paid up share capital, deposits reserved and other funds and borrowings, Loans Outstanding includes outstanding in respect of loans, cash credit and overdrafts and the amount of outstanding bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' refer to amount of loan or instalments which are due for collection but which were not actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

Table No. 39:- Presents the No. of societies, their membership, share capital, working capital and operation respectively for each type of co-operative societies.

Table No. 40:- Shows data regarding operation and primary Co-operative marketing societies in the district during the year 1974-75.

Table No. 41:- Gives data regarding operation and other co-operative societies of different types in the district.

Table No. 42:- Gives the value of purchases and sales of Agriculture produce through regulated markets in the district.

Table No. 43:- Gives talukawise number of registered money lenders in each taluka and loans advanced by them during the year 1974-75. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the state are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money Lenders Act, 1946. According to the Act, no money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in area for which he has been granted a licence and except in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence.

7. Medical and public Health:- In all 5 tables i.e. table Nos. 44 to 48 are included in this section.

Table No. 44:- In this table indicates number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes and medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies in this district with the number of health centres and Primary Health Centres, Doctors, Nurses, Vaidyas, Beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated as well for the year 1974-75. The table does include all the Central Government Medical Institutions and also other private institutions engaged in providing medical facilities. Private clinics ~~xxxx~~ run by Private bodies or individual individuals are however not included in the table.

Table No. 45:- Gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district. Sexwise classification of births, deaths and infant deaths for 1974 is also given talukawise in the district inclusive of the vital statistics.

Table No. 46:- Gives number of deaths due to important causes in Nagpur district during 1971 to 1974. Table No. 47:- Gives talukawise statistics of vaccination and revaccination for small pox and cholera Inoculation during 1974.

Table No. 48:- Indicates number of sterilisation operations done under vasectomy and Tubectomy with number of I.U.C.D. insertions performed during the year 1974-75 and Family Planning Centres in the district.

8. Education:- In all 7 tables i.e. table 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54 and 55 are included in this section. The data in table No. 49 is according to 1971 Census.

Table No. 49:- Gives sexwise number of literate and percentage of literacy separately for rural and Urban areas of this district according to 1971 population census. As per 1971 Census definition a person was classified as a literate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language.

Table No. 50:- Gives the sexwise educational levelwise statistics ~~incorporated~~ according to 1961 Census in Nagpur district.

Table No. 51:- Gives the sexwise educational levelwise statistics in urban areas according to 1961 Census.

Table No. 52:- Gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for the year 1973-74 and 1974-75. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teacher in these institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to 'type' is slightly different from stage of education. There were at present many Secondary Schools, which also impart education in Primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrolment of students included under 'Secondary' education. Primary institutions provided education for standards I to IV standard I to VII/VIII or less, and teach the curriculum approved by the Education Department. The Secondary institutions coach students for standard VIII to X standards with or without lower standards. Higher education is education after passing Secondary School Certificate Examination, which leads to a Degree Examination.

Table No. 53:- Presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as scheduled caste, scheduled tribes and other backward classes for the year 1973-74 and 1974-75. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting educational concessions of either type such as scholarships, freeships etc.

Table No. 54:- Gives number of beneficiaries and financial concession granted to the Economically backward class in respect of Primary Secondary and Higher Institutions in the district during the years 1973-74 and 1974-75.

Table No. 55:- Gives data regarding recurring and non-recurring expenditure under Normal, and Plan heads by different agencies viz. Zilla Parishad, Municipal Councils, Corporations, Cantonment Boards etc. during the year 1974-75 in this district.

9. Transport and communication:-

In all seven tables i.e. table Nos.56 to 62 are included in this section.

Table No. 56:- Gives total railway length as on 31st March 75 according to type of routes Broad Gauge, Metre Gauge and Narrow Gauge. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundry. The figures of length of each type of route are therefore, approximate and not accurate.

Table No. 57:- Gives road length according to different categories and surfacewise for the roads of Zilla Parishad and Building and Communication Department as on 31st March.

Table No. 58:- Gives the motor vehicles in operation in Nagpur district as on 31st March 1975.

Table No. 59:- Deals with operational statistics of National Road Transport in Nagpur division as on 31st March 1975. Forx this table, the S.T. Division Comprise of Nagpur district only.

Table No. 60:- Presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted in Buildings and Communication Department. Govt. of Maharashtra. Data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of count-post. Type of surface carriage way, No. of light Medium and heavy motor vehicles and total traffic intensity in toons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table based on traffic census.

Table No. 61:- Relates to communication system No. of post Offices, telegraph offices No. of letter Boxes, telephone numbers, Radio Licences renewed during the year 1961-62, 1965-66, 1970-71, 1972-73 + 1973-74 and 1974-75.

Table No. 62:- Relates to Rural Broad Casting Statistics as on 31st March, 1975 in Nagpur District.

10 Local Bodies:- In all 4 tables i.e. tables Nos. 63 to 66 are included in this section.

Table No. 63:- 64 and 66 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as Village Panchyats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial years 1965-66, 1968-69, 1969-70, 1970-71, 1971-72, 1972-73, 1973-74 and 1974-75. The number of Village Panchyats includes number of independent Village Panchyat as well as group Village Panchyats.

Table No. 65-A, 65-B, 65-C, gives headwise receipts of Zilla Parishad for the financial year, 1973-74 (Actual) 1974-75 (Revised) and 1975-76 Estimates.

11. Plan and Community Development:- In all 5 tables i.e. Table Nos. 67 to 71 are included in this section.

12. Prices:- Only 3 tables i.e. table Nos. 72, 73 and 74 are included in this section.

Table No. 72:- Gives monthly average wholesale prices of certain agricultural Commodities at regulated markets during the years 1974 in Nagpur District. Table No. 73 gives monthly

The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1974 along with units and varieties of Commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by the District Statistical Office, every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The average prices of each commodities for the year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too only from one shop at Distt. Headquarters, the average price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative. But the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the changing trend in retail prices over the period of time.

Table No. 74:- Gives consumer price index number (revised) series for working class of Nagpur Centre published by the office of the Commissioner, of Labour, Bombay. Monthwise data for the years 1974-75 commencing from April and also averages for the years 1974-75 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price Index (new series) is 1960. The Index numbers of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Advisor to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1952-53. The method of Construction of the index is given in the Appendix to Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India revised series (1956) issued by the office of the Economic Advisor to Government of India. The equivalent of old Index numbers can be obtained by multiplying the new index by 5.22 as Multiplier.

13- Miscellaneous:- In all 11 tables i.e. table Nos. 75 to 85 are included in this section,

Average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarters during the year 1974 in Nagpur district.

Table No. 75:- Gives the position of Police Force in Nagpur district during the year 1974.

Table No. 76:- is for crime statistics giving classification of offences under cognizable crimes and Non-cognizable crimes with the details of No. of offences, persons tried. Persons convicted and person's acquitted under above categories during the year 1974 in Nagpur district.

Table No. 77:- Gives statistics regarding work disposed off in civil and criminal courts in Nagpur district during the year 1974. The cases decided by the Distt. Magistrate and Executive Magistrates are not included in this table.

Table No. 78:- Gives the talukawise classification of cinema Talkies and Theaters during 1974-75.

The talukewise position has been depicted wherever possible and in case it is not possible, district position has been shown. Data on Agricultural statistics have been presented for the year 1973-74

Indicator No. 1:- Percentage of Gross Sown area to net area sown.

The percentage of gross sown area to net sown area increased during 1973-74 to 103.39 as compared to 101.43 during the year 1960-61. The increase is noticed in all the tahsils in the district.

Indicator No.2:- Productivity of Important Crops.

The availability of area for cultivation being limited as compared with the growing population one of the ways to increase agricultural production is to step up the productivity of crops. The productivity of crops by and large depends upon the timely rains, its even spreading over the period of the season, so also upon the adoption of hybrid and high yielding varieties of seeds use of chemical fertilisers and pest control measures.

Jowar, wheat, rice, tur and gram are the main food crops of the district, while cotton, ground nut and chillies are the major cash crops. The data of productivity for the year 1960-61 and 1973-74 are presented in the following table.

The above table indicates that there has been decrease in the productivity of all most all the crops except Rice, Gram and cotton during 1973-74 as compared to the year 1960-61. The proportion of decrease is observed to be very much in the case of productivity of tur (114.34 %). Ground nut (40.96 %) Jowar (25.09 %) However, the productivity of Rice Gram and cotton increased by 18.13 %, 33.33 % and 238.70 respectively during 1973-74 over the year 1960-61/ is notx available, productivity could not be compared. since the data in respect of chillies for the year 60-61

Indicator No. 3:- Gross Value of Agricultural Products.

As the farm harvest prices of various commodities are not available, the indicator has not been worked out.

Indicator No. 4:- Percentage of Irrigated area:-

The percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown in Nagpur District was 5.17 during 1960-61 which is increased to 8.00 during 1973-74. Low percentage of net irrigated area to area sown indicates that the irrigation facilities are very meagre in the district and needs to be improved. The percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area has slightly increased during 1973-74 as compared to the figures of previous year for the district as a whole. There was slight increase in percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown in the Nagpur district during 1973-74 as compared to 1960-61. The increase was observed in Katol, Ramtek and Savner tahsil only.

The percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area in the district has increased to 103.39 during 1973-74 over 1960-61 when it was 102.00

Indicator No.5:- Change of crop Pattern:-

The types of cropping patterns followed bifurcate the district in two parts. The first part comprises of Katol and Savner tahsils and part of Nagpur tahsil where mainly Kharif Jowar and Cotton crops are grown. The other part consists of Ramtek and Umred tahsils and part of Nagpur taluka where paddy, rabi- Jowar wheat and linseed crops are predominately grown.

The table below shows the percentage of food and non-food crops to gross cropped area in each taluka during the years 1960-61 and 1973-74.

During 1960-61 the area under food crops was approximately four times to the areas under non-food crops in the district. The areas under food crops during 1973-74 shown decrease as compared to the area under food crops during 1960-61 in all talukas of the district. Reversed is the case with the area under non-food crops. The change is due to the tendency of cultivators to grow more cash crops.

Under food crops, areas under oranges and chillies have been increased as these are cash crops. Areas under oil seeds have also increased under non-food crops. These are also cash crops. The decrease in areas under food crops during the year 1973-74 over 1960-61 was mainly due to the increasing tendency on the part of the cultivators to cultivate cash crops in general. This can be proved from the fact that the area under non food crops is increased in Katol, Savner and Ramtek Tahsils. Katol, Savner and Nagpur where cotton is grown 23% and 27% and 24% while it is limited to 4% in the tahsil of Ramtek and 8% in Umred where Paddy is the main crop. This can be proved from the fact that the area under non food crops in the Tahsils of Katol Nagpur and Savner and part of Nagpur Tahsil where paddy is the main crop. The area under food crops was therefore approximately three times than the area under non food crops during the year 1973-74 in this district.

It is seen that during the year 1960-61 almost all irrigated area was under food crops except 2.44 percent of it which was under irrigated non food crops. The area under irrigated food crops in 1973-74 decreased slightly to 97.45 percent, while the area under non food crops increased 2.55 percent as compared with corresponding figures for 1960-61. The increase was greatest in Katol tahsils while it was lowest in Ramtek Tahsil.

Indicator No. 6:- Increase in Agricultural credit and outstanding dues.

Agricultural credit is the backbone of the Co-operative movement even though it has been enlarged to marketing, processing, Industry, Labour etc. There were 2067 Co-operative Societies in Nagpur district during the year 1974-75 out of which 633 were agricultural credit societies.

The agricultural credit facilities given by the agricultural credit societies play vital role and have paved a way to bring rapid development in the rural economy. The following table shows the position of loans advanced and outstandings of loan during 1961-62 and 1974-75 in Nagpur District

The average wage rates both for males and females in the district have increased during 1974 as compared with the wage rates during 1963. The increase in average wage rates of males and females is 154.4 and 366.9 percent respectively. The average wage rates in all the three centres have been increased during 1974 as compared to average wage rates during 1963. The practice of utilising the services of carpenters, Black smiths, Cobblers and Herdsman for the whole year, on annual payment in kind called 'Baluta' is still followed at the time of harvesting in still the centres selected from this district. It is noticed that the livestock population per hectare of cultivable land has increased in all the tahsils during 1973-74 over 1960-61 except in Umred tahsil. It indicates that the cultivable land in Umred tahsil has decreased in 1973-74.

Poultry per person was highest in Umred taluka in 1972 and lowest in Nagpur taluka. It was less in Nagpur taluka due to sizable population of Nagpur district city. As compared to the 1961 live-stock population census poultry population per person decreased in Ramtek, Umred and Nagpur Tahsils, while it had increased in Katol and Saoner talukas in 1972 livestock Census.

Indicator No. 10:- Per Capita Consumption of Electricity.

In Nagpur district, electricity is generated in thermal power station at Knaperkhada and at Koradi from where it is distributed to Nagpur and other districts in the State. As a consequence of rapid development in rural electrification the per capita consumption of electricity has increased considerably in the district as can be seen from the table given below:-

The consumption of electricity has more than double during 1974-75 as compared to consumption of electricity during 1961-62. The number of villages electrified increased from 216 during 1960-61 to 1072 at the end of the year 1974-75. The percentage of villages electrified to total number villages in the district works out to 56.9 percent. There is still much scope for the progress to be made in rural electrification. To fulfill this need of the district, as well as the demand from this region, one more super thermal power station with generating capacity of 1030 MWH is being set up at Koradi. The work of this project has made considerable progress during the year under review, and one generator is functioning since 1974.

Indicator No. 11:- Increase in number of candidates enrolled in employment exchange and vacancies notified.

The table below gives the number of registration, vacancies notified and placements during the year 1960-61 and 1974-75 in employment exchange, Nagpur.

CHAPTER - IV

The basic goal of planning is improvement in the living condition of the people. The stable and progressive economy could only satisfy the requirement of rapid development. Planning pays good result if all conditions remain unchanged. Unfortunately the rural economy of the Maharashtra State has been affected by the untimely Monsoon. Development of the State can be judged from the increase in per capita income. In order to increase per capita income, the growth rate of gross national product should be faster than the rate of increase of population.

The Government of India has given high priority by giving more weightage to the programme of family planning, out of necessity for checking the rapid birth rate. The experts of the Planning have pointed out the fact that achievements and the developments of the planning have been curbed due to constant growth of population. It is, therefore, essential to check up the growth of population and to arrange proper exploitation of the resources for increase in production and set up the tempo of economic activities in general and industrial development in particular to the maximum possible extent. In the present circumstances the planning organisation has to plan the economic activities based on resources and not on requirement. It is, therefore, seen that in the present planning, all the schemes have been introduced on the priority of necessity and urgency in tune with the resources available. State Government has decided looking to the need of the day, that the planning should be framed at district level according to the requirements of district with a view of balance development.

The progress achieved under district level plan schemes during the fourth five year plan and during the first year of the fifth five year plan

in the Nagpur district has been reviewed in the following paragraphs.

In all 151 distt. level schemes have been implemented in the distt. during fourth plan. The total cost during IVth plan for each year & on major head of development is given in table 1 & 2 below.

From the above statement it will be seen that more weightage was given to the 'Agricultural Programme and 'Social Services Sector in district level plan schemes. The major expenditure in 'Social Services' head is on General Education and on water supply and Drainage work and Housing which is Rs.171.72 lakhs, Rs. 138.61 lakhs, Rs. 87.24 lakhs respectively.

In the first year of 5th Plan i.e. Annual Plan 74-75 various state level and divisional level schemes were treated as district level schemes. The budget allocations were also made on the basis of benefit received by the district if the scheme covers more than one district. Accordingly, except schemes which give benefit to the state as a whole are considered as state level schemes. Therefore except Major Industries, National and State Highways, technical and Medical Education, power project etc., other schemes are treated as district level schemes.

The allocation of outlays for district level schemes was a subject of District Planning and Development Council headed by the minister incharge for the district and assisted by the Member Secretary i.e. the Chief Executive Officer of Zilla Parishad and three joint secretaries viz. the Dy. Chief Executive Officer Planning (Z.P.), the Employment Exchange Officer, and the District Statistical Officer.

The plan scheme proposals are discussed in the meeting of the members of the D.P.D.C. and after finalisation of the proposals same are submitted to the Government in Planning Department. Final decision is to be taken after discussion at higher level.

The outlay of Annual Plan 1974-75 was of Rs. 546.49 lakhs as communicated by the State Government in Planning Department in Red book. The implementing authorities at district level were in receipt of budget provision of Rs. 469.17 lakhs at the end of the year under report, but the actual expenditure incurred is reported to be Rs. 505.57 lakhs which is 92.51 p.c. of outlay allotted and 107.74 percent of budget provision reported in six monthly progress report for March 1975. The excess expenditure is incurred by the implementing authorities after using reappropriation powers conferred on them or using misc. grants. The subheadwise outlay, budget provision and expenditure is given in the following table 3.

The outlay of 1974-75 is near about double of the expenditure incurred during each year of 4 th plan. This is due to inclusion of major and medium irrigation projects and inteensive package scheme of SICOM and also due to new educational pattern. Agricultural Programme:- This head of development is an important one as it is concerned with rural economy. The data of plan expenditure and percentage on variou s ~~skkxxx~~ subheads of development is given in table No. 4 below:-

Under Agricultural programme more weightage is given to minor irrigation works and Soil Conservation programme. The irrigation is essential to bring certainty in agricultural production. The dry farming depends upon monsoon which result in uncertainty in agricultural field. The minor irrigation pays immediate result as compared to medium and major irrigation projects. Soil Conservation ranks next to minor irrigation. Under Soil Conservation, graded bunding and paddy bunding programme has been implemented during the fourth plan and in Annual Plan 1974-75.

Agricultural Production:- During the 4th Plan, the scheme of Improved seed programme, Manure and Fertilizers, Intensive Cultivation of Food Crops, Cooperative Farming and Integrated Area Development Scheme for Small Holders have been implemented for which Rs. 39.39 lakhs expenditure has been incurred.

During the year 1974-75 only three schemes viz. Improved seed programme, Manure and Fertilizer and Integrated area development programme, were continued. The Agricultural school has been transferred to Agricultural University and other schemes have been discontinued. Under this programme following major achievements have been made.

Minor Irrigation:- During 4th Plan Malgujari Tanks were renovated and the Minor Irrigation Tanks were constructed. Subsidy for construction of new wells and old wells and Mastallation of Pump sets was also given to the farmers. By the end of 4th Plan 18 Minor Irrigation Tank work in State sector and 77 Minor Irrigation Tank work in local sector were in progress. During the year 1974-75 the work of 51 Minor Irrigation Tanks, 10 lift Irrigation schemes and one percolation tank, was under taken from regular departmental fund, and 56 Minor Irrigation Tanks under Employment Guarantee Scheme were in progress. The departmental expenditure on these works was reported as Rs. 30.35 lakhs and the amount of Rs. 36.64 lakhs under Employment Guarantee Scheme was spent on Minor irrigation tanks in bulk and megare amount on Soil Conservation works.

The following table gives the irrigation potential to be achieved during the 4th plan and in 74-75.

The achievement during 1974-75 seems to be abnormally more as compared to achievement by the end of 4th Plan. This is due to the reason that most of the tank works were nearing completion stage and were to be completed during 1974-75.

Soil Conservation:- Soil conservation is one of the most important programmes in modern agric. development. Leveling of land by contour bunding, afforestation for Soil Conservation and Reclamation of land have been done under this programme. During the 4th Plan period an expenditure of Rs. 149.69 lakhs has been incurred on this programme which was 11.68 percent of total expenditure. In 1974-75 an expenditure of Rs. 25.47 lakhs is booked under this programme. An area of 75820 acres land was contour bunded and 5318 acre land was brought under paddy terracing during the 4th Plan. The table below gives the land available for Soil Conservation Programme and level of achievement by the end of 1974-75

It will be seen from the above statement that 27.68 p.c. of area available for Terracing has been covered by the end of 1974-75. Under afforestation of soil conservation per year 50 Hectares of land has been brought under plantation with a view to avoid soil erosion.

Animal Husbandry:- During 4th Plan an expenditure of Rs.1.09 lakhs has been incurred in this subhead.

Forest:-Total geographical area of the district is 986397 hectares out of this 182846 hectares is forest area which is 18.53 percent. The scientific development of forest is expected under this sector. The schemes like plantation of General utility timber, plantation of pulpwood species, development of fodder resources have been implemented during the fourth Plan and in 1974-75. Apart from this, a scheme of Nature conservancy and development of Seminar Hills, wild life preservation has been implemented in this district. An amount of Rs. 18.38 lakhs have been booked on this sector during the 4th Plan and Rs. 3.79 lakhs during 1974-75 which is 1.43 percent and 0.75 percent of the total expenditure respectively.

Dairy Development:- Under this subhead Nagpur Milk supply scheme and scheme of subsidy to dairy cooperative have been implemented in this district. In 1969 to 70 the capacity of Nagpur Milk Scheme was to handle 13439 Liters of milk per day which increased to 34840 liters per day by the end of 1974-75.

Out of Rs. 31.30 lakhs, Rs. 0.03 lakhs is spent as subsidy to Dairy Cooperative Societies for managerial expenditure and for training for construction work and purchase of machinery for Nagpur Milk Scheme.

Fisheries:- To develop inland fisheries and to help the traditional fisheries, while covering the fisherman under co operative field, the schemes like Fish seed production, Fish farming in Impounded water Assistance for Fishery requisites and Fisheries cooperative have been implemented in this district, for which Rs. 3.70 lakhs in 4th plan and Rs 1.12 lakhs in 1974-75 have been spent. Co-operation and community Development:-

Co-operation:- The expenditure under this subhead of development during 4th plan is Rs.32.05 lakhs and during 74-75 is Rs. 0.20 lakhs. Under this head of development, the scheme to strengthen the cooperative credit structure in the distt. organisation of the consumer cooperative in rural and urban areas have been implemented. Under Agril. processing Ginning and pressing cooperatives have also been organised in this district. Industrial cooperative and other than credit cooperatives are classified under respective head of development. The total cooperative societies in this district are given in the table No. 37 to 42 of this booklet. The following societies are benefitted under various plan schemes:-

Community Development:- Under this programme an amount of Rs.27.94 lakhs has been booked during 4th plan and in 1974-75 ~~this~~ it is 3.75 lakhs. Community Development programme is being implemented in 13 blocks in this district.

Irrigation and Power:- During fourth plan the scheme of rural electrification has been implemented as district level scheme in 1974-75, the major and medium irrigation projects have also been considered as district level schemes. The cost and the expenditure on major and medium irrigation projects is divided into each district on the basis of irrigation benefit likely to be derived by them. The work of only one major irrigation project i.e. Pench Project was in progress by the end of 4th plan. During 1974-75 an amount of Rs. 46.69 lakhs has been spent on this project from plan fund.. The total expenditure on major and medium project is Rs. 129.06 lakhs during 1974-75. The work of Chandrabhaga Kesarnalla, Khekarnala and Kanholi project under medium irrigation project schemes was in progress. The schemes viz. Kolar, Mordhan, and Nakhokda projects were undertaken under scarcity programme, but there is no expenditure on these schemes during 1974-75.

The work/Chandrabhaga project is nearing completion. Under rural electrification programme the programme to electrify the villages has been undertaken. This programme has been implemented from the Normal Development Programme and Rural Electrification programme for which special provision has been made by the Central Government and loans were sanctioned by the Institutions. The latest position of rural electrification by the end of 1974-75 is given below :-

Industries and Mining:- Up to the end of 4th Plan only Handicraft industries, Handloom industries and Small Scale Industries have been given assistance under various programme. On this subhead actual expenditure is reported to be Rs. 116.31 lakhs during 4th plan. In 1974-75 a scheme viz. Package scheme of Incentives has been implemented as district level schemes, under which incentives have been offered to the Industrial/and to develop industries in this district. As per draft for 5th plan submitted by SOCOM it was proposed to give incentives under this scheme upto Rs. 6.40 crores.

In 1974-75 actual expenditure on this scheme is of Rs. 24.75 lakhs only. On other schemes like assistance to Block level village artisans scheme, development of Handloom Industries and Financial Assistance to Small Scale Industries under S.S.I. rules, an expenditure of Rs. 22.50 lakhs is recorded for the Small Scale Industries during 1974-75.

Roads:- The schemes as Major and Ordinary District Road village Approach Roads, and Roads in Hilly and in accessible areas are implemented under this subhead. During 4th plan total expenditure on this subhead is Rs. 86.47 lakhs and in 1974-75 it is Rs. 26.95 lakhs.

Social Services:- Rs.444.30 lakhs in 4th plan and Rs. 102.09 lakhs during 1974-75 have incurred under this sub-head. The following table gives the breakup of expenditure under the various subheads of development under social services.

Education:- In general education the schemes to assist primary schools, to open balwadis, training of local women workers, training programme of primary teachers, secondary teachers and teachers in colleges have been undertaken in 1974-75. During the plan period of 1974-75 8 teachers were appointed in M.C.'s primary schools and one Balbhawan was started. Under training programme 7 Extension Officers, 120 teachers of Secondary Schools, 785 primary teachers were trained during 1974-75, for which programme like subject-wise summer institutions was organised in 74-75 100 Adult prisoners were educated under the scheme of education of prisoners one centre under college complex has been opened. Additional merit scholarships to 18 students in colleges and 12 scholarships under talent development in Maths and Science has been awarded during 1974-75. 980 students were benefited under the scheme of free education to sons and daughters of primary teachers. Educational concession to additional 10800 students under E.B.C.scheme has been given for which Rs. 8.25 lakhs expenditure is recorded.

Under development and expansion of non-Govt. Secondary Schools expenditure of Rs. 8.30 lakhs has been incurred.

Medical and Nursing:- Schemes regarding Rural Health Services has been implemented in this district, under which construction of quarter for interness has been undertaken and the construction work at public Health centre has been undertaken. The expenditure during 1974-75 is Rs. 1.44 lakhs.

Water supply and Drainage:- The work of six municipal water supply schemes was in progress, for which Rs. 6.20 lakhs have been spent during 1974-75. The work of 32 rural piped water supply schemes was in progress and expenditure incurred during 74-75 is reported to be Rs. 18.02 lakhs 56 drinking water wells were constructed and 36 wells are covered under boring operation of GSDA, for which expenditure of Rs. 1.39 lakhs is incurred. The L.I.C. has given an assistance of Rs. 1.71 lakhs in form of loan to the rural pipe water supply schemes.

Housing:- Total 7 schemes have been implemented under this subhead for which an expenditure of Rs. 33.37 lakhs is incurred during 1974-75. Major expenditures of Rs. 13.00 lakhs for slum improvement and Rs. 12.32 lakhs under low income group Housing scheme is booked. 16 tenements under low income group have been completed by 1974-75. Under scheme of Extension of village Gaothan 4 villages were benefited and under scheme of House sits for landless workers in rural area an expenditure of Rs. 1.50 lakhs is incurred and 4 villages were benefited.

Urban Development:- Under this subhead the Municipal Council is to be assisted to implement the town plan approved by the Town Planning and Valuation Department. There is no expenditure on this subhead during 4th plan. In 1974-75 Kamthi Municipal Council is assisted by Rs. 3.00 lakhs.

Welfare of Backward Classes:- Exemption from payment of tuition fees, examination fees, award of scholarships had been given to 9321 students in 4th plan and 839 students in 1974-75. Building grant to one hostel of backward class students has been given. Total expenditure during 4th Plan is Rs. 4.86 lakhs and during 1974-75 is Rs. 1.23 lakhs on this

Miscellaneous:- Under this subhead Employment Guarantee scheme/ unskilled labour in rural area has been implemented for during 74-75. This programme is newly introduced during the 5th Plan. This is special programme of its type. Expenditure on this item is of Rs. 36.64 lakhs under which 11.90 lakh man days work has been provided in rural area.

Sponsored Schemes:- In addition to above schemes, centrally sponsored schemes have also been implemented in this district during 1974-75. The budget provision for these scheme was Rs. 19.19 lakhs and expenditure was Rs. 17.49 lakhs. Under this programme, scheme of Malaria Control Surveillance scheme, Family planning programme has been implemented. As a measure of family planning 2724 sterilisation operations have been done, 75 IUCD insertions have been performed and 37064 dozens of condoms have been distributed during 74-75.

Institutional finance schemes:- The Punjab National Bank advanced Rs. 100.00 lakhs as loan to M.S.E.B. to implement rural electrification programme in this district. Actual expenditure under this programme during 1974-75 is Rs. 61.84 lakhs and 127 villages have been electrified and 1128 pumpsets were given electric connections. Moreover, 2 lift irrigation schemes, have also been given power connection during the year under report.
