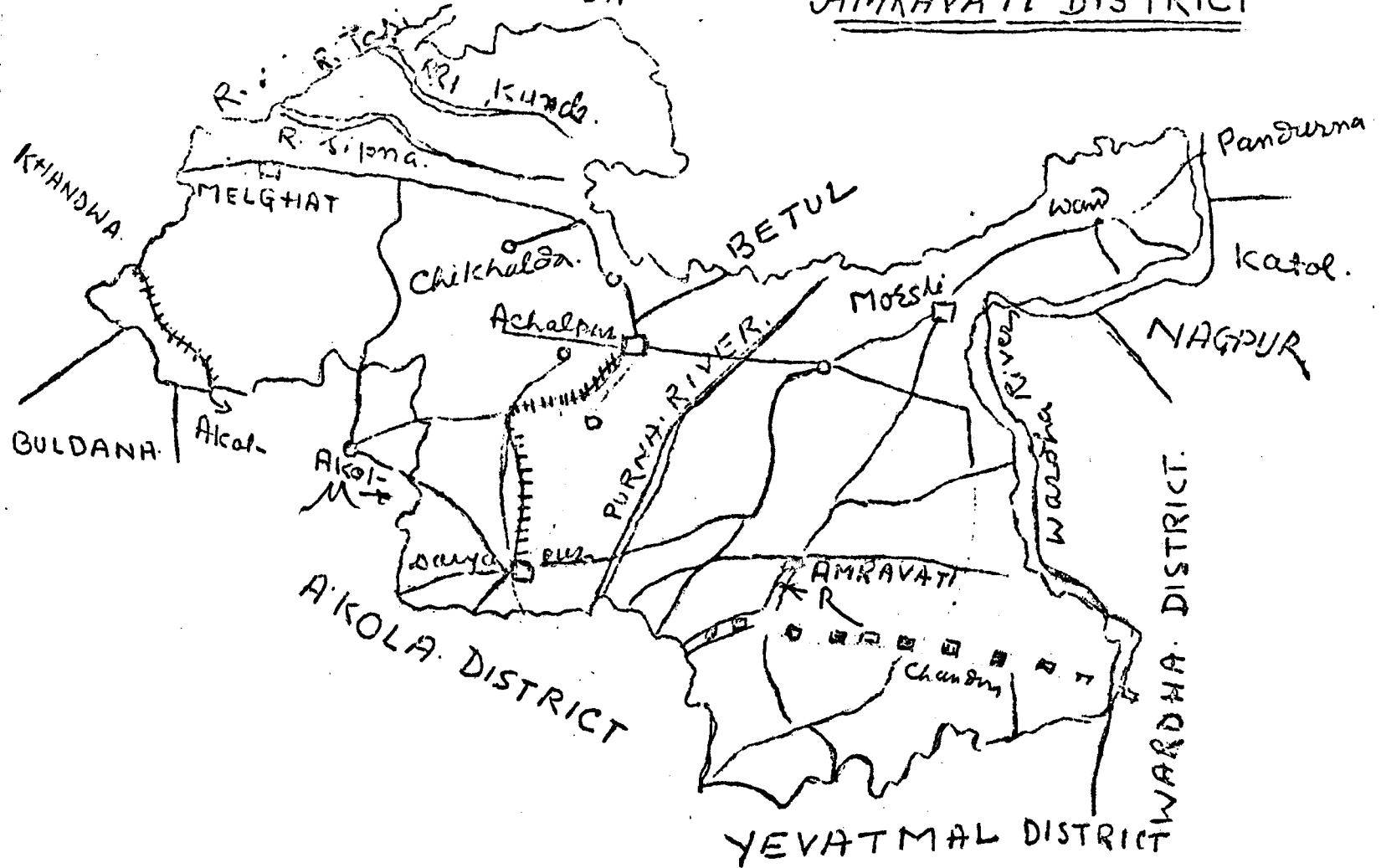

CHAPTER - I

1.1 ^{Introduction} ~~Introduction~~ Amravati district is one of the important districts of Vidarbha region, with its headquarter by the same name. Numerous legends are told regarding the origin of the name Amravati or 'Umravati'. According to one belief, Amravati district is said to have derived its name from the temple of Ambadevi situated centrally in Amravati city. According to another, the name Amravati has its origin in sanskrit which means the abode of immortals or eternal city.

Amravati has been an important place throughout all the ages in the history for one reason or the other right from ancient period to the modern times. It is believed that some of the significant events described in Mahabharat had occurred in Amravati district Kaundinyapur, which is situated on the bank of the River Wardha in this district, was the capital of the kingdom of King Bhimak, who was father of Rukmini. Royal families of Satvahans and Vakatakas were closely associated with some places in this district. One land grant has been found at Chamak in Achalpur tahsil of this district, which was made by Pravarasen II. It records the Kings, donation of 8000 'Nivartanas' of land in the village Chamak which was situated in the Bhojakata division, Bhojkata, the Headquarter of the division goes now by the name Bhatkuli.

In the eighth century, Amravati was a part of the Kingdom of Rashtrakutas. One land grant by Govinda III has been found at Anjanvati in Chaudur tahsil. The grant was made by Govinda III at his capital Mayurkhadi on the occasion of 'Tula-Purusa-gift' at the time of Solar eclipse in the Saka year 722 (800 A.D.)

In the mediaeval period, Achalpur city had been the capital of Imadsmati of Berar. During the regime of Shahajan, Achalpur formerly known as "Ellichpur" was the capital of the 'Subha' or division. In 1722, Sahu granted a sanad to Ranoji ^{For Amravati. Madhew Peshwa had a treaty with} Bhosala of Nagpur at Nandgaon near Amravati in 1769.

Under the company rule General Arthur Wellesley having defeated Marathas at Adgaon, passed through Achalpur to take the fort of Gavilgad at Chikhaldara.

During the independence struggle of 1857, Tatyasaheb Tope forced his way through the Melghat and had raised Gondas, Bhils and Korkus against the British. In the struggle for freedom also the district played an important part under the leadership of Dadasahib Khaparde, a colleague of Lokmanya Tilak and Veer Wamanrao Joshi disciples of Mahatmaji.

1.2 LOCATION:

Amravati district divided into 6 talukas lies between 20-22' and 21-46' north latitude and 76-37' and 78-27' East longitude. It occupies an area of 12,210.0 square kilometers. This district of Nagpur division is situated right in the centre of northern border of the Maharashtra State.

1.3 BOUNDARY:

The district is bounded on the north by Madhya Pradesh for the greater part by Betul district, Nimar and Chindwada on the North-West and North-East having a lesser extent of common boundaries with the district. It is bounded on the east by Nagpur and Wardha districts and on the south and south-west by the districts of Yavatmal, Akola and Buldhana.

The district boundary runs along the Tapi river on the north-west from point 1.6 K.M. north west of Bhokarbardi village as ^{702.03 162} the village Kund and to a distance beyond it, and then deviates to the south of the river and after a general easterly course along the Satpuda upto the Khirsi river, follows a course close to the valley of that river upto point 3 K.M. east of the village Katkumbha. After a tortuous course along the Satpuda, it reaches the southern-most slopes and thereafter has a general north-easterly course following in the beginning the southern most crests and then close to the base of the hills. The river Wardha forms the entire eastern boundary of the district. The boundary on the south is mostly one of administrative convenience except for western part where it runs along the course of the purna river. The boundary on the west also is mostly administrative except for an east to west stretch along the foot of the Satpudas.

1.4 DISTRICT SET UP:

Amravati district with the rest of Berar was assigned to the East Company by the Nizam following the treaty of 1853. After the province was assigned to the company, it was divided into two districts, south Berar with its headquarter at Hingoli and north Berar with headquarter at Buldana later on Hingoli, with the neighbouring region was restored to the Nizam and North Berar was reconstituted into East Berar with headquarter at Akola.

In 1934, the district of Yavatmal was separated from Amravati. In 1867 the district of Ellichpur, which at first

included the tahsil of Morshi, subsequently restored to Amravati was formed.

In 1903, the treaties of Assignment were superseded by an agreement under which Nizam leased Berar to the Government of India in perpetuity. Berar was joined to the Central Province in 1903 to form the enlarged province of the Central provinces and Berar.

With the Reorganisation of State in 1956, Amravati alongwith the other districts of the Vidharbha region, was included in the then bilingual Bombay State. Since the biburca-tion of the bilingual Bombay State, into Maharashtra and Gujrat in 1969, Amravati along with other district of Vidarbha, is an integral part of Maharashtra state.

1.5 AREA, VILLAGES AND TOWNS

The district covers, total area of 12210 sq. Kilometers (or 469.0 Sq. Miles). There are, according to 1971 census, 1978 villages, 1637 being inhabited and 341 being uninhabited. There are 13 Municipal towns in the district. The talukawise number of villages and towns is given below:-

In respect of area, the district ranks twelfth in the State and third in Nagpur division next only to Chandrapur and Yavatmal district. According to 1961 Census the population of Amravati district was 12,32,780 (6,37,861) males and 5,94,919 female out of which the rural population was 9,10,586, the urban population being 3,22,194. Amravati district was at seventeenth rank by population in numerical order among the districts of Maharashtra. In Nagpur division the district occupied fourth place in respect of population the first three being accounted by Nagpur, Bhandara and Chandrapur.

In the year 1971 Amravati district retained seventeenth place in numerical order of the population of districts in Maharashtra and its fourth place in Nagpur, division changing the order of first three as Nagpur, Chandrapur and Bhandara. According to 1971 Census, the population of Amravati district is 15,41,209 persons (7,88,073 ~~ma~~ ~~ma~~ ~~ma~~ males and 7,53,136 females) out of which the rural population is 11,16,526, the urban population being 4,24,683

During the period of 10 years 1951 to 1961, the population of this district increased by 19.55%, while during the years 1961 to 1971 it increased by 25.92%. During last seventy years it has

increased by 91.01% . The average density of population for the district as a whole was 101 per sq. km. in 1961, and it is increased to 126 during the year 1971.

The urban population as distributed amongst the different classes of towns during the year 1961 and 1971 is as under, in this district.

1.6 HILL RANGES:

With an exception of Melghat taluka, the Major part of the district is a plain region, some hills of Satpuda ranges are extended and are known as Melghat. The Gawilgad hills of the Satpuda, being near the confluence of the Purna and the Tapi rivers in the Nimar district of Madhya Pradesh and pass through the Melghat tahsil of Amravati district to Beltul district of Madhya Pradesh . In Melghat, the crests of the range attain an average elevation of 1,000 metres, the highest point being Vairat

at a height of 1,117.75 metres above sea level, the Chikhaldara and the Gawilgad plateaus being only slightly lower. The foothills bordering the Tapi river have a mean height of 500 metres. The hills are composed of the Deccan trap except that in south-easterly section along the scarp north, ^{and north-} east of Achalpur, a line of fault has been responsible for exposing the sedimentary beds from beneath the Deccan trap the northern being the up throw side of the fault.

The only other range, is a low line of trap hills, lateralised to some extent rising in the vicinity of Amravati city and extending eastwards for some distance beyond Chandur Rly. with a general average height of 50 ^{to 100} metres above the ^{surrounding} sea level. ^{Country or about 500 metres above the} Spurs from these hills extend northwards for some distance, and the barrenness of the land around them is in sharp contrast to the general fertility.

1.7 IMPORTANT RIVERS:

The Purna is the largest of all the rivers in the district which rises near Bhaishdehi in Betul district of Madhya Pradesh at a height of just over 760 metres in the Satpudas and after flowing over some 50 Kilometres in a general southerly and south-easterly direction, through hills enters the district emerging into the plains and the district boundary here along the base of the hill. It traverses across the plains of the district in a south westerly direction dividing it into halves. First it flows through Achalpur tahsil and then along the boundary between Amravati and Daryapur tahsils. Then it turns westwards to join the Tapi in Jalgaon district.

The only important left bank tributary of the Purna is the Pedhi. It rises in the low hills near Ritpur and flows in a general south-easterly course, passing by Walgaon Bhatuli and Ganoja (Devi). After crossing the district boundary, it turns and flows westwards and north-westwards to join the Purna at the point where the latter makes a very short sojourn outside the Amravati district, in Aka; a district.

The other tributaries of the Purna are the Chandrabhaga, the Shahanur and the Bordi. The Chandrabhaga river rises just below the Vairat point and after receiving a number of small streams, flows in the easterly direction. The Principal right bank affluent of the Chandrabhaga is the Bhuleshwari which passes by Shindi Bt. and Kokarda and join the Chandrabhaga near Daryapur east of Babhal.

The Shahanur rises in the Gawilgad hills near Jhireghat and after a fairly long and widening course enters the plains near Malkapur and flows southwards passing by Anjangaon and continues in this direction to join the Purna beyond the border of the district.

Other important rivers of the District are the Wardha and the Tapi. The Wardha flows along the eastern border of the district for over 80 Kms. The tributaries of the Wardha are the Chudamani, the Belmund and Mula which drain Morshi tahsil. The Tapi flows along the north-west boundary of the district for about 48 Kms. and receives through its tributaries, the Kamda, the Kapra, the Sipna and Garga a large share of the rainfall from the Gawilgad hills. ✓

1.8 SOILS:

Decomposition of Deccan traps has given rise to either deep brown to rich red or black cotton soil (regur) which is widespread in the district. The regur is rich in plant nutrients such as lime, magnesia and low in nitrogen and phosphorus. Thus Amravati district is rich in fertile black cotton and alluvial soil. The richest tracks are found in the vallies of the Purna, the War and the Wardha rivers. This soil is porous and swells considerably on addition of water and dries up with distinct cracks on loosing the moisture. The whole of Melghat tahsil is a hilly part and contains very dense forest. The soil is generally of the poorest description with some small pockets of good soil found in parts of the vallies where Kharif crops are mostly grown.

1.9 CLIMATE AND RAINFALL:

The district being in the interior, far away from both the eastern as well as the western coast, its climate is dry and extreme, yet healthy. The winters are quite cold whereas the summers are extremely hot.

After October, the temperature decreases progressively till December which is the coldest month. The mean daily maximum temperature at Amravati is 24.4 c and the mean daily minimum temperature is 14.7 c. At Chikhalda the mean daily maximum temperature is about 22.0c and the mean daily minimum temperature is about 13.0c. Temperature rises after February till May which is the hottest month of the year. In May the mean

daily maximum temperature at Amravati 42.1c and the mean daily minimum temperature is about 27.2c while at Chikhaldara the mean daily maximum temperature is about 35.0 c and the mean daily minimum temperature is about 23.0c . With the arrival of the south-west monsoon by about mid-june there is an appreciable decrease in days temperature and the weather becomes pleasant after the end of September. ✓

The highest maximum temperature recorded in Amravati was 46.7c on 25 May 1954 and 2nd June 1923. The lowest minimum temperature recorded was 5.0c on 9th February 1887.

The average annual rainfall in the district is 877.4mm in the plains. The rainfall at Chikhaldara, which is a hill station and tourists centre is about twice of that in the plains . The rainfall during June to September Constitutes 85% of the annual rainfall, July being the month of maximum rains. On an average the number of rainy days in the plains of the district is 49 in a year. At Chikhaldara there are 77 rainy days in a year.

The heaviest rainfall in 24 hours recorded in the ~~plains~~ ^{of the plains} of the district was 293.9 at Badnera on July 23, 1921. The heaviest rainfall in 24 hours at Chikhaldara hill station was 431.0 mm. on August 19, 1886.

Temperature records are available for Amravati Station. The highest maximum temperature during the year in 1975 was (44.8) in the month of (April) while minimum temperature in the month of (Dec) of the same year was 13.3 . The average maximum and average minimum temperature during the

Year 1975 was (36.5) and (33.4) respectively. The District receives a moderate amount of rainfall and comes under the assured rainfall zone. The rainfall is more or less uniform all around except in Melghat tahsil which receives a higher amount of rainfall. The rainfall recorded at Amravati station during the year 1975 was 905 mm. ✓

1.10 Latest Development in the district.

The latest Development in the district may be mentioned as below:-

(1) From the beginning of the Fifth Five Year Plan (i.e. 1974-75 - 1978-79) . The planning Commission has laid emphasis on the need to adopt multi-level approach so far as planning at the state and sub-state level is concerned. The basic idea underlying this approach is that, from the point of view of both efficiency as well as equity, etc. if is not desirable to mechanically impose the hierarchy of programme priorities, determined on the National and State level, without taking into consideration, the peculiarities of different areas as regards levels of development, Physico-Geographical conditions, resources potential and the coverage and quality of economic and Social Services. The Planning Commission has also observed that involvement of the representatives of the people in the process of formulation and implementation of the plan at Sub-State Level is essential if the message of the plan has to be translated in action at the sub-state level.

With the aforesaid underlying philosophy the district planning and Development Councils, in the state, were constituted with the functions of giving guidelines to various implementing agencies at the district level in regard to preparation and implementation of perspective. Fifth Five Year and Annual Plans and ensuring co-ordination between various implementing agencies. Besides the D.P.D.Cs. are expected to approve the perspective, Five year and annual plans within the broad frame of National and State Five Year plans and review the same from time to time and make recommendations to the State Government.

2. The major developmental activity worth mentioning in the district is that of major irrigation project i.e. Upper Wardha project the work of which is resumed now.

(3) Besides the aforesaid major irrigation project one medium irrigation project is completed i.e. Malkhed Tank and two medium Irrigation projects are coming up in the district viz. Shakhalli Nallah project and the Shekhardari project. The Shekhardari project is in the initial stage. On completion of these irrigation projects district will have an improved picture in respect of irrigation.

(4) For the benefit of the small farmers, Small Farmers Development agency has already been registered in the district. Subsequently the benefits of the agency were also extended to the marginal farmers too. The agency is doing exemplary work in the field.

(5) For Live-stock development in the district an intensive cattle Development project has come up and is catering the longfelt need of improving the Live-stock part with its centres in the interior part of the district.

(6) In the Tribal Sub-plan area of the district viz. Melghat Taluka Integrated Child Development project scheme has come up to cater to the nutritional and ancilliary needs of the fostering children and pregnant monthers. The location of the project in the tribal area presupposes to assist the backward tribals in the district.

(7) With the introduction of the Lead Bank scheme the lead Bank of the district. viz:- Central Bank of India has prepared a " Credit Plan " for the district to cater to the need of institutional finance particularly in the agricultural and industrial spheres alongwith expansion of the branches, in a phased manner, in the rural areas so as to enable the rural population to fulfil the credit need.

Integrated cotton Development project, sponsored by the Government of India, has been established at Amravati for the all rounded Deveopment of Cotton crop in this cotton growing area of the country alongwith a reseach Centre on cotton and grapes, which was long felt need of this area.

(8) Crop d&seases controlling mobile unit is run by the P.K.V. to help and assist the cultivators to check the crop destroying diseases by modern methods .

1.11 Development of the District in Agro-Industries sphere :-

The district is mainly divided into this broad Division viz: The Ghat region comprising of Melghat and Northern part of Achalpur, Daryapur and Morshi and the plains of Achalpur, Daryapur and Amravati talukas. The district lies in the assured rainfall zone. The annual average precipitation is of 750 mm. The average size of the holding in the district is 3.75 hectares. Small cultivators owning less than two hectares constitute about 46 percent of the total holders. About 58 percent of the total geographical area is under cultivation. The crop pattern of the district is dominated mainly by cotton and Jawar crops, together accounting for about 75 percent of the net cropped area cotton area cotton crop alone shares 50 percent of the cropped area.

The total irrigated area in the district accounts for about 1.75 percent of the net sown area. With the increasing irrigational facilities in the district the proportion of irrigated crop may reach about 4 percent.

The report on the resources survey on agriculture for Amravati district has not visualised large scale changes in the existing cropping pattern during the next 15 years. However due to increase in area under irrigation the presently grown varieties may yield place to short duration high yielding varieties. However on increasing trend both in area and production of groundnut crop is marked during the aforesaid survey.

As is evident Amravati district is predominantly an agricultural zone and is known for its irrigational and industrial backwardness. Though cotton and Jawar are the very prominent crops ground-nut and other oil seeds as well as the orange cultivation is fairly in large proportion.

As stated in the earlier paragraph the district is regarded as industrially and backward district, though few cotton ginning and pressing units and oil mills, Dal mills etc. are established mostly in the Amravati city and adjoining places.

Out of the two textile manufacturing units in the district Vidarbha textile Mills Achalpur is only in production where as the other unit at Badnera which was in the dormant condition has in the recent few years started few looms. Besides there is a spinning Mill in Amravati city being run on cooperative basis. In the recent years a fertilizer plant known as "Krishi-Deo" is established by the Vidarbha Marketing society. Considering the availability of raw materials infrastructure in the district fairly large potentiality is available for the growth of agro-industries. Similarly, fairly large potentiality for the growth of forest based industries is also available in the district in view of the proportionately vast area under forest. The coffee plantation in the Melghat mountain ranges though on very small scales being done by the missionaries in the Melghat taluka.

Besides the existing agro-industries of conventional type fairly large potentiality of establishing technically feasible and economically viable units of modern agro and forest based industries is available in the district.

CHAPTER - II

EXPLANATORY NOTE ON THE SCOPE AND LIMITATIONS OF THE STATISTICAL DATA PRESENTED IN PART-II (STATISTICAL ABSTRACT)

I. PURPOSE:-

The abstract part of this publication gives exhaustive statistical data on important socio-economic aspects of development. Tables on almost all important topics are presented in this part, so that the publication could serve as a reference book. Talukawise and wherever possible Panchayat Samitiwise data have been displayed as far as possible for inter taluka comparison. In most of the tables, data for 1975-76 have been indicated. The available data for latest year have been presented, wherever those could not be available for the year 1975-76. All the data are collected from the State and Central Government Offices, Local Bodies and other relevant agencies. The foot note below each table indicates the source from which the data have been collected.

II. DISTRICT AT A GLANCE:-

This table presents a birds-eye-view of the Socio-Economic indicators of development in Amravati district and Maharashtra state, under different heads such as area, population, agriculture, animal husbandry, education, transport and communication, plan and C.D. programme, Local Bodies and other miscellaneous statistics. Reference year of the data is also indicated in the table.

III. CONCEPTS, SCOPE AND LIMITATIONS:- Page No. 18

The Statistical tables presented in the district Statistical Abstract are grouped into 13 parts. The contents of the tables and the scope and limitations of the data displayed under each group are explained below.

1. AREA AND POPULATION:-

In all 7 tables i.e. table Nos. 1 to 7 are included in this section. Data for 1971 census are indicated in all the tables. Table No. 1 indicates Panchayat Samitiwise area, houses and population according to 1971 census.

Table No. 2 indicates (decadal variation) sexwise rural and urban population enumerated in 1951, 1961 and 1971 census, alongwith variation between the three censuses. The population figures for 1951 and 1961 census shown in the table have been adjusted to cover the boundaries of areas of the district and talukas as they existed at the time of 1971 Census. According to 1971 census, the term urban area as used in col. 6 of the table was defined as under:-

For any place to be recognised as an urban area (town) for the 1971 census, it was to have a municipal corporation or an area under a municipal council or a cantonment or a civil line. If it did not have any of these urban local bodies to administer its affairs, the following empirical tests were applied, (a) a minimum population of 5,000 (estimated for 1971), (b) a density of not less than 400 per Sq. Km. (1,000) per sq. mile), (c) 75 percent of the male working population pursuing occupations falling outside agriculture, (d) the place should have, according to the

Director, of Census Operations of the state, a few pronounced urban characteristics and amenities.

Table No.3 gives ^S Panchayat Samitiwise as well as talukawise classification of inhabited villages according to different population ranges. The term village (i.e. rural area) used in the table denotes a statutorily recognised village having a well defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, wadies or padas have therefore not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand, Statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as 'Uninhabited' villages. Villages also include forest villages comprising mostly of forest labourers and their families. Total population of the villages in each range is also indicated in the table, Table No.4 gives talukawise classification of towns according to population ranges in 1971 census. The table No.5 gives number of workers and non-workers in each Panchayat Samiti as well as in each taluka of Amravati district according to 1971 census, and they are classified according to ~~livelihood~~ standard livelihood classes. The population according to livelihood classes is also shown separately for rural, urban area in tables and also for the district as a whole. The concept of dependancy has been abandoned for economic classification at the 1971 census. Instead the population is classified into workers and non workers, the emphasis is now on work and not on income or economic dependence. A person is defined as worker, if (a) in case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry, etc. he has had some regular work of more than one

hour a day through the greater part of the working season and (b) in the case of regular employment in any trade, profession service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the fifteen days preceding the day of the enumerator's visit to the household.

Persons like beggars, pensioners, agricultural or non-agricultural royalty, rent or dividend receivers etc, who earn an income but who are not participating in any productive work, have been classified as non-workers.

The table No.6 gives distribution of population according to (A) Age group (B) Mother-Tongue and (C) Religion separately for Rural and Urban areas and for the district as a whole. The table No.7 gives Panchayat Samitiwise and talukawise details of schedule castes, scheduled tribes and Neobuddhist separately for rural and urban areas and also for the district as a whole.

2. CLIMATE :- (2)

Only two tables are included under this section pertaining to rainfall and temperature at the selected centres in Amravati district.

Table No.8 gives monthly rainfall and number of rainy days in each month at the selected centres for the year 1975. The data are collected through Revenue agency. A day is treated as a 'rainy day' if during the 24 hours, the rain gauge recorded a minimum of 2.55 M.M. of rainfall. Annual rainfall for each centre is also indicated in the table. 'Normal rainfall' is the average rainfall over a period ranging from fifty to eighty years. But moving average rainfall of ten year is given in this table.

Table No.9 gives monthwise 'Maximum', 'Minimum' and annual temperature as recorded at selected centres for the year 1975. The data are supplied by the Government of India's Regional Meteorological centre at Nagpur. The maximum and the minimum temperature denotes the maximum and the minimum temperature recorded on any day during the month.

3. AGRICULTURE :-

In all 14 tables i.e. tables No.10 to 23 are included in this section.

The table No.10 indicates talukawise figures of land utilisation under the standard heads of land uses for the year 1973-74, 1974-75. The breakup for the total geographical area according to different types of land uses is shown. Major constituents of the Geographical area are forest, land put to

non-agricultural uses, barren and uncultivable land, cultivable waste, permanent pastures, land under miscellaneous tree crops not included in area sown, current fallows, other fallows and lastly net area sown. Under 'Forest' are included all actual forest areas or lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forest whether state owned or private. If any portion of such land is not actually wooded but put to some agricultural use, that portion is included under the appropriate heading of cultivated or uncultivated land as the case may be, 'Land put to non-agricultural uses' stands for all lands, occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agriculture. 'Barren and unculturable land' covers all barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts etc. land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost, is classed as 'barren and unculturable land' whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. 'Culturable waste' includes all lands available for cultivation whether not taken up for cultivation or taken up for cultivation once but not cultivated during the current year and last five years, or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or not assessed and may lie in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings. Permanent pastures' and other grazing lands cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common and

grazing lands within forest areas are included under this head 'Land under miscellaneous tree crops etc. not included in the net area sown' includes all cultivable land, which is not included under net area sown, but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casuring tree, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other for fuel etc. which are not included under 'orchards' are classed under this category. 'Current fallows' comprises cropped areas, which are kept fallow during the current year. 'Other fallow' land includes all lands which were taken up for cultivation, but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and more than five years. The 'net area sown' consists of net area sown with crops and orchards, area sown more than once being counted only once. The gross cropped area represents the total of area under all crops. The difference between the total or gross cropped area and net area sown is accounted for by the area sown more than once during the same year with the same or different crops.

In table No. 16 the data about new table availability of under ground water survey for the year 1975-76 is presented Panchayat Samitiwise in the district.

The table No. 18 gives the Panchayat Samitiwise information on Major Medium projects in this district. Complete projects have been covered in this table. Position in this table is as it was on 30th June 1975. The cost of medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 crores whereas that of a major irrigation project, is Rs. 5/- crores and above.

Table No.19 deals with monthly agricultural wage rates in 1975. This data is collected fortnightly through-out the year from three selected Rural centres viz. (1) Bhatkuli (2) Bhandaraj (3) Dhami. These data also do not represent the actual wage level in the district, but are useful for studying the general trend in agricultural wage rates in the district. New table i.e. 20 is included in the publication to indicate the tehsilwise data of agricultural operational holdings area operated, no of holdings reporting irrigation and number and area of operational holdings by tenure according to the size class. Table No.22 deals with famine, scarcity, akin to scarcity and Table No.23 indicates determination of precarious and other scarcity areas.

4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AND FOREST:-

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY.

In all 6 tables i.e. table Nos. 24 to 29 are included in the section.

Table No.24 gives Panchayat Samitiwise and also talukawise number of various types of livestock and poultry as enumerated in the district in the livestock census, 1972. The Census is conducted throughout the country on an uniform basis of concepts and methods of enumeration once in 5 years. During the Livestock census operations, the livestock and poultry were enumerated by house to house enquiry, particular care was taken to enumerate livestock in slaughter houses, stray animals and animals in transit. Sex and age-groupwise classification of the livestock is also indicated in the table.

B. Forests:- The table No.28 (A) gives details of area in different types of forests during the year 1975-76 . Data regarding forests under the control of the State Government's Forest Department and those under the control of the State Government Revenue Department are shown separately. The area under forests are classified according to legal status into reserved forests, protected forest and unclassed forests.

The legal status refers to the classification of forest under the Indian forest Act. XVI of 1927. Reserved forests are those that are intended mainly for timber production wherein the rights of grazing and cultivation are seldom allowed. In protected forests, the restrictions are not so rigid. Right of grazing or cultivation is allowed but certain limitations and restrictions are imposed. The unclassed forest refers to the inaccessible forest or unoccupied waste. The forests which are taken by Government from local bodies or private individuals for management on lease basis are called 'Leased Forest'. There is no classification of ex-proprietary forests as such but in Nagpur Division, some private lands containing valuable forest are taken over by Government under section 29 of the Indian forests Act, which are not yet classified as per tripartite classification and they are termed as ex-proprietary. The forest area shown in Table No.28 (A) may not tally with the area under forest shown in Table No.10 The two sets of figures differ due to the following reasons.

(i) In the Indian Forest Statistics Returns, the whole area including non-wooded area under the control of forest Department is taken as area under forests, while in Agricultural Statistics, it is classified according to its actual utilisation.

(ii) The forest Department returns are meant to serve a definite administrative purpose and indicate the ownership of the forest areas and actual utilisation of these areas is not so important from the point of view of Forest Department as it is in the land utilisation statistics under Agricultural Statistics.

(iii) The Forest Department returns relate to financial year and Agricultural Statistics relate to the agricultural year.

Table No.29 (A) the information on inland fisheries is presented talukawise for the year 1974-75 and 1975-76 for coastal area only.

5. EMPLOYMENT INDUSTRY MINING ELECTRICITY:-

In all 10 tables i.e. table Nos. 30 are included in this section.

The factory statistics shown in table Nos.30-31 and 32 relate to the following types of factories registered under the factories act, 1948.

(1) Those employing 10 or more workers working with the aid of power (section 2 (ii)).

2 and (3) Those employing 20 or more workers and working without the aid of power (section 2 (ii))

and (3) Those registered under section 85 of the Act. under which the State Government makes applicable the provisions of the Act, eventhough the above conditions are not fulfilled. However, statistics of the Defence Factories are excluded.

The table No.34 deals with employment exchange statistics while ,the table No.35 gives occupational distribution of total registrations and placements in the employment exchange for the year 1975-76 according to standard National classification.

The table No.36 contains the data on works undertaken under Employment Guarantee scheme in the district during the financial year 1975-76 alongwith the information about employment generated and expenditure booked.

6. CO-OPERATION:-

In all 8 tables i.e. table Nos.40 to 47 are included in this section.

Table No.42 gives Panchayat Samitiwise and also talukawise number of primary agricultural societies, their membership, share capital, reserve and other funds, working capital, loans advanced and recovered loans outstanding and overdues and percentage of recovery to total loans advanced for the year 1975-76. Working Capital' includes paid up capital, deposits and borrowings. Loans outstanding includes outstanding in respect of loans, cash credits and overdrafts and the amount of out-standing bills purchased or discounted. 'Overdues' refer to amount of loan or instalments which were due for collection but which were not

actually collected and for the repayment of which no extension has been granted by a competent authority.

Table No.47 gives Panchayat Samitiwise as well as talukawise number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them during 1975-76. Separate figures of loans advanced to traders and non-traders have been furnished in the table. The transactions of money lending in the State are regulated under the provisions of Bombay Money lenders Act, 1946. According to the Act no money lender shall carry on the business of money lending except in the area for which he has been granted a licence, and except in accordance with their terms and conditions of such licence.

7. MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH:-

In all 5 tables i.e. table Nos 48 to 52 are included in this section.

Table No.48 gives the information of Panchayat Samitiwise and also talukawise number of hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, Health centres and Primary Health Centres, doctors nurses, Vaidyas, beds and total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated for the year 1975. The table covers all the State and central Government medical institutions, and also institutions owned by Municipalities. Private clinics run by private bodies or individuals are, however not included in the table.

Table No.49 gives vital statistics such as number of registered births and deaths in this district for the year 1975. The table 52 deals with the number of Family planning Centres operating in the district in the year 1975-76.

8. EDUCATION:- (29)

In all 7 tables i.e. Table No.53 to 59 are included in this section.

Table No,53 gives sexwise number of literates and percentage of literacy separately for rural and urban areas of each taluka according to 1971 population census. As per 1971 census definition, a person was classified as ^a illiterate if he was able to read or write a simple letter in any language. Educational levels in rural and urban areas are shown in table No.54 and 55 respectively according to 1961 census as these data for 1971 census are not yet available.

Table No.56 gives information regarding number of educational institutions according to types for 1975-76. Sexwise institutions is also indicated in this table. Sexwise enrolment and number of trained and untrained teachers in these institutions is also indicated in this table. The classification of institutions according to type is slightly different from stage of education. There are at present many Secondary schools, which also impart education in primary course. Nevertheless, the entire enrolment of students is included under 'Secondary education. Primary/standards I to ^{institutions coach} Provide Education for standards I to ^{or standards} VII/VIII or less and teach the curriculum approved by the education Department. The secondary institutions coach students for standards VIII to X or XI/XII with or without lower standards. Higher education is the education, after passing S.S.C. examination which leads to a Degree examination.

Table No. 57 presents data on the number of beneficiaries among backward classes such as scheduled castes, Scheduled tribes and other Backward Classes for the year 1975-76. Beneficiaries for this table are persons who are getting education concessions of either type such as scholarships etc.

9. TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS:-

In all 7 tables i.e. table Nos. 60 to 66 are included in this section.

Table No. 60 gives total railway length as at the end of 31st March 1976 according to types of route i.e. Broad Gauge, Metre Gauge and Narrow Gauge. The information is compiled from the railway time table. The railway length is measured between the first and last stations within the district boundary. The figures of length of each types of route are, therefore, approximate and not accurate.

Table No. 63 deals with operational statistics of Nationalised Road Transport in Amravati division. For this table, the S.T. Division comprises of (1) Amravati and (2) part of Wardha district of Nagpur Division.

Table No. 64 presents the results of the traffic census on important roads conducted in Building and Communication Department, Government of Maharashtra, data on the number of vehicles is according to categories and location of countpost. Type of surface and total traffic intensity in tons per 24 hours are also indicated in the table.

10. LOCAL BODIES:-

In all 4 tables i.e. table Nos. 67 to 70 are included in this section.

Table No. 67 gives abstract of income and expenditure of local bodies such as village panchayats, Zilla Parishad and Municipalities for the financial year 1975-76. The number of village Panchayat-s includes number of independent village Panchayats as well as group village panchayats.

11. PLAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT:-

In all 5 tables i.e. table Nos. 71 to 75 are included in this section.

12. PRICES:-

Only three tables i.e. table Nos. 76 to 78 are included in this section. Table No. 76 shows the wholesale prices of certain agriculture commodities at selected centres in the district.

Table No. 77 gives monthly average retail prices of various commodities at district headquarter Amravati. The average prices under each commodity are shown from the month of January to December for the year 1975-76 alongwith units and varieties of commodities for which prices have been quoted. The data are regularly collected by District Statistical Office every week on Friday by visiting the selected shops. The price of each commodity for the year is also shown in the table. As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too from only one shop at District Headquarter, the average

price for individual commodity cannot be said to be fully representative, but the data may prove useful as a broad indicator of the trend of retail prices, over the period of time.

The table No.78 gives consumer price index number (revised series) for working class for Nagpur Centre published by the Office of the Commissioner of Labour, Bombay, Monthwise data for the year 1975-76 commencing from April and also average for the year 1975-76 have been given in this table. The base year for calculating price index (New series) is 1960. The index number of wholesale prices are issued by the Economic Adviser to the Government of India. The base year for the same is 1961-62. The methods of construction of the index are given in Appendix to Index Numbers of wholesale prices in India Revised series (1961-62) issued by the Office of the Economic Advisor to Government of India.

13. MISCELLANEOUS:-

In all 12 tables i.e. table Nos. 79 to 90 are included in this section.

Table No.82 gives Panchayat Samitiwise and also talukawise Cinema statistics for the year 1975-76. Number of permanent, semi-permanent and touring theatres and their seating capacity per show has been indicated in this table. A new table i.e. table No.84 is added in this section. The talukawise information about No. of schedule Banks and their deposits and advances as on 31-3-1976 is presented in this table No.90 indicates important trends in selected indicators.

CHAPTER-III

INDICATORS OF DEVELOPMENT:

In this chapter, the pace of development under various sector in respect of Amravati has been reviewed in the following paragraphs by presenting sectoral trends, spotlighting the development during the year 1975-76, in comparison with the position in 1960-61. The data for earlier years have been used in the cases wherever they were not available for the period under review.

INDICATOR No. 1:-Percentage of gross area sown to net area sown.

The success of multiple cropping much depends upon the factors such as availability of continued irrigation facilities and the moisture retention capacity of the soils. The nature and duration of the crops grown also help in deciding the extent of double cropping. The proportion of area sown more than once with net area sown is indicated with the help of percentage of gross sown area to net sown area in the district and hence the comparison over a period of time viz. 1960-61 and 1974-75 is presented in the form of percentages of gross sown area to net area sown tahsilwise as well as for the district as a whole in the subjoined table.

It would be seen from the above table that the percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown increased to 101.72 during 1974-75 from that of 100.65 in 1960-61. Since the entire cultivation in the district is rainfed, the increase in double cropped area during 1974-75 is only 1.07 percentage over that in 1960-61. In between the tahsils, Achalpur taluka ranked first (102.64%) followed by Melghat taluka (102.61%) while the percentage is the lowest (100.28%) in Daryapur taluka.

INDICATOR No. 2:- Productivity of Important crops.

The availability of the area for cultivation being limited as compared with the growing population, one of the ways of increasing agricultural production is to step up the productivity of crops. The productivity of crops by and large depends upon the wells, spread timely rains, so also upon the adoption of hybrid and highyielding varieties of seeds, use of chemical fertilizers and pest control measures. Strenuous efforts have been made by the state Government and the local bodies like zilla parishad, and Panchayat Samitis in this direction through the implementation of various plan schemes under the subsector of "Agricultural production" and the allied sub-sectors such as "Minor Irrigation", 'Soil conservation' and "Ayacut

development" etc. The schemes were mainly pertaining to the propagation of improved agricultural practices, distribution of hybrid/highyielding varieties of seeds, chemical fertilizers and insecticides, as well as the intensification of soil conservation measures and exploitation of irrigation potential to the optimum level. However, the equitable and adequate timely rainfall is the dominant factor of all ^{other} factors in this district, since the dry farming methods are in practice almost all area in the district due to the lack of large scale irrigation facilities.

Jowar, wheat, Bajra, Tur and Gram are the main food crops of the district while cotton, groundnut, and chillies are the major cash crops. The data on productivity and total output of principal food and non-food crops for the year 1960-61 and 1974-75 are presented in the subjoined table.

The above table indicates that there has been increase in the productivity of almost all crops except paddy, Bajra and Tur during 1974-75 from 2.07% to 508.42% as compared with that of corresponding crops 1960-61. The proportion increase is observed to be too much in the productivity of cotton(508.42%), Chillies (147.93%). However productivity of wheat, Bajra, Tur decrease by 21.45%, 40.27% and 51.04% respectively during 1974-75 over that of corresponding crop 1960-61.

The total out-turn of paddy, wheat, gram, cotton, groundnut and chillies increased by 43.90%, 100.00%, 39.13%, 1.78%, 18.03% and 62.50% respectively over that of the corresponding crops in 1960-61. But total out-turn of Jowar, Bajra, and Tur decreased by 49.86%, 16.67% and 49.86% respectively as compared to that of the crops in 1960-61.

INDICATOR No.3:- Gross value of agricultural production

Since the relevant data are not available the gross value of agricultural production has not been possible to workout.

INDICATOR No.4:-Percentage of Irrigation/area

Development of irrigation is the sine qua-non for agricultural prosperity and the general economic well being of the state. Frequent visitations of draught area in agonising reminder of the fact that agriculture in Maharashtra continues to be vulnerable to the vagaries of monsoon. The inadequacy of water as well as the undulating nature of soils and existence of saline tracts are the main reasons for backwardness in irrigation and consequently the low coverage of cropped area under irrigation. In spite of the numerous schemes under implementation for development of irrigation potential, such as, construction of new wells, repairs to old wells, construction of percolation and minor irrigation tanks and bandharas, energizing of pump sets and co-operative lift irrigation schemes, the irrigation potential of the district could not be developed significantly primarily because of the dearth of suitable sites for major and medium irrigation projects. The wells irrigation forms the major part of the total irrigation so far developed in the district-

The following table shows the number of irrigation wells in 1962-63 and 1974-75 in each taluka and in district as a whole.

It would be seen from the above table that with the increase in the no. of irrigation well in use in the district as a whole as well as tahsils except Morshi, during 1974-75 as compared with those in 1962-63, the no. of irrigation wells not in use has also considerably increased in the district as a whole as well as in all tahsils except Daryapur during the period under reference.

As an alternate approach for Judging the impact of irrigation development on agriculture, the percentage of net irrigated area to net cropped area during the year 1960-61 and 1974-75 in respect of each taluka and for the district as a whole is indicated in the sub-joined table.

The percentage of net irrigated area to net cropped area increased from 1.03 % in 1960-61 to 3.36 % during 1974-75 in the district as a whole because of the increase in the sources of irrigation during the decade ending with the year under reference.

Morshi taluka has the highest percentage (2.55) in 1960-61 and (7.84) in 1974-75 while Achalpur, Daryapur, Amravati and Chandur talukas, the percentage of net irrigated area to net cropped area increased from 0.05, 0.39, 0.60, and 1.08 in 1960-61 to 4.22, 2.22, 1.89 and 2.58 respectively during 1974-75, in the corresponding talukas. However with the utilisation of irrigation potential of Malkhed irrigation tank in Chandur taluka and implementation of Upper Wardha project in Morshi taluka, it can be hoped that the prospects of extensive use of irrigation facilities in these talukas in the years to come would be rather bright.

INDICATOR No. 5:- Changes in Cropping pattern

As pointed out in the previous indicators, the cultivation in the district is predominantly rainfed. Due to the

dearth of major and medium irrigation project, the cropping pattern in the district has traditionally been adjusted in conformity with the seasonal rainfall and climatic conditions. However, with the modernisation of agricultural practices, the positive trend has been observed in the replacement of extensive cultivation by the intensive cultivation during the period of last one decade. Due to the lack of irrigation facilities, the kharif crops are grown in the major part of the cultivated land of the district and rabi crops are grown to a lesser extent.

The subjoined table indicates talukawise changes in between the area under food and non-food crops during the year 1974-75 in comparison with those in 1960-61.

It would be seen from the above table that the percentage of area under food crops to gross cropped area decreased

from 46.23 in 1960-61 to 43.63 during 1974-75. There was decrease in the area of food crop in all taluk during 1974-75. in comparison of that in 1960-61 except in Achalpur tahsil.

It would be seen from the above table that the percentage of area under irrigated food crops increased from 88.82% in 1960-61 to 89.42% in 1974-75 in the district as a whole with the corresponding decrease in area under irrigated non-food crops from 11.18% in 1960-61 to 10.58% in 1974-75. The probable reasons for the rising trend in the irrigated area under food crops might be that being the unirrigated area under food crops on the decline, that the increasing tendency amongst the agriculturists having irrigation facilities to grow more irrigated food crops so as to compensate the low yield of unirrigated food crops by high-yielding varieties of irrigated food crops.

INDICATOR No. 6:- Increase in Agricultural Credit and outstanding dues.

Co-operative movement has always been looked upon as an effective instrument of credit utilisation for the uplift of rural economy and for bringing about the decentralisation of economic power. Efforts have therefore been directed in the state from 1st Five Year Plan or even from the earlier period for building a strong Co-operative sector. Since the beginning, emphasis has naturally been on rural credit. Now the cooperative movement in the state embraces several economic activities such as agricultural credit, distribution of inputs, agricultural marketing and processing and agro-Industries etc. Agricultural finance through short term, medium term and the long-term cooperative credit is of paramount importance in the green revolution of the country. Accordingly, the Cooperative credit structure has been developed to meet the seasonal credit requirement of the agriculturists. In the district, the cooperative credit societies and especially primary agricultural cooperative credit societies (service cooperatives) are destined to play an important role in meeting the demand of short term loans of the agriculturists for financing the agricultural activity at moderate cost, alongwith the other agricultural financing agencies viz. The Maharashtra State Cooperative Land Development Bank Nationalised Banks etc. However the financing by these other agencies is generally done on long term and medium term basis.

The information regarding the number of primary cooperative credit societies, the position about their advances and the outstandings during 1960-61 and 1975-76 is presented in the subjoined table.

It would be seen from the above table that the number of primary cooperative credit societies in the district increased from 647 in 1960-61 to 727 during 1975-76. Similarly the increase in No. of primary cooperative credit societies has been during 1975-76 in all the tahsils over those in 1960-61 in corresponding tahsils.

Likewise there has been considerable increase in the volume of advances by the cooperative credit societies as well as in that of their outstandings during 1975-76, in comparison with the corresponding figures of 1960-61. The total advances in 1975-76 increased to Rs. 959.47 lakhs from Rs. 145.21 lakhs in 1960-61. The outstandings have also been of the order of Rs. 941.57 lakhs during 1975-76, but for want of the information about the extent of outstandings in 1960-61, the proportion of increase therein by 1975-76 could not be brought out.

INDICATOR No.7:- Agricultural Wage Rates

Wage rates of agricultural labourers are being regularly collected from three rural centres in this district since 1963. The average daily wage rates of male and female agricultural labours are given for these 3 centres in the following table for the years 1963 and 1975. These wage rates might not be representative of the tahsils in which these centres are situated, as a whole, but they may prove useful in studying the general trend in agricultural wage rates prevailing in the tahsils and district during the years under reference.

The average wage rates for agricultural field labourers increased from Rs. 1.45 in 1963 to Rs. 3.16 during 1975 for male workers and Rs. 1.08 to Rs. 1.78 for the female workers during the same period. Thus the increase in the wage rates of male workers accounted for 117.93 % and that in the case of female workers accounted for 64.81 % . The wage rates for male and female agricultural workers were the highest at Bhatkuli and Dhami Centres respectively during 1975.

The table below indicates the average wage rates for skilled labourers (Males) such as carpenter, blacksmith and other labour during 1963 and 1975 for three centres in the district.

It is seen from the above table that the average wage rates for skilled labourers as well as for other labourers showed upward trend in 1975 over those in 1963. In general the variations in the wage rates of skilled labourers were not much significant except in the case of Bhandaraj centre, wherein the wage rates for carpenter were reported @ Rs. 6.50 when the same were prevailing at Bhatkuli and Dhami Centres @ Rs. 10.00 each respectively.

INDICATOR No. 8:- Livestock per hectare of cultivable land.

Animals besides providing major draught power for agricultural operations, are the important source of food, manure and other raw material.

The following table gives livestock population (Ovine and bovine) per hectare of cultivable land in each taluka as well as for the district as a whole as per 1961 and 1972 livestock census.

The Livestock population per hectare of cultivable land has decreased from 1.04 in 1961 to 1.03 in 1972, the decrease being very negligible. According to 1961 Livestock Census, the proportion of livestock per hectare of cultivated land was the highest 1.38 in Melghat taluka and the lowest (0.92) in Daryapur taluka. During 1972 Livestock Census the highest ranking has been retained by Melghat with 2.04 and the lowest (0.78) proportion of livestock per hectare of cultivable land has been observed in Daryapur taluka.

Net cultivated area per head of the Livestock was the lowest (0.40) in Melghat taluka, where as the same was the highest (1.26) in Daryapur taluka. In other words, the proportion of livestock with the net cultivated area was the lowest in Daryapur taluka and the highest in Melghat Taluka.

INDICATOR No. 9:- Poultry as compared to population

Poultry, generally includes a variety of domestic birds like fowls, ducks, gease, turkeys and guina fowls. poultry provides mostly subsidiary income and food by way of eggs and meat to the pesasantry.

The following table shows the number of poultry birds per hundred persons in each taluka during 1961 and 1972.

It would be seen from the above table that the number of poultry birds per 100 persons in 1961 worked out to 16 and it decreased to 12 in 1972 in the district as a whole. Amongst the six talukas, Melghat was at the forefront accounting for 66 and 34 poultry birds per 100 persons in 1961 and 1972 respectively. Achalpur taluka accounted for the lowest number (10) of poultry birds per 100 persons in 1961, while in 1972, Amravati and Daryapur talukas accounted for only 9 poultry birds per 100 persons.

According to the livestock census of 1972, it was estimated that the district had an average ⁶² 62.42 poultry birds per 100 households as against 129.01 and 137.40 in the division and state respectively (according to 1966 livestock Census).

INDICATOR No. 10:- Per capita consumption of electricity.

Availability of cheap and reliable power supply is one of the key factors in the economic development of both urban and rural areas and is the basic requirement of for industrial as well as agricultural development. Demand for

power therefore, is continuously on the increase due to industrial progress and considerable emphasis on rural electrification. Electricity has also been exploited in the task of energizing the pump sets mainly for irrigation of crops and thereby stepping up the agricultural production in the district.

The following table indicates per capita consumption of electricity in 1961-62 and 1975-76 in Amravati district.

It is seen from the above table that per capita consumption of electricity increased from 24.66 Kwh. in 1961-62 to 58-89 Kwh. during 1975-76, the percentage of increase being 138.81. The rural electrification in Melghat taluka which was handicapped for want of feeding line has now gathered momentum, especially efforts, have been concentrated to accelerate the rural electrification programme through the funds made available by the Agricultural finance corporation and the Rural Electrification corporation.

INDICATOR No.11:- Increase in the number of candidates enrolled in Employment Exchange Vacancies notified and placements.

The problem of providing the gainful employment to the thousands of unemployed and under employed has been a great concern for the planners in the Nation. The problem

has not been of only illiterates, but also of the educated unemployed. The sub-Regional Employment Exchange has been functioning at Amravati and it helped the employers and employment seekers. It has been made compulsory for the employers in public and private sectors to notify the vacancies for recruitment to the district Employment Exchange, which in turn acts as liaisoning authority in between the employers and employment seekers.

The sub-joined table indicates the comparative data on registrations, vacancies notified, and the placement of candidates through the Sub-Regional Employment Exchange in the district during 1960-61 and 1975-76.

It would be seen from the above table that the increase in the no. on registration and on the Live Register of Sub-Regional Employment Exchange during 1975-76 over that of 1960-61 was 22.33 and 301.63 percent respectively. However, the vacancies notified and the placements decreased during 1975-76 by 14.83 % and 13.82 respectively.

INDICATOR No. 12: Increase in the number of indoor and outdoor patients treated.

Proper care of public health is one of the primary responsibilities of a modern state. Industrialisation and the resultant urbanisation created new problems so far as public health administration is concerned. Though the diseases like plague is the thing of the past, the out-break of epidemics are not very un-common. Special campaigns have been launched in earlier Five Year plans for the eradication of epidemics with considerable success in controlling the said epidemics.

The general aim of health programme is to expand the health services so as to bring them within the reach of common man, and to provide progressive improvement in the level of natural health. Provision of adequate institutional facilities for organising health services, control of communicable diseases, improvement of environmental hygiene comprising better sanitation and protected water supply and training of medical and health personnel are some of the important health programmes taken up for the improvement of general health standard. Another distinguished aspect of the public health programme of national significance that of restricting the growth rate of population to the optimum level through the media of family planning measures.

Modern improved medical facilities have gone a long way in raising the average expectancy of life-span in the country coupled with the decrease in death rate and infant mortality.

The following table indicates the number of indoor patients and out-door patients treated in each taluka and the district as a whole during the years 1961 and 1975, through the medical institutional facilities available therein.

It would be seen from the above table that the number of indoor patients treated in hospitals during 1975 has increased in all the talukas in the district as compared with those in 1961. Comparatively the highest increase was observed 969.62% in Amravati taluka and the lowest increase was observed to be 29.79% in Chandur taluka.

The number of outdoor patients treated has been decreased during 1975 in Achalpur, Daryapur and Melghat taluka while the same has been increased in Amravati, Morshi, Chandur rly. taluka and district as a whole, over the corresponding figures in 1961. The proportion of decrease was the highest (17.66) in Achalpur.

INDICATOR No. 13:- Increase in the no. of students.

" Suitably oriented system of education can facilitate and promote social change and contribute to the economic growth not only by training skilled man power for specific tasks of development, but what is more important by creating the requisite attitude and climate. Facilities for universal elementary, ^{are a pre - requisite for equality of opportunity} Education, imparted in its proper perspective can ^{be said.} thus touch the very core of human life".

The broad objective during the fifth plan under this sector is universalisation of education of all children up to 14 years of age, the avoidance of wastage and stagnation at the pre-primary stage by developing pre-school centres to help children of 4+ and 5+ age group in to habits of good health, to cover 1300 hamlets with primary education facilities, to give an impetus to girls' education and education of S. cs and S. T. S. Under Minimum Needs programme it is proposed to attain 95% enrolment in the age-group 6-12 and 49.3% enrolment in age-group 11 to 14, to have a primary school within 1-5 Kms. and a middle school within 5 Km. every village.

The policy of the Maharashtra Govt. is based on the National policy on Education and is emphasizing the following objectives.

- (1) To transform the educational system as to relate it more intimately to the needs and aspiration of the people.

- (2) To provide increasing facilities in all ranches and at all stages of education with a view to providing equal educational opportunities to all sections in large scale.
- (3) To make special efforts for educational development of socially and economically under developed classes and areas.
- (4) To pay special attention to the education of minorities as provided in the constitution,
- (5) To make efforts to develop and implement a comprehensive programme of games, sports and youth welfare activities at all stage, by making physical education an integral part of education.
- (6) To improve and develop standard of education to give special assistance to under-developed areas and institutions situated therein implementing programme of qualitative improvement,
- (7) To discover and develop talents in various fields.

According to 1971 Census, 42.36% persons (52.28% males and 31.69% females) of the total population of the district were literate as against 37.85% and 39.18% percent literates in the division and state respectively. While according to 1961 Census 33.68% persons (45.95% males and 20.57% females) of the total population were literate. Thus in 1961-1971 decade there has been considerable increase in the proportion of literates in the district.

The most remarkable feature of educational growth in the recent years is the progressively rising demand of educational facilities in rural areas. The table indicates the no. of boys and girls attending primary, secondary and higher educational institutions in the district during 1960-61 and 1974-75.

The growth of primary education in the district has been noteworthy during 3rd Five Year plan and onwards. The No. of students attending primary schools increased from 1,25,066 in 1960-61 to 2,28,906 during 1974-75 having 83.03 % increase over 1960-61. The no. of primary schools increased from 1147 in 1960-61 to 1472 during 1974-75.

As regards secondary education, fact progress has been made in regard to the no. of schools and enrolment therein during the period under review. The no. of secondary schools increased from 116 in 1960-61 to 225 in 1974-75.

Most of these schools are functioning in remote places of the district. The enrolment of students increased by 154.86% during 1974-75 over that in 1960-61. The proportion of increase in the no. of female students has been more than twice (275.50%) of that of the boys (110.69%). Higher education Facilities also registered an increase in their no. by 244.44% and in their enrolment by 207.68% during 1974-75 over the corresponding figures of 1960-61.

INDICATOR No. 14:- Increase in Road length per 100 Square Kms.

Road communications constitute an important item of infrastructure for the progress of all developmental activities. Amravati district enjoy comparatively favourable position in the case of railway route and road links. The road development programme aims at completion of missing links and the roads provision as envisaged in Minimum Needs programme under road development.

The sub-joined table indicates the road length of pucca roads per 100 Sq. Kms. of area in Amravati district during 1961-62 and 1975-76

It would be seen from the above table that the road length of pacca roads per 100 Sq. Kms. of area increased from 8.84 Km. to 27.63 Km. at the end of 1975-76, (The road length maintained by Forest Department and Municipal Councils in the district is how^{over}, not considered.

INDICATOR No. 16:- Increase in banking facilities in proportion to Population.

In present intrigue economy, banks play very important role. With the approach of banking facilities in rural area, it helps to mobilise deposits and mitigates the shocks of economy upheavals. Since the nationalisation of 14 leading banks in country these institutions have been extending financial help to the promising entrepreneurs and have been providing capital to the small scale industries and petty traders. The cooperative banks have been in particular, much helpful in catering the credit needs of the agriculturist from rural areas.

Since 1961, there has been considerable increase in the banking facilities in the district. The branches of scheduled banks & cooperative banks have also extended term leading in rural areas of the district.

The following table indicates the statistics about the banking facilities in the district for the year 1961 and 1975.

Each banking office on an average served 49,311 persons in 1961, which reduced to 19759 persons per banking office in 1975, because of 212% increase and spread of banking offices over the period under review.

INDICATOR No. 16:- Change in the price level of important Commodities.

The District Statistical Office in each district has been assigned with the regular work of collection and compilation of weekly retail prices quotations of important commodities at the district head-quarter on every Friday as a part of its normal functioning. The price collection work has been started by D. S. Organisation since the declaration of the state of Emergency in the country consequent upon the Chinese aggression on our north-eastern border in October 1962, and the same has been continued with a view to facilitate the observation of the trend in prices fluctuations at the district head quarter.

The retail quotations of 51 selected commodities, under the various sub-headquarters, such as cereals, pulses, clothing, utensils, fuel and beverages etc. are being regularly obtained from the selected shops at the district head quarter.

The varieties of the commodities which are most commonly used by the majority of the people have been considered for these price quotations.

The annual average prices of some of the important commodities for the 1963 and 1975 are presented in the sub-joined table.

It would ^{be} seen from the above table that there has been overall increase in the average prices of all the commodities during 1975 as compared with those in 1963. The extent of increase in the average prices has been more than 50% in the case and all essential commodities, except tea and potatoes the average prices of which have been increase by 42.55 and 4.00 percent respectively over the corresponding prices of the respective commodities in 1963.

The minimum increase has been observed in the average prices of potatoes (4.00%) and the maximum increase has been observed in the average price of Rice (461.33%) during 1975 over the corresponding prices of commodities in question. The increase in the average prices of cereals and pulses has been from 192.04% to 461.33% during 1975 respectively over those of the corresponding commodities in 1963. The average prices of majority of commodities in general and of cereals and pulses in particular have registered very

steep rise from 192.04% to 461.33% during 1975 in comparison with those of corresponding commodities in 1963. Likewise the average prices of other essential commodities like ground nut (277.29%), sugar (272.13%), Gur (142.85%), Turmeric (179.47%), Dry Chillies, (334.51%), Charcoal (217.00%), Firewood (133.65%), and Kerosine (139.53%) indicated galloping increase in the year 1975 over those in 1963.

C H A P T E R - I V

ANNUAL PLAN- 1975-76

The country is on the eve of the Fifth Plan. The draft Fifth Plan of the state which was formulated in accordance with the guidelines laid down in the national and the state approach to the fifth plan has yet to be finally approved by the planning commission. However the National Development council endorsed the draft fifth five year plan of the state in December 1973, but on account of some unforeseen factors which emerged since the publication of the draft plan it has not been finalised. The size of Maharashtra's Fifth Five Year plan was tentatively fixed at Rs. 1921 crores proposed in the draft plan.

The emphasis in the Annual Plan for 1974-75 was on the development of the core sectors, viz. Irrigation, Industry, Agriculture and Power which, both in their operation as well as in their financial outlay, have a long term impact on the economy. The thrust during coming year will continue to be the same. Special feature which distinguish the state's Annual Plan for 1975-76 are (i) District Planning (ii) Employment Guarantee (iii) Area Development and (iv) Improvement of urban Environment.

1975-76 is the second year of the Fifth Five year Plan. The state Government had provided an outlay of Rs. 354.64 crores for the year 1975-76 for the state.

In the Maharashtra State, the district is adopted as a unit of planning and district planning bodies have been

constituted for the district. The District Planning and Development council formulated the draft Fifth Five Year Plan (1974-79) for the district with the financial ceiling of Rs.39.42 cores with complimentary outlay of Rs. 4.39 crores and Rs. 3.26 crores on state level and centrally sponsored scheme respectively. Rs. 57.97 crores are anticipated by way of institutional Finance. Like wise the Annual Plan 1975-76 was formulated by the District Planning and Development Council as per the guidelines from the Government

Under the Annual Plan 1975-76, total provision of Rs. 493.49 lakhs was made for various district level schemes under the state sector and local sector. As against this

budget provisions the total expenditure of Rs. 445.14 lakhs has been booked forming 89.89 percent of the total budget provision, booked forming 89.89 percent of the total provision.

The sectorwise budget provisions and expenditure of Annual Plan 1975-76 are indicated in the subjoined table.

It would be seen from the above table that the highest share (35.68 %) of budget provision was earmarked under the Agricultural programme followed by social services (28.57 %). The remaining budget provision was shared amongst cooperation and community Development 1.33 %, Irrigation and Power (15.66 %) Industry and Mining (1.96 %) Transport and communication (6.67 %) and Miscellaneous (10.13 %).

As compared to the previous year 1974-75. The provision of Rs. 404.72 lakhs was made for various district level schemes. As against this budget provision the total expenditure of Rs. 343.58 lakhs has been booked forming 84.89 percent of the total budget provision. The total expenditure on district level plan schemes during the IVth plan period is 1357.34 lakhs major headwise expenditure is stated below.

Agriculture and allied programme have been given high priority in the Annual Plan 1975-76. The schemes included under this sector were aimed at increasing agricultural production and these schemes were pertaining to (i) Agricultural production (ii) soil conservation (iii) Minor Irrigation (iv) Animal Husbandry (v) Dairy Development (vi) Forest (vii) Fisheries and (viii) Ware housing and marketing.

Keeping in view the main objection of achieving a stage of self sufficiency in food-grain of the Fifth plan the programme of bringing large areas under hybrid and high yielding varieties has been intensified simultaneously with the creation of irrigation potential from minor irrigation tanks.

The table below indicates the budget provision and the expenditure on different sub-sectors under the sector Agricultural programme during the Annual Plan 1975-76.

The distribution of Improved varieties of seeds of wheat, Jowar, Cotton pulses was made to the extent of 2114, 1415, 3567, 268 quintals respectively during 1975-76. Similarly, the distribution of 25,552 quintals of chemical fertilisers of various type has been made during the reference period. Moreover, the schemes relating to the intensive cultivation of food crops various package practices of Plan protection, Horticultural Development etc. were continued to be implemented during the Annual Plan of 1975-76. under soil Conservation programme bunding is completed for 11,133 hectares, terraced for 41 hectares and reclaimed for 41 hectares.

In order to boost up the irrigation potential the programme of minor irrigation, wells construction and lift irrigation has always received high priority in the State's Development programme under this programme an additional area

of 611 hectares have been covered by newly constructed irrigation wells and 27 pump sets have been energised. The irrigation potential of 132 hectares and 150 hectares has been created by the lift irrigation scheme on the riverside and minor irrigation tanks respectively.

Under the sub-sector Animal Husbandry there was a continued schemes to extend for cattle wealth improvement 3710 Improved birds were supplied. The provision under Dairy Development has been utilised mainly for strengthening Amravati milk supply scheme.

Under Fisheries, the provision has been utilised for Assistance for fisheries requisites, Fish farming in impounded water. The stocking and netting of fish are 8.13 lakhs and 0.80 lakhs respectively.

II. Co-operation & Community Development

The cooperative sector has played and will continue to play a very significant role in the development of Economy It an major instrument for implementation of rural development programme, such as credit, marketing, processing, large and small industries, housing, distribution of consumes articles and training in cooperative leadership. Efforts have therefore, been directed from the first five year plan for building up strong cooperative sector. In the beginning emphasis was naturally was on rural credit. During the course of past 20 Years, its scope has considerably widened. During the annual plan of 1975-76 total Expenditure of Rs. 2.53 lakhs has been incurred on various schemes,

such as strengthening of credit structure, Development of Co-operative Marketing, Agricultural processing Societies consumer cooperative in urban area and share capital contribution to Dhanwantri Cooperative Hospital.

Under the sub-sector community Development total expenditure of Rs. 4.33 lakh has been incurred during the year 1975-76 as against the budget provision of Rs. 4.53 lakhs. Under the programme, all 13 existing blocks covering entire rural area of the district were continued and applied nutrition programme was also continued in 3 blocks during the year 1975-76. Likewise large no. of C.D. scheme, such as distribution of hybrid/high yielding varieties of seeds, chemical fertilizers, pesticides and insecticides, veterinary services and artificial insemination facilities, Family Planning programme public health programme and Gram Safai Programme were taken through block agencies during the year 1975-76.

III. Irrigation and Powers

Irrigation is the sine qua-non for agricultural prosperity and the general Economic well being. The scheme of sakhli Nalla and sheikdari project have been under taken under medium irrigation project and an expenditure of Rs. 8.58 is booked on the sakhali nalla project during the year 1975-76 No expenditure could be booked on sheikdari project.

Under the rural Electricity programme an expenditure of Rs. 69.11 lakhs was booked as against the budget provision of Rs. 63 lakhs during the Annual Plan period of 1975-76.

The Electrification of 63 villages have been completed. Total no. of electrified villages ^{increased} to 1173 villages as on 31-3-1976. Similarly with the provision of 27 new connection for pump sets has increased to 20243 in the district as on 31-3-1976.

IV. Industry and Mining.

The industrial development in Maharashtra is not without its weak points. Amravati district has been one of the 13 district which have been identified as industrially backward. Naturally under the sector industries and mining, the schemes for Development of small and cottage industries were implemented. Total expenditure of Rs. 8.76 lakhs was booked on the schemes for development of small and cottage industries and package scheme as against the provision of Rs.9.66 during the Annual plan 1975-76.

V. Transport and communication:

The net work of roads has to be developed to meet the requirement of infrastructural needs for various growth centres. The plans of transport and communication, however now aims at the serving of following ends and fulfilment of largest of road development under minimum needs programme.

i) to narrow down the disparities among different area by even spread of transport facilities.

ii) to meet the requirement of industrial and Economic development by linking industrial and trading centres to interior rural areas.

iii) to meet the needs arising out of the development of places of education and cultural importance tourists interests and urban complexes etc, and

iv) to cater the needs of rural areas particularly agricultural markets, backward areas including hilly inaccessible areas.

As against the budget provision of Rs.32.94 lakhs an expenditure of Rs. 27.94 lakhs has been booked on the road development during the Annual plan 1975-76 in the district. No. expenditure has been booked under Tourism as against the budget provision of Rs.0.50 lakh. The percentage of expenditure to budget provision was Rs. 84.87 under the road development. The completion of incomplete works taken during scarcity period and spill over items were given priority besides, modernisation of existing roads and construction of bridges and culverts incomplete in earlier plan period were aimed to be completed. Now roads length of 37 Km. earth work, 17 Km. surfacing 13 Km. metal dipping and the work of 18 culverts has been completed during the Annual Plan period of 1975-76.

VI. Social Services

Under the sector 'Social services the various schemes pertaining 10 sub-sectors viz. 1) General Education 2) Technical education 3) Public Health 4) Nutrition programme 5) Water supply and drainage (6) Housing 7) Urban Development 8) 4A 8) Welfare of Backward classes 9) Social welfare 10) Labour and Labour welfare were implemented during the annual plan of 1975-76.

Under the sub-sector 'General education total expenditure of Rs. 37.36 lakhs was booked out of the provision of Rs. 31.23 lakhs forming 119.63 % of the provision in 1975-76. The scheme of attaching standards V or VII to secondary school Building, Grants to Zilla Parishad for primary school Building, Grants to Municipal Council for primary Teachers, increased grants to 'A' class Municipalities for primary Education have been implemented

during Annual Plan 1975-76. 30 Primary school Buildings were constructed and 1305 adults have been literate.

As regards secondary education, Development of non-Government secondary schools, Additional standards in Ex-Government Secondary schools, ^{Grant of R.P. for Ex-Govt. Secondary} Building Development of facilities for S.S.C. Education and Development of Higher secondary education (*New Pattern*) were implemented during the year 1975-76.

Under the sub-sector Technical Education total expenditure of Rs. 0.27 lakhs has been booked as against the budget provision of Rs. 0.59 lakhs forming 45.76% of the budget provision during Annual plan 1975-76. The scheme of Re-orientation ^{entation} of Diploma Courses in Engineer and Technical with ^{with} ~~and~~ pattern has been implemented.

Under the health programme the scheme of training of Nurses (construction of Nurses quarters at Civil Hospital, Amravati) expansion facilities in Civil Hospital (Non-teaching), Primary Health centres, sub-centres and rural hospital etc. (Construction works), increase in medical grants of public Health centres and sub-centres, T.B. Hospital Amravati. Additional alteration of X Ray machine have been implemented during 1975-76 Annual Plan with total expenditure of Rs. 10.76 lakhs. as against the budget provision of Rs. 16.39 lakhs. The percentage of Expenditure to budget provision was 65.65 under the family planning programme and 21761 sterilisation were carried out under centrally sponsored scheme.

Under the sub-sector water supply and drainage total expenditure of Rs. 43.23 lakhs has been booked as against the budget provision of Rs. 43.75 lakhs during Annual Plan 1975-76, 5 Drinking water wells have been constructed and boring operations of ground water survey and development Agency were continued in the district.

Nutrition programme is formulated with the object of providing nourishment to weaker sections and school going children. Under the subsector, Nutrition programme' applied nutrition programme and special Nutrition programme with an expenditure of Rs. 0.46 lakhs has been continued in three blocks of the district and two triple Development blocks respectively during the Annual Plan 1975-76. Total amount of Rs. 0.83 Lakhs was provided for implementation of this scheme and as such the percentage of Expenditure to budget provision comes to 55.42% under the sub-sector' Housing' the scheme in-respect of sub-sidised Industrial housing scheme for low income group, Basic Amenities to Zopadpatties, Tiling of roofs of Huts, extension of village Gaothan and provision of House sites and construction of huts for landless labours have been implemented with total expenditure of Rs.20.72 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs.21.76 lakhs during Annual Plan 1975-76.

The programme under 'Welfare of backward classes' supplements the other development programme in other sectors which directly or indirectly benefit the members of the backward classes. It has been recognised that it is very important to increase the level of income of these classes by providing

againfull employment. The programme under this sector therefore constitutes Social and economic upliftment schemes for welfare of backward classes, alongwith health, housing and other schemes. An expenditure of Rs. 9.47 lakhs was booked on the various schemes under welfare of backward classes as against the provision of Rs. 22.83 lakhs, during 1975-76 Annual Plan.

Under the sub-sector 'Social Welfare' the schemes relating to non-institutional services to destitute children, expansion of work under the children act, rehabilitation of physical handicapped. Rehabilitation of leprasy affected persons etc, have been implemented in the district during Annual Plan 1975-76. An expenditure of Rs. 0.45 lakhs has been booked as against the budget provision of Rs. 0.64 lakh.

Under the sub-sector labour and labour welfare the scheme of craftsmen Training in Industrial Training Institute Amravati has been continued with total expenditure of Rs.0.20 lakhs as against budget provision of Rs.0.20 lakhs during Annual plan 1975-76.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS:

Under the sector 'Miscellaneous' the scheme of employment Guarantee scheme has been implemented during the Annual Plan 1975-76 with an expenditure of Rs.32.05 lakhs as against the budget provision of Rs. 50.00 lakhs. Soil conservation works 39, forest worked 3 and minor irrigation Tanks 2 have been completed under this scheme. Most of Minor irrigation tanks and Soil conservation works are nearing completion.
