INTRODUCTION

LOCATION

Nanded District is one of the 5 districts of Marathwada region of the Maharashtra State. Nanded town which is the district Headquarters is situated on the bank of Godavari river which flows east wards through the central part of the district. The District lies between $18^{\circ} - 15'$ and $19^{\circ} - 55'$ north latitude and $77^{\circ} - 7'$ and $78^{\circ} - 15'$ east longitude. The area of the district is 10333.30 Sq.Km. i.e. (3989.7 Sq.Miles) and the population in 1961 is 10,79,674. In terms of area and population it forms 3.37% and 2.73% of the State respectively.

BOUNDARIES

The district is bound on the north by Yeotmal district, on the east and ~~east~~ south by Adilabad and Nizamabad districts of Andhra Pradesh, on the south west by Osmanabad district and towards the west by Parbhani district.

HILL RANGES AND FORESTS

There is only one main system of hills known as Bhag or Thanvari range. It traverses the district from north west to south east. There are a few minor ranges of hills in the Nanded, Kandhar, Hudgeon Talukas and Bhokar Mahal.

The area under forest is over 300 Sq.Miles forming 8.27% of the total geographical area. Major portion of the forests in this district is in Kinwat taluka, where 25% of the area is forests. Kinwat and Hadgaon Talukas and Bhokar Mahal are gifted with dense forests and ~~these~~ they together account for 95% of the district forests. This district has various types of forest from sparse and stunted to dense and ever green forests of high rainfall areas. Teak, Bamboo and grass are the main forest products.

NATURAL ZONES

Nanded is one of the most homogeneous district in Maharashtra and does not have any well defined natural zones. The southern portion of the district is, however, a little different because of its poor hilly soils and crop pattern yielding yellow Jawar. The north eastern taluka of Kinwat is again different because of its extensive forests and barren areas. The northern plateau of the district covering most of Hadgaon taluka is very favourable for cultivation ^{of} wheat. The rest of the central area of the district is flat, fertile being cotton soils favourable for cultivation of cotton, Jawar, Groundnut and pulses.

RIVERS

The most important river in the district is the Godavari. Other important rivers are the Manjara, Manyad, Sarswati, Penganga, Ashana, Sita and Lendi. The Godavari enters from the west and flowing past Nanded in the centre of the district passes out into Nizamabad district of the Andhra Pradesh State.

The Manjara which is the largest tributary of Godavari flows from South to North and demarcates the boundary of the district and Andhra Pradesh. The Manyad flows through Kandhar taluka from west to east and forms the natural boundary between Mukhed Mahal and Deglur Taluka on one hand and Biloli taluka on the other. The Sarswati rises in Wakad hill and flows from north to south through the eastern portion of the district and finally joins the Godavari near the village Malkavatha. The Ashana flowing in the eastern direction falls into the Godavari on the left bank about 2 miles from Nanded town. The Sita also rises from North and meets Godavari. The Lendi flows from west to east in Deglur taluka. It runs partly along the southern boundary and after taking a slightly northward course passes through Deglur taluka and meets the Manjara.

The Penganga forms the northern boundary of the district flowing in easterly direction. Further downstream, it falls into the Wardha river in Yeotmal district.

SOILS

The soils of the district are in general black and fertile. The ridges and spurs from the uplands, which are all of trap formation, reduce the cultivable area considerably. The best black soils are found in a narrow strip

of land on the banks of the Godavari and its tributaries.

Good black soil is found along the banks of the Manjra and the Manyad rivers in Biloli taluka, while else-where it is undulating, much inferior in quality and covered with loose stones. It grows rabi as well as kharif crops. The soil of Nanded taluka consists principally of rich black alluvial deposits. Near the foot of the hills the black soil is scarce and it is of a very poor description.

Devlur taluka is considered to have the best soil in the whole of the district. With the exception of a small portion of the taluka towards the West, the soil is of superior quality and most suitable for rabi crops.

Wandhar taluka generally has black and rich soil and grows rabi crops. Nearly half of the taluka is covered with hills and has light soils. It is undulating and covered with loose stones where Kharif crops are chiefly grown.

About three-fourths of Hadgaon taluka is highly fertile. The portion along the banks of the Penganga is the most fertile. Towards the south, nearer the hills, the soil is rather mixed up with certain saline matter.

In Bhokar mahal and Kinwat taluka, except for the hilly tracts, the entire land is of black cotton soil.

MINERALS

The only mineral found in the district is limestone. Deposits of intertrappean limestone have been found to occur in Kinwat taluka. The limestone quarried is not uniform in grade and is highly siliceous at places. The reserves have been estimated at ten million tons.

Building materials like Deccan trap or basalt,

sandstones and brick clay are also found in this district.

CLIMATE

The rainy season starts from June and lasts up to the end of September. It is followed by winter season from October to February and summer season lasting from March to May. The climate in the district is dry and subject to extremes of heat and cold. The hottest month is May and lowest temperature is reached some time during December and January.

The following table shows the Mean maximum, mean minimum temperature and variation during the year 1964.

The climate of the district is considered to be good for cattle. The cows and bulls are more robust and Kandhari breed is note-worthy.

The climate on the whole is quite healthy.

RAINFALL

Rainfall conditions in this district are not much different from those in the other districts of the State, 75 Percent of the total rainfall being brought by south west monsoon (June to September) and 16 Percent rainfall occurring during post monsoon period from October to December and 12 Percent from winter monsoons during January and February. Pre-monsoon showers contribute about 7 Percent of the total rainfall.

The crop pattern, the nature of the soil and the nature of rainfall are in imperfect harmony. Agricultural operations for kharif crops start vigorously with the advent of the monsoon advancing from the Arabian sea. Monsoon is normally ushered in by the Pre-monsoon showers. Pre-monsoon showers contribute approximately 7 percent of the total rainfall. Kharif crop accounts for more than 80 percent of the total area sown. Winter monsoon (January - February) although it contributes only to the extent of 2 percent of the total rainfall helps the Rabi crops greatly.

The table below gives the distribution of rainfall over period of three years (1962 to 1964) in each Taluka of Nanded district.

It could be said that Nanded district received average rainfall of 1130.4 m.m. and that the average number of rainy days was 67 per year during the last three years.

It also appears that during the period of last three years i.e. 1962 to 1964, Kinwat received maximum rainfall while Kandhar received the least rainfall. Kandhar, Biloli, Mukhed and Deglur are rather unfortunate with average annual rainfall 846.0 m.m., 992.5 m.m., 970.9 m.m., and 1069.1 m.m. with 51, 62, 61, 77 rainy-days respectively. It is also interesting to note that the rains are not equally distributed in respect of both quantity and duration. Nanded district saw unprecedented floods during October, 1961 when water of the Godavari inundated Nanded-town and some villages situated on its banks.

A D M I N I S T R A T I V E S E T U P

1. PRESENT SET UP

For administrative purposes, the district is at present divided into six talukas and two mahala. The area, number of inhabited villages, number of towns, 1961 population and the percentages of area and population for each taluka and mahal are as follows:-

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION AND REVENUE

The Collector is in charge of general administration, Law and order, treasury, land revenue and civil supplies. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector and two Deputy Collectors who hold charge of the two revenue divisions and have their headquarters at Nanded and Deglur, respectively. Six Tahsildars are in charge of six taluka offices and two Naib-Tahsildars in charge of the two mahal offices.

ZILLA PARISHAD AND PANCHAYAT SAMITIS

With a view to promoting development of democratic institutions and securing greater measure of participation by the people in Development Plans and in local and governmental affairs by decentralisation of powers and functions, a Zilla Parishad and eight Panchayat Samitis have been established in the district in the year 1962 under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act, 1962. The areas under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad and the Panchayat Samitis correspond to the district and Taluka boundaries except municipal towns which are not covered by them. The Zilla Parishad covers 97.70 percent of the area and 85.56 percent of the total population of the district. The number of villages and population included under the Zilla Parishad and each Panchayat Samiti are shown separately by percentages of area ~~and~~ and population in 1961.

CONSTITUTION

The zilla Parishad has 47 directly elected councillors. Out of these 47 seats, one seat has been reserved for scheduled castes and two for scheduled Tribes. In addition, a woman councillor has been co-opted by the elected Councillors. There are five associate councillors who are Chairman of five federal co-operative societies conducting business in the district. The elected chairman of all Panchayat Samitis are also ex-officio Councillors.

At the Block (Taluka) level, the Panchayat Samiti consists of all elected and co-opted councillors from the area of the Block and a Chairman of a Co-operative society conducting the business of purchase and sale of agricultural produce in the area of the Block as an associate member. The Sarpanch^{as} or village head-men is elected by members of village panchayats/^{are the} members of the Panchayat Samiti. Two Sarpanchas from each electoral division in the area of the block are also members of Panchayat Samiti.

Elections were held in the year 1962. The term of office of the Councillors is five years. The Zilla Parishad has elected the President and Vice-President from amongst the elected Councillors.

An officer in the senior scale of I.A.S. works as the Chief Executive Officer to the Zilla Parishad. The Parishad is also assisted by various departments and the heads of those departments at the district level, are officers of Class I or Class II service under the State Government. At the Block Level, the Panchayat Samitis have elected Chairman and Deputy Chairman. The Block Development Officers work as secretaries to the Panchayat Samitis. The Executive authority for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act, vests in the Chief Executive Officer and the Block Development Officers. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as a secretary to the Zilla Parishad.

COMMITTEES AND OFFICE BEARERS

The Zilla Parishad functions through a Standing Committee presided by the President and six Subject Committees for Finance, Works, Agriculture, Co-operation, Education and Health. Two subject committees are presided over by the Vice-President and four by two Chairmen elected by the Zilla Parishad to preside over two specified subject committees each. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as Secretary of the Standing Committee, while the district heads of Departments work as secretaries to the subject committees concerned. Co-ordination between the subject committees is achieved through the Standing Committee which includes the Chairman of all the

subject committees as members.

The Panchayat Samitis do not have subject Committees.

The elected President of the Zilla Parishad is paid an honorarium of Rs. 500 per month. The Vice-President and the two chairmen of the subjects committees are paid an honorarium of Rs. 300 per month. The elected Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Panchayat Samitis are paid an honorarium of Rs. 300 and Rs. 150 per month, respectively.

FUNCTIONS

The Divisional and State Officers of the Govt. continue to exercise technical supervision and give guidance to Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis. The State Government has powers to give direction to the Zilla Parishad regarding works and schemes in the interest of National or State Development plans. Inspection and supervision are carried out by the Divisional Commissioners.

Except for a few safeguards, the developmental and administrative functions of Government are now, with the creation of democratic bodies at the district and Block level, are vested in them. In other words, the State Government has divested itself of the responsibility of local activities which are now left to the peoples initiative and resources.

The Developmental and administrative subjects transferred to the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis have been listed in Schedules I and II to the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act. By and large, all functions of Government administration including development activities at the district level, but

excluding matters relating to law and order, judicial and quasi-judicial functions, and development functions involving high technical skill like research stations, etc. have been devolved on the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis.

The zilla Parishad has replaced the erstwhile statutory bodies known as District ~~Local~~ Local Board and District Panchayat Mandal. The functions of non-statutory body known as the District Development Board have of course been absorbed. Municipalities, however, remain unaffected as municipal areas are excluded from the jurisdiction of the zilla Parishad.

Table No. 1.1 :- This table indicates the monthly rainfall in milli metres, number of rainy days and normal rainfall for the years 1963 and 1964. The total rainfall received in the district during the year 1964 was very much less when compared to the rainfall received in the year 1963. Generally the talukas Anwat, Madgaon and Bhokar receive more rains than other talukas in the district mainly because they are covered by forests. The rainfall in the district is mostly received from south west monsoon from June to September with a few showers even in October also. This district lies in the area of assured rainfall and scarcity conditions due to paucity of rains rarely occur.

Table No. 1.2 :- This table deals with temperature statistics at Nanded-Centre only in Nanded District. The data on maximum, minimum and mean, monthly temperature for the years 1963 and 1964 is shown in the table. The maximum temperature is reached generally in the month of May and the minimum in the month of December or January. The temperature figures for the years 1963 and 1964 show that in the year 1964 summer and winter seasons were more severe compared to corresponding seasons in the year 1963. Similarly the variations in temperature during 1964 have been more than the variations in the year 1963. This appears to be due to lesser rains and dry climate in the year 1964.

Table No. 2.1:- This table gives taluka-wise rural and urban population according to 1961 Census, and Variations in populations during the last one decade. The area of the ~~xxx~~ district and each of its talukas is also indicated in the table. In terms of area and population the district forms 3.37% and 2.73% of the state respectively. Highest percentage increase in population was indicated by Kinwat taluka i.e. 32.79 and the lowest by Biloli Taluka i.e. 16.37. The density in Kinwat taluka being 146 persons per Sq.mile is lowest due to existence of forests-area in this taluka and lack of communications whereas it is highest in Nanded taluka being 496 persons per Sq.mile due to the growing importance of Nanded-town as educational and industrial centre in the district. Amongst the 26 districts of the State this district ranks 18th in terms of density of population. The smallest taluka by area in the district is Deglur and by population it is Bhokar taluka.

Table No. 2.2:- This table indicates classification of villages according to population ranges according to 1961 Census in Nanded-District. The majority of the villages in the district have population between 200 to 999 as this range covers 910 inhabited villages out of 1325 inhabited villages. There are only three villages in the district which have population between 5000 to 9999 and these villages are located one each in taluka Hadgaon, Nanded and Kandhar. The villages with less than 1000 population are 81.81% of the total number of villages in the district and account for 55.94% of the rural population and remaining 18.19%

of the total number of villages account for 44.06% of the rural population. Thus 42.19% of the rural population of the district is concentrated in villages with population between 1000 to 4999.

Table No. 2.3:- This table indicates taluka-wise classification of 11 towns according to population ranges in 1961 Census in Nanded district. Nanded which is the district H.Q.s is the most important town and is emerging as an industrial as well as educational centre in the district.

Table No. 2.4:- This table indicates the number of workers in each taluka of this district according to 1961 Census. The total number of workers is 563170 forming 52.2% of the total population. The classification of working population reveals that 83.3% of the working population is engaged in Agriculture, mining and allied operations and only 16.7% of the working population is engaged in other than agriculture and allied services. The district ranks eleventh amongst the 26 districts of Maharashtra in so far as the number of workers engaged in agriculture including agricultural labourers is concerned.

Table No. 2.5:- This table indicates the number of non-workers in each taluka in this district according to 1961 Census. The total non-workers in the district are 516504 forming 47.8% of the total population of the district. Out of the non-workers the percentage of different categories of persons is as under:-

Table No. 2.6: This table indicates the number of Scheduled Castes and scheduled Tribes in each taluka of this district. The total number of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes according to 1961 Census is 118879 and 40597 respectively. Scheduled Tribes are pre-dominantly found in Kinwat taluka and also in Hadgaon and Shokar talukas of this district mostly because of the forest areas in these talukas. However the Scheduled Castes population is spread over evenly in all the talukas of this district. Total Scheduled Castes form 11.10% of the total population of the district whereas the scheduled Tribes form 3.76%.

Table No. 2.7 :- This table indicates the population of Urban area in Nanded District according to 1961 Census. Nanded town is the biggest and important town in the district being District H.Q. and educational and industrial centre. The other town growing in importance is Deglur which is also an industrial centre.

3. Agriculture.

Table No. 3.1 :- This table indicates the land utilization statistics in the district for the years 1962-63 and 1963-64. The district accounts for 3.37% of the area of the State. Out of the total area 68.87% and 69.30% area was under cultivation during the years 1962-63 and 1963-64. Next important item of land use in the district is forest which occupies about 7.75% of the area of the district. The forest area is mostly found in Kinwat, Hadgaon and Bhokar talukas of this district. Land put to non-agricultural uses and barren and un-culturable land occupies about 5.2% area of the district. Un-cultivated land including cultivable wastes and permanent pastures is about 9.11% of the district. Current fallows and other fallows cover about 9% area in the district. This indicates that only about 70% of the land in the district is under cultivation and about 10% more can be put to agricultural uses, if the fallows are removed and culturable wastes are brought under plough. The area sown more than once is about 2% of the total area. The area under cultivation in the district increased by 0.43% in the year 1963-64 over the year 1962-63.

Table No. 3.2 :- This table deals with the area under different crops in each taluka of this district in the years 1962-63 and 1963-64. It is evident from the table that food crops dominate the cropping pattern of the district. During the years 1962-63 & 1963-64, 65.34% & 66.68% of the gross cropped area respectively was under food crops and 34.66% and 33.32% respectively was under non-food crops. The figures for the years 1962-63 and 1963-64 indicate slight changes in the cropping pattern in the district. The area under cereals has increased from 48.52% in the year 1962-63 to 50.13% in the year 1963-64. During 1962-63 the percentage of areas under kharif & rabi Jowar was 81.13% & 18.87% whereas the corresponding percentages during 1963-64 worked out to 81.04% & 18.96% indicating that the district is a predominantly kharif Jowar tract. The area under pulses has decreased from 12.77% in 1962-63 to 12.52% in 1963-64. Similarly, the area under fibers including cotton decreased from 27.75% in 1962-63 to 26.98% in 1963-64. The same is the case with the area under oil seeds and it has gone down from 6.89% in 1962-63 to 6.32% in 1963-64. This change appears to be due to growing popularity of food crops. The total gross cropped area has also increased from 70.44% in 1962-63 to 71.34% in 1963-64.

Table No. 3.3 :- This table deals with yield per hectare and out-turn of principal crops in the district. In general the out-turn of total cereals has increased by 16.63% in 1963-64 over the out-turn in 1962-63. However, the total out-turn of pulses and cotton shows a decrease of 8.56% and 23.56% in the

year 1963-64 over the year 1962-63. The yield per hectare of sugarcane indicates considerable variation from 3803 Kg. per hectare in 1962-63 to 4217 kg. per hectare in 1963-64. This has led to increase in total out-turn of sugarcane in terms of gur by 18.75% in 1963-64 over the corresponding out-turn of 1962-63. Among the oil-seeds groundnut, rape and mustard and castor seeds show an increase in yield per hectare in the year 1963-64 over 1962-63. As a result of this the total out-turn of oil seeds has increased by 8.79% in 1963-64 over the out-turn of 1962-63.

Table No. 3.4:- This table indicates the area irrigated by different sources in each taluka of this district. The increase in the net area irrigated in 1963-64 over the year 1962-63 was of the order of about 31.8%. The gross cropped irrigated area increased from 1.52% in 1962-63 to 1.61% in 1963-64. The major source of irrigation in the district is well irrigation which irrigated 82.84% and 85.66% of the total net irrigated area for the year 1962-63 & 1963-64 respectively. The area served by tanks accounted for 15.93% and 14.17% respectively during the years 1962-63 and 1963-64 respectively. This indicates that not even 2% of the gross cropped area is served by irrigation in the district and the cultivation depends exclusively on rains. More irrigation is found in Biloli taluka which is bordering Andhra Pradesh. One major irrigation project viz. Manar Project is completed in the district and it is likely to provide additional irrigational facilities in next year.

some minor irrigation tanks like Kedarnath, Kini, Gortha, have also been completed during the period under report and they too will provide irrigation facilities in the district. Well irrigation is pre-dominant in Mandad and Kanhar talukas. Less irrigation facilities are found in Kinwat taluka because of the hilly area and consequent difficulties in sinking wells.

Table No. 3.5 :- This table indicates the area irrigated under different crops in each taluka of this district. The total area irrigated in the district during 1962-63 and 1963-64 was 11055 and 11887 hectares respectively. Out of this the area under food crops accounted for 99.5% and 98.7% respectively during the year 1962-63 and 1963-64. The area under non-food crop is very negligible in this district forming 0.5% and 1.3% respectively during 1962-63 and 1963-64 of the total gross cropped area. Among the total irrigated area cereals cover 33.19% and 40.51% respectively during 1962-63 and 1963-64. Rice and wheat crops are irrigated. Sugar-cane crop which is perennial irrigated crop occupied 19.3% & 19.2% ^{area} respectively during 1962-63 & 1963-64. Miscellaneous food crops cover 28.2% and 21.2% of the total irrigated area during 1962-63 and 1963-64 respectively.

Table No. 3.6(a) :- This table deals with the number of irrigation wells in each taluka of this district. Out of the total number of irrigation wells 88.5% ~~were~~ were in use and 11.5% were not in use wells during the year 1962-63. During 1963-64 however 91.3% of the irrigation wells were in use and only 8.7% were not

in use. The highest number of wells are found in Wanded taluka. However, Kandhar taluka stands first in so far as the number of wells in use is concerned. Lesser number of wells is found in Deglur taluka as compared to other talukas because of the relatively small size of the taluka. Wells in Biloli Taluka are comparatively fewer mainly because this taluka is served by tank irrigation.

Table No. 3.3(b) :- This table deals with the minor irrigation works in this district. Upto the end of March 1965, three works have been completed in state sector and 32 in local sector by the Zilla Parishad with an irrigation potential of 2573.30 hectares and 753.93 hectares respectively.

Table No. 3.0(c) :- This table indicates the major and medium projects in Wanded district. There was only one major project namely Manar Project by the end of March, 1965 and there was no medium project at all. The Manar Project is to be completed in two stages. This project is likely to command a total culturable area of 213582 Hectares and will serve 163020 Hectares area on completion of both stages and canal works. The area from Kandhar, Mukhed and Biloli Taluka will be irrigated by this project. Major area under irrigation will be from Biloli Talukas.

Table No. 3.7 :- This table indicates the distribution of households engaged in cultivation, classified by interest in land and size of land cultivation. Out of the total number of households, 53.49% of the households cultivate land and the remaining 46.51% do not cultivate any land. Percentage distribution of ownership holdings ^{is} and cultivating holding/as under:-

The average size of cultivation holding in the district in 1960-61 is 19.36 acres, whereas that of ownership holding was 15.73 acres against the average of 11.95 acres for the State.

Table No. 3.8 :- This table deals with the agricultural wage rates at the three selected centres namely Ardhapur, Loha and Bhokar in this district during

the year 1964 and 1965. Average wage rates of carpenters, black-smiths and cobblers at Ardhapur and Loha centre remained constant during the years 1964 and 1965. However, the wage rates of carpenters, black-smiths and cobblers at Bhokar Centre increased by 14.28% , 16.0% and 25.00% respectively during 1965 over 1964. This increase appears to be due to the increase in the prices of agricultural commodities which these skilled labourers receive as wages in kind from the agriculturists. The wage rates of the un-skilled agricultural labourers in the district which include field labourers, male and female, other agricultural labourers (male and female) and herdsmen have also increased in the year 1965 over 1964. The increase in the wage rates of these unskilled agricultural labourers at Loha centre in 1964 was from 14.28% to 20.00% at Bhokar centre from 25.00% to 32.2% and at Ardhapur centre it was 33.3% over the corresponding wage rates in 1963. In general, it can be said that the wage-rates of unskilled agricultural labourers in the district increased from about 14.00% to 33.00% in 1965 over 1964.

The reasons for the increase in the agricultural wage rates appear to be the availability of other types of works like bunding, canal works, canal work etc., and increase in prices of essential commodities.

Table No. 3.9 :- This table indicates the talukewise agricultural implements in Nanded-District for the year 1961. The Live stock and Agricultural Implements Census. The iron ploughs forms 5.3% of the total number of ploughs. Electric pumps form 4.5% of the total number of pumps used for irrigation. Tractor ploughing is very uncommon in this district as only 5 tractors are found in the district.

Table No.3.10:- This table deals with the data regarding famine, scarcity and akin to scarcity conditions and the relief works taken in Nanded district for the year 1964-65. The rains in the year 1964-65 were not adequate and timely in about seven talukas of the district and hence the relief works were taken in all the talukas except Kinwat, in view of conditions akin to scarcity.

Table No.3.11:- This table deals with the progress under Soil Conservation and land reclamation in Nanded district for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. The work of area bunding was started on large scale by Government efforts only in the year 1963-64 and hence there was not much progress in this behalf. But during the year 1964-65 much progress was achieved in area bunding in the district. Approximately 1.14% of the net cultivated area in the district was bunded.

4. Animal Husbandry, Forest & Fisheries.

Table No.4.1:- This table indicates the Summary of Live-Stock Census in Nanded-District for 1956 and 1961 Censuses. The total cattle population over the period of

Veterinary Hospital in the district. The Veterinary Dispensaries and Aid Centres under-take preventive as well as curative measures against animal diseases.

Table No. 4.4:- This table shows disease-wise Live-stock mortality in Nanded district. Among the cattles and Bovines Haemorrhagic Septicemia, foot and mouth and black quarter diseases are commonly found in the district. Similarly, among sheep and goats anthrax and foot and mouth diseases are found. However, the sheep, and goat breeders generally do not avail the Veter-inary facilities. Poultryies are generally vaccinated against smallpox.

Table No. 4.5 :- This table indicates the number of recognised slaughter houses and animals slaughtered in each Slaughter Houses in Nanded district during the year 1964 and 1965. There is only one recognized slaughter house for all kinds of animals in the district located at Nanded town. Generally, cattles, sheep and Goats are slaughtered in this slaughter house. The proportion of cattles slaughtered is considerably higher in comparison with sheep and goats slaughtered due to proportionately higher number of cattles.

Table No. 4.6 :- This table shows range-wise forest area in Nanded district. There has not been any change in the forest area in each range of the district during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 except for the five hectares in reserve forest area in Kinwat, Mahore and Islapur ranges during the year 1964-65. Approximately the forests occupy about 7.75% of the area in the district. Kinwat, Hadgaon and Bhokar taluka are

five years from 1956 to 1961 increased by 4.02% in the district. Male cattles of this district are mostly of Deoni and red Kandhari breeds. The animals of these breeds are recognised to be very good for agricultural purposes. Cattle and buffaloes together covered 82.43% and 80.06% of the Live Stock of this district during 1956 and 1961 Live stock Census respectively. During the period from 1956 to 1961 the number of sheep and goats increased considerably. Generally, the sheep and goats of local breed are found in the district. The number of Horses and ponies has however decreased in 1961 Census when compared to 1956 Census. The increase in the number of poultry was of the magnitude of 78.29% during 1961 over the corresponding figure in 1951 mainly due to poultry farming being more and more popular as a subsidiary occupation.

Table No. 4.2:- This table indicates taluka-wise distribution of important live-stock in the district. The young stock of cattle, form about one third of the cattles in the district. Highest number of cattle i.e. 163651 is found in Kandhar Taluka whereas the lowest number i.e. 43616 is found in Deglur Taluka of this district. Similarly, highest number of buffaloes i.e. 37004 is found in Kandhar taluka and the lowest number i.e. 10540 is found in Kinwat taluka of this district. Live stock population in Kandhar taluka is highest whereas it is lowest in Bhokar taluka.

Table No. 4.3:- This table gives the details regarding the veterinary facilities available in each taluka of the district. There is no full-fledged District

gifted with dense forests. Kinwat taluka alone covers about 6% of the total area under forests in the district. The distribution of category of forests into reserved, protected and un-classed indicate that 55.24% are reserved forests, 4.38% are protected forests and 40.38% are un-classed forests in the district.

Table No. 4.7:- This table gives the data regarding major and minor forest produce in Nanded-district for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65 together with the quantity and value of the products. The total value of forest products during 1964-65 had decreased by Rs. 8065 over 1963-64. Timber and fuel is the main forest produce in the district and accounted for 78.48% and 72.66% of the total value of forest produce during the years 1963-64 & 1964-65 respectively. Minor forest produce like Bamboo, grass etc; account for 0.44 and 0.66 percent of the total value during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 respectively.

Table No. 4.8 This table indicates fishery statistics for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65 in Nanded district. Fishery is not well developed in the district. Fish is generally netted from the Godavari and other rivers and small tanks which do not go dry even in summer season. Efforts to develop fishery in the district are being made which cover stocking of fish and supply of modern fishery requisites to the fishermen.

5. Employment, Industry, Mining & Electricity.

Table No. 5.1:- This table gives the data regarding number of working factories and average daily number

of workers employed during the year 1963 and 1964. Above 50% of the factories in the district are cotton ginning and baling ~~xxxxix~~ factories. Next in importance are the factories engaged in manufacturing edible oils. There are rice and dal mills, saw mills etc; in the district which are mostly resource based industries due to availability of raw materials in the district. Nanded town is an industrially developing town in the district and hence the factories engaged in electrical machinery apparatus, appliances and supplies and repairs of Motor Vehicles etc; are also found at Nanded in the district.

Table No. 5.2 :- This table indicates the distribution of factories according to categories of industries and the number of workers. Majority of the factories in the district come under the category of factories employing labourers ranging between 20 to 99. During the year 1963-64 the Osmanshahi Mills Nanded employed workers ranging between 1000 to 4999. This factory alone employed daily 3168 to 3635 workers in 1963 and 1964 respectively. The factories engaged in cotton and ginning and baling work seasonally.

Table No. 5.3 :- This table indicates the distribution of factories according to number of days worked in Nanded district for the year 1963 & 1964. The factories which worked for more than 6 months are those engaged in Spinning, Weaving and ~~xxxx~~ finishing of Cotton Textiles, manufacture of edible oils and saw mills, electric and machinery works etc;

The rest of them mostly comprising cotton ginning & baling are purely seasonal in nature.

Table No. 5.4 :- This table gives the data regarding industrial and mineral production of important commodities during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. During the years 1963-64 and 1964-65 there was no mineral production of any kind in the district. The production of cotton yarn had doubled in 1964-65 over the corresponding production in 1963-64. Similarly, there was increase of 29 lac metres in Cotton cloth during 1964-65 over the year 1963-64 mostly to be attributed to the Osman Shahi Mills, Nanded. However, the production of synthetic, organic, dyestuffs had decreased by about 10 thousand K.G. (10,000) in 1964-65 when compared to the production of the same in 1963-64.

Table No. 5.5 :- This table indicates statistics relating to handlooms and powerlooms for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 in Nanded-district. The strength of Handlooms has considerably increased by 381 in 1964-65 over 1963-64 due to increased financial assistance given to handloom weavers through co-operatives; whereas the number of powerlooms remained constant in both the years at 30. Even though there had been increase in the number of handlooms in 1964-65, the production of handloom cloth indicated remarkable decrease from 1013336 metres in 1963-64 to 390206 metres in 1964-65 due to short supply of yarn to weavers. There had also been reduction in production of powerloom from 250839 metres in 1963-64 to 238768 metres in

in 1964-65. This decrease appears to be due to difficulties of marketing of handloom cloth and financial difficulties of their managements. The main handloom cloth production centres in the district are Nanded, Mudkhed, Deglur, Shahpur, Biloli, Kundalwadi, Umri, Kandhar, Bahadarpura, Ashtoor, Mukhad, Jaboor, Betmogra and Honwadaj in Nanded district. No handlooms are found in Kinwat and Hadgaon talukas of this district. Nanded and Deglur towns have 15 powerlooms each.

Table No. 5.6 :- This table gives month-wise information regarding the registration, number of vacancies notified and the number of placements for the year 1963-64 to the extent of registrations made with Employment Exchange. Increase in the registrations is generally found in the month of June and July after the examination results are published. The average number of registrations per month has decreased during 1964-65 from 776 to 747 in 1963-64; whereas average number of vacancies notified per month has increased from 90 in 1963-64 to 110 in 1964-65. Average number of employers using exchange per month has decreased from 25 in 1963-64 to 20 in 1964-65. Similarly, the average number on live-register at the end of each month fell down from 5873 in 1963-64 to 4987 in 1964-65. There had been considerable increase in the average number of placements per month in 1964-65 over 1963-64 as the average number of placements per month increased from about 65 in 1963-64 to 87 in 1964-65. In general

the employment opportunities increased in the district in the year 1964-65 when compared to 1963-64, and hence placements in 1964-65 increased from 783 in 1963-64 to 1065 in 1964-65.

Table No. 5.7 :- This table indicates occupational distribution of total registrations, vacancies notified and placements etc; in Nanded district. The vacancies notified increased in the year 1964-65 by about 22.26% over the vacancies notified in the year 1963-64. Similarly, the placements increased in the year 1964-65 by about 36% over the placements in the year 1963-64. The number on the live register at the end of the year 1964-65 was less by 184 as compared to the corresponding number in 1963-64.

Table No. 5.8 :- This table indicates the changes in the volume of employment in Nanded district in the year ending 31st December 1964 and 31st March 1965. The figures indicate that the volume of employment in the year 1964-65 has decreased by 0.4% as compared to the volume existing in the year 1964. The decrease has occurred mainly in case of manufacturing industries and trade and commerce. This data is based on the reports from 162 reporting establishments. Majority of the employees in the district appears to be in public services covering more than 57% of the total employment for which data is collected by Employment Exchange. Next important sector in volume of employment is manufacturing Industries and constructions covering about 32% of the total employment generated. Rest of the sectors covered about 11% of employment.

Table No. 5.9 :- This table gives the statistics relating to annual survey of industries in Nanded district in 1961. The data for 11 reporting factories in is indicated in the table which have produced goods worth Rs. 2783000 during 1961.

Table No. 5.10 :- This table gives the details of generation and consumption of electricity in Nanded district in the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. The generation of electricity in the district has increased by 47.8% in 1964-65 over the level of generation of electricity in the year 1963-64. Similarly, the total consumption of electricity has increased by 55.7% in 1964-65 over the level of consumption in the year 1963-64. This increase in consumption has been in all types of items of consumption. The percentage increase in consumption of electricity has not been uniform, as shown below:-

The highest percentage increase is indicated by item of consumption of electricity for agricultural and other purposes. This is due to rural electrification and installation of electric pumps.

Table No. 5.11 :- This table indicates the number of towns and villages electrified and population covered

in Wanded district for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. The number of villages electrified increased from 24 at the end of 1964 to 44 at the end of 1965. No town was electrified during these years as all the towns in the district had already been electrified by 31st March 1964. There has been 83.3% increase in the villages electrified during the year 1964-65 over the year 1963-64. Similarly, the rural population covered by electrification also increased by 58.1% in 1964-65 over 1963-64. In general 22.6% population of this district was covered by electrification of towns and villages at the end of March 1965.

Table No. 5.12 :- This table indicates the installed capacity and electricity generated in Wanded district during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. There was no change in the installed capacity in 1963-64 and 1964-65.

6. Co-operation.

Table No. 6.1 :- This table presents statistics relating to District Central Co-operative Bank, District Industrial Co-operative Bank and District Development Bank in Wanded-district, for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. The number of branches of District Central Co-operative Bank increased by 30% during 1964-65 over the corresponding number during 1963-64. The membership of District Central Co-operative Bank, however, did not denote a proportion/rise. Financially the bank business increased remarkably in 1964-65 compared to 1963-64. In 1964-65 share capital rose by 18.1%, reserve fund by 27.1%,

working capital by 37.3%, short term loans by 13.08% and medium term loans by 103.7% over 1963-64. Similar increase in financial business in 1964-65 was indicated by District Development Bank even though there was no change in the number of branches during both the years.

The increase in share capital and reserve funds of development Bank was 116.1% and 10.2% respectively in 1964-65 over the year 1963-64. However, the working capital of this bank decreased by 66.9% in 1964-65 compared to 1963-64. The advances of long term loans by this Bank increased remarkably by 278.2% in 1964-65 over 1963-64. The increase in loan advances by the District Central Co-operative Bank and District Development Bank shows that these banks are vigorously financing the agricultural credit in the district.

Table No. 6.2 :- This table indicates eight types of Co-operative Societies in Nanded district during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. Out of these eight types of societies agricultural credit & non-credit societies cover larger sphere of activities than the rest. There was no increase in the number of Co-operative Societies/ ^{and it} fell down from 1546 in 1963-64 to 1506 in 1964-65. However, the membership of these Co-operative Societies increased considerably both in case of member societies and individuals. The share capital of the societies indicated an increase of 34.73% in 1964-65 over 1963-64. Reserve funds and working capital rose by 24.65% and 40.00% in 1964-65 over the corresponding figures in 1963-64. The advance of loans by all the societies put together

denotes an increase of 34.59% in 1964-65 over 1963-64. Loans overdue indicated rise of 46.04% in 1964-65 over 1963-64 and loans outstanding had also increased by 38.04% over the year 1963-64. This over all increase in the financial statistics of the Co-operative Societies in the district show that the co-operatives are covering more and more spheres of economic activities.

Table No. 6.3 :- This table gives the data regarding agricultural co-operative Societies for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 in Nanded-district. There was no change in the number of agricultural Co-operative Societies in Biloli, Hadgaon and Nanded talukas. The membership of these co-operative societies however increased by 14192 in 1964-65 forming about 20.9% increase over 1963-64. The financial position of these societies show increase in all the activities in 1964-65 when compared to 1963-64. The share capital of these societies increased by 30.48%, Reserve Fund, by 51.39%, working capital by 27.54%, advance of loans by 13.32%, Recoveries of loans by 29.49%, over dues 58.94% and loans outstanding by 25.12% over the year 1963-64. The increase in the overdue was remarkable i.e. 58.9% eventhough there was increase in recovery to the tune of 29.49%.

Table No. 6.4 :- This table gives the data regarding agricultural marketing societies and their purchase and sale of agricultural commodities and requisites in each taluka of Nanded-district. There was one

District Central Marketing society in the district and 7 & 8 Primary Agrl. Marketing Societies in the year 1963-64, and 1964-65 respectively. There was no Primary Agrl. Marketing society in Kandhar Taluka in 1963-64. In 1964-65, each taluka in the district was having one Primary Agricultural society. The data in the table gives the details regarding the value of purchases and sales effected by these societies as owner and as agent in the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. These societies generally purchase the goods required for agricultural purposes and sell agricultural produce both as owner and agent to members and others.

Table No. 6.5 :- This table indicates the number of registered money lenders and loans advanced by them in Nanded district for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. The registered money lenders are found in greater number in talukas of Nanded, Hadgaon and Kandhar. The Loans advanced by these money lenders indicate increase of 6.30% in 1964-65 over 1963-64. The proportion of the loans advanced to traders and to non-traders was 64.51% and 35.49% respectively in 1963-64 and 64.29% and 35.71% in the year 1964-65.

This indicates that the registered money-lenders are generally interested in advancing loans to the traders rather than the non-traders when compared to the ~~the~~ loans advanced by Co-operative organisation in the district. Credit facilities extended by registered money lenders are too small as compared to loans advanced by Co-operative societies in the district.

7. Medical & Public Health.

Table No. 7.1:- This table indicates the number of persons engaged in medical and public health services in Nanded district according to 1961 Census. There was no female physician or surgeon in rural areas of the district. There were about 10 physicians, surgeons etc; ^{and} in rural area per lakh of population/in urban areas their proportion was 51 per lakh of population. The number of female physicians and surgeons in the district was quite negligible. There were only 13 hospital beds per lakh of population as per 1961 Census in the district which ranked 23rd in this regard amongst 26 districts of Maharashtra.

Table No. 7.2 :- This table indicates data regarding medical facilities available through public and public aided bodies in each taluka of this district during the year 1963-64. There were only two hospitals (1) General Hospital; (2) Ayurvedic Hospital in the district located at Nanded town, the district head quarters. These hospitals are fully equipped with operation theatres and X-ray facilities etc; There were 25 dispensaries in the district located at taluka Head Quarters and important villages in addition to 8 Primary Health Centres in 1963 and 10 in 1964, located in rural areas and 6 Maternity Homes in 1963 and 8 in 1964. In the year 1963 each medical and public health institution covered approximately a total population of 31000 in 1963 and a population of about 24000 in ~~1963~~ 1964. In the year 1964, a separate children ward was opened in General Hospital, Nanded with 33 beds.

Table No. 7.3 :- This table gives disease-wise classification of number of indoor and outdoor patients treated in the years 1963 and 1964. Dysentary, Diarrhoe, phrexia of uncertain origin due to infection, diseases of nervous system, diseases due to deficiency or disorder of nutrition or metabolism, injuries general and local, diseases of respiratory other than pneumonia and tuberculosis and diseases of the digestive system etc; were the main ailments for which outdoor and indoor patients were treated in general.

Table No. 7.4 :- This table gives the data regarding number of births and deaths registered in Nanded district during the year 1963 and 1964. The number of infant deaths have also been shown. It is clear from the table that there has been increase in number of births, number of deaths and infant deaths in the year 1964 compared to the year 1963. However, the percentage increase over 1963 in number of births was 5.94%, in number of deaths it was 17.65% and in number of infant deaths it was 8.05%, in the year 1964.

Table No. 7.5 :- This table indicates the number of deaths due to important causes in Nanded district for the years 1963 and 1964. The number of deaths due to Cholera, small pox, fever, dysentery, periparatory diseases and other causes had increased in 1964. Secondly, more deaths occurred due to fever in both the years. Deaths due to periparatory diseases were also numerous during both the years. There were no deaths due to plague epidemic in 1963-64.

Table No. 7.6 :- This table gives vaccination statistics and cholera inoculations in Nanded district during the year 1963 and 1964. Mass vaccination programme is undertaken for eradication of small pox and the cholera inoculation programme is undertaken as a preventive measure. Due to these mass vaccination and inoculation programmes the number of deaths due to small pox and cholera in the district has fallen considerably.

Table No. 7.7 :- This table indicates the statistics on B.C.G. Vaccinations in Nanded district during the year 1964 alone. The existence of negative cases in the district as revealed by the cases tested in 1964 is about 34.14% which proves the necessity of undertaking B.C.G. Vaccination programme in the district. The number of the absentees among the tested cases followed 11.74% and therefore for reducing the number of absentees good propoganda to educate the masses, is required, for implenenting this programme successfully.

Table No. 7.8 :- This table indicates the hygenic drinking water supply sources available in the rural areas of Nanded district. Out of the total number of 1325 inhabited villages in the district, about 276 villages or 20.8% of the total number of villages have no hygenic drinking water supply and 25.4% of the total villages have in-adequate water supply. Kinwat taluka has 87 villages without any hygenic drinking water source. This was due to the difficulties in sinking wells and scar%city of water in the hilly areas of Kınwat taluka. As many as 124 villages in Kandhar taluka existed with in-adequate water supply.

8. Education.

Table No. 8.1 :- This table indicates the number of literates and the percentage of literacy in each taluka of Nanded district according to 1961 Census. The percentage of literacy in the district rose from 7.89% in 1951 Census to 15.14% in 1961 due to concerted efforts in the sphere of spread of literacy. Male literacy was 24.83% and that amongst the females was 5.16% in 1961. According to the literacy of male the district was 25th in rank among the 26 districts of Maharashtra State including the greater Bombay as a separate district. In respect of female literacy the district likewise ranked 26th being the last. The highest literacy of 23.33% is found in Nanded taluka and lowest i.e. 12.14% is found in Bhokar Mahal. The percentage of literacy is higher in Nanded and Deglur talukas because of the large urban population of Nanded town in Nanded taluka and Deglur town in Deglur taluka. In rural areas Hadgaon taluka ranks first with 14.40% of literacy and in urban areas Kandhar taluka has the highest literacy for males (51.56%) and female (22.52%) population.

Table No. 8.2 :- This table indicates the education in rural areas in each taluka of the district according to 1961 Census. In all 87.7% of the rural population of the district is illiterate. Amongst the literates in rural areas 8.9% were mere literates without any educational standard. A very negligible percentage of rural population i.e. 0.2% had education upto Matriculation and above. This indicates that the rural pop-

ulation in the district is too far behind in education compared to the urban population of the district.

Table No. 8.3 :- This table indicates the distributions of urban population according to educational standards in 1961 Census. In all 67.7% of the urban population was illiterate. The percentage of literate without any educational level was 16.8. Persons having educational level upto Primary and matriculation standard formed 12.5% and 2.4% respectively of the total urban population. The percentage of educated persons above Matriculation was less/then that in the urban population of the district. The technical and non-technical diploma holders formed 0.1% whereas graduates and post-graduates other than technical formed 0.3%. Technical graduates and post-graduates formed 0.2% of the urban population. All this indicates that a very negligible percentage of even urban population had successfully completed university education. This was due to the lack of higher educational institutions in the district particularly for technical diplomas and technical degrees and post-graduations. In so far as ~~xxx xxxxx~~ provision of number of seats for technical training upto diploma level is concerned, Nanded district ranked 22nd in the districts of the States. However, the educational standard among the urban population is higher than its counter part in rural areas because of more educational facilities in urban parts of the district.

Table No. 8.4 :- This table indicates the data regarding number of educational institutions, pupils and teachers in Nanded-district in the year 1964-65. Among the primary teachers 57.4% were untrained and only 42.6% were trained. The average number of students per institution worked out to about 68. The ratio of boys to girls was about 3 : 1 in Primary Schools.

The percentage of trained teachers was 56.7 in secondary schools. The ratio of boys to girls in secondary schools was about 5:1 and the average number of students per secondary school was 290 in 1963-64. The ratio of boys to girls in higher institutions was about 21:1.

Table No. 8.5 :- This table deals with the beneficiaries and concession to Backward Classes in Nanded district in 1964-65. The relative percentages of Scheduled castes, Scheduled tribes and other backward classes in the total enrolment were 27.6, 8.2 & 64.2 respectively. Out of the educational concessions granted to students the percentage of the grants to Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and other Backward Classes ~~xxxxxx~~ worked out to 28.0, 3.7 and 68.3 respectively. The percentages of students in primary, secondary and higher education among the total Backward Classes were about 69.7, 28.6 and 1.7 whereas the percentages of concessions granted to students in primary, secondary and higher levels of education worked out to 0.8, 79.4 and 20.6 respectively. The concessions granted to students of primary level were however not in commensurate with their numerical strength.

Table No. 8.6 :- This table gives information regarding the concessions of free education granted to economically backward class students in Nanded-district. The percentage of secondary students of economically backward classes who were benefitted was 84.2 and that the University students and other students was 15.6. The percentages of grants to secondary students and university and other students were 5.8 and 38 respectively. In colleges the majority of students benefitted were from faculties of Arts and Science.

Table No. 8.7 :- This table indicates the expenditure on primary education by way of grants-in-aid to local bodies in Nanded district during the year 1964-65. The grants were given only to the Zilla Parishad, Nanded solely entrusted with primary education in the district.

Table No. 8.8 :- This table gives the classification of the villages and towns with and without primary schools by population range in Nanded district for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. There was no town in the district without primary school for both the years. The highest number of villages without schools in the year 1963-64 and in 1964-65 was in Kinwat taluka because of existence of forest area and tribal and backward class population in that taluka with ~~many~~ widely scattered villages. ~~Majority~~ Majority of villages in the district having a population above 200 were covered with primary schools during 1963-64 & 1964-65 ~~except~~ barring a few in Hadgaon, Mukhed & Nanded talukas. These villages however remained to be covered due to non availability of req-

uirod number of students in them and existence of primary school in neighbouring villages.

9. Transport & Communication.

Table No. 9.1 :- This table indicates the length of the Railways in Nanded district as on 31st March, 1964 and 31st March, 1965. The approximate average Railway length per hundred sq.Km works out to 2.16 Km and average Railway line per lakh population works out to 20.78 Km. The Manmad-Hyderabad Railway line running through the Godavari valley connects Nanded town which is the District H.Qs. The other branch line links up Mukhed in Nanded taluka with Adilabad town of Andhra Pradesh. The railway line passes through Nanded, Bhokar, Biloli, Hadgaon and Kinwat talukas. The remaining three talukas of Kandhar, Mukhed and Darga do not have Railway lines in them. Bhokar and Kinwat are the only two taluka H.Qs linked with Nanded town by Railway.

Table No. 9.2(A) :- This table indicates road length excluding Municipal roads according to the category and surface of the roads in Nanded district. The road length in the district rose at the end of 1964-65 by 12.6% over the corresponding road length in 1963-64. The average road length in 1964-65 worked out to 8.98 Km. per 100 Sq.Km. The increase in major District Roads in 1964-65 was of 22.6% and in village roads it was 18.4% over 1963-64.

However, the water bound macadam road length increased in 1964-65 by 20.1% over 1963-64 and the increase in granular material roads was only 6.9%. In general, the district is having inadequacy of better types of

roads. Out of the total road length in 1964-65, black topped roads formed 8.8%, water bound macadam roads formed 51.5% and of granular material roads formed 39.7%.

Table No. 9.2(B) :- This table indicates the length of the Municipal roads surface-wise for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 in Nanded-district. Municipal road length increased by 9.7% in 1964-65 over the corresponding length/1963-64. This increase was found mostly in Dharmabad, Kandhar and Nanded Municipalities in the District. The road length in other Municipalities however remained constant during both the years. The percentage of cement concrete roads, black topped roads, water bound macadam, granular material roads and lower typed roads was 6.86, 7.78, 39.75, 12.89 and 32.72 respectively in the year 1964-65. Cement concrete and black topped roads existed in Nanded Municipality only. Kinwat, Umri and Biloli Municipalities do not have even water bound macadam roads.

Table No. 9.3 :- This table gives data regarding Motor Vehicles in operation in Aurangabad Region. No separate data was available regarding the vehicles in operation in Nanded district. The vehicles in operation in this region increased by 5.31% over the corresponding number in 1963-64. This increase was mostly due to increase in the number of motor cars taxi cars, auto-Rickshaws, stage carriages, public carriages, ambulances, trailers, tractors and others. However, there was reduction in the number of motor cycles, private carriages (lorries) and private service vehicles during 1964-65. The increase

in public carriages was due to the growing facilities provided by the road transport department to the passengers in this region.

Table No. 9.4 :- This table gives operational statistics of nationalised road transport. The number of routes in 1964-65 increased by 10.59% over those in 1963-64. The average service distance in 1964-65 rose by 12.4% over the distance in 1963-64. Average daily earnings in 1964-65 increased by 9.99% over the average earnings in 1963-64. The average earnings per vehicle per day however increased ^{in 1964-65} / only by 2.2% over 1963-64. The number of passengers travelled per day indicated a rise of 19.1% during 1964-65 over 1963-64. The over all increase in road transport is the proof of more use of State Transport facilities by the public and consequent increase in transport facilities provided by State Transport department.

Table No. 9.5 :- This table gives data regarding the traffic census on State High-ways and national high ways in Nanded-district as in November, 1964. There is no national high way in the district. Hence, the Census was taken only on state high ways section at nine places on Nagpur-Tuljapur State High way at count post in Hadgaon, Ardhapur, Nanded, Loha and Malgaon. On Nanded-Deglur Road the count posts were in Nanded, Narsi and Deglur. Majority of the vehicles moving per day was from the category of medium heavy motor vehicles and slow moving vehicles. Highest vehicles traffic (667 vehicles per day) was found

on Nagpur-Tuljapur State Highway and at Nanded (3.57 Vehicles) on Nanded-Devlur road. The percentages of light motor vehicles, medium, heavy vehicles and slow moving vehicles at Nanded count post was found to be 13.04, 32.53 and 54.43 respectively.

Table No. 9.6 :- This table gives the data regarding number of posts, telegraph and telephones statistics in Nanded district during 1963-64 and 1964-65. The number of post offices, telegraph offices and letter boxes increased by 2.04%, 55.55% and 8.54% respectively over the corresponding figures in 1963-64. The number of telephones also rose in 1964-65 showing 28.12% increase over 1963-64. The number of radio licences issued however fell in 1964-65 indicating a percentage decrease of 20.41 over the corresponding number 1963-64.

Table No. 9.7 :- This table indicates the availability of postal facilities in Nanded district during 1960-61. During 1960-61, the percentages of villages having postal facilities within the ~~village~~ 6 Kms. were 15.09, 43.39, 30.18 and 11.34 respectively. Highest number of villages having postal facilities within the village was in Biloli taluka whereas the lowest number of villages of this category was in Mukhed taluka. The highest number of villages having postal facilities at a distance above 6 Km was in Kinwat Taluka mostly because of the forest area in the taluka. Majority of the villages in the district had postal facility within 3 Km ^{from} ~~of~~ the village.

Table No. 9.8.:- This table indicates the rural Broadcasting statistics in Nanded district, for the years - 1963-64 and 1964-65. There are 2 rural broadcasting Technicians one each at Nanded and Hadgaon. The Technician at Nanded is in charge of six Talukas viz; Nanded, Bhokar, Kondhar, Biloli, Mukhad and Deglur and the Technician at Hadgaon is in charge of Hadgaon and Kinwat talukas only. Nearly 22.56% of the villages in the district had receiving sets by ~~XXXX~~ at the end of March 1964 and 23.16% of them had this facility by the end of March 1965.

10. Local Bodies.

Table No. 10.1.:- This table indicates the income and expenditure of local bodies in Nanded district for the years 1962-63, 1963-64 and 1964-65. The income and expenditure of the local bodies like village Panchayats, Zilla Parishads and Municipalities is considerably and continuously growing since the year 1962-63. Particularly, the increase in income and expenditure of village Panchayat and Zilla Parishad was remarkable due to the formation of Zilla Parishad. The increase in the income of village Panchayats in 1964-65 over 1962-63 and 1963-64 was 132.5% and 18.8% respectively; whereas the increase in expenditure in these years was 152.4% & 18.9% respectively. Similarly, the increase in Zilla Parishad income in the year 1964-65 over 1962-63 and 1963-64 was 337.1% & 26.8% respectively. The increase in expenditure during the same period was of the order of 379.7% & 25.2% respectively. The increase in Municipal incomes and expenditures was not as high as

in the case of Village Panchayat or Zilla Parishad during this period. The figures of incomes and expenditures of all these local bodies over the period from 1962-63 to 1963-64 reveal that the expenditures were less than the incomes of the corresponding year except in case of expenditures of the municipalities in the year 1964-65.

Table No. 10.2 :- This table indicates the Panchayat-Block-wise income and expenditure of Village Panchayat in Nanded district for the year 1962-63 and 1963-64. The incomes of all the panchayats had increased in 1963-64 by 89.6% over 1962-63 whereas the expenditures increased by 104.02% over the same period. This increase in income was mainly due to Government Grants-in-aid which had more than doubled in 1963-64 compared to those in 1962-63. The income from donations and contributions and from other sources also rose up in 1963-64. On the expenditure side the increase was due to more expenditure on public works and sanitation and health. The expenditure on administration of village Panchayats and Social and moral promotion indicated considerable increase. Similarly, the expenditure on collection of land revenue and maintenance of the, rose in this period. The per capita income and expenditure of Gram Panchayats during 1963-64 was Rs. 3-45 and Rs. 2-62 respectively.

Table No. 19.3 (A) :- This table indicates the Head-wise receipts of Zilla Parishad, Nanded, for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. ~~Annexure~~ These receipts included the transactions of the debt section. Total revenue

receipts increased ^{in 1964-65} by 53.5% over the corresponding revenue receipts in 1963-64. The percentage of self raised resources in 1963-64 in the total revenue receipts was only 13.7 whereas the percentage of the Government grants including grant for agency scheme was 86.3. In 1964-65 the relative percentages of self raised resources and government grants (including agency schemes) were 8.1 and 91.9 respectively. Local fund cess formed major portion of self raised resources of Zilla Parishad which by themselves were very meagre. The increase in total revenue receipts in 1964-65 over the corresponding figures in 1963-64 was mainly because of substantial increase in Govt. grants and Govt. grants for agency schemes.

Table No. 10.3 (B) :- This table indicates the head-wise expenditure of the Zilla Parishad, Nanded, for the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. The total expenditure of Zilla Parishad, Nanded, increased by 25.2% over the year 1963-64. The total revenue expenditure of Zilla Parishad had also increased by 43.5% over 1963-64. Both in 1963-64 as well as in 1964-65 expenditures on -- (1) education; (2) C.D. Programme; (3) Buildings and Communications and (4) Administration were more prominent.

Table No. 10.4 :- This table indicates the constitution of Municipalities in Nanded-district. The percentage of female councillors in the municipalities of the district was nearly 10.38. Percentage of the reserved seats worked out to 20.12. The municipalities of the district covered 14.4% of the total population of the district.

Table No. 10.5 :- This table indicates the income and expenditure of municipalities for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. The income of municipalities increased by 10.4% in 1964-65 over that in 1963-64 whereas the expenditure increased by 36.4% in 1964-65 over that in 1963-64. The increase in the incomes was mostly due to the Government grants and levy of Octroi and other taxes by the municipalities whereas the increase in expenditure in 1964-65 over that in 1963-64 was mainly due to the increase in the expenditure on General Administration and Miscellaneous charges. Nanded Municipality in the district is the most important municipality in the district. Out of the total income of the municipalities in the district income of Nanded Municipality alone formed 76.24% and 72.31% respectively in the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. Similarly, in expenditure Nanded Municipality covered 78.68% and 79.04% of the total expenditure of the municipalities in the district in the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 respectively. The other important municipalities in the district are Deolur, Phanshad and Minwat mainly because of their development as industrial and commercial centres in the district.

Table No. 11.1 :- This table indicates the expenditure in 3rd Five Year Plan on District Level Schemes in Nanded district from 1961-62 to 1964-65. Out of the total 3rd plan provision of Rs. 430.280 Lakhs for the district a total expenditure of Rs. 318.325 Lakhs was incurred upto 1964-65 forming 73.98% of the total plan provision. The percentages of expenditures to the total plan provision at the end of each year during

1961-62, 1962-63, 1963-64 and 1964-65 were 11.92, 14.12, 17.73 and 30.19 respectively. The percentage of the expenditure incurred on the Major Heads of expenditure up to the end of 1964-65 is shown below :-

Above figures reveal that the expenditures on Co-operation & Community Development were highest whereas the expenditure on industry and mining was the lowest. The important sub-heads which contributed to the expenditure under agriculture were - (1) Agricultural production (2) soil Conservation (3) Minor irrigation; (4) Animal Husbandry (5) Forest and Ware Housing and Marketing. Under 'Co-operation & Community Development' the major expenditure was on community development programme. Next in order of importance was the sub-head of "Co-operation". Under "mining and industry" all the expenditure was incurred on the sub-head of "Small Scale Industries" only. Under Transport and Communications, the total expenditure was on the sub-head of "Road Development". Under "Social services" the sub-heads which contributed to the major portion of expenditure of this head were (1) "General Education" (2) "Public Health" (3) "Housing and (4) "Labour &

Labour Welfare". The sub-heads on which even 50% of the plan provision was not spent upto the end of 1964-65 were (1) 'Agricultural production; (2) 'Dairy Development' (3) 'Forest' (4) 'Fisheries' (5) 'Warehousing and marketing' (6) 'General Education' (7) 'Technical Education' (8) 'Medical and Nursing' (9) Labour and Labour welfares'. The sub-heads on which more than 75% expenditure upto 1964-65 was made were (1) 'Minor irrigation' (2) 'Animal Husbandry' (3) 'Co-operation' (4) 'Community development' (5) 'Road development' (6) 'Water supply and drainage' (7) 'Housing' and (8) 'Social Welfare'. The percentage of expenditure to the plan provision of different major heads is shown below.

From the above, it is clear that the expenditure on plan schemes under the Heads of Agriculture programme, Co-operation and Community Development and Transport and communication was quite satisfactory whereas on industry and mining and social service it was not so satisfactory.

Table No. 11.2 :- This table indicates the physical ~~xxx~~ achievements of different district level schemes in Third Five Year Plan implemented in Nanded district for the years 1961-62 to 1964-65. An effort to develop the agricultural production by propogation of improved agricultural practices was made during the year 1961-62 to 1964-65 in

Third Five Year Plan. Up to the end of 1964-65 improved variety of cotton seeds of 31200 quintals was distributed. Similarly, intensive cultivation of oil seeds was ~~xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx~~ ~~xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx~~ undertaken on 12279 acres during 1961-62 to 1964-65. The plantation of fruit trees as a measure of general horticultural development was undertaken on 839 acres during 1961-62 to 1964-65 against the target of 1000 acres for the IIIrd Five Year Plan period. Under the scheme of intensive cultivation of food crops 193150 acres area was covered by intensive cultivation and 621997 acres of area was brought under improved Agronomic practices. Under the development of manural resources, the compost of 82096 tons was prepared.

For retention of moisture and stopping of soil erosion, the scheme for bunding was undertaken and upto the end of 1964-65 20128 acres of area was banded. Under minor irrigation 6380 acres irrigation potential was created.

Fishery development programme included the stocking of 1860758 carp fry and provision of fishery requisites to fishermen and cooperative fisheries during the year 1961-62 to 1964-65.

The programme of Cooperative Development included the extension of agricultural credit, development of cooperative marketing and development of farming societies. Particularly, the loan advances by the cooperative societies increased considerably during this period and the target set for the plan period were fully achieved upto the end of 1964-65. In all Rs. 173 Lakhs were advanced as long term credit against

the target of Rs.107 Lakhs. Similarly, Rs. 226 Lakhs were advanced as medium term credit against the target of Rs.34 Lakhs. Again Rs. 500 Lakhs were advanced as short term credit against the plan target of Rs.285 lakh during the period from 1961-62 to 1964-65.

By the end of 1964-65, about 50 miles major district roads were constructed and construction of about 63 miles of roads was in progress. Similarly, the rural roads of about 29 miles were constructed during this period.

In Social Services sector by the end of 1964-65 an additional number of 32,010 pupils was covered under the scheme of normal expansion of primary education for which 1067 additional teachers were employed. Under the training programme of Primary teachers 1132 teachers were trained during this period. Under the construction of buildings for primary schools, 33 class rooms were constructed by the end of 1964-65 & a provision of 174 additional classes in Govt. Secondary Schools was also made by the end of 1964-65. In all 198 teachers were employed in secondary schools for the additional classes.

Under "Technical Education" the polytechnic was started at District Hqs with intake capacity of 120 students, and by the end of 1964-65 40 students were admitted. Under Medical & Public Health measures one blood bank was opened at General Hospital, Nanded. Under public Health measure by the end of 1964-65 about 74% of population was covered by small pox vaccination and in Family planning programme 28 F.P.C. were opened in the district and 4119 sterilization operations were performed.

Under Housing Scheme, construction of 428 houses under Village Housing Project Scheme was completed and construction of 479 houses was in progress. Under social welfare and labour and labour welfare programmes, one welfare extension project was working in the district and one technical and vocational training institute for labour welfare was also functioning.

Table No. 11.3 :- This table indicates the community development programme in the district as on 31st March, 1955. There were no M.D.B. blocks or T.D. blocks by the end of March, 1955. All the rural population of the district was covered by community development programme.

Table No. 11.4 :- This table indicates the expenditure incurred in different stages of blocks in Mandla district upto the end of 31st March, 1954 and 31st March, 1955. It also indicates the talukawise C.I.A. size of the blocks in the district. Two blocks viz; Mandla and Madgaon which were in stage-I in 1954 entered in stage-II in the year 1955, and one block of Mandla which was in stage-II entered in stage-III in 1955. The total expenditure in column No. 8 in the table is given according to the stage of the block in the year 1955.

Table No. 11.5 :- This table indicates the physical achievement on the selected items in all the blocks of Mandla district for the year 1953-54 and 1954-55. The distribution of the fertilizers had increased appreciably in almost all the blocks except in Mandla in the year 1954-55. Similarly, there was increase in the distribution of improved seeds in the year 1954-55 in Bankar, Mandla (both blocks) Madgaon, Mandla and Biloli blocks. However, there was decrease in the distribution of improved seeds in the year 1954-55 over 1953-54 in Mandla, Beglur and Inwet. The increase in the distribution of fertilizers in

improved seeds denotes the growing adoption of improved agricultural practices by the cultivators of the district.

Table No. 11.6 :- This table indicates the blockwise index numbers of physical achievements and expenditure in Nanded-district in 1963-64 and 1964-65. Out of the nine blocks in the district during 1963-64, two blocks viz; Nanded and Hadgaon had completed five years in Stage-I and were in extension period hence the classification of these blocks according to prorata expenditure was not made. The classification of the blocks into A, B, C shown in the table was on the basis of the level of expenditure incurred in these blocks. Whenever the expenditure exceeded 75% to the expected expenditure for that period the block was classified as 'A'. When the percentage of expenditure was between 50 to 75%, the block was classified as 'B' and for less than 50%, it was classified as 'C' type of Block. Majority of the blocks in the district in 1963-64 were in 'A' class by expenditure. According to physical achievement also the classification was made into special A, A, B and C according to the level of achievements as a percentage to the norms of achievements fixed for different stages of the Blocks. Whenever the percentage of achievements to the norms was more than 150% the block was classified as Special A, when it was between 100 to 150% it was classified as A class, and when it was between 50 to 100% it was regarded as 'B' Class Block. The blocks having ^{upto} 50% achievements were classified as 'C' Class Blocks. In the year 1963-64 majority

of the blocks in the district were in B class in achievements whereas in 1964-65 they were in A Class. It indicates that the performance of the Blocks in respect of physical achievements in the year 1964-65 was considerably better than the performance in the year 1963-64.

12. Prices.

Table No. 12.1 :- This table indicates the average retail prices of important commodities at District H.V.Nanded, in Nanded-district for the year 1964. In all 51 commodities are included in this table. During the year 1964 the prices of cereals indicated continuously increasing trend from January 1964 to October 1964. The price of wheat increased even upto December, 1964. In November, 1964, the prices of rice and Jowar fell compared to prices in the month of October, 1964, due to the harvesting of these crops in that month. The price of pulses also indicated continuously increasing trend for the year 1964 recording a maximum increase in the month of December, 1964. Particularly, the prices of Gram and Gram Dal, Arhar and Mung nearly doubled in the month of December, 1964. The increase in the prices of pulses was mainly due to the comparatively bad crops of the pulses. The prices of Gur indicated rising trend in the months of June, July, August and September and subsequent falling trend in its prices. The price of ground-nut oils indicated increase from January 1964 to September 1964. The price of vanaspati "Dalda" (loose) also increased in May 1964 to October, 1964 and thereafter came down in December, 1964. The prices of goat, meat, fresh fish and eggs also indicated increasing

trend of the year. The change in the price of rice was 0.1 per cent in 1959-60. There was no considerable change in the price of dry chillies during the period under report. The prices of vegetable and fruits more or less remained the same showing only seasonal variations. The price of average index of rising trend from August, 1959 to December, 1959 indicating about 25% increase over the prices in January, 1960. There was no considerable change in the prices of such power, light and lubricants and clothing items except slight increase in charcoal, match-box and soap prices. The price of brass, indicated about 10 to 15 percent increase in prices. In the miscellaneous items of the consumption there were no considerable changes in the prices and the prices remained constant throughout the year.

Table No. 12.2: This table indicates the operation of regulated market in each taluka of Nanded district. In all talukas there were 13 regulated markets in the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. The table gives the quantity of different commodities sold in the market together with its value for the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. The main commodities sold in these markets were paddy, rice, wheat, Jawar, gram, tur, moong, urad, groundnut, chillies, turmeric, tamarind, sugarcane and cotton. Out of the 13 markets in the district, important markets were at Nanded, Deglur, Dhanu, Mukhed, Shamabad, Kunalwadi, Natarani and Kirtwat.

Table No. 12.3: This table indicates consumer price index number for working class in Nanded district.

The consumers price index number for working class increased from 281 in January 1964 to 350 in October, 1964 indicating continuous increase and again fell down from November 1964 upto March, 1965. This increase in the working class consumer price index was mainly due to the increase in the prices of food articles and articles under miscellaneous group during the year under report.

13. Miscellaneous.

Table No. 13.1:- This table indicates the strength of Police Force and Crime statistics in Nanded district during the year 1963 and 1964. There was no increase in the strength of police force in the year 1964. But the strength of the Police force decreased in the District by 1.57% in 1964 from 1963. This decrease was only in case of temporary police force. There was no change in the number of Police Stations. The number of cognizable crimes rose by 60.27% over the corresponding figure in 1963. Similarly, the number of non-cognizable crimes reported increased by 114.52% over the corresponding figure in 1963. The cost of Police force also rose by 152.11% over the corresponding figure in 1963. This appears to be mainly due to the revised scales of Dearness Allowances etc;

Table No. 13.2:- This table indicates the cases disposed in Civil and Criminal Courts of Nanded district in the year 1963 and 1964. In the civil side the original regular cases increased in the year 1964 by 3.83% over the previous year's figure

and the original miscellaneous cases increased by 322.03% over 1963. In respect of Civil appellate cases, the regular cases decreased in the year 1964 by 35.07% from 1963 and the miscellaneous cases remained constant during the period. In criminal side, the original regular and miscellaneous cases decreased in 1964 by 22.1% over 1963. However, in the criminal appellate side the regular and miscellaneous cases together increased by 410.3% over the corresponding figure in 1963.

Table No. 13.3 :- This table indicates cinema statistics in Nanded district. The average number of seats per theatre in the year 1963-64 and 1964-65 was 633 and 630 respectively. The average number of seats per theatre in case of Nanded-town and in other places in district showed considerable difference. Average number of seats in Nanded town per theatre during 1963-64 and 1964-65 was 825 whereas the average number of seats per theatre at other places in district was 490 in 1964-65 and 490 in 1963-64. All theatres were located in the urban areas of the district.

Table No. 13.4 :- This table indicates the pay-rangewise number of Government employees in 1961 Census in Nanded district. Out of the total number of Govt. employees in Nanded district, 0.26% were gazetted Class-I officers & 1.53% were gazetted Class II officers, Class-III officers formed 81.12% and Class IV employees formed 17.09% of total Govt.

employees in the district. The maximum number of Govt. employees fell in the pay-range of Rs. 75 to Rs. 200 forming 89.87% of the total Government employees, in the district.

Table No. 13.5 :- This table indicates the number of Banking offices in 1964-65 in Nanded district. The Bank offices were located in 15 villages and towns in Nanded district which covered the population of 169483 in the district. The average population covered per bank was 11298.

Table No. 13.6 :- This table gives the information regarding number of Joint stock Companies in Nanded district during the year 1963-64. Out of the two "companies limited by shares" one was in public sector and another was in private sector. Besides this there was only one company in public sector under the ~~xxxxx~~ category of "Companies limited by guarantees and associations for profit". The number of Joint stock ~~xxxxx~~ Companies in the district appears to be considerably less, probably due to Industrial backwardness of the area.

Table No. 13.7 :- This table furnishes the information on number of Policies issued and amount insured in Nanded district during the years 1963-64 and 1964-65. The number of Policies issued in the district during in 1964-65 rose by 15.09% over the corresponding number in 1963-64. The total amount insured in the district in 1964-65 showed an increase of 19.50% over the total amount insured in 1963-64;

Table No. 13.8 :- This table gives the account of Collection of Small Savings in Nanded district during 1963-64 and 1964-65. The gross collection increased by 22.10% during 1964-65 over 1963-64. The withdrawals also increased by 24.61% during 1964-65 over 1963-64. The percentage increase in net collection during 1964-65 over 1963-64 was of the order of 34.16.

Table No. 13.9 :- This table indicates land revenue collections in each taluka of Nanded district during 1963-64 and 1964-65. The percentage of collection to demand was 96.66% during the year 1963-64 and 95.40% during the year 1964-65. It indicates that the collections of land revenue were comparatively less in the year 1964-65 as compared to those in the year 1963-64. Similarly, the arrears of land revenue at the end of 1964-65 were considerably higher than the arrears at the end of 1963-64.

Table No. 13.10 :- This table gives information on receipts ~~and~~ of Excise Revenue/Sales-tax/Entertainment tax in Nanded district during the year 1963-64 and 1964-65. The figures of the receipt of excise revenue during 1964-65 decreased by 7.64% over 1963-64. The receipts of sales tax increased by 4.99% during 1964-65 over 1963-64. The receipts of Entertainment tax decreased by 47.74% during 1964-65 over 1963-64.

Table No. 13.11 :- This table furnishes the information on number of documents registered, income and expenditure therefrom and value of properties.

transferred in each taluka of Nanded district. There was 20.48% increase in number of documents registered during 1964-65 over 1963-64 in the district. Similarly, the value of properties transferred during 1964-65 had shown the percentage increase of 22.61% over 1963-64 in the district. The income from registrations increased by 34.33% during 1964-65 over 1963-64 and the expenditure incurred decreased by 3.41% during 1964-65 over 1963-64 in the district. The net income increased by 70.77% during 1964-65 over 1963-64 in the district.

Table No. 13.12 :- This table furnishes the constituency-wise statistics relating to General elections held in 1962 in Nanded district with percentages of votes polled to total number of voters. The highest percentage (64.30) was polled in Kinwat whereas the lowest percentage (35.3) was polled in Mukhed taluka. Male voters formed 59.84% and female voters formed 40.14% of the total number of votes polled.

Table No. 13.13 :- This table indicates the talukewise percentage distribution of households according to the number of rooms occupied and the percentage distribution of these households to the population in Nanded district according to 1961 Census. In all 64.46% of the houses are used in the district as dwellings, 22.62% as cattle sheds etc., 5.93% were vacant houses at the time of the Census and the remaining are used as shops, workshops, factories, schools etc. The classification according to number of rooms occupied

indicate that 67.75% households occupy one room dwellings and 19.96% occupy two room dwellings in the district. The households occupying larger number of rooms are more in urban area than in rural areas. Average number of persons per room is 3.49 in the district being 3.53 and 3.24 in rural and urban areas respectively.

A NOTE ON THE
ANNUAL PLAN REVIEW ON DISTRICT LEVEL SCHEMES
OF THIRD FIVE YEAR PLAN FOR THE YEAR 1964 - 65.

The Third Five Year Plan of Maharashtra was a prelude to perspective Planning in the history of Planned Development Programmes of the State. In the two earlier plans, no doubt, efforts to develop certain sectors were made, but a beginning of the long-term Development Plan which aims at all-sided Development of the State with a view to create a self-reliant and self-generating economy of the State was made during the Third Five Year Plan period. While formulating the schemes in the Third Five Year Plan it was envisaged that the foundation of the economy would be laid in such a way that it would fulfil the objects of Planning within a span of 15 years from the beginning of the Third Five Year Plan. The experience of previous ten years of Planning had also helped in assessing the potential of Development of the State and the requirements for effective Planning for further Development. Similarly, the Regional and District Level Potential for Planning was also kept in view while formulating the schemes in the Third Five Year Plan. Thus, an endeavour was made to develop the basic requirements for the Development of sound Agro-Industrial structure within the State. However, together with Planning of the Economic resources of the State it was also desired that the Structure of the economy and the Social environment should be so created that the Planned Development would result in generating a high rate of growth in Income and Employment with equitable distribution, for which Co-operative organisation at all levels had to be developed and role of public sector expanded.

The Third Five Year Plan schemes of Maharashtra State are classified into (1) State level, (2) Divisional level and (3) District level schemes on the basis of the benefits that are likely to be derived by the implementation of the Schemes. The

schemes benefitting one District area are called "District Level" Schemes. The schemes benefitting more than one District are classified as "Divisional" or "State" level Schemes depending upon the scope of the scheme. However, this is a broad classification and a particular District or Division may also receive considerable financial and physical benefits by the State level, Divisional level and District level Schemes implemented outside the District or Division.

In this Review an attempt is made to discuss the progress of District level schemes implemented in Nanded District during 1964-65.

The Third Five Year Plan in Nanded District was implemented in April, 1961 with a total plan Provision of Rs. 390.840 Lakhs for District level schemes and subsequently the plan provision was revised to Rs. 430.280 Lakhs.

In all 62 District level schemes are implemented in the Third Five Year Plan at present in this District.

The Progressive Expenditure incurred on District level schemes in Nanded District, during 1961-62, 1962-63 and 1963-64 was to the tune of Rs. 48.930 Lakhs, Rs. 115.230 Lakhs & Rs. 182,429 Lakhs respectively showing 11.87, 26.78 & 43.79 percent of the corresponding Plan Allocation. The progressive expenditure by the end of the Year 1964-65 on total District level schemes in the District was Rs. 318.068 Lakhs forming 73.92 percent of the corresponding Plan Provision of Rs. 430.280 Lakhs.

The expenditure during first three years period was comparatively less than the expected normal phasing of expenditure. Particularly, the expenditure was very less in the first year of the Third Five Year Plan mainly because of non-availability of the

Budget Provisions on most of the schemes during that period. Similarly, the allocations of the Plan schemes to the local sector in the year 1962 after formation of Zilla Parishad also held-up for some time the progress of implementation of the schemes till the taking over of these schemes by local sector authorities. In some cases the shortage of personnel and technical staff also hampered the progress of the schemes in earlier years of the Plan. Hence, the of year-wise expenditure was behind the schedule,

The table below indicates the Major Head-wise allocation and progressive expenditure from the year 1961-62 to 1964-65.

It is evident from the above table that the percentage of progressive expenditures from 1-1-1961 to 31-3-1965 under the Head Transport and Communication tops when compared with the percentages of progressive expenditures on other Heads of Development. This was so because the District lacked communication facilities and construction of roads in the length and breadth of the District was a pre-requisite of Social and Economic Development. The next higher percentage of progressive expenditure is under the Head Co-operation and Community Development. The percentage of progressive expenditure on the Head Agricultural Programme occupies Third position. The percentage of progressive expenditures under the Heads Industry & Mining and Social Services are next in descending order. Particularly, the percentage of expenditure on the Head Social Services is low due to late commencement of the scheme of "C-2-Extension of Universal Free and Compulsory Primary Education to Children of age range 6 to 11 years" and "II-Development of existing Polytechnics taking over of private polytechnics and starting of New Polytechnics (Grants and Teachers Training Programmes)."

However, the percentage of expenditure on all Heads of development in the District was quite satisfactory during the year 1964-65 i.e. 30.13 per cent when compared to 11.37%, 15.41% & 17.51% of expenditures respectively during the year 1961-62, 1962-63 & 1963-64, to the corresponding Plan Provisions.

In the following paras sub-Headwise Plan Progress of financial as well as physical achievements is discussed, so as to focus the impact of Plan schemes in the District.

AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTIONS

The schemes under this Sub-Head mostly aim at popularising the improved agricultural practices such as use of improved

seeds, use of ~~improved~~ chemical fertilizers, insecticides & pesticides; use of Improved Agricultural Implements and use of Intensive & Improved methods of cultivation etc., etc. and increasing the Agricultural production. There are 9 District level schemes under this Sub-Head for Mandated-District with a total Plan Provision of Rs. 37.730 Lakhs. The progressive expenditure on this Sub-Head upto end of March, 1965 was Rs. 13.300 Lakhs forming ~~35.730 Lakhs~~ 35.25% of the corresponding plan provision. Out of 9 schemes under this Sub-Head the schemes of "Co-ordinated Cotton Extension" and "Establishment of Taluka Seed Farm" have a plan provision of Rs. 14,100 Lakhs & Rs. 12,840 Lakhs respectively totalling to Rs. 26,940 Lakhs which form 71.40% of the total Plan allocation on this Sub-Head. The progress under both the schemes was very slow because of excess Plan Provision against scheme "Co-ordinated Cotton Extension" and delay in settling the land acquisition cases due to disputes in case of scheme of "Establishment of Taluka Seed Farm." Similarly, the scheme for "propagation of Improved Agricultural Implements" with Plan Provision of Rs. 1,970 Lakhs was not implemented till the end of March, 1965 due to non-provision of subsidy under the scheme. The scheme of development of sugar-cane with Plan Provision of Rs. 1,770 Lakhs was also not properly and quickly implemented in the District, due to delay in finalisation of the site for sugar-cane Development centre.

Owing to this the progress of expenditure under this sub-head was considerably low, even though other schemes under this sub-head such as schemes of Agriculture School, Development of Oil Seeds, Development of Horticulture, Plant Protection services, Intensive Cultivation, and Propagation of Improved Agronomic Practices indicated considerable progress.

Following were the Major Physical Achievements under this Sub-Head.

One Agriculture School for training the candidates in improved methods of cultivation was established in the year 1963. The area of 7,000 acres was covered by the scheme of Development of sugar-cane. Similarly, the plantation of 368 acres fruit trees and re-juvenation of fruit trees in 273 acres was done. An area of 5483 acres was brought under green manuring and 15956 tons of compost was made. Under Intensive Cultivation an area of 119258 Acres was covered and in an area of 175610 acres Improved Agronomic practices were introduced.

Although due to the Implementation of the above scheme, such an atmosphere was created that the cultivators would be entrusted to adopt Improved Agriculture Practices on their own accord the programme under this Sub-Head could not fully be substantial so as to augment Agriculture Production, due to dependence on rains which failed thereby defining the degree of programme of Agriculture Improvements.

LAND DEVELOPMENT

There was no scheme under this Sub-Head implemented in this District.

SOIL CONSERVATION.

The programme of land development is very essential for increasing the fertility of the land and for developing yield per acre. Soil Conservation measures are very much necessary in an area where there is acute scarcity of rains and possibilities of Soil erosion, due to un-even nature of the contour. The programme of the Soil Conservation in the district was undertaken with a two-fold purpose of stopping the soil erosion and increasing the

retentivity of moisture in the land. The scheme of Soil Conservation was not initially provided in the Third Five Year Plan for this district, but the same was started in the year 1963-64. The scheme covers the activities of contour bunding, Nala Bunding and Contour trenching. During the year 1964-65, the expenditure of Rs.10.820 Lakhs was incurred and the area of 19326 acres was bunded. The progressive expenditure and the progressive Achievements till the end of the year 1964-65 were of the order ^{of} Rs.10.820 Lakhs and a coverage of 20128 Acres of land respectively. Even-though this scheme was started late in the district it became very popular among the cultivators. Besides stopping Soil erosion this scheme is also increasing the water levels of the surrounding wells.

MINOR IRRIGATION:

It is generally observed that the Major and Medium Irrigation Projects take considerable period for their completion and releasing additional irrigation facilities to the cultivators. With a view to provide quick irrigation facilities to the ~~xxx~~ cultivators, Minor Irrigation works are considered very useful, as they can be completed within a short period and the irrigation facility is quickly available to the cultivators. Hence together with a programme of Major & Medium Irrigation Projects, the works of Irrigation wells and Minor Irrigation tanks have also been planned and implemented. Loans were advanced for wells programme by the Wanded District Co-operative Land Development Bank, Wanded and 128 wells were constructed upto the end of the year 1964-65. To increase the area irrigated by these and the existing wells, a scheme of Installation of pumping sets was taken up and 87 pumping sets were installed upto the end of the year 1964-65. Though under these schemes construction of wells and installation of pumping sets are undertaken, the plan schemes only provide subsidy to the

extent of $\frac{1}{4}$ th amount required for construction of each well and installation of pumping sets. An expenditure of Rs. 1.605 Lakhs was incurred on scheme of construction of Irrigation wells and of Rs.0.590 Lakhs were spent on scheme of installation of pumping sets upto end of the year 1964-65. A scheme of Co-operative Lift Irrigation was also started in the district. However the expected physical target could not be achieved though an expenditure of Rs. 0.463 Lakhs was incurred on the scheme upto the end of the year 1964-65.

Out of the four schemes under this Sub-Head the Major portion of the plan outlay is covered by Scheme No. MIN 7-Minor Irrigation works. There are two types of minor irrigation works

(1) covering irrigated area below 250 acres and (2) covering more than 250 acres. The works irrigating less than 250 acres area are allotted for implementation to the Zilla Parishad, Nanded, and the works irrigating more than 250 acres area are implemented by Minor Irrigation Division in State Sector. By the end of 1964-65 an expenditure of Rs.38.605 Lakhs was incurred on minor irrigation works of State Sector and an additional irrigation potential of 6170 acres was created due to these works. However, the expenditure during the year 1964-65 on these works was Rs.12.8 Lakhs. Similarly, for works irrigating less than 250 acres area, an expenditure of Rs. 7.930 Lakhs was incurred upto the end of 1964-65 creating an irrigation potential of 4742 acres out of which the achievements during 1964-65 on financial and physical side were Rs. 4.185 Lakhs and an additional irrigation potential of 210 acres respectively.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY:

The importance of animal husbandry activities is increasing day by day with the growing consciousness of the people

regarding this aspect of development. Preservation of live-stock and improvement in their breeds are the main objects of animal husbandry activities. During the Third Five Year Plan period only three types of schemes of animal husbandry were undertaken in the district with a total provision of Rs. 1.410 Lakhs. Veterinary Dispensaries and Veterinary Aid Centres are useful in treating the animals from various ailments. These centres also undertake preventive vaccination programme against various animal diseases. A need to house these dispensaries in properly constructed building was felt and the scheme of construction of veterinary buildings was undertaken and Aid centres was undertaken in the District. By the end of 1964-65 three veterinary Dispensary buildings were constructed with an expenditure of Rs. 1.837 Lakhs. Another important scheme under this sub-head was of organisations of breeders Society and Supplementary Cattle Breeding Centres. By the end of 1964-65, four cattle breeding centres and one breeders society were organised in the district with an expenditure of Rs. 0.391 Lakhs. Under the district premium Bulls scheme the Premium bulls are located in certain selected villages with the prior approval of the willing gram panchayats with a view to improve the breed of the cattle. By the end of 1964-65 122 premium bulls were located in the district at certain places and an expenditure of Rs.0.400 Lakhs was incurred on them out of which the achievement during 1964-65 27, premium bulls, were supplied in certain centres at a total cost of Rs. 0.193 lakhs.

DAIRY DEVELOPMENT:

Dairy Development activities are meant for increasing milk yield on one hand and for providing supplementary source of income to the cultivators on the other. However, Nanded District could not do much in this direction during the IIIrd Five Year

Plan period, as only one scheme of organisation of milk producers societies and Federation was initially started in this district. Subsequently, while revising the plan outlays one more scheme of provision of loans for cattle purchase was allotted with a total plan provision of Rs. 0.400 Lakhs. The total plan provision of both the schemes for this district stood at Rs. 1.300 Lakhs. During the period under report no expenditure was incurred. However upto the end of 1964-65 only Rs. 0.069 Lakhs were spent on the scheme of organisations of Milk producers Societies and Federation and only one society was organised. The other scheme of loans for cattle purchase was not implemented in the district. In short, the programme under this Sub-head was not appreciable and hence no impact of the schemes under this Sub-head could be felt by the district.

FORESTS:

The programme under this Sub-head is planned with a view to increase plantation of valuable trees afforestation for Soil conservation, development of wood lands and pastures with the help of Village Panchayats and Forest Communications in the district. Besides the necessity of the forests as a source of income and wood requirements it is also helpful in preserving the land from soil erosion. Similarly, the problem of forest communications is also of importance for preservation of forest and transportation of forest produce in forest areas. During the Third Five Year Plan period only the schemes of plantation of valuable trees, afforestation for soil conservation, Forest communication, and assistance to Village Panchayats for afforestation and Development of pastures with a total plan provision of Rs. 3.170 Lakhs were undertaken. By the end of 1964-65 against the target of 200 acres of plantation of valuable trees, 210 acres of plantation of valuable trees was achieved.

Similarly, out of a target of 1000 acres for afforestation for soil conservation, afforestation was made over 650 acres with an expenditure of Rs. 0.587 Lakhs. Out of the target of 40 k.m. of construction of forest road however only 10 k.m. road was constructed ~~by the end of 1964-65~~ by the end of 1964-65 with a total expenditure of Rs. 0.459 Lakhs. The scheme of assistance to Village Panchayats for development of wood lands and pastures started functioning only during the year 1964-65 and afforestation of 5 acres could only be possible by the end of 1964-65 with an expenditure of Rs. 0.011 Lakhs.

Fisheries:

The programme of Development of Fisheries in the district aimed at increasing the fish production by stocking the tanks with carp fry on one hand and by providing assistance to the fishermen through loans and supply of fishery requisites. The schemes under this head also aimed at developing the societies of fishermen. All these schemes are provided with a view to develop the fish production and better arrangements for netting of fish. It is also intended that these fishermen's co-operative societies will undertake the storage and marketing of fish caught by its members. The total provision on all these schemes under this Sub-head in the district for the IIIrd Five Year Plan was Rs. 1.140 Lakhs out of which Rs. 0.228 Lakhs only were spent by the end of 1964-65. Against the target of stocking of 6 Lakhs of carp fry in the district 1,23,000 carp fry were stocked by the end of 1964-65. Similarly, against 3,00,000 kg. of netting of fish 6,732 kg. of fish^{was} netted. The progress of supply of fishery requisites was quite unsatisfactory as against the target of 3,000 kg. nylon twine and 500 kg. cotton twine to be supplied only about 60 kg. of nylon twine and about 93 kg. of cotton twine was supplied upto the end of 1964-65. The development of fishery

co-operative was also not upto the mark. Regarding provision of loans to the fisherman and fisheries societies Rs. 800.00 only were granted as loan against the target of grant of loans of Rs. 18000 upto the end of 1964-65. In general the programme of fisheries development was not satisfactory as only 15.83% of the plan provision was spent upto the end of the 4th year of the plan. It indicates that the development of inland fishery will take a long time unless fish storage and fish marketing facilities with quick transport facilities are made available.

WARE HOUSING AND MARKETING:

The programme under this scheme provides for financial assistance to market committees of regulated markets for developing necessary facilities such as market yards, office buildings, sale halls etc. in order to carry out the work of regulating marketing and development of grading services. The total plan provision for development of Agricultural Marketing and development of grading was Rs. 5.010 Lakhs of which Rs.1.337 Lakhs was spent upto end of 1964-65. On physical achievement side loans for two marketing committees for regulation of market & marketing committees for development of market yards etc. were granted. Similarly, subsidy was granted to 13 market committees. One grading unit was established in the district. The loans for the development of market yards for 4 market committee/could not be granted due to land disputes regarding land of market yard.

CO-OPERATION:

Development of Co-operative structure at all levels is intended to strengthen the isolated sectors of economy with a view to make them compatible with more organised sectors. Co-operation in the rural areas is particularly emphasised with two-fold purpose (1) to inculcate the spirit of self help amongst the

cultivators in villages/ (2) and to provide for their credit needs and other requirements such as marketing and storage of food grains etc. on co-operative basis.

Five schemes on Co-operation were started in the district with a Plan Provision of Rs. 18.590 Lakhs. The scheme for strengthening of co-operative structure in the district aims at (I) Supplementing the capital of these institutions with the share capital contribution by Government; (II) encouraging by means of subsidies the opening of new branches of Land Development Bank and the Central co-operative Bank; (III) encouraging by means of outright grants to the Central Co-operative Bank and Service Co-operatives and to provide for production finance to the agriculturist hitherto considered non-credit-worthy. During the year 1964-65 Rs. 31.201 Lakhs as long term credits, Rs. 7.109 Lakhs as medium term credit and Rs. 120.233 Lakhs as short term credit were granted through the co-operative organisations. Similarly, 4 new branches of Central Co-operative Banks were opened and share capital contribution to the extent of Rs. 14.620 Lakhs was granted to the Central Co-operative Banks. The membership of 3370 was also increased. Up to the end of the year 1964-65 the advances of long and medium term credits together and short-term credits stood at Rs. 88.005 Lakhs and Rs. 170.615 Lakhs respectively. Similarly, 17 new branches of Central Co-operative Banks were opened and share capital to the extent of Rs. 28.750 Lakhs was granted to the Central Financing agencies. The increased membership up to the end of 1964-65 stood at 18700. Though two new branches of Land Development Bank were planned to be opened in the district but till the end of 1964-65 no new branch of Land Development Bank was opened.

Under the scheme of development of Co-operative Marketing

it was intended to link the Co-operative Agriculture Credit Societies with Co-operative Marketing. The purpose was to strengthen the co-operative marketing structure at District and primary level by organising new primary marketing societies. This scheme also proposed to advance loans and subsidies for managerial purposes, and construction of godowns for storing of agricultural produce so that such societies could serve as primary collection centres for agricultural produce to be marketed later through co-operative marketing societies. With this view 4 new Primary Marketing Societies were started during the year 1964-65 bringing up the total of new primary marketing societies to 6 upto the end of March 1965. Besides this 12 rural godowns, 2 medium godowns and one ~~xxxx~~ large godown were constructed by the marketing societies upto end of 1964-65 the total expenditure on the scheme development of marketing up 1964-65 was Rs. 9.184 Lakhs which entirely exhausted all the total provision of Rs. 8.070 Lakhs for the district within 4 years only.

The scheme for development of the Grain Depots for backward classes was also provided for the district but it was dropped subsequently.

Another scheme of co-operative farming in Pilot Project areas in the district was also started with a view to organise small farmers with un-economic holdings and new grantees of lands with inadequate resources into co-operative farms so that they could be assisted financially and technically to derive the maximum benefit from the land. Ten such societies were formed upto the end of 1964-65. The scheme was implemented in pilot project areas only. The financial assistance to the extent of Rs. 0.080 Lakhs in the year 1964-65, and Rs. 1.081 Lakhs upto end of 1964-65 was provided to these societies. Similar type of scheme to

organise and assist the Co-operative Farming Societies of small holders and landless agricultural labourers outside the pilot project area was also implemented in the district. 12 such societies were organised and financial assistance to the tune of Rs.0.945 Lakhs was provided to them upto the end of 1964-65. The total plan provision on this sub-head was Rs.18.590 Lakhs and the expenditure during 1964-65 was of the order of Rs. 0.110 Lakhs and 0.945 Lakhs respectively.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME:

The community development programme was initiated in the district for the social, and economic development of the rural population of the district. All the rural area of the district was covered under this programme before the commencement of IIIrd Five Year Plan. However, the intensive phase of development of $\frac{1}{2}$ C.P.A. pattern blocks covering Kandhar and Biloli Talukas had not started before the end of IIInd Five Year Plan. In the 1st two years of IIIrd Five Year Plan all these $\frac{1}{2}$ C.P.A. Patterns units were converted into State I Block from pre-extension Stage. Other blocks of the district which were on intensive and post-intensive development stage were also continued during the plan period. The achievements of these C.D. Blocks were satisfactory during the period under report and upto the end of 1964-65 as out of the plan provision of Rs. 89.530 Lakhs, Rs.36.903 Lakhs were spent upto the end of the year 1964-65.

The other scheme of local Development works which aims at providing drinking water supply in villages and completion of other types of local developmental works was also implemented in the District. This scheme is a Centrally Sponsored scheme and worked on the basis of 50% public contribution and 50% central

grant. # Upto the end of 1964-65 Rs.1.933 Lakhs were spent for these local developmental works with the achievement of completion of 26 School buildings and 65 drinking water wells.

The scheme of financial assistance to rural local bodies for local development works programme was also taken in the Sub-Head which aimed at granting financial assistance to rural local authorities to supplement the resources for undertaking the works under the local development works programme. An expenditure of Rs. 0.403 Lakhs was made during the year 1964-65 only.

Besides these schemes the scheme of financial assistance to Village Panchayats was also taken up with the object of giving financial assistance to Village Panchayats in order to enable them to discharge their functions properly.

The scheme consisted of two parts (I) payment of land revenue grants to Village Panchayats and (II) Special assistance to Village Panchayats in backward and Adivasi areas. Under this scheme land revenue was paid to one Village Panchayat and special assistance was given to 62 Village Panchayats upto the end of period under report.

LARGE AND MEDIUM INDUSTRIES:- Under this Sub-Head only one scheme namely strengthening the enforcement - cum - inspection machinery was provided with no plan allocation but subsequently it was dropped unimplemented.

SMALL SCALE INDUSTRIES:- The development programme for Small Scale Industries provided in the plan aims at assisting the artisans, crafts-men, persons engaged in the traditional and cottage industries and handicrafts for their individual development and development of such industries on co-operative basis. Establishment of Industrial Estates, Small Industries Development Co-operation and organisation of Small Scale and Cottage Industries on modern lines were constructed

under this programme. The organisation of these industries and their over all development on modern lines is very essential to increase the efficiency of these small and cottage industries which provide employment and means of livelihood to a sizeable portion of the population. Under Small Scale Industries programme only two schemes with an outlay of Rs. 7.920 Lakhs was provided in the plan for this district. The scheme for industrial co-operatives including the co-operatives of handicrafts workers provided for financial assistance to industrial co-operatives and co-operatives of handicrafts for share capital, loans to members for purchase of shares of their co-operative societies, loans and subsidies to the industrial co-operatives for improvement equipment and common facilities like subsidy for managerial cost and subsidy to the Central Financing Agencies to enable them to provide working capital to the co-operative at the concessional rates of interest. Upto the end of 1964-65, Rs. 1.401 Lakhs were spent on the scheme.

The other scheme of development of Handloom Weavers Co-operative Societies was started with an object of improving the economic condition of Handloom Weavers to encourage them to organise themselves into co-operatives and by offering them financial assistance for different purposes. Upto the end of 1964-65 one society of Handloom was organised and a total assistance of Rs. 2.94 Lakhs was given to this society and other existing Handloom Weavers Co-operative Societies.

ROAD DEVELOPMENT:

Roads play very important role in the development of a particular area. An adequate and wide spread transport system is very essential for economic development of a district. Particularly district roads and rural roads fulfil the internal

movements of produce from villages to the marketing centres in the district. During Third Five Year Plan period only two types of schemes namely construction of District Roads and Rural Roads were undertaken in the district under district level schemes with a Plan provision of Rs. 61,000 Lakhs. District Roads are those which traverse the district serving areas of production and markets and connect them with one another or with the inter-secting State Highways, National Highways or Railway Lines. Construction of district roads with a target of 173 miles in length was planned and during the year 1964-65, 50 miles of roads were constructed with total expenditure of Rs. 23,331 Lakhs. The total road length of district roads of about 126 miles was completed and the construction of 63 miles of road was in progress by the end of the year 1964-65. Similarly, construction works of two important bridges one across the Godavari at Raheer on Unari Naigam Road and another on the Manar near Ratoli on Narsi-Mukhad Road was started.

The programme of construction of a net work of Rural Roads aims at construction of village approach roads with a view to link them with major and other district roads. The provision of Rs. 7,900 Lakhs was made for the scheme, with a target of construction of 166 miles of rural roads. The progress of this scheme, however could not be satisfactory upto the end of 1964-65 as only 29 miles of rural roads were constructed by the end of 1964-65. One of the difficulties in the way of implementation of this scheme was the lack of required popular contribution forthcoming, from the concerned areas.

GENERAL EDUCATION:

A sound Educational System is necessary for raising the intellectual standard of the citizen with a view to make him understand different aspects of life. An educated citizen is more adjustable and can participate with an enlightened mind in the

programmes planned for his own development ~~and for the development~~ ~~work~~ and for the development of the community at large. Mandla District ^{is an} Educationally Backward District of the State. The Scheme provided in the Third Five Year Plan aim at expanding the educational facilities such as increase in number of schools, number of classes in existing schools, teachers construction of school buildings, training of teachers etc. The total plan provision on all the 7 schemes under this sub-head was Rs. 75.480 Lakhs for Mandla District. An expenditure of Rs. 16.845 Lakhs and Rs. 31.291 Lakhs was incurred during 1964-65 and upto the end of the year 1964-65 since beginning of the Third Five Year Plan respectively on this sub-head.

The scheme of normal expansion of Primary Education combined with Extension of Universal, Free and Compulsory Education to Children between the age group 6 to 11 years with a Plan Provision of Rs. 40.300 Lakhs covered major plan provision under this sub-head. The scheme comprises (1) Normal expansion of primary education and (2) Universal, Free and compulsory education. The scheme for Normal expansion of Primary Education was implemented in the district and 204 teachers were appointed during 1964-65 under this scheme. Similarly, the increase in strength of pupils to the extent of 13,710 was achieved in 1964-65. The physical achievements of this scheme since beginning of Third Five Year Plan till the end of 1964-65 were the appointment of 1,247 teachers and enrolment of 37410 pupils. The second part of the scheme namely universal Free & Compulsory Education was not implemented at all upto the end of 1964-65. Due to this 52.74% expenditure could only be booked on this scheme till the end of 1964-65.

Another important scheme of this Sub-Head was of Basic

training of primary teachers with a Plan outlay of Rs. 21.030 Lakhs by the end of 1964-65, 1,132 Teachers were trained under this scheme in which an expenditure of Rs. 3.079 Lakhs was incurred. The implementation of this scheme was rather slow till the end of 1964-65.

Under the scheme of Construction of School Buildings, 10 School buildings were constructed in the District with a total expenditure of ~~xxx~~Rs. 1.768 Lakhs upto the end of 1964-65. The provision of additional classes in Government Secondary Schools with a view to accommodate more students of higher classes was planned and by the end of 1964-65, 198 additional classes were opened and 174 additional teachers were appointed with an expenditure of Rs. 5.539 Lakhs. The plan targets for appointment of 125 additional teachers and opening of 190 additional classes respectively were fully achieved during the first four years of the plan only. The scheme of Scholarships in Secondary Schools with a plan Provision of Rs. 0.010 Lakhs and target of 39 sets of scholarship however was not implemented upto the end of 1964-65.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION:

Technical Training Facilities assume great importance in a developing economy of a country. Industrial and technical development is not possible in absence of technically trained persons. The schemes of development of existing Government Poly-technics/ taking over of private polytechnics and starting of new polytechnics/ set up in the District aim at providing more facilities of diploma courses in the field of Engineering. One New Polytechnic was started under this scheme at Handed town during the year 1962-64 with the intake capacity of 60 students initially. The scheme had a plan provision of Rs. 25.450 Lakhs and upto the end of 1964-65 only Rs. 3.170 Lakhs were spent due to the late implementation of the scheme. The target of intake capacity of 120 pupils was also not achieved till the end of 1964-65.

Another scheme for provision of Hostel facilities at the Polytechnics with a provision of Rs. 1.000 Lakhs was not started upto the end of 1964-65.

The construction of the building for polytechnic had, however, started during the year 1964-65 and the construction of Hostel buildings could not be taken up due to the delay in land acquisition.

MEDICAL & NURSING:

Only one scheme of starting of Blood Bank was undertaken in the District under this sub-head with a Plan Provision of Rs. 0.200 Lakhs. Blood Bank was opened before the end of 1964-65 and expenditure of Rs. 0.081 Lakhs was incurred on this scheme upto the end of 1964-65.

PUBLIC HEALTH:

Under Public Health Programme, 5 schemes were provided for this district with a total plan provision of Rs. 25.080 Lakhs and an amount of Rs. 15.498 Lakhs were spent on all these schemes by the end of 1964-65. The major scheme under this sub-head was of Malaria Eradication Programme with a Plan Provision of Rs. 18.010 Lakhs. Under this scheme the programmes for spraying of D.D.T., detection of positive cases/were taken up in the district. Upto the end of 1964-65, 335 cases of Malaria were detected and treated. The total expenditure on this scheme till the end of 1964-65 was of Rs. 11.228 Lakhs. Another important scheme under this sub-head was that of Family Planning with a Plan Provision of Rs. 3.890 Lakhs. The object of the scheme was to intensify Family Planning Campaign by encouraging sterilisation as a positive measure for population control and distribution of contraceptives for Family Planning purposes in general. Upto

the end of 1964-65, 15 Rural Family Planning Centres, 13 Officers Training Corps, 1 Mobile vasectomy unit and 1 D.E.F.P.O. were established in the district and 3405 sterilisation operations were performed in the district with a total expenditure of Rs. 1.225 Lakhs. The scheme of B.C.G. Vaccination started in the district aims at taking protective measures against Tuberculosis by Mass B.C.G. Vaccination for securing immunity from T.B. The Plan Provision for this scheme was of Rs. 0.960 Lakhs out of which an expenditure of Rs. 0.902 Lakhs was incurred upto the end of 1964-65 and 2,11,089 cases were treated and 78,225 persons were Vaccinated against T.B. till 1964-65. Similarly, the Small Pox Vaccination Unit was also strengthened by appointment of staff with an expenditure of Rs. 2.750 Lakhs upto 1964-65 against the Plan Provision of Rs. 1.830 Lakhs which covered 80% re-vaccination of the population against Small Pox. The work under the scheme of Primary Health Centres with a provision of Rs. 0.990 Lakhs for maintenance of Primary Health Centres and the their construction had not been accelerated till the end of 1964-65.

WATER SUPPLY & DRAINAGE:

Only one scheme of village well water supply was started in the district under this sub-head. Against the Plan Provision of Rs. 0.170 Lakhs, the expenditure of Rs. 0.530 Lakhs was incurred on the scheme upto the end of 1964-65. The ^{three} well works were completed and 11 well construction works in progress under this scheme were transferred for completion during the year 1963-64 from the funds of schemes of Local Development Works Programme under community developments as per Govt. orders, as there was no sufficient Plan provision under this scheme.

HOUSING:

The housing Programme envisaged for this district in

Third Five Year Plan aims at construction of houses for Industrial workers through Maharashtra Housing Board, provision for housing facilities for persons belonging to low-income group, and assistance for developing villages and provision of house sites by extension of Gp. thans. The total Plan Provision under this sub-head was Rs. 13.500 Lakhs for district and the expenditure during 1964-65 and upto the end of 1964-65 was Rs. 5.753 Lakhs and Rs. 12.107 Lakhs respectively. The scheme of subsidised Industrial housing with a Plan provision of Rs. 2.520 Lakhs was not implemented in district upto end of 1964-65. Under the scheme of low-income group housing an amount of Rs. 3.419 Lakhs was spent against the Plan Provision of Rs. 1.410 Lakhs till the end of 1964-65 for the purpose of loans to individuals belonging to Low Income group and Co-operative housing Societies. The Village Housing Project Scheme implemented in the district for developing selected villages into model villages had a plan provision of Rs. 9.350 Lakhs, which covered major portion of the total plan outlay of this sub-head. During the year under report and upto the end of 1964-65 and expenditure of Rs. 4.322 Lakhs and Rs. 7.874 Lakhs was incurred respectively and 184 houses were built under the scheme. In all 34 villages were covered by the scheme and by the end of 1964-65 the construction of 629 houses was in progress. Under the scheme of extension of Village Gp. thans and provision of house-sites for which a plan provision of Rs. 0.220 Lakhs was made and an expenditure of Rs. 0.814 Lakhs was incurred, 80 villages were covered out of a target of 100 villages and 471 acres of area was acquired for house sites against the target of acquiring an area of 500 acres till the end of 1964-65.

SOCIAL WELFARE:

Under this Sub-Head only one scheme of Welfare extension

Project aimed at extension of welfare services for women children and handicapped in Rural areas with a plan provision of Rs. 0.710 Lakhs was taken up in the district and Rs.0.860 Lakhs were spent till the end of 1964-65. On the physical achievement side 26 Balwadis, 12 literacy classes, 8 maternity centres and 8 arts and crafts centres were functioning in the district under this scheme during the period under report.

LABOUR & LABOUR WELFARE:

The schemes provided under this Sub-head covered technical and vocational training, extension of Employees State Insurance Scheme, expansion of Employment services and collection of Employment Market Information. The Total provision of this Sub-Head was Rs. 9.390 Lakhs out of which Rs. 1.967 Lakhs were spent upto the end of 1964-65 on all these schemes. Particularly, the expenditure on the scheme of Technical & Vocational training for which a plan provision of Rs. 8.420 Lakhs was made, was slow till the end of 1964-65, as only Rs. 1.870 Lakhs were spent on the schemes of the extension of the Employees State Insurance and expansion of Employment Services were not implemented upto the end of 1964-65. However, one Information Unit for collection of Employment Market Information was started in the year 1964-65. In general, the progress of the Plan Schemes under this Sub-Head was not satisfactory in relation to the financial and Physical Achievements programme planned under this Sub-Head.
