CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION :

Physical features :

Location :

Buldana district has been named after Buldana town, which was selected as the District Headquarter in the year 1867. It was partly in the Tapi basin and partly in the Godawari basin. In 1905, subsequent to the amalgamation of Berar with the Central Provinces, the size of the district was increased by the addition of the talukas -- Khamgaon and Jalgaon from Akola district.

The district stretched out into the Deccan Plateau and lies between 19.51° to 21.17° North latitude and 75.75° to 76.49° East longitude. Situated at the western end of the Vidarbha, the district is bounded on north by the Nimar district of Madhya Pradesh, on the west by Jalgaon district of East Khandesh and Aurangabad district of Marathawada and the south by Parbhani of Marathawada and on the east by Akola district. The district covers an area of 3,766 square miles i.e. 9,754 square kilometres.

History :

The history of Buldana district is obscure and ^{was} of interest until the arrival of the Mohamedans in the Deccan in 1294. The greater part of Southern India was included in the empire of the Maurayas and on it's disruption, the north-western tracts of the Deccan (including Buldana district) fall into the possession of the conquerors viz., the Shakas, Pallavas, Yavanas, Andhras, Yadavas and local dynasty the Vakatakas.

The fifth king of this dynasty - Mahadev, Ugrasarva bhauma, who reigned from 1260 to 1271, had a Brahmin minister named Hemadrxi, whose name is of local importance for the reason that the Hindu temples in the Chalukyan style, the finest of which is at Lonar in this district, are attributed to him and are popularly known as the 'Hemadpanthi Temples'.

With the arrival of Allaudin Khilji in 1294, the Mohamedans first appeared in the Deccan. In 1312, Malik Kafur marched through the district to Devgiri and having defeated and slain Shankar, the Devgiri Prince, annexed his dominions.

In 1758, Balaji Rao attacked Sindkhed (birth place of Jijabai - mother of Shri Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj) to the rescue of which place, Nizam Ali hastened. He was compelled to fight his way from Aurangabad to Sindkhed, but succeeded in relieving the place. Daulat Rao Scindia and Raghuji Bhonsale ^{had} ~~was~~ encamped at Malkapur, when in August 1803, they allowed the British Envoy to depart and received General Wallaslay's declaration of war. A month or two later, General Wallaslay traversed the district, while pursuing them from Assaye to Argaon.

In 1853, Berar (Vidarbha) and other districts of the Nizam's Dominions were assigned to the East India Company in liquidation of the large debt due on account of arrears of pay of the Hyderabad Contingent and as a security for the further payment of that force. At the assignment, Berar (Balaghat) with headquarters at Bhingoli and North Berar with headquarters at Buldana were established.

After the war of Independence in 1857, the province was reconstituted into East and West Berar with headquarters at Aravati and Akola respectively, the present Buldana district being included in the latter.

Till 1st November 1956, Buldana was one of the districts of the erstwhile Madhya Pradesh. Consequent upon the Reorganisation of States, it formed a part of the Bilingual Bombay State till 1st May 1960, when it became part of the Maharashtra State. However, these changes involved no changes in the geographical boundaries of the district.

Topography :

Out of the five talukas now forming the district, the talukas of Chikhali and Mehkar lie on the Balaghat Plateau; while the rest of the talukas viz. - Malkapur, Khamgaon and Jalgaon are in the Great Plain below known as the Payanghat. There are thus two natural subdivisions, which correspond closely with administrative subdivisions of the district. The edge of the Plateau, where it falls abruptly into the valley is intersected by numerous deep ravines.

The landscape is of varied character, fertile villages alternating with barren hill sides and deep ravines. Below the Ghats, the land is flat except where it is broken by spurs of hills putting out into a plain. The general slope of the country above the Ghats is from north to south.

Soil :

The geological formation of the district is of Deccan trap with intra-trappen beds of shale, sandstone, and limestone. From the disintegration of the trap, these less prominent layers of non-crystalline rock can be traced, the various classes of soils of this tract, varying from the very fertile deep loam to the shallow murrum soils of the higher lands.

The soil of the plain is largely a deep black loam, which cakes into a solid mass in the beginning on the dry weather, and cracks freely in all directions later.

These features run to a depth of several feet and give the soil a reticulated appearance. The fertility of black cotton soil is proverbial.

The soil varies in texture and colour as well from the deep fine-grained and almost jet black soil of low laying fields to the shallow grey soils of the higher lands containing more sand and limestone.

The soil of the higher land called 'Barad' is lighter and less subject to cracking. The depth of the black cotton soil varies from 3 to 20 feet. The richest soil of the district is to be found in the valley of the Purna lying north of the railway line.

This soil, locally known as 'Bharkali' is of very fine texture, very ^{much} retentive of moisture, becomes sticky when wet, cracks freely in the dry weather and is comparatively heavy to work ^{upon}. The largest stretches of it are found in strips of about eight mile breadth on each side of the Purna.

Rivers :

The type of mountains in the district and their broad features would enable us to get an idea of the nature of rivers in the district. The Painganga, which may be called the principal river in the district rises in the hills near Deulghat in the district itself. It flows in south-eastern direction ^{passes} Mehkar and then enters into Akola district to form the southern boundary of that district. It collects the drainage of Mehkar and partly of Chikhali talukas and eventually falls into Wardha river near about Chanda. The Painganga is almost dry in the summer.

The other river which runs parallel to and in a south-easterly direction is the Katepurna or Lower Purna. It rises in the Ajantha Hills to the west of the district and flows past Deulgaon-Raja, a little to the north and across Mehkar taluka and falls into the Godawari. It is also dry in the dry season.

The Purna is the only perennial river in the Great Payanghat Plain, which rises in the lower portion of the Gawilgarh hill in Amravati district, and flows across the northern part of the district to join the Tapti in the East Khandesh. Its principal tributaries within the district are the Nalganga, the Vishwaganga and the Gyanganga from the south and the Ban from the north.

Hills :

Buldana district has no mountains worth the name except that the portion of the district lying on the Plateau, has a considerable altitude. There are some hills and elevations, of which the Gawilgarh hills are worth mentioning. The main system of hills is the Ajanta range forming the plateau called Balaghat, comprising Chikhali and Mehkar tahsils in the south of ^{the} district. There is also a branch of the Satapura range in the north of Jalgaon tahsil, which demarcates the district from Madhya Pradesh. The elevation of the three plain talukas of Malkapur, Khamgaon and Jalgaon varies from 865 to 910 feet above the sea level; while the elevation of Chikhali and Mehkar table-land varies from 1736 to 2415 feet above the sea level. Buldana town itself is pleasantly situated at an elevation of 2,190 feet. The altitude of the Plateau region is of considerable utility and is useful to mitigate the rigours of climate. Extremes of heat and cold compare favourably ^{there} with any moderate hill station of some importance in the region.

Minerals :

The district is not known to have any minerals of outstanding importance, except some saline deposits and lead in the lake of Lonar. These saline deposits were worked for sometime past, but subsequently found to be not profitable. Hence, further exploitation of these deposits was abandoned. However, the agates,

cornacians and calcite formed in the trap is Sealdhesh part of the district have same utility, the first two for ornamental purposes and the last for applical purposes.

Administrative Set up :

The district comprises 5 sub-divisions or talukas viz. Chikhali, Mehkar, Malkapur, Khamgaon and Jalgaon-Jamad. The Collector as the head, is in charge of General Administration, law and order, treasury, land revenue and civil supplies. He is also a District Magistrate and District Registrar. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector in his office and by other Deputy Collectors who look after different branches. A Sub-Divisional Officer has been put incharge of the administration of each of the 5 talukas. He is assisted by a Tahsildar and a few Naib-Tahsildars. The taluka ^{has} ~~is~~ further been divided into Revenue circle, each in charge of a Revenue Inspector, assisted by a number of Patwaris, whose number for each circle is determined by the size and the volume of work.

There are many other offices of the Government, quasi-Government ^{and} private institutions at the district headquarters for facilitating the smooth and coordinated working of the Government machinery.

Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis :-

Under the Maharashtra Zilla Parishads and Panchayat Samitis Act, 1961, a three-tier structure was established embodying the Zilla Parishad at the apex, the village panchayat at the base and the Panchayat Samiti at the intermediate level. The Zilla Parishad and Village Panchayats are both local bodies directly elected by universal suffrage at the district and village levels.

The Panchayat Samiti, however, is a body at the Block level constituted by indirect elections. Each of these bodies has been given a clearly defined sphere^{of} activities with major part of the funds transferred to it with the executive staff required for implementing its responsibilities.

Formation of the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis has been a land-mark in the history of the Local Self Government, which revolutionised existing administrative set up at the district and block levels.

The anticipated catalytic role of community development funds in mobilising rural savings for the provision of civic amenities in rural areas has fallen short of expectations to emerge to the extent necessary. To develop this local leadership, it was necessary to give it a positive and effective part to play in the Local Self Government.

This consideration led to the establishment of the Zilla Parishad with vast powers of administrative sanction in relation to the development schemes of local interest. The existing administrative machinery which otherwise would have been responsible for executing the schemes, has been placed under Zilla Parishad. However, while the Zilla Parishad and its subordinate bodies have power to determine the form and direction in which development schemes are implemented, this power is circumscribed within the existing frame work of Five Year Plans. The administration headed by the Chief Executive Officer, is statutorily responsible for executing the decisions of non-official bodies at various level. This administration, being independent and yet responsible to Government, ensures that the decisions are executed within the frame-work.

The local leadership can determine priorities within the over-all framework of Government rules and development policies.

The Zilla Parishad, Buldana, ^hcomprises 69 members, out of which 47 are elected from the Constituencies with an average electorate of 35,000. Remaining ~~22 members~~ ^{members} are co-opted/ ^tof various institutions, such as Co-operative Societies, Banks, ladies representatives, Panchayat Samitis etc. From among these members, the Zilla Parishad elects a President, Vice-President and 2 Chairmans of Subject Committees, all of whom have certain executive functions and are chairman of Subject Committees ~~with~~ ^{with} supervisory powers in relation to certain subjects.

The spheres of development of the district importance relating to Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, Minor Irrigation, Community Development, Public Health, Public Works, Co-operation and Industries etc. have been transferred to the Zilla Parishad.

Thirteen Panchayat Samitis have been established, each having a Chairman with certain statutory functions. With a budget normally varying between -- Rs. 2 lakhs to 10 lakhs, these bodies have limited powers of administrative sanctions in relation to the existing schemes implemented in their jurisdiction. The Panchayat Samiti is essentially responsible for granting financial assistance to the Village Panchayats, which in turn provide basic amenities at the village level. The Panchayat Samiti is also responsible for providing technical guidance to the village level staff in educating the village in modern methods of Agriculture, Animal Husbandry etc. Finally it is responsible for supervising the administration of the 750 Village Panchayats in the district.

Co-ordination within this elaborate three-tier structure is essential in two ways. The Panchayat Samiti consists of persons elected by the members of the Village Panchayats as also of Zilla Parishad members elected from within its jurisdiction. The Chairman of the Panchayat Samitis are co-opted members of the Zilla Parishad.

Area :

The area, number of villages, population etc. covered by each taluka, are given in the following table.

If the size and population of Buldhana district are compared with those of other districts in Vidarbha, this district stands 6th and 7th as regards the size and population respectively. Out of the total population of 10,59,698 of the district in 1961, 8,84,260 persons i.e. 83.45 % and 1,75,438 persons i.e. 16.55 % reside in the rural and urban areas respectively. The area of the district is 3,766 square miles (9754 sq. kms.), which accounts for 9.98 % and 3.20 % of the total area of Vidarbha and Maharashtra respectively. The district accounts for 11.47 % of the population of Vidarbha and 2.42 % of the population of Maharashtra.

Climate, Temperature and Rainfall :

The climate of the district in general is dry and hot and considered to be generally healthy. Maximum temperature in summer was 38.2 C^o. and minimum i.e. 15.3 C^o. In winter season in 1964-65. After May, the temperature rapidly falls down. Then after June, with the arrival of monsoons, starts the rainy season, and last upto the end of September. It is followed by cold weather season, which is quite pleasant.

The above temperature figures are typical of the Balaghat Plateau or the Chikhali and Mehkar talukas only, where the hot season sets in late and the heat is most intense. The rainy season is pleasant and winter is invigorating. Buldana town itself is the coolest and the most pleasant district headquarter in Vidarbha. The climate of the Payanghat or the talukas of Malkapur, Khamgaon and Jalgaon affords a great contrast. There the heat is intense and specially in the month of March, April and May, it is, perhaps, as intense as in the hottest part of India. The strong westerly winds, which then prevail become intensely heated and exercise their influence.

The annual rainfall of the district averages about 725 millimetres. If rains come in time and are spread over the monsoon period properly, the rainfall of 725 m.ms. proves to be adequate for good crops. The district gets rains from the south-west monsoons during the period from June to September.

Famine and Scarcity :

Famine, scarcity and akin to scarcity, data in Buldana district reveal that 1,291 villages have been affected due to famine and chronic scarcity during the year 1965-66, out of which full suspension in Land Revenue was given to 584 villages. Although a few isolated villages in Chikhali, Mehkar and Khamgaon tahsils have suffered from scarcity conditions, there are no tract frequently affected by famine and scarcity conditions in the district.

CHAPTER II

The statistical data on 13 topics are presented in this Abstract. A brief summary of these tables is given in the following paragraphs to indicate some of the salient features of the data presented.

1. CLIMATE :

The climate of the district is dry and extreme, but considered generally to be salubrious. Buldana town itself is quite cool and pleasant. It has the only meteorological observatory under the Regional Meteorological Centre, Nagpur, and, therefore, the figures of temperature recorded at Buldana town are given in the relevant tables of the Abstract. The district receives a moderate amount of rainfall and the average rainfall at Buldana town is 971 m.ms.

2. AREA AND POPULATION :

The district covers an area of 3,766 square miles or 9,753.9 square kilometres, which accounts for 9.98 % and 3.20% of total area of Vidarbha and Maharashtra respectively. In respect of area, the district ranks sixth and in terms of population, it ranks seventh in the region.

In respect of population, as per 1961 Census, the district had a population of 10,59,698, out of which 83.45 % and 16.55 % reside in rural and urban areas respectively. The percentage of population of Buldhana district is 11.47 % and 2.42 % of Nagpur region and Maharashtra respectively.

Buldhana district comprises mainly small villages, since out of 1,225 inhabited villages as many as 586 are nearly half of them, have a population of less than 500 each. In absence of large towns and major industries, the population necessarily depends on agriculture. Since 1901, the district population has

increased by 71.47 % against nearly 103.97 % in Maharashtra. The percentage of growth of population during the last decade worked out to 21.78 %.

The density of population per square mile for Buldana district is 281 as against 384 for Maharashtra. It also varies from 233 persons per sq. mile in Mehkar tahsil to 368 per sq. mile in Malkapur tahsil. These differences generally correspond to those of topography and the land utilisation.. Malkapur and Khemgaon talukas have higher concentration of population, whereas due to black cotton soil and medium black soil in Malkapur and Chikhali talukas, rural densities are higher in these talukas.

The distribution of population by the size of villages shows that about 47.84 % of the total number of villages account for less than 500 population; but these villages account for only 16.54 % of the total rural population. More than 60 % of the rural population of the district is concentrated in villages, with population between 500 and 1,999. The average population per village is 722 in the district as against 792 in Maharashtra. The number of inhabited villages per 100 sq. mile is 38 in the district as against 44 in Maharashtra.

As regards sex ratio, there are 959 females per 1000 males (970 in rural and 903 in urban areas) in the district ^{as against} 936 females (995 in rural and 801 in urban areas) per 1000 males in Maharashtra.

The total scheduled castes population in the district as per 1961 Census is 56,214 forming about 5.30 % of the district population. The proportion of scheduled castes has decreased from 17.48 % in 1951 to 5.30 % in 1961, because large number of persons belonging to Scheduled Castes have recorded themselves in the 1961 Census as 'Buddhists' or 'Neo-Buddhas'.

No Scheduled Tribes have been enumerated in the district at the time of 1961 Census as none were notified then.

The proportion of total workers, which is 522 per 1000 persons in the district, is much more as compared to the proportion of 470 workers in Maharashtra. However, the percentage of cultivators is more or less equal between the district and Maharashtra; Whereas there is a high percentage of agricultural labourers i.e. 21.5 % as compared to the corresponding percentage of 11.4 in Maharashtra. Slightly less than half of the total population of the district has been classified as non-workers in the 1961 Census.

The distribution of non-workers in the district reveals that there is a marked difference in the distribution pattern for Non-workers among males and females. Of the male workers, 34.06 % are full-time students, while the corresponding proportion for female is 9.66 %. This is because 29.48 % females are engaged in the household duties as Non-workers. The rural and urban differences are more or less similar both for male and females. In the urban areas, the percentage of full-time students is higher and that for dependent lower than the rural areas. The percentage of females engaged in household duties is higher in urban areas than in the rural areas. The percentage of the unemployed is 2.22 and 0.48 for males in the urban and rural areas respectively; whereas the same is negligible in both areas for females. The proportions of full-time students among females are lower both in urban and rural areas. The difference is not, however, entirely due to more attention given generally to the education of boys than that of girls; but because Non-workers comprise a large number of adult women engaged in the household duties.

3. AGRICULTURE :

Buldhana district has an agricultural population overwhelmingly. Out of the total workers in the district, 84.54 % constitute the agricultural workers and this district ranked 2nd after Yeotmal in this respect in 1961 in Maharashtra.

The area figures in the various agricultural tables are shown in hectares. One acre is equal to 0.4047 hectares.

Out of the total geographical area in the district, 12.44% was under forests, 5.27 % was not available for cultivation, 7.57 % was uncultivated land, 4.38 % was under fallow land, whereas 70.34 % was sown during the year, 1964-65.

The agricultural season during 1965-66 was not so favourable in general. The untimely rains at the time of harvesting of kharif crops had caused damages. However, the crop conditions during Rabi season were slightly better.

Jowar, cotton wheat, chillies and sugarcane etc. are the important crops of the district. During the year 1964-65, 53.8 % of the gross-cropped area was brought under food-crops. Jowar being the major crop of the district, occupied 33.41 % area, whereas cotton was the major non-food crop and occupied 38.42 % of the gross-cropped area. Oilseeds occupied only 7.2 % of the area. The area under cotton has slightly increased as compared to the previous year.

The irrigation facilities in the district are inadequate, so much so that only 1.8 % of the gross-cropped area was brought under irrigation during 1964-65.

The various medium ~~xxxxx~~ and minor irrigation projects in the district are yet to be commissioned into service fully. However, on 31st March 1966, all the 66 minor irrigation works were in use on account of which 6,366 hectares of gross cultivable area will be commanded, of which 3,867 hectares was irrigable area by the completed projects by the end of 1965-66. But out of this potential only 2,658 hectares of area was irrigated.

The Nalganga River Project, costing Rs. 230 lakhs is expected to be completed in the year 1966-67 with a gross command area of 8,741 hectares, of which 6,208 hectares area was irrigated during the period under review.

The Gyanganga River Project is expected to be completed in 1970.

Chikhali tahsil tops the list under the irrigation facilities, subsequently followed by Mehkar and Malkapur tahsils, whereas Khangaon and Jalgaon tahsils lack in the irrigation facilities.

The yield rates of rice, wheat, jowar, bajra, tur, sugarcane, sesamum, rape and mustard and linseed had increased, whereas those for maize, gram, cotton and groundnut have fallen during the year 1964-65 as compared to 1961-62. This had correspondingly affected outturns also.

Data collected on agricultural wage rates from the selected cultivators at 3 rural centres of the district is presented in table 3.8. The monthly wage rates shown are the averages of two fortnights for which the data are collected. The selected cultivators are being approached every fortnight from whom the wages paid by them to the labourers employed by them during the

preceding fortnight are collected.

The data on agricultural implements given in table 3.9 are obtained from the Livestock Census, 1961.

Due to the famine, scarcity and conditions akin to scarcity, 1,291 villages had been affected during the year 1965-66. Out of them, 584 villages have been granted full suspension in Land Revenue. An amount of Rs. 35 lakhs was distributed under A.L. Act as tagai loans.

51 villages had been affected by heavy floods.

4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY, FOREST AND FISHERIES :

Due to the lack of mechanised cultivation and inadequate transport facilities in the district in the rural areas, livestock wealth still continues to be of enormous importance.

The total livestock in the year 1966 had decreased by 60,737 as compared to the 1961 Census, with a corresponding decrease in the number of milch cattles also. Similarly, the poultry had also decreased by - 51,695 in the reference period.

Buldana district possesses a distinct type of cattle known as 'Khangavl' breed of cows and 'Nagpuri' she-buffaloes.

The density of livestock population of the district as per 1966 Cattle Census worked out to - 75 cattle per square kilometre. There were 68 cattles in 1966 per thousand population and the ratio of a pair of working bullock to the net cropped area was 6.77,

During 1965-66, out of the 1,192 cattle, and bovine population attacked by different diseases, 25 died due to the disease of Black quarter, 4 by Ghatsarp, one by Anthrax and 5 by other contagious and Parasitic diseases. Similarly, 34 out of 38 poultry birds died of Ranikhet disease.

Adequate number of veterinary hospitals, Aid-centres, taluka dispensaries, key village centres, supplementary cattle breeding centres, artificial insemination centres etc. are available for treatment of livestock in the district.

FOREST :

Though Buldhana district does not fall in a dense forest belt, it accounts for large forest wealth of 1,19,580 hectares comprising timber, fuel, bamboos and grass.

About 94 % of the area has been classified as the reserve forests, whereas the rest of the 6 % of the area is under protected forests.

FISHERIES :

The fishery activities in the district are limited to the inland waters in rivers, tanks and ponds. However, the Nalganga reservoir offers great fishing facilities. The fishery co-operative societies in the district deal in the stocking of carp fry and manufacture of fishing nets and the sale thereof.

The total length of the perennial rivers in the district is about 220 kms. Besides, 7 perennial tanks and 40 seasonal tanks and ponds provide 1,629 acres of water spread. However, the existing water spread is rather inadequate for full development of fishing industry.

According to the 1961 population census, 209 persons were engaged in fishing in the district. Fishing is generally done with the help of Gill nets made of cotton or nylon.

EMPLOYMENT, INDUSTRY, MINING AND ELECTRICITY :

Factory Establishment :

The district is not industrialised and hence the proportion of industrial labour forms a small part of the total employment in the district. However,

the cotton ginning and bailing formed a major group of organised industries in the district, which formed 79 % of the total working factories and 97.66 % of the total factory workers. In all 6 industries dealt in manufacture of edible oils (other than Hydrogenerated oils) and one each in tobacco chemicals, metal, machinery industries. Besides, there were 3 other industries.

There were 224 looms out of which 177 and 47 were hand operated and power operated respectively located at 5 centres during the year 1965-66. All these looms were established in Chikhali and Malkapur tahsils only. They produced 57.08 crores of metres of cloth with average daily employment of 232 workers.

There are no authorised estimates available relating to the industrial production in the district. However, the data collected in Annual Survey of Industries in 1961 indicate that the value of productive capital of the factories was roughly of the order of Rs. 1.88 crores and the value added by manufacture was of Rs. 39 lakhs in the district.

Mineral Production :

Buldana district is not known to have any mineral deposits of outstanding importance, except some saline deposits and lead in the lake of Lonar. It appears from the District Gazetteer that these saline deposits were worked for some time past, but since they were found to be unprofitable, their further exploitation was stopped. Though there is no major mineral production in the district, some minor minerals, such as building stones, boulders, murrum, brick earth, sand, road metal, hakkal etc. are found in abundance.

Electricity :

Power development and the extension of the electricity to remotest rural and urban areas have paved way for rapid industrialisation. Electricity in the district is supplied by the Maharashtra State Electricity Board, which receives the power supply from Khaparkheda and Paras Power Stations. There is an independent electricity generation station in the district.

Under the scheme of 'Rural Electrification Programme', more and more villages are being electrified. The number of towns and villages electrified has increased from 123 to 142 covering 39 % of the population of the district. Electricity consumption per million kilowatt worked out to 77.90 and 148.34 during the years 1964-65 and 1965-66 respectively. About 52 % of electricity was consumed for industrial purposes during 1965-66; while domestic consumption was only 12 % in all.

EMPLOYMENT :

An Employment Exchange is functioning at Buldhana as a recruiting agency for Government and non-Government offices and public and private undertakings.

During 1965-66, the Employment Exchange registered 4,942 candidates on its live-register. In all, 795 vacancies were notified, out of which 429 candidates were placed in employment. The volume of employment, as can be seen from Table 5.8 is on the increase in all the industries, perhaps because of the more employment avenues opened under different plan schemes and numerous development activities in the district.

6) CO-OPERATION :

The co-operative movement has taken great strides during the last three plan periods. By the end of 1965-66, almost all the villages in the district had been covered by the Agricultural Credit Societies. The cooperative movement which was in the beginning mainly an Agricultural credit movement, has entered other fields of economic activities, such as marketing, processing, farming, industrial housing etc. However, the movement still continues to be predominantly an agricultural credit movement, as the Agricultural Credit Societies accounted for 68 % of the total number of Societies, claimed 79.3 % of the membership and shared 97 % of the working capital of all types of societies.

The number of societies of all types had increased during the year 1965-66 over the earlier year, with the corresponding increase in their membership, share capital, working capital, loans advanced etc.

The number of money lenders had decreased from 240 in 1964-65 to 179 in 1965-66. The amount of loans advanced by them had also dwindled from Rs. 44.84 lakhs to Rs. 26.86 lakhs during the reference period. Out of the total loans advanced during 1965-66, by the registered money lenders, about 60 % loans were advanced to traders; while the remaining were given to the non-traders.

7) MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH :

The work of the Health Department in the district is under the purview of the Zilla Parishad. The subject committee looks after it's working and the Public Health Officer works as Secretary to that committee as well as the Officer-in-charge of the health activities

in the district. A T.B. Sanitorium at Buldhana is functioning independently.

Medical Facilities :

The various public and public-aided medical institutions functioning in the district include hospitals, dispensaries, maternity homes, primary health centres, ayurvedic dispensaries etc.

There were 57 beds for every one lakh population in Buldhana district during the period under review. According to 1961 population census, there were 1,026 persons in the district engaged as physicians, surgeons, dentists, nurses, pharmacists, health technicians etc. Thus, for every 1,033 persons, there was one person engaged in medical profession in the district.

In all 6.88 lakhs and 0.16 lakh ^{of} out-door and indoor patients were treated during 1965-66 respectively.

The birth and death rate per thousand of population in the district during the year 1965-66 works out to 48 and 17 respectively as per the birth and death registration data available.

8. EDUCATION :

Buldhana district has made enormous progress in the field of education. As per 1961 Census, the percentage of literacy in the district was 26.96 % as compared to 29.18 % for Maharashtra.

As on 31-3-66, out of the total number of uninhabited villages, 87.12 % had schools in them. However, 159 or 12.88 % of them had no schools and 143 and 16 villages out of them were in the population range of 0-199 and 200-399 respectively. There was one primary school in the district for every 1,137 rural population.

Under the category of special education, Polytechnic, Industrial Training Institute, Gram-Sevak Training Centre, Training of Nurses etc. are functioning in the district.

For the uplift of Backward Classes, an amount of Rs. 1,960 lakhs was distributed to 49,690 students belonging to the scheduled castes/scheduled tribes and other Backward Classes as educational concessions to them.

9. TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION :

Transport and communication facilities constitute one of the major determinants of economic progress and prosperity in this district.

R o a d s :

A substantial part of the passengers and goods traffic is handled by the road transport in the district. The total road mileage of the district as on 31-3-66 was 1,246.12 kilometres and of which 59.39 % of roads were water bound macadam, 29.53 % were Black topped, 9.07 % were of lower types and 2.01 % were of Granular material.

The road length per 1,000 sq. mile worked out to 330.85; whereas the same per lakh of population was 118.

With the uninauguration of Zilla Parishad on 1-5-62, the National and State Highways continued to be under the control of Building and Communications Department, while other types of roads, such as district roads, village roads etc. were transferred to the Zilla Parishad.

Railway :

The Central Railway connects only 4 important towns of Shegaon, Khamgaon, Nandura and Malkapur and passes through 5 other villages, but leaves Buldhana town aside.

The total length of the railway line passing through the district is only 82 kms. Khamgaon town is connected with Jalamb station and the length of the special broad guage line measures about 13 kms. The entire railway length comprises broad guage only.

Post and Telegraphs :

Unlike transport, communication is equally important in economic growth. Out of the 1,225 inhabited villages, 23 % had Post Offices within the village, 37 % had within a distance of 3 kms., 30 % within a distance of 3-6 kms. and 10 % had Post Offices at a distance above 6 kms. At the end of 31-3-66, there were 286 Post Offices, 13 Telegraph Offices, 55 Postmen (excluding runners) and 712 Telephones in the district. On an average, 27 Post Offices, 1 Telegraph Office, 5 Postmen and 67 Telephones functioned per lakh of population.

10. LOCAL SELF GOVERNMENT :

Village Panchayats :

A Village Panchayat represents local-self Government at the village level. All the revenue villages were covered by the R Village Panchayats. Forest villages are, however, excluded. There were 750 Village Panchayats in the district and 55 % of the total income of all the Village Panchayats was by way of Grant-in-aid; while 37 % of the income was derived ^{from} taxation and fees and the remaining 8 % consisted of the contributions, donations and from other sources.

Zilla Parishad :

Buldhana Zilla Parishad was inaugurated on 1st May 1962. Out of the total income of Rs. 4,66,89,879 in 1965-66, income in the form of self-raised resources accounted for 3.5 % (such as Local fund cess, taxes, fees etc.); while 50 % of it was by way of Government grants,

including grants for agency schemes and 7 % was derived from loans, advances, deposits etc.

Out of the total expenditure of Rs. 4,35,46,155 during the year 1965-66, revenue expenditure formed 57 % and 39 % of it was spent on Education, 9 % on Community Development Programme and the rest on other development activities.

Municipal Councils :

There are 9 Municipal towns in the district. In all, 46.86 % of the total income of all municipalities in 1965-66 was derived from rates and taxes, 29.69 % from grants, 3.83 % from Municipal property and 18.62 % from other sources.

Out of the total expenditure during the same year, 26.56 % was incurred on Public Health and conveniences, 34.52 % on public instructions and the rest on other items.

11. PLAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT :

Third Five Year Plan (1961-62 to 1965-66) .

The break-up of the outlay reveals that 36.7 % of the Plan provision is made for various Agricultural Programmes of Agricultural Production, Soil Conservation, Minor Irrigation, Animal Husbandry, Forests, Fisheries, Warehousing and Marketing. 27.9 % of the Plan provision is made for various programmes under 'Social Services' like Education, Health, Housing, Water Supply, Social and Labour Welfare. The Co-operation and Community Development Programme constituted 21.4 % share of the Plan provision, Transport and Communications share 13.1 % of the Plan outlay, while the remaining 0.9 % provision was made for Industries.

The District Plan was implemented through 77 schemes. Consequent upon the formation of the Zilla Parishad on 1st May 1962, 29 schemes concerning Agricultural Production, Animal Husbandry, Community Development and General Education were transferred to the Zilla Parishad for implementation. 3 schemes could not be implemented for one or the other reasons despite Plan provision.

While taking into account the actual expenditure on various schemes till the end of 1965-66, an amount of Rs. 417.19 lakhs was spent, which accounts for 104.29 % of the total Plan provision (revised to Rs. 400.02 lakhs). The percentage of expenditure in the last year i.e. 1965-66 comes to 38.17 % to total expenditure.

Out of the total expenditure, the amount of Rs. 211.99 lakhs ^{was} under Local sector and 49.19 % under State sector. The total geographical area of the district stands at 9,77,161 hectares and thus the plan outlay per hectare works out roughly to Rs. 40 as a whole for the district.

Head of Developmentwise expenditure :

The percentage of head of developmentwise expenditure worked out as 36.06 % under Agricultural Programmes, followed by 27.50 % under Social Services, 25.41 % under Co-operation and Community Development, 10.77 % under Transport and only 0.26 % under Industries.

The percentage of headwise expenditure to the corresponding headwise Plan provision accounted for 102.60 % under Agricultural Programmes, 123.37 % under Co-operation and Community Development, 30.70 % under Industries, 85.76 % under Transport and 102.86 % under Social Services.

Plan Achievements :

During the Third Five Year Plan period, the salient physical achievements are enumerated below :-

- 1) Under the Agricultural Programmes, 38,601 quintals of improved seeds were distributed, 3,227 improved implements were distributed to cultivators on subsidy^{and} additional 1,183 acres were covered by fruits. 2,07,847 acres were bunded under Soil Conservation. 31,664 tons chemical fertilizers were distributed. 41,991 compost pits dug, 1,88,481^{tons of} compost prepared, 3,574 acres covered under green manuring and 337 hand flush latrines were construc^{ted}/2,525 new irrigation wells constructed and 1,693 pumping sets were installed under 'Minor Irrigation'. 3 veterinary aid centres, 5 artificial insemination centres, 3 cattle breeding centres, 2 cattle breeding societies and 23 co-operative milk societies were started under 'Animal Husbandry'. Plantation of valuable trees for 170 acres was completed under 'Forests'. 11,17,000 fingerlings were stocked and 1,84,342 quintals fish netted under 'Fisheries'.
- 2) Under Co-operation and Community Development, 14 Agricultural Credit Societies were formed and the membership of Primary Co-operative Societies increased by 34,937. 35 Co-operative Farming Societies, 3 Processing Societies, 2 Co-operative Lift Irrigation Societies, 6 Industrial Co-operative Societies and Handloom Weavers' Co-operative Societies were formed. The amount of Rs. 1,065 lakhs as loan was advanced.
- 3) Under Transport, new roads of 85 miles were constructed, and 57 culverts were constructed.

- 4) Under 'Social Services', 133 rooms of school buildings were built under 'Education'. 35 additional T.B. beds ^{were} provided under 'Health' and one new institution for technical and vocational training with intake capacity of 232 pupils was opened under 'Labour Welfare'.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME :

In all, 13.50 Blocks of C.P.A. pattern covering 1,371 villages with an area of 9,247.07 sq. kms. served a total rural population of 8,84,260 in Buldhana district at the end of 31-3-66. 30 % of the rural population was covered by Stage-I Blocks, another 54 % by Stage II Blocks and the remaining 16 % by Post Stage II Blocks. Physical achievements of certain selected items of development are given in Table 11.5.

12. P R I C E S :

The important indicator reflecting the fluctuations of prices is the All India Wholesale Price Index Number. The Bureau of Economics and Statistics collects the prices of some important commodities every week at the district headquarters and every fortnight at the selected rural centres. The commodities are selected from each group like cereals, pulses, sugar and gur, edible oils, hydrogenated oils, meat and fish, condiments and spices, vegetables and fruits, fuel, clothing and several other important items of consumption.

Varieties of each particular commodity are fixed and price of these varieties only are collected in order to get a comparable picture of the price situation.

During the year 1965-66, the prices of almost all commodities under various groups, such as cereals, pulses, edible oils, spices etc. showed a rising

tendency in the latter half of the year due to scarce supply. Rice was not available throughout the year, as also juar being under monopoly purchase by Government.

There are 8 regulated markets in the district dealing in cotton and agricultural produce. They are governed by the Central Provinces and Berar Common Market Act, 1932 and the Agricultural Produce Market Act, 1935. Annual arrival of the commodities of 7,83,435 tonnes, worth Rs. 11.25 crores, was handled by all these regulated markets during the year 1965-66.

13) MISCELLANEOUS :

The section covers the topics relating to the Police force and crime, civil and criminal cases decided in the Courts, Cinema statistics, Banking offices, Joint Stock Companies, Insurance Policies, Small Savings, Land Revenue demand, Collection and arrears, Documents registered and value of property transferred and the General Elections.

At the end of 1965, law and order in the district was maintained by ^{of 1,004,} Police force/ which means that there was one Policeman for every 1,055 population.

During 1965-66, there were 13 and 11 permanent and touring talkies with 10,225 and 13,150 seating capacity per show respectively. In all, there was one cinema theatre for every 44,154 population in the district.

There were 26 towns and villages of -
2,42,475 population in the district having 38 Banking offices in them, of which the scheduled and co-operative banks numbered 11 and 27 respectively. Thus, one banking

office served a population of 6,381. Besides, there were 7 Joint Stock Companies.

During 1965-66, 2,972 Insurance policies to the tune of Rs. 1,11,21,250 were issued and the average value per Policy was Rs. 3,742.

The Small Savings target for 1965-66 was fixed at Rs. 20 lakhs. Though the target of gross collection of Rs. 109.55 lakhs was reached, the district was minus ^{to} the extent of Rs. 37.46 lakhs, because of heavy withdrawals of Rs. 147 lakhs.

The total revenue demand ~~k~~ (including previous arrears) for 1965-66 of the district was of the order of Rs. 37.46 lakhs, of which the collection of Rs. 10.92 lakhs was made, thus leaving Rs. 26.54 lakhs again as arrears at the close of the year.

CHAPTER III

In this chapter, the progress of development covering roughly the period of III Five Year Plan has been reviewed by presenting taluka-wise sectorial trends based on certain important indicators of development. Comparative taluka-wise figures for 1961-62 ^{and} / 1965-66 or 1960-61 and 1964-65, as the case may be, have been given to bring out the space of development.

INDICATOR NO.1. PERCENTAGE OF GROSS SOWN AREA.

The district accounted for a very low percentage of area sown more than once to the net area sown in Nagpur division as well as in Maharashtra during 1961-62, when it stood 22nd amongst the 26 districts of Maharashtra and 7th amongst the eight districts of this region. In 1964-65 it ranked 3rd in this regard in Vidarbha.

The following table shows the percentage of gross sown area to net sown area in 1960-61 ^{and} / 1964-65 in each taluka--

The total gross cropped area of the district accounted for 7,04,900 hectares during the agricultural year 1964-65, of which an area of 17,608 hectares was cropped more than once.

The cultivable area per agricultural worker for the year 1964-65 accounted for 1.62 hectares for the

district as whole. Khamgaon taluka stood first (1.81 hectares) in this regard, subsequently followed by Mehkar (1.67 hec.), Jalgaon-Jamod (1.64 hec.), Chikhali (1.56 hec.) and Malkapur (1.47 hec.).

The net area sown per agricultural worker for the same reference period worked out to 1.49 hectares for the district. The ranking of talukas worked out the same as above i.e. Khamgaon (1.64 hec.), Mehkar (1.54 hec.), Jalgaon-Jamod (1.50 hec.), Chikhali (1.45 hec.) and Malkapur (1.35 hec.).

The percentage of area sown more than once to net area sown during the year 1964-65 was 102.56 hectares for the district as a whole, whereas the same in Mehkar taluka was 105.3, being the highest and it was lowest in Jalgaon taluka being only 100.20 .

INDICATOR NO.2. PRODUCTIVITY OF IMPORTANT CROPS.

The productivity of crops generally depends on an equitable distribution of rains in the absence of adequate irrigational facilities. The year 1960-61 was supposed to be the most productive agricultural year in which the outturn of crops broke all the past records. After 1960-61, the productivity and outturn have improved during the year 1964-65, as compared to the year 1961-62, except for maize, gram, cotton and groundnut.

The following table gives the figures of outturn per hectare of important crops:--

From the above table, it is seen that the productivity of total food-crops has increased by 28% during 1964-65 as compared to the year 1960-61. The out-turn of non-food crops has decreased in case of groundnut, linseed and cotton over the period. Though, the yield per hectare of linseed had increased, its outturn had decreased during 1964-65 as compared to 1961-62 due to decrease in area under it.

INDICATOR NO.3. GROSS VALUE OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION.

As relevant price data required are not available, the gross value of agricultural produce could not be calculated.

INDICATOR NO.4. PERCENTAGE OF IRRIGATED AREA.

The district stood 4th and 18th in Vidarbha and Maharashtra respectively in regard to the percentage of gross irrigated area to net sown area during 1961-62. Even during the year 1964-65 it ranked 4th in Vidarbha in this regard.

During 1964-65, the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area was highest in Chikhali taluka, while in Jalgaon taluka it was the lowest. The following table shows the talukawise percentages of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area in 1960-61 & 1964-65.

During the year 1964-65, 12827.86 hectares of area was irrigated in the district, of which a majority of irrigated area fall in Chikhali (43.3%), Mehkar (24.8%) and Malkapur (21.6%) talukas. Khangaon and Jalgaon-Jamed talukas lack irrigation facilities, where only 5.9% and 4.4% of the area was irrigated during 1964-65.

The percentage of gross irrigated area to the net area sown during the year 1964-65 accounted for 1.87% for the district as a whole as against 1.83% during 1960-61.

The following table indicates the percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown:--

From the above table, it can be seen that in most of the talukas, the percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown has shown an upward trend during

during 1961-62 to 1964-65. Chikhali taluka had the highest percentage of net irrigated area to net area sown and in Khamgaon taluka it is the lowest.

INDICATOR NO.5. CHANGES IN THE CROP PATTERN (Total & irrigated).

The district stood 6th in the division and 16th in Maharashtra as far as cultivable area per agricultural worker during 1961-62 is concerned. In so far as it relates to the net area sown per agricultural worker during 1961-62, it stood 4th and 13th in the division and Maharashtra respectively.

During the past five years from 1960-61 to 1964-65, the percentage of area under food-crops has decreased from 57.51 percent to 53.80 percent. This decrease is mainly discernable in Malkapur, Mehkar and Khamgaon talukas. However, the percentage of area under non-food crops has increased from 42.49 % to 46.20 % during the same period. This has increased mainly in Malkapur, Mehkar and Khamgaon talukas.

The gross cropped area and net cropped area during the year 1964-65 was of 7,04,899.96 hectares and 6,87,291.90 hectares respectively. There was a slight increase in the gross and net cropped area in 1964-65 over the year 1960-61 of (+) 0.42 and (+) 0.81 percent respectively.

Out of the gross-cropped area during 1964-65, 52.7 % was under food-grains, 0.2 % under sugarcane, 4.4.% under groundnut, 38.4 % under cotton and the rest was under other miscellaneous crops.

The areas under rice, sugarcane, cotton and total non-food crops has increased during 1964-65 over the areas in 1960-61, whereas the same under Wheat, Jowar total cereals, total pulses, ^{total foodgrains,} total food-crops and groundnut has decreased during the same reference period.

The district had 3.22 % and 3.38 % of the total irrigated area under food-crops during 1960-61 and 1964-65

respectively. Like-wise, it had 3.93 % and 3.94 % of the total irrigated area under non-food crops.

The gross and net irrigated areas had increased by (+) 1.79 percent and (+) 2.97 percent during 1964-65 over the areas during 1960-61 respectively.

Chikhali taluka had the maximum irrigated area under food as well as non-food crops both during 1960-61 and 1964-65 and Khamgaon taluka had the minimum area irrigated during that period.

Out of the net irrigated area during 1964-65, 12210.72 hectares of area was irrigated by wells, as principal source followed by 309.58 hectares and 43.30 hectares by canals and other sources respectively.

The total irrigated area during 1964-65 under food-grains covered 7136.30 hectares. Cotton and sugar-cane covered 1653.15 hectares and 1404.27 hectares area respectively.

INDICATOR NO.6. INCREASE IN AGRICULTURAL CREDIT, OUTSTANDING DUES AND GROSS VALUE OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE .

Agricultural credit plays an important roll in development of agriculture. According to ^{the} per capita (rural population) gross value of agricultural output in 1961 the district stood first in Vidarbha and fifth in Maharashtra. During last five years there was an increase of about 268 percent in the loans advanced; The following table shows the percentage increase in the agricultural credit during 1963-64 and 1965-66. Talukawise break-up of loans advanced for the year 1961-62 and 1962-63 is, however, not available.

From the above table it will be seen that the percentage increase was comparatively higher in Malkapur and Khamgaon talukas than the district average. It was below the district average in Jalgaon, Mehkar and Chikhali talukas during the above period as seen from the above table.

There were 582 Agricultural Credit Societies during the year 1965-66 in the district; with 90643 members and a total working capital of Rs.5.47 crores. Total loans to the time of Rs.3.55 crores were advanced through them; of which Rs.2.28 crores were recovered. However, Rs.4.29 crores of loans were still outstanding

dues, of which Rs. 98 lakhs were overdue. The percentage of recovery during the year 1965-66 worked out to 63 % as against 103 % during 1961-62.

Out of the total number of Primary Agricultural Credit Societies in the district during 1965-66, Mehkar and Malkapur talukas had equal number of them (148 each), followed by Chikhali (134), Khamgaon (90) and Jalgaon (60).

Out of the membership of these societies, 30.4 % members were in Chikhali taluka, followed by Malkapur (24.0%), Khamgaon (18.9%), Jalgaon-Jamod (16.0%) and lastly Mehkar (10.7%) taluka.

Considering the share capital of the Primary Agricultural Societies in the district during 1965-66, Chikhali taluka contributed 34.7%, followed by Malkapur (18%), Mehkar (17.9%), Khamgaon (16.3%) and Jalgaon-jamod (13.1%) of it. The percentage of loans advanced in the district during the same year worked out to 24.0% in Malkapur, followed by 21.9% in Mehkar 21.8% in Chikhali 17.9% from Khamgaon and 14.4% in Jalgaon-Jamod talukas.

Mehkar taluka recovered to the maximum extent of 22.8% of loans advanced in the district further followed by Chikhali (22.7%), Malkapur (21.8%), Khamgaon (17.8%) and Jalgaon-jamod (14.9%). Out of the loans outstanding in the district during the year 1965-66, 24.2% of them were from Malkapur taluka, 22.0% from Chikhali, 20.1% from Mehkar, 19.4% from Khamgaon and 14.3% from Jalgaon-jamod talukas.

Maximum overdues of loans in the district were out-standing against Khamgaon taluka (29.4%), followed by Malkapur (20.8%), Chikhali (18.8%), Mehkar (17.3%) and Jalgaon (Jamod) (13.7%).

The total agricultural produce handled by the Agricultural Marketing Societies during the year 1965-66 was of the value of Rs.1.05 crores.

INDICATOR NO.7 AGRICULTURAL WAGE RATES.

The agricultural wage rates were collected from the selected cultivators at 3centres viz; Dongaon, Deulghat and Asalgaon in Mehkar, Chikhali and Jalgaon talukas respectively, for both skilled and un-skilled labour. However, these centres do not represent the district position very correctly and as such these wage rates may be taken as ^a/broad indicators-of wage levels in the district.

The skilled labour included carpenters, black-smiths and cobblers, whereas the field labour and other agricultural labour comprised the un-skilled labour. Monthwise wage-rates during 1965-66 for all the 3 centres have been presented in table No.3.8 in detail. The following table shows agricultural wage rates in the District in 1965 and 1966. The data for these selected centres for 1960-61 are however, not available.

From the above table, it is seen that the skilled labour got the highest wage at Deulghat and at Asalgaon, it was lowest during 1966. An un-skilled field labour (Male) got highest wage at Dongaon; while the same was lowest at Asalgaon. Other agricultural labour got maximum wage at Asalgaon, whereas at Dongaon, it was lowest. Deulghat being nearer to Buldana, has some urban characteristics, whereas the other two centres are purely rural.

As per 1966 Livestock Census, a total number of 7,27,689 livestock population was enumerated in the district, of which Mehkar taluka shared 28.3 %, followed by Chikhali (25.3 %), Malkapur (18.8 %), Khangaon (16.8 %) and Jalgaon-Jamod (10.8%).

If the district livestock population in 1966 is compared with the livestock population in 1961, it is seen that there was a decrease of 8.35%.

seen that there was a decrease of 8.35 percent in it.

The ratio of live-stock as per 1966 Census to the gross cropped area in the district during the year 1964-65 worked at about 1 : 1.

The net cropped area per pair of bullock over 3 years worked out to 6.77 hectares of cultivable land during 1964-65 as against 6.42 and 6.54 hectares during 1950-51 and 1955-56 respectively.

INDICATOR NO. 9 : POULTRY AS COMPARED TO POPULATION

It is estimated that the average number of birds kept per 100 households in 1961 in the district was 70.58 (70.24 fowls and 0.14 ducks) as against 129.01 (127.61 fowls and 0.22 ducks) in Nagpur division and 137.40 (136.47 fowls and 0.35 ducks) in Maharashtra. The district ranked 6th in the division in this respect and 22nd in Maharashtra.

The percentage of improved fowls to all fowls in the district in 1961 is estimated at 0.75, as against 1.04 percent in the division and 1.69 percent in Maharashtra. The district ranked 5th and 18th in the division and Maharashtra respectively on this basis.

The number of eggs produced per hen per annum in the district in 1961^{it} is estimated, worked out to 48, as against 61 and 84 in Nagpur division and Maharashtra. The district ranked 6th and 22nd in the Division and in Maharashtra respectively on this basis.

The total poultry as per 1966 Livestock Census in the district was 1,02,608, whereas the total population of the district was 10,59,698 as per 1961 population Census. Thus, the ratio of poultry with the population was 1:10.3 for the district.

Chikhali talukas returned 37.6% of the total poultry, whereas Mehkar accounted for 29.4 % of it. Malkapur, Khamgaon and Jalgaon talukas shared 14.6 %, 12.1 % and 6.3 % respectively the poultry population of the district.

INDICATOR NO. 10 : PER CAPITA CONSUMPTION OF ELECTRICITY

On the basis of the number of establishments (manufacturing and repairs) using electricity in the district in 1961 Census, ranked the 7th and 18th in Nagpur division and Maharashtra respectively. In all, 142 villages in the district are electrified by the end of of March 1965. The total population of these electrified villages is 39.17 percent of the total population of the district.

The district consumption of electricity on different items is shown in the table below for the years 1964-65 and 1965-66. Figures for 1960-61 are not available.

The per capita consumption of 36 Kilowatts is naturally much lower than the State average as only 142 towns and villages in the district had been electrified as on 31-3-66. The percentage of villages electrified to the total number of villages in the district as on 31-3-66 was 10.36 only. The maximum number of villages electrified as on 31-3-65 were in Jalgaon taluka, followed by Malkapur, Khamgaon, Mehkar and lastly in Chikhali taluka. There is a rising tendency of the electricity consumption during 1965-66 over 1964-65 in general and particularly as industrial power. The total consumption during 1965-66 increased by 37.4 percent.

INDICATOR NO. 11 : INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF CANDIDATES ENROLLED IN EMPLOYMENT EXCHANGE AND VACANCIES NOTIFIED

In 1963, the district stood 5th in the division and 14th in the State in so far as the number of workers per lakh of population employed in registered factories is concerned. The number of candidates registered with the Employment Exchange, Buldhana, increased from 4,645 in 1961-62 to 6931 in 1965-66. Similarly, 795 vacancies were notified during 1965-66 as against 1,382 during 1961-62. The number of placements has, however, decreased from 768 in 1961-62 to 529 in 1965-66 as against 192 in 1961-62.

The number of workers employed in the registered factories per lakh of population for the year 1966 was for 391 for the district as a whole. However, Khamgaon taluka, being industrial, had 767 factory workers per lakh of population, and Chikhali taluka was ^{the} last in this regard in 1966 having employed only 84 persons per lakh of population in that year.

With the advent of medical facilities available through public and public-aided bodies in the district, the number of indoor patients treated in the hospitals is increasing in general. However, the number decreased from 18,358 in 1961 to 15,577 in 1965, but subsequently increased.

Khamgaon taluka had maximum medical facilities, whereas 50.3% of the total indoor patients alone were treated during 1965-66. Chikhali taluka followed subsequently accounting for 37.4% of the patients treated. The number of hospital beds per lakh of population for the year 1965, worked out to 57 for the district as a whole. Khangaon taluka had 133 beds per lakh of population, followed by Chikhali(94) Mehkar(13) Jalgaon(13) and Malkapur(12).

INDICATOR NO.13. INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF STUDENTS IN DIFFERENT CATEGORIES :-

There has been a rapid growth in the number of primary institutions during the last five years. Facilities for secondary education are also steadily improving.

The district literacy rates are, however, still below the state averages. The district ranked 5th and 11th in Nagpur division and Maharashtra in relation to the percentage of male literates as per 1961 Census. However, as per female literacy in the district, it ranked 5th in the division and 17th in Maharashtra.

PRIMARY SCHOOLS :-

The district ranked 6th (in case of boys) and 5th (in case of girls) in the division in 1962-63, in relation to the percentage of school-going children in age-group 6-11. Consequent upon the opening of various new schools in the district, the number of school-going children has increased appreciably during the last five years. It ranked 19 in the case of boys and 18th in the case of girls in the State as a whole during the year 1962-63.

The district ranked 3rd and 14th in the Division and Maharashtra in relation to the percentage

of school going children (Boys) ⁱⁿ age group 11-14 during 1962-63, On the basis of ranking in case of girls, the district stood 5th and 18th in the division and State respectively ^{in that year.} The percentage of primary school going children to 1961 district population for the year 1965-66 worked to 12.54% as against 9.06% during 1961-62. Out of the total primary school going children, 64.8% and 35.2% were the boys and girls respectively.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS :-

The number of secondary schools rose from 74 in 1961-62 to 94 in 1965-66. The secondary schools are dispersed throughout the district. The number of secondary school going children rose from 24980 in 1961-62 to 36156 in 1965-66

because of the opening of 20 new schools. The boys and girls students constituted 79% and 21% respectively of the total number of students under this category during 1965-66.

The percentage of girl pupils showed a declining trend in the higher standards than the lower ones, presumably because a large number of females get married at early ages and do not continue further education.

There is a rise in all the stages of higher education during 1965-66 over 1961-62. The number students attending higher institutions rose from 1349 in 1961-62 to 2758 in 1965-66 because of the opening of 4 additional institutions during the period. The boys and girls students formed 88.1% and 11.9% respectively of the total number of students taking higher education. The lower percentage of girls students indicates the slow advance of higher education of females.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION :-

Accordingly to the number of seats per million population for technical training upto diploma level during 1963-64, the district ranked 3rd and 13th in the division and Maharashtra. In so far as technical training at Craftman's level is concerned, the district ranked 6th in Nagpur Division and 19th in Maharashtra during that period.

From the above table, it is observed that length of all types of roads has increased in the last five years.

The total road mileage has increased from 932.11 Kms. in 1960-61 to 1246.12 Kms. in 1965-66. The black-topped roads formed 30%, water-bound macadam 60%, granular material 2% and lower types 9% of the total road length in the district in 1965-66.

The road length of surface roads per 100 square miles as on 31st March 1966 was 33.08 miles.

for the district as a whole, as against 30.48 miles as on 31.3.1965.

The mileage of surface roads per lakh of population was 117.59 Kms. and 108.35 Kms. as on 31.3.1966 and 31.3.1965 respectively.

It is seen that the banking facilities are progressing gradually in the district.

The number of banking offices has increased from 33 during the year 1963-64 to 38 during 1965-66; of which 11 and 27 were the scheduled and co-operative banks respectively. Twenty six towns and villages had banking offices covering a population 2,42,475 in the district, which means that one banking office served a population of 6381 persons as against 6676 persons during 1963-64.

INDICATOR NO. 16: P R I C E S :-

The price situation during the year 1965-66 continued to pose a serious problem and the trend of general price rise particularly of food stuffs which prevailed in the previous years continued further in 1965 also.

As the information collected for the given commodities is restricted to only one quotation and that too

from only one selected shop in the district head-quarter, the averages shown above for individual commodities can not be said to be fully representative of prevailing price levels, but the data may still prove useful as a broad indicator of the trends in changes in the retail prices over the period of time.

The above table indicates that most the commodities showed an upward trend. Fluctuations in the key markets artificial scarcity, etc. collectively contributed to the price rise.

Except for the prices of gur, shirting and coating, the prices of all other commodities rose up during 1965 as compared to 1961. Prices of Arhar dal penicillin and novogaine remained stable. Monopoly purchases by the Government continued to be in force during the year 1965-66 also. Under the monopoly purchase, the Government had fixed the prices of paddy at Rs.45/- Rs.50/-, Rs.55/- and Rs.60/- per quintal for coarse medium, superior and superfine varieties respectively. The prices of rice were fixed at Rs.69/- for coarse, Rs.76.55 for medium, Rs.80.70 for superior and Rs.90.80 per quintal for the superior varieties.

Jowar prices had been fixed by the Government at Rs.53/- per quintal for the superior variety of Rabi Jowar, Rs.51/- per quintal for medium variety corresponding to Kharif Jowar under the scheme of "Monopoly Procurement of Jowar" implemented in the State of Maharashtra. However, the procurement of old-jowar is done at the prices fixed during the last year i.e. the superior quality @ Rs.45/- and the medium quality @ Rs.43/- per quintal.

Since the declaration of emergency in the country in 1962, the price quotations for some of the essential commodities from the District Headquarters are being obtained on every Friday and an index number of prices is worked out with the week ending 9th November 1962 as the base.

Retail prices of some 51 important commodities constituting the major items of consumption prevailing at Buldana Town are being collected from the year 1964 and are presented in the Table No.12.1 in details.

CHAPTER IV
THIRD FIVE YEAR PLAN

The Third Five Year Plan was the first Plan for the composite State and offered greater opportunities for refashioning the State's economy and reorienting it into all sided growth. This plan represented a phase in a programme of long term development, transforming radically the economy of the State during the three or four successive plan periods. It also contemplated to rectify the various imbalances and even out the existing disparities.

During first two Plan, smaller amounts were spent for the development of Vidarbha region as compared to the western part of the State and as such additional allocation were made for the Third Plan Programme for Vidarbha to make good the shortfall. The additional allotments were used for accelerating the progress under irrigation, primary education and roads.

The total Third Plan outlay for the Nagpur division was originally fixed as Rs.88.18 crores and was subsequently revised to Rs.96.41 crores for augmenting production during Emergency. The allocations for the district level programmes of Buldhana district amounted to a total of Rs.400.02 lakhs. The Agricultural Programmes were given priority with total outlay of about 37 per cent. The programmes included under Social Services were allotted about 28 per cent of the total provision; while 13 percent of total allocations were set aside for road development programme.

All the plan programmes were implemented as per the targets in district, the total amount expended being even more than the total allotment by about 4 % . The total expenditure made amounted to Rs.417 lakhs. Both under Agricultural development and Community Development, additional allotments were required to be made. In the case of activities, of other sectors the allotments were nearly fully spent.

Agricultural Programme :-

The different schemes under Agricultural programmes specially aimed at improvement in the agricultural productivity, schemes for Soil Conservation, Minor irrigation, propagation of improved agricultural practices, and improved implements, development of crops etc.

were undertaken and implemented. The programmes of development of forests, Fisheries(inland), Animal Husbandary were also included as other agricultural programmes. The table below show the allotments and total expenditure on various programmes in the district :-

Agricultural Production:-

A little over half a crore of rupees have been spent on the schemes relating to agricultural production (Rs.2.07 lakhs on training of personnel Rs.16.30 lakhs on development of crops, Rs.14.03 lakhs on supplies and services and Rs.10.40 lakhs on improved practices. The schemes relating to agricultural production received momentum with the Emergency, when the production programmes were of vital importance for the economy. For intensive cultivation, special campaigns were organised for propagating the use of improved seeds, fertilizers and improved methods. The table below give the account of actual achievements in the district for the programme:-

Another important plan activity under agriculture was bunding programme for moisture conservation. Under this programme, 2.08⁹¹ lakhs acres of area in this district was covered during the plan period. The total cost of the bunding works amounted to Rs.78.79 lakhs.

Minor Irrigation :

Minor irrigation works were undertaken on priority basis, particularly after Emergency, with a view to boost up particularly production of foodgrains. As many as 2,525 new wells were constructed in the course of the Plan period. A total number of 1,693 pump sets were installed for irrigation purpose. The repairs on old irrigation wells and renovation of ex-malgujari tanks were also undertaken on a large scale. The total cost of the tanks completed was Rs.15.40 lakhs, while the total expenditure on minor irrigation amounted to Rs.16.72 lakhs. The total irrigation potential created thereby was to the extent of 9,557 acres and the actual utilisation was for irrigating about 6,470 acres. Another important feature under irrigation programme was the completion of Nalganga Project for 21600 acres of irrigation.

Animal Husbandry :

The veterinary services were already established during the first two Plans. During the Third Plan, more emphasis was focused on the improvement and development of cattle breeds. Three cattle breeding centres were established in the district and 84 premium bulls were also located in the district for servicing. The construction of veterinary dispensaries in different parts was also undertaken and the total expenditure on all the programmes was Rs.1.68 lakhs, as against the total provision of Rs.1.61 lakhs forming nearly 104% of the corresponding allotment.

Forests : About 12 percent of the total area of the district is under forests. Teak is the main species of timber, commonly found all over the forest area. Anjan and Babul are also found in parts. The total forest revenue is about Rs.5 lakhs annually. On different schemes for development of forests, a total amount of Rs.57 thousands had been spent. The programme completed comprised plantation of valuable trees an area of

170 acres, afforestation of soil conservation on 25 acres plantation, development of pastures on 75 acres and construction of forest roads of 3 miles.

Fisheries : For the development of fisheries in inland waters, the programmes aimed at increase in the producing of fish and improvement of Socio-Economic conditions of the fishermen. The expenditure incurred was Rs.40 thousands. About 12 lakhs of fingerlings were stocked in unbounded waters in different tanks in the district. Nalganga dam, which was complete, was made available for fishery in 1963. Two Fishermen's Co-operative Societies, already established in second Plan, continued functioning.

Co-operation & Community Development :
Co-operation :

Co-operative movement has taken tremendous strides in the State. The State Five Year Plans have sought the promotion of Co-operative organisations through financial supports for undertaking different economic activities in the form of subsideries, share capital investment and loans according to the needs. The programme during the Third Plan was concerned mainly with development of co-operative marketing. Credit facilities to agriculturists through co-operatives and co-operative farming were also extended.

An outlay of Rs.29.43 lakhs was fixed for the activities in the district. Under co-operative marketing, a district level society and two new primary marketing societies were organised and 51 godowns were constructed. The expenditure on marketing was to the tune of Rs.19.45 lakhs. For accelerating co-operative farming, 9 societies in pilot area and 58 outside pilot areas were organised. In addition, 5 branches of Land Development Bank and 11 branches of Central Financing Agency were opened. The memberships of primary credit societies showed an increase of 73,965; whereas the total expenditure on co-operation amounted to Rs.30.70 lakhs.

Community Development :

Community Development programmes were continued during the Third Plan period, under the new fold of Panchayat Samitis. The provision made for the programme was Rs.56.49 lakhs, while an actual expenditure of Rs.75.20 lakhs, was booked. The expenditure -

incurred on Community Development Projects was Rs.65.49 lakhs of which Rs.9.43 lakhs were financed to rural local bodies for their own developmental programmes.

There are in all 13 Community Development Blocks in the district covering the entire rural population.

Small Scale & Cottage Industries :

For rural industrialisation, there was a programme of financial assistance to the artisans and craftsmen in forming their Co-operatives. The total assistance of Rs.3 thousand was given to 6 such Co-operatives, while Rs.92 thousands were advanced to the Co-operatives of handloom weavers. The total expenditure on industries was recorded at Rs. 95 thousands.

Transport & Communications :

Transport by road has much more significance in the district, as it is ill-equipped with railway. At the end of the 2nd Five Year Plan period, the total road length was 914 kms., which in other words meant 9.6 Kms. of roads per 100 Sq.Kms. of area. The target of Nagpur Plan for the district is 2,700 Kms. The roads works undertaken during Third Plan were on the lines suggested in Nagpur Plan and at the end of the Third Plan, the total road length of 1148 Kms. was constructed accordingly the ratio worked to 10.7 Km. ^{of road} per 100 Sq.Km. of area. The total cost of road works completed during the Plan period was Rs.44.94 lakhs.

Social Services :

The programme for General Education was emphasised as an important aspect of development. The total amount spent on the programme was Rs.44.47 lakhs of which Rs.39.33 lakhs were expended. Cb programme for primary education. By the end of Second Plan 86 villages had no schooling facilities. Almost all these villages have, therefore been covered when 84 primary additional schools were opened during the Plan period, bringing the total number of schools in the district to 1,113. Similarly 20 new Secondary schools were also opened, bringing the total number of schools to 90 .

One technical and vocational training centre and a Polytechnic was opened at Khamgaon with facilities of civil, mechanical and electrical courses.

The programme under Public Health included mainly measures for control and eradication of epidemics and communicable diseases. It may be mentioned that these measures adopted for control, have shown tangible results. The total expenditure on these measures was Rs. 18.15 lakhs. The number of B.C.G. vaccinations performed during five year period totalled to over 2.50 lakhs. In addition, about 5 lakhs of rupees were spent on Family Planning Programme which was launched on a large scale. A mobile vaccectomy unit was opened and centres seperatly in rural and urban areas were started.

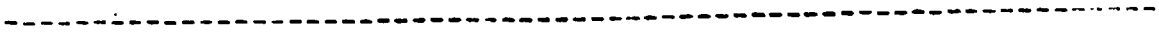
