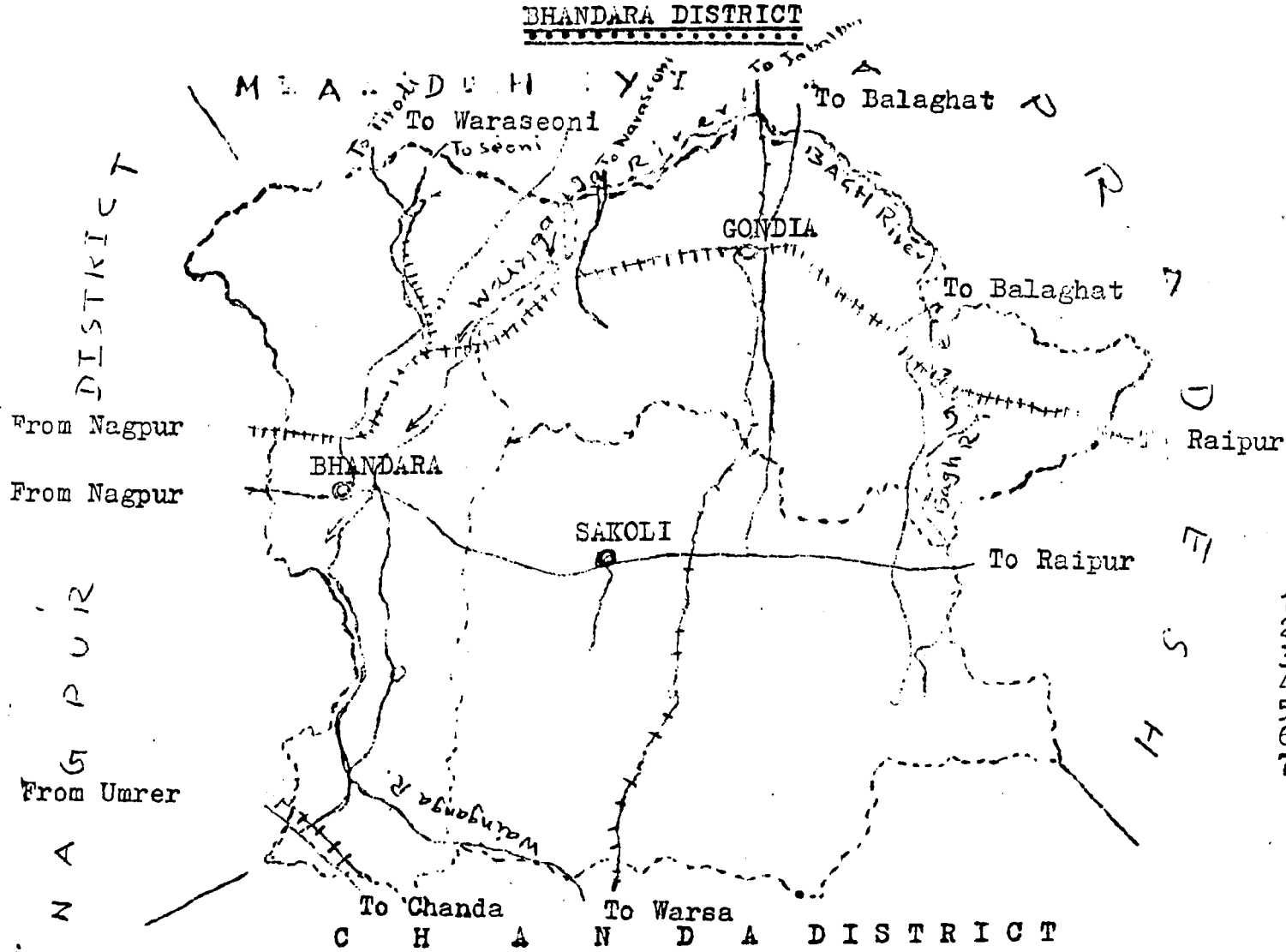

CHAPTER NO. I.

'Bhandara' has its origin in the term 'Bhanara' i.e. a place where metal utensils are manufactured. The place is famous for handmade big utensils of brass and copper of<sup>a</sup> specialised and distinguishing character.

1.1. Location.

Bhandara district is situated on the farthest eastern boundary of Maharashtra. The district lies between  $20^{\circ}, 39'$  and  $21^{\circ}, 38'$  N latitude and  $79^{\circ}, 27'$  and  $80^{\circ}, 42'$  E longitude on the eastern portion of the Nagpur plains.

1.2. Boundaries.

It is bounded on the north by the Balaghat and Seoni district of Madhya Pradesh; Nagpur district on the west, Chanda district on the south and Drug district of Madhya Pradesh on the east. The area of the district is, 3,623 Sq. Miles (9,383.6 Sq. Km.) accounting for 9.8 per cent of the area of Nagpur Division and 3.06 percent of Maharashtra. The East-West length of the district is 128.748 Kms. (80 miles) and North-South length is 109.436 Kms (68 miles). The district ranks 7th in term of area among the districts of Nagpur Division.

1.3. Administrative Set-up.

For administrative purposes, the district is at present divided into 3 tahsils. The Collector is the administrative head of the district. He is incharge of General Administration, Law and Order, Treasury, Land Revenue and Civil supplies. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector in his office and three Sub-Divisional Officers of

the rank of Deputy Collector-in-charge of three Revenue Divisions and have their Headquarters at respective Tahsil Headquarters.

Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis:

As a result of Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act, 1961, a Zilla Parishad and 13 Panchayat Samitis, viz. Bhandara, Mohadi, Tumsar, Tirora, Gondia, Amgaon, Salekasa, Deori, Goregaon, Sakoli, Lakhandur, Paoni and Morgaon-Arjuni have been established in the district and they have been entrusted with the work of development activities within the frame work of the Act. The areas under the jurisdiction of the Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis correspond to the district and Block boundaries except the Municipal Towns which are not covered by them. The Zilla Parishad covers 99.20 % of the area and 89.26 % of the total population of the district.

The Zilla Parishad has 51 directly elected Councillors. Out of these 51 seats, one seat reserved for Scheduled Caste. In addition, a woman Councillor co-opted by the elected Councillors. There are five associate councillors who are Chairmen of five federal co-operative societies conducting business in the district. The elected Chairmen of all Panchayat Samitis are also ex-officio Councillors. At the Block level, the Panchayat Samiti consists of all elected and co-opted councillors from the area of the Block and the Chairman of a co-operative society conducting the business of purchase and sale of Agricultural produce in the area of the as an associate member and the Chairman of the co-operative society conducting business in agriculture in the area of the Block as co-opted member. elected by the members of the Village Panchayats are also elected members of the Panchayats Samiti. Two Sarpanchas from each electoral division in the area of the Block are returned to each Panchayat Samiti.

Elections were held in the year 1962. The term of the office of the Councillors is of five years. The Zilla Parishad has an elected President and Vice-President from amongst the elected Councillors.

An Officer in the Senior scale of I.A.S. works as the Chief Executive Officer to the Zilla Parishad. The Parishad is also assisted by various departments and the heads of these departments at the district level are Officers of Class I or Class II Service under the State Govt. At the Block Level, the Panchayat Samitis have elected Chairmen and Deputy Chairmen. The Block Development Officers work as Secretaries to the Panchayat Samitis. The executive authority for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act vests in the Chief Executive Officer and Block Development Officer. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as a Secretary to the Zilla Parishad. The Zilla Parishad functions through a Standing Committee presided by the president and six Subject Committees for Finance, Works, Agriculture, Co-operation, Education & Health. Two Subject Committees are presided by the Vice-President and four by two Chairmen elected by the Zilla Parishad to preside over two specified subject committees each. The Deputy Chief Executive Officer works as Secretary of the Standing Committee, while the District Heads of Departments work as Secretaries to the Subject Committees concerned. The Pan-

chayat Samitis do not have Sub-ject Committees.

1.4. Area & Territorial Changes.

There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district or its talukas between 1911 and 1955 except that the headquarters of Tirora Tahsil were shifted to Gondia and the name of the tahsil was changed to Gondia Tahsil in the year 1914. With the reorganisation of the States in 1956, the district was transferred from Madhya Pradesh to erstwhile bilingual Bombay State. The district now forms a part of Maharashtra since 1st May, 1960. The area, number of inhabited villages, number of towns, and 1961 population and the percentages of area and population of each tahsil are as follows.

Sakoli Tahsil is the biggest in respect of area and occupies 42.8 % of the total area of the district. Gondia Tahsil has got the largest population of the district. The urban areas forms 0.03 % of the total area of the district.

#### 1.5. Topography.

The district is generally open and even being broken in a few places by isolated ranges of hills. The district lies in the Wainganga basin and the Wainganga controls the entire drainage system in the district.

#### 1.6. Hill ranges, rivers system, soil etc.

The lowest and the most northerly hill range is the Ambagad range, an outlayer of the Satpura. It enters the district from the west and tending in the northeasterly direction cuts off the valley of the Bawanthady river from the rest of the district. Soon after entering the district the ridge is crowned by the fortress of Ambagad. In front of it, looking across the valley which here pierces the range, is a remarkable balastic precipice with a sheer drop of some hundred feet. In the centre of the district, running from the east of Bhandara Town to the Railway near Gondia, is a Gaikhuri range, a cluster of low peaks, ~~and~~ surrounded by irregular forest country. The points of Khura (2,009 Ft.), Lendezari (1,490 Ft.) and Jamni (1,712 Ft.) are the highest. The range divides the valley of the Wainganga and Bagh. Just west of the Bhandara, the Bhilai Range consisting of a few sand stone hills capped with granite and overhanging the ~~xxx~~ eastern road forms a prominent feature in the landscape. Lastly

in the south-east lie the Nawegaon or Pratapgarh hills, the highest part of the district. Thus the four demarcated natural divisions of the district are 1). Hilly tract of Gaimukh and Ambagad on the north-west. 2). Valley of Wainganga River covering the Bhandara Tahsil and part of Gondia Tahsil 3). Hilly tract of Gaikhuri and Pratapgarh ranges covering Sakoli Tahsil and 4). Valley of Bagh and Pangodi rivers in the north-east corner of the district covering the portion of Gondia Tahsil.

The Wainganga is the main river flowing through this district and all others viz. Bagh, Chulbandh, Pangodi, Chandan and Bawanthadi are its tributaries. The Wainganga enters the district from the north-east side and flows diagonally across it until it passes within a mile of Bhandara Town. Then it flows to the south and forms boundary between Bhandara and Nagpur districts for a short distance. It then enters the Chanda district. The total length of the river is 360 miles out of which, a length of 150 miles lies in Bhandara district. Bagh is the principal affluent of the Wainganga. It joins the Wainganga near Beni, being crossed by the Jabalpur-Gondia Narrow gauge railway just before its junction. The length of the river is 103 miles. The other river called the Chulband which rises in Bhandara district and flows through Sakoli Tahsil is of 20 miles length and meets the Wainganga near Soni on the Southern border of the district.

#### Tanks.

~~Like~~ Bhandara district, known for its thousands of tanks, is called the lake region of Nagpur Plains. There are 580 big and 13,758 small tanks in the district. It is noteworthy that this district has the maximum number of



tanks in the whole of Maharashtra. Besides serving as a source of irrigation, these tanks are also utilised for the development of fisheries which form an important aspect of economic development of the district.

The soils of this district are light in general, except in Paoni and Lakhandur area, which are locally known as 'Chauras' area. Most of these soils are of granite origin where as some are of laterite origin. The soils in Paoni and Lakhandur are heavy. Some of them especially in Lakhandur area can be classified as heavy clay whereas the rest as clay loam. The light soils have PH slightly less than 6.5 i.e. they are slightly acidic but the clay soils are natural with PH ranging from 6.5 to 7. There are few patches in light soil whose PH is about 5.55 i.e. they are acidic in nature.

#### 1.7. Climate, Temperature and Rainfall.

Table No.1: - "Normal rainfall" in column 3 denotes the average of rainfall over a long period.

The highest maximum temperature recorded at Gondia centre, during the year 1965 and 1966 was  $41.8^{\circ}$  and  $42.3^{\circ}$ , respectively particularly in the month of May. The lowest minimum temperature during the year 1965 and 1966 recorded as  $13.2^{\circ}$  C. and  $12.6^{\circ}$  C. respectively, particularly in the month of December,

In 1965 the monsoons commenced late in the month of June and lasted up to August with sufficient rains in

the year where as in the year 1966 they commenced in the [right earnest at the beginning of June and lasted upto middle of September with sufficient rains. The rain fall was too abnormal from the month of August to the end of September in the year 1965 where as it was less abnormal in the year 1966. Because of failure of rains the years 1965 and 1966 were treated as drought years and scarcity affected villages w-ere declared by Govt. in both these years. The average rainfall of the district was 841.3 mms and 1173.3 mms in the year 1965 and 1966 respectively which was much less than the normal annual rainfall of 1448.3 mms for the district. It clearly shows that the rainfall was much below the normal in both the years 1965 and 1966.

Scarcity: - Some parts of the district have been affected in the past due to untimely rains or local insufficiency. There is however, no sizeable area affected by deficiency of rainfall. The fact finding committee appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 came, therefore, to the conclusion that the district may be generally considered as free from scarcity.

The crop condition was found satisfactory from the year 1961 to 1964 because of satisfactory rainfall during the span of four years. In the year 1965-66 and 1966-67 because of abnormal failure of rains the crops had withered and the water level had fallen. However the percentage of scarcity area was lesser in

the year 1966-67 than that of the year 1965-66. Govt. had declared 453 villages as scarcity affected villages out of the total 1486 inhabited villages in the district in the year 1966-67 accounting for 30.48 percent of the villages affected by scarcity. In all 53.64 percent villages in Bhandara Tahsil, 31.12 percent villages in Gondia Tahsil and 15.24 percent villages in Sakoli Tahsil were declared as scarcity affected villages in the year 1966-67. Necessary measures were immediately taken up by Government to provide the bulk of employment to the people living in the scarcity affected area.

C H A P T E R -II.Explanatory Notes.POPULATION.

Table No.3: - The terms "rural" and "urban" under column 3 are defined as follows according to 1961 census.

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has

1. a municipality, a cantonment or civil lines

- 2.(i). A population of 5,000 or over  
a n d
- (ii). At least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in non-agricultural pursuits.

Rural population is a population of all villages in a revenue unit.

A "village" is a statutorily recognised village having a defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadies or Padas have, therefore, not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as "uninhabited" villages. Villages also includes forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families.

Table No.5: - Town is a urban area as defined under table no.3.

- Table No.6: - A person is classified as a worker if -
- (a). in case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock dairying, household industry, etc., he has

had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season; and

- (b) in the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the 15 days preceding the day of enumerator's visit to the household.

Workers are classified into the following nine categories of economic activity: -

1. As cultivator
2. As agricultural labourer
3. In Mining, Quarrying, Livestock, Forestry, Fishing, Hunting and Plantations, Orchards and allied activities.
4. At household industry
5. In Manufacturing other than household Industry.
6. In construction.
7. In Trade and Commerce
8. In Transport, Storage and Communications
9. In other services

Table No. 7: - "Mother tongue" is defined as language spoken by the persons mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house. Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's Classification.

Table No. 8: - Scheduled Tribes: -

There are no Scheduled Tribes notified for the district.

Bhandara District stands second in respect of population, seventh in respect of area and second in respect of density of population per square mile, in Vidarbha Division. The percentage of population of Bhandara district to the total population of Vidarbha Division and Maharashtra State according to 1961 Census Works out to 13.74 and 3.21 respectively.

The percentage increase of population in 1961 over that of 1901 and 1951 is 112.3 and 18.4 respectively. The highest increase in population is observed in the last decade only. The ratio of Rural to Urban population in 1961 Census is 8:1. About 10.73 percent of the total population according to 1961 Census was enumerated in Urban areas.

The density of population has increased sharply from (76 persons per square Km.) in 1921 to 135 per Sq. Km. persons in 1961. The district density has, however, always been higher than the State average because of the very intensive pattern of crops, with a large proportion of areas under irrigation and double cropping. Density of population varies from 90 persons

per square Km. in Sakoli Tahsil to <sup>177</sup> persons/in Gondia Tahsil. These variations generally correspond to those of topography and land utilisation. Lands in Gondia Tahsil are the richest and yield the best crops. Lands in Sakoli Tahsil are comparatively poorer in the district. The densities of population ~~are~~ in Gondia and Bhandara Tahsil are high because of their urban population and large proportions of irrigated and double cropped lands.

Since 1961, the Sex ratio in the district has declined from 1027 to 997, while in Maharashtra it has declined from 978 to 936. Since 1901 the sex ratio of the district has been continuously decreasing. The rural sex ratio has always been higher than the urban sex ratio. It is because of outmigration of males from rural to urban areas within the district for employment.

According to 1961 Census workers formed 58.42 % and non-workers accounted for 41.58 % of the total population. Cultivators formed 32.63 % whereas agricultural labourers formed 9.40% of the total population.

There are no schedule tribes in Bhandara district as per 1961 Census. The total schedules caste population in the district in 1961 was about 2.45 percent of the total population of the district. The Schedule caste population has decreased remarkably from 19.7 % in 1951 Census to 2.45 percent in 1961, as a majority of persons belonging to that castes got themselves converted to Buddhism.

2. A G R I C U L T U R E

Table No. 9 - For definition of terms used in columns 5 to 18 are as follows: -

1. (i). Total Geographical area by
  - (a). Professional survey
  - (b). Village papers
- (ii). Forests. All actually forested areas on the lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests, whether State-owned or private.

1. (iii). Barren and unculturable land. :

All barren and unculturable land like mountains, deserts, etc. (land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost) is classed as unculturable whether such land is in an isolated block or within cultivated holdings.

2. Land put to non-agricultural use

All lands occupied by building roads and railways or under water e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agricultural.

3. Culturable wastes.

All lands available for cultivation, whether or not taken up for cultivation or abandoned after five years for one reason or the other. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or unassessed and may be in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings.



Land once cultivated but not cultivated for five years in succession is also included in this category, at the end of the five years.

4. Permanent pastures  
or other grazing lands.

All grazing lands whether permanent pastures and meadows or otherwise.

5. Land under miscellaneous  
tree crops and groves not  
included in the net area  
sown

All cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use. Lands under casurina trees, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves used for fuel, etc. which are not included under "orchards" will be classed under this.

6. Current fallows:-

Lands which are left fallow during the current year only.

7. Other fallow lands:-

All lands which were taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years.

The reasons for keeping such lands fallow may be inter-alia one of the following.-

1. Poverty of the cultivators;
2. Inadequate water supply;
3. Malarial climate;
4. Silting of canals and reivers; or
5. Unremunerative nature of farming etc.

### 8. Net area sown :-

Net area sown represents the area sown to crops, counting area sown more than once in the same year only once. This represents the difference between the total geographical area and sum of area under forests, barren and unculturable land, land put to non-agricultural uses, culturable waste, permanent pastures and other grazing lands, miscellaneous tree crops and groves, not included in net area sown, other fallow<sup>1</sup> and and current fallows.

### 9. Area sown more than once :-

Area sown with two or more than to crops and counted more than once in the same year.

### 10. Total cropped area :-

This is the total of Net area sown and areas sown more than once.

### IRRIGATION :-

Table No.15 :- The cost of Minor irrigation is up to a maximum of Rs. 20 lakhs.

### Table No.16 :-

The cost of a Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs.20 lakhs to Rs.5 crores whereas that of a Major irrigation project it is Rs. 5 crores and above.

Agriculture is the most important productive activity in the district as it engages 71.94 percent of the total population.

As in other areas of the state in the district also there are two agricultural seasons viz. Kharif and Rabi. But the district has more area under

Kharif than Rabi crops. Only Bhandara Tahsil <sup>is</sup> ~~was~~ an exception where Rabi crops predominate. But compared to Kharif Jowar the district has a larger area under Rabi Jowar. In all about 87 percent of the total Jowar was grown in Rabi season during 1965-66. Rice is the main crop of the district covering more than half of the gross cropped area.

Because of abnormal failure of rains during 65-66 the green fields that generally promise a bumper harvest had withered and the water level had fallen. Thousands of tanks which were used as a protective measure of irrigation to paddy crops had inadequate or no water in them. A considerably large portion of paddy area was kept unsown during the year 1965-66.

Within the district, the net area sown in Bhandara and Gondia Tahsils were about half of the geographical area in the year 1964-65. The percentage of net area sown to total geographical area, however, declined in the year 1965-66. The total gross cropped area had decreased by 16.13 percent and net cropped area by 6.64 percent in the year 1965-66 as compared with corresponding gross cropped and net cropped areas in 1964-65. The <sup>area</sup> under current fallow had increased by 24,591 hectares in the year 1965-66 as compared to that in the year 1964-65, and area sown more than once had also decreased by 42.27 percent in the year 1965-66 than in the year 1964-65. Bhandara taluka was the worst

sufferer in the year 1965-66 in the district.

Almost the entire area under non-food crops was under oilseeds. Linseed and Lakhori were the main crops reaped after paddy which were generally sown by broadcasting method and locally called "Uteran". There was a reduction in area of about 13,363 hectares under oilseeds in 1965-66 over that of the year 1964-65. But at the same time the area under wheat and Jowar increased by 407 hectares and 5,259 hectares respectively in the year 1965-66 over that in year 1964-65.

The percentages of gross irrigated area to gross cropped area in the district were 25.21 and 23.48 in the years 1964-65 and 1965-66 respectively. Sakoli taluka had the largest area under irrigation in 1965-66 where as in ~~1965-66~~ 1964-65 Gondia taluka had the largest area under irrigation, although the proportion of irrigated area to gross cropped area sown was highest in Sakoli Tahsil for both the years. Thus in every tahsil the proportion of irrigated area was considerably higher than the state average in this regard.

### 3. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY, FOREST, AND FISHERIES.

Table No.24 - In the reserved forest broadly speaking every<sup>th</sup>ing is an offence that is not permitted while in the protected forest nothing is an offence that is prohibited.

1). Animal Husbandry:- The percentage increase in Livestock population in 1961 over that of 1951 was 9.38. The total bovine population in the district in 1966 was 77.28 percent of the total livestock. The percentage decrease in male bovine population over 3 years was 8.43 in the year 1966 over that of the year 1961. During the first half of the decade (i.e. 1951-56) there was a reduction in the number of buffaloes and sheep. This was however, made good during the latter half i.e. 1956-61 and the number of sheep increased more than 100 percent during the decade. During 1965 the population of sheep had decreased by 18.1 percent over that of the year 1961. The total livestock population had increased by 1.6 percent over that of the year 1961. There had been an over-all increase in the total livestock in 1966 over that of 1961 except the numbers of cattle, sheep and horses and ponies which had decreased by 4.0 percent, 18.1 percent and 35.5 percent respectively. The over-all mortality percentage of livestock was more in 1966-67 over that of the year 1965-66. The average nos. of animals treated per dispensary and veterinary aid centre in 1965-66 and 1966-67 were 1,507 and 1,451 respectively. The number of animals inseminated had increased by 38 percent in the year 1966-67 over that of the year 1965-66. There were also 8 slaughter houses in this district at Paoni, Bhandara, Tumsar, Adyal, Mohadi, Gondia, Tirora and Sihora. Mostly goats and sheep were slaughtered there and the percentage of goats slaughtered, was much higher than

that of sheep.

11). Forest: - In all 18.35 percent of the total forest land was under of Revenue Department and remaining 81.65 percent was under Forest Department. Out of the total forest area, 31.25 percent is covered by "reserved" forest, 50.40 percent by "protected" forest and remaining 18.35 percent formed "unclassed" forest. The total area under forest had decreased in the year 1966-67 by 0.003 percent over that in 1965-66. Certain reduction was found in the forest area incharge of forest department, where as the forest area under Revenue Department was almost constant. For purposes of administration, the forests are divided into the two units comprising Bhandara Division and Gondia Division with headquarters at Bhandara and Gondia respectively. The Divisions are also sub-divided into 10 ranges. The forest incharge of Revenue Department are looked after by the District Collector.

The forest exists in all the three tahsils of the district. They fall in the broad type "Southern Tropical Dry Deciduous Forest" and consists of the sub-types (1) Teak Forest and (2) Mixed Forests. The most valuable species namely the "decorative veneer" is found in large sizes and it is important as constructional timber.

The forest produce is exploited through the agencies of the Contractors and also through the forest labourer's Co-operative Societies. The total value of

the forest products sold was to the tune of Rs.48.23 Lakhs and Rs. 53.67 Lakhs in the year 1965-66 and 1966-67 respectively.

iii). Fisheries: - Rivers, tanks and ponds are the Chief sources of fishing activities in the district. <sup>The</sup> total length of perennial rivers in the district is about 440 Kms. There are also about 1,000 perennial tanks and about 14,000 seasonal tanks and ponds. The water spread area provided by them is quite adequate for development of fishery.

One fish farm has been established at Seoni-bandh for research on pisciculture and experiments on included breedings. The farm has an area of 10.68 acres and has a set of 2 stocking tanks, 2 rearing tanks, 2 marketing tanks and 6 nursery units. In addition to this, there are about 15,300 fishing nursery tanks which are looked after by the Department of Fisheries, Nagpur.

#### 4. INDUSTRIES, MINING AND ELECTRICITY.

Although agricultural development has a crucial role in the process of economic development in the district as in the rest of the country, substantial gains in levels of living and employment opportunities can only be achieved by diversification of economic activity through rapid industrial development. Bhandara district can not be called an industrially developed region as it stands 7th in Nagpur division and 18th in Maharashtra in order of placement in case of the workers per lakh of population employed in registered factories.

The number of registered factories working in this district in the year 1966 had decreased by 13.37 percent over that in the year 1964 which had eventually decreased the average no. of daily workers by 2.98 percent in 1966 over that in 1964. In Bhandara district there were only two major industries viz. Rice Mill and Bidi and Tobacco industries. The percentage of major industries to that of total registered factories in 1966 was about 83.33 where as the average no. of daily workers in the major industries to that of total registered factories was about 89.03.

In the Cottage and Small Scale Industries Sector Bidi making, cane and Bomboo works, Saw Milling, hand pounding of Rice, Gur making, handloom, brass ware, Rice milling, Soap, Cement tiles and pipes, Oil ghanies etc. are ~~next~~ more important. A few of these industries are traditional crafts operated on household and Cottage Industries scale. Next to Bidi industry, Cotton weaving in handloom, engages the second largest proportion of ~~non-agricultural~~ workers in the district.

The district is one of the important mineral producing areas in Maharashtra. It has large deposits of iron ore which however are not useful in manufacture of steel. The district also has deposits of corundum, building stones and Mica.



The percentage increase of electrified villages in 1966-67 over that of the year 1960-61 was about 797.3. This was a remarkable achievement especially in the expansion programme of electrification of villages as it was directly linked up with boosting of agricultural production. Simultaneously the percentage of installation of pumping sets had also increased in the course of five years from 1961 to 1966. Industrial power consumption accounted for 78.79 % of the total consumption of power in 1966-67 in the district and the remaining 21.21 percent of power consumption was for domestic, commercial light, and small power, public lighting and other purposes.

#### 5. CO-OPERATION.

Concentrated efforts made during the last decade have resulted in rapid expansion of the co-operative movement in the district. All the villages in the district are now covered by the rural co-operatives. Besides, agricultural credit, the activities are <sup>now</sup> ~~not~~ extended to processing of agricultural produce, farming, marketing, fisheries etc. There are, however, many more fields like dairying, lift irrigation etc. which have not been brought under the co-operative fold.

The total number of societies during the year 1965-66 was 1,117 where as the total number of Societies during the year 1966-67 was 1,116. Though the number of Societies had decreased in the year 1966-67 over that in the year 1965-66, and the working capital of the Societies

had increased over that in the year 1965-66. The break up of the total co-operative societies functioning during the year 1966-67 revealed that. Agricultural Societies accounted for 70.97 percent, Non-Agricultural societies accounted for 0.80 percent, Agricultural non-credit societies accounted for 9.86 percent and Non-agricultural credit societies accounted for 18.37 percent. The break up of the total membership of all types of Societies revealed that membership of Agricultural credit societies accounted for 30.23 percent, Non-agricultural credit societies accounted for 3.25 percent, Agricultural non-credit societies accounted for 28.68 percent and Non-agricultural Non-credit societies accounted for 37.84 percent. The break-up of total share capital of all types of societies revealed that the share capital of Agricultural credit societies accounted for 80.32 percent, Non-agricultural credit societies accounted for 0.40 percent, Agricultural non-credit societies accounted for 15.06 percent and Non-agricultural Non-credit societies accounted for 4.22 percent. The break-up of the total working capital of all types of societies revealed that the working capital of Agricultural credit societies accounted for 88.79 percent, Non-agricultural credit societies accounted for 0.28 percent, Agricultural non-credit societies accounted for 7.13 percent and Non-agricultural Non-credit societies accounted for 3.80 percent.

Besides; the financial activities, good progress had also been made by Agril. Credit societies in the sphere of services to agriculturists, such as distribution of agricultural requisites and marketing of agricultural produce.

According to Audit classification during 1966-67, about 5.55 percent societies were class in 'B' category, 60.67 percent societies in 'C' category and 23.39 percent societies in 'D' category, had been placed where as 9.14<sup>percent</sup> societies had not been audited and 1.25 percent of societies had not been placed under any of the categories, though audited during 1966-67.

#### 6. MEDICAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH.

According to 1961 Census the proportion of physicians working in rural to urban area was 16:1 where as the proportion of urban/rural populations was 8: 1 only. The proportion of female physicians in rural to urban areas was more than the proportion of male physicians. All the Hospitals are under the management of Civil Surgeon where as the dispensaries and Primary Health Centres are looked after by the Local Bodies. The population per bed worked out to 2,463 persons where as the proportion of Indoor patients to Out-door patients was 1: 70 during the year 1966.

According to survey of drinking water supply works it was found that 9.70 percent villages were with sufficient water supply and 38.65 percent villages had inadequate water supply. Bhandara is the only town where

there is piped water supply in the district. The work of piped water supply to Tumsar town has been undertaken.

#### 7. EDUCATION.

Literacy rates have increased more than six times since 1931. Female literacy especially had gone up from 0.56 percent in 1931 to 8.19 percent in 1961. The male literacy had also risen from 7.61 percent in 1931 to 39.90 percent in 1961. The literacy percentage of the district as a whole worked out to 24.07 in 1961.

There has been a rapid growth in the number of primary schools in the district. The percentage increase of primary schools was 1.62 where as the percentage increase in the total strength of pupils was 3.34 in the year 1966-67 over that in 1965-66.

The progress of Secondary Education in the district was also quite rapid. The percentage of pupils going to Secondary School had increased by 9.36 in 1966-67 over that in 1965-66. The Secondary Schools were adequately dispersed in Rural and Urban areas of the district. Maximum number of Schools were located in Bhandara Tahsil and their minimum number was found in Gondia Tahsil.

There were 8 Colleges in Bhandara district in 1966-67. Two were established at Bhandara, two at Gondia, one at Lakhni in Sakoli Taluka, one at

Tumsar in Bhandara Taluka, one at Tirora in Gondia Taluka and one at Sakoli in Sakoli Taluka.

There is an Industrial Training Institute at Gondia providing instruction in the courses such as Electricians, Fitters, Turners, Welders and Carpentry. In addition to this two Technical High Schools were established each at Gondia and Tumsar respectively. In addition to this there are 10 Institutions imparting instructions in major trades such as agriculture and other technical courses during the year 1966-67. About 65.84 percent villages had schools in 1966-67 in this district.

#### 8. TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION.

Although there are very few roads in the district still the important Centres and Taluka headquarters are interconnected by roads. There are also a few roads connecting the adjoining districts and the State of Madhya Pradesh. Many of the interior places have no connection by roads to other places in the district. The district headquarter is connected by roads and railways with the Taluka headquarters. Sakoli Tahsil is a hilly terrain and has a fewer roads. The National Highway No. 6 connecting Nagpur with Raipur traverses through Bhandara and Sakoli Tahsils for 104 Kms. The third Taluka headquarter of Gondia is also connected to this National Highway from Kohamara. During the period from 1.4.61 to 31.3.67 the total increase in all types of road length

was 764.74 Kms. The increase was more than double as compared to the corresponding road length in 1961. The abnormal increase in road length was due to the efforts made by Zilla Parishad to inter-connect villages by approach roads under various schemes such as village road scheme and Rural man-power programme scheme. A bridge on the Chulband river was also constructed, connecting Sakoli and Lakhandur. The percentage of Black topped roads to total road length was 22.73 where as the percentage of road length of National Highways and State Highways to total road length was 26.84 only as on 31.3.67. The proportion of road length per 100 Sq. Kms. of area was about 14.92/as on 31st March, 1967 in this district.

The total bus routes as on 31.3.1967 were 192 in Nagpur, Bhandara, Chanda and Wardha district in Vidarbha division. There is still a large scope for starting new bus routes though the motorable roads are constructed in the district. There was no increase in the length of Railway routes in the year 1967 over that in the year 1966.

The district is included in the Chanda postal division with Head Post Office at Gondia and Sub-Post Offices at Taluka Headquarters and towns. The bigger villages have branch offices. The number of Post Offices had increased from 211 in 1961-62 to 222 in 1966-67. The number of postmen and letter boxes also

increased simultaneously in proportion to above increase in number of Post Offices. The number of telegraph offices had increased from 11 in 1961-62 to 15 in 1966-67. Because of increase in telegraph office the number of telephones installed had increased by 66.25 percent in 66-67 over than in the year 1961-62. Partly because of electrification of villages the number of Radio licensees had increased by 185.56 percent in the year 1966-67 to that in the year 1961-62. The increase in radio licenses may also be due to the increase in number of transistors in rural as well as in urban area.

#### 9. LOCAL BODIES.

Village Panchayats - All the revenue villages were covered by 976 village panchayats. The percentage decrease in income and expenditure of Village Panchayats in the year 1966-67 worked out to 14.95 and 4.87 respectively over that of the year 1965-66. The break-up of the Income of Village Panchayats from all sources during 1966-67 revealed that 85.20 percent income was derived from taxes and fees, 1.44 percent from contributions and donations, 53.74 percent from Grant in aid and 19.62 percent from other sources. The break-up of expenditure of Village Panchayats during 1966-67 revealed that 2.22 percent expenditure was incurred on Sanitation and Health, 61.69 percent on Public Works, 9.47 percent on Administration and remaining 26.62 percent on other items such as Social and Moral promotion, Welfare, Preservation of Animal Husbandry and other unspecified items.

Zilla Parishad:- During 1966-67 the percentage increase in the income of Zilla Parishad was 0.62 where as percentage decrease in expenditure of Zilla Parishad was 8.90 as compared to the year 1965-66. The break-up of the total income of Zilla Parishad during the year 1966-67 revealed that 4.76 percent was derived from self raised resources, 32.60 percent from Govt. grants and the remaining 62.64 percent was derived from Loans and Advances, Deposits and advances and Remittances. The break-up of expenditure during 1966-67 revealed that 54.97 percent expenditure was incurred as Revenue expenditure and remaining 45.03 percent expenditure was incurred on debt section.

Municipal Committee:- The percentage decrease in income and expenditure of Municipal Committees in 1966-67 was 16.98 and 19.52 respectively over the year 1965-66. The break-up of the income from all sources during 1966-67 revealed that 48.57 percent income was derived from Govt. contributions, 39.80 percent from Municipal rates and taxes and the remaining 11.63 percent was derived from Revenue of Municipal properties and other sources. The break-up of expenditure during 1966-67 revealed that 4.13 percent expenditure was incurred on Public Works, 38.43 percent on Public Institutions and remaining 57.44 percent of expenditure was incurred on General administration, Cost of collection of taxes, Public safety, Public Health and Convenience and other unspecified items.



10. ANNUAL PLAN 1966-67.

The outlay for the district level plan schemes was of the order of Rs.204.72 Lakhs, against which the total expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 158.10 Lakhs. Agricultural Programmes were given the highest priority in the district. More than half of the total Annual Plan outlay i.e. about 54 percent was earmarked for the various agricultural programmes. The important feature of the agricultural programmes was the implementation of different schemes for Intensive Agricultural development through Package Programme for which this district was particularly selected during the third plan period. The programmes for Co-operation and Community Development shared 13 percent of the total outlay, while schemes under Social Services accounted for a total outlay of about 24 percent of the total Plan outlay for the district. Transport and Communications were allotted 8 percent of the total plan outlay whereas the Industries & Mining were allotted the remaining one percent of the total plan outlay.

Out of the total plan outlay of Rs.204.72 Lakhs the expenditure incurred during the Plan period was to the tune of Rs. 158.10 Lakhs. The break-up of the total expenditure during the plan period showed that 60.29 percent expenditure was incurred on Agricultural Programmes, 12.75 percent on Co-operation and Community Development Programmes, 0.34 percent on Industry and

Mining, 9.94 percent on Transport and Communications and 16.68 percent on Social Services.

11. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT.

The District comprises 13 Blocks of 15 C.P.A. Pattern covering all villages except 5 towns and 11 Forest villages. Out of the 13 Blocks in the district, 3 Blocks were in Stage I, 7 Blocks in Stage II and remaining 3 Blocks in Post Stage II. According to the classification of Index number of Physical Achievement calculated in the year 1965-66 and 1966-67 it was found that most of the Blocks were classified under 'A' Class. All the Blocks were covered under I.A.D. Programme. All the Blocks had shown remarkable achievement in case of distribution of Improved seed and chemical fertilizers, construction of School buildings, repairs and renovation of Ex-Malguzari tanks and Family Planning Programmes.

12. REGULATED MARKET AND PRICES.

Since the declaration of emergency in the country prices of some essential commodities from all district headquarters are regularly collected every week basis and Index number of prices is worked out with the week ending 9th November, 1962 as the base.

The Retail prices of 72 commodities are collected on every Friday from the selected shops at district headquarters. The prices of cereals and pulses increased by 36.47 percent and 2.08 percent respectively within a period of one year.

The prices of cereals showed the abnormal increase during the period under review. A significant price rise was also observed in case of Rice, Wheat, Gramdal and Mung dal. The prices of other commodities such as Groundnut oil, Vanaspati(galda), Dry chillies, Kerosene Oil, Charcoal and Washing Soap showed a steep rise in the year 1966 to that in the year 1965.

In this district, there are 11 important market places where agricultural produce is brought and sold. Out of these 11 Centres, Preliminary survey has been completed in all places, except Mor-gaon-Arjuni and Deori. Moreover, an additional centre at S.undad in Deori Block is proposed to be taken up <sup>for</sup> survey. Out of the remaining 8 Centres Market Committees have already been established at Gondia, Tirora, Amgaon, Bhandara, Lakhani and Paoni.

In all the 6 Regulated Markets, the total arrivals of food grains had increased from 80,448 tons to 3,31,758 tons in 1966-67. The increase in arrivals was due to better agricultural season in 1966-67 to that in ~~1965-66~~ and also because of opening of Regulated market at Paoni.

### 13. MISCELLANEOUS.

This caption includes data pertaining to Police, Courts, Cinema Statistics, Census of Govt. Employees,

Housing, Financial Statistics and Assembly and Parliamentary Constituencies and the result of General Election 1967.

1. The percentage increase in cognisable crimes in 1966 was 24.17 over that in the year 1965, and the proportion of cognisable crimes per one thousand population was about four in the year 1966.

2. According to 1966 Census of Govt. Employees, it was found that there were 25 Class I Officers, 115 Class II Officers, 3,447 Class III and 2,716 Class IV Employees in this district. According to Pay rangewise classification of the employees it was found that 87 per cent employees draw not more than Rs.199, comprising mostly Class III and Class IV employees.

3. There were 8 Scheduled Banks and 16 Co-operatives Banks functioning as on 31st March, 1967 in this district located in 15 villages and towns covering a population of 1,70,867. The population served by each bank worked out to 0.53 Lakh persons.

4. In the General Election held in the February, 1967 the percentage of votes polled to total electorate were 67.9 and 69.4 under Parliamentary and Assembly Constituencies respectively. The break-up of the partywise number of votes polled ~~xxxxx~~ revealed that the ~~xxxx~~ congress had secured 40 % votes, Jan Sangh 18% , Republican Party 25 % and Independants 17 % of votes under the Parliamentary

Constituency Election. Under the Assembly Constituency Election the Congress had secured 37 % of votes, Republican Party 20 %, Jan Sangh 14 % and Independent 29 % of votes, to the total number of votes polled.

CHAPTER- III.

In the following paragraphs an attempt has been made to bring out the impact of Third Five Year Plan and the Annual Plan 1966-67 on the different sectors of the economy of the district. Comparative talukawise data for 1960-61 & 1965-66 or 1966-67 or for the latest available years, as the case may be, are also given under the following relevant indicators of development.

Indicator- 1: Percentage gross sown area: Since 1960-61 the net area sown in the district decreased from 3.81 Lakh hectares to 3.63 Lakh hectares in 1965-66 i.e. by 4.73 percent and the gross cropped area sown similarly decreased from 5.16 Lakh hectares in 1960-61 to 4.44 Lakh hectares in 1965-66 i.e. by 13.96 percent. This was because of abnormal failure of rains in the year 1965-66 when most of the area was remained unsown which had resulted in decrease in net area sown and gross area sown. The following table indicates the percentage of gross cropped area to net sown area during 1960-61 and 1965-66.

In the year 1965-66, the percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown had decreased in all talukas as compared with corresponding figures in the year 1960-61 because of scarcity conditions prevalent in the year 1965-66. The maximum decrease in percentage of cropped area to net sown area was observed in Gondia taluka. The Sakoli taluka was not much affected because larger areas were under irrigation mainly from tanks where sufficient moisture remains in the Paddy bunds after the Kharif season, and where the other Rabi Crops had been sown by the cultivators in the year 1965-66 to a larger extent. Because of the higher proportion of irrigated areas, moisture retentive capacity of soil and the rainfall received from the north-east monsoon, the percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown was considerably higher in the district than the state average. Crops like Linseed and Lathori were grown after Paddy and the rotation is supposed to improve the fertility of soil. Within the district, the percentage of gross cropped area to net area sown was highest in the Gondia taluka whereas it was lowest in Bhandara taluka because of lesser irrigation facilities therein.

Indicator No.2 : Productivity of Important crops:-

The programmes of Agricultural development have all along received a high priority. The average annual food grains production in the district rose from 2.542 Lakh metric tonnes at the end of the first five

year plan to 3.139 Lakh metric tonnes at the end of the Second Five Year Plan. The average annual food grains production in the Third Five Year Plan however, declined to 2.903 Lakh metric tonnes due to insufficient rainfall from the end of September in the year 1962-63, affecting the paddy crop and also due to scarcity conditions arising out of inadequate rain fall in the year 1965-66. Secondly the year 1960-61 which happened to be the base year for planning additional potential to be created in the Third Five Year Plan was an exceptionally good year. The following table indicates the major cropwise production and yield rates during the year 1960-61 and 1965-66.

It ~~is~~<sup>is</sup> seen from the above table that the total food grains production had declined by 56.40 percent in the year 1965-66 to that of the year 1960-61. The major reduction was found <sup>in</sup> the production of rice which had declined by 60.06 percent in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61. In short, the year 1965-66 was supposed to be the worst affected year from the point <sup>of</sup> view of agricultural production.

Indicator No.3: Gross value of agricultural production :- As relevent price data required are not available, the gross value of Agril. production could not be calculated.

Indicator No.4: Percentage of Irrigated Area :- In every taluka the proportion of irrigated area was about four times more than the State average. Tanks are the major source of irrigation irrigating about 85.07 percent of the total net irrigated area in the year 1965-66. Second major source of irrigation is from Canals, irrigating 7.76 percent of the total net irrigated area. The largest canal irrigation was <sup>found</sup> in Gondia taluka whereas the largest irrigation from tanks was found in Sakoli taluka. The following table indicates the talukawise percentage of irrigated area to net sown area.

The gross irrigated area to net irrigated area sown had decreased in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61, because of failure of monsoon in the year 1965-66. The percentage of irrigated area (net or gross) to net area sown had decreased in Bhandara and Gondia talukas because these two talukas were badly affected due to failure of rains in the year 1965-66. In Sakoli taluka, however, there was <sup>an</sup> increase in the percentage of irrigated area to net area sown because of decrease in net area sown and increase in irrigated area in the year 1965-66. During the last year of the Third Five Year Plan because of this natural calamity the Govt. had introduced special Kharif and Rabi campaign by supplying oil engines and pumping sets to ~~and~~ <sup>food</sup> needy farmers to save their crops. The oil engines and pump-sets were installed to pump water from the available water resources in the year 1965-66. In Sakoli taluka the area irrigated had shown some increase because of large water reservoirs and also because of above measures. The

irrigation to Paddy and condiments and spices had considerably decreased whereas the irrigation to wheat and fruits and vegetables had increased in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No.5: Changes in the crop pattern (Total

and Irrigated): - Bhandara district is a mono-crop area and paddy is the main crop of this district. Lakhori and Linseed are also the major crops of this district which are reaped after Paddy and locally called as "Utera". During the span of five years from 1960-61 to 1965-66 there were no major changes in the cropping pattern except a very few minor changes. The following table indicates the total area and areas under irrigated food and non-food crops in the year 1960-61 and 1965-66 in Bhandara district.

The total food and non-food crop areas in the district had decreased by 44,844 hectares and 27,158 hectares respectively in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61.

The irrigated/under food crops had decreased by 21,158 hectares where as the irrigated area under non-food/19 hectares in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61.

In Bhandara taluka the total food crop area had decreased by 29,267 hectares whereas the total non-food crop area had increased by 709 hectares in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61. The decrease in total food crop area was mainly due to decrease in Paddy area because of scarcity conditions prevalent in the year 1965-66. The decrease in food-crop area was mainly observed in case of Paddy, Other cereals, Black gram, Lakhori & Sugarcane whereas the increase in food crop area was observed in case of Wheat, Jowar, Gram, Tur, Condiments & spices and fruits and vegetables in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61. The

increase in non-food crop area was mainly observed in case of other fibres, Ground nut and Linseed. The decrease in irrigated area was mainly observed in case of Paddy, Sugarcane, Condiments & spices and Fruits and vegetables whereas the increase in irrigated area was mainly observed in case of wheat.

In Gondia taluka the total food and non-food crop areas had decreased by 13,085 hectares and 25,554 hectares respectively in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61. The decrease in total food crop area was mainly due to decrease in Paddy area because of scarcity conditions prevalent in the year 1965-66. The decrease in food crop area was mainly observed in case of Paddy, Black gram, Lakhori & Sugarcane whereas the increase in food crop area was observed in case of Wheat, Jowar, Gram, Tur and Condiments & spices. The decrease in <sup>non-</sup>food crop area was mainly due to ~~an~~ decrease in Linseed area. The decrease in irrigated area was mainly observed in case of Paddy and Sugarcane.

In Sakoli taluka, the total food crop and non-food crop area had decreased by 2,492 hectares and 2,313 hectares respectively in the year 1965-66 over the year 1960-61. The decrease in total food crop area was mainly due to decrease in area under Wheat, Black gram, Lakhori, Sugarcane and Gram. The increase in area food crop was observed in case of Jowar, Paddy & Tur. The decrease in non-food crop area was observed in case of Linseed and other oilseeds. The irrigated area had increased under

Paddy, Wheat where as irrigated area had decreased under Sugarcane and Condiments & spices.

While summarising the change in cropping pattern of the district<sup>it</sup> was observed that the area under Paddy, Black gram; Lakhori and Sugarcane had decreased considerably where as area under Wheat, Jowar, Gram, Tur, Condiments & spices, Fruits & vegetables had shown a favourable increase. The area under non-food crops had decreased mainly under Linseed and other oilseed.

Indicator No.6: Increase in Agricultural Credit, Outstanding dues and gross value of Agricultural produce.

Even though the coverage of the Co-operative movement is being enlarged from agriculture to industry, trade etc. agricultural credit societies continue to constitute the largest group of co-operatives. There were 700 Primary Agricultural credit societies functioning in this district during the year 1961-62 and 1966-67, covering all revenue villages of this district.

The following table shows the talukewise number of agricultural societies, loans advanced & loans outstanding in 1961-62 and 1966-67 respectively.

The primary agricultural credit societies had advanced loan to their members to the tune of Rs.155.98 Lakh s in the year 1965-66 showing an increase of 16.07 percent over the year 1961-62 where as the amount of loans outstanding in the year 1965-66 was to the tune of Rs.192.14 Lakhs; showing an increase of ~~24.75~~ 24.75 percent over the year 1961-62. As 1965-66 was a drought year the amount of Loans advanced and Loans outstanding were much higher than in the previous years. The amount of loan outstanding showed an increase of 2.65 percent in Bhandara taluka, 65.29 percent in Gondia taluka and 15.75 percent in Sakoli taluka in the year 1966-67 over the year 1961-62.

There were in all 14 Primary agricultural marketing societies which handled the agricultural produce in the year 1961-62 & 1966-67. The turn over of these Primary agricultural Marketing Societies, however, rapidly increased during the year 1966-67. In Sakoli tahsil the societies showed a remarkable progress and handled the maximum agricultural produce of more than one crores of rupees. In Bhandara and Gondia talukas the achievement was also remarkable in the year 1966-67 over the year 1961-62.

Indicator No.7 : Agricultural Wage Rates. - Because of upward rise in price line, agricultural wage rates have also increased since 1961. The work of collecting agricultural wage rates has been started from July, 1963 at three selected centres in the district, one each from every taluka. Though the selected centre from each taluka cannot be treated as a representative of the level of prevailing agricultural wage rates in the taluka, it can still be used as a broad indicator of talukawise variations in wage rates of different categories of skilled and unskilled workers. The following table indicates the average agricultural wage rates during 1964 and 1966/Lakhni in Sakoli taluka, Ajyal in Bhandara taluka and Mundikota in Gondia taluka.

The wage rates of Skilled labourers were highest in all talukas than those of unskilled labourers. They were highest at Lakhni and lowest at Adyal centres. ~~xxxxxx~~ There were no fluctuations in the average wage rates of field labourers and herdsman during 1964 and 1966 at Adyal & Lakhni centres. The average wage rates of herdsman were constant at all the three centres. At Mundi-kota centre the wage rates of field labourers were highest where as they were lowest at Lakhni centre.

Among the Skilled Labourers the wages of carpenters were highest where as among the field labourers the wage rates of males were more than those of female labourers. The wage rates of the field labour were higher than those of Category of other agricultural labourers at all the three centres.

Indicator No.8 : Live Stock per Hectare of Land: -

Bovine population comprises population of buffaloes and Cattle where as ovine population includes the population of sheep and goats. The following table gives the bovine and ovine population per hectare of cultivable land in each taluka.

The livestock per hectare of cultivable land was highest in Gondia Tahsil whereas it was lowest in Sakoli Tahsil, during both the years 1961 & 1966. A remarkable decrease in livestock per hectare of cultivable land was observed in Gondia Tahsil in the <sup>year</sup> 1966 over the year 1961 whereas an almost equal proportion of increase in Livestock per hectare of cultivable land was observed in Sakoli Taluka. The proportion of livestock per hectare of cultivable land had remained constant in Bhandara taluka and in the district as a whole both in the years 1961 & 1966.

Indicator No.9: Poultry as compared to population:-

Development of poultry is essentially a Cottage industry without being linked up with Commercial hatcheries, Commercial feed industry and organised marketing of poultry products. An attempt has been made to show the proportion of poultry population per 100 persons in the year 1961 and 1966 in the following table.

The proportion of poultry for every hundred persons was largest in Sakoli tahsil whereas it was lowest in Gondia tahsil. The poultry population as compared to human population had decreased in all the three talukas during the span of six years, perhaps because there was no nearby market so as to promote this Cottage Industry. The decrease may also in small measures be due to changing consumption pattern of shifting to non-vegetarianisms though it may not be the sole reason for this decrease.

According to 1961 Livestock Census it was estimated that there were 139.67 poultry birds (136.17 fowls and 0.39 ducks) in the district as compared to 129.01 poultry birds (127.61 fowls and 0.22 ducks) in Vidharbha. Similarly only 0.24 percent of fowls were of the improved variety in the district as against 1.07 % in Vidharbha and 1.69 in Maharashtra. It was also estimated that each hen in 1961 produced 55 eggs per year in the district as against 61 in Vidharbha and 84 in Maharashtra.

Indicator No.10: Per Capita consumption of Electricity

The demand for electricity in Bhandara is growing rapidly due to industrialisation, installation of pumps for irrigation and rising standards of living. The supply of energy to this district is made from the thermal stations, located at Khaperkheda and Ballarshah. In the year 1961, only 37 villages and 5 towns were electrified where as in the year 1967 their corresponding number increased to 295 and 5 respectively. The following table indicates the per capita consumption of energy in the district during 1960-61 and 1966-67.

Because of remarkable achievement in the field of electrification of villages, the per Capita consumption of Electricity had increased from 3.11 K.W.H. in 51-62 to 85.54 K.W.H. in 1966-67. The increase during the last ~~six years~~ is mainly due to more use of energy for electric pumps, domestic consumption, Industrial Power and Public Lighting. The large difference in consumption per capita during the year 1966-67 over 1960-61 is due to non inclusion of data of H.T.Units for industrial power during the year 1960-61.

Indicator No.11: Increase in No. of candidates enrolled Employment Exchanges and Vaccancies Notified. -The Employment Exchange was established in Bhandara town on 13.3.1958 to register the unemployed persons and to guide them in seeking suitable employment.

Because of increase in population the number on Live Register had increased from 2,686 as on 31.3.61 to 10,321 as on 31.3.67. The following table indicates the number of persons enrolled with Employment Exchange and the vaccancies notified in the year 1960-61 and 1966-67.

The number of registration during the year 1966-67 had increased by more than two and a half times, over the year 1960-61 where as number of vacancies notified in the year 1966-67 had decreased by 20.36 percent as against the corresponding number of vacancies notified in the year 1960-61.

Because of increase in population and growing education facilities in the district the number of unemployed persons had increased during the last six years and hence there was a heavy rush for registration of candidates with the Employment Exchange where as total number of vacancies notified during 66-67 showed a considerable decrease over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No. 12: Increase in Indoor and Out-door patients treated in Hospital and dispensaries: - During the Third Five Year Plan a substantial progress had been made in various health programmes. The number of hospitals and dispensaries had increased from 94 in 1961 to 113 in the year 1966 and the number of beds increased from 444 to 515. The following table indicates the number of hospitals and dispensaries and number of patients treated.

The number of out-door patients treated per hospital and dispensary increased in all the talukas in 1966 as against the corresponding number in 1961. The increase in Out-door patients was due to some extent the increase in the number of dispensaries in the year 1966 over the year 1961. The increase in the number of out-door patients in 1966 to 7,332 was merely apparent and not real to that extent since this figure was inclusive of out-door patients treated in Ayurvedic dispensaries where as the corresponding figure for 1961 excludes figures of out-door patients treated in Ayurvedic dispensaries.

A general increase in in-door patients treated per hospital and dispensary was found in the year 1966 over 1961 in all talukas except Sakoli. A remarkable rise was found in Gondia taluka where the increase in in-door patients was mainly due to increase in the number of Primary Health Centres in the year 1966 as compared to those in the year 1961. The decrease in number of in-door patients per hospital was found in Sakoli-taluka due to increase in the number of dispensaries where there were no arrangements to treat in-door patients.

Indicator No. 13: Increase in the number of students in different categories. Education is the most important single factor in achieving rapid economic development for creating a social order founded on the values of freedom, social justice and equal opportunity. It was one of the major aims of the Third Five Year Plan to expand and intensify educational activities and to bring every home within its fold, so that from now on, in all branches of national life, education becomes the focal point of Planned development. The following table indicates the growth of educational institutions in the district from the years 1960-61 to 1966-67.

It is seen from the above table that the number of Primary Schools increased by 28.25 percent in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61, where as the no. of boys and girls enrolled increased by 30.37 percent and 76.82 percent respectively in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61. The increase in the number of girl students in Primary Schools was mainly due to opening of Primary Schools in rural areas to a large extent. Secondary Education had also made rapid progress during the last six years. The number of Secondary Schools increased by 110 percent where as the strength of boys and girls enrolled. increased by 62.64 percent and 178.73 percent respectively in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61. The increase in the number of girl students was mainly due to expansion of Secondary School education, made available to rural areas, and also because of change in the traditional outlook of the villagers who were not very much keen on the past to send their wards to schools.

Because of increase in Primary and Secondary Schools and the growing need of the Local people, some new Colleges had been established in the district to provide facilities for higher education. The number of higher institutions increased from 2 in the year 1960-61 to 8 in the year 1966-67 which had eventually increased the strength of students by 771.43 percent during that period.

A few more special schools comprising Agricultural School, Technical Schools and Industrial Training Institutions had been started in the district during the Third Five Year Plan period. The number of special schools increased from 3 to 13 from 1960-61 to 1966-67 and the strength of boys and girls eventually increased from 394 boys and 5 girls to 582 boys and 112 girls respectively in the year 1966-67 over the year 1960-61.

Indicator No.14: Increase in Road Length per 100 Sq.Kms

The road development Programmes for the Third Five Year Plan had been formulated in accordance with the broad objectives laid down in the Tw-enty Year Road Development Plan for the period 1961-81, which had been drawn up by the Chief Engineers of the state and the Central Government. The broad objective of this plan was that no village in a developed and agricultural area should remain more than four miles from a metalled road and more than 1 ½ miles from any type of road. The following table indicates the total road length in Bhandara district as on 31.3.1961 and 31.3.67.

During the Third Five Year Plan period new schemes such as Rural Road Works Programme and Rural Man-Power Programme have been introduced under which rural roads had been constructed by the Zilla Parishad to link different villages with the Block headquarters. These schemes had been continued in the Annual Plan 1966-67. The road length which was 7.15 Kms. per 100 Sq.Kms. of area on 31st March, 1961 had increased to 16.48 Kms. per 100 Sq.Kms. of area as on 31st March, 1967. This remarkable increase was mainly due to increase in length of rural roads of lower types and other district roads.

Indicator No.15: Increasing Banking facilities in proportion to population: - There were 7 Schedule Banks and 9 Co-operative Banks functioning in this district during the year 1960-61. In the year 1965-66 one Schedule Bank has been established at Bhandara town and 7 more Co-operative banks have been established at various block headquarters during 1961-62. The following table indicates the number of banks and the population covered per bank under different tahsils during the year 1960-61 and 1966-67.

A larger number of banks were located in Gondia taluka in both the year 1960-61 and 1966-67. Because of formation of Zilla Parishad a larger number of co-operative Banks functioned in each Block after the year 1960-61 and hence there was a substantial increase in the number of banks in the year 1966-67. Because of increase in Banks the population served per bank had decreased from 79,268 persons in 1960-61 to 52,845 persons in the year 1966-67. In Gondia taluka the urban population is highest as compared to the remaining <sup>two</sup> talukas in district and hence the proportion of banks located in that taluka to total banks in the district is highest among all the ~~the~~ other two talukas in the district.

Indicator No.16:- Prices :- Since the declaration of Emergency in the country, price quotations for some important commodities from 26 district headquarters are obtained on weekly basis. A significant rise was observed in food prices in the years 1965 and 1966 mainly due to unprecedented drought in that year. The following table indicates the average prices of some important commodities collected at Bhandara town for 1962 and 1966, respectively.

According to Maharashtra Scheduled food grains (Stock Declaration and Procurement and disposal, acquisition, Transport and Price Control) order 1966 published in the Maharashtra State Gazette on 25th November, 1966 enforced till 30th November, 1967, the prices of Rice and Jowar were fixed by Government according to their varieties and according to act these commodities were treated as non saleable in the open market. The prices of Jowar were taken as prices fixed by Government whereas the prices of Rice were obtained from retail shopkeepers.

The prices of almost all commodities had shown a sharp rise during the year 1966 over those prevailing in the year 1962. An abnormal increase in prices was observed in case of all types of food grains, Groundnut oil, Vanaspathi Ghee, fresh fish, potatoes, dry chillies, charcoal, firewood, Brass, Gund, Pan(Kapuri) and Supari. The prices of sugar did not show much rise in the year 1966 as it was controlled by Govt. and was sold only through fair price shops. Because of the restrictions on the export of Groundnut oil to Maharashtra, imposed by Gujrat Government, the prices of Groundnut oil had shown a sharp rise in the year 1966. Due to increase in the prices of edible commodities, the prices of other non-edible commodities also increased mostly in the same proportion in the year 1966 over those prevailing in the year 1962. The highest price rise of 205.35 % was observed in the case of gram dal and the lowest price rise of 2.46 % was noticed in the case of turmeric in 1966 over their corresponding prices in 1962.

"CHAPTER-IV"  
ANNUAL PLAN 1966-67

The Annual Plan 1966-67 was formulated without prejudice to the magnitude and dimensions of the fourth five year plan of the State. While drawing up the programme under each sector, the need to give highest priority to agricultural production, particularly to schemes which are in nature of quick-yielding results and help to augment production in the shortest possible time.

During the course of first two plans, comparatively smaller amounts were spent for the development programmes in Vidharbha and, therefore, additional allocations were made for the third plan programme in the division in order to make good the shortfall in developmental expenditure. These additional allotments made during the third five year plan period, were used for accelerating and intensifying the programmes under irrigation, Primary education and roads. During the Annual Plan 1966-67 an additional stress was given on Agricultural Production and minor irrigation and most of the allocations under these programmes were completely utilised.

The outlay for district level programmes of this district was of the order of Rs.204.72 Lakhs, against which the total expenditure incurred amounted to Rs. 158.10 Lakhs. Agricultural Programmes were given the highest priority in this district. More than half the total Annual Plan outlay was earmarked for the various agricultural programmes. The important feature of the agricultural programmes was the implementation



of different schemes for Intensive Agricultural Development for which this district was particularly selected. The programmes for co-operation and Community Development shared 13 percent of the total outlay, while schemes under Social Services accounted for a total outlay of about 24 percent of the total plan outlay for the district. Transport and Communications were allotted 8 percent of the total plan outlay where as the Industries and Minings were allotted the remaining one percent of the total plan outlay.

The overall performance of the plan programmes was substantial though not up to the mark. The total expenditure during the year 1966-67 amounted to Rs.158.10 Lakhs against the total outlay of Rs.204.72 Lakhs. The provisions set aside for almost all programmes however remained unspent to some extent.

#### AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMMES

The various schemes under Agricultural Programmes were specially aimed at improvement of agricultural productivity. The district was covered under package programme, because of its maximum irrigation potential for increasing the production, particularly of paddy crop, through Intensive Agricultural Methods. Soil Conservation measures, Minor Irrigation Works, Development of Forest and Fisheries were the other programmes, that were implemented in the district. The following table indicates the allotments and expenditure on these various programmes.

#### AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION

The package programme implemented in the district was a major activity under agricultural production. The total expenditure on this programme was Rs. 1.53 Lakhs covering an area of about 1,26,787 acres including 6,353 acres area under "Taichung Native-1", ~~and~~ a new high yielding variety of Paddy. Other usual programmes such as those relating to agricultural campaigns and development of crops etc. were also implemented in this district. The ~~details~~ details of achievements under various activities were as follows: -

SOIL CONSERVATION.

Terracing works in the paddy fields were completed covering an ~~xxx~~ area of 11,390 acres and the total expenditure on these works was of Rs.30.10 Lakhs.

MINOR IRRIGATION.

Minor Irrigation Works play an important role in the agricultural economy of the district. There are many large number of Ex-Malguzari Tanks in the district. The programme of renovation of these tanks for providing quick irrigation facilities was launched on a large scale. New irrigation wells and repairs to old wells were also taken up. The total expenditure on these minor irrigation works was of Rs. 44.55 Lakhs against a total provision of Rs. 51.91 Lakhs. In all 614 new irrigation wells have been constructed and 104 old irrigation wells were repaired during the plan period. In all 240 pump sets were installed during the year 1966-67.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY.

Amongst the programmes of Animal Husbandry the main emphasis was focussed in the improvement and development of cattle breeds. The expansion of veterinary services was also envisaged. The total expenditure on the programme in the District was Rs. 0.24 Lakhs, as against the budget provision of Rs.0.26 Lakhs. The remaining construction<sup>al</sup> works of three veterinary buildings were completed and 13 premium bulls were distributed during the plan year.

FOREST

Nearly 27.47 percent of the total areas of district is covered under forest. The development programme of forest was therefore quite important. In all Rs. 13.16 Lakhs have been expended on the various developmental schemes in the district against the total allocation of Rs. 14.91 Lakhs. The Plantation of valuable trees such as teak, ~~the~~ Eucalyptus etc. was done on 2,300 acres. The plantations of General utility timber & Bomboos were done on 1,825 acres and 675 acres respectively. The achievement in plantation schemes was however cent percent. In addition to these achievements forest roads of 9.80 Kms. length were constructed during the plan year.

FISHERIES.

The aim of the programme was to increase the production of fish and to improve the Socio-Economic conditions of the fishermen working in the field. There is ~~xxx~~ large scope for development of fisheries in this district because of larger facilities of water reservoirs. An expenditure of Rs. 0.40 Lakh was incurred on various schemes, against the plan provision of Rs. 0.74 Lakh under this sub-head. It was proposed to establish one more fish seed production farm near the Itiadh Project but the selection of site could not be done during the year. Sub-~~xx~~sidies were paid to fishermen for purchase of fishery requisites. The fishery co-operatives were granted loan for productive purposes.

CO-OPERATION AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

CO-OPERATION.

Co-operative movement has taken tremendous strides in Maharashtra. The State five year plans had sought the

promotion of co-operative organisations through financial supports, for undertaking different economic activities in the form of subsidies, share capital investments and loans according to needs. The programme during the third plan was however continued during the plan year under review and was concerned mainly with the development of co-operative marketing. Credit facilities were taken to the doors of the agriculturist co-operatives and co-operative farming were also extended.

An outlay of Rs. 4.42 Lakhs was fixed up for the various programmes under co-operation. The total expenditure during the plan year was reported to be Rs.1.01 Lakhs forming less than 25 percent of the financial targets. Under the scheme development of co-operative marketing loan was financed for construction of 42 Godowns. The membership of Agricultural Credit Societies Co-operative farming Societies and Processing Societies increased by more than five thousands, ten, and about five hundred respectively.

#### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT.

Community Development was described as a method of rural extension and as a agency through which the transformation of the social and economical life of villages was to be initiated. The concept of rural extension has broadened into that of Panchayat Raj. One of the principal tasks in the Third Five Year Plan was to ensure the growth and working of Panchayat Raj institutions so as to enable each area to realise its maximum development potential on the basis of local man power and other resources, Co-operative self help and community efforts, and effective use of the available resources and man-power.

During the third plan period five new blocks of pre-extension stage were converted into stage-I and the entire rural area was covered under this programme.

During the plan year under review the provision made for the programme was to the tune of Rs.23.60 Lakhs, where as the expenditure incurred was of Rs.19.15 Lakhs. Financial assistance of Rs. 3.94 Lakhs was made for Local Development Works.

#### SMALL SCALE AND COTTAGE INDUSTRIES.

For rural industrialisation there was a programme of financial assistance to the artisans, craftsman etc. for forming co-operatives. The total assistance given on this account <sup>was</sup> of Rs.0.24 Lakhs. In addition to this an amount of Rs.0.33 Lakhs <sup>was</sup> paid as an assistance to the handloom weavers co-operatives.

#### TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS

Transport by Road has much significance in this district, as it is ill equipped with railway facilities. At the end of Second Five Year Plan, the total road length in the district was 661 Kms. which in other words meant 7 Kms of road per 100 Sq.Kms of area. New roads of about 50 Kms. length were constructed during the Third Five Year Plan period. During plan year under review new roads of 136 Kms length were constructed. The total expenditure on the roads worked out to Rs. 15.72 Lakhs, as against the provision of Rs. 17.29 Lakhs.

SOCIAL SERVICES.

The programme of general education was emphasised as an important aspect of development. The total amount spent on this programme was Rs. 5.72 Lakhs, out of which Rs. 2.71 Lakhs were spent on primary education. At the end of the Third Five Year Plan, there were in all 610 Villages having no schooling facilities. In all 19 new primary schools were then started during this plan period, raising the total number of primary schools to 1,194. Three Secondary Schools were also started during this plan period.

Under the programme of technical education a mining polytechnic was started with an intake capacity of 40 students during the Third Five Year Plan period. To begin with, this polytechnic was started in the Government polytechnic at Nagpur and a decision has been taken by Govt. to locate this mining polytechnic school at Nagpur permanently.

Under the programme of Primary Health, Construction of building works of 5 Primary health centres were completed. The major programme was the control of communicable diseases, for which the total amount of expenditure was of Rs. 4.45 Lakhs, out of the total expenditure was of Rs. 9.57 Lakhs incurred on Public Health Programme. The National malaria eradication unit which was already in existence had done the work as per time schedule ~~dx~~ during the plan period. Under strengthening of the establishment against small pox 3.39 Lakhs<sup>s</sup> persons were vaccinated and re-vaccinated. Under the Family Planning Programme an amount of Rs. 5.12 Lakhs was spent and the vasectomy and tubectomy operations on 3,191 persons were performed and 3,954 loops were ~~xxxx~~ inserted against the target of 3,732 operations and 7,130 loops respectively during the plan period.

Under the housing programme, the scheme for Village housing was implemented and 227 tenements were constructed during the Third Plan period. During the plan year under review only one tenement was constructed.
