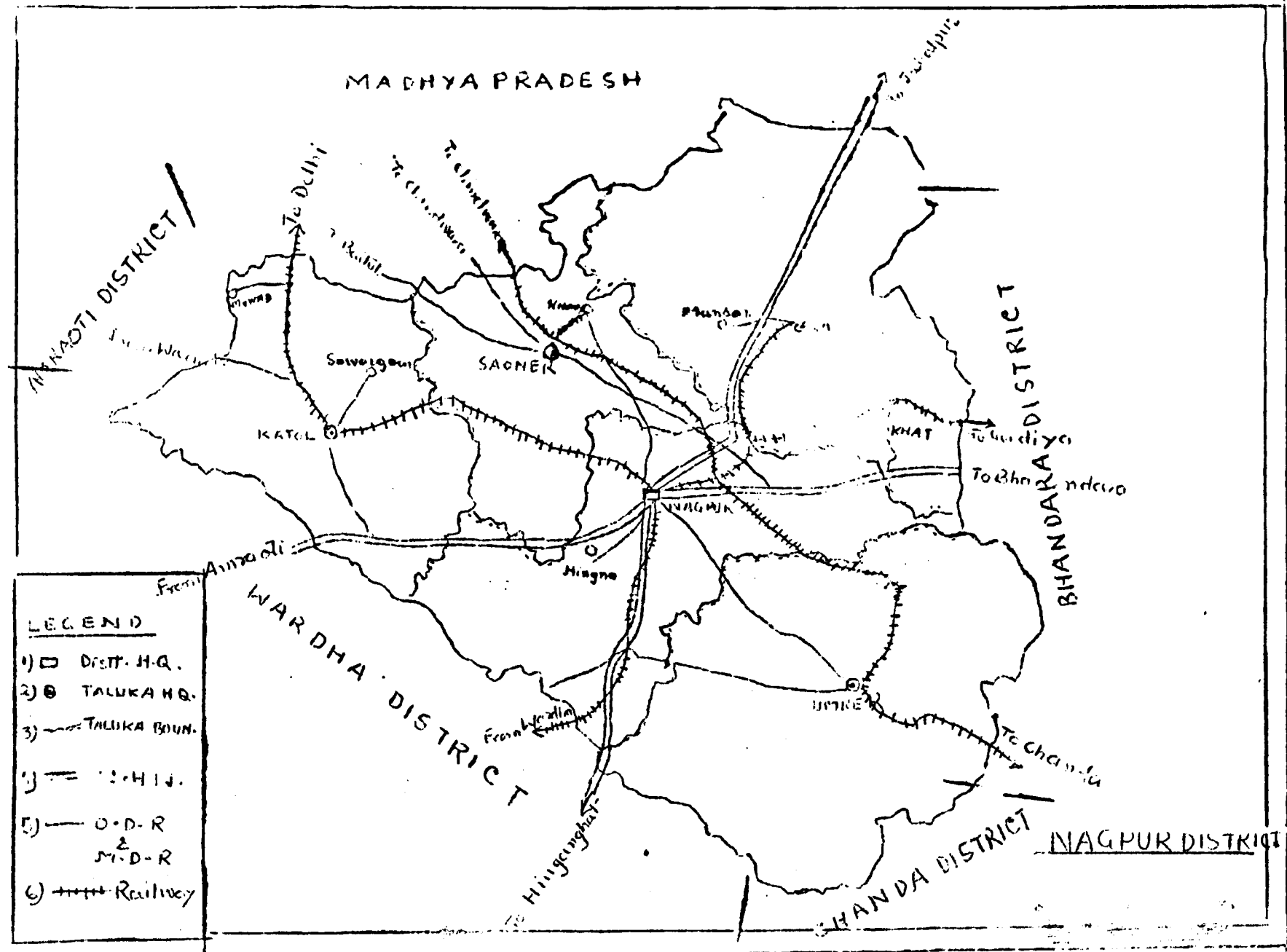

CHAPTER - I
Introduction

1.1 Introduction and Location :-

The district is one of the eight districts of Vidarbha, which according to the "MAHABHARAT" was the Kingdom of Damayant who was married to Nal. It is also mentioned in "MAHABHASYA", "YOGINTANTRA", "BHAGAWAT PURAN" and "BRIHATSAMHITA".

According to Historical records, Nandivardhana, the well known as the ancient capital of the Vakatakas was located at village Nandardhan (Nagardhan) about three miles from Ramtek. Nagpur, which was situated near it, may have marked the original site of the modern city of that name. Tradition, however, gives the credit for settling up the city of Nagpur to the Gond King Bakht Bulanda of Devagad in 1702. Burhan Sah was probably the last of the Gond Rulers, after which the area passed into the hands of Bhonsale dynasty which ruled till 1853, when it was annexed by Lord Dalhousie. The district, as at present, was formed in 1854. In 1861 the country with Saugar and Narbada territories was formed into the Central Provinces by Lord Canning with Nagpur as its Capital. The district lies between 20°36' and 21°43' North Latitude and 78°15' and 79°57' East Longitude in the plain to which it gives its name at the southern base of the Satpuda Hills.

1.2 Boundaries :-

The district is bounded on the north by the Chhindwada and Seoni districts of Madhya Pradesh, on the east by Bhandara district, on the south and west by Chandrapur and Wardha districts respectively, and along a small strip on the north-west by Amravati district. It has a total area of 9930 square kilometers (3834 sq. miles) forming 3.34 percent of the total area of Maharashtra with a population of 15,12,807 forming 3.82 percent of the population of Maharashtra.

1.3 Administrative set up :-

The district comprises 5 Sub-Divisions or talukas viz. Katol, Saoner, Ramtek, Nagpur and Umrer.

The Collector as the head is in charge of General Administration, Law and Order, treasury, Land Revenue and Civil Supplies. He is assisted by a Resident Deputy Collector, in his office and by Deputy Collectors who look after different branches. The Collector is also the District Magistrate. One of the Deputy Collectors is vested with the Magistrerial powers and is designated as the Additional District Magistrate. A Sub-Divisional Officer is put in charge of the administration of each of five talukas.

The Sub-Divisional Officer is assisted by a Tahsildar in his administrative functions. The taluka is further divided into revenue circles, each being put in charge of a Revenue Inspector.

Besides the Collectorate, there are many other District Offices of different departments, dealing in departmental matters.

For promoting development of democratic institutions and for securing greater participation of the people on development plans and local and Government affairs, a district level body, known as "Zilla Parishad" constituted with the councillors, chosen by elections from electoral divisions, was set up on 1st May, 1962. It has 44 councillors with no nominated members. Out of these 44 councillors one seat^{is} reserved for scheduled castes and 4 women councillor has been co-opted by the elected councillors. There are five associate councillors who are chair of Five Federal Co-operative Societies. The Parishad has jurisdiction corresponding to the district boundaries, excluding municipal towns, Municipal Corporation and Cantonment Board. The Parishad is presided over by the President who is elected amongst the councillors.

The work of the Zilla Parishad is carried out through a set of seven Subject Committees. For administration, there is a competent machinery headed by the Chief Executive Officer of Senior I.A.S. rank.

He has been vested with Full Administrative Powers for carrying out the provisions of the Maharashtra Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis Act of 1962. He is assisted by Officers of various departments. The Finance branch of the Zilla Parishad, is controlled by the Chief Accounts and Finance Officer and this branch works on the lines of the Finance Department of the State Government.

At the Block level the Panchayat Samiti comprises all elected and co-opted councillors from area of the Block and a chairman of a Co-operative Society in the area of the Block is a co-opted member. Two Sarpanchas from each electoral division who are electoral division who are elected by members of Village Panchayat are elected as members of Panchayat Samiti. The area of the Panchayat Samiti corresponds to the Block area. The Block Development Officers work as secretaries of Panchayat Samitis with Executive authority vested in them.

Except for a few safe-guards, the developmental and administrative functions of Government are now devolved on Zilla Parishad and Panchayat Samitis and the State Government has thus divested it self of the responsibility of local activities.

1.4 Area and territorial changes.

The area, number of villoges, population etc. covered by each taluka according to 1961 census is shown in the following table.

Nagpur district previously included areas which now are partly in Wardha and partly in Bhandara districts. The area now constituting Wardha district was separated in 1862. There were only four talukas upto the year 1908, when a new taluka was created with its headquarters at Saoner. There were no major changes in the boundaries of the district or talukas from 1911 onwards. With the reorganisation of states, the district was transferred from Madhya Pradesh to erst-while bilingual Bombay State and subsequently formed part of Maharashtra since 1st May, 1960.

1.5 Topography :-

The district has an average elevation between 274.50 and 305 meters (900 and 1000 feet) above sea level and its relief is characterised, by and large, by the residual hill ranges of the Satpudas and their detached ranges enclosing between them undulating black soil valleys. Much of the topography is typically one of the Deccan Trap having flat-topped and terraced features, low buttressed sides and isolated knolls. Eastwards and north-eastwards, the landscape changes in an interesting manner due to the changes in the underlying rocks. The rocks of Gondwana series are not only important because of their coal and manganese deposits but in their surface expression they present a low rolling topography with a deep soil cover.

The district can be broadly divided into three zones viz. i) The hilly area in the north, ii) the plateau region in the west and iii) the Kanhan and Wunna Basins in the centre, south and east. The general slope of the district except in Katol talhsil is towards east or south east. The slope in Katol is, however, towards the west.

1.6 Hills, River, system, Soils.

The main system of hills is the Satpuda and its offshoots.

In the north, a strip of the Satpuda hills is included within the district, narrow on the west but widening to a breadth of 19 Kms. or more towards the east.

A few hills to the south of the main Satpuda ranges are two minor lines of hills to the west and east of the Pench river. Those to the west are between Bhingarh

A few miles to the south of the main Satpuda ranges are two minor lines of hills to the west and east of the Pench river. Those to the west are between Bhingarh and Parsivani, terminating in the peak of Tekari. East of the Pench are the Mansar hills and after a gap of few kilometres comes the well known Rantak hills, rising to 427 Kms. (1400 feet) at Rantak 5 Kms. (Three Miles) east of Rantak, the Sur river has forced a passage through the hills, but beyond it they continue as the Ambagarh range of Bhandara.

The second main bill range extends along the south-east of the district from Khargurh on the Wardha river to the junction of Wardha and Chandrapur with Nagpur. It separates the valley of Kar from that of Jam upto Kondhali and further south-east forms the watershed between the latter river and the Bor.

The third main range runs northwards through Katol from Kondhali to Kolod, separating the Wardha and the Wainganga valleys. The highest peak of it is a Pilkapar.

The Wardha and the Wainganga are the chief rivers of the district. The Wardha flows along the part of the western border and controls the drainage system of the western part of the district. The Wainganga flows along the part of the eastern border and controls the drainage system of the central and eastern portions of the district. It forms the district boundary with Bhandara district for some distance.

Among the important tributaries of the Wardha are the Jam and the Wunna. The Jam flows through Katol taluka and joins the Wardha on its border at Jalalkheda. The Wunna flows along the northern base of the Kauras plateau in Nagpur taluka. It then takes southern course and passes out of the district at Ashta to join the Wardha river in Wardha district.

The Kanhan is the most important tributary of the Wainganga. It rises in the Satpuda hills in the north and after flowing south-east joins the Wainganga on the eastern border of the district at Gondpipri. It receives the Pench, the Kolar and the Nag rivers in its course as its important tributaries.

The Kanhan river provides drinking water to Nagpur city, and lands situated on its banks are very fertile.

The main soils of the district are kali (Medium deep black cotton), morand (comparatively light deep light brown in colour), Khardi (shallow, mixed with sand and hence of grayish colour) and bardhi (red gravel with boulders). Medium deep black soil is found around Kalneshwar and Saoner, in the Wardha valley and in the Nagpur and Kamptee Plains. The principal soil of the district is known as morand. It is very suitable for cotton and jowar and is found in all talukas. In the western part of Rantek taluka especially in the valley of the Sur river, the morand soil is of very light colour. Khardi is the regular vice land in the eastern part of the district. Bardhi is found on the summits and slopes of hills, principally in the Katol taluka.

1.7 Climate, Temperature and Rainfall :-

The climate of the district is dry and salubrious. Nagpur city is, however one of the hottest places in India and May is the hottest month of the year.

The rainy season starts from the second week of June and lasts upto the end of September. It is followed by sultry weather in October, cold season from November to February, and hot weather from March to May. Though the cold weather is of a short duration, the climate during this season is extremely pleasant. In summer although days are hot, the nights are comparatively cool. Maximum temperature recorded at Nagpur city in the year 1966 was 44.6° c in June 66 and minimum 6.9° c in December 1966.

Rainfall is not uniform in all parts of the district. It is comparatively light in the west and heavy in the east. It gradually increases from west to east. The average rainfall on western most taluka of Katol is 1011 m.m. while it is 1211 m.m. in Rantek taluka which is eastern most.

The rains start in the second week of June but they are very weak at the out-set. Occasionally there are breaks in July and August. Hail pours down occasionally January, February and early part of March, sometimes in large stones, causing damage to spring crops.

The seasonal pattern of rainfall is more or less uniform in all parts of the district. Nearly 85 percent of rains are received during the period from June to September. The cold weather rains are advantageous to the rabi crops, provided they are light and well distributed. Showers in hot months are accompanied by dust storms of considerable severity.

The district has rarely suffered on account of shortage of rains. The Food Finding committee appointed by the Government of Bombay in 1960 has opined that the district is free from famine and scarcity conditions.

CHAPTER - II

Explanatory notes

(VIII)

The statistical data presented in this abstract are divided into 13 groups. A brief summary of tables and explanatory notes on each group of table are given in the following paragraphs.

Explanatory notes on certain tables are given below :-

1) Climate & rainfall:-

Table No. 1 :- " Normal rainfall " in column 3 denotes the average of rainfall during the years1956..... to1965.....

The climate of Nagpur District is dry and salubrious. Nagpur city has the only Meteorological Observatory in the district maintained by the Regional Meteorological Centre, Nagpur and therefore the temperature recorded of Nagpur Aerodrome is reported. The highest temperature during 1966 recorded at Nagpur city was 44.6°C in the month of June, 1966 while it was lowest being 6.9°C in the month of December 1966. Rainfall during 1966 was not uniform and well distributed in the district. All the centres have recorded rainfall below the average.

The seasonal distribution of rain fall is more or less uniform in all parts of the district. About 85 per-cent of rainfall is received during the period from June to Sept.

The average rainfall of the District during the year 1966 is 878.1% maximum and minimum rainfall was 1255.5 and 667.8 mm.

Table No. 3 :- The terms " rural " and " urban " under column 3 are defined as follows according to 1961 census .

A town or an urban area is defined as a place which has

1. a municipality, a cantonment or civil lines

or

2.(i) a population of 5,000 or over

and

(ii) at least 3/4 or more of male workers are engaged in

non-agricultural pursuits. (2)

Rural population is a population of all Villages in a revenue unit.

A " Village " is a statutorily recognised village having a defined boundary and separate land records. Hamlets, Wadies or Padas have, therefore, not been shown as separate villages. On the other hand statutorily recognised villages having no population have been shown separately as " uninhabited " villages. Villages also includes forest villages comprising mostly forest labourers and their families.

Table No. 5 :- Town is a urban area as defined under table No. 3

Table No. 6 :- A person is classified as a worker if -

- (a) in case of seasonal work like cultivation, livestock, dairying, household industry, etc., he has had some regular work of more than one hour a day throughout the greater part of the working season; and
- (b) in the case of regular employment in any trade, profession, service, business or commerce, he was employed during any of the 15 days preceding the day of enumerator's visit to the household.

Workers are classified into the following nine categories of economic activity :-

1. As cultivator
2. As agricultural labourer
3. In Mining, Quarrying, Livestock, Forestry, Fishing, Hunting and Plantations, Orchards and allied activities.
4. At household Industry
5. In Manufacturing other than Household Industry
6. In construction
7. In Trade and Commerce
8. In Transport, Storage and Communications
9. In Other services

Table No. 7 :- " Mother tongue " is defined as a language spoken by the person's mother to the person in his childhood or mainly spoken in the house, Dialects have been included in the main languages on the basis of Grierson's Classification.

Scheduled tribes :- No caste is notified as schdeule tribe in the district.

2) Population of Nagpur district, according to 1961 census was 15,12,807, forming nearly 3.82 percent of the population of Maharashtra. The rural areas of the district accounted for 47.93 percent of the total population where as the remaining 52.07 percent was found in urban areas.

Nagpur district is relatively more urbanised than the state where in percentage of urban population is 28.2. This high percentage of urban population was mainly due to Nagpur city had nearly doubled (101.46percent) during last 60 years since 1901 and had increased by 22.54 percent during the decade 1951-61

The density of population per square kilo - meter for Nagpur district was 152 (392per sq.mile) which was higher as compared to Maharashtra where on it was 129 (334 per sq. mile). Among the talukas , density was highest in Nagpur with 394 persons per Sq.Km.(1022 per Sq. mile) and lowest with 75 persons per Sq.Kilometer (195 per Sq.Mile) in Rantek taluka. Because of Nagpur city the density of Population was highest in Nagpur taluka.

The distribution of population by size of villages showed that about 73.22 percent of the total number of villages have less than 500 population , where as in Maha- rashtra as a shole only 47.72 percent of the villages have a population of less than 500 in each of them.

This shows that the district comprises mostly small villages. The average population per village in 1961 works out to '439' for the district as against 792 for Maharashtra. The number of villages per 100 square kilometer was about 17 in the district as against 12 in Maharashtra.

No Scheduled Tribes had been enumerated in Nagpur district during the 1961 census, while the total scheduled caste population in 1961 formed 3.60 percent of the total population of the district. The proportion of scheduled castes had decreased from 18.11 percent in 1951 to 3.60 percent in 1961 census; because a large number of persons belonging to Mahar caste had returned themselves during 1961 census as Buddhist or "Nav. Buddha".

The concept of dependency which was adopted during the 1951 census had been abandoned for economic classification in the 1961 census. Instead, the population had been classified as workers and non-workers. The workers were further classified into nine categories of economic activity. The population of workers in Nagpur district was 46.5 percent where as it is 47.9 percent in Maharashtra. The proportion of workers in different categories of economic activity in Nagpur district differed significantly with that of Maharashtra state as a whole because of a very high proportion of urban population in the district. The percentage of persons classified as cultivators and agricultural labourers was 14.9 and 10.1 respectively, and these two categories together accounted for 25 percent of the population of Nagpur district. It was quite low as compared to corresponding percentage of 33.5 for Maharashtra.

(ii) Forests :- All actually forested area on the lands classed or administered as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests, whether State owned or private.

1. (iii) Barren and unculturable land :-

(XII)

All barren and unculturable land like mountain, deserts, etc (land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost) is classed as unculturable whether such land is in an insulated block or within cultivated holdings)

2. Land put to non-agricultural uses:-

All lands occupied by buildings roads, and railways or under water, e.g. rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agricultural.

3. Culturable Wastes :-

All lands available for cultivation, whether or not taken up for cultivation or abandoned after five years for one reason or the other. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. They may be assessed or unassessed and may be insulated blocks or within cultivated but not cultivated for five years in succession is also included in this category, at the end of the five years.

4. Permanent pastures or other grazing lands :-

All grazing lands whether permanent pastures and meadows or otherwise.

5. Land under miscellaneous trees, crops and groves not included in the net area sown.

All cultivable land which is not included under net area sown but is put to some agricultural use. Lands under casurina trees, thatching grass bamboo bushes and other groves used for fuel, etc. which are not included under "orchards" will be classed under this.

6. Current fallows :-

Lands which are left fallow during the current year only.

7. Other fallow lands :-

All lands which were taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than one year and not more than five years. The reasons for keeping such lands fallow may be inter alia one of the following :-

1. Poverty of the cultivators ;
2. Inadequate water - supply ;
3. Malarial climate ;
4. Silting of canals and rivers ; or
5. Unremunerative nature of farming etc.

8. Net area sown :-

Net area sown represents the area sown to crops counting areas sown more than once in the same year only once. This represents the difference between the total geographical area and sum of area under forests, barren and unculturable land, land put to non-agricultural uses, culturable waste, permanent pastures and other grazing lands, miscellaneous tree crops and groves, not included in net area sown, other fallow land and current fallows.

9. Area sown more than once :-

Area sown with two or more than two crops and counted more than once in the same year.

10. Total cropped area :-

This is the total of Net area sown and area sown more than once.

IV Irrigation .

Table No. 15 :- The cost of Minor irrigation project is up to a maximum of Rs. 20 lakhs .

Table No. 16 :-

The cost of a Medium irrigation project ranges between Rs. 20 lakhs to Rs. 5 crores where as that of a Major irrigation project it is Rs. 5 crores and above .

3. Agriculture :-

The area figures in the various agricultural tables are shown in hectares . One acre is equivalent to 0.4047 hectare.

Out of the total geographical area in the district, about 53.9 percent is under cultivation in 1965-66. The percentage of area under cultivation has decreased by 0.3 as compared to that in the year 1964-65 . The district had considerably lower percentage of areas under barren and cul-

Uncultural waste and old and current fallows. The proportion of permanent pastures (Permanent Pastures means land utilised for grazing whether it is a permanent pasture and meadow or not) to the total geographical area has comparatively such higher being 11.5 percent.

The proportion of net area sown to the geographical area range between 39.4 percent in Ramtek taluka has a very high proportion of area under forests being 37.1 percent and hence the proportion to net area sown was substancially low in that taluka.

During 1965-66 the proportion of food crops to the gross cropped area was about 75.0 percent . The proportion of area under jowar the highest amongst the food crops. The percentage of area under jowar to the gross cropped area was about 41.2 percent and 3 41.7 percent respectively. The proportion of wheat and paddy to the gross cropped area was about 13.3 percent and 3.8 percent respectively during that.

period where as the proportion of pulses to gross cropped area was about 10.2 percent

The area under non-food crops was about 25.0 percent of the gross cropped area . Among non-food crops cotton and oil seeds were the main crops . which covered most of the area under non-food crops .

The proportion of gross irrigated area to gross cropped area was about 4.4 percent while proportion of net irrigated area to net sown area was also 4.4 percent. The proportion of area irrigated by wells , tanks and Government canals accounted for 66.1 percent , 19.3 percent and 3.7 percent respectively and remaining 5.9 percent of the area was irrigated by other sources . Out of the gross irrigated about 96.5 percent was under food crops and 3.5 percent under non-food crops .

Rice , Wheat , Fruits and vegetables and miscellaneous crops are important crops under irrigation.

Table No. 24 :-

In the reserved forests broadly speaking every thing is an offence that is not permitted while in the protected forest nothing is an offence that is not prohibited.

4 Animal Husbandry, Forest and Fisheries :-

Total number of livestock population in the district according to the livestock census 1966 was about 851458 out of which 89.7 percent were enumerated in rural areas. The livestock population increased by about 4.7 percent during the period 1964 to 1966. Cattle formed of 67.44 percent of the total livestock population being the highest. The number of goats being next in numerical order formed 20.7 percent of the total livestock population while the buffaloes accounted for 7.3 percent of the total livestock population. Poultry however recorded a decrease of about 19.6 percent in 1966 over to that in 1961.

An artificial insemination centre functions at Telangkhedi for development of livestock. An animal Geneticist section with a well equipped laboratory has also been functioning at Nagpur and cater to the artificial insemination centre and sub-centres.

The central poultry farm located at Nagpur undertakes poultry breeding, management and research in poultry science.

The live stock mortality had increased in case of cattle and bovine and sheeps and goats while it is decreased in case of poultry during 1966-67 as compared to 1965-66. The increase was mainly due to the diseases haemorrhagic, septiceamias, black quarter and other contagious and parastic diseases in case of cattle and bovine while increase in case of sheeps and goats was due to other contagious and parastic diseases.

Forest area is classied into three types of forest viz "Reserved forest , "Protected " forest and "unclassed" forest. In the year 1879 . Government declared the forests in Nagpur division as ' protected ' under Indian Forests Act VII of 1878 . These forests, Thereafter , were constituted into Reserved Forests under the Indian Forests Act during the period from 1879 to 1893 . The working of forests was not, however, regulated then by any scheme or plan.

The area under forests According to the Forest Department is 22.8 percent of the total area of the district is under Forests . Out of the total area under Forest 47.4 percent is under " reserved " forest , 34.0 percent is under " protected " forest and the remaining 18.6 percent is under " unclassed " forest. The value of forest produce has increased , by 37 percent during 1966-67 as compared to the year 1965-66.

Fisheries :-

Fishing activities in the district are naturally restricted to inland waters only, rivers , tanks and ponds being the principal sources. The commercially important important varieties of fish formed in the district are Murrel , Dhadkya, Betri , Padhan, Tambu, Karvadi, Poshti, Dhcara , Gane of Kanheri , Chela etc . At some places the fishing activity is carried on through co-operative societies which have been given financial assistance in the form of loan and subsidy to fishermen . The fisheries department has also provided loan and subsidy to individuals for the fishing activity.

5 - Industry , Mining , Employment & ElectricityIndustry :-

Nagpur city is an important industrial centre in Maharashtra , Industrial development has taken place mostly at Nagpur city and at a few smaller towns , of the total working factories in district about 90 percent of them are located in Nagpur taluka alone.

There are a number of large scale units such as cotton textiles , Cotton Ginning and Pressing , Saw mills , Paper and straw Board , Ceramics, Ferro-Manganese , steel rolling etc. Out of the total factories about 32.4 percent are saw mills employing approximately 5.4 percent of the total factory workers . The percentage of factories manufacturing machinery other than electrical machinery works out to about 8.3 percent employing 3.7 percent of the total factory workers. The factories engaged in spinning , weaving and finishing of cotton textiles though account for only about 1.6 percent of the total number of factories has a maximum number of workers forming 48.6 percent of the total number of factory workers.

Mining :-

The district is outstandingly rich in mineral wealth. In addition to known occurrences in the district large areas still remain unexploited for preliminary prospecting. The valuable minerals like Manganese, Coal, Limestone and Dolomite , white clay, Mica etc. are found in the district.

Electricity :-

The only power generating station in the district is at Khaparkheda which supplies power to other districts also. The power supply was slightly improved during the year 1966-67 as compared to the year 1965-56 and there was an increase by 3.2 percent in the consumption of electricity during the year 1966-67. The proportion of electricity used for industrial purposes was

about 46.1 percent of total electricity consumed which increased by 0.5 percent as compared to the previous year. All the 12 towns have already been electrified covering a population of 787700. Out of the total inhabited villages 27.7 percent of men have been electrified upto the end of the year 1966-67. The total population covered by electrification worked out to 73.8 percent. This high percentage is obviously due to coverage of entire Nagpur city.

Employment :-

The registration of persons during 1966-67 had gone down by about 0.4 percent as compared to 1965-66. During 1966-67 about 53.6 percent were placed in employment all of the total number of vacancies notified as against 52.0 percent during previous year. About 31.1 percent of the candidates placed in employment during 1966-67 belonged to scheduled caste and scheduled tribes as against 27 percent during previous year. The number of employers using employment had gone down by 12.2 percent during the year as compared to previous year.

6. Co-operation.

The co-operative movement has made great stricks during the last three plan periods. All the villages in the district have already been covered by agricultural credit societies. There were 1799 Co-operative societies in the district at the end of June 1967 out of which 42.0 percent were Co-operative credit societies (including agricultural as well as non agricultural credit) while the remaining 58 Percent were of non-credit types. In all 36.5 percent of the total number of societies were of the agricultural credit type.

Amongst the other important types of societies the following were prominent.

- 1) Housing Societies (259)
- 2) Consumer Stores (229)
- 3) Handloom Weavers Societies (171)
- 4) Animal Husbandry including Dairy societies (62)
- 5) Salary earners (71)

The Co-operative credit societies perform a vital function of providing cheap credit to the cultivators. Apart from this, some of the important types of co-operatives registered in the district as shown above include agricultural marketing, consumers stores, co-operative farming, industrial co-operatives, housing and dairy societies.

There has been increase in the membership, share capital reserve and other funds, working capital and loan advanced in respect of agricultural co-operative societies in the year 1966-67 as compared to the previous year.

7- Medical and Public Health :-

The urban as well as rural population of Nagpur district is well served by a fairly large number of hospitals and dispensaries. Medical facility is also availed by the people from other districts also at the hospitals located in the Nagpur city. The various public and public aided medical institutions functioning in the district included hospitals, dispensaries, Maternity homes, Primary health centres and Ayurvedic hospital and dispensaries.

As per 1961 census 3461 persons were engaged in medical and public health profession in the district. This meant that for every 437 persons, there was one person engaged in medical profession in the district. There were 155 beds for one lakh population in the district during 1966-67.

8- Education :-

As per the 1961 Population census the district had highest literacy percentage (35.15) in the Nagpur Division and ranked second in Maharashtra. The percentage of literacy among males and females in the district as in the district as per 1961 census was 48.06 and 21.26 respectively out of the 1653 inhabited villages in Nagpur district, 1284 villages or 77 percent of the total

villages had schools in them . There was one primary school for every 943 persons in 1966-67 and during that period there were 567 students in secondary stage of education for every 1000 students in primary stage of education in the district.

There are very good facilities for higher education in the district. Nagpur city is an important centre of college education in Maharashtra . Almost all types of colleges have been established and facilities for Medical , Engineering , Agriculture, veterinary courses are also provided in the Nagpur city.

9- Transport and communication :-

The district is well served by rail. The Central and South - Eastern Railway operate in the district. There was no change in the length of railway routes. The existing railway length in the district is 3.4 kilometers per 100 sq. kilo meters and 22.1 kilometers per lakh of population.

The district is also well connected by roads with adjoining districts of Wardha, Chanda, Bhandara Amravati and to some of the district places in Madhya Pradesh . The district head quarter is connected with all taluka places in the district. The road length in the district during the year 1966-67 were 9.8 kilometers per 100 square kilometers and 4.2 kilometers per lakh of population.

The roads are classified in to (1) National High ways (2) State High Ways ,(3) Major District Roads (4) Other district Roads and (5) Village Roads . The proportion of these roads to the total road length during 1966-67 was 22.7 ; 23.4 ; 19.3 ; 26.0 and 8.6 percent respectively . According to surface classification of road length it is found that 0.3 percent of roads are of cement concrete , 63.6 percent of roads are ~~blank~~ topped, 31.5 percent are water bound macadam and the remaining 4.6 percent are of granular material and of lower type . Out of total road length 55.5 percent / ^{of} it was under control

of Buildings and Communication Deptt. and 44.5 percent under Zilla Parishad Nagpur.

Nagpur is a centrally situated city in India and ^{as} such is an important airport. The Nagpur a/crodrone is situated 5 miles away from the city is located at Sonegach village merged in Nagpur Corporation. Planes coming from Bombay, Delhi, Calcutta and Madras touch the air port.

10. Local Bodies :-

A village Panchayat represent local self government at the village level. All the revenue villages were covered by the village panchayats. Forest villages were, however excluded. About 66 percent of the total income of all village panchayats during 1965-66 was in the form of grants-in-aid while 16 percent of it was by way of taxes and fees and the remaining 18 percent was derived from contributions donations and other sources.

Nagpur Zilla Parishad came into existence on 1-5-1962. Out of a total revenue receipts of Rs. 3,02,03,657 of Nagpur Zilla Parishad during 1966-67, 95.2 percent of it was by way of Government grants, while only 4.8 percent was formed self raised resources. Out of the receipts from self raised resources 67 percent was from local fund cess; 3.9 percent from taxes; while 29.1 percent of it was realised from other heads. The Zilla Parishad had spent on an average Rs. 41.9 per person during 1956-67 as against Rs. 44.95 during 1965-67. Out of total revenue expenditure during 1966-67 8.6 percent was spent on General Administration; 54.7 percent on Education; 4.6 percent on Medical and public Health; 3.5 percent on Agriculture and Animal Husbandry; 5.1 percent on Social Welfare; 3.4 percent on community Development; 10.4 percent on Buildings and Communication and 9.7 percent on other miscellaneous heads.

There are 10 Municipalities, one Municipal Corporation and one Cantonment Board in the district during the year 1966-67. Out of the total income of all Municipalities and cantonment Board during 1966-67,.....

77.2 percent was from rates and taxes while 10.6 percent was from Government grants and 12.2 percent from other sources. Out of the total expenditure of Municipalities and Cantonment Board ; 8.6 percent was on General Administration and cost of collection of taxes ; 4.8 percent on public safety, 31.1 percent on Public Health and convenience ; 11.1 percent on public works ; 21.2 percent on Public Instructions and 2.2 percent on other heads . The Municipalities on an average collected Rs. 25.6 per person by way of taxes .

11 Plan and Community Development :-

The year 1966-67 was the first year of the 4 th Five Year Plan. Since the Fourth Five Year Plan of the country could not be finalised for several reasons, the yearly development programmes have been drawn by up keeping in view of the main objectives of the longterm plan and within the limited resources that would be available for the year.

In drawing up the Annual Plan the main objective objective and policies of the state's Fourth Plan as set out in the memorandum on the Fourth Plan have been kept in view. The annual Plan laid emphasis on the productive sectors of the plan and includes provision for the key programme. The key-note to the Annual Plan was however the consolidation of gains already made, avoidance of inflationary spending and enlargement of those areas of operation where optimum gains accrue within the shortest possible time and utmost economy.

The total outlay of Annual Plan 1966-67 for Nagpur district was of Rs. 234.15 lakhs . Agricultural Programmes were given priority by allotting about 42 percent of the total provision for them , The programmes included under " Social Services were allotted about 34 percent of the total provision; while 14 percent of the total provision was set out for road development programme The remaining 10 % of allocation was expended on other sub Heads of development . All the Plan Programmes

were mostly implemented as per targets fixed for the district and the total expenditure booked was to the tune of Rs. 222.88 lakhs . The distribution of the total expenditure incurred was 34.74 percent under Agricultural Programmes ; 13.92 percent under co-operation and community Development ; 3.25 percent under Industry and Mining; 15.16 percent under Transport and communications and 32.93 percent under social services . The entire rural area was covered by the Community Development Programme in the district . On 31 st March 1967 stage I blocks covered 26.70 percent of the rural population , stage II blocks covered 38.43 percent and remaining 34.87 percent of the rural population was covered by Post Stage II blocks. Physical achievements of certain selected items are given in table number 72.

12 Prices :-

In the year 1966-67 , Jowar, Rice, Wheat, Bajra, Sugar etc . were controlled commodities under statutory Rationing and hence these were not marketed in the Nagpur city, which was a rationed area . The prices of these commodities were fixed by Government and there was no remarkable change in these commodities except that of sugar for which price was increased by eight paise per Kg. in April 1966. Due to inadequate rains in the year 1965-and 1966 agricultural production decreased considerably and prices of almost all commodities like cereals, pulses, oils, and miscellaneous items under food had shown an increase in prices. The average consumer price index has increased from 134 in January 66 to 152 in December 66. The price trend in rural areas of the district was identical with the price trend at Nagpur city.

13 Miscellaneous :-

Nagpur city which was the former capital of Madhya Pradesh and now the 2 nd capital of Maharashtra state is an important educational, commercial and cultural centre in Vidarbha. There were 30 permanent/¹semi permanent and 9 touring cinema theatres in the district in 1966-67 out of which 21 were located Nagpur city alone . There were 56

banking offices in the district which were located in 14 different places having more than 50 percent population of the district. About eleven thousand insurance policies of 5 crores and 7 lakhs were issued during the year 1966-67. During the general election held in February 1967 more than 65 percent of the total electorate have polled their votes.

CHAPTER - III

IMPORTANT INDICATORS

XXV

In this chapter the progress of development covering roughly the period of Third Five Year Plan and First Annual Plan 1966-67 has been reviewed by presenting talukawise sectorial trends based on certain important indicators of development. Comparative talukawise figures for 1961-62 and 1966-67 or 1960-61 and 1965-66 as the case may be, have been given to bring out the pace of development.

Indicator No. 1 :- Percentage of gross sown area.

The district accounted for the lowest percentage of area sown more than once to the net area sown in Nagpur Division as well as in Maharashtra during 1961-62 when it stood last amongst the 26 districts of Maharashtra and as 8th district of this region. The following table shows the percentage of gross cropped area to net cropped area.

From the above table it is seen that the proportion of gross cropped area has decreased in 1965-66 over 1961-62 in Rantek and Umrer talukas while it slightly increased in other talukas during this period. The decrease of the proportion of gross cropped area to net cropped area in these two talukas was mainly due to inadequate rains during the year 1965 which affected double

cropping to some extent . The irrigation facilities in these two talukas comprise water from canals which were mostly dry during the rabi season of the year . The year 1965-66 was a drought year to some extent as compared to the year 1960-61 which was supposed to be the best agricultural year.

Indicator No. 2 :- Productivity of important crops:-

The year 1960-61 is supposed to be the best agricultural year which has broken all past records of outturn of crops. The year 1965-66 was a drought year which had affected Nagpur all crops in most of the part of the district. In some part rabi crops were not sown due to inadequate rains and hence the gross cropped area also decreased. The total irrigated area was also much less during the year 1965-66 as compared to the irrigated area in 1960-61 as most of the taluks were dry.

The following table shows outturn of different crops during 1960-61 and 1965-66.

From the above table it is seen that production of all crops except groundnut has decreased. The production of ground-nut had increased mainly due to increase in area under groundnut during 1965-66 as compared to the year 1960-61. The percentage of decrease in production during 1965-66 as compared to 1960-61 is maximum in the case of production of total cereals, "total pulses" and tur.

Indicator No. 3 :- Gross Value of Agricultural Production

As the relevant price data required are not available, the gross value of agricultural produce could not be calculated.

Indicator No. 4 :- Percentage of irrigated area.

The irrigation facilities are very meagre in the district. Canal irrigation in the district depends on the rains. Canal irrigation during the year 1965-66 had considerably decreased due to inadequate rains. Tank irrigation had also decreased to some extent. The following table shows the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area.

Though the area under irrigation had decreased in the year 1965-66 the percentage of gross irrigated area to net irrigated area remained unchanged in the district as a whole.

This percentage had increased remarkably in Saoner taluka and had slightly decreased in Ramtek taluka while it remained steady in other talukas. The irrigated area in Katol, Saoner and some part of Nagpur taluka is mostly under oranges where the possibility of a second crop is ruled out.

The following table shows percentage of net irrigated area to net sown area.

From the above table it can be seen that the proportion of net area irrigated to net area sown had decreased in all talukas except in Katol taluka.

There is a remarkable decrease in Ramtek taluka due to non-availability of canal water from the canal which is the main source of irrigation in that taluka,

Indicator No. 5 :- Changes in the crops pattern.

In Nagpur district, Katol, Saoner, and part of Nagpur talukas grow mainly kharif jowar and cotton while other areas of the district grow paddy, rabi jowar, and wheat and linseed. Among the food crops main crops under irrigation are oranges other fruits and vegetable and paddy while cotton is the main irrigated crop among non-food crops.

The following table shows to percentage under food and non-food crops in each taluka during 1960-61 and 1965-66.

From the above table it is seen that area under food crops in all talukas had decreased to some extent during the last six years. Area under cotton and oil seeds had increased in almost all the talukas. Under food crops area under dranges and chillies had also increased considerably at the cost of food grains as they are main cash crops of the district. The decrease in area under food crops during 1965-66 over 1960-61 was mainly due to non-sowing of rabi crops such as wheat jowar etc. due to insufficient and growing preference of cultivators to cultivate cash crops in general. The area under food crops was comparatively more in Ramtek and Umrer talukas as the lands in these two talukas are not suitable for cotton. In other talukas cotton is grown on large areas.

The distribution of irrigated areas among food crops and non-food crops is given in the following table.

The area irrigated in Ramtek and Umrer talukas was mostly under rice and wheat which accounted for higher percentage of area irrigated under cereals. Area irrigated in other talukas mainly consisted of oranges, chillies and food grains. Among non-food crops, cotton was the main irrigated crop particularly in Katol and Saoner talukas while in Nagpur taluka irrigated area was mainly under cotton and miscellaneous non food crops.

Indicator No. 6 :- Increase in agricultural credit and outstanding dues etc.

Agricultural credit plays an important roll in development of agriculture. The number of agricultural credit societies was the largest in the district in the period under review. The following table shows number of Primary Agricultural Credit Societies, loans advanced and outstanding dues during the year 1965-66 and 1966-67. Talukawise break-up for 1960-61 is, however, not available.

The number of societies during 1965-66 and 1966-67 remained unchanged in the district as a whole with a meagre decrease of only one society; while the loans advanced had increased by 4.7 percent during 1966-67 as compared to the year 1965-66, Similarly the amount of loans outstanding had also showed an increase of 23.74 percent during 1966-67 over 1965-66. In 1961-62, there were 651 Primary Agricultural Credit Societies in the district. The amount of loan advanced during 1961-62 was Rs. 9311 thousands and the amount of loan outstanding was Rs. 14654 thousands, which meant that there was an increase of 106.9 percent in the amount of loans advanced in 1966-67 as compared to the year 1961-62

Indicator No. 7 - Agricultural wage rates.

Since last few years the price line has shown an upward trend. The agricultural wage rates have also increased during 1966 as compared to the year 1964. Agricultural wage rates were collected regularly from June 1963 at three selected centres at Parseoni in Ramtek taluka, at Kuhi in Umrer taluka and at Dhapewada in Saoner taluka. Since January 1964 Parseoni Centre was substituted by Mouda in the same taluka.

As it is generally found that no carpenters, Black smiths, cobblers and Herdsmen and employed in rural area on daily wage basis the wage rates for these categories were not available.

The average agricultural wage rates (field labour) for selected centres are given in the following table.

The average wage rates for males during 1966 were highest at Kuhi and lowest at Dhapewada, while for females the rates were highest at Mouda and lowest at Dhapewada. In general the wage rates both for males and females had increased during the year 1966 as compared to those in the year 1964. The increase in average agricultural wage rates for males was 24 percent at Mouda, 43 percent at Dhapewada and 58 percent at Kuhi in 1966 over 1964 while in case of females the increase was of 12 percent at Mouda, 72 percent at Dhapewada and 25 percent at Kuhi during this period. The average increase in the wage rates in the district was of 40 percent for males and 31 percent for females during the year 1966 as compared to the year 1964.

Development of poultry is essentially a cottage industry without being linked up with commercial hatcheries, commercial feed industry and organised marketing of poultry products. During the Third Five Year Plan period a number of schemes such as Malaria Erradication, Small pox Erradication , B.C.G. Vaccination etc. were implemented by the Public Health Department through out the state. The medical facilities had also been extended to the rural areas on large scale . Due to erradication of Malaria on large scale, which was supposed to be the most common disease, The number of out door patients decreased after 1961 . The above table indicated that the number of indoor patients treated had slightly decreased in 1966 as compared to the year 1961 while the number of out door patients had decreased to a greater extent. This decrease in number of patients had started from 1962 onwards as most of the above schemes were implemented since 1961-62 onwards. In the Nagpur city, there are good medical facilities where people from the surrounding districts of Vidarbha and Madhya Pradesh/ ^{came in large numbers for} expect consultation and treatment.

Indicator No. 13 :- Increase in the number of students in different categories :-

By the end of the year 1966-67, Primary education had covered almost all the rural area of the district. At present every village in the district is within the vicinity of a primary school. Secondary education has also made a tremendous progress upto the year 1966-67 as compared to the year 1960-61. There were 1064 primary and 151 secondary schools in the district in 1960-61 and their number went upto 1604 ^{and} 234 respectively during 1966-67.

From the above table, it is seen that there was a rapid growth in the primary as well as secondary education. The percentage increase of 73.1 in the number of girls schools was mainly due to the extension of secondary school facilities in rural areas and the change in traditional outlook of villagers on female education. The enrollment in higher stage of education had also shown an increase as new higher institutions were established year after year at some important towns of the district.

Indicator No. 14 :- Increase in Road length per 100 sq. Kms.

The road development programme for the Third Five Year Plan and the Annual Plan 1966-67 had been formulated in accordance with the objectives laid down in the Nagpur Road Development Plan 1961-81. The broad objectives of the Nagpur Plan are that no village in a developed and agricultural area should remain more than four miles from a metalled road and more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile from any type of road.

From the above table it is seen that the road length per 100 sq. kilometers had increased from 8.06 kms in 1961-62 to 9.79 Kms in 1966-67. Road kilometrage in 1961-62 and 1966-67 was highest in Nagpur taluka because of road length in Nagpur city whereas it was largest in both the above years in Rantek taluka in Maharashtra. According to road length in 1962, the district ranked 6 th in the division. The road length per 100 sq. Kms. is below the corresponding district average in Rantek and umrer talukas due to large forest areas in these two talukas.

Indicator No. 15 :- Increase in Banking facilities in proportion to population.

The number of banking offices per lakh of population had gone up from 2.51 population 1961 to 3.70 in the in the year 1967 . Similarly the population served by each banking office had decreased from 39,811 to 27,014 from 1961 to 1967 . There were 14 places where banking facilities were available in the district in the year 1966-67 . Due to the rapid industrialisation of Nagpur city and surrounding areas, banking facilities of all types had more concentration in Nagpur city.

Indicator No. 16 :- Prices :-

The price collection work in all the district head quarters was started in the month of November 1962 i.e. since the declaration of Emergency in the country. The price quotations for some essential commodities are obtained on weekly basis. A significant rise was observed in food prices in the year 1966 mainly due to unprecedented drought in that year . As prices are collected at selected shops every week at the district head quarters they can not be taken to indicate the true fluctuation in price levels of different commodities. They merely give a broad indication of the price structure during the period under review . The year 1966-67 was the first year of 4th Five Year Plan. Since the Fourth Five-Year-Plan of the country could not be finalised for several reasons, the yearly development programmes have been drawn up keeping in view the main objectives of the long-term plan and within the limited resources that would be available for the year.

In drawing up the Annual Plan the main objectives and policies of the State's Fourth Plan as set out in the memorandum on the Fourth Plan have been kept in view. The Annual Plan laid emphasis on the productive sectors of the plan and includes provision for the key programmes. The key-note to the Annual Plan was however the consolidation of gains already made, avoidance of inflationary spending and enlargement of those areas of operation where optimum gains accrue within the shortest possible time and at most economy.

The total Annual Plan outlay for Nagpur District was Rs. 234.15 lakhs in 1966-67. The agricultural programmes were given priority by allotting about 42 percent of the total provision for them. The programme included under "Social Services" were allotted about 34 percent of the total provision was set out for road development programme. All the Plan Programmes were mostly implemented as per targets in the district and the total expenditure booked was to the tune of Rs. 222.88 lakhs. Sub-headwise progress of expenditure and physical achievement is given in subsequent paragraphs.

Agricultural Programme :-

Programmes of agricultural development have generally aimed at increasing the area under cultivation and improving agricultural productivity. This is done through a variety of programmes like measures of land development, Soil Conservation provision of irrigation and tractor ploughing, propagation of improved agricultural practices, through better input factors like improved seed, fertilisers Compost, Crop protection from pests and diseases etc.

The programme of development of Dairy, Forest, Fisheries, Animal Husbandry etc were also included as other agricultural programmes. The table below shows the allotments and total total expenditure on various programmes in the district.

Agricultural Production :-

As against the total provision of Rs. 9.10 lakhs for various schemes, the total expenditure incurred in the district was Rs. 6.27 lakhs. The schemes relating to intensive cultivation of food crops viz. crop campaign, development of co-ops, horticultural development, Plant protection were predominantly implemented in the District. Certain facilities were provided to the seed farms which were already established in district during the III rd Plan to augment the work of multiplication of seeds. The table below shown the physical achievement made in this district under programme.

Land Development :-

Out of impediments in the way of productive programmes, is the fragmentation & sub-division of holdings. This is sought to be mitigated by programmes of consolidation of holdings. Under this programme the work of consolidation of land in 25 villages covering area of 30,732 acres was undertaken and the target set-up in this regard was fully achieved. The expenditure on Scheme amounted to Rs. 0.39 lakhs.

Minor Irrigation :-

Minor Irrigation works programme consisted of construction of Storage, diversion scheme, percolation tanks and renovation of existing tanks. There was a provision of Rs. 34-37 lakhs in the Annual Plan 1966-67. Out of this provision, an expenditure of Rs. 20.77 lakhs was incurred by the Zilla Parishad for grant of Subsidy towards construction of wells, installation of pumping sets and Construction and improvement of open well/azari tanks. The details are as under.

Besides the above, Rs. 3.93 lakhs were expended for the completion of Spill-over minor irrigation projects namely (1) Khursapar (2) Kadki (3) Adegaon (5) Sawar-chara and Nandera undertaken in III Five Year Plan period.

Animal Husbandry :-

The development programme for the year 1966-67 provided an amount of Rs. 0.53 lakhs for veterinary aid, disease control, improvement of breed and for encouragement of poultry. Against this provision in local sector an expenditure of Rs. 0.69 lakhs was incurred by the Zilla Parishad. A major part of this expenditure was for completion of 3 Veterinary dispensaries (Rs. 0.46 lakhs). For improvement of breed, 10-bulls were provided and 10 beneficiaries were given loan of Rs. 1000/- each for poultry.

Dairy Development :-

During the Annual Plan 1966-67 a budget of Rs. 9.60 lakhs was provided. Against this an expenditure of Rs. 4.07 lakh was incurred on installation of dairy machinery and equipments in the Nagpur Dairy Project. As a result of this, the milk handling capacity of project rose to 8270 litres of milk per day.

Forests :-

An out-lay of Rs. 10.72 lakhs was included in the Annual Plan 1966-67 for continuance of several schemes in III rd Five - Year - Plan and taking up some new schemes. (5)

An expenditure of Rs. 10.96 lakhs, was made for plantation of trees required for industrial and commercial uses, development of minor forest products, development of fodder resources, survey and demarcation, forest communication, and labour welfare. The target of plantation of different types of trees in 1300 acres was achieved in the year 1966-67.

Fisheries :-

The Annual Plan 1966-67 provided for continuance and intensification of the activities under various schemes which were already in operation during the III Plan period. During the year 1966-67 two schemes viz. Fish farming in impounded waters and assistance for supply of fishery requisites were undertaken and an amount of Rs. 0.13 lakhs was expended. About 19 lakhs fingerlings were stocked in impounded waters in Nagpur District.

Co-operation and Community Development.

1) Co-operation :-

The development programme for 1966-67 provided for strengthening the capital base of the Co-operative structure further by contribution to the share capital of agricultural credit societies and marketing societies. Provision was also made to grant loan to societies for construction of godowns. Managerial subsidy on existing pattern was also continued for marketing societies. For all these activities there was a total provision of Rs. 13.75 lakhs in the Annual Plan 1966-67 against which expenditure of Rs. 13.72 lakhs was incurred. In all 20 Co-operative institutions of various kind were benefited.

Community Development :-

For the community Development and other allied programmes, the Annual Plan 1966-67 provided an outlay of Rs. 17.78 lakhs in the local sector. The provisions for various categories, programme and expenditure there on was as under .

Funds for stage I and stage II blocks were provided by way of plan grants according to schematic budget. (The post stage II blocks were also given funds outside the State plan for works at the rate of Rs. 1.00 Lakh per year per block.)

Under L.D. Works Programme, the funds were utilised for construction of 121 wells. Against Rural Man-Power Programme 6 blocks were covered to solve the problem of rural unemployment.

The Applied Nutrition Programme is taken in one block of Nagpur district.

Small Scale and Cottage Industries.

Under this programme, there were two schemes. One was "Development of Handloom Industry" in State sector in which loans and subsidy to the tune of Rs. 6.92 lakhs were distributed to 250 weavers for purchase of shares and for tools and equipments. The other scheme was "Grant of loan and subsidy to industrial Co-operative Societies." In all loans and subsidy of Rs. 0.33 lakhs were paid to 14 societies under this scheme.

Transport & Communication :-

In the Annual Plan of 1966-67 there was a provision of Rs. 33.61 lakhs for road development. Out of this, the provision in Local Sector was Rs. 22.00 lakhs. The total expenditure was Rs. 33.80 lakhs and out of this local sector's share was Rs. 19.73 lakhs.

The whole expenditure was incurred mainly on repairs and maintenance of roads and construction of 3 new bridges.

Social Services :-

The programme under " Social Services " includes " General Education " " Technical Education " " Medical and Nursing " " Public Health " " Urban Development Water supply and drainage, Housing Welfare of backward classes Social Welfare and labour and labour Welfare " and Miscellaneous Programmes . The table below shows by allotments and expenditure on various programmes in the District.
