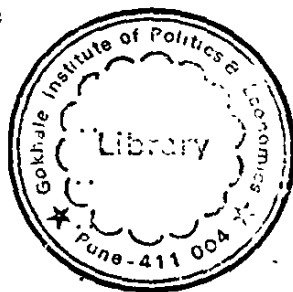

CRITIQUE

During 1981-82 a number of steps were taken for the expansion and improvement of existing facilities. In order to expand the educational facilities in the age group 11-14, 66 primary schools were up graded to Middle Standard and to provide more facilities in age group 14-17, 24 Middle Schools were up graded to High Schools

One crore rupees were provided for the construction of 400 primary school buildings.

The School complex system was introduced for better supervision. Under this system all the middle schools were attached with High/Higher Secondary Schools situated nearby.

The State Council of Educational Research and Training was set-up for bringing about improvement in Syllabi and Courses at school level.

As there was un-employment among J.B.T. teachers, it was decided to close J.B.T. classes. Instead the institutions were utilised for re-orientation/in service training to J.B.T. teachers to acquaint them with latest techniques of teaching, 3,012 teachers were imparted training under this scheme.

At college level 18 new Courses/subjects were introduced in 14 Govt. Colleges. For imparting training to students for competitive examinations, 'Career Wings' were opened in Govt. Colleges for Boys at Patiala, Ludhiana, Hoshiarpur and Govt. College for Women, Amritsar.

A District Library was opened at Amritsar in order to provide library facilities and promote Art and Culture.

On the whole the progress of work of the Education Department was satisfactory during 1981-82.

Salient Features of the Year

1. School Complex System was introduced and Middle Schools were attached with nearby High/Higher Secondary Schools.

2. A sum of Rupees one Crore was sanctioned for the construction of 400 Primary School buildings.

3. To provide facility of Education to the drop-outs in the age-group 6-14- 250 part-time education centres, which were started during the year 1979-80, remained continued during this year.

4. The admission to J.B.T. Course was discontinued due to the un-employment of about 10,000 J.B.T. Trained teachers.

5. With the efforts of Parent Teacher Associations in Primary School, 525 rooms and boundry walls of 433 schools were constructed and the repair of 696 schools and installation of 420 handpumps was done.

6. Under the care scheme 80,000 children were benefitted with the 'ready to eat food programme.'

7. Ten new Science Laboratories for Government Middle Schools, a new School building for Girls High School at Raheon. Additional Block of rooms for Govt. High School for boys (Amloh and resource rooms for handicapped children in four schools (Govt. Multipurpose Hr. Sec. School, Town Hall, Amritsar, Ludhiana, Jalandhar and Patiala) and boundary walls for two schools were sanctioned.

INTRODUCTION

The entire Department of Education functions under the three tier Administrative set-up viz. Government, Directorate and the field organisation including educational institutions.

The overall charge of the Department of Education vests with the Minister for Education, who lays down the policies and controls the entire administration through the Financial Commissioner and Secretary to Government, Punjab Education Department, who is assisted by a team of senior officers viz. Joint Secretary, Deputy Secy. and under Secretary. The Education Secretary carries out the work of the department in collaboration with the three Directorates viz. Primary School College and State Council of Educational Research and Training.
