CRITIQUE

In order to expand the educational facilities in the age-group 11-14 and 14-17, 50 Primary Schools were upgraded to Middle Standard & 15 Middle Schools were upgraded to High Standard. National Girls High School, Bhogpur (Jull.) was taken over by Govt. w. e. f. 22-3-1983.

Consequent upon the reduction in food assistance from CARE the beneficiary Coverage came down from 2.79 lacs to 241 lacs during the year under report.

Under the 20 Point programme, 7,323 stores were opened for the st pply of exercise & Text Books to the students at cheaper rates 4.70,086 students were penefitted.

Under the Social Education, Scheme, a tremendrous progress was made.

To provide essential service to the Children in the age-group 6-11. School Builings were constructed repaired, lavatories & drinking water facilities were made available.

The admission to JBT Courses remained discontinued due to unemployment of about 9,000 JBT trained 'eachers.

7,600 teachers of schools were given in-service training for Professional growth.

The Punjab players won 33 gold, 36 Silver and 32 Bronze Medals in Mini National School games.

During the year under report Education Deptt. did exceedingly well in so far as the girls education at the elementary stage was concerned. The Puniab State stood second in the country and bagged a prize of Rs. One Crore.

The over all work of the Education Department remained satisfactory during the year under report.

- 4. A sum of Rs. 92,000/- was spent for providing stipends to the children belonging to Vimukat Jatis/Scheduled Tribes studing in Primary Schools.
