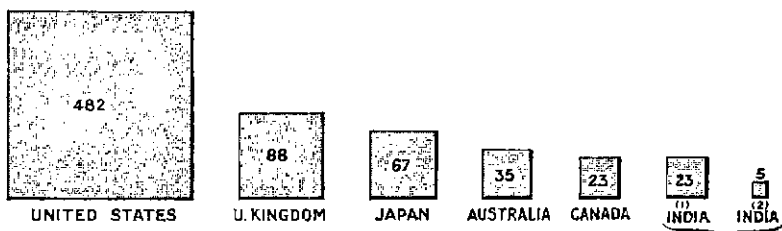

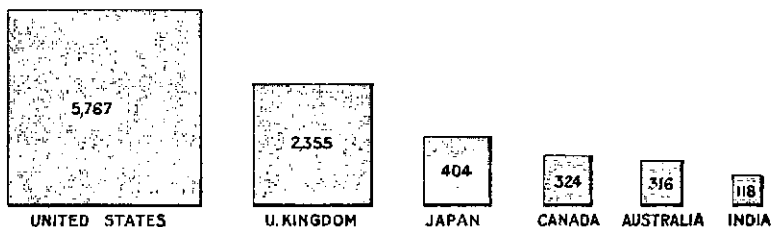

THE BANKING POSITION OF INDIA.

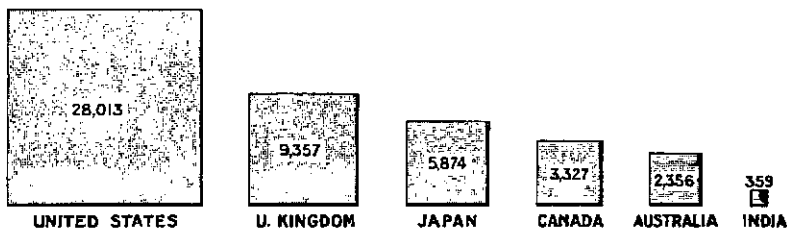
BANKING CAPITAL, MILLION £.
