#### PREFACE

#### Introduction

Modifications in presentation of data

The All-India Income-tax statistics brought out in this compilation are bas on the assessment completed by the Income-tax Department during the financial year .5-67.

- 2. This is the first compilation to bring out statistics processed on computer to which this Directorate has lately switched over.
- 3. This compilation follows the traditional pattern of presentation of data in the form of All India Statements but a few modifications have been made as indicated below:-
- i) An additional statement entitled All India Statement No.5-F has been introduced to give a break-up of data relating to individuals according to un married and married categories.
- ii) All-India Statement No.2 has been recast to give a summary of the net budget collections of income-tax as distinguished from gross collections which used to be exhibited in the past.
- iii) All-India Statement No.5 and Its further sub-classifications have been modified to show the data for "Un-registered Firms" and "Association of Persons" under two separate heads. In the corlier compilations the data was exhibited under a single head in respect of these two categories of assessees. Another modification introduced in these statement is the merger of the data regarding "Local Authorities" with the data regarding "Association of Persons.".

#### Scope and coverage

- 4. This compilation covers assessments completed during the financial year 1966-67 but such assessments relate to the assessment year 1966-67 as well as for earlier years. The old practice of referring to assessments as assessees has been maintained.
- 5. The Statistics exhibited in the various All-India Statements appearing in this compilation relate to 17,83,376 assessments 16,55,811 assessments resulting in tax demand and 1,27,565 assessments resulting in tax refunds. Actually the Department completed 24,18,066 assessments during 1966-67 and the assessments which are not reflected in the statistics analysed in this compilation are those wh

which did not result either in demand or refund i.e.(i) assessments of new industrial undertaking exempt under the Income-tax Act,(ii) assessments in which the entire income is absorbed by depreciation or development rebate or loss, (iii) assessments of Registered Firms with income less than Rs.25,000 and consequently not liable to sax and (iv) other 'no assessment' cases, where the assessable income is computed at a figure less than the taxable minimum.

6. Statistics relating to 1965-66 are still being processed on the computer and are not available for purposes of comparison in this preface. Comparative figures of 1964-65 have, therefore, been given to indicate the trends.

#### I - DEMAND AND COLLECTION

## All-India Statement Nos. 1 & 2

7. All India Statement No.1 contains figures of arrears as on 1st April; 1966, amount reduced in appeals, current demand raised on regular assessments and collections made out of the arrears and the current demand, and finally arrears as on 31st March, 1967. All-India Statement No.2 makes a departure in regard to its traditional contents and now contains a summary of net budget collections as against gross collections.

#### Comparative figures

8. Following chart sums up the position emerging from the two statements; compartive figures for the year 1965-66 are available and are also indicated.

## II - ANALYSIS OF INCOME ACCORDING TO SOU CES OF INCOME AND DEDUCTIONS AND REBATES.

## All India statement

9. All-India Statement No.3 contains an analysis of income-tax demand raised in assessments made during the year, classified according to the sources

or heads under which income has been assessed. Details of deductions and rebates allowed, Double Income-tax relief and credit of tax deducted or otherwise paid at source, are given in parts B, C & D of the statement.

- 10. Total tax relief arising out of (i) speical deductions allowed in computing the total income, (ii) consessions in the form of rebate worked out on the basis of average rate, (iii) concessional treatment given to certain items of income and (iv) Double Taxation relief, aggregate to Rs.36.5 crores as against 19.8 crores in 1964-65. Contributions to Provident Fund and Life Insurance Premia constitute the most important deductions allowed in computing the total income. These amounted to Rs.50.2 crores and tax relief allowed works out at Rs.4.9 crores.
- 11. There are several items on which relief in tax has been allowed in the form of rebate at average rates. The particulars of some of the important items of rebate are as follows:-

#### IV - CLASSIFICATION BY RANGES OF INCOME AND STATUS

## All-India Statements Nos. 5, 5E, 5F & 6.

- 15. All India Statement No.5 analyses income-tax demand according to the range of total income assessed and according to status of the assessee. The figures of tax shown against "un-classified demand" and "unclassified refund" shown at the bottom of the statement, refer to the increase or decrease in tax arising out of re-assessments on account of appeals, revisious, rectifications etc. which are not included in the range-wise analysis given in the statement.
- 16. All India Statement No.5E gives classification of the gross income, losses set off, other deductions allowed, income assessed, tax payable thereon according to the range of the income assessed and status of the assessee.
- 17. All India Statement No.5F has been newly introduced in this compilation to give data regarding married and unmarried tax payers.
- 18. All India Statement No.6 contains a status-cum-net income range-wise classification of tax-payers. Net income means income left in their lands after deduction/tax.

## Excome-range above

There are 2140 assessess with income over Rs.5 lakhs and they account for total tax demand of Rs.261.2 crores which roughly come to 50% of the entire tax demand. There are 1497 companies in this range and they account for a tax demand of Rs.235.0 crores. Individuals and HUFs having incomes over Ps.5 lakhs are 207 and 34 respectively. After payment of taxes the total number of assessess in this income range comes down to 1219 including 30 persons assessed as individuals.

## Married and Unmarried Individual.

22. There were 66,394 unmarried individuals and 14,05,383 married individuals who were assessed to tax during 1966-67. The unmarried individuals contributed Rs.8.2 crores to tax demand whereas tax payable by married individuals comes to Rs.181.8 crores.

#### V-SOURCES OF INCOME-CUM-RANGE OF INCOME-CUM-STATUS OF ASSESSEE.

## All-India Statements Nos.5A, 5B, & 5D.

23. All-India Statement No.5A gives status-wise and income-range-wise analysis of the gross income assessed and demand raised according to principal sources of income. All India Statement No.5B gives break-up of the tax demand of the individuals under the head 'salaried persons' and 'Non-salaried persons'. All India Statement No.5D gives classification of the income assessed under the head 'Capital gains' and tax payable thereon according to range of capital gains assessed and status of the assessee.

# Business & Professions.24. This is the most important source of income and accounts for a total assessed income of Rs.1303.0 crores, the tax demand being Rs.338.6 crores. Out of the various business groups, the assessees in the group 'Commerce, Transport and Communications' account for the largest income and tax demand, the figures being Rs.649.2 crores and Rs.94.2 crores respectively. The assessees engaged in 'Processing and manufacturing of Metals and Chemicals' one next, the figures of income and tax demand being Rs.178.6 crores and Rs.76. Corores respectively.

#### Salaries

This is the next important source of income after 'Business and profession'. The total gross income from salaries assessed to tax works out to Rs.598.7 crores the gross demand thereon being Rs.55.7 crores. Government salaries account for Rs.159.6 crores (Central Government Salaries Rs.108.7 crores and State Government salaries Rs.50.9 crores), the tax demand being Rs.9.3 crores (Central Government Salaries Rs.6.1 crores and State Government salaries Rs.5.2 crores).

#### Dividends

26. Income from Dividends assessed to tax is Rs.81.9 crores, the tax demand being Rs.31.0 crores. Of the total Dividend income assessed, companies account for Rs.39.3 crores (48 %) and Individuals Rs.36.1 crores (44/) the relevant tax demand being Rs.17.2 crores (55%) and the Rs.11.19 crores (38%) respectively. Income from dividends earned by all assesses with total income over Rs.1 lac is Rs.48.9 crores (60%) and accounts for Rs.23.6 crores (76%) of the tax demand.

#### Rouse Property:

27 There are 264875 assessess having an income from house Property. The income earned and tax demand on the same are Rs.50.5 erores and Rs.9.4 erores respectively. Individuals (217313) have the highest income from House Property the income reseased and tax demand being Rs.35.3 erores (70%) and Rs.5.4 erores (57%) respectively. Property income earned by all assesses with incomes over Rs.1 lac is Rs.6.5 erores (13%) and accounts for Rs.3.3 erores (35%) of the tax demand.

#### Interest on Securities

28. The total income assessed under the head (Interest on Securities! is Rs.26.3 crores, yielding a tax demand of Rs.6.8 crores. Individuals (44832) have the highest income from this source viz. Rs.16.3 crores (64%) but the tax demand involved is only Rs.2.5 crores (37%). On the other hand, companies (1325) with income of Rs.7.3 crores (28%) yield a tax demand of Rs.3.6 crores (53%). All assessess in the income breakets over Rs.1 lac account for an income of Rs.8.9 crores (34%) from this source, the tax demand involved being Rs.4.5 crs. (66%).

#### Capital Gains.

29. The total amount of income from Capital Gains assessed to tax is Rs.15.4 crores the tax demand thereon being Rs.4.2 crores. The Capital Gains arising out of transfer of short-term assets is Rs.2.3 crores, the tax involved being Rs.0.6 crores.

#### VI - STATISTICS REGARDING CLASSIFICATION OF COMPANIES

## All India Statement No.5-C

30. This statement gives data of income assessed tax payable etc. and most of tax payers, in corporate sector. Companies have beend divided into three main categories i.e. widely held domestic companies, closely held domestic companies and foreign companies. The following chart sums up the classified statistics exhibited in the statement.

31. There were 1374 domestic and 123 foreign companies with income exceeding Rs.5,00,000 and they together accounted for about 235 crores of the total demand of Rs.275 crores.
