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

Introductory

It has been increasingly realised that the active involvement and participation of the youth is a sine qua non for rapid socio-economic development of the nation. The horizon of cooperative activities is limitless and so is the capacity of the tremendous youth power of our country. In the organisation, management and functioning of Cooperatives, an increasing role has to be assigned to the youth. For enabling the youth to play this role effectively, it is necessary to inculcate in them cooperative ideology and impart in their knowledge of cooperative methods and skills while they are students at various levels.

With the above objective in view, the National Council for Cooperative Training has evolved a few schemes for involvement of the youth. These schemes aim at developing youth leadership for Cooperative organisations which are instrumental for future growth of the Cooperative sector. A few of our prize winners have already achieved distinctions by joining the civil service, coveted assignments in the Reserve Bank of India and above all executive assignments in various Cooperative Federations.

2. Inter-University National Debate in English

The 20th Inter-University National Debate on Cooperation in English Language was organised at University of Kerala, Trivandrum from February 11, 1980 to February 12, 1980. The subject of the debate was "IN THE OPINION OF THE HOUSE, RURAL POVERTY CAN BE ERADICATED ONLY THROUGH A STRONG AND STABLE COOPERATIVE MOVEMENT". The Debate was inaugurated by Dr. V.K. Sukumaran Nair, Vice-Chancellor of Kerala University.

In the debate, 48 students from 25 Universities participated. The participants were drawn from different regions including South, North, West, East and Central Zones. The 25 Universities which sponsored the teams are located in the states of Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Union Territory of Delhi, Karnataka, Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Gujarat and Orissa. In all, there were 40 men and 8 women participants.

Nagpur University, being the best team, bagged the Running Shield and National Scroll and the team of Kurukshetra University was

awarded the Runners Cup. The first second and third prizes were won by Shri Hugo D. Souza of Nagpur University, Shri N. Jayan Menon of Andhra University and Shri V. John Mathew of Kerala University. Three consolation prizes were awarded to Shri Sandeep Sehgal of Kurukshetra University, Kumari A. Shailaja of Bangalore University and Shri Ramesh of Banaras Hindu University. Two special prizes for best women participants instituted through the courtesy of the National Federation of State Cooperative Banks and National Federation of Cooperative Land Development Bank were awarded to Kumari Kavita Kesthur of Mysore University and Kumari Sujatha Sheshadri of Andhra Pradesh Agriculture University.

3. Symposium

On the eve of the National Debate a Symposium was also organised on "THE ROLE OF COOPERATIVES IN INTEGRATED RURAL DEVELOPMENT". Shri K.L.N. Rao, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation, Department of Agriculture and Cooperation, was the Chief Speaker at the Symposium. The Symposium was addressed by Dr. P.K. Gopalakrishnan, Secretary of Planning Board, Government of Kerala, Shri P.A. Bhaskaran Nair, Member-Governing Council, NCUI and Dr. Ramachandran, Reader, Department of Economics, University of Kerala.

4. Essay Competition

During the year under report, the scheme of the Essay Competition was circulated to all the Universities in the country as early as in the month of Sept., 1979. As per reports received at the Council, essay competition was organised by 22 Universities, but the actual participation of competitors was as high as 347. During the last year 24 Universities had organised these competitions with the participation of 350 students. The number of participating Universities has come down as these competitions could not be organised in the Universities of the North-Eastern region due to student agitation there. However, average participation per University has increased from 14.6 to 19.3.

The highest participation in Essay Competition during the year was reported from Gujarat University, Ahmedabad (31), followed by Punjab Agriculture University, Ludhiana (16) and University of Udaipur, Udaipur (15).

The Council awards 3 prizes of the value of Rs. 150/-, Rs. 100/- and Rs. 75/- depending upon the number of entries for each of the competitions held at the University Level. During the year the Council awarded 33 prizes in these competitions.

5. Inter-Collegiate Debates

During the year under report the participation in the Inter-Collegiate Debates organised at the University level has suffered a marginal shortfall. Results of Inter-Collegiate Debating Competitions were received from 40 Universities informing participation of 640 students. During the last year 50 Universities had reported participation of 750 students, representing multi-disciplines such as humanities, basic sciences, agriculture, engineering, medicines, law, etc.

The highest participation of 42 students in the Inter-Collegiate Debate was reported by Annamalai University, followed by University of Bombay (33) and Karnataka University (32).

For these debates conducted at the University level three prizes of Rs. 100/- Rs. 75/- and Rs. 50/- respectively are awarded depending upon the number of entries in each competition. Two consolation prizes of Rs. 30/- each are awarded if the number of entries exceed 20 teams in a debate. The Council has awarded 95 prizes during the year 1979-80.

Speeches and Addresses

WELCOME ADDRESS

Shri T. A. Thomman, President, Kerala State Cooperative Union welcomed the distinguished guests and participants on the occasion of the XX Inter-University National Debate on Cooperation. He pointed out that cooperation was of much relevance in the present context, particularly when our institutional values are being eroded by the onslaught of undemocratic and authoritarian ideals and the social fabric is being polluted by a highly individualistic approach characteristic of the acquisitive, capitalistic order thereby creating self-centred human beings in our society. He appealed to all to make the cooperative system as an effective instrument for uplifting the weak and the downtrodden, so as to enable them to lead a fuller and nobler life, free from exploitation. He felt that organisation of debates would provide intellectual climate required for the development of the youth and the society.

Prof. B. N. Choubey, Secretary, NCCT welcomed the distinguished guests and student participants. In his welcome remarks, he explained the objects and activities of the NCCT with particular reference to the organisation of the Inter-University Debate. He also explained the background in which this programme was introduced and the need and usefulness of the debating competions organised for the University students. He pointed out that the activity of National Debate is undertaken as a part of our programme to spread the gospel of cooperation in the Universities, Colleges and Schools. He felt that no movement can thrive or grow unless there is a succession of devoted and enlightened leadership. The student community represents the miniture community and they must be involved in order to provide successive leadership and it was precisely in this context that the programme of organising National Debate was launched.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

In his inaugural address, Dr. V. K. Sukumaran Nair, Vice Chancellor, University of Kerala Stated that Cooperation can be viewed as an ethical bond as well as the social process which everybody should recognise otherwise the world will not function. Tracing the brith origin of the Cooperative Movement, he mentioned that the movement was

started in the middle of 19th century in U. K. in the wake of Industrial Revolution which later spread to Sweden, Germany, India and other countries where there was need for Cooperation. In India the cooperative societies were started by the then British Government mainly to provide agricultural credit. Since its origin, it has made rapid strides even in areas other than agricultural credit. He further pointed out that there has been a tremendous increase in the working capital and share capital of the cooperative societies particularly in the last 30 years. In Kerala, cooperatives covered different activities such as poultry, fishing, construction of houses, publication of books, etc. In the end, he stated that like democracy, Cooperation is an art of persuasion and stressed that the student participating in the debate should continue to take interest in cooperation in future also and participate in cooperative activities enthusiastically.

PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

Shri B. S. Vishwanathan, Chairman, NCCT in his presidential address emphasized the importance of cooperative system and stated that the Movement has spread in almost all parts of the world and it has been recognised and given a due place in the economic development both in the capitalistic as well as the socialistic countries in the world. He stated that it has made remarkable strides in several developed as well as developing countries, including India. The Indian Cooperative Movement is the biggest in the world covering a vast population and has made good progress in the production and distribution activities particularly in the agricultural sector.

Though there are certain gaps and defects such as regional imbalances, lack of enlightened membership and lack of professionalised management. He further emphasised the role of the youth in the Cooperative Movement and suggested that similar to this National Debate conducted by the NCCT, the State Cooperative Unions should also conduct such debates in regional language at the State level with the assistance of the NCCT. He expressed his happiness that in almost all the Universities there are Consumer Cooperative Stores and Cooperative Canteens run by the students. He called upon the students to continue to associate with the cooperative movement even after the completion of the Debate and be in touch with the NCCT and NCUI and also to contribute articles for the English and Hindi journals brought out by the NCUI

VALEDICTORY FUNCTION

The valedictory function was held on 12.2,1980. Shri E K. Nayanar Hon'ble Chief Minister of Kerala delivered the valedictory address and

gave away the prizes. In his valedictory address, Shri Nayanar expressed his happiness for the debate to have been organised at Trivandrum and appreciated the idea of organising this type of debate every year for the student community with a view to spread cooperation amongst the students and encourage them to involve themselves in the cooperative activities. He also stressed that cooperative system is the best means for reducing in quality of income and equitably distribution of the available resources among the people. He further added that cooperative movement is a movement full of idealism and missionary zeal, and the youth by virtue of their phychological and upsurging fortitude are prone to be attracted towards the movement. Therefore, we must organise a number of congenial programmes to bring youth into the fold of active cooperative field. In the end, he exhorted that the cooperative movement should address itself to its invaluable task by designing and developing adequate number of programmes for the dynamic involvement of the youth of this great nation.

Shri T. A. Thomman, Chairman; Kerala State Cooperative Union presided over the function and Prof. B. N. Choubey, Secretary, NCCT welcomed the guests.


