THE CHEMICAL INDUSTRY

In this industry the Committee adopted the same definition which was adopted by the previous 'Norms' Committee for the purpose of classification of Settlements, Agreements and Awards. The definition is as follows:—

"Manufacturing of basic industrial Chemicals such as acids, alkalis and their salts; fertilizers, ammunitions, explosives and fireworks; turpentine, synthetic resin and plastic products and materials."

During the relevant period the Committee scrutinized and examined 88 Awards (81 published and 7 unpublished); 90 settlements under the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 and 5 Settlements under the Central Provinces and Berar Industrial Disputes and Settlement Act, 1947. WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The question of wages and dearness allowance was involved in 141 cases; out of these, 16 cases dealt with dearness allowance only; wage scales were revised in 61 cases; both dearness allowance and revision of wages were granted in 45 cases and ad-hoc increments in wages were granted in 19 cases.

The adjustment of wages in the revised scales was done according to the following rules:-

- (1) In case the existing basic wages of an employee is less than the minimum of the revised scale he shall get the minimum of the revised scale.
- (2) In case the existing wage of an employee is equal to the minimum of the revised scale or above he shall be stepped up to the nearest higher stage in the revised scale.
- (3) In case the existing wage of an employee is more than the maximum of the revised scale he shall continue to get the same and the difference shall be treated as his personal pay.

In M/s. Kosmek Plastic Manufacturers, Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 13) no employee, by reason of adjustment, was allowed to cross the efficiency bar in the wage-scales automatically.

In Imperial Chemical Industries, Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 103) the workmen who were drawing the maximum of the pay-scales at the date of the settlement and/or who reached the maximum of the pay-scales during the period of operation of the settlement continued to get the annual increments till the settlement was in force.

In Photogravours (India), Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 94) all employees who did not get any benefit by adjustment of their wages in the new wage-scales were given an ad-hoc rise in wages to the extent of Rs. 5, Rs. 4 and Rs. 3 per month which were paid to the skilled, semi-skilled and unskilled categories, respectively.

LEAVE ·

There were 104 concerns in which various kinds of leave were considered. A statement showing the names of these 104 concerns and the various type of leave granted is attached.

Privilege Leave:

There were 44 cases in which privilege leave has been granted. In 15 cases it was granted according to the provisions under the Indian Factories Act, 1948. In 9 cases 21 days in a year, in 5 cases 30 days; in 3 cases 15 days; in 2 cases each it was granted for 20 days, 14 days, 1 day for every 20 days worked and 1 day for every 15 days' worked, respectively and in 1 case each it was fixed at 18 days, 7 days, 1 day for every 10 days worked and according to the provisions under the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act, 1948, respectively.

There were 17 cases in which accumulation of privilege leave was granted.

In 5 cases accumulation was granted for 42 days, in 2 cases each it was granted for 90 days, 63 days and 40 days, respectively and in one case each it was granted for 60 days, 48 days, 45 days, 36 days, and 30 days, respectively. In Teddington Chemical Factory Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 114) Watchmen were granted privilege leave which could be accumulated to any extent.

Sick Leave:

There were 30 cases in which sick leave has been granted. In 11 cases it was granted for 7 days in 6 cases 15 days; in 4 cases 6 days; in 2 cases each for 10 days, 4 days, and according to the provisions under the Employees' State Insurance Act, 1948, respectively and in 1 case each it was granted for 14 days 5 days and 3 days, respectively.

There were 13 cases in which accumulation of sick leave was granted. In 5 cases it was granted for 21 days; in 2 cases each it was granted for 30 days and 12 days, respectively and in one case each it was granted for 45 days, 28 days, 18 days and 14 days, respectively.

In 10 cases condition was laid down to the effect that the application for leave shall be supported by a medical certificate.

Maternity Leave:

There were 3 cases in which maternity leave has been considered. In 2 cases it was granted for 12 weeks and in one case it was granted for 21 days.

Leave Without Wages:

There were 3 cases in which leave without wages has been granted. In 2 cases it was granted for 15 days in a year and in one case it was granted for one month in a year.

Casual Leave:

There were 68 cases in which casual leave has been granted. In 21 cases it was granted for 5 days in a year; in 18 cases 7 days in a year; in 9 cases 4 days in a year; in 7 cases 6 days in a year; in 6 cases 10 days in a year; in 5 cases 3 days in a year; and in one case each it was granted for 8 days and 2 days in a year, respectively.

In 7 cases balance of casual leave not enjoyed was allowed to be encashed at the end of the year. In 7 cases not more than 2 days' casual leave was allowed to be taken at a time and in 9 cases not more than 3 days' casual leave was allowed to be taken at a time.

In 8 cases casual leave was not allowed to be prefixed or suffixed to weekly off; or festival holidays and in 7 cases it was allowed to be prefixed or suffixed to weekly offs and festival holidays.

Festival Holidays:

In 71 cases festival holidays ranging from 2 days to 15 days were granted. In 23 cases it was granted for 4 days in a year; in 15 cases 5 days; in 8 cases 6 days; in 5 cases each for 2 days and 8 days in a year respectively; in 6 cases for 3 days; in 2 cases each for 9 days and 13 days in 1 year respectively and in one case each for 7 days, 10 days, 12 days, 14 days and 15 days in a year, respectively.

In 4 cases holidays were to be fixed in consultation with the workmen or their unions. In the cases examined it was noticed that following festival holidays were enjoyed:—

In the Natural Gas Co., Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 47) 3 festival holidays were granted to the work-men on different days as per the convenience and desire of the individual workmen.

ALLOWANCES

Allowance to Drivers and Cleaners:

In the Ciba Dyes, Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 5) as there were only drivers and there were no cleaners, the drivers were paid Rs. 15 per month as cleaner allowance.

In the Bhor Industries Ltd., Bhor (Sr. No. 42) the drivers and cleaners were paid Rs. 40 per month as line allowance.

In the Teddington Chemical Factory, Bombay (Sr. No. 114) the drivers were paid an allowance of Rs. 60 per month and motor transport cleaners were paid an allowance of Rs. 20 per month.

Allowance for Working on Paid Holidays or Weekly off Days:

Five cases were noted. In the Bombay Sewree Chemicals Manufacturing Co., Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 137) the workers were paid $\frac{1}{4}$ of their total wages in addition to their normal wages as compensation for working on Sundays and holidays and they were also given a compensatory holiday in lieu of working on Sunday or holiday.

In the Ciba Dyes, Private, Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 5) the compensation for working on festival holidays was paid on the following basis:—

Clerical Staff.—Double the basic salary calculated on the basis of 175 hours per month.

Subordinate Staff.—Double the basic salary calculated on the basis of 200 hours per month or Re. I per hour whichever is higher.

In the Imperial Chemical Industries (India) Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 8) for work done on Sundays and Holidays the workmen were paid half days' additional total salary and dearness allowance. For working on festival holidays they were paid a day's salary and dearness allowance but they were not given a substitute holiday.

In the Teddington Chemical Factory, Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 114) workmen who worked on Sundays were paid half day's wages at overtime rate which was double the rate of normal pay plus dearness allowance and they were also given a compensatory holiday. Workmen who worked on a holiday were paid at double the rate of normal pay plus dearness allowance.

In the Sarabhai Chemicals, Bombay (Sr. No. 126) for work done on a weekly off, the workmen were paid at the rate of twice their normal rate of wages and they were also given a compensatory holiday.

Lunch allowances:

Two cases were noted during the course of scrutiny. In the Teddington Chemical Factory, Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 114) any workman who had to go for outdoor work during lunch hours was paid an allowance at the rate of Rs. 2 per day.

In the Rainbow Ink and Varnish Manufacturing Co., Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 150) any workman who had to go out of the factory for work during lunch time was paid Rs. 1.25 nP. per day as lunch allowance. Those workmen whose normal work was outside the factory were paid of Rs. 15 per month.

Tea allowance:

In Teddington Chemical Factory, Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 114) any workman who had to go an outdoor duty during tea interval was paid an allowance of 20 paise per day.

Officiating allowance:

Eleven cases were noted during the course of scrutiny. The details of officiating allowance granted is as follows:—

Outstation allowance:

In the Amar Dye Chem., Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 7) those employees who were drawing less than Rs. 200 per month as pay were paid 3rd Class railway fare and 75 paise per day and those who were drawing over Rs. 200 per month were paid 1st Class railway fare and Rs. 2 per day as outstation allowance.

In the Imperial Chemical Industries, Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 8) drivers were paid Rs. 5 per day as outstation allowance.

In the Cawnpore Chemical Co., Kanhan (Sr. No. 179) those employees who were sent for outstation duties were paid 0.80 paise per day as outstation allowance provided they were away for more than 5 hours.

Allowances to Boilermen:

In the Teddington Chemical Factory Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 114) all boilermen in the qualified grade were paid an allowance of Rs. 50 per month.

Allowance to Watchman:

In the Teddington Chemical Factory Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 114) all watchmen were given an allowance, of Rs. 50 per month.

Machine allowance:

In the Sarabhai Chemicals, Bombay (Sr. No. 126) employees were paid allowance as follows:—

- (a) Peons who were working on Franking and Cyclostyling machines were paid an allowance of Rs. 5 per month.
 - (b) Computists and typists were paid an allowance of Rs. 10 per month.
- (c) Machine Operators who were working on Accounting machines were paid an allowance of Rs. 20 per month.
- (d) Operators who were required to operate Punchers and verifiers were paid an allowance of Rs. 15 per month.
- (e) Operators who were required to work on Adrema and Bradma machines were paid an allowance of Rs. 15 per month.

In the Pfizer Private Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 44) the Company paid Rs. 10 per month to peons who worked on franking machines.

Shift allowance:

In the Rainbow Ink and Varnish Manufacturing Co., Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 150) all workmen who worked in the third shift were paid a shift allowance of 12½ per cent of their total wages for the number of days they worked in that shift.

Washing allowance:

In the Bombay Gas Co. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 26) the Lamp Lighters were paid Rs. 2 every alternate month as washing allowance.

Permanency:

22 cases were noted during the relevant period. In 8 cases workmen who had put in 6 months, continuous service were made permanent. In 5 cases each employees who had worked continuously for 240 days and 12 months respectively were made permanent. In 8 cases workmen who had put in 3 months continuous service were made permanent. In one case those employees who had worked for 200 days in a year were made permanent.

PROMOTION

In the Teddington Chemical Factory (Sr. No. 114) the following basic principles governed promotion:—
(a) Promotion was not automatic and could not be claimed as a matter of right.

- (b) Promotion was against an existing or a new vacancy.
- (c) Promotion was ordinarily made from the existing workmen who passed a test or interview and on the basis of educational qualifications, efficiency, satisfactory service, good attendance, good conduct and such other relevant factors.
- (d) Efficiency, however, was a primary factor governing promotion, but, other thing being equal, seniority was given due weightage.

UNIFORMS

Cases of provision of uniforms were noted during the course of scrutining. Details regarding provision of uniform are as follows:—

RETIREMENT AGE

6 the cases were noted during the course of scrutiny. In 3 cases the age of retirement was fixed at 58 years; in 2 cases at 55 years and in one case at 60 years. In 3 cases the company had the option to continue an employee after the retirement age.

MEDICAL AID

In the Sarabhai Chemials, Bombay (Sr. No. 126) the Company gave its own manufactured medicine to an extent of Rs. 12.50 paise each year to the employees on the production of a medical certificate for the sickness of the employee or the members of his family.

WORKING HOURS

5 cases were noted. In 3 cases the working hours were 48 hours in a week and in one case the working hours were 46 in a week. In one case the clerical staff in the head office worked for 44 hours in a week while the telephone operators and peons worked for 48 hours in a week.

PROVIDENT FUND

In the Indian Plastics Ltd., Kandivli (Sr. No. 3 and Sr. No. 141) it was agreed that the Co. and the members shall each contribute six and a quarter per cent of the basic wages and dearness allowance of each member as their contribution to the provident fund.

In the Hominion Plastic Industries, Bombay (Sr. No. 99) and in the Plastic Packaging Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 130) workmen were allowed to contribute to the Provident Fund Scheme after 12 months from the date they became permanent.

In the Consolidated Pen Makers, Bombay (Sr. No. 93) and in the Plastella, Bombay (Sr. No. 127) Provident Fund Schemes for employees based on the Employees' Provident Fund Scheme, 1952 were introduced.

GRATUITY

Cases were noticed during the relevant period. A table showing the details of the amounts of gratuity granted is attached herewith.

ATTENDENCE BONUS

In the Machinery Paints and Chemicals (India) Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 162) the Compnay paid one day's extra wages as attendence bonus to a workman who actually worked on all the working days in a month 2 days' casual leave in a calendar year was, however, treated as working days for purpose of attendance bonus provided not more than one day's casual leave was taken in any one month.

INCENTIVE BONUS

In the Sanyal Hasonji Explosive Works, Nagpur (Sr. No. 88) the incentive allowance was calculated at the rate of 1½ paise per coil of 24 feet of safety fuse manufactured in excess of the normal production of the spinning machine in one shift of 8 hours.

The normal production of each spinning machine was 100 coils of safety fuse less than the maximum rated capacity of that machine calculated on the basis of $7\frac{1}{2}$ hours working. (The maximum rated capacity of each machine was directly proportional to the diameter of the pulling drum and the speed of the pulling drum.)

LATE ATTENDENCE

In the Hoechst Dyes and Chemicals Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 159) the following procedure was adopted for late attendence:—

- (a) Those coming late between 10 and 15 minutes twice in a calendar month forfeited ½ day's casual leave if available or ½ day's privilege leave or ½ day's wages as the case may be.
- (b) Those coming late between 15 minutes and half an hour twice in a month forfeited 1 day's casual leave or 1 day's privilege leave, or 1 day's wages as the case may be.
- (c) Late attendence on account of established disorganisation of the public transport system was condoned.

LEAVING EARLY

In Hoechst Dyes and Chemical Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 159) employees were not allowed to leave the factory early on more than 3 occasions in one calendar month. If the total time exceeded one hour in one calendar month, proportionate wages were deducted.

SUPPLY OF FREE MILK

In the Iwacom, Pvt. Ltd. Bombay (Sr. No. 32) the moulders were given a quarter seer of milk every day. In Dharamji Morarji Chemical Co., Ltd, Ambernath (Sr. No. 100) the employees working in Hydrocloride Acid Plant, Nitric Acid Plant and Oleum Plant were given milk.

SPECIAL GRANTS FOR FEAST

In the Cawnpore Chemical Works, Pvt., Ltd., Kanhan (Sr. No 84) the management paid Rs. 100 per year to the Secretary of the recognised union to be spent for feast on any of the following occasions:—

(a) 26th January, (b) 15th August, (c) Dassera.

FIRST AID ALLOWANCE

In the Teddington Chemical Factory Ltd. Bombay (Sr. No. 114) an allowance of Rs. 5 per month was paid to all workmen included in the official list of personnel available for rendering first aid treatment.

FIRE FIGHTING ALLOWANCE

In the Teddington Chemical Factory Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 114) an allowance of Rs. 5 per month was paid to all workmen included in the company's fire fighting squad.

PHARMACEUTICALS

The last Norms Committee had defined the Pharmaceutical Industry as "manufacture of Medicines, Pharmaceutical preparations, Perfemes, Cosmetic and other Toilet Preparations except soaps". The present Committee has adopted the same definition which was adopted by the previous 'Norms' Committee for the purpose of classification of Settlements, Agreements and Awards.

The Pharmaceutical Industry is a well established and highly organised industry in the State. Many of the concerns in this industry are of foreign origin or working with foreign collaboration. The labour in this industry is also highly organised and the service conditions are almost standardised. The financial position of the concerns in this industry in many cases is sound and prosperous.

The industry is mostly concentrated in and around Greater Bombay as will be evident from the fact that out of 133 Awards and Settlements in this industry examined, 116 Awards and Settlements were from the Greater Bombay Region. There were 13 Awards and Settlements from the Poona Region and 4 from the Nagpur Region.

During the relevant period, the Committee scrutinised and examined 60 awards (of which 52 were published Awards and 8 were unpublished), 71 Settlements under the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 and 2 Settlements under the Central Provinces and Berar Industrial Disputes & Settlement Act, 1947.

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The question of wages and dearness allowance was involved in 89 cases. Out of these, 8 cases dealt with dearness allowance only, wages were revised in 29 cases, both dearness allowance ard revision of wages were granted in 46 cases and ad-hoc increments in wages and dearness allowance were granted in 6 cases. A statement showing wages, dearness allowance and increments decided in 89 cases is attached herewith.

The adjustment of wages in the revised scales was done according to the following rules:-

- (1) The workmen shall be adjusted in the revised wage-scales according to their present pay.
- (2) In case the existing basic wage of an employee is less than the minimum of the revised scale, he shall get the minimum of the revised scale.
- (3) In case the existing basic wage of an employee is not a step in the revised scale, he shall be stepped up to the next higher stage in the revised scale.
- (4) In case the existing wage of an employee is more than the maximum of the revised scale he shall continue to get the same and the excess amount shall be treated as his personal pay.

INCREMENTS IN THE REVISED SCALES FOR LENGTH OF SERVICE

In 25 cases increments were granted after adjustment of existing wages in the revised wage-scales. Generally increments were granted as below:—

- (a) For service of more than 2 years but less than 4 years I increment.
- (b) For service of more than 4 years but less than 6 years 2 increments.
- (c) For service of 6 years or more 3 increments.

LEAVE

There were 60 Awards and Settlements in which various kinds of leave were considered. A statement showing the names of 60 concerns and the various types of leave granted is attached.

Privilege Leave

There were 44 cases in which privilege leave has been granted. In 12 cases it was granted for 21 days in a year; in 8 cases 30 days; in 5 cases according to the provisions under the Indian Factories Act, 1948; in 4 cases each for 15 days in a year, for 28 days in a year and 1 day for every 12 days work in a year; in 2 cases for 25 days in a year; in one case each for 16 days in a year, 23 days in a year, 60 days in a year, one month for every 11 months' attendance in a year and 1/12 of the period spent on duty in a year.

In 30 cases accumulation of privilege leave was granted. In 6 cases accumulation of leave was allowed up to 63 days; in 5 cases up to 30 days; in 4 cases up to 90 days; in 2 cases each up to 45 days; 50 days, 60 days, 84 days and 120 days; in one case each up to 46 days, 48 days, 54 days, and 56 days, respectively. In one case privilege leave was allowed to be accumulated to the extent of 2 years' privilege leave entitlement.

Sick Leave

There were 36 cases in which sick leave has been granted. In 10 cases sick leave was granted for 7 days in a year; in 8 cases it was 10 days a year; in 4 cases 15 days a year; in 3 cases each it was 6 days and 5 days in a year; in 2 cases each it was 25 days and 3 days in a year and in 1 case each it was 4 days, 8 days and 30 days in a year, respectively. In one case sick leave was granted according to the provisions of the Employees' State Insurance Scheme.

- In 24 cases accumulation of sick leave was granted. In 5 cases sick leave was allowed to be accumulated up to 21 days; in 3 cases each it was up to 40 days and 45 days; in 2 cases each it was up to 30 days and 120 days and in 1 case each it was up to 9 days, 10 days, 12 days, 18 days, 20 days, 28 days, 60 days and 100 days, respectively. In Colgate Palmolive (India) Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 112), sick leave for permanent workmen who were covered by the Employees' State Insurance Scheme was non-accumulative.
- In 13 cases a condition was laid down to the effect that the application for sick leave should be supported by a medical certificate. In 7 cases of doubt, the applicants for sick leave had to appear for medical examination before the companies' physician.

Maternity Leave

Five cases of maternity leave were noted during the course of scrutiny. In 2 cases maternity leave was granted as per the provisions of the Employees' State Insurance Act, 1948. In 2 cases it was granted for 60 days and in 1 case it was granted for 56 days. In Chemo-Pharma Laboratories Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 26) and in Franco Indian Pharmaceuticals Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 117) maternity leave was granted with half pay.

In Chemo-Pharma Laboratories Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 26) materrity leave was granted 2 weeks before the date of delivery as certified by a registered medical practitioner. The female employees in this concern were granted maternity leave only on 3 occasions and only when the period between the incidents of delivery was not less than 2 years.

Leave Without Pay

One case was noted. In Khandelwal Laboratories Pvt., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 93) leave without pay for 7 days per year was granted. This leave was not allowed to be accumulated.

Casual Leave

In 35 cases casual leave ranging from 4 days to 10 days were granted. In 16 cases casual leave was granted for 7 days in a year; in 7 cases it was 3 days a year; in 6 cases it was 5 days a year; in 3 cases it was 10 days a year; in 2 cases it was 4 days a year and in one case it was granted for 6 days in a year.

In 6 cases balance of casual leave that was not enjoyed was allowed to be encashed at the end of the year. In Chemo-Pharma Laboratories Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 26) casual leave that was not enjoyed in the year was allowed to be tagged with the privilege leave.

In 2 cases casual leave was not allowed to be prefixed or suffixed to weekly offs or holidays. In 9 cases casual leave was allowed to be prefixed or suffixed (but not both) to holidays or weekly offs.

FESTIVAL HOLIDAYS

In 35 cases festival holidays ranging from 3 days to 23 days were granted. In 6 cases the number of such holidays was 12 days in a year; in 2 cases each it was 3 days, 8 days and 18 days; in 3 cases each it was 4 days and 5 days, in 4 cases each it was 6 days, 10 days and 13 days; in one case each it was 7 days, 9 days, 14 days, 20 days and 23 days in a year.

In 14 cases festival holidays were to be fixed in consultation with workmen or their unions. In the cases examined it was noticed that the following festival holidays were enjoyed by the workmen.

Two cases were noted wherein the number of holidays enjoyed by the workmen was reduced by Industrial Tribunals. In M/s. Pfizer Pvi., Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 14) the company allowed the workmen all holidays under the Negotiable Instruments Act. However, the Industrial Tribunal reduced the number

of holidays to 10 days per year. This case subsequently went into the Supreme Court who confirmed the the decision of the Tribural. Similarly, in Kemp and Co. Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 29), the number of holidays enjoyed by the workmen were reduced by the Industrial Tribunal from 16 days to 12 days in a year.

Overtime

24 cases were noted. In 1 case overtime work in excess of normal hours of work but less than 44 hours of work in a week was paid at the rate of 1½ times of normal wages. In 1 case work in excess of 44 hours in a week was paid at twice the normal rate of wages. Work in excess of normal hours of work but up to 48 hours in a week was paid at the rate of single rate of wages plus dearness allowance in 7 cases, at the rate of 1½ times the daily wage in 3 cases and at the rate of 1½ times in one case. Work in excess of 48 hours in a week was paid at the rate of twice the ordinary rate of wages in 10 cases and at the rate of 1½ times the ordinary rate in one case.

Allowance for Working on Paid Holidays or Weekly off Days

19 cases were noted. In 6 cases whenever an employee worked on a weekly off he was allowed a substituted holiday and half day's additional basic wages and dearness allowances was paid to him. In 2 cases he was allowed a substituted holiday and one day's additional basic wages and dearness allowances were paid to him. In one case, he was given one day's additional basic wage and dearness allowance only.

In 7 cases whenever an employee worked on a paid holiday he was paid one day's additional wage plus dearness allowance. In one case, he was allowed a compensatory off and 1½ day's basic wages and dearness allowance were paid to him. In one case, he was paid 1½ day's basic wage and dearness allowance.

In Hoechst Pharmaceuticals Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 113), if an employee was called for work on Saturday or on a day off given in lieu of Saturday he was paid at the following rate:—

(a) For first 3 hours' work At normal rate of wage.
(b) For hours exceeding 3 hours' work At double the normal rate.

House Rent allowance

In Hindustan Antibiotics Ltd., Pimpri-Poona. (Sr. No. 56), the Company charged 10 per cent of basic pay plus half dearness allowance to those who were provided quarters. Those employees who were provided quarters were not given house rent allowance. Those who were not allotted quarters by the Company were paid house rent allowance at the following rate:—

In Johnson and Johnson of India, Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 100), watchmen were paid Rs. 5 p. m. as house rent allowance as long as they were not provided with accommodation.

Conveyance allowance

In M/s. Sandoz (India) Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 11), the medical representatives were paid head-quarters conveyance allowance of Rs. 5 per working day and an additional allowance of Rs. 2 per working day whenever they worked in the suburbs of Bombay beyond Ghatkopar and Andheri. No allowance was paid for the days on which they were absent from duty for whatever reason.

Machine allowance

Two cases were noted. This allowance was paid to those workmen who worked on embossing machines. In Cynamide India Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 50), machine allowance was paid at the rate of Rs. 15 per month and in Anglo French Drug Company (Eastern) Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 122), the machine allowance was paid at the rate of Rs. 10 per month.

Lunch allowance

6 cases were noted wherein lunch allowance was paid to the employee. Details regarding the pay ment of lunch allowance were as follows:—

Shift allowance

2 cases were noted. In Sandoz India Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 9), all workmen excluding watchmen working on shifts by rotation were paid shift allowance on the basis of the actual shift attendance as follows:-

- (a) Shift allowance for working in the 2nd shift .. 0.40 Paise per shift.
- (b) Shift allowance for working in the 3rd shift 0.60 Paise per shift.

Shift allowance was paid only to those employees who worked in rotation on shifts. It was not paid to employees permanently assigned particular shifts.

In Glaxo Laboratories (India) Pvt. Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 99), workmen rotating from one shift to another after 6 working days and 2 days of rest or workmen working in regular night shifts were paid at the rate of Rs. 15 per month. Those workmen who worked in the 2nd shift (after-noon) were paid 0.50 nP. for each shift worked and those employees who worked in the 3rd shift (at night) were paid an amount of Rs. 0.75 paise for each shift worked.

In Johnson and Johnson of India Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 100), all workmen except watchmen were paid night-shift allowance at the following rate:-

- (a) If the regular shift ended between 10.00 p.m. and 5 per cent of the total emoluments shall be up to midnight.
 - paid as shift allowance on the day on which they work.
- (b) If the regular shift ended after midnight but 72 per cent of the total emoluments shall before or at 7.30 a.m.
 - be paid as shift allowance.

In Colgate Palmolive (India) Pvt. Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 107), a shift allowance was paid to the employees at the rate of 0.25 paise per shift except in the general shift.

Outstation allowance

One case was noted. In Hindustan Antibiotics Ltd., Pimpri-Poona (Sr. No. 56), the various rates of outstation allowance were as follows:-

MEDICAL AID

Two cases weer noted during the course of the scrutiny. In Ayurvedashram Pharmacy Ltd., Ahmednagar (Sr. No. 53), the company provided to the employees of the company free medical treatment available in both the Ayurvedic and Allopathic sections of the Ayurvedic Hospital.

In Hoechst Pharmaceuticals Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 125), the company introduced a medical aid scheme with the following features:—

(a) The medical aid scheme applied to only permanent employees excluding those who were covered under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme.

(b) An employee had to produce vouchers together with the medical certificate.

(c) The company granted a medical aid of Rs. 50 to each employee during each calendar year.
(d) Deserving cases in which expenses exceeded Rs. 50, excess amount of expenditure was consi-

dered for payment.

(e) Out of every medical bills, Rs. 5 in case of clerical and higher paid staff and Rs. 3 in case of subordinate staff, was borne by the employee concerned.

- (f) The following types of illness or eventualities were specifically excluded from the medical aid scheme:—
 - (i) Cosmetic Surgery.

(ii) Rest Courses.

(iii) Maternity Expenses.

(iv) Congenital anomalies.

(v) Expenses incurred in respect of age glasses, dental treatment, dentures, veneral diseases intentional self injury, dissipation or drunkenness.

RETIREMENT AGE

18 cases were found during the relevant period. In 8 cases the age of retirement was fixed at 58 years and in 4 cases each it was fixed at 60 years and 55 years respectively.

In two cases, (1) Ayurvedashram Pharmacy Ltd., Ahmednagar (Sr. No. 53) and (2), Parke-Davis (India) Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 81), the retirement age fixed for male employees was different from the retirement age fixed for female employees. It was 58 years and 52 years for male employees and female employees respectively in Ayurvedashram Pharmacy Ltd., and 60 years and 55 years for male and female employees respectively in Parke-Davis (India) Pvt. Ltd.

PERMANENCY

There were 13 concerns in which permanency periods were considered. In 9 concerns a workman was made permanent after he had worked for a period of 6 months and in 2 concerns each he was made permanent after the period of service of permanency 9 months and 240 days respectively.

WORKING HOURS

13 cases were noted. In 3 cases each the working hours were 45 hours in a week and 48 hours in a week respectively. In 2 cases the working hours were 37½ in a week. In one case, each the working hours were 38½, 40, 44, 44½ and 46 hours in a week respectively.

PROVISION OF FREE TEA

In Johnson and Johnson of India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 100), the hourly rated employees were supplied with one cup of tea (per working day) during tea-breaks in the morning and afternoon. In Colgate Palmolive (India) Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 107), the workmen were provided with one free cup of tea per shift.

FESTIVAL ADVANCE

In Johnson and Johnson of India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 87), the Company gave festival advance to its employees on the following conditions:—

- (a) On an application by an employee the company shall pay an advance of Rs. 15 immediately prior to any festival period.
 - (b) This facility will not be allowed for more than 2 times in a calendar year.
- (c) The amount of advance will be recovered in one instalment from the pay of the month during which the advance is made.

DEMOTION

In Raptakos Brett and Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 61), in the event of a reduction of vacancies in any particular grade the management reserved the right to demote workers to a lower grade. The considerations governing such demotions were the period of service and adverse entries in the service records. The demotions were made only in case reduction in vacancies remained effective for 3 months or more. Such demotions did not however affect the workers' basic salary but only the annual increments and maximum of the grade. Such demoted workers excepting those demoted for had record were entitled to promotion to their old grade in the event of vacancies in order of their seriority.

In Hoechst Pharmaceuticals Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 82), employees were demoted for 3 months for slow down in production or inefficiency. If they still continued to be slow and inefficient they were removed from service. All such actions were taken in consultation with the employees' representatives.

SPORTS CLUB

In Beecham India Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 95), and in Colgate Palmotive (India) Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 107), the companies contributed to the expenses incurred on sports clubs, staff socials to the maximum of Rs. 200 per year.

SUPPLY OF PHARMACEUTICAL PRODUCTS

In Sandoz India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 9), the company supplied to the workmen such reasonable quantities of the companies pharmaceutical products as required by them and their immediate families at the standard retail price less a rebate of 33½ per cent.

SUBSIDISED TRANSPORT

In Hoechst Pharmaceuticals Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 82), the company subsidised the transport expenses from the railway station to the factory and back by 2/3rds while the employee paid 1/3 of the actual cost.

PROVISION OF FREE MILK

In Hocclet Pharmaceuticals Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 82 and Sr. No. 113), those employees who worked continuously wearing masks or special goggles and those employees who even required to work under sterile conditions and acid fumes were provided with I little of milk free of charge per working day.

LEAVE EARLY

In Hoechst Pharmaceuticals Pvt. Ltd., Bombay. (Sr. No. 113), the company allowed its employees to leave work-places earlier on the following conditions:—

- (a) No employee could leave early without prior sanction in writing.
- (b) This facility could be used for not more than 3 times in a month.
- (c) If the total time exceeded one hour in one calendar month, proportionate wages were deducted.

PROVIDENT FUND

Ten cases were noticed during the relevant period; of these in 7 cases rate of contribution of employers and employees was mentioned. In 3 cases the rate of contribution was according to the Employees' Provident Fund Scheme, 1952; in 2 cases the rate of contribution was $6\frac{1}{4}$ per cent of the monthly wages and in one case each the rate of contribution was fixed at $8\frac{1}{3}$ per cent and 8 per cent of the monthly wages respectively.

GRATUITY SCHEMES

The Committee examined 30 gratuity schemes formulated during the relevant period. A table showing the details of the amounts of gratuity granted is attached herewith.

For working on paid holidays either a compensatory day off or in addition to normal wages and Dearness Allowance, additional basic wages and Dearness Allowance for that day were awarded.

AGE OF RETIREMENT

By an unpublished award, dated 24-7-61 (Sr. No. 3) the age of superannuation or retirement was fixed at 60 years in the case of workmen employed up to the date of award and 58 years in the case of workmen employed after the date of award with a right to continue up to 60 years if found physically and mentally fit by the Company's doctor.

MEDICAL AID

By an Award published (Sr. No. 7) in the M.G.G., Part I-L, dated 1-6-67 (pages 2334—2337) a medical aid scheme for monthly, daily and piece rated employees, who were not covered under the Employees' State Insurance Act, 1948 was framed. The provisions and particulars of scheme are attached herewith.

PRODUCTION BONUS

The Production Bonus Scheme was awarded by an award published (Sr. No. 7) in the M.G.G., Part I-L, dated 1-6-67 (pages 2334—2337). The details of the scheme are attached herewith.

The demand for Production Bonus on production of book matches was rejected by the Tribunal as it felt that the increase in production is due to more mechanisation and not due to increase in efforts of workmen vide award published in the M.G.G., Part I-L, dated 26-12-63 (pages 4466—4470).

GRATUITY

The demand for increasing the maximum gratuity under the existing gratuity scheme was rejected by the Tribunal by its award published in the M.G.G., Part I-L, dated 14-3-63 (pages 809 to 816) on the ground that the existing total emoluments of the workmen were so satisfactory that there was scope for them to save for the future and hence there was no need to liberalise the gratuity scheme. Moreover, the existing scheme was neither unfair nor out of line with the prevailing schemes in the region.

However, the existing scheme of grauity was amended to the effect that gratuity should not be withheld in the case of misconduct; but if a workman was dismissed for misconduct causing financial loss to the Company the gratuity would not be payable to the extent of the amount of the loss.

The factory employees not covered by the Employees' State Insurance Act, 1948 and the scheme framed thereunder shall be paid each year, in case of sickness under the Rules given below the medical benefit to the extent of 60 per cent of the medical bills submitted and approved by the Management provided, however, no amount shall be payable in respect of medical bills exceeding the total value of Rs. 500 in a year. In other words the maximum medical aid thus payable to an employee in a year shall not exceed Rs. 300. This medical aid will be payable only if the following Rules are observed:—

- 1. The patient must in the first instant be examined by the Company's Medical Officer or by such Specialist duly recommended by him.
- 2. The result of each examination should be submitted in writing to the Management with the Medical Officer's recommendation.
- 3. The patient should submit a written application to the Management in which he should state what special treatment as per the Company's Medical Officer's recommendation he intends to undergo (such as surgical operation, medicines, etc.) and to which hospital or specialist he intends to go.
- 4. The Management's prior approval in writing should be obtained, for treatment, medicines, etc., to qualify for such medical aid. However, in urgent cases where it is not possible for the employee to take prior permission in writing, he should do so at the earliest opportunity.
- 5. The employee should indicate in his application the approximate maximum charges likely to be incurred by him on account of his illness.
- 6. Only those bills will be passed which are properly made out giving the necessary details to enable the Management to verify such bills.
- 7. The employee should in all cases obtain proper receipt for consultation, hospital charges if any, and purchase medicines. The employee shall be entitled to reimbursement in accordance with the scheme only on production of proper receipts duly stamped and signed.
- 8. Only those medicines which are obtaind against proper prescription will rank for payment. Such prescription should be attached with the bills. Altrenatively, cash memos should be duly signed by the Medical authority concerned.

Statement showing details of the Production Bonus Scheme in the Western India Match Co. Ltd.

Production bonus will be paid to all permanent employees of the factory in respect of the manufacture of all types of matches except the Book Matches on the following lines:—

- 2. 'A' means 50 gross of box matches (wax, wood or any other material).
- 3. 'Production per day' means total production of matches of any calendar month converted 50 gross cases, irrespective of sizes, divided by the scheduled working hours of a shift for the month multiplied by 8.5 hours.
- 4. Profit bonus, Dearness Allowance, and other benefits or allowances of whatsoever kind shall not form part of basic wages for purpose of calculating Production Bonus.
- 5. In case Profit Bonus, Dearness Allowance and other benefits or allowances or part thereof, come to be included in basic wages then the Management will be at liberty to amend this scheme suitably in consultation with the parties concerned.
- 6. The above scheme of Production Bonus supersedes all previous Circulars and/or Factory orders of the company in respect of Production Bonus payment. Except to the extent of the revision made by this Settlement, the existing practice regarding calculation and payment of Production Bonus shall be continued.
- 7. In case the monthly production of this factory exceeds an average of 600 cases per day for a period of 2 months during the period of 12 months, it will be open to the parties to negotiate as regards the quantum, of Production Bonus that should be paid in respect of cases produced over 60 cases per day.
- 8. The Management shall be at liberty during the pendency of this Settlement to introduce a third shift in any other department or departments of the factory in addition to the third shift in the Dipping Department.
- 9. The parties also agree that the existing norm of 260 cases per day and the existing practice of excluding the special quality matches intended for the Armed Forces, from the Production Bonus Scheme, shall remained unaltered.
- 10. This revised Production Bonus Scheme shall come into effect from 1st of November 1966 and the difference in Production Bonus payable from November 1966 to April 1967, shall be paid within one month from the date hereof.

PAINTS AND VARNISHES

The previous Norms Committee defined this industry as 'Manufacturing of Dyes, Paints, Colours and Varnishes'. The same definition is adopted by the present Committee.

During the relevant period the Committee examined 13 Awards and 10 Settlements under the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 and 2 Settlements under the Central Provinces and Berar Industrial Disputes Settlement Act, 1947. All the Awards and Settlements under the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, are from Bombay Division. The divisionwise break up of the material examined is as below:—

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

There were 19 cases in which the question of Wages and Dearness Allowance was dealt with. Out of these 19 cases, only wages were considered in 4 cases, only Dearness Allowance in 2 cases, wages and Dearness Allowance together in 9 cases and increment in 1 case. In the remaining 3 cases ad-hoc increase was given in existing wages.

A statement showing the names of the 19 concerns wherein wages and Dearness Allowance, etc., were awarded or agreed is attached herewith.

It was seen that the workmen in this industry were divided into daily rated and monthly rated. The monthly rated workmen were classified into subordinate staff and office staff. The daily rated workmen were usually working as operatives in the factory, while the monthly rated subordinate workmen include watchmen, peons and subordinate staff in the factory. The technical staff was engaged in the laboratories attached to the factories and the clerical staff was employed in offices. The workmen were divided into 4 general classes namely (1) Unskilled, (2) Semi-skilled, (3) Skilled and (4) Highly Skilled.

It was observed that minimum basic wages paid to unskilled workmen were Rs. 1.25 per day, rising by 10 paise to Rs. 2.25 per day. The semi-skilled workers were paid Rs. 1.75 per day rising by 15 paise to 3.25 per day. Skilled workmen started on Rs. 2.25 per day rising by 20 paise to Rs. 4.25 per day. Highly-skilled workmen were paid Rs. 3.50 per day rising by 25 paise to Rs. 7.50 per day. In the case of monthly rated workmen it was observed that unskilled workmen were paid basic wage of Rs. 30 per

month rising by Rs. 1.50 to Rs. 45 per month, semi-skilled started on Rs. 35 per month rising by Rs. 2.50 to Rs. 60 per month, skilled started on Rs. 45 per month rising by Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 80 per month, Highly-skilled started on Rs. 85 per month, rising by Rs. 5 to Rs. 125 per month.

The clerical and supervisory staff have been divided into different grades according to the nature of their duties. The lowest scale for Junior Clerk was Rs. 60—5—100—EB—7.50—120; for Senior Clerks it was Rs. 140—10—190—EB—12.50—240—15—345. Senior Chemists were started on Rs. 220 per month rising up to Rs. 450 per month.

Overseers and other technical staff were paid basic alary of Rs. 60 per month rising up to Rs. 230 per month.

Truck Drivers, Car Drivers were paid Rs. 60 per month rising up to Rs. 110 per month.

Dearness allowance:

It was seen that there was no uniformity in the rates of Dearness Allowance which were granted in this industry. In most of the cases it was linked up to the Consumer Price Index Number.

Adjustment of wages:

The adjustment of revised wage-scales with the existing one's was done on the following lines:-

- (a) Workers, whose existing wages were less than the minimum of the revised wage-scales should be given the minimum of the revised scale.
- (b) If his existing wage was more than the minimum of the revised scale but not a stage in the revised scale, it should be stepped up to the next higher stage in the scale.
- (c) No workman should be adversely affected due to the adjustment in the revised wage-scales.

ALLOWANCES

Holiday working allowance:

In M/s. Goodlass Nerolac Paints Pvt., Ltd. (Sr. No. 9), for working on weekly off days workmen were paid 1½ times of daily basic wage plus Dearness Allowance with a substituted off and for working on paid festival holidays they were paid double their basic wage plus Dearness Allowance but no substituted holidays.

In M/s. British Paints (India) Ltd. (Sr. No. 21) for working on weekly holiday or on public holiday observed by the management, workmen were paid one day's extra wages and a compensatory holiday in the succeeding week.

Milk allowance:

In M/s. Hard-Castle and Waud Manufacturing Company, Ltd. (Sr. No. 18) workmen who weigh white lead pigments and work on sodium chloride were paid As. 8 per day in addition to their wages.

Outdoor Lunch allowance:

In M/s. Goodlass Nerolac Paints Pvt., Ltd. (Sr. No. 19) workmen were entitled to pay as below:—
Daily rated and subordinate staff ... Rs. 1.25 per day.

Other monthly rated staff ... Rs. 2.00 per day.

In M/s. British Paints (India) Ltd. (Sr. No. 21), whenever a driver or subordinate staff were sent outside on company's work and were unable to come back during lunch hours they were entitled to be paid Re. 1.00 per day as outdoor lunch allowance.

Cash allowance:

In M/s. British Paints (India) Ltd. (Sr. No. 21), the peon who was entrusted the work of collecting cash on behalf of the management from a Bank was entitled to Rs. 5 per month, as cash allowance.

Overtime allowance:

In M/s. British Paints (India) Ltd. (Sr. No. 21), this allowance is paid as below:—

- 1. For working beyond existing hours of work but up to scheduled hours Single rate. of work under the Shops Act.
- 2. For working beyond 48 hours As per Shops and Establishment Act.

Night Shift allowance:

In M/s. Bombay Paints and Allied Products Pvt., Ltd. (Sr. No. 17), workmen are paid additional wage of Re. 0.15 per day for working on night shift.

LEAVE

A statement showing the names of 11 concerns wherein various kinds of leaves were awarded or agreed is attached.

Privilege Leave:

Only 5 cases were noticed wherein the question of privilege leave was dealt with. The leave was allowed at the following rates:—

The accumulation of privilege leave was allowed in 4 cases as follows:—

In M/s. Asian Oil and Paint Co. (India), Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 15), workmen were allowed to encash the excess over one month of privilege leave to his credit to the extent of 14 days only.

Sick Leave:

There were only 4 cases which were examined wherein this leave was granted at the following rates:—

In M/s. British Paints (India) Ltd. (Sr. No. 21), this leave was allowed to be taken together with privilege leave at the discretion of the management in deserving cases where it was supported by a certificate from a registered medical practitioner.

Leave without pay:

The Committee examined 2 cases (Sr. Nos. 17 and 20) in which this leave was granted at the rate of 15 days in a year.

Casual Leave:

In all 8 cases were examined in which this leave was dealt with. The leave was granted at the following rates:—

In M/s. Machinery Paints and Chemicals Pvt. Ltd. Bombay (Sr. No. 22), workmen who have put in more than six months continuous service were allowed this leave.

In M/s. British Paints (India) Ltd. (Sr. No. 21), this leave was allowed to be prefixed or suffixed to weekly off days and other holidays with the previous permission of the management. Not more than 3 days casual leave at a time was allowed.

UNIFORMS

Committee examined 8 cases in which uniforms have been sanctioned. In all cases 2 sets of uniforms consisting of either half pants and shirts or full pants and underwares were given. In the case of M/s. Jonson and Company, Bombay (Sr. No. 12) spray-painters were provided with over-alls.

In 3 cases the management agreed to make arrangements for washing of the uniforms.

PERMANENCY

In the case of M/s. Bombay Paints and Allied Products Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 17), workmen who have put in 240 working days within a period of 2 years were classified as permanent workmen.

In M/s. British Paints (India) Ltd. (Sr. No. 21) Drivers were made permanent after 6 months service and other workmen after 3 months service.

ATTENDANCE BONUS

In M/s. Machinery Paints and Chemicals (India) Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 16) workmen who actually works on all working days in a month were entitled for one day extra wages as attendance bonus.

MEDICAL EXPENSES

In M/s. British Paints (India) Ltd. (Sr. No. 21) the management agreed to bear medical expenses (excepting tonics and foods) of the employees during their sickness as approved by the Medical Officer of the Company.

PROVIDENT FUND

The Committee scrutinised six cases wherein Provident Fund Schemes were introduced.

In M/s. Goodlass Nerolac Paints Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 2) the rate of contribution was awarded as 8-1/3 per cent of the basic wage/salary or 6½ per cent of total salary (basic wage and Dearness Allowance) whichever was more. The management of M/s. Noble Paint and Varnish Co., Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 23), revised the existing rates of contribution on this line.

In M/s. Goodlass Nerolac Paints Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 19), the scheme was applicable to the staff at head office was made applicable to the factory workmen.

GRATUITY

8 Cases came to the notice of the Committee in which gratuity schemes were awarded or agreed to. In the case of M/s. Noble Paints and Varnish Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 23) the existing scheme was modified, as a result of which a dismissed workers would be entitled to full gratuity except in case where the misconduct has resulted in financial loss to the Company. In that case the management would be entitled to recover such loss from the gratuity payable to the worker.

A statement showing he details of the gratuity payable is attached.

OIL INDUSTRY

In this industry the Committee adopted the same definition which was adopted by the previous Norms Committee for the purpose of classification of Settlements, Agreements and Awards. The definition is as follow:—

" Production of Ghee, Butter, Cheese, Edible Fats and Oil including Hydrogenated Oil".

During the relevant period the Committee scrutinized and examined 17 Awards (16 published and 1 unpublished), 21 Settlements under the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 and 3 Awards and 2 Settlements under the Central Provinces and Berar Industry Disputes and Settlement Act, 1947.

WAGE AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The question of wages and Dearness Allowance was involved in 34 cases. Out of these two cases dealt with Dearness Allowance only, wage scales were revised in 14 cases, both dearness allowance and revision wages were granted in 11 cases and ad-hoc increments in wages were granted in 7 cases. A statement showing the wages, dearness allowance and increments decided in 34 cases is attached herewith.

It may be mentioned here that this industry is a scheduled industry under the Minimum Wages Act 1948 and the minimum wages have been fixed vide Govt. Notification, Industries and Labour Department No. MWA 1662-LAB III, dated 30-4-1964.

ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES

The adjustment of wages in the revised scales was done according to the following rules:-

- 1. In case the existing basic wages of an employee were less than the minimum of the revised scale he should get the minimum of the revised scale.
- 2. In case the existing wage of an employee were equal to the minimum of the revised scale or above, he should be stepped up to the nearest higher stage in the revised scale.
- 3. In case the existing wage of an employee is more than the maximum of the revised scale he shall continue to get the same and the extra amount shall be treated as his personal pay.
 - 4. Dates of annual increments would remain unaltered.

INCREMENTS IN THE REVISED SCALE FOR LENGTH OF SERVICE

In 8 cases increments were granted after adjustment of existing wages in the revised scales as below:—

.. No increment. (a) For service less than a year (b) For service of 1 year but less than 2 years One (1 case). (c) For 3 years service .. One (1 case). (d) For more than 2 years but less than 4 years Two (1 case). (e) For more than 3 years but less than 6 years Two (1 case). (f) For 4 years or more .. Two (1 case). (g) For 6 years or more Three (1 case). (h) For 7 years or more ... Three (1 case).

LEAVE

The Committee noted that in 24 concerns various kinds of leave were considered. A statement showing the names of these 24 concerns and the various types of leave granted is attached:

Privilege Leave

The Committee examined Six cases in which privilege leave has been granted. They are all from Bombay Division. In 3 cases (Sr. Nos. 12, 37, 39) it was granted according to the provision of the Factories Act, 1948; in one case (Sr. Nos. 40) 20 days; in one case (Sr. No. 28) leave as available under the statutory provisions plus additional 6 days was granted; in one case (Sr. No. 3) it was fixed at one month on completion of 11 months service.

Only in one case (Sr. No. 3) accumulation of leave up to 90 days was granted.

Sick Leave

The Committee noted 10 cases in which sick leave has been granted. They are all from Bombay Division. In one case (Sr. No. 12) it was 4 days a year; in one, (Sr. No. 13) it was at the rate of 5 days a year for monthly rated employees only; in five cases (Sr. Nos. 27, 29, 30, 31 and 32) it was at the rate of six days in a year; in two cases (Sr. No. 14 and 33) it was at the rate of 7 days with half pay; in one case (Sr. No. 39) it was according to the provisions of the Employees State Insurance Act.

In 5 cases this leave was agreed to be accumulated upto 24 days; in one case it was allowed to be accumulated upto 28 days; in one case accumulation was agreed upto 21 days on full pay to all monthly rated employees and 42 days on half pay or 21 days on full pay in case of those who are not covered by the Employees State Insurance Scheme.

In Six cases condition was laid down to the effect that the application for leave should be supported by a medical certificate.

Leave without Wages

Six cases of this leave were noted during the course of the scrutiny. They are all from Bombay Division. In one case it was at the rate of 7 days in a year, in one case it was at the rate of 10 days; in three cases it was at the rate of 15 days and in one case it was at 20 days.

In one case accumulation of this leave was agreed upto 30 days and in another case accumulation allowed upto 40 days.

In one case it was allowed to be annexed to the privilege leave. In two cases managements agreed to consider applications for this leave favourably in genuine cases and in cases of workmen who hail from a long distance.

Casual Leave

Eleven cases of this leave were noted during the relevant period. In 2 cases it was at the rate of 4 days in a year; in 4 cases it was at 5 days, and in 5 cases it was 7 days in a year.

In one case balance of casual leave not enjoyed was allowed to be encashed at the end of the year.

Festival Holidays

In all 18 cases were noted wherein festival holidays ranging from 3 to 10 days were granted. In one case the number of such days was 3 days; in 3 cases it was 4 days; in 4 cases it was 5 days; in 7 cases it was 6 days; in one case it was 10 days; in one case it was as per rules for Maharashtra Government employees and in one case 2 more holidays were agreed upon.

In 4 cases holidays were to be fixed in consultation with workmen or their unions. In the cases examined it was noticed that following festival holidays were enjoyed:-

ALLOWANCES

Officiating Allowance

There was one case (Sr. No. 3) in which this allowance was paid when an employee was asked to work in a higher grade for more than 15 days. If his existing salary was less than the minimum of the higher grade, he was to be given the minimum of this higher grade and if he was drawing more than the minimum of the higher grade, he was to be paid his present pay plus one stage in the higher grade.

Allowance for working on paid holidays or weekly off days

In M/s. Swastik Oil Mills Ltd., (Sr. No. 4) whenever a clerk from factory worked on any paid holidays he was allowed a substituted holiday and half days additional basic salary.

In the Tata Oil Mills Ltd., (Sr. No. 22) allowance for working on weekly off days was extended to the Watch and Ward and Canteen Staff and the practice of giving compensatory holidays was discontinued.

Lunch Allowance

In the Jai Hind Oil Mills Company, Bombay (Sr. No. 9), Rs. 1.50 was paid to those employees who were sent out for outdoor duty and could not return during the lunch interval. For Drivers and Cleaners it was allowed if they are sent out before 11.30 a.m.

In the case of the Tata Oil Mills Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 22) monthly rated employees were granted Rs. 1.25 and daily rated Re. 0.75 whenever they are deputed on outdoor work during their lunch interval.

Permanency

In this subject 7 cases were noted. In 3 cases (Sr. No. 10, 11 and 13) workers who had put in 6 months service were made permanent. In one case (Sr. No. 14) workmen who worked for an aggregate period of 150 days in a year were made permanent, whereas in the case of Tata Oil Mills Co. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 16) the limit was laid down at 240 days service for permanency. In the remaining two cases it was decided to make permanent few workmen according to seniority and effeciency.

Retirement

In 1 case (Sr. No. 40) the age of retirement was fixed at 58 years.

In 2 cases (Sr. No. 3 and 10) Watchmen, Peons, Drivers, Boiler Attendants and Fitters, were provided with 2 sets of uniforms in a year.

6 cases of gratuity were examined by the Committee during the relevant period. A table showing the details of the amounts of gratuity granted is attached herewith.

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The question of Wages and Dearness Allowance was involved in 37 cases. Out of these 6 cases dealt with Dearness Allowance only, Wage scales were revised in 9 cases, both Dearness Allowance and revision of wages were granted in 18 cases and ad-hoc increase in wages is granted in 4 cases. A statement showing wages, dearness allowance, etc., decided in 37 cases is attached herewith.

It may be mentioned here that this industry is a scheduled industry under the Minimum Wages Act, 1948. The Minimum Wages in this industry have been fixed, vide Government Notification, Industries and Labour Department, No. MWA-5562-Lab-III, dated 30th April 1964.

Adjustment of wages

The adjustment of wages in revised scales was done according to the following rules:-

- (a) Workers, whose existing wages are less than the minimum of the revised wage scales shall be given the minimum of the revised scales.
- (b) If his existing wage is more than the minimum of the revised scale but not a stage in the revised scale, it shall be stepped up to the next higher stage in the scale.
 - (c) No workman shall be adversely affected due to the adjustment in the revised wage scales.

Adjustment / Service Increment

Service increments after adjustments were given in 6 cases (Sr. Nos. 5, 8, 10, 24, 30 and 43) as follows:—

Length of Service

Number of increments

(a) Less than one year No increment. (b) More than one year up to 5 years One increment. (c) Above 7 years Two increments.

Dearness Allowance

In the Firestone Tyre & Rubber Co. of India Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 10) the existing rate of Dearness Allowance paid to all factory workmen is at the uniform rate at the Revised Textile Scale. The Tribunal observed that the Textile Scale only neutralises the rise in the Cost of Living of the lowest category only. In their opinion the Dearness Allowance needed to be revised so as to provide some increases in the higher slabs. The recent trend in the case of flourishing concerns towards dearness allowance is according to slab system for factory workers also. An additional circumstances that has to be borne in mind in the case of this concern is that a large proportion of workers have had their basic wages on the straight piece-rate system providing for adequate differentials in the base rate and providing earnings at a higher rate than for time-rated workmen. A piece-rated workman may, therefore, earn basic wages in a particular month by working hard but it does not mean that the standard of living had changed so as to require a proportionate increase in the Dearness Allowance also.

LEAVE

A statement showing the names of the 25 concerns wherein various kinds of leaves were awarded or agreed is attached.

Privilege Leave

There were only 4 cases wherein the question of privilege leave was allowed at the following rates:

As per the Factories Act, 1948 ... 2 cases (Sr. Nos. 41, 47).

21 days in a year 1 case (Sr. No. 47).

1 day for every 15 days work ... 1 case (Sr. No. 13).

28 days in a year 1 case (Sr. No. 3).

The accumulation of privilege leave was allowed in 2 cases as follows:

40 days 1 case.

56 days 1 case.

Sick Leave

In the Goodyear India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 12) while rejecting the demand for accumulation of present sick leave beyond 42 days the Tribunal observed that most of the ailments can be cured in 42 days. Therefore accumulation of sick leave to the extent of 42 days does not appear to be inadequate. If a person is not able to get well in 42 days, because his ailment is chronic he is not likely to get cured in 60 days. The demand that the company should be compelled to give sick leave without production of certificate from a competent medical practitioner was rejected being untenable and unreasonable.

In M/s. Korula Rubber Works Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 21) the workmen who are not covered by the E. S. I. Scheme are granted 10 days sick leave in a year with full pay and it is allowed to be accumulated up to 30 days. Those who are covered by the E. S. I. Scheme are given 7 days with half pay.

In M/s. Waterproof Corporation Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 34) 4 days sick leave in a year was allowed.

In M/s. Ceat Tyres of India Ltd. (Sr. No. 47) it was agreed to give monthly rated workers 7 days sick leave in a year with wages with permission to accumulate it up to 42 days.

In M/s. Swastik Rubber Products sick leave is granted at the rate of 5 days per year with permission to accumulate it up to 15 days.

Maternity Leave:

In Ceat Tyres of India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 47) maternity leave for eight weeks is allowed to married women (monthly rated) who have been in continuous employment for not less than one year, prior to the date of confinement.

Leave Without Pay:

In M/s. Inarco Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 43) workers having their native place in Uttar Pradesh are allowed leave without pay up to one month.

In M/s. Ceat Tyres of India Ltd., in the case of daily rated employees whose homes are situated at a distance of more than 48 hours travelling, it is agreed that the management in their sole discretion grant such leave without pay as they consider necessary to cover the period spent in travelling. In the case of monthly rated workmen leave without pay is left to the discretion of the management.

Casual Leave:

There are 13 cases in which this leave was dealt with. The leave was granted at the following rates:—

In 4 cases (Sr. Nos. 13, 29, 36 and 47) the workers were allowed to prefix or suffix casual leave to a holiday or weekly off but not to both.

In 3 cases (Sr. Nos. 2, 32 and 35) it is not allowed to be prefixed or suffixed to any weekly off.

In 1 case (Sr. No. 13) casual leave is allowed to be encashed at the end of a year in case it is not consumed.

In 2 cases (Sr. Nos. 29 and 47) not more than 3 days leave at a time is allowed; in one case at (Sr. No. 36) not more than 2 days leave at a time is allowed.

Festival Holidays:

There are 21 cases in which festival holidays have been allowed. They are as below:-

In M/s. Ceat Tyres of India (Sr. No. 47) by Settlement workers are granted following types of leaves:—

Accident Leave:

A daily rated worker suffering injury in course of duty in the factory, will for the period of his incapacitation from work, be first required to utilise the privilege leave to his credit up to 50 per cent of such leave. Beyond that period he will be granted leave on half pay for the period of his incapacitation. Where the worker is permanently incapacitated from working no such leave will be granted beyond the period of his hospitalization. No such leave will be granted unless the period of incapacitation exceeds 15 days and the injury is of such a nature as to require hospitalization.

Bonus Privilege Leave:

Daily rated workmen are to be given leave for good attendance at the following rates for actual days worked per calendar year at the following rates:—

275 days or more ... 1 day. 280 days or more ... 2 days. Over 282 days ... 4 days.

Such bonus leave will not be paid in cash but shall be credited to the worker's leave account. Accumulation of leave shall be allowed up to 2 years leave.

Sports Leave:

Workers who have had one year's service with the Company are allowed 14 days Sports Leave with pay and allowances for participating in recognised University, State, National, Commonwealth, Asian or International meets and tournaments.

AL LOWANCES

Officiating Allowance:

In M/s. Goodyear India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 15) for officiating for fourteen days or more, worker is paid in addition to his normal salary, half the difference between the minimum of his basic wage and the minimum of the basic wage of the person in whose place he officiates.

In Rawal Rubber Works (India) Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 37) and in Ceat Tyres of India Ltd. (Sr. No. 46) for officiating fourteen days or more, the worker is paid at the following rates:—

- (a) If his existing salary is less than the minimum of the grade in which he officiates he will be paid the minimum of the higher grade.
- (b) If his existing salary is more than the minimum of higher grade, he will be given the next higher stage in the grade.

Lunch Allowance:

In India Tyres & Rubber Co. (India) Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 38) all workmen are paid Re. 1 per day as Lunch Allowance with effect from 1st January 1961 for the days they are present excluding Saturday, Sundays and Holidays.

Allowance for Cash Handling Occasionally:

In Swastik Rubber Products Ltd. (Sr. No. 24) the clerks other than cashier who are required to handle large amount of cash occasionally on the pay day are paid on allowance of Rs. 3 for the work.

Allowance for Strain of Work:

In Swastik Rubber Products Ltd. (Sr. No. 52) with effect from 1st October 1962, Drivers and Cleaners are paid 10 per cent extra of their salary (basic plus Dearness Allowance) for the strain of work they have to undergo as and when the necessity of continuous work exists.

Shift Allowance:

In Ceat Tyres of India Ltd. (Sr. No. 46) all workers while working in the third shift will be paid 5 per cent of their wages (inclusive of Dearness Allowance) as a shift allowance.

In all the above concerns the managements agreed to arrange to get the uniforms washed once a week or pay the workers adequate washing charges.

In the Firestone Tyre & Rubber Co. of India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 11) the Tribunal directed that the management should pay to all hourly rated workmen (time and piece-rated) on the permanent roll of the Company on 1st January 1963 and thereafter on 1st January of each succeeding year, a yearly allowance of Rs. 65 to cover a cost of work-clothes and their washing. If this system for any reason does not work satisfactorily and the amount is not utilised for the purpose for which it is meant the management may give from 1st January 1964, 3 pairs of suitable uniforms consisting of 2 pieces each every year and give in addition Rs. 30 per annum as washing allowance.

In the Goodyear India Ltd. (Sr. No. 12) and In M/s. International Tyre Service Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 13) workers who are called upon to handle material and workers working in the Packing Department or in Transportation Department are supplied with one overall every year or are paid Rs. 10 per year in lieu thereof.

PERMANENCY

Six cases were noted in which permanency has been granted. In 2 cases (Sr. Nos. 26 and 30) workmen who work for a continuous period of 100 days were made permanent. In 2 cases (Sr. Nos. 32 and 47) workmen who had put in 180 days continuous service were made permanent. In one case (Sr. No. 13) workmen who work for 240 days in course of a year are deemed permanent.

In Imperial Tyre & Rubber Co., Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 36) workmen are made permanent in accordance with the Model Standing Orders.

MEDICAL-AID

In Goodyear India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 12) the management gives medical-aid to the workers employed in their Bombay office who earn a monthly salary or wage less than Rs. 450 per month. The Company is to bear half the charges of the bill that would have been paid by the workers for treatment given to him for the ailment lasting for a period in excess of 2 days taken only from a qualified doctor holding a degree of the Bombay University or its equivalent. The Company will bear expenses on this account up to Rs. 250 during one year. This benefit will be entitled to be accumulated up to Rs. 600.

ATTENDANCE BONUS

In Carona Sahu Co. Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 33) with effect from 1st May 1960 workmen are paid attendance bonus at Rs. 6.75 per month if they work for all the working days in the month. For this purpose (i) "casual leave, with pay" for one day availed in a month in which the working days are more than 24 days, (2) "Annual leave with wages" availed of under the provisions of the Factories Act and (3) "Paid holidays" granted will be treated as days "Worked".

GROUP ATTENDANCE BONUS

In Carona Sahu Co. Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 33) if a group of workmen which is notified by the Factory Manager qualify, themselves for the attendance bonus each member of the group shall be entitled to an additional attendance bonus at Rs. 3.37 per month.

PRODUCTION BONUS

The rate of production bonus is uniform for all classes of workmen at 2 nP. per percentage increase in production. Defective Products are not taken into account for this purpose.

SUPPLY OF SOAP

In M/s. International Tyre Service Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 13) each worker is supplied every month two cakes of standard soap which is unscented and of ordinary quality.

SUPPLY OF FREE MILK AND TEA

In Ceat Tyres of India Ltd. (Sr. No. 47) all workmen are served tea twice per shift. Workers who work in actual contact with Casbon Black are given 4 Ozs. of milk per head. Similarly, other workers certified by the Co.'s Chief Medical Officer are also given milk.

CLASSIFICATION

In the Swastik Rubber Products Ltd. (Sr. No. 24) the Tribunal awarded the classification in terms of recommendations of the assessors.

In M/s. Korula Rubber Co. Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 28) classification of workmen was done in accordance with the methods elaborated in the case of Rubberrex Industries Ltd., Bombay by the Adjudicator, vide Reference (I. T.) No. 109 of 1949 published in the Industrial Court Reporter (March 1950, pages 352—360).

In Rawal Rubber Works (India) Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 37) classification was done in consultation with the union which acted in an advisory capacity.

PROVIDENT FUND

In M/s. Goodyear Tyre & Rubber Co. of India Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 3) the Tribunal directed that the rate of contribution shall be 8 per cent of the consolidated salary with effect from 1st July 1960. The Company's contribution payable with interest is as follows:—

GRATUITY

In the Firestone Tyres & Rubber Co. of India Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 11) the Tribunal observed that the Company has had a period of exceptional prosperity and there is every reason to be optimistic about its future. The dearness allowance forms a very large proportion of the total emoluments particularly in the case of lower paid workers. The existing 15 months' basic salary as gratuity with the Provident Fund at $6\frac{1}{4}$ per cent of the total wages does not provide an adequate retrenchment benefit. The Tribunal directed that the maximum should be raised to 20 years' basic wages with the provision that after 15 years' service the scale should be at the rate of half month's basic wage or salary.

In M/s. International Tyre Service Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 13) the Tribunal amended the scheme according to the amendment the provision in the old scheme to the effect that "gratuity will not be paid to workman who is entitled to receive retrenchment compensation under section 25-F of the Industrial Disputes Act,

1947" was deleted. Similarly, the condition that both the retirement benefits would not be given at the same time was deleted.

A statement giving the details of the gratuity schemes granted in 12 concerns is attached:—

NOTE

Maternity Leave Rule for Monthly-rated employees in the Ceat Tires of India Ltd., Bombay

- (a) Married women who have been in the continuous employment of the Company for not less than one year, prior to the date of confinement, shall be allowed maternity leave with full pay for eight weeks (four weeks before confinement and four weeks after confinement) provided that they undertake not to obtain employment during these eight weeks and that the confinement is notified and certified by the Company's Medical Officer.
- (b) Maternity benefit will be given on the basis of the average remuneration drawn during the period of nine months immediately preceding the confinement.
- (c) The applicant for maternity benefit should give notice to the Company of her impending confinement within the preceding four weeks supported by a medical certificate.
- (d) Maternity benefit shall be given only for the days actually absent up to a maximum of eight weeks as specified above.
- (e) Maternity leave will be in addition to leave facilities already in force.
- (f) Sick leave, if due, may be granted in continuation of maternity leave to female workmen, subject to a medical certificate as required from the Company's Medical Officer.

These leave rules shall not be applicable to the Security Staff who shall be governed by the leave rules applicable to the daily-rated workers.

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The question of wages and Dearness Allowance was involved in 7 cases. Out of these, wage scales were settled in 6 cases and in 1 case both wages and Dearness Allowance were settled. A statement showing the wages, dearness allowance, etc., settled in 7 cases is attached herewith.

PRIVILAGE LEAVE

In a settlement, dated 24-9-1961 (Sr. No. 1) between the Bhayandar Salt Manufacturer's and Dealer's Association and the employees it was agreed that every workman would be paid at the end of the season for earned leave at the rate of one day for every 20 days worked.

FESTIVAL HOLIDAYS

In respect of six concerns at Sr. Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 it was agreed to give employees the following six days as Festival Holidays:

Republic Day. Ram Navmi. Mahashivratri. Holi. Local Festival Day. 1st May.

Out of the above six hoildays, Republic Day and 1st May were paid holidays. For working on these days, employees were given additional wage for that day at single rate.

WEEKLY OFF

In a settlement dated 24-9-1961 (Sr. No. 1) between the Bhayandar Salt Manufactuerer's and Dealer's Association and the employees it was settled that every worker will be given one day's weekly off in a week by rotation.

HOURS OF WORK

In a settlement, dated 24-9-1961 (Sr. No. 1) between the Bhayandar Salt Manufacturer's and Dealer's Assosication and the employees it was settled that all workers shall work for 8 hours a day fixed in consultation with the supervisors of the merchants.

PROVISION OF CLOTH

In 3 concerns (Sr. Nos. 4, 6 and 7) it was settled that the employer shall give 2 pieces of 2 yards cloth to each woman employee only once during the season.

SUPPLY OF IMPLEMENTS OR TOOLS

In a settlement, dated 24-9-1961 (Sr. No. 1) between the Bhayandar Salt Manufacturer's and Dealer's Association and the employees it was settled that workers will bring their own tools or implements necessary for manufacturing salt and for carrying it to platforms. However, for manufacturing salt in accordance with modern systems, they will be provided with additional tools by merchants.

In 3 concerns (Sr. Nos. 4, 6 and 7) it was settled that the employers shall provide hooks and needles in stitchers and hamals. If these are lost, the employees shall make good the losses.

PREFERENCE FOR EMPLOYMENT

In 5 concerns (Sr. Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6) it was settled that (1) employees who worked in the previous season, be given preference for employment in the coming season. This shall not apply in cases where disciplinary action is taken against an employee for misconduct. (2) Female employees who are confined due to maternity at the start of or in the season shall not loose their lien on the job.

PANEL FOR DECIDING DISPUTES

In a settlement, dated 24-9-1961 (Sr. No. 1) between the Bhayandar Salt Manufacturer's and Dealer's Association and the employees it was settled that in case of dispute employees shall not stop work either by going on strike or by stopping work but will refer dispute to the panal of 3 persons mentioned in the settlement and its decision thereon will be biding on both the parties.

SILK TEXTILE

The Silk Textile Industry was not referred to the previous Norms Committee. It was, therefore, necessary to define the scope of the industry. The Committee noted that the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1947 (Bombay Act No. XI of 1947), has been made applicable to this Industry and two notifications issued thereunder have defined the industry.

Government Notification, Labour Department, No. 150/48, dated 13th November 1948, defined the industry as (a) Spinning of waste silk, (b) Silk, artificial silk or rayon weaving with or without an admixture of Cotton or staple fibre and all processes incidental or supplemental thereto, (c) all mechanic shops attached to, and all dyeing, bleaching and printing departments attached to it.

Government Notification, Development Department, No. 150/48, dated 28th May 1958, extended the scope of the B. I. R. Act to:—"Winding, Warping, Sizing, Twisting or any, other process preparatory to weaving of silk, artificial silk or rayon yarn".

The definition is a comprehensive one and covers almost all the process in the industry. The definition given in these notifications was considered by the Committee and it decided to adopt the same. It was noted that the Act applied to those units in the industry which employ twenty or more workmen and are run with the aid of power. Since the Settlements and Awards are under the Bombay Industrial Relations Act they naturally cover only such units which employ twenty or more workmen.

The industry is concentrated in Greater Bombay Region as will be borne out by the fact that the majority of the awards and settlements are reported from that region.

From 1956 to the end of 1967 there have been 151 Awards and 111 Settlements in this industry. Of the Awards 2 were from the Poona Division and the rest from the Bombay Division. The Awards and Settlements covered the subject wages, dearness allowance, leave facilities, paid holidays and gratuity. A list of the Awards and Settlements is given below:—

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The Committee examined 116 cases in which wages and dearness allowance were fixed. In most of the cases a basic wage and a separate dearness allowance was fixed. In a very few cases a consolidated wage was fixed. The Committee noted that the wages were standardised in this industry by an Order of the Wage Board in 1958 and by another Order in 1961. The minimum basic wage for an unskilled workman was fixed at Rs. 30.06 for 26 working days. The minimum consolidated wage has been fixed at Rs. 3.25 per day. It was noted that a majority of the silk mills were covered by the standardisation order.

The dearness allowance has been fixed at 80 per cent of the allowance paid to the Cotton Textile Operatives in Greater Bombay.

In the year 1962, on a reference for the increase in dearness allowance, an ad-hoc increase in wages at the rate of Rs. 6.50 per month was granted. A statement showing the wage rate and dearness allowance obtaining in this industry is attached herewith.

ALLOWANCES

One of the important allowances that was found to be the subject-matter of the Awards and Settlements, is the compensation for short working hours in the third shift. In all 22 cases on the subject came to notice where compensation at the rate of 6.25 per cent of the basic earnings for working $7\frac{1}{2}$ hours instead of 8 hours was fixed.

The clerical staff employed in this industry were entitled to the following according to the Order of the Wage Board in a reference in 1957 as modified by the Order in Reference 12 of 1964.

Machine Allowance:

This was fixed at Rs. 7.50 per month for mills with less than 50 looms and Rs. 10 per month for mills having more than 50 looms.

Cash handling Allowance:

This was sanctioned for the clerks handling cash on occassions on which general payment are made. The rates were as follows:—

- (a) For clerks in mills having less than 50 looms ... Rs. 5 p. m.
- (b) For clerks in mills having more than 50 looms Rs. 10 p. m.

Acting Allowance:

A clerk acting in a higher post for a period of 15 days or more shall be paid acting allowance calculated at the rate of 50 per cent of the difference between his own salary and the salary of a person for which he acts.

Overtime:

Overtime payment should be made to clerks who are asked to work beyond the usual working hours at the rate of 1½ times the ordinary rate of wages as defined under the Factories Act, 1948, except when the provisions of the said Act as to overtime apply (order of the Wage Board in Modification application No. 1 of 1964).

LEAVE FACILITIES

Privilege Leave :-

Up to the period ending 31st December 1967 the Committee found 22 cases in which privilege leave had been fixed. In 18 cases the leave was to be granted according to the provisions under the Factories Act. In 2 cases, it was upto 240 days, 12 day's and above 240 days at the rate of 1 day for 12 working days. In two cases which covered the clerical, technical and supervisory staff only the quantum was fixed at 30 days per year.

In 1964 however, on a reference by the representative union the leave with pay was fixed at 12 days for the first 240 days of work as laid down in the Factories Act, and thereafter one day for 12 days of work in excess of the first 240 days. Accumulation of leave was allowed up to 36 days.

Sick Leave:

No cases were reported on the question during the relevant period.

Maternity Leave:

No cases on this question came to light.

Leave without pay:

Only four cases were examined on this point. In all these 4 cases one month leave without pay was allowed.

Casual Leave:

7 cases on the question of casual leave were scrutinised by the committee. In two cases the quantum was fixed at 5 days per year. In one case 7 days, in 3 cases 4 days and in one case at 3 days. These cases related to the period before 1963. In 1964 on a reference by the Mill Mazdoor Sabha, the casual leave in this industry was placed at 4 days per year. The Industrial Court also laid down the conditions for casual leave as follows:—

(a) Casual leave could not be taken without the previous permmission of the management, except under unavoidable circumstances, (b) It would not be admissible for more than 2 days at a time, and was allowed to be suffixed or prefixed but not both. Grant of casual leave was subject to the exigencies of work, but it was directed that it should not be refused except for good reasons. The demand for counting the days of casual leave with pay for minimum attendance required for qualifying for leave was rejected by the Court as it would be against the principle in the Act laying down minimum qualifying period of attendance.

PAID HOLIDAYS:

38 cases on the question of paid holidays were examined. In 25 cases 2 paid holidays were fixed in 9 cases 4 paid holidays were given. In 4 cases the paid holidays were given according to the list given by the Silk and Art. Silk Mills Association. This was the position before 1964.

In 1964 on a reference by the Mill Mazdoor Sabha, the number of paid holidays for the industry was fixed at 4 per year. The days were 26th January, 15th August, Holi and Diwali.

GRATUITY:

A gratuity scheme in the Silk Industry was introduced by the Award of Industrial Court in Refurence (IC) No. 23 of 1958. The Scheme is applicable to all the member mills of the Association. Under the scheme, gratuity is payable in the following circumstances:—

- (a) In the case of death of an employee while in the service of the company or of his becoming physically or mentally in capacited for further service, and
- (b) On retirement or voluntary resignation after 15 years of service at the rate of 14 days basic wages for each completed year of service for the period before the enforcement of the Employees Provident Fund Act, and 7 days basic wages for each year of continuous service thereafter. The maximum amount of gratuity was fixed at 10 months basic wages.

On termination of the service after 10 years continuous service but less than 15 years the rate was fixed at 11 days basic wages for each completed year of service for the period before 1952 and 7 days basic wages thereafter.

For termination after 15 years continuous service the rates were the same as provided for voluntary resigntion or retirement.

Basic wages for the purposes of gratuity were to be the average basic wages for the 12 months immediately preceding the death, disability, retirement, resignation or termination of service of the workman. The Court also directed that for the purposes of continuous service breaks for periods not exceeding 6 months should be condoned. Gratuity was not payable for dismissal for misconduct.

POWERLOOM INDUSTRY

The Industry was not covered by the reference to the previous 'Norms' Committee. After a careful consideration the Committee adopted the following definition:

It may be pointed out that a Committee was appointed by Government to study the conditions of Iabour, in this Industry. That Committee has already submitted its report to Government.

The Committee examined 9 Awards and 1 Settlement in respect of this industry for the relevant period during the course of its study. Of these 8 Awards were from the Bombay Division and 1 from Ichalkaranji in the Poona Division. Only one settlement was reported from the Poona Division. All these Awards covered the questions of paid holidays. The Settlement covered the question of supply of beams and wages.

WAGES

There was only one settlement on this question which related to Ichalkaranji. The wage-rates fixed ranges from Rs. 1.81 to 3.25 per each piece of material depending on the size and the kind of material.

LEAVE FACILITIES

No material was available except on the question of paid holidays. In all 10 cases were examined by the Committee. In all of them the paid holidays were fixed at 2 per year. One of them was the 26th January, and the other was 1st May (in eight cases) and 15th August in (2 cases). In 8 of these cases it was a condition that the workers who remained present on the day preceeding or succeeding to the above holidays would be entitled to the paid holiday. Those who were on authorised leave on those days would be entitled to the holidays.

Except these two matters none of the award or the settlement dealt with any other service condition or benefit.

DYEING, BLEACHING AND TEXTILE PROCESSING

This industry though not referred to the previous Norms Committee is covered by the provisions of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, (No. XI of 1947), and the notification issued under that Act, has given the scope of the industry. After considering the notifications it was decided to adopt the same definition for the industry. The Government Notification, Labour Department, No. 180-48, dated the 13th December 1948, defines this industry as dyeing, bleaching, finishing, mercerising, calendering, printing or glazing of yarn, cloth or articles made of cloth or any process incidential or supplemental thereto. It may be noted here that the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1947 at present applies to concerns employing twenty or more persons and which runs with the aid of power. The Awards and Settlements in the industry therefore, relate only to such concerns.

The Committee examined 51 Awards and 24 Settlements in this industry. Of these only 4 Awards were reported from Ichalkaranji in Poona Division. The rest were from the Bombay Division. All the Settlements were from the Greater Bombay Region. A list of the Awards and Settlements together with their dates is given below:—

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The Committee examined 37 cases on the question of wages and dearness allowance for the relevant period. All these cases with two exceptions related to the Bombay Division of these in 9 cases only consolidated wage was fixed. The Consolidated wage for a daily worker was fixed at Rs. 2.25 per day while for the monthly rated it was fixed at Rs. 65 per month. It was noticed that these wages were fixed during the period prior to 1963. The lowest minimum wage for a monthly-rated worker after 1964 was Rs. 80 per month which was a consolidated wage. It was also noted that the wages in this industry were standardised by an Award of the Industrial Court in the year 1958. The minimum basic wage was fixed

at Rs. 26 per month of 26 working days and dearness allowance at 95 per cent of the dearness allowance paid to the Cotton Textile Operatives in Bombay. In the only case (Sr. No. 51) from Ichalkaranji the dearness allowance was fixed at 30 per cent of the rate at which the textile operative in Sholapur were paid. The details about the rates of wages and dearness allowance will be seen in the accompanying statement.

LEAVE FACILITIES

Privilege Leave:

Only 4 cases were noticed where privilege leave was granted. The rate in one case (Sr. No. 74) was 1 day for every 13 days of actual work put in. But here the quantum included all other kinds of leave also. In another case (Sr. No. 69) the leave was according to the Factory Act and in the remaining two cases (Sr. Nos. 39 and 46) it was at the statutory rate for the first 240 days and 1 day for every 12 days worked thereafter.

Sick Leave:

Only 3 cases came to notice on the subject. In two cases (Sr. Nos. 48 and 50) it was given at the rate of 5 days per year while in one case (Sr. No. 14) it was at the rate of 7 days per year. It was not clear whether this leave was given over and above the provisions of the Employees State Insurance Scheme.

Casual Leave:

The Committee examined 12 cases on the question of Casual Leave. In 2 cases (Sr. Nos. 9 and 23) leave was to be considered as Casual-cum-Sick leave. In one of these the quantum was 7 days while in another it was 5 days. In two cases the quantum was 7 days in 5 cases each was 3 days and 5 days, respectively.

Leave Without Pay:

Two cases on this subject came to notice during the course of the study. In one case it was fixed at 10 days per year (Sr. No. 74) In the second at 20 days per year (Sr. No. 25). The details about the conditions on which this leave was to be granted were not available.

Maternity Leave:

No case on this question came to light during the enquiry.

Festival Holidays:

The Committee studied 16 cases in this industry on this question. In 9 cases the number of festival holidays was 4; in 4 cases it was three days and in 3 cases 2 days.

Of these cases only in 3 cases the days of the festival holidays were indicated. In 2 cases they were 26th January, 15th August, 1st May and Diwali. In the remaining case Diwali was omitted.

Retirement Age:

The Committee studied two cases on this point. In both these cases (Sr. Nos. 21 and 32) the Retirement Age was fixed at 60 years as recorded with the Provident Fund Authorities.

GRATUITY

The Committee found 5 cases (Sr. Nos. 30, 31, 32, 34 and 41) in this industry. In all these cases the same scheme was introduced. Gratuity was payable (i) at the rate of 20 days basic wages for each year of continuous service for the period prior to the introduction of the Employees' Provident Fund Scheme prior to 1st November 1952 and at the rate of 10 days for the period thereafter in the case of death or disablement for further service, during the period of service and for retirement or resignation after 15 years service, (ii) The corresponding rates for retirement or resignation after 10 years are at the rate of 14 days basic wages for service rendered before 1st November 1952 and service thereafter at the rate of 7 days basic wages. The rates given at (i) above were effective in case of termination after 15 years and those at (ii) applied in cases of termination after 10 years but less than 15 years service.

ABOLITION OF CONTRACT SYSTEM

Four cases (Sr. Nos. 33, 36, 44 and 45) on this question came to notice of the Committee. In all these cases the employers were directed to abolish the system of contract labour within specified period and absorb the workers of the contractor into their own concerns.

UNIFORMS

Two cases (Sr. Nos. 48 and 50) came to notice where uniforms were provided for certain categories of workmen. Both these cases were reported from Ichalkaranji.

COTTON GINNING AND PRESSING INDUSTRY

This industry has been defined by the previous 'Norms' Committee as "Cotton Ginning and Pressing including c'eaning." The present Committee has adopted the same definition. It may be noted that this is one of the scheduled employments under the provisions of the Minimum Wages Act, 1948 and the minimum rates of wages have been fixed for the workers employed in this industry by Government Notification, Industries and Labour Department No. MWA-2562-C-7031-Lab-III, dated 4th January 1964.

The Committee examined 4 Awards and 7 Settlements in this industry for the period under review. All the 4 awards in this industry were from the Bombay Division. Of the Settlements 3 were from Bombay Division while the remaining 4 related to the Nagpur Division. The Awards covered a variety of subject, principal among them being wage structure, abolition of contract system, leave facilities, Uniforms, etc., while the Settlements mainly dealt with the subjects like the casual leave, paid holidays, sick leave, etc.

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

Of the 6 cases examined by the Committee in 2 cases piece rates of wages were fixed. It was Rs. 1·12 per bale for ordinary pressing; Re. 0·50 per bale for opener work, and Rs. 1·12 per bale for repressing. In both those cases the Awards were given in 1959 and 1960. Apparently the Awards covered only those workers who were actually doing the work of pressing Cotton Bales. The other workers connected with the process like the mechanical staff were excluded from the Award. There were two Awards on wages where, in the first case consolidated minimum wage to all workers at Rs. 3·10 per day was awarded and in the second case an incremental scale was prescribed whereby the unskilled worker was awarded scale of Rs. 30—1·50—3·50—3·00—53·50. This was to be a basic wage scale. A dearness allowance at the rate of 70 per cent of the textile rate was also awarded in addition.

There were two Settlements which covered the Sclerical, ubordinate and the godown staff. The wage scale for the unskilled subordinate staff was fixed at Rs. 40—3—70—4—86 per month in the first settlement while in the second case it was fixed at Rs. 32—6—46—2½—66. A dearness allowance on the slab basis was also fixed in these cases.

The Committee noted that the Awards and Settlements on wages related to the Bombay Division only.

The attached statement gives the details of the cases of the wages and dearness allowance that were examined by the Committee.

ALLOWANCES

Only one case (Sr. No. 6) came to the notice of the Committee wherein 4 types of allowances were given to the workers. They were as follows:—

Acting Allowance:

Workers who worked in a higher post a period over 2 weeks were eligible for this allowance. The rate was the difference between basic and the minimum of the higher grade. If the salary which the worker was drawing was equal to or more than minimum of the higher grade he would be entitled to one increment in the higher grade.

Lunch Allowance:

Workers who were required to work on outdoor duty during the lunch hour only would get lunch allowance. The rates prescribed under the settlement were Rs. 2.00 per day for the clerical staff and Re. 1.25 per day for the other staff.

Overtime Allowance:

Overtime allowance was not payable for working for less than $\frac{1}{2}$ hour. It was to be paid at the normal rate for working as allowed under the Factories Act, or the Shops and Establishments Act. For working on Sundays and holidays, the allowance was to be paid at $\frac{1}{2}$ times of the normal rate.

Daily and Travelling Allowance:

Daily allowance was given at the rate of Rs. 7.50 plus 1st class travelling to clerical staff drawing salary up to Rs. 175; Rs. 9 to those drawing salary Rs. 175 up to Rs. 299 and Rs. 12 to those drawing salary above Rs. 299. Drivers were paid daily allowance at Rs. 6 plus second class travelling. Sepoys and other subordinate staff were paid daily allowance at Rs. 4 plus second class travelling. From the data before the Committee it was not clear whether the travelling allowance was payable on duty or whether it was leave fare concession.

LEAVE AND HOLIDAYS

Privilege Leave:

Only one case (Sr. No. 6) was noticed wherein privilege leave of 30 days per year with accumulation up to 90 days was given. The conditions for this leave were that it should normally be started from the first working day of the week and should be taken in not more than two instalments in any one calendar year and that it could not be encashed.

The Committee however noted that this solitary case of privilege leave was in respect of very well established concern having its Head Office in Bombay with a large office staff.

Leave Without Pay:

The Committee noted only one case (Sr. No. 6) wherein leave without pay to the extent of one month was allowed.

Sick Leave:

Only 4 cases of sick leave were examined by the Committee. Of these in two cases (Sr. Nos. 10 and 11) sick leave was to be given according to the provisions in the certified Standing Orders; while in the third case (Sr. No. 9) it was fixed at 5 days during the season on production of a medical certificate. All these cases were reported from the Vidarbha Region. In the remaining case (Sr. No. 6) which was from Bombay the quantum was fixed at 2 weeks on full pay and dearness allowance during the first year of service, and 4 weeks per annum thereafter. In case of prolonged illness the leave could be extended further up to 8 weeks on half pay and dearness allowance on production of the medical certificate, but at the discretion of the management. Such leave for more than two days required medical certificate.

Casual Leave:

Five cases of casual leave were examined by the Committee. In two cases (Sr. Nos. 10 and 11) it was according to the Certified Standing Orders. In the remaining cases, viz., Sr. Nos. 4, 6 and 9 it was fined at 4 days, 10 days and 7 days, respectively. The case where the casual leave of 11 days was fixed was reported from Bombay and the concern is a commercial establishment covered by the provisions of the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act.

Festival Holidays:

Six cases were noted wherein festival holidays were granted. In 3 cases (Sr. Nos. 9, 10 and 11) the quantum was 2 days per year. In one case (Sr. No. 8) it was 4 days, for monthly rated and on Republic Day for others. In case of Sr. No. 4 it was 4 days. One in the remaining case (Sr. No. 6) it was all Public Holidays declared by Government. In the last case again the firm was the well established firm in Bombay.

ABOLITION OF CONTRACT SYSTEM

Two instances came to the notice of the Committee wherein the contract-system was abolished. In one case (Sr. No. 1) the workers with a continuous service of one year in the previous year were directed to be treated as direct workers. In the second case (Sr. No. 2) all the old workmen were directed to be treated as Company's employees and were to be treated in continuous employment from the date of entry in service.

LEATHER AND TANNERIES

The Committee has adopted the same definition for this in dustry which was adopted by the previous "Norms Committee". The definition is as follows:—

"(i) Currying, Tanning and Finishing of Hides and Skins and preparation of Finished Leather, (ii) Manufacturing of shoes and other leather footwear, (iii) Manufacturing of clothing and wearing apparel made of leather and Fur (iv) Manufacturing of leather products such as leather Upholstery, suit-cases, pocket books, cigarette and key cases, purchases, saddlery, whip and other articles."

The Committee examined 3 Awards (2 published and 1 unpublished) and 8 Settlements in respect of this industry. Of the 3 Awards 2 are from the Bombay Division and 1 from the Poona Division. All the eight Settlements are from Bombay Division.

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The question of wages and Dearness Allowance was involved in 8 cases; out of these, 1 case dealt with dearness allowance only; wage-scales were revised in 2 cases, both dearness allowance and revision of wages were granted in 2 cases and in 3 cases ad-hoc increase in wages was granted. A statement showing wages, dearness allowance etc., decided in 8 cases is attached herewith.

It may be mentioned here that this industry is a scheduled industry under the Minimum Wages Act, 1948. The minimum wages for this industry have been fixed, vide Government Notification, Industries and Labour Department No. MWA-2162-Lab.-III dated 25th July 1964 and No. MWA-2162-Lab.-III dated 20th May 1965.

LEAVE

The Committee examined the cases in 6 concerns in which various kinds of leave were considered. A statement showing the names of these 6 concerns and various types of leave granted is attached.

Privilege Leave:

In Noble Leather Works, Bombay (Sr. No. 6) it was settled that workers will be given 14 days privilege leave.

Sick Leave:

In Weikfiled Products (India), Poona (Sr. No. 3) 5 days leave with pay in a year was awarded. The accumulation of this leave was granted for 15 days.

Leave without Pay:

In National Leather Cloth Mfg. Co., Bombay (Sr. No. 4) it was settled that workers will be given 15 days leave without pay.

Casual Leave:

The Committee came across 5 concerns in which casual leave had been granted. Of these only 1 was from the Poona Division and 4 from the Bombay Division. The following shows the number of cases and period of leave granted:—

In Gold Filled Leather Works, Bombay (Sr. No. 7) this leave was not allowed to be taken for more than 2 days at a time and also was not allowed to be prefixed or suffixed to holiday or weekly off.

In Kamco Leather Works, Bombay (Sr. No. 10) this leave was termed as casual leave-cum-sick leave. For sickness for more than a day, a medical certificate shall be produced.

FESTIVAL HOLIDAYS

It was noted that there were 5 concerns in which Festival Holidays had been granted. Of these only one was from the Poona Division and 4 from the Bombay Division. The following shows the number of cases and number of holidays granted:—

PERMANENCY

In Weikfield Products Co. (India), Poona (Sr. No. 3) it was awarded that the workmen who have completed one year's continuous service shall be deemed to be permanent workers. Similarly, the workmen employed temporarily during the season shall be given preference at the time of seasonal recruitment or while increasing the number of workers.

In M/s. National Leather Cloth Manufacturing Co., Bombay (Sr. No. 4) and Kamco Leather Works, Bombay (Sr. No. 10) it was agreed that the employees who have put in six months' continuous service should be made permanent and those who had already completed 6 months' continuous service at present should be deemed to be permanent employees.

ATTENDANCE BONUS

In National Leather Cloth Mfg. Co., Bombay (Sr. No. 4) it was agreed that the workmen who remain present on all the working days in a month would be given an additional one day's wage at the end of the month.

UNIFORMS

In National Leather Cloth Mfg. Co., Bombay (Sr. Nos. 4 and 11) it was agreed that employees closely connected with colour/paint operation should be given 3 pairs of uniforms per year, one each in month's of January, May and September every year.

PROVISION OF LOCKERS

In National Leather Cloth Mfg. Co., Bombay (Sr. No. 11) it was agreed that individual lockers would be provided to all workmen in a suitable place in the factory.

GUARANTEE OF 26 DAYS' WORK

In National Leather Cloth Mfg. Co., Bombay (Sr. No. 4) it was agreed that the employees should be guaranteed work for 26 days in a month provided that they should be ready and willing to work on weekly off days as a substitute working day in place of any holiday voluntarily declared by the management as a holiday without pay over and above the paid holidays, subject to and without prejudice to statutory provisions.

PROVIDENT FUND

Though the Employees' Provident Fund Act was not made applicable in the Western India Tanneries Ltd. (Sr. No. 2) the Tribunal directed that the contribution of the management be raised to 6½ per cent of the total earnings as from 1st January 1959.

(It may be mentioned here that the industry 'Leather and Leather Products' was covered by the Employees' Provident Fund Act, 1952 from 31-8-1961.)

In the Weikfield Products Co. (India), Poona (Sr. No. 3) the Tribunal directed that the Provident Fund Scheme made under the Employees' Provident Fund Act, should be made applicable immediately if it was made compulsory by Government; otherwise a scheme on the same lines should be made applicable to workmen by mutual agreement after the factory is shifted to new premises.

ABOLITION OF CONTRACT SYSTEM

In the Western India Tanneries Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 2) since the manufacturing of pickers was seasonal and was entirely suspended during monsoon, it was agreed that the workmen in that section who would be laid off without payment of lay-off compensation would be taken on the pay roll of the company as permanent or temporary workmen at the discretion of the management and would enjoy the same benefits as enjoyed by the other permanent or temporary workmen. Service benefits could only be earned on actual days worked during the service period. The resumption of the picker department would be notified by the Company and workmen would return to work within 8 days.

BIDI

The previous Norms Committee defined this industry as "Manufacturing of Bidis". The same definition is adopted by the present Committee.

It may be mentioned here that all the provisions of the Bidi and Cigar Workers (Conditions of Employment) Act, 1966, except the provisions of section 3 came into force in Maharashtra State from 1st April 1968 and the provisions of section 3 came into force from 1st May 1968 by Governmen: Notification, Industries and Labour Department No. BCA-1067/Lab-II, dated 28th March 1968.

This is a special legislation aimed at regulating the working conditions like working hours, overtime, weekly holidays, annual leave with wages, licensing of the premises, sanitary facilities, manner of termination of services and the procedure for grievances, etc.

During the relevant period the Committee examined 34 cases, 8 Awards and 26 Settlements. The divisionwise break-up of these 34 cases is as follows:—

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCES

In the case of Imperial Tobacco Co. of India Ltd., Bombay (Sr. Nos. 1 and 2) wages and dearness allowances in respect of daily-rated employees were awarded in 1960 and in respect of monthly-rated in 1961, respectively.

In the case of the Master Tobacco Co. (India) (Sr. No. 3) wages and dearness allowance in respect of employees were awarded in 1965.

In M/s. Godfrey Philips India Ltd., (Sr. No. 4) wages of daily Rated employees were settled by Settlement under Section 2 (P) of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, on 1-6-1960. The duration of this settlement was for 5 years from 1-9-1960.

In M/s. D. Macropolo and Co. Ltd., wage, scales of monthly rated employees were settled under 3 different Settlements under Section 2 (P) of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, on 19-4-1963, 22-4-1963 and 21-6-1963, respectively. The duration of these 3 Settlements was for five years from 1-1-1963.

A statement showing wages and dearness allowances granted in the 4 concerns is attached.

Allowances:

In the Imperial Tobacco Co. of India Ltd., the Tribunal awarded the following allowances:—

Acting Allowance:

No allowances were awarded for officiating in higher post for a period less than a month when it was for the first time or for a period less than 14 days on subsequent occasions.

In case an employee was likely to work in the higher grade for a longer period he should be paid minimum of the higher grade or if his wages were more than such minimum, he should get wages in the higher grade next above his existing wage.

Lunch Allowance:

LEAVE

A statement showing various kinds of leaves granted in M/s. Imperial Tobacco Co. of India Ltd. and M/s. Masters Tobacco Co. (India) Ltd., and M/s. Godfrey Philips India Ltd., is attached herewith.

RECRUITMENT

In the Imperial Tobacco Co. India Ltd., the management agreed to give preference to suitable candidates from amongst the relations of employees and/orex-employees.

In Godfrey Philips India Ltd., the management agreed not to recruit unskilled labour over 30 years of age and skilled workers over 35 years of age. It was further agreed that in future no married women be recruited. However, widows below 30 may be recruited.

UNIFORMS

In Imperial Tobacco Co. of India Ltd., the Tribunal directed the management to give every female worker two sarees and two cholis every year or other uniforms suitable and acceptable to workers.

ADVANCES

In Imperial Tobacco Co. it was directed that daily-rated workmen when in needs be given Rs. 15 as and by way of advance recoverable in three months equal instalments.

MEDICAL BENEFIT SCHEME

In Godfrey Philips India Ltd., it was agreed to introduce a scheme for those who were not covered under the E. S. I. Scheme. The details of the scheme are attached.

RETIREMENT AGE

In the Imperial Tobacco Co. of India it was agreed that workers attaining the age of 55 years, should be continued up to 60 years subject to their being declared fit by the Company's doctor.

FROVIDENT FUND

In the Imperial Tobacco Co. of India Ltd., the existing rates of contribution on either side was increased to 61 per cent of the total wage (Wages and D.A.) as was done under Employees' Provident Fund Act, 1952.

GRATUITY

The Tribunal awarded the gratuity at the following rates in the Imperial Tobacco Co., of India Ltd. Bombay (Sr. No. 2).

- 1. On death of an employee while in sevrice or on his physi- One month's salary for each year of service cal or mental disablement while in service.

Details of the Medical Benefit Scheme for the staff in M/s. Godfrey Philips India Ltd. who are not covered under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme

- (a) With effect from 1st September 1960, the Company will introduce the following medical benefit rules, which will apply only to: (1) those Monthly Rated Staff who are permanently not covered under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme and (2) those staff who do not receive any benefits under the Employees State Insurance Scheme by virtue of not fulfiling the contributory conditions laid down under the Employees State Insurance Act, due to fluctuations in their salary:—
 - 1. The Company will meet the cost of medicines and common injuctions.
 - 2. The Company will meet the visit fee of the Medical Practitioner only when the sickness period lasts for 7 consecutive days or more. However, in emergency cases, where the employee concerned is not able to go to the dispensary due to sudden high fever, etc., the visit fee may be allowed even for less than 7 days sickness.
 - 3. If the employee is admitted in hospital for surgical or serious illness and/or accident, the Company will meet 50 per cent of the hospital charges, excluding charges in respect of food and all things and appliances of a medical, surgical or dietic character. The permission must be obtained from the Company prior to the admission at the hospital except in emergency cases.
 - 4. Common patent medicines and tonics prescribed by the Registered Medical Practitioner will be paid for by the Company. The bills must be supported by a prescription from a Registered Medical Practitioner. The Company reserves the right to restrict the sanctioning of bills in respect of patent medicines and tonics, if it finds that the above rule is being misused by any Staff.
 - 5. Bills in respect of pathological examination (urine, sputum, blood, and stools examination) and Specialist's fees only once in respect of an aliment will also be met by the Company.
 - 6. The Company will arrange for X-ray wherever possible and when it is recommended by a Registered Medical Practitioner.
 - 7. These Rules will also apply to Staff on leave out of Bombay.
 - 8. Bill in respect of dental ailments and extractions, eye-tests, cost of spectacles and cost of false teeth-sets will not be paid for by the Company.
 - 9. The Medical Benefit Rules apply only to the employees and not to the family. These Rules will not apply to a female Staff when on maternity leave.
 - 10. The Company will not meet the Railway fare or taxi fare or bus fare incurred in connection with consultation, hospitalization or sickness.
 - 11. The Company will arrange for free vaccination against small-pox, cholera, typhoid, etc whenever considered necessary.
 - 12. The Company reserves the right to accept a medical certificate and/or medical bill or not, and also the right to have the Staff examined by a R-gistered Medical Practitioner of Company's choice, when the Staff reports back for duty from sick leave.
 - 13. The Management shall be the sole authority for the interpretation of the above rules and it decision or any question of interpretation shall be final and binding on all Staff.
 - 14. The Management will take a sympathetic view of cases of extreme hardship when a Staff gets an attack of T. B., Leprosy, Cancer, and Mental and Malignant diseases, provided such diseases occur after 15 years of continuous satisfactory service. In such cases if the Staff has forfeited any sick leave by virtue of the accumulation limit, such number of days forfeited will be allowed to him with full pay and dearness allowance. The number of days forfeited earlier to 1st January 1960 will not be counted for this purpose.
- (b) The Company reserves the right to discharge an employee with full dues if he continues to be on sick leave for more than nine months continuously, both in respect of persons who are covered under the Employees' State Insurance Scheme and not covered under the said Scheme.

WOOD AND FURNITURE

The Committee has adopted the same definition for this industry which was adopted by the previous Norms' Committee. The definition is as follows:—

"(i) Sawing and Plaining of Wood, (ii) Manufacturing of Wooden Furniture, Fixtures Structural Wooden Goods (including Threated Timber) such as Beams, Posts, Doors, Windows; Wooden Industrial Goods other than Transport equipments and Fixtures; other Wooden Products such as Utensils, Toys, Art-wares, Veneer and Plywoods, Plywood Products such as Tea-Chest, Boxes and Packing cases other than of Plywood and other Wood and Allied Products."

The Committee examined 16 Awards and 28 Settlements/Agreements in respect of this industry during the relevant period. The Divisionwise break-up of the Awards and Settlements is as follows:—

The adjustment of wages in revised scales was done in the following two cases:—

In 6 concerns at Sr. Nos. 6, 7, 10, 12, 24 and 42 the names of the holidays are not mentioned. In 3 concerns (Sr. No. 1, 5, 19) they are to be decided in consultation with workers.

ACTING ALLOWANCES

In Bhavsar Home Furnishers and Decorators, Bombay (Sr. No. 7) the Tribunal directed the company to give to the workers who are made to work in two higher category for an aggregate period of 15 days or more in a month, an allowance in addition to his usual wages, equivalent to half the difference between the minimum of his grade and that of the worker in whose place he acts.

LUNCH ALLOWANCES

In Jayanand Khira and Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 23) it was agreed that workmen who are occassionally called upon to go out for office work during lunch interval shall be paid Re. I as lunch allowance.

PERMANENCY

There were 8 cases in which the period of work for permanency of a worker was considered. In 7 cases the workmen who had put in 6 months continuous service were made permanent. In one case M/s. Bhavsar Home Furnishers and Decorators (Sr. No. 7) the workers were made permanent after 8 months continuous service.

ATTENDANCE CARDS

In 18 concerns (Sr. Nos. 25 to 41 and 43) it was settled that the management will give attendance cards to all workers.

PROVIDENT FUND

In Gujarath Wood Works (Sr. No. 1) the Tribunal directed the management to introduce Provident Fund Scheme from 1-7-61 on the same conditions as stipulated under the Employees' Provident Fund Scheme. The contribution each of workmen and Company will be 6½ per cent of the salary.

In Indian Plywood Mfg. Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 17) it was agreed to introduce Provident Fund Scheme with the following main features:—

- (1) Qualification of an employee for joining the fund will be minimum 2 years of service on 1st of April each year.
- (2) Contribution to the Fund by each of the employee and the employer will be 1/16 of the basic wage.
- (3) An employee must have joined the Scheme for a period of 5 years to entitle him to get the contribution of the Company. For shorter service he would get his own contribution only.

In the Bharat Timber Industries, Bombay (Sr. No. 22) the management agreed to start the Provident Fund Scheme wherein the contribution each of the employer and employee will be $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent of the monthly earned wages.

GRATUITY

In the Indian Shuttle Co. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 3) while rejecting the demand for gratuity, the Tribunal observed that the Company pay other benefits like efficiency bonus, railway fares, etc. It has also a Provident Fund Scheme with a contribution of 8½ per cent of the total wages by the employer, which is liberal, considering the fact that wages in the concern are higher than most of the comparable concerns. The concern has not built up reserves and its financial capacity and the scope of its business is also limited.

A statement showing the names of the concerns where gratuity is granted, rates of gratuity etc. is attached herewith.

GLASS INDUSTRY

In this industry the Committee adopted the same definition which was adopted by the previous 'Norms' Committee for the purpose of classification of Settlements, Agreements and Awards. The definition is as follows:—

"(i) Manufacturing of Glass Bangles and Beads; (ii) Manufacturing of Glass and Glass Apparatus; (iii) Manufacturing of Glass and Glass Products except Optical and Photographic Lenses".

During the relevant period the Committee scrutinised and examined 8 awards and 26 settlements. The divisionwise break up of these awards and settlements is as follows:—

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The question of wages and dearness allowance was involved in 23 cases. Out of these three cases dealth with dearness allowance only; wages were revised in 9 cases; both dearness allowance and revision of wages were granted in 3 cases and ad-hoc increments in wages were granted in 8 cases. A statement showing wages, dearness allowance and increments decided in 23 cases is attached herewith.

It may be mentioned here that this industry is a scheduled industry under the Minimum Wages Act, 1948, and the minimum rates of wages were fixed by Government Notification No. MWA. 4062-Lab. III, dated 22nd May 1964, in the Vidarbha area and No. MWA. 4062 (i) Lab. III, dated 22nd May 1964, in the Bombay and Hyderabad areas of the State.

ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES

The adjustment of wages in the revised scales was done according to the following rules:-

(1) Where the worker got equal to or less than the minimum of the scale prescribed for his category, he should be paid the minimum.

- (2) If the worker was getting more than the minimum of the scale prescribed for his category he should be brought up to the next incremental stage.
- (3) All personal allowances should be merged in the wages while fixing the wages in the revised grades.

LEAVE

There were 20 cases in which various kinds of leave were considered. A list showing the names of these 20 concerns and the various types of leave granted is attached—

Privilege Leave:

There were six cases in which privilege leave has been granted. In 4 cases it was granted according to the provisions under the Factories Act, 1948. In J. G. Glass Industries, Poona (Sr. No. 26), the staff was given privilege leave at the rate of one day for every 17 days of work performed during the previous calendar year while operatives, supervisory staff, drivers, office boys, malis, sweepers and watchmen were given privilege leave according to the provision under the Factories Act, 1948. Similarly in Ogle Glass Works Ltd., Oglewadi (S. No. 6 and 29), clerical and supervisory staff was granted 30 days' Privilege Leave in a year while other workmen were granted privilege leave according to the provisions under the Factories Act, 1948.

Only in one case (Viz. Ogale Glass Works Ltd., S. No. 29) accumulation of leave up to 60 days was granted.

Sick Leave:

There were 5 cases in which sick leave has been granted. In 4 cases it was 6 days a year. In one case it was at the rate of 7 days a year. In J. G. Glass Industries, Poona (S. No. 26), sick leave provision for clerical staff and other workmen was 7 days and 6 days respectively. In Techni Glass Works Ltd., Bombay (S. No. 3), provision of sick leave was on half pay.

Only in 2 cases accumulation was mentioned. In one case it was three times of annual sick leave entitlement while in one case it was five times of annual sick leave entitlement.

Two concerns laid down conditions for grant of sick leave viz. The Ogale Glass Works Ltd., (Sr. No. 29) and J. G. Glass Works (S. No. 26). In the former concern sick leave was granted only after the workman had exhausted his leave with wages under the Indian Factories Act, 1948 and on production of medical certificate from the companies Medical Officer. In the latter concern weekly offs and paid holidays were not allowed to be prefixed and suffixed with sick leave and sick leave for 2 days or more was required to be supported by a medical certificate from an authorised medical practitioner.

Casual Leave:

Fifteen cases of this leave were noted during the relevant period. In 7 cases it was at the rate of 4 days in a year; in 3 cases it was at 6 days; in one case each it was at 2 days, 5 days and 8 days and in 2 cases it was 7 days a year. Maximum and minimum days of casual leave entitlement were 8 days and 2 days respectively.

In 2 cases casual leave was not allowed to be prefixed or suffixed to weekly offs or any other leave. In one case it could not be prefixed or suffixed without prior consent. In one case casual leave was allowed to be either prefixed or suffixed to any holiday but not to both. In 2 cases not more than 2 days of casual leave was granted at a time while in 2 other cases not more than 3 days at a time could be granted.

The Utility Articles Manufacturing Company (S. No. 18) did not allow casual leave on the ground of workman's sickness. In Patanwalla Glass Works Private Limited (S. No. 19) only permanent workmen were entitled for casual leave, while Acme Mirror Works, Thana (S. No. 1), allowed casual leave only to those employees who had completed one year's continuous service. In Acme Mirror Works, Thana (S. No. 1), unavailed casual leave could either be encashed or added to privilege leave at the option of the employee at the end of the year.

FESTIVAL HOLIDAYS

In 12 cases festival holidays ranging from 3 to 9 days were granted. In 2 cases the number of such holidays was 3 days, in 3 cases it was 4 days; in one case each it was 5 days, $6\frac{1}{2}$ days and 7 days; and in 2 cases each it was 8 days and 9 days.

In the cases examined it was noticed that the following festival holidays were enjoyed:-

In one case festival holidays were fixed in consultation with the union. While in another case out of 7 holidays 5 holidays were fixed in consultation with the union, the remaining 2 holidays being 15th August and 26th January.

ALLOWANCE

Allowance for working on paid holidays on weekly offs:

In Bombay Glass Blowing Industries, Bombay (S. No. 2) whenever a workman worked on any Sunday or a paid holiday, he was allowed a compensatory holiday and double the normal wages.

In M/s. Techni Glass Limited, Bombay (S. No. 3) for working on paid holidays or Sunday a workman was paid 1½ times his normal wages.

PERMANENCY

5 cases on this subject were noted. In 3 cases (S. Nos. 2, 3, 24) workmen who had worked for a continuous period of 240 days were made permanent. In 2 cases (S. Nos. 3 and 9) workmen who had put in 6 months continuous service were made permanent.

UNIFORMS

7 cases were noted in which uniforms were provided to the workmen. The following table gives details regarding provision of uniforms:—

In J. G. Glass Industries, Poona (S. No. 26) uniforms were provided on condition that they were to be returned while leaving the service or while receiving a new set. The Company also made suitable arrangements for washing the uniforms.

RETIREMENT

In one case (S. No. 25) age of retirement was fixed at 60 years, or on completion of 35 years of service.

PROVIDENT FUND

There were 5 cases in which Provident Fund Scheme was introduced by the management. In Ogale Glass Works Limited, Ogalewadi (S. No. 5) in respect of workmen not covered by Provident Fund Act, 1952, the Tribunal directed that the scheme which was prevailing before the Act applied should be made applicable to such workers and the Company should contribute at the rate of 6½ per cent of basic wages and dearness allowance. In an other Award in respect of Ogale Glass Works Limited, (S. No. 6) the workmen covered by that dispute were deemed to be eligible for the Provident Fund Scheme as laid down by the Adjudicator in the Award in Reference (IT) No. 29 of 1960 or Provident Fund Scheme of 1952 in case it is made applicable to the factory workers including Glass and other sections.

In All India Glass Works Private Limited, Bombay and the United Glass Works Private Limited, Bombay. (S. No. 15 and 16) the management introduced the Provident Fund Scheme on the lines of the Employees' Provident Fund Act, 1952 on voluntary basis with 6.25 per cent of wages as the employers' contribution.

In Swastik Glass Works, Chanda (S. No. 34) the Company introduced Provident Fund Scheme for permanent workers who had worked for at least 5 years.

GRATUITY

5 cases of gratuity were noted. In all cases gratuity was provided ranging from 10 day's wages to 21 days' wages per completed year of service.

The Ogale Glass Works Limited (S. No. 6) if an employee was dismissed or discharged for misconduct, causing financial loss to the company, gratuity to the extent of that loss was not payable to him. In Vitrum Glass Works (S. No. 9) gratuity was not payable to any workman who was dismissed for gross misconduct.

In Ogale Glass Works Limited (S. No. 6) in case of termination of service of the workman he was entitled to gratuity but in case he got retrenchment compensation then he was entitled to only one benefit whichever was higher.

A statement showing details of gratuity schemes is attached herewith.

ATTENDANCE BONUS

In the United Glass Works Private Limited, Bombay (Sr. No. 23), all Ralsawallas who remain present on all working days in a month were paid Rs. 5 per month as attendence bonus. Similarly Rs. 10 per month was paid as an incentive to drivers who fetch highest wages among the rest of the drivers on piecerate. Drivers were also paid 0.50 paise as an incentive for third trip from factory to Bombay.

SUPPLY OF FREE MILK

In the Mahalaxmi Glass Works, Bombay the management incurred an expenditure of Rs. 250 per month for providing free milk to mixingmen. This facility was also extended later on to furnacemen.

STONE BREAKING AND CRUSHING

The Committee adopted the same definition for this industry which was adopted by the previous Norms Committee. The definition is as follows:—

"Stone Breaking and Crushing".

The "Stone Breaking or Stone Crushing" is a scheduled employment under the provisions of the Minimum Wages Act, 1948 and the Minimum Wages for the workmen employed therein are fixed vide, Government Notification, Industries and Labour Department No. MWA-1962/LAB-III, dated 6th July 1965

During the relevant period the Committee examined only 1 Award in respect of the following concern in the Bombay Division:—

(1) M/s. Shah Brothers, Bombay (M. G. G. Part I-L, dated 5th October 1967, Page 3922).

In the Award employees were awarded the following daily wage from 1st April 1966 at the Consumer Price Index No. 621-630 and directed that neutralisation shall be available either way at 10 paisa per day on 10 points variation—

Rs. 4.00-0.25-7.00.

BUILDINGS AND CONSTRUCTION

The 'Buildings and Construction' Industry was not referred to the previous 'Norms' Committee. It was, therefore, necessary to define the scope of the industry. This is a schedule industry under the Minimum Wages Act, 1948 (No. XV 1948) and the minimum rates of wages for the employees in this industry were last revised by Government vide, Notification No. MWA-1862-(i)-Lab-III, dated 21st October 1965 in the Vidarbha Region, and No. MWA-1862-(ii)-Lab-III, dated 21st October 1965 in the Bombay area of the State. The Committee decided to adopt the definition given in the said Act. The definition is as follows:—

"Employment on the Construction or maintenance of roads or in building operations."

During the relevant period the Committee scrutinized and examined 7 Awards and 10 Settlements. The divisionwise break-up of these awards and settlements is as follows:—

WAGES AND DEARNESS ALLOWANCE

The question of wages and dearness allowance was involved in 12 cases. Out of these one dealt with D. A. only, wages were revised in 8 cases; both D. A. and revision of wages were granted in 2 cases and ad-hoc increment in wages in one case. A statement showing wages, D. A. and increment decided in 12 cases is attached herewith.

LEAVE

There were 12 cases in which various kinds of leave were considered. A list of statement showing the names of these 12 concerns and the various types of leave granted is attached.

Privilege Leave:

There were 8 cases in which privilege leave has been granted. In 3 cases (Sr. Nos. 13, 14 and 17) it was granted according to the provisions of the Indian Factories Act, 1948. In one case (Sr. No. 8) it was granted according to the Bombay Shops and Establishments Act, 1948. In M/s. Shapoorji Pallonji and Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 4) it was granted at the rate of 1 day for every 15 days attendance with a maximum of 15 days. This leave is allowed to be accumulated up to 60 days. In Gammon India Pvt. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 5) it was granted at the rate of 30 days per annum, with permission to accumulate it up to 90 days. In the Cementation Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 15) it was modified from 21 days to 30 days.

Sick Leave:

There were 5 cases in which sick leave has been granted. In M/s. S. S. Marathe and Co. (Sr. No. 17) it was granted for 3 days (with full pay). In M/s. Patel Cement Concrete Works (Sr. No. 16) 5 days were granted with permission to accumulate it up to 10 days. In the Cementation Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 15) it was granted at the rate of 10 days with full pay and 20 days on half pay. In the Construction Co. Pvt. Ltd., (Sr. No. 7) it was given at the rate of 10 days with pay. In Gammon India Pvt. Ltd., (Sr. No. 5) 21 days sick leave was granted after completion of 11 months' Service.

Leave Without Pay:

In the Hindustan Construction Co. Ltd., (Vikhroli Establishment) (Sr. No. 14) 15 days leave without pay was granted. This leave was not allowed to be accumulated.

Casual Leave:

There were 7 cases where casual leave was granted. In two cases it was for 10 days, in 3 cases it was 7 days and in two cases it was 5 days. Maximum and Minimum days of casual leave were 10 days and 5 days respectively.

FESTIVAL HOLIDAYS

In 7 cases Festival Holidays ranging from 3 to 12 days were granted. In 4 cases the number of such holidays was 3 days; in one case each it was 4 days, $5\frac{1}{2}$ days and 12 days each.

In M/s. M. Pallonji and Co. Pvt. Ltd. (Sr. No. 8) the holidays were to be decided in consultation with workers and their Union.

TRAVELLING EXPENSES

In the Cementation Co. Ltd., (Sr. Nos. 12 and 15) in respect of contracts where no accommodation or transport is provided the foremen are paid 3rd class rail fare or bus fare from place of their residence and back for all working days.

In cases of travel on the company's business the employees are paid travelling allowance and daily allowance at the following rates:—

Each workman proceeding home on privilege leave once in 3 years' is given fares for himself, and his wife from his place of work and return or a distance of 800 Kilometers each way, whichever is lower at the class applicable to him.

Lunch Allowance:

In the Cementation Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 15) the workman who is away from the normal place of his work on Company's work on Company's order during his lunch interval and does not return before the close of his lunch interval was eligible for an allowance of Rs. 2.50 per day.

Outdoor Allowance for doing Postal and Bank-work:

In Cementation Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 15) the peon doing bank work is paid an allowance of Rs. 5 p. m. Similarly the peon doing postal work is paid Rs. 5 p. m.

UNIFORMS

In the Cementation Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 15) peons, drivers and watchmen are given 3 sets of uniforms in a year, Umbrellas or protection clothing once in 2 years.

Every workman in the workshop is provided with one boiler suit every year. Similarly workmen working in stores and workshops who have to work in open are given a pair of gumboot every 2 years.

In M/s. S. S. Marathe and Co. (Sr. No. 17) all empoyees are given 2 sets of uniforms consisting of Khakhi half-shirt and half pants.

In the Pallonji Shapoorji and Co. Pvt. Ltd. and the Shapoorji Pallonji and Co. Pvt. Ltd., Bombay, (Sr. No. 2) the management agreed to supply to every workman a suitable protective equipment during working time.

MEDICAL AID

In the Cementation Co. Ltd. (Sr. Nos. 12 and 15) in Bombay the Company agreed to continue to provide free consultation with the Company's doctor and at outstation to pay any reasonable expense incurred for medical treatment. Similarly during the period a workman is on sick leave he is allowed to reimburse the actual cost incurred by him on medicines and injections up to a maximum of Rs. 4 per day on production of vouchers. If E. S. I. Scheme is made applicable to any Section of workmen, the above scheme of payment shall cease to operate to the extent to which the benefit is available under the E. S. I. Scheme.

In M/s. S. S. Marathe and Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 17) all employees are given free medical aid and free supply of medicines at the cost of management as before.

PERMANENCY

In M/s. Shree Engineering Works and 3 other Concerns (Sr. No. 13) a workman who has put in 6 months continuous service with the management is made permanent except if he is taken on a temporary basis or for a fixed period of time or job.

In the Cementation Co. Ltd., (Sr. No. 15) monthly rated employee after six months probation period f his work is found satisfactory will be confirmed.

In M/s. Patel Cement Concrete Works (Sr. No. 16) workers who have put in continuous service of 240 days are made permanent.

SUPERANNUATION

In the Premier Construction Company, Bombay (Sr. No. 10) and the Hindustan Construction Co. Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 11) with effect from 1st April 1961 the age of superannuation for the workmen at the Head Office has been decided as 60 years.

GRATUITY

In the Cementation Company Ltd., Bombay (Sr. No. 15) Gratuity Scheme came into force from 1st January 1962. According to the Scheme it was agreed to pay gratuity at the rate of 14/26th of a month's salary per year of continuous service with the Company subject to a maximum of 10 months salary in the following circumstances:—

- (i) Death of Workman while in service.
- (ii) Physical or mental disability rendering the workman incapable of further service.
- (iii) Retirement at the age of 60.
- (iv) Voluntary retirement or resignation after completing 6 years continuous service.

No gratuity is payable to any workman who is dismissed for gross misconduct.
