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I.

At its last meeting on January 22nd, the Committee of Eighteen adopted the following resolution:

"The Committee of Eighteen,

"Recalling its Proposal IV A, of November 6th, 1935, to the effect that measures of embargo should be extended to certain articles as soon as the conditions necessary to render this extension effective had been realised;

"Subject to the proposals which it may see fit to submit on this question to the political decision of Governments:

"Decides to create a Committee of Experts to conduct a technical examination of the conditions governing the trade in and transport of petroleum and its derivatives, by-products and residues, with a view to submitting an early report to the Committee of Eighteen on the effectiveness of the extension of measures of embargo to the above-mentioned commodities;

"Requests its President to invite certain Governments to appoint experts to serve on a Committee for this purpose."

In accordance with the terms of this resolution, the President of the Co-ordination Committee requested certain Governments to send experts to meet in Geneva on February 3rd. The Committee, which met under the chairmanship of M. Gomez (Mexico) from February 3rd to February 12th, was composed of experts designated by the Governments of the United Kingdom, France, Iran, Iraq, Mexico, Netherlands, Norway, Peru, Roumania, Sweden and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. The Venezuelan Government sent an observer.

At the opening meeting, the President of the Co-ordination Committee submitted a list of questions to the experts which, after certain minor modifications, was adopted by them as their agenda. The President emphasised the fact that the Committee of Eighteen desired at this stage to submit to a technical examination only the whole problem of the effectiveness of an embargo on petroleum products, and the present report is strictly confined to such a technical examination. By the term "effective", the Committee has understood the influence which this embargo might have on Italy's power to cover the whole or the greater part of her oil requirements. It has not deemed it to be its function to include in its study the whole of the effects—financial, economic and other—that the embargo might have, even were it not to prove completely watertight.

Before setting out the results of its work, the Committee wishes to emphasise at the outset that the facts and the opinions set forth below relate to the situation as it exists to-day or existed in the earlier years to which consideration is given, and that they must not therefore be treated as applying to the future if, in the future, there is any substantial change in general conditions.

In order to distribute its work, the Committee appointed three Sub-Committees to study:

- (a) The general problem of consumption and supplies;
- (b) The possible use of substitutes;
- (c) The question of transport.

II.

After an examination of the reports of its Sub-Committees,¹ which it approved after discussion, the Committee formed the following opinions:

(a) IMPORTS.

The total supplies of petroleum and petroleum products to Italy in the years 1932 to 1934, excluding bunker oil purchases by Italian ships in foreign ports for current needs, amounted on an average to approximately 2½ million tons per annum, of which rather more than 1¾ million tons were fuel oil.

These purchases have increased steadily from a total of about 2 million tons in 1931 to nearly 3 million tons in 1934, a tendency to be found in other principal consuming countries. There was a further increase in 1935, when it is believed that purchases may have amounted to about 3.8 million tons.

Of the increase of 800,000 tons, it will be seen from section (c) below that some 300,000 tons (i.e., about 40 % of the increase) is estimated to have been added to stock.

(b) CONSUMPTION.

There are no reasons for supposing that Italy was accumulating abnormal stocks of petroleum prior to 1935. It is probable therefore that her consumption of petroleum products up to the end of 1934 was approximately equal to her total purchases. Italy's normal consumption in recent years had increased at the rate of about 13 % per annum. Assuming that a similar increase has taken place in 1935 and allowing for some increase in Italian consumption due to greater industrial and military activity, consumption in that year would have amounted to 3.5 million tons. This figure includes the consumption in the theatre of war estimated to amount during the last five months of the year to a figure of 20,000 to 30,000 tons per month.

(c) STOCKS.

The total stock at the end of 1934 probably averaged about six weeks' to two months' supply, or 400,000 to 500,000 tons. If to this be added the difference between the purchases and estimated consumption in 1935, amounting to 300,000 tons, a total of 700,000 to 800,000 tons on December 31st, 1935, is obtained. Stocks may have increased during January 1936 by a further 50,000 tons, and, at the end of January, may, therefore, have been equivalent to some two and a half to three months' consumption.

If an embargo were imposed, there would be at the moment of its imposition certain supplies *en route*, representing about half a month's supply to be added to the stocks already in hand.

(d) SOURCES OF SUPPLY.

The most important sources from which world markets derive their supplies of petroleum are Colombia, Iran, Iraq, Mexico, the Netherlands East Indies, Peru, Roumania, Trinidad, the United States of America, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, and Venezuela. All these countries, with the exception of the United States of America, are themselves Members of, or are territories belonging to, Members of the Co-ordination Committee.

The largest exporters of oil are Venezuela and the United States of America. The former reports no direct exports to Italy.

Substantial quantities of Venezuelan crude oil are normally refined in the Netherlands West Indies and refined products are exported from these islands to Italy.

From the figures at the disposal of the Committee,¹ it is clear that the quantity of oil products available for export from the United States of America greatly exceeds Italy's probable demands. In past years relatively small quantities of oil products have been exported from the United States to Italy. In the period 1931 to 1934, the average percentage of Italy's total supplies provided by the United States were as follows:

During the last few months, these exports have shown a very large increase. It is not known whether the recent increase in exports will be maintained or whether any form of limitation will, in fact, be instituted. In the case of an effective limitation being imposed, it would make but little difference to the effectiveness of an embargo imposed by States Members of the Co-ordination Committee whether that limitation took the form of an absolute embargo or the reduction of exports to the normal level of the United States exports prior to 1935.

(e) SUBSTITUTES.

Economy in the use of petroleum products by the use of substitutes could most easily be effected in the case of petrol (motor spirit), for Italy has already had some experience in the production and use of such substitutes as alcohol, benzol, etc. The Committee considers that an economy of the order of 100,000 tons a year might be possible by an extension of production of these products in Italy or by increasing imports. Any increase, however, in the demand for alcohol and benzol for the manufacture of explosives would naturally result in a reduction of this figure.

The Committee has explained in Annex 2 the reasons for which it does not feel able to estimate the extent to which any further economy might be effected by the employment of other sources of power, such as the use of gas-producer plants on motor vehicles, compressed gas or electric power.

As regards Diesel and fuel oils, which form by far the larger part of the oil imports of Italy, the Committee does not consider that any appreciable proportion of these oils could be replaced by substitutes. Some substitution of coal for oil might be practicable provided Italy can import larger quantities of coal.

As regards lubricating oils, it would be possible to replace them to a limited extent by oils of vegetable or animal origin.

In view of the possibility of obtaining by importation substitutes for petrol, the Committee is of the opinion that if an embargo is imposed on petroleum and petroleum products, it should be extended to cover industrial alcohol and benzol.

(f) TRANSPORT.

The Committee estimates that if Italy's supplies of oil had to be drawn from ports in the Gulf of Mexico, the Italian fleet might be expected to carry not less than $1\frac{3}{4}$ million tons (*i.e.*, one half of Italy's consumption in 1935), or possibly as much as 2 million tons. As stated above, the present consumption is estimated at the rate of about $3\frac{1}{2}$ million tons per annum. If no economies in use were effected, therefore, Italy would require somewhat over 225,000 tons gross of foreign shipping for her transport services.

Were an embargo on transport to be imposed by the Members of the Co-ordination Committee, there would remain for this purpose vessels belonging to the tanker fleets of the United States and Germany. The German tanker fleet that is suitable for transatlantic voyages and from which vessels might be obtained for transportation to Italy would appear to amount to about 90,000 gross tons, and that of the United States which is not engaged in the coastwise trade to between 300,000 and 500,000 gross tons according to the season of the year.

If tankers forming part of these two fleets were to be diverted to the Italian trade, there would be nothing, so far as the Committee is aware, to prevent the owners of such vessels from replacing the tonnage so diverted by tankers chartered from other States' Members of the Co-ordination Committee. Tankers of these other States now engaged in the carriage of oil to Italy would become available for this purpose. Moreover, there are at present some 340,000 gross tons of tankers laid up, half of which might be brought into commission, and some 435,000 gross tons of tankers under construction.

For an embargo on transport of oil to Italy to be effective, measures of control would, therefore, require to be taken by countries not members of the League of Nations. On the other hand, even without such measures of control, the carriage of oil to Italy would be rendered more difficult and more expensive were an embargo on transports by Member States to be imposed.

The Committee has given consideration to the question of the possible form of such an embargo. In its opinion, the most practicable form would be one which combined (a) a prohibition against the sale of tankers to States not applying the embargo, and (b) notwithstanding the special legal difficulties which might arise in certain cases in connection with tankers already chartered, a prohibition against the proceeding of tankers to Italy.

* * *

Accordingly:

(1) The figures given above with reference to consumption, to stocks and to supplies which might be *en route* at the moment of the imposition of an embargo on the export of petroleum and petroleum products make it possible to estimate roughly the period which would have to elapse before such an embargo, were it to be universally applied, would become fully effective. In the conditions prevailing at the moment of its session, the Committee is of opinion that this period may be taken to be about three to three and a half months.

(2) In the event of such an embargo being applied by all States Members of the Co-ordination Committee, it would be effective if the United States of America was to limit its exports to Italy to the normal level of its exports prior to 1935.

(3) If such an embargo were applied by the States Members of the Co-ordination Committee alone, the only effect which it could have on Italy would be to render the purchase of petroleum more difficult and expensive.

(4) In view of the possibility of substitutes being used to some extent for petrol (motor spirit), an embargo on the export of petroleum and petroleum products would be strengthened were it extended to cover industrial alcohol and benzol.

(5) The effectiveness of an embargo imposed by States Members of the Co-ordination Committee on the transport of oil to Italy is subject to the same limitations as an embargo on exports. Were these States alone to prohibit the use of tankers for the transport of oil to Italy, it would be able to satisfy its needs up to about 50 % from its own resources, and the rest by means of vessels of other States, but with greater difficulty and at greater expense.

(6) If an embargo on transport should be decided on, the Committee is of the opinion that the most practicable form of embargo would be one which would prohibit tankers from proceeding to Italy and would also prohibit the sale of tankers to States not applying the embargo.

(7) Should it be decided to impose an embargo on petroleum, attention should be given to the necessity of taking suitable measures to prevent traffic by indirect routes, including use of free ports, which is of special importance as regards petroleum.

ANNEX I.

SUPPLY AND CONSUMPTION.

The Committee has studied the figures of the sources of Italian petroleum supplies and has endeavoured to estimate Italy's consumption in recent years and the stocks held by her. Wherever possible, the Committee has used statistics for the year 1935, but in regard to certain of the matters dealt with, information for 1935 is not yet available and the Committee has then been obliged to use the figures for 1934.¹

(a) IMPORTS.

In Appendices I and II² are given tables showing the Italian imports of petroleum and its derivatives and the exports of these products to Italy from the countries from which she derives her supplies. The Italian import statistics record the entry of goods into Italy when they pass the Customs frontier. As considerable quantities of petroleum and its derivatives are purchased by Italy for use as bunkers in Italian ports, for the requirements of the navy, for refining in the free ports of Fiume and Trieste and, from time to time, for storage in tanks outside the Customs area, the import figures, especially for crude petroleum and fuel oil, do not account for the whole of Italian requirements. It is necessary, therefore, to estimate these requirements from the export statistics of other countries, in so far as they are available.

It would appear, from the evidence afforded by these export statistics, that total purchases in recent years have amounted, on an average, to 2.6 million tons per annum, of which 1.8 million has been fuel oil.³

These figures of total purchases do not generally include bunker oil purchased by Italian vessels in foreign ports for current needs, and it is not possible to make an estimate of the amount of the bunker oil so bought. On the other hand, any purchases of bunker oil by foreign vessels are included. There is no doubt, however, that these foreign purchases in Italian ports are very substantially less than the large Italian bunker purchases abroad.

Exports to Italy have increased steadily, year by year, from a total of 2 million tons

¹ The Committee would draw attention to the fact that statistics of petroleum present special difficulties, owing to the fact that the various petroleum products bought, sold and used may be of varying degrees of refinement. The total statistics of imports or consumption are, for this reason, open to the objection that they involve the addition of non-identical units. This objection is, however, only of practical importance when the proportions in which these various products contribute to the totals vary from year to year.

² As Italian statistics are not available after September 1935, an estimate has been made in Appendix II for the last quarter of the year based on the tonnage of tankers arriving in Italian ports.

³ The export statistics given in the appendices refer only to the nine most important countries. For the others, it has been necessary to interpolate the Italian import statistics, which, for the reasons given above, are certainly too low.

The margin of error in the case of the export figures for petroleum which is mainly carried in special vessels sailing direct to their final destination is probably not great. It will be seen from the following figures that by far the major part of the discrepancy between Italian import statistics and the export statistics given is accounted for by fuel oil, which is largely used as bunkers in seagoing vessels and does not cross the Customs frontier.

in 1931 to a total of nearly 3 million tons in 1934¹ and about 3.8 million tons in 1935. As there was a rapid increase of exports in the autumn of 1935, especially from the United States, and petroleum shipped from the latter country in December would not have arrived until after the new year, arrivals in Italy in 1935 may have been somewhat—perhaps 100,000 tons—less than the export figures would seem to indicate.

(b) CONSUMPTION.

There are no reasons for supposing that Italy was accumulating abnormal stocks of petroleum prior to 1935. Her average working stocks may have increased with the increase in consumption and the extension of refineries; but it is probable that her total consumption up to the end of 1934 was approximately equal to her total purchases, or only slightly less.

It is more difficult to estimate her probable consumption in 1935. Purchases increased between 1931 and 1934 by 45%, which is equivalent to approximately 13% per annum. Had this rate of increase been continued, the consumption in 1935 would have amounted to 3.3 million tons. There were certain factors which would result in an increase in consumption—namely, the increased industrial and military activity in Italy itself, the transport of troops and war material to Italian East Africa, the transhipment of oil from Italy to Italian East Africa. Against these increases have to be set some reduction in the consumption of certain oil products, particularly motor spirit, for civilian use. Sufficient data are not available to enable the Committee to assess the value of each of these factors. The increase in consumption due to the greater industrial and military activity in Italy itself may be material; the extra quantity of fuel required for the use of ships engaged in transport to Italian East Africa may not be large, as such oil-burning ships as are concerned would formerly have been engaged in other work.

As regards the total requirements for Italian East Africa, no official information is available, but from various particulars available, including those of the movement of tankers, the Committee is of the opinion that the consumption of petroleum products in those territories during the autumn of 1935 has been of the order of 25,000 to 30,000 tons per month, of which probably some 20,000 tons were motor spirit. The quantity of additional motor spirit required for use in Italian East Africa may possibly have been offset by the economies effected in the use of motor spirit in Italy itself.

Taking all these factors into consideration, the Committee thinks it would not be unreasonable to assume that Italy's aggregate consumption during the course of the year 1935 may have amounted to some 3.5 million tons.

(c) STOCKS.

There is no direct evidence available as to the stocks of petroleum products in Italy at the end of 1934. They are, however, not likely to have exceeded six to eight weeks' supply or 400,000 to 500,000 tons.

If consumption during 1935 amounted to 3.5 million tons and imports as indicated to 3.8 million tons,² the increase in stocks effected during the course of the year would have been 300,000 tons. On the basis of these figures, the total stocks at the end of December last would have amounted to some 700,000 to 800,000 tons.

This estimate is not incompatible with the information available concerning Italy's storage capacity. The Committee believes that the aggregate capacity of existing storage is about one million cubic metres. By a Decree dated October 24th, 1935, all owners and lessees of depots exceeding 500 cubic metres are required to keep stocks of motor spirit and fuel oil equivalent to 70% of the total capacity of their storage accommodation for these products. The tonnage of petroleum and its derivatives which might be held in storage tanks of a total capacity of one million cubic metres depends, of course, on the specific gravity of the products. In view of the nature of the known Italian imports, the co-efficient may perhaps be taken as 0.85, which would give a total storage capacity of 850,000 tons; 70% of this total storage capacity would therefore amount to 600,000 tons. A comparison of this figure with the estimated total stocks at the end of December last—viz., some 700,000 to 800,000 tons—would leave 100,000 to 200,000 tons to be accounted

for by storage tanks holding more than the legal minimum required, by storage tanks with a capacity of under 500 cubic metres, by stocks held in tankers and by stocks held in the open.

The Committee would add that the present storage capacity of Italy could, of course, be increased during the course of the present year. Open reservoirs with a limited capacity are not expensive; but normal storage tanks would be appreciably more expensive and would take a considerable time to construct.

On the basis of the records of tankers reaching ports in Italy and the Italian colonies in East Africa during January 1936, the imports during that month may be estimated at slightly under 350,000 tons, which may have rendered possible a further increase in stocks during that month of some 50,000 tons.

Thus, on the basis of data not always adequate and of assumptions sometimes conjectural, the Committee estimates that stocks at the end of January may have amounted to some two and a half to three months' supply at the rate of consumption in 1935. In the case of certain petroleum products, the stocks may suffice for a longer period, and, of others, for a shorter period than this.

If an embargo were to be imposed, supplies in transit to Italian ports representing perhaps half a month's supply would have to be taken into consideration.

(d) SOURCES OF SUPPLY.

In considering the available sources of supply, it may be well to distinguish between the sources from which Italy has actually derived her supplies in recent years and the sources which might be tapped under changed conditions. In Appendix III is given a table of the petroleum production of the world for the last four years. It will be observed that the production of the countries mentioned in this table which are not Members of the Co-ordination Committee is, with the exception of that of the United States of America, quite negligible.

In the following table are shown the exports, specified according to the nature of the product, of the main sources of supply for the international market in the years 1933 and 1934.

It will be seen from Appendix III that there are thirteen countries each of which in 1935 produced over one million tons of crude petroleum. All except one of these, which is the largest producer of all, are Members of the Co-ordination Committee. Two of these countries—namely, the Argentine and India—do not, in normal circumstances, export any oil. The other eleven countries all export substantial quantities; five of them—namely, Venezuela, Iraq, Mexico, Colombia and Peru—export mainly crude oil, and the others—Roumania, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, Iran, the Netherlands East Indies and Trinidad—mainly export refined products; the United States of America exports large quantities of both crude and refined products. The total exports of these countries was, in 1934, about 66 million tons. Taking crude oil and refined products together, the United States of America and Venezuela are by far the largest exporters.

The sources from which Italy drew her supplies during the year 1934, the quantities being based on the export statistics of the supplying countries, are shown in the following table:

It will be seen from this table that the principal sources of supply were Roumania, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the Netherlands West Indies, Iran and the United States of America, which together accounted for 92.6 % of the total. Although the statement does not show any direct shipments from Venezuela to Italy, the Italian import statistics include a small quantity.

The exports from the Netherlands West Indies are refined products obtained from Venezuelan crude oil. The Committee considers that, as practically the whole of the output of Venezuelan crude oil is exported for refining elsewhere, including about 15 % to 20 % to the United States of America, it is desirable to call special attention to the position of Venezuela.

It may be argued that the imposition of an oil embargo would in any event affect the position of Venezuela, since about 80 % of its production of oil only reaches the consuming countries through the Netherlands West Indies. But as already pointed out, most of the remaining 20 % is sent to the United States for refining and there is no reason why this proportion should not be increased. Any oil exported to the United States would become subject to whatever regime might be applied in the United States to trade with Italy in oil products. There are no technical reasons why Venezuelan crude oil should not be sent direct to Italy for refining. According to the information available to the Committee, the capacity of Italian refineries is probably not less than 700,000 tons per annum.

The statement on page 8 shows that the United States supplied 6.4 % of Italy's requirements in 1934. The average for the years 1931-1934 was approximately the same—viz., 168,800 tons out of total purchases by Italy of 2,552,000 tons, or 6.6 %.

The position in the United States as regards production, imports and exports is as follows: During the past four years, the output has varied from 107 million tons to 134 millions, the figure for 1934 being 123 million tons. For that year, the imports of crude oil and refined products were 7.1 million tons. The home consumption of the United States was 103.8 million tons and exports were 14.4 million tons, the difference being accounted for by the output of solid products, by refinery losses and changes in stocks. The production of oil in 1935 exceeded that for 1934

by 11 million tons and, with the enormous resources of this country, there is no practical reason why a much larger increase could not be secured without any abnormal development work being undertaken.

Besides importing substantial quantities of crude oil from Venezuela, the United States of America also obtains supplies from Mexico and Colombia.

Assuming that all States Members of the Co-ordination Committee were to co-operate in an oil embargo, the possible sources of supply of petroleum other than those from the United States are quite insignificant. Italian domestic production amounts to 20,000 to 30,000 tons per annum and there is no reason for believing that it could be rapidly increased. Even if supplies were available, they could not be developed without the expenditure of very large sums of money. Production in Albania has only just begun and the amounts likely to be obtained from that source in the immediate future will not, it is believed, prove to be of such importance as materially to affect the position. Moreover, Albanian oil is reported to be of a poor quality. The other countries in which Italy has invested capital in petroleum are Members of the Co-ordination Committee.

ANNEX 2.

SUBSTITUTES.

I. INTRODUCTION.

The Committee has examined the possibility of Italy substituting other products for petroleum products and thus effecting an economy in its requirements of petroleum and its derivatives, which would otherwise have to be imported.

The Committee is of opinion that such possibilities exist, but the actual extent of the economy which might be effected will depend on several factors:

- (a) The possibility of producing the necessary raw material on Italian territory;
- (b) The possibility of importing such raw material from abroad;
- (c) The possibility of manufacturing or importing the necessary plant and machinery for the production or utilisation of substitutes;
- (d) The time required to secure the production in Italy of large quantities of substitutes, the construction of plants and the transformation of vehicles;
- (e) The possibility of financing these various processes and of paying for the necessary imports.

The production of substitutes is generally a costly operation. The financial charge which would, however, devolve upon Italy might vary considerably according to whether the country was able to effect the necessary production within its own territory or was obliged to have recourse to importation.

On the other hand, several of the factors enumerated above are of a non-technical character and fall outside the competence of the Committee. It is impossible, in these circumstances, to make any precise estimate of the total economy which it would be possible for Italy to effect by the use of substitutes.

II. PETROL.

The Committee has specially considered the substitutes for petrol (motor spirit) which may be used in motor vehicles.

The principal substitutes for petrol which, for the purposes of its investigation, the Committee has regarded as of more immediate importance are:

- (1) Motor alcohol — ethyl alcohol highly concentrated;
- (2) Benzol;
- (3) Methyl alcohol (methanol, wood spirit);
- (4) Generator gas, produced in portable gas generators.

As additional substitutes for petrol which might come under consideration in present circumstances in Italy, the following may be mentioned:

- (5) Compressed coal-gas;
- (6) Compressed hydrogen;
- (7) Shale oil and products of distillation thereof;
- (8) Use of hydro-electric power either transmitted by wire or by the use of accumulators;
- (9) Other possible substitutes.

A short résumé is given below of the production and use of these substitutes.

1. *Motor Alcohol* is used blended with petrol. The percentage of alcohol used in the mixture varies considerably, but up to 25% (by volume) may be used without any adjustment of the motor. Whilst the calorific value of the alcohol mixture is somewhat lower than that of petrol, it has a higher anti-knock value and the overall results are similar.

When a mixture of motor spirit containing more than 25% of alcohol is used, a certain modification of the motor becomes necessary, the degree of adjustment augmenting with the percentage of alcohol. These alterations—a certain pre-heating of the air, adjustment of the fuel inlet to the carburettor, etc.—do not entail any serious difficulties or any great cost. It is even possible, after proper adjustments have been made, to use alcohol alone as motor fuel. In this case, it is, however, necessary, in order to obtain any satisfactory effect or economy, to use a higher degree of compression than that for which the ordinary motors are constructed. This would entail more extensive and costly changes.

In France and Sweden, a mixture of 50% petrol and 50% motor alcohol is used with good technical results for motor-buses.

If alcohol is to be used in motors, it should have a minimum degree of concentration of 99.6%. It is produced from ordinary strong spirits (of 95-96°) by one or other of the various special methods of concentration, viz.:

- (1) Dehydration with calcium oxide (calcined chalk);
- (2) Dehydration with gypsum;
- (3) Distillation with certain salts (acetate of alkalis, etc.): the so-called Hiag method;
- (4) Distillation with benzol, etc.

Methods (3) and (4) are those principally used; method (2) also is used in Germany.

The manufacture of alcohol both for industrial purposes and as motor fuel is carried on in various countries in Europe on a comparatively large scale, its manufacture being in many countries regarded as a suitable outlet for an existing surplus production of certain agricultural products, or a by-product in certain other manufactures. Thus, the raw material may be potatoes, sugar-beet, corn, grapes, apples and other fruit, molasses, or refuse-lye from the manufacture of sulphite cellulose; technical alcohol is also obtained in the manufacture of yeast and by treatment of sawdust.

In Italy, according to information available to the Committee, five factories working according to method (3) above, with an aggregate yearly capacity of 50,000 to 60,000 tons, have been erected or are under construction.

According to the *Zeitschrift für Spiritusindustrie*, of January 23rd, 1936, some very large factories for the production of raw alcohol are under construction at present in Italy. The Committee considers that further factories might possibly be erected within a relatively short space of time.

The production of motor alcohol alone has been given in various periodicals for the last year for which figures are available as:

Alcohol for drinking purposes and for industrial purposes is produced in addition to the above quantities and some part of it might be made available for the production of motor alcohol.

From the information available, it would appear that the Italian production of motor alcohol has hitherto been at the rate of 6,400 tons per year. It is anticipated that in 1936 the quantity of motor alcohol which may be produced will be 40,000 tons. This quantity might possibly be doubled by importation. Reference has already been made to the practice in several countries of utilising the over-production of agricultural products for the production of motor alcohol. As this motor fuel is more costly than petrol, it might be considered advantageous to those countries to dispose of some of their production by export under the circumstances being considered by the Committee.

2. *Benzol* is used in admixture with petrol, the percentage of benzol in a mixture varying up to a maximum of 40%. The addition of benzol increases the anti-knock value of the fuel and also its power. Benzol mixtures are also used in various countries for aviation purposes, but the maximum percentage in this case would be considerably lower than that already referred to, as benzol has a comparatively high freezing-point.

Benzol is a by-product obtained during the carbonisation of coal at gas-works and coke-ovens and by the distillation of coal tar. The principal producing countries are Germany, United States

of America, United Kingdom, France and Belgium. The figures for production during the year 1934 in the case of these countries were as follows:

Italy's own production of benzol in 1934 amounted to about 4,000 tons. An obligation to extract the maximum amount of benzol from the gas produced at gas-works and coke-ovens in Italy might be regarded as a possible means of increasing Italy's own production of benzol.

Italian imports of benzol during the nine months January to September 1935 amounted to 11,600 tons (or about 15,500 tons per annum). In case of need, the total imports might be increased to, say, 25,000 tons, thus making together with Italy's own production an aggregate quantity of about 30,000 tons available to Italy.

3. *Methyl Alcohol* has been used lately in Italy in admixture with petrol, and motor alcohol, the proportions used being:

This motor fuel is reported as having given very satisfactory results in a motor race (Rome-Paris).

Methyl alcohol, or wood spirit (methanol), is obtained as a by-product from charcoal-ovens and is now also produced synthetically.

The main countries of production are the United States of America, Germany, Canada, Sweden, Finland and Austria.

The figures available to the Committee regarding the production of methyl alcohol, or wood spirit, are rather incomplete and somewhat uncertain; probably they do not include synthetic methanol.

The total quantity available to Italy in admixture with and as substitute for petrol would probably not exceed 5,000 tons.

4. *Use of Portable Gas Generators.* — Motors driven by gas generated in producers affixed to the vehicle are used in France, Sweden and some other countries, especially in motor lorries and buses. Such generators have also been introduced lately in Italy.

The efficiency of the motor is reduced by some 25-30%, unless compression in the cylinders is increased.

As fuel, various carbonaceous materials may be used—e.g., charcoal, wood or coal.

According to a communiqué issued on August 28th, 1935, the Italian Government is reported to have decided that, before the end of December 1937, all automobiles used in public transport of persons should be either fitted with gas-generator-driven motors or adapted to substitutes for petrol. This transformation, if carried through, might result in an appreciable saving of petrol as motor fuel.

5. *Compressed Coal-gas* has been used in certain countries, in cases of emergency, as a substitute for petrol. Technically, the substitution offers no difficulty whatever. In the case of Italy, a country possessing practically no coal deposits of her own and where the gas produced by the gas-works from imported coal is needed in the first place for illuminating and heating purposes, the use of this gas as a substitute for petrol may be dismissed as not probable on any considerable scale.

6. *Compressed Hydrogen* has been proposed as a possible substitute. Italy, in fact, produces considerable quantities of hydrogen in her electrolytic plants, for the production of ammonia, nitric acid and nitrates.

Motors for the use of hydrogen may, however, be considered as still being, to a large extent, in an experimental stage, and are, it is understood, likely to be rather complicated and costly.

7. *Shale Oil and Products of Distillation thereof.* — The treatment of bituminous shale, deposits of which are to be found in Italy, may yield a certain quantity of oil which may be distilled

to yield petrol and other oils. The cost involved in securing any large development of these deposits would be considerable and time would be required, but the Committee thinks it desirable to call attention to the matter.

8. *Hydro-electric Power.* — An extended use of hydro-electric power may have to be reckoned with as a further possibility, for Italy has a large potential capacity for the production of electrical energy.

The substitution of petrol-driven motors by electric power might take the form either of an extended installation of trolley-bus lines or of an increased use of accumulator-driven motor-cars.

The quantity of petrol which might be replaced in this way can, of course, only be a matter of conjecture.

9. *Other Possible Substitutes.* — As is well known, petrol and certain other petroleum products may be produced by synthetic methods from coal, lignite or other carbonaceous materials. The leading countries in the development of the method of production have been Germany, the United Kingdom and France. In these countries, which possess large natural resources in coal and bituminous materials, certain processes of manufacture have, in fact, been developed on an industrial scale, as the result of extensive and extremely costly experiments.

Italy, possessing no coal deposits of her own, has not, however, undertaken any developments in these directions.

A supply of Italian synthetic petroleum products may therefore be regarded as out of the question at present.

Finally, the Committee considers that it should mention the possibility of motor fuels being manufactured from certain products of vegetable or animal origin, such as peanuts, palm-kernels, olives, castor-oil, fish-oils, etc.

* * *

As a result of its investigations, the Committee is of opinion that it would be possible, by the adoption and extension of the use of substitutes for petrol, to effect a material economy in the quantity of motor fuel, which otherwise would have to be imported.

As the Committee has already indicated at the beginning, various considerations have to be taken into account which are of a non-technical character and fall outside the competence of the Committee. It is impossible, in these circumstances, to make any precise estimate of the economy in petrol which it would be possible for Italy to effect by the use of substitute fuels.

As some substitution of imported motor fuels by home-produced fuels is already taking place, it is considered that no serious difficulty would be experienced in expediting this substitution immediately, and that, subject to the problems implicit in the factors mentioned above being satisfactorily resolved, economies of the proportions indicated by the Committee might be obtained within a relatively short time. The cost of substitute fuels will, however, be considerably higher than that of petrol.

In order to give some indication of the extent of the possible economy, taking into account only those substitute fuels in respect of which approximate figures can be given—that is to say, the fuels referred to in Sections 1, 2 and 3 of the present report—the Committee would roughly estimate this at 100,000 tons per annum.

Whatever the possible economy may be, however, it will remain necessary, in any case, for Italy to continue to import considerable quantities of petrol. As was explained above, some of the principal substitute fuels existing at present can only be used by mixing them with larger quantities of petrol, which will have to be imported in any case.

It should, moreover, be added that alcohol and benzol are essential for the production of explosives. In consequence, the greater the demand for explosives, the less alcohol and benzol will be available for motor fuel.

III. PETROLEUM PRODUCTS OTHER THAN PETROL.

Diesel Oil and Kerosene. — As regards substitutes for petroleum products other than petrol, which form by far the larger part of the imports of Italy, no substitutes of any practical importance for Diesel oil and kerosene may be said to exist in Italy, at least at present. It is true that certain fractions of shale oil might be employed as substitutes for Diesel oil and kerosene, but, as set forth in Section 7, the cost and time involved in securing any large development of the shale deposits would be considerable. Kerosene for lighting purposes in lamps, which it is estimated represents rather less than half of the total quantity of kerosene imported, might, in extreme circumstances, be replaced by acetylene, produced—as is well known—from carbide, in carbide lamps. The introduction, however, of such lamps, in themselves rather unsatisfactory substitutes, would take some time and considerable cost. Some additional use of electricity might also be employed for this purpose.

Fuel oil used under boilers by the mercantile marine may in certain cases be replaced by coal without making extensive changes to the furnaces and bunker equipment. In many cases,

substitution would involve considerable alterations. The substitution would, of course, mean a corresponding increase of imports of coal. Similar considerations would apply to fuel oils used in Italy for other purposes. In the case of naval vessels, such change of fuel would in most cases be out of the question.

Lubricating mineral oils might to a certain extent be replaced by lubricants made from or containing vegetable oils, such as olive-oil, castor-oil, etc., or animal fats—e.g., fish or whale oil. But for certain purposes, such as the lubrication of high-speed machinery, internal-combustion motors, etc., the general replacement of high-grade mineral lubricants is not regarded as practicable.

ANNEX 3.

TRANSPORT.

The Committee has made a technical examination of the conditions governing the transport of oil to Italy.¹

It appeared to the Committee that the problem could best be dealt with if they considered, first, the capacity of the Italian tanker fleet, secondly, the extent to which it might be possible for tanker tonnage belonging to non-member States to be transferred to the Italian trade and, thirdly, the form of any possible embargo on the use of tankers belonging to Member States for the carriage of oil to Italy, together with the difficulties that might attach to any such embargo.

I. CAPACITY OF THE ITALIAN TANKER FLEET.

Details are attached of the principal tanker fleets of the world as at July 1st, 1935 (see Appendix IV). The Italian fleet of vessels of 1,000 gross tons and over is there shown as sixty-seven vessels of 329,319 gross tons. It has since been increased, and at January 17th, 1936, is believed to have amounted to eighty-two² vessels of approximately 356,000 gross tons. (There are, in addition, the Italian naval tankers, which probably amount to about 70,000 gross tons.)

Of the 356,000 gross tons, 254,000 gross tons are recorded as trading on January 17th last. Of the remainder, 16,000 gross tons are reported as being used as depot ships, 42,000 gross tons as lying at Massowa or Mogadiscio and 36,000 gross tons as laid up or not having moved for two months. The balance of 8,000 gross tons is not reported.

A number of Italian tankers are, because of their age and size, not eminently suited for ocean-going voyages, but if all vessels under 2,000 gross tons and also all vessels over 30 years of age are omitted, a balance of 270,000 gross tons is left, and it must be assumed, in the absence of detailed information as to the actual condition of the individual ships, that this tonnage would be used, if necessary, for transatlantic voyages. It appears that Italy has, during recent months, used a number of these vessels (aggregating 40,000 gross tons) for storage purposes of oil in the Italian colonies in East Africa and a number (aggregating 27,000 gross tons) for the storage of oil in Italy; but there is no reason to think that, if Italy were pressed for tanker tonnage, she would not arrange for any reserve required to be held in less serviceable tankers, or in shore tanks.

The Committee presumes that Italy would, under the pressure of a great emergency, make arrangements for increased storage of oil in shore tanks, so as to release further tanker tonnage for the carriage of oil to Italy. If this were done, it is possible that the Italian tanker tonnage which could be sent over the Atlantic for oil supplies might even be as high as 320,000 gross tons. It is certainly not possible for the Committee to say that this could not be done if the Italian need were sufficiently great.

Ordinarily, it could be assumed that a speed of 200 or more miles per day would be attained by a fleet of tankers, but having regard to the average age of the Italian fleet, the Committee thought it well to assume that, on average, the vessels would not do more than 180 miles per day at sea. Allowing reasonable time for loading, unloading, repairs, etc., this would mean that

the ships, if running between Italy and the United States Gulf ports, would, on average, make 4.75 instead of a normal 5 or 6 voyages per year.

The average cargo-carrying capacity of a tanker is approximately one-third more than her gross tonnage. The Committee is accordingly led to the conclusion, on the information available to it, that, if the Italian supplies of oil had to be drawn from the Gulf and 270,000 gross tons were put into the transatlantic trade, the Italian fleet might be expected to carry not less than about 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ million tons of oil from the Gulf to Italy in a year. If, however, as much as 320,000 gross tons were put into the transatlantic trade, and the Committee cannot say that this would be impossible, then the Italian tanker fleet would carry as much as 2 million tons a year.

The Committee has not overlooked the fact that about 20,000 gross tons of tankers are required for the carriage of oil (estimated to amount to 25,000 to 30,000 tons per month) from Italy to its colonies, but it seems probable that the tonnage which has been left out of account above would be sufficient for this, even if as much as 320,000 gross tons were put into the transatlantic trade.

Vessels under other flags which might be employed in the carriage of oil to Italy from the Gulf could reasonably be expected to make at least five voyages a year, and the carriage of 1,000,000 tons of oil to Italy in such vessels would mean the employment for a year of tanker tonnage of about 150,000 gross tons (cargo-carrying capacity, 200,000 tons).

In short, therefore, the position is that for every million tons of oil in excess of 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ million tons—or possibly 2 million tons (see above)—which could be carried by the Italian tanker fleet, Italy would require to obtain the use of 150,000 gross tons of tanker tonnage under other flags.

II. AVAILABILITY OF NON-ITALIAN TONNAGE.

As regards the second question—i.e., the extent to which tanker tonnage belonging to non-member States might be used for the carriage of oil to Italy—details of the fleets in question will be found in Appendix IV. The three principal fleets are those of the United States of America, Japan and Germany, and it has not been thought necessary to consider the fleets of the other non-member States, as these fleets are very small.

The Japanese tanker fleet is constantly being kept trading in the Far East, and the Committee considers it altogether unlikely that this fleet, or part of it, would be diverted to Italian trade.

The German tanker fleet is at present practically entirely engaged in trade to Germany, where the German tankers presumably are at an advantage to-day compared with foreign tankers, on account of exchange difficulties. The Committee does not, however, know of any measures which would prevent German owners from diverting this tonnage to Italian trade, if they were given sufficient inducement in the shape of higher freight rates. The German tanker tonnage that is suitable for transatlantic voyages would appear to amount to about 90,000 gross tons.

As regards the United States tanker fleet, a report issued by the United States Shipping Board Bureau on September 30th, 1935, states that, on that date, 258 tankers of 1,721,648 gross tons were employed in the coastwise trade, and 69 tankers of 526,962 gross tons in nearby and overseas foreign trades. As, however, the amount of tanker tonnage employed in the United States coastwise trade tends to increase in the winter months, the Committee has examined the reported movements of United States tankers in the months of December 1935 and January 1936, and has found that, in this period, the number of tankers employed in foreign trades had fallen to 43 tankers of 316,000 gross tons. Whilst only United States ships can be employed in the United States coastwise trade, there is no reason, so far as the Committee is aware, why other vessels should not be chartered for and employed in the United States nearby and overseas foreign trades, thus releasing the United States tankers engaged in those trades for the carriage of oil to Italy.

Further, in this connection, it has to be borne in mind that, in so far as the United States might be able to arrange for the supply of oil to ports in the northern Atlantic range from ports in the Gulf in lieu of from ports in California, an additional amount of tonnage would be made available for possible use in foreign trade because of the much shorter voyage involved.

The Committee has also examined the question whether non-member States would, in the event of any of their tonnage being diverted to Italian trade, be able to replace such tonnage by tankers chartered from Member States. During recent months, there has been a fair number of tankers belonging to Member States engaged in the carriage of oil to Italy, which, in the event of an embargo, would become available for this purpose. Secondly, there are, at the present time, no less than 340,000 gross tons of tankers laid up. It is thought that, if necessary, at least one-half

of this tonnage could be put into commission. Thirdly, according to *Lloyd's Register* shipbuilding returns for December 1935, there is 435,560 gross tons of tanker tonnage under construction, and the greater part of this tonnage will, it is reported, become available for service during the year. There seems little doubt, therefore, that any tonnage belonging to non-member States which may be diverted to Italian trade can be replaced.

From the foregoing, it appears clear that, in the event of an embargo on the use of tankers belonging to Member States, arrangements could be made by Italy and non-member States for a very considerable block of tonnage belonging to non-member States to be made available for the carriage of oil to Italy, although there can be no doubt that the carriage of Italy's supplies of oil in such circumstances would be more difficult to arrange and would be made more expensive, owing to the fact that Italy would be precluded from chartering in the open freight market and could only obtain such tonnage as was required from the restricted market offered by such States as were not applying the embargo.

III. FORMS OF EMBARGO.

As regards the form of any possible embargo on the use of tankers for the carriage of oil to Italy, the embargo, if it is to be fully effective, would have to be such as to prevent tankers of Member States from being used (whether by Italians or by anyone else) for the carriage of oil to Italy. For the sake of completeness, the prohibitions should perhaps cover discharges to Italian ships, but the possibility of oil being transferred at sea from a tanker belonging to a Member State to a tanker in Italy's service need probably not be regarded as serious in practice.

It would clearly be necessary to prohibit, in the first place, the direct sale to Italy of tankers belonging to Member States, and early simultaneous action by all Member States would be required. It would, however, be necessary also to prevent indirect sales to Italy, and to this end all sales of tankers to States not actually applying the embargo would have to be prevented.

The Committee has considered the question of an embargo on the chartering of tankers. A prohibition of time chartering of tankers to Italy would not by itself prevent the tankers being used for the carriage of oil to Italy. If the embargo was one against chartering, then it would be necessary for Member States to prohibit time chartering of tankers to States not applying the embargo, and to prohibit voyage chartering of ships for the carriage of oil to Italy, and also to prohibit the use for the carriage of oil to Italy of any tankers that might be time chartered by their nationals from other Member States. A prohibition of all time chartering of tankers to non-member States would, however, mean a very serious interference with tanker trades not in any way connected with Italy. Further, considerable difficulty must arise in dealing with ships chartered by a Member State applying the embargo to a national of another such State where that national resides outside the jurisdiction of the latter State.

Another form of embargo might be either a prohibition against (a) the discharge in Italy of oil from tankers belonging to Member States or (b) the proceeding of such tankers to Italian ports. The latter would appear to be the more practicable, in view of the difficulties which would arise if it were necessary, in cases of offences, to prove the actual unloading of oil in Italy.

The Committee is of the opinion that, if an embargo on the use of tankers belonging to Member States for the carriage of oil to Italy is to be enforced, the most practicable form of embargo would be one which combined:

- (i) A prohibition against the sale of such tankers to States not applying the embargo; and
- (ii) A prohibition against the proceeding of such tankers to Italy.

A prohibition on the proceeding of tankers belonging to Member States to Italy might raise difficulties in the case of vessels chartered on voyage charters for the carriage of oil to Italy. Such a prohibition would, of course, apply to vessels already on time charter and might, perhaps, raise difficulties for the owners of ships so chartered, which can, under the contracts already made, be used for worldwide trade. The extent of these difficulties cannot, however, be estimated in the absence of detailed information of these contracts.

It would be necessary for the States enforcing the embargo to take measures to watch the movements of all their tanker vessels, and also to take steps, in cases of offences, to collect the evidence required to secure convictions with the possible application of heavy penalties on the owner and/or master.

IV. CASED OIL.

The Committee has further considered the question of the prohibition of the carriage to Italy of cased oil in ships belonging to Member States, and has come to the conclusion that it would be impracticable to prohibit such carriage, having regard to the difficulties attached to the administration of any such prohibition.

V. INLAND TRANSPORT.

Finally, as regards the possible transportation of oil to Italy from neighbouring countries by rail or inland waterways, the Committee is of opinion that this would only arise as part of an attempt to secure supplies through States not applying the embargo. While certain possibilities exist which might be used, the Committee is of opinion that, if any State or States were giving facilities to Italian trade in this matter, the oil would be more likely to be carried by sea, since it would be much cheaper and much more practicable, particularly if considerable quantities were involved.

NOTE BY THE CHAIRMAN OF THE CO-ORDINATION COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Co-ordination Committee has the honour to communicate to the members of the Committee a summary of the statistics drawn up by various countries of their trade with Italy and the Italian colonies during the period November 1935 to January 1936 and the corresponding period of the preceding year:

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INTRODUCTION.

I.

On January 22nd, 1936, the Committee of Eighteen requested that the Committee of Experts should take "all measures, whether by questionnaire or otherwise, necessary for the collection and publication of statistical and other information concerning the state of trade between the countries applying" the proposals of the Co-ordination Committee and Italy and the Italian colonies.

The question was examined by the Committee of Experts during its second session from January 29th to February 1st, 1936. The Committee drafted a questionnaire, which, it decided, should be submitted to all Governments members of the Co-ordination Committee with a view to obtaining statistics concerning the development of trade with Italy.

The Committee of Experts thought it appropriate to view three distinct aspects of that trade :

- " (a) The changes in the value of that trade as a whole and in particular of certain classes of Italian sales abroad ;
- " (b) The movement of precious metals ;
- " (c) The purchases by Italy of certain agricultural products, raw materials, etc. ".

II.

The present document has been prepared, after consultation with the experts on trade statistics who assisted in the drafting of the questionnaire, mainly from the replies to the questionnaire received up to April 8th, 1936.

A complete list of the replies will be found in Annex I. They numbered 38 for November and December, and for January 34.

Some overseas Governments whose written replies have not yet been received have, in compliance with the request made when the questionnaire was sent out, cabled the figures of the total value of their merchandise trade and also of their trade in precious metals with Italy. These figures are included in Tables I to IV. Tables V, VI and VII will be completed when the final replies to the questionnaire are received.

According to a suggestion made by the Committee of Experts, the Secretariat has endeavoured to complete the returns made by Governments by information obtained from the official trade statistics of countries not represented on the Co-ordination Committee.

Moreover, for certain countries represented on the Co-ordination Committee whose replies have not yet been received, it has proved possible to insert figures of the value of their trade with Italy obtained from their monthly official trade returns. These figures will in due course be replaced by the statistics specially provided in replies to the questionnaire.

Figures not supplied by the Governments for the purpose of this enquiry are given in italics throughout the tables.

Although the present document relates primarily to the months of November and December 1935 and January 1936, together with the corresponding period of the previous year, figures for February 1936 relating to total trade with Italy and Italian colonies received in time for insertion are given on page 40.

III.

The trade with Italy in 1932 and 1933 of the countries for which figures have been included in Table I accounted, according to the Italian trade returns, approximately for the following proportions of the total value of Italian trade :

It should perhaps be observed that the export figures given above would be registered in Italian returns as imports, and the import figures as exports. The Italian import figures would, however, be recorded c.i.f. Italian ports and would therefore tend to exceed the export figures given above, which show f.o.b. values ports of shipment; similarly, the Italian export figures would be recorded f.o.b. Italian ports of shipment and would therefore tend to be lower than the import figures given above, which show in most cases the c.i.f. values of the importing country.

As the Committee of Experts pointed out in its report on the questionnaire, it was to be expected that there would be "certain imports to record at first by countries applying Proposal III on account of goods paid for before October 19th or *en route* when Proposal III was enforced and a more restricted number of imports to record subsequently on account of the contracts approved by the Committee of Eighteen and of the exemption made in Proposal III in favour of books, music, etc."

The import figures for January 1936 may for these various reasons be more significant than those for November and December 1935.

The observations transmitted by the Belgian, Polish and Swedish Governments (see pages 8-9) indicate the nature of the trade that has actually taken place as regards these three countries, and may perhaps be taken as illustrative of events elsewhere.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

1. COUNTRIES NOT REPRESENTED ON THE CO-ORDINATION COMMITTEE.

Germany. — The figures given in the various tables are calculated on the basis of information given in the "Monatliche Nachweise über den Auswärtigen Handel Deutschlands". As regards the method followed for the calculations, see footnotes to the tables.

Japan. — The figures inserted in Tables I, III and IV have been taken from the "Monthly Return of the Foreign Trade of Japan" published by the Department of Finance, Tokio.

The information available does not permit of the completion of Table V for Japan.

United States of America. — The figures inserted in Tables I, III and IV have been taken from the following publications :

Monthly Summary of Foreign Commerce of the U. S. A. :

Department of Commerce : Foreign Trade in December (1935) with Italy, Italian Africa and Ethiopia.

Department of Commerce : Foreign Trade in January (1936) with Italy, Italian Africa and Ethiopia.

The information available does not permit of the completion of Table V for the United States of America. A few figures concerning certain commodities included in that table are, however, given in an Annex to the table.

2. SPECIAL TRADE AND GENERAL TRADE.

A column is given in Table I showing which countries give figures for general trade and which give figures for special trade.

3. DEFINITION OF "ITALY" AND "ITALIAN COLONIES".

Several Governments have stated that they cannot isolate the figures for the Italian colonies, as the data, in accordance with the normal national list of countries of provenance and destination, are included, without distinction, among those of certain other countries or colonies. Steps are being taken by certain Governments, however, to overcome this difficulty.

"Italy" comprises the continental and insular territory of Italy in Europe, including Fiume, Trieste and Zara, but excluding the Italian Aegean Islands (Rhodes, etc.) ; "Italian Colonies" comprises the Italian Aegean Islands and the Italian colonies in Africa — namely, Libya (*i.e.*, Tripolitania and Cyrenaica), Eritrea and Italian Somaliland. 5. SPECIAL OBSERVATIONS RECEIVED.

Belgium. — As regards imports of Italian goods, the figure 3,012,000 francs for January 1936 is made up as follows :

- (1) 1,076,000 francs represent goods taken out of bond which were bonded before November 18th ;
- (2) 1,823,000 francs are for an aeroplane, the import of which was specially authorised ;
- (3) 113,000 francs are mainly for goods imported before November 18th in interrupted transit (a deposit being paid as security for the duties) and not subsequently cleared (the deposit being forfeited).

Poland. — The imports from Italy into Poland are explained by :

- (a) The import into free ports of goods consigned from Italy or the Italian colonies to Polish Customs territory before November 18th, 1935. (The Polish statistics cover only special trade : there are no statistics of indirect transit trade, showing imports into free ports) ;
- (b) The exceptions for which provision is made in the Order of the Finance Minister of November 13th, 1935. These exceptions are in accordance with the resolution of the Committee of Eighteen of November 6th, 1935.

¹ Figures by country of origin are compiled quarterly only. The value of Czechoslovak imports from Italy in the whole year 1935 was : by country of consignment : 243 million Kč. (including 55 millions from Flume and Trieste). : by country of origin : 201 million Kč. (of which, Flume and Trieste : nil).

Sweden. — With reference to the particulars supplied regarding imports from Italy, it should be explained that the import statistics are based in the main on the data contained in the Customs clearing certificates. The Customs dues are generally assessed on Customs declarations made by the owners of the goods. The Customs regulations do not specify any time-limit for these declarations ; but the Customs authorities assess the dues without a previous declaration if the declaration is not made within thirty days of the arrival of the goods. Goods placed in transit or bonded warehouses or imported into free ports appear in the import statistics relating to the month in which they are taken out of the transit or bonded warehouse or free port (after being cleared through the Customs in the regular course) for import into the country. The declaration of the value of imported goods may occasionally be postponed by permission, in which case the goods do not appear in the statistics until the month in which the declaration is made.

It will be apparent from the above that goods imported into Sweden may frequently not appear in the official statistics until some time after their arrival in Sweden.

6. CONVERSION OF FIGURES INTO GOLD DOLLARS.

The figures given by Governments in their national currencies have been converted by the Secretariat into U. S. A. old gold dollars, the unit generally utilised in statistical publications of the League of Nations. The conversion rates are given in Annex II.

in accordance with the classification of the Brussels Convention (1913) or any other similar classification already used by the country making the returns.

It will be noticed from the following table that not all the Governments which have transmitted figures for the total value of imports from Italy have found it possible to give information by main groups.

I. ELECTION OF OFFICERS, APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES AND ADOPTION OF AGENDA.

- (a) Appointment of a Credentials¹ Committee.
- (b) Election of the President of the Assembly.
- (c) Adoption of the Agenda.
- (d) Appointment of the Main Committees of the Assembly.
- (e) Appointment of an Agenda Committee.
- (f) Election of Vice-Presidents of the Assembly.

The questions are usually divided between the main Committees of the Assembly in the following manner:

First Committee:	Legal questions.
Second Committee:	Questions connected with the work of the technical organisations.
Third Committee:	Questions connected with the limitation and reduction of armaments. ²
Fourth Committee:	Administrative and budgetary questions.
Fifth Committee:	Social questions.
Sixth Committee:	Political questions.

2. REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE LEAGUE SINCE THE LAST SESSION OF THE ASSEMBLY.

Each year the Secretary-General prepares a general report on the work of the League since the last session of the Assembly. This report is distributed in two parts, one in July, the other at the opening of the session.

The report forms the basis of the general discussion with which the session usually opens, and during which the various delegations have an opportunity of expressing their views on the work of the League.

The Assembly from time to time refers to the appropriate Committee chapters³ of these reports dealing with questions which do not appear separately on the agenda.

3. ELECTION OF NON-PERMANENT MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

The Assembly decided, on September 15th, 1926 (seventh session), to elect each year three non-permanent Members of the Council for a period of three years from the date of their election.

The Assembly further decided, on October 2nd, 1933 (fourteenth session), upon the provisional creation of one new non-permanent seat for three years.

The mandates which expire in 1936 are those of the Argentine Republic, Australia, Denmark and Portugal.

4. PERMANENT COURT OF INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE.

- (a) Participation of States not members of the League in the election of Members of the Court.

In accordance with Article 4, paragraph 3, of the Revised Statute of the Permanent Court, the Assembly is called upon, on the proposal of the Council and in the absence of a special agreement, to lay down the conditions under which a State, which has accepted the Statute of the Court but is not a member of the League, may participate in electing the Members of the Court.

The question is included in the agenda of the May session of the Council.

- (b) Election to vacancies among the judges of the Permanent Court of International Justice.

Unless the elections to the vacancies on the Permanent Court are held earlier, as a result of decisions of the Council, it is anticipated that they will take place during the ordinary session of the Assembly. There are, at present, three vacancies, due to the death of M. W. Schücking (German) and the resignations of Mr. F. B. Kellogg (American) and M. Wang Chung-Hui (Chinese). On January 24th, 1936 (ninetieth session), the Council made arrangements to enable the first two vacancies to be filled before the Assembly's ordinary session, if a special meeting of the Assembly should be held; and at its session in May it will discuss the measures to be taken in regard to the third vacancy.

Items inserted by or arising out of Decisions of the Assembly.

5. RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE ASSEMBLY.

- (a) Maintenance of the rule relating to the convocation of the Finance (Fourth) Committee of the Assembly.

On October 11th, 1933 (fourteenth session), the Assembly established this rule experimentally for the year 1934; on September 24th, 1935 (sixteenth session), it decided to maintain the rule provisionally for the year 1936.

- (b) Proposed amendments regarding the composition of the General Committee, the insertion of a provision regarding the Agenda Committee and the creation of a Nominations Committee.

Discussion of these proposals, particulars of which will be found in the report of the First Committee of the Assembly (document A.69.1935.V), was adjourned by the Assembly on September 28th, 1935 (sixteenth session), to its session of 1936.

6. COMPOSITION OF BODIES TO WHICH APPOINTMENTS ARE MADE BY THE ASSEMBLY.

- (a) Commission of Enquiry for European Union.

On September 27th, 1935 (sixteenth session), the Assembly decided to renew for twelve months the term of office of the Commission of Enquiry for European Union.

- (b) Appointment of the President of the Governing Body of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

On January 24th, 1936 (ninetieth session), the Council appointed M. M. Hansson (Norwegian) to act for the time being as President of the Governing Body of the Nansen International Office for Refugees. In accordance with Article 6 of the Statutes of the Office, the Assembly is called upon to proceed to the definitive appointment of the President.

- (c) Supervisory Commission.

The Assembly will be called upon to appoint, on the proposal of the Fourth Committee, two members of the Supervisory Commission for the period January 1st, 1937, to December 31st, 1939.

The members whose term of office expires at the end of 1936 are M. S. Osusky (Czechoslovak) and M. J. Réveillaud (French).

- (d) Administrative Board of the Staff Pensions Fund.

The Assembly will be called upon to appoint, on the proposal of the Fourth Committee, three members and three substitute members of the Administrative Board of the Staff Pensions Fund for the period January 1st, 1937, to December 31st, 1939.

The members and substitute members whose term of office expires at the end of 1936 are: Members: M. W. Rappard (Swiss), M. A. Hoel (Norwegian) and Mr. F. T. Cremins (Irish); Substitute members: M. C. Parra-Pérez (Venezuelan), M. J. Modzelewski (Polish) and M. C. van Rappard (Netherlands).

7. COMMITTEES OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

On September 26th, 1935 (sixteenth session), the Assembly requested the Council to take the necessary measures for the execution of certain of its decisions concerning the constitution, procedure and practice of Committees of the League of Nations. Any decisions of the Council requiring action by the Assembly will be submitted to the latter.

8. QUESTION OF PROHIBITING, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE COVENANT, THE SUPPLY OF ARMS AND WAR MATERIAL TO BELLIGERENTS.

On September 27th, 1934 (fifteenth session), the Assembly requested the Council to appoint a committee to study, from the standpoint of pure law and, in particular, from that of interpretation of the Covenant, the question of prohibiting, under the provisions of the Covenant, the supply of arms and war material to belligerents, and to present its conclusions to the Council and to the Assembly.

The Committee not having met before the Assembly's session of 1935, the Assembly, on September 11th, 1935 (sixteenth session), adjourned consideration of this question to the present year.

9. AMENDMENT OF THE COVENANT OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS IN ORDER TO BRING IT INTO HARMONY WITH THE PACT OF PARIS: EXAMINATION OF THE TREATY OF NON-AGGRESSION AND CONCILIATION CONCLUDED AT RIO DE JANEIRO ON OCTOBER 10TH, 1933.

On September 25th, 1931 (twelfth session), the Assembly, taking note of a report of the First Committee on the subject of the amendment of the Covenant of the League in order to bring it into harmony with the Pact of Paris, decided to create a committee consisting of representatives of all the Members of the League, for the purpose of seeking unanimous agreement on the bases indicated in that report and of drawing up a final text for submission to the Assembly.

By decisions of the Council and of the Assembly, the Treaty of Non-Aggression and Conciliation concluded at Rio de Janeiro on October 10th, 1933, has also been referred to the Committee.

The Committee not having met before the Assembly's session of 1935, the Assembly, on September 11th, 1935 (sixteenth session), adjourned consideration of this question to the present year.

10. COMPOSITION OF THE COUNCIL.

The Assembly, on October 2nd, 1933 (fourteenth session), adopted the following resolution:

"The Assembly

"Approves the recommendation of the Committee for the provisional creation of one new non-permanent seat on the Council, and accordingly declares that it is desirable that, for the period commencing with the election of the non-permanent Members of the Council at the Assembly's session of 1933 and ending with the election of the said non-permanent Members in the year 1936, the number of non-permanent seats on the Council should be provisionally increased from nine to ten, on the understanding that, towards the end of that period, the question of the number of the Members of the Council will be reconsidered and that all the Members of the League will remain entirely free to propose any final solution of this question which they consider desirable."

The Council, on September 26th, 1935 (eighty-ninth session), appointed a Committee to undertake the study indicated in the above resolution and, in connection therewith, to examine certain proposals put forward by the Chinese Government regarding the representation of Asia on the Council. The Committee will report to the Assembly and the Council.

II. REFUGEES.

(a) Report of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

The Nansen International Office for Refugees is placed under the direction of the League of Nations in conformity with Article 24 of the Covenant, and submits an annual report to the Assembly on its activities.

(b) Results of the work of the Committee on International Assistance to Refugees.

(i) Report of the Committee on International Assistance to Refugees.

On September 28th, 1935 (sixteenth session), the Assembly requested the Council to appoint a committee for the study of international assistance to refugees. This Committee submitted its report to the Council, which, on January 24th, 1936 (ninetieth session), decided to refer it to the Assembly, particularly those proposals contemplating measures of a permanent character.

(ii) Report of the Acting President of the Governing Body of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

In adopting the report of the Committee on International Assistance to Refugees, the Council approved the Committee's proposal that the Acting President of the Governing Body of the Office present a special report.

(iii) Report of the High Commissioner of the League of Nations for Refugees, Jewish and Other, coming from Germany.

The High Commissioner of the League for Refugees, Jewish and other, coming from Germany, appointed by the Council on February 14th, 1936, should, in accordance with the report of the Committee on International Assistance to Refugees, approved by the Council, submit a special report to the Assembly.

12. NUTRITION.

On September 27th, 1935 (sixteenth session), the Assembly adopted the following resolution:

"The Assembly,

"Having considered the subject of nutrition in relation to public health and the effects of improved nutrition on the consumption of agricultural products:

"Urges Governments to examine the practical means of securing better nutrition and requests the Council:

"(i) To invite the Health Organisation of the League of Nations to continue and extend its work on nutrition in relation to public health;

• " (2) To instruct the technical organisations of the League of Nations, in consultation with the International Labour Office and the International Institute of Agriculture, to collect, summarise and publish information on the measures taken in all countries for securing improved nutrition; and,

" (3) To appoint a committee, including agricultural, economic and health experts, instructed to submit a general report on the whole question, in its health and economic aspects, to the next Assembly, after taking into consideration, inter alia, the progress of the work carried out in accordance with paragraphs (1) and (2) above."

The Committee mentioned in paragraph (3) of the resolution was appointed by decision of the Council of September 28th, 1935 (eighty-ninth session), and its report will be before the Assembly.

Item proposed by the Council.

A.7.1936.V. 13. INTERNATIONAL REPRESSION OF TERRORISM.

On January 23rd, 1936 (ninetieth session), the Council decided to place on the Assembly's agenda the report of the Committee which it had set up to study this question, together with two draft Conventions drawn up by the Committee and the observations which it had invited the Governments to make on these drafts. The draft Conventions and the Council's report have been circulated in document A.7.1936. The observations from Governments will be communicated to the Assembly in a further document.

Budget of the League and Financial and Administrative Questions.

14. AUDITED ACCOUNTS FOR THE SEVENTEENTH FINANCIAL PERIOD (1935) AND AUDITOR'S REPORT THEREON.

In accordance with Article 38 of the Financial Regulations, "the Assembly shall finally pass the expenditure and income accounts".

15. BUDGET OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS FOR THE NINETEENTH FINANCIAL PERIOD (1937).

In accordance with Chapter IV of the Financial Regulations, the budget of the League (including the budgets of the Secretariat and special organisations of the League, the International Labour Organisation and the Permanent Court of International Justice) is annually submitted to the Assembly.

16. REPORT OF THE SUPERVISORY COMMISSION.

In accordance with Article 16 of the Financial Regulations, "the Commission shall annually examine the budget and prepare a report thereon".

Under other provisions of the Regulations, the report of the Commission must also deal with the accounts and with such other relevant questions as might arise in consequence of decisions of the competent organs of the League. Thus, the Commission will this year report to the Assembly, inter alia, on various amendments to the Financial Regulations.

17. CONTRIBUTIONS IN ARREARS.

The Assembly, on September 28th, 1935 (sixteenth session), invited "the Special Committee as at present constituted to continue its tasks and to present a report to the Assembly at its seventeenth session".

18. ALLOCATION OF EXPENSES.

The Assembly, on September 28th, 1935 (sixteenth session), decided that the Committee on the Allocation of Expenses should place before the Assembly at its next session a revised scale.

19. REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE BOARD OF THE STAFF PENSIONS FUND.

It is provided in Article XX of the Administrative Rules of the Staff Pensions Regulations which were adopted by the Assembly that the Board shall submit a report to the Assembly; a further valuation of the Fund will also be submitted to the Assembly.

RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE ASSEMBLY.

Rule 5.

1. Each Member shall communicate to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session, the names of its representatives, of whom there shall be not more than three. The names of substitute representatives may be added.
2. The full powers of the representatives shall be delivered to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session. They shall be issued either by the Head of the State or by the Minister for Foreign Affairs.²
3. A Committee of nine members for the examination of the full powers shall be elected by the Assembly on the proposal of the President. The Committee shall report without delay.
4. Any representative to whose admission objection has been made shall sit provisionally with the same rights as other representatives, unless the Assembly decides otherwise.

A.6(a).1936 (Annex). *Each year the Secretary-General prepares a general report on the work of the League since the last session of the Assembly. This report is distributed in two parts, one in July, the other at the opening of the session.*

The report forms the basis of the general discussion with which the session usually opens, and during which the various delegations have an opportunity of expressing their views on the work of the League.

The Assembly from time to time refers to the appropriate Committee chapters of these reports dealing with questions which do not appear separately on the agenda.

A.15.1936. 3. ELECTION OF NON-PERMANENT MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

The Assembly decided, on September 15th, 1926 (seventh session), to elect each year three non-permanent Members of the Council for a period of three years from the date of their election.

The Assembly further decided, on October 2nd, 1933 (fourteenth session), upon the provisional creation of one new non-permanent seat for three years.

The mandates which expire in 1936 are those of the Argentine Republic, Australia, Denmark and Portugal.

4. PERMANENT COURT OF INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE.

- (a) Participation of States not members of the League in the election of members of the Court.

In accordance with Article 4, paragraph 3, of the Revised Statute of the Permanent Court, the Assembly is called upon, on the proposal of the Council and in the absence of a special agreement, to lay down the conditions under which a State, which has accepted the Statute of the Court but is not a member of the League, may participate in electing the members of the Court.

The Report of a Committee of Jurists (document C.293.M.178.1936.V.) has been distributed to the Members of the League and the examination of the question is included in the agenda of the next (September) session of the Council.

- (b) Election to vacancies among the judges of the Permanent Court of International Justice.

The Assembly and the Council will be called upon to elect three members of the Court to fill the vacancies created by the death of M. W. Schücking (German) and the resignations of Mr. F. B. Kellogg (American) and M. Wang Chung-Hui (Chinese).

Under the revised Statute of the Court, it rests with the Council at its next session to fix the date of election of a successor to the late Baron Rolin-Jaequemyns, (Belgian).

Items inserted by or arising out of Decisions of the Assembly.

5. RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE ASSEMBLY.

- (a) Maintenance of the rule relating to the convocation of the Finance (Fourth) Committee of the Assembly.

On October 11th, 1933 (fourteenth session), the Assembly established this rule experimentally for the year 1934; on September 24th, 1935 (sixteenth session), it decided to maintain the rule provisionally for the year 1936.

- (b) Proposed amendments regarding the composition of the General Committee, the insertion of a provision regarding the Agenda Committee and the creation of a Nominations Committee.

Discussion of these proposals, particulars of which will be found in the report of the First Committee of the Assembly (document A.69.1935.V), was adjourned by the Assembly on September 28th, 1935 (sixteenth session), to its session of 1936.

6. COMPOSITION OF BODIES TO WHICH APPOINTMENTS ARE MADE BY THE ASSEMBLY.

- (a) Commission of Enquiry for European Union.

On September 27th, 1935 (sixteenth session), the Assembly decided to renew for twelve months the term of office of the Commission of Enquiry for European Union.

- (b) Appointment of the President of the Governing Body of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

On January 24th, 1936 (ninetieth session), the Council appointed M. M. Hansson (Norwegian) to act for the time being as President of the Governing Body of the Nansen International Office for Refugees. In accordance with Article 6 of the Statutes of the Office, the Assembly is called upon to proceed to the definitive appointment of the President.

- (c) Supervisory Commission.

The Assembly will be called upon to appoint, on the proposal of the Fourth Committee, two members of the Supervisory Commission for the period January 1st, 1937, to December 31st, 1939.

The members whose term of office expires at the end of 1936 are M. S. Osusky (Czechoslovak) and M. J. Réveillaud (French).

- (d) Administrative Board of the Staff Pensions Fund.

The Assembly will be called upon to appoint, on the proposal of the Fourth Committee, three members and three substitute members of the Administrative Board of the Staff Pensions Fund for the period January 1st, 1937, to December 31st, 1939.

The members and substitute members whose term of office expires at the end of 1936 are: Members: M. W. Rappard (Swiss), M. A. Hoel (Norwegian) and Mr. F. T. Cremins (Irish); Substitute members: M. C. Parra-Pérez (Venezuelan), M. J. Modzelewski (Polish) and M. C. van Rappard (Netherlands).

7. COMMITTEES OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

On September 26th, 1935 (sixteenth session), the Assembly requested the Council to take the necessary measures for the execution of certain of its decisions concerning the constitution, procedure and practice of Committees of the League of Nations. Any decisions of the Council requiring action by the Assembly will be submitted to the latter.

8. QUESTION OF PROHIBITING, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE COVENANT, THE SUPPLY OF ARMS AND WAR MATERIAL TO BELLIGERENTS.

On September 27th, 1934 (fifteenth session), the Assembly requested the Council to appoint a committee to study, from the standpoint of pure law and, in particular, from that of interpretation of the Covenant, the question of prohibiting, under the provisions of the Covenant, the supply of arms and war material to belligerents, and to present its conclusions to the Council and to the Assembly.

The Committee not having met before the Assembly's session of 1935, the Assembly, on September 11th, 1935 (sixteenth session), adjourned consideration of this question to the present year.

9. AMENDMENT OF THE COVENANT OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS IN ORDER TO BRING IT INTO HARMONY WITH THE PACT OF PARIS: EXAMINATION OF THE TREATY OF NON-AGGRESSION AND CONCILIATION CONCLUDED AT RIO DE JANEIRO ON OCTOBER 10TH, 1933.

On September 25th, 1931 (twelfth session), the Assembly, taking note of a report of the First Committee on the subject of the amendment of the Covenant of the League in order to bring it into harmony with the Pact of Paris, decided to create a committee consisting of representatives of all the Members of the League, for the purpose of seeking unanimous agreement on the bases indicated in that report and of drawing up a final text for submission to the Assembly.

By decisions of the Council and of the Assembly, the Treaty of Non-Aggression and Conciliation concluded at Rio de Janeiro on October 10th, 1933, has also been referred to the Committee.

The Committee not having met before the Assembly's session of 1935, the Assembly, on September 11th, 1935 (sixteenth session), adjourned consideration of this question to the present year.

A.9.1936.V. 10. COMPOSITION OF THE COUNCIL.

The Assembly, on October 2nd, 1933 (fourteenth session), adopted the following resolution:

"The Assembly . . .

"Approves the recommendation of the Committee for the provisional creation of one new non-permanent seat on the Council, and accordingly declares that it is desirable that, for the period commencing with the election of the non-permanent Members of the Council at the Assembly's session of 1933 and ending with the election of the said non-permanent Members in the year 1936, the number of non-permanent seats on the Council should be provisionally increased from nine to ten, on the understanding that, towards the end of that period, the question of the number of the Members of the Council will be reconsidered and that all the Members of the League will remain entirely free to propose any final solution of this question which they consider desirable."

The Council, on September 26th, 1935 (eighty-ninth session), appointed a Committee to undertake the study indicated in the above resolution and, in connection therewith, to examine certain proposals put forward by the Chinese Government regarding the representation of Asia on the Council. The Committee's report is before the Assembly. On May 13th, 1936 (ninety-second session), the Council decided to adjourn action on the report until the Assembly should have expressed its views.

II. REFUGEES.

(a) Report of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

The Nansen International Office for Refugees is placed under the direction of the League of Nations in conformity with Article 24 of the Covenant, and submits an annual report to the Assembly on its activities.

(b) Results of the work of the Committee on International Assistance to Refugees.

On September 28th, 1935 (sixteenth session), the Assembly requested the Council to appoint a committee for the study of international assistance to refugees. This Committee submitted its report to the Council, which, on January 24th, 1936 (ninetieth session), decided to refer it to the Assembly, particularly those proposals contemplating measures of a permanent character.

(ii) Report of the Acting President of the Governing Body of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

In adopting the report of the Committee on International Assistance to Refugees, the Council approved the Committee's proposal that the Acting President of the Governing Body of the Office present a special report.

(iii) Report of the High Commissioner of the League of Nations for Refugees, Jewish and Other, coming from Germany.

The High Commissioner of the League for Refugees, Jewish and other, coming from Germany, appointed by the Council on February 14th, 1936, should, in accordance with the report of the Committee on International Assistance to Refugees, approved by the Council, submit a special report to the Assembly.

RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE ASSEMBLY.

Rule 5.

1. Each Member shall communicate to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session, the names of its representatives, of whom there shall be not more than three. The names of substitute representatives may be added.

2. The full powers of the representatives shall be delivered to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session. They shall be issued either by the Head of the State or by the Minister for Foreign Affairs.¹

3. A Committee of nine members for the examination of the full powers shall be elected by the Assembly on the proposal of the President. The Committee shall report without delay.

4. Any representative to whose admission objection has been made shall sit provisionally with the same rights as other representatives, unless the Assembly decides otherwise.

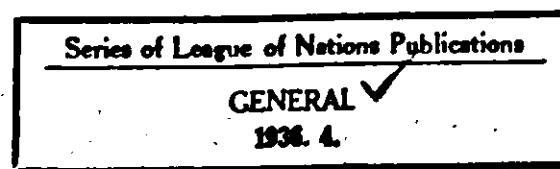

NOTE BY THE CHAIRMAN OF THE CO-ORDINATION COMMITTEE.

The Chairman of the Co-ordination Committee has the honour to communicate to the members of the Committee a summary of the statistics drawn up by various countries of their trade with Italy and the Italian colonies during the period December 1935 to March 1936 and the corresponding period of the preceding year.

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INTRODUCTION.

I.

On January 22nd, 1936, the Committee of Eighteen requested that the Committee of Experts should take "all measures, whether by questionnaire or otherwise, necessary for the collection and publication of statistical and other information concerning the state of trade between the countries applying" the proposals of the Co-ordination Committee and Italy and the Italian colonies.

The question was examined by the Committee of Experts during its second session, from January 29th to February 1st, 1936. The Committee drafted a questionnaire, which, it decided, should be submitted to all Governments members of the Co-ordination Committee with a view to obtaining statistics concerning the development of trade with Italy.

The Committee of Experts thought it appropriate to view three distinct aspects of that trade :

- " (a) The changes in the value of that trade as a whole and in particular of certain classes of Italian sales abroad ;
- " (b) The movement of precious metals ;
- " (c) The purchases by Italy of certain agricultural products, raw materials, etc. "

II.

This third document, containing statistics of trade with Italy and Italian colonies,¹ has been prepared mainly from the replies to the questionnaire.

A complete list of the replies will be found in Annex I. They numbered 64 for December, 63 for January, 57 for February and 36 for March.

Some overseas Governments whose written replies have not yet been received have, in compliance with the request made when the questionnaire was sent out, cabled the figures of the total value of their merchandise trade and also of their trade in precious metals with Italy. These figures are included in Tables I to IV. Tables V, VI and VII will be completed when the final replies to the questionnaire are received.

According to a suggestion made by the Committee of Experts, the Secretariat has endeavoured to complete the returns made by Governments by information obtained from the official trade statistics of countries not represented on the Co-ordination Committee.

Moreover, for certain countries represented on the Co-ordination Committee whose replies have not yet been received, it has proved possible to insert figures of the value of their trade with Italy obtained from their monthly official trade returns. These figures will in due course be replaced by the statistics specially provided in replies to the questionnaire.

Figures not supplied by the Governments for the purpose of this enquiry are given in italics throughout the tables.

Although the present document relates primarily to the months of December 1935 and January, February and March 1936, together with the corresponding months of the previous year, figures for April 1936 relating to total trade with Italy and Italian colonies received in time for insertion are given on page 59. As regards November, reference should be made to Co-ordination Committee document 120; a summary of additional information received since the publication of that document and revised totals of all tables for the months of November 1934 and 1935 will be found in Annex III, pages 48 to 58.

It should perhaps be observed that the export figures given above would be registered in Italian returns as imports, and the import figures as exports. The Italian import figures would, however, be recorded c.i.f. Italian ports and would therefore tend to exceed the export figures given above, which show f.o.b. values ports of shipment; similarly, the Italian export

figures would be recorded f.o.b. Italian ports of shipment and would therefore tend to be lower than the import figures given above, which show in most cases the c.i.f. values of the importing country.

As the Committee of Experts pointed out in its report on the questionnaire, it was to be expected that there would be "certain imports to record at first by countries applying Proposal III on account of goods paid for before October 19th or *en route* when Proposal III was enforced and a more restricted number of imports to record subsequently on account of the contracts approved by the Committee of Eighteen and of the exemption made in Proposal III in favour of books, music, etc."

The import figures for the later months may for these various reasons be more significant than those for the earlier months.

The observations transmitted by certain Governments (see pages 9 and 10) indicate the nature of the trade that has actually taken place as regards these countries, and may perhaps be taken as illustrative of events elsewhere.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

1. COUNTRIES NOT REPRESENTED ON THE CO-ORDINATION COMMITTEE.

Germany. — The figures given in Tables V, VI and IX are calculated on the basis of information given in the "Monatliche Nachweise über den Auswärtigen Handel Deutschlands". As regards the method followed for the calculations, see the footnotes to the tables.

Japan. — The figures inserted in Tables I, III and IV have been taken from the "Monthly Return of the Foreign Trade of Japan" published by the Department of Finance, Tokio.

The information available does not permit of the completion of Table V for Japan.

United States of America. — The figures inserted in Tables I, III and IV have been taken from the following publications :

Monthly Summary of Foreign Commerce of the U.S.A.

Department of Commerce : Foreign Trade with Italy, Italian Africa and Ethiopia (published monthly since October 1935).

The information available does not permit of the completion of Table V for the United States of America. A few figures concerning certain commodities included in that table are, however, given in an annex to the table.

2. SPECIAL TRADE AND GENERAL TRADE.

A column is given in Table I showing which countries give figures for general trade and which give figures for special trade.

In the case of Belgium, all the figures refer to special trade, with the exception of those for March in Table V, which are for general trade.

3. DEFINITION OF "ITALY" AND "ITALIAN COLONIES".

Several Governments have stated that they cannot isolate the figures for the Italian colonies, as the data, in accordance with the normal national list of countries of provenance and destination, are included, without distinction, among those of certain other countries or colonies. Steps are being taken by certain Governments, however, to overcome this difficulty.

"Italy" comprises the continental and insular territory of Italy in Europe, including Fiume, Trieste and Zara, but excluding the Italian Aegean Islands (Rhodes, etc.) ; "Italian Colonies" comprises the Italian Aegean Islands and the Italian colonies in Africa — namely, Libya (i.e., Tripolitania and Cyrenaica), Eritrea and Italian Somaliland. 5. SPECIAL OBSERVATIONS RECEIVED.

Belgium. — As regards imports of Italian goods, the figure 3,012,000 francs for January 1936 is made up as follows :

- (1) 1,076,000 francs represent goods taken out of bond which were bonded before November 18th ;
- (2) 1,823,000 francs are for an aeroplane, the import of which was specially authorised ;
- (3) 113,000 francs are mainly for goods imported before November 18th in interrupted transit (a deposit being paid as security for the duties) and not subsequently cleared (the deposit being forfeited).

¹ Figures by country of origin are compiled quarterly only. The value of Czechoslovak imports from Italy in the whole year 1935 was :

Bulgaria. — The small amount of imports from Italy registered during February 1936 (341,000 leva) represents luggage and samples ; no commercial imports from Italy took place during this month.

Colombia. — The figures for imports from Italy for January and February 1936 refer to goods which were already *en route* from the factory of origin prior to November 18th, 1935. Delay in loading at the respective ports and on arrival in Colombia and the time required for dealing with applications for licences in respect of goods *en route* explains the entry of these goods into the Colombian Customs during January and February 1936.

Malta. — The imports appearing in the return for January 1936 concern goods which either had arrived from Italy before the imposition of sanctions and had been placed in bond until released in January, or had been exported from Italy to France before sanctions came into effect and arrived in Malta from France in January.

New Zealand. — The imports during February 1936 consist of goods consigned from Italy prior to the application of sanctions and subsequently transhipped to New Zealand from Australia or the United Kingdom.

Poland. — The imports from Italy into Poland are explained by :

- The import into free ports of goods consigned from Italy or the Italian colonies to Polish Customs territory before November 18th, 1935. (The Polish statistics cover only special trade : there are no statistics of indirect transit trade, showing imports into free ports) ;
- The exceptions for which provision is made in the Order of the Finance Minister of November 13th, 1935. These exceptions are in accordance with the resolution of the Committee of Eighteen of November 6th, 1935.

Sweden. — With reference to the particulars supplied regarding imports from Italy, it should be explained that the import statistics are based in the main on the data contained in the Customs clearing certificates. The Customs dues are generally assessed on Customs declarations made by the owners of the goods. The Customs regulations do not specify any time-limit for these declarations ; but the Customs authorities assess the dues without a previous declaration if the declaration is not made within thirty days of the arrival of the goods. Goods placed in transit or bonded warehouses or imported into free ports appear in the import statistics relating to the month in which they are taken out of the transit or bonded warehouse or free port (after being cleared through the Customs in the regular course) for import into the country. The declaration of the value of imported goods may occasionally be postponed by permission, in which case the goods do not appear in the statistics until the month in which the declaration is made.

It will be apparent from the above that goods imported into Sweden may frequently not appear in the official statistics until some time after their arrival in Sweden.

Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. — The imports in January 1936 are exclusively due to the carrying-out of contracts of which the Contracts Committee of the Committee of Eighteen was informed.

6. CONVERSION OF FIGURES INTO GOLD DOLLARS.

The figures given by Governments in their national currencies have been converted by the Secretariat into U.S.A. old gold dollars, the unit generally utilised in statistical publications of the League of Nations.

The conversion rates are given in Annex II. A change in the rates of conversion for the figures given by Austria is indicated in Note 1 to that annex.

I. FIRST WHITE BOOK ON THE QUESTION OF ALEXANDRETTA AND ANTIOCH.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN TURKEY AND FRANCE SIGNED AT ANKARA ON OCTOBER 20TH, 1921.

Article 7.

A special administrative regime shall be established for the district of Alexandretta. The Turkish inhabitants of this district shall enjoy every facility for their cultural development. The Turkish language shall have official recognition.

Protocol of Signature (Extract).

Paragraph 3:

As regards the Alexandretta and Antioch districts, Youssouf Kemal Bey declares that it is necessary to grant the inhabitants the right to adopt a special flag containing the Turkish flag. The French Plenipotentiary agreed that it was desirable to accord such a right to the inhabitants of these districts and promised to approach his Government for the purpose.

Paragraphs 7, 8, 9, 10:

The Turkish Plenipotentiary makes the following request, which the French Plenipotentiary agrees to support when it is considered by his Government:

In the port of Alexandretta, Turkish nationals, Turkish property and the Turkish flag shall have entire freedom in regard to the use of the port. In this and every other respect, they shall be treated on terms of complete equality with the inhabitants, property and shipping of the country.

In this port, an area shall be leased to Turkey to be used for direct transit of goods coming from or consigned to that country. Every facility shall be given to Turkey for linking up this area with the railway connecting Alexandretta with Turkish territory and also in regard to the installation, the leasing and the working of the said area.

No duty or charge other than such tonnage, wharfage, pilotage, lighthouse and quarantine dues as are also levied on the inhabitants, the property and the flag of the country shall be imposed on Turkish nationals, Turkish property or the Turkish flag, when goods coming from or consigned to Turkey pass through this port in transit.

LETTER FROM THE FRENCH DELEGATE TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE TURKISH DELEGATION WITH REGARD TO ARTICLE 7.

Ankara, October 20th, 1921.

Your Excellency,

With regard to Article 7 of the Agreement between our two Governments, signed this day, it appears to me to be desirable to make it quite clear that, so far as the special administrative regime of the Alexandretta district is concerned, those districts in which there is a Turkish majority shall as a rule be administered by officials of Turkish race. Schools will be established which will be afforded all facilities for Turkish cultural development.

The same shall also apply to the Antioch district and to those parts of the former Adana vilayet remaining south of the line laid down in Article 8.

ACTS SIGNED AT LAUSANNE:
TREATY OF PEACE SIGNED ON JULY 24TH, 1923.

Article 3.

From the Mediterranean to the frontier of Persia, the frontier of Turkey is laid down as follows:

i. With Syria:

The frontier described in Article 8 of the Franco-Turkish Agreement of October 20th, 1921.

Article 16.

Turkey hereby renounces all rights and title whatsoever over or respecting the territories situated outside the frontiers laid down in the present Treaty and the islands other than those over which her sovereignty is recognised by the said Treaty, the future of these territories and islands being settled or to be settled by the Parties concerned.

The provisions of the present Article do not prejudice any special arrangements arising from neighbourly relations which have been or may be concluded between Turkey and any limitrophe countries.

LETTERS REGARDING ARTICLES OF THE TREATY OF PEACE OF LAUSANNE.

Letter from the French Delegate to the President of the Turkish Delegation regarding the Ankara Agreement.

Lausanne, July 24th, 1923.

Monsieur le Président,

In amplification of the assurances which I have given you during the Lausanne Conference, I have the honour, with the special authority of the French Government, to confirm to you by the Declaration appended hereto that the Treaty of Peace of to-day's date in no way affects the stipulations of the Franco-Turkish Agreement signed at Ankara on October 20th, 1921.

The Declaration which I have the honour to transmit to you will, I have no doubt, entirely satisfy the desire of the Government of the Grand National Assembly of Turkey to have confirmation of the fact that that Agreement remains wholly in force with all its annexes.

He also confirms to His Excellency General Ismet Pasha that, in the eyes of the French Government, the Treaty of Peace signed this day in no way affects the provisions of the Franco-Turkish Agreement of October 20th, 1921, which remains wholly in force together with its annexes.

CONVENTION OF FRIENDSHIP AND GOOD NEIGHBOURLY RELATIONS BETWEEN TURKEY AND SYRIA,
SIGNED AT ANKARA ON MAY 30TH, 1926.

Protocol of Signature (Extract).

The present Convention forms with its Annexes a total of seven documents. It involves no modification of the provisions of the Ankara Agreement of October 20th, 1921, to which it constitutes a supplement; referring to the provisions laid down by the Contracting Parties in 1921 for carrying out their respective undertakings, it constitutes a concrete application of the clauses of their agreement, more particularly as regards the delimitation of the Turco-Syrian frontier, the line of which is now adapted to practical necessities by Protocol No. 1.

Whatever administrative measures may be taken and whatever organic statutes may be established in Syria, the special regime established for the district of Alexandretta under Article 7 of the Ankara Agreement shall always be taken into account.

RECORD OF THE CONVERSATION BETWEEN THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT
AND THE HIGH COMMISSIONER OF FRANCE IN SYRIA AND LEBANON WHICH TOOK PLACE AT
THE MINISTRY FOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS ON MARCH 27TH, 1935.

The Turkish Minister for Foreign Affairs, having called the French High Commissioner's attention to the special administrative regime for the Alexandretta district as regards the special status of the inhabitants of Turkish race, M. de Martel replied that France intended to safeguard the autonomy of the Sanjak of Alexandretta and to ensure respect for the agreements existing on the subject between the two Governments.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS. — NINETY-THIRD SESSION OF THE COUNCIL: MINUTES OF THE
FOURTH MEETING (PRIVATE, THEN PUBLIC),

held on Saturday, September 26th, 1936, at 5.30 p.m.

(*Extract.*)

M. Rüştü ARAS observed that the representative of France had been good enough to inform the Council of the French Government's intention to introduce a new regime in Syria. The Turkish representative desired to recall a very fortunate precedent. He referred to the case of

Iraq, where the very best results had been obtained, thanks to the circumspection of the United Kingdom and the wisdom of the Iraqi leaders. At the time when Iraq had entered the League, M. Rüştü Aras had expressed before the Assembly, after first consulting the High Commissioner of France, the hope that Syria would shortly be called upon to enjoy the same benefits.

To-day, he officially took note of a proposal by means of which that hope might be realised. The Press had already announced the preparation of the plan, the terms of which were as yet unknown to him. It was hardly necessary for him to dwell on the interest Turkey attached to such a settlement, close neighbour as it was of the territories concerned and a friend of France. Apart from those good neighbourly relations, Turkey attributed a fundamental importance to the agreement because of a question of law which was connected with international instruments, seeing that the regimes in question covered the area of Alexandretta and Antioch, where there was a considerable Turkish majority.

M. Rüştü Aras felt convinced that the French Government would not fail to see that that area enjoyed a treatment under which the population would be able to manage its own affairs. He therefore hoped that the facilities arranged for the areas of Syria, Alexandretta and Antioch would further strengthen the cordial relations between France and Turkey.

M. ANTONESCO thought the Council would wish to take note of the observations made by the representative of Turkey.

M. VIÉNOT thanked the Turkish representative for the sympathy he had shown for the efforts of the representative of Syrian public opinion and the French Government, which had so fortunately resulted in the agreement recently mentioned.

At the same time, M. Viénot wished to inform M. Rüştü Aras that the draft treaty made full provision for the rights relied on by the Turkish Government. Syria would, in fact, be liable for the undertakings France had contracted towards Turkey in respect of the Sanjak of Alexandretta as soon as she had obtained her independence and was endowed with sovereignty. As the successor of the mandatory Power, she would succeed to both the liabilities and advantages entailed by the operation. Furthermore, the new State would find it easier—and would be the more ready—to accept the stipulations in question in that its public law was based on the principle of local autonomy. Moreover, the application of that principle was entirely in harmony with respect for national integrity and unity.

M. Rüştü ARAS thanked the representative of France for having given assurances, on behalf of his Government and of Syria, especially as regarded the area of Alexandretta and Antioch. That area formed part of the territories placed under the authority of France.

He would ask the representative of France to allow him to obtain more precise details concerning the application of the regime for that area and to give the Turkish Government an opportunity to engage in friendly conversations on that matter with the French Government.

M. Rüştü Aras also thanked the Roumanian Minister for Foreign Affairs, in his capacity as Rapporteur, for taking his request into consideration.

M. VIÉNOT wished to assure the representative of Turkey that the French Government would be quite ready to take part in any conversations to which it might be invited on the question raised by M. Rüştü Aras.

SPEECH DELIVERED ON OCTOBER 2ND, 1936, BY HIS EXCELLENCY SÜKRÜ KAYA, MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR, MEMBER OF THE TURKISH DELEGATION, AT THE SEVENTEENTH ORDINARY SESSION OF THE ASSEMBLY.

(*Extract.*)

Perhaps I ought, in this connection, to pause for a moment, and refer to the news—which, indeed, we welcome—of the reforms shortly to be introduced in the districts adjoining the south-western area of our own territory, and to voice certain anxieties felt by the Turkish people, who desire to know whether the vital interests of the considerable and compact Turkish element dwelling in our immediate neighbourhood are being sufficiently taken into account in these proposed reforms, the bases of which are not yet known to us.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS.—SEVENTEENTH ORDINARY SESSION OF THE ASSEMBLY: SIXTH COMMITTEE: PROVISIONAL MINUTES OF THE FIFTH MEETING,

held on Tuesday, October 6th, 1936, at 10.15 a.m.

(*Mandates: General Discussion (Extract.)*)

Chairman: M. TURBAY (Colombia).

The Turkish delegate next expressed his satisfaction with the new policy applied by France in Syria. He had already spoken in the Council of the great interest his country took in that part of the world; the Turkish Minister of the Interior had done the same in the Assembly. The concern which was apparent in the Commission's report regarding the degree of tolerance of

majorities appeared to him to be justified, but he would not stress this point, in view of the fact that friendly conversations were to take place between the mandatory Power and Turkey. He wished, however, to draw the attention of the Mandates Commission to the fact that, in these territories, divisions as well as fusions were of great importance. The measures to be adopted in consequence of the political transformation of that country would have to be carefully analysed.

M. Rüştü Aras did not share the apprehensions which had been expressed in this connection regarding the fitness of the peoples for independence; in his opinion, the best way of effecting the political education of a people was to leave it in charge of its own Government. He was therefore quite prepared to have full confidence in Syria, and in particular in the compact mass of Turks who lived in that country, regarding whose fitness for self-government there could be no doubt.

.....

M. VIÉNOT had already explained to the Council of the League of Nations that the Franco-Syrian Treaty, though modelled on that between the United Kingdom and Iraq, contained special provisions for safeguarding both the minorities which were concentrated in certain districts and those which were scattered over the whole territory of the States of the Levant. That guarantee went further than any which might have been given within the framework of the general provisions for the protection of minorities contained in the post-war treaties. He wished to refer at this point to the anxiety expressed by the first delegate of Turkey regarding the fate of the Turkish minority, most of which inhabited the Alexandretta district. The French Government had several reasons for giving particular attention to that minority during the negotiations, one reason being the existence of special agreements concluded in 1921 between the mandatory Power and the Turkish Government. By those agreements, France had defined the guarantees which she, as a mandatory Power, intended to give to the Turkish minority, especially the promise that the Turkish character of the population—their language and culture—would be safeguarded under the mandate. That promise had been kept in a manner satisfactory to the population concerned during the whole of the mandatory period. It would continue to be kept under the Treaty, which would soon be signed officially. He had already pointed out to the Council that the obligations assumed by France with regard to Turkey obviously would be opposable to the Syrian State which was to succeed the mandatory Power. Since then he had had conversations with M. Rüştü Aras in the course of which he had first of all reassured him with regard to the scope of the Treaty and the consequences it might have for the Turkish minority. He had also pointed out to M. Rüştü Aras that, should the Turkish Government wish to use this opportunity for redefining the system of autonomous government at present in force in the Alexandretta district, or even to formulate any new demand which it might deem necessary, France would be prepared to enter into negotiations, provided always that they came within the framework of the 1921 agreements: i.e., that they related to the same subject—namely, the maintenance of the Turkish character of the population. The French Government would associate the Syrian Government with those negotiations. The mandatory Power thought it was only logical that the transitional period of three years provided for in the Treaty, during which there would be an intermediary state between the actual mandate and full independence, should be used in order, so to speak, to educate the Syrian Government, especially by enabling it to take part in international discussions under the aegis of the mandatory Power.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS. — MANDATES: REPORT SUBMITTED BY THE SIXTH COMMITTEE
TO THE ASSEMBLY.

(*Extract.*)

.....

As regards Syria and Lebanon, the Committee noted the desiderata put forward by the Turkish delegate concerning the future of the population of Turkish language and culture in the Alexandretta district in connection with the signature of the preliminaries of the Franco-Syrian Treaty. The French delegate informed the Committee of the recent developments of the policy in respect of Syria and Lebanon and of the prospects of emancipation of the territory in the near future, and gave an assurance that the rights of the minorities would be safeguarded. As regards the present and future regime of the Sanjak of Alexandretta, he referred to the statements of the mandatory Power at the Council meeting held on September 26th, 1936, concerning the application of the existing Franco-Turkish agreements. He considered that any exchange of views which the Turkish Government might wish to initiate on this subject should be kept within the framework of those agreements; he proposed to invite the Syrian Government to take part in the contemplated negotiations.

NOTE HANDED ON OCTOBER 10TH, 1936, BY HIS EXCELLENCY SUAD DAVAZ, TURKISH AMBASSADOR
AT PARIS, TO THE MINISTRY FOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS OF THE FRENCH REPUBLIC CONCERNING THE

would not be advisable for the French Government to conclude with the delegates of the populations, the vast majority of whom are Turkish, in the region of Alexandretta and Antioch, a treaty similar to that signed by France with the representatives of Syria and the treaty now being negotiated with those of Lebanon.

The Government of the Republic considers that, in providing these regions with a regime which will make it possible for them to govern themselves, France would be acting in accordance both with the general spirit of the Covenant of the League of Nations and the provisions of the A type of mandate, and with the spirit and the letter of the Franco-Turkish Conventions of 1921 and 1926.

At the end of the war, France assumed a mandate over the whole geographical entity represented by the territories detached from the former Ottoman Empire and placed under her authority. The object of the mission thus entrusted to her was to endeavour by every possible means to bring these populations up to a degree of maturity sufficient to enable them one day to govern themselves freely and independently. France has accomplished this mission under what were often difficult conditions and by administrative methods varying according to the circumstances.

The experience acquired during these various endeavours has led the French Government to establish separate sovereignties in the regions embracing Syria and Lebanon properly so called and to abandon the idea of amalgamating them.

In regarding this method of separation as most favourable to the interests of the populations placed under her tutelage, France has merely acted in accordance with the spirit of the mandate, without assuming any other obligation towards a third Power.

The Levant territories under French mandate include, however, one region in respect of which France from the outset assumed an international obligation. When she decided to raise Syria and Lebanon to the rank of independent and sovereign States, France considered that the populations of those two countries had become fit to govern themselves and to be released from her tutelage; but, as regards the Turkish populations of Alexandretta and Antioch, this decision had been embodied by France in an international Agreement. The decision taken in regard to Syria and Lebanon must *a fortiori* be applied to the Turkish territories which were entrusted to her under certain express conditions.

On the basis of the letter of the 1921 and 1926 Conventions, His Excellency M. Viénot, in his speech to the League Council, referred to autonomy. The large measure of autonomy granted by those agreements related to a period when French administration extended over the whole territory, without any distinction, and embraced all the local autonomies created by France, such as those of Syria, Lebanon, the Alawites and the Jebel Druse. It was certainly not the object of the international obligation assumed by France to curtail the rights of the Turkish populations recognised in 1921 as fit to govern themselves and detached from Turkey on the sole condition of this recognition.

This autonomy was therefore understood to come within the framework of the French mandate and not of Syrian independence. The incorporation at one time of Alexandretta and Antioch in Syria constitutes an act of authority which can be explained by the requirements of the mandatory administration, but which cannot constitute a right acquired for Syria, which is to-day about to receive its independence, to the prejudice of the two Franco-Turkish Conventions.

As soon as France, in a gesture of generous abnegation, brings her tutelage to an end in order to give peoples that have reached maturity the rank of independent nations, it is obvious that the considerations governing the administration of the districts of Alexandretta and Antioch during the mandate must automatically give place to a regime of complete freedom and sovereignty as the logical consequence of the 1921 and 1926 Agreements. The evolution of Syria and Lebanon within the framework of the French mandate should, rightly and fairly, be extended to Alexandretta and Antioch; and the independence granted to Syria and Lebanon after the end of the tutelage under which they were placed should be accorded to Alexandretta in view of the large measure of autonomy which this region enjoyed under the Conventions.

French policy, which aims at establishing peace, understanding and fraternity between the nations, will undoubtedly make of this region, with its Turkish population, a bond of union between France, Turkey and Syria, thus creating a new element of concord in this part of Asia which is bound to it by so many ties of sincere friendship.

I should be glad if Your Excellency would be good enough to let me know what action the French Government proposes to take in the matter and have the honour, Monsieur le Ministre, to renew to you the assurance of my very high consideration.

OPENING SPEECH DELIVERED ON NOVEMBER 1ST, 1936, BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC,
KÂMAL ATATÜRK, AT THE SECOND SESSION OF THE FIFTH LEGISLATURE.

(Extract.)

The important topic of the day, which is absorbing the whole attention of the Turkish people, is the fate of the district of Alexandretta, Antioch and its dependencies, which in point of fact belongs to the purest Turkish element. We are obliged to take up this matter seriously and firmly.

This important question is the only one outstanding between ourselves and France, to whose friendship we continue to attach special importance; those who know all the facts of the case and who respect law and justice fully understand the keen and sincere interest which we take in the fate of that district, and regard it as perfectly natural.

2. SECOND WHITE BOOK ON THE QUESTION OF ALEXANDRETTA AND ANTIOCH.

I. NOTE FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF THE FRENCH REPUBLIC IN ANSWER TO THE NOTE FROM THE TURKISH EMBASSY AT PARIS, DATED OCTOBER 9TH, 1936.

Monsieur l'Amambadeur,

November 10th, 1936.

By a note dated the 9th instant, Your Excellency, referring to the statements made in the Sixth Committee at the last session of the Assembly of the League of Nations by the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Turkish Republic and by the Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs of the French Republic, was good enough to ask me to consider the possibility of concluding with the delegates of the population of Alexandretta and Antioch a Treaty analogous to the Franco-Syrian Treaty, the text of which was recently initialled at Paris, and to the Franco-Lebanese Treaty now in process of negotiation.

I have the honour to remind Your Excellency that, according to the terms of the statements made by M. Viénot to the Council of the League of Nations, the French Government will not refuse to enter into any negotiations that the Turkish Government may wish to open within the scope of the Agreements of 1921. Those terms accurately define the position of the French Government, and I can do no more than confirm them to Your Excellency to-day.

Now, the Agreement of October 20th, 1921, is essentially an agreement to delimit the frontier between Turkey and Syria. It deals with various questions raised in connection with that delimitation, such as a contemplated Syro-Turkish Customs Convention, an amnesty, the rights of minorities in Turkey, and the safeguards and facilities to be provided for the Turkish inhabitants of the district of Alexandretta. As regards the status of that district, it is specified that a special administrative regime shall be established for it.

Since the signature of the Ankara Agreement, the French Government has readily consented on various occasions, more especially in 1926, to negotiate agreements confirming the clauses embodied in the 1921 texts and defining the details of their application. It has been at pains to give effect to those clauses by conferring upon the Sanjak of Alexandretta, within the State of Syria, a special administrative regime at present defined by the organic regulation of May 14th, 1930, and by seeing to it that the cultural and linguistic safeguards and facilities stipulated for the Turkish inhabitants of the district should be upheld.

It should not, however, be overlooked that, as Your Excellency observes in the aforesaid note, the French Government, in these various circumstances, has not acted, and could not act, otherwise than in the capacity of a mandatory Power. The principle of the A mandates assigned to certain Powers over communities whose independence was provisionally recognised was established on June 28th, 1919, by Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations. The assignment of the mandate for Syria to France dates from April 25th, 1920. Hence, from October 20th, 1921, onwards, the French Government was legislating for and on behalf of Syria in virtue of the powers that had been conferred upon it over that country by the aforesaid international instruments.

Subsequently, on July 24th, 1922, the obligations and powers of the mandatory Government were specified in the text of the mandate.

The text of 1922 defines those obligations and those powers very explicitly. In particular, it defines the purpose of the mandatory regime, which is to lead up to the independence of two States mentioned by name—viz., Syria and Lebanon. It recommends the development of local autonomy as far as circumstances permit. It reserves for the mandatory Power the conduct of the foreign relations of the two States, makes it responsible for seeing that no part of their territory is ceded or leased or in any way placed under the control of a foreign Power, and enumerates the steps to be taken to ensure the free development of the various minorities.

The measures taken by the French Government to give effect to the provisions of the 1921 Agreement regarding the Sanjak of Alexandretta fall exactly within the limits laid down by the text of the mandate.

Since, however, the mandatory Power's guidance and advice have borne fruit, the French Government now considers that, within three years, Syria will have become capable of standing alone, the recognition of which fact by the League of Nations should entail the end of the mandate. In anticipation of that date, the French Government has been at pains to define in a draft treaty, recently initialled at Paris, the bases of its future relations with a sovereign and independent Syria.

That treaty will not come into force until Syria is admitted to the League of Nations. Pending that event, which will represent the termination of the mandate, the mandatory Power's action will continue to be governed by the instrument of the mandate.

If, then, the French Government, being anxious to ensure a harmonious transition from the mandated state to the state of independence, had to stipulate, and has in fact stipulated, for the acknowledgment and assumption, by the Syrian Government, of the undertakings to which the mandatory Power has subscribed, for and on behalf of Syria, towards foreign Governments, it cannot, either in a Franco-Syrian settlement or in a negotiation with a foreign Power in connection with a Franco-Syrian settlement, infringe the provisions of the mandate. It would not be possible—as Your Excellency will readily realise—for the French Government to go further in 1936, at the moment when it is proposing to recommend the final establishment of Syria's independence,

than the undertakings subscribed to on Syria's behalf in 1921. Nor would it be in the French Government's power to use this future emancipation as a pretext for conferring an international status upon any given part of the territory of the two States which it has been made responsible for guiding to independence. By detaching from the Syrian State a sanjak which belongs to it, and which, under the safeguard of its special status, actually co-operates in the political life of that State; by concluding, with the representatives of that sanjak, a treaty of alliance analogous to those which are being negotiated with Syria and Lebanon, the French Government would be, both in law and in fact, setting up a third State on the same footing as the first two. Such an action would be tantamount to the dismemberment of Syria—a contingency against which the mandatory Power is explicitly responsible for safeguarding the Syrian State.

Such is not, and cannot be, the effect of Article 7 of the 1921 Agreement, which merely provided for the establishment of a special *administrative* status for the district of Alexandretta. That text makes no mention of any special political status, and does not recognise the people of the sanjak as possessing either an international distinction or the capacity for self-government outside the Syrian community referred to in Article 22 of the Covenant. The Ankara Agreements treated the question of Alexandretta from the standpoint of the establishment of administrative autonomy and the safeguarding of linguistic and cultural liberties. That standpoint being so defined, it does not seem that Syria's acquisition of independence should give rise to any apprehension, for it is clearly established that the privileges secured to the sanjak by the 1921 Agreement will not be affected thereby.

I can again assure Your Excellency that the French Government will gladly agree to an exchange of views on this subject with the Turkish Government, and will study any suggestion that may be made to it in the desire to facilitate for the future the establishment of confident and cordial relations between the Turkish Government and the Syrian Government. With that aim in view, it reserves the right to associate in those conversations and that study the qualified representatives of the Syrian Government.

II. INSTRUMENTS AND DOCUMENTS REFERRED TO IN THE TURKISH AND FRENCH NOTES.¹

COVENANT OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

Article 22.

To those colonies and territories which as a consequence of the late war have ceased to be under the sovereignty of the States which formerly governed them and which are inhabited by peoples not yet able to stand by themselves under the strenuous conditions of the modern world, there should be applied the principle that the well-being and development of such peoples form a sacred trust of civilisation and that securities for the performance of this trust should be embodied in this Covenant.

The best method of giving practical effect to this principle is that the tutelage of such peoples should be entrusted to advanced nations who, by reason of their resources, their experience or their geographical position, can best undertake this responsibility and who are willing to accept it, and that this tutelage should be exercised by them as mandatories on behalf of the League.

The character of the mandate must differ according to the stage of the development of the people, the geographical situation of the territory, its economic conditions and other similar circumstances.

Certain communities formerly belonging to the Turkish Empire have reached a stage of development where their existence as independent nations can be provisionally recognised subject to the rendering of administrative advice and assistance by a mandatory until such time as they are able to stand alone. The wishes of these communities must be a principal consideration in the selection of the mandatory.

Other peoples, especially those of Central Africa, are at such a stage that the mandatory must be responsible for the administration of the territory under conditions which will guarantee freedom of conscience and religion, subject only to the maintenance of public order and morals, the prohibition of abuses such as the slave trade, the arms traffic and the liquor traffic, and the prevention of the establishment of fortifications or military and naval bases and of military training of the natives for other than police purposes and the defence of territory, and will also secure equal opportunities for the trade and commerce of other Members of the League.

There are territories, such as South West Africa and certain of the South Pacific Islands, which, owing to the sparseness of their population, or their small size, or their remoteness from the centres of civilisation, or their geographical contiguity to the territory of the mandatory, and other circumstances, can be best administered under the laws of the mandatory as integral portions of its territory, subject to the safeguards above mentioned in the interests of the indigenous population.

In every case of mandate, the mandatory shall render to the Council an annual report in reference to the territory committed to its charge.

The degree of authority, control, or administration to be exercised by the mandatory shall, if not previously agreed upon by the Members of the League, be explicitly defined in each case by the Council.

A permanent Commission shall be constituted to receive and examine the annual reports of the mandatories and to advise the Council on all matters relating to the observance of the mandates.

AGREEMENT OF SAN REMO: DECISION OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL OF THE ALLIED AND ASSOCIATED POWERS REGARDING
THE ASSIGNMENT OF MANDATES.

(*Extract.*)

April 25th, 1920.

It is hereby decided that the terms of the article of the mandates should be as follows:

The High Contracting Parties have agreed that, in accordance with the fourth paragraph of Article 22 of Part I (Covenant of the League of Nations), Syria and Mesopotamia shall be provisionally recognised as independent States, provided that they are given administrative advice and assistance by a mandatory until such time as they are able to govern themselves. The frontiers of the aforesaid States shall be fixed and the mandatories selected by the Principal Allied Powers.

The terms of the mandates in respect of the above-mentioned territories shall be drawn up by the Principal Allied Powers and submitted for approval to the Council of the League of Nations.

The mandatories selected by the Principal Allied Powers are: France for Syria; and Great Britain for Mesopotamia and Palestine.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN TURKEY AND FRANCE SIGNED AT ANKARA ON OCTOBER 20TH, 1921.

Article 7.

A special administrative regime shall be established for the district of Alexandretta. The Turkish inhabitants of this district shall enjoy every facility for their cultural development. The Turkish language shall have official recognition.

Protocol of Signature (Extract).

As regards the Alexandretta and Antioch districts, Youssouf Kemal Bey declares that it is necessary to grant the inhabitants the right to adopt a special flag containing the Turkish flag. The French Plenipotentiary agreed that it was desirable to accord such a right to the inhabitants of these districts and promised to approach his Government for the purpose.

The Turkish Plenipotentiary makes the following request, which the French Plenipotentiary agrees to support when it is considered by his Government:

In the port of Alexandretta, Turkish nationals, Turkish property and the Turkish flag shall have entire freedom in regard to the use of the port. In this and in every other respect they shall be treated on terms of complete equality with the inhabitants, property and shipping of the country.

In this port, an area should be leased to Turkey to be used for direct transit of goods coming from or consigned to that country. Every facility should be given to Turkey for linking up this area with the railway connecting Alexandretta with Turkish territory and also in regard to the installation, the leasing and the working of the said area.

No duty or charge other than such tonnage, wharfage, pilotage, lighthouse and quarantine dues as are also levied on the inhabitants, the property and the flag of the country shall be imposed on Turkish nationals, Turkish property or the Turkish flag when goods coming from or consigned to Turkey pass through this port in transit.

LETTER FROM THE FRENCH DELEGATE TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE TURKISH DELEGATION WITH REGARD TO ARTICLE 7.

Ankara, October 20th, 1921.

Your Excellency,

With regard to Article 7 of the Agreement between our two Governments, signed this day, it appears to me to be desirable to make it quite clear that, so far as the special administrative regime of the Alexandretta district is concerned, those districts in which there is a Turkish majority shall as a rule be administered by officials of Turkish race. Schools will be established which will be afforded all facilities for Turkish cultural development.

The same shall also apply to the Antioch district and to those parts of the former Adana vilayet remaining south of the line laid down in Article 8.

THE MANDATE.

July 24th, 1922.

The Council of the League of Nations:

Whereas the Principal Allied Powers have agreed that the territory of Syria and the Lebanon, which formerly belonged to the Turkish Empire, shall, within such boundaries as may be fixed by the said Powers, be entrusted to a mandatory charged with the duty of rendering administrative advice and assistance to the population, in accordance with the provisions of Article 22 (paragraph 4) of the Covenant of the League of Nations; and

Whereas the Principal Allied Powers have decided that the mandate for the territory referred to above should be conferred on the Government of the French Republic, which has accepted it; and

Whereas the terms of this mandate, which are defined in the articles below, have also been accepted by the Government of the French Republic and submitted to the Council of the League for approval; and

Whereas the Government of the French Republic has undertaken to exercise this mandate on behalf of the League of Nations, in conformity with the following provisions; and

Whereas by the afore-mentioned Article 22 (paragraph 8), it is provided that the degree of authority, control or administration to be exercised by the mandatory, not having been previously agreed upon by the Members of the League, shall be explicitly defined by the Council of the League of Nations;

Confirming the said mandate, defines its terms as follows:

Article 1.

The mandatory shall frame, within a period of three years from the coming into force of this mandate, an organic law for Syria and the Lebanon.

This organic law shall be framed in agreement with the native authorities and shall take into account the rights, interests, and wishes of all the population inhabiting the said territory. The mandatory shall further enact measures to facilitate the progressive development of Syria and the Lebanon as independent States. Pending the coming into effect of the organic law, the Government of Syria and the Lebanon shall be conducted in accordance with the spirit of this mandate.

The mandatory shall, as far as circumstances permit, encourage local autonomy.

Article 2.

The mandatory may maintain its troops in the said territory for its defence. It shall further be empowered, until the entry into force of the organic law and the re-establishment of public security, to organise such local militia as may be necessary for the defence of the territory, and to employ this militia for defence and also for the maintenance of order. These local forces may only be recruited from the inhabitants of the said territory.

The said militia shall thereafter be under the local authorities, subject to the authority and the control which the mandatory shall retain over these forces. It shall not be used for purposes other than those above specified save with the consent of the mandatory.

Nothing shall preclude Syria and the Lebanon from contributing to the cost of the maintenance of the forces of the mandatory stationed in the territory.

The mandatory shall at all times possess the right to make use of the ports, railways and means of communication of Syria and the Lebanon for the passage of its troops and of all materials, supplies and fuel.

Article 3.

The mandatory shall be entrusted with the exclusive control of the foreign relations of Syria and the Lebanon and with the right to issue exequaturs to the consuls appointed by foreign Powers. Nationals of Syria and the Lebanon living outside the limits of the territory shall be under the diplomatic and consular protection of the mandatory.

Article 4.

The mandatory shall be responsible for seeing that no part of the territory of Syria and the Lebanon is ceded or leased or in any way placed under the control of a foreign Power.

Article 5.

The privileges and immunities of foreigners, including the benefits of consular jurisdiction and protection as formerly enjoyed by Capitulation or usage in the Ottoman Empire, shall not be applicable in Syria and the Lebanon. Foreign consular tribunals shall, however, continue to perform their duties until the coming into force of the new legal organisation provided for in Article 6.

Unless the Powers whose nationals enjoyed the afore-mentioned privileges and immunities on August 1st, 1914, shall have previously renounced the right to their re-establishment, or shall have agreed to their non-application during a specified period, these privileges and immunities shall at the expiration of the mandate be immediately re-established in their entirety or with such modifications as may have been agreed upon between the Powers concerned.

Article 6.

The mandatory shall establish in Syria and the Lebanon a judicial system which shall assure to natives as well as to foreigners a complete guarantee of their rights.

Respect for the personal status of the various peoples and for their religious interests shall be fully guaranteed. In particular, the control and administration of Wakfs shall be exercised in complete accordance with religious law and the dispositions of the founders.

Article 7.

Pending the conclusion of special extradition agreements, the extradition treaties at present in force between foreign Powers and the mandatory shall apply within the territory of Syria and the Lebanon.

Article 8.

The mandatory shall ensure to all complete freedom of conscience and the free exercise of all forms of worship which are consonant with public order and morality. No discrimination of any kind shall be made between the inhabitants of Syria and the Lebanon on the ground of differences in race, religion or language.

The mandatory shall encourage public instruction, which shall be given through the medium of the native languages in use in the territory of Syria and the Lebanon.

The right of each community to maintain its own schools for the instruction and education of its own members in its own language, while conforming to such educational requirements of a general nature as the administration may impose, shall not be denied or impaired.

Article 9.

The mandatory shall refrain from all interference in the administration of the Councils of Management (Conseils de fabrique) or in the management of religious communities and sacred shrines belonging to the various religions, the immunity of which has been expressly guaranteed.

Article 10.

The supervision exercised by the mandatory over the religious missions in Syria and the Lebanon shall be limited to the maintenance of public order and good government; the activities of these religious missions shall in no way be restricted, nor shall their members be subjected to any restrictive measures on the ground of nationality, provided that their activities are confined to the domain of religion.

The religious missions may also concern themselves with education and relief, subject to the general right of regulation and control by the mandatory or of the local government, in regard to education, public instruction and charitable relief.

Article 11.

The mandatory shall see that there is no discrimination in Syria or the Lebanon against the nationals, including societies and associations, of any State Member of the League of Nations as compared with its own nationals, including societies and associations, or with the nationals of any other foreign State in matters concerning taxation or commerce, the exercise of professions or industries, or navigation, or in the treatment of ships or aircraft. Similarly, there shall be no discrimination in Syria or the Lebanon against goods originating in or destined for any of the said States; there shall be freedom of transit, under equitable conditions, across the said territory.

Subject to the above, the mandatory may impose or cause to be imposed by the local governments such taxes and Customs duties as it may consider necessary. The mandatory, or the local governments acting under its advice, may also conclude on grounds of contiguity any special Customs arrangements with an adjoining country.

The mandatory may take or cause to be taken, subject to the provisions of paragraph I of this article, such steps as it may think best to ensure the development of the natural resources of the said territory and to safeguard the interests of the local population.

Concessions for the development of these natural resources shall be granted without distinction of nationality between the nationals of all States Members of the League of Nations, but on condition that they do not infringe upon the authority of the local government. Concessions in the nature of a general monopoly shall not be granted. This clause shall in no way limit the right of the mandatory to create monopolies of a purely fiscal character in the interest of the territory of Syria and the Lebanon, and with a view to assuring to the territory the fiscal resources which would appear best adapted to the local needs, or, in certain cases, with a view to developing the natural resources either directly by the State or through an organisation under its control, provided that this does not involve either directly or indirectly the creation of a monopoly of the natural resources in favour of the mandatory or its nationals, nor involve any preferential treatment which would be incompatible with the economic, commercial and industrial equality guaranteed above.

Article 12.

The mandatory shall adhere, on behalf of Syria and the Lebanon, to any general international agreement already existing, or which may be concluded hereafter with the approval of the League of Nations, in respect of the following: the slave trade, the traffic in drugs, the traffic in arms and ammunition, commercial equality, freedom of transit and navigation, aerial navigation, postal, telegraphic or wireless communications, and measures for the protection of literature, art or industries.

Article 13.

The mandatory shall secure the adhesion of Syria and the Lebanon, so far as social, religious and other conditions permit, to such measures of common utility as may be adopted by the League of Nations for preventing and combating disease, including diseases of animals and plants.

Article 14.

The mandatory shall draw up and put into force within twelve months from this date a law of antiquities in conformity with the following provisions. This law shall ensure equality of treatment in the matter of excavations and archaeological research to the nationals of all States Members of the League of Nations.

(1) "Antiquity" means any construction or any product of human activity earlier than the year 1700 A.D.

(2) The law for the protection of antiquities shall proceed by encouragement rather than by threat.

Any person who, having discovered an antiquity without being furnished with the authorisation referred to in paragraph 5, reports the same to an official of the competent Department, shall be rewarded according to the value of the discovery.

(3) No antiquity may be disposed of except to the competent Department, unless this Department renounces the acquisition of any such antiquity.

No antiquity may leave the country without an export licence from the said Department.

(4) Any person who maliciously or negligently destroys or damages an antiquity shall be liable to a penalty to be fixed.

(5) No clearing of ground or digging with the object of finding antiquities shall be permitted, under penalty of fine, except to persons authorised by the competent Department.

(6) Equitable terms shall be fixed for expropriation, temporary or permanent, of lands which might be of historical or archaeological interest.

(7) Authorisation to excavate shall only be granted to persons who show sufficient guarantees or archaeological experience. The mandatory shall not, in granting these authorisations, act in such a way as to exclude scholars of any nation without good grounds.

(8) The proceeds of excavations may be divided between the excavator and the competent Department in a proportion fixed by that Department. If division seems impossible for scientific reasons, the excavator shall receive a fair indemnity in lieu of a part of the find.

Article 15.

Upon the coming into force of the organic law referred to in Article 1, an arrangement shall be made between the mandatory and the local governments for reimbursement by the latter of all expenses incurred by the mandatory in organising the administration, developing local resources, and carrying out permanent public works, of which the country retains the benefit. Such arrangement shall be communicated to the Council of the League of Nations.

Article 16.

French and Arabic shall be the official languages of Syria and the Lebanon.

Article 17.

The mandatory shall make to the Council of the League of Nations an annual report to the satisfaction of the Council as to the measures taken during the year to carry out the provisions of this mandate. Copies of all laws and regulations promulgated during the year shall be attached to the said report.

Article 18.

The consent of the Council of the League of Nations is required for any modification of the terms of this mandate.

Article 19.

On the termination of the mandate, the Council of the League of Nations shall use its influence to safeguard for the future the fulfilment by the Government of Syria and the Lebanon of the financial obligations, including pensions and allowances, regularly assumed by the administration of Syria or of the Lebanon during the period of the mandate.

Article 20.

The mandatory agrees that, if any dispute whatever should arise between the mandatory and another Member of the League of Nations relating to the interpretation or the application of the provisions of the mandate, such dispute, if it cannot be settled by negotiation, shall be submitted to the Permanent Court of International Justice provided for by Article 14 of the Covenant of the League of Nations.

Done at London on the twenty-fourth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-two in a single copy, which shall remain deposited in the archives of the Secretariat of the League of Nations. Certified copies shall be forwarded by the Secretary-General to all Members of the League of Nations.

(The mandate for Syria and Lebanon came into force on September 29th, 1923.)

INSTRUMENTS SIGNED AT LAUSANNE: TREATY OF PEACE OF JULY 24TH, 1923.

Article 3.

From the Mediterranean to the frontier of Persia, the frontier of Turkey is laid down as follows:

(i) With Syria:

The frontier described in Article 8 of the Franco-Turkish Agreement of the 20th October, 1921;

.....

Article 16.

Turkey hereby renounces all rights and title whatsoever over or respecting the territories situated outside the frontiers laid down in the present Treaty and the islands other than those over which her sovereignty is recognised by the said Treaty, the future of these territories and islands being settled or to be settled by the parties concerned.

The provisions of the present Article do not prejudice any special arrangements arising from neighbourly relations which have been or may be concluded between Turkey and any limitrophe countries.

LETTERS RELATING TO ARTICLES OF THE TREATY OF PEACE OF LAUSANNE.

Letter from the French Delegate to the President of the Turkish Delegation concerning the Ankara Agreement.

Lausanne, July 24th, 1923.

Monsieur le Président,

Following upon the assurances which I gave you during the Lausanne Conference, and being specially authorised for this purpose by the French Government, I have the honour to confirm by the attached Declaration that the Treaty of Peace of this day's date in no way affects the stipulations of the Franco-Turkish Agreement signed at Ankara on October 20th, 1921.

The Declaration which I have the honour to send you will, I am sure, give entire satisfaction to the desire of the Government of the Grand National Assembly of Turkey for confirmation of this Agreement, which remains fully in force with all its annexes.

Declaration.

Lausanne, July 24th, 1923.

The undersigned, authorised thereto by the French Government, has the honour to confirm to His Excellency General Ismet Pasha that the Franco-Turkish Agreement signed at Ankara on October 20th, 1921, has received on the part of the French Government the sanction necessary for its full validity through the French Government's approval, as a result of which, in accordance with one of its express stipulations, that international act has come into force.

He also confirms to His Excellency General Ismet Pasha that in the French Government's view the Treaty of Peace signed this day does not affect the stipulations of the Franco-Turkish Agreement of October 20th, 1921, which remains fully in force together with its annexes.

Letter from the President of the Turkish Delegation to the French Delegate.

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of July 24th and of the Declaration annexed thereto containing confirmation of the stipulations of the Franco-Turkish Agreement signed at Ankara on October 20th, 1921. I have the honour to state that I have noted the contents of the above-mentioned Declaration.

III. NOTE HANDED BY THE TURKISH AMBASSADOR IN PARIS TO THE MINISTRY FOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS OF THE FRENCH REPUBLIC ON NOVEMBER 17TH, 1936.

Monsieur le Ministre,

In reply to Your Excellency's note of November 10th, 1936, I have the honour to inform you that my Government has considered with special care the French Government's point of view on the question of Alexandretta and Antioch, which formed the subject of my previous communication of October 9th. I am instructed by my Government to communicate to you the following observations, which I beg you to be good enough to consider in the friendly spirit in which they have been framed.

In order to determine the exact position of the Agreement of 1921, I propose to examine, in chronological order the various instruments mentioned in the note which you were good enough to send me in reply.

A. — At the time when the Treaty of Versailles, embodying the Covenant of the League of Nations, was concluded, the situation in Syria was that of a military occupation, which could not involve any juridical consequence as regards the problem now under consideration. The question at issue is one of sovereignty in regard to Syria, from the double standpoint of the termination for Turkey and the beginning for another Power of that right, which remains legally intact notwithstanding the existence of situations such as military occupation.

B. — On April 25th, 1920, the Allied Powers concluded at San Remo an agreement conferring on France the mandate over "Syria" and on Great Britain the mandate over Mesopotamia and Palestine. That geographical expression, however, which in the Act of San Remo is called "Syria" had not and could not be the object of even approximate delimitation, since the territories to be detached from Turkey were still juridically unknown.

C. — On October 20th, 1921, France concluded with the Government of the Turkish Grand National Assembly an agreement designed to put an end to the state of war and to fix a line to the north and south of which the Turkish and French troops respectively were to withdraw. Your Excellency defines that instrument as a "frontier-delimitation Agreement". Although the French Government's point of view has hitherto been to regard the detachment of the territories beyond the above-mentioned line as having been effected under the Treaty of Lausanne of 1923, and not by the Ankara Agreement, I will follow your argument on the lines laid down in your note, since in this instance the origin of this change of sovereignty in no way affects the conclusion which I shall deduce from the provisions of the above-mentioned Agreement.

In 1921, there existed in the Levant countries detached from Turkey no political entity called the State of Syria, and Turkey has not at any moment had to deal with the direct or indirect representatives of such a political entity. Having had to negotiate this "frontier-delimitation Agreement" with France, Turkey, whether in virtue of this Agreement or in virtue of the Treaty of Lausanne, which provided the definitive legal form for its provisions as a whole, abandoned part of the territories situated south of the line defined by these two instruments unconditionally and part subject to the forms and conditions stipulated in those documents.

I should add here that Article 16 of the Treaty of Lausanne, which confirms Turkey's renunciation of her sovereignty over the said territories, specifies that that renunciation is in favour of the parties concerned alone. As soon as France ceases to exercise authority in Syria, the parties concerned which are to inherit the sovereignty conditionally relinquished by Turkey over the Alexandretta and Antioch districts can only be, under the terms of the two international instruments of 1921 and 1923, the Turkish populations of those districts which are recognised as autonomous within the framework of the authority exercised by France.

D. — On July 24th, 1922, the Council of the League of Nations, confirming a decision taken by the Principal Allied Powers, adopted the charter of the mandate, which speaks, for the first time, of Syria and Lebanon and makes no mention of the Alexandretta and Antioch districts.

If this silence is to be interpreted as excluding these districts from the general denomination of "Syria and Lebanon", it is in conformity with the stipulations of the 1921 Agreement.

But, if the effect of not mentioning them is to include the districts in question in the Syrian or Lebanon political unit, it is definitely contrary to the provisions of the said Agreement.

Your Excellency appears to me, in your note, to favour this second alternative. Such an interpretation would, however, be tantamount to a breach of obligations, the immediate consequence of which would be to release Turkey from the whole of the contractual stipulations embodied in the Ankara Agreement and confirmed in the Treaty of Lausanne. For no country can, by an international act concluded with one or more Powers or even decided by the high institution of Geneva, of which, moreover, Turkey was not a member at that time, contravene undertakings previously entered into in regard to a third Power.

E. — At Lausanne, during the negotiations preceding the conclusion of the Treaty of 1923, no discussion took place regarding the confirmation of the Ankara Agreement, and, on the contrary, letters were exchanged confirming the validity of that instrument and of its annexes. The Protocol of Signature of the Agreement of 1921 mentions the request submitted by the Turkish delegate that the inhabitants of the Alexandretta and Antioch districts should be granted the right to adopt a special flag containing the Turkish flag. "The French Plenipotentiary agreed that it was desirable to accord such a right to the inhabitants of these districts and promised to approach his Government for the purpose."

From this Protocol, which was confirmed at Lausanne by General Pellé's letter of July 24th, 1923, and the annexed Declaration of the same date, without any reservation or objection of any kind as to the adoption of the flag in question, it would seem that this privilege should have constituted an acquired right of the Turks in those districts. If the French delegate who negotiated the Ankara Agreement, if the French representative who concluded the Treaty of Lausanne and, lastly, if the French Government which approved of both these instruments contemplated the creation of a flag, an inference can equitably be drawn which is hardly consistent with the assimilation expressed in Your Excellency's note of the provisions relating to the regime of Alexandretta and Antioch to those regarding the conclusion of a Customs Agreement between Turkey and Syria and others.

F. — I would further venture to remind Your Excellency that such instruments as the mandate or the Organic Regulation of 1930 are documents which were drawn up without the knowledge of the Turkish Government and that those of their provisions which are at variance with the obligations arising out of the Conventions signed by France and Turkey cannot be regarded as valid or as capable in any way of being invoked against my country.

G. — Your Excellency is good enough to tell me that, in 1921, France concluded the Ankara Agreement in her capacity as a mandatory Power and acting on behalf of Syria. In the first place, however, Turkey did not at that time recognise the mandate or the rights conferred thereunder and, secondly, she knew of no political entity called Syria and could not therefore have contemplated the conclusion of an international instrument in virtue of powers tacitly delegated by a still non-existent entity. The autonomy set up at Ankara was thus not created within the framework of a hypothetical State of Syria, but within the framework of French authority, and was intended, like Syria or any other such entity, to progress towards full and complete independence.

H. — There can be no question in this case of the recognition by one State and the taking-over of the obligations assumed by a Power towards a third country. An undertaking of this kind cannot, like an ordinary bank cheque, be endorsed without the consent of the chief party concerned. Such a transfer, moreover, could only, under the terms of the above-mentioned agreements, mean the delegation to Syria of the powers held by France. As the sanjak was not incorporated in France, it cannot now be incorporated in Syria by an acceptance which has no legal basis.

I. — Apart from this consideration, I should point out that the equitable application of the instruments of 1921 and 1923 cannot be regarded as a dismemberment of Syria, Turkey not having recognised any claim of the latter to the separate areas of Alexandretta and Antioch. The entry into force of the Franco-Syrian Treaty would, on the contrary, mean the end of a dismemberment in so far as the States of the Alawites and the Jebel Druze would return to Syria.

Before concluding, I would repeat that the granting of independence to Syria and Lebanon is highly creditable to France and is regarded by Turkey as a happy consummation in harmony with the principles which she has always proclaimed. The Government of the Republic trusts that an independent Syria will succeed in conferring prosperity on all the populations entrusted to her and will grow into a strong, happy and prosperous country. My Government is certain that the most cordial relations will be established between our contiguous countries and that an understanding of each other's essential interests will enable Turkey and Syria to live in perfect harmony.

The views held by Turkey on Alexandretta and Antioch cannot in any way be an obstacle to genuine friendship between the Turkish and Syrian peoples. On the contrary, they tend to consolidate that friendship and to form a strong link of peace and concord between the two countries.

Turkey has agreed to immense sacrifices in pursuit of her policy of peace and co-operation; she makes no mental reservations as to those sacrifices, even when they concern the future of a Turkish population which remains outside national territory. When, however, at the cost of those very sacrifices, my country acquires rights and privileges and has to watch over the necessities arising therefrom, Your Excellency will agree that it cannot abandon them or consent to their being in any way impaired.

In the light of the above arguments, my Government sincerely hopes that the French Government will draw the inevitable conclusion—namely, that the districts of Alexandretta and Antioch must not be given less favourable treatment than Syria and Lebanon.

It was in Your Excellency's communication that the Government of the Republic first found itself confronted by the plea based on the mandate of 1922 and the Organic Regulation of 1930. These two instruments constitute a clear breach of the undertakings previously given by France to Turkey. So long as the French Government continues to rely on them and does not bring its attitude into line with treaty provisions, Turkey will be forced to consider herself released from all existing agreements. Only in the latter eventuality could the possibility of representatives of Syria taking part in new negotiations be contemplated, since it would then be necessary to define by joint agreement the frontier line which is to separate the two countries.

In a sincere desire to obviate such an unpleasant contingency, the Government of the Republic instructs me to suggest to Your Excellency that negotiations be opened on the problem as a whole without any reservations or prejudice being entertained by either country.

3. NOTE FROM THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT DATED NOVEMBER 30TH, 1936.

Paris, November 30th, 1936.

To His Excellency M. Suad Davaz,

With reference to Your Excellency's letter of the 17th instant, regarding the status of the Sanjak of Alexandretta, I have the honour to confirm the information which the French Ambassador at Ankara was instructed to convey to His Excellency the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Turkish Republic, and which was recently embodied in an *aide-mémoire* handed to M. Aras by M. Ponsot on the 25th instant. This information may be summarised as follows:

The French Government has duly considered in the friendliest spirit Your Excellency's letter of November 17th, in amplification of a previous communication of October 9th. However anxious the French Government may be to take into account to the fullest extent the cordial relations existing between France and Turkey, and whatever be the arguments advanced by the Turkish Government in favour of the solution proposed by Your Excellency on October 9th last, the French Government cannot in this matter depart from the principles which it must observe in view of the special character and the very origin of its mission in the Levant.

Even before 1921, by a decision taken at San Remo on April 25th, 1920, the French Government was entrusted with a mission, the nature and purpose of which had been defined, ever since June 29th, 1919, by Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations. It was in pursuance of this mission that France concluded the Ankara Agreement with Turkey on October 20th, 1921.

The French Government could not *de jure* assume, and has not *de facto* assumed, any obligations inconsistent with the two aforesaid international decisions.

The proposal made in Your Excellency's letter of October 9th last was to the effect that the autonomous Sanjak of Alexandretta should be separated from Syria and made an independent State, with which the French Government would negotiate a treaty similar to the Franco-Syrian and Franco-Lebanese Treaties.

The French Government took the view that this proposal was not contained in the provisions of the Ankara Agreement of October 20th, 1921. It found, moreover, that it was incompatible with Article 4 of the mandate, in which the Council of the League of Nations, on July 24th, 1922, fixed the terms of the mandate and defined the obligations of the mandatory Power.

The French Government accordingly considered itself unable to open negotiations with the Turkish Government for a new agreement on the bases proposed in the said letter.

In submitting these conclusions to His Excellency M. Aras, M. Ponsot added that the French Government was still prepared to give the friendliest consideration to any suggestions the Turkish Government might make for a clearer definition, within the framework of the 1921 Agreement, of the special administrative regime of the sanjak and of the rights and privileges accorded to the inhabitants of that district.

In the event of the Turkish Government, nevertheless, maintaining the above proposal, the French Government saw no other alternative, if the various aspects of the problem were to be fully and impartially examined, than to refer it to an international instance whose authority would have equal weight with the various parties concerned and whose competence to deal with the question would be beyond discussion.

Knowing the Turkish Government to be as deeply attached as itself to the spirit and methods of Geneva, the French Government suggested, in the second alternative, that the question be referred to the Council of the League of Nations.

From the conversations which have been held at Ankara between His Excellency the Minister for Foreign Affairs and the French Ambassador, and from the statements made by M. Aras to the Grand National Assembly, it would appear that the Turkish Government has decided to adopt the second of the two alternatives before it.

The French Government cannot but associate itself with this decision. While still convinced that direct negotiations would have led, in practice, to solutions satisfactory to the various parties concerned, it is fully prepared to leave it to the Council at its next ordinary session to decide on what basis a settlement should be sought.

4. REPLY OF THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT, DATED DECEMBER 4TH, 1936, TO THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT'S NOTE OF NOVEMBER 30TH, 1936.

Paris, December 4th, 1936.

To His Excellency M. Yvon Delbos,

Paris.

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of Your Excellency's letter of November 30th, 1936, the contents of which I at once brought to the notice of my Government.

Deeply appreciating the French Government's renewed assurances of friendship given on this occasion, and being itself actuated by a similar spirit of friendship towards France, the Government of the Republic accepts the proposal to submit the various aspects of the problem of Alexandretta and Antioch for full and impartial consideration to the next ordinary session of the Council of the League of Nations.

My Government was, for its own part, firmly convinced that an agreement could have been reached through direct conversations, all the more so since it hoped that, at the present turning-point in the history of the mission which it had assumed in the Levant, the French Government would have drawn the necessary conclusions from its undertakings towards Turkey. Had the French Government seen its way to agree to a joint examination of the whole question on the basis of the independence of the sanjak, there would probably have been no need for recourse to the Council of the League of Nations, to the principles and methods of which Turkey is as firmly attached as France.

As, however, such was not the case, the Government of the Republic, in its desire to accede to the French Government's courteous request, agrees to await the ordinary session to be held in January, even though a settlement of this problem is a matter of such urgency and importance.

I am, however, instructed by my Government to draw Your Excellency's serious attention to the lamentable position in which the Turkish inhabitants of the whole sanjak are now placed. The disturbances brought about by a direct infringement of the sovereign rights of the Turkish inhabitants of that district have had tragic consequences to which the Government of the Republic cannot remain indifferent.

The fate of the Turks of Alexandretta and Antioch, the treatment to which they are subjected, and the deaths of several among them have produced the most painful impression on the inhabitants of the neighbouring Turkish provinces.

Your Excellency has no doubt been informed of the most recent proceedings in the Grand National Assembly, when the deep anxiety voiced by the members was merely a somewhat attenuated echo of that felt by the whole Turkish people. At the close of the discussion, the Minister for Foreign Affairs was impelled to give the most formal assurances on behalf of the Government of the Republic regarding the security of the Turks of the sanjak. It is the lead thus given by the nation's representatives which now determines the Government of the Republic, bearing in mind the alarming nature of recent events, to ask France, with her deep-seated traditions of justice and humanity, to observe, during such time as the future of the sanjak remains legally in dispute, the strictest neutrality in that district, where the recent intervention of her troops has unfortunately not benefited public order, the disturbances having been entirely due to the usual provocative elements.

If, however, the French authorities should be unable to observe such neutrality and to see that the rights of the inhabitants are respected, the Government of the Republic—in its desire to avoid the serious consequences that might result if the inhabitants of the frontier provinces were faced with a spectacle which it would be impossible for them to endure—would be compelled, in virtue of Articles 11, 12 or 15 of the Covenant of the League of Nations, which will form the basis of the appeal to the ordinary session, to request an immediate meeting of the Council in extraordinary session, with a view to the adoption of the necessary conservatory measures.

I am persuaded that, in its great wisdom, the French Government will not fail to appreciate the very serious aspect which this question has recently assumed, and that even now it will be willing to consider the problem from the standpoint of the great friendship prevailing between Turkey and France—a friendship which should not be impaired through a lack of understanding prejudicial to the higher interests loyally served by both our countries.

5. REPLY BY THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT, DATED DECEMBER 7TH, 1936, TO THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT'S NOTE OF DECEMBER 4TH, 1936.

Paris, December 7th, 1936.

In a letter dated December 4th last, Your Excellency informed me that the Government of the Turkish Republic agreed to the proposal to refer the question of the Sanjak of Alexandretta to the Council at its next ordinary session.

I am highly gratified at this decision. As my letters of November 10th and 30th last showed you, the mandatory Government, while it is prepared to examine the Turkish Government's request in the most friendly spirit, does not consider that it has contracted any obligations other than those expressly stipulated in the Ankara Agreement of 1921. The terms of the mandate, moreover, do not allow it to undertake negotiations on the basis of the sanjak's independence. The Council of the League of Nations, which drew up the terms of this mandate, is therefore alone competent to determine the compatibility of the Turkish request with its own doctrine.

In acquainting me with your Government's decision, you inform me of the anxiety with which the Turkish Government views the present situation in the sanjak.

I am glad to inform you that, according to recent and accurate information in my possession, complete calm now reigns in the whole district. The steps taken by the mandatory authority, which is responsible for the double task of maintaining order and of guaranteeing to each citizen of the States placed under its mandate the free exercise of his civic rights, appear to have usefully contributed to this result. These measures had become necessary owing to the activities of elements foreign to the sanjak and to Syria, which were endeavouring to exercise pressure on the population, sometimes going so far as threats of death. As early as November 22nd, the French Ambassador had been instructed to bring these facts to the attention of the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Turkish Republic and to inform him of the mandatory Power's obligation to take appropriate measures.

In actual fact, the forces responsible for the maintenance of security only had to intervene on a single occasion, in the town of Antioch alone. On the morning of December 1st, the police, endeavouring to bar the way of demonstrators who were marching to the residence of a member of the Chamber of Deputies, was attacked with stones and revolver shots. The armed forces were called in to support the police and rapidly restored order. Although there were a few victims of this regrettable incident among the demonstrators, two of whom succumbed to their wounds, it should be remembered that the son of the member of the Chamber of Deputies whose house was attacked was himself wounded during the incident.

I willingly give Your Excellency the assurance that the mandatory Power, in carrying out the obligations imposed on it in this connection by the terms of the mandate, will always observe the strictest impartiality. The representatives of the mandate are striving at the present moment to pacify public opinion by bringing influence to bear both on the Damascus Government and on the Syrian students and Press, who are tempted to reply to the demonstrations and propaganda campaigns, of which they find an echo in the Turkish Press, by such lively expressions of their own feelings.

I am confident that the Turkish Government will take equal care to avoid any occasion for incidents liable to produce a painful impression either in the sanjak itself or in Damascus, Paris and Geneva. I should like to draw your special attention to the tone recently adopted by the Turkish Press and to the reports that bands threatening the security of the borders are being formed on the frontier.

Lastly, having noted the apprehensions with which the Turkish Government seems to view the relatively distant date of the Council's next ordinary session, I wish to confirm the indications given to you verbally on this point by the Under-Secretary of State of December 5th last. The Council of the League of Nations having been convened for another purpose for December 10th next, the French Government would think it expedient, if the Turkish Government shares this view, to ask that the question of Alexandretta should be placed on the agenda of that session. I would add that the French Government will willingly leave it to the Council to take any conservatory measures it may think desirable pending a decision on the substance of the question.

6. REPLY BY THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT, DATED DECEMBER 9TH, 1936, TO THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT'S NOTE OF DECEMBER 7TH, 1936.

Paris, December 9th, 1936.

In reply to Your Excellency's note of December 7th last, I have the honour to inform you that my Government, while formally denying the truth of allegations no doubt due to the manifest partiality of the local authorities, entirely shares the French Government's view as to the desirability of placing the question at issue on the agenda of the Council's session which is to open on December 10th next.

I hasten to add, as regards the facts mentioned by Your Excellency, that the Turkish Government is prepared to submit immediately to an international enquiry for the purpose of establishing on what side of the frontier the armed bands were formed, in what districts military preparations were made and in what manner sanguinary repressive measures were taken against unarmed and inoffensive populations.

The news which has reached my Government is extremely alarming, and the present situation of the sanjak is such as to produce extremely regrettable consequences if a remedy is not speedily found.

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It is therefore not only desirable but urgently necessary to adopt conservatory measures in addition to the enquiry mentioned above, pending the finding of a solution as regards the fate of the sanjak, which will ensure the welfare of the population while providing them with the liberty to which they aspire.

Accordingly, I hasten to inform you that the Turkish Government has just asked the Secretary-General of the League of Nations to submit to the President of the Council a request to place this dispute on the agenda of the forthcoming extraordinary session, so that its discussion may begin on December 14th, on which date it will be possible for the Minister for Foreign Affairs to reach Geneva.

*Réunions de

Sessions ordinaires.

ARTICLE PREMIER.

1. L'Assemblée se réunit chaque année de plein droit, au siège de la Société des Nations, le second lundi de septembre, sous réserve que le second lundi ne corresponde pas à une date postérieure au 10 septembre. S'il en est ainsi, la session commencera le premier lundi.
2. Elle se réunit également aux dates fixées par l'Assemblée au cours d'une session antérieure ou par le Conseil, votant à la majorité des voix.
3. Si un ou plusieurs Membres de la Société estiment une réunion opportune, ils en informent le Secrétaire général, qui demande leur avis aux autres Membres de la Société. Si le projet de réunion est accepté par la majorité des Membres dans le délai d'un mois, à partir de la date de cette communication, l'Assemblée est convoquée en séance extraordinaire.

Lieu de réunion.

ARTICLE 2.

L'Assemblée se réunit au siège de la Société ou, en cas de circonstances exceptionnelles, en tout autre lieu désigné par l'Assemblée ou par le Conseil votant à la majorité, ou approuvé par la majorité des Membres de la Société.

Convocation.

ARTICLE 3.

1. Les réunions de l'Assemblée auront lieu sur convocation du Président du Conseil par les soins du Secrétaire général.
2. Les convocations sont adressées aux Membres de la Société quatre mois avant la date fixée pour l'ouverture de la session ; ce délai peut, toutefois, dans les circonstances exceptionnelles, être réduit par une décision du Conseil prise à la majorité des voix.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS

RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE ASSEMBLY

RULE 1.

Sessions.

1. The Assembly shall meet in general session every year, at the seat of the League of Nations, commencing on the second Monday in September, provided that the second Monday does not fall later than the 10th. If the second Monday falls later than the 10th, the session will begin on the first Monday.
2. Sessions may also be held at such times as the Assembly at a previous meeting decides, and at such times as the Council, by a majority vote, decides.

3. If a Member of the League considers a session to be desirable, it may request the Secretary-General to summon a special session of the Assembly. The Secretary-General shall thereupon inform the other Members of the League of the request, and enquire whether they concur in it. If within a period of one month from the date of the communication of the Secretary-General, a majority of the Members concur in the request, a special session of the Assembly shall be summoned.

RULE 2.

Place of Meeting.

The sessions of the Assembly shall be held at the seat of the League, or, in exceptional circumstances, at such other place as is designated by the Assembly or by a majority of the Council, or approved by a majority of the Members of the League.

RULE 3.

Summons.

1. The sessions of the Assembly shall be summoned by the President of the Council, acting through the Secretary-General.
2. The summons shall be addressed to the Members of the League not less than four months before the date fixed for the opening of the session. In exceptional circumstances, however, the Council, by a majority vote, may sanction a shorter period.

Ordre du jour.

ARTICLE 4.

1. L'ordre du jour de la session est établi par le Secrétaire général de la Société, avec l'approbation du président du Conseil, et communiqué en entier aux Membres, autant que possible quatre mois avant la date de la première séance.

2. L'ordre du jour de chaque session annuelle comprendra :

3. Tout Membre de la Société peut, un mois avant la date fixée pour la séance d'ouverture, demander l'inscription de nouvelles questions à l'ordre du jour. Ces questions figureront sur une liste supplémentaire, qui sera communiquée aux Membres de la Société des Nations trois semaines au moins avant la date fixée pour la séance d'ouverture. 4. 3. Nothing contained in paragraph 2 of this Rule shall affect the provisions, concerning special cases, contained in the Covenant.

RULE 4.

Agenda.

1. The agenda shall be drawn up by the Secretary-General with the approval of the President of the Council. The complete agenda shall be circulated as nearly as possible four months before the date fixed for the opening of the session.

2. The agenda of a general session shall include :

(a) A report on the work of the Council since the last session of the Assembly, on the work of the Secretariat, and on the measures taken to execute the decisions of the Assembly ;

(b) All items whose inclusion has been ordered by the Assembly at a previous session ;

(c) All items proposed by the Council ;

(d) All items proposed by a Member of the League ; and

(e) The Budget for the next fiscal period, and the report on the accounts of the last fiscal period.

3. Any Member of the League may, at least one month before the date fixed for the opening of the session, request the inclusion of additional items in the agenda. Such items shall be placed on a supplementary list, which shall be circulated to the Members of the League at least three weeks before the date fixed for the opening of the session. The Assembly shall decide whether items on the supplementary list shall be included in the agenda of the session.

Inclusion of Additional Items.

4. The Assembly may in exceptional circumstances place additional items on the agenda ; but all consideration of such items shall, unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds majority of the Assembly, be postponed until four days after they have been placed on the agenda, and until a committee has reported upon them.

4 a. No proposal for the placing of a new question on the agenda of the Assembly may be signed by more than fifteen Members of the League.

ARTICLE 5.

1. Chaque Membre communique au Secrétaire général, autant que possible une semaine avant l'ouverture de la session, le nom de ses représentants, dont le nombre ne doit pas excéder trois. Il peut y ajouter les noms des représentants suppléants.

2. Les pleins pouvoirs des représentants doivent être remis au Secrétaire général autant que possible une semaine avant l'ouverture de la session. Ils seront délivrés, soit par le chef de l'Etat, soit par le ministre des Affaires étrangères¹.

3. Une Commission de vérification des pouvoirs, composée de neuf membres, est élue par l'Assemblée sur la proposition de la Présidence. Elle nomme son président et son vice-président et fait immédiatement son rapport.

ARTICLE 6.

5. No proposal for a modification of the allocation of expenses for the time being in force shall be inserted in the agenda, unless it has been communicated to the Members of the League at least four months before the date fixed for the opening of the session.

RULE 5.

1. Each Member shall communicate to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session, the names of its representatives, of whom there shall be not more than three. The names of substitute-representatives may be added.

Communication
of Names of
Representatives.
Full Powers.

2. The full powers of the representatives shall be delivered to the Secretary-General, if possible, one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session. They shall be issued either by the Head of the State or by the Minister for Foreign Affairs.¹

3. A Committee of nine members for the examination of the full powers shall be elected by the Assembly on the proposal of the President. The Committee shall appoint its own Chairman and Vice-Chairman. It shall report without delay.

4. Any representative to whose admission objection has been made shall sit provisionally with the same rights as other representatives, unless the Assembly decides otherwise.

RULE 6.

Substitute
Representatives
and Substitutes.

1. In addition to the substitute-representatives mentioned in paragraph 1 of Rule 5, the representatives of a Member of the League attending the Assembly, acting together as a delegation, may appoint substitutes. Any such appointment shall be communicated in writing to the President.

2. A substitute-representative appointed by a Member of the League may take the place of a representative without nomination by the representatives.

3. A substitute-representative or substitute may take the place of a representative who is absent from a

¹ It is obvious that, in the case of countries which do not possess a Minister for Foreign Affairs, the full powers may be issued by an authority possessing similar or equivalent powers.

ARTICLE 7¹.

1. Le Bureau de l'Assemblée est composé du président de l'Assemblée, de huit vice-présidents, ainsi que des présidents des Commissions générales, du président de la Commission de l'ordre du jour et du président de la Commission de vérification des pouvoirs.

meeting of the Assembly, or is temporarily prevented from taking part in its deliberations, but, if the representative is present at the meeting, the substitute representative or substitute is only entitled to assist him.

4. A delegation may appoint for service on a committee a deputy or technical adviser other than those referred to in the above paragraphs of this Rule; but a deputy or adviser so appointed shall not be eligible for appointment as Chairman or Rapporteur, or for a seat in the Assembly.

Deputies and Technical Advisers.

RULE 7.¹

1. The General Committee of the Assembly shall consist of the President of the Assembly, eight Vice-Presidents and the Chairmen of the main Committees of the Assembly, the Agenda Committee and the Committee for the examination of the full powers.

*President,

The Assembly may decide to add to the General Committee the Chairmen of other Assembly Committees and, in exceptional cases, other members.

2. The President shall be elected at the beginning of each session.

3. Until the election of the President, the President of the Council shall act as President of the Assembly.

4. The election of the Vice-Presidents shall take place at one of the early meetings of the session.

RULE 7(a).

Agenda Committee.

1. An Agenda Committee shall be set up at the beginning of each session. It shall consist of seven members, who shall be appointed by the Assembly on the nomination of the President.

2. The Committee shall elect its own Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

3. The Committee shall consider applications for the inclusion of new questions in the agenda of the Assembly, and shall report to the Assembly thereon.

¹ On September 30th, 1933, the Assembly approved the following recommendation, which was made to it by the General Committee:

* When proceeding to the election of the Vice-Presidents of the Assembly, in application of Rule 7, paragraphs 1 and 4, of the Rules of Procedure, the voting-papers should not bear the names of individuals, but should be marked "The First Delegate" of such and such a country.

Comité de nominations.

ARTICLE 7(b).*

1. L'Assemblée constitue au début de chaque session un comité de onze membres, auquel est confiée la tâche de présenter des candidatures pour toute élection à des fonctions qui confèrent un siège au Bureau.

2. Le président provisoire de l'Assemblée fait à celle-ci des propositions quant à la composition de ce comité.

ARTICLE 8.

1. Le président ouvre, suspend et lève les séances et dirige le travail de l'Assemblée ; il assure l'observation du règlement, donne la parole, déclare les discussions closes, met les questions aux voix et proclame les résultats du scrutin.

2. Le président est assisté des membres du Bureau pour diriger d'une façon générale le travail de l'Assemblée, pour constituer les commissions que l'Assemblée peut décider de créer, pour arrêter les communications à lui faire et pour fixer l'ordre du jour de chaque séance, ainsi que l'ordre dans lequel les différentes questions devront être examinées.

Secrétariat.

ARTICLE 9.

1. Le Secrétaire général est chargé de l'organisation du secrétariat de l'Assemblée, ainsi que des secrétariats des commissions constituées par l'Assemblée.

2. Le Secrétaire général peut être assisté ou remplacé, au cours des séances de l'Assemblée, par un ou plusieurs

4. Proposals for the mere reference to one of the main Committees or portions of the Report on the Work of the League shall be decided upon by the Assembly without previous reference to the Agenda Committee.

RULE 7(b).*

Nomination Committee.

1. At the commencement of each session, the Assembly shall appoint a committee of eleven members whose duty shall be to nominate candidates for functions which carry with them a seat on the General Committee.

2. The provisional President of the Assembly shall submit proposals to it regarding the composition of this Committee.

3. The Members of the Assembly and the Committees shall retain the right to vote for persons other than those proposed by the above-mentioned Committee.

RULE 8.

Functions of President and General Committee.

1. The President shall announce the opening, suspension and adjournment of the meetings of the Assembly, direct the work of the Assembly, ensure the observance of the Rules of Procedure, accord the right to address the Assembly, declare the debates to be closed, put questions to the vote, and announce the result of the voting.

2. In the general direction of the work of the Assembly, in the constitution of such committees as the Assembly decides to create, in deciding on the communications to be made to the Assembly, in the framing of the agenda for each meeting, and in the determination of the order of priority for its various items, the President shall be assisted by the General Committee.

RULE 9.

Secretariat.

1. The Secretary-General shall be responsible for the organisation of the Secretariat of the Assembly and of the secretariat of any committees set up by the Assembly.

2. The Secretary-General may be assisted or replaced at the meetings of the Assembly by a deputy or deputies.

* On October 10th, 1938, the Assembly adopted as an experiment the procedure laid down in this rule, which, unless otherwise decided in the interval, is to have effect down to the termination of the ordinary session of 1939.

The Secretary-General, or one of his deputies, may at any time, on the invitation of the President, bring before the Assembly reports concerning any question which is being considered by the Assembly, and may be invited by the President to make verbal communications concerning any question under consideration.

RULE 10.

Documents.

1. It shall be the duty of the Secretariat, *inter alia*, to receive, print, circulate and translate documents, reports and resolutions; to translate speeches made at the meetings; to draft, print and circulate the Minutes of the session; to have the custody and proper preservation of the documents in the archives of the Assembly; to publish the reports of the meetings, and, generally, to perform all other work which the Assembly thinks fit to entrust to it.

2. All documents emanating from the Assembly shall be circulated to the Governments of the Members of the League.

RULE 11.

**Publicity of
Plenary
Meetings.**

1. The public shall be admitted to the plenary meetings of the Assembly, by cards distributed by the Secretary-General.

2. The Assembly may decide that particular meetings shall be private.

3. All decisions of the Assembly upon items on the agenda, which have been taken at a private meeting, shall be announced at a public meeting of the Assembly.

RULE 12.

(Deleted.)

RULE 13.

**Communications
to the Assembly.**

At the beginning of each meeting the President shall present to the Assembly all communications addressed to the Assembly or to the League, the importance of which appears to him to warrant such action.

ARTICLE 14¹.

RULE 14.¹

Committees.

1. The Assembly shall establish such committees as it thinks fit, for the consideration of the items on the agenda. Items of the same nature will be referred to the same committee.
2. The Assembly shall not decide items on the agenda in full meeting until the report of a committee upon them has been presented and circulated, unless the Assembly itself, by a two-thirds majority, determines otherwise.

Reports of Committees, particularly Reports involving Expenditure.

Decisions involving expenditure shall be subject to the rules laid down in the Regulations for the Financial Administration of the League of Nations.²

Reports by a committee involving the expenditure of money must indicate whether the expenditure will constitute part of the general expenses of the League or whether it will be recovered from the Members of the League particularly concerned.

No resolution involving expenditure shall in any case be voted by the Assembly before the Finance Committee shall have expressed its opinion on the advisability of the proposed expenditure from the point of view of general budgetary resources.³

3. Each delegation may designate one member, and *Membership*, may nominate technical advisers, for each committee.

4. Each committee shall appoint its *Chairman* and *Officers*. *Rapporteurs*.

5. Each committee may appoint sub-committees, *Sub-committees*, which shall elect their own officers.

6. Each committee shall meet in private unless it decides otherwise. It shall keep a register of its discussions, *Publicity of Meetings. Minutes*.

¹ On October 10th, 1936, the Assembly decided that the following rule, established as an experiment by the Assembly's resolution of October 11th, 1933, should be maintained for the session of 1937 :

The President of the Council, after consulting the Chairman of the Supervisory Commission, may convene the Finance Committee for a date preceding by not more than one week the first meeting of the ordinary session of the Assembly. The Committee shall be composed of the representatives accredited for the purpose by the Members of the League. It shall appoint its Chairman, who shall thereby become a member of the General Committee of the Assembly under the terms of Rule 7 of the Rules of Procedure. 1. When the reports and resolutions submitted by the various Committees of the Assembly are brought up for adoption in plenary session, the President, in the cases indicated below, shall read the titles of the reports and put forthwith to the vote the resolutions which are proposed.

2. The procedure provided for in paragraph 1 shall only apply in cases where the Committee has unanimously declared that it does not consider a discussion of the report in plenary session to be necessary and where no delegation has subsequently asked the President to open a discussion on the report. RULE 15.

*Procedure for

1. No representative may address the Assembly without having previously obtained the permission of the President.

2. Speakers shall be called upon in the order in which they have signified their desire to speak. The Chairman and the Rapporteur of a committee may be accorded precedence for the purpose of defending or explaining the conclusions arrived at by their committee. The same principle shall apply to any Member of the Council.

2. A representative speaking in another language shall provide for the translation of his speech into one of these two languages.

3. All documents, resolutions and reports circulated by the President or the Secretariat shall be rendered in both French and English.

4. Any representative may have documents circulated in a language other than French or English, but the Secretariat will not be responsible for their translation or printing.

5. Any Member of the League, or any group of Members, may require that all documents and publications of the League shall be regularly translated into, and printed and circulated in, a language other than French and English, but shall in such case defray all the necessary expenses.

RULE 17.

1. Resolutions, amendments and motions must be introduced in writing and handed to the President. The President shall cause copies to be distributed to the representatives.

2. As a general rule, no proposal shall be discussed or put to the vote at any meeting of the Assembly unless copies of it have been circulated to all representatives not later than the day preceding the meeting.

5. When a number of proposals are before the Assembly, the proposal furthest removed in substance from the principal one shall be voted on first.

6. If an amendment striking out part of a proposal is moved, the Assembly shall first vote on whether the words in question shall stand part of the proposal. If the decision is in the negative, the amendment shall then be put to the vote.

7. When an amendment adds to a proposal it shall be voted on first, and if it is adopted the amended proposal shall then be voted on.

RULE 19.

Majority.

1. Except where otherwise expressly provided in the Covenant or by the terms of a treaty, decisions of the Assembly shall be taken by a unanimous vote of the Members of the League represented at the meeting.

2. All matters of procedure at a meeting of the Assembly, including the appointment of committees to investigate particular matters, shall be decided by a majority of the Members of the League represented at the meeting.

The Assembly shall vote by "Appel Nominal", except when the Members of the League represented at the meeting agree that the method of voting shall be by heads of delegations rising in their seats, and except in the cases provided for in Rule 21. The "Appel Nominal" shall be taken in one of the following manners, as the Assembly may decide :

(a) The name of each delegation shall be called, and one of its members shall reply "Yes", "No", or "Not voting". The result of the vote shall be recorded and announced to the Assembly;

or

(b) The delegation of each Member of the League represented at the meeting shall be provided with two voting tickets, on which the name of the country is written, one red and one blue, the former being "Aye" the latter "No". The voting tickets shall be deposited in an urn placed near the President's platform. When all the votes have been collected the President shall declare the ballot closed, and the General Committee shall proceed to count the votes. The individual votes shall be communicated to the Assembly and the result shall be announced by the President.

RULE 21.

Elections.

1. All decisions relating to individuals shall be taken by a secret ballot.

2. If, when one person only is to be elected, no one person obtains at the first ballot an absolute majority of votes, an entirely new ballot shall be taken; but on this occasion the voting shall be confined to the two candidates

3. When a number of elective places of the same nature are to be filled at one time, those persons who obtain an absolute majority at the first ballot shall be elected. If the number of persons obtaining such majority is less than the number of persons to be elected, there shall be a second ballot to fill the remaining places, the voting being restricted to the unsuccessful candidates who obtained the greatest number of votes at the first ballot, not more than double in number the places remaining to be filled. Those candidates, to the number required to be elected, who receive the greatest number of votes at the second ballot shall be declared elected.¹

RULE 22.

Equality in
Voting.
Second Vote.

In case of equality in any voting other than that referred to in Rule 21, in which a majority is required, a second vote shall be taken in the course of the next meeting; this meeting shall be held within 48 hours from the date on which the first vote was taken, and it shall be expressly mentioned on the agenda that a second vote will be taken on the matter in question. Unless there is at this subsequent meeting a majority in favour of the proposal, it shall be considered as lost.

RULE 22a.

Election of Non-
permanent
Members of the
Council.

1. The Members whose representatives are to sit on the Council as non-permanent Members of that body shall be selected by the Assembly by secret ballot.

2. Where several seats are to be filled, the election shall be made by voting a list of names. Any ballot-paper containing more names than there are seats to be filled shall be null and void.

3. No Member shall be elected at the first or at the second ballot unless it has obtained at least the absolute majority of the votes. If, after two ballots, there still remain seats to be filled, a third ballot shall be held upon a

4. If two or more Members obtain the same number of votes and there is not a seat available for each, a special ballot shall be held between them; if they again obtain an equal number of votes, the President shall decide between them by drawing lots.

RULE 23.

1. The President may declare a meeting to be adjourned or suspended if a proposal for adjournment or suspension made by him does not meet with objection from the Assembly.

Adjournment or Suspension of Meetings.

2. The President shall declare an adjournment or suspension of the meeting upon a vote to this effect by the Assembly.

RULE 24.

The General Committee, in cases where it deems it necessary, may revise the resolutions adopted by the Assembly, changing their form but not their substance. Any such changes shall be reported to the Assembly.

Revision of Resolutions.

RULE 25.

The verbatim report of each meeting shall be drawn up by the Secretariat and submitted to the Assembly after approval by the President.

Verbatim Reports.

RULE 26.

The resolutions adopted by the Assembly shall be circulated by the Secretary-General to the Members of the League within fifteen days after the termination of the session.

Circulation of Assembly Resolutions.

RULE 27.

These Rules of Procedure shall apply to the proceedings of committees of the Assembly.¹

Application of Rules to Committee Proceedings.

RULE 28.

These Rules of Procedure may be altered by a decision of the Assembly ; but no such alteration shall be made except upon a majority vote of the Assembly, taken after a committee has reported on the proposed alteration.

Alteration of Rules of Procedure.

**RECOMMENDATIONS AS TO
THE ARRANGEMENTS FOR
THE DEBATES IN THE ASSEMBLY
ON THE ANNUAL REPORT BY THE COUNCIL.**

**Communicated by the General Committee to the Delegates
to the Third Ordinary Session of the Assembly on
September 29th, 1922.**

The General Committee, in accordance with the desire expressed by the Assembly, has carefully investigated the proposals made by the President with regard to the arrangements for the debates in the Assembly on the report by the Council. The General Committee unanimously recognises the utility of these proposals and has adopted the following recommendations, which may perhaps serve for guidance in the procedure of future Assemblies and help their Presidents in the exercise of the powers conferred upon them in pursuance of Articles 8 and 15 of the Rules of Procedure :

1. The report by the Council on its work of the year shall be communicated to the Assembly at the beginning of the session, and as a general rule it shall constitute the first subject on the agenda after the organisation of the Assembly has been completed.

2. The report by the Council shall be submitted for debate in the Assembly, to be opened with a general discussion, which may be followed by consideration of particular subjects dealt with in the report or arising out of it.

3. The delegates shall be invited to inform the President before the beginning of the debate, or as soon thereafter as possible, whether they desire to participate, indicating at the same time their wishes as to engaging in the general debate, or more particularly in the discussion of specific matters covered by the Council's report ; they should be invited to state also the subjects with which they wish to deal specially in the specific discussion.

The President will propose to the Assembly, as early as possible, the subjects to be covered in the specific discussion following the general debate, arranging to have speakers on the same topic heard in succession. The delegates will be invited to limit their speeches in the special debates, as far as possible, to the special topics under discussion at the time. It is in no sense inconsistent with the present Recommendations that delegates taking part in the general discussion should on that occasion refer to subjects on which a specific discussion will take place.

**PROCEDURE FOR ADOPTION OF THE BUDGET
AT PLÉNARY MEETINGS OF THE ASSEMBLY.**

(Report made to the Fourth Ordinary Session of the Assembly by the General Committee on September 18th, 1923.)

At the third session of the Assembly a question arose as to whether the Budget of the League could be voted by a majority or only by unanimity, and it was decided that the Council should be asked to consider the question.

The Council considered the subject thus referred to it on January 29th, 1923.

On the legal question as to what constitutes a valid opinion of a budgetary resolution by the Assembly, the Council agreed with the opinion expressed by its Rapporteur, M. Tang Tsai-Fou, which has been communicated to the Assembly in document A.3.1923.V.

The question as to what would be the most desirable method of procedure for the Assembly to adopt in the preliminary stages before the final voting of the Budget was referred by the Assembly to the General Committee on September 10th last. The General Committee has now

c) Le Président mettra ensuite successivement en discussion les différents crédits que les délégations désirent modifier.

Si les amendements proposés à certains crédits ne soulèvent aucune opposition, les crédits ainsi modifiés seront mis aux voix.

D'autre part, si les amendements proposés à certains crédits particuliers ne sont pas unanimement approuvés, ces crédits seront, si possible, renvoyés à l'examen de la Commission des finances, pour qu'elle puisse les discuter et présenter de nouvelles propositions à l'Assemblée. Si l'on ne dispose pas du temps nécessaire pour renvoyer à la Commission des finances les crédits au sujet desquels un accord unanime n'a pu être, pour le moment, obtenu à

the honour to place the following recommendations as to procedure before the Assembly :

1. The opinion expressed by the Council to the effect that the adoption of budgetary proposals by the Assembly requires a unanimous vote should be concurred in by the Assembly.
2. The Rules of Procedure of the Assembly (Rule 18, paragraphs 2, 5, 6 and 7) establish the procedure to be followed in dealing with amendments to the Budget proposed at the plenary meetings.

It would be convenient that the Rules should be applied in the following manner :

(a) The Budget as presented by the Finance Committee will be regarded as a single proposal which, if no amendments are moved, will be submitted for adoption as a whole, by a single vote of the Assembly.

(b) If amendments are moved to the Budget as presented by the Finance Committee, the President of the Assembly, after ascertaining all the credits on which the various delegations desire to propose amendments, will divide the budget and put to the vote, as a whole, all those credits on which no question of amendment arises.

(c) The President will then successively submit for discussion the various credits which delegations desire to alter.

If amendments proposed to particular credits are not opposed, the credits as amended will be put to the vote.

If, on the other hand, amendments proposed to particular credits do not secure unanimous agreement, those credits will, if possible, be referred back to the Finance Committee, in order that they may be discussed there and new proposals be presented to the Assembly. If time does not permit of referring to the Finance Committee credits in regard to which unanimous agreement cannot for the

Article 15.

Annex III.

EXTRACT FROM THE REGULATIONS FOR THE FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.¹

(Note : In this extract, " Commission " or " Supervisory Commission " means the Supervisory Commission established under Chapter I of the Regulations.)

CHAPTER IV.—ADOPTION OF THE BUDGET.

Article 15.

(1) The Secretary-General shall arrange for the Budget and the Annexes, as described in the preceding Chapter, together with a general introduction, to be submitted to the Commission before May 1st of each year.

(2) In order to enable the Secretary-General to comply with the provisions of paragraph 1, the competent officials of the autonomous organisations shall supply the Secretary-General with the data required on or before a date to be fixed by the Secretary-General in agreement with the officials concerned.

Article 16.

(1) The Commission shall annually examine the Budget and prepare a report thereon in time for both documents to be despatched to the Council and the Members of the League three months before the regular annual session of the Assembly.

Article 16a.

1. Toutes propositions de dépenses autres que celles comprises au budget primitivement communiqué aux Membres de la Société doivent parvenir au Secrétaire général un mois au moins avant la date fixée pour l'ouverture de la session de l'Assemblée. Si une proposition de cette nature est présentée moins d'un mois avant l'ouverture de la session ou est déposée au cours de la session, la procédure suivante lui sera appliquée :

a) Elle sera renvoyée directement par le Secrétaire général à la Commission de contrôle, qui fera rapport sur ses conséquences financières d'ordre général ;

(2) The observations of the Council upon the Budget and upon the report of the Commission shall be despatched to the Members of the League in time for them to be received at least one month before the regular annual session of the Assembly.

(3) When the Commission is considering their respective budgets, the autonomous organisations shall be represented before the Commission in such manner as they may decide and the Commission approve. A non-autonomous organisation shall be represented by the Secretary-General, assisted by one of the officials especially responsible for its work, and, if so requested, by a member of the Advisory Committee.

(4) The Commission may not amend the Budget, as presented to it, but may propose modifications. The Commission will discuss such modifications (if any) with the competent official or authority, and report its conclusions to the Council and the Assembly.

(5) Proposed credits which in the opinion of the Commission require special examination by the Assembly may form the object of special reports by the Commission which shall be dealt with by the procedure laid down in Article 16c below. If the credit forms part of the budget of an autonomous organisation, the special report shall be communicated to the competent authority of the organisation.

Article 16a.

(1) A proposal for expenditure on a purpose for which provision is not made in the Budget as communicated to the Members of the League must be placed in the hands of the Secretary-General at least one month before the date fixed for the opening of the Assembly's session. If such a proposal is received later than one month before the opening of the session, or made during the session, it shall be dealt with as follows:

(a) It shall be submitted directly by the Secretary-General to the Supervisory Commission for a report upon its general financial consequences;

(b) Unless, after considering the report of the Supervisory Commission, the Assembly or the Finance Committee, by a special resolution adopted by a two-thirds majority, decides to take it into consideration during the current session, the proposal shall be adjourned until the next session of the Assembly;

(c) If it is decided to deal with the proposal during the current session, the ordinary procedure laid down for supplementary credits should be followed, with the exception that the voting of a credit by the Finance Committee shall require a two-thirds majority.

(2) The Secretary-General shall incorporate the estimates referred to in paragraph (1) above, and estimates for any increases in the Budget of the Secretariat which he himself considers it necessary to propose, in a single supplementary budget, which shall be circulated to the Members of the League and to the Supervisory Commission not later than two weeks before the opening of the Assembly's session.

Article 16b.

A session of the Supervisory Commission shall be held each year during the session of the Assembly.

Article 16c.

I. Proposed credits upon which a special report has been made by the Supervisory Commission under Article 16, paragraph 5, and the various estimates included in the supplementary budget, shall be dealt with by the following procedure :

(a) Where consideration of the objects for which the proposed credit is required is referred by the Assembly to a Committee other than the Finance Committee, all the relevant documents shall be placed before such Committee, which, in so far as it reports in favour of the said objects, shall examine the estimate of expenditure, and, if necessary, modify it to correspond to the recommendations which it makes. The Committee's report, if

it recommends a credit, shall be passed directly to the Supervisory Commission for verification of the estimated expenditure and be then submitted to the Finance Committee with a report by the Supervisory Commission. The report of the Committee concerned (other than the Finance Committee) must, however, be received by the Supervisory Commission within fifteen days from the opening of the session of the Assembly. If it is received later, the examination of the credit shall be adjourned to the next session of the Assembly, unless the Finance Committee, by a decision taken by a two-thirds majority, shall otherwise resolve, in which case the credit shall be referred to the Supervisory Commission for examination and report at the earliest possible moment.

(b) In other cases, the proposed credits shall be referred to the Finance Committee with the observations of the Supervisory Commission.

2. The rules contained in paragraph 1 (a) above shall also apply in all cases where : (1) a proposal for expenditure for a purpose for which provision is not made in the Budget or supplementary budget is referred by the Assembly to one of its Committees other than the Finance Committee ; (2) a Committee, other than the Finance Committee, of its own motion adopts proposals capable of involving an increase in the Budget as originally communicated to the Members of the League.

Article 16d.

A decision of the Finance Committee shall be reconsidered if a request to that effect is formulated by one-quarter of the members of the Finance Committee or by the competent official of the organisation affected or by a vote of another committee of the Assembly affected thereby.

Such reconsideration shall not take place until after an interval of at least twenty-four hours from the time when the request was made or was communicated to the Finance Committee.

Article 16e.

(1) When the Assembly or its Finance Committee discusses the budget of any autonomous organisation, such organisation may delegate one representative to assist at the meetings of the Assembly and as many representatives as the Finance Committee may approve to assist at the meetings of the Finance Committee. Such representative or representatives may be heard, but shall not address the meeting except on the invitation of the President.

(2) The Advisory Committee of a non-autonomous organisation may, in like manner, send a representative to attend at meetings of the Finance Committee of the Assembly at which its budget is discussed.

Article 19.

(Cancelled.)

**RULES DEALING WITH THE ELECTION
OF THE NON-PERMANENT MEMBERS
OF THE COUNCIL.**

**1. Rules adopted by the Assembly on September 15th,
1926.**

Article I.

The Assembly shall each year, in the course of its ordinary session, elect three non-permanent Members of the Council. They shall be elected for a term commencing

L'Assemblée statue séparément sur chaque demande de rééligibilité et au scrutin secret. Le nombre des suffrages exprimés est déterminé par le total des bulletins, déduction faite des bulletins blancs ou nuls.

L'Assemblée ne pourra statuer sur la rééligibilité d'un Membre que sur la demande écrite de ce Membre lui-même. Cette demande devra être remise au président de l'Assemblée, au plus tard la veille du jour fixé pour l'élection ; elle sera présentée à l'Assemblée, qui statuera sans renvoi à une commission et sans débat.

Toutefois, le nombre des Membres réélus en conséquence d'une déclaration préalable de rééligibilité sera limité de façon que ne fassent pas partie en même temps du Conseil plus de trois Membres élus dans ces conditions. Si le résultat du scrutin est tel que cette limite de trois se trouve dépassée, ne seront pas considérés comme élus ceux de ces Membres qui, se trouvant dans ces conditions, ont recueilli le moins de voix.

Article III.

Nonobstant les dispositions qui précédent, l'Assemblée peut, en tout temps, et en statuant à la majorité des deux tiers, décider que, par application de l'article 4 du Pacte, il

Should a non-permanent Member cease to belong to the Council before its term of office expires, its seat shall be filled by a by-election held separately at the session following the occurrence of the vacancy. The term of office of the Member so elected shall end at the date at which the term of office of the Member whose place it takes would have expired.

Article II.

A retiring Member may not be re-elected during the period between the expiration of its term of office and the third election in ordinary session held thereafter, unless the Assembly, either on the expiration of the Member's term of office or in the course of the said period of three years, shall, by a majority of two-thirds of the votes cast, previously have decided that such Member is re-eligible.

The Assembly shall pronounce separately, by secret ballot, upon each request for re-eligibility. The number of votes cast shall be determined by the total number of voting tickets deposited, deducting blank or spoilt votes.

The Assembly may not decide upon the re-eligibility of a Member except upon a request in writing made by the Member itself. The request must be handed to the President of the Assembly not later than the day before the date fixed for the election; it shall be submitted to the Assembly, which shall pronounce upon it without referring it to a committee and without debate.

The number of Members re-elected in consequence of having been previously declared re-eligible shall be restricted so as to prevent the Council from containing at the same time more than three Members thus elected. If the result of the ballot infringes this restriction to three Members, those of the Members affected which have received the smallest number of votes shall not be considered to have been elected.

Article III.

Notwithstanding the above provisions, the Assembly may, at any time, by a two-thirds majority decide to

**2. Règle supplémentaire adoptée par l'Assemblée

Article IV. — Temporary Provisions.

**2. Additional Rule adopted by the Assembly
on October 2nd, 1933.**

No Member of the League shall be eligible to be elected as a non-permanent Member of the Council unless it has proposed itself for election, or been nominated by another Member of the League, at least forty-eight hours before the election, which shall not be held before the seventh day of the Assembly's session.¹

The notice of the candidature shall be given in writing to the Secretary-General, who shall forthwith bring it to the attention of the Assembly. The Secretary-General shall at the time of the election place before the Assembly a list of the Members which have been duly put forward as candidates.

Annex V.

**ADOPTION OF DECISIONS BY A MAJORITY IN
COMMITTEES OF THE ASSEMBLY :
MINORITY REPORTS.**

Extract from the Report of a Sub-Committee of the First Committee adopted by the Assembly on September 20th, 1924.

I. The Sub-Committee has carefully examined the Netherlands proposal, which was in the following terms :

¹ On September 8th, 1927, the Assembly decided, on the proposal of the General Committee, that, until otherwise decided by the Assembly, the election of the non-permanent Members of the Council should take place on the Monday following the opening date of the Assembly—that is to say, at the beginning of the second week of the Assembly.

Le délégué néerlandais a exposé à la Sous-Commission que, dans l'esprit de son Gouvernement, l'amendement proposé était d'ordre interprétatif et n'avait d'autre but que de consacrer la pratique courante des Commissions.

Votre Sous-Commission a reconnu la rectitude de l'interprétation proposée. L'unanimité n'est, en effet, requise aux séances plénières de l'Assemblée que pour l'adoption des résolutions constituant des décisions proprement dites, liant les Etats, et non relatives à la procédure. On ne peut reconnaître ce caractère obligatoire à des rapports de Commissions, et qui ne constituent qu'une étape préparatoire et provisoire des résolutions finales de l'Assemblée.

S'il est vrai que le vote final exige l'unanimité à l'Assemblée, il n'en résulte pas que les votes de majorité de Commissions doivent demeurer stériles. L'expérience démontre en effet que, tout en s'efforçant de faire prévaloir les solutions qui ont leur préférence, les délégués composant la minorité au sein des Commissions n'entendent pas, le plus souvent, faire obstacle à l'adoption de résolutions différentes qui auraient rallié la majorité des suffrages.

Votre Sous-Commission a estimé, cependant, qu'il peut arriver que l'opposition manifestée en Commission par la minorité, lors d'un vote d'une résolution, qui exigera pour son adoption l'unanimité en séance plénière de l'Assemblée, soit d'une nature telle qu'il n'y ait guère d'utilité à soumettre la résolution votée, sans modification, à l'Assemblée. En pareil cas, il serait inopportun de ne pas permettre aux Commissions de revenir sur le vote acquis pour apporter à la résolution votée, si la majorité le juge utile, des modifications de nature à atténuer les objections qui ont été formulées.

Il a paru, pour ce motif, à votre Sous-Commission que mieux valait ne pas lier les Commissions par un texte rigide dans le sens de la proposition néerlandaise et de leur laisser continuer la pratique souple suivie jusqu'à ce jour.

"There shall be added to Rule 27 of the Rules of Procedure of the Assembly a second paragraph worded as follows:

"Provided that decisions of the Committees shall be taken by the vote of the majority of the Members of the League represented at the meeting."

The Netherlands delegate informed the Sub-Committee that his Government's intention was that the amendment should be purely explanatory, and should merely legalise the existing practice of the Committees.

Your Sub-Committee quite realised that the proposed interpretation was correct. Unanimity at plenary meetings of the Assembly is only necessary for the adoption of resolutions representing genuine decisions which are not connected with procedure and are binding on the States. Committee reports do not fall within this category, since they are merely a preliminary and provisional stage of the resolutions finally adopted by the Assembly.

Although the ultimate vote of the Assembly must be unanimous, it does not follow that majority votes in Committees can be of no effect. Indeed, experience shows that minorities on Committees, while endeavouring to secure the acceptance of their own resolutions, do not, as a rule, attempt to prevent the adoption of other resolutions if the majority are in favour of these.

It has occurred to your Sub-Committee, however, that in some cases the opposition of a minority in a Committee to a resolution, which cannot be adopted at a plenary meeting of the Assembly except by a unanimous vote, may render it useless to submit the resolution actually voted by the Committee to the Assembly without amendment. It would be inexpedient in such cases not to allow Committees to reconsider their decisions and, if the majority thinks it desirable, to amend the resolutions already voted with a view to meeting to some extent the objections raised.

For this reason, your Sub-Committee is of opinion that it would be preferable not to bind the Committees by a rigid rule, as proposed by the Netherlands delegation, but to allow them to continue to use the elastic procedure which has hitherto been followed.

Le délégué des Pays-Bas a bien voulu se rallier à cette manière de voir.

II. Votre Sous-Commission a examiné ensuite une proposition d'amendement à l'article 27, émanant de la délégation de l'Espagne.

Cette proposition consiste, au cas où l'amendement suggéré par la délégation néerlandaise serait adopté, à compléter le deuxième alinéa nouveau de l'article 27 du Règlement par l'addition d'un paragraphe ainsi conçu :

« Sur la demande d'un ou de plusieurs membres de la Commission, n'ayant pas voté en faveur d'un rapport adopté par la majorité, l'opinion divergente, accompagnée de son exposé des motifs, sera communiquée à l'Assemblée en même temps que le rapport. »

Le délégué des Pays-Bas ayant retiré son amendement, le sous-amendement espagnol fut également retiré.

Il a paru du reste à la Sous-Commission qu'on pouvait s'en remettre au rapporteur du soin de faire l'exposé sincère des opinions dissidentes d'un ou de plusieurs membres, si ceux-ci lui en exprimaient le désir, ledit exposé étant, du reste, soumis au contrôle de la minorité lors de l'adoption du rapport.

III. Le délégué chinois à la Sous-Commission avait proposé, comme amendement à la proposition néerlandaise, que le vote à la majorité ne soit admis que si ce système de vote obtenait, en premier lieu, l'adhésion de tout pays mentionné dans la résolution ou le plus intéressé dans la question visée par ladite résolution.

Le retrait de la proposition néerlandaise amena le délégué de la Chine à retirer également sa proposition.

La Sous-Commission a estimé, du reste, qu'on pouvait faire confiance aux Commissions qu'avant de décider si une résolution, votée à la majorité, devait être transmise telle quelle à l'Assemblée, elles auraient spécialement égard à la nature des objections émanant des Etats visés dans la proposition du délégué de la Chine.

The Netherlands delegate has accepted this view.

II. The Sub-Committee then considered a proposal put forward by the Spanish delegation to amend Rule 27.

This proposal was to the effect that, if the amendment put forward by the Netherlands delegation was adopted, the new second paragraph of Rule 27 of the Rules should be completed by the addition of the following further paragraph :

"At the request of one or more members of the Committee who have not voted in favour of a report adopted by a majority, the dissentient opinion, with a statement of the reasons for it, shall be communicated to the Assembly at the same time as the report."

As the Netherlands delegate had withdrawn his amendment, the Spanish additional amendment was also withdrawn.

The Sub-Committee was of opinion that the Rapporteur might be relied upon to give a fair statement of the dissentient opinions of one or more members, if asked by them to do so ; moreover, the minority would have a check on this statement when the report came to be adopted.

III. The Chinese delegate on the Sub-Committee proposed, as an amendment to the Netherlands proposal, that the consent of any country mentioned in the resolution, or whose interests are principally or mainly affected by such a resolution, must first be obtained to the system of majority voting.

In view of the withdrawal of the Netherlands proposal, the Chinese delegate also withdrew his proposal.

The Sub-Committee was of opinion that the Committees, might be relied upon, before deciding whether a majority resolution should be submitted to the Assembly as voted, to give special attention to the nature of any objections raised by States in the position described in the Chinese delegate's proposal.

CHAPITRE PREMIER. — ORGANISATION DE LA COUR.

Article 2.

La Cour permanente de Justice internationale est un corps de magistrats indépendants, élus, sans égard à leur nationalité, parmi les personnes jouissant de la plus haute considération morale, et qui réunissent les conditions requises pour l'exercice, dans leurs pays respectifs, des plus hautes fonctions judiciaires, ou qui sont des jurisconsultes possédant une compétence notoire en matière de droit international.

Article 3.

La Cour se compose de quinze membres.

Article 4.

Les membres de la Cour sont élus par l'Assemblée et par le Conseil sur une liste de personnes présentées par les groupes nationaux de la Cour d'Arbitrage, conformément aux dispositions suivantes.

En ce qui concerne les Membres de la Société qui ne sont pas représentés à la Cour permanente d'Arbitrage, les listes de candidats seront présentées par des groupes nationaux, désignés à cet effet par leurs Gouvernements, dans les mêmes conditions que celles stipulées pour les membres de la Cour d'Arbitrage par l'article 44 de la Convention de La Haye de 1907 sur le règlement pacifique des conflits internationaux.

**RULES CONCERNING THE ELECTION
OF THE MEMBERS OF THE PERMANENT
COURT OF INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE.**

**(a) EXTRACT FROM THE STATUTE FOR THE PERMANENT
COURT OF INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE AS AMENDED IN
ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROTOCOL OF SEPTEMBER 14TH,
1929.¹**

CHAPTER I.—ORGANISATION OF THE COURT.

Article 2.

The Permanent Court of International Justice shall be composed of a body of independent judges, elected regardless of their nationality from amongst persons of high moral character, who possess the qualifications required in their respective countries for appointment to the highest judicial offices, or are jurisconsults of recognised competence in international law.

Article 3.

The Court shall consist of fifteen members.

Article 4.

The members of the Court shall be elected by the Assembly and by the Council from a list of persons nominated by the national groups in the Court of Arbitration, in accordance with the following provisions.

In the case of Members of the League of Nations not represented in the Permanent Court of Arbitration, the lists of candidates shall be drawn up by national groups appointed for this purpose by their Governments under the same conditions as those prescribed for members of the Permanent Court of Arbitration by Article 44 of the Convention of The Hague of 1907 for the pacific settlement of international disputes.

En l'absence d'accord spécial, l'Assemblée, sur la proposition du Conseil, réglera les conditions auxquelles peut participer à l'élection des membres de la Cour un Etat qui, tout en ayant accepté le Statut de la Cour, n'est pas Membre de la Société des Nations.

Article 5.

Trois mois au moins avant la date de l'élection, le Secrétaire général de la Société des Nations invite par écrit les Membres de la Cour d'Arbitrage appartenant aux Etats mentionnés à l'Annexe au Pacte ou entrés ultérieurement dans la Société des Nations, ainsi que les personnes désignées conformément à l'alinéa 2 de l'article 4, à procéder dans un délai déterminé par groupes nationaux à la présentation de personnes en situation de remplir les fonctions de Membre de la Cour.

Chaque groupe ne peut, en aucun cas, présenter plus de quatre personnes, dont deux au plus de sa nationalité. En aucun cas, il ne peut être présenté un nombre de candidats plus élevé que le double des places à remplir.

Article 6.

Avant de procéder à cette désignation, il est recommandé à chaque groupe national de consulter la plus haute Cour de Justice, les Facultés et Ecoles de Droit, les Académies nationales et les sections nationales d'Académies internationales, vouées à l'étude du droit.

Article 7.

Le Secrétaire général de la Société des Nations dresse, par ordre alphabétique, une liste de toutes les personnes ainsi désignées : seules ces personnes sont éligibles, sauf le cas prévu à l'article 12, paragraphe 2.

Le Secrétaire général communique cette liste à l'Assemblée et au Conseil.

Article 8.

L'Assemblée et le Conseil procèdent indépendamment l'un de l'autre à l'élection des membres de la Cour.

The conditions under which a State which has accepted the Statute of the Court but is not a member of the League of Nations may participate in electing the members of the Court shall, in the absence of a special agreement, be laid down by the Assembly on the proposal of the Council.

Article 5.

At least three months before the date of the election, the Secretary-General of the League of Nations shall address a written request to the Members of the Court of Arbitration belonging to the States mentioned in the Annex to the Covenant or to the States which join the League subsequently, and to the persons appointed under paragraph 2 of Article 4, inviting them to undertake, within a given time, by national groups, the nomination of persons in a position to accept the duties of a member of the Court.

No group may nominate more than four persons, not more than two of whom shall be of their own nationality. In no case must the number of candidates nominated be more than double the number of seats to be filled.

Article 6.

Before making these nominations, each national group is recommended to consult its Highest Court of Justice, its Legal Faculties and Schools of Law, and its National Academies and national sections of International Academies devoted to the study of law.

Article 7.

The Secretary-General of the League of Nations shall prepare a list in alphabetical order of all the persons thus nominated. Save as provided in Article 12, paragraph 2, these shall be the only persons eligible for appointment.

The Secretary-General shall submit this list to the Assembly and to the Council.

Article 8.

The Assembly and the Council shall proceed independently of one another to elect the members of the Court.

Article 9.

Dans toute élection, les électeurs auront en vue que les personnes appelées à faire partie de la Cour, non seulement réunissent individuellement les conditions requises, mais assurent dans l'ensemble la représentation des grandes formes de civilisation et des principaux systèmes juridiques du monde.

Article 10.

Sont élus ceux qui ont réuni la majorité absolue des voix dans l'Assemblée et dans le Conseil.

Au cas où le double scrutin de l'Assemblée et du Conseil se porterait sur plus d'un ressortissant du même Membre de la Société des Nations, le plus âgé est seul élu.

Article 11.

Si, après la première séance d'élection, il reste encore des sièges à pourvoir, il est procédé, de la même manière, à une seconde et, s'il est nécessaire, à une troisième.

Article 12.

Si, après la troisième séance d'élection, il reste encore des sièges à pourvoir, il peut être à tout moment formé sur la demande, soit de l'Assemblée, soit du Conseil, une Commission médiatrice de six membres, nommés trois par l'Assemblée, trois par le Conseil, en vue de choisir pour chaque siège non pourvu un nom à présenter à l'adoption séparée de l'Assemblée et du Conseil.

Peuvent être portées sur cette liste, à l'unanimité, toutes personnes satisfaisant aux conditions requises, alors même qu'elles n'auraient pas figuré sur la liste de présentation visée aux articles 4 et 5.

Si la Commission médiatrice constate qu'elle ne peut réussir à assurer l'élection, les membres de la Cour déjà nommés pourvoient aux sièges vacants, dans un délai à fixer par le Conseil, en choisissant parmi les personnes qui ont obtenu des suffrages soit dans l'Assemblée, soit dans le Conseil.

Si parmi les juges il y a partage égal des voix, la voix du juge le plus âgé l'emporte.

Article 9.

At every election, the electors shall bear in mind that not only should all the persons appointed as members of the Court possess the qualifications required, but the whole body also should represent the main forms of civilisation and the principal legal systems of the world.

Article 10.

Those candidates who obtain an absolute majority of votes in the Assembly and in the Council shall be considered as elected.

In the event of more than one national of the same Member of the League being elected by the votes of both the Assembly and the Council, the eldest of these only shall be considered as elected.

Article 11.

If, after the first meeting held for the purpose of the election, one or more seats remain to be filled, a second and, if necessary, a third meeting shall take place.

Article 12.

If, after the third meeting, one or more seats still remain unfilled, a joint conference consisting of six members (three appointed by the Assembly and three by the Council) may be formed, at any time, at the request of either the Assembly or the Council, for the purpose of choosing one name for each seat still vacant, to submit to the Assembly and the Council for their respective acceptance.

If the Conference is unanimously agreed upon any person who fulfils the required conditions, he may be included in its list, even though he was not included in the list of nominations referred to in Articles 4 and 5.

If the joint conference is satisfied that it will not be successful in procuring an election, those members of the Court who have already been appointed shall, within a period to be fixed by the Council, proceed to fill the vacant seats by selection from amongst those candidates who have obtained votes either in the Assembly or in the Council.

In the event of an equality of votes amongst the judges, the eldest judge shall have a casting vote.

Article 13.

Les membres de la Cour sont élus pour neuf ans.

Ils sont rééligibles.

Ils restent en fonction jusqu'à leur remplacement.
Après ce remplacement, ils continuent de connaître des affaires dont ils sont déjà saisis.

En cas de démission d'un membre de la Cour, la démission sera adressée au Président de la Cour, pour être transmise au Secrétaire général de la Société des Nations.

Cette dernière notification emporte vacance de siège.

Article 14.

Il est pourvu aux sièges devenus vacants selon la méthode suivie pour la première élection, sous réserve de la disposition ci-après : dans le mois qui suivra la vacance, le Secrétaire général de la Société des Nations procédera à l'invitation prescrite par l'article 5, et la date d'élection sera fixée par le Conseil dans sa première session.

b) PARTICIPATION A L'ÉLECTION DES JUGES D'UN ÉTAT NON MEMBRE DE LA SOCIÉTÉ, PARTIE AU STATUT DE LA COUR.

Résolution adoptée le 3 octobre 1936.

L'Assemblée,

Vu les dispositions du troisième alinéa de l'article 4 du Statut revisé de la Cour permanente de Justice internationale ;

Vu la proposition du Conseil¹ ;

Décide :

1° Que, si un Etat non membre de la Société et partie au Statut de la Cour signale au Secrétaire général son désir de participer à l'élection des membres de la Cour,

Article 13.

The members of the Court shall be elected for nine years. They may be re-elected.

They shall continue to discharge their duties until their places have been filled. Though replaced, they shall finish any cases which they may have begun.

In the case of the resignation of a member of the Court, the resignation will be addressed to the President of the Court for transmission to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations.

This last notification makes the place vacant.

Article 14.

Vacancies which may occur shall be filled by the same method as that laid down for the first election, subject to the following provision : the Secretary-General of the League of Nations shall, within one month of the occurrence of the vacancy, proceed to issue the invitations provided for in Article 5, and the date of the election shall be fixed by the Council at its next session.

**(b) PARTICIPATION IN THE ELECTION OF THE JUDGES
OF A STATE WHICH IS NOT A MEMBER OF THE LEAGUE
BUT IS A PARTY TO THE STATUTE OF THE COURT.**

Resolution adopted on October 3rd, 1936.

The Assembly,

Having regard to the provisions of the third paragraph of Article 4 of the revised Statute of the Permanent Court of International Justice ;

Having regard to the proposal of the Council ¹:

Decides that :

(1) If a State which is not a member of the League but is a party to the Statute of the Court notifies the Secretary-General of its desire to participate in the

cet Etat sera de plein droit admis à prendre part au vote au sein de l'Assemblée ;

(2) At any election of members of the Court which may take place before January 1st, 1940, Germany, Brazil and Japan, being States which are not members of the League but are parties to the Statute of the Court, if they notify their desire to do so to the Secretary-General, shall, as a provisional measure and without prejudging any question of principle, also be admitted to vote in the Council;

(3) The Secretary-General is instructed to take the necessary measures to allow States which, though parties to the Statute of the Court, are not members of the League of Nations to participate in the elections.

The questions on the agenda are usually divided between the main Committees of the Assembly in the following manner:

- First Committee: Legal questions.*
Second Committee: Economic and financial questions: communications and transit: health.
Third Committee: Limitation and reduction of armaments.
Fourth Committee: Budgetary and administrative questions.
Fifth Committee: Social questions: opium and other dangerous drugs.
Sixth Committee: Political questions: intellectual co-operation.

2. REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE LEAGUE SINCE THE LAST SESSION OF THE ASSEMBLY.

Each year the Secretary-General prepares a general report on the work of the League since the last session of the Assembly. This report is distributed in two parts, one in July, the other at the opening of the session.

The report forms the basis of the general discussion with which the session usually opens, and during which the various delegations have an opportunity of expressing their views on the work of the League.

The Assembly from time to time refers to the appropriate Committee chapters² of this report dealing with questions which do not appear separately on the agenda.

3. ELECTION OF NON-PERMANENT MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

The Assembly decided, on September 15th, 1926 (seventh session), to elect each year three non-permanent Members of the Council for a period of three years from the date of their election.

The mandates which expire in 1937 are those of Chile, Spain and Turkey.

4. RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE ASSEMBLY: MAINTENANCE OF THE RULE RELATING TO THE CONVOCATION OF THE FINANCE (FOURTH) COMMITTEE OF THE ASSEMBLY.

On October 10th, 1936 (seventeenth session), the Assembly decided that the rule relating to the convening of the Finance (Fourth) Committee, established as an experiment by the Assembly's resolution of October 11th, 1933 (fourteenth session), should be maintained for the session of 1937.

5. APPOINTMENTS.

(a) Supervisory Commission.¹

Under the existing decisions of the Assembly, the Assembly will be called upon to appoint, on the proposal of the Fourth Committee, five members of the Supervisory Commission.

The members whose term of office is due to expire at the end of 1937 are: M. S. Osusky (Czechoslovak), M. J. Réveillaud (French), Lord Meston of Agra (India), M. C. J. Hambro (Norwegian), M. Boris Stein (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics).

(b) Administrative Board of the Staff Pensions Fund.

The Assembly will be called upon to appoint, on the proposal of the Fourth Committee, a substitute member of the Board to replace Mr. C. Ridder van Rappard (Netherlands), who has resigned.

(c) Commission of Enquiry for European Union.

On October 8th, 1936 (seventeenth session), the Assembly decided to renew for twelve months the term of office of the Commission of Enquiry for European Union.

6. THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS AND MODERN MEANS OF SPREADING INFORMATION UTILISED IN THE CAUSE OF PEACE.

(a) Report of the International Committee on Intellectual Co-operation.

On October 10th, 1936 (seventeenth session), the Assembly invited the International Committee on Intellectual Co-operation to submit detailed suggestions to form the basis of the Assembly's discussions at its next ordinary session.

(b) Report of the Secretary-General.

On October 10th, 1936 (seventeenth session), the Assembly invited the Secretary-General to report on the technical means of spreading information at the disposal of the competent sections of the Secretariat, in order that the Assembly might consider whether such means are adequate or whether their further development is desirable.

7. NUTRITION.²

On October 8th, 1936 (seventeenth session), the Assembly decided to reappoint for one year the Mixed Committee on the Problem of Nutrition and instructed it to submit a final report to the next Assembly.

8. RAW MATERIALS.¹

On October 10th, 1936 (seventeenth session), the Assembly decided to request the Council to appoint a Committee to undertake the study of this question and report thereon. The Committee met from March 8th to 12th, 1937.

9. EMIGRATION.¹

On October 10th, 1936 (seventeenth session), the Assembly decided to place the question of emigration on the agenda of its next ordinary session.

10. URBAN AND RURAL HOUSING.¹

On October 8th, 1936 (seventeenth session), the Assembly requested the Council to invite the Economic, Financial and Health Committees and the International Labour Office to establish a suitable collaboration with a view to submitting to the next ordinary Assembly a general report on the question. On October 10th, 1936 (ninety-fourth session), the Council decided to give effect to the Assembly's resolution.

II. REFUGEES.

(a) Report of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

The Nansen International Office for Refugees is placed under the direction of the League of Nations in conformity with Article 24 of the Covenant, and submits an annual report to the Assembly on its activities.

(b) International Assistance to Refugees.

(i) Report of the President of the Governing Body of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

The date of the second session of the Committee is to be fixed by its President, after consultation with the Rapporteurs.

REPORT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL

(furnished in accordance with (3) of the Assembly Resolution of

Note by the Secretary-General:

1. The Secretary-General was invited by the Assembly in (3) of a resolution dated October 10th, 1936, "to report on the . . . technical means of spreading information at the disposal of the competent sections of the Secretariat, in order that the Assembly may consider at its next ordinary session whether such means are adequate or whether their further development is desirable". Accordingly, he has the honour to submit the following report, which he has caused to be prepared by the competent services of the Secretariat, in particular by the Information Section.

2. As the suggestions contained in this report would, if they were wholly or partly adopted by the Assembly, have some effect on the budget of the Information Section, the Secretary-General thought well to submit them first to the Supervisory Commission. But, at its May session, the Commission observed that the report had been asked for by the Assembly and therefore requested the Secretary-General to forward it as a whole to the Assembly, in order that that body might take a decision. If the Assembly accepted all or some of the proposals, the Supervisory Commission would then state its views on their budgetary aspect.

3. At the end of the report is a recapitulatory table giving the following figures for the chapters in the Information Section's budget: (1) financial period 1937; (2) present proposals for 1938 (document A.4.1937.X)¹; (3) proposals for 1938 on the supposition that the suggestions contained in this report are adopted.

4. The report by the International Committee on Intellectual Co-operation, which is asked for in (2) of the Assembly resolution of October 10th, 1936, will be communicated to the Assembly in document C.327.M.220.1937.XII: Report of the International Committee on Intellectual Co-operation on its Nineteenth Session—Part II.

The Secretary-General was thus requested to submit to the 1937 Assembly a report on the technical means at the disposal of the competent Sections of the Secretariat for the spreading of information in regard to the League, and it is understood that, in adopting paragraph 3 of the resolution, the Assembly had the Information Section specially in view.

The debate in the Sixth Committee showed that various speakers referred in particular to all means of spreading information that were available to the Secretariat and especially to the Information Section; stress was laid on the cinematograph and on broadcasting.

It is also clear from the discussion that, when the Sixth Committee asked the Secretary-General to make a report on this subject, it laid down a restriction to which it attached special importance—namely, that, in the proposals to be made, any idea of propaganda should be

rigorously excluded and that the technical methods employed by the Secretariat for informing public opinion as to the organisation and work of the League could be used only for the purpose of information and explanation. In drawing up the present note, the Secretary-General has held to the fundamental principle that the various means of information at the disposal of the competent Section form a homogeneous whole. The work of the Information Section is essentially the collection of information suitable for publication and, on the other hand, the selection of the most appropriate means of influencing public opinion.

Having regard to the subject to be dealt with, the public to be reached, and the language to be used (to mention these factors only), it may be found that sometimes a periodical publication, sometimes a brochure and sometimes merely a roneographed article or *communiqué*, or photographs, cinematograph films, or broadcast or telegraphic transmissions are most suitable.

In view of the many methods of information now available, it might be easy to suggest that funds amounting to several million Swiss francs should be placed at the Information Section's disposal. If the example of the propaganda organisations set up by many States were to be followed, the budget of the Section would have to be as large as that of an important Ministry of Press and Propaganda. But that was evidently not the Assembly's intention: in the first place, because there is no question of transforming the Information Section into an international Ministry of Propaganda; and, secondly, because the Section is necessarily obliged to remain within the budgetary and administrative limits laid down for the whole Secretariat.

In putting forward the following suggestions, endeavour has constantly been made to remain within reasonable limits, taking account of seventeen years of experience by the competent section and of recommendations that have been made for many years past by a number of organisations of various kinds in different countries, which are anxious to spread a knowledge of the League and of its work and apply to the Secretariat for the necessary information.

Care has been taken, in making these suggestions, not to go beyond the limits laid down for the Information Section's work in 1934 by the Supervisory Commission and by the Assembly, and also to avoid as far as possible any increase of staff.

I. COMMUNIQUÉS, ARTICLES (RONEOGRAPHED) AND OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS (PRINTED) DISTRIBUTED TO THE PRESS AND TO CERTAIN ORGANISATIONS AND PRIVATE INDIVIDUALS.

Generally speaking, this part of the Section's work seems to meet reasonable requirements. The only observation to be made is that it is becoming more and more necessary to despatch such publications by air, in order to keep pace with the growing rapidity in distribution of news throughout the world, due to air transport.

The Information Section and the Publications Service also agree that the "review copy" service—*i.e.*, the free distribution to newspapers, reviews and individual publicists of certain printed official documents that have just been issued—should be extended with the twofold purpose of making them better known to the public and of stimulating their sale.

In the same way, one branch of the Information Section's activity requires development—namely, the publicity given to technical publications and collections of the League in daily and periodical reviews specially devoted to such questions.

The Information Section, the Publications Service and the technical Sections of the Secretariat agree in proposing that the personnel of the Section should be increased by the addition of publicists specialised in particular subjects. This need for specialisation is particularly felt in the case of economic and financial publications.

It is therefore proposed that an expert publicist for economic and financial questions should be appointed to the Information Section. Having regard to the new system of grading Members of Section which came into force on January 1st, 1937, a post of "specialist" should be created for this purpose.

II. PRINTED PUBLICATIONS OF THE INFORMATION SECTION.

These are in three categories: brochures, *Fortnightly News* (specially intended for the overseas Press) and the *Monthly Summary*.

As regards the first two, the Section has at present a global credit of 20,000 francs, and for the third a credit of 65,000 francs. Owing to the devaluation of the Swiss franc, these sums were raised for 1937 to 28,000 francs and 91,000 francs respectively.

I. Brochures, "*Fortnightly News*".

The above credit of 20,000 francs is at present used in the first place for an *annual publication* on the League's work; this is the only concise *résumé* that treats the subject methodically and chronologically from year to year, apart from the Secretary-General's Annual Report, which is

voluminous and difficult to consult for those unfamiliar with the League's organisation and work. "The League from Year to Year" is used as a book of reference by publicists and the Press, as well as by students and research workers, to whom it is of great value.

Secondly, the above credit is used for the publication of "Essential Facts about the League of Nations". This is a handbook, easily consulted, and containing brief and accurate information on the main features of the League's work and organisation. It is published in English, French, German, Italian and Spanish, and thousands of copies are sold every year. It meets a definite want, and all that can be said in regard to it is that it might well be re-edited more frequently than is the case with the funds at present available, in the most widespread languages other than English and French.

The credit is also drawn upon for the printing of *Fortnightly News*, which is an information sheet issued in English, French and Spanish every fifteen days. Its style and make-up render it specially suitable for Press agencies and newspapers. It is sent chiefly to overseas countries in which the Press, especially the provincial Press, fails to receive sufficient definite and practical information from Geneva through the ordinary agencies and newspaper correspondents. Now that the *News* appears every fortnight instead of once a month and is sent by air mail, it is very useful and is much appreciated, and for the moment there is no need to suggest any change. But in the future more frequent issues corresponding to the rapid increase in overseas air mail services may become desirable.

When the cost of printing the three above-mentioned publications has been met, there remain a few thousand francs out of the credit of 20,000 francs, and these are used for issuing small volumes or pamphlets on various subjects.

Thus, during recent years, an important volume has been published jointly with the Intellectual Co-operation Section on "The Aims, Methods and Activity of the League of Nations". This volume appeared in 1935 and will soon require revision and reprinting. Other publications have dealt with the "Saar Plebiscite", the "Settlement of the Assyrians", and the "Problem of Nutrition"; also with economic questions and with the new League buildings. Lack of funds has prevented these occasional publications from appearing rapidly and regularly, and a number of interesting subjects have had to be left on one side.

To meet reasonable applications for information that are constantly reaching the Secretariat from many sources, from eight to ten publicity brochures on different subjects, some technical, should be issued, either by the Information Section itself or in co-operation with other Sections.

Provision should also be made each year for a series of small booklets on current subjects, with the object of drawing attention to the most important events in the League's activity. The success of these booklets would largely depend on their appearing almost simultaneously with the occurrences to which they relate (speeches or important reports, official publications for immediate information, etc.).

The new Ariana buildings will be completed during 1938, and it would be well if an album with a detailed description of the whole edifice were provided for; it should contain good illustrations and be proportionate to the importance of the new League premises and the works of art they contain.

Experience has shown that publicity pamphlets cannot attain their object unless some of them appear in languages other than English and French. The absence of such translations is often the cause of justifiable complaint.

Having regard to the above, the publications budget of the Information Section might be drawn up as follows:

The above credits would reappear each year, save that of 30,000 francs for the Illustrated Album.

2. "Monthly Summary".

The present credit for the *Monthly Summary* (English, French, German, Italian and Spanish editions, and a contribution to the edition in Czech), is 65,000 francs. This is the only League publication that gives a complete and practical account regularly and at short intervals of all League events. As an instrument of work, it is indispensable for anyone who, for the purpose of his profession or for other reasons, desires to follow the League's work regularly, without having to refer constantly to a mass of official documents.

The complaint has often been made that the style and form of this publication are somewhat severe. It is difficult to remedy this; for a greater freedom in style or in the subjects treated would remove this review from its position as a succinct but rigorously correct account of the League's work.

It might, however, be given a wider scope by the occasional insertion of a speech or a declaration, or a specially interesting report.

There are other possibilities when the *Monthly Summary* is regarded from the aspect of presentation. Here, it is true, much improvement might be made on the lines of the numerous information publications issued by Governments which, while they are just as official, are more attractively presented. The cover, size, quality of paper and type might all be improved.

The official character of the publication would not prevent the improvement of an article on a political subject by the addition of a map, or by graphs or schedules in the case of articles on economic or financial subjects. There would be many opportunities of inserting from time to time photographs, either of a distinguished League personality, or of important events.

To enable such a transformation to be made, the credit for the *Monthly Summary* would have to be increased. The Publications Service has reached the conclusion that, if it were raised from 65,000 to 117,000 francs, a more attractive presentation might be realised, without the *Summary* losing its character of an official publication.

III. INFORMATION BY WIRELESS CONCERNING THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS
(BROADCASTING AND TELEGRAPHY).

Since the Radio-Nations Station was constructed in 1932, the Information Section has arranged for weekly broadcasts, which are on short waves and consequently intended chiefly for overseas countries.

In 1935, the Section started weekly telegraphic transmissions on both long and short waves. The cost of these two classes of transmissions is at present covered by a credit of 10,570 francs, of which about 4,570 francs is for broadcasting and about 6,000 francs for telegraphy.

When Radio-Nations began to operate, experience in a number of countries had already shown that broadcasting has only a limited value for the transmission of news, properly so called. The transmission of such news for reproduction by the Press is done much more effectively by radiotelegraphy (morse) than by broadcasting; the latter is essentially suitable for the issue of information bulletins and lectures destined, not for the Press, but for the public.

This is especially true as regards the League, which, unlike a national station, cannot use only one language for the diffusion of information, and can only attain its purpose by employing several languages. For this purpose, a complicated and costly organisation would be necessary, such as would probably give rise to complaints from the Press, as was the case in several countries with regard to national broadcasting. Accordingly, the Information Section, as soon as it began to make use of wireless, employed broadcasting for information bulletins and lectures, relayed in some cases by national stations, and subsequently it employed radiotelegraphy for the transmission of news.

In view of the foregoing, the following suggestions are made. Account has been taken of the fact that all League transmission is necessarily of an official character and cannot go beyond the limits of information and explanation of an objective character.

A. BROADCASTING.

I. Short-wave Transmissions.

At present, the Radio Service makes the following short wave transmissions each week:

- (a) One in English for the North-American continent;
- (b) One in English for Australia and New Zealand;
- (c) One in Spanish for Latin America;
- (d) One in French for certain French colonies and districts of the American continent in which French is the chief language.

The Section also arranges periodically for the re-transmission of broadcasts by national stations. These deal generally with subjects of special interest to certain countries and the speakers are usually delegates.

Each of these transmissions lasts from ten to fifteen minutes. The total time is 70 hours per year, including trials.

From the above it will be seen that certain large areas of the world, such as North and South Africa, the Near East, India and the Far East, are not touched by the existing service. The total period of transmission should therefore be increased from 70 to 140 hours.

In making these proposals, it is necessary to add that the purpose of these transmissions is both to secure a greater number of direct listeners on short waves¹ and also to encourage the re-transmission of our broadcasts by national stations. Experience gained from broadcasts to Australia and New Zealand and also, less regularly, to North and South America show that there are considerable possibilities of development in this field.

Recent improvements in wireless sets have also made it possible to receive Radio-Nations in certain countries of the European continent: for instance, in the north of the United Kingdom, where a growing number of English and Scotch listeners take an interest in our transmissions. The increase of the transmission hours proposed above would enable certain wave-lengths to be used that would improve reception in the above European countries.

2. *Broadcasting to Europe.*

But in order to arrange for satisfactory broadcasting to the whole of Europe—for which the League is often asked—other means than short waves must be available. The most effective, but the most costly method, would be the building of a special long- or medium-wave transmitter. For various reasons, this idea is set aside.

On the other hand, it would be possible to arrange for indirect broadcasting, through national stations, of information bulletins or lectures recorded at Geneva by the Information Section. This has become possible since the acceptance by the League two years ago of a gift from the Netherlands Committee of the Carnegie Foundation, which has enabled the Section to purchase the necessary apparatus. But to permit of its use, a sum must be provided in the Section's budget for buying the material necessary for registration (gramophone records, etc.). The apparatus would primarily be used for broadcasting to Europe, but it might at the same time be of great service for transmissions further afield, especially by enabling the system of radio reporting to be developed. It would thus be easier than it is at present to enable delegates to speak to their own countries during their stay in Geneva.

3. *Transmission of Assembly, and in certain cases, of Council Debates.*

Delegates have frequently asked the Secretariat to arrange for transmissions of their speeches in the Assembly, generally for relay by one of their national stations. Many such transmissions have been arranged.² The New Zealand Government even suggested that this method should be employed regularly when the discussion permitted (see *Official Journal*, Special Supplement, No. 154, page 8). As such transmissions fall outside the present programme, and outside that proposed above, a special credit would have to be inserted in the budget for this purpose.

The Section's budget for broadcasting should therefore be composed as follows:

¹ The latest models of radio sets have for some time been adapted for receiving short waves. Thus, Radio-Nations' field of activity is always extending, not only in overseas countries, but also in certain countries on the edge of the European continent.

² At the request of the Egyptian Government the proceedings of the special Assembly for the admission of Egypt to the League were broadcast to Egypt.

In order to carry out this programme, it is essential that the Section should in future have at its disposal a specialist in broadcasting work. Formerly, there was on the staff an official of sufficient experience belonging to the intermediate class. In order to secure a competent successor familiar with the new profession of "announcer", it became apparent that a higher salary than that of the intermediate class must be offered. It is therefore proposed that the former intermediate post be transformed, according to the new system of grading, into one of "specialist".

B. WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

The experience of the League and also that of many Governments has shown that the best method of diffusing information for publication is by radiotelegraphy. Of course, there is no intention of replacing the telegraphic information sent by a large number of news agencies from Geneva, but rather of completing it, as is now done by the similar services that have been established for some time by various Governments.

The information in telegraphic form is sent out at fixed hours; the transmitting station gives previous notice to all stations likely to be interested, of the length of the transmission, the language used, the rate of transmission, etc. Most receiving stations either belong to Governments or to large private companies—there are generally one or two in each country—and arrangements must then be made on the spot for the forwarding to the Press of the information received. These arrangements are necessarily different in different countries, according to local circumstances.

In virtue of the International Telegraphic Convention, the Press is not authorised to use so-called "multiple" telegrams addressed to Governments unless the latter place them at its disposal.

Another method authorised by the Convention is the issue of so-called "C.Q." telegrams, which may be freely received by any person or institution authorised to work radiotelegraphic stations.

When the League Secretariat, as an inter-Governmental institution, began, in September 1935, to send information by radiotelegraphy, it naturally preferred the first method. The beginnings were on a small scale and consisted of one transmission per week of 400 words, in English, Spanish and French; the first two of these, on short waves, were intended for extra-European countries, and the third, on long waves,¹ for Europe, making a total of 1,200 words per week.

The Secretary-General informed all Governments of States Members by circular of the inauguration of the service, and many of them have given the necessary instructions for reception; but it has not been possible to make up a list of such countries.

The Information Section has several times endeavoured to ascertain the utility of this service to different countries. The general impression is that it is only limited and will have no possibility of development until there is a daily transmission.

The reception of circular and multiple telegrams and their transmission to the Press is for receiving-stations essentially a matter of organisation. A daily service is of more interest to them than a weekly one. The Press holds the same view. Moreover, all Governments that issue news by radiotelegraphy through agencies or Press bureaux do so daily.

The Information Section feels bound to confirm the result of this experience. If its service is to be of any real value, there must be daily transmissions. The difficulty, of course, is that the service must be strictly limited to news concerning the League and of an official character, and also that the volume of information available varies greatly throughout the year.

For this reason, the Section proposes to arrange, during quiet periods, for a service of an average of 100 words per day per language, there being six transmissions each week, in English, French and Spanish. During periods of considerable activity, the daily average would be raised to 1,000 words per language. The use of other languages might be considered at a later stage, if the need is felt.

An approximate calculation shows that the 1,000-word service would be necessary for 55 days each year—namely, 20 days for ordinary Council sessions, 20 days during the Assembly, and 15 days for extraordinary Council and Assembly meetings and for important conferences or committees. Excluding Sundays, there would therefore remain 260 days when the daily service would consist of an average of 100 words per language.

Experience has also shown that, for various reasons, a number of Governments desire certain words to be repeated, and a margin of 30% should be allowed for this.

¹ It may be observed that, in contradistinction to broadcasting, Radio-Nations has a long wave for radio-telegraphy which may be received in all parts of Europe.

IV. FILMS, PHOTOGRAPHS AND LANTERN SLIDES.

The credit now available to the Section for these three forms of visual information is 6,000 francs. It is manifestly insufficient for the proper working of even one of the three forms.

I. Cinematographic Service.

The Secretariat has for a long time been asked from several quarters to produce films on the League.

Some hold that these films should bring out primarily the principles and ideals of the institution, without paying too much attention to the material facts of its organisation and to the work it has done. Others consider that the films should be informative and should describe the manner in which the League works and the principal results it has secured.

For the Information Section, the second of these conceptions is alone realisable. A film on such lines would be an instrument of information, whereas a film which brought out a certain ideological conception of the League would evidently rank as propaganda.

With the very small funds at its disposal, the Information Section has endeavoured to respond to the frequent applications made to it by producing purely documentary films on several occasions. The method used by it was to secure from private cinematograph companies, who from time to time asked permission to film various League activities, free copies of their films. The somewhat heterogeneous material thus obtained was then put together and, in certain cases, provided with a running commentary and a number of "captions". Films of this sort, which were quite insufficient, cost a few thousand francs. They were frequently used, especially in overseas countries, and during 1936-7 were shown to visitors to the new League buildings. Though they were sometimes severely criticised, they have shown above all that the documentary film is one of the best means of information at the League's disposal, provided always that the material is up to the standard of modern technique and is kept up to date. The cinematograph industry in certain countries has been busy perfecting a new technique for use especially in documentary and school films, and this technique would in the view of experts be specially suitable for the requirements of the Information Section.

All this seems to show:

(a) That, if the Secretariat desires to have cinematographic material of good quality for information purposes, it can only employ to a small extent the material produced by "current news" companies. The documentary film as a whole is based on a different conception from that of the pictures taken by news services.

(b) That the Information Section is not, and could not be, save at considerable expense, itself equipped to produce documentary films of the trade dimensions that are asked of it.

There is therefore only one solution: to apply to firms that specialise in the production of documentary films, giving them precise instructions as to scenario, and affording them the necessary assistance. The production of even a short film is, however, costly. After enquiries made from several firms, it appears here that 75,000 francs would be necessary for the production in English and French of a sound film of a general character, to illustrate a lecture on the League, and of a length of about 3,000 feet (duration 36 minutes). Such films could be reduced to 16 mm. size for use in supplementing League of Nations teaching in schools.

The production of a film each year reviewing the League's work, or alternatively the production of several shorter films on various aspects of its work, would meet demands that are constantly made of the League from all parts of the world to help lecturers; at the same time, it would meet the wishes of the numerous visitors who, when they come to see the League buildings, ask for a film and a commentary—both of which must be up to date. Such films could be sold or lent.

But, beside the production of documentary films, there is another aspect of the question of cinematography: the supply of "news reels" which would be shown with the "current news". "News reels" are a sort of filmed information bulletin and play a part of ever-growing importance in the instruction and information of the masses in almost all countries. It is important that the League's work should be given a place in these news reels as much as in the columns of the newspapers. From time to time, but at very irregular intervals and too seldom, private companies send special representatives to Geneva to produce such "news reels" or current news films.

Here, too, the Information Section would be mistaken if it were to try to take the place of private initiative, which, on the contrary, should be encouraged. But the Section must supplement private effort by offering information films, produced at its own expense by competent professionals, for insertion in the "current news", in the same way as it supplies the Press with *communiqués* and information articles.

The two foregoing proposals relate to films of so-called "commercial" size (35 mm.). But experience shows that there is another type of cinematographic activity that must not be neglected—the school film, a narrow or "small" film (16 mm.). The Information Section has many opportunities not open to private interests of producing at fairly low cost some of the raw material essential for such films. Such material in the form of short lengths of film could be used to great advantage in the construction of educational films by voluntary effort. For this purpose, the Section must have a good film camera, such as many private individuals now possess.

The equipment must be completed by a lantern for the same type of film; the credit involved must also cover the purchase of film and the cost of development.¹

A cinematographic organisation on such lines might do useful work and would at the same time avoid the engagement of special staff and the purchase of costly apparatus.

The credits involved would be as follows:

2. Photographic Service.

Since the League was first formed, the daily Press has been steadily increasing its pages of photographs. And at the same time, besides the ordinary Press, a special "illustrated" Press has developed. In consequence, these various classes of newspapers have for many years been asking, more and more insistently, for a regular supply of photographs concerning the League of Nations, in the same way as the ordinary Press is furnished by a regular service with *communiqués*, articles, etc.

The Information Section has always held that private initiative should above all be encouraged in this field—i.e., that pictures should be taken by newspapers themselves or by special agencies. But experience has shown that it is desirable to supplement this by the taking of photographs

at League expense. Geneva has no photographic agency of sufficient importance, and professional photographers from foreign agencies come very irregularly to the League headquarters. Moreover, it is not only the Press that asks for photographs. Similar demands are constantly received from delegates, League officials sent on mission, lecturers, private associations, schools, etc.

A service of this nature is all the more indispensable because the entry of the League into its new premises has much increased the demand for photographs. These are required for reproduction. Picture postcards are also much in request, large quantities having been sold this year. At present we are endeavouring to satisfy both demands, but it is necessary that the credits for the purpose should be increased.

Provision should be made in the budget of the photographic service for the following:

3. *Lantern Slides (including films for projection in lanterns).*

Many countries in which the use of narrow cinema films in private meetings and in schools is still difficult owing to lack of apparatus are constantly asking us for lantern slides. The old type of magic lantern using expensive glass slides is being replaced by more modern types using strips of film the cost of which is negligible compared with slides. The purchase of an apparatus of this kind is desirable.

In our experience, a series of from 40 to 60 slides (or an equivalent length of film) should be made in 50 copies; each separate series would be accompanied by an explanatory text. This stock could be used for sale and for loan. To keep the stock up to date, a credit of 1,400 francs should be provided.

The total credit for films, photographs and lantern slides would thus be:

But such a service could not work effectively unless the Members of Section in charge of the three branches had at their disposal a clerk to assist them. He would take views, develop them, supervise the photographers, keep stocks of photos, lantern slides, etc., up to date, help cinematograph operators and have many other duties to perform.

Hitherto, the Internal Services had kindly placed at the disposal of the Information Section a young assistant who has already specialised in this class of work. He has just been definitely transferred to the Information Section.

V. LECTURERS.

It often happens that the Secretariat, and especially the Information Section, is asked to delegate an official to give a lecture either on the League in general or on a special aspect of its work or organisation.

The Secretary-General has frequently authorised officials to give lectures subject to certain restrictions, which are, moreover, laid down in the Staff Regulations (see Article 5 and Annex 4 of those Regulations). But it has often been felt desirable that the League should have professional lecturers at its disposal, for giving lectures either at the seat of the League or elsewhere.

The question has not been sufficiently studied for definite suggestions to be made at the moment; but, if the Assembly agrees, proposals on the subject might be made next year.

VI. MATERIAL FOR EXHIBITIONS.

In the same way, the question of the League's participation in exhibitions has often arisen. This is a valuable means of informing the public at large of the League's work and organisation. But such participation requires careful preparation and special skill in the presentation of exhibits. On this subject also, if the Assembly so desires, proposals in detail could be made next year.

**FINAL REGULATIONS
for the First Elections in the Sanjak
of Alexandretta**

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i. REPORT OF THE COUNCIL COMMITTEE

I.

[Translation.]

The Committee set up by the Council's resolution of January 31st, 1938, consisting of the representatives of Belgium, the United Kingdom, France, Sweden and Turkey, sat at Geneva from March 7th to 19th, under the chairmanship of the representative of Sweden.

2. The following sat as members of the Committee:

For Belgium:	M. BOURQUIN;
For the United Kingdom:	Mr. RENDEL, and subsequently Mr. BOWKER;
For France:	M. DE TESSAN, and subsequently M. LAGARDE, assisted by M. LUCIEN-HUBERT;
For Sweden:	M. WESTMAN;
For Turkey:	M. MENEMENCIOLU, assisted by M. SADAK.

3. The Committee's terms of reference are laid down in the Council's resolution of January 31st, 1938, as follows:

"Within the limits of the provisions and texts adopted by the Council on May 29th, 1937, and accepted by France and Turkey, a Committee of the Council, consisting of representatives of Belgium, the United Kingdom, France, Sweden and Turkey, will endeavour to make such modifications as may prove necessary in the regulations drawn up by the Electoral Commission. The President of the Electoral Commission will afford the Committee his assistance. The Committee's decisions must be unanimous."

"In the probable event of this work's being completed before the Council's next session, the Committee will submit to the President of the Council the regulations finally adopted by it. The President of the Council will then immediately communicate those regulations to the mandatory Power, on behalf of the Council, for promulgation in the Sanjak."

"Furthermore, the Committee will take the decisions mentioned in paragraphs 8 and 9 of the report adopted by the Council on May 29th, 1937, concerning, on the one hand, the appointment of officials and staff, and, on the other, the date of the first elections, it being understood that it will postpone the latest date mentioned (April 15th, 1938) as far as may be necessary."

II.

4. The Committee proceeded to discuss in their order the articles of the Regulations drawn up by the Electoral Commission. It took note of the Turkish Government's observations, which were laid before it in the form of a counter-draft by that Government's representative on the Committee.

Mr. REID, President of the Electoral Commission, whose co-operation the Committee greatly appreciated, was invited to be present at the discussions, and furnished all additional information necessary for the study of the texts.

5. After introducing such amendments as seemed necessary into the text drawn up by the Electoral Commission, the Committee unanimously decided upon the final text of the Regulations.

6. The Committee considers it superfluous to comment in detail upon the amendments it has made in the Regulations as drawn up by the Commission. It would merely make the following observations:

(a) In regard to the penal provisions, the Committee decided, on the proposal of the representatives of France and Turkey, that they should be applied by a special tribunal composed of nationals of members of the League of Nations other than France and Turkey.

(b) It was thought superfluous to retain Article 7 of the Regulations drawn up by the Commission, which deals with the "patronage" of candidatures; since it is patent that the authorities of the Sanjak could in no case extend their patronage to candidates.

(c) The expression "public officials" as used in the Regulations, refers not merely to officials in the strict sense, but also to gendarmes and members of the police and military forces.

(d) The Committee recommends that, when the Chairman of a board has to have an elector arrested under the powers vested in him by paragraph 3 of Article 13, he should take steps to ensure that such arrest shall not have the effect of preventing the elector from exercising his right to vote.

(e) In order to expedite the proceedings, it was agreed that the authorities should bring to the notice of the communities the lists of representatives drawn up at the time of the Commission's first visit to the Sanjak, and should call the attention of the communities to the number and nature of the bodies to which community representatives are to be attached, and to the fact that it is open to the communities either to confirm the appointment of those representatives or to appoint others. The authorities will communicate the lists so established to the Commission immediately upon its arrival in the Sanjak.

(f) Needless to say, it is for the authority exercising executive power to take the necessary steps to convene at the earliest possible date the first Assembly, chosen through the legislative elections.

III.

7. Under the terms of the Council's resolution, it is for the Committee to appoint the officials and staff required to enable the Electoral Commission to discharge its duties. A list of persons appointed by the Committee is appended to this report.¹ The Committee has instructed its Chairman to fix the terms of the engagement of each of these officials. The letters of appointment will be signed by the Secretary-General of the League.

Disciplinary questions affecting these persons will be settled by the Commission.

As regards interpreters and subordinate staff, the Committee felt that the Electoral Commission should be free to engage them for itself in whatever manner it might think best.

8. Lastly, it rested with the Committee to determine the date of the first elections, postponing what was originally fixed as the latest date, *viz.*, April 15th, 1938. The Committee accordingly decided that the elections should in any event be completed by July 15th, 1938, on the understanding that the Electoral Commission would do its utmost to complete the proceedings by June 30th, 1938.

2. REGULATIONS
FOR THE FIRST ELECTIONS IN THE SANJAK OF ALEXANDRETTA

(Text finally decided upon by the Council Committee.)

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[Translation.]

CHAPTER I. — GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Article 1.

The term "Commission" as hereinafter employed shall mean the Commission provided for in Article 15 of the Fundamental Law of the Sanjak of Alexandretta—hereinafter referred to as the Fundamental Law—and appointed by the Council of the League of Nations to organise and supervise the whole of the proceedings involved in the first elections to the Assembly of the Sanjak of Alexandretta—hereinafter referred to as the Assembly—the territory of the Sanjak being delimited in Article 4 of the Statute of the Sanjak¹—hereinafter referred to as the Statute.

A. THE COMMISSION.

Article 2.

The Commission shall finally decide all questions, and settle, on its own authority, all disputes, arising out of the electoral proceedings.

The decisions taken by the Commission within the limits of its powers shall override all other decisions.

The decisions of the Commission shall be taken by a majority of the members present.

Article 3.

The Commission shall have power:

(a) To decide upon an application from any of the persons referred to in Article 9, paragraph 2, and Article 12 of the Statute, who, not having been registered prior to the beginning of the electoral proceedings, may ask leave to establish his right to take part therein;

(b) To decide upon any complaint from a person who deems himself wrongfully deprived of the right to be registered and to vote, and to take steps to secure the free exercise of those rights to any person who may allege that pressure of any kind whatsoever has been brought to bear upon him;

(c) To decide any disputes that may arise as to whether certain persons were actually "established" in the territory of the Sanjak prior to January 1st, 1937, within the meaning of Article 9 of the Statute, as interpreted by paragraph 21 of the Report of the Committee of Experts.¹

Article 4.

The Commission, the section and constituency election boards, and the Committee of Appeal, shall be assisted by representatives of the communities referred to in Article 15 of the Fundamental Law and, if necessary, of the communities referred to in Article 9.

Accordingly, each of the aforesaid communities shall appoint a representative or representatives to each of these bodies, and a substitute or substitutes to replace them in case of need.

The Commission shall consult the community representatives on questions connected with the electoral proceedings on which it may have to decide in plenary session. It shall itself determine the conditions of such consultation.

Article 5.

If a community representative or, in his default, his substitute, on being duly summoned, fails to attend any of the proceedings at which his attendance is required by these regulations, such proceedings may nevertheless take place, and shall not be invalidated by his absence.

Should a community representative engage in systematic obstruction, the Chairman may temporarily—or, if need be, permanently—deprive him of the rights with which he was invested.

He shall then be replaced by his substitute, or, if he has no substitute, by a new representative appointed by the community concerned.

Should the substitute or new representative likewise engage in systematic obstruction, and should the Chairman then take similar action against him, the proceedings shall none the less be deemed to be valid.

The absence of the Mukhtar from any of the proceedings at which his attendance is required by these Regulations shall not invalidate such proceedings.

Article 6.

The Commission shall appoint a committee of three persons selected either from its own members or from the officials appointed by the League of Nations.

This committee, after affording the community representatives an opportunity of stating their views, shall finally decide, on behalf of the Commission, all appeals lodged under the terms of Chapter II of these Regulations.

The committee's decision upon any appeal shall not be valid unless the committee is so composed as to include no member who shared in the responsibility for the decision complained of.

B. SPECIAL TRIBUNAL.

Article 7.

A special tribunal shall be set up to deal with the offences contemplated in Chapter VII of these Regulations.

The tribunal shall be composed of a judge and two deputies.

The auxiliary staff (clerks, interpreters, etc.) required by the tribunal shall be supplied by the local judicial authorities.

C. ELECTORAL PROCEEDINGS.

Article 8.

The object of the electoral proceedings is to elect, by the system defined in these Regulations, the Assembly of the Sanjak, which shall consist of a single chamber of forty members.

Article 9.

The electoral proceedings shall comprise three successive operations:

- (a) Registration of electors according to communities;
- (b) Elections at the first stage;
- (c) Elections at the second stage.

Article 10.

For all electoral proceedings the constituency shall be the caza. The voting section shall be the nahié or quarter; two voting sections may be established in the same nahié or quarter. An election board shall be responsible for the proceedings in each constituency and in each voting section.

Article 11.

(a) The election boards referred to in the preceding article shall consist:

(i) For each voting section:

Of one or more members of the Commission or of delegates selected from among the officials appointed by the League of Nations, who shall sit in a deliberative capacity, together with the Mukhtar of the village or quarter concerned in the proceedings and one or more representatives appointed by each of the communities enumerated in Article 15 of the Fundamental Law.

In sections where this may be found necessary, the "Kurdish community" and the "other communities" referred to in Article 9 of the Fundamental Law shall be invited to appoint representatives. The Mukhtar and the community representatives shall sit in an advisory capacity.

(2) For each constituency:

Of three members selected from the members of the Commission or the officials appointed by the League of Nations, who shall sit in a deliberative capacity, together with one or more representatives appointed by each of the communities enumerated in Article 15 of the Fundamental Law.

In constituencies in which this may be found necessary, the "Kurdish community" and the "other communities" referred to in Article 9 of the Fundamental Law shall be invited to appoint representatives. The community representatives shall sit in an advisory capacity.

(b) The Commission shall appoint the Chairmen and the members sitting in a deliberative capacity.

Article 12.

The election boards of the voting sections shall be responsible for the following proceedings:

- (a) Registration of electors at the first stage;
- (b) Election of electors at the second stage.

Article 13.

The policing of the premises of the section and constituency boards shall be a matter for the Chairmen of such boards. No armed force may be stationed on such premises except on their instructions.

Throughout the period of the elections, the Sanjak authorities shall be required to comply with the recommendations of the Chairmen of the boards in regard to police arrangements in connection with the electoral proceedings.

In the event of disorder or acts of violence, the Chairman of the board may suspend the proceedings. He may cause any person whose conduct disturbs, or threatens to disturb, the maintenance of order to be arrested and kept temporarily in custody.

Article 14.

Should it be materially impossible for the Chairman of an election board to conduct the registration or voting proceedings, he may postpone such proceedings until a later date.

CHAPTER II. — REGISTRATION.

Article 15.

The purpose of the registration of electors is to determine the number of electors at the second stage and the number of deputies to which the various communities in the Sanjak as a whole and in each caza will be entitled.

Article 16.

A person shall be registered as an elector at the first stage only if:

- (1) He is a male citizen of the Sanjak within the meaning of Articles 8 to 12 of the Statute;
- (2) He was born prior to July 1st, 1918;
- (3) He has not forfeited the right to vote through being sentenced to loss of civil rights or through a personal disability established by law and duly recorded by the competent authority.

Article 17.

In accordance with Article 9 of the Fundamental Law, electors at the first stage shall register with the board referred to in Article 12 dealing with registration as members of one of the following communities: "Turkish community", "Alawite community", "Arab community", "Armenian community", "Greek Orthodox community", "Kurdish community", "other communities".

It shall be the duty of every person qualified as an elector at the first stage to register.

The Commission shall fix the dates for the registration of electors. It shall give publicity to the foregoing provisions by appropriate means.

If for paramount reasons registration cannot be effectively carried out in the place prescribed, the Chairman of the board may decide temporarily to transfer the seat of the board elsewhere. In such case, he shall inform the public of the place and date of registration.

Article 18.

Registration shall be effected with the following boards:

In the case of electors who have acquired Sanjak citizenship under Article 9, paragraph 1, of the Statute and are resident in the Sanjak: with the appropriate board for the place in which they were habitually resident on March 31st, 1938. Nevertheless, public officials shall register with the appropriate board for the place in which they are serving at the time of registration;

In the case of electors who have acquired Sanjak citizenship under Article 9, paragraph 1, of the Statute but are no longer resident in the Sanjak: with the appropriate board for the place in which they resided before their departure;

In the case of electors registered under Article 9, paragraph 2, of the Statute: with the appropriate board for the place in which such registration took place;

In the case of electors who have acquired Sanjak citizenship under Article 12 of the Statute: with the board at the principal centre of the caza in which is situated the place in which they themselves (paragraph (a) of that Article) or their fathers (paragraph (b) of that Article) were born.

Article 19.

Each elector at the first stage shall apply in person before the board, and shall state in good faith:

- (1) His name and his father's name;
- (2) His place of birth;
- (3) His age;
- (4) His habitual place of residence on March 31st, 1938;
- (5) The community to which he belongs.

The applicant shall be presumed to be a member of the community to which he declares himself to belong. Nevertheless, should the representative of any community so request, the Chairman of the board may formally question the applicant as to the truth of his declaration. If he then confirms it and publicly affirms that his decision was freely reached, he shall be registered accordingly.

Article 20.

Should the board consider that an elector has made a false declaration with a view to obtaining registration for which he is not qualified, the Chairman shall intimate his refusal to register him and shall, thereupon, draw up a formal record of the case. The applicant may appeal against such a decision within seven days.

Article 21.

No person may register more than once.

Article 22.

The representative of any community on the board shall be entitled to object to registration on the grounds:

That the applicant does not possess all the qualifications necessary to become an elector, or

That, though qualified, he is not entitled to be registered by the board to which he has applied.

All objections must be accompanied by a statement of grounds and must be raised at the time of application, failing which they may not be entertained.

Article 23.

The Chairman shall hear the arguments both of the person raising an objection and of the applicant. He may take the opinion of the authorities and representatives of communities and may obtain any necessary information.

His decision shall be rendered at the current meeting of the board.

Negative decisions shall be accompanied by a statement of grounds and recorded. Those concerned shall be informed of their right of appeal.

Article 24.

The Chairman of the board may, of his own motion, raise either of the considerations set out in Article 22.

In such cases, he shall hear the arguments of the applicant and of the representatives of the communities concerned, obtain any material information and, if necessary, take the opinion of the authorities and render his decision at the current meeting of the board.

Article 25.

Should the Chairman not consider the evidence at his disposal sufficient, he may, as an exceptional measure, postpone his decision.

In such a case the decision, which shall be taken with the least possible delay, shall be communicated in writing to the applicant, to the person raising the objection and to the representative of the community or communities concerned, together with an intimation of their right to appeal to the Commission.

Registrations which are not opposed at the time cannot, thereafter, be called into question.

Article 26.

All appeals must:

- (a) Refer to a dispute raised in the course of the registration proceedings;
- (b) Reach the Committee of Appeal provided for in Article 6 within seven days following the verbal delivery of the contested decision or the despatch of the letter notifying the applicant of such decision;
- (c) Indicate in what particulars and on what grounds it is sought to reverse the contested decision;
- (d) Be accompanied by all such documents as are required to support the appeal.

Article 27.

The Committee of Appeal shall refuse to entertain any appeal not fulfilling the conditions laid down in the preceding article.

Should it decide that the appeal is in good and due form, the Committee, after assembling whatever material it deems necessary for its decision, shall advise the appellant, together with the representative of the community or communities concerned, of the place, date and time at which the appeal will be heard.

On the date fixed the Committee shall hear the persons notified, or, failing them, their appointed representatives.

The grounds of the Committee's decision shall not be stated, nor shall such decisions be subject to appeal. They shall take effect immediately and be communicated in writing to those concerned.

Article 28.

On registration, each duly registered elector shall receive from the Chairman of the board a card, the possession of which will qualify him to vote in the elections at the first stage.

Such card shall bear the number under which the applicant has been entered in the register of his community in the order of his application to the board.

The electors' cards of the various communities shall be of different colours.

Article 29.

During the registration proceedings the registers and other relevant documents shall, at the end of the day, be sealed with the Chairman's seal in the presence of the members of the board. The removal of the seals shall be effected in like manner.

The day after the termination of the registration proceedings for which it is responsible, each board shall count those registered as belonging to the several communities.

Should the count not be completed the same day, the registers and relevant documents shall be sealed in the manner described in the first paragraph of the present article.

On the completion of the count, a record shall be drawn up in duplicate and signed by the members of the board sitting in a deliberative capacity.

Article 30.

As soon as the registration proceedings are completed and the disputes to which they may give rise are disposed of, the Commission shall publish in French, Turkish and Arabic the list of electors at the first stage, with particulars of the villages or quarters to which they belong and the communities in which they are registered.

CHAPTER III. — ALLOCATION OF SEATS IN THE ASSEMBLY AND DETERMINATION OF THE NUMBER OF ELECTORS AT THE SECOND STAGE.

Article 31.

After consideration of the results of the registration proceedings, the Commission shall decide, in the manner prescribed below, the number of electors at the second stage and of the deputies to which the various communities shall be entitled in the Sanjak as a whole and in each caza, in accordance with Articles 5, 10 and 11 of the Fundamental Law.

Article 32.

For each community there shall be one elector at the second stage for 100 duly registered electors at the first stage.

Article 33.

The number of deputies allotted to each of the communities mentioned in Article 9 of the Fundamental Law shall be determined by the number of electors registered as belonging to those communities.

Nevertheless, each community shall be assured of a minimum number of deputies as follows:

Turkish community	8
Alawite community	6
Arab community	2
Armenian community	2
Greek Orthodox community	1

In consequence of the application of this provision, the number of deputies may be increased to more than forty.

Article 34.

The mandates of electors at the second stage and deputies allotted to a given community in respect of the Sanjak as a whole shall be distributed as between the different cazas by the Commission as it shall think most equitable, and as far as possible in exact proportion to the number of the electors of each community registered in the several cazas.

A schedule of the mandates thus allotted shall be made public by posting in appropriate places.

CHAPTER IV. — ELECTIONS AT THE FIRST STAGE (ELECTION OF ELECTORS AT THE SECOND STAGE).

Article 35.

The constituency for the election of the electors at the second stage shall be the caza.

The elections shall be conducted by secret ballot.

The candidates elected shall be those obtaining a relative majority.

Article 36.

Electors at the second stage shall possess the following qualifications:

1. They shall be electors at the first stage.
2. They shall be able to read and write.

Article 37.

Notice of all candidatures shall be given by the candidates personally, and as far as possible, at the time of their registration as electors at the first stage.

The Chairman of the board shall satisfy himself that candidates are qualified to become electors at the second stage.

Candidatures put forward subsequently to the termination of the registration proceedings shall be examined by the Commission in the manner prescribed below:

Candidates shall be required to appear personally before the Commission within five days following the termination of the registration proceedings.

The latest date for the withdrawal of candidatures shall be five days before the date of the elections at the first stage.

The Commission shall take the relevant decisions on its own authority.

Article 38.

Lists of candidates thus recognised shall be drawn up according to communities and cazas. They shall be published by the Commission by means of placards, the text of which shall be identically the same as that of the voting-papers referred to in Article 41.

Should the number of recognised candidates for a given community in any caza be less than the number fixed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter III, the Commission shall consider how the list of candidates may as far as possible be completed without undue loss of time.

Article 39.

Should the Commission find that in the case of certain cazas and communities the number of candidates does not exceed the number of electors at the second stage fixed in application of the provisions of Chapter III, it shall declare all such candidates returned unopposed.

It shall render such decisions public, and such publication shall be regarded as equivalent to notice that for the caza and community concerned a ballot will be unnecessary.

Article 40.

The Commission shall give proper notice of the places, dates and times at which balloting will open for the election of the other candidates.

Article 41.

The voting papers shall be printed on paper of different colours for the different communities mentioned in Article 17 of the present Regulations; the colours shall be the same as those adopted for the electors' cards provided for in Article 28.

The voting-papers shall bear only the names of the recognised candidates for the community and caza concerned.

The order of the names of the candidates of each community on the voting-paper shall be determined by the Commission by the drawing of lots.

Opposite the name of each candidate there shall be an enclosed space to be blacked in by electors desiring to vote for such candidate.

The voting-papers shall bear the Commission's stamp and the number of the voting section.

Article 42.

The election board having assembled on the date and at the time fixed, the Chairman of the board shall open the ballot-box and publicly show it to be empty; he shall then lock it, keeping the key himself or giving it into the keeping of his deputy. The ballot-box shall then be sealed by the Chairman in such a way that it cannot be opened without the seals being broken.

Throughout the period of the electoral proceedings an extract of the lists of electors, as referred to in Article 30, shall be kept on the table of the board.

Article 43.

The electors shall be called forward one by one and shall state their identity, which shall be certified if necessary by the Mukhtar of the village or quarter.

Any dispute as to the identity of an elector shall be settled at the current meeting by the election board.

The elector shall present his elector's card to the Chairman, who, in exchange, shall hand him a voting-paper for the community in which he is registered. The voting-paper shall first have been stamped with the stamp of the board.

The voter's name shall then be marked off in the list of electors.

The elector's attention shall be drawn to the fact that he may vote for not more than the number of candidates fixed under the provisions of Chapter III.

Article 44.

Electors who declare that they can read shall enter the polling-booth and shall there fill up their voting-papers, blacking in the enclosed space opposite the names of the candidates for whom they vote.

Should an elector declare that he cannot read or is prevented by some infirmity from voting without assistance, the Chairman or his deputy shall accompany him into the polling-booth and fill up the voting-paper in accordance with his instructions.

Article 45.

Every effort shall be made to ensure that the voting shall be completed, if possible, in a single day.

If for any voting section more than a quarter of the total number of electors summoned shall have presented themselves by the end of the first day, the Chairman may order the ballot to be closed.

If this proportion has not been reached, the Chairman shall continue the election proceedings on the next day, and shall make every effort to have the persons concerned again summoned through the Mukhtar.

In such circumstances the aperture of the ballot-box shall be publicly sealed.

On the next day the seal shall be publicly removed on the arrival of the first electors, and the ballot shall continue until the time fixed for the close of the voting.

Article 46.

After the close of the ballot, the votes shall be counted by the board, which may obtain the assistance of additional tellers chosen from among the staff of the Commission.

The voting-papers taken from the ballot-box shall be classified and numbered by communities, without, however, being read.

Should the number of voting-papers cast by any given community be greater or less than the number of voters, the fact should be mentioned in the record. In the first case the voting-papers of the community shall all be replaced in the ballot-box, from which the Chairman shall extract a number of papers equal to the number of electors having voted for the community concerned. The surplus voting-papers shall be publicly burned without being counted or read.

Blank voting-papers, papers on which the voters indicate their identity and those not bearing the stamp of the Board shall not be reckoned in calculating the majority, though they shall be annexed to the record.

Should the votes indicated on a voting-paper exceed the number of candidates to be elected, as many names shall be struck out at the bottom of the paper as shall be required to reduce the number of votes to the figure fixed in application of the provisions of Chapter III.

Furthermore, votes for candidates other than those whose names are printed shall not be held valid.

Article 47.

Should two or more candidates obtain the same number of votes, lots shall be drawn to decide between them.

Article 48.

The Chairman shall finally decide any difficulties arising in the course of the proceedings. All such decisions shall be entered in the record. The relevant documents or voting-papers shall be annexed after being initialled by the Chairman and his deputy.

Article 49.

After the counting of the votes, the results of the ballot shall be combined and declared at the chief centres in the nahiés and at the headquarters of the municipalities.

Electors at the second stage shall receive a certificate from the Commission recording their election.

CHAPTER V. — ELECTIONS AT THE SECOND STAGE (APPOINTMENT OF DEPUTIES TO THE ASSEMBLY).

Article 50.

Any citizen desiring to stand as a candidate for election to the Assembly must appear in person before the Commission, or cause himself to be represented by some person appointed for the purpose, immediately after publication of the lists under Article 34, and not later than the tenth day before the poll. The notice of candidature must be in writing.

The Commission shall ascertain that the candidate complies with the following conditions, that is to say, that he:

- (1) Is qualified for election at the second stage;
- (2) Was born before July 1st, 1913.

No person may be a candidate in more than one caza at once.

If the above conditions are fulfilled, the Commission shall deliver a certificate of candidature to the person concerned.

The Commission shall publicly post the names of the recognised candidates.

Article 51.

The provisions of Article 39 shall be applicable *mutatis mutandis* to the case of particular cazas and communities where the number of candidates thus recognised by the Commission does not exceed the number of seats allotted to the community concerned for the caza in question.

Article 52.

The electors at the second stage of cazas and communities, the deputies of which have not already been declared elected under the preceding article, shall be requested to meet at the chief centre of their caza, at a date and hour to be determined by the Commission, for the purpose of electing the number of deputies determined by the Commission, as provided in Chapter III of the present Regulations.

Article 53.

The provisions of Article 41 of the present Regulations shall be applicable *mutatis mutandis* to the voting-papers for the elections at the second stage.

The election board shall have a ballot-box for each community.

The attention of electors shall be drawn to the fact that they may vote only for the number of candidates determined in the manner provided in Chapter III of the present Regulations.

Article 54.

In any given community, the poll shall not be valid unless three-fifths of the electors at the second stage of the community have voted.

Where this quorum is attained, those candidates who have obtained a relative majority shall be elected.

Where the quorum of three-fifths is not attained, the ballot-box of the community shall be sealed by the Chairman and kept in safe custody.

The Chairman shall in such case summon the electors concerned for the earliest possible date.

At the end of the day thus appointed the poll shall be finally closed and the votes counted.

The candidates shall be elected by a relative majority.

Where two or more candidates have obtained the same number of votes, lots shall be drawn to decide between them.

The counting of votes shall be public.

The Chairman shall impose a fine of 25 Syrian pounds on any elector at the second stage failing to vote without a good and sufficient reason and shall notify the authorities whenever this is done.

Article 55.

The provisions of Article 46 shall be applicable *mutatis mutandis* to the counting of votes.

Article 56.

As soon as it has determined the results of the election, the Commission shall inform each deputy of his election, in writing.

The Commission shall publish the names of the deputies.

CHAPTER VI. — ELECTION POSTERS.

Article 57.

Election propaganda by means of posters shall be permitted for the elections only at the first and second stages.

Article 58.

All posters must show the name of the person or persons by whom they are issued and the name and address of the printer.

Article 59.

It shall be prohibited to display posters or to send or distribute leaflets, circulars or manifestoes in favour of persons whose candidature has not yet been made public.

Article 60.

It shall be prohibited to display or distribute in any constituency posters, placards or manifestoes in support of candidates standing in another constituency.

Article 61.

For the duration of the election period, special spaces shall be reserved by the administrative authorities for the display of election posters in the cities of Antioch, Alexandretta and Kirik-Khan, and in the chief centres of the nahiés. In each such space, an adequate surface shall be allotted to each community for which there are candidates.

No election posters shall be displayed elsewhere than in the spaces allotted.

Election posters shall be free of stamp duty.

Article 62.

The posters referred to in the present chapter which do not comply with the prescribed conditions shall be torn down or confiscated.

CHAPTER VII. — PENAL PROVISIONS.

A. OFFENCES AND PENALTIES.

Article 63.

Any person required to supply information or to furnish assistance in connection with any proceedings provided for in the present Regulations shall be liable, in the event of refusal or abstention, to a fine of from 5 to 50 Syrian pounds.

Article 64.

Any person objecting in bad faith to the registration of an elector (Article 22) shall be liable to a fine of from 5 to 50 Syrian pounds.

Article 65.

Persons who, by gifts or inducements in money or in kind, shall procure or attempt to procure the making of a false declaration in connection with the registration provided for in Chapter II, or who, by the same means, shall obtain or attempt to obtain votes directly or through the intermediary of third parties, or who, by the same means, shall induce or attempt to induce one or more voters to abstain from registering or voting or standing as a candidate, shall be liable to a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds. Persons accepting or soliciting such gifts or inducements shall be liable to the same penalty.

Article 66.

Persons who, by violence, constraint or menaces, induce or attempt to induce an elector, through fear of loss of employment or injury to his person, family or property, to abstain from registering or voting or standing as a candidate, or who, by the same means, procure or attempt to procure the making of a false declaration in connection with the registration provided for in Chapter II, or who, by the same means, deter or attempt to deter an elector from voting in accordance with his convictions, shall be liable to imprisonment for not less than three months or more than two years together with a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds, or to one or other of these penalties.

Article 67.

Persons who, independently of the cases for which special provision is made under the present Regulations, shall violate or attempt to violate the secrecy of the ballot before, during or after the poll, or who shall obstruct or attempt to obstruct the proceedings of the poll, or alter or attempt to alter the results thereof, shall be liable to a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds.

Article 68.

Persons who knowingly issue false papers shall be liable to imprisonment for not less than one month or more than one year, together with a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds.

Article 69.

Persons who, by false declarations, obtain or attempt to obtain registration without being qualified therefor, or who, by the same means, improperly cause any other person to be registered or struck off the register, or attempt to cause him to be registered or struck off the register, shall be liable to a fine of from 25 to 100 Syrian pounds.

Persons who, in such cases, make use of false papers shall be liable to imprisonment for not less than one month or more than one year, together with a fine of from 50 to 150 Syrian pounds, or to one or other of these penalties.

Article 70.

Persons not qualified to vote who shall vote or attempt to vote shall be liable to a fine of from 10 to 100 Syrian pounds.

Article 71.

The following persons shall be liable to imprisonment for not less than one month or more than one year and to a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds.

- (1) Persons who falsify or attempt to falsify the registration proceedings by reproducing declarations incorrectly, whether verbally or in writing;
- (2) Persons who alter or attempt to alter entries in the registers;
- (3) Persons who, being entrusted at a poll with the duty of receiving or numbering or counting the voting-papers of the electors, remove, alter or add voting-papers or read out a name other than the name written on a voting-paper;
- (4) A person who, being entrusted with the duty of filling in the voting-paper of an illiterate elector or of an elector prevented by infirmity from voting without assistance, shall, in so doing, give his votes to candidates other than those designated by him.

Article 72.

With the exception of the case of armed forces called in under Article 13, no person bearing arms shall be permitted to enter any registration office or polling station. If the arms are carried openly, the offender shall be liable to a fine of from 5 to 25 Syrian pounds. If the arms are concealed, the offender shall be liable to imprisonment for not less than fifteen days or more than

three months, together with a fine of from 25 to 50 Syrian pounds or to one or other of these penalties, without prejudice, however, to the application of the penalties for carrying prohibited arms.

Article 73.

Persons who, by means of manifestly false declarations in connection with the election procedure laid down by the present Regulations, intercept or divert votes or induce an elector or electors not to register or to abstain from voting, shall be liable to a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds.

Article 74.

Persons who, by menacing demonstrations, disturb the registration or voting proceedings or an electoral meeting, shall be liable to a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds. If the freedom of registration or of the poll is by this means interfered with, the offenders shall be liable to imprisonment for not less than one month or more than one year together with a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds, or to one or other of these penalties.

Article 75.

Any unauthorised entry into the premises of an election board with a view to interference with the freedom of registration or of the poll shall be punishable by imprisonment for not less than three months or more than two years together with a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds, or one or other of these penalties.

Should the unauthorised entry referred to in the previous paragraph be effected under threat of armed violence, or should there be interference with the poll, the penalty shall be imprisonment for not less than one year or more than five years. This penalty shall be doubled if the offence is the result of concerted design to be carried out either in the Sanjak as a whole or in one or more cazas or nahiés.

Article 76.

Persons who, in the course of registration or voting proceedings, are guilty of insulting behaviour or violence towards the Chairman or to any of the members of the board, or who, by acts or violence or threats, delay or obstruct the proceedings, shall be liable to imprisonment for not less than one month or more than one year, together with a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds, or to one or other of these penalties.

Article 77.

The removal of ballot-boxes containing votes not yet counted shall be punishable by imprisonment for not less than three months or more than two years together with a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds.

Article 78.

Falsification of the poll, whether by members of the board or by agents of the authority appointed for the custody of the votes not yet counted, shall be punishable by imprisonment for not less than one year or more than five years together with a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds.

Article 79.

Theft or destruction of official documents belonging to the Commission or to any of its delegates shall be punishable by imprisonment for not less than three months or more than five years together with a fine of from 100 to 250 Syrian pounds, or by one or other of these penalties. Attempted theft or destruction of such documents shall be punishable by imprisonment for not less than one month or more than one year together with a fine of from 50 to 150 Syrian pounds, or one or other of these penalties.

Article 80.

Offences against the provisions of Chapter VI shall be punishable by a fine of from 25 to 75 Syrian piastres.

In the event of a repetition of the offence, the offenders shall be liable to a fine of from 1 to 5 Syrian pounds for each offence. It shall be deemed to be a repetition of the offence if the offender has already been convicted of the same offence in the course of the electoral proceedings.

Article 81.

Any public official found guilty of any of the offences referred to in the foregoing Articles shall be liable to a penalty of not less than twice the penalty for which the said Articles provide.

B. PENAL PROCEDURE.

Article 82

Subject to the following provisions, the special tribunal provided for in Article 7 shall lay down its own procedure for the preliminary investigation and trial of the cases submitted to it. This procedure shall be summary and expeditious in so far as is compatible with the protection of the defendant's interests and the efficient administration of justice.

Article 83.

The judge shall decide in the first and last resort. His decisions shall not be subject to appeal.

Article 84.

The deputies shall perform such duties as the judge may assign to them. They shall, if necessary, act in his stead. The functions of public prosecutor shall be discharged by one of the deputies hereinafter referred to as the "prosecutor".

Article 85.

Criminal proceedings shall be instituted by the prosecutor.

Article 86.

The prosecutor shall collect the evidence. Should the evidence of an offence be insufficient, or if on any other grounds a prosecution is not warranted, he shall dismiss the case. Such decisions are not subject to appeal.

Article 87.

In regard to any offence or offences connected with offences under the present Regulations, the prosecutor shall decide whether proceedings shall be instituted in the special tribunal in the matters within its jurisdiction.

Until a judgment having the force of *res judicata* has been rendered, the prosecutor shall have the right to request the local courts to communicate any documents of which he may deem it necessary to have cognisance.

In the case of concurrent proceedings in regard to related offences, the local courts shall postpone judgment until the special tribunal has rendered its decision.

Article 88.

Any person apprehended in the act of committing an offence punishable by imprisonment shall at once be brought before the prosecutor, who shall question him and, where appropriate, bring him before the tribunal for examination. In such a case, the prosecutor may order the accused to be kept in custody.

Article 89.

Should the case not be ready for trial, the tribunal shall remand the accused pending further investigations; it may, according to the circumstances of the case, order that the accused be held in custody or provisionally released on bail. An order committing an accused person to custody shall state the acts with which he is charged and the article of the present Regulations under which proceedings are taken.

Article 90.

Should the accused so request, the tribunal shall grant him a period of not more than four days in which to prepare his defence.

Article 91.

Proceedings under the present Regulations shall be held to be barred by lapse of time, on the expiry of a period of fifteen days after the date of the proclamation of the result of the elections to the Assembly.

Article 92.

The functions of the special tribunal shall commence simultaneously with those of the Commission. They shall terminate one month after the proclamation of the result of the elections to the Assembly.

Article 93.

The local authorities shall afford assistance to the tribunal and the prosecutor, whenever these may so request.

Article 94.

The judgments rendered by the tribunal shall be enforced by the local authorities.

The questions on the agenda are usually divided between the main Committees of the Assembly in the following manner:

- First Committee: Legal questions.*
- Second Committee: Economic and financial questions: communications and transit: health.*
- Third Committee: Reduction and limitation of armaments.*
- Fourth Committee: Budgetary and administrative questions.*
- Fifth Committee: Social questions: opium and other dangerous drugs.*
- Sixth Committee: Political questions: intellectual co-operation.*

2. REPORT ON THE WORK OF THE LEAGUE SINCE THE LAST SESSION OF THE ASSEMBLY.

Each year the Secretary-General prepares a general report on the work of the League since the last session of the Assembly. This report is distributed in two parts, one in July, the other at the opening of the session.

The report forms the basis of the general discussion with which the session usually opens, and during which the various delegations have an opportunity of expressing their views and their policy in regard to the League and its activities.

The Assembly also from time to time refers to the appropriate Committee for consideration and report particular chapters of this report. This is notably the case in regard to questions of a political character, since the work of the League in technical fields, although also treated in the report of the Secretary-General, is by custom included specifically in the agenda of the Assembly. (See items 16 to 25.)

A.7.1938.VII. 3. APPLICATION OF THE PRINCIPLES OF THE COVENANT OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS:
REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

At the conclusion of its third session (January 31st to February 2nd, 1938), the special Committee submitted to the Assembly a progress report. It drew the attention of the Members of the League to the reports and Minutes annexed to the progress report.

4. REDUCTION AND LIMITATION OF ARMAMENTS: ACTION TAKEN ON THE ASSEMBLY'S RESOLUTION OF SEPTEMBER 30TH, 1937.

On October 23rd, 1937, the Secretary-General communicated to the Members of the League and non-member States the resolution adopted by the Assembly on September 30th, 1937 (eighteenth session), referring to:

- (1) *The conclusion of an international convention on the publicity of national defence expenditure; and*
- (2) *The examination by States Members of the League—to the extent that this has not already been done—of internal measures with a view to the effective supervision of the manufacture of and trade in arms, ammunition and implements of war.*

The replies received from Governments up to March 10th, 1938, are included in document Conf.D.183. Any additional replies received will be circulated before the opening of the Assembly.

5. REFUGEES.

(a) Report of the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

The Nansen International Office for Refugees is placed under the direction of the League of Nations, in conformity with Article 24 of the Covenant, and submits an annual report to the Assembly on its activities.

(b) International assistance to refugees.

(i) Report by the Council.

On October 5th, 1937 (eighteenth session), the Assembly requested the Council to draw up, or cause to be drawn up, a plan for international assistance to refugees.

(ii) Report of the High Commissioner for Refugees, Jewish and Other, coming from Germany.

The High Commissioner will submit to the Assembly a report on his work during the past year and on the results of the inter-governmental Conference convened at Geneva on February 7th, 1938, for the adoption of a Convention regarding the status of refugees coming from Germany.

6. THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS AND MODERN MEANS OF SPREADING INFORMATION IN THE CAUSE OF PEACE: REPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE ON INTELLECTUAL CO-OPERATION.

(i) Cinematography.

The Committee will submit proposals on the basis of the Assembly's recommendations of October 2nd, 1937 (eighteenth session).

(ii) Broadcasting.

The Committee will submit, with its observations, the proposals made by the Committee of Experts summoned in accordance with the Assembly's recommendation of October 2nd, 1937 (eighteenth session).

7. MEANS OF SPREADING INFORMATION REGARDING THE LEAGUE AT THE SECRETARIAT'S DISPOSAL: REPORT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL.

On October 2nd, 1937 (eighteenth session), the Assembly postponed to its next session the examination of certain points dealt with in the report presented by the Sixth Committee (document A.71.1937).

8. UNIFICATION OF PRIVATE LAW: WORK OF THE INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR THE UNIFICATION OF PRIVATE LAW.

On October 2nd, 1937 (eighteenth session), the Assembly decided that the work of the Institute should be placed on the Assembly's agenda every year.

* * *

9. ELECTION OF NON-PERMANENT MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

The Assembly decided, on September 15th, 1926 (seventh session), to elect each year three non-permanent Members of the Council for a period of three years from the date of their election.

The mandates which expire in 1938 are those of Ecuador, Poland and Roumania.

10. PERMANENT COURT OF INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE: ELECTION OF A JUDGE TO FILL THE VACANCY CREATED BY THE DEATH OF M. ÅKE HAMMARSKJÖLD.

In accordance with Articles 4 and 14 of the Statute of the Permanent Court, vacancies among judges of the Court are filled by an election by the Assembly and the Council.

11. ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE ORGANISATION FOR COMMUNICATIONS AND TRANSIT.¹

In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Council on January 29th, 1938 (one-hundredth session), the Assembly is requested to proceed to the elections required under Article 4 of the Statute of the Organisation for Communications and Transit.

12. APPOINTMENTS TO THE SUPERVISORY COMMISSION.

In accordance with the report (document A.7.1937.X) adopted by the Assembly on September 30th, 1937 (eighteenth session), four members of the Commission are due to retire at the end of 1938—viz., M. Réveillaud (French), M. Parra-Pérez (Venezuelan), M. de Ottlik (Hungarian) and M. de Modzelewski (Polish); the first two members mentioned will not be eligible for re-election.

As regards M. de Ottlik and M. de Modzelewski, one (to be determined by lot) will be eligible for re-election for a period of two years only and the other for a period of three years.

If a person other than M. de Ottlik or M. de Modzelewski is elected to the seat tenable for two years only, his subsequent eligibility for re-election to two full periods of office will not be affected.

The 1938 Assembly is, in accordance with the same decision, called upon to elect:
One member for two years;
Two members for three years.

13. COMMISSION OF ENQUIRY FOR EUROPEAN UNION.

On September 30th, 1937 (eighteenth session), the Assembly decided to renew for twelve months the term of office of the Commission of Enquiry for European Union.

14. STRUCTURE AND FUNCTIONS OF THE ECONOMIC AND FINANCIAL ORGANISATION OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

On October 4th, 1937 (eighteenth session), the Assembly invited the Council to set up a committee to consider this question.

15. BUDGET OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS AND ADMINISTRATIVE QUESTIONS.

- (a) Audited Accounts for the Nineteenth Financial Period (1937) and Auditor's Report thereon.

In accordance with Article 38 of the Financial Regulations, "the Assembly shall finally pass the expenditure and income accounts".

- (b) Budget of the League of Nations for the Twenty-first Financial Period (1939).

In accordance with Chapter IV of the Financial Regulations, the budget of the League (including the budgets of the Secretariat and special organisations of the League, the International Labour Organisation and the Permanent Court of International Justice) is annually submitted to the Assembly.

- (c) Report of the Supervisory Commission.

In accordance with Article 16 of the Financial Regulations, "the Commission shall annually examine the budget and prepare a report thereon".

Under other provisions of the Regulations, the report of the Commission must also deal with the accounts and with such other relevant questions as might arise in consequence of decisions of the competent organs of the League. For example, the Commission will this year report, inter alia, on the question of the actuarial rate of interest of the Staff Pensions Fund.

- (d) Contributions to the League: Report of the Special Committee on Contributions.

On October 5th, 1937 (eighteenth session), the Assembly renewed the term of office of the special Committee for a further year, on the understanding that "the Committee will not be empowered to make new arrangements with States in arrears except in regard to those at present pending".

- (e) Report of the Administrative Board of the Staff Pensions Fund.

The report of the Administrative Board of the Staff Pensions Fund will be submitted to the Assembly as usual. In accordance with Article 23 of the Staff Pensions Regulations, a report on the fifth valuation of the Fund will also be submitted.

- (f) Allocation of League expenses.

On October 5th, 1937 (eighteenth session), the Assembly decided to ask Governments to communicate suggestions calculated to help the 1938 Assembly, and such body as that Assembly might set up, to determine the future scale of allocation. The present scale will cease to be in force on December 31st, 1939.

* * *

The following items relating to the regular technical work of the League are, in accordance with custom, included as separate items in the agenda, though this is not required under the Rules of Procedure. The items are divided into sub-items indicating the principal subjects under discussion, but the enumeration of these subjects is not to be considered as exhaustive:

16. COMMUNICATIONS AND TRANSIT.¹

- (a) Reform of the Statute of the Organisation for Communications and Transit.

- (b) Co-ordination of Transport.

- (c) Codification of Road Law and Other Questions relating to Road Traffic.

- (d) Signals at Level-crossings.

- (e) Civil Liability of Motorists and Compulsory Insurance.

Rules of Procedure of the Assembly. Rule 5.

1. Each Member shall communicate to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session, the names of its representatives, of whom there shall be not more than three. The names of substitute representatives may be added.

2. The full powers of the representatives shall be delivered to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session. They shall be issued either by the Head of the State or by the Minister for Foreign Affairs.¹

3. A Committee of nine members for the examination of the full powers shall be elected by the Assembly on the proposal of the President. The Committee shall appoint its own Chairman and Vice-chairman. It shall report without delay.

4. Any representative to whose admission objection has been made shall sit provisionally with the same rights as other representatives, unless the Assembly decides otherwise.

CREDENTIALS

Rules of Procedure of the Assembly. Rule 5.

1. Each Member shall communicate to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session, the names of its representatives, of whom there shall be not more than three. The names of substitute representatives may be added.
2. The full powers of the representatives shall be delivered to the Secretary-General, if possible one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session. They shall be issued either by the Head of the State or by the Minister for Foreign Affairs.¹
3. A Committee of nine members for the examination of the full powers shall be elected by the Assembly on the proposal of the President. The Committee shall appoint its own Chairman and Vice-chairman. It shall report without delay.
4. Any representative to whose admission objection has been made shall sit provisionally with the same rights as other representatives, unless the Assembly decides otherwise.

Annex II

COMPOSITION OF DELEGATIONS FOR DISCUSSION OF COMMUNICATIONS AND TRANSIT QUESTIONS

Resolution adopted by the Council on January 29th, 1938.

The Council:

Draws the attention of Governments to the fact that the Assembly at its next ordinary session and those which will be held at the end of each three-year period, as from 1938, will be required to discharge the functions hitherto performed by the ordinary General Conferences of the Organisation for Communications and Transit, and expresses the hope that the delegations at such sessions will include members specially qualified to deal with the questions falling within the Organisation's competence.

¹ It is obvious that, in the case of countries which do not possess a Minister for Foreign Affairs, the full powers may be issued by an authority possessing similar or equivalent powers.

ARTICLE PREMIER.

Sessions ordinaires.

1. Le Conseil se réunit de plein droit en session ordinaire quatre fois par an, soit le troisième lundi de janvier, le deuxième lundi de mai, trois jours avant la réunion de l'Assemblée et, en ce qui concerne la quatrième session, à une date qui suivra de près l'élection par l'Assemblée des membres non permanents du Conseil et qui sera précisée par le Président du Conseil.

Sessions extraordinaires.

2. Le Conseil peut toujours décider de se réunir en session extraordinaire.

3. Il doit se réunir, et, au besoin, en session extraordinaire, à la demande d'un Membre de la Société des Nations, dans les circonstances prévues aux articles 11, 15 et 17 du Pacte.

4. Si elle ne l'a pas été par le Conseil, la date d'ouverture de la session extraordinaire est fixée par le Président, si possible après consultation de ses collègues.

5. Le Président du Conseil, après avoir présenté ses collègues et obtenu l'assentiment de la majorité d'entre eux, peut, en cas de besoin, avancer ou retarder la date d'ouverture d'une session du Conseil. Toutefois, le Président ne pourra, sans l'assentiment de tous ses collègues, avancer ou retarder de plus de sept jours l'ouverture d'une session ordinaire.

6. Le Secrétaire général notifie aux membres du Conseil la date d'ouverture de la session, à moins que cette dernière ne doive se tenir à une date prévue par le présent Règlement ou fixée par le Conseil.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS

RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE COUNCIL

Adopted by the Council on May 26th, 1933.

ARTICLE I.

1. The Council shall meet in ordinary session *Ordinary sessions.* four times in each year—namely, on the third Monday in January, the second Monday in May, three days before the meeting of the Assembly and, for the fourth session, at a date following closely upon the appointment by the Assembly of the non-permanent members of the Council and fixed by the President of the Council.

2. The Council may at any time decide to *Extraordinary sessions.* meet in extraordinary session.

3. The Council must meet, at the request *Date of opening.* of any Member of the League of Nations (if necessary, in extraordinary session), in the circumstances referred to in Articles 11, 15 and 17 of the Covenant.

4. If not fixed by the Council, the date of the opening of an extraordinary session shall be fixed by the President, if possible after consultation with his colleagues.

5. The President of the Council, after consulting his colleagues and with the consent of the majority, may, where necessary, advance or retard the date of the opening of a session of the Council. The President may not, however, without the consent of all his colleagues, advance or retard by more than seven days the opening of an ordinary session.

6. The Secretary-General shall give notice to the members of the Council of the date at which a session is to begin, unless the session is to be held at a date provided by the present Rules or fixed by the Council.

ARTICLE II.

Place of Meeting.

The sessions of the Council shall be held at the seat of the League of Nations, except in cases where the majority of the members of the Council consider that the Council should meet elsewhere.

ARTICLE III.

Ordre du jour.

1. Un ordre du jour provisoire est établi par le Secrétaire général et approuvé par le Président du Conseil. 6. Au début de la session, le Conseil arrête l'ordre du jour en séance privée.

7. Le Conseil, à la majorité des voix, peut, au cours d'une séance, ajouter de nouvelles questions à son ordre du jour. Dans ce cas, sauf décision contraire du Conseil, prise à l'unanimité, il ne sera pas procédé à la discussion de ces questions avant la séance suivante.

Adoption de l'ordre du jour.

Présidence du Conseil.

ARTICLE IV.

1. Les représentants au Conseil président les sessions du Conseil à tour de rôle, dans l'ordre alphabétique des dénominations en langue française des pays qu'ils représentent.

2. Les fonctions d'un président commencent, en principe, au début d'une session ordinaire. Elles prennent fin lorsque s'ouvre la session ordinaire suivante.

3. Les sessions extraordinaires sont présidées par le Président en fonction.

4. Si le représentant appelé à exercer la présidence croit devoir y renoncer pour la session ou pour une affaire déterminée, le Conseil pourvoit à son remplacement.

ARTICLE III.

1. A provisional agenda shall be drawn up by *Agenda*.
the Secretary-General and approved by the President of the Council. It shall in all cases include any questions which a Member of the League has asked the Council to consider. It shall, so far as possible, show the rapporteurs for the various questions and give references to the documents relating thereto.

2. The provisional agenda shall be sent to the members of the Council not less than three weeks before the opening of the session, except in the case of the fourth ordinary session of the year or of a session the date of which is such as to make it impossible to maintain this interval.

3. Any subsequent modification of the provisional agenda shall be communicated to the members of the Council.

4. At the last ordinary session of each year "Rapporteurs".
the Council shall draw up a list of rapporteurs for the various matters with which it is habitually called upon to deal.

5. Where rapporteurs have not been appointed by the Council, they shall be appointed by the President.

6. At the opening of the session, the Council *Adoption of Agenda*.
shall adopt its agenda at a private meeting.

7. The Council may, by a majority, add during a meeting new questions to its agenda. In such case, unless the Council otherwise unanimously decides, such questions shall not be discussed before the next meeting. *Insertion of items during session.*

ARTICLE IV.

Presidency of the Council.

1. The representatives on the Council shall preside over its sessions in rotation in the alphabetical order in French of the names of the countries which they represent.

2. A President shall, in principle, enter into office at the beginning of an ordinary session and remain in office until the opening of the next ordinary session.

3. Extraordinary sessions shall be presided over by the President for the time being in office.

4. If the representative who should act as President considers that he should decline to do so during a particular session, or during the consideration of a particular matter, the Council shall arrange for another member to act as President.

ARTICLE V.

ARTICLE VIII.

ARTICLE V.

Temporary replacement of President.

Where, during the interval between sessions of the Council, the Secretary-General, for the purposes of the application of the provisions of the present Rules or for any other purpose, has occasion to apply to the President of the Council and the President is prevented from acting, the Secretary-General shall apply to the last President, if the country which he represents continues to belong to the Council. If the last President is unable to act, the Secretary-General shall apply, subject to the same condition, to his predecessor, and, thereafter, in accordance with the same system, to earlier Presidents of the Council.

ARTICLE VI.

Changes in the Presidency.

1. If the person who is President ceases to represent his country on the Council, he shall be replaced by the new representative.

2. In like manner, if a former President has ceased to represent his country on the Council, the new representative shall act in his place for the purposes of Article V of the present Rules.

ARTICLE VII.

Publicity of meetings.

1. Subject to the provisions of Article III, paragraph 6, and Article X of the present Rules, the meetings of the Council shall, unless the Council otherwise decides, be held in public.

2. Unless they have been previously circulated, the reports of rapporteurs and the documents to which they relate shall, so far as possible, be sent to the members of the Council not less than forty-eight hours before the opening of the meeting at which they are discussed. Where this has been done, the report will not be read, unless the rapporteur desires or another member of the Council asks that it shall be read; the rapporteurs may always give such explanations in regard to their reports as they consider desirable. The text of resolutions proposed in the reports shall be read in all cases.

Circulation of reports.

ARTICLE VIII.

Quorum.

The Council shall not discuss or decide upon any matter unless the majority of its members are present.

ARTICLE IX.

Unanimity.

1. Except where otherwise expressly provided by the Covenant, or by the terms of any other instrument which is to be applied, decisions at

Compte rendu.

4. Le Conseil peut décider de ne pas publier de procès-verbal. Dans ce cas, il n'est établi qu'un compte rendu sommaire en un seul exemplaire. 2. All matters of procedure at meetings of the Council, including the appointment of committees to investigate particular matters, shall be regulated by the Council and may be decided by a majority of the Members of the League represented at the meeting. *Majority decisions.*

3. Subject to the provisions of Article X of the present Rules, each member of the Council shall be called upon separately to vote, if a member of the Council so requires. In counting the votes, abstentions from voting shall be disregarded. *Vote by roll call.*

ARTICLE X.

Decisions concerning persons.

All decisions concerning persons shall be taken at a private meeting. On the demand of any member of the Council, the voting shall be by secret ballot.

ARTICLE XI.

1. The Minutes of the meetings of the Council shall be kept by the Secretariat. They shall be published. *Minutes.*

2. The Minutes of each meeting of the Council shall be sent as soon as possible to the members of the Council, who shall, within forty-eight hours, inform the Secretariat of any corrections which they may desire to have made in their own speeches.

3. Where the Minutes were sent to the members of the Council less than forty-eight hours before the close of the session, they shall be considered as approved if no corrections have been asked for within ten days.

4. The Council may decide not to have published Minutes. In this case, a summary record in a single copy shall alone be made. Such record shall be kept in the Secretariat of the League of Nations, where the representatives of Governments which took part in the meeting may have corrections made in their own speeches within a period of ten days. On the expiration of this period, the record shall be considered as approved and shall be signed by the Secretary-General. Representatives of the said Governments shall at all times have the right to consult the record at the Secretariat. *Summary record.*

ARTICLE XII.

Mesures administratives arrêtées par correspondance.

ARTICLE XII.

1. When the Council is not in session, its members may be consulted by correspondence by the Secretary-General, on instructions from the President, and may by this means adopt such measures of an administrative character as appear on grounds of urgency to be strictly necessary before the Council again meets.

Administrative measures adopted by correspondence.

2. Subject to confirmation by the Council at its next session, the President of the Council, at the request of the Secretary-General, may, in the interval between sessions, take financial measures of an urgent character which fall within the competence of the Council, such as the approval of transfers, charging of expenditure to the Council's vote for unforeseen expenditure, and advances from the Working Capital Fund.

Financial measures taken by President.

ARTICLE XIII.

Presence of Committee Chairmen, etc.

The chairmen and members of committees, experts and officials of the League may be admitted to give information or assistance at meetings of the Council.

ARTICLE XIV.

1. Subject to the provisions of the Covenant, the present Rules may be amended by a three-fourths majority, subject to the proposal for amendment of the Rules having been first placed on the agenda.

Amendment of Rules.

2. Subject to the same restriction, a departure from the provisions of the present Rules may be sanctioned, by the same majority, without its being necessary for a proposal to that effect to be first placed on the agenda.

Departure from Rules.

(a) COMMUNICATIONS FROM NON-OFFICIAL INTERNATIONAL ORGANISATIONS.

((Resolution of December 10th, 1923.)

The Council of the League, while confirming the principles laid down in July last in its decision that the documents of non-official associations should not be forwarded to Governments by the Secretary-General of the League, in order that the Members of the Council might be informed of the nature of any communications addressed to the League by non-official international associations, instructs the Secretary-General to prepare and present to the Council at the beginning of each of its sessions a list of any such communications which he may have received, stating the international organisations from which they emanate and the subject to which they refer.

Each Member of the Council will thus be aware what resolutions or petitions have been received, and will be able, should it so desire, to obtain cognisance of their terms.

(b) ACCEPTANCE OF GIFTS.

((Resolution of January 15th, 1934.)

1. Gifts which are less than 5,000 Swiss francs in value and which do not involve the League in financial liability shall be brought to the knowledge of the Council by the circulation of a list before each session. On this list, the Secretary-General shall report in each case whether, in his opinion, the gift is one which should be accepted.

2. The gift shall not be placed upon the agenda of the Council unless one of its Members makes a request to that effect.

3. If no Member of the Council raises any objection during the session following the circulation of the list, the Secretary-General shall be considered as being authorised to accept the gifts which he has reported to be acceptable and to refuse the other gifts.

4. Lorsque le don apparaîtra, de toute évidence, comme trop minime ou comme indésirable, le Secrétaire général sera autorisé à le refuser sans en référer au Conseil.

5. Lorsque le don ne comportera pas d'affectation particulière, le Secrétaire général indiquera les fins auxquelles il se propose de l'utiliser.

c) ORDRES DU JOUR DES SESSIONS EXTRAORDINAIRES.

(Résolution du 1^{er} juin 1934.)

Dans le cas d'une session extraordinaire, l'ordre du jour provisoire, celui qui sera distribué aux Membres du Conseil, contiendra exclusivement les affaires qui ont provoqué la session extraordinaire ; mais au début de la session, lorsque le Conseil arrêtera son ordre du jour, le Secrétaire général lui fera connaître la liste des autres affaires les plus urgentes. Cette liste serait destinée à permettre aux Membres du Conseil d'exercer la prérogative, qui leur est reconnue par l'article III, paragraphe 7, du Règlement intérieur du Conseil, de demander l'inscription à l'ordre du jour de la session.

d) DATE DES SESSIONS DU CONSEIL.

(Résolution du 11 janvier 1935.)

a) Sauf dans les cas d'urgence réelle, le Président du Conseil ne proposera pas de modification à la date fixée pour une session du Conseil, si cette session doit s'ouvrir dans les cinq jours.

b) Dans la communication par laquelle il consultera ses collègues sur un changement à apporter à la date d'une session du Conseil, le Président indiquera, si possible, la nouvelle date proposée pour l'ouverture de la session, ou, si cela n'est pas possible, la date la plus rapprochée à laquelle le Conseil sera convoqué.

c) Sauf dans les cas d'urgence réelle, le Président du Conseil fera connaître à ses collègues, au moins douze jours à l'avance, la date qu'il se propose de substituer à la date primitivement fixée pour une session du Conseil.

4. Where the gift is obviously of a trivial or undesirable nature, the Secretary-General is authorised to refuse it without reference to the Council.

5. Where the gift is not made for a particular purpose, the Secretary-General shall indicate the object for which he proposes to use it.

(c) AGENDA OF EXTRAORDINARY SESSIONS.

(Resolution of June 1st, 1934.)

In the case of an extraordinary session, the provisional agenda circulated to the Members of the Council shall contain only the item for which the extraordinary session was originally called; but, at the beginning of the session, when the Council adopts its agenda, the Secretary-General shall communicate to it a list of the other most urgent questions. The purpose of this list would be to enable the Members of the Council to exercise the right accorded to them under Rule III, paragraph 7, of the Rules of Procedure of the Council, to ask for the inclusion of an item in the agenda of the session.

(d) DATE OF SESSIONS OF THE COUNCIL.

(Resolution of January 11th, 1935.)

(a) Except in cases of real emergency, the President of the Council should not propose a change in the date fixed for a session of the Council if the session is already due to commence in five days.

(b) In the communication by which he consults his colleagues as to a change in the date of a session of the Council, the President should, if possible, state the new date proposed for the opening of the session or, if this is not possible, should indicate the earliest date at which the Council will be convened.

(c) Except in cases of real emergency, the President of the Council should give his colleagues at least twelve days' notice of the date which he proposes to substitute for the date originally fixed for a session of the Council.

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I. NOTE INTRODUCTIVE.

Le Comité institué par le Conseil, le 27 mai 1937 (quatre-vingt-dix-septième session), pour examiner certains points relatifs à la procédure du Conseil, était composé comme suit :

M. Komarnicki a été désigné comme rapporteur.

Le Comité a estimé qu'il serait inopportun de tenter de réglementer trop en détail la procédure du Conseil. Néanmoins, il a pensé que l'expérience avait montré qu'il y aurait intérêt à préciser certains points non visés par le Règlement intérieur. En outre, il a considéré qu'il conviendrait de rappeler, sur un ou deux points, la procédure du Conseil, telle qu'elle a été établie par l'usage.

En conséquence, le Comité soumet les points suivants à l'examen du Conseil.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON COUNCIL PROCEDURE.

I. INTRODUCTORY NOTE.

The Committee appointed by the Council on May 27th, 1937 (ninety-seventh session), to consider certain points in connection with Council procedure was composed as follows:

Poland: His Excellency M. Tytus Komarnicki.

M. Komarnicki was appointed Rapporteur.

The Committee was of opinion that it would be a mistake to attempt to regulate the procedure of the Council in too great detail. Nevertheless, it considered that experience had shown that a number of points not covered by the Rules of Procedure might with advantage be clarified. Moreover, it thought that it might be convenient if, on one or two points, the procedure of the Council, as established by custom, were expressly stated.

The Committee therefore submits the following points for the consideration of the Council.

II. RECOMMANDATIONS DU COMITÉ.

1. Séances secrètes.

a) Il est désirable que l'assistance aux séances secrètes soit aussi restreinte que possible. A cet effet, il est recommandé que chaque membre du Conseil soit normalement accompagné d'un seul adjoint. Si, pour des raisons exceptionnelles, un membre du Conseil désirait être accompagné de plus d'un adjoint, il devrait en informer préalablement le Président. Le nombre des adjoints ne devrait pas être supérieur à trois.

Les mêmes considérations s'appliquent en ce qui concerne le nombre de personnes qui peuvent accompagner le Secrétaire général en plus du personnel technique.

b) Il est désirable que, lorsque les circonstances ne s'y opposent pas, le Conseil publie un communiqué. La rédaction de ce communiqué pourrait normalement être confiée au Président et au Secrétaire général.

Pour ce qui concerne les communications de caractère confidentiel qu'il conviendrait de fournir aux délégués permanents ou aux autres représentants des Membres de la Société dûment autorisés par leurs gouvernements respectifs à suivre les débats du Conseil, celui-ci pourrait charger le Président ou le Secrétaire général d'y procéder dans des conditions qui tiendraient compte autant des intérêts de la Société des Nations que du désir légitime de ces représentants d'être éclairés en temps utile sur l'orientation générale des travaux du Conseil.

Sauf dans la mesure où la publication de renseignements est autorisée par le Conseil lui-même, aucune des personnes présentes n'a le droit de divulguer ce qui s'est passé au cours de la séance.

2. Séances privées.

a) En vue d'éviter l'encombrement dans la salle affectée au Conseil pour ses séances privées, il est recommandé que chaque membre du Conseil ne soit normalement accompagné que de trois adjoints au maximum. Si, pour des raisons exceptionnelles, un membre du Conseil désirait être accompagné de plus de trois adjoints, il devrait en informer préalablement le Président. En aucun cas, le nombre des adjoints ne devrait être supérieur à cinq.

The Committee does not consider it necessary, at all events at the present stage, to amend or supplement the Rules of Procedure.

Certain resolutions on procedure already adopted by the Council but not included in its Rules of Procedure, and on which the Committee has no suggestions to make, are annexed for convenience to the present report.¹

II. RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE.

1. *Secret Meetings.*

(a) It is desirable to limit as far as possible the number of persons attending secret meetings. It is therefore recommended that each member of the Council be normally accompanied by not more than one assistant. If, for exceptional reasons, a member of the Council wishes to be accompanied by more than one assistant, he should so inform the President beforehand. In no case should the number of assistants exceed three.

The same considerations apply to the number of persons who may accompany the Secretary-General (apart from technical staff).

(b) It is desirable that, where circumstances permit, the Council should issue a *communiqué*. The preparation of such *communiqué* might normally be left to the President and the Secretary-General.

As regards information of a confidential nature, of importance to permanent delegates or other representatives of the Members of the League duly authorised by their respective Governments to follow the Council's proceedings, the latter might empower the President or the Secretary-General to furnish such information with due regard both for the interests of the League and for the legitimate desire of these representatives to be kept duly informed of the general course of the Council's proceedings.

Except in so far as the issue of information is authorised by the Council itself, no person present has the right to divulge what passed at the meeting.

2. *Private Meetings.*

(a) With a view to avoiding overcrowding in the room assigned to the Council for its private meetings, it is recommended that each member of the Council be normally accompanied by not more than three assistants. If, for exceptional reasons, a member of the Council wishes to be accompanied by more than three assistants, he should so inform the President beforehand. In no case should the number of assistants exceed five.

4. Votes.

The representatives of Members of the League not represented on the Council may also attend private meetings. In view of the limited accommodation available, however, it is desirable that, as far as possible, each Member should be represented by one person only.

The Secretary-General shall limit as far as possible the number of officials attending private meetings.

The Committee considers that a reasonable allocation of the seating accommodation available at private meetings would be as follows :

For each Council delegation	2 seats.
For representatives of Members of the League not represented on the Council	15 seats.
For members of the Secretariat (other than technical staff)	5 seats.

(b) It is recommended that the President should open the private meeting not later than five minutes after the time announced.

3. Adoption of Agenda.

It is recommended that the following procedure, which corresponds to the practice generally adopted hitherto, should be followed, unless the Council, in a given case, should decide otherwise :

At the private meeting at which it adopts the agenda, whether of the session or of the meeting, the Council sits in its ordinary composition. Nevertheless, if the representative of a Member of the League entitled to send a representative to the Council for the discussion of the substance of an item asks permission to present any observations to the Council in regard to the inclusion of that item on the agenda, that representative is invited to the Council table. Similarly, if any discussion in regard to the inclusion of the item otherwise arises, the representative of such Member of the League, if present in the room, is invited to the Council table.

4. Voting.

It is recommended that the following procedure, which corresponds to the practice generally adopted hitherto, should be followed, unless the Council, in a given case, should decide otherwise :

When a vote by roll-call is required under Article IX, paragraph 3, of the Rules of Procedure, it shall be taken in French alphabetical order of the Members of the League represented at the meeting, the President voting last. In cases in which the vote concerns a dispute, the representatives

5. Distribution du texte des discours.

6. Présidence du Conseil.

8. Rapports des Commissions techniques.

Pour obvier, dans une certaine mesure, à l'inconvénient qu'entraîne la mise en discussion de rapports de commissions techniques, lorsque les documents dont il s'agit n'ont été distribués qu'au cours de la session du Conseil ou qu'immédiatement auparavant, il est recommandé de suivre la procédure ci-après :

Lorsque le rapport d'une commission technique permanente n'aura pas été distribué au Conseil au moins une semaine avant la date fixée pour l'ouverture de la session, la question sera exclue de l'ordre du jour revisé, qui est communiqué par le Secrétariat juste avant la session. 9. Présence de représentants des Commissions, de la Société à la table du Conseil.

5. Distribution of the Text of Speeches.

In deference to the dignity of Council meetings, it is recommended that those delegations desirous of communicating the text of a speech to the Press should wait, before doing so, until the speaker in question has finished speaking.

6. Presidency of the Council.

In order to expedite the operation of the system of rotation, it is recommended that the practice followed hitherto, by which the two autumn sessions of the Council are presided over by the same President, should be discontinued, and that a new President should take office for each of the four regular sessions of the Council.

7. Deputations.

The President of the Council cannot speak in the name of the Council unless he has been specially requested to do so by the latter, and therefore should not, in that capacity, receive deputations. Any statement made to him should therefore be received by him in his capacity as a member of the Council only.

8. Reports of Technical Committees.

In order to avoid to some extent the inconvenience resulting from members of the Council being asked to discuss reports of technical Committees distributed during or immediately before the Council session, it is recommended that the following practice be observed :

When the report of a standing technical Committee has not been distributed to the Council at least one week before the date fixed for the opening of the session, the relevant question shall be excluded from the revised agenda which is distributed by the Secretariat just before the session. Members of the Council shall nevertheless retain their right, under Article III, paragraph 7, of the Rules of Procedure, to propose to the Council that the discussion of a particular report should be added to the agenda in the course of the session.

9. Presence of Representatives of League Committees at the Council Table.

It is generally unnecessary for the chairman or other representatives of League Committees to come to the Council

Toutefois, les membres du Conseil autres que le Président gardent naturellement la faculté de prendre la parole en de telles occasions, mais il y aurait intérêt à ce que, dans toute la mesure possible, ils fissent part de leur intention à cet égard, lors de la séance privée qui précède la séance publique en question.

table for the discussion of their Committees' reports. Nevertheless, it is open to the Rapporteur for the particular question on the agenda to ask the Secretary-General to arrange for the representation of the Committee, should special circumstances appear to the Rapporteur to warrant such action.

10. Occasional Speeches.

Occasional speeches, such as speeches of condolence or congratulation, are normally made by the President on behalf of the Council as a whole, so that any member of the Council may refrain from speaking without any courtesy being imputed to him. Members of the Council other than the President are nevertheless at liberty to speak on such occasions, but it is recommended that so far as possible they should make their intention of speaking known at the private meeting preceding the public meeting in question.
