LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT,

The 29th June 1835.

The following Extract from the proceedings of Government in the Legislative Department, under date the 29th June 1835, is published for general information.

Read a letter from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, dated the 10th of December 1834.

With reference to paragraph 50 of that letter, read again the proceedings of the 25th day of May 1835.

Resolved, that in consequence of the desire expressed by the Hon'ble Court, that any general measure concerning the holding of lands by Europeans in India, should be submitted to the Hon'ble Court before it be passed into a law, the draft on that subject fixed to be read a second time on the first day of August next, be referred to the Hon'ble Court.

Resolved, that the said draft be read again at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 1st day of July 1836, or, if orders on the subject shall arrive at an earlier period from the Hon'ble Court, then at the first meeting of the Legislative Council after the arrival of such orders.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The 6th July 1835.

The following Extract from the proceedings of Government in the Legislative Department, is published for general information.

Resolved, that the following Rules be adopted as standing orders of the Council of India in its Legislative Department.

First.—When the Governor General of India in Council shall approve of the draft

of a law, the draft shall be printed and published for general information.

Second.—No draft of a law shall be ordered to be published till at least one week shall have elapsed from the day on which it was first laid before the Council of India in its Legislative Department.

Third.—When a draft of a law shall be approved, a day shall be appointed for the reconsideration thereof, which day shall be at least six weeks later than the day of publication.

Fourth.—On the day appointed for the reconsideration of the draft, it shall be competent to the Governor General in Council to pass it into a law with any amendments which he may deem necessary.

Fifth.—In case any Member of the Council shall represent, that any amendments which may have been made appear to him to require longer consideration, the discussion shall be adjourned for a period of not less than one week.

Sixth.—In case any Member of the Council shall represent, in writing, that any amendments which may have been made appear to him to be of so new and important a nature that they ought not to be adopted without being previously published for general information, every other Member of the Council shall record his opinion on that point, with the reasons of that opinion, and if the majority shall then be of opinion that the amendments are of so new and important a nature, that they ought not to be adopted without being previously published for general information, the amended draft shall be published, and the further consideration thereof shall be adjourned to a day later by at least six weeks than the day of such second publication.

Seventh.—Every Member of the Council shall be entitled either on occasion of a draft

of a law being ordered to be published, or on occasion of its being passed or finally rejected, to demand that every Member shall record his opinion, and the reasons thereof.

Eighth.—Any of the foregoing standing orders may be suspended by an unanimous resolution of the Council of India, but in every such case the reasons for that resolution shall be recorded.

Ninth.—If there be a majority of the Council of India for suspending any standing order, any Member may demand an adjournment of the discussion for at least twenty-four hours, and on the resumption of the discussion at the reassembling of the Council, each Member shall deliver in his opinion, with the reasons thereof, in writing, and if a majority, including the Governor General or the President of the Council for the time being, shall still be for suspending the standing order, the standing order shall be suspended, and not otherwise.

NOTIFICATION.

MARINE DEPARTMENT.

The following extract from a letter from captain C. Biden, of the ship Victory, describing the situation of a group of Islands and a Sand Bank discovered by him in his passage through the Chagos Archipelago, is published for general information.

"Standing to the N. E. we discovered a cluster of small islands bearing S. E. by E. distant 4 or 5 leagues, which supposing we had experienced a current to the N. N. W. we imagined were the Solomon Islands; our observations however at noon placing them in a different position from that assigned to those islands by Horsburgh, a look out was kept, and at 1-45 P. M. when the former bore E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. the Solomon Islands were seen from the mast head bearing N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. at 4-45 P. M. having run N. by E. 23 miles we saw the Peros Banhos Islands from the mast head bearing from N. W. by N. to W. by N. which confirmed the relative position of this and the Solomon group as described by Horsburgh, and proved beyond doubt that the first cluster we had passed was a new discovery. The three islands of this group, which I have named Nelson's Islands, are covered with trees of considerable size and apparently connected by a Sandy Bank which extends a short distance to the westward; our observations place them in latitude $5^{\circ} 39' 15''$ S. and longitude $72^{\circ} 25' 45''$ East, and the Solomon group in latitude $5^{\circ} 20'$ S. and longitude $72^{\circ} 19' 30''$ East, the latter agreeing very nearly with the position assigned them by Horsburgh."

"Pursuing our course to the northward, crossed over a bank lying nearly midway between the Solomon and Nelson's Islands, which I have called the Victory's Bank we had several casts of $\frac{1}{2}$ less 5 fathoms on it, which was the least water obtained; the body of the Solomon Islands then bore north, and Nelson's Islands from the mizen topsail yard S. S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. although there was no broken or discoloured water discernible from the mast head, a good look out should be kept in crossing over this bank, for it is probable, there are patches upon it with less water on them than we obtained in the Victory."

THE 29TH JUNE, 1835.

The following draft of a proposed Act, was read in Council for the first time on the 29th June 1835:—

Act No.—of 1835.

1. Be it enacted, that from the—day of—the undermentioned silver coins only, shall be issued from the mints within the territories of the East India Company.

First.—A rupee, to be denominated the Company's rupee, of the weight of 180 grains troy, and of the following standard, vizt.—

++ or 165 grains of pure silver.

+ or 15 . ditto of alloy.

Second.—A half rupee of proportionate weight, and of the same standard.

Third.—A quarter rupee of ditto.

Fourth.—A double rupee of ditto.

2. And be it enacted, that these coins shall bear on the obverse the head and the name

of the reigning Sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and on the reverse the designation of the coin in English and Persian, and the words "East India Company" in English, with such other embellishment as shall from time to time, be approved and ordered by the Governor General in Council.

3. And be it enacted, that the Company's rupee, half rupee and double rupee, shall be legal tender in satisfaction of all engagements, without the demand of any batta for wearage, provided the coins have not been clipped, filed, or defaced otherwise than by use.

4. And be it enacted, that the said rupee shall be received as equivalent to the Bombay, Madras, Furruckabad and Sonat rupees, and to fifteen-sixteenths of the Calcutta Sicca rupee, and the half and double rupees shall respectively also be received as equivalent to the half and double of the abovementioned Bombay, Madras, Furruckabad and Sonat rupees, and to the half and double of fifteen-sixteenths of the Calcutta sicca rupee.

5. And be it enacted, that the Company's quarter rupee shall be legal tender only, in payment of the fraction of a rupee.

6. Provided that, if in any contract it be specially stipulated that if discharged at Madras or at Bombay or in the Agra presidency, payment shall be made in the rupees now current in those presidencies respectively at a different rate from that above declared to be the relative intrinsic value thereof with reference to the Calcutta sicca rupee, then, and in all such cases, the contract shall be satisfied when discharged in any of the said presidencies by payment thereof of an equivalent amount of the rupees, half rupees, and double rupees, authorized to be coined by this Act, for the Furruckabad, Madras, or Bombay rupees so specially stipulated.

7. And be it enacted, that the undermentioned gold coins only, shall henceforth be coined in the mints of British India.

First.—A gold mohur or fifteen rupee piece of the weight of 180 grains troy, and of the following standard, vizt.

++ or 165 grains of pure gold.

+ or 15 . ditto . . of alloy.

Second.—A five rupee piece equal to a third of a gold mohur of proportionate weight and of the same standard.

Third.—A ten rupee piece equal to two thirds of a gold mohur of ditto.

Fourth.—A thirty rupee piece or double gold mohur of ditto.

8. And be it enacted, that these coins shall bear on the obverse the head and name of the reigning Sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and on the reverse the designation of the coin in English and Persian, and the words "East India Company" in English, with such other embellishment as shall from time to time be approved and ordered by the Governor General in Council.

9. And be it enacted, that no gold coin shall henceforward be a legal tender of pay-

ment in any of the territories of the East India Company.

10. And be it enacted, that it shall be competent to the Governor General in Council in his executive capacity to direct the coining and issuing of all coins, coined and issued under the authority of this Act, and to establish, regulate and remove mints, any law hitherto in force to the contrary notwithstanding.

Ordered, that the draft now read, be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 11th day of August next.

2nd. Station and Regimental Prize Committees will be assembled to investigate all claims to the Prize Dividends, and when found correct, Bills or Abstracts for the amount, according to annexed Form No. 1, are to be transmitted to the General Prize Committee, in order to be checked and passed by that Committee for payment on the Paymaster of the Division or range in which the Claimants respectively may reside.

3rd. The Regimental Committees will be constituted of the Commanding Officer, the next in Seniority, with the Adjutant, and the Quarter Master. Those at Stations, in such manner as the Officer Commanding may direct.

** It will be necessary for the Regimental Committee to state in these Abstracts, the Regiment, and Troop or Company to which the individuals belonged at the time of Capture, which entitles them to share in the Prize Money, and the Abstracts, if preferred by individual claimants, should be accompanied with a certificate from the Commanding Officer or Adjutant of the Regiment to which they belonged, stating that they are the persons who were actually present.*

4th. All persons present with Regiments are to be paid by Committees respectively, and in acknowledgment of the receipt of their shares, they are to be required to sign Acquittance Rolls, which are to be prepared in accordance with the annexed Form No. 2.

5th. Claimants who may not now be with the Regiments in which they served during the War, must either appear personally before the Regimental Committee, charged with the issue, or prefer their demand through a Regimental or Station Committee, as may be most convenient.*

6th. Individual Claimants who may have belonged to Corps since disbanded, or who may have been attached to Regiments of His Majesty's Service which have subsequently returned to Europe, and who may not be borne on the strength of any Regiment in India, will submit their claims to the nearest Station or Regimental Committee, and if ascertained to be correct, a Bill for the dividend, countersigned by the Committee, and accompanied by a separate receipt of the Claimant, will be forwarded to the General Prize Committee, to be examined and passed for payment in the manner above detailed.

7th. The claims of Officers and Men who may have belonged to His Majesty's Regiments embarked for Europe, but who may now be attached to Corps serving under this Presidency, will be drawn for by the Committee of the Regiment to which they are at present attached, in the manner laid down in the 4th paragraph.

8th. Staff Officers whose shares are not included in the Distribution Statement of Corps, will prefer their claims, and receive dividends in the manner prescribed in the 6th paragraph.

9th. Applications in behalf of the Heirs of Officers and Men who may have died, will be addressed to the Committee of the Regiment to which the deceased belonged, and a consequent payment will be made on account of the Estate, if the claim be satisfactorily established.

10th. On the 1st of May 1836, the Proceedings of the several Regimental and Station Committees will be closed, and the Acquittance Rolls will be forwarded to the General Prize Committee, by whom they will be submitted to Government for transmission to the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, at the same time, the balance of unappropriated Shares of Individuals of the Honorable Company's Service, will be remitted by Regimental and Station Committees, to the General Treasury, and those referrible to His Majesty's Forces, will be disposed of in conformity to the War Office Regulations, with the exception of unclaimed Shares of Native Establishments, which will be remitted to the Treasury; in either case, the Acquittance Rolls will be furnished as above directed.

11th. Copies of the Proceedings of the Regimental and Station Prize Committees, are to be carefully preserved by the General Prize Committee.


