Overland Letters, &c.

1. Notice is hereby given for general information, that all Letters and Newspapers, intended for transmission by the Overland Mails, except Soldiers' or Sailors' Letters, and except those specially marked via Falmouth, are forwarded via Marseilles.

2. Soldiers' and Sailors' Letters, certified by their Commanding Officers, are transmitted via Falmouth, whether so directed or not;

as if sent through France, they would be subject to a heavy rate of Postage.

3. Letters and Newspapers, addressed to France, as well as those to other Foreign Countries, to which France serves as a channel of communication (provided the latter are specially addressed to be so sent,) are forwarded via Marseilles, but Letters for Foreign Countries, other than France, when not specially directed via France, are included in the Packets for England.—Letters &c. for places lying between Bombay and Marseilles, are made up separately, and directed to Cairo, Alexandria, Malta, and Marseilles.

POSTAGE.

Letters for the United Kingdom, weighing less than a quarter of an Ounce, sent via Marseilles, are charged Single Postage, which by that route is.....2s. 8d.

By the Falmouth route Letters of half an Ounce in weight, are subject to Single Postage only, which by that route, has now been reduced to.....1s.

Newspapers if sent via Falmouth, are free of Postage, but if transmitted by the way of Marseilles, they are charged 2d. each. They should however be kept open at the ends, or they are liable to be charged the Letter rate of Postage.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information, the following Lists of Duties levied on all articles of Trade arriving at, and departing from, Shikarpore.

List of Duties levied upon all Articles of Trade or Consumption, arriving at, or departing from, the Town of Shikarpore, as also those paid upon the same when bought or sold in the Market, with a detail of the various heads under which the said Duties are levied.

First.—Most Articles entering Shikarpore pay Duties under 5 heads.

- 1st "Chowkee" (outside the Gates)
- 2nd "Durwazeh" (in passing ditto)
- 3rd "Chibooturee" to the Dorogah (1st Custom)
- 4th "Tarazon i Killan" (2nd Custom House.)
- 5th Tarazon i whil i Bazar (Bazar Transactions)

Second.—Some of these Duties vary according to the direction from which the Goods are brought, whether Bhowulpore, Mooltan, Jeysulmeere, Marwar (Palee) Kurrachee (Sewistan) Khorassan, and Cutchee.

- On Flour of every description from any direction, 4 pice per maund.
- On raw Goats skins, 1/2 pice per skin.
- On raw Cotton thread, country manufacture, 4 pice per 1 Rupee ad val.
- On Shields, 5 pice per maund.
- Cotton tree blossoms, 5 pice per maund.

The above 6 heads apply also to Articles brought from the neighbourhood of Shikarpore.

On goods arriving at Shikarpore from Cutch or Khorassan, "Chibootree" is levied under another term "Mahal ibatalah" and with it the duties of Kotewallee, "Choongie" and "Bundyann Kotewallee" claimed by the Kotewaul of the town, "Choongie" in kind from packages, and "Bundyann" originally appropriated to religious purposes, all these are however now brought to the account of Government, and claimed as lawful dues—A slight distinction is occasionally made between Hindoo and Mahomedan traders, in amount of duty paid.
